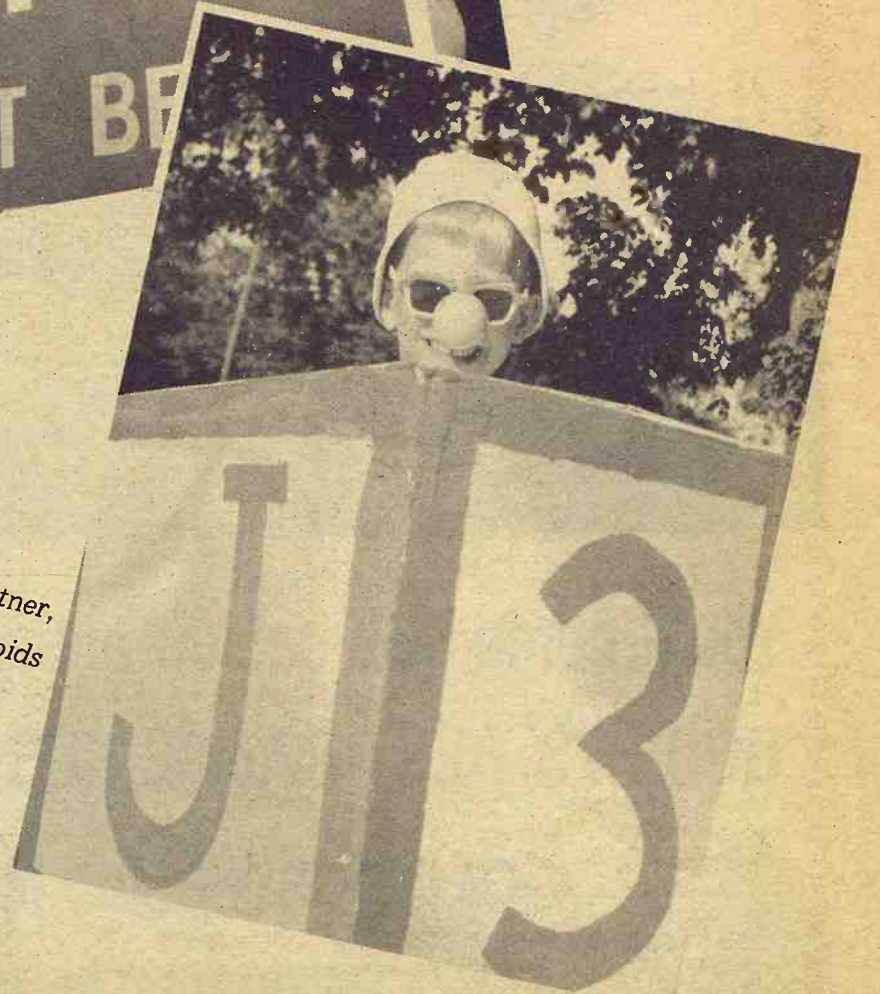

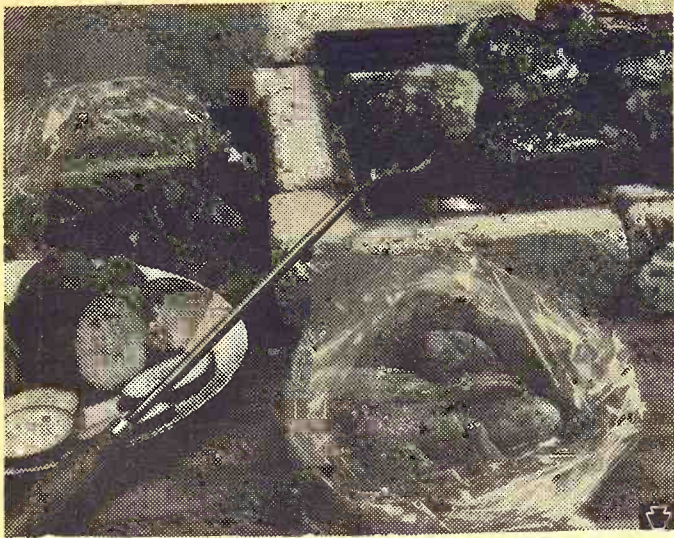

## Chicken Recipe Will Please Outdoor Cooks

Outdoor cooks will win compliments with this recipe:

### PICNIC CHICKEN

2 chickens (2½-3 pounds each) cut into serving pieces  
2 teaspoons dried tarragon leaves

1 bottle (16-ounce) barbecue sauce

Combine chicken pieces, barbecue sauce and tarragon in a food wrap size plastic bag. Secure with tie band. Refrigerate at least four hours, turning plastic bag over several times to coat chicken evenly with the marinade. Grill chicken over hot coals until crisp and brown, turning to brown sides (about one hour). Drizzle from time to time with any marinade left in the plastic bag. Serves six to eight.

### PICNIC NOTES

Keep food chilled enroute to picnic by filling food wrap size plastic bag with ice cubes. Secure bag with tie band. Stack

bags of food around ice filled bag.

For direct chilling — Fill food wrap size plastic bag one-third full with ice cubes. Set sandwich size plastic bags of food such as hamburger meat, cold cuts, butter sandwiches on top of ice and secure larger bag with tie band.

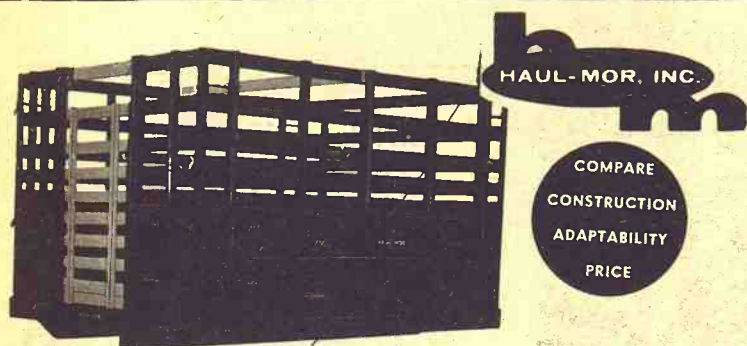

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# Price Counterweights to Heavier Fall Meat Marketings

Cattle and hog prices probably will decline this fall and early winter, but there might not be much change for consumers on the price tags at grocery store meat counters.

Meat experts agree that cattle and hog markets have seen their highest prices for the year, but they add that price declines in livestock markets likely won't

be very sharp.

For one thing, these specialists predict, hog marketings will increase from the current mid-summer slow pace, but the supply of hogs later this year will be 2% to 3% below a year earlier and prices will stay above last year's lows.

Cattle marketings in the July-September quarter are expected to be 5% above a year before, but will fall short of the even heavier rate in the April-June quarter this year. And, analysts say, the possibility of continued good demand for red meats may help limit any price declines.

Rising consumer income, high employment and increasing population have boosted meat consumption, and demand had been strong this year even in the face of heavy meat production. So far this year, Federally inspected beef production is 3% above a year earlier and pork output is also up 3%. Even so, the Government says, consumer prices for beef were 5% above a year earlier in mid-May, and if anything they have risen further since then.

In addition to strong demand, increased distribution and marketing costs at wholesale and retail levels probably will add to price strength for consumers, trade sources say. While regular prices aren't likely to change much, weekend "specials" could

become more frequent in the fall to absorb periods of increased marketings.

Active demand for meat and low corn prices have helped boost profits for some cattle and hog farmers this year, and cheap feed may continue to aid returns into 1969 as another big corn crop is expected. The key feed ingredient currently brings \$1.08 1/4 a bushel in Chicago, down from \$1.22 a year ago, and prices probably will fall as harvest nears. Last November, No. 2 yellow corn fell to \$1.06 1/2 a bushel, the lowest in more than six years.

Another trade source isn't overly concerned about the 7% increase in the number of cattle on feed reported by the Government. He points out that a good share of the increase resulted from a 12% boost in heifers on feed. Because heifers would be marketed at lighter weights than steers, he reasons, there will be a smaller amount of meat per animal slaughtered than the overall increase normally would indicate.

Manhattan has rewritten a local ordinance to place a curfew of 11 pm. until 6 am. on boys and girls 16 years and under. The restriction applies to streets and public places.

