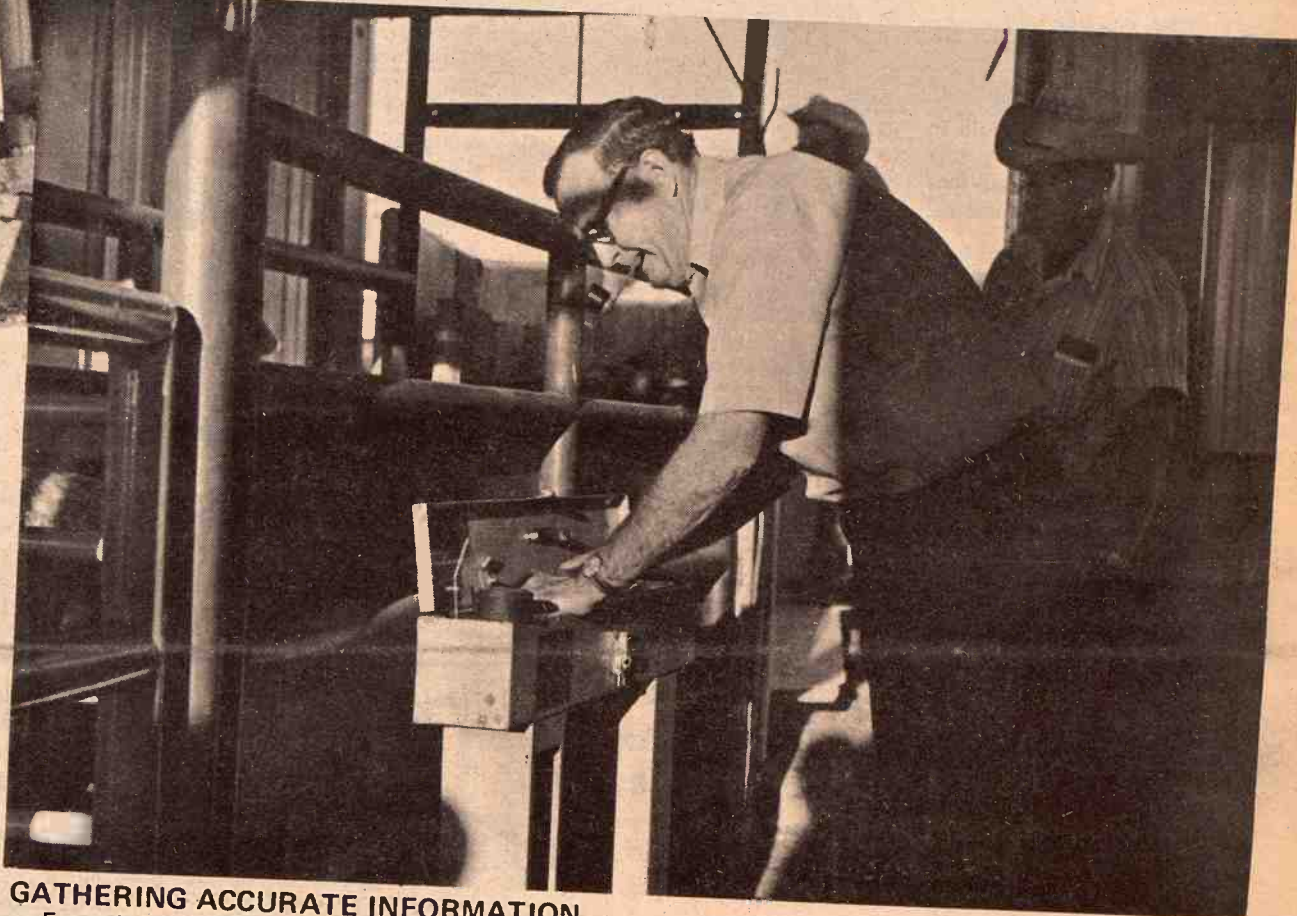

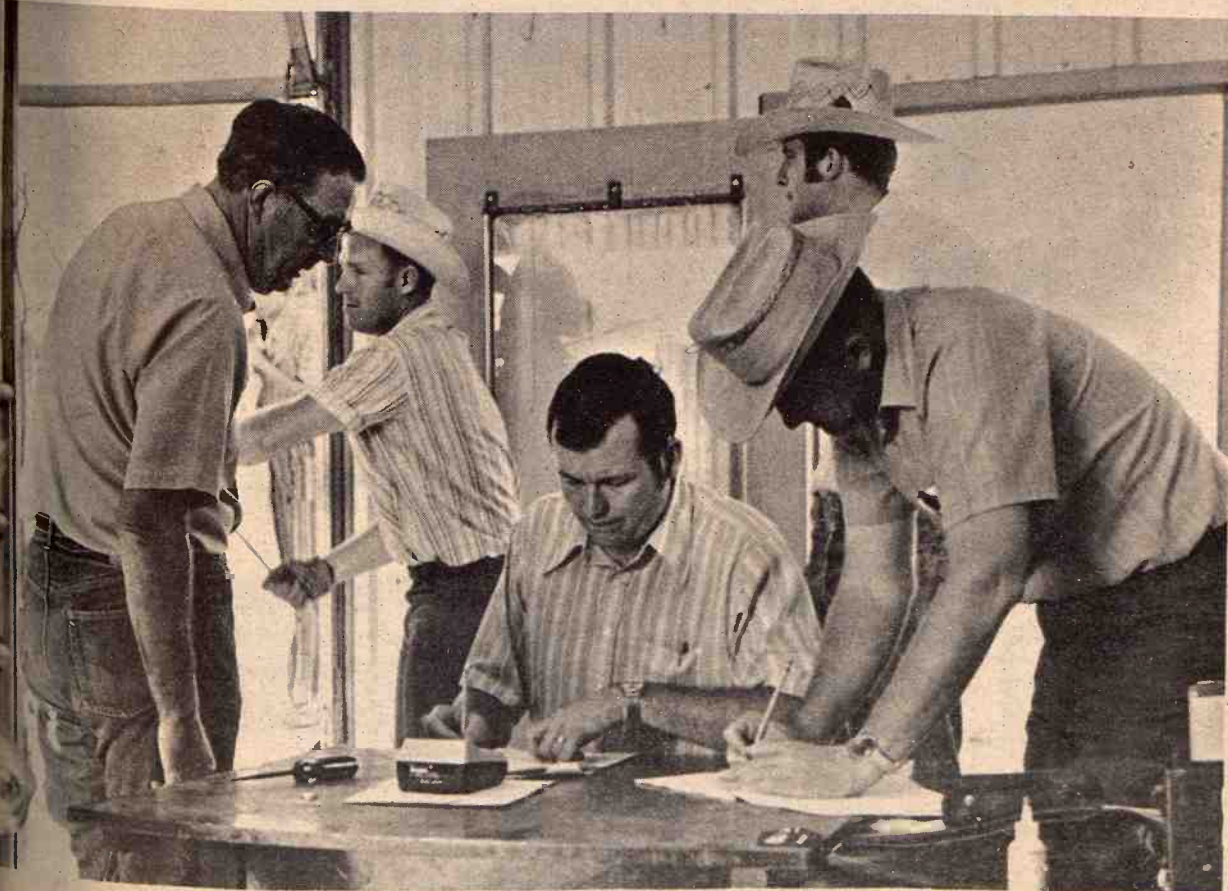


**COMING THROUGH: BULL TESTING IN KANSAS**  
The Kansas Bull Test Station facilities are located at the Solomon Valley feedlot, and are used only for the test program. Pens and treatment and weighing equipment will accommodate 250 bulls per test. The current testing session includes 175 bulls from 53 breeders representing 11 different breeds. Officials look for even more bulls. The next session starts November 1.

# Beloit Bull Testing Station Growing

Bull testing, a relatively new management tool in the beef industry, appears to be gaining converts in Kansas.

The increase in interest is strikingly evident at the Kansas Bull Test Station near Beloit.

In slightly more than a year, the station has steadily grown from a modest beginning of 130 cattle on test last year to the current 175 being evaluated this session.

Behind the success of the new station are its active sponsors, the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service and the Kansas Livestock Association.

Dr. Keith Zoellner and Herman Westmeyer, KSU Extension livestock specialists, are the administrators of the testing program.

"Kansas producers may have been somewhat skeptical at first," says Zoellner, "but each session has seen a larger number of enrollees."

The current six-month test session has 53 breeders entering 11 different breeds of bulls.

"There are a number of reasons for the increasing enrollment," Westmeyer explains. "First, more producers have realized the economic benefits of being able to identify their best bulls. In this program, the other can find out just what each animal's genetic potential for sire production is."

"Another reason for the greater interest," Westmeyer continues, "is due to the indexing program we have for the bulls. The producer can see how his bull stacks up against others of the same breed in the test, and a high indexing usually means a better price at the end-of-test sale."

If a management practice helps the producer or breeder, it will also help the consumer — primarily in a greater selection of high-quality meat at the supermarket, the KSU meat specialists say.

"In this testing program we look for the bull that puts weight on in red meat and muscling," Zoellner explains. "That way, the consumer gets more for his money."

The test station is situated on part of the Solomon Valley Feedlot a few miles east of Beloit.

"This location is perfect from the standpoint of test reliability," Zoellner points out. "The bulls are fed and handled the same as other cattle in the lot. They receive no special treatment or feed, which allows us to evaluate the bulls under normal commercial conditions."

Facilities at the station were provided by the feedlot. The arrangement of pens and weighing equipment allow the specialists to weigh, tag, inspect, and — if necessary — treat the 175 bulls in less than two hours.

Animals entering the station are weighed, checked for health, and held for official weighing after 21 days. Other weighings at 56 days, 112 days, and the final weighing at 140 days, allow the specialists to compute an average daily weight gain for the animals.

"We look for three things when evaluating the animals," Westmeyer explains, "gainability of the bulls while on test, weight per day of age, and the muscle-to-fat ratio."

Bulls on the current test will receive final weighing November 8, followed by an auction November 15. To be eligible for the sale, a bull must be in the upper two-thirds of an index based on average daily gain ratio and weight per day of age ratio of his breed group.

Bulls will be accepted for the next test session November 1, and Zoellner and Westmeyer expect an increase in the number of bulls

entered. Existing facilities will accommodate up to 250 bulls.

## Midwest Prairie Conference Slated September 22-23

The third Midwest prairie conference is slated for September 22-23 at K-State, and is open to the public. Dr. Lloyd C. Hulbert, KSU professor of biology and coordinator of the conference, expects 200 people from Kansas and a dozen other states to attend.

Thirty-three speakers, including seven K-State faculty members, will give presentations for the two-day conference.

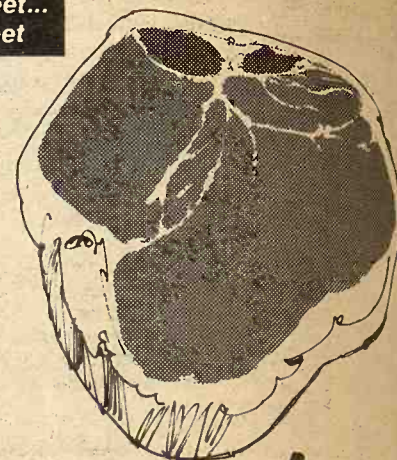
Prairie conferences, which started in 1968 at Knox College, Galesburg, Ill., offer an in-depth look at prairies and a place and a time for people concerned with prairie studies and preservation to share ideas.

