





More Farmers Sure To Use 'Set-Aside'

Agriculture Department officials expect a larger participation in 1971 feed grains program under the new "set-aside" feature than in 1970 or 1969 when stricter controls were in force.

Carroll G. Brunthaver, associate administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation

Service, says 72 per cent of the nation's corn and sorghum base acreage is expected to be signed up in the new program this spring.

Brunthaver commented during the annual National Agricultural Outlook Conference.

Last year farmers signed up 65 per cent of their corn-sorghum acreage,

and in 1969 agreed to 67 per cent. Under the set-aside feature, a farmer can agree to take from production crop land equal to 20 per cent of his feed grains base acreage and then plant as much as he wants on his remaining land.

The same principle is involved for wheat and cotton. All told, Brunthaver said, farmers may agree to idle 35.1 million acres under 1971 programs for feed grains, wheat and cotton, compared with 56.9 million taken from production under the old law last year.

The expected acreage to be diverted this year by individual crop, compared with the acres idled in 1970, included:

Corn 12.8 million acres idled this year and 26.1 million in 1970; grain sorghum 3.8 million and 7.4 million; barley not in the set-aside program this year but 39.9 million acres taken from output in 1970; wheat 13 million and 15.7 million; and cotton 2.1 million and none required for diversion last year.

Brunthaver said the new program's flexibility which he says allows farmers more freedom to adjust their operations also will enable crops to be shifted among different geographic areas.

Wheat farmers have the choice of substituting feed grains and still retain credit for their acreage history, and feed grains farmers can plant wheat.

Also, Brunthaver said, in designated severe corn blight areas

farmers can protect their feed grains history if they cannot get blight-resistant seed.

"The flexibility of the set-aside program can be appreciated this year as farmers are faced with the corn blight problem," Brunthaver said.

"Farmers outside the affected (blight) area can expand corn production without losing program benefits, and producers in the affected area can plant alternative crops without losing payments."

Big California Lake Reverting To Farm Land Again

California's largest lake is disappearing again.

Tulare lake, almost eliminated by land-reclaiming projects, spread to nearly its original size two years ago after record floods strained dams and flood-control projects.

By September, experts recently said, it will be nearly dry again and farming operations will have resumed in much of the fertile bottom land.

As recently as two years ago the lake covered about 88,000 acres to depths of up to 20 feet. It now is spread over less than 30,000 acres and is less than 6 feet deep in most places.

Exceptionally heavy snowfall and record runoffs from the Sierra watershed in 1969 made Tulare lake the largest body of water entirely within the state's borders.

At its peak it contained nearly 2-million-acre-feet of water. When it is "dry" there will be less than

175,000 feet remaining.

Stanley Barnes, chief engineer for the Boswell corporation's extensive farming operations, says most of the land will be dry enough to farm this year. Cotton and grain thrive in the area covered by the lake basin.

"If we don't have any unusual or significant storms between now and the end of the current season," Barnes said, "most of the lake will be planted for the first time in two years."

Once a common sight in the Central valley the lake became only a memory from the mid-1950's to early 1969.

Wheat Exports Up 48 Percent, Says USDA


Wheat exports were up 48 per cent in 1970, according to the Department of Agriculture.

Total farm products exports reached a record of \$7.2 billion in 1970, reflecting an overall 20 per cent gain over 1969, the USDA reported. The USDA's economic research service indicated that the total figure was comprised of \$2.6 billion in grain, \$1.9 billion in soybeans and oil seed products, \$817 million in animal and animal products, \$488 million in tobacco, \$378 million in cotton and \$609 million in fruits, vegetables and nuts.

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
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Experiment Station List Top Research Of 1970

Research of the Seventies by the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station is geared to benefit consumers in ways never dreamed of a decade ago.

That became apparent when Dr. Keith Huston, assistant director of the experiment station with headquarters at Kansas State University, Manhattan, released a list of the station's research highlights for 1970.

Solution of problems of the food production, processing, and allied industries is continuing to receive a large share of the experiment station's attention as the Seventies

get underway, Huston emphasized, since those industries are the backbone of the Kansas economy. The research administrator added, however, that other research which also has direct economic and social impacts on all Kansans — whether they live in the suburbs, cities, or on farms — is being increasingly stressed.

Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station funds last year financed, at least partially, some 550 studies by scientists who represented most colleges and departments of the university and by research specialists at five branch ex-

periment stations and 12 experimental fields located throughout the state.

He listed some projects having agricultural experiment station support in 1970 which hopefully should benefit all Kansans and, in many instances, people throughout the world.

A formula for an additive which gives bread and other baked products high nutritional value was developed by two scientists in the Department of Grain Science and Industry. The additive makes it possible to add high protein ingredients such as soyflour to breadstuffs without sacrificing other qualities of the breadstuffs.

KSU agricultural engineers developed a system of recycling water used to transport wastes from feedlots that has stopped complaints of urban neighbors about odors and flies. It also has reduced the number of trips necessary for the stockman to dispose of wastes. More important in the long run, perhaps, is the discovery that soil salinity might sterilize fields unless the amount of salt in waste is controlled.

Research with laying hens may help prevent heart attacks and strokes, cardiovascular diseases thought to be associated with high cholesterol levels in the human body. This study was done by a physiologist in the College of Veterinary Medicine, assisted by the foods and nutrition department and the poultry department. The KSU research hens, when put on a special diet, produced eggs containing up to 35 per cent less cholesterol than eggs laid by the same hens while on a standard feeding ration. Secret for the special diet was the use of sitosterol in the hens' feed. Sitosterol

is a fatty substance found in soybeans and other plants.

A new disinfecting process that purifies water without affecting its taste was developed by a chemist and microbiologist. The process may be useful for everything from space flights to industrial use and family camping.

A computer systems model, developed by Kansas and U.S. Department of Agriculture economists and now being processed for publication by the agricultural experiment station, should make the grain marketing industry several million dollars a year more efficient.

Consumers now have additional assurance of pure foods as a result of the work of KSU physicists. Using the university's tandem Van de Graaff accelerator, the scientists easily locate as little as one part per million of methyl bromide, mercury, or lead in food materials they sample.

