It's Pressure Difference, Not Wind That Makes Tornado Destructive

While it may not be possible to construct buildings that will survive the center line of a path of an intense tornado, a Kansas State University civil engineer argues that much of the loss of life and property caused by tornadoes could be prevented by relatively simple, and relatively inexpensive, construction techniques.

struction techniques.

Dr. Michele G. Melaragno, an assistant professor of architectural structures, points out in a pamphlet, "Tornado Forces and Their Effects on Buildings," that building codes in earthquake-prone areas require earthquake resistant designs and that these designs have increased costs very little. He believes tornado-resistant designs also could be achieved at nominal cost.

Melaragno concludes from information available that most of the damage from tornadoes is caused by pressure differential, together with wind pressure. A building enveloped in a tornado

funnel is surrounded by a pressure lower than the pressure that existed before the funnel enveloped it. Unless there is a way for the air to escape rapidly, the building literally explodes. When the funnel passes on, the situation is reversed, with the pressure load being directed inward on the building as the air seeks to rush back in.

"Damage to well constructed buildings is due to the explosive force of pressure differential, rather than to direct wind action," he emphasizes.

The amount of "venting" necessary in a building so that air could move in or out rapidly without damaging the structure would depend, to some extent, on the acceptable velocity of air entering or leaving. For instance, in a home low velocities would be desirable to avoid, or limit, damage to household objects.

Melaragno cites two sources with estimates for venting a home. One suggests 12 square feet for a one story house 30 by 40 feet in size; the other suggests 10 to 15 per cent of the outside wall area be vented.

Reinforced concrete structures have shown marked su-

periority over other types of structures in resisting tornado damage. But structural steel structures probably would give equivalent resistance, Melaragno says, if they had rigid connections or equivalent bracings to withstand the horizontal forces better.

Even wood frame houses can be made much more stable and tornado-resistant if certain elements are designed as integral parts of the frame. Among things Melaragno suggests are placing of partitions and exterior walls parallel to the direction of the wind, using extra nails to permit the wood sheathing to be stressed to maximum limits and using steel wires (they could be relatively small) to brace existing studs diagonally.

One thing often overlooked, but which Melaragno thinks of major importance, is the psychological considerations. He believes some people would gain a great deal of satisfaction to know they lived in a tornado-resistant house, and he suggests that builders test the market to see if buyers would respond.

ny Brook, told a hearing of State Department of Natural Resources that the pesticide should no longer be tolerated.

Wisconsin last month began the national battleground struggle between conservationists and the pesticide industry when the Natural Resources department opened hearings and petition to severely limit use of DDT.

The department has jurisdiction over Wisconsin's waterways which ecologists have been dangerously contaminated by DDT and other "persistent" pesticides that do break down readily into constituent elements but for years in air and water build up in the bodies of birds, animals and humans.

Wurster and other scientists from outside Wisconsin testified here that DDT, the world's most widely-used pesticide since its introduction in general use during World War 2, has had a devastating effect on fish and birds and through such species as the bald eagle with extinction.

"With many effective alternatives of low-toxicity available," Wurster testified, "there is justification for further use of DDT."

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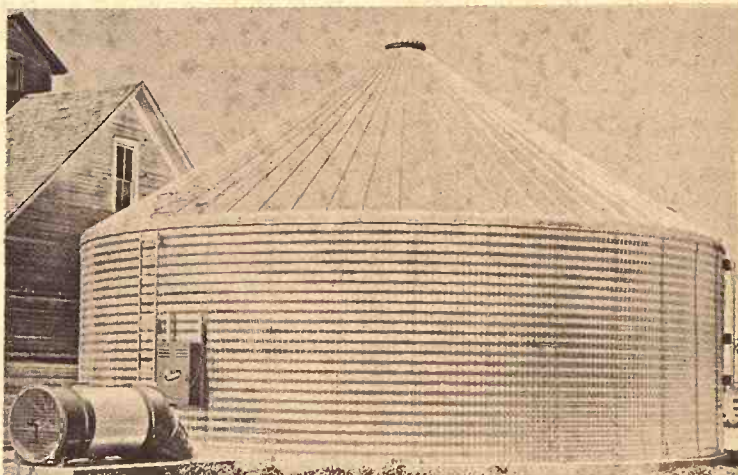
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member of the powerful appropriations committee.

Pearson, Dole Like Committee Assignments

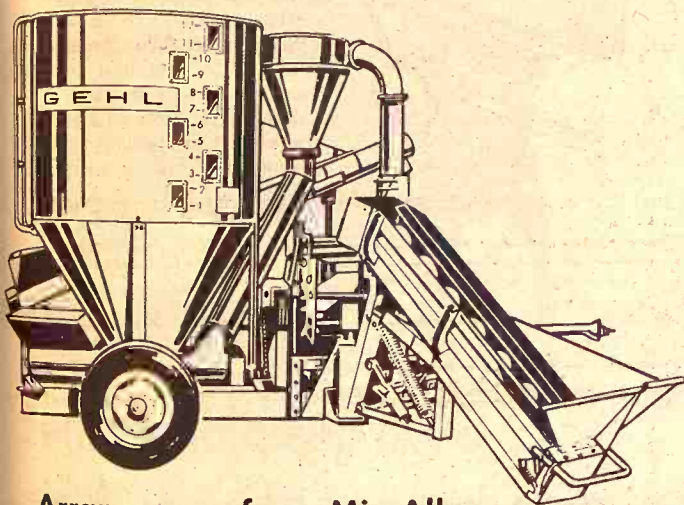

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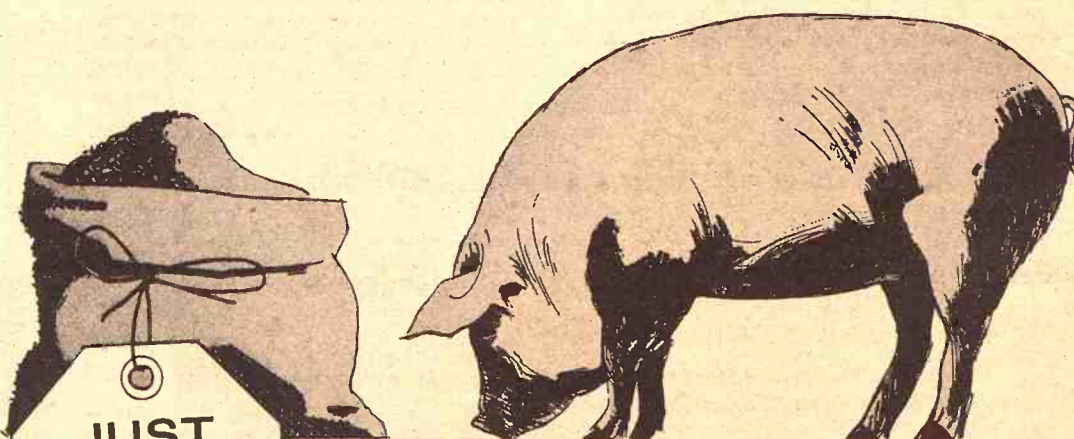

**No Shortage
In Hay Supply**

On January 1 this year hay supplies stored on Kansas farms were the fourth largest for the

date in records dating back to 1937 according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The estimated 36 million tons on hand was 4 per cent less than a year earlier but 16 per cent more than 2 years ago.

The 1968 hay production in Kansas was 10 per cent less than during 1967 but carryover stocks last May 1 were relatively large. A generally mild open fall with better pastures than a year ago limited the use of hay early in the feeding season, but recent cold weather stepped up feeding rates.

Milk Production

Milk production during December on Kansas farms was estimated at 136 million pounds. Production was up 1 per cent from the previous month and unchanged from the same month a year earlier.

Average milk production per cow during December was 665 pounds, a record high for the month, but the number of cows in milking herds was the smallest in many years.

Egg Production

Kansas egg production during December totaled 79 million eggs. This is 4 million eggs above November but 2 million

eggs below December a year ago.

Average daily rate of lay was up almost 3 eggs per 100 layers from November. The number of layers in Kansas poultry flocks averaged 1 per cent more than during November.