## Complete Naturich Deal

ABILENE — Formal completion of negotiations and transfer of stock of the Naturich Mills to Central Soya, Inc., of Fort Wayne, Ind., has been made. Announcement of the sale had been made some time ago.

Naturich was a subsidiary company of the Security Milling Co., which was formerly associated with the Abilene Flour Mills Co. prior to its reorganization and sale. Jack Grubb, former president of the subsidiary company, continues as plant manager.

He said the name will probably be changed soon to Central Soya of Abilene, Inc. Two new

families already have moved to Abilene in connection with the change of operations and Grubb said considerable expansion is planned with additional plant personnel and increased production.

The Naturich company manufactures all types of livestock and poultry feeds for sale over a three-state area. The output of the local plant will be distributed over a wider area.

Central Soya is one of the large companies in the grain and feed processing fields. The company stock is listed on the New York stock exchange, the latest quotation being 19 3/4 per share.

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# Watershed Plan Vote Date Is September 3

On September 3, 1968 voters in an area embracing parts of four counties will have the opportunity to approve the method of financing for the Lyons Creek Watershed District. Lyons Creek Watershed is now authorized by law to levy two mills and under the resolution adopted by the board of directors this same two mill levy will be continued, no increase will be authorized but part of the funds will go into construction.

A watershed district is organized under the laws of the state and may seek cost-sharing aid from the state and federal governments. Watershed districts must be developed by local initiative and must be controlled by a board of directors elected from the district.

Lyons Creek Watershed applied for federal assistance and was granted a priority by the Governor's Watershed Review Committee six years ago. Lyons

Creek Watershed District completed and adopted a General Plan three years ago, in accordance with the Kansas Watershed District Act. This action was undertaken and completed entirely at local expense. The plan was recognized by the 1966 state legislature and is now a part of the state water plan. The work plan for that portion of the General Plan that can be accomplished under Public Law 566 has been completed by the Soil Conservation Service and has been laying on the Governor's desk for some months. All it will take to send it to Congress for authorization and funding is his signature. Apparently the only question in his mind is not "is it a good plan." He has been assured thru approval of his own engineers and approval at federal levels as well as state levels that it is a feasible plan and it should be carried out. The Governor's question is "Are the people of the Lyons Creek Watershed District ready to pay their portion of the costs?"

Watershed programs are of growing importance to both farm and city. And cost sharing assistance is available thru the Agricultural and Conservation program for the necessary land treatment. The development of Lyons Creek Watershed Program would mean an adequate supply of clean water, better and accessible recreational facilities, less damage and expenses from floods and erosion and protection from stream and reservoir siltation as each watershed structure must have 75 percent of the needed land treatment done above that structure before it can be built. Although land treatment and conservation farming is necessary for the

proper functioning of a district, an individual cannot be forced to treat his land.

The board of directors of the Lyons Creek Watershed District has been interested in developing a plan to slow the rate of runoff and protect the topsoil from additional erosion. The board of directors is made up of farmers elected by you . . . the residents of the district. They have felt it would be beneficial to the area to control the rate water leaves, and to reduce downstream flooding. This control would reduce the tax burden of repairing bridges and roads. Through conservation of our soil and water and their more efficient use the board of directors expects an improvement in the economy of this area. This has been the experience of completed watershed districts.

## WHO CAN VOTE

Any eligible voter who is a resident of the Watershed District can vote in this election.

Landowners living outside the Watershed District may come to the polling places to vote. Can all eligible voters in incorporated cities within the District vote? NO. None of the incorporated cities within the District have voted to be included in the watershed. None are being asked for its support. The only eligible voters residing in these incorporated cities who may vote in this election are those who own property in the District.

## THE POLLING PLACES

Polling places have been set up over the Watershed area. At least one polling place to a county. Polling places are located as follows: The Charles Casper Residence, Route 1, Junction City; The Herington Boat House at Lake Herington; Ramona Municipal Polling Place in Ramona (City Building, one half block south of Post Office); the former Marie Sellin Farm on Route 2, Herington; the Woodbine Grade School in Woodbine. Polling places will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, September 3, 1968.

## THE QUESTION

The question which will be put is: Shall the following be adopted to the voters in the Watershed — "Resolution"

## RESOLUTION 68-1

BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of Lyons Creek Watershed, Joint District No. 41, as follows:

1. That the cost to the District of the works of improvement set forth in the Modified General Plan as heretofore approved, shall be financed out of the funds to be derived from a continuation of the present annual general levy of not to exceed two (2) mills upon all the taxable tangible property located within the district and the funds so available to the district may be used in conjunction with funds available from other sources for the construction of the works of improvement within the District.

2. This tax levy shall be made upon authority of K.S.A. 24-1219 and the funds so derived shall be used only for the purposes as authorized by K.S.A. 24-1219.

3. That the annual levy by said Joint District No. 41 upon the taxable tangible property within the District for all purposes shall not at any time exceed two (2) mills.

4. The method of financing and the tax limitation herein proposed, upon approval by the qualified voters of the District or upon automatic approval if no election is called, shall remain in full force and effect until modified or terminated by a majority vote of the qualified voters of the district.

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# Area Editor Says Delay Means End Of Project

If the residents of the Lyons Creek Watershed District again see fit to vote down the proposed method of financing the work, this long projected development for the conservation of soil and water may be lost forever.

This is not written for "scare" or promotional purposes. It is just plain fact.

It is neither our place — nor intention — of endeavoring to tell the residents and landowners what to do. It is entirely up to them. However, we do suggest they examine all elements of the situation carefully. It will soon be too late.

We have followed the Lyons Creek project closely from the beginning, and have been one of the strong supporters of the watershed plan. Our interest is purely one of community and area concern — of saving the land, the farms, the water and the economy. We do not pro-

pose to engage in the pro and con debates of financing, although the proposed two mill maximum plan is similar to programs that have been carried out successfully elsewhere.

The point of fact is that if the project is delayed much longer, for whatever reason, it is a dead duck.

From the inception of the Lyons Creek watershed plan, it has received the backing and support of many "outside" groups which have a vital stake in the future of the area. These include the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, the City of Abilene, the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce Board of Water Resources and others.

However, in view of developments much of this active support is "wavering" and eroding off like washing silt.

The reaction is one of question mark surprise. It was the initial understanding of these "outside" supporters among the influential business and civic groups that, generally speaking,

a majority of these people most directly involved — residents and landowners of the district — were in favor of some watershed plan as against the proposed Woodbine dam.

Officials of the watershed association will verify that efforts and actions by some of these friendly supporters were contributing factors in keeping the watershed plan "alive" up to this point. I have personally been close enough to the situation to know that if the Woodbine Dam, as proposed by the U.S. Corps of Engineers, had been authorized two or three years ago — the Lyons Creek Watershed would be a dead issue today.

We have never opposed the Woodbine Dam, as such. But along with others we did lend considerable effort — in the right places, mostly behind-the-scenes — to holding off the Woodbine authorization by the State of Kansas and by Congress UNTIL the Lyons Creek Watershed program could get off the ground. Give it a chance, was the argument. Then, if the government still insists on building the dam, that's for the experts to determine.

Unfortunately, the watershed program is still floundering.

As a past president of the Kansas State Chamber of Commerce, I am in a position to know what on at least three

occasions this statewide organization representing over 65,000 business and industrial members was instrumental in blocking attempts to persuade the Board of Water Resources to amend its stand and include the Woodbine Dam in the Kansas State Water Plan. This is a required major step in getting it authorized by Congress, which is reluctant to authorize any

public works project that is not officially requested by the state involved. If and when the dam is included in the state water plan, it is almost tantamount to official sanction by the governor, although it has twice been rejected by governors who were not convinced that it is as needed as proponents say it is. This is not apt to occur again.

Attitudes have changed. The State Chamber of Commerce has a Water Resources Council composed of men from many walks of life who make special studies of various projects. They have repeatedly backed Lyons Creek

## Informational Meeting Is Friday, August 30

A public information and discussion meeting on the method of financing the Lyons Creek Watershed District will be held Friday, August 30, 1968, at 8:00 p.m. in the Woodbine Grade School, Woodbine, Kansas, according to the board of directors.

