Feedlot Count Down By 13 Percent

Cattle on feed—July 1, 1967
Cattle and calves on grain feed for the slaughter market in Kansas on July 1, 1967, totaled 402,000 head, according to the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service.

This is 13 percent less than the record high number on feed for this date last year, and down nearly one-fourth from the number on feed April 1.

Large feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or more were feeding 244,000 head of cattle and calves, a record number for this type of operation at mid-year.

An additional 158,000 head were being fed in farm feedlots, 30 percent less than last year and down 37 percent from April this year.

Steers and steer calves made up 6 percent of the cattle on feed July 1, compared with 65 percent last year.

Marketings of grain-fed cattle during the April-June quarter totaled 356,000 head, compared with 296,000 for these same months in 1966.

Cattle and calves placed on feed during the quarter were estimated at 237,000 head, compared with 275,000 placed a year earlier.

As of July, some 222,000 head had been on feed less than 3 months compared with 268,000 a year ago.

Those on feed 3-6 months totaled 155,000 head, 11 percent less than last year. Those on feed over 6 months totaled 25,000 head, an increase of 25 percent over a year earlier.

Numbers on feed by weight classifications included 18,000 head weighing over 1,100 pounds, 112,000 head weighing 900-1,099 pounds, 168,000 head weighing between 700-899 pounds, 99,000 head from 500-699 pounds and only 5,000 head weighing less than 500 pounds.

The average daily ration of farm-fed cattle on feed consisted of 19.4 pounds of grain, 1.6 pounds of high protein feed, 2.2 pounds of hay and 4.8 pounds of silage.

Kansas feeders intended to market 260,000 head of grain-fed cattle during the July-Sep-

tember quarter of this year or 65 percent of the total number on feed July 1. If realized, this would be 12 percent less than during the same period last year.

Major Feeding States

Cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market on July 1, 1967, in 32 major feeding States totaled 8,724,000 head, 2 percent less than a year earlier. Decreases from a year earlier in the number on feed weighing between 500 and 899 pounds more than offset increases for the remaining weight groups. The 3,844,000 head placed on feed during the past quarter was 1 percent above placements during the comparable period in 1966. Marketings of 5,614,000 head during this period were up 9 percent. The July 1 number on feed was 17 percent below the number on feed April 1 this year as compared with a 13 percent decrease during the same period last year.

Weight, Kind & Time On Feed

The July 1 number of cattle and calves on feed in the 32 states by weight groups showed greater numbers in the light and the heavy groups, while the middle weight groups were below a year earlier.

The number in each weight group and percentage change from July 1 last year are as follows: under 500 pounds, 400,000 head, up 18 percent; 500-699 pounds, 1,900,000 head, down 8 percent; 700-899 pounds, 3,697,000 head, down 6 percent; 900-1,099 lbs., 2,313,000 head, up 7 percent; 1,100 pounds and over, 414,000 head, up 12 percent.

Cattle feeders had 6,159,000 steers and steer calves on feed July 1, 1967 — about the same as a year earlier. Heifers and heifer calves, at 2,540,000 head, were down 6 percent. Cows and others on feed totaled 25,000 head on July 1 compared with 32,000 a year earlier.

The 3,631,000 cattle and calves on feed less than 3 months was about the same as a year earlier, the 3,045,000 head on feed 3-6 months down 3 percent and the 2,048,000 head, on feed 6

months or longer, down 2 percent.

Marketing Intentions

Of the July 1 number on feed, cattle feeders intend to market 5,073,000 head during July, August and September. This would be 2 percent above July-September marketings last year from July 1 numbers.

Old WPA Lake Is Sold

WAKEFIELD — A Wakefield woman, Mrs. Alice Carpenter, was highest bidder Monday for the purchase of the Old Wakefield lake and park.

Mrs. Carpenter bid \$4,550 for the 13-acre lake and 43-acre park located about a mile west of Wakefield.

The park was put up for sale by Clay County when a new park was constructed on the banks of the Milford Reservoir. The lake and park were built in 1935 by the Works Progress Administration and were part of the first water conservation program in Kansas under the WPA.

Co-op Refinery Raises Price

McPHERSON — The National Co-operative Refinery association announced it had raised the price it pays for 23,000 barrels of crude oil a day.

The increase of seven cents a barrel on crude in Kansas and Oklahoma brings the price to \$3.15 a barrel, except in Southwestern Kansas and Panhandle areas, where it puts the top at \$3.07 a barrel for 40- to 44.9 gravity oil.

The increase is retroactive to July 10, when Phillips Petroleum started the latest round of price hikes in Kansas.

National Co-operative's increase came shortly after Champlin Petroleum announced a new higher price of \$3.15 for Oklahoma oil.

Mail Has \$100 Million In It —It's Certificate Payment

Barring mail mixup, Kansas farmers should have opened mail worth \$100 million last week.

Nebraskans in the G&G area should have gotten theirs too, or should early this week anyway.

Wheat certificate checks rolled out the Government's New

Orleans Commodity Office last week, a most welcome stream to hailed-out, rained-out, weed-grown Kansans.

The payment program this year was designed to get money to farmers with more speed and efficiency than before.

Under the 1965 Food and Agriculture Act, the per bushel price of domestic wheat certificates is set according to parity price on July 1 each year.

Certificate value is determined by parity price, less loan guarantee price of \$1.25. Since parity was \$2.61 a bushel July 1, 1967, the certificate for 35 percent of the crop — the amount used in domestic consumption — is worth \$1.36.

The number of certificates a farmer gets is computed on the historic average production per acre in his county. He gets the certificates whether or not he is able to harvest any wheat in a given year.

Under the pilot check-writing program this year, the New Orleans Commodity Office was scheduled to "write" the checks for Kansas farmers.

Ed Jaenke, associate director for ASC, U.S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D.C., Monday, explained this process:

● After the final plow-up date and compliance verifica-

tion, county ASC offices forward reports and records to the State ASC office.

● The State ASC office sends the transcripts to the New Orleans office prior to June 30.

● July 1, the domestic certificate amount is set and computation begins on the basis of reports from the states.

● This was completed and check-writing equipment readied and the "go ahead" from the secretary of agriculture was given "more than 10 days ago," Jaenke said.

Only verification of the amount and a countersignature will be required before the checks can be mailed, officials said.

Varied Outlook For Poultry And Eggs

Almost everyone is interested in the poultry and egg business. Many farmers produce eggs, chickens, or turkeys. Other farmers grow the feed crops — principally corn and soybeans. Feed processors and dealers also have a stake in the business, as do the processors and retailers of poultry and eggs. Producers of cattle and hogs are also concerned because they compete with the poultry people for feed and for markets. Finally, almost everyone in the United States is a consumer of eggs, chicken, and turkey.