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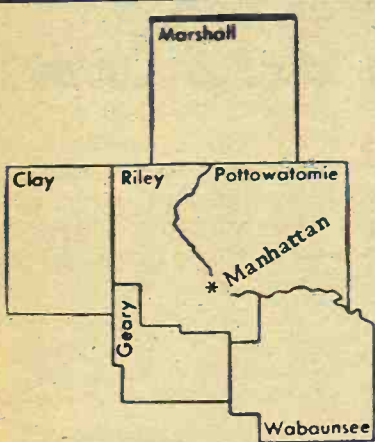

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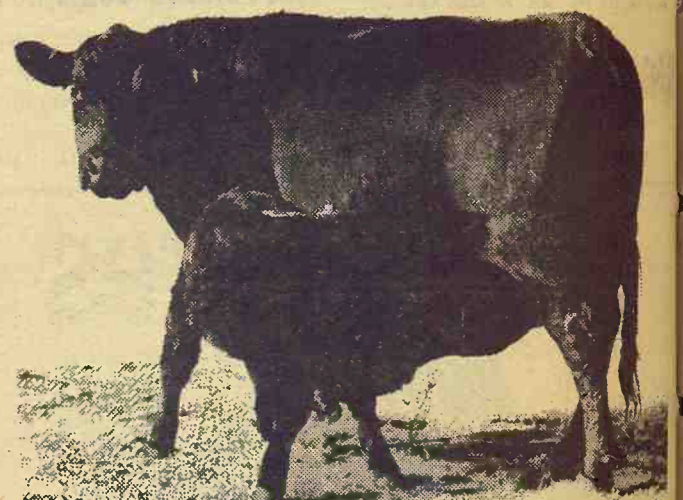
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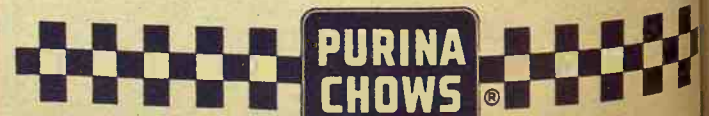

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Net Farm Income \$15 Billion

American farmers harvested some of the largest crop yields in history during 1968 to help boost their net income to the fourth highest level on record.

Bumper crops of wheat, corn and soybeans were offset by sagging cash market prices during seasonal peaks which forced farmers to place large amounts of their grain under federal price support loans.

Direct payments to farmers for participating in government production control programs were expected to total a record \$3.5 billion, compared with \$3.1 billion in 1967.

Overall, farmers netted around \$15 billion after paying their production expenses, compared with \$14.2 billion last year. Their 1968 net income, Agriculture Department officials said, was by the record \$16.2 billion in 1966.

Excellent growing weather contributed most to the increased output. Not only grain crops, but cotton, fruit and dairy production benefited by improved conditions.

More feed and better pastures meant larger meat production to fill the rising demand by con-

sumers who also were enjoying a higher living standard.

But farmers' production costs continued to rise and by late fall were a record 358 per cent of the Agriculture Department's base period of 1910-14 used to show financial comparisons. The traditional "parity ratio" used to indicate farmers' purchasing power in relation to costs hovered around 73-74 per cent for much of the year.

Net income per farm, however, averaged about \$4,900, up sharply from \$4,526 in 1967, and was the second highest in history, exceeded only by the \$5,000 per farm in 1966.

Gross farm income this year was about \$2 billion more than the \$49.1 billion of 1967, the department said.

Total farm debt was reported increasing around 7 per cent from the \$49.9 billion reported last Jan. 1, officials said.

The value of farm real estate climbed again and totaled nearly \$194 billion, up about 6 per cent from a year earlier. The average price of farm land — including buildings — was \$178 an acre, compared with \$167 the year before.

Net income per farm, as well as average investment and costs, rose also because of the continuing trend to larger farms and fewer farmers.

The Agriculture Department estimated the farm population at around 10.5 million persons, compared with 10,875,000 in 1967 and 15.6 million in 1960.

Farm employment showed a slightly slower rate of decline this year. The average — including farm operators and hired labor — was estimated at 4,750,000, compared with 4,903,000 in 1967, and 5,214,000 in 1966.

Livestock production was high in 1968, aided by strong market prices and high consumer demands.

Ample supplies of livestock

feed continued for red meat, and fairly strong prices are expected to keep inventories of early 1969 at least.

Crop production next year depends in part on to what extent farmers decide to participate in federal programs for such crops as feed grains, wheat and cotton. The new administration is expected to adhere fairly close to existing programs for 1969 crops already planted or being planned, is expected to go slow on major recommendations until later in the year.

Game Agency Backs New Laws

Seven proposed items to be sought during the 1969 session of the Legislature were endorsed Tuesday by the Kansas Fish and Game Commission at its monthly meeting.

Among the proposals was a new boating law that would incorporate a number of new water safety measures, call for the state, and conform with federal regulations now required on many Kansas lakes.

Other proposals include: — Clarification of the present scuba diving law on the placing of buoys.

—Placing the hunting and possession of rabbits under jurisdiction of the commission as is the case with all other game animals in Kansas.

— Elimination of coyote and predator hunting during the firearms deer season.

— Allowing hunters to ship legally harvested game across Kansas borders.

—Raising the non-resident animal hunting license fee from \$15 to \$25.

— Require a bond from agents handling hunting, fishing and other commission licenses.

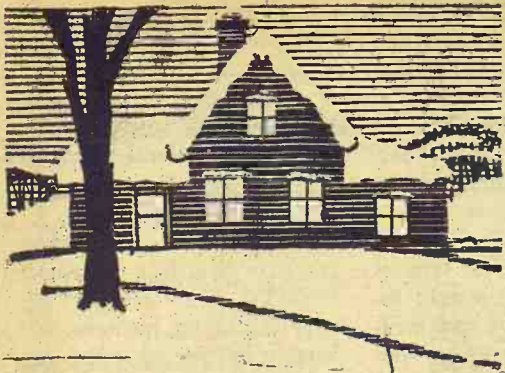

OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

Winning Recipe Sent By Mrs. M. E. Zeller, Manhattan

The winning recipe is from Mrs. M. E. Zeller, Route 1, Manhattan:

- 1/4 cup Shortening
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 well-beaten egg
- 1 cup bran
- 2 tablespoons water
- 1 1/2 cups crushed banana
- 1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Cream shortening and sugar; add eggs, then bran; mix thoroughly. Combine water and bananas, mix them thoroughly, then add vanilla and nuts. Bake in greased pan, 9 1/2 x 5 1/4 x 2 1/4 inch loaf pan in moderate oven (350 degrees) for one hour.

Mrs. Layton McCandless, R 1, Fontana, submitted the following recipe:

HARVEST SALAD

- Drain:
- 1 can kidney beans
 - 1 can golden wax beans
 - 1 can green beans
- Add:
- 1/4 cup slivered celery
 - 1/4 cup slivered onions
 - 1/4 cup slivered green peppers
 - 1 can cooked sliced carrots, drained
- Put all in large bowl.

DRESSING

- 1/3 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 cup Wesson oil
 - 1/2 cup mild vinegar
 - 2 tablespoons catsup
 - 2 tablespoons mustard
- Pour dressing over vegetables but do not stir. Let stand overnight. Drain and pour again over vegetables but do not stir. Serve cold.

The recipe below is from Clara Floy Prymek of Cuba:

RHUBARB CRISP

- 1/2 cups raw or frozen rhubarb
- 1 cup granulated sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

- 1/2 teaspoon mixed ground spices
- 1 cup sour milk or sweet milk with 1 teaspoon vinegar
- 2 cups all-purpose flour

Cream sugar, shortening and egg. Stir in sour milk, soda, spices, flour, salt and vanilla. Beat for three minutes at medium speed or 300 strokes with spoon. Add rhubarb cut in small pieces and chopped nutmeats. Pour in 9x14-inch oblong pan, greased and floured. Sprinkle crumbled mixture of 1/4 cup sugar, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon oil with a little mixed spices on raw batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 30-35 minutes.

Mrs. Vail McClintock of Beloit sent the next recipe:

OATMEAL CAKE WITH TOPPING

Place in mixing bowl 1 1/2 cups boiling water; 1 cup quick cooking oatmeal; 1 stick of oleomargarine; 1/2 cup cocoa. Cover. Let stand 20 minutes.

Add: 1 cup white sugar; 2 eggs; 1 1/2 cups of flour; 1 teaspoon each of soda, cinnamon, salt. Mix well. Bake in oblong pan, 350 degrees, for 35 minutes.

TOPPING

2 tablespoons oleomargarine; 1/4 cup evaporated milk; 1/2 cup sugar (brown or white); 1/2 cup coconut; 1/2 teaspoon of vanilla; 1/2 cup of nuts. Spread on cake while still hot. ("I find some-

Open Office For Spillman Creek Watershed Project

LINCOLN — The USDA Soil Conservation Service office has opened in Lincoln. The opening is the first step in project construction of the Spillman Creek Watershed.

Engineer in charge is C. Rex Molineux, former project engineer at Hiawatha.

The engineering staff will begin a survey for design and construction of 21 flood-retarding dams and two grade stabilization dams in the 119,360-acre watershed.

