Row On Row

Anyone who has ever pitched bundles into an old-time threshing machine may have fond memories of Emmitt Richardson. In 1908 Richardson developed and started manufacturing an extension feeder. This took some of the back-breaking labor out of feeding bundles into a threshing machine.

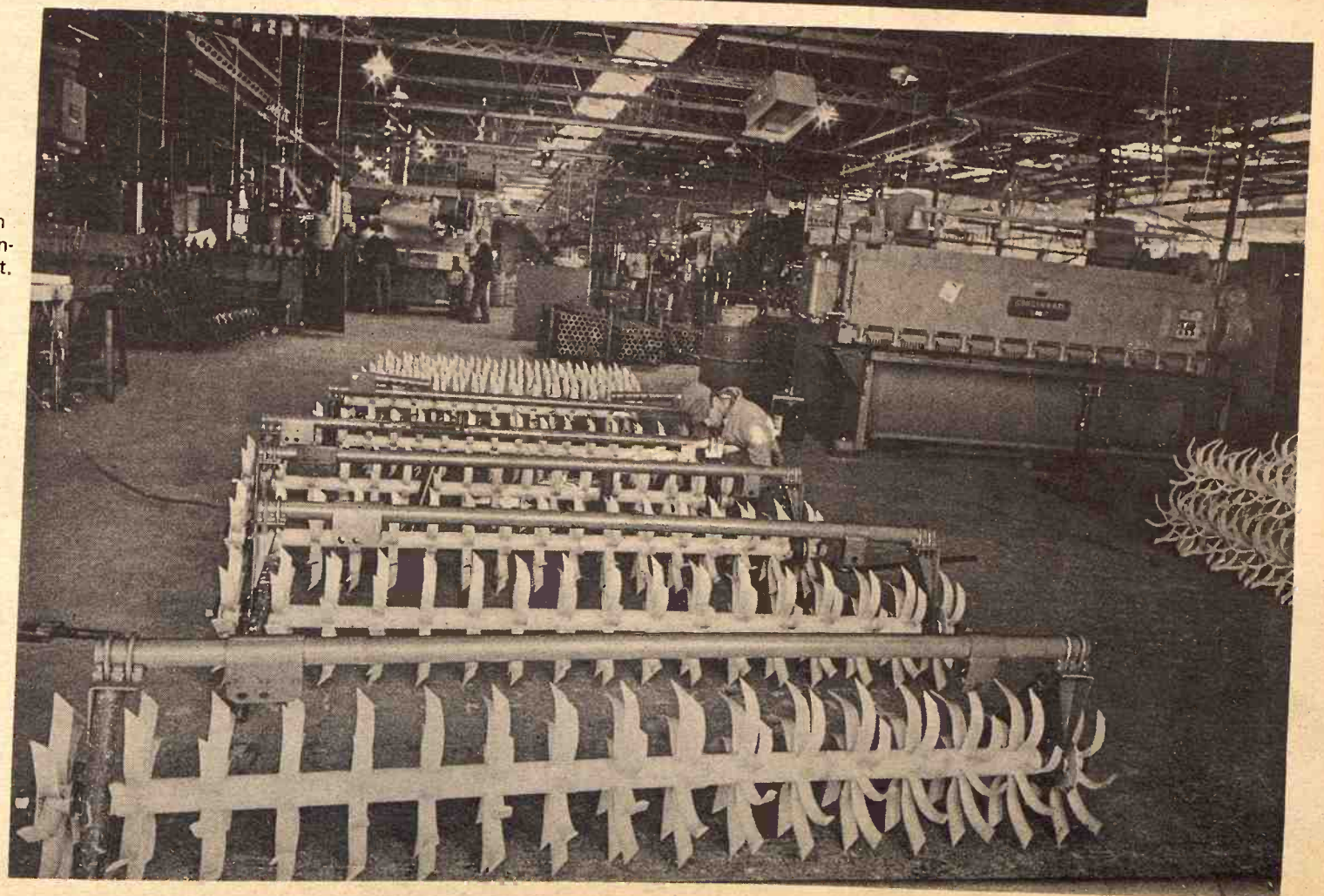
That company founded in Cawker City is still at it, though its products have changed and its sales area increased. The firm is now managed by Emmitt's sons, Ray and Bob. Bob takes charge of finance and sales; Ray, product development and manufacturing.

The first product, the extension feeder, was phased out after 20 years' production. Since then the firm has made heavy-duty combine canvasses, peanut shakers, bean pilers, straw-walker covers used in combining milo, and milo guards.

The product in manufacture when these pictures were taken was a mulch treader, a piggy-back treader to be mounted behind other implements. Since 1960 the Richardson plant has emphasized soil tillage equipment with that piece of equipment and an under-cutter plow.

Bad News Says Farm Bureau Of Tax Proposal

Ray Frisbie, president of Kansas Farm Bureau, says that relief from property taxes has become a popular subject, but proposals for relatively high minimum levies or a state-wide property tax will not solve the problem.

In a statement to Kansas news media Frisbie said almost everyone seems to agree that relief is needed. But, he added, many of those who give lip service to property tax relief keep coming back to relatively high minimum levies when they talk about school finance. He suggests that a state-wide property tax can be an instrument of achieving equity in taxation.

Frisbie said, "Those who dabble with the idea of a state-wide levy or relatively high minimum levies in a school finance formula simply do not understand two basic facts:

The first is that taxes are paid out of income. Property alone cannot pay taxes. The only way to collect taxes from property is to take a percentage of that property away; in other words to confiscate it at a stated annual percentage.

"The second fact, apparently not understood by many, is the heavy investment farmers must make in tangible property to earn a bare

living income. Farmers must have an investment in tangible property three to ten times as great as other segments of the economy in order to earn a comparable income."

In the period from 1950 until 1969, personal income in Kansas increased by 221 percent. Property taxes in the same period went up by 293 percent. In that period farm income rose only 7 percent, "and farmers have to bear the brunt of the property tax load," Frisbie noted.

"There persists in many quarters the tendency to look at big assessed valuations and associate such valuations with wealth and tax-paying ability," he said. "Tax dilettantes look at Moscow or Mullinville and tend to associate high assess valuations per pupil with

some big public utility property or with huge gas and oil resources. The facts are that very few districts have the blessings of Moscow or Mullinville.

"In Kansas total public utility property is 17.5 percent of total assessed tangible valuation. Total state assessments of oil and gas working interests and royalty interests are 6.2 percent of total state assessed valuation.

"But let's look at the effects of one proposal which is being studied by a joint legislative committee when it is applied to certain school districts in Kansas. This proposal would impose a 20 mill minimum levy. The district of Healy would get no money at all under this proposal, but in Lane County—the home of Healy—

Sylvan Grove would receive no money under this proposal, but in Lincoln County—the home of Sylvan Grove—public utilities are 21.8 percent of the total, somewhat above the state average, but oil and gas assessments are zero percent of the total.

"The committee is also looking at a plan in which the levy requirements would remain the same but the guarantee would be reduced. Under this proposal Greeley County would receive no money even though Greeley County has zero assessments of oil and gas, and public utility property is only 7.5 percent of the total, less than half

the state average. "Scott County would receive money, Public utility property in county is 18.7 percent of the total, only about 1 percent above the state average—while oil and gas assessments are 2.6 percent of the total, well below the state average. "Other districts which would receive no money under this proposal are Bird City, Esbon, Jewell, Mahaska and Greenleaf—all counties with no oil nor gas—only in Washington County is public utility property a higher percentage of total than in the state as a whole," Frisbie said.

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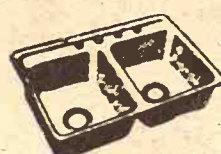
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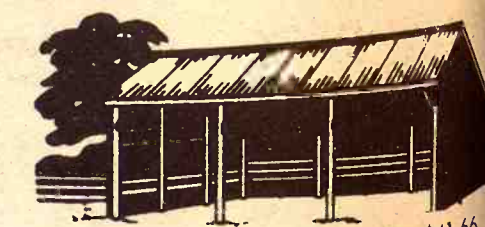

Step Toward A Soybean Growers Association

On the theory that there is strength in unity, some Kansas soybean producers are considering formation of a statewide growers association. The proposed organization would be known as the Kansas Soybean Association and would be affiliated with the American Soybean Association when membership reached 200. A small group of enthusiastic growers met at Kansas State University to organize on a preliminary basis. The group decided to present its ideas to other Kansas growers within the next few weeks.

A steering committee was organized to get the ball rolling. Wayne Dicken of DeSota was elected chairman. Verlin H. Peterson, extension agronomist at KSU, was elected secretary.

Other committee members are Jack Smith and Larry Heidrick of Beloit, Elmer Bruner of Olathe, Bob Manson of DeSota, and Albert Kientz of Wamego.

Merv Syverson, field director for the American Soybean Association, pointed out that more than 50 percent of U.S. soybean production is sold overseas.

"The ASA has been active in market development in Japan and other countries," he explained. "The export markets which it has developed have meant production opportunities and higher prices for soybean growers in the U.S."

ASA also gives soybean growers a voice in Washington on policies and legislation relative to the popular crop, Syverson said. In addition, it has helped secure added research funds for the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Syverson also made these points: After several years of increased U.S. soybean acreage, demand for whole soybeans as a source of livestock feed and for the oil and meal extracted from the crop is exceeding supply. Therefore, more research is needed to increase production on a per acre basis.

• U.S. farmers must maintain a

ready supply so other countries won't look elsewhere for oil crops.

Dr. Robert Bohannon, director of the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University, told the growers that KSU researchers have proved that 75 bushels of soybeans per acre are possible. Other KSU research helpful to the soybean growers has been concerned with date and rate of planting, row widths, and varieties.

Historically, he said, soybeans have done well for farmers who can grow them. Kansas acreage is approximately one million acres, and average yield has reached as high as 23 to 25 bushels per acre. Only 15 years ago soybean producers in Kansas were growing eight bushel crops.

Grain Dealers Oppose Bill On Farm Bargaining

Opposition to a compulsory farm bargaining bill was expressed last week by W. C. Theis of Kansas City, president of the national grain and feed association.

Theis told the Senate Agriculture Committee the proposal would "destroy the highly efficient grain marketing system we now have, with great harm to the nation and without the effect on the producer that the proponents hope for."

Theis cited these reasons for opposition to the bill by the grain trade: compulsory farm bargaining would mean distortion of the role of price, destruction of the market pricing system, demise of the futures markets, increased marketing costs to farmers, inflated food costs, loss of grain exports, inequitable distribution of benefits among farmers, and expanded government farm program costs. "It is our firm conviction," Theis said, "that senate bill 1775 and other proposals regarding mandatory

farm bargaining are not reasonable substitutes for the highly efficient and low cost grain marketing system that has been developed and refined the past seven decades for the benefit of producers and consumers, and that such legislation is not a reasonable substitute for farm programs established by congress."

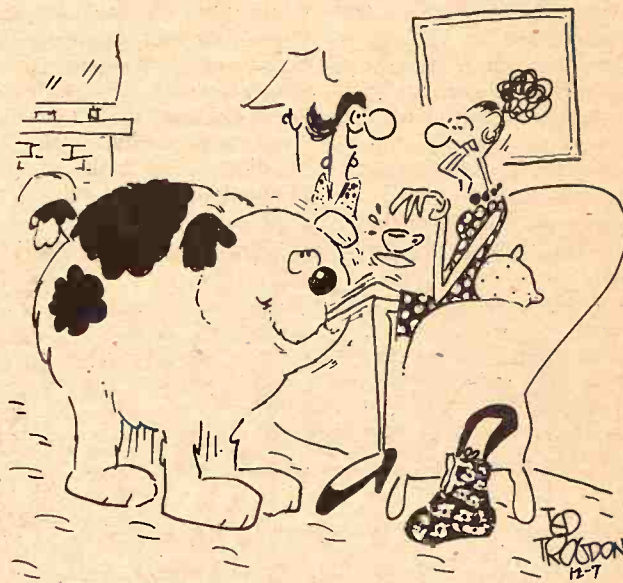

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Hesston Shows Profit Gain

Hesston (Kan.) Corp. has reported record sales and earnings for its fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 1971. The company's profit margin also was up substantially over a year ago.

Sales for fiscal 1971 reached \$41.8 million, compared to \$39.1 million a year ago, or a 7 per cent increase. For Hesston's final quarter, sales were \$9.3 million, down slightly from final quarter sales of \$10 million.