The outlook for poultry and eggs recently was assessed by a group of specialists known as the Poultry Survey Committee. They come from universities, the USDA, and the poultry industry. Some of their findings and forecasts were as follows:

EGGS

During the remainder of this year, egg production will be slightly slower than it was in 1966. But by next spring egg supplies are expected to be lower than they were this past spring.

Average prices received by U.S. farmers are expected to be around 32 cents a dozen in the third quarter of this year, 34 to 35 cents in the fourth quarter. These prices are about 7 cents lower than those in the last half of 1966.

The Committee expects egg prices to average around 35 cents in the winter quarter, about the same as last winter. The average price next spring (April-June) was forecast at around 31 cents, 2 cents above this year's prices.

BROILERS

Low prices in recent months checked the expansion of broil-

er production, but supplies during the remainder of this year will be near or slightly larger than the record levels of last fall and winter.

Prices received by farmers for broilers were forecast at slightly below 15 cents a pound during the remainder of this year, slightly above 15 cents for the first half of 1968. July-September prices are likely to be slightly lower than last year,

while the prices expected this fall and in the first half of 1968 should be slightly higher than one year before.

TURKEYS

Farmers are producing about 122 million turkeys this year — 6 percent more than in 1966. Cold-storage holdings are believed to be around 150 million pounds, about twice as much as last year.

Average prices received by U. S. farmers for turkeys during the main marketing season (August-November) were forecast at 21½ cents a pound, 1 cent less than last year.

FEED COSTS

If weather conditions are normal for the remainder of this growing season, poultry feed costs should decline from the levels of this past year.

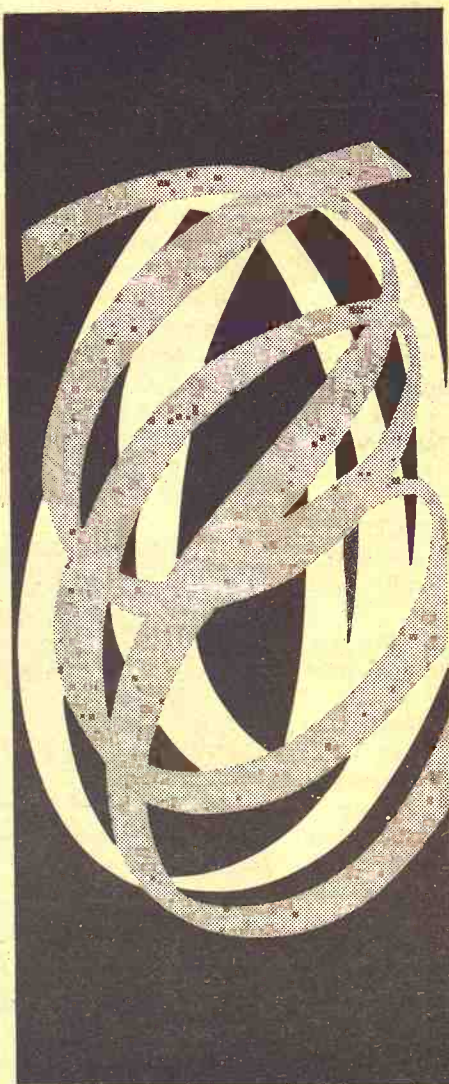

40% Of '68 Wheat Crop May Earn Certificate

Reports from the wheat areas around the world seemed to indicate this month that United States Department of Agriculture rulings for the 1968 wheat crop compliance may be of benefit to the average farmer.

The national support level will remain at \$1.25 a bushel, but domestic marketings estimated at 530 million bushels will make 40 per cent of the farmer's crop eligible for a marketing certificate.

Each marketing certificate this year was worth \$1.36 a bushel since parity was \$2.61 a bushel July 1, date when certificate value is set by law.

Some farm organizations and legislators are seeking to get 50 per cent of the value of domestic marketing certificates advanced to the farmers ahead of harvest time when the average farmer's cash balance is down and his needs for operating expenditures are greatest. This is in the spring and early summer seasons.

According to the National Association of Wheat Growers figures, the federal government sends out about \$700 million in certificate payments. Of this amount, 75 cents a bushel is paid to the government by the millers and processors.

Those advocating a date change for the certificate payment claim that half the amount — \$350 million — could be paid four months early, thus saving the farmer about \$7 million in interest payments alone. This assumes of course, that the farmers have to borrow operating capital each spring at a 6 per cent interest rate.

The proposed law change allowing this is House Bill 6437

submitted by Rep. Robert Dole, R-Kan., and other wheat state congressmen.

Under the 1968 regulations sent out by the secretary of agriculture, other rulings are:

- No acreage diversion program is planned for the 1968 crop.

- The substitution clause will be effective allowing farmers to plant wheat on feed grain acreage and substitute for oats and rye on the same basis as the 1967 program. Barley, if it is not used in the 1968 feed program (still to be announced) may also come under the substitute clause on an acre-for-acre basis.

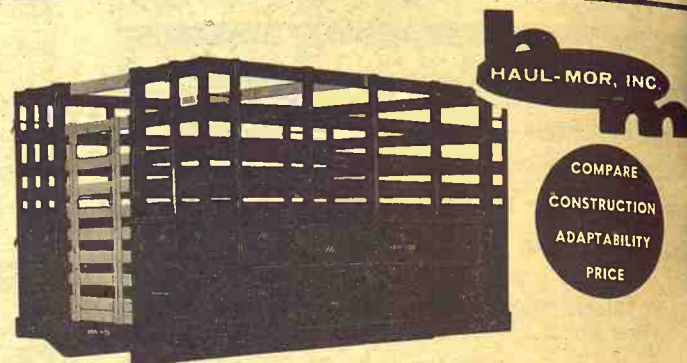
- The 'excess wheat option' may be exercised again in 1968. This means a wheat farmer

can overplant his acreage by not more than 50 per cent if the excess production is stored and the farmer complies with all other terms of the program.

- 1968 conserving bases will be increased by the same amount for 1968 that they were decreased in 1967 by the additional 15 per cent wheat acreage increase sought by the government last summer.

This conserving base would be the same as it was under the 55 million-acre wheat planting level set up by the 1965 Food and Agriculture Act.

This 55-million-acre normal planting has been increased by legal additions to the "15-acre farms" to 59.3 million acres, which is the allotment set for 1968 harvest.



Grain Body with Combination Lift-Off Rack.

