Seven Million Acre Cut In All Crops

Crop plantings in the U.S. this year will be about seven million acres less than in 1968, a reduction comparable to the entire farm acreage in New England.

Right now it appears that about 300 million acres will be planted to major crops, down from 307 million last year.

Despite the cut in planting, market experts figure production will be about the same as the record output of 1968.

Weather permitting, yields tend to rise "dramatically" when acreage drops, notes Roy Sloan, farm economist of the Federal Reserve Bank in Chicago. That's because farmers seed their best-yielding acres and nurture them with more fertilizers, weedkillers and pesticides than usual.

In addition, improved seed varieties and farming practices enhance chances each year for bigger yields.

The probability that acreage reductions may be partially offset by better yields shows up clearly in wheat, which accounts for most of the 1969 acreage cutback. The Government lowered the wheat allotment — which farmers must comply with to get subsidies — by 13% to 51.6 million acres from 59.7 million.

Corn plantings in 1969 are expected to be virtually unchanged from the 1968 level of 65 million acres, according to Iowa State University farm economist Robert Wisner. Midwest seed companies say that

corn seed sales are up slightly from a year ago, but that some of the increase is coming from farmers who want to boost yields by planting narrower rows.

There's likely to be last-minute changes in corn planting intentions by farmers, however. Some analysts think 500,000 to 750,000 more acres of corn could be planted by farmers unhappy with the cut in the soybean support price.

Others note that late winter snows in Iowa and the upper Midwest could keep his fields muddy and delay corn planting so much that farmers would end up seeding that land to soybeans, which can be planted a month later than corn.

A survey by the American Soybean Association indicates that soybean plantings may fall almost 1.5 million acres short of the 41.5 million acres seeded last year — only the second time in the past 15 years that plantings have declined. Industry observers say the cut in support level for the beans makes the "wonder crop" less attractive to grow. The Government had cut the support price because of mounting surpluses.

Little change is seen from grain sorghum seedings from last year's 18 million acres.

Barley plantings, however, may drop 500,000 to a million acres below the 10.3 million seeded last year, because of diversion incentive payments.

The biggest planting boost is

predicted for cotton. Trade sources say plantings could jump as much as one million acres over the 10.9 million last year. The Government raised the cotton support price and eliminated acreage diversion payments for the 1969 crop in an effort to boost cotton production.

But the government also lowered its support price for cottonseed, which yields meal and oil, a move that could negate some of the added planting encouragement of the higher cotton support.

Among other crops, slight increases in seedings are expected for oats, flaxseed and sugar beets. Small reductions are anticipated for rice and several processed vegetables. Little change from last year's plantings is foreseen for peanuts, hay and some other crops.

No Federal Park Permits In State

The Golden Eagle Passport — the federal park user fee — will not apply anywhere in Kansas this year. It will still be in force, however, at national parks and other federal areas throughout the nation. They can be obtained at U.S. Army Corps of Engineers offices and at many AS CS offices in the state.

Entire K-State Campus For Open House View

Kansas State University will open its doors Friday and Saturday, April 11 and 12, for the first all-University open house in the history of the university. The theme for the student-planned weekend is "KSU Showcase '69."

"KSU Showcase '69" is a gigantic effort by K-State students to show what the various colleges, departments, clubs, organizations and living groups have to offer prospective students and parents.

"This is the first year that the separate K-State colleges have joined for one big open house weekend," Loren Kruse, publicity chairman, said. "In this age of student riots, protests and sit-ins we believe too many people get a distorted view of university life. One of the purposes of 'KSU Showcase '69' is to show that students are willing to show constructive support of their university system."

Exhibits, displays, tours and question and answer sessions highlight the efforts of the students in the separate colleges. The exhibits officially open at 1 p.m. Friday, April 11, and classes will be dismissed at 1:20 p.m. to allow all students to participate Friday afternoon.

The students of the College of Agriculture will put on departmental displays and conduct tours of research and educational facilities. Engineering students will have displays and films and hold informal talk and answer sessions.

College of Architecture and Design Students will have displays in the five departments of the college and also show films and a special experimental light demonstration.

K-State's largest college, arts and Sciences, will have many displays ranging from chemistry experiments to displays and demonstrations of art work. The speech department will have a "Reader's Theatre" in which the audience can partici-

pate.