Earnings for fiscal 1971 were \$1.7 million, up significantly from 1970 earnings of \$920,815. Earnings for the final quarter of fiscal 1971 also were above those of the same quarter in 1970—\$127,780 compared to \$55,938.

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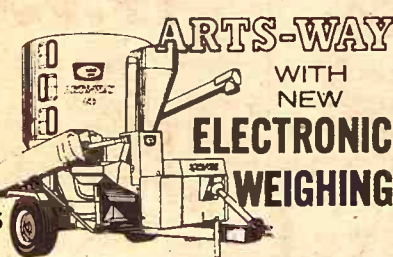

Pulled wool will continue to be supported at a level comparable to the incentive price for shorn wool through payments on unshorn lambs.

Shorn wool payments will be based on each producer's returns from sales. The percentage will be that required to raise the national average price received by all producers from shorn wool up to the announced incentive price of 72 cents a pound. For example, payments on 1970 marketings, which began in April, were made at the rate of 102.8 per cent of the dollar return each producer received from the sale of shorn wool. This percentage was based on the difference between the incentive price of 72 cents and the national average grower price of 35.5 cents a pound.

Bills In Hopper Before Start Of Legislature

Members of the Kansas Legislature have gotten a running start on its 1972 session by introducing 21 bills and six concurrent resolutions. It is more than six weeks until the Legislature convenes in January.

Mrs. Elwill Shanahan, secretary of state, reported the flurry of preliminary activity has set a record. Eighteen bills and resolutions were filed in advance of the 1971 session. Members of the House have filed 14 bills and five resolutions. Senators have put seven bills and one resolution into the hopper.

Because the 1972 session will run for only 60 days, legislators want to get an early start, Mrs. Shanahan said. Committees have been active between sessions, and several have filed bills. Some legislators figure their proposals will get an advantageous spot on chamber calendars if they are in early.

No Change On Wool Incentives

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has announced that the incentive price of 72 cents a pound for marketings of shorn wool and a support of 80.2 cents a pound for mohair will continue unchanged in 1972 from 1971 levels.

These prices are in accordance with the National Wool Act as amended by the Agricultural Act of 1970 which requires that the support shall be at the above levels for each



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Hope In Utilizing Rubbish Heaps

Items to be found in the nation's garbage dumps: Fuels to run generators, chemicals for industry, materials for home building and sand to replenish eroding beaches.

This is no garbage picker's dream but a list of just some of the products that might be recovered from the ever-growing amount of waste discarded by Americans.

Some experimental techniques used to do it were outlined by packaging experts interviewed at a Packaging Machinery Manufacturers Institute exposition at Atlantic City. The packaging men are confronted with the nation's solid-waste problem because they manufacture the cans, bottles and boxes that are part of the problem.

The problem is growing. The amount of rubbish increases with the growth in population, affluence and convenience packaging.

At the same time it becomes more difficult and costly to dispose of the rubbish. To burn it in dumps or incinerators causes pollution, and population growth reduces the land available for dumps or landfill areas.

However, according to Dr. Sy Gilbert, a professor in the Rutgers University Food Science Department, the problem is not unsolvable. It can be solved by recycling but not by the narrow definition the public has of recycling, Gilbert said.

"It isn't re-use," he explained. "It's added use."

Gilbert said some products can be recycled directly, but others—food wastes, for example—must be used in different forms.

He added that research is underway into techniques to use wastes not directly usable in other ways.

He said pyrolysis is one of the most promising experimental techniques. Pyrolysis is the heating of the wastes in the absence of oxygen, breaking down the wastes into gases and liquids that can be used as fuel or industrial chemicals.

Push To Make Tougher Cars

The Insurance Institute for Highway Safety, using movies to illustrate its case, has delivered to Congress the results of the group's low-speed collision tests on some new cars.

"Not one dollar's worth of damage is necessary in any such crashes" said William Haddon, Jr. "Not one dollar's worth would have to be borne by consumers and insurers if these cars had been designed to make use of long-available energy-absorbing technology in their front and rear-end structures."

Haddon, a former director of the Transportation Carpenter's

National Highway Safety Board, is president of the institute, which is supported by major insurance organizations. Haddon's detailed testimony and a filmed report on the results of test crashes were presented at a hearing of the House Commerce Committee's subcommittee on commerce and finance.

Haddon said the tests involved 1972 versions of four inside sedan models that the institute has tested since 1969, and the latest models of four small cars.

Tests on the 1972 cars produced what he said was needless and avoidable dollar damage, but in all cases they met and many times exceeded the Transportation department's 1973 model requirements that rear bumpers protect so-called "safety related" items in crashes into a barrier at 2.5 miles an hour, he said.

Estimated repair costs averaged \$263.81 on 1972 models and \$221.60 for 1971 models when crashed at five miles an hour with the front end against a barrier, he said.

This rose to \$1,126.96 for 1972 and \$1,113.90 for 1971 when crashed at 15 miles an hour, he added.

Figures for so-called economy cars tested were \$216.92 for 1972 and \$155.90 for 1971 in front-end crashes at five miles an hour, he said. This reached \$814.60 for 1972, \$810.67 for 1971 at 15 miles an hour.

Grange Finishes Convention With Resolution Flurry

The 105th convention of the National Grange has concluded with resolutions on subjects ranging from respect for the flag to foreign relations as they relate to farm

exports.

The resolutions included ones favoring "stricter enforcement of all present laws followed by stiffer sentences," prohibition of "prolonged work stoppages in the interests of the public" with a recommendation for mandatory arbitration after certain lengths of time, restoration of traditional national holiday dates, and a "severe penalty be inflicted on all who violate" laws pertaining to respect for the flag.

The Grange contended the 10 per cent surcharge on imports "could bring about difficult economic conditions for agricultural products being exported." The 600,000-member organization of farmers said that it would "use its influence

to oppose the continuation of the surcharge after the government had made sound adjustments in the international monetary system."

Other resolutions urged development of vocational training and specialized training to move those living in ghettos to higher economic levels, better supervision of sex education and family planning programs in public schools, and congressional adoption of a broader health insurance program.

Another resolution applauded American withdrawal from Vietnam and added that after completion withdrawal the U.S. "should not use any personnel...for combat outside the United States except in furtherance of a declared war or where essential for our national defense."

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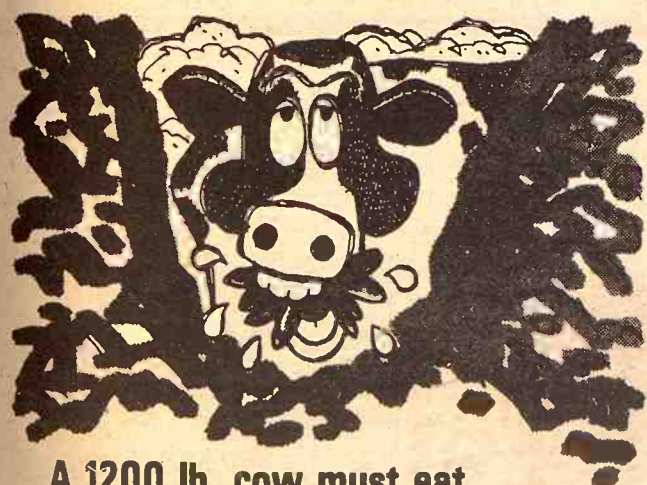

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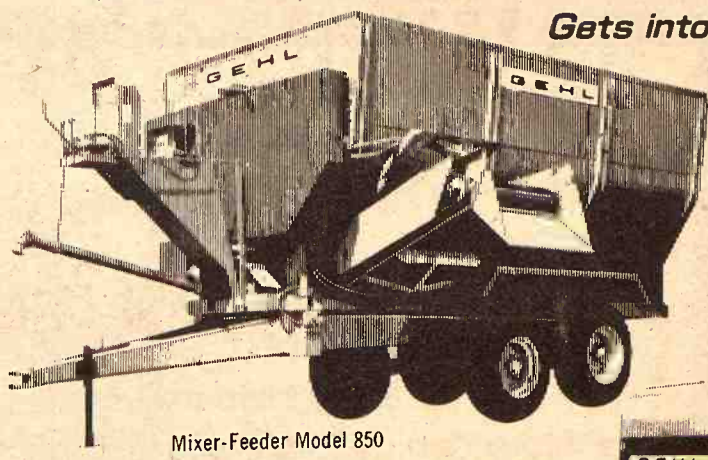
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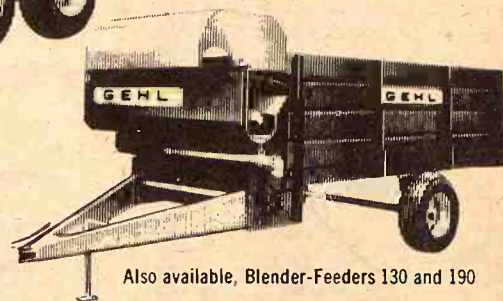
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Chicago Market To Try Feeder Futures

The Chicago Mercantile Exchange futures contract in feeder cattle has been approved by the Commodity Exchange Authority and trading will open Tuesday, Nov. 30, Everett B. Harris, exchange president has announced.

The contract will be listed for seven trading months on opening day, Harris said, providing options for March, April, May, August, September, October and November of 1972.

Harris pointed out that the new feeder cattle contract completes a three-sided complex along with the C.M.E. contract in live (slaughter) cattle and yellow grain sorghum (milo) that should be particularly useful to feedlot operators and other cattle feeders.

"Now, the producer can hedge his feeder cattle, his cattle on feed, and his grain," Harris said.

The new contract will be listed on the seventh anniversary of the live cattle contract, which was the first successful contract in a live, non-storable commodity to be listed on any futures exchange. The live cattle contract has generated more than 3,000,000 trades in less than seven years and is well over the 600,000 mark in 1971.

Harris announced that the non-member roundturn commission for one feeder cattle contract will be \$40, with the spreading transaction commission \$43.

He also announced the listing of spreads between feeder cattle, and live cattle and milo, and initial margins. The initial margin for a feeder contract will be \$400 with maintenance margin at \$250. A spread covering different months of the feeder contract will be \$250 initial and \$100 maintenance.

A spread of one feeder versus one live cattle will be \$400 with maintenance margin of \$250. A spread between two milo contracts and one feeder cattle contract will be \$800

with \$500 maintenance.

Extensive feasibility studies prior to approval of the new contract, Harris said, showed that "all elements for a viable futures contract exist."

"Volume and price fluctuations of feeder cattle exceed those for slaughter cattle, and the calves are less perishable, according to the studies," he said.

Each contract will be for feeder cattle of the Choice (80 percent) or Good (20 percent) grades as defined by the USDA, with each unit to consist of 42,000 pounds, averaging 650 pounds per steer.

Par delivery will be made from approved livestock yards at Omaha, Nebraska and Sioux City, Iowa, with delivery permitted at St. Paul, Greeley, Colo.; Springfield, Kansas City and St. Joseph, Mo.; Dodge City, Emporia and Wichita, Kansas; Oklahoma City, and Amarillo, Texas, all with 50 cent cwt. discount; and Billings, Mont. at 45 cent cwt. discount.

The milo contract was opened in March 1971 and has developed what Harris described as an encouraging amount of interest and volume.

The triumvirate of cattle-feed contracts is expected to have par-

ticular interest in the Southwest which has been a cattle-breeding area for many years but has greatly expanded as a feedlot and milo-raising area. In addition, many major packing houses have established facilities there, including some of the largest and most modern in the world, Harris said.

Tightest Check On Living Costs In 4½ Years

The government's cost of living figures crept up again last month during the price freeze. Rising prices of 1972 autos, clothing and shelter outweighed a harvest-time decline in food prices, the Labor Department said.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the Consumer Price Index rose 0.2 per cent for October. It said the

increase was an even smaller 0.1 per cent if adjusted to compensate for the fact that prices usually rise a little this time of year.

The seasonally adjusted rise was the smallest since April 1967, the BLS said. Perhaps more important, the October report means prices rose only 3.8 per cent in the preceding year, the smallest 12-month rise since the period ending February 1968.

As prices rose, average weekly earnings for private nonfarm jobs dropped two cents in October to \$129.11. One of the chief criticisms of the freeze was that it held down wages more effectively than it held down prices.

The price increase puts the consumer price index at 121.6 per cent of its 1967 level. This means it cost \$11.26 in October to buy what \$10.00 bought four years ago.

Food costs dropped 0.2 per cent for October, normal for this time of year. But housing increased 0.3 per cent, apparel 0.7 per cent and

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transportation 0.7 per cent.

