SALARY STATUS OF PUBLIC SECONDARY SCHOOL COUNSELORS IN KANSAS FOR THE YEAR 1960-1961

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INTRODUCTION

The need for constructive personal guidance in our high schools has been increasing steadily. The curriculum is more complicated than ever before and the diversity of higher education bewildering. About one-third of all high school graduates now enter college. For those who don't go, many more vocations are open today than a generation ago. Expert guidance is essential for youngsters who generally can't get it from their parents.

Moreover, with a large number of U. S. students dropping out of high school each year, there is a huge waste of our human resources. Yet, as Irwin (1) pointed out, at least 40 percent of our secondary schools have no guidance counselor at all. And many of the existing guidance men and women are inadequately trained.

Spurred by the National Defense Education Act of 1958, schools all over the country began launching counseling programs and expanding the programs they already had in operation. It was estimated that 25,000 new school counselors would be employed within the next ten to twenty years. Thousands more counselors would be needed in the other areas of work.

It is true that few counselors acquire wealth. It is also true that the work is emotionally and, often, physically exhausting, that some students and other clients may be incredibly defensive and exasperating, that counselors face many frustrations in sensing their own inadequacies and in the lack

of comprehension upon the part of others. Yet, the rewards of the profession are many and wonderful. Counselors do constructive work with human lives and many times can see tangible results. Most clients have respect and warm affection for counselors, and some take pains to let them know it. The duties are usually interesting, always varied -- as interesting and varied as people are. The hours are as reasonable as in any profession, the working conditions good, and in institutional service there are extra benefits like pensions and health protection plans. A counselor enjoys stature in the community as a specialist. A great educator once said that a counselor is a person with a sense of immortality, for to leave a vestige of oneself in the development of another is a touch of immortality. Through this we find an impelling and sufficient reason for living. Through this we live far beyond our span of years.

STATEMENT OF PROBLEM

The purpose of this study was to ascertain the salary status of persons assigned time in Kansas public secondary schools for guidance and counseling for the year 1960-1961. The problem was handled and subsquently answered in relation to four distinct aspects; (1)qualifications of counselor, (2)size of school, (3)salary differential east and west of U.S. Highway 81, (4)time allotted for counseling.

DEFINITION OF TERMS

In accordance with the state of Kansas <u>Certificate Hand-</u> <u>book</u> (7), dated January 1, 1959, the writer defined standard and minimum qualifications as follows:

Standard qualifications

The counselor shall:

- (1) hold degree certificate for teaching at the level in which he was to serve as a counselor,
- (2) have had at least three years successful teaching or counseling experience in an accredited elementary or secondary school,
- (3) present evidence of twenty-four months of cumulative work experience at a wage earning job other than teaching, and
- (4) hold a master's degree, including sixteen semester hours of graduate^{*} credit in professional guidance courses with credit in the Basic Course and in each of the areas as follows: Analysis of the individual, occupational information, counseling techniques, supervised practice in guidance services, and administrative relationships of the guidance program.

Minimum qualifications

The counselor shall:

- (1) hold degree certificate for teaching at the level in which he was to serve as counselor,
- (2) have had at least two years successful teaching or counseling experience in an accredited elementary or secondary school,
- (3) present evidence of twelve months of cumulative work experience at a wage earning job other than teaching, and

Up to three semester hours undergraduate credit in the Basic Course was accepted here. (4) have had at least twelve semester hours of graduate^{*} credit in professional guidance with credit in the Basic Course and in at least three of the areas as follows: Analysis of the individual, occupational information, counseling techniques, supervised practice in guidance services, administrative relationships of the guidance program.

Secondary schools

For purposes of this thesis, all public secondary schools accredited by the Kansas State Department of Public Instruction were included, four year, junior high, senior high, and six year schools. All such schools listed on the <u>Report of Guidance Service Programs in Kansas Secondary Schools¹</u> were included in this study. Attention is drawn to the fact that this was not all of the public secondary schools in Kansas in 1961, but only those which reported having assigned guidance time allotted to some member of the school staff.