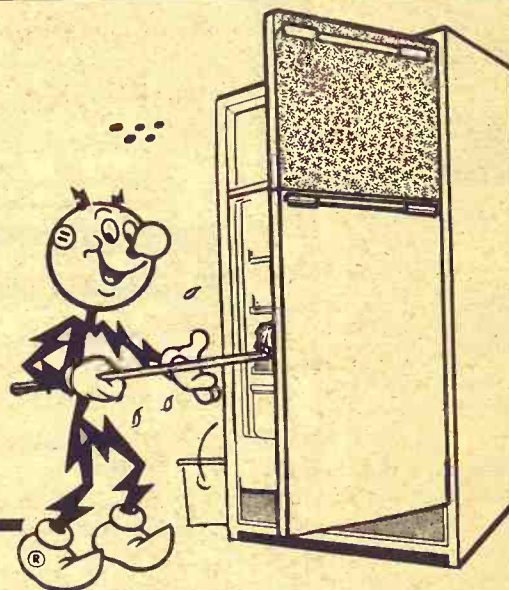

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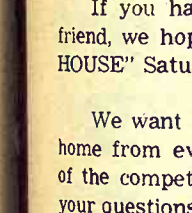

Tariffs Can Muddle Feed Grain Exports

...a move that could cost the United States millions of dollars of badly needed exports, the European Common Market quietly set in motion a change in its farm program to restrict production of corn and other feed grains. This has caused concern, if not alarm, in both the government and the grain trade. The Kennedy Round of trade negotiations, in which the U.S. has sought major reductions in the Common Market tariff on industrial goods but relatively little trade liberalization in agriculture. The Common Market action

is a proposal, still not formally published, by the Executive Commission in Brussels to raise substantially the minimum price support levels for corn, barley, and rye, without any change in the price level for wheat.

Two-Fold Result

The result, in the view of both American and European officials, would be two-fold, both of which would reduce the present European need to import large amounts of feed grains for cattle and poultry. The U.S. is by far the largest supplier of these grains, chiefly corn.

First, the higher price support levels would induce European farmers to grow more feed grains, thus cutting the need for imports. Under the Common Market system of variable levies at the Frontier, imports from a "residual" supply, meeting only needs not filled by domestic production.

Second, with feed grains more costly, it would become profitable for some European wheat production to be used as feed for animals rather than for human consumption. This again would cut the need for imported feed grains.

Diversion of wheat for use as feed would reduce the amount available for export by the Common Market, almost all of which comes from France. But this would not help the U.S. because French wheat is of a different quality than U.S. wheat and is sold to markets where U.S. wheat is not competitive.

Wouldn't Make Up

Thus, if the proposal is adopted, the U.S. would lose feed grain exports to the Common Market and would not make up the difference in wheat exports. Total grain exports to the community are about \$500 million a year, mainly feed grains.

The proposal by the Common Market Commission still must be approved by the Ruling Council of Ministers. It would affect the crop year beginning July 1, 1968.

The Common Market Com-

mission reliably reported to be frankly desirous of changing the "balance" of community agriculture, with more emphasis on feed grain production and less on wheat. The six member

nations taken together are huge importers of feed grains, yet not exporters of wheat.

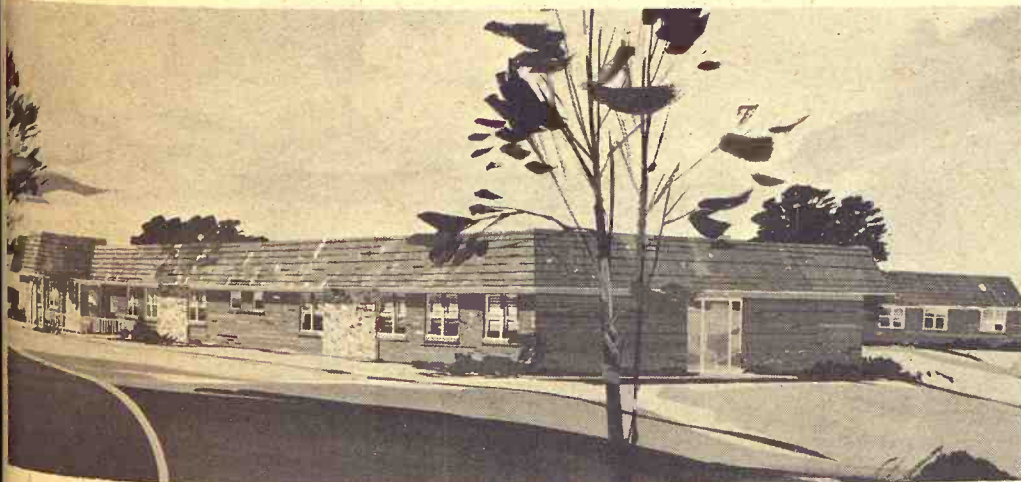

COCONUT ANGEL PIE

- 1 baked pie shell, 9 inch
- 1 package plain gelatin
- 1/4 cup cold water
- 4 tablespoons flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/2 cups milk
- 3/4 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon almond flavoring
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 3 egg whites
- 1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
- 1 cup coconut

Soften gelatin in cold water. Mix the 1/2 cup sugar, flour and salt in saucepan. Add milk and cook one minute. Add softened gelatin and cool. When partially set, beat with rotary beater until smooth. Add flavorings. Whip cream and fold into mixture. Make a meringue of beaten egg whites, cream of tartar and 1/2 cup sugar and fold in. Last, fold in coconut. Pour into baked pie shell and chill in refrigerator until ready to serve. P.S. I use one package of Dream Whip instead of the cream and the recipe makes two once sized pies. Top of this may be decorated with tinted coconut.

WESTERN FLAPJACKS

- 1 cup flour
- 1 egg
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 teaspoon soda
- 1/2 cup dry buttermilk
- 1 tablespoon oil
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon butter flavor
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup water (approximately, to make right consistency)

Stir together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, buttermilk and sugar. Add egg, oil, flavorings, and water. Fry at 375 degrees in electric skillet.

To Dust Blinds

When dusting Venetian blinds, work from the top down and clip the cleaned slat to the one immediately above it. This eliminates the possibility of cut fingers.

Easy Does It When Caring For New Furniture

Tender loving care is good for any household possession, especially wood furniture. Today, however, routines should be confined to maintaining finishes on old furniture.

Regular dusting, an occasional washing and periodic polishing and waxing are all that is necessary. Too much wax or furniture polish can actually do more harm than good.

Finishes on wood furniture these days are durable and require comparatively little care. Super finishes for walnut case goods, for example, have been developed for tops of dining tables, dressing tables and occasional tables. They are resistant to stains and mars, including alcohol and burns.

Extra caution is in order with laminated surfaces, because they are vulnerable to scratching and nicking.