Hulbert asked for the third prairie conference to be held at K-State late last year when the Konza Prairie Research Natural Area was established eight miles from Manhattan.

The Konza Prairie, a 916 acre grassland area, was a gift from the Nature Conservancy, the only national, public-supported, non-profit organization, whose resources are solely for the preservation of samples of natural landscape. The actual contribution was made by Katherine Ordway.

Hulbert feels the interest in preserving prairies has grown immensely in the last 20 years and welcomes the public to attend the conference.

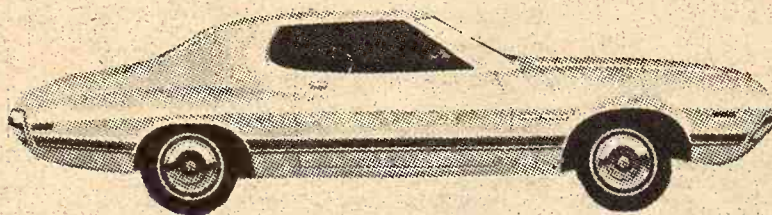
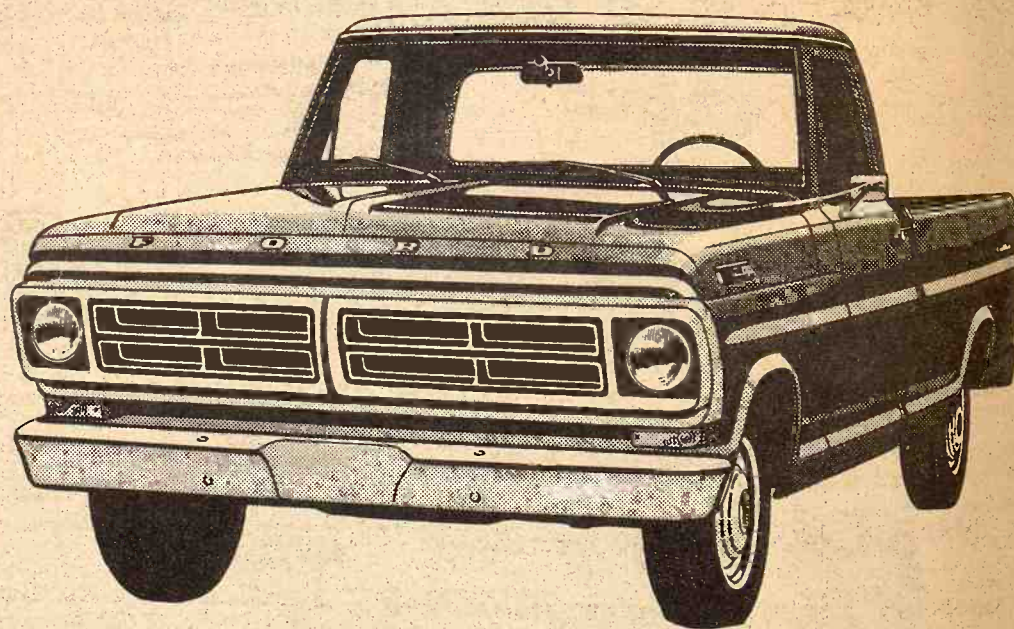

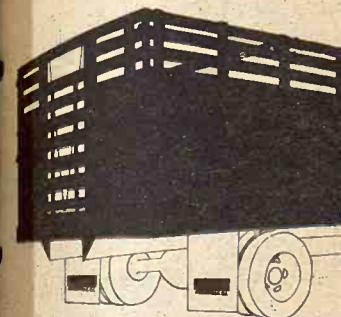

## Slight Increase Forecast In Price of Grain Sorghum

A slight increase in grain sorghum prices is in the offing during 1972-73, reports a Kansas State University extension economist.

Roy Frederick points to reduced acreage and a higher loan value as factors behind the higher prices. He sees prices bottoming out at around \$1.65 per hundred during

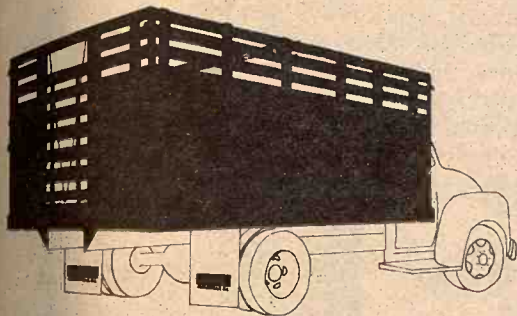
harvest, then rising seasonally to the \$1.85-\$1.90 range late next spring.

Estimated 1972 acreage of 17.4 million acres is down 18 percent from last year, the economist says. The government set-aside program, with its provision to reduce feed grain acreage, is responsible for this reduction.

Although yields are expected to be up, the reduction in acreage may cause total production to fall 15 percent below last year's 895 million bushel crop. Acreage in Kansas is expected to be down 20 percent from last year's 4.3 million acres.

Frederick points out that the loan rate for sorghums has been raised 6 cents per hundred to \$1.79. This will peg the sorghum loan rate at 95 percent of the corn loan rate, compared to 92 percent in 1971.

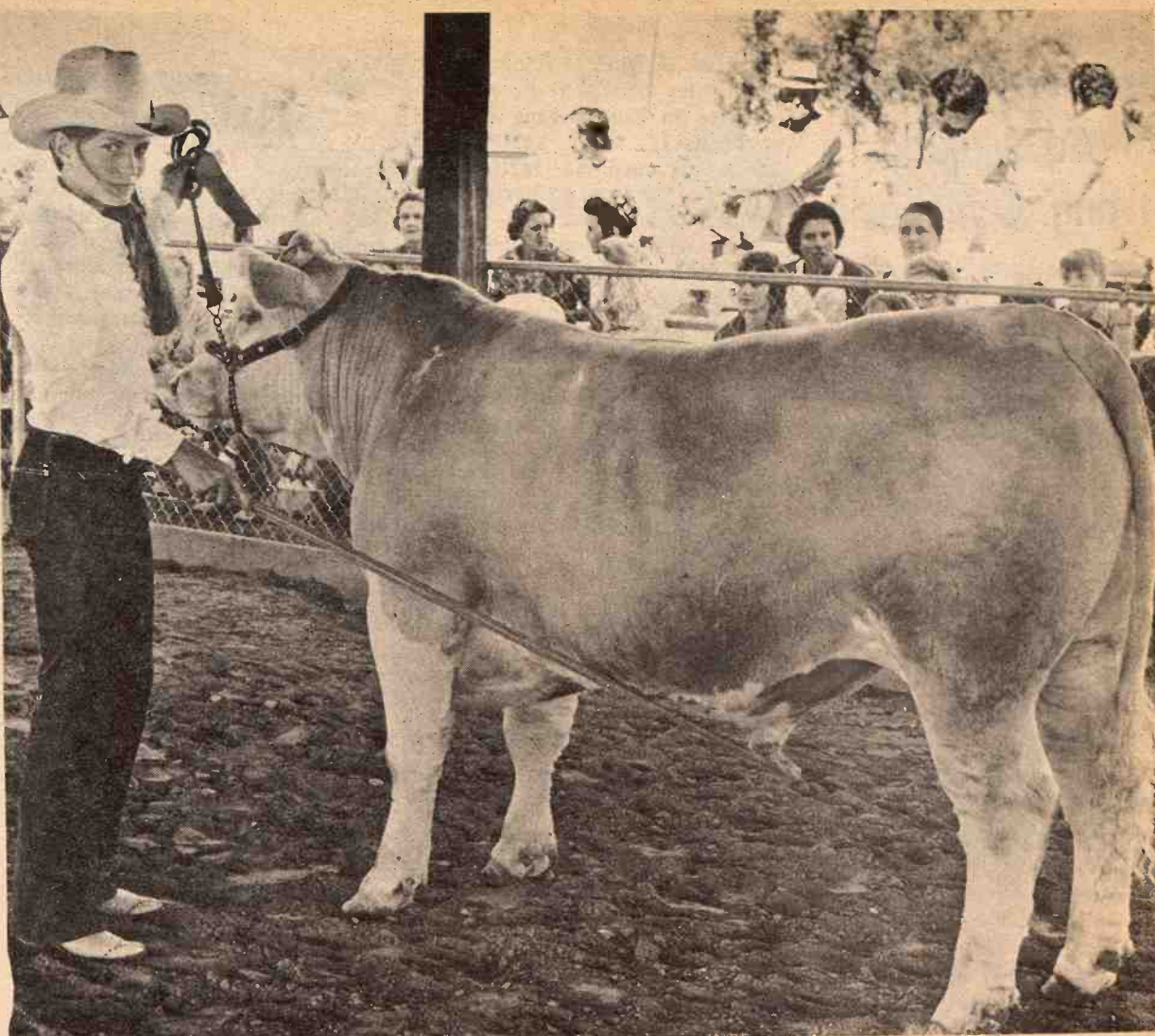

## Hunter Conduct On Private Land Means Future Use

After securing landowner permission to hunt, sportsmen should carry the ball one step further, advises the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

This is the time of year when landowners are closely observing hunters on their land. The Commission reminds hunters that their behavior on private land may determine whether they or other hunters will be allowed access in the future. After hunting permission is granted, access can be maintained by following a few logical suggestions, according to the Commission.

First, always cross a fence so as to put the least possible strain on it. Refencing is a bothersome and costly part of farming, and this is one area where farmer-hunter relationships often fail.

Second, leave a gate in the condition you find it. It is not always true that it has to be closed. Farmers sometimes leave gates open to allow livestock to water, or to promote faster movement of farm equipment.

Third, keep the land clean. Empty bottles, cigarette and candy wrappers scattered about is sure to irritate any landowner.

Fourth, and very important, do not shoot near livestock. Some cattle can be spooked very easily by hunting and no farmer likes to see pounds of beef run off by stampeding cattle.

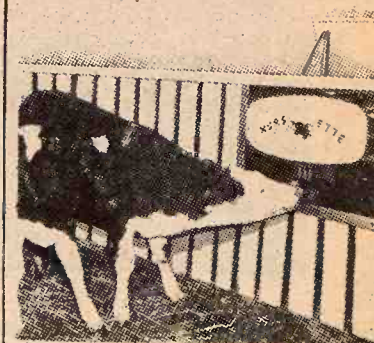
Fifth, shotguns should allow a 300-yard safety zone around farm buildings. Rifleman should not shoot toward machinery or buildings at all.

The Commission says that if these suggestions are heeded, chances are that hunters will continue to have access to the majority of private lands in Kansas. But if disregarded, "Keep Out" signs will start to mark their favorite sites.

## State High School Vo-Ag Making Strong Comeback

Vocational agriculture is making a strong comeback in Kansas high schools despite declining farm population, local and state officials reported.

A 36 percent increase in enrollment in agriculture in the past 10 years was reported by Dean Prochaska, Topeka, director of agricultural education for Kansas Department of Education.

High school students in Kansas enrolled in agriculture increased from 6,233 in 1962 to 8,512 in September 1972. However, vocational agriculture departments in Kansas decreased from 187 in 1962 to 155.