Approximately 82 per cent of the watershed area is in north-west Lincoln county above Lincoln. The watershed also takes in portions of Mitchell, Osborne, and Russell counties.

Construction will take about seven years.

When completed, the project is expected to have an average annual flood protection benefit of \$159,000.

The Lincoln watershed office will also serve the adjacent Upper Salt Creek Watershed (201,990 acres) and Lower Salt Creek Watershed (91,955 acres) in Lincoln, Mitchell and Ottawa counties.

The Salt Creek projects have been approved by Congressional Committees and are awaiting authorization of funds.

The three projects are expected to result in benefits more than double the cost, according to Leslie Johnson, Assistant State Conservationist, Salina.

\$1 Million Check To Repay State For Asphalt Fix

Atty. Gen. Robert Londerholm displayed a \$1 million check last week, the first money to be drawn by the state from \$1,060,000 paid into the Shawnee County District Court by six firms in settlement of a highway asphalt antitrust suit.

Londerholm said 80 per cent would be placed in the state highway fund and 20 per cent in the state general fund.

Londerholm brought suit against 12 defendants for \$11.21 million on grounds they conspired to fix the price of highway asphalt sold the state from January 1959 through Feb. 28, 1965.

Remaining defendants which have not reached settlement with the state are still technically liable for the full \$11.21 million, Londerholm said.

The attorney general said the state went ahead and drew the first \$1 million from the settlements so the money could be placed in state funds drawing interest from Kansas banks.

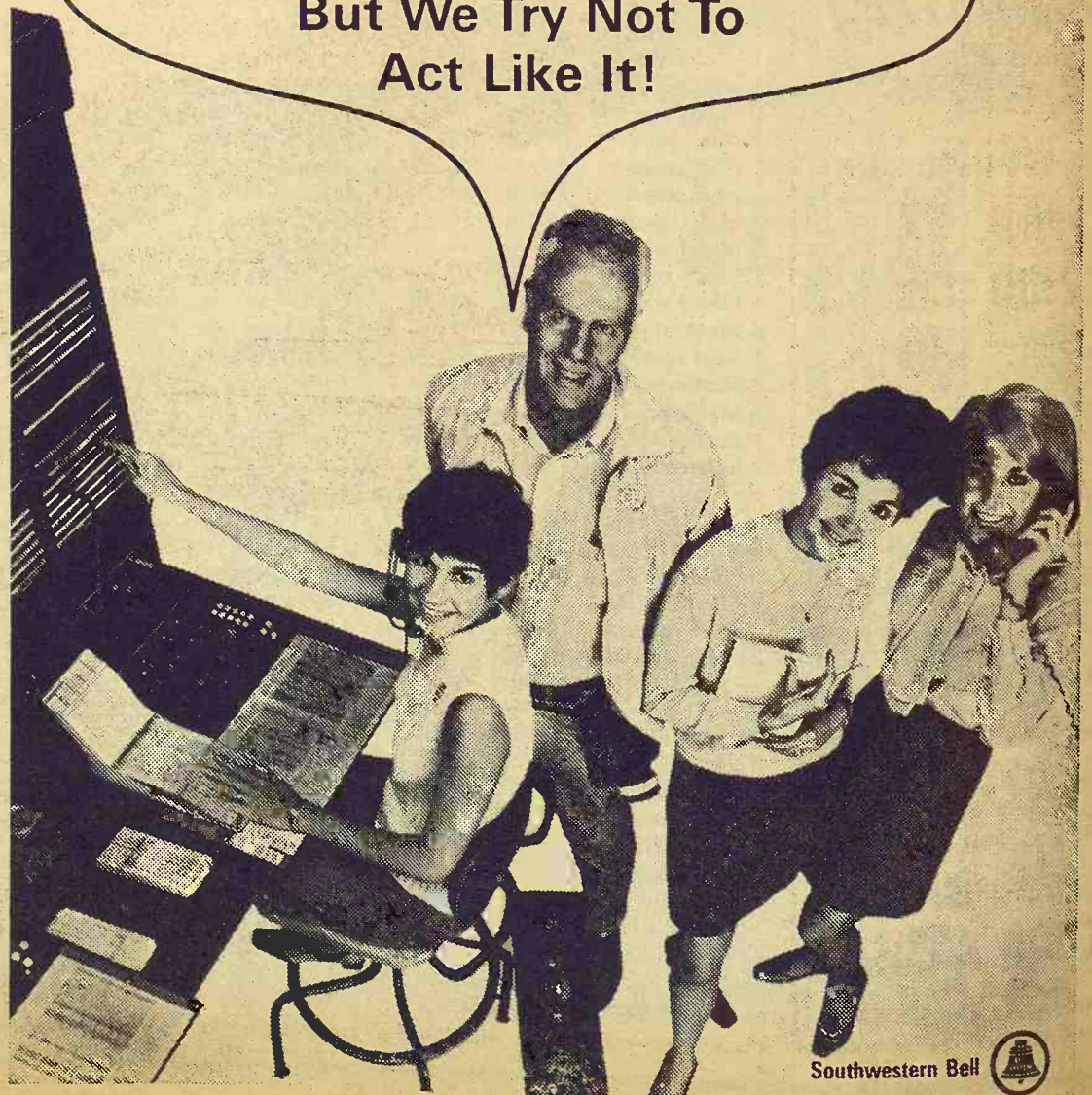

Poultry Troubles Soon?

The poultry industry may be in for serious trouble by late 1969 or 1970 if the hatch of egg type chicks continues to increase.



This warning comes from a Kansas State University Extension economist, M. E. Jackson. He says that egg prices during July-December 1969 may be 5 or 6 cents a dozen lower than year earlier levels if production continues to climb.

Hatch of egg type chicks last November was up 27 percent from a year earlier. Eggs in incubators December 1 were up 27 percent from December 1, 1967.

ST. PAUL, Minn. — About twice as many beef cows can be carried per acre of cropland on a drylot system, as compared to conventional pasture systems, according to a five-year study conducted by University of Minnesota animal scientists.

J. C. Meiske and R. D. Goodrich say the economic feasibility of the drylot system compared to the pasture system depends on differences in labor costs, in addition to the differences in land area required.

The scientists found weaning weights of the calves raised in drylot were less than those of calves raised on pasture. Fewer accidental losses of animals oc-

Number of eggs set in 1967 was rather low. However, a continued 25 to 30 per cent increase each month will soon create problems, Jackson warns.

If it materializes, this continued expansion will again bring about pressure for some type of production control. The industry is working on a program for "self control" of production. Such a program could benefit the entire industry, Jackson points out, but must have the support of all areas of production to succeed.

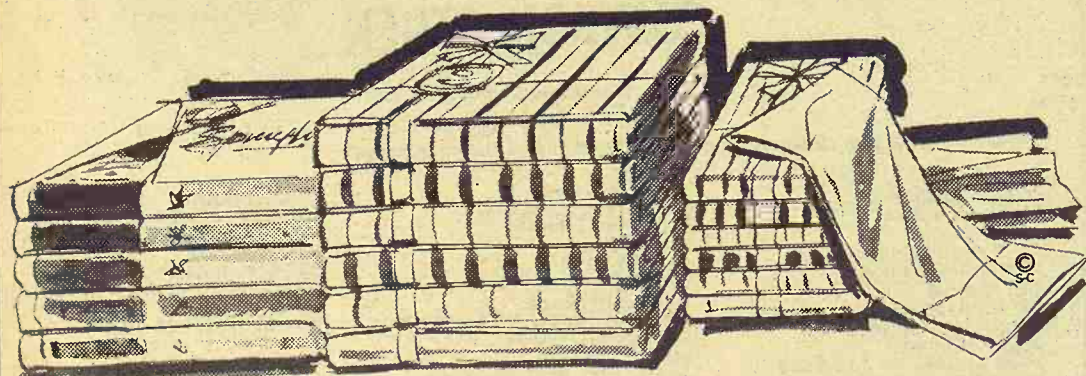

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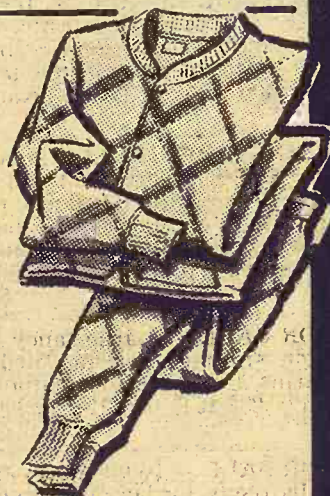

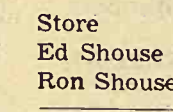

Corn Yield Up To 78 Bushels

In December of each year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture issues a 100-page report called Crop Production, Annual Summary. This publication contains state and national estimates of the production of all major crops for the year.