Here are some wood furniture care suggestions:

1. Wash once or twice a year with mild soap and warm water. Be sure the washcloth is well rung out. Go over all surfaces with a clean damp cloth. Wipe dry.
2. For medium, low lustre or oil type finishes, avoid furniture polishes designed to dry to a high gloss.
3. Avoid furniture oils or oil base polishes which produce a shine through a surface residue.

4. If cleaner-waxes are used, be sure to wipe clean with a soft dry cloth. Do not buff.

5. To remove minor spots or rings from genuine oil finishes simply rub down affected area lightly with finest grade steel wool, then apply a light coat (or coats) of boiled linseed oil.

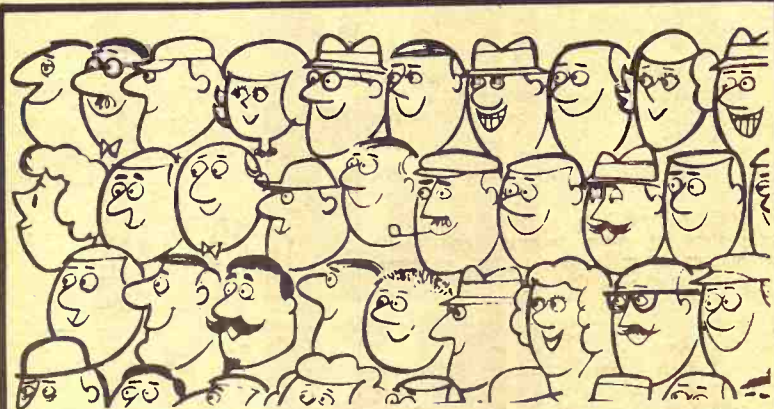
6. To restore dull lustre, try the mild soap and water cleaning technique first. If this does not reduce the shine, a cloth dampened with turpentine and olive oil and carefully wiped in the direction of the grain will usually restore the original finish. Wipe dry immediately.

7. If in doubt, follow the recommendations of your furniture manufacturer or dealer.

Cheaper Gains on Roughage
A recent feedlot meeting on the Alvin and Jared Hoover farm in Dickinson County indicates that maintaining a high percentage of roughage in fattening rations pays off. The Hoovers try to buy 450 lb. calves in the fall and put them on a wintering ration of ensilage, a urea protein supplement, and 1/2 pound of grain per 100 lbs. of body weight. The grain is gradually increased to 1 lb. per 100 lbs. body weight during the dry lot feeding period. Steers usually weigh around 1050 and the heifers 900 lbs. when marketed. Some steers and heifers fed in this manner graded 71% choice and the balance top good when slaughtered. The Hoovers felt these cattle performed well on a high roughage ration and costs of gain were quite profitable. It seems that this type of feeding program fits in with the astute farmer feeder's operation, especially if he's going to stay in business and compete with the commercial feeder who is on a high volume low profit per unit basis. 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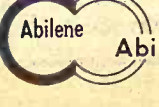
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Power Mowers Must Be Handled With Extreme Caution



With the job nearly done, the mower clogged. Rather than turn the mower off, this impatient teenager reached into the discharge chute — and risked losing his fingers, if not his whole hand.

Mowing with rotary machines can be safe and pleasurable if the operator turns off his impulses and turns on his common sense.

A prime rule is never to tink-
er with or refuel a running en-
gine. As important is the need
to keep the lawn free of the

sticks, stones and debris that
the whirling blade can hurl at
bullet like speeds, with injury
to the operator or someone
close by.

Pulling the mower toward
you or mowing up and down a
hill instead of sideways are oth-
er ways to court disaster.

In every situation, caution is
the key.

1. If you buy a mower, make
sure you read the booklet and
know all the controls.

2. Don't leave the motor run-
ning if you step away.

3. Watch your clothing. Loose
clothing or the use of sneakers
is an invitation to injury.

Mowers are a great invention
for saving time and effort and
assuring you of a beautiful
lawn. But, consider that with
every mower comes a built-in
warning: "HANDLE WITH
CARE."

Pretty Border

A double feather stitch in em-
broidery is very pretty as a bor-
der stitch. It is worked in the
same manner as the feather
stitch except that two stitches
are taken in one direction and
then two in the other rather
than alternating back and forth
as in feather stitch. This is an
embroidery stitch that makes a
neat appearance on the back of
cloth, as it looks like a single
stitch from the back.

Planting, Nurturing Walnut For Profit

Memo to midwestern land-
owners:

If you have planted walnuts,
seed nuts or seedlings, or plan
to do so, here are some valu-
able tips from the experts:

1. Fall and spring are ideal
walnut planting times. Normal
care and good soil will result in
sizable profits in years to come.

2. Make a rim around the
outside of the planted area to
act as a saucer to hold water in
the root area.

3. Keep the seedlings from
wind damage by attaching them
to solid stakes beyond the hole
area.

4. Don't fertilize too soon.
The best time to feed a newly
planted seedling is the second
year after planting.

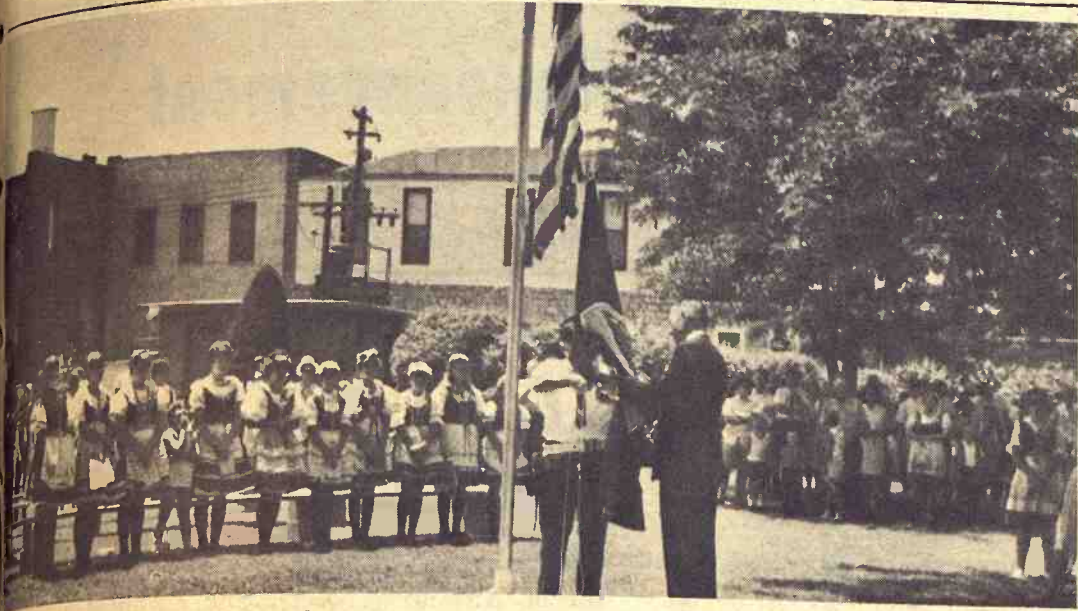

Hog Producers Hope For More Interest From K-State

McPHERSON — Kansas State University will place greater emphasis upon research coordinated with the Kansas swine industry.