Howard Bradley of the ag

education division of Kansas State University credited the student increase to the growing job opportunities in agri-related businesses such as horticulture, grain elevators and agri-related but nonfarm occupations.

Mulvane High School, where 75 of about 200 boys are enrolled typifies the growing interest. The school is the state winner in dairy products judging and will represent Kansas at the national Future Farmers of America conference at Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 10 to 14.

Courses offered in agricultural mechanics, feedlot operation, veterinary medical helpers or care and maintenance of farm machinery.

As the number of farmers decline, it takes more people in agri-related business areas to serve the farmers.

"This has opened up an entirely new ball game in job opportunities for vo-ag graduates," said

Prochaska.

"There is additional emphasis in the ag-related occupations—nonfarm agriculture—with a little less emphasis on production agriculture," said Bradley, who teaches agricultural education at K-State.

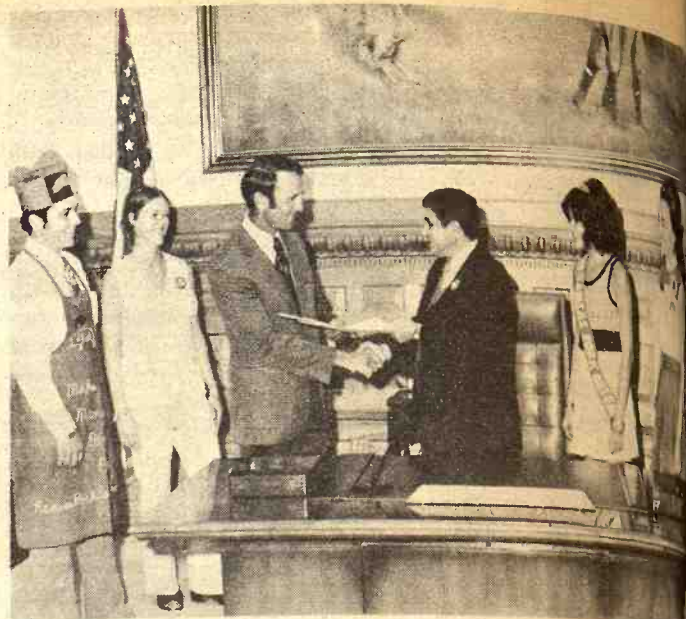
"About 5 percent of the jobs are directly connected with farming while possibly 30 to 35 percent of the openings are agri-related occupations. Our critical situation is not having enough vocational agriculture teachers to fill the job opportunities."

Half of the 35 new vocational agriculture teachers employed in Kansas have been recruited in Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. "There is a definite need for Kansas boys to prepare and become teachers of vocational agriculture," Bradley said.

With more and more urban youths drawn into the field of agriculture, the farm background for teaching has become less necessary, he said.

At Moundridge, a class of 13 girls are studying horticulture, illustrating the trend to the broader preparation, he said.

He indicated more youths are realizing it is not necessary to go to college and preparation for the world of work can be made in high school.

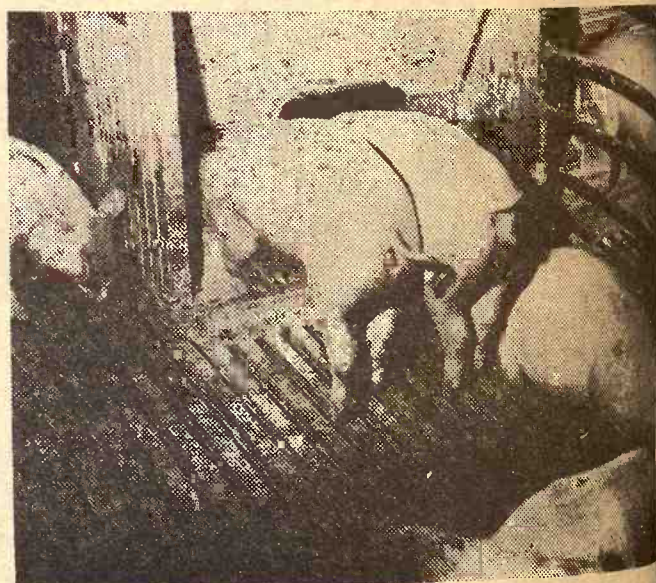

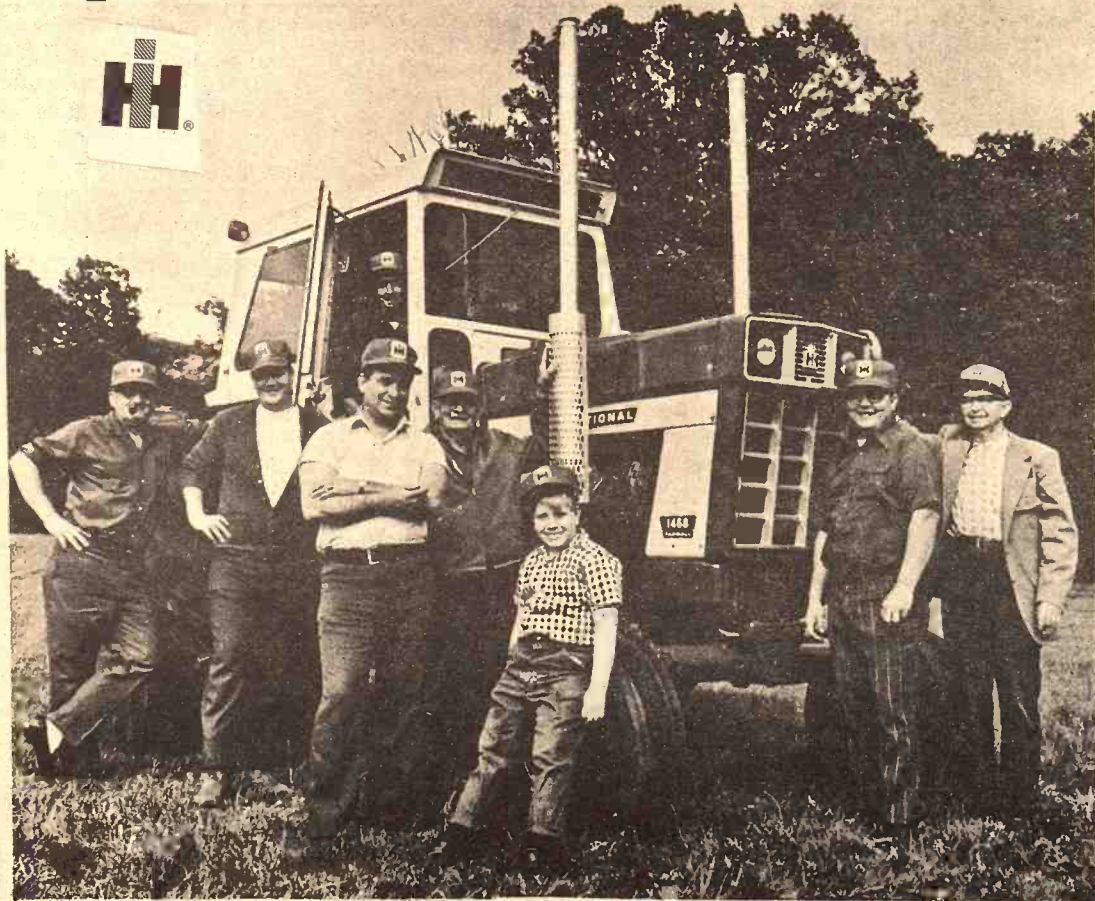

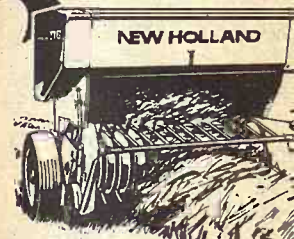

"I don't think this country and our neighbors to the south have launched such an aggressive joint attack on an animal health problem since the outbreak of foot and mouth in Mexico back in the 1950's," said C.

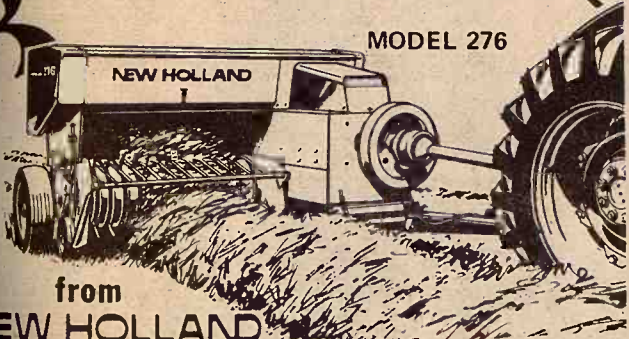

W. McMillan, Washington spokesman for the American National Cattlemen's Assn. "We all should be mighty pleased with this far-reaching example of international cooperation."

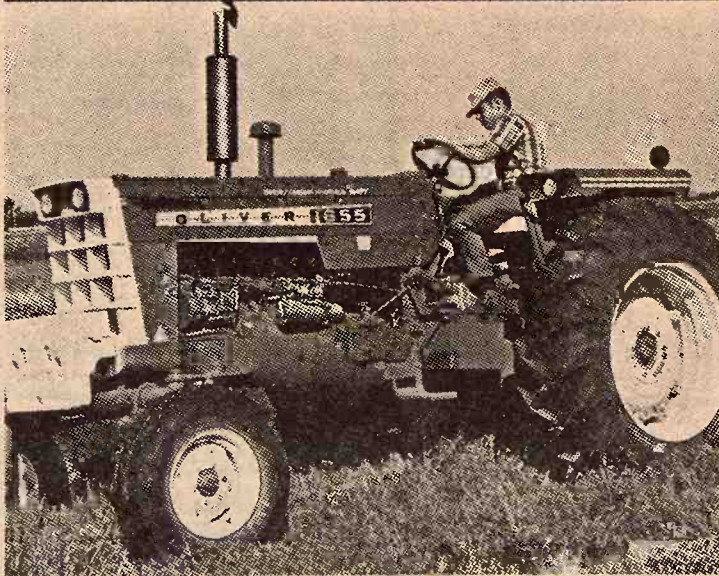
Prior to the inception of the sterile fly program in 1962, screwworms caused a loss of \$100 million each year to ranchers in the southwestern United States. Up until this year, the program was working beyond all expectations, McMillan said, but a combination of wet weather and a mile winter caused the problem to get out of hand again. Currently the southwest is undergoing the worst screwworm outbreak since 1962.

"When we realized the seriousness of the outbreak," McMillan said,

"ANCA began to work in collaboration with cattlemen's groups along the Mexican border to step up the efforts for a new approach to a barrier zone."

The USDA was asked to help move the barrier zone down to the isthmus of Tehuantepec where there is only a narrow neck of land on Mexico's southern border. By establishing a wall of sterile flies at a cost of \$40 million, the cooperative program is expected to eradicate the screwworm in five years.

#### TOO WET TO WORK

Heavy rains in the Grass and Grain area are keeping farmers out of the field. For those trying to prepare wheat ground the weather may create some anxious moments if things don't dry out. Bob Leonard, Manhattan, farms about 530 acres and works at Farm Bureau. "Trying to farm that much while working at two jobs just isn't working out," Leonard said.