This meeting is planned as an open forum wherein there will be questions and answers and a general discussion regarding the watershed project. A panel will be formed consisting of Mr. Morrie Boline, state conservationist, Salina; Mr. Charles Brehdal, executive secretary, State Soil Conservation Committee; Mr. Keith Krause, executive secretary of the Water Resources Board of the State of Kansas; and Mr. Bob Smrha, Chief Engineer of the Division of Water Resources of the State Board of Agriculture.

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when the subject of the Woodbine dam came up. So has the board of directors.

Now comes my reason for bringing up this subject. Several weeks ago the council changed its position and recommended inclusion of the Woodbine Dam in the state water plan. The question then went to the board of directors, which approved it without even a discussion. Previously there had been some rather vocal floor fights in the board to prevent this. But they grew tired of bickering over what was beginning to look like a lost cause.

The general reasoning was that "on the basis of the two special elections in which the watershed plan was defeated, it would indicate that we have been misled into believing that residents of the area were in favor of the watershed program." Therefore, if the people don't want the watershed, forget it. Thus, the official policy of the State Chamber of Commerce (a powerful body) is now chang-

ed—and its legislative representatives will be working for the Woodbine Dam, instead of against it, at the next session of the legislature.

My personal view, based on observation and many discussions with various individuals on both sides of the question, is that by and large the citizens are in favor of a watershed program, but differ on how it should be financed, and other specifics.

If this is true, it would be unfortunate to have the whole project washed down the Kaw river at this stage. This will surely happen—if the people fail to get together, one way or another.

It would be unwise to take a short-sighted view of the situation. Soil and watershed conservation projects will increase the valuations, and thereby tend to lower taxes on everyone in the district and at the same time keep this valuable land in production at even higher levels. Anyone who argues that taking

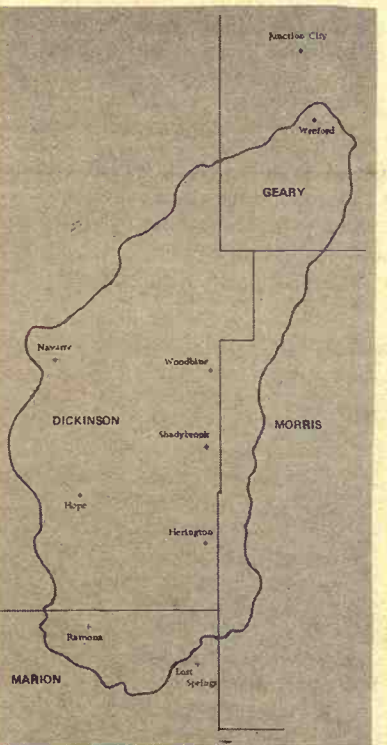
thousands of acres out of production and wiping out hundreds of homesteads—~~and~~ off the tax rolls—would be "hurting everyone alike" is taking a near sighted view.

We need to hold and save the water. This can be accomplished either through the watershed or big dam approach. Large dams are needed, and no doubt better suited for some areas. But in the particular case of Lyons Creek, it is the opinion of many that the watershed is the best way. The Corps of Engineers want it, as part of their overall drawing board plan for the Kaw river. The cities downstream, prodded by the engineers, want it for local flood protection. But at best in peak flood time, the crest of Lyons Creek makes a small difference at Kansas City.

There's another factor that is becoming quite serious in Kansas. It is irrigation. Irrigation is increasing at a rapid rate—already nearly twice as much water is used for irrigation as the total amount used for both municipal and industrial purposes. This may startle you, but the Water Resources Board says it is true.

Furthermore, irrigation can be expected to continue to increase in Kansas because of its obvious economic benefits—but serious water shortages are expected to develop within a few years. Also, cities, including some in the general Lyons Creek area, face the possibilities of water shortages in a few years.

The Lyons Creek Watershed activity has taken on almost statewide stature and is being watched closely by many interested people outside the immediate area.



## Finance Plan At 'Cads

"We have now come to the 'cross-roads' in the Lyons Creek Watershed District", says Hayes B. Beck, President of the District Board. "We must arrive at a satisfactory method of financing our plans for the watershed now, or the SCS Work Plan for that portion which qualifies under PL 566 will not be submitted to Congress for consideration this year".

He added, "The more we delay now, the less our chance of obtaining favorable action in Washington. There are many agencies seeking federal aid. Congress is not going to waste its time while we fumble around trying to decide whether we want help".

He was referring to the referendum election to be held September 3 on the method of financing the General Plan of the District. The referendum will call for an annual levy not to exceed a grand total of 2 mills.

The two great areas of misunderstanding have been the method of finance and who will bear the cost of the multiple purpose structure at Herington.

In attempting to clear up the areas of misunderstanding, Beck made the following statements:

It is estimated that the assessed valuation of the Lyons Creek Watershed Joint District No. 1 is \$11,000,000 (includes portions of Dickinson, Geary, Marion and Morris counties within District limits). Estimated revenue is based on an annual general levy not to exceed 2 mills or \$22,000. Kansas State sales taxes allocated to the District annually deducted from the levy. The levy for 1967 was 1.91 mills. The proposed levy for 1968 .94 mills out of the permitted 2 mills.

Twenty-two of our largest structures qualify under the Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (PL 566) and will receive federal funding. The multi-purpose structure at Herington is one of these. Thus the flood control portion will receive

## Soil Conservation On Farms, Ranches

Three-fourths of the nation's land area is in private ownership. Sixty per cent is in farms and ranches. The U. S. Department of Agriculture works directly with land owners and operators in cooperative programs with the 50 states to bring about the conservation, development, and management of soil, water, grass, forest, and wildlife resources on private lands and on the forests and grasslands under its administration as well.

The Watershed Protection and Flood Prevention Act (P. L. 566) fills the gap in the conservation job between work on individual farms and that undertaken in the larger river basins. Pictured is a portion of Minnesota's East Willow Creek Watershed, showing a flood prevention dam and upland conservation measures such as strip cropping and contour planting. Although primarily for flood prevention, small watershed projects are developed by local organizations for many other purposes, including municipal and industrial water supply, recreation, fish and wildlife, and irrigation. USDA provides educational, technical, research, cost-sharing, and credit assistance.

federal funds and the municipal water supply and recreation portion will be funded by the City of Herington. There will be no costs on this structure charged to the Watershed.

Of the funds available from the maximum tax levy of 2 mills, approximately \$9,500 would be used for general administration and programming costs and the balance of \$12,500 would be accumulated for land acquisition, operation, maintenance and construction. Construction funds for those structures not qualifying under PL 566 will be sought under the Rural Water Facilities Act, pooling agreements under the Agriculture Conservation Program and private individuals, associations and organizations.

Any changes in the method of financing at any time must be approved by the Chief Engineer of the Division of Water Resources of the Kansas State Board of Agriculture and by referendum election to the District. No change can be made

arbitrarily by the Board of Directors acting alone.

To further inform the public and to answer any questions that may be had, there will be a public meeting on the method of financing at the Woodbine Grade School on Friday, August 30. The electorate is invited to attend and learn more of the Watershed Program.

## Asks Districts Join Anti-Litter Drive

Conservation districts can help keep America beautiful by joining in the anti-litter drive, says Sam S. Studebaker, president of the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Soil and water conservation practices, by bringing man and nature into a better balance, result in a more beautiful landscape. Special anti-litter projects can help keep it that way, he says.

Districts that have special conservation programs with youth groups can incorporate clean-up activities in the list of projects. The subject also lends itself to district-sponsored essay, speech, and poster contests.

District and state Ladies Auxiliaries can help too, by working with young people in youth groups and schools. Many districts are already "adopting" a stream in an effort to stimulate and coordinate pollution abatement progress. How about adopting a park, beach, highway, or other area, and organizing a clean-up campaign for it?

Litter is a serious national problem, costing the taxpayers \$500 million annually just to remove from highways, streets, parks, beaches, and other public areas. The assault on our senses of seeing the bottles, cans, papers, and other trash until it's taken away can't be measured in dollars and cents, of course.

Additionally, there are things that every citizen can do to keep the countryside beautiful. Here's a list from Keep America Beautiful, Inc., 99 Park Avenue, New York City 10016, which has many helpful guides for action programs to clean up litter:

- Carry a travel-trash container in your car.
- Dispose of your trash at home—or in a proper receptacle wherever you are.
- Urge your community officials to provide sufficient litter receptacles—conveniently located.
- Encourage local educational programs to prevent litter.
- Set a good example for children—habits are formed early.
- Ask your friends to join the fight against litter.