Studies of acute pancreatitis, a painful disease difficult to diagnose in humans and dogs, have been successfully conducted by a veterinarian. These studies may help speed the cure of the disease.

KSU remained in the forefront of universities combating insects without poisonous chemicals last year by releasing a new insect-resistant variety. The experiment station also released a germ plasm of a grain sorghum that resists a new biotype of greenbugs that has been attacking the state's number two crop.

Agricultural Experiment Station scientists also gave a boost to the state's developing pork industry. They used bacteria to demonstrate that it is possible to raise swine in confinement without odors. Needed is enough air, supplied by electrically-operated paddles in waste

pits, to permit the population of bacteria to remain alive and multiply.

A min-watermelon named Peter Sweet and weighing an average eight pounds was developed by KSU horticulturist. It has particular advantages for members of households. Also introduced by KSU was a mid-watermelon weighing about 15 pounds. The melons are offshoots of the Crimson Sweet (25-pound melon) developed by KSU in 1963 and now one of the top three watermelon varieties in the United States.

A KSU economist, aided by an experiment station, received national recognition in 1970 for directing tax research studies related to Kansas individuals and communities in all 105 counties.

Studies of Kansas census data by KSU sociologist resulted in recommendations for changes in the accuracy of Kansas census data.

A technique to identify and quantify sulfur in grain meal without destroying the material was developed by KSU nuclear engineers last year.

A KSU plant breeder discovered that greatly increased soybean yields are possible by irrigating soybeans according to their stage of development. Soybeans irrigated as soon as they began to emerge, provided much shade, and yielded less than those irrigated during the two-day delay in soybean maturation. The practice can reduce yields 13 bushels an acre.

A dairy scientist, recognizing Americans' habit of eating snacks between meals (many of them low in protein), developed snacks of flavors which use protein-rich milk as a base.

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

Winner is Mrs. Blanche Harris, R 1, Idana. "I would like to share my bread recipe with you. My grandsons like it very much."

ORANGE-APPLE NUT BREAD

- 1 large orange
- 1/2 cup raisins
- 2 cups canned applesauce
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup chopped nuts
- 3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine

Squeeze juice from orange. Use medium blade — put rind and raisins through food chopper. Add orange juice, rind, and raisins to applesauce. Sift together flour, baking powder, baking soda, sugar and salt. Add applesauce mixture and nuts. Mix thoroughly. Beat eggs, add to mixture with melted butter or margarine; stir until thoroughly blended. Pour into greased loaf pan, 9x5x3-inch. Bake in 350-degree oven 70-80 minutes. Remove from pan. Cool on wire rack. The bread will slice better if allowed to stand for 12 hours.

- 1 cup fresh chopped spinach
 - 1/2 cup chopped lettuce
 - 2 strips crisp bacon, chopped
 - 2 hard-cooked eggs, sliced
 - one-third cup mayonnaise
- Mix spinach and lettuce well and place in serving dishes. Mix mayonnaise and chopped bacon.

Cover spinach mixture with this. Top with sliced, hard-cooked eggs. If mayonnaise mixture is too thick, thin with cream.

- 4 cups flour plus 2 tablespoons

Cream sugar and oleo. Add salad oil and beaten eggs, flavoring, soda, cream tartar and flour. Mix well; chill. Roll into balls and flatten with glass or back side of meat chopper for a design. Bake at 350 degrees.

 - 1 can condensed onion soup
- Mix ingredients except soup and shape into balls. Brown both sides in hot fat. Drain. Pour onion soup over the balls and simmer 30 minutes.

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 cup brown sugar
- 1 cup white sugar
- 1 1/4 cups boiling water
- 1 stick butter
- 1 cup oatmeal
- 2 eggs

Sift together flour, salt, cinnamon and soda. In mixing bowl pour boiling water over oatmeal and butter. Let stand five minutes; beat in sugars and eggs. Add sifted dry

ingredients and mix well. Bake in greased and floured 13x9x2-inch pan in 350 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes. Cool slightly and add topping.

TOPPING

- In saucepan mix:
- 3/4 stick butter
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1/2 cup sugar

Boil two minutes then add:
1 cup chopped pecans
1 cup coconut

- 1 cup butter

- 2 cups flour, sifted

Cream butter and sugar well. Blend in remaining ingredients except powdered sugar. Chill dough 30 minutes. With teaspoon form small round balls. Place on baking sheet. Bake at 300 degrees, 20-25 minutes. Lift balls from sheet and roll in powdered sugar until heavily coated. If warm, the powdered sugar will become creamy. Makes four dozen.


PARMESAN BISCUITS

Bake in preheated 350-degree oven until lightly browned, 10-12 minutes. With small spatula, loosen biscuits and remove. Serve at once. Makes dozen small biscuits.

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




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Pork For Christmas

Serve Pork For Change Of Pace On Sundays

Sunday dinner means having a roast in many homes. If you are looking for a change from the usual beef, try serving a pork loin roasted to succulent tenderness.

Have your meat man saw across the rib bones at the base of the backbone, thus separating ribs from backbone of a four to six-pound pork loin roast.

Place roast fat side up on a rack in roasting pan. Insert a meat ther-

mometer so the bulb is centered in the thickest part, being careful that it rests neither in fat nor on bone. Do not add water or cover.

Roast in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until the meat thermometer registers 160 degrees. Allow 30 to 40 minutes per pound for roasting.

After cooking, remove backbone from ribs to facilitate carving. Place roast on platter with rib side toward

the carver. With fork firmly inserted in roast, cut slices on each side of the rib bones. (Every other slice will contain a bone.)

You can garnish the pork with seasonings or glazes according to your preference. Either a currant glaze or orange glaze is good with pork. If you choose either of these instead of using any other seasoning, during the last hour of roasting brush meat every 15 minutes with the glaze. Serve any remaining glaze as a sauce.

Currant Glaze: Heat 1 jar (10 ounces) currant jelly, ¼ cup prepared mustard and ½ teaspoon onion salt over low heat, stirring constantly, until jelly is melted. Boil and stir three minutes. Makes about ¾ cup.

Orange Glaze: Heat 1 cup (6 ounces) frozen orange juice concentrate, ½ cup honey and ½ teaspoon ginger to boiling, stirring

constantly. Boil and stir three minutes. Yield: 1¼ cups.