The largest single increase was a 3.7 per cent jump in the price of automobiles as 1972 models hit showroom floors. The BLS said window-sticker prices were roughly unchanged from comparable older models, but dealers gave smaller discounts and so customer paid more.

Freeze rules allowed normal seasonal price increases, so long as they did not go above levels that prevailed a year earlier.

Clothing prices went up as new fall and winter items showed up in stores. However, the BLS said that samples clothing costs only once every three months, and so much of this increase could have taken place before the freeze was announced Aug. 15.

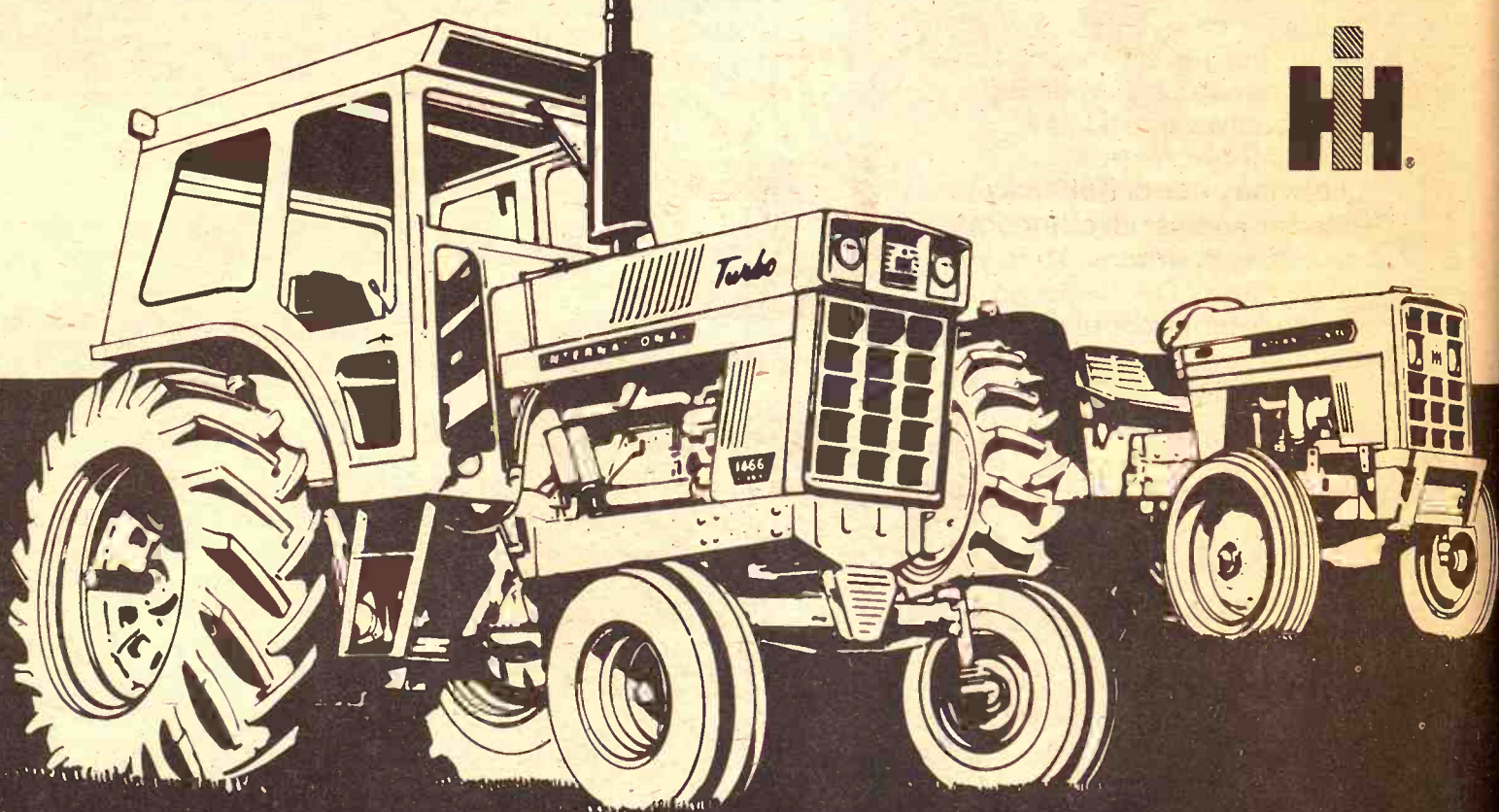


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Welfare Cases, Expenses Reflected In 20% Cut In Assistance

The number of people on welfare and the amount spent has dropped in the two months since payments to public assistance recipients was cut by about 20 per cent.

Figures showing the impact of the reduction in cash payments to welfare clients appears in statistics compiled by the State Dept. of Welfare for its budget hearing before State Budget Director James W. Bibb.

Dr. Robert Harder, the state director of social welfare, said most of the decline in caseload and the total amount spent can be traced

directly to the cutback in cash grants which took effect with checks mailed in September.

Gov. Robert Docking and the 1971 Legislature combined to slash about \$30 million from the Welfare Dept. budget request for this fiscal year, and welfare officials made a general cut in cash grants plus reductions in medical services to welfare clients in order to stay within their reduced budget.

The data assembled by Welfare Dept. officials shows that public assistance rolls decreased by 3,094 persons from the month of August to

the month of September—the first month of the general 20 per cent cut in cash assistance.

The total dollars spent on welfare in September dropped by about \$797,000 from the previous month, and the average number of dollars per person per month declined by \$5.21—from \$67.61 to \$62.40 per month.

The total number of persons receiving welfare in August was 115,900 and in September the figure declined to 112,800.

The total dollars spent on welfare in August was \$7.8 million and that

figure declined to \$7 million in September.

The number of persons on welfare, and the total amount spent, continued to decline in the second month following the cutback in cash grants to welfare recipients.

The number of persons receiving welfare declined by an additional 1,547 from September to October, and the total amount spent on all categories of public assistance dropped by an additional \$132,000 from September to October.

The area where the reduction in cash grants had the most dramatic impact was in the category of aid to the aged. The number of persons receiving that category of aid declined from 17,283 in August, the month before the cutback to 15,239 persons in September, the month the cuts took effect.

It was a reduction of 2,044 in the number of persons receiving aid to the aged, and the number declined by an additional 390 persons from September to October.

Welfare Dept. officials said the reason for the sharp drop in number of persons receiving aid to the aged was the number of elderly persons who had been receiving less than \$23 per month in public assistance.

Households receiving less than that amount were dropped from welfare rolls, although welfare officials said there was some

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compensation in the form of higher Social Security benefits.

Welfare officials said the aid to dependent children (ADC) category did not drop as much as they had expected.

The number of persons receiving ADC dropped by only 430 from August to September—from 78,751 in August to 78,421 in September. The number of persons on ADC declined at a faster rate between September and October. There were 625 fewer persons receiving ADC in October.

The total amount spent on ADC dropped by \$523,000 from August to September—from a total of \$4.24 million in August to a total of \$3.71 million in September.

The statistics show declines in all five categories of welfare from the month before the cuts took effect. There were drops in aid to the aged, aid to the blind and aid to the disabled, the so-called "adult categories," plus declines in ADC and general assistance.

The Welfare Dept. does not have case load statistics for the month of November to show whether or not the trend towards fewer welfare clients and lower outlays for public assistance will continue.

However, the department is projecting that the total amount spent on welfare will increase slightly during the month of November over the month of October. Nonetheless, the amount will be almost \$800,000 less than what was spent during the month before the cuts went into effect.

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Delay In Opening Turon Feedlot

TURON—Mechanical difficulties on the new feed mill installed at the Cattle Feeders Inc. feedlot here have delayed last weeks tentative opening date.

Parts are expected to arrive within a few days, said Don Henderson, feedlot manager and assistant vice president of Cattle Feeders.

The newly developed feedlot, owned by Ninnescan Development Corp. of Turon, is designed for 8,000 head of cattle. Cattle Feeders Inc. will operate the locally developed agri-business under a lease from the development company.

Henderson anticipates the first arrival of cattle at the feedlot this week.

¼ teaspoon nutmeg

Prepare pie crust, rolling to fit 10-inch pizza pan. Make an edge of dough around outer edge to form a crust. Mash cream cheese with fork until soft. Blend in egg, lemon juice, beat until smooth. Pour into crust. Peel, core and chop apples, then spread over cheese layer. Sprinkle with sugar, nuts and spices. Dot with pineapple. Bake in a moderate oven, 350 degrees, for 40 minutes. 1 9-inch baked pie shell or graham cracker crust
1 envelope unflavored gelatin

¼ cup sugar
1 cup cranberry juice
½ teaspoon grated lemon peel
3 egg whites
¼ teaspoon salt
½ cup light corn syrup
Frosted cranberries for garnish
Sprinkle gelatin over cranberry juice in a small saucepan. Let stand a few minutes to soften gelatin. Add sugar and stir over very low heat until gelatin and sugar are completely dissolved. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon peel. Chill to unbeaten egg white consistency. (Don't let it get too stiff or the filling will not be smooth.) Add salt to egg whites and beat until stiff but not dry. Slowly add corn syrup, beating until smooth and glossy. Fold chilled gelatin mixture into beaten whites; chill till thick enough to pile up. This takes about half an hour. Stir mixture occasionally for a very smooth filling. Pile lightly into baked crust and chill. Decorate with Frosted Berries.

FROSTED BERRIES

1 cup fresh cranberries

1 egg white

¼ cup sugar

Wash and dry berries. Beat white till slightly foamy. Toss berries in beaten white. Spread to dry partially and toss in sugar. Dry and place on top of pie.

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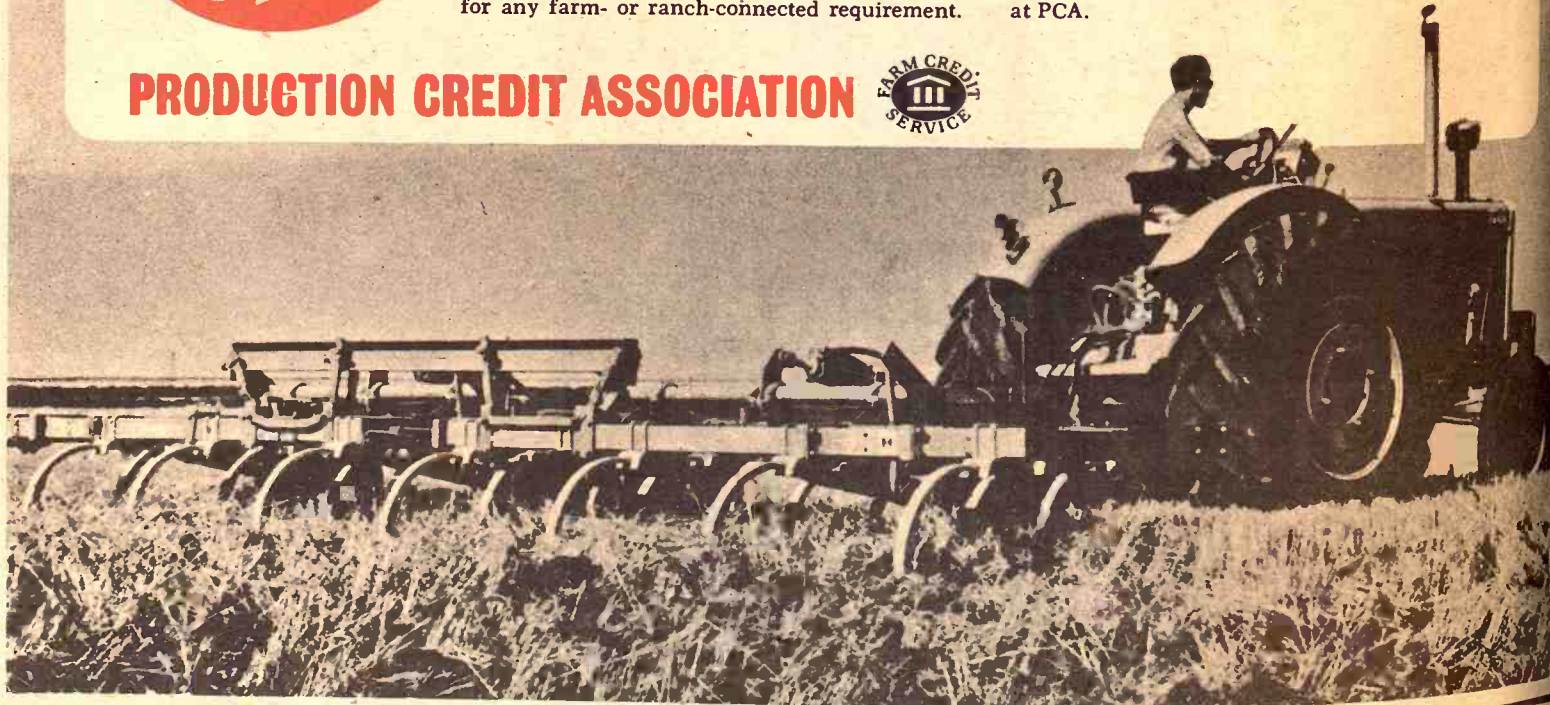

Troubled by a figure that is less than total perfection but can't be changed by diet or exercise? Structural problems, such as a short waist, small bosom, heavy legs, and so on, can't be wished away, but artful dressing can disguise figure faults.