## Research Study Shows Farmers Pay Dearly For Today's Machinery

Studies by the Agriculture Department show farmers for many years have been buying larger, more complicated and higher priced machinery to help them operate with more acres and less labor.

But a Texas research organization, NARIS, Inc., says the trend to bigger, more sophisticated machines is costing farmers dearly and, in fact, has helped put many smaller operators out of business.

The San Antonio firm, after studying the situation in Texas, Iowa and California, says in a report that poor design, high cost of replacement parts, model changes and inefficient procurement for replacement parts have weighed heavily on farmers.

"As small towns were reduced or disappeared, there are now fewer dealers in the countryside," the report said. "Furthermore, these dealers cannot afford to carry the high inventory needed for the larger number of models of machines and tractors in operation."

It is not unusual, the researchers said, to find a farmer waiting one to four weeks for parts to come from a central warehouse or factory. Such a wait can spell disaster during harvest, the report said.

"The mark-up on farm tractors, machinery and implement parts ranges from 40 to 65 percent," the researchers said. "We found one two-inch washer that fitted a

combine sold for \$1.65. This washer can be purchased for 25 cents in any hardware store, but must be milled down trimmed 25 percent to fit."

One model of a combine cost \$6,000 new in 1960. Today, the same model is priced at \$9,000. But if farmers bought replaceable parts the same harvester, not counting the frame and engine, the cost would be \$23,000 at parts stores, the report said.

The Agriculture Department says the average farm tractor today has a horsepower rating of 47, nearly two-fifths higher than a decade ago. Last year tractors in the 120-horsepower class accounted for 10 percent of sales, compared with three percent in 1968.

The Texas watchdog group says the trend to larger tractors and other machines has caused new safety problems, more noise and

greater need for better design. The report criticized land-grant colleges and universities promoting bigness on the farm, though they were salesmen for the tractor and machinery companies.

The researchers said that machinery manufacturers have fewer and more diversified other nonagricultural markets, apparent that the current high cost of parts and equipment will not rather than improve.

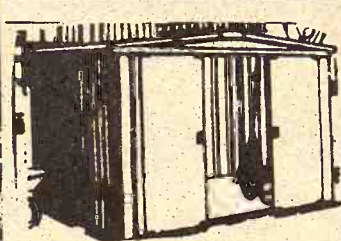

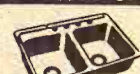

In many cases, he said, the paper companies are given the trees simply for clearing the land. Some landowners receive a token payment of about \$1 per cord, although a fair price might be \$4 or more a cord, Gallaher said.

"It's a little like the old-time hog

buyer who would go around the country buying up hogs for as little as possible," Gallaher said. "No one knew what the going price was when the buyer came. We don't have quoted prices on timber like we do on such things as wheat."

But too often landowners are anxious to clear their land for other production such as cattle grazing.

"What bothers us in seeing land best suited for cottonwood taken out of production with no consideration of other use," Gallaher said. "Many times that land is suited only for growing cottonwood."

The buyer's market for cottonwood is in contrast to the market for black walnut and other hardwoods native to Kansas.

The state ranks 2nd in the nation in log production for walnut veneer, and the landowner with a walnut tree likely knows what it's worth.

"The walnut market is very competitive, and tree owners are getting what they are worth," Gallaher said. He added the extension forestry department at

Kansas State University has worked closely with walnut growers and encourages bids when it's time to sell.

One problem with cottonwood is the young market. Only in the last 2 years has there been extensive cutting. "People don't even think trees in Kansas," Gallaher said.

So the landowner who might demand a higher price for his cottonwood trees can be ignored. The paper company may go next door and get the trees for nothing.

Gallaher said some re-seeding is being done in areas stripped of cottonwood, but most trees planted are walnuts or other varieties not cottonwood.

Kansas, a state which conjures up images of rolling prairie grassland, actually has a vast natural resource in cottonwood. A recent survey by extension foresters showed the state has 556,000 acres of bottomland timber, mostly cottonwood. There are 158 million cubic feet of cottonwood timber in Kansas.

Gallaher said the annual growth rate for cottonwood is estimated at 7.8 million cubic feet. Current cutting is substantially below the growth rate, he said, so there is no immediate worry about depleting the state's cottonwood supply.

But the demand for paper is growing. "It's going to require cottonwood be managed for maximum production in the next

few years," he said.

Research is now underway in fast-growing hybrid cottonwood that can be planted in rows and harvested for pulp every 3 or 4 years.

But so far nothing is better than the native timber, and Kansas apparently has the best around.

Gallaher said a Texas paper company recently began growing trees on a cultivated plot with little success before looking at the Kansas timber.

The demand for Kansas cottonwood is apparent, he said, in the price paper manufacturers are willing to pay to get it shipped to Texas—sometimes as much as \$33 per cord.

Gallaher said it's possible paper manufacturers might look to Kansas for new pulp plants. "But that's

probably a long ways away. It would be difficult for a plant to meet environmental standards for a new industry."

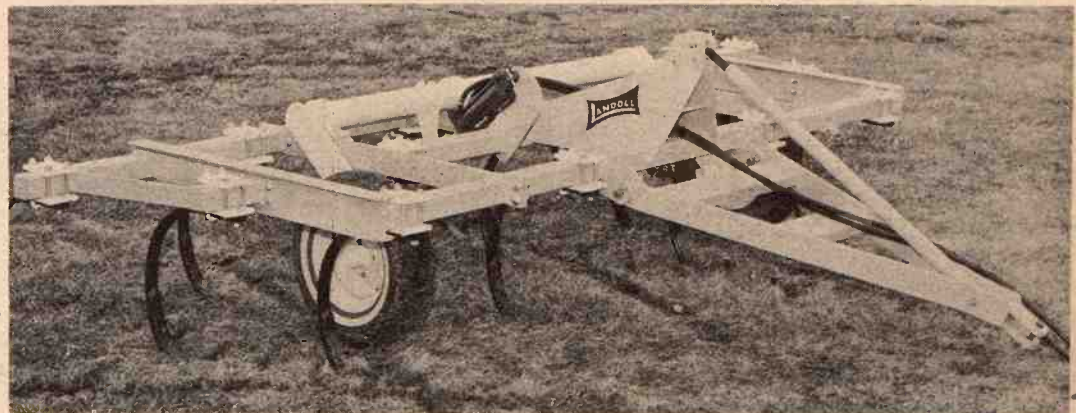

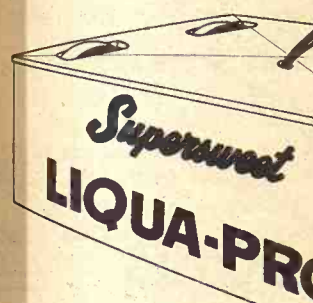

## Decorative Screen Can Be Made From Doors

We think of doors as entries. But,  
they have another side. Wood panel  
doors and sidelights have long been  
the handyman's favorite in creating  
unusual room dividers, cocktail  
tables, desks, headboards, and  
folding screens.

Reasons are: the natural beauty of  
rich wood grain; the ability to paint,  
stain or varnish wood as desired,  
and the fact that wood can be  
worked with carpentry tools. Doors  
of ponderosa pine also offer the  
added detail and visual dimensions  
of panels and lights.

If you'd like to try your hand at  
door decor, consider making a  
decorative folding screen that can  
be put to beautiful use in the most  
elegant living room, dining area or  
bedroom. Instructions are fairly  
simple and all materials—including  
sidelights—are available at lumber  
or building supply dealers.

Materials required are: Three  
entranceway sidelights of ponderosa  
pine (combination of four lights and  
a closed wood panel) size 1'6" wide  
by 6'8" high. One quart of stain or of

semi-gloss paint. Six 3" butt hinges  
(two sets of three each). And, if you  
like, some self-adhering "stained  
glass" paper.

Follow these steps in building the  
screen:

1. Plane the top and bottom edges  
of each sidelight.
2. Stain or paint the wood.
3. Screw three hinges to each edge  
of one sidelight. Place one hinge four  
inches from the top, one four inches  
from the bottom, and center the  
third. Position the hinges so the  
hinge pins of the first set are on the  
opposite side of the hinge pins of the  
second set. This allows the sidelights  
to fold in opposite directions, and  
permits the screen to be free-  
standing.

4. Fasten the two outer sidelights  
to the hinges on the center sidelight,  
making sure all bottom edges are  
smooth and even.
5. Cut stained glass paper to fit  
over glass sections, and adhere in  
place.

The screen, carefully made of the  
right materials, makes a handsome  
— and sturdy — room accent.