Counselor

Counselor was so defined as to mean any school staff member with assigned guidance time as reported on the <u>Report of</u> <u>Guidance Service Programs in Kansas Secondary Schools.</u>

PROCEDURE

Data used in this report were secured from the Kansas State Department of Public Instruction located in Topeka. The two specific sources were the <u>High School Principal's Organization</u> <u>Report² and the Report of Guidance Service Programs in Kansas</u> ¹See Appendix B ²See Appendix A

Secondary Schools. Duplicates of both are to be found as appendices of this thesis. The writer spent several days in Topeka collecting the data. Once the data had been obtained. the writer bisected the state using U. S. Highway 81 as the dividing line. With the exception of Wichita, all towns located on U. S. Highway 81 were considered to be west of U. S. Highway 81. As for Wichita, the writer talked with residents of Wichita in order to ascertain on which side of U.S. Highway 81 each particular school was located. and they were grouped accordingly. It was felt that the salaries of these schools would be large enough to have a significant effect on the overall picture of counselor salary status in Kansas. Further delineation was processed by size of school as well as specific classification of school personnel as to qualification. Once this had been done. the procedure was then to arrive at an hourly pay schedule of the specific personnel. On the basis of information obtained from the Report of Guidance Service Programs in Kansas Secondary Schools, the writer divided the total salary reported on the High School Principal's Organization Report by six, since a full time counselor was given credit for counseling six hours per day. The tables in this thesis report both the mean hourly pay and the mean annual pay of guidance personnel in the state of Kansas for the school year 1960-1961.

REVIEW OF LITERATURE

In reviewing the related literature, the writer was somewhat surprised to find so little written directly related to the subject. Much had been put on paper regarding the classroom teacher's salary, but so very little written as regards the counselor's salary. Authorative literature included the cost of operating the guidance service program but neglected to mention the most obvious cost. the counselor's salary.

Perhaps to recall some of the principles of salary scheduling in search of inherent connotations regarding a salary differential between classroom teachers and personnel other than classroom teachers would be beneficial. The N.E.A. Research Division (2) presented such a set of principles in a leaflet entitled <u>The Local</u> <u>Association Works on Salaries</u>. The principles were postulated as follows:

- 1. Minimum salaries should be high enough to attract well-educated, promising young people to the teaching profession.
- 2. Maximum salaries should be high enough to retain highly competent and professionally ambitious men and women in classroom teaching.
- 3. Equity of treatment of classroom teachers of like qualifications and experience is essential.
- 4. Annual increments should provide an orderly progress to the maximum salary.
- 5. The salary schedule should offer professional stimulation through incentives in recognition of professional qualifications.
- 6. Salary schedules should be adjusted periodically with due considerations for trends in earnings in other professional occupations and for changes in the cost of living.
 7. Salaries of professional school personnel other than
- 7. Salaries of professional school personnel other than classroom teachers should be scheduled in accordance with the principles that apply to classroom teachers, with suitable recognition of responsibilities and

preparation for leadership.

8. There should be professional participation by classroom teachers in the development and administration of salary policies.

Principle number seven seemed to satisfy our search. It stated that personnel other than classroom teachers should be financially rewarded in accordance with responsibilities and preparation. This seemed to justify a salary differential between classroom teachers and personnel other than classroom teachers. counselors.

Stevens and Hoppock (4,5) reported data from one university's placement department on the number and kinds of positions that exist in the field of counseling. School counselors were paid on a sliding scale related to training and experience and were given an increment beyond the teacher's scale. Purcell (3) showed that school counselors on Long Island were in a salary bracket above that indicated by Stevens and Hoppock's surveys.

In a preliminary report of the project on guidance in American schools. C. Gilbert Wren (8) reported as follows:

1. The high school counselor is likely to be male (64 and 51 percent), the elementary counselor to be female (69 percent). The average age is slightly above 40, and a substantial majority possess a master's degree (89, 70, and 60 percent respectively). High school counselors are likely to be employed for a 10 month's school term for they receive a median salary somewhat in excess of \$6,000.

In a pamphlet reprint of an article that appeared in Coronet magazine, Theodore Irwin (1) states that guidance counselors are frequently drawn from the ranks of superior teachers. Their official title may be dean of discipline as well as of career planning. Many, known simply as guidance counselors, spend part of the day teaching. Salaries range about \$300 to \$500 above that of regular teachers, and sometimes not at all higher.