Education will open up the audio-visual teaching rooms and have special educational exhibits. Home economics will display a variety of exhibits and demonstrations from its various departments.

Other highlights include an activities carnival in the K-State Union at which many student clubs and organizations will have information booths. The University for Man will have an informal coffee and discussion group in the Union lounge both Friday night and Saturday afternoon for parents who want to ask any questions.

Friday afternoon the K-State Wildcats will play Kansas in a double-header baseball game at Myers Field. The exhibits will close at 6 p.m. Friday. There will be a concert in the Field house at 8 p.m.

On Saturday, the exhibits will re-open at 10 a.m. At 10:30 Kansas Sen. Bob Dole will speak in Williams Auditorium on "The 1969 Outlook for Agriculture."

From 11:30 till 1 there will be a barbecue in old memorial Stadium. Hot beef sandwiches, baked beans, salad and pop will be served for \$1. The meal will be catered by a Manhattan firm and served by student groups at K-State.

Beginning at 1 p.m. the College of Home Economics and the merchants of Manhattan will combine for a large fashion show in the Fieldhouse. The campus exhibits will close at 6 p.m.

Two major events are planned for the evening. The 41st Little American Royal will be in Weber Arena and the Miss K-State-Manhattan pageant will be in Manhattan Auditorium.

Maps, information booths and concessions will be available across campus to help guests find the attractions for KSU Showcase '69.

Finally Stop Lumber Price Runaway

The runaway price increases on plywood and lumber have apparently been stemmed.

A major producer of sanded plywood made substantial price cuts in late March, sending prices into a sharp decline in the

Pacific Northwest.

The break marked an end to the record rise in wood product prices that has been contributing to the spiraling cost of home construction.

Wholesale prices on sanded interior grade, quarter-inch plywood were about \$76 a thousand square feet a year ago, but had increased to \$144 in late February. The price settled back to \$136 in mid-March and dropped back to \$118 by April 1.

Half-inch exterior grade sheathing dropped to about \$125 a thousand square feet at the mill after hitting \$140 in late February. It was \$79 a year ago.

Lumber prices have also declined but not in such dramatic proportions.

Buyer resistance to the high prices had been building for the past several weeks, and most lumber officials in the Northwest felt a break was inevitable. The increase in the prime

lending rate to 7½% from 7% by many major banks heightened speculation among lumbermen that mortgage rates would rise again, perhaps putting a damper on any homebuilding boom.

The Government also made several moves to cut back wood costs. President Nixon directed the Pentagon to cut back purchases, Agriculture and Interior departments to take steps to make more timber available

from Government lands, and the ICC to take steps to relieve the shortage of boxcars used to ship lumber from the Northwest.

AFL Pinpoints Tax Loopholes

The AFL-CIO has told Congress it could rewrite the tax code to pick up as much as 10 billion dollars net additional revenue and at the same time give lower-income taxpayers substantial relief.

The labor federation proposed a drastic clampdown on special income tax provisions, including those on capital gains and oil depletion allowances. Andrew J. Biemiller, presenting the statement on behalf of President George Meany, told the ways and means committee the revenue pickup would range between 14.8 billion and 17 billion dollars.

Against this, the AFL-CIO proposed new advantages mainly for lower-bracket taxpayers that would offset the revenue gain by 6.7 billion dollars. The difference, Biemiller suggested, could be used to pay for social programs started during the Johnson administration.

Some of the changes the labor spokesmen suggested and their estimate of the revenue gain:

- Shut off mineral depletion allowances when the cost of the property has been fully written off; 1.5 billion dollars.
- Tax capital gains at full rates; 6 billion to 7 billion dollars.
- Tax capital gains on property transferred at death 3 billion to 4 billion dollars.
- Tax the interest on state and local government bonds but provide a federal subsidy; 100 million dollars.
- Repeal the investment tax credit by which businesses can recover 7 per cent of investment in equipment; 3 billion dollars.
- End accelerated depreciation on most real estate properties; \$700 million to \$800 million dollars.
- Limit deduction of farm losses from nonfarm income; 145 million dollars.
- Levy a minimum tax on otherwise exempt income; 1.5 billion dollars.

The AFL-CIO's proposals for tax relief, and the estimated revenue cost, included:

- Increase the minimum deduction by \$400; 1.2 billion dollars.
- Increase the standard deduction from 10 per cent with a \$1,000 maximum to 5 per cent with a \$2,500 maximum; 2 billion dollars.
- Reduce the two lowest income tax bracket rates from the present 14 per cent and 15 per cent to 9 per cent and 13 per cent; 3.4 billion dollars.
- Liberalize deductions for moving expenses; 100 million dollars.