Don Good, dean of the department of animal husbandry, told a liaison committee of the Kansas Swine Improvement Association, meeting here Saturday, that the university intends to be more active in swine research than in the past.

"We're hoping to establish good working relations with Kansas State University. We realize we are not running the swine department (of K-State), but we hope Kansas State University can serve the needs of the industry," said Jack Baird, Arkansas City, chairman of the committee.

The committee, composed of Jasper De Vore of Arkansas City, president of the state association; Baird; Gene Sturgeon; Don Sailors, Erie; and Norman Schnittker and Dick Strohl, both of Cunningham, placed nutritional research at the top of the list of what they expect from the university.

Of primary concern is nutrition research with milo, the state's most abundant feed grain. Sturgeon said there is a

great need for research with the new hybrid varieties of milo to determine the most valuable sources of supplements providing amino acids to effect conversion of the milo to weight gains.

"There is room for us (the producers) to save at least \$1 to \$2 a ton on ration with this research, said De Vore.

Second on the list for nutrition research was the calcium-phosphorus ration requirements for swine rations. The committee listed research feeding of the by-products of the milling industry as third in importance.

The fourth recommendation was for changes in the Kansas State Extension Service program.

"We feel the extension specialists should concentrate on nutrition and not on swine facilities and housing. How do we communicate with extension?" De Vore asked.

Good said he has proposed the hiring of a second swine extension specialist.

Good said he believed swine research could be multiplied

several times if funds were available to offer several assistantships in the department of animal husbandry. He suggested the assistantships might be provided through the experiment stations or perhaps from use of funds provided by the Kansas Livestock Improvement Assn.

Horned Wheat

This kernel of wheat, much enlarged, shows sprouting, a condition not unusual in the G&G area, where rains kept farmers from getting into fields to harvest wheat for days, and in some cases, weeks.

Farmers in some parts of the area found 50 percent of the crop sprouting in the head. If the kernel hadn't sprouted, the straw wasn't able to support the head for long and farmers had the problem of picking up "down" wheat.

The mineral is mined in open pits in Woodson county, near Yates Center.

If all the shares offered were purchased, the public would own 61.2% of the stock, with the present stockholders owning the remainder.

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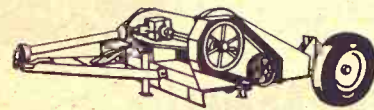


Blind Ambassador

He lost sight in one eye at the age of five due to disease and lost the other at 14.

He credits his mother for his success in a sighted world. George Fogarty, of the California School for the Blind, Berkeley, said in presenting the award, "Jerry tells me he had one of two choices to make; to sit hunched in a corner and be miserable, or to go out and enjoy life. The course he took is obvious."

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Slow Down Rural Drain

The National Planning association has predicted that American cities will continue to drain population from the rural areas during the next eight years, but at a slower rate than before.

At the same time, the association said, employment and income in the cities will speed up their growth — and it's employment, not size, that seems to promote further growth.

By 1975, the report said, some 73 percent — 164 million persons — of the nation's population will be concentrated in 224 metropolitan areas, with 60 percent of those city folk crammed into the 25 largest centers, ranging from an estimated 1,271,000 in and around New Orleans to an expected 17 million plus in the New York-Northeast-New Jersey area.

The predictions come from the association's center for economic projections, and are published in the NPA's monthly report, "Looking Ahead."

The report said metropolitan areas in the Southeast, Southwest, mountain and Far Western states, would continue to burgeon, "primarily at the expense of the Middle Atlantic region," with the fastest growth — except for the Far West — in the relatively smaller population centers of today.

Rapid growth in the southeast is predicted for Macon, Ga., with an annual population increase of 3.6 percent, and Tallahassee, Fla., with 3.8 percent.

In the Southwest, high growth

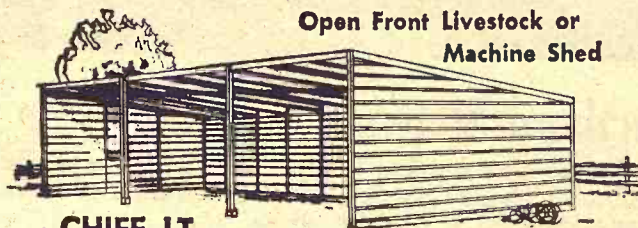
is looked for in Texarkana, Tex., 3.1 per cent, and Phoenix, Ariz., 3.2 percent. In the mountain states, Provo-Orem, Utah, looks promising with 3.4 percent.

Reno, Nev., at 3.7 per cent and Las Vegas at 4.2 percent will draw the crowds in the Far West, the report said, and mean-

while, back at the Middle Atlantic, Binghamton, N.Y., with 2.3 percent and Baltimore, Md., with 2.4 percent will be leaders.

One of the prime movers of early growth in many cities — heavy industry — no longer seems to be decisive, the report indicated. Rather, growth seems related to the "industry mix."

A Grant To K-State To Reduce Cost Of Grain Inspection

MANHATTAN — Two contracts totaling \$145,446 for 3½ years of research to find ways of cutting costs and time for grain inspection and analysis have been awarded Kansas State University by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Floyd Smith, director of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station, said the grants will be administered through the K-State Food and Feed Grain Institute.

The larger grant, \$123,080, will be used by K-State scientists to develop a simple, objective test for determining the percentage of sound kernels in grain samples of wheat, corn, barley, rye, oats and sorghums.

A simplified, accurate system would reduce considerably the cost of the 3.5 million inspections made annually by USDA grain inspectors.

Grains need to be inspected for cracks, water absorption rate, internal damage, heat and microorganism damage, as well as other characteristics. Then this data needs to be related to the per cent of sound grain, Smith pointed out.

Better ways to isolate and concentrate the germ of grains for inspection will be sought with use of funds totaling \$22,336 in the second grant, officials said.

Objective of this research is to develop equipment for simply, rapidly and effectively isolating the germ of wheat, rye, sor-

ghums, barley, oats and corn, Smith said.

Considerable time and effort is expended by inspectors using current processes and a savings is expected with development of newer, more effective equipment.