## SCD Winners Boost Watershed

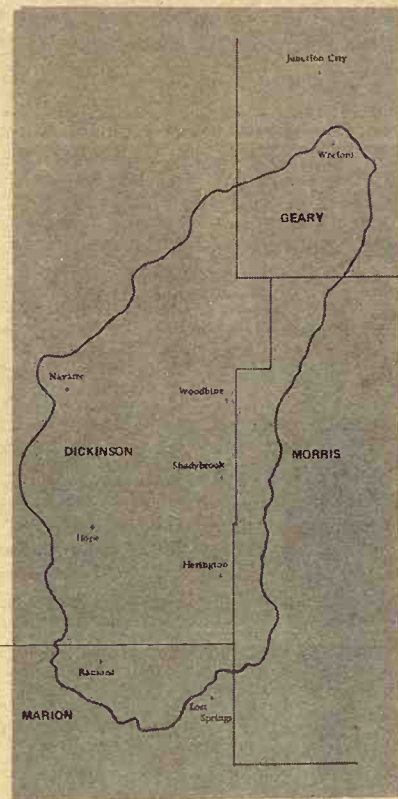
It is no surprise that many of the families residing in the Geary County Portion of the Lyons Creek Watershed are among the Watershed's top boosters. A check of the records of the Geary County Soil Conservation District reveals that there are ten former winners of the Kansas Bankers Soil Conservation Award residing or holding land in the District. Two of these awardees are also Kansas Master Farmer and Master Farm Homemaker Winners.

Marvin Poland, Rt. 1, Junction City, a former member of the Geary County Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors and a former member of the Lyons Creek Watershed Steering Committee, is a believer in total water and soil conservation and has these comments.

Through the years we have seen our valuable soil wash away, he says. We have watched rain water run off the fields and rush down the river. Now the time has come when we must do all we can to conserve these valuable resources. The following list of the Bankers Soil Conservation Award winners and many of their neighbors have adopted conservation practices. Hayes Beck, Charles Caspar Sr., Richard Gfeller, Harvey Janke, Harvey McVay, Marvin Poland, John Ruhnke, E. S. Schellhorn, E. H. Shane, Charles Caspar Sr. and John Ruhnke have received the Master Farmer - Master Farm Homemaker award.

But there is a limit to what they as individuals can do to save our soil and water. Total conservation can be achieved only through group effort. Mr. Poland believes that the Lyons Creek Watershed project is the type of group effort which can do the job. "The Watershed will work for the betterment of the whole area," he says.

Total conservation means



keeping the moisture where it falls. This means we will grow more crops. It will probably mean a higher water table. The watershed district would reduce flood damage and erosion to our farmland. Fewer fences would be washed out with heavy rains.

Progress on the Lyons Creek Watershed District is an example of what conservation minded citizens and their leaders can accomplish through group effort. The entire watershed stands to benefit from their work.

## United Fund Lists Watershed Project

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## Everyone Benefits from Watershed Where Rural-Urban Efforts Combine

A watershed is a valuable natural resource. It is a creation of nature, and natural laws determine its character.

Watersheds are tangible, vital elements in the life and development of our country. Everyone lives in a watershed. To some degree, his welfare is affected by the watershed. In turn, what he does or fails to do alters the condition of the watershed.

A watershed includes all the land area from which water flows into single stream or river. It may be a few hundred acres draining into a small creek, or the half-million square mile Missouri river watershed which in turn is part of the larger Mississippi river watershed.

Watershed programs can best be planned and applied in smaller watersheds — those which are small enough so that rural and urban persons can work together on a community basis.

Group action is essential in the development of a watershed project. There must be full coordination and cooperation among landowners, operators, watershed

boards, Soil Conservation district supervisors and all county, state, and federal agencies involved.

Too many persons assume that watershed programs are federally-sponsored projects. In the main this is not true, nor should it be. Watershed programs are most successful when they are conceived and developed by local persons. A project that is planned, executed, and owned by local people has a long-time vitality characteristic of the traditional American spirit.

Citizens involved in watershed development should be willing to spend time, money, and energy because they regard the watershed as their own. The watershed is an area with which they

associate their past, but important, their future. It will provide a wide range of improvement opportunities, with a correspondingly wide variety of desirable benefits, both tangible and intangible.

Above all, a watershed should be one in which the residents recognize a community responsibility and from which they expect to develop community assets.

The purpose of the watershed program is to escort the raindrop from the ridge down the slopes, across the fields, through small field drainageways and creeks to the river. Recent studies show that about three-fifths of the total average flood damage in the U. S. occurs on headwater streams and small tributaries.

The watershed plan includes using each piece of land within its capabilities and applying the practices needed to retard runoff and reduce erosion. Soil conservation practices include conservation, cropping systems, terracing, contour farming, crop residue use, pasture and range ways, diversions, and stockwater ponds.

These measures increase moisture penetration, resulting in more efficient use of land. For complete watershed protection, these conservation practices must be combined with floodwater retarding dams downstream. These structures hold back flood waters and release them gradually, thus reducing flood damage.

Benefits from watershed protection are many. They vary in kind and amount among the owners and operators of watershed lands. Provision of those benefits depends on acceptance of watershed program by all landowners and operators in the watershed area.

Contributions from each person will vary in kind and extent. Management practices applied by one farmer and water-control structures built by others affect the economy of still others.

Large benefits occur to roads and bridges in fully developed watersheds. This in turn is a saving to taxpayers within the watershed. Thus, watershed protection benefits everyone in the watershed area.

### Inspection Program For Hawaii Set Up

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced April 30 that it has completed a cooperative agreement with Hawaii to establish a joint federal-state meat inspection program under the authority of the Talmadge-Aiken Act of 1962.

Officials of USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service, which administers the Federal meat inspection program, said the cooperative agreement, signed April 29, provides for licensing state meat inspectors to conduct federal meat inspection in meat packing and processing plants.

Each individual plant first must be surveyed and approved jointly by federal and state officials. The state inspectors will be licensed to perform specific types of inspection. Inspection in these plants will be conducted under the Federal Meat Inspection Act and Regulations, and continuing federal supervision will be maintained in each plant, C&MS officials said.

USDA and Hawaii will share the cost of the program.

C&MS officials pointed out that the Talmadge-Aiken agreements differ from the cooperative meat inspection agreements provided for in the Wholesome Meat Act. Under the Wholesome Meat Act, USDA gives financial and technical aid to the states for developing state-operated inspection programs that are at least equal to the federal program. Plants so inspected may sell their meat products only within state lines.

## Total of \$1,834,140 in FHA Loans Are On Record in Five Northwest Counties

A total of \$1,834,140 in loan funds has been used in Ellis, Ness, Rush, Russell and Trego Counties to support family farms under the Farmers Home Administration expanded program, Joseph B. Turney, supervisor for the rural credit agency said.

Approximately \$776,350 was advanced in 1967. Currently 164 farmers and rural residents in the five counties are using the supervised credit services of the Farmers Home Administration.

The supply of Farmers Home Administration credit, which supplements the credit supplied by banks and other private credit sources is one of the measures recommended by President Johnson to provide family farmers an opportunity to earn parity of income.

"These loans have enabled farmers to stay in business who would otherwise have had to give up and to go to the city. They have helped young farmers to get established. They have enabled farmers to keep going after drought, hail, untimely freezing and heavy rain at harvest time substantially reduced their income," Turney noted.

Farmers Home Administration loans can be used to buy land, refinance debts, acquire livestock and equipment, pay fertilizer and fuel bills and pay other expenses connected with acquiring, improving and operating farms.

Latest in the yearly survey of farm ownership borrowers shown that in Kansas on the average over a 5-year period, these borrowers have raised their gross cash incomes from \$12,279 to \$19,886 and made substantial gains in net worth.

The incomes of farmers using Farmers Home Administration credit in Ellis, Ness, Rush, Russell and Trego Counties in 1967 totaled approximately \$11,000.

Typical of the progress made with the aid of the supervised credit program is the record of the Walter Haselhorst family of Gorham, Kansas. FHA made a loan to the Haselhorst family to purchase 480 acres in 1962. During the five years this family was indebted to FHA their net worth was doubled. This is proof that young families following good management practices, when given the opportunity, can become successful in farming.