Another pamphlet yielded some information regarding the school counselor's salary. C. Gilbert Wren (9) said.

A master's degree or one year's graduate work in psychology, sociology and education, plus teaching experience, are usually required in order to be a school counselor. Salaries may range from \$4,000 to \$9,000 or \$10,000. Administrators of large counseling programs get more.

In February 1961, the Commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards of the Kansas Teachers Association (6) published a report on teacher's standards, recruitment, supply and salaries. The report indicated that guidance personnel in first class cities received an average salary of \$6,523, personnel in second class cities received an average of \$5,692 and that third class cities and county averages were \$6,218.

FINDINGS

Salary Status of Persons Assigned Time for Guidance and Counseling in Kansas Public Secondary Schools for the Year 1960-1961.

Table 1, which follows, presents in summary form the salary status of all persons assigned time for guidance and counseling in Kansas public secondary schools for the school year 1960-1961, as reported on the <u>High School Principal's</u> <u>Organization Report and the Report of Guidance Service Pro-</u> <u>grams in Kansas Secondary Schools</u>. Figures at the extreme lower right-hand corner of Table 1 report that 586 persons of all categories were assigned time for guidance and counseling and were paid a mean annual salary of \$5737.90. The

figure at the bottom of the column headed "A" shows that all administrators with assigned time for guidance and counseling, but without counseling qualifications, were paid a mean annual salary of \$5912.94. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "AS" indicates that all administrators with assigned time for guidance and counseling who met standard counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6131.76, and the figure at the bottom of the column headed "AM" shows a mean annual salary of \$6190.32 for similiar administrators who met minimum counselor qualifications.

In the column headed "CS" in Table 1, the figure at the bottom reports that all guidance counselors (non-administrators) who met standard qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6313.92. The next column to the right shows that all guidance counselors who met minimum qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6109.92. Similiar data are presented in the last three columns of Table 1, for teacher counselors who met standard qualifications, minimum qualifications, or no counselor qualification standards, respectively.

Each line of Table 1 presents counselor salary data grouped according to the pupil enrollment of the school.

The number in parenthesis above each salary mean indicates the number of persons included in determining that mean.

Except for the bottom line of the table, salaries are reported for one period of a six-period day, the basis used by

the Kansas State Department of Public Instruction in determining reimbursement under Title V(a) of the National Defense Education Act of 1958.

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Salary Status of Persons East of U. S. Highway 81 Assigned Time for Guidance and Counseling in Public Secondary Schools of Kansas in 1960-1961.

Counselor data according to the classification used in Table 1 but limited to public secondary schools of Kansas east of U. S. Highway 81 is presented in Table 2. which follows. Figures at the extreme lower right-hand corner of Table 2 report that 335 persons of all categories were assigned time for guidance and counseling and were paid a mean annual salary of \$5658.76. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "A" shows that all administrators with assigned time for guidance and counseling, but without counselor qualifications, were paid a mean annual salary of \$5808.72. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "AS" indicates that all administrators with assigned time for guidance and counseling who met standard counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6250.20. and the figure at the bottom of the column headed "AM" shows a mean annual salary of \$6283.26 for similiar administrators who met minimum qualifications.

In the column headed "CS" in Table 2, the figure at the bottom reports that all guidance counselors (non-administrators) who met standard qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6449.16. The next column to the right shows that all guidance counselors who met minimum qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6222.72. Similiar data are presented in the last three columns of Table 2 for teacher counselors who met standard qualifications, minimum qualifications, or no counselor qualifications, respectively.

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Salary Status of Persons West of U. S. Highway 81 Assigned Time for Guidance and Counseling in Public Secondary Schools of Kansas in 1960-1961.

Table 3 presents data according to the classification used in Table 1 but limited to public secondary schools of Kansas west of U. S. Highway 81. Figures at the extreme lower righthand corner of Table 3 report that 251 persons of all categories were assigned time for guidance and counseling and were paid a mean annual salary of \$5461.12. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "A" shows that all administrators with assigned time for guidance and counseling, but without counselor qualifications, were paid a mean annual salary of \$6030.90. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "AS" indicates that all administrators with assigned time for guidance and counseling who met standard counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$5799.96. and the figure at the bottom of the column headed "AM" shows a mean annual salary of \$6110.70 for similiar administrators who met minimum qualifications.