Project leaders in the research will be William J. Hoover, director of the Food and Feed Grain Institute, and Eugene P. Farrell, grain science and industry department.

Principal investigators, representing an inter-disciplinary approach to the research, are Do Sup Chung, agricultural engineering; Marten van Swaay, chemistry; F. W. Crawford, physics; Leo Wirtz, electrical engineering; and V. D. Foltz, bacteriology.

BIG TURKEY FARM RULED NOT AN INDUSTRY

CLAY CENTER — A large egg and turkey farm southeast of here has been ruled to be a farming enterprise, not an industrial one, by District Judge L. L. McLaughlin. The ruling was made on inquiry of the Clay County Planning Board, as a matter of zoning. The farm is owned by John McKee and managed by his son Jack McKee. Presumably the ruling also applies to the turkey farm operated by Charles Wernette east of Clay Center on US24 and the poultry production operation of Wilburn Nelson at Morganville.

No Change In Wheat Program

Agriculture Secretary Freeman has authorized a 1968 wheat program almost unchanged from the one in effect for the current crop.

The price-support loan level continues at \$1.25 a bushel.

Wheat also may again be planted on feed-grain acreage on farms participating in both programs, and feed grains may be planted on wheat allotments.

As in 1967, too, a farmer may plant up to 50% in excess of his allotment and still be eligible for the program, provided the excess production is stored and

OFFICIAL OK TO SELL K-STATE STADIUM BONDS

The State Board of Regents has okayed the sale of \$1.45 million in revenue bonds to build a new football stadium at Kansas State University, to be ready for the 1968 season. The stadium will cost \$1.6 million and reportedly about \$300,000 has been raised by donation in Manhattan and the rest of the state. Athletic department funds and further donations are expected to supply some of the revenue to retire the bonds, but they are guaranteed by activity fees.

other conditions are met.

Domestic marketing certificates, which are designed to provide farmers with full parity prices on wheat consumed in the U.S., will be issued on an estimated 530 million bushels that the nation is expected to consume in the coming year.

As before, the certificates will be valued at the difference between full parity and the \$1.25 loan value. For the 1967 crop, certificates worth \$1.36 a bushel are to be issued on 520 million bushels of wheat.

Mr. Freeman termed the 1968 program adequate to "assure an ample supply of wheat to meet all needs, both domestic and foreign, and protect farm

income."

Farm revenue from wheat next year will match that from the current year's crop, he predicted.

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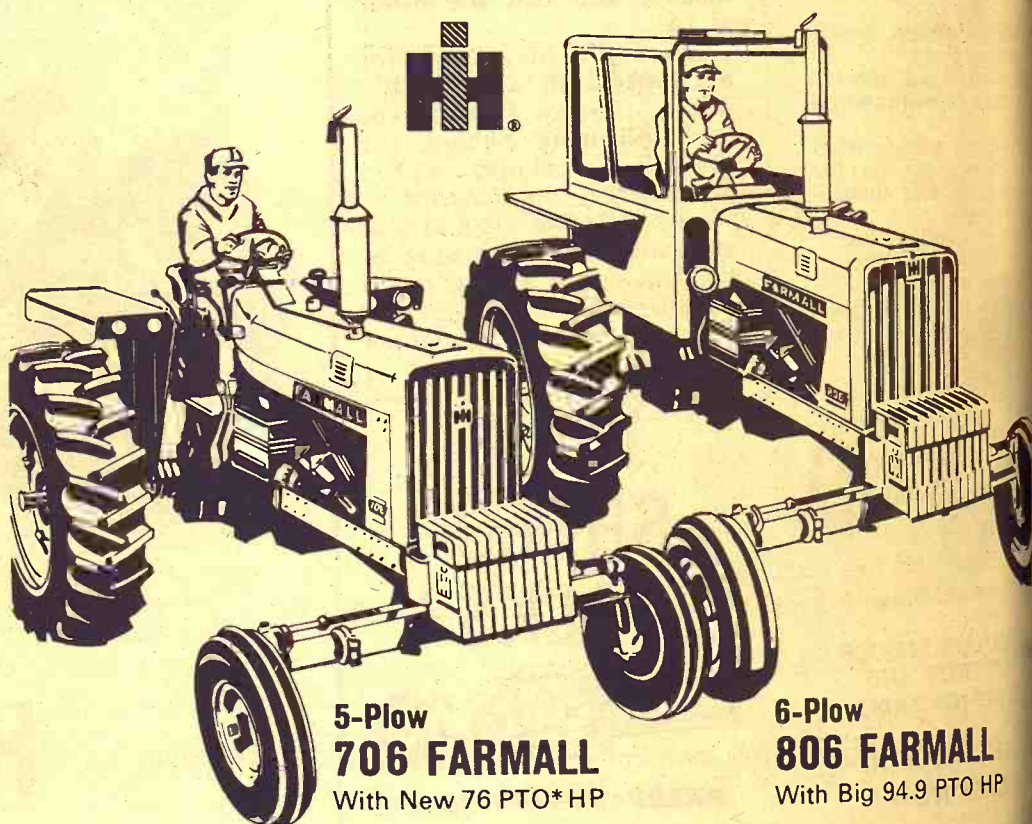