## Removal Of Grease From Clothes

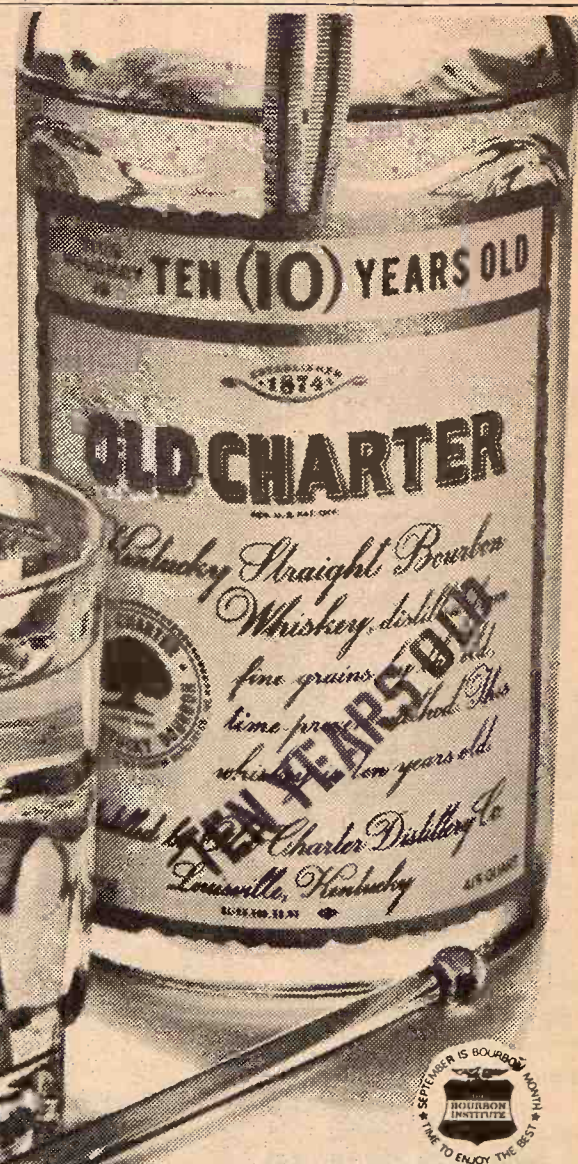

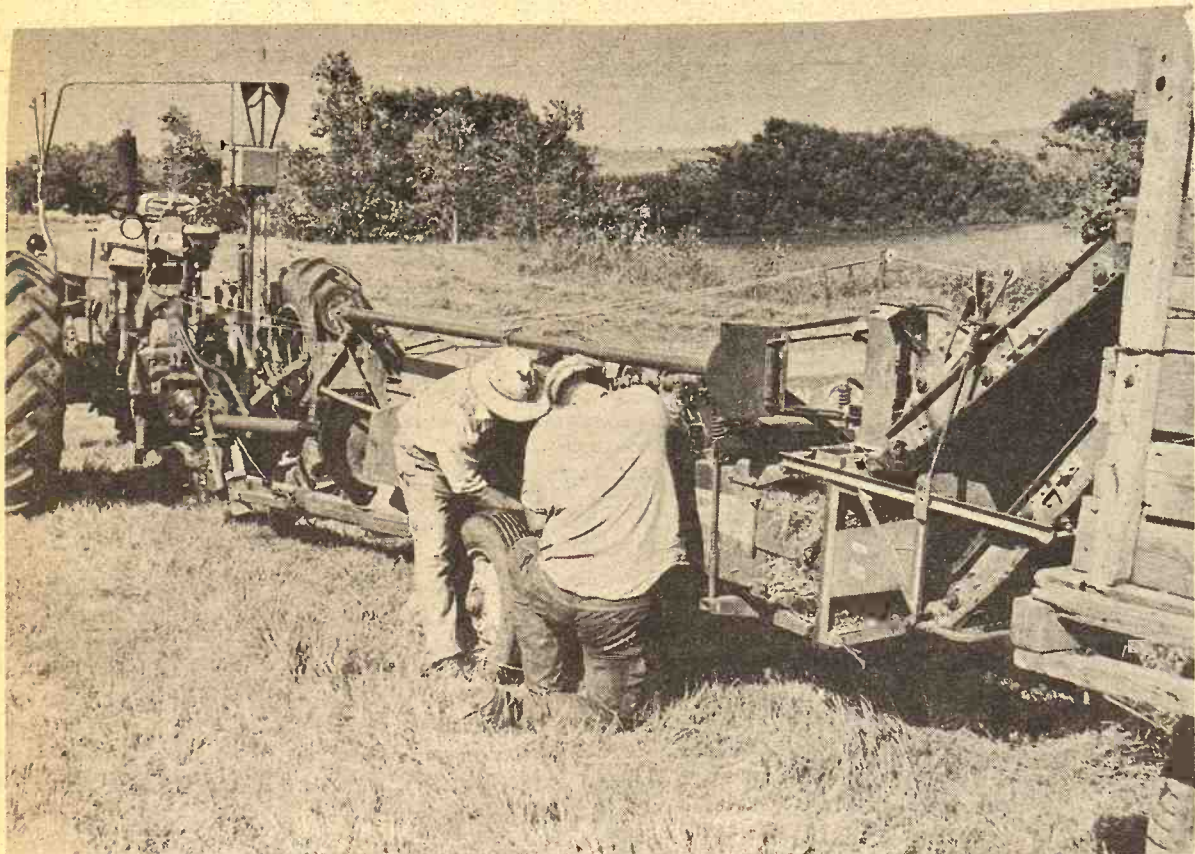

## Grain Exports Hit Record High, But Who Turned A Profit On The Deal?

Based on new information supplied by grain exporters, Agriculture Department experts currently expect that foreign sales of U.S. wheat will surge to more than a billion bushels in this marketing year, well above any previous year's level.

Exporters have advised the Agriculture Department that they plan to seek government export subsidies on about 300 million additional bushels of wheat. The latest application raised to about 780 million bushels the amount of wheat registered for export since the July 1 start of the marketing year.

The new total is close to the 800 million bushels used by the department in its August estimate of wheat exports for the entire 1972-73 year. The previous figure, moreover, included an estimate 180 million bushels in food-for-peace shipments as well as the commercial sales on which the exports subsidies are paid.

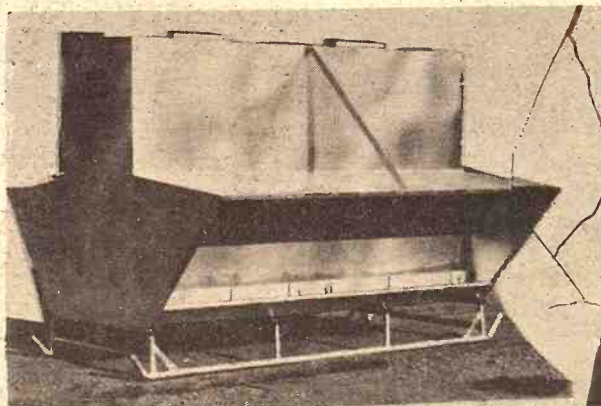
USDA policy makers deny any deals with the grain trade, a growing number of critics contend the

department's policies have enabled grain exporters to profit from the Soviet Union's unexpected wheat

needs. On the other hand, farmers who were left in the dark about the extent of the Russian purchases, sold their grain too soon to benefit fully, the critics contend.

One charge, by Tony T. Dechant, president of the National Farmers

Union, is that "large wheat exporting companies have been privy to advance information concerning the extent of government subsidy and credit arrangements on export sales of wheat." This has enabled the companies to make "windfall profits" by purchasing wheat before recent price rises and by "speculating in the wheat futures market," Dechant has stated.

The issue should be spread on the public record in the near future as a result of hearings that have been promised by Rep. Graham Purcell (D., Texas), chairman of the House Livestock and Grains Subcommittee. Rep. Purcell, who is currently in a tough battle for reelection, last week wrote to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz criticizing the failure of the department to provide farmers with

better intelligence about the extent of Russian purchases. He also attacked the timing of government Credit Corp. wheat sales for blunting the higher prices farmers ordinarily would have gotten for their wheat production.

The responses of department officials to such allegations are that they were as surprised as anyone by the magnitude of the Russian grains agreement, the department was convinced the Russians were mainly interested in corn and wheat for livestock production and thought that wheat sales to the Soviet Union this year at the level would reach 100 million bushels.

Another issue certain to be raised at the House Committee hearings is the question of Agriculture Department grain policy officials who have moved into department policy positions. One such case involves former Assistant Secretary Clarence Palmby, who did most of the foundation work for the three-

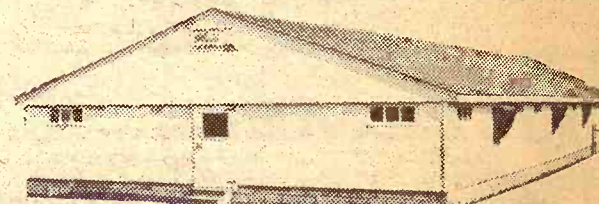

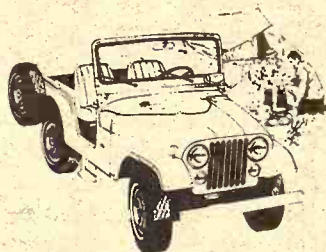
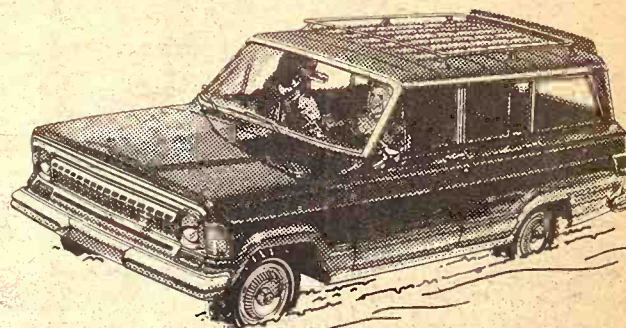

are buying most heavily and that accounts for 200 million bushels of the latest registration, were eligible for a nine-cent per bushel retroactive subsidy under the grace period provision, or a total of 47 cents per bushel. By comparison, the regular subsidy for No. 2 hard red winter wheat has moved down from 38 cents a bushel at the time the new policy was announced to 30 cents a bushel.

Applications for the augmented subsidies were expected to range between 100 million and 200 million bushels, said department officials, expressing surprise at the final total.

Presumably, the department could have reduced its subsidy sharply and quickly on hearing the first reports of the size of the Soviet purchases. Though, that move would have moved up the world price for wheat and encouraged expansion of production in Australia, Argentina, Canada and possibly other countries. Over the long run, such a development would work to the disadvantage of U.S. wheat producers, he said.

# Can Railroads Handle This Year's Harvest?

The railroads of America's heartland, and the great farmland area which produces the bulk of the nation's grain crops, expect this fall and winter to be their busiest in peacetime history.

The reasons are big crops and big exports.

The railroads believe they are better organized to handle the huge volume of freight business pending than ever before.

Despite this fact, they expect to see piles of corn and milo on the ground this fall, particularly if periods of wet weather should "bunch" the harvest. They explain that elevators just will not be able to handle the grain fast enough.

These observations were the consensus of a meeting held a few days ago of representatives of

Operating Departments of Railroads, the Association of American Railroads, the Interstate Commerce Commission, the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Kansas City Board of Trade.

The meeting was called by Jon C. Hansen, Transportation Commissioner of the Board of Trade, and was one of a series that began about 4 years ago in an effort to find means of coping with what appeared to be a chronic boxcar shortage, especially during fall harvest periods.

All groups involved with the movement of grain agreed that conditions have improved; in fact, for the last couple of years the boxcar shortages have been at a minimum.

But all also agreed that this fall presents a challenge to the industry beyond anything ever experienced before because of the huge exports to the Soviet Union which will be on

top of an already expanded export trade.

While much publicity has been given the big sales to Russia, which up to now apparently include up to 400 million bushels of wheat, up to 40 million bushels of soybeans, and perhaps 25 million bushels of corn, what is not fully realized is that only a small part of the total has been shipped. Most of the business lies in the months ahead, and the real movement will get started just about the time the corn, milo, soybean and cotton harvests are in full swing.

Figures mentioned in the meeting on what they were talking about in the way of exports included estimates of a billion bushels of wheat, 700 million bushels of corn, 425 million bushels of soybeans, and 150 million bushels of other grains. This projects an impressive total of 2,275 million bushels.

Probably 200 million bushels of wheat will move from Northwest Pacific ports, substantial quantities of corn and soybeans will be transported from the Great Lakes and Atlantic ports, or will move to the Gulf by barge. But the greatest quantity of the wheat will be moved by rail to the Gulf.

An indication of the logistics involved came from one of the world's largest elevator establishments in Oklahoma (50 million bushel capacity) whose representative at the Kansas City Board of Trade reported their facilities could not take on any more wheat until December. This elevator already has purchased from country elevators all the wheat it can receive and bin between now and December, and it has sold for export all the wheat it can load out of its bins.

In an around-the-table discussion, the railroad officials indicated their greatest hope for coping with the heavy grain movement would be in quick "turnarounds." In other words, get the grain to the Gulf, get it unloaded promptly, and im-

mediately turn the train around and head it back north. They also spoke of the efficiency of full trainloads of grain.

"We can move fantastic amounts to the Gulf ports if we can get unloaded and can turn around in 7 days," one of the railroad men commented. As an example, what he meant was that they should be able to load at Kansas City, haul grain to Houston, unload it at a Houston elevator and have the train back in Kansas City in 7 days.

The railroad officials spoke at the necessity for communication and coordination among themselves not

only to make the best use of available equipment, but to avoid moving cars into congested areas.

An obvious worry was whether ships will be on hand in the ports to move the grain as fast as it is loaded into port elevators. The narrows will be slower if there are any delays at the ports.

"When a port elevator is full and ship is not there, we should be sending cars," another railroad official commented.