Modest Cut In Federal Payroll

Employment in certain federal agencies was cut by about 48,000 in the first eight months since a bill to trim government spending was passed.

In releasing the preliminary figures, Rep. George H. Mahon (D-Tex.), noted the cutback was partly offset by increases of about 15,000 in employment exempted by the revenue and expenditure control act of 1968.

The act which went into effect in July required many federal agencies to trim the number of permanent employees on the payroll.

Mahon, chairman of the Joint Committee on Reduction of Federal Expenditures, said executive agencies of the federal government reported permanent civilian employment in the month of February totalling 2,967,940.

This was up 7,117 over the previous month, due largely to seasonal employment.

Civilian agencies reported 1,651,617 employees, while military agencies had 1,316,323.

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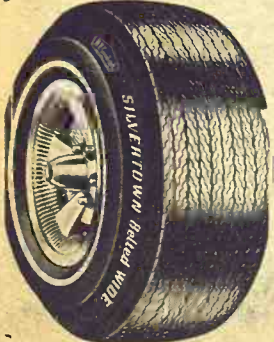

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Ford Starts Its War With VW

Ford Motor Co. has unveiled its new Maverick car with a \$1995 price tag.

The Maverick will go on sale April 17 and is the first of a new breed of smaller American cars aimed at cutting sales of foreign imports such as the German Volkswagen.

The new Ford has received so

much publicity that there was little new revealed at the press showing. But everything about the car — its price, its cut-back warranty, a minimum of cost-adding optional equipment, a claim of simplified repair, and the advertising — is aimed at making the Maverick a sales competitor of the Volkswagen.

Here is how Maverick compares with the VW Beetle.

In addition there is a transportation charge to the dealer and usually local sales taxes.

Cost of a semi-automatic transmission — a shift lever but no clutch — is \$121 in the Maverick and \$135 in the VW. The Maverick also offers a fully automatic transmission for \$174, plus \$26 for a slightly larger engine that is recommended with the automatic.

To keep the price down, Ford is limiting the number of options available on its new cars. No V-8 engines, convertible models or vinyl roofs are offered. The Maverick comes only as a two-door sedan, like the VW Beetle.

Ford claims 22.5 miles per gallon of gasoline for the Maverick; VW claims 26.7.

The Maverick is longer and wider than the VW — 179 inches long to 159 for the Beetle and 71 inches wide to 61 inches. It also is heavier — 2487 pounds against 1807 — and more powerful — with a 105 or 120 horsepower engine against 53 for the Volkswagen.

Farm Sale Pause For Ike

Besides the national ceremonies at Abilene, the death of General Dwight Eisenhower was memorialized at several G&G area towns.

One rather unusual location was at a farm sale Monday, March 31, northeast of Manhattan. The auctioneer, Foster Kretz of Clay Center, suggested to owner LeRoy Peterson that the death of the 34th president of the United States and the area's most known historical figure should be noted, and Peterson had Lutheran pastor Paul D. Olson resume the sale after lunch break with a prayer for Eisenhower.