No one expects these figures to be perfect, but they are generally accepted as the best that are available. They are carefully studied by producers and buyers in the United States and in many foreign countries. We will summarize the statistics on corn and other feed grains.

Corn. The 1968 corn crop is estimated at 4,375 million bushels. This amount is 8 percent less than the 1967 crop, but is 6 percent larger than the previous record crop of 1966.

The 1968 corn crop was smaller than that of 1967, mostly because of the smaller acreage planted and harvested in 1968. Farmers planted 64,787,000 acres in 1968, 9 percent less than in 1967. They harvested 55,707,000 acres for grain, 8 percent less than in 1967.

The national average yield of corn in 1968 is estimated at 78.5 bushels per acre. This yield is one-tenth of a bushel less than the estimate for 1967, but it is 6.2 bushels more than the previous record, which was set three years ago.

Illinois Loses First Place (?) Illinois lost its leadership in corn production — maybe. Official estimates show Iowa at the top with 901,728,000 bushels, and Illinois second in a photo finish

with 901,570,000 bushels. The difference, according to our one-finger computer, is two-hundredths of one percent. But no crop estimator claims such accuracy, so it appears that Illinois and Iowa tied for first place in corn production in 1968.

The Illinois corn crop of 902 million bushels was down 16 percent from the record out-turn of a year earlier.

Illinois clearly lost first place in yield of corn per acre in 1968. The state average yield is estimated at 89 bushels. Four states had higher yields: Iowa and Wisconsin had 93 bushels per acre, California had 95 bushels, and Washington had 97 bushels. (Much of the corn in California and Washington is grown under irrigation.)

The 1968 Illinois yield of 89 bushels per acre compares with 100 bushels in 1967 and with 85 bushels for the five-year 1962-1966 average.

Good Corn In Other States. Corn yields in most other states were higher in 1968 than in 1967. The 93-bushel figure reported for Iowa was 4½ bushels over the 1967 figure and 12 bushels better than the five-year average. Minnesota, with 81 bushels, had 9 bushels more than in the previous year. The Missouri average of 83 bushels was 14 more than that of 1967. Other midwestern states with higher yields in 1968 were Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Kansas, South Dakota, and North Dakota. But Nebraska, like Illinois, had poorer corn this past year

than in 1967.

Other Feed Grains Increase. The cut in U.S. corn production in 1968 was partly offset by increased output of other feed grains. The oat crop is estimated at 930 million bushels, up 18 percent from 1967. Barley production was 418 million bushels, up 12 percent. And the sorghum grain crop is estimated at 739 million bushels, down 2 percent from the year before. Total production of these three feed grains was 43 million tons, up 7 percent from 1967.

Total U.S. production of the four feed grain crops — corn, oats, barley, and sorghum grain — in 1968 was 168 million tons, 5 percent less than in 1967. Most of this shortage was caused by the disappointing corn crop in Illinois.

Slowdown In Farm Exodus

For the first time since 1959 there was no major decline in farm employment in 1968.

The Labor Department said farm employment averaged 3.8 million workers last year, only 27,000 less than the prior year. In 1967 there was a decline of 135,000 and in 1966 a 382,000 cut.

Department experts think the farm-to-city migration may be easing.

An Agriculture Department analyst notes that consolidation of farms is also slowing. The number of farms declined less than usual last year. These trends could foreshadow a slower rural-to-urban population flow, some Government experts predict. One official says there's already "some evidence the exodus to the cities is slowing."

Unemployment among hired farmhands averaged 6.3% last year, lowest since 1953.

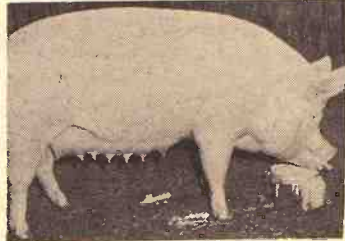
State Lottery Falls Short

Now a year and a half old, New York state's lottery is bringing in even less revenue in its second year than it did in the first, when receipts were only a fraction of predictions.

Started in June 1967, the lottery, aimed at bringing in revenue for schools — averaged about \$5 million a month in sales in the first year. After six months of the second year, monthly sales are down to \$4 million.

Neighboring New Hampshire has not fared any better. Last

year New Hampshire netted only about \$500,000 on its lottery, short of the \$2.7 million netted in the first year and shorter yet of the \$4 million predictions.

In New York, lottery tickets are bought for \$1. For every million tickets sold, 480 prizes are awarded. The prizes range from \$150 up to \$100,000. Since November, when the number of prizes was increased from 240 to 480, there have been fewer large prizes and more smaller awards.

The purpose of the lottery as designed was to catch the dollars of the inveterate gambler for state purposes rather than have them go to racketeers.

Unfortunately, based on a year and a half's returns, the chance-takers still would rather

do their business with bookie operations and other illegal gambling. Some say the underworld promoters offer better odds, accept lower stakes, and pay winners daily, making tough competition for government-sponsored gambling.

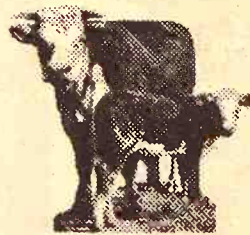

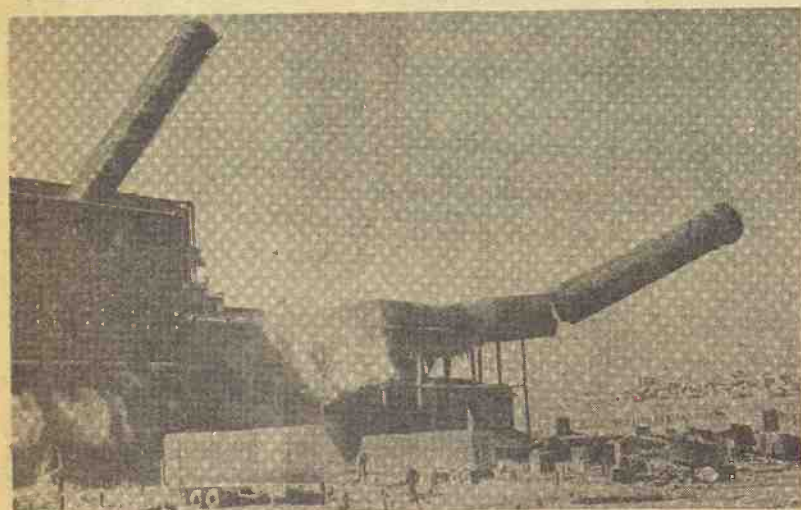
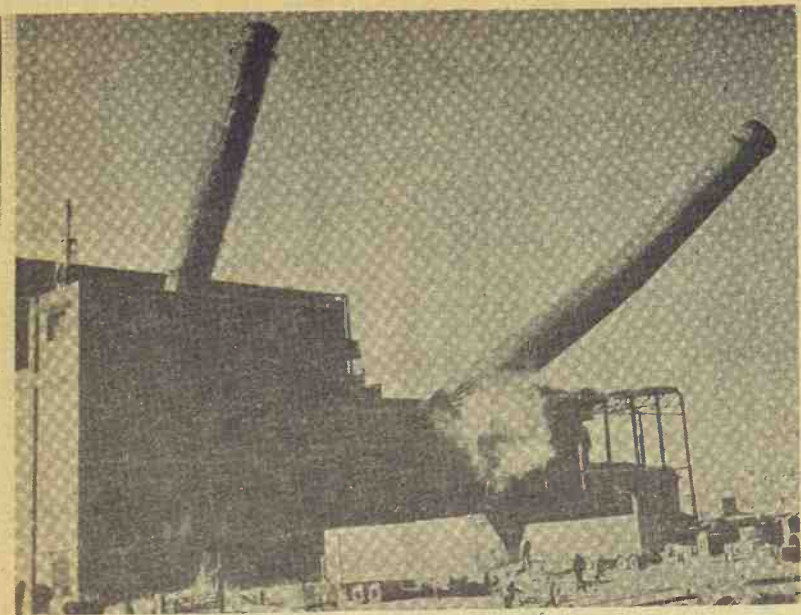