"We must have a system or cannot get the job done," another interjected.

The rush to move grain already

but the railroad officials agreed that the bind would come with the harvests. Kansas City grain-haulers admitted they had not included cotton harvest in their calculations. Railroad representatives explained they needed more cars to haul cotton bales, and meant they would have to utilize a main number of these cars in the fall before they could be transferred to the grain country farther west. A big cotton crop is in prospect this year, 27 percent above last year's yield.

The railroads indicated they had

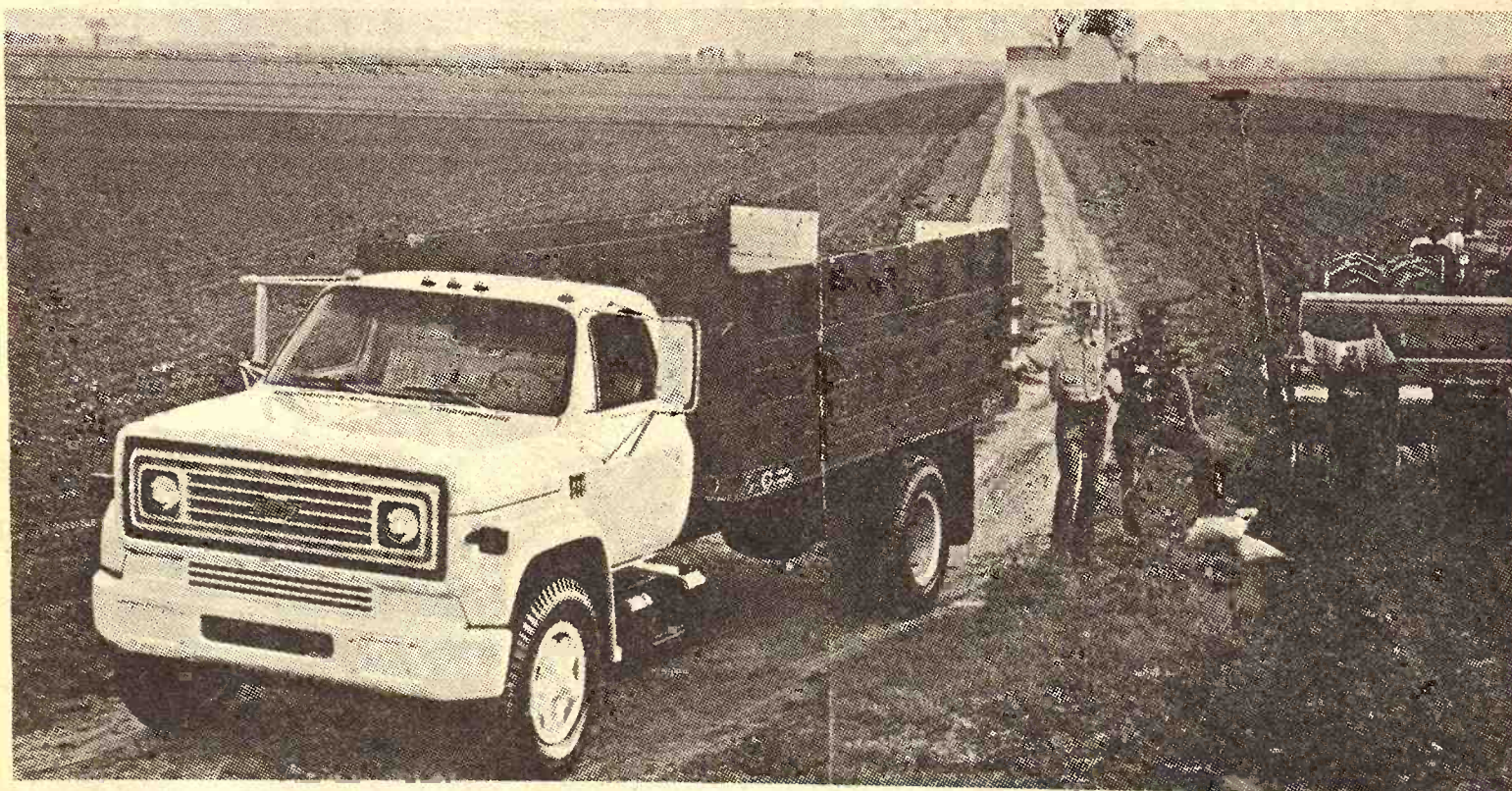

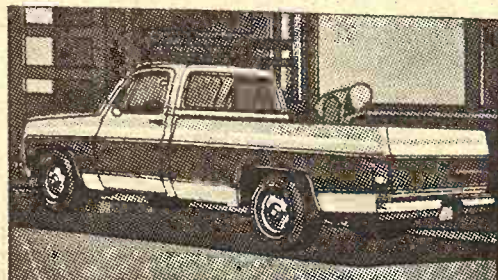

## USDA Planning Quarantine Center For Imported Stock

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is drawing up plans for a maximum security livestock quarantine center costing about \$7 million, to be constructed in the ocean just off Key West, Fla., Dr. Ernest E. Saulmon, deputy administrator of the USDA's animal and plant health inspection service, told stockmen attending the 26th annual National Association of Animal Breeders convention.

The center will be the import station for livestock being brought to the U.S. from other nations. It will enable U.S. livestockmen to bring in imported breeding stock without having to route it through the Canadian quarantine center, as has been the case for many years.

Dr. Saulmon revealed details of the plans for the center. He said it would be completed late in 1974 or early in 1975 and would accommodate 400 animals at a time. The animals will be held in quarantine five months. Two shipments of cattle a year will be permitted.

"We don't contemplate importing hogs or sheep at this time," he explained. "We want to be sure of the biological testing for them. We are trying to set up safeguards against the introduction of any foreign disease of livestock into the U.S."

The APHIS official said architectural and engineering fees for the facility will cost about \$300,000, and the rest will be used for construction. Congress will be asked to appropriate the construction funds at the session opening next January.

Two diseases which will be especially guarded against by the center are foot and mouth and rinderpest disease. Foot and mouth is prevalent in all continental countries of Europe, and this is

where most of the imported cattle will come from. Rinderpest, also common there, is caused by a virus and affects the udder and teats of cows.

Since passage of the tariff act of 1930, Congress has prohibited the import of cattle susceptible to foot and mouth and rinderpest diseases. Outbreaks of foot and mouth disease in this century in the U.S. have been eradicated by slaughter of all affected animals.

Dr. Saulmon said many American cattle breeders are eager to import cattle in order to increase the available germ plasm so they can broaden the genetic base of our livestock.

The Insurance Services Office, a rating organization representing over 170 companies operating in Kansas, will afford a 10 percent discount in collision premiums for all 1973 private passenger vehicles, Fletcher Bell, commissioner of insurance, said.

"The collision insurance discount results from the 1973 safety standard published by the Department of Transportation which requires 1973 model vehicles to withstand a barrier impact of 5 miles per hour in the front and 2½ miles per hour in the rear without causing damage to safety-related items," Bell said.

Record high sorghum grain and corn yields per harvested acre are forecast for Kansas, based on September 1 conditions, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Total 1972 Kansas production of sorghum grain was expected to be second only to last year's record

crop. Most sorghum grain fields were headed by the first of the month with harvest underway in a few early fields in southeast Kansas.

Corn production was estimated to be slightly below last year, but otherwise highest since 1932. Most corn fields were maturing slightly

later than average for recent years.

Soybean yield and production was expected to be highest on record except for the 1968 crop. A few soybean fields are nearing maturity in southern counties.

Sugar beets were expected to yield an average crop despite hail damage to some fields.

Pasture and range feed condition was mostly good to excellent over the State after widespread August rains.

Kansas sorghum grain production is forecast at 219,000,000 bushels as of September 1, 6 percent less than the 1971 production, but otherwise the second largest of record for the State.

The sorghum acreage expected to be harvested for grain was 3,650,000 acres, compared with 4,325,000 acres last year and 3,560,000 two years earlier. The indicated yield per acre was a record high 60 bushels per harvested acre, compared with 54 bushels last year and the previous record yield of 56 bushels in 1969.

Sorghum grain production prospects improved significantly during August as major sorghum producing areas received excellent rains.

Production of corn for grain is expected to total 117 million bushels, 3 percent less than last year, but 46 percent higher than two years earlier.

Moisture received in late August plus a steadily rising percentage of the State's corn grown under

irrigation is expected to push the crop to a record high yield of 92 bushels per harvested acre. This compares with the previous high of 92 bushels set last year.

Soybean production is expected total 22,320,000 bushels, second highest of record for the State. Yield of 24 bushels per acre was forecast, compared with 20.5 bushels in 1971 and the record high of 28 bushels in 1968. Moisture received during August was very beneficial to both early and late planted soybeans.

Indicated production of sugar beets at 578,000 tons, would be smallest in five years. An expected yield of 16.5 tons per harvested acre compares with a range from 14.8 to 18.1 bushels for individual years since 1954.

The September 1 pasture and range feed condition at 85 percent normal, was well above the 1967-1971 September 1 average of 76 percent.

A 1948 law allows abortions for "physical and economic" reasons. Officially recorded abortions climbed from a quarter million in 1950 to almost one million, 200 thousand a year in 1955. The official figure dropped to 732,000 in 1970. But medical sources estimate unrecorded abortions at half-a-million—or even as high as one million a year. Thus, total abortions could be near the number of births, almost precisely two million in 1971. Population experts and government officials agree that Japan's population growth would have doubled had it not been for so many artificially terminated pregnancies. Despite the almost universal use of contraceptives, several surveys indicated more than 40 percent of married women have had an abortion. About 17 percent said their first pregnancy was aborted. One university professor studied these figures, and said there is only one conclusion that can be drawn. As he put it—"The conventional contraceptives have been highly ineffective. That is why there have been so many abortions."

The secretary-general of the Japanese Family Planning Federation pointed out a by-product. He said Japan has the highest mortality rate among pregnant women in industrialized countries: 93 per 100,000 births. That compares with 29 in the United States and 51 in Sweden. Some researchers suspect a close relationship between abortions and these deaths. ## Farm Milk Prices Expected To Reach Record Highs

Farm prices for milk in 1973 are expected to reach record highs for the sixth straight year, according to a USDA economist.

The average price for milk received by farmers has increased

42 percent in the last ten years, Roger Wilkowski says. He looks for Grade A milk prices in Kansas to average about \$6.35 per hundred in 1973, up ten cents from 1972.

Kansas farm prices for ungraded milk for manufacturing are expected to average \$4.88 per hundred in 1972 and about \$5.00 per hundred next year.

Milk production is expected to increase in 1972 and again next year. Wilkowski says the same conditions that favored milk production in 1971 are still in effect: record high milk

prices, ample herd replacements, favorable feeding rations, an eased farm labor situation, and an increase in consumption.

Production in Kansas has been fluctuating at around 1.7 billion pounds for the last six years and is expected to remain near this level in 1972 and 1973.

Last year saw a substantial reduction in U.S. dairy surpluses. Total stocks on June 1 were equivalent to 6.9 billion pounds, down from 7.8 billion pounds a year earlier.

The most important item in this decline was the sale of 140 million pounds of butter to the United Kingdom. Spurred by this sale, dairy exports last year totaled 2.5 billion pounds, the largest since 1964.