Clever fashion sense can help dieting beauties too. Mask your problems while you diet and exercise your way to a new, slim figure.

If your hips are too heavy, wear longer jackets. A long safari jacket and matching pants tucked into high boots mask heavy thighs too.

Girls who are really tall can cut some of their height by wearing the new longer skirts with a deep center slit. The slit breaks the long line of the figure. A matching coat is an added plus.

Take Special Care When Sewing Velvet

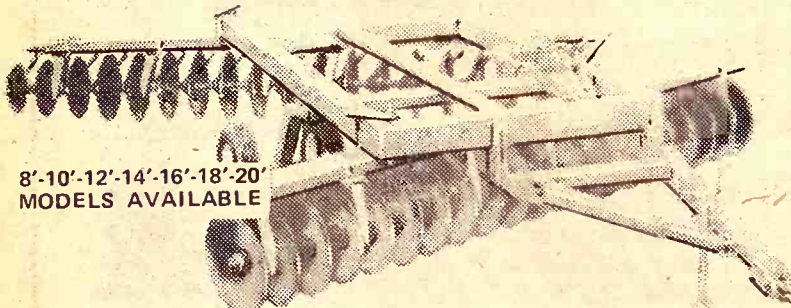
Velvet has become more popular with home seamstresses, but it still requires careful attention.

To avoid slipping while stitching, hand-baste seams with silk thread. Remember that stitching errors leave marks on the velvet's pile. Decrease presser-foot pressure slightly and hold fabric taut to sew.

Consistent Care for Fingernails

Winter weather makes keeping... pretty a problem, so follow... manicure pointers and

maintain regular hand care this winter. Begin a manicure by removing old polish, applying remover with a cotton puff. Apply remover again and let work on stubborn, imbedded flecks of enamel while filing is done. File in one direction, from corner to center to prevent snags. An emery board or triple-cut professional file is best. Apply cuticle softener with a stick. Probing the cuticle with the point of a file risks infection and can also cause malformation of the nail at the base. Trim hangnails with scissors or nippers, being careful not to cut into the flesh. Follow with an application of good-quality witch hazel. The witch-hazel pad will also remove any traces of oily softener. When applying more than one coat of enamel, be sure the base coat is thoroughly dry, otherwise tiny bubbles may form and cause your polish to chip.

Big Step

Bathing alone, unsupervised by mother, is a big step toward growing up. Youngsters generally take over this personal care at about the second or third grade. However, it is important to instruct them on how to wash thoroughly. Plenty of washing is needed to remove perspiration and skin bacteria.

Irrigators Meet At Great Bend This Week

The eighth annual meeting of the Kansas Irrigation and Water Resources Association will be held Wednesday and Thursday, Dec. 1-2, in Great Bend. Theme of the conference is "Our Responsibility for Water Management." Russell Herpich, Extension irrigation specialist at Kansas State University, reports that committee meetings and a board of directors meeting will be held Dec. 1 at the Holiday Inn. Those meetings begin at 1:30 p.m. The general meeting is Dec. 2 in the Knights of Columbus Hall. Registration begins at 8:15 a.m. with the educational program starting at 9 a.m. Herpich says that "the educational information will be highly useful for all Kansas irrigators and water users. The speakers will discuss various means that we can conserve our precious water resources."

A film "The California Water Plan" will kickoff the meeting. Gordon Walhord, chief, Engineering Division of the Albuquerque District Corps of Engineers, will follow with a talk about developing water resources in the upper Arkansas River basin.

Dick Muncie, manager, crop hail division of Kansas Farm Bureau Insurance, will discuss "Adjusting of Insurance for Crop Hail Damage." The annual business meeting of the association will be held immediately prior to lunch.

Following lunch, Dr. Glenn Beck, vice-president for Agriculture at Kansas State University, will give his views about "Water, Agriculture, and the Kansas Economy."

Frank Rayner, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District at Lubbock, Texas, will describe the workings of his district and how it might be applicable to Kansas underground water sources.

Fred Corey, irrigation engineer for Benjamin-Peterson-Kasl Associates, McCook, Neb., will outline an irrigation water scheduling program.

Evans Banbury, superintendent of the Colby Branch Station of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station at KSU, will cite research results showing crop response to selected water management practices. The meeting will be completed at approximately 3:30 p.m.

K-N Natural Gas Gets OK To Raise Rates

Natural gas rate increases for the 37,400 Kansas customers of Kansas-Nebraska Natural Gas Co. have been granted by Kansas Corporation Commission (KCC). The total increase was below the amount sought by the company, said Dale E. Saffels of Topeka, KCC chairman. The company had requested a rate of return of 8.82 per cent which would have raised an additional \$1,649,630 annually, however, the

commission granted a 7.75 per cent rate of return which will raise an additional \$1,375,062 annually.

Saffels noted Kansas-Nebraska already has been authorized a \$489,338 increase because of increased costs of natural gas. Those increased gas prices were authorized by the Federal Power Commission.

The KCC chairman noted in recent rate cases, the commission has taken into consideration the diminishing gas reserves and the fact that they are gradually being replaced by higher priced reserves.

"The commission's conclusion is that there exists too great a disparity between the rates charged the larger users (industrial and wholesale) with rates charged the highest priority customers (the domestic)." "Therefore, the commission is directing that in the rates to be filed, a higher percentage of the increase allowed should be passed on to the domestic customer," Saffels said.

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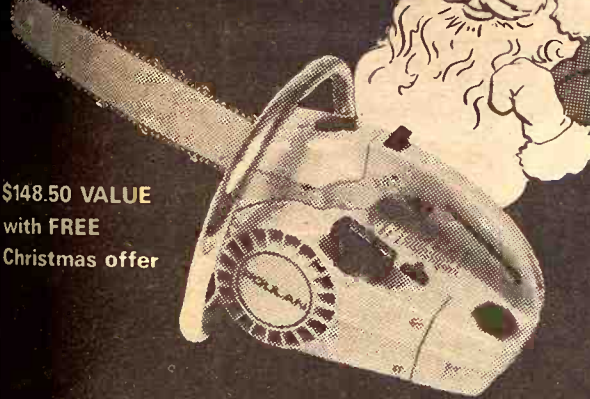


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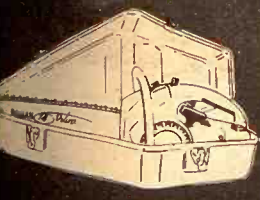
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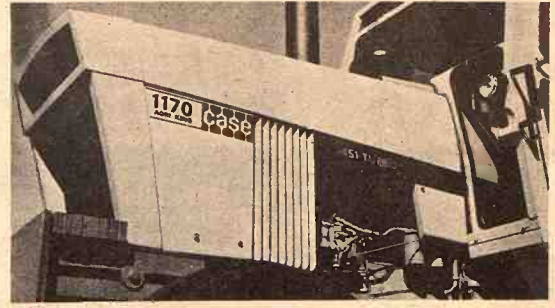

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A Jump In Pork Consumption

Americans have eaten a little less beef this year, the first decrease since 1965, but pork consumption soared because of near-record supplies, says the Agriculture Department.

The per-capita beef consumption is expected to average 113.6 pounds, down only one-tenth of a pound from last year's record. Statistically, however, the dip represented the first drop in six years when per-capita beef-eating averaged 99.3 pounds, half a pound less than in 1964. Pork, on the other hand, jumped to a per-capita average this year of 72.7 pounds, compared with 66.4 in 1970. That is not a record, however. During World War II pork consumption rose to nearly 80

pounds per person.

The total red-meat consumption, computed on the basis of animal carcass weights was estimated at a record 192.2 pounds per capita, compared with 186.3 in 1970. Veal consumption was put at 2.3 pounds per capita, continuing a decline, and lamb and mutton 3.2 pounds, also less.

Chicken consumption, although double that of 15 years ago, was estimated at 40.3 pounds per capita, compared with 41.4 pounds last year. That would be the first sizeable slip since 1960, the report said.

There were "relatively small" per-capita consumption increases for potatoes, vegetable oils, cereal

products, eggs, beans, peas and nuts, which were offset largely by declines for poultry, vegetables, coffee, fish, animal fats and melons, the report said.

Second top-selling bull brought \$1050 from Meenen brothers of Clifton. Bill Scott of Ransom was the consignor.

Edgar Crockett & Sons, Kinsley, and Russel Lawson of Maple Hill bought other high-selling bulls.

Keith Lauer of Abilene had the runnerup in the female judging, and she sold for \$500 to Dorsey Elliott of Sublette.

Britt & Son of Talmage paid \$290 for the top-selling club heifer.

The best-selling club steer came from Warren Campbell of Geneseo and sold for \$315 to Bill Poovey of Westphalia.

Ike Dollar Just Worth A Buck

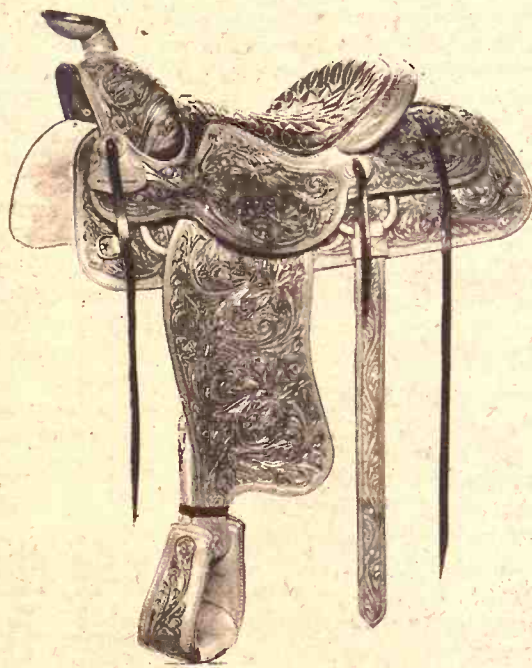
The new Eisenhower dollar worth just \$1, and people should pay a premium for the coins, chairman of the House conservation subcommittee said today.

Soil Testing Needs To Be Done

Soil testing is like a physical examination. What the doctor ordered five years ago may not apply to today's situation.

As in getting a physical, it's just as important for farmers to resample and test fields as it is for those who have not tested their soils at all, suggests Dr. David Whitney, Extension soil testing specialist at Kansas State University.

Soil tests taken 5 to 10 years ago provided farmers with recommended fertilizer rates for optimum profit (based on soil fertility levels of individual fields at that time) but these test values may have increased or decreased so that old recommendations no longer fit field and crop conditions.

Farmers having the most success with fertilizer applications test their fields every three to four years, allowing them to detect declines as well as excessive build-ups. For fields with special problems, soil tests should be taken more often, Whitney adds.

Recent fertilizer use and cropping practices may have elevated soil fertility levels. The soil test tells the producer all about it, in which case he can reduce fertilizer application.

In other instances, yields above those expected may have depleted reserves, so he will need to make an upward adjustment. It is easy to see that in either case, fertilizer recommendations made 5 to 10 years ago would be of little help, says Whitney.

Declining soil test levels mean present fertilizer programs are not meeting crop needs. Excessive nutrient build-ups of phosphorus and nitrogen, on the other hand, can upset crop nutrition and cause yield reductions. Also excessive nutrient build-ups pose potential problems of pollution.

Soil test costs are but a tiny fraction of the actual cost of fertilizer applied and it's probably the best investment the producer will make, says the KSU specialist. Several hundreds of dollars invested in the wrong fertilizer could result in less net profit.

On the majority of Kansas soils a general fertility test, which costs \$1.50, is recommended. This test includes determinations for pH, available phosphorus, exchangeable potassium and lime requirement of samples with a pH of 6.4 or less.

Other tests are available at an

additional cost for determining the amount of available zinc, available nitrogen or organic matter.