If you prefer seasoning, rub the meat with your choice of these seasonings (enough for a 4-pound roast).

Herb Salt: Cut 1 clove garlic in half. Rub meat with garlic. Mix 1 teaspoon sage, 1 teaspoon marjoram leaves and 1 teaspoon salt.

Mustard Rub: Mix 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, ½ teaspoon salt, ½ teaspoon onion powder and ¼ teaspoon pepper.

Makeup Tips For Teen-agers

When selecting a foundation, choose one shade lighter if you're in

doubt. The natural skin tone will add depth. Since facial hairs grow down, lightly blend base downward with gentle pressure. Press your facial powder rather than wiping it and it will last longer.

Eye-brow pencil should be applied with light hairlike strokes in an upward motion.

Yogurt

When you buy milk in the form of yogurt, you can choose from two basic types or styles — "Sundae" or Swiss. Yogurt is one of the large family of cultured dairy products. In producing yogurt, milk is inoculated with two cultures, one produces the yogurt flavor, the other regulates the yogurt flavor. The milk is generally low in butterfat and high in solids, not fat.

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
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

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Thoughts Of Gardeners Turn To Lawns

When the weather warms the first thoughts of most gardeners are of their lawns. How did they survive the winter? What must be done to bring them to perfection? And, if there is no lawn yet, how early may one be planted?

Lawns which were fertilized last fall and cut until grass growth ceased should need little maintenance this spring. Dead grass should, of course, be removed.

There may possibly be a few bare spots which are easily mended by raking the soil, planting the same kind of lawn seed used previously, firming it to the soil and then covering the area with transparent plastic. This holds moisture in the soil and increases daytime temperature underneath.

Gray spots in the lawn probably are signs of a disease called snow mold. This is caused by too early cessation of mowing in fall. Nothing will help now but raking out dead grass and reseeding. Prevention starts next fall with late mowing so tall grass does not encourage fungus growth. Treatment with a broad spectrum turf fungicide also may be necessary.

If the lawn was not fertilized last fall, that's the first chore this spring after raking out dead grass. Kinds and amounts of fertilizer to use depend on the kind of grass you have. Remember that there are now fertilizers which release plant nutrients slowly and do not burn grass.

After fertilization comes weed killing. Crabgrass preventives may be applied until apple blossoms bloom. 2, 4-D products should be used only after weeds are growing lustily and then only with great care to guard other nearby broad-leaved plants.

New lawns are really best planed in autumn but may be achieved in spring by waiting until soil has dried, then tilling and leveling a seedbed of fine soil, fertilizing and then planting good quality, virtually weed-free lawn seed. Water is

usually the limiting factor as the area must be kept moist until seeds sprout and watered regularly throughout the summer.

Mulching the planted area with straw holds seeds in place and keeps the soil cool until seeds sprout.

Not How Much But How Often

In a program designed to prevent tooth decay, "the total amount of sugar eaten is less important that

the frequency of eating," according to the National Institute of Dental Research. The Institute found that between meal snacks of foods containing sugar, but recommended as a compromise that sweets be eaten once a day, preferably as a dessert, after a well-balanced meal.




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
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
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No End To Bigger, Costlier Machinery

Agriculture Department economists say the trend toward larger, more expensive farm machinery will continue as the hired labor market declines and more producers seek highly specialized mechanical substitutes.

But bigger, more powerful tractors and their implements are major reasons why farm expenses are rising faster than gross incomes. The cost-price squeeze between expenses and revenues again this year is expected to shrink net farm

income. Last year net farm income dropped to \$15.8 billion from \$16.2 billion in 1969. A new report on farm costs shows that farm prices rose six per cent last year.

"For 1971," the report said, "further increases appear certain. Results of wage negotiations in the farm equipment industry and in the steel industry will exert pressure on these prices."

Last year the wholesale price index for farm machinery was 13 per cent more than in 1967, the year used for comparison. During the same period, the report said, total gross farm income increased about 14 per cent.

All farm production expenses last year totaled \$40.4 billion. Of that, nearly \$2.5 billion was spent to buy, repair and operate machinery. Ten years earlier the outlay was less than \$1.8 billion.

One of the methods used by economists to compare such costs is the relationship between costs.

Since 1960, the report said, the amount of man-hours of labor used for farm work dropped more than 30 per cent. At the same time the inventory value of farm machinery

rose 50 per cent.

Put another way, the report said, the investment in machinery in 1960 was \$1.95 per hour of farm labor used to produce the nation's food and fiber. Last year it was \$4.34 per man-hour.

Still another measure is the number of tractor horsepower per farm worker. Last year the average was 45 horsepower per worker, about double that of 1960. The experts say the average will be about 60 horsepower by 1975, indicating a continued move toward more powerful machines and less human muscle.

"Continuing increases in farm size, combined with further mechanization in fruits, vegetables and tobacco, will contribute to a strong demand for larger, more specialized equipment," the report said.

Also, the report said, changes in farming practices such as reduced tillage will require new types of machinery. Safety and antipollution regulations also will increase the demand for cabs, roll bars, and specialized equipment for waste disposal.

Court Narrows Miranda Case

Prosecutors may use the confession of a defendant who testified in a trial, the Supreme Court ruled today.

The decision, announced by Justice Warren E. Burger, significantly narrowed the Court's controversial Miranda decision and some of the protection it gave defendants against incrimination.

At issue was trial testimony made to police by suspects who had not been advised of their constitutional rights and remain silent.

Burger's five-man majority reached the conclusion that the ruling did not bar prosecutors from using such statements to impeach the credibility of a defendant.

That is, Burger said, when a defendant takes the stand and tells an account that conflicts with what he told police, the prosecution can bring out the otherwise inadmissible statement during examination.

The chief justice said this helps juries assess the credibility of defendants and should not be taken up "because of the special possibility that impermissible conduct will be encouraged thereby."

The four-man minority, led by Justice William J. Brennan, hotly disputed this interpretation of the Miranda decision.

One Half Of Car Market Away From Big Ones

More than half of America's new car buyers are taking smaller cars, at least smaller than the full size models that dominated the highways until recently.

In January for example, the new American minicars, the small

imports, the older compacts and intermediate-size models accounted for 54 per cent of the new cars delivered.