In keeping with their agreement to return to commercial credit when their indebtedness has been reduced so that commercial credit is available at rates and terms they could afford, the Haselhorst family paid their FHA loan in 1967. They have purchased additional land and are well on their way to being outstanding, progressive, established farmers in their community.

Loans are made only to families who are unable to obtain adequate credit from other sources.

The program is tailored to individual family needs and loans are accompanied by technical assistance in farm and money management.

## Savings on Bridge Replacement Costs Brought About by Watershed District

The Walnut Creek Watershed district in Brown county proved its worth during the heavy rains which fell in June 1967. Not one bridge in the area was lost to floodwaters during this period.

The 76,000-acre watershed district is located in the deep, loess soils and rolling hills in the northwestern part of the county. It was the first watershed district to organize under the Kansas Watershed District Act of 1954.

The project is nearing completion. The final two floodwater retarding dams and one grade stabilization dam are under construction. Much of the necessary land treatment has already been done.

Additional measures are rapidly being applied. When current construction is completed, the watershed district will have 21 floodwater retarding dams and

24 grade stabilization dams.

Federal, state, county, and township roads provide transportation routes on nearly all sec-

tion lines in the watershed area. The Missouri Pacific and Union Pacific Railroads cross the area.

Railroads and roads which cross the main stem of the Walnut Creek were subject to severe flood damage before the watershed project was initiated. Traffic was stopped during the floods, resulting in financial loss, loss of time, and general inconvenience.

With the watershed project underway, County Commissioners and Township Trustees were able to install smaller replacement bridges and culverts in the area. This resulted in a substantial savings in bridge replacement costs in the county.

"The initial cost of our share of the Walnut Creek Watershed Project was \$23,000," reports William R. Warren, chairman of the Brown County Commissioners. "But we feel that the project will save us many times this amount in future years."

Citizens in the local community are highly pleased with the watershed program and the beneficial effect it had on the road program in the county. The project is nearing completion only because of the fine coordination and cooperation provided by landowners, farm operators, public utilities, and public officials.

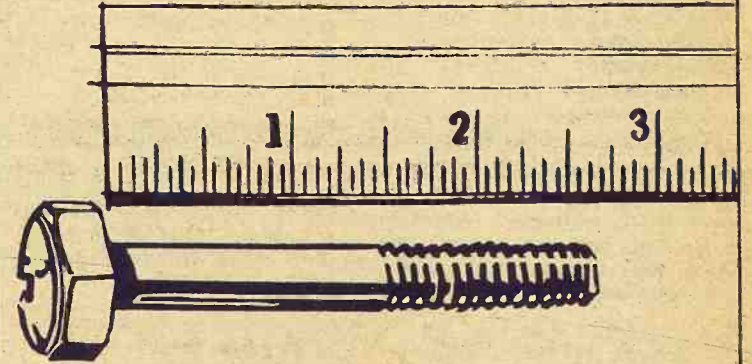

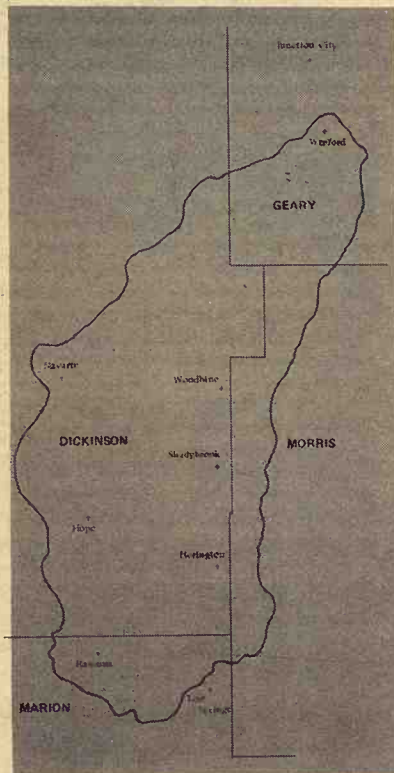

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Winner, Mrs. James Stehno, Munden: "Enclosing a pickle recipe that takes a little more time but is extra good."  
**SWEET DILL PICKLES**

6 cucumbers  
ice water  
onion slices  
dill, fresh or dried  
1 cup sugar  
1 cup water  
1 pint vinegar  
½ cup salt

Soak whole cucumbers in ice water three to four hours. Drain. Slice or cut into strips. Combine sugar, water, vinegar and salt; bring to a boil. Pour over pickles to within ½ inch from jar top. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath (212 degrees F.) 20 minutes. (Start to count the processing time as soon as hot jars are placed into the actively boiling water.) Remove jars from canner and complete seals unless closures are self-sealing. Makes three pints.

**TOMATO SAUCE**  
2 cups  
1 tablespoon oleo

1 tablespoon chopped onion  
1 tablespoon flour  
1 tablespoon sugar  
2 cups tomato puree (tomatoes cooked and sieved)  
½ teaspoon salt  
½ teaspoon pepper  
½ teaspoon celery salt ("I used celery leaves that I had dried and powdered.")  
½ teaspoon chili powder  
1 tablespoon chopped parsley ("I used parsley leaves that I had dried and powdered.")

Melt oleo in skillet over low heat. Add onion and cook until brown. Add flour and stir until smooth. Place tomato puree, salt, pepper, celery salt, chili powder and parsley in a bowl and mix thoroughly. Add to flour mixture in skillet. Cook on low heat, stirring constantly until thickened. Serve with meat balls, meat loaf, croquettes or spaghetti. If desired, add ½ teaspoon oregano and use as pizza sauce. "I made this up in multiple batches and canned some while also freezing some. I have individual plastic ice cube containers which hold exactly ½ cup. I used these as there is no measuring problem when using

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them as I had removed cubes from containers and put a dozen or so in plastic bags in the freezer. May use canned tomatoes to make the puree, hence, a winter-time job."

### Topping For Eggs

Cook sliced mushrooms with thin strips of onion in butter and use as a topping for scrambled eggs.

### Ambrosia

For dessert eat fruit. Ambrosia is a simple way. Just sprinkle pineapple, banana and orange slices with confectioners' sugar. Before serving, top with plain or toasted coconut.

# What's Effect of Big Crop Year?

Farmers are producing big crops again this year. They have cut acreage on several important crops, but yields per acre are generally higher than they were in 1967.

On August 9, the USDA issued new estimates of the production of corn, wheat, and several other crops, also making its first forecasts of the production of soybeans and sorghum grain.

Corn. Government statisticians forecast the production of

corn at 4,556 million bushels — 2 percent greater than the forecast made in July, but 4 percent less than the record 1967 crop. Total production is down this year because the acreage was reduced by the Government price-support program.

The 1968 corn crop may be more evenly distributed than that of last year. In 1967, Illinois had big yields per acre, but most other Corn Belt states didn't have much to write home about. This year, most of the other states have better crops. But Illinois will probably lead again in average yield per acre, and in total production.

Soybeans. The soybean crop was forecast at 1064 million bushels — 9 percent greater than the record set last year. This was the first official forecast concerning the 1968 crop.

Illinois still holds a big lead in soybean production, but other states are gaining. The production area for this crop now stretches from Minnesota, which borders on Canada, to Mississippi which borders on the Gulf of Mexico. East and West, the crop spreads from Nebraska and Kansas to the Carolinas. This wide distribution of the production area helps to stabilize average yields and production.

Wheat. The USDA now estimates 1968 wheat production at 1606 million bushels — 5 percent more than the crop produced a year ago. Most of the crop has been harvested, but large amounts are still standing in the northern areas — from Minnesota westward.

Sorghum Grain. The production of sorghum grain was forecast at 772 million bushels — 1 percent more than the record crop produced last year. This was the first official estimate of the 1968 sorghum grain crop.

The big states in the production of sorghum grain are Texas, Kansas, and Nebraska. Sorghum grain competes directly with corn in both U.S. and world grain markets.

Oats. The oat crop was figured

at 938 million bushels — up 20 percent from 1967. Production has increased this year primarily because farmers cut back on corn to participate in the price-support program.

Barley. Government statisticians calculate barley production at 425 million bushels — 15 percent more than in 1967. The increased output comes from the larger acreage planted this year.