KANSAS SECOND IN PICKUP CAMPER OUTPUT

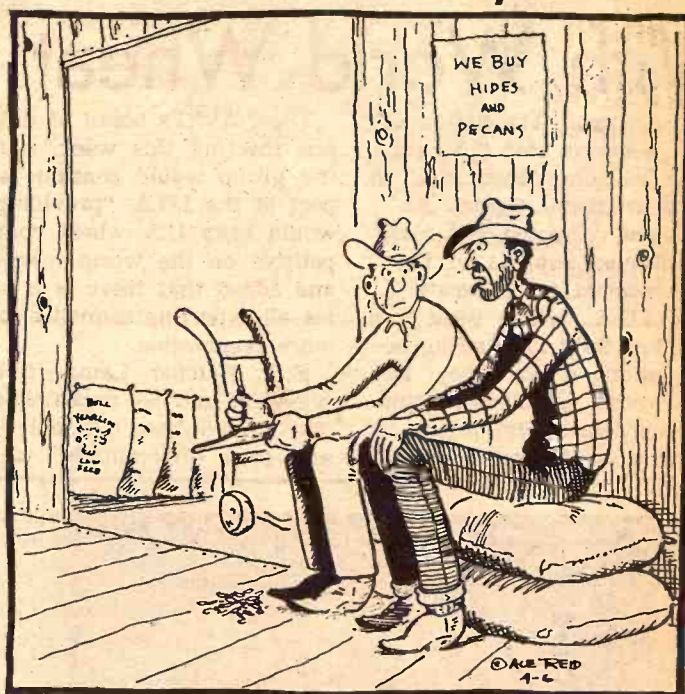

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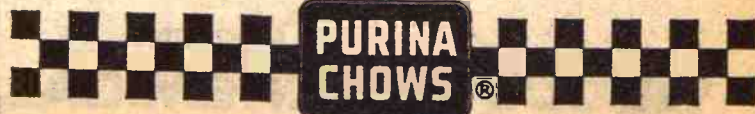

Wheat Growers Assn. Sticks With World Wheat Pact

The National Association of Wheat Growers said it would like to see some "inequities" in the International Grains Arrangement corrected, but pledged continued support of the nine-month-old trade treaty.

The I.G.A., which went into effect last July 1, is an agreement among major wheat nations which establishes minimum and maximum prices for the grain on the world market.

The NAWG's board of directors, meeting this week, said the group would continue support of the I.G.A. "providing it would keep U.S. wheat competitive on the world market," and added that there is a need for all exporting countries to be more responsible.

E. L. Hatcher, Lamar, Colo., president of the organization, cited freight rate manipulations and price differentials which,

he said, had permitted some countries to sell high quality wheat at lower prices, undercutting U.S. exports.

The NAWG also favored legislation which would require flour millers and other wheat users to bear the entire cost of "certificate payments" to farmers cooperating in the government's wheat program.

Certificate payments are made to growers on the basis of their share of the annual domestic use of wheat, usually around 40 percent of a farmer's normal production on allotted acres.

The certificate payments make up the difference between the \$1.25 a bushel national average price — about \$2.63 — on the farmer's share of domestic wheat consumption.

The costs of certificate payments are now shared by the industry and the federal government.

The NAWG wants the entire cost borne by the trade and the government share shifted to provide a new export certificate payment which would boost farmers' income on the rest of their crop.

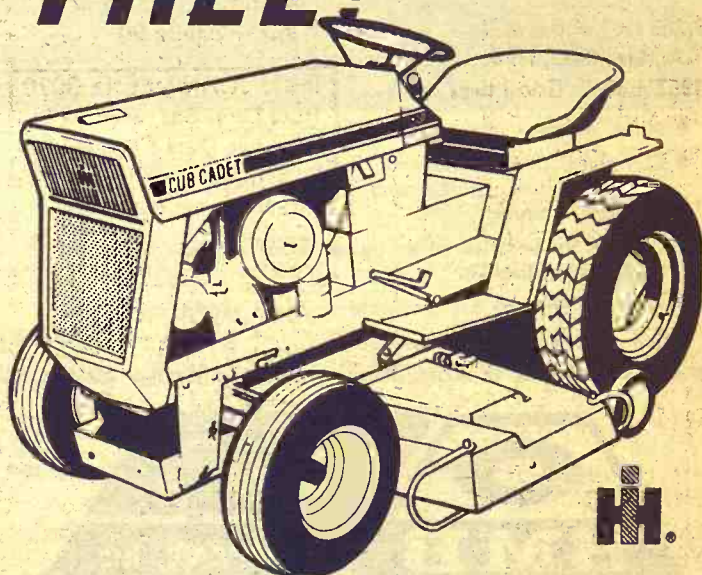
A Close Look At 3 1/4 Million Eggs

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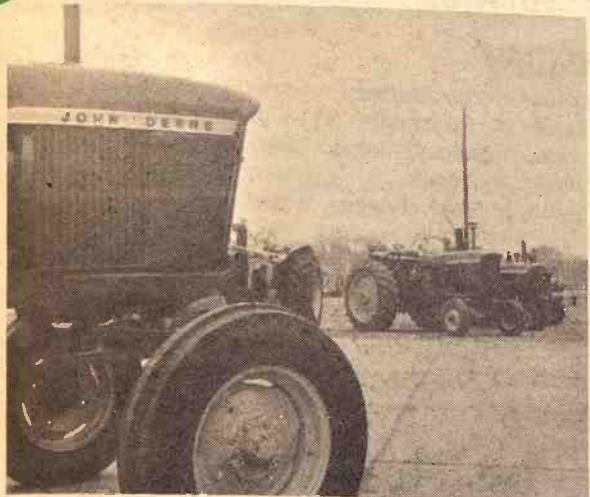

Hereford Assn. Revises Rules For Mixed Shows

Effective with the next show season, beginning July 1, 1969, the Board of Directors of the American Hereford Association has authorized a more flexible policy for shows sponsored by the Association.