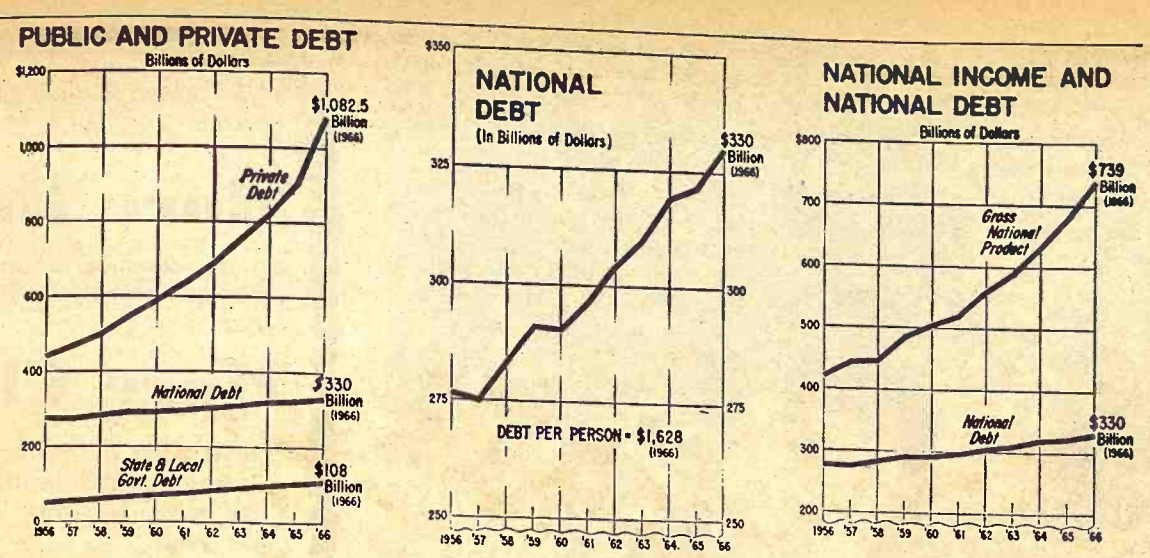

Soviet Crop
Meet Needs
 The Soviet wheat crop this year will fall short of the record 1966 harvest, but no foreign purchases beyond current commitments are expected, West-
 agricultural experts predict. The specialist said the Russians undoubtedly can feed their people and export some wheat to Eastern Europe with this year's crop, "barring a sudden and widespread crop failure."
 Last year's harvest totaled 10 million metric tons. The needs of the Soviet people are estimated at 70 million metric tons. Informants said last year's surplus, in addition to 3 million tons purchased from the United States, "almost surely built up considerable stockpile." The Soviet Union last year signed an agreement with Canada to buy 1 million tons of wheat over a one-year period.

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We Owe A Lot Of Money, From All Angles
 The trend toward higher debt levels is not limited to the Federal Government. Senator James Pearson noted in a recent newsletter, as these three graphs show.
 While the national debt has increased by 20 percent during the past 10 years, the indebtedness of state and local governments has increased about 110 percent. In addition, private debts — those of individuals and businesses — have increased at an even more dramatic rate, up 185 percent during the same period.
 Pearson, while calling the trend unhealthy, also noted that the country's capacity to carry these debts has grown significantly. Gross national product, which is a measure of the wages, profits, and earnings we acquire each year, has risen from \$418 billion in 1956 to \$738 billion in 1966, an increase of 76 percent.
 Pearson noted the national debt, while relatively less burdensome than it was in 1956, still costs \$12 billion each year in interest — highest item in the federal budget except for national defense.

Sub-Professional May Be Answer To Shortage Of Doctors

A new highly trained subprofessional, working under the direction of doctors, may be a long-range answer to the scarcity of medical service, Dr. W. Clarke Wescoe, chancellor of the University of Kansas, said at Parsons last week.

"There will never be enough doctors to satisfy everyone," he predicted, and new concepts will be necessary as a result.

The subprofessional could be utilized in small communities which otherwise will be without medical service, Wescoe explained, to provide emergency treatment until a patient could be removed to a hospital for attention, to screen the critical from the noncritical patients for more efficient use of doctors' time and perhaps be in communication with doctors thru closed circuit television.

Wescoe, former dean of the KU medical school and a leading medical educator, acknowledged that the development is a "long-range, long-time" plan. But, he added, the KU Medical Center has experimented with it only on a limited basis and plans further testing of the idea.

Wescoe met here with a southeast Kansas committee, organized by Mid-America Inc. to explore a regional approach to the doctor supply and medical service in a nine-county area. Mid-America is a regional development organization.

Trends are away from solo practice of medicine and tow-

ard group practice, he said, and few young doctors being graduated today will practice alone in the future.

"Medical education is highly sophisticated and costly," he

said. "The young man picks and chooses where he will practice and his area of origin does not dictate where that location will be."

Wescoe said regionalization of medical practice probably is the best short-term solution Kansas can devise for the shortage of doctors.

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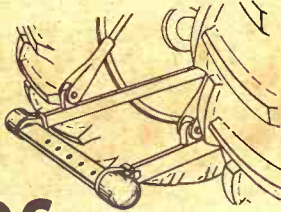

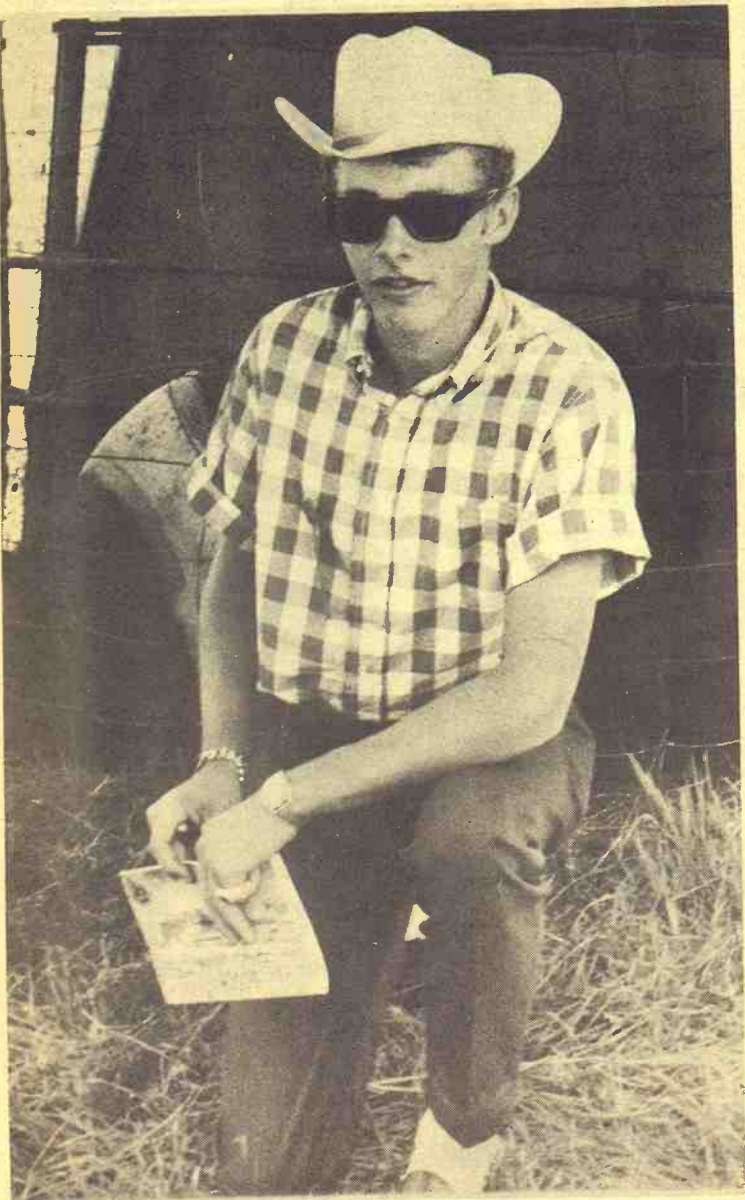

Docking To Name His Own Man This Week

Governor Docking will likely name a new livestock sanitary commissioner sometime this week, as the conflict between the governor and the Kansas Livestock Association continues.