And, while the automobile manufacturers just a few years ago were adding high-horse power engines and stripe-covered models to their spring line-up, now they are scrambling to come up with more low-priced cars.

Detroit motor car executives are divided on which way the market will go in the future. Some believe

the big cars themselves will get smaller; others do not. Some think the small foreign import car sales will slacken because of the American minicars and an improving American economy. Others believe the foreign competition is tougher than Detroit expected and will not be driven back easily.

The Ford Motor company has added a three-door version of its Pinto minicar. The third door is at the rear making the entire rear of the car available for trunk space. This model, called the Run-About, will carry a list price of \$2,062, compared to \$1,919 for the lower-priced Pinto.

The General Motors corporation's Pontiac division will have a new compact model called the Ventura II, a version of the compact Chevrolet Nova, on sale March 11.

From Germany will come a new four-door Opel, sold by G.M.'s Buick dealers, and from Japan, the Togo Kogyo company, the third largest automobile manufacturer in that country, said it would enter the American market in May in California with its small Mazda cars.

Automobile manufacturers retreated from the high-horsepower models, or "superbacks," because insurance rates have been raised and younger buyers cannot afford these models. Some high-horsepower models are still being made but Detroit's emphasis has switched. Ford and Chrysler even stopped most of their support for automobile racing to save money and put their engineers to work on pollution-related problems.


Bread Cost Still Prime Example Of Farmer Woe

Twenty years ago a one-pound loaf of bread cost consumers 13.5 cents at supermarkets. Farmers received 3.3 cents for wheat and other ingredients used in the loaf. Last year, says the Agriculture department, the same type of bread sold for 24.2 cents at retail stores. Farmers received 3.4 cents for products used to make it, only one-tenth of one cent more than in 1947-49.

The analysis of bread costs was included in a marketing and transportation situation report. Bread cost studies are considered classic examples of reasons farmers do not share fully in food price increases passed on to consumers.

Nationally, for all types of food, farmers in 1970 received 39 cents from each dollar consumers spent at retail markets. This, too, has been fairly consistent. In 1969 farmers got 41 cents of the consumer food dollar, but on the whole during the 1960's the

A Way To Avoid 5c A Lb. For Cull Hens

What to do with an egg-laying hen when it no longer can lay eggs has been a major problem of egg producers for years. Dr. F. E. Cunningham, associate professor of poultry products at Kansas State University, Manhattan, is working on a solution.

"A hen lays for about 12 months, after which it becomes what is known as a 'spent hen.' Egg producers are now forced to sell these spent hens to outlets such as soup companies for use in soup stock at ridiculously low prices — 4 or 5

cents a pound," Cunningham explained.

Cunningham's solution to this problem would entail the use of a mechanical de-boner, a machine used for several years in the production of fish products, to remove the bones from the chicken. The resulting emulsified product could be used in several kinds of meat products, he theorizes.

To test the workability of his proposal, Cunningham and Dr. David J. Mugler, assistant professor of poultry science and assistant to the dean of the College of Agriculture, took 100 spent hens and processed them under commercial conditions. They then worked with Dr. Glen Froning, professor of poultry science at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, to use the de-

boner the university has leased and run the chicken through.

"It took 15 minutes to run the 100 birds through the de-boner, separating the meat from the bone. So you can see how useful the machine is, and how indispensable it has been to the fish industry," Cunningham commented.

Cunningham and Mugler are currently testing the emulsified chicken in a study of composition, stability, and utilization of the product. "We've been cooking up a storm here, making chicken loaves and breaded chicken sticks, much like fish sticks, and adding seasoning to make salami, bologna, sausage, frankfurters, and anything else we can think of," Cunningham explained.

Mugler and Cunningham have run into a few problems in analyzing the qualities of the 150 pounds of emulsified meat. "The bacterial quality is good, and the emulsifying possibilities are good. One problem is the stability; the meat oxidizes quickly and becomes rancid. We're looking for antioxidants to correct this," he said.

If the results of the analysis and testing show that such processing is feasible, Cunningham hopes to make the ideas available to egg producers and show them how they can get better use from their spent hens. "A producers cooperative, if interested, could lease one of these de-boners at a reasonable price. All poultry producers could then realize a profit from their spent hens," he said. "But we're just testing the product; after that our job ends. We will probably co-author a paper showing the results of this project. Hopefully we can get someone interested enough to take over from there."

STATE OF KANSAS

Notice of Submission of Proposed Constitutional Amendment at April 6, 1971 General Election

Senate Concurrent Resolution 12, adopted by the Legislature of the State of Kansas on February 8, 1971, reads as follows:

"Section 1. A special election is hereby called, to be held on April 6, 1971, pursuant to section 1 of article 14 of the constitution of the state of Kansas, for the purpose of submitting to the electors the proposition to amend the constitution contained in Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11."

Pursuant to Section 1 of Article 14 of the Constitution of the State of Kansas and in compliance with Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 11 adopted by the Legislature on February 8, 1971, a proposition to amend the Kansas Constitution reads as follows:

"Section 1. Every citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who shall have resided in Kansas six months next preceding any election and in the precinct in which he or she seeks to vote at least thirty days next preceding such election shall be deemed a qualified elector. A citizen of the United States who has attained the age of eighteen years and who shall have resided in Kansas in the precinct in which he or she seeks to vote at least thirty days next preceding any general election, may vote for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States. A citizen of the United States, who is otherwise qualified to vote in Kansas for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States may vote for such offices either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of this state if his or her removal from this state occurs during the thirty days next preceding such election. A person who is otherwise a qualified elector may vote in the precinct of his former residence either in person or by absentee ballot notwithstanding the fact that such person may have become a nonresident of such precinct during the thirty days next preceding such election if his new residence is in another precinct in the state of Kansas."

Sec. 2. The title appearing on the ballot by which this amendment is submitted to the electors of this state shall be the following:

"Shall the constitution be amended to permit persons eighteen (18) years of age and upwards to vote in all elections, to reduce the residency requirement from forty-five to thirty days for electors to vote only for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States, to permit electors who have moved from the state during the thirty days next preceding the election to vote only for presidential electors and candidates for the offices of president and vice-president of the United States, and to permit persons who move within the state within thirty (30) days of an election to vote?"