This action is the result of a year's study. In announcing the several options which are being offered to the show managers, W. T. Berry, Jr., executive secretary, said that he believed the more flexible show options of the past show season; he favorably received by both exhibitors and show managers; and improve the Hereford shows in the coming show season.

Adult Breeding Shows

Plan A shows will continue to be held under the same rules and regulations which have governed American Hereford Association sponsored shows for many years. Only Herefords registered with the American Hereford Association will be eligible to enter the show; compete in the showing; and receive the Association's premium support.

Plan A includes: (1) all American Hereford Association shows held where the Polled Herefords compete in a separate show; and (2) all Register of Merit Shows and similar shows where the manager requests a standard AHA sponsored show.

Plan B is the newly created category in which Polled Herefords not registered with the American Hereford Association are invited to participate in AHA shows.

Show managers who wish to hold a Plan B show have been asked to submit their requests to the American Hereford Association. In Plan B, premiums will be paid to exhibitors of only those animals registered with the AHA. Show managers have been asked to keep the premiums and awards equitable for all entries.

Junior Breeding Shows

In Junior Breeding Shows, where managers request to show all Junior Hereford Heifers together, the American Hereford Association will officially sponsor the show under identically the same policy as Plan B of the adult breeding shows.

Steer Shows

In Steer Shows, where man-

agers request to show all Hereford steers together, the American Hereford Association will pay the Association's share of premiums to all entries. Show managers have been asked to keep all special premiums, awards, and prizes equitable for all exhibitors with no restrictions on any segment or group.