## Number Of People Farming Continues Downward Trend

Farm people dropped 287,000 to an average 9.4 million during 1970-71, according to a cooperative estimate of the Census Bureau and USDA's Economic Research Service.

The drop continues a farm population decline that has averaged 4.6 per cent yearly since 1960.

During the 1960-71 period, loss of whites was less — 3.9 per cent than of blacks and other races — 9.7 per cent. Farm males outnumbered farm females by about 300,000 in 1971. Farm residents 55 years old and over rose from 18 to 24 per cent between 1960 and 1971. Of the 4 million in the 1971 farm resident labor force, 2.3 million, or 54 per cent, were employed in agriculture, a drop from 4 million — or 64 per cent in 1960.

As with labor force participation, agricultural employment was

higher among farm residents in the North and West than in the South. Employment was higher among whites than among blacks and other races, 61 and 56 per cent.

Self employment was the major class of work among farm persons. Non-farm resident engaged in agriculture increased substantially since 1960 when they represented one-fourth of the total, reflecting a trend among farm wage workers to commute to the job from non-farm residences.

The 2.3 million farm residents employed in agriculture in 1971 represented about 62 per cent of total agricultural employment, and 4.6 per cent of the total employment in the United States.

year, says a Kansas State University Extension economist.

Prices at harvest are expected to be in the \$1.05 to \$1.10 range depending on the progress of the general condition of the new crop, Roy Frederick says. Highs near \$1.10 or June.

The economist looks for corn utilization during 1972-73 to be about 5.2 billion bushels, compared with 5.1 billion bushels during the 1971-72 marketing year.

Domestic consumption should be up about 100 million bushels to the 4.3 billion bushels projected for 1971-72. With prices expected to remain relative to feed costs, an increase in beef cattle numbers is in the offing. Feeding rates per animal are up slightly.

Corn exports should be estimated 700 million bushels in 1971-72. Most of this optimism is from the expected increase in shipments to Russia. Frederick believes the Soviets will take 100 million bushels in 1972.

#### Housewife Should Get Price Break At Meat Counter

Cattlemen are angry and consumers skeptical, but government and meat industry officials say housewives soon will get a price break at the meat counter.

The Department of Agriculture said prices for cattle at market dipped in August for the first time in four months, although there has been no official indication that retail prices have followed suit.

The USDA said cattle prices were down \$1.10 per one hundred pounds on the hoof from the record high of \$34.60 in July. There also are 18 percent more cattle being fattened now than a year ago, which means a bigger supply by fall, it said.

John A. Copeland, chairman of the National Livestock and Meat Board in Chicago, said the declining prices at the market level should be passed on at supermarkets in the coming months.

But Iowa cattleman Bert Eason Jr. said here that cattlemen are "irritated, frustrated and upset" over the slump in meat prices.

He told a news conference that the cattlemen are the ones absorbing the burden of the lower wholesale costs and that consumers would now be paying 12.9 cents a pound less for beef if the lower farm prices had been passed on.

Wheat was at a six-year high, averaging \$1.51 per bushel, nearly 20 cents above July and 23 cents more than a year ago. The wheat market has been strained by the sale of one-fourth of the U.S. grain crop to the Soviet Union.

Government analysts stand by earlier predictions that grocery prices this year will be only about 4 percent higher than in 1971. That would be more than the 2.4 percent

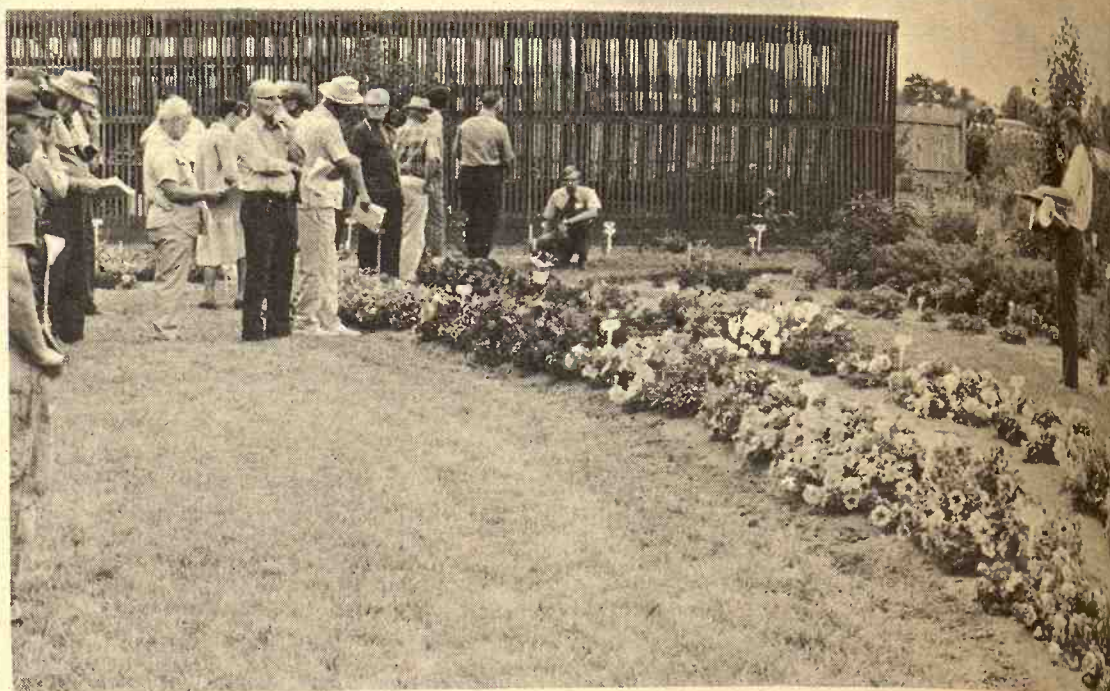
The fact that the experimental field is only a couple of years old didn't dampen the enthusiasm of the onlookers one bit.

The facility is unique in that it will 1) provide information that will aid the establishment of a new industry for south central Kansas, namely the production, processing and

distribution of horticultural products, and 2) provide information that will aid urban populations in the beautification of homes, parks, and recreational areas.

The growers saw first hand the progress of annual flower trials, hedging materials, deciduous shrubs, ornamental and shade trees, flowering trees, turf grass selections, including bermuda, zoysia, and 51 varieties and mixtures of cool season grasses; peach and apple trees, strawberries, and vegetables such as Irish potatoes, tomatoes, snap beans and sweet corn.

The first field day was sponsored jointly by the KSU Agricultural Experiment Station, Cooperative Extension Service, and Wichita Area Development, Inc.

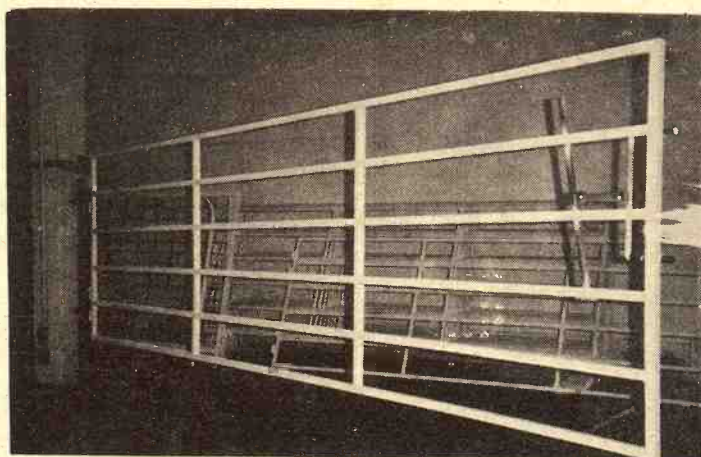


**STRAWBERRY STUDY**

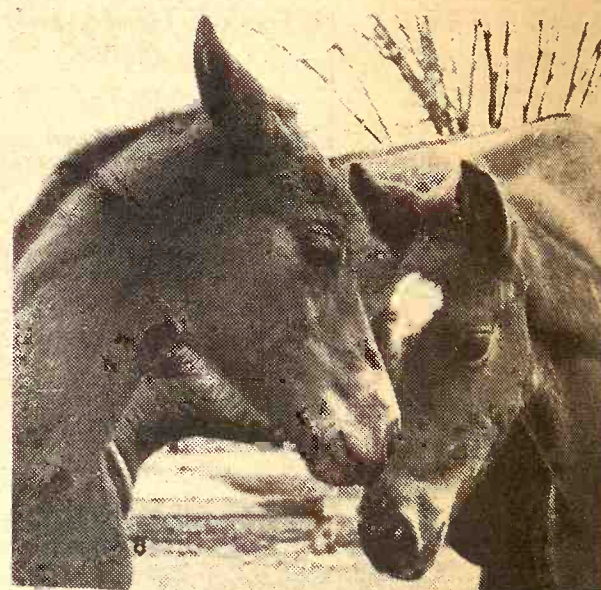

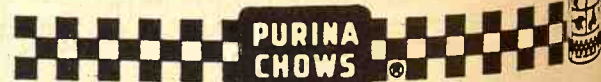

## Lower Slaughter Rates Push Lamb Market Higher

A continuation of the recent trend toward lower slaughter should help lamb prices above 1971 levels during the rest of the year, according to Richard Fenwick, Extension Economist at Kansas State University.

Lamb prices have been holding above 1971 levels all year, reflecting lower January-June slaughter, Fenwick points out.

January-June slaughter totaled 4.9 million head, compared to 5.1 million head a year earlier. Fenwick looks for slaughter to continue below 1971 levels the remainder of the year.

If expected slaughter levels materialize, lamb prices could average \$32 to \$33 during the third quarter, with a seasonal decline to the \$30 to \$31 range in the fourth quarter.

Lamb prices in 1973 will hinge on labor negotiations in the packing industry. If the talks drag on several months, Fenwick believes that supplies will back up, seriously depressing prices.

# Another Year Of High Food Prices In 1972

To no one's surprise, 1972 will go down in history as another year of higher food prices. By the end of the year, prices Americans pay for the things they eat will be up an average of 4 to 4.5 percent from 1971.

Prices for food purchased at the grocery store will average about 4 percent higher, according to Mildred L. Walker, Extension consumer marketing economist at Kansas State University, Manhattan. Cost of food eaten away from home will be up a little less than 5 percent.

Higher prices for livestock products will account for most of this year's increase, she says. Continued strong demand and a leveling of the per capita food supply also will put added pressure on food prices.

Some relief may be ahead in the coming weeks, however. The climb in retail food prices will ease somewhat from the sharp surge registered earlier this year. Some further price hikes late this summer may be partly offset by small declines this fall.

Purchases of meat account for more than a fourth of total consumer spending for food and beverages, Miss Walker says. But per capita consumption of meat will decline to 189 pounds, a drop of about 3 pounds from 1971. Americans continue to eat more beef, but not enough to offset an expected decline in pork consumption.

A dip in hog production this year will account for the decline in

consumption. Coupled with brisk demand for red meat, the lower pork slaughter has boosted hog prices to near-record levels.

Miss Walker looks for prices to drift lower during the fall, however.