The national organization will have 60,000 members by April, compared with only 14,000 just four years ago, Knau said. He called NPPC "the largest agricultural commodity organization in the world."





Wiens, who farms in Thomas County in northwest Kansas, raised 189.12 bushels to the acre on a 26.2 acre field. Abbott obtained a yield of 131.25 bushels to the acre on a 25.21 acre field.

Second place in the irrigated contest went to Jack and Wayne Reynolds, Hugoton, in the southwest corner of the state, with a yield of 181.43 bushels to the acre in a 25.07 acre field.

Second place for non-irrigated corn went to Harold Rush, Troy, in

Doniphan County, on a 75 acre plot yielding 121.49 bushels to the acre.

Third places went to Fred Brewer, Leoti, Kan., in Wichita County on an irrigated 26.76 acre plot yielding 180.77 bushels to the acre, and to Harold Boehl, Euroda, Kan., in Douglas County, with a yield of 55.80 bushels to the acre on a 25-acre non-irrigated field.

First place in the nation went to Joe Maria, Walnut Grove, Calif., with a yield of 249.74 bushels to the acre — an all-time contest record high yield, officials said.

KSU Sheep Day To Honor V. E. McAdams

New practical approaches to increase lamb crops will be the theme of Sheep Day at Kansas State

University, April 5.

Sheep Day will be dedicated to V.E. McAdams, recently retired Extension sheep specialist at KSU and a long time supporter of the Kansas sheep industry, reports Dr. George Ahlschwede, Extension livestock specialist.

"We'll have research reports and live demonstrations to show Kansas

sheepmen how to get more lambs per ewe per year," Ahlschwede says.

Registration begins at 9:30 a.m. and the official program at 10:00, with a welcome by Dr. Don Good, head of the KSU Animal Science and Industry Department.

Bob Lukens, president of the Kansas Sheep and Wool Growers Association from Beloit, will give a report on association activities and Joe Greene, chairman of the quality sheep committee from Beverly, will report on his committee activities. Mrs. John Graver, Rush Center, will give a report on the Ladies Auxiliary activities.

After a lunch of barbecued lamb and dedication ceremonies honoring McAdams, Dr. Guy Kiracofe will demonstrate the effects of hormone treatments on ewes.

Larry Arehart, sheep researcher at the Colby Branch Experiment Station, will describe how to efficiently raise extra lambs and display equipment he uses to do the job.

The KSU staff will also have a panel discussion about managing ewes for higher lamb crops.

A separate ladies program will begin at 10:40 a.m.

The resolution passed by a 9-1 vote with two members abstaining.



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

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
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Sheep Expert McAdams Retires

V.E. McAdams has been associated with crops and livestock for most of his 66 years. But the fact he has retired from the Cooperative Extension Service at Kansas State University doesn't mean he has severed ties with agriculture.

Although McAdams — a lot of friends call him Mac — will continue to reside in Manhattan, he operates the Cloud county farm near Clyde on which he was born. Now he'll have more time to put into practice some of the advice he's been giving others as an Extension specialist.

McAdams, whose retirement began Feb. 1, is known either personally or by reputation by hundreds of Kansas farm families. Following graduation from Kansas State in 1928, (a masters degree was earned in 1958) Mac became vocational agriculture instructor at Medicine Lodge high school.

Then in 1934 he began what was to be a 37-year association with Extension when he became Barber county's first agricultural agent.

"In those days we didn't have a training program for new county agents," Mac recalls. "I was

inexperienced by somehow gained the confidence of the people. I really had a wide open field. People were not familiar with Extension programs and I had to organize everything...4-H clubs and even women's units."

McAdams says proudly that some of the Barber county Extension groups he organized in the 1930s are still active.

In 1939 Mac became county agent in Barton county and it was on to Dickinson county in a similar capacity in 1947. Following a five-year stint there — in 1952, he became an Extension livestock specialist, headquartered in Manhattan.

Concentrating on cattle, sheep and swine, the thrust of Mac's educational efforts was centered in northwest Kansas. Then in 1967 he became a sheep specialist, the position he held upon retirement.

McAdams has been active with the Kansas Quality Ewe Procurement Committee, which brings yearling ewes into Kansas each spring. He served as secretary of both the Kansas Sheep and Wool Growers Association and the Kansas

Purebred Sheep Growers Association.

McAdams' latest major accomplishments concerned the sheep industry in Kansas. First, he was instrumental in getting Kansas producers to approve a voluntary wool checkoff program. Second, he conducted an extensive survey of the sheep industry to determine if Kansas could support a lamb marketing and slaughter facility.

Money raised under the checkoff program will be used to promote the Kansas sheep industry.

In looking back over his career, Mac says he enjoyed the opportunities to work with people and to play a small role in helping to develop Kansas agriculture.

"Agriculture and rural living have come a long way in the last 40 years," says Mac fondly. "Terracing, rural electrification, soil testing, artificial insemination, new wheat and sorghum varieties

and hybrid corn...these are just some of the advances that have made farming more profitable and enjoyable."

Mac and his wife Louise, whom he married while working at Medicine Lodge, are "K-State people all the way." Their two daughters and even their sons-in-law are KSU graduates.

Mrs. Shirley Postier and her family live in Robinson, and Mrs. Janet Medley and her family live in Mission. Mr. and Mrs. McAdams have four grandchildren.

"Louise is not much of a gadabout, so we'll just stay around Manhattan, go to the farm once in a while and visit the grandchildren," smiles Mac. And with that he headed for the sale barn, which will probably be a favorite hangout in the years ahead.

Lead-Free Gas A Problem For 2-Cycle Engines

The introduction of lead-free automotive gasolines to help auto makers fight air pollution is causing an unexpected threat to boat engines.

Boat owners are being warned by two manufacturers and by the Boating Industry Association here that use of the new fuels causes premature firing that can burn holes in pistons and chamber walls of outboard motors in only a few hours, and can harm inboard marine engines as well.

Lead is a cheap method of raising the "octane" rating of a fuel that measures its anti-knock quality in high-compression engines. Its removal requires addition of more processed high octane components.

The boat group says the new fuels contain phosphorus additives that create deposits that overheat the

chamber, cause premature firing of the engine and damage the motors.