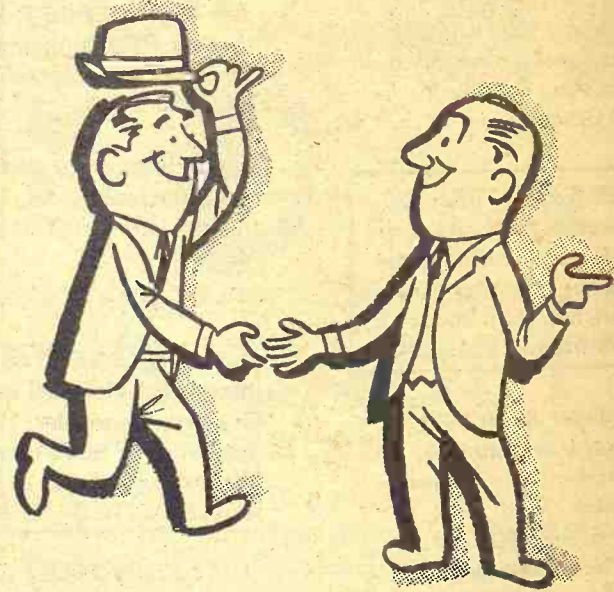

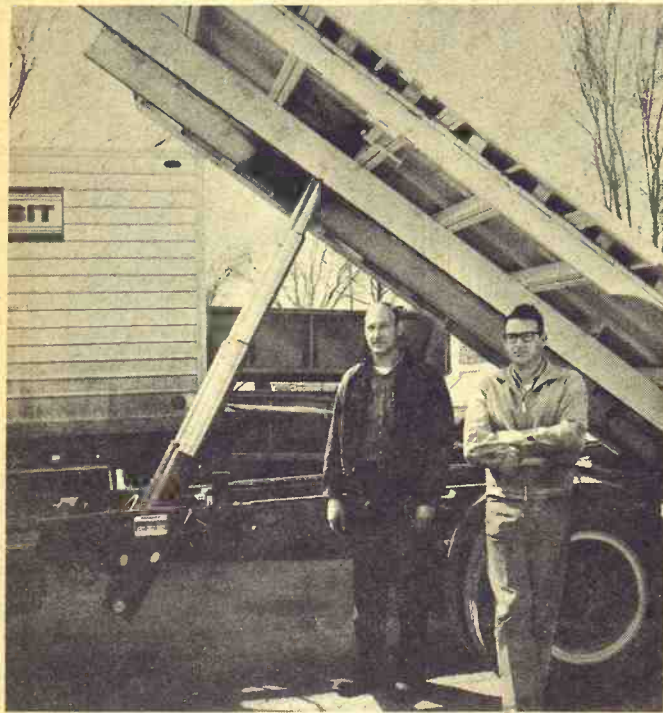

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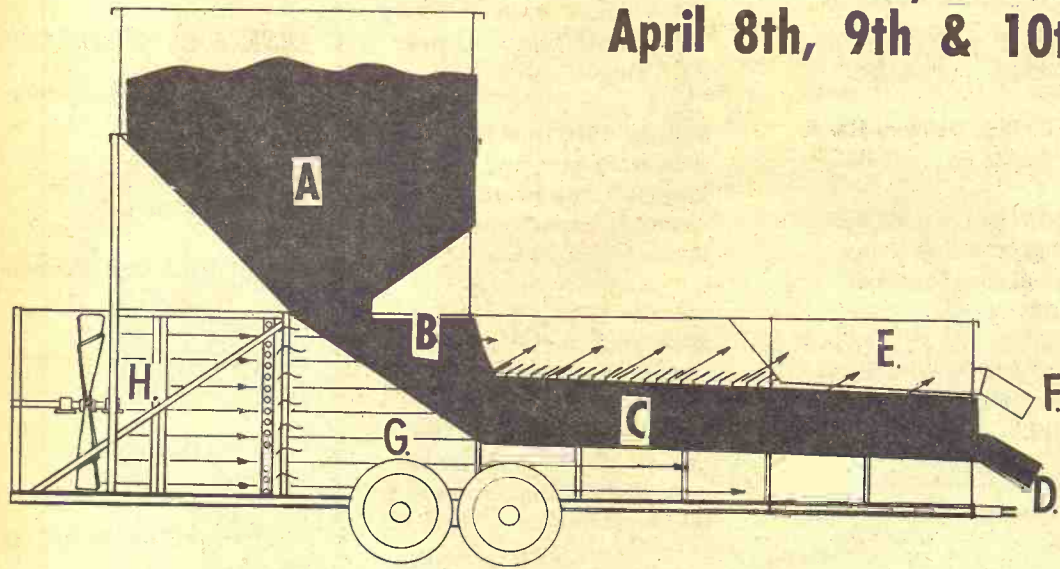

A. WET GRAIN HOLDING BIN:
Large capacity with gravity flow into the dryer.

B. PRE-HEATING AREA:

EASTER EGG BREAD

12 eggs in shell, uncooked
Easter egg coloring
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup sugar
1 teaspoon salt
1 cup shortening
2 packages active dry yeast
1/2 cup warm water (110-115 degrees)
2 eggs at room temperature
4 1/2 cups all purpose flour (about)
1 egg, beaten
Many uncolored candies
Wash 12 uncooked eggs. Tint eggs with egg coloring. Set aside. Scald milk; add sugar, salt, shortening and lemon peel. Cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle yeast on warm water; stir to dissolve. Add to milk mixture, with two eggs slightly beaten, 2 1/2 cups flour. Beat until

smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour, a little at a time, to form a dough that is easy to handle. Turn onto a lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, 5 or 8 minutes. Place in slightly greased bowl; turn dough over to grease top. Cover and let rise in warm place free from drafts until doubled, about one hour. Punch down; cover and let rise again until almost doubled, about 30 minutes. Make 2 large braided rings or 12 individual rings as follows:

Large rings: Divide dough into 4 parts. Form each part into 36" rope. On a greased baking sheet, shape two of the ropes into a loosely braided ring, leaving space for 6 eggs. Repeat with other 2 ropes of dough for second ring. Insert 6 tinted eggs in spaces in each ring.

Individual rings: Divide dough into 12 parts. Form each part into a ring around a tinted egg. Cover; let rise until doubled.

Brush evenly with beaten egg. Sprinkle with decorating can-

dies. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) 15 minutes for individual rings and 20 minutes for large rings, or until lightly browned. Serve warm. Makes 2 large or 12 small rings.

Note: Easter Bread can be baked the day before. Refrigerate. At serving time, reheat in moderate oven (350 degrees) 8 minutes.