The increase in beef eating continues a trend which has seen consumption soar 78 percent—or about 50 pounds per person—during the past two decades. This trend has accounted for almost all the increase in per capita meat consumption during the period.

An important factor generally associated with changes in per capita meat consumption, Miss Walker says, is per capita disposable income. She points out that disposable income in 1971 was about 2.5 times higher than in 1950. When adjusted for inflation, however, the increase is only about 50 percent.

U.S. population has increased by about a third between 1950 and 1971, and each person is eating about a third more meat. Thus, total meat consumption soared about 80 percent during the period. Domestic production increased from 22.1 billion pounds to 37.8 billion pounds in that time.

What about meat imports? Boneless fresh or frozen beef is by far the largest import item, Miss Walker says. Similar to cow beef produced in the U.S., it is used mainly for hamburger and luncheon meats. Imports of boneless beef totaled 1.4 billion pounds in 1971, down slightly from a year earlier.

Pork imports, on the other hand, were slightly higher in 1971.

Development of the broiler industry in the U.S. is often cited as an example of "the leading edge of technological development" in American agriculture. Production of chicken meat has moved from a by-product of egg production to a highly efficient industry in its own right.

Key factor in this development is the efficient conversion of feed into meat. Only about 2.5 pounds feed are needed to produce one pound broiler meat. This is less than half that required for hogs and about a fourth as much as for beef.

Most of the increased production efficiency in the broiler industry has been translated into lower prices. The current price is down about 50 percent since 1950-1951. Although prices will decline seasonally during the fall, they will remain slightly above 1971 levels.

Dairy production from January through May, 1972 was up, but was more than offset by greater dairy sales. Increases in low fat and skim milk (12 percent) and cheese (10 percent) led the sales parade. Consumption of cream, frozen products, and butter also increased, but at a lower rate. Retail dairy prices in May were about two percent higher than a year earlier.

Consumers will find vegetable prices somewhat higher this fall than a year ago, due to an estimated 4 percent reduction in summer production. Only carrots, tomatoes, and watermelons will be available in

larger supplies.

Miss Walker looks for an increase in the pack of processed vegetables in 1972. The largest gains will be in vegetables for freezing. If production is close to average, the pack of canned vegetables in 1972 will probably be slightly larger than last year.

The story is much the same for fruit—production down, prices up. Winter tree damage, spring freezes, and poor pollinating conditions have reduced crop prospects from most non-citrus fruits. Production of seven early fruit crops may be down as much as 13 percent from a year ago. Especially hard hit was the peach crop, which may be the smallest since 1955.

Raisins and dried prunes also will be in short supply. However, plenty of cherries, plums, nectarines, and apples should be available.

Miss Walker believes that eating places will continue to take advantage of changing American habits, such as greater mobility and more leisure time. Trends towards more working wives, greater consumer purchasing power, and a growing population likely will continue, resulting in an increase in food eaten away from home.

Although the average American is spending more for food, he is taking home more money, too. Disposable income may rise to 7.5 percent in 1972. So Americans are spending a smaller share of their income for food—less than 16 percent—than ever before.

#### SPRUCING UP THE PLACE

Ed Simon, Olsburg, said the fields were too wet to work last week, so he decided to do some painting. Simon's farmstead reflected the care he has given it. "I only farm 200 acres and that's a limiting factor," he said. The heavy rain recorded in the Olsburg area recently didn't seem to have a serious damaging effect. Simon had some young alfalfa and it wasn't washed out.

## Just What Does Soil "pH" Mean

Soil pH is the degree to which a soil is acid or alkaline. It's expressed as a numerical figure, a reading on a gradual scale.

The pH scale is from 0 to 14; seven is neutral—neither acid nor alkaline. A reading below 7 is acid, above 7 is alkaline.

The pH test measures the concentration of hydrogen and hydroxyl ions (ions are particles carrying a positive or negative electrical charge) in the soil. When the number of hydrogen ions equals the number of hydroxyl ions, their reactions are balanced, or neutralized. But, if there are more hydrogen ions than hydroxyl, the soil is acid, and alkaline if there are more hydroxyl ions.

The pH scale values increase 10-fold for each unit change in pH. A soil with a pH of 5.0 is 10 times more acid than a pH of 6.0 and 100 times more acid than a soil with pH of 7.

Soil pH is important because it governs the availability and concentration of soil nutrients. Most nutrients needed by plants are most available around pH 6.5.

When pH approaches 8.0, nutrients like iron and manganese rapidly diminish. Copper, zinc, and boron also tend to be less available.

At high pH, a high sodium content can cause a deficiency of calcium and phosphorus and may damage the soil structure.

When soil pH drops below 6.0, availability of phosphorus, calcium, and magnesium decreases. In highly acid soils, elements like aluminum and manganese may concentrate to the point where they'll be toxic.

It's easy to make soils less acid—apply limestone. But reducing alkalinity isn't as easy. Nitrogen fertilizers tend to increase soil acidity some. Gypsum and sulfur may be used to lower soil basicity but the costs may be too high for agricultural use.

## Bull Test Entries Due By October 1

Cattlemen who plan to place bulls in the Kansas Bull Test Station's fall test must submit entries by October 1.

Dr. Keith Zoellner, Extension beef specialist at Kansas State University, said calves born from January 1 through April 30, 1972, will be accepted for the test. Each entry must be accompanied by a \$25 fee.

The testing program is co-sponsored by the Kansas Livestock Association and Cooperative Extension Service at K-State. The test will be conducted at the Solomon Valley Feed Yard in Beloit.

Zoellner said calves must be delivered for the test on November 1 between 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. They must have a minimum weight per day of age of two pounds on arrival.

Each bull must be accompanied by an official health certificate, with one copy to be filed in the state livestock health office for bulls originating in Kansas. Bulls originating out of state must conform to interstate health regulations.

In addition to the health certificate, bulls must meet all health regulations, details of which can be acquired from Zoellner at Weber Hall, KSU, Manhattan.

Objectives of the 140-day test are to compare gainability and conformation of bulls and their sires, to encourage herd improvement, and to promote the use of records as a tool in beef production.

To be eligible for the sale, at the end of the test a bull must be in the approximate upper two-thirds of an index based on average daily gain ratio and weight per day of age ratio of his breed group.

**Soybean Variety Tests**  
KSU researchers, through variety trials conducted at various locations in Kansas, are determining the most

suitable soybean variety for particular sections of the state.

They point out that soybean varieties are divided into 10 maturity groups which form horizontal bands across the U.S. These bands correspond with the day length change. Varieties most adapted to Kansas production are found in Groups III and IV.

In general, Group III varieties (Calland and Williams) perform well in northern and east central Kansas and may be used in a double-cropping system, allowing wheat to be planted in the fall. Group IV

varieties (Clark 63, Cutler 71, Columbus) are full season varieties that may be grown in Kansas. Varieties have produced the highest yields when planted after wheat in most cases, will not allow wheat planting.

Varieties from Groups I (Beech 71, Corsoy) are too early for Kansas as far as double-cropping is concerned, although they may be grown in the extreme northern section.

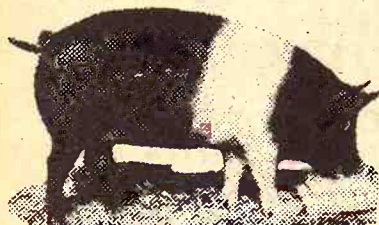

# 1971 Net Farm Income Highest Recorded Since 1949

Kansas farmers' 1971 realized net farm income was 9 percent above the previous year and the highest in records dating back to 1949, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The increase in realized net farm income was the result of increased cash receipts from products marketed which more than offset a sharp rise in farm production expenses.

Cash receipts from livestock and livestock products marketed in 1971 were 18 percent above the previous year and cash receipts from crops were 6 percent above 1970.

The 1971 Kansas realized net income per farm was a record \$7,797, moderately above the \$7,063 in 1970 and far above the ten-year average of \$4,455.

Realized net farm income of Kansas farmers was \$671 million,

compared with \$615 million in 1970 and the 1960-69 average of \$437 million.

The 1971 realized net farm income was 26 percent of the gross farm income, compared with 27 percent for both 1970 and the ten-year average.

Total cash receipts from farming, including Government payments, were a record \$2,474 million in 1971, 12 percent above 1970. Receipts from livestock and livestock products at \$1,492 million and crops at \$764 million were both the highest on record.

Cattle and calves with 82 percent of the total livestock and livestock products income were the leading livestock source, followed by hogs, dairy products, and eggs.

Wheat was the most important

crop item accounting for 53 percent of the receipts from all crops.

Following in order of importance were sorghum grain, corn, soybeans, hay, and sugar beets. Government payments to Kansas farmers in 1971 were \$218 million, \$10 million less than the \$228 million in 1970.

Production expenses on Kansas farms continued to climb rapidly reaching a new high of \$1,889 million in 1971. Expenses were 13 percent above a year earlier and 61 percent

higher than the ten-year average.

Current operating expenses for seed, livestock, feed, repairs, hired labor, miscellaneous items made up 13 percent of the total expenses.

Depreciation and consumption of capital goods accounted for 10 percent of the farm production expenses, while the other 13 percent of total farm production expenses consisted of taxes, interest on mortgage debt, and rent to landlords.

## Changes Noted in Seed Treatment

The Environmental Protection Agency has stopped the manufacture of a pair of widely-used fungicides for treating wheat seed against fungusborne diseases.

Ceresan and Panegen-two mercurial fungicides that have been widely used—are no longer being manufactured. If they are on hand, says the EPA, they can be used, but farmers without a nearby supply of either, will have to use something different.

Several substitute fungicides—one

called "Vitavax" if effective in controlling the loose smut of wheat and the brown loose smut of barley. It is a systemic fungicide that is placed on the seed and then moves up into the young plants. This kills smut infection, increases stands, and prevents rust from getting established in the plants for six

weeks. Vitavax costs about 35 cents for each bushel treated. Lesser fungicides cost only about 12 cents for each bushel treated. The added cost may be most worthwhile to seed growers to prevent loose smut, along with the other benefits.

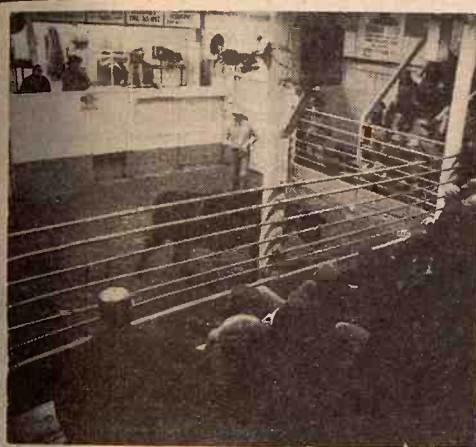

Many packing houses across the country dump the waste directly into sewage systems, or use their own

But Bordenave uses it for a nice little garden behind the packing plant, in what has to be one of the world's biggest compost piles.

Bordenave says that within 48 hours the composting mixture will break the plant's waste down to a rich soil-like mixture that seems to have amazing fertilizing power.

His experimental garden would be the envy of any home gardener who started his labors in May. Bordenave didn't start planting until July, but his garden features squash two feet long and chili plants bearing so many pods they break down the bush that bears them.

Bordenave says he knows how to prepare the mixture, but adds, "I don't have the slightest idea why it works."