Donald Reed, engineering director for the association, who made tests of the new fuels, said lead-free fuel is dangerous, besides outboards, to such other two-cycle motors as those on snowmobiles, lawnmowers and chain saws. He said the fuel also is dangerous to use the four-cycle inboard marine engines. He said the stress on these motors is much greater than the comparable stress on auto engines.

In the past, outboards often operated on low-octane, lead-free "white" gasoline, but these fuels don't contain the phosphorus additives.

The Johnson division of Outboard Marine Corp. and Keickhafer-Mercury, a unit of Brunswick Corp., two of the nation's leading makers of outboards, said they're telling their dealers to warn customers against use of any of the new lead-free auto gasolines.

Outboard Marine said its owners manual for Johnson motors has recommended only leaded gasoline for several years; it reports that its

new Johnson motors are displaying a decal warning against lead-free fuels.

Reed said lead is a necessary lubricant to prevent valve seat wear in an engine, and the oil companies have added phosphorus to do the same job in lead-free fuel. But the phosphorus harms boat engines, he asserts.

Oil companies have introduced the lead-free gasolines to prepare for introduction by 1974 of new devices on automobiles that will nearly eliminate auto pollution. But those devices would be harmed by lead content in the fuel, the auto makers say.

The trip to Europe for winner Wayne Dicken of DeSoto will be paid by Eli Lilly Manufacturing Co. of Indianapolis. The winner a year ago won a trip to Europe.

G&G used a story filed by K-State Extension Information, which erroneously reported the prize as a trip to Japan.

OVEREDUCATED OUTPUT, UNDEREDUCATED MARKET

I'd say NFO is certainly on the right track by getting the story of the beating farmer takes in the market place before the public.

You criticized the philosophy of NFO. What approach method would you suggest that might be more effective than the hog lift? Do you think the price quoted by buyers when you ask, "what will you give me" is a more intelligent approach? As long as farmers are willing to sell out for a few cents more than their neighbor is receiving for his production, we

will not have an effective market.

You mentioned that Cudahy Packing Co. purchased hogs on other markets in order to supply their needs. So in a way that is similar to the NFO lift policies that you say aren't realistic. Machine companies shift machines from a surplus area to a market where there is a need so they can profit financially. If Cudahy would improve their markets at the local level, it probably wouldn't be necessary to purchase elsewhere. NFO members would be interested for a fair price for their production.

It is reasonable to think that NFO did play a part in improving hog prices. Where did you get your information concerning NFO marketing policies? It is a fact that NFO does encourage limiting farm production according to demand and participation of farmers in government farm programs to help curb surpluses.

Have you actively supported NFO with your time as well as your dollars? In this age of unfair farm prices \$75 NFO dues may seem like a lot of money. Any NFO member will tell you this amount can be repaid many times by blocking farm production cooperatively.

I'm concerned that NFO is helping improve our antiquated marketing policies. Do you know of any other business that operates on the what will you give me policy when they have something to sell?

All any NFO member wants is a fair price plus a reasonable profit. I truly

believe that collective bargaining is the sleeping giant in the farming industry. Farmers are over-educated in the business of production and undereducated in marketing.

I think you'd be surprised at the number of hard working and dedicated NFO members.

GUESS WHO IS TRUMPETING NFO?

I would like to ask John Adrian (G&G letters Feb. 16) what caused the \$3-\$4 rise in hog prices the latter part of January if it wasn't the NFO nationwide hog lift operation? Mr. Adrian is rather naive about hog buying stations setting the price and their ability to forecast prices. When new factors enter a marketing pattern - such as NFO taking hogs out of known supply areas - then the packers have to bid up to maintain their supply.

Mr. Adrian states that both Cudahy Packing Co. and Maurer-Neuer are both good markets and often a producer gets \$1 more per hog over the market price. But Mr. Adrian ignores the hard facts of life, that farmers are going out of business by the thousands and those that remain are assuming a staggering debt load to stay in business. Some of us are smart enough to realize that farmers have to do it ourselves. No one is going to do it for us. No one did it for the doctors, lawyers, bankers or laborers.

He questions the size of NFO membership. An organization even though relatively small is better than individuals and tremendously more powerful. The Communists maintain that numbers in organization aren't important. It is organization that is all important. They are controlling practically half of the world with only 1/2 of one percent in the Communist party.

NFO offers a way out of the dilemma to build solid individual farmers and farm communities - and put life blood in the economy of communities, states and nation.

We fully realize that production control is important but we are the ones to control it - not the unreliable USDA boys. They spread our business all over the map. For instance, they let the packers know a year ago that 13% more hogs were on the way - then in July they came up with a 17% figure and the trade started hammering away at the hog price. It fell to \$15-\$16 and then believe it or not - slaughter figures showed no substantial increase over a year earlier. But we farmers had taken a beating. The NFO came up with the hog lift and make them eat crow. NFO did something when prices were down. In fact, they make you enough to pay your dues for the rest of your life.

You can listen to those that buy off of you as cheap as they can. Also the good will boys in the ivy league colleges and their stooges in the county extension offices. Why not listen to a neighbor who is in the same boat with you? He might know something. He might like to tell you about our inventory system of blocking grain, meat and milk - how our area chiefs and county committees are acting nation wide - searching for the best possible price for this NFO production. Do you have any body really trying to get you a decent price or are you just taking what is offered? Don't blame the NFO. The guilty guy is in the mirror. Look him in the eye and let him have it.

To answer Mr. John H. Adrian, Moundridge.

I was county NFO president in Mr. Adrian's county. I resigned recently because of conflicting interests. I am sure that the new man is equally or better qualified. I tried to do my best with pride.

Did anyone know that Mr. Adrian is a member of NFO? I don't know why. Enrolling is voluntary. He had to be equally as sold as he is unsold today. Mr. Adrian has attended three meetings in nearly two years. Would that be giving any organization a chance?

The American farmers have the inbred, mistaken, idea that they should be in competition with each other. I don't blame the rest of the economy one bit for trying to ignore the plight of the farmer.