Thirty soil testing labs are located in county Extension offices, plus one is at the Garden City Branch Experiment Station and one on the Manhattan Campus. Together these labs test approximately 20,000 soil samples a year.

Farmers should take their samples to the local county Extension office. If a soil testing lab is not located in that county, the Extension office will mail the sample to K-State or Garden City.

Kansas 6th In Farm Exports

Twelve Midwestern states, including Kansas, accounted for 47 percent of all United States farm products exported in fiscal year 1970-71, according to Kansas Secretary of Agriculture Roy Freeland.

Kansas ranked sixth in the nation in total agricultural exports, a position due primarily to wheat and flour volume. Total dollar volume for all Kansas commodities in 1970-71 amounted to \$391.6 million.

Exports of farm products in 1970-71 were \$7.8 billion, equivalent to about 16 percent of the \$49.2 billion that U.S. farmers received from farm marketings in 1970. The output of one of every four harvested acres was exported.

State Departments of Agriculture of the 12 midwestern states have organized the Mid America International Agri-Trade Council (MIATCO) with the cooperation of the Foreign Agricultural Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Participating states in addition to Kansas are Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

MIATCO is designed to work on developing markets for commodities not now represented in foreign trade effort, and to supplement and work with organizations serving specific commodities.

Kansas was seventh among all the states in exporting feed grains, sixth in tallow and lard, eighth in hides and skins, seventh in meat and poultry and ninth in dairy products. Sales of animals and animal products equaled only 12 percent of total farm exports.

G&G Area 4Her In 4H Ceremony With President

Two Kansas 4-H'ers—Russell Crossen, Minneapolis; and Lynn Shannon Carpenter, Stockton—will represent the state's 34,000 4-H members and tens of thousands of alumni during a Presidential ceremony at the 50th National 4-H Congress, this week, in Chicago.

Russell and Lynn will present an official state seal to President Richard M. Nixon during the Congress. The seal will be mounted along with the seals of the other 49 states, District of Columbia, and Puerto Rico to form a commemorative plaque saluting the golden anniversary of the National 4-H Service committee.

The Committee is a private organization serving as a liaison between government and business as the two sectors work together for the advancement of the nationwide 4-H movement. The Annual

Sun Oil Interest - But Not In Sunflower State

Sunflower seeds, a long-time favorite of parrots and children, are beginning to blossom in several U.S. markets.

Such versatility is nothing new inside this country, where the sunflower is the world's second-greatest source of edible oil.

But while foreign growers were developing the native American sunflower into an important cash crop, U.S. farmers were busy growing an Asian plant—the soybean. Today, the soybean is the world's leading oilseed crop, while U.S. sunflower use has been largely limited to the producers of snacks and pet foods.

Now, all this is starting to change. In the past four or five years, more and more U.S. manufacturers are turning to sun oil as an ingredient in food products, including paints, cosmetics, drugs and plastics.

No one is predicting that sunflowers will cut into the soybean market, which currently satisfies 70 percent of the nation's demand for edible oils.

It's also unlikely that the increase in sunflower production will resemble the boom that made beans the glamor crop of the past decades. Crop observers say it may take several more years to develop dependable hybrids and for

demand to pick up enough to make it a consistently profitable crop.

Nonetheless, increasing numbers of farmers are growing sunflowers for the oilseed market. In most cases, they contract with oilseed processors in advance, which assures them a return comparable to what they could expect for other crops. In the two leading sunflower-producing states, Minnesota and North Dakota, about 40,000 acres were planted to sunflowers under such arrangements this year. About half of these plants were high-oil varieties.

This isn't much, compared with the 11 million acres of sunflowers planted in Russia this year. But this year's U.S. acreage represents a five-fold increase from five years ago. Some boosters predict that U.S. farmers will plant one million acres of high-oil sunflowers annually by 1976.

If so, these enthusiasts predict, sun oil production in that year could nudge corn oil aside as the third most widely produced U.S. vegetable oil. Of course, corn oil isn't produced for its own sake. It's a by-product of corn meal and corn syrup manufacturing, so its supply is determined by demand for these other commodities.

By contrast, sun oil is the primary product of the high-oil sunflower.

Consequently, yearly production can be keyed to supply and demand, which could make for a stable market and boost farmers' confidence in growing sunflowers as a cash crop.

Because the surge in sun oil use began so recently, figures aren't available to illustrate current demand. In general, sun oil is interchangeable with oil from other plants, including soybeans, corn, cottonseed, flaxseed and peanuts. "Most users blend it with other oils without labeling it as an ingredient," one industry observer says. "They don't want to get pinned down to any specific oil."

But sun oil has a competitive edge over other oils, its boosters claim: It is 70 percent polyunsaturated. Soybean oil is only 50 percent polyunsaturated and corn oil 55 percent. Saturated fats are those that solidify at room temperature.

The polyunsaturated fat content will boost demand for sun oil in the next few years, these sunflower supporters say, as more and more consumers become concerned about reports of links between the consumption of saturated fats and heart disease.

Per capita consumption of edible fats and oils may reach 58 pounds by 1980, compared with 53 pounds last year, and experts already are noting

a trend to vegetable oils at the expense of animal fats.

But not everyone is convinced that the sunflower will catch on as an oilseed crop. "We're not ready to recommend sunflowers wholeheartedly," says Murray Kinman, an agronomist at Texas A & M University. "The crop isn't as profitable as it should be. Farmers will need either higher prices than they're getting now or bigger yields."

There may be other drawbacks. Sun oil margarine, popular in Europe, flopped in the U.S. a few years ago when it was test-marketed in a small area. An official of one of the concerns that produced the product said consumers didn't like it because it was "grainy."

Still, oilseed pressers are encouraging farmers to grow sunflowers, especially in the Cotton Belt, where a big drop in cotton production has put a damper on the cottonseed crushing industry. "Ten years ago, we crushed 6,000 tons a month, seven months a year," comments Jack W. Kidd, president of Farmers & Ginners Cotton Oil Co., Birmingham, Ala. "Now we're down to 4,000 tons a month, 5½ months a year."

Kidd and his colleagues say they could improve their efficiency and

profits if there were some sunflower seeds to crush each year when the cottonseed supply is exhausted. They add that the seeds also yield a high-protein meal suitable for livestock feeding.

"The information we have indicates that sunflowers should find a place in the Cotton Belt from the Carolinas to California," says Robert J. Miravalle, a plant-breeding specialist for the National Cottonseed Products Association.

While northern farmers experiment with the crop and southern growers contemplate planting it, practically no sunflowers are being grown commercially in Kansas, which calls itself the Sunflower State. Agricultural officials there say this is because commercial varieties are unable to survive the sunflower-eating insects that thrive on the hardy wild sunflowers growing throughout the state.

Strong Demand For Seedlings

Take it from an Extension forester at Kansas State University, the environmental revolution is here to stay.

"I've never seen Kansans so tree-planting conscious, realizing that this is one of the best tools available for cleaning up the environment," enthuses Gary G. Naughton.

"The demand for seedling trees and shrubs for conservation plantings is creating a shortage of nursery stock throughout the United States."

Naughton has been aware of the demand for tree seedlings for some time. But he wasn't totally aware of

the shortage of nursery stock until he began purchasing seedlings for this winter's K-State tree distribution program.

He found some species particularly difficult to purchase, but feels there will be a sufficient supply on hand to meet the needs of most Kansans who order seedlings for 1972 planting.

Of course, the most popular species are the most difficult to locate. These include black walnut, pecan, eastern redcedar, and osageorange. Each will be available, though, during the 1971-72 tree order season.

"Although we've expanded our supply of seedlings this year, we're urging people to send in their orders as early as possible," observes Naughton.

"Fortunately, we've been able to hold our price at last year's level, seedling trees remain an excellent buy."

Order forms are available at county Extension offices. County Extension personnel will help buyers plan their spring planting programs. Twenty nine species of trees and shrubs are on the order form.

Area Bull On Hereford ROM Super-Sire List

The American Hereford Association has announced the addition of the name of the 15th Register of Merit "super ROM" plaque at AHA headquarters in Kansas City.

Tex Real Onward 178, owned jointly by Schlickau Herefords, Haven and Argonia, Kan., Elmer Johnson, Smolan, Kan., and Kansas State University, Manhattan, is the latest addition to the elite list. He was bred by Alex Born & Sons, Follett, Tex., and calved March 3, 1964.

Before he can be classified as an ROM super sire a bull's progeny must earn points in sanctioned ROM Hereford shows and demonstrated superior performance in feedlot and carcass trials.

The "new ROM" with its more stringent qualifications was begun in 1970, and has proven to be a highly successful method of recognizing the Hereford breed's top individual sires.

This is the third ROM sire serving in Kansas herds as "the 178th" joins CK Silver Jet 10, owned by CK Ranch, Brookville, and R Standard Domino 56R, owned jointly by CK Ranch, Budd Hereford Ranch, Big Piney, Wyo., Trademark Farms, Barneveld, Wis., and Jerry Moxley, Council Grove.

"The 178th" is the latest of a rather large family of super sires. His sire, HDR Real Onward 166, is a super sire as are three other sons of "the 166th." His grandsire is also on the plaque.

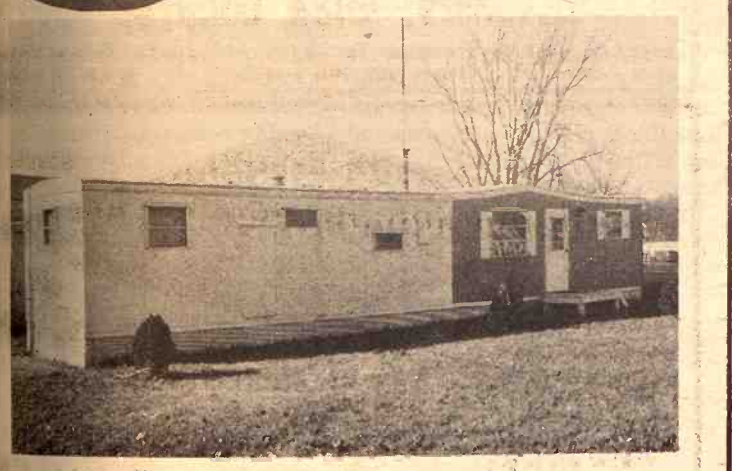

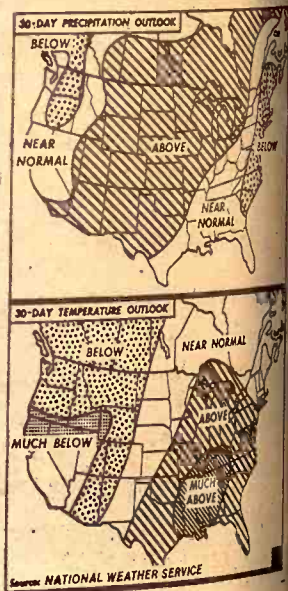

Health Risks In Artificial Breeding

AMES, Iowa—Current interest in beef crossbreeding and the increasing use of artificial in-

semination by individual breeders has sharply increased the risk of spreading diseases through artificial insemination.

This warning comes from Dr. John B. Herrick, Iowa State University extension veterinarian and long-time proponent of AI.

The risk of spreading diseases through AI has always existed. But

because of strict health and disease control procedures used by organized bull studs, AI has actually been an aid in controlling disease.

But now many breeders are collecting, processing and selling semen without health regulations or standards being applied to the donor animals, Herrick points out. He said diseases such as tuberculosis, brucellosis, leptospirosis, vibriosis, and even foot-and-mouth disease can be spread through semen.

This is why members of the committee on infectious disease of cattle of the U.S. Animal Health Association have proposed that the U.S. Department of Agriculture regulate the movement of bull semen across state lines. Such regulations are now in force for semen imported into the United States, Herrick stated.

Donor sires under the proposal would be required to be free of evidence of communicable diseases and have a physical examination by an accredited veterinarian 60 days prior to the first semen collection made for interstate shipment. If the bull remains in continuous production, he must remain negative to tests conducted at intervals of not more than six months.

The proposal would also restrict interstate shipment of semen from donor sires which have been used for natural breeding. Records of examination and tests must be kept available for state and federal inspectors.

Another section of the proposal would set standards for semen processors to follow in the packaging of semen.

Sunday Liquor Sale Loophole In Missouri

It's possible to buy liquor by the bottle now in Missouri.

Liquor sales are still not legal in the state on Sunday in package

stores, groceries, and drug stores.