In the column headed "CS" in Table 3, the figure at the bottom reports that all guidance counselors (non-administrators) who met standard qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6128.10. The next column to the right shows that all guidance counselors who met minimum qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$5707.14. Similiar data are presented in the last three columns of Table 3 for teacher counselors who met standard qualifications, minimum qualifications, or no counselor qualifications, respectively.

Salary Status of Guidance Counselors in Public Secondary Schools of Kansas 1960-1961 According to Allotted Time for Guidance and Counseling.

Salary status as related to allotted guidance and counseling time given counselors in public secondary schools of Kansas 1960-1961 is presented in Table 4. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "Full time". indicating a counselor who was given six hours credit for guidance and counseling time on the Report of Guidance Service Programs in Kansas Secondary Schools. reports that full time counselors in public secondary schools of Kansas in 1960-1961 were paid a mean annual salary of \$6416.94. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "Half time or more but less than full time", indicating a counselor who was given credit for any fraction of three, four, or five hours of guidance and counseling time on the aforementioned report, shows that half time or more but less than full time counselors were paid a mean annual salary of \$5547.42. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "Less than half time", indicating a counselor who was given credit for any fraction of one or two hours of guidance and counseling time on the report, reports that less than half time counselors were paid a mean annual salary of \$5419.50.

The salary status of guidance counselors in public secondary schools east of U.S. Highway 81 according to allotted time for guidance and counseling is presented in Table 5. As shown by the figure at the bottom of the column headed "Full time". indicating a counselor who was credit on the Report of Guidance Service Programs in Kansas Secondary Schools for having six hours guidance and counseling time. full time counselors in schools east of U.S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$6440.46. Presented at the bottom of the column headed "Half time or more but less than full time", indicating a counselor who was given credit for any fraction of either three. four, or five hours for guidance and counseling time on the above mentioned report, is the figure which indicated that half time or more but less than full time counselors in schools east of U.S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of The figure at the bottom of the column headed "Less \$5634.60. than half time", indicating a counselor who was given credit for any fraction of either one or two hours guidance and counseling time on the mentioned report. shows that less than half time counselors in schools east of U.S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5356.62.

Table 6 reports the salary status of guidance counselors in public secondary schools west of U.S. Highway 81 according to allotted time for guidance and counseling. As shown by the figure at the bottom of the column headed "Full time". indicating counselors who were given credit for having six hours guidance and counseling time on the Report of Guidance Service Programs in Kansas Secondary Schools, full time counselors in schools west of U. S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$6358.14. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "Half time or more but less than full time", indicating counselors who were given credit on the above report for any fraction of either three. four. or five hours guidance and counseling time, reports that half time or more but less than full time counselors in schools west of U. S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5438.46. The figure at the bottom of the column headed "Less than half time", indicating counselors were given credit for any fraction of either one or two hours guidance and counseling time on the aforementioned report, shows that less than half time counselors in schools west of U.S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5509.68.

SUMMARY AND CONCLUSIONS

All persons with assigned time for guidance and counseling in the public secondary schools of Kansas in 1960-1961 were paid a mean salary of \$5737.90 for the year. Those who met the standard counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6075.49, those who met minimum counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$5164.51, and those who met neither standard nor minimum qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$5731.10. The reader might question the higher salary for lower qualifications reported by the last salary mentioned. This is explained by the fact that 181 administrators who met neither standard nor minimum qualifications were included in the derivation of this salary.

Administrators with assigned time for counseling were paid on the average \$313.58 per year more than non-administrators who were assigned time for guidance and counseling. Administrators who met standard counselor qualifications were paid \$182.16 per year less than full time counselors who met standard qualifications. This seemed to be due to the large number of full time counselors, 69 in all, employed in schools with enrollment above 601 students. Full time counselors who met standard qualifications were paid \$1102.92 more per year than teacher counselors who met standard qualifications. Administrators who met minimum counselor qualifications were paid \$80.40 more than full time counselors who met minimum qualifications. Full time counselors who met minimum qualifications. Full time

more per year than teacher counselors who met minimum qualifications.