National York Meeting At Ark City

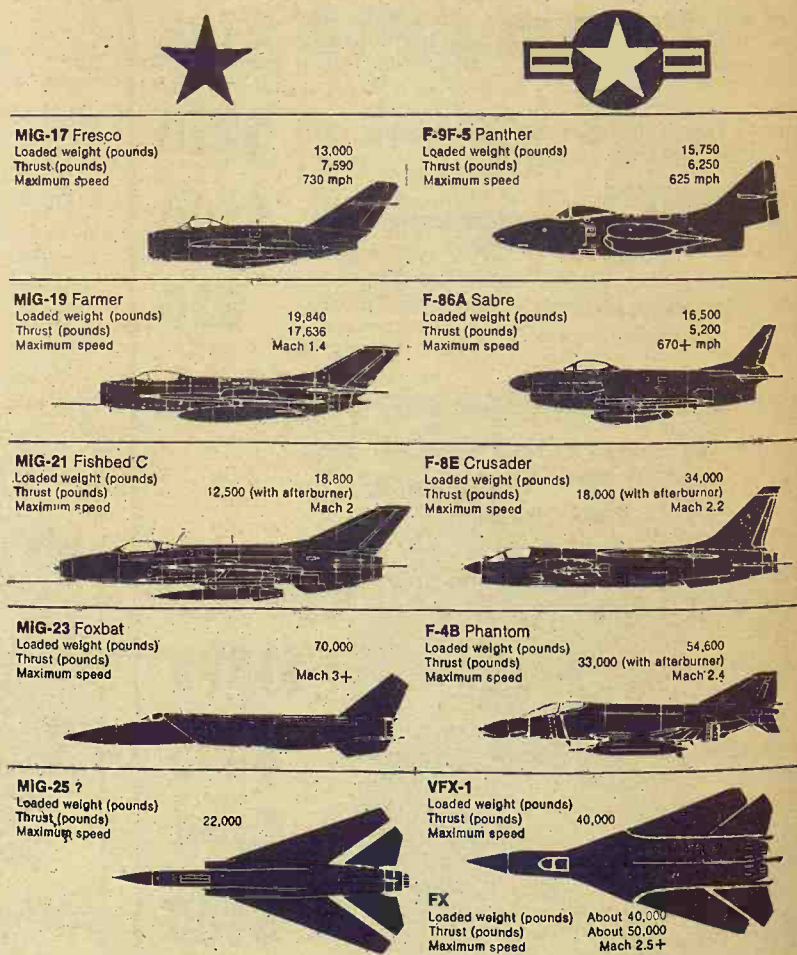
The G&G area will be the site of a national livestock breeders meeting when Ark City will be host to the annual meeting of the American Yorkshire Club and to a York Type Conference on January 23-24-25.

At least 87 breeders from 18 states have entered 360 head of boars, bred and open gilts, plus a possibility of a record number of pairs of littermates for certification at the conference. Kansas has 11 breeders who will be exhibitors.

Among those who will be helping with the show are (top line) Kansas hog breeders Wallace Wolf of South Haven, Jasper DeVore of Ark City, and John Weir of Geuda Springs.

Kansas State University livestock specialists who will be there include Wendell Moyer, Don Kropf, and Robert Hines.

Many of the accommodations at the meeting will be provided by the Maurer-Neuer meat packers, which headquarters in Ark City. Among the men will be Jim McGinn, Karl Faidley, and Bob Bickford.



U.S.-Soviet Air Comparison

The Navy is expected to announce soon the contractor for the VFX — a carrier-based jet fighter to replace the ill-fated Navy F-111B.

The new fighter — to be designated the F-14A, will weigh about 50,000 pounds and is expected to cost about 7.3 million each.

The United States has not designed a completely new fighter in 10 years but the Soviet Union reportedly has a whole arsenal of new fighters. One Soviet plane especially, called Foxbat by NATO code, is the Mig-23 which is said to be capable of speeds up to Mach 2.8 for more than 18 minutes and with a dash speed of Mach 3.

The chart above makes some comparisons of US and Soviet air power.

New USDA Undersecretary Campbell Was Foe Of Meat Inspection Law

President-elect Richard Nixon's choice of J. Phil Campbell for under secretary of agriculture will place responsibility for enforcing the controversial 1967 federal meat inspection law in the hands of one of its leading opponents.

The law, still a year away from full implementation, has the effect of extending federal standards for purity and wholesomeness to all red meat sold in the United States.

It requires the 15,000 meat packing plants operating within state borders to meet the same sanitation standards as packers who do business across state lines.

If states fail to enforce the law by 1970 the Agriculture Department is required to step in and take over inspection duties.



New Ag Assistant Phil Campbell

Campbell, who will resign as Georgia commissioner of agriculture to take the No. 2 job in the federal department, was a leading critic of the meat inspection bill in hearings before the Senate Agriculture Committee. But his appointment has stirred little, if any, reaction in the upper chamber.

The question of Campbell's views on the meat bill still are virtually certain to be raised when his appointment comes before the Senate for confirmation.

Iowa Democrat Neal Smith, a sponsor of the bill in the House, has denounced the appointment, calling Campbell "one of two or three most prominent in opposing the new act."

"Linked with Nixon's statement that there will be no independent consumer advocate in government, the appointment of Campbell gives the green light to the dirty meat people," he said.

Smith's reference to an independent consumer advocate referred to Nixon's decision to do away with the job of special assistant to the president for consumer affairs, now held by Betty Furness, and assign the duties to the Health, Education and Welfare Department.

At his home in Watkinsville, Ga., Campbell denied that he is an enemy of the consumer.

"I said at the time that we were not opposed to it (the meat inspection law)."

Campbell explained that he favored the original version of the bill, which left meat inspection up to the states. He said he opposed the Senate version because the bill made meat inspection a federal responsibility.

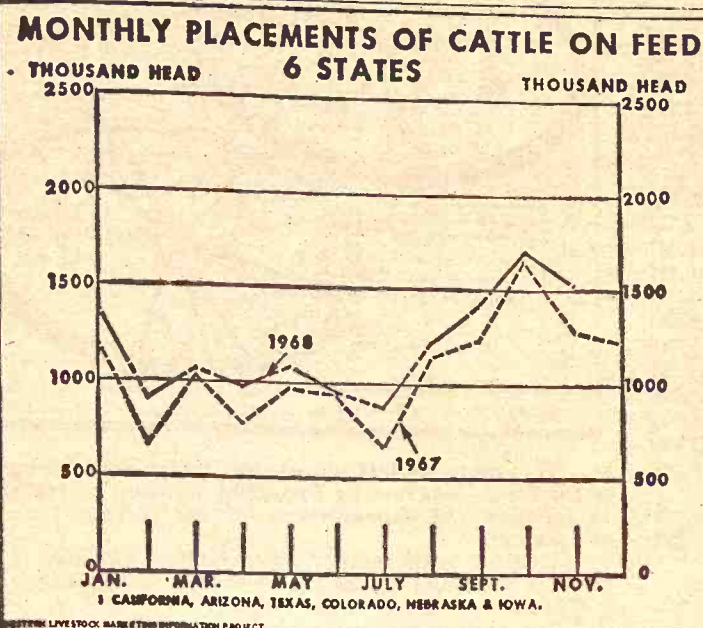
Looking into the future, Campbell said he saw no major changes in agriculture policies.

"We'll be taking a good hard look at the Agriculture Department in the first few months," he said. Clifford Hardin, nominated to be secretary of agriculture, has planned a series of meetings with farmers to hear their discussion of current problems, he added.

As undersecretary, Campbell will have direct control over the meat inspection law, including decisions as to whether the states have met the deadline in

complying with federal standards.

The 1967 slipped all but unnoticed through the House, but by the time it reached the stage of Senate hearings it had become the center of a raging dispute between consumer spokesmen and meat packers.



More On Feed

Cattle feeders in the six states for which monthly data are available placed 10% more cattle on feed in October-November than a year earlier. The 4% increase in October placements was followed by an 18% increase in November.