But a change in law by the legislature allowed sale of liquor by the drink in certain restaurants even on Sundays. Many of these restaurants have also been selling package liquor on Sunday and the

attorney general has ruled that the wording of the law the sale is legal.

The legal opinion is expected to cause package stores, groceries and drug stores to ask the legislature for similar rights.

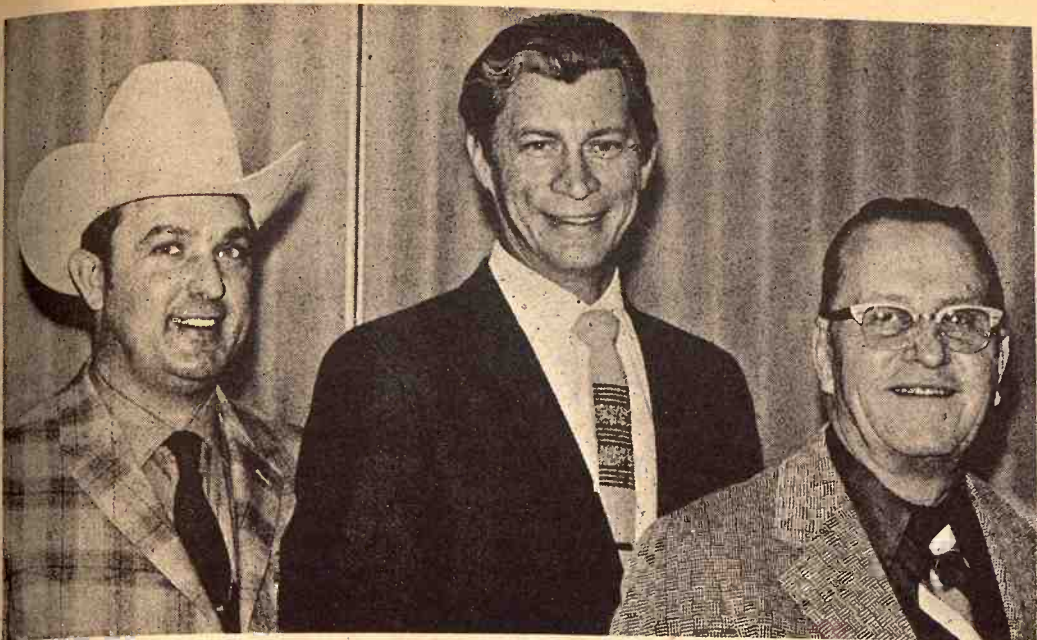

Bull Test Sale Averages \$631

The progressive mindedness of Kansas cattlemen was probably never more evident than at the recent sale of performance tested bulls from the Kansas Bull Test Station near Beloit.

More than 700 cattlemen jammed the new livestock building on the Mitchell County Fairgrounds—despite rainy muddy weather and chill temperatures—to drive the bidding high for the bulls scoring highest in performance and having the most modern conformation.

Sixty-three bulls representing seven breeds or crosses sold under the gavel of Hutchinson auctioneer Gene Watson. The average price for all bulls was \$631.

Herman Westmeyer, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University and a member of the Bull Test Committee, said he believes the turnout for the sale, especially in view of the inclement weather, proves that many Kansas cattlemen are seeing the advantages they can get from a performance tested bull. They showed us that they'll buy good testing, modern bulls, if we can provide them."

Two bulls shared top selling honors at \$1110 each. A Shorthorn, Dan Dee Napoleon, owned by Lindee Farms, Galva, sold to Robert Ahlschwede and Sons of Crete, Neb. A Simmental-Hereford crossbred bull that was the highest indexing bull in the sale and owned by Hills, Inc., of Mankato, Kans., sold to Larry Kindig of Osborne.

Ahlschwede's Shorthorn bull gained 3.41 pounds per day on the 220-day test. His weight per day of age was 3.06 pounds, his 365-day weight was 1117 pounds, and his backfat thickness was only two-tenths of an inch.

Kindig's Simmental-Hereford bull gained 4.03 pounds per day. His weight per day of age was 3.25 pounds, his 365-day weight was 1187

pounds, and his backfat thickness was one-quarter of an inch.

Eight Angus bulls sold for an average of \$615. Highest selling Angus went to Bob Burgess of Wamego. He was owned by Everett Benoit of Esbon.

Fourteen Hereford bulls averaged \$497. Highest selling Hereford went to Harry Walker of WaKeeney for \$680. He was owned by Wayne Billings, Jetmore, Kan.

Eight Charolais bulls averaged \$574. Highest selling Charolais went to Dana Cox of Newton for \$735. He was owned by Mo Charo Ranch, Shawnee Mission, Kan.

Twenty-six Simmental crossbred bulls averaged \$730, which was the

highest group average in the sale. The highest selling bull went to Larry Kindig, Osborne, Kan. for \$1110.

Five Milking Shorthorns averaged \$442. Two Milking Shorthorn bulls shared high selling honors in their breed at \$510. Darrell Boyd of Beattie Kan., and Leo and John Wilson of Glasco, Kan., each bought a bull owned by Virgil Wegener of Norton, Kan.

The only Shorthorn bull in the sale was the one purchased by Robert Ahlschwede of Crete, Neb., for \$1110. The only Murray Grey crossbred bull in the sale sold to Randy Scott of Jennings, Kan., for \$450. He was owned by Allen Worcester, Hill City,

Kan. Worcester also had a Simmental cross bull on test that sold to Roy Stroup of Fontana, Kan., for \$1000, making it the third highest selling bull in the sale.

An educational program was held prior to the sale. Dr. Milton England, head of the animal science department at Panhandle A & M College, Goodwell, Okla., presented information about how performance tested bulls could increase profits. Dr. Don Good, head of the Kansas State University animal science and industry department, praised both the bull test station and the cattlemen in attendance who wanted to buy performance tested bulls.

The Kansas Bull Test Station is jointly sponsored by the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University and the Kansas Livestock Association.

More States Now Cholera Free

The nationwide program of hog cholera eradication is moving rapidly toward a successful completion. Since October 1, Kansas, Colorado, Hawaii, Maryland and Nebraska were declared free of the

November 30, 1971

swine disease by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The goal is nationwide eradication by December, 1972. Kansas is one of 28 states free of the disease. To be declared hog cholera free, a state must not have had a confirmed case for a period of one year and all protective measures established by the USDA must have been carried out.

Belleville Man To Shawnee Co. FB Post

Ralph Huffman of Belleville has been named to succeed State Rep. La Verne Spears of Rossville as manager of the Shawnee County Farm Bureau. Spears recently retired from the post upon reaching the mandatory retirement age of 65.

Spears had been bureau manager for 32 years. He took the position in 1939, one year after the Kansas Farm Bureau was organized.

Huffman has been manager of the Republic County bureau for the past few years.

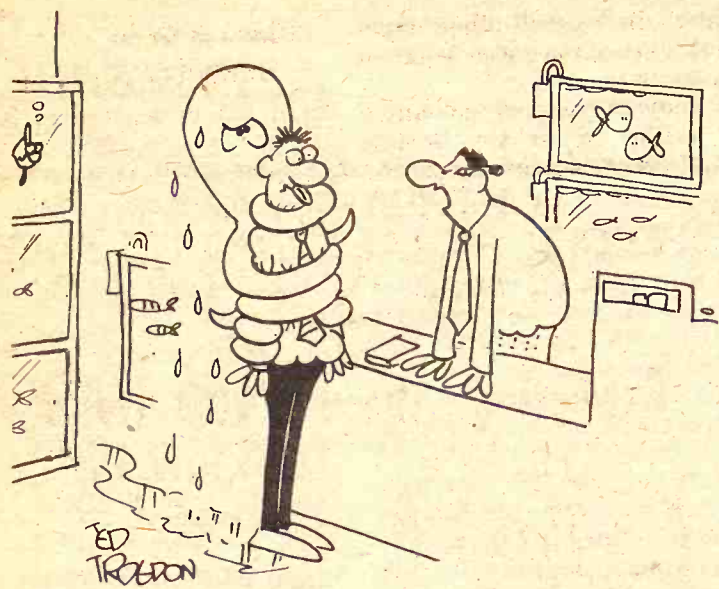

More Complaints That Tenure Holds Poor Teachers

The same laws that protect the jobs of qualified teachers make it extremely difficult for a school board to fire a poor teacher.

As a result teacher tenure laws—on the books in 46 states—are coming under fire from more school superintendents and boards of education.

At least 15 state legislatures are acting currently to eliminate or substantially modify tenure laws. A recent poll of school superintendents and school board members by the National School Boards Association revealed a majority would like to see tenure abolished.

The association in its November journal said in states having teacher tenure laws a teacher could not be fired without an out-and-out fight. "As one superintendent put it," the article said, "if I can't catch a teacher in the act of molesting a student and in front of witnesses—there's not a damn thing I can do to get him out of the system."

The association said the tenure system could be modified to weed out incompetents by revised state laws granting tenure for a limited period of time—perhaps for five years—at the end of which the teacher would have to apply for renewal. Currently any teacher who has served in a school district for a certain length of time is granted tenure for the duration of his employment.

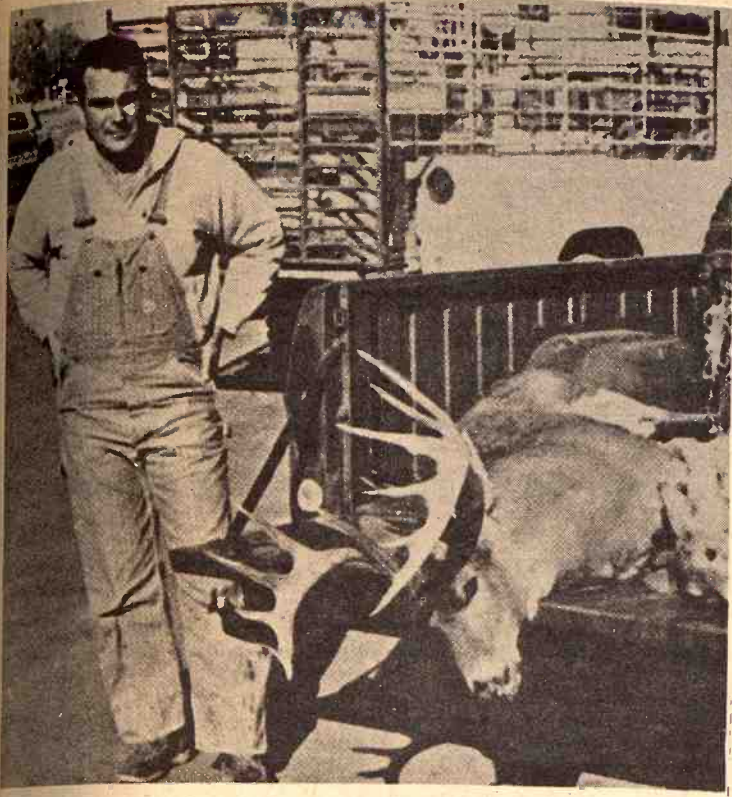

THE HIGHWAY GOT 'EM

Deer have become plentiful enough in some parts of the G&G area that they have become a more than ordinary highway hazard. Here, Dudley Foster, game protector from Minneapolis, shows a 250-lb. whitetail buck which was one of four deer struck by automobiles on US81 in half a day. Foster said 18 were killed by cars in two weeks.

Damage to automobiles is often \$300 or more and Foster said two of the cars which hit deer in his area were regarded to be totally wrecked.

Women Return To Pill Use

Women who quit using birth control pills after publicity concerning their use have apparently returned to them.

Subcommittee hearings in the Senate in early 1970 called attention to certain risks in birth control pills, especially blood clotting, and the result was a decline in their use.

A Gallup poll, taken at the time of the hearings, indicated that 18 percent of the women using the pill had stopped and another 23 percent were considering quitting.

But pill manufacturers say sales have increased after the short-lived

decline. Industry magazines now say that 10 million women use the pill compared to about 8 million before the publicity concerning risks of the the pill.

Reasons given for the increased use of the pill are its effectiveness compared to other methods and conclusions that risks of childbirth are greater than the risks in the pill itself.

Another reason women—in particular older women—may be turning to the pill, some doctors say, is the estrogen in it. Estrogen, one of the female sex hormones, prolongs youthful life and delays and treats menopausal symptoms, think many gynecologists.

Doctors also seem prepared now to discount the findings of the 1970

hearings. After the hearings, Dr. John Shrogie was appointed chief of the fertility regulation methods evaluation branch of the Center for Population Research, a government agency. His job was to conduct further studies on the side effects of the pill in light of the testimony at the hearings. Shrogie, who formerly worked in the Food and Drug Administration, said several studies on the possibility of cancer, strokes and thromboembolism (blood clots) were made.