Having failed to get three nominations from the association, Docking indicated he will make his own nomination, rather than reappoint A. G. Pickett, present commissioner, who has been recommended for the post again by the livestock association.

A 50-year old law requires that the livestock commissioner have the association's recommendation, but Governor Docking has requested that the association give him some choice in the nomination by recommending three men.

The Kansas Livestock Association has been predominantly

Republican over the years, and Pickett — who has dual jobs with the state and with the livestock association — wrote editorials in the association's magazine, the Kansas Stockman, before the 1966 elections which were generally interpreted to be against Docking and for his opponent, then Governor William Avery.

The Association had recommended three men for another state livestock post, that of brand inspector, but Docking called the list "bogus" and "offered in bad faith," after he offered the job to one of the men on the list, Wayne Rogler of Matfield Green.

Docking noted in a letter to Earl Brookover of Garden City that Rogler turned down the appointment when it was formally offered. "Mr. Rogler declined the appointment and told a member of my staff that he had no desire to be brand commissioner," Docking wrote.

Rogler also said he had not been consulted by any official of the livestock association regarding the recommendation, Docking said.

The other two names submitted to the governor as nominees for the post were Hade Gupton of Greensburg, the present brand commissioner, and Fran-

cis Arnold of Ashland. Both are publican county chairman of Republicans and Gupton is Re-Kiowa County.

Borrowing At 2 1/2% Not Bad

Banks in Kansas apparently decided that holding state inactive funds, even at twice the cost they had to pay before, still isn't a bad deal.

The State Board of Treasury Examiners received bids from the banks last week, and all but a few of the state's 586 banks indicated they were willing to pay 2.56 percent interest on the funds in contrast to the effective 1.2 percent interest they paid on inactive funds under the old law.

Under state law, the banks are allowed to have an amount of state idle funds equal to their capital and surplus. Each year the banks submit these figures and make a bid on the amount of state idle funds they want.

If their bid is accepted, the state signs a contract with the bank stipulating it will not draw the money for at least 12 months. The banks pay interest on the amount of idle funds they are awarded under the contract.

The bill passed last session changed the interest rate from a statutory fee, to an interest rate based on 70 percent of the average yield of U.S. Treasury bills during the preceding 3-month period.

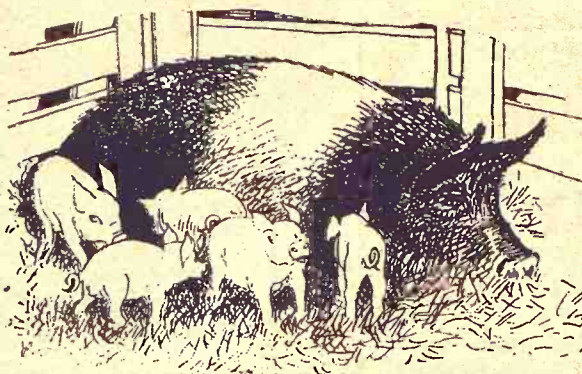

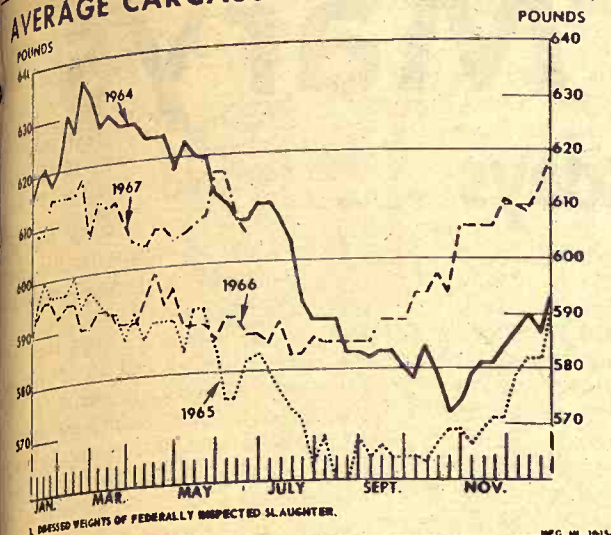

ADMINISTRATION TO ASK DOMESTIC PROGRAM CUTS

The Associated Press report-
ed last week, without documen-
tation, that the Johnson admin-
istration was quietly asking for
cuts in domestic program spend-
ing of 15 percent. Presumably
the cuts will soften congression-
al opposition to a 6 percent sur-
charge on income taxes.

Historic Session Of Unicameral Ends In Nebraska

LINCOLN, Nebr. — A cen-
tennial legislature which gave
Nebraska its most significant
tax system overhaul in its 100-
year history and which blazed
new policy trails in education,
traffic safety and industrial de-
velopment, completed its regu-
lar session labors last week.

The nearly seven-month-long
session saw a record 947 bills
introduced, a record 632 bills
passed.

Overall appropriations totaled
a record \$614 million, including
\$258 million from the tax sup-
ported general fund.

The spending figures compare
with previous highs of \$459 mil-
lion for total authorized spend-
ing, and \$137 million for general
fund spending approved two
years ago.

Topping the enactments was
adoption of the first sales tax
in Nebraska's history, coupled
with a state personal and corpo-
rate income tax destined to
take effect next year unless a
pending court test of constitu-
tionality knocks it out.

The 2½ per cent sales tax
took effect June 1 and is expect-
ed to contribute some \$50 mil-

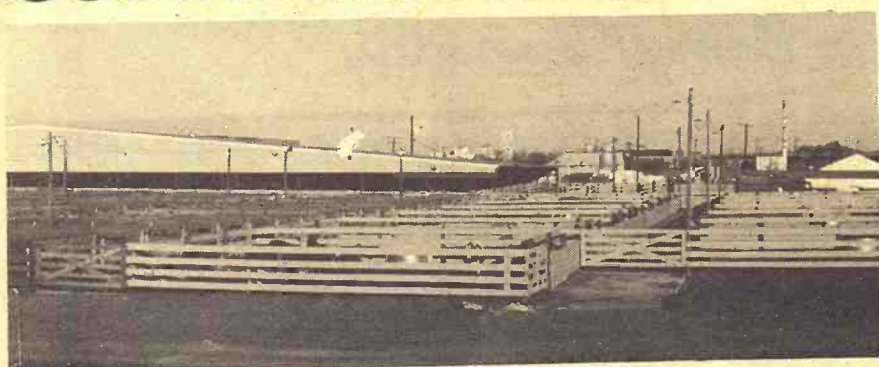