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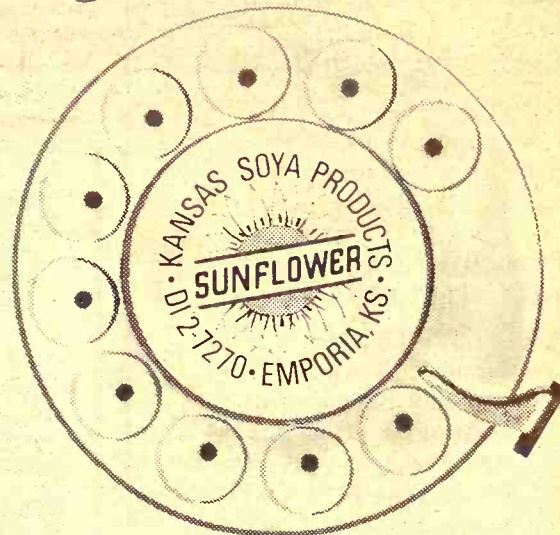

for waterfowl hunters giving hunters a 30-day consecutive duck season.

Duck season extends from Nov. 2 through Dec. 1 with four ducks in the daily bag and eight allowed in possession after the first day. The daily bag should include no more than two wood ducks, one redhead or one canvasback and two mallards. The possession limit includes four wood ducks, one redhead or one canvasback, and four mallards.

This is a better mallard harvest than foreseen because early reports showed mallard populations down. A late hatch for mallards north of the Canadian drouth areas held the decrease to only four per cent, however, while some other species were hurt more — pintails were down 12 per cent, bluewing teal, 30 per cent, and gadwalls 40 per cent.

Last year, a 45-day, split duck season was set by commissioners. A 65-day goose season will open Oct. 12 and close at sunset Dec. 15. This compares to a 72-day season last year.

Geese, which normally nest farther north, were not greatly hurt by drouth on the Canadian prairies. Hunters may take five geese daily and have one day's bag in possession.

## Conditions Favor Streak Mosaic

Volunteer wheat, encouraged by ample rain in July and August, abounds in many areas of the state this fall. This may mean trouble for wheat farmers, says Claude L. King, Extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University.

The wheat streak mosaic disease virus is carried by a microscopic mite from volunteer wheat plants to planted wheat. Because of favorable summer growing conditions this year, it is more important than ever for farmers to plow-down this volunteer wheat at least 3 weeks before seeding a new wheat crop.

The mites and virus are able to survive on the plowed-under volunteer plants for several days, King notes, so the minimum 21-day interval is very important.

The first major loss due to wheat streak mosaic in Kansas was a \$30 million blow in 1949. In 1959, the damage amounted to \$60 million. Another loss may be coming in 1969 unless farmers take proper precautions.

Change in planting procedures does offer some help, King indicates. Growers in Western Kansas usually plant their wheat in mid-September instead of August. This reduces the time the mite vector is in the wheat field and thus reduces the egg laying, increasing, and spreading time.

Also, if the temperature is lower than normal in the fall, this slows down damage. In addition, some wheat varieties have 35 to 50 percent resistance to wheat damage. In addition, some wheat varieties have 35 to 50 percent resistance to wheat streak mosaic. The resistant varieties include Bison, Triumph, Comanche, Scout, and Rodco.

In eastern Kansas, soil-borne wheat mosaic takes its toll if continuous cool, wet weather occurs during the spring growing season. Growers in this area may want to consider planting resistant varieties of Shawnee, Gage, Ottawa, Comanche, and Tascosa to prevent this.

In previous growing seasons, there has been considerable acreage of soil-borne mosaic as far west as Hutchinson, but dry

spring weather prevents heavy losses. However, field tests show that yields may be cut one-third or more if the weather turns wet and cool in the spring.

But don't pick a wheat variety on the basis of resistance to the mosaics alone, King advises. Consider the stem rust problem as well in northwest and north central Kansas, and leaf rust in the south central area.

Varieties that show the best stem rust resistance are Lancer, Gage, Scout, Kaw 61, Shawnee, and Ottawa. For leaf rust resistance, try Parker and Gage.

For more complete informa-

tion about wheat varieties, King advises farmers to consult with their local county Extension agricultural agent. He has a copy of the K-State Experiment Station Variety Tests with Small Grains, which contains search data for all sections of the state.

# Fertilizer Use Still Sets New Records

Fertilizer sales in Kansas for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1968 reached an all time record high of 1,072,882 tons. The report, based on commercial fertilizer sales by manufacturers to Kansas dealers, was issued by the Control Division of the Kansas State Department of Agriculture.

Robert Guntert, Director of the Control Division, said the previous high was 890,863 tons in 1966-67. "Actual plant food content of fertilizers sold in Kansas in 1967-68 fiscal year amounted to 548,467 tons as compared to 461,201 tons in

1966-67," Guntert said.

"Substantial increases for fertilizer materials were recorded over the previous fiscal year with the exception of Superphosphates," Guntert said. Grades of mixed dry fertilizers with the greatest increase were: 18-46-0 (percentage nitrogen-available phosphorus-potash), 16-48-0 and 13-52-0. For the fourth straight year, 18-26-0 had a large increase, 177,118 tons as compared to 149,073 tons the previous year.

Fertilizer sales for the six-month period ending June 30, 1968 recorded an increase of almost 35% over the same period ending June 30, 1967. This year's figure was 658,571 tons as compared to the 478,678 tons in the spring period of 1967.

A new high of 329,265 tons of actual plant nutrients was sold during the spring period, an increase of 97,647 tons over sales of the same period in 1967. Nitrogen sales showed 244,462 tons, up 77,414 tons; available phosphoric acid sales totaled 64,810 tons, up 15,398; potash sales were 19,993 tons, up 4,835.

Brown county again led the state in spring sales with 23,006 tons, followed by Doniphan, 21,816; Jackson, 18,884; Atchison, 16,730; Marshall, 16,355; Reno, 14,946; and Nemaha, 14,766.

# Two Years To Get Poultry Plan Operative

Kansas has two years to develop a poultry inspection program at least equal to federal standards, Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman said Tuesday as he moved to give practical use to the Wholesome Poultry Products Act of 1968 recently signed by President Johnson.

Kansas has only a voluntary poultry inspection law, the files of the Department of Agriculture indicated.

The new law provides states with federal financial and technical assistance and authorizes the department to pay up to 50 per cent of the cost of developing a poultry inspection program.

The law also authorizes the secretary of agriculture to take immediate corrective action in or require federal inspection of any poultry processing plant judged to constitute a hazard to public health.

The consumer and marketing service of agriculture will make available a model poultry inspection law for use by states which have no inspection laws as well as a proposed federal-state cooperative inspection agreement.

An acceptable state law, under the new federal legislation, must require mandatory inspection of poultry-processing plants before and after slaughter of fowls.

Kansas also was reported as one of more than 25 states which have not completed federal-state cooperative inspection

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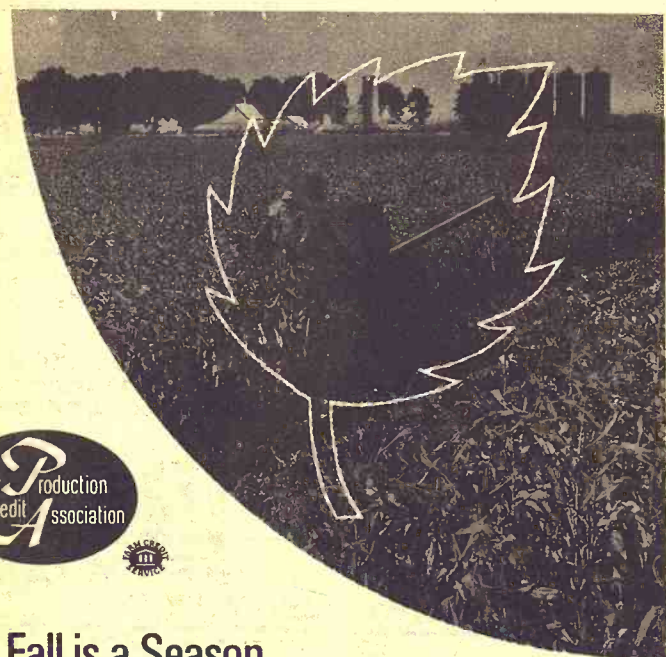

## Study Shows Most of McPherson County Suitable For Irrigation

McPHERSON — McPherson County has 454,516 acres of land suitable for irrigation, according to the Water Resources Board of Kansas.