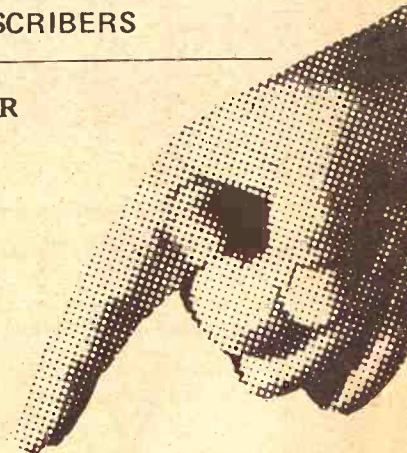

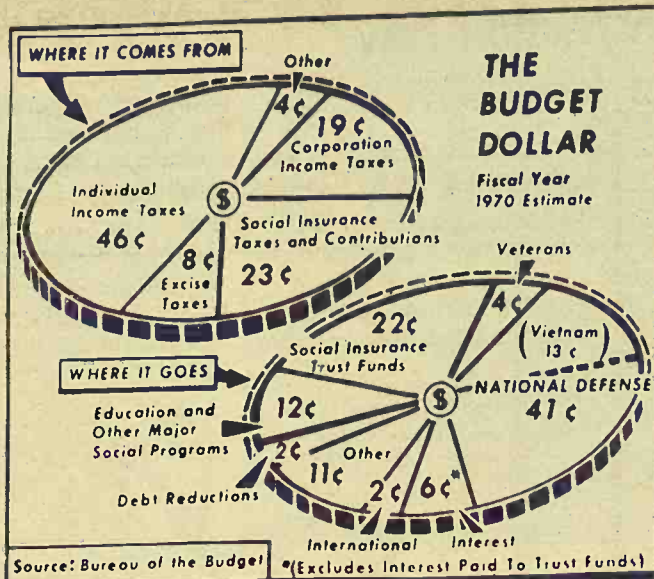

The table at left shows the fiscal 1970 budget as outlined to Congress by President Johnson as compared to receipts and expenditures for the current year and the past year.

Johnson anticipated a \$2.4 billion surplus in the current year and the budget for 1970, as estimated, has a \$3.4 billion figure in the black.

The budget "pie" above puts the figures in terms of percentages of each dollar that comes in and goes out. Of the 41 cents out of every dollar going to defense, 13 cents is spent on the Vietnam war.

Gas is free here, a result of living over one of the largest gas storage areas in the U.S. A gas field was depleted about 30 years ago, but Cities Service Gas Co. leased the old wells underlying the town to store gas. For the lease Cities Service agreed to supply gas without cost to the town of Welda.

The Welda storage wells receive gas from Texas and supplies various area towns including Garnett, Ottawa, Atchison, and Kansas City.

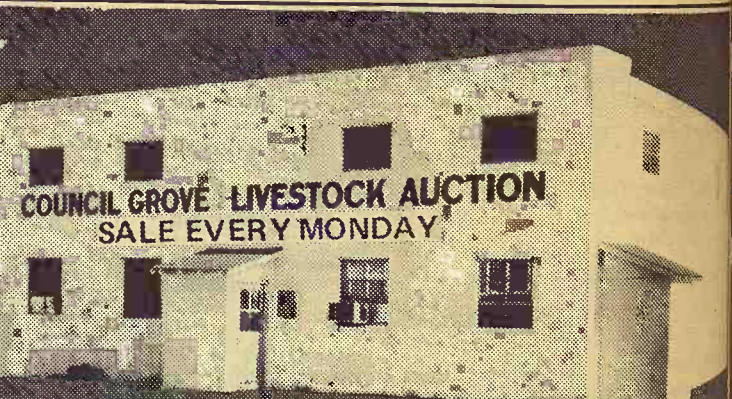

State Irrigation Over 1 1/2 Million Acres

Irrigation farming in Kansas will expand another 80,000 to 90,000 acres this year. This will be newly developed systems ready for production by June, Russell Herpich, Extension irrigation engineer at Kansas State University, says.

This expansion brings the total irrigated acres in Kansas to over 1 1/2 million acres.

Herpich gave several reasons for this expansion. "The main reason is that irrigation farming is purely a business venture," he said. This is in contrast with the past when irrigation was used as insurance against drought.

Great increase in demand for feed grains in Kansas calls for expanded production in the near future. Irrigation can give a big boost in yields, but maybe not enough. The engineer predicts more cattle will be fed in southwest Kansas in the next 10 years than available grain will feed.

Kansans are gaining a greater appreciation for the value of water, leading to more interest in irrigation development, he says. Irrigators who can control water application can experience greater control of the total resources they have for crop and livestock production.

An awareness of a growing need for expanded income with a given land resource is another reason farmers are looking to irrigation. Their costs are rising and irrigation development helps them meet higher production expenses.

Historically, Kansas is one of the older irrigated areas of the United States, Herpich says. Following World War II, irrigation of alfalfa, grain sorghum, and wheat expanded rapidly.

Nearly half of Kansas' irri-

gated acres are producing grain sorghum, 1/4 are in corn, and 1/6 are in wheat.

Ten years from now about 2 1/2 million acres will be irrigated in Kansas, Herpich estimates. This represents about 10 percent of the present acreage devoted to crop production.

Irrigation expansion predictions can only be based on the size and location of known water supplies in the state, Herpich cautions. Further consideration is the amount of these water supplies that are made available for irrigation, and also the application of present technology.

If any of these factors should change significantly, irrigation development could change accordingly, Herpich points out. Importation of water can change this outlook greatly.

"Economic impact of irrigation expansion in Kansas is not presently fully appreciated or evaluated by citizens of the state," Herpich says. He explains that additional production and expenditures necessary for development of this natural re-

source will add considerably to economic growth and stability of income.

Carey Salt Of Hutchinson Sold

One of Kansas' largest home-owned industries, Carey Salt Co. of Hutchinson, is being acquired by a New Jersey firm, Interpace Corporation.

The 68-year old Carey Co., still essentially a family corporation, will exchange its stock for 150,000 shares of Interpace. Interpace common stock has recently sold for slightly more than \$100 a share.

Carey produces and markets table salt, livestock salt, and salt used in various industrial and chemical processes. Sales last year were nearly \$7 million.

Interpace is presently building a facility at Mankato which will produce filter aids, fillers and insulation materials from a mined silica source. The plant is expected to be in operation early this year.

It also has plants at Turner and Wichita, both of which manufacture concrete sewer and water transmission pipe.

Interpace mines and markets numerous nonmetallic minerals for industrial uses throughout the world. It also serves the consumer market with commercial and home dinnerware. Its products for the construction market include various types of concrete and clay pipe, ceramic building products and precast architectural members. Its sale total around \$125 million annually.

Livestock Turn To Long-Range Boom

A bright future for Kansas agriculture is pictured by Dr. Paul L. Kelley, head of the agricultural economics department at Kansas State University, in reporting on long range studies by university staff members.

Dr. Kelley's projections are in terms of hundreds of millions of dollars. He sees a steady annual increase which will result in totals that are staggering when compared with former years.

The most dramatic gains will be in livestock production, but tremendous growth also is possible in the wheat sector. There are more "ifs" in the wheat projection because expansion in sales is tied almost entirely to exports.

The wheat export volume depends on economic growth in importing countries and on U.S. foreign aid policy. The amount of wheat the U.S. (and the Kansas) farmer can export will be determined in part by how much this country is willing to give away or to sell under conces-

sions.

But the demand for livestock products, pork and beef, comes primarily from American consumers, and this demand is increased not only by a growing population, but by a rise in the average income level. As Kelley sees it, Kansas will be providing an increasing share of the total meat production.

The "milo belt" which includes Western Kansas, parts of Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas and Colorado, is where the biggest boom is on in commercial cattle feeding lots. Dr. L. S. Pope, associate dean of agriculture at Texas A&M University, recently predicted that this plains area would become within less than 10 years the most concentrated beef producing sector in the world.

Beef is the big Kansas item. Yearly per capita beef consumption in the United States increases. Per capita consumption is double what it was before World War II. It is this fact that lends credence to projections of future expansion.

"Our analysis indicates," Kelley said, "an increase of U.S. consumption of beef from 36.3 billion pounds in 1966 to more than 49.5 billion pounds in 1980. That is a 36 per cent increase or about 2.5 percent a year.

"We translated that increase to production potentials for Kansas. In 1966, we produced about 2.2 billion pounds of all classes of beef. We project production of 3.9 billion pounds by 1980 or about an 80 per cent increase. This is a growth rate of 5.5 per cent a year. But this is not an exaggerated projection when we look at 1966 when Kansas marketed 14.6 percent more grain-fed cattle than in 1965. From all indications, we maintained a 10 per cent growth rate in 1968. Continuing at that rate, we would more than double by 1978.

"Considering that meat production already is by far the greatest income producer in Kansas, the potential for development of Kansas' total economy is too vast to be readily comprehended."

While it is true that the big boost in Kansas cattle feeding has been in the commercial feedlots, this has not been entirely at the expense of the farmer-feeders, Kelley said.

"Our data indicates," he added, "that since 1962, farm feedlots, except extremely small ones, have been holding their own. Studies by Dr. John McCoy in our department of economics indicate that well-man-

aged efficient farm feeders will be around for some time."

The Kansas State research team has projected a 26 per cent increase in U.S. consumption of pork by 1980. The team estimated that this would result in a 30 per cent expansion in Kansas.

"Kansas really has a strong competitive position in marketing pork," Kelley said. "Our data indicates that hog production has been expanding more rapidly in Western Kansas than elsewhere in our state or in the United States as a whole."