"As far as we can determine," Shrogie said, "we don't see any serious problems with cancer of the breast or cervix and the possibility of pill users having strokes is minimal."

"Thromboembolism is possible with use of oral contraceptives," Shrogie said. "However our studies indicate that with lower dosages of estrogen the problem seems to be diminishing," he said.

The one thing that has affected the use of the pill is the liberalized New York state abortion law, Dr. Renner said. The Suffolk obstetrician said, however, that abortions were more dangerous than the pill. He said, "In New York City last year eight deaths occurred out of every 100,000 abortions while only 1.5 deaths were caused by the pill."

No Reason Yet For Pipeline Explosion At Olpe

EMPORIA—No cause has been determined of a pipeline explosion early Friday near here that shot flames 100 feet into the air and blackened a 250-foot patch of land.

The explosion occurred about 3:10 a.m. in a line of Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Co. about 8½ miles southeast of Emporia. Nearby fences, a corral and several highline poles were damaged by the blast, but no one was injured.

The fire went out after pipeline crews rerouted the gas to other lines. Service was not disrupted.

Area residents said the ground rocked for a couple of minutes, and

windows, dishes and other items rattled. Flames were seen as far as 20 miles away.

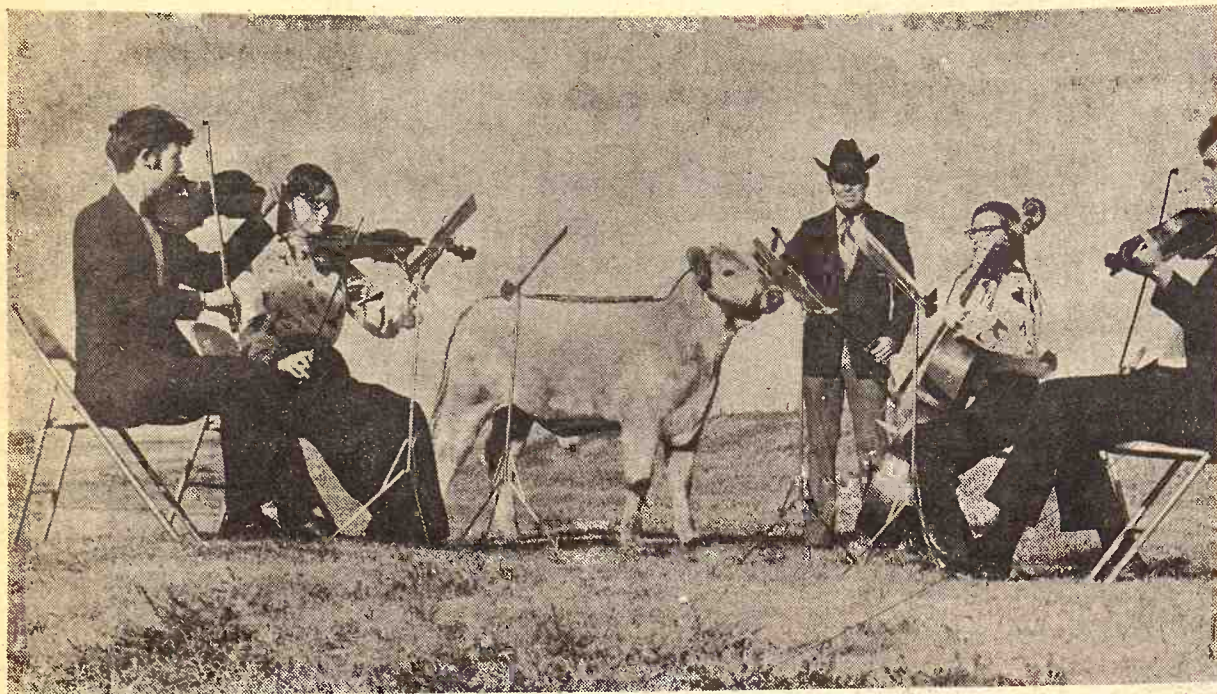

Seven More Bridges Posted For Lower Limits

Seven more bridges on the Kansas Highway System will be posted this week for loads less than legal licensed weights, according to John D. Montgomery, director of highways.

On the state highway system,

bridge postings now total 102 of 152 that have been inspected. These result from federal bridge inspection regulations written to comply with the 1968 and 1970 Federal Aid Highway Acts passed by the Congress. The latest seven to be posted are for load weights from eight tons to 30 tons, depending on the type of vehicle.

On the county federal aid highway system, bridge inspections have been completed on about 300 bridges; and 25 percent of these either have or will be closed since

they cannot safely carry loads of more than three tons, Montgomery said.

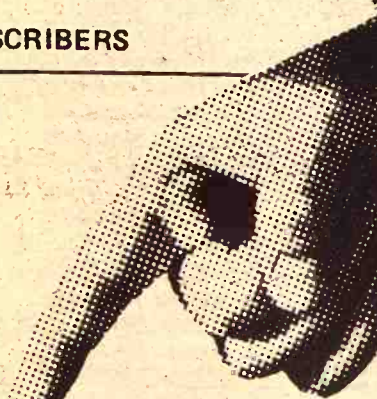

Dollar Impact From Pay Raises At Fort Riley

FT. RILEY—Military pay raises which went into effect at Ft. Riley this month will add \$1.2 million per month to the pay checks of soldiers here, Ft. Riley authorities say.

The \$13 million per year which

goes primarily to those serving in the lower enlisted and commissioned ranks, boosts the post's annual military and civilian pay roll to \$200 million, the largest in Kansas.

The biggest effect of the pay raise was for the basic recruit whose salary jumped from \$1,618 to \$3,222 per year. Throughout the armed forces the average increase was 15 per cent, as approved by the pay board.

With the hiring of 90 civilians two weeks ago to take over kitchen police duties from military personnel the Ft. Riley payroll topped the 3,000 mark.

Older Population In Midwest

Iowa and Nebraska ranked second highest in the nation with the number of citizens 65 years or older,

November 30, 1971

a survey of the 1970 census figures by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Administration on Aging shows.

Of the six states in the country which ranked highest by per cent of population aged 65 or older—12 per cent or more—five are in the central region. Three of those five are in the area comprising the federal government's Region VII— Iowa, Nebraska, Missouri and Kansas.

Iowa and Nebraska show 12.4 per cent of their total population being in the senior citizen category. Missouri had 12 per cent and Kansas was close behind with 11.9.

Iowa's aged 65-plus population, 350,293, represents an increase since 1960 from 11.9 per cent of its total population; Nebraska's 183,526 an increase from 11.6 per cent; Missouri 560,656 an increase from 11.7 per cent and Kansas' 266,201 an increase from 11 per cent.

Deer Hunters Need Dental Training

Firearms deer hunters will need some dental technician know-how this year as they extract the two lower, front teeth of animals they bag. The teeth are to be mailed to the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission at Pratt for research purposes.

Firearms deer permits were mailed to 8,624 successful applicants recently. The mailed packets held metal locking tags to be affixed to the bagged deer, report cards which must be mailed to the commission within 10 days after the close of the season and a pre-addressed envelope for holding the deer teeth. Directions for extracting are included.

Commission biologists formerly extracted the lower jaw of deer brought to a deer check station by hunters in order to determine the age of deer. This with other report information mirrors field condition of Kansas' deer herds.

No wide scale use of check stations will be needed this year. Much of the information desired by biologists was collected in prior years of Kansas deer hunting.

Stations this season will be located within the High Plains, Solomon, Republican, Kirwin-Webster and Red Hills deer management units with exact locations to be announced later.

Primarily whitetails will be available to eastern hunters and mule deer will comprise the bulk of the harvest for western nimrods.

The archery deer season, split this year, closed last week until the second segment of Dec. 11-31.

Good Safety Record From Deerhunters

The state of Kansas boasts six consecutive seasons of deer hunting without injuries or accidents. The Forestry, Fish and Game Commission wants to make it seven.

The eastern Kansas deer season started last Sunday and is to last eight days and cover two-thirds of the state.

The western season opens Dec. 4 and continues through Dec. 8.

Canada Less Lure To Migrants

Immigration to Canada is running 17 per cent behind 1970 figures although trend-bucking Americans continue to arrive in record numbers.

Nine-month statistics show 17,270 arrivals from the United States compared with 9,060 from England, usually the leading source of immigrants.

Meanwhile, over-all nine-months figures list 94,005 arrivals compared with 113,323 in the same period of 1970. The total for last year was 167,713 but it appears unlikely to pass 125,000 this year—which would be the lowest annual total since 1964 when Canada was pulling out of a recession.

The latest downturn in immigration began with inflation and unemployment gradually setting in during 1968. Immigration Minister Otto Lang attributed last

years figure to economic conditions in this country and to a prosperous situation in Europe.

Europe, the traditional source of manpower for Canada, sent only 40,530 immigrants up to Sept. 30 this year compared with 59,467 in the

same period of 1970.

American migration north continued the steady increase that began as the Vietnam war and urban violence in the U.S. focused attention on Canada as a more pacific home.

Drop Corporate Limits On Four Big Packers

The Justice Department has agreed to free four of the nation's leading meat packers from the restraints of a 1920 consent decree which barred them from entering more than 100 lines of business.

The four companies, Swift & Co.; Armour & Co.; Wilson & Co.; and Cudahy Co., were restrained by the 1920 antitrust decree from entering non-meat food lines as well as various non-food lines.

Court concurrence still is required to free the four companies from most of the old restraints, but the Justice Department's agreement was a vital first step. The companies had tried in the 1930s and again in the 1950s to gain their freedom, but the department opposed them. A formal motion to amend the 1920 decree is expected to be filed in district court in Chicago in about 30 days which will allow interested parties time to "make their views known."

The meat packers consented to the 1920 decree as a means of settling a suit that charged them with violating the Sherman Antitrust Act.

The suit alleged a variety of violations, including price fixing and abuse of monopoly power in the sale and distribution of meat and other food products.

The decree, among other things,

barred the companies from manufacturing, wholesaling or retailing in more than 100 product lines. It also barred them from acquiring any other concern that manufactured, wholesaled or retailed the prohibited product lines.

The amended decree, by agreement of the packers and the Justice Department, wouldn't allow the companies to enter the prohibited lines at the retail level. Also, it would impose routine restriction on reciprocity, by barring use of the packers' buying or selling power to promote sales in any of the currently prohibited product lines.

Farmland Refund Of \$29 Million From Meat Packing

Farmland Foods has announced an unprecedented distribution of patronage refunds and expansion plans involving two locations in Iowa.

Refunds totaling \$2,974,573 will be paid members who have marketed hogs and cattle through Farmland Foods, a subsidiary of Farmland Industries, in the fiscal year ended Aug. 31. At that date, Farmland Foods had 9,014 producer-members.

"This is the largest patronage refund ever paid by the organization and it dramatically reflects the value of the cooperative approach to farmer needs," Ernest T. Lindsey,

chairman of the board of Farmland Foods, said.

Refunds for the full year are paid on dollar purchases and average \$1.22 per hog and \$2.48 per head of cattle. The refund will be paid 35 per cent in cash and the balance in capital equity fund certificates.

Two Lyons, Nebr., hog producers rank 1 and 2 in number of hogs sold to Farmland Foods in the last fiscal year.

Rounding out the "top 10" in hog sales were producers from Iowa Falls, Ia., South Amana, Ia.; Tekamah, Nebr., Archer, Ia.; Galt, Ia.; Whittemore, Ia.; Woden, Ia.; and Alden, Ia.

The top five sellers of cattle to the Farmland beef plant at Garden City, Kans., were Leoti, Kans.; Scott City, Kans.; Alva Okla.; and Granada, Colo.

Regarding expansion plans, Fred R. Clymer, Farmland Foods president, said "sales of processed products are on a successful, upward trend which necessitates an expansion of these operations at this time." To accomplish this, the Denison, Ia., plant will be enlarged to increase production of sliced bacon and smoked meat products. Pork cutting at Denison will be enlarged to handle twice the present volume. Conversion facilities will be added to further refinement of fresh and frozen pork cuts to provide a new line of case and consumer-ready products.

Farmland Foods' Denison plant now employs more than 500 persons. About 80 additional employees will be required for the total expansion at Denison. The increased curing, smoking and slicing phase is scheduled for completion early in 1973. The added pork cutting and conversion facilities are scheduled to start production in September, 1974.