The board's estimate is based on a survey of water conditions in the county, part of a state-

wide survey providing statistics on the amount of water available for irrigation purposes.

McPherson County's area includes 573,440 acres, of which 534,781 are classed as agricultural acres. Of the agricultural acreage, only 80,000 acres are

not suitable for irrigation.

The Resources Board provided a map showing that nearly all of the southern two-thirds of the county is suitable for irrigation. The northern one-third has scattered areas suitable for irrigation, including all of the area along the Smoky Hill River Valley.

Ground water supply, running north and south through the central part of the county, is rated at more than 1000 gallons per minute.

The board has issued surface water rights to 104 farmers, most of them in the Smoky Hill river valley.

Water in storage in the ground in the county is estimated at 4,032,000 acre-feet. The estimated annual recharge is 138,000 acre-feet.

### FIRST LOSS REPORTED BY LLOYD'S OF LONDON

Lloyd's of London, the world-wide insurer, has reported its first yearly deficit since it started to divulge its accounts in 1948. The loss was a staggering \$91 million. The report covered the year 1965, in keeping with Lloyd's practice of holding open its accounts for three years to get a better picture of claim settlements. Hurricane Betsy, the Watts riot, and a number of air crashes were among the heavy claims on the association, which is principally a reinsurer.

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# Tests of Bluestem Grass Values May Force Tax Equalization

The values of Flint Hills grassland in several counties will come before the Kansas Board of Tax Appeals in what may be a case that will hurry equal assessment and taxation of state property.

The tax board has been asked by Marion County officials to equalize property assessments among seven grassland-rich

counties in the heart of the Flint Hills region.

It is the first time the direct question of equalizing assessments on similar types of property in different counties has been presented to the board, and members of the agency indicated they welcome an opportunity to rule on the controversial matter.

The decision could set a quasi-judicial precedent that would help bring about uniform and equal assessment and taxation of property, as called for in the state constitution.

At present, the county assessors and county commissioners, sitting as boards of equalization, set the assessment, and there is widespread disparity among counties.

Taxpayers in counties which have complied with a 1963 law requiring all real estate to be assessed at 30 percent of its justifiable value are at a disadvantage compared to residents of counties which have not complied with the statute.

George Wagstaff, secretary-attorney for the Board of Tax Appeals, said the Marion County request provides a good test case. He said almost all of the area involved in bluestem pasture land.

The Marion County officials asked the state board to inquire into and equalize the valuation and assessment of all pasture and rangelands in Marion, Chase, Lyon, Elk, Cowley, Greenwood and Butler counties.

The case, brought by the Marion county commissioners as individual taxpayers and as county officials, alleges the grazing land in the seven counties is of "similar type" composition and topography, has similar capabilities in livestock production, and similar sale values on the open market.

The Marion County officials claim there is no uniformity of assessment for "like grade or quality of pasture or range-land."

"This circumstance," the Marion County cases allege, "causes the imposition of an excessive tax burden upon those counties

which have complied with the law requiring property to be assessed for tax purposes at 30 percent of its real value."

Figures in the state property valuation directors office indicate Marion County range land has the highest assessment of the seven counties involved.

In Marion County, the average assessment countywide on No. 1 grassland is \$29.61 per acre.

In Chase County, adjacent to Marion County on the east, the same category of grassland has an assessed value of \$24.77 an acre.

In Lyon County, the assessment indicated by records in the property valuation directors office shows the grassland is assessed at \$20.14 an acre.

The assessed value on number 1 grassland in Elk County is \$22.79 an acre; in Cowley County, \$17.86 per acre; and in Greenwood County, \$19.19 per acre.

Wagstaff said the Marion County matter probably cannot be set for hearing before the Board of Tax Appeals until September or October because of cases already pending.

If the Board of Tax Appeals finds that assessment is unequal among the seven counties, the board likely will order the local counties to raise their assessments, which in turn would raise property taxes.

More important, if the board finds unequal and nonuniform assessment on similar types of

land, the ruling would apply to other categories of like property, such as cropland, and possibly even to urban areas of similar character.

Most cases on assessment which have come before the Board of Tax Appeals concern inequity of assessment between property within one county.

This is revealed in a recent comparison of Russian and U.S. farming and livestock operations made by the Statistical Reporting Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

In 1966, the bulletin discloses, both countries enjoyed a good agricultural year. It was a bumper one for the Soviets. Some 36 per cent of the total Soviet work force engaged in agricultural labor in the USSR in 1966 compared to 7 per cent or about 5,200,000 in the U.S. Russian workers sowed 511 million acres while American farmers planted 300 million acres.

In livestock and meats, the U.S. produced nearly 2½ times more beef, 1½ times more pork and nearly five times as much poultry. The Soviets, however, raised more mutton, lamb and goat and processed three times as much wool.

Yields per acre for most crops were much lower in the Soviet Union than in the U.S. Exceptions were cotton and sunflower seed, in which the Soviets led, and vegetables, in which yields were roughly equal.

Although the Soviet farmer planted vastly greater acreages to grain, his output of eight grain crops totaled 80 per cent of the American farmers' production.

The USSR totaled slightly more milk and butter. The U.S., however, produced twice as many eggs.

Collective farms in the Soviet Union in 1966 averaged 31,000 acres each and employed 417 workers to sow about 7000 acres. The Soviet state farms averaged over 120,000 acres each and employed 651 workers to sow just over 18,000 acres. There are also some private plots, averaging an acre. However, nearly one-third of the Soviet's agricultural production comes from these small privately-owned plots.

The U.S. had 3.2 million farms in 1966 compared to about 37,000 collective and 12,000 state farms in the Soviet.

### LIBERAL TO SELL BONDS FOR PACKING HOUSE

The town of Liberal has agreed to try to sell \$250,000 in revenue bonds to finance a sewage disposal plant for the National Packing beef processing plant. The bonds will be paid off by National as service charges over a 15-year period.

### ASK TO GRAZE MORE G&G AREA SOIL BANK

Grazing of soil bank land in Ellsworth, Lincoln, Mitchell and Ottawa Counties will be allowed if USDA accepts, as expected, a request from Governor Docking. Docking said the request from the area came from E. E. Kissick of Beverly.

PERRY — A group not happy with phone service in this area has scheduled an open meeting for Thursday, August 29, says Mrs. Merle Black, a Williams-town housewife who thinks that service by the Kansas Telephone Co. is not all it should be.

Kansas Telephone, based in Ottawa, serves Circleville, Corning, Delia, Denison, Easton, Effingham, Emmett, Hoyt, Lancaster, Mayetta, Meriden, Nortonville, Ozawie, Perry, Rock Creek, Rossville, St. Marys, Sil-

ver Lake and Winchester.

Mrs. Black says complaints center around lengthy periods when phones are dead, deficiencies in repair service, and a proposed \$1 monthly rate increase.

Kansas Telephone, she says, has applied to the Kansas Corporation Commission for the rate boost, altho a date for a public hearing has not yet been set.

# Maize Mosaic Is New Crop Threat

Kansas is faced with a new virus disease of grain sorghum, maize dwarf mosaic, according to Dr. Leon K. Edmunds, U.S. Department of Agriculture plant pathologist at Kansas State University, Manhattan. Maize dwarf mosaic is ranked with downy mildew, both diseases new to sorghum in Kansas in 1967, and both presenting major disease problems of sorghum in Kansas, commented Edmunds.

Maize dwarf mosaic is more prevalent in the southern part of the state, largely because Johnson grass, which serves as a weed host for the disease, and corn leaf aphid, a major vector of the disease, are abundant there.

Two symptoms result from infection by the virus.

"Probably the most common symptom is a mosaic pattern of yellow and green areas on leaves. It is most readily seen in

young emerging leaves, but also occurs on older leaves," said the plant pathologist. He added that the other symptom is a red-leaf which is characterized by various degrees of striping and elongated reddish lesions with bleached centers. This symptom appears on infected plants when the nights are abnormally cool. "Not all sorghum varieties, however, react the same way when they are infected," stated Edmunds.