WEEPLESS, SHRINKLESS MERINGUE

1 tablespoon cornstarch, dissolved or moistened with a little cold water. Cook in 1/2 cup boiling water till clear and thickened. Set aside to cool. Whip 3 egg whites till foamy and start gradually adding sugar until 6 tablespoons have been beaten in and frosting is light and fluffy. Flavor and beat in thoroughly the cooled cornstarch mixture. Bake on pie in 375 degree oven till lightly browned.

If you are one of the millions of Americans who is taking to outdoor barbecuing this year, these tips will come in handy. Like any art, successful outdoor cookery has a base. In the case of barbecuing the base is an efficient grill and good fire. Put the grill in condition with a thorough cleansing. Wirebrush rust spots and touch up bare metal with paint. Check the grill motor and clean tools and related accessories. Find a location where smoke

will not blow directly into the house or be offensive to neighbors, yet is accessible for serving. When you have reached this point, you're ready to test your culinary skill. Here are some simple steps for best results: A layer of a special grade of coarse vermiculite should be spread on bottom of grill. The material absorbs drippings and protects the grill while providing a better draft beneath the coals. Since it insulates, the grill stays cooler, thus safer.

Center the charcoal briquets on the vermiculite. Spray lighter fluid across the coals and ignite. Vermiculite acts as a wick to provide uniform burning.

Tap coals frequently with a tool or utensil to remove ash. Ash insulates the coals and retards the heat.

After guests leave, pour a layer of vermiculite over the hot coals for safety's sake. You'll be able to save the charcoal for the next cookout — both the briquets and vermiculite can be re-used.

When you do decide to change the vermiculite in the grill it's easy. The lightweight mineral can be dumped in the garden as a soil conditioner.

The coarse grade of vermiculite recommended for outdoor cooking is usually found wherever charcoal is sold.

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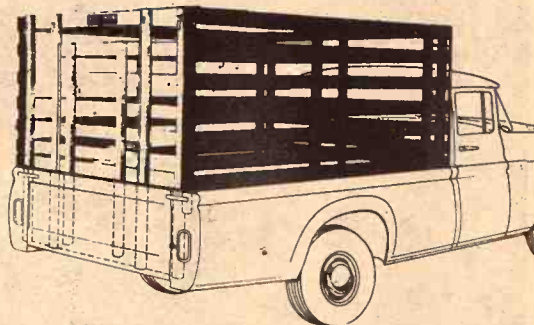
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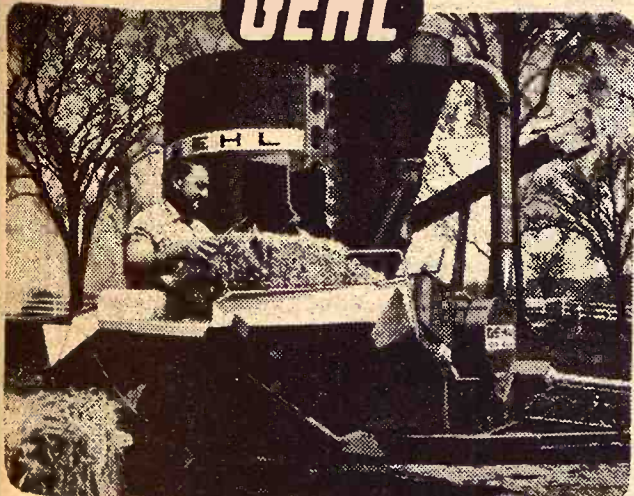

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Price Index Up A Notch

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-March 1969 were slightly above the previous month and March last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Small price increases from February were noted for most grain crops, hay, and hogs, while beef cattle and lamb prices were moderately above a month earlier.

However, prices of soybeans and milk were slightly lower. Compared with March last year, hog, lamb and egg prices were

up sharply, and prices for most other livestock were up moderately, but wheat, sorghum and soybean prices were down considerably.

The index of prices received by farmers for all commodities was 238 per cent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 233 last month and 234 a year ago.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 151 per cent at mid-March, 1 point above February but 14 points below last year.

Wheat prices were \$1.24 per bushel, 1 cent above February

but 14 cents below March 1968.

Corn at \$1.11 per bushel was 2 cents above last month but 1 cent below a year ago.

Oats at 75 cents per bushel was unchanged from last month but 2 cents below a year ago.