I just returned from the tax accountant. There is land area enough for 600 plus farmers in our county. (My size: I am exactly average) Had I received cost of production plus a reasonable profit, I would have paid \$2903 more federal income tax, \$72 more surtax, and \$547 more state income tax. For the county it would have been 600 times or \$1,742,250

more Federal income tax, \$43,544 more surtax and \$328,428 more state income tax. For Kansas multiply times 100. But, more important, times 3,000 and you would have a close estimate of lost revenue to the nation.

Ask anyone who has had to live without paying income tax. I will gladly pay and with pride.

This additional income would have cost the housewife 1.7% additional at the grocery store.

Had I spent half this additional income, it would have created \$56,000 plus worth of business in the economy of our nation. (\$56,000 x 600 x 3,000 would be a lot of additional business for our national economy.) This would also have increased someone else's taxable income.

The other day President Nixon said he would favor a deficit budget that would fully employ the nation. Maybe considering the above, we could have fully employed the nation and balanced the budget both.



57 Nations Sign For Free World Wheat Trade

Fifty-seven nations recently signed a new wheat trade convention to replace the International Grains Arrangement (IGA) which worked badly during the past three years.

The new agreement will establish an international free market price level for wheat. Although providing for an interchange of information on marketing and marketing costs, the new agreement provides essentially no controls.

The sessions in Geneva, Switzerland, finally were stalled over how much control could be maintained. It seemed impossible to set price levels that could be maintained.

A delay in the final sessions came when Russia complained that she did not want to sign an agreement if the European Economic Community (EEC) signed the arrangement as a single country. Agreement was reached however and the EEC was listed in the pact as a single entity.

The London-based International Wheat Council is empowered under the treaty to call a new wheat conference at any time in the future if the questions of prices and related rights to markets and obligations can be negotiated successfully.

Other provisions on the new treaty provide for 3.9 million metric tons of food aid being shipped annually to developing countries over the next three years. This food would be paid for by local currency or long-term credit.

Profit Off, Strike Averted At Deere

Deere & Co. reports its first quarter profit dropped about 16 per cent from a year ago, with a profit of \$6.5 million on sales \$226 million for the three-month period just ended.

The big farm equipment maker based in Moline, Ill., just missed a strike by 21,000 workers at the end of

the quarter, with an agreement reached with the United Auto Workers.

The first quarter results included an estimate of retroactive labor costs as a result of the labor settlement.



EARTHQUAKE CHANCES IN G&G AREA?

The chances of an earthquake in the G&G area might seem rather remote, but the Department of Commerce lists an extension from southeast Nebraska through the Flint Hills to the Osage Hills in Oklahoma as a "moderate" risk in this map. The map shows "fault zones," where the greatest risks are in California, the Olympic peninsula in Washington state, and parts of the Western Rockies.

The nearest major fault is the New Madrid fault in southeastern Missouri. The last major disturbance in that area was in 1811-12.

Muddy Feedlots Cut Beef Gains

Research shows mud in feedlots is a definite hindrance to beef gains. Leo Wendling, Extension

agricultural engineer at Kansas State University, cited a three-year California study in which mud reduced daily gains 25 to 37 per cent when compared with concrete pens, and increased the feed required per pound of gain 25 to 33 per cent.

Wendling said both losses were reduced sharply when a dry place was provided for rest. Gain was reduced only 10 per cent while conversion efficiency dropped 4.7 per cent.

The purpose of the study was to compare the effects of mud, wind and rain of beef cattle performance. Tests were held during the winter months but air temperatures were relatively mild, Wendling said.

Rain reduced beef production more than wind but less than mud. Artificial rain of .19 inches during a 10-minute period each hour decreased daily gains 15 per cent and reduced feed conversion efficiency 20 per cent.

Wind of up to four miles per hour apparently did not affect the cattle.

Soybean Meal Fares Best In KSU Test

Heifers fared better on a ration of soybean meal than on a ration of molasses-urea mixture in a Kansas State University test.

The test-conducted at the Southeast Kansas Branch Experiment Station at Mound Valley — was designed to compare the rations as supplemental protein for wintering yearling calves.

H. Bruce Perry, KSU beef scientist, said 20 Hereford heifer calves averaging 476 pounds were divided and assigned to the following treatments:

(1) 28 per cent crude protein mixture of liquid molasses-urea fed in a self-feeder, and (2) three pounds of a soybean meal-grain mixture containing 28 per cent crude protein once daily.

Both groups received prairie hay free choice in drylot for 114 days. The average daily intake of liquid supplements was 3.52 pounds.

The group receiving the molasses-urea mixture actually most .09 pounds daily while the group receiving soybean meal gained .72 pounds daily.

Perry said the calves were then placed on brome pasture 62 days. As

might be expected, the first group's average daily gain was considerably more — 2.01 pounds to 1.25 pounds.

However, the total average daily gain for the 176 days was .66 pounds for group 1 and .91 pounds for group 2.



Safety From Diagonal Brakes?

The space agency says it had developed a motor car with a diagonal braking system as the most useful means yet found of measuring the slipperiness of wet roads or runways.

The braking system is not a better means of halting a skidding car but it does help keep the vehicle on course throughout the skid, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said.

Accordingly the machine is considered a promising tool for predicting stopping conditions on

various types of surfaces. The test car was fitted at NASA Langley Research center, Hampton, Va., with a braking assembly which links the right front wheel with left rear wheel, and the left front wheel with the right rear wheel with the right rear separate subsystems.

When for example the left front and right rear wheels are locked and braked, the other two wheels continue to roll freely.

"The diagonal system results in less fishtailing and weaving, providing more accurate measurements," NASA said.

years, largely because of improved prices for milk. The 1.4-per cent shrink in cow numbers last year was smallest since 1960, Mathis said. And another small drop is expected in 1971, he said. Milk output per cow, on the other hand, has increased steadily because of better culling practices and herd improvement generally. The national average production per cow last year was 9,388 pounds of milk, compared with 7,029 pounds a decade earlier.

Mathis, Economic Research analyst, told the National Dairy Outlook Conference a rise from 1970 output is expected this year. Replacement of 1971 were 31.7 per cent, about the same as last year, Mathis said. "Though current and future prices for slaughter (affecting how much cull their herds) are likely high, the decline in milk numbers likely will continue at a rate."