Edmunds said that K-State pathologists are trying to get a meaningful assessment of the disease and the extent of damage. "Since it is a new disease

and has potential to be a major problem, it will help our assessment of damage if farmers directly, or through their county agents, would report occurrence of symptoms similar to the ones just described," commented Edmunds. He added that last year it was estimated that Texas suffered an 18 percent reduction in total grain sorghum from the disease.

According to Edmunds, eight test nurseries will be established in the southern part of Kansas this year to evaluate the disease under variable conditions. Results from these tests will be integrated with test results from other states as part of an effort to determine how large a program should be initiated for control of maize dwarf mosaic.

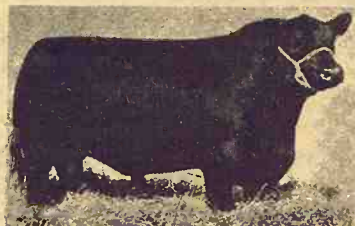

## Pork Producers Fret Over "Image"

National Pork Producers Council has completed early stages of work on investigation of the image of "pork" among housewives and their families across the nation.

They found some items that need to be subjects for corrective information — and other items which make producers believe positive action will make pork more appealing to an average housewife.

A research team visited with chain meat buyers, hotel, restaurant and institution administrators throughout the country. They also interviewed house-

wives in Atlanta, Boston, Baltimore, Dallas, Minneapolis and San Francisco.

Specific recommendations for bettering the pork image are due soon from the "Image Committee" of the NPPC.

The research information was summed up as containing material for three overriding conclusions, according to the NPPC publication.

- The housewife likes the taste of pork. The team remarked that the liking for pork is stronger and more widespread than earlier was believed.

- The housewife is afraid of pork.

- Pork carries a fat label

NPPC believes that the second point, fear, may be overcome by publicizing accurate information regarding pork. Disease and dirt are things of the past around hog pens, the pork producers declare.

The producers believe the "fat label" may be overcome by the producers themselves who are producing much leaner hogs than in former times and by the butcher who trims the meat.

The "image committee" was expected to recommend a program for overcoming misinformation and helping the public to indulge its taste for pork.

The big program is a part of development brought about by

National Pork Producers Council after an overwhelmingly favorable vote by hog producers from across the United States about 18 months ago in Springfield, Ill.

A "Nickles For Profit" program undertaken a year ago has spread into most of the pork producing states so hog producers contribute automatically toward NPPC when they sell fat hogs.

These funds are being used to better the salability of pork and to create more demand for this red meat throughout the United States.

Annual convention for the NPPC has been set for Omaha, Nebr., March 5 and 6.

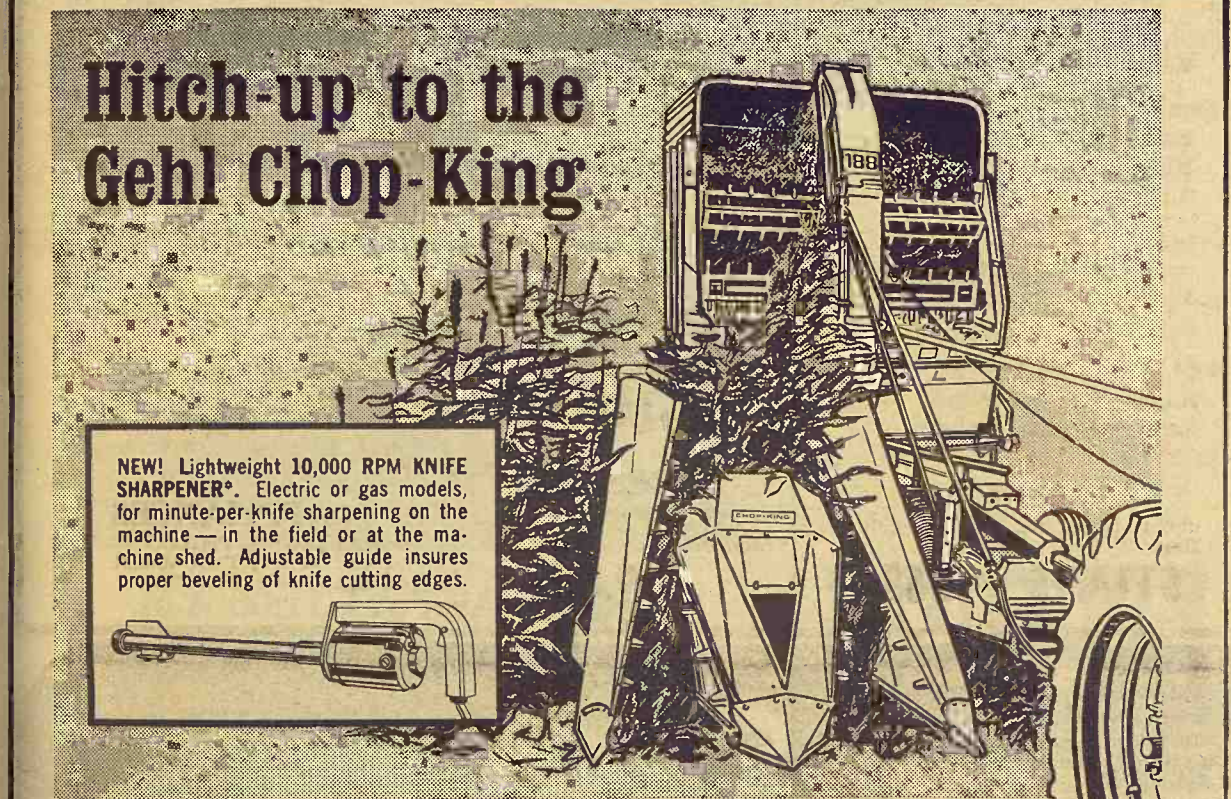

## STRIKE-BOUND CAMPBELL'S TO PAY CROP COSTS

Farmers who found no market for their tomatoes because of the strike of workers at six plants of Campbell Soup Co. in the eastern U.S. will get paid anyway. Campbell told 250 contract farmers that it would pay pre-harvest costs and "a reasonable profit" for the unpicked crop.

## Hard Words For Grain Agreement

The International Grains Agreement already is coming in for some hard words from at least one major farm organization — the American Farm Bureau Federation — which opposed the treaty and fought it in the United States Senate prior to its adoption.

Demand for wheat on the international market has been down since the agreement went into use July 1.

Export figures for the period July 1 to Aug. 9 totaled 65,143,000 bushels, according to a report from the National Association of Wheat Growers. This is down about 30 per cent from the same period a year ago.

Glen Hofer, NAWG national executive secretary, said most of the decline in exports has come as the United States emerges from a period of heavy forward sales made prior to the IGA effective date.

The United States already has protested to Australia that some sales that country made since the IGA date were made at prices below minimums set for such sales under the agreement.

Australia and France are believed to have made international sales of wheat at below the prices set by the agreement.

Australia has been selling high quality hard wheat at the same prices as their "Fair Average Quality" varieties.

France has shipped wheat with transportation charges figured wrongly, the United States contends.

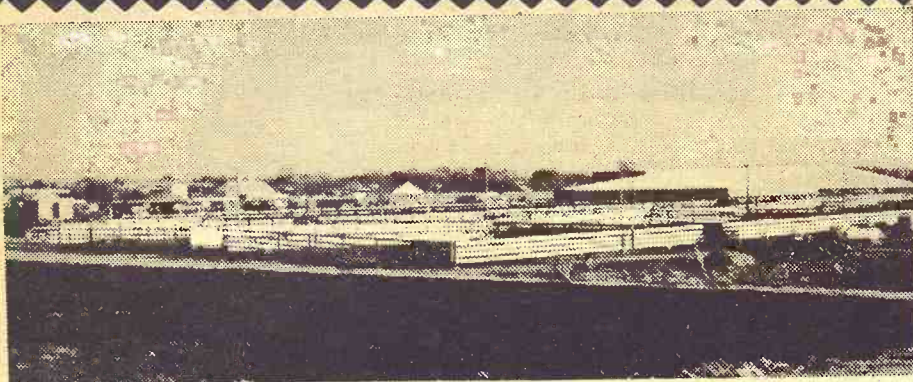