Farming is the largest single industry in Kansas, and livestock and livestock products have for several years provided more than half of the state's farm cash receipts. But with all farm products, the income story isn't complete with just farm receipts. Many related industries in Kansas benefit tremendously. Kelley mentioned meat packing and processing, the feed industry, livestock equipment, livestock supplies, veterinary services, transportation, marketing and insurance.

"Dr. Jarvin Emerson of our department of economics has just completed a study that provides information not previously available," Kelley said. He divided the state into 69 separate industries or sectors and considered the interrelationship among them, that is, how they buy and sell from each other and to other sectors outside Kansas.

"Eased on the 1965 data, his study shows that sales by cattle and hog sectors were \$596,977,000 and \$100,852,000 respectively — a total of \$697,829,000, or more than any other sector in the state."

The importance of cattle and hog sales can be evaluated, Kelley said, by relating sales of

other leading Kansas sectors. Ranked by sales, typical examples:

Meat packing and processing according to Kelley, contributed \$590,639,000. Add cattle, hogs and meat processing together and it comes to \$1,288,468,000. By a large margin livestock and its processing became the largest state industry. Thus a big growth in the livestock industry will contribute correspondingly to the state's economic development.

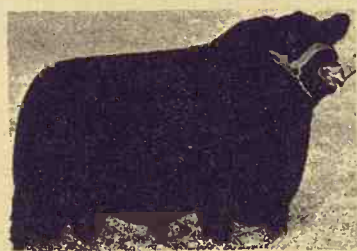

Two-Thirds of Farm Assets In Real Estate

A balance sheet of agriculture issued annually by USDA since 1940 estimates that U.S. farmers had a moderate increase in their assets in the past year amounting to about 4.5%, almost all of it from price increases rather than real capital accumulation.

The estimated \$283.5 billion in assets includes all the farmer owns — his land, livestock, machinery, stored crops, cash, and investments. For every \$100 in assets a farmer has, he owes about \$18 in debt, about half in real estate and the rest in borrowing for other production and personal items.

Here is how the current balance sheet itemizes: (in billions of dollars)

The total of \$283.5 billion compares with \$52.9 billion in 1940, when the USDA first started to assemble the information.

The pattern of having the bulk of farm asset value gains coming from price increases rather than real capital accumulation has continued for two decades.

However, the appreciation in market value of farm assets in recent years is of positive value to the farmer. Farm owners

often make use of appreciated values by offering the property as security for new mortgage loans. The borrowed money is then available for productive uses or for further investment.

About two-thirds of the total investment is in land, with land values rising about 6% in the past year. The highest percentage of increase was in the Southern Plains and Northern Plains regions. The lowest relative gains occurred in the Mountain and Northeast regions.

Not all farm real estate is owned by the farmer who tills the soil. It is estimated that about a third of this is owned by nonfarm landlords.

Nationally, the value of farmland and buildings averaged \$178 an acre and an average of \$69,100 per farm.

Farm Bureau Plug For Income Tax Base For Schools

The Kansas Farm Bureau is promoting a finance plan which would place the burden of financing public schools on an income tax base rather than the present property tax base.

The education finance plan, outlined in a brochure being distributed by the Kansas Farm

Bureau, the Kansas Electric Cooperatives, and other farm groups, provides a better base for financing school operations than the property tax, says Clarence Rupp, director of research for the Kansas Farm Bureau.

"An income base," Rupp says, "meets three essential requirements. It is a base that grows with growing needs. It is a base with far less variation among school districts than the property tax base. And, as evidenced by the steady growth of total personal income and per capita

income in Kansas, an income base is capable of producing a steady flow of revenue to finance elementary and secondary education."

Details of how those "three essential requirements" are met are continued in the brochure. Also included are suggested procedures to be used by the state director of revenue and county clerks in order to establish income as the tax base for local school districts.

Move To Join Wheat Voices

BOISE, Idaho — The National Association of Wheat Growers Thursday moved toward merging Great Plains Wheat Inc. and Western Wheat Associates, giving United States wheat one voice in the international marketplace.

In their 19th annual convention here the NAWG asked for a study toward merger of the two major international marketing organizations for wheat together with the commodity outlook provided by the national association.

Observers at the convention

said they believed the move could decrease some duplication of effort in marketing wheat overseas. The move would put Great Plains Wheat Inc., Western Wheat Associates and the wheat group under a combined effort to market wheat.

They elected E. L. Hatcher, Colorado wheat grower, president; Gene Moos, Washington state wheat grower, vice-president; and Ora Martin, Ulysses, Kans., secretary treasurer.

Glen Hofer, former Washington wheat producer, was renamed executive vice president to represent wheat growers in Washington, D.C.

The group, in an apparent effort to head off possible legislation which would decrease hard-won gains through legislation the past several years, expressed strong opposition to limiting payment for compliance with farm programs and to a massive land retirement program in order to decrease production.

They voted to ask parity prices for wheat going into the export market.

UNEMPLOYMENT RATE TO 15-YEAR LOW

The rate of unemployment in the U.S. fell to a 15-year low of 3.3% of the labor force at the end of 1968. Unemployment for Negroes was also at a low point since the Korean War.

MARQUETTE HIGH SCHOOL FUTURE IN DOUBT

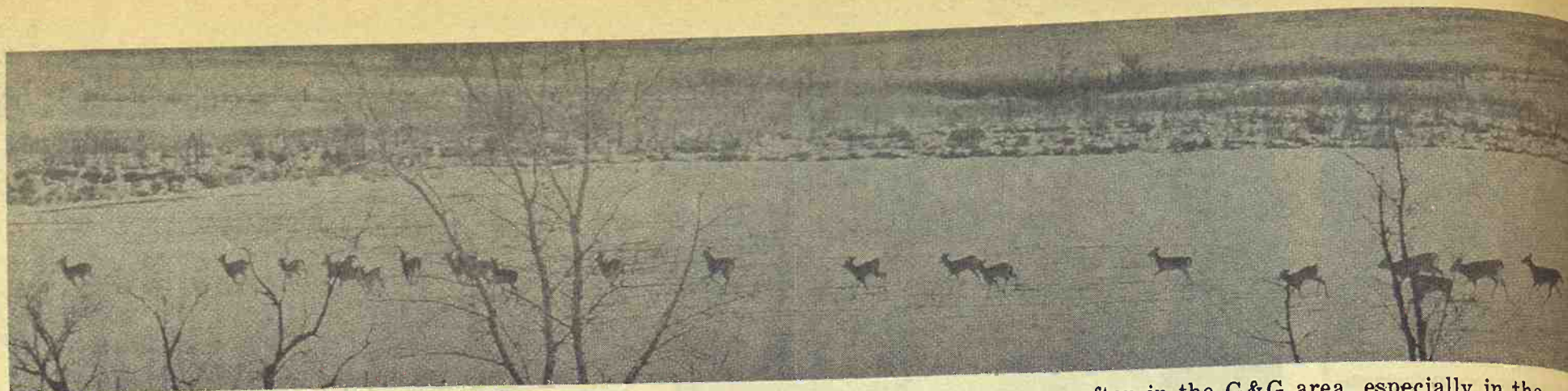

Crop Improvement Assn. At Hutch Next Week

HUTCHINSON — How to produce and market quality seed will again be the main topic of discussion at the annual Kansas Crop Improvement Association meeting here, Friday, January 31.

The 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. program at the Baker Hotel will include several crop improvement reports, awards to premier seed producers, a noon luncheon, and a business meeting, reports Howard D. Wilkins, secretary-treasurer of the organization.

The morning session will feature a quartet of Kansas State University specialists. Ted L.

Walter, crop testing agronomist, will review "New Crop Varieties;" Dr. H. Leroy Brooks, Extension entomologist, will suggest "Insect Control Recommendations for 1969;" Dr. Richard L. Vanderlip, research agronomist, will discuss "Research on Sorghum Germination;" and Wilkins will explain "Changes in Seed Certification."

A featured portion of the luncheon will be a slide presentation by KCIA Vice President Lester Ewy, Partridge, on his "People to People" visit to Czechoslovakia and Russia.

"Hybrid Wheat" will get featured treatment in the afternoon from Dwight Glenn, Manager of Wheat Development for the DeKalb Agriculture Association, Wichita.

Wilkins will make his annual business report on the past

year's operation of KCIA during the business meeting, and the group will select three new directors and new officers.

O. R. Caldwell, Emporia, KCIA president, said that this self-supporting organization has a mailing list of more than 2000 farmers and businessmen interested in the production and distribution of pure seed of known superior heredity.