Farmland's meat canning operations will be transferred from Denison to Carroll, Ia., Clymer said.

The Carroll plant will eventually employ more than 200 persons and will be ready for operation in the fall of 1972. Farmland is acquiring existing facilities from the Ocoma Foods Company. They will be remodeled for meat canning which will result in a modern meat canning plant. It will be a major expansion of

this activity.

Farmland Food's business, with sales approaching an annual rate of \$200 million, has developed over the last 12 years.

W. Gordon Leith, Farmland Foods vice-chairman, who has been active in the food marketing program over this period of time, said: "With the continued keen interest livestock producers have in food marketing, and the acceptance of our product lines in the marketplace, it is essential that Farmland Foods continue its expansion planning and execute these plans as they prove themselves to be feasible."

Long-range plans call for a

balance growth in all phases of livestock and meat program added.

Farmland Foods facilities, other than those at Denison, include a plant at Iowa Falls, Ia.; the plant at Garden City, Kans.; and turkey processing facility at Cheraw, Colo.

Farmland Foods markets products in 42 states and serves foreign countries through company sales organization and network of meat specialty brokers and distributor representatives.

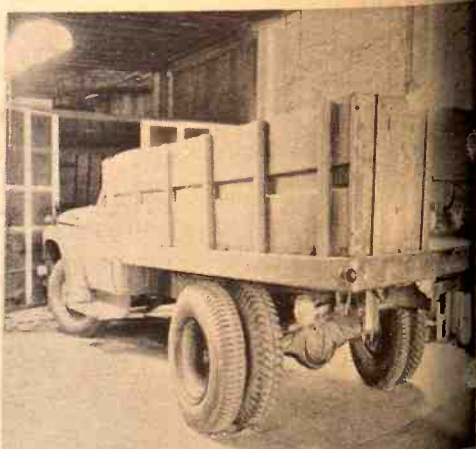

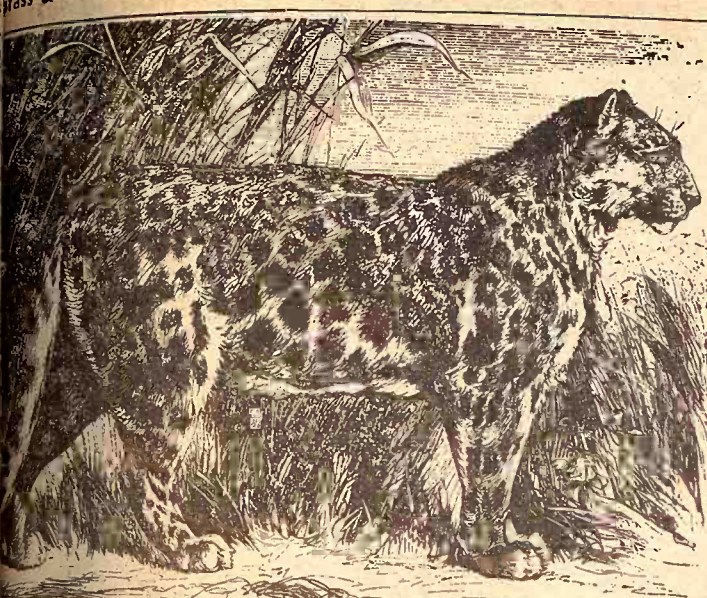

Less Gasoline Tax Collections

James T. McDonald, state tax director, reports that motor-vehicle fuel tax collections in October were down more than 25 per cent from the same month in 1970.

It was the second month in a row the fuel tax collections had dipped below the receipts for the same month in 1970.

Collections in October were \$5.36 million, compared with \$7.21 million in October, 1970.

That brought the total for the previous 12 months to \$83.03 million, compared to \$83.97 million for the year before that.

Refunds of the gasoline tax totaled \$8.63 million, or 11.6 per cent in October.

Farmers Union Closer To Regaining National Charter?

The Kansas Farmers Union, which surrendered its charter to the National Farmers Union, may be getting close to regaining it. Many KFU members think that initial steps toward regaining the charter will be made at the state convention at Salina this week. The organization has continued to maintain membership and hold conventions since 1967 even though there is no actual state organization. Dale Lyon, Smith county farmer from Athol, has held the appointed post of legislative director and has been the spokesman for the group.

Farmers Union organized in 1907 and often has been a major voice in the national group. Tony Dechant, the current national president, originally came from Ellis county. In fact, of seven men who have held the top position of the NFU, four have had Kansas origins. C. E. Huff came Norton county, John Vesecky from Mitchell county, and Jim Patton, Dechant's predecessor, hailed from Bazaar. The state organization was broken by a scandal involving Martin J. Byrne, under whom Farmers Union had its greatest membership in the

1950s. Byrne was president from 1953 until 1960, then resigned because of ill health. He was reelected in 1962, to be succeeded by William Daniels of Cimarron, in 1966.

Shortly after Byrne was succeeded by Daniels it was revealed that the Kansas FU was restrained from selling certificates of indebtedness. Reportedly, more than \$300,000 worth of unsecured certificates were sold by Byrne, who was not registered as a security broker.

Byrne was charged in Rush county court but the case never came to trial. The Kansas organization had to file for bankruptcy the next year, showing assets of \$96,000 and debts of over \$450,000.

An insurance company operated by the organization was reformed as a separate company and continues to operate.

Many people, of course, lost money from the bankruptcy and the unsecured certificates but no other suits were ever filed against Byrne. The Kansas charter was

surrendered in early 1967. Many members, however, have continued to affiliate with the national organization and money has come from the headquarters at Denver to support Lyon in lobbying activities.

Kansas members have continued to attend national conferences and the state is entitled to a delegate to the national convention.

The NFU says Kansas still has about 10,000 members, more than enough for a state charter. NFU rules also require geographic balance, a strong financial structure, and other indications of permanence. Dechant has said that the Kansas group could get its charter reinstated "within two or three

years." The 10,000 figure for Kansas membership compares with 90,000 for the Kansas Farm Bureau, 4000 for the Kansas Livestock Association. It is also lower than estimates for the Kansas Assn. of Wheatgrowers and the National Farmers Organization, now thought to have between 25,000 and 35,000 members.

But Lyon notes: "We don't play games with our membership. There is a difference between a paper count that includes non-farmer members who belong for insurance purposes and actual, active farmers."

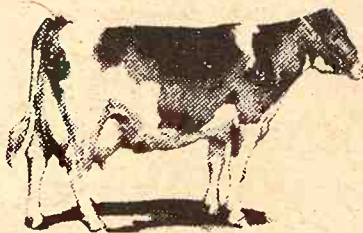

Best Wheat Pasture For Grazing Since '65

Wheat pastures in the western two-thirds of Kansas improved greatly from mid-October to mid-November.

On the latter date, 45.0 percent of the seeded wheat acreage had sufficient growth to provide pasture for livestock compared with only 5.0 percent a month earlier. This was the largest percentage for November since 1965.

Some 13.0 percent of the seeded wheat acreage was actually being pastured, also the highest November

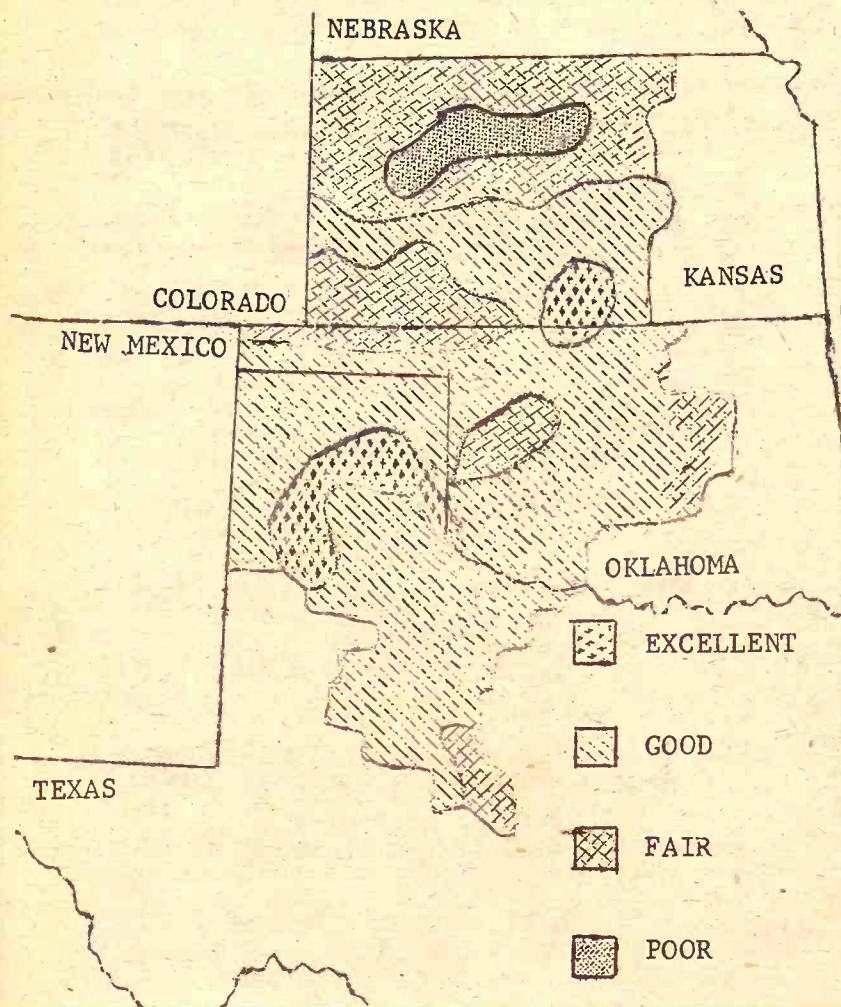
percent since 1965.

This compares with only 0.2 percent a month earlier and 8.0 percent a year ago.

The percent of seeded wheat acreage available for pasture in the central and south central districts was 53 and 71 percent, respectively. The other districts ranged from 21 percent in north central Kansas to 42 percent in the southwest district.

The acreage required to carry a 400-pound calf through fall and winter was six acres. This is the least acres required in the last seven years.

Surface and sub-soil moisture supplies are mostly adequate and grazing prospects in most of south-western and south central Kansas are very good.



Great Plains Area

Available forage supplies from seeded wheat in the 3-State area of Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas, as of November 15, were the best since 1965. In much of south central Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas, forage supplies were mostly good.

Two areas, one in south central Kansas and the other in the northern plains of Texas, showed excellent forage conditions.

Poor forage conditions were reported in only a few counties located mostly in north central Kansas.

By mid-November nearly 55 percent of the seeded wheat acreage in the three-State wheat pasture region had sufficient growth to pasture livestock. This was more than double a year earlier and the largest for mid-November since 1965.

About 23 percent of the seeded acreage was actually being pastured at mid-month compared with 13 percent a year ago. The percent of the available acreage being grazed in mid-November was also the highest since 1965. Moisture supplies in most of the region are adequate to abundant.

Oklahoma (Western)

Wheat fields in the five western districts of Oklahoma were providing the best mid-November grazing of the past decade.

Two-thirds of the wheat acreage had sufficient growth for grazing, just slightly more than in mid-November 1965. Nearly one-third of the wheat acreage was being grazed, a better utilization than in 1965 when plants were not well rooted down, but slightly below the utilization in mid-November 1968 when moisture and weather were favorable.

Early sown wheat fields were providing a good to excellent amount of forage. The wheat acreage required to carry a 400-pound calf averaged 3 acres, the lowest since 1961.

Temperatures have been favorable for wheat growth

the past month. Moisture is generally adequate but additional moisture will be needed for continued growth. Many cattle have been moved into the wheat districts and demand for grazing stock was strong.

Texas (Plains)

Seeded wheat fields in the northern high plains and southern low plains of Texas were providing good to excellent forage for livestock. About 64 percent of the 1972 wheat acreage had sufficient growth to pasture by November 15, highest since 1965.

Nearly 40 percent of the seeded wheat acreage was actually being grazed at mid-November, well

above a year ago and about the same as in 1969.

An average of 3 acres was required to carry a 400-pound calf the lowest in recent years.

Moisture supplies are good, and prospects for grazing during the coming month very favorable.

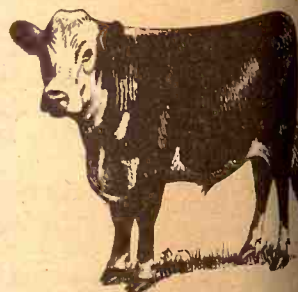