Counselors who met either standard or minimum qualifications and were employed by Kansas public secondary schools with enrollment of between 301 and 1000 students were paid a mean annual salary of \$5536.26 while those of similiar qualifications employed by schools with enrollment less than 300 students were paid a mean annual salary of \$5092.38. There was an annual salary differential between the two of \$443.88 favoring counselors in schools with enrollment of between 301 and 1000 students. Counselors meeting standard or minimum qualifications in schools with enrollment of over 1000 students were paid a mean annual salary of \$6481.20, some \$944.94 more per year than counselors with similiar qualifications in schools with enrollment of between 301 and 1000 students.

Qualified counselors in Kansas public secondary schools west of U. S. Highway 81 in 1960-1961 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5521.05 while qualified counselors in Kansas public secondary schools east of U. S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5883.84. A mean annual salary differential of \$362.79 was noted in favor of the eastern schools. This seemed to be due to the fact that more qualified counselors were employed by the larger schools and there were more larger schools east of U. S. Highway 81.





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SALARY STATUS OF PUBLIC SECONDARY SCHOOL COUNSELORS IN KANSAS FOR THE YEAR 1960-1961

The purpose of this study was to ascertain the salary status of guidance counselors in Kansas public secondary schools for the year 1960-1961. The problem was handled and subsquently answered in relation to four distinct aspects; (1)qualifications of counselor, (2)size of school, (3)salary differential east and west of U. S. Highway 81, (4)time allotted for counseling.

Data were secured from the <u>High School Principal's Organ-</u> <u>ization Report</u> and the <u>Report of Guidance Service Programs in</u> <u>Kansas Secondary Schools</u> through the office of the Director of Guidance and Pupil Personnel Services in the Kansas State Department of Public Instruction. The writer bisected the state using U. S. Highway 81 as the dividing line. The procedure was then to determine the mean hourly salary of counselors east and west of U. S. Highway 81. By mean hourly salary was meant the counselors total salary divided by six, since a full-time counselor was given credit for six hours counseling time per day.

On the basis of tabulated data, the following conclusions were warranted.

All persons with assigned time for guidance and counseling in the public secondary schools of Kansas in 1960-1961 were paid a mean salary of \$5737.90 for the year. Those who met the standard counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$6075.49, those who met minimum counselor qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$5164.51, and those who met neither standard nor minimum qualifications were paid a mean annual salary of \$5731.10. The reader might question the higher salary for lower qualifications reported by the last salary mentioned. This is explained by the fact that 181 administrators who met neither standard nor minimum qualifications were included in the derivation of this salary.

Administrators with assigned time for counseling were paid on the average \$313.58 per year more than non-administrators who were assigned time for guidance and counseling. Administrators who met standard counselor qualifications were paid \$182.16 per year less than full-time counselors who met standard qualifications. This seemed to be due to the fact that 69 full-time counselors were employed in schools with enrollment above 601 students. Full-time counselors who met standard qualifications were paid \$1102.92 more per year than teacher counselors who met standard qualifications. Administrators who met minimum counselor qualifications were paid \$80.40 more than full-time counselors who met minimum qualifications. Full-time counselors who met minimum qualifications were paid \$1116.00 more per year than teacher counselors who met minimum qualifications.

Counselors who met either standard or minimum qualifications and were employed by Kansas public secondary schools with enrollment of between 301 and 1000 students were paid a mean annual salary of \$5536.26 while those of similiar qualifications employed by schools with enrollment less than 300 students were paid a mean annual salary of \$5092.38. There was an annual salary differential between the two of \$443.88 favoring counselors in schools with enrollment of between 301 and 1000 stu-

dents. Counselors meeting standard or minimum qualifications in schools with enrollment of over 1000 students were paid a mean annual salary of \$6481.20, some \$944.94 more per year than counselors with similiar qualifications in schools with enrollment of between 301 and 1000 students.

Qualified counselors in Kansas public secondary schools west of U. S. Highway 81 in 1960-1961 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5521.05 while qualified counselors in Kansas public secondary schools east of U. S. Highway 81 were paid a mean annual salary of \$5883.84. A mean annual salary differential of \$362.79 was noted in favor of the eastern schools. This seemed to be due to the fact that more qualified counselors were employed by the larger schools and there were more larger schools east of U. S. Highway 81.