Prices farmers get for milk have increased 34 per cent since 1965, Mathis said, and are at record-high levels. "When it comes to raising hogs, there's no place like the good old U.S.A.," Wendell Moyer said at a Sedgwick County swine production meeting at Wichita recently. Moyer returned from an extended European tour Jan. 1 and has conducted 35 meetings in pork-

producing counties. Another 20 are planned for February and March. European hogs are more uniform with only one breed, but they lack muscling, grow slower and do not have the low fat carcasses of American hogs, he said. Moyer said that Kansas State University is happy with a farm testing program involving 2,000 hogs. The six-month program was aimed at identifying superior breeding stock. K-State and Kansas Swine Improvement use the Scanogram, an electronic ultrasound machine, to measure the loin eye and back fat plus weight checks to mark the growth rate.

Statewide School For Sheepshearers

A state-wide sheep shearing school will be held in Hutchinson April 7-9, reports Dr. George Ahlschwede, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University. The school is being repeated again this year to help ease the shortage of qualified sheep shearers serving the Kansas sheep industry. Although enrollment is limited to 20 students, Ahlschwede urges interested persons to make application to the school through their county Extension offices. Enrollments will be accepted in the order they are received. Applications must be in by March 29. "Sheep shearing is hard work, but profitable for the skilled operator," Ahlschwede notes. "This school will offer the opportunity to learn sheep shearing from a national champion."

Charles Swaim, Jr., Drakesville, Ia., will be the school's instructor. He was a national champion sheep shearer in both 1967 and 1969. Midwest Wool, Inc., and Sunbeam Corporation are cooperating in the school. The school will begin at 9:00 a.m. April 7 and finish at 4:00 p.m. April 9. Participants should bring work clothes and any shearing equipment they might own. They will be responsible for their own meals and lodging during the school.



U.S. COTTON EXPORTS CLIMBING BACK UP

Cotton exports, which have been in a slump for two years, show indications of going up. USDA figures exports for the 1970-71 year will be about 3.5 million bales, up from 2.7 million the year before. The U.S. will have about one-fifth the world cotton market.

CCC Empties Soybean Bins

The Commodity Credit Corporation, owner of the biggest stocks of grain the free world, has become a Mother Hubbard, whose cupboards are virtually bare, as far as soybeans are concerned.

For the first time since 1965, the CCC has issued shipping orders for every one of the 17 million bushels of beans it held in commercial warehouses on January 1. It still has, however, some 4 million bushels in its own bin sites, down some 16 million bushels from a year ago.

There are, of course, other soybeans in the U.S., plenty of them, to fulfill export demands, planting requirements, for crushing and other uses. The nation's carryover as of the next crop year, September 1, is expected to be some 60 million bushels.

The development means the market price will prevail until beans are harvested again this autumn. Users have no place to turn, except private holders and owners.

Now one might jump to the conclusion that prices would incline upward at a steep rate between now and the new crop. That doesn't necessarily follow, though, because the demand, while expected to remain vigorous, may not be as strong as earlier forecasts.

One reason is that chicken broiler and hog producers are cutting back production. Both overshot their ideal production quotas badly last year and are pulling in this spring. Hence, the demand for feed manufactured from soybeans has softened.

Even with that, soybeans remain the fair-haired child of U.S. agriculture. Every year usage grows. This year total disappearance from all uses is exceeding production by a vast margin. A year ago, the carryover of beans was 300 million bushels.

But from now on until autumn, what soybeans do price-wise will depend entirely on the availability of free-market supplies.

'Go' On Wichita Section Of Interstate 35W

Sen. Bob Dole and Rep. Garner E. Shriver, Kansas Republicans, have announced that all obstacles have been cleared for the construction of the Wichita segment of I-35 West.

John A. Volpe, secretary of transportation, informed Dole and Shriver that 12 million dollars in advance money will be made available immediately to the state as authorized by the federal highway administration.

Construction of the Wichita highway segment requires the use of lands from Wichita East high school, Willard elementary school and McAdams park.

Approval of the project had been pending a Department of Transportation stipulation:

"There is no feasible and prudent

alternative to the use of such land and such program includes possible planning to minimize resulting from such use."

Final clearance to use the land was announced.

Planning has been in progress since 1946 for a major highway facility to connect the northern industrial area of Wichita with the residential section in the south part of the city. 



Up Pressure Against Welfare Stamps

Tright abolition of the rapidly ending food stamp program has proposed privately by the administration and by leaders of the House Agriculture Committee. Present food stamp benefits are to be incorporated into proposed reforms.

The district court recommendations come at a time when food stamp benefits, authorized by the last Congress, are being received by about 9.8 million persons at an annual federal

cost of more than \$1.5 billion. The program has grown in response to presidential and congressional commitments to meet the food problems of the hungry poor.

John Veneman, undersecretary of Health, Education and Welfare proposed in written testimony before the House Ways & Means committee that a family receive \$2,200 cash and no food stamps. His proposal would mean a total loss of aid for four million persons now receiving food stamps but not welfare, unless those persons signed up for family assistance benefits.

The administration made similar proposals in both 1969 and 1970, but baked away from them in the face of criticism. The administration's

intention was to save money and to lessen the administrative confusion in supplying the poor both money and stamps.

Powerful leaders of the House Agriculture Committee have for the first time embraced the idea of eliminating food stamps.

Chairman W. R. Poage, D-Tex., and Oklahoma Rep. Page Belcher, the ranking Republican, suggested eliminating food stamps in a surprising Feb. 20 letter to ways and means committee chairman Wilbur Mills, D-Ark., and ranking Republican member John Byrnes (Wis.).

Poage and Belcher complained in the letter that, over their protest,



Dairy Farmers Get A 29-Cent Milk Increase

Dairy farmers selling milk to Mid-America Dairymen get a price increase of 29 cents a hundredweight this month.

Mid-America Dairymen is the farmer co-op that handles nearly all the class 1 milk in the G&G area, as well as most of Kansas, Missouri, and Iowa. The co-op gathers milk from farms and sells it to handlers.

The price increase is almost sure to be passed on to the consumer and will likely mean an increase of 2 to 4 cents a half gallon at retail stores.

The price change announced is an increase in the premium for farmers over the federal marketing order minimum for milk. The milk order price is \$6.50 a hundredweight.

The increase had been in effect in southeast Kansas and southwest