Start Survey On Western Kansas Water Levels

How fast are the underground reservoirs of water in Kansas being depleted?

This week about 15 geologists and engineers working out of the State Geological Survey offices in Garden City and Colby will be measuring water levels in many wells in the western fourth of Kansas, checking the extent of water level declines resulting from the ever-increasing withdrawal of ground water for irrigation.

Extensive withdrawal of ground water for irrigation in Grant and Stanton counties already has brought significant declines in water levels — declines sharp enough to cause some irrigators to redrill, deepen and otherwise rehabilitate their wells.

Omaha Has Shaky Hold On Stockyard Title

The Omaha stockyards' proud title of "world's largest livestock marketing and meatpacking center" is shaky at best, and may no longer be true.

For the first time in 14 years, Omaha's Union Stockyards was surpassed in total number of livestock received. St. Paul, Minn., reported total receipts of 4,912,326 animals to 4,295,086 for Omaha in 1968.

Omaha's claim to being No. 1 is based on retention of the lead in the "salable livestock" category. Last year, Omaha reported 3,780,817 head of livestock sold. Sioux City, Iowa, was second with 3,338,395 and St. Paul third with 3,219,900.

Salable livestock are those actually sold through competitive bidding at the stockyards. Total receipts include all livestock that goes through the stockyards, whether or not they are sold there. Some animals bought directly by packers are held at the stockyards until they can be

slaughtered.

"The salable figure is the one reported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture," said Robert McCreight, president of the Omaha stockyards. "As far as I'm concerned, we're still the No. 1 market."

Omaha became the world's largest market in 1955 when receipts passed those of Chicago. Chicago continued ahead salables until 1959 when Omaha pulled ahead.

Omaha's total receipts of 4,295,086 last year compared with 6,764,140 in 1955.

Major packers have been trimming their Omaha operations. Cudahy does no slaughtering. Armour slaughters only beef and Swift has announced plans to close this year.

TOPEKA — The 28th annual meeting of the Kansas Electric Cooperatives was held Monday and Tuesday. The first electric cooperatives in Kansas were organized in May 1937. There are now 37 electric co-ops serving 98,000 consumers with nearly 60,000 miles of power lines.

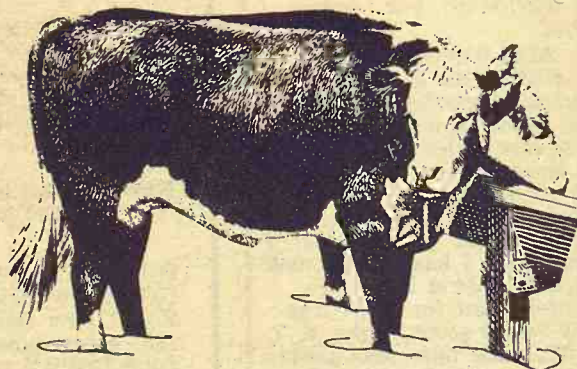

Kansas Farms May Soon Average A Section In Size

Kansas farms are getting closer to an average section of land per farming unit. The estimate from the Kansas Crop Reporting Service is for a 568-acre average farm in 1969. The 1968 average was 551 ac-

res, up from 512 in 1965, 417 acres in 1955, and 274 in 1935. The Reporting Service says there are 88,000 farms as of the first of 1969, about 3000 fewer than a year ago and 25,000 fewer than 10 years ago. Farm numbers have declined

steadily since 1935 when they were double the present number. Total land in farms is estimated at 50.0 million acres. This is slightly less than the 50.1 million acres in 1968, with some land taken out of farm production by highways, reservoirs and urban development.

Nationally, Texas and Montana were the only states to exceed Kansas in total land in farms. Texas led the nation in number of farms, while Kansas ranked 15th among the 50 states.

Arizona had the largest average farm size of 7233 acres while North Carolina, which had an average size of farm of 99 acres, was the smallest among the states.

A total of 2,976,310 farm units are expected to be in operation during 1969 in the U.S. This is a 3% decline from 1968.

The 1969 preliminary estimate of land in farms is 1.123 billion acres. The exact figure is four million acres less than in 1968.

Since 1959 farm numbers have declined slightly more than one-fourth, while land in farms has decreased only 5%. Discontinuation of small farming enterprises and the merging of larger units continue as an important influence in the change of farm numbers.

State Spent Billion Dollars

TOPEKA — For the first time in its 108-year history, state government in Kansas spent more than \$1 billion in a single 12-

month period.

In fiscal 1968, which ended June 30, 1968, the state's total expenditures were \$1,054,097,129.72. The previous fiscal year, the total was \$964,309,485.05.

The figures were contained in the recently released annual financial report, prepared by the state department of administration.

The total for fiscal 1968 was larger than the \$619.6 million appropriated by the legislature. The extra dollars came from unrestricted federal grants and from no-limit fee accounts.

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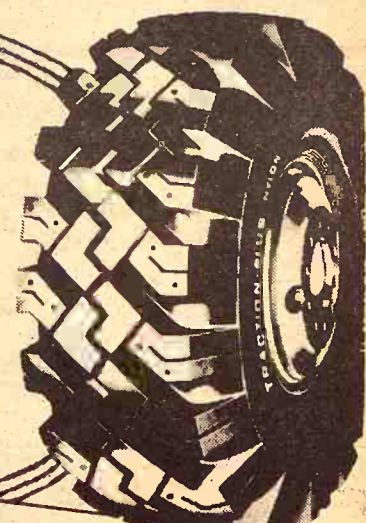

Big Machines Harden Plowpans

As Kansas farmers increase their use of heavy machinery, the problem of "hardpans" or "plowpans" will grow more serious.

Dr. Orville W. Bidwell, a soil scientist at Kansas State University, explained that constant packing of the soil by machinery, plus tilling it to a constant depth, often results in "plowpans" of two to four inches thick directly under the tilled or plowed layer.

"Drought seems to accentuate these layers, making them more dense, if anything. He added these plowpans become virtually inaccessible to wheat and sorghum roots.

"Often we find descending roots making a 90 degree turn to a horizontal position rather than penetrate the dense layer," Bidwell said.

Plowpans keep plant roots at the surface, rather than allowing them to penetrate to deep soil moisture, result in increased runoff, and prevent easy pen-

etration of the soil with tilling, seeding or fertilizing equipment.

"The plowpan may prevent setting a drill deep enough to get good germination, or prevent getting fertilizer deep enough into the soil for maximum effectiveness," he added.

Bidwell said he is particularly concerned about applications of gaseous anhydrous ammonia, which need to be inserted deep enough into the soil that little escapes to the atmosphere.

Kansas farmers who haven't been concerned with plowpans should be, Bidwell said. An easy way for a farmer to determine if he has a plow pan is to dig a hole 15 inches deep and then slice off the side of the hole.

Close examination will reveal the tilled layer at the top, the untilled layer at the bottom, and the layer in between — the plowpan.

Farmers who have a troublesome plowpan should seek the advice of their county agent or soil conservation technicians.

That's A Lot Of Manure

Here's a new problem for a problem-beset country. It's manure.

The stuff is piling up so fast that it's becoming a major pollution problem, the Four States Irrigation Council was told at Denver.

Concentration of cattle in feeding lots has resulted in animal manure production of more than two billion tons a year, enough to cover a square mile 10 feet deep every day in the year.

Litton Eyes Giant Farm Supply Centers

National Farm Stores, Inc., (NFSI), Minneapolis, Minn., and the Retail Services Group of Litton will arrange financing for a planned nationwide chain of NFSI Agri-Business Centers, a new mall shopping center concept designed to provide all the needs of farmers on a 40-acre tract.

Harry A. Steffen, president of NFSI, said each center would cost a minimum of \$3 million to build and current plans call for construction to start on 20 centers throughout mid-America in 1969. He said each center is expected to produce an estimated \$20 million in annual sales.

Steffen said specific locations have been surveyed between the Appalachian and Rocky Mountains, and plans for construction of the first centers will be announced within 90 days. Eventually centers will be located in every agricultural state, including Kansas and Nebraska.

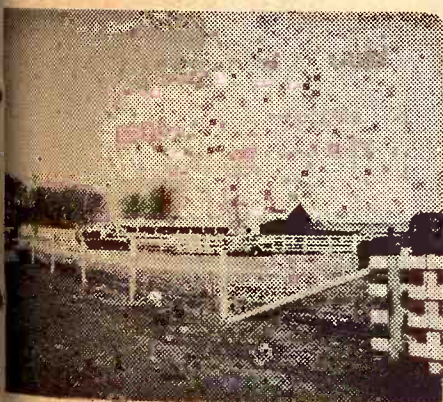