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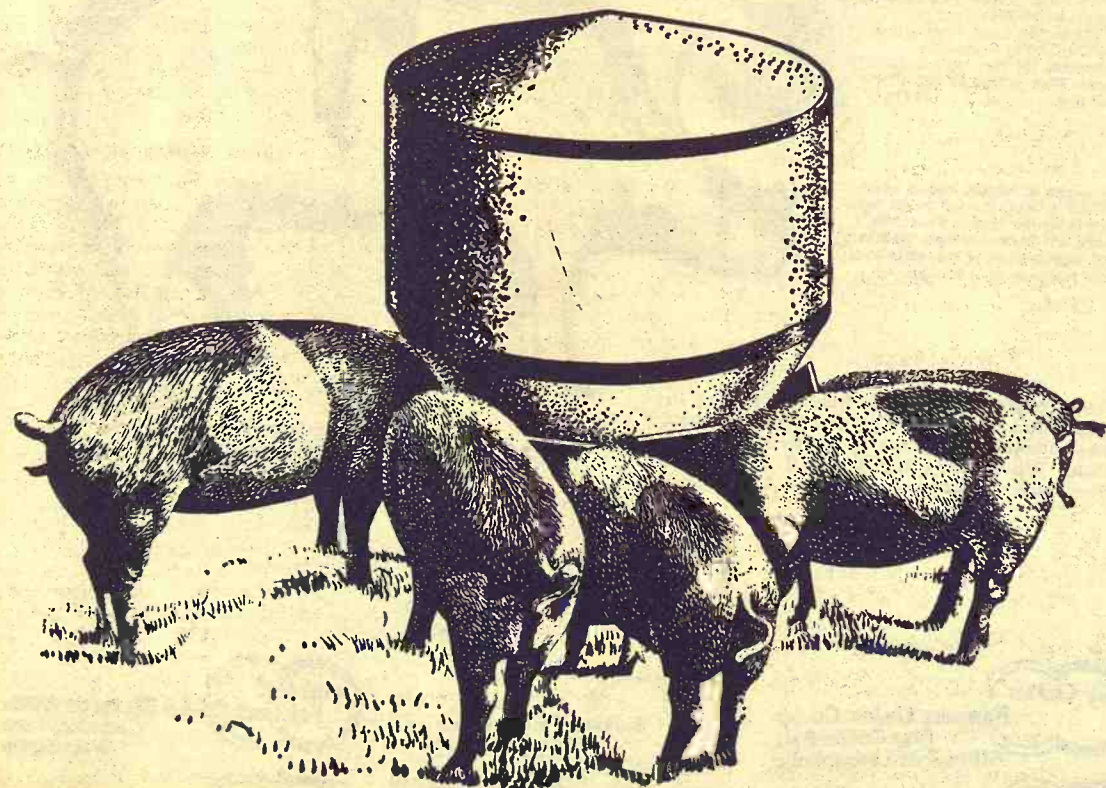

Barley averaged 91 cents per bushel, unchanged from the previous month but 10 cents below last year.

Sorghum grain brought \$1.70 per cwt., up 1 cent from last month but 11 cents below last year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.38 per bushel compared with \$2.39 in February and \$2.51 a year ago.

Meat Prices

Livestock and livestock products price index at mid-March was 337 per cent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 328 per cent in February and 312 per cent in March a year ago. The meat animal price index was 394 per cent at mid-March compared with 380 per cent the previous month and 370 per cent last year.

Hog prices averaged \$20 per cwt., 30 cents above February and \$2.10 above March 1968.

Beef cattle brought \$25 per cwt. compared with \$24.10 per cwt. the previous month and \$23.80 per cwt. last year.

Steer and heifer prices averaged \$26.50 per cwt., 60 cents above the previous month and \$1.50 above last year. Calves at \$28.50 were up 50 cents from the previous month and \$1.60 above March of last year.

The dairy price index was 321 per cent in March compared with 326 in February and 304 per cent last year.

The preliminary wholesale milk prices at \$5.35 per cwt. in March was 15 cents below February but 15 cents above March last year.

Egg prices averaged 29 cents per dozen, unchanged from February but well above the 21.1 cents a year ago. Turkey prices at 21 cents per pound were unchanged from February

Prices Paid

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for protein supplement were up slightly from a month earlier, while mixed feeds were about steady.

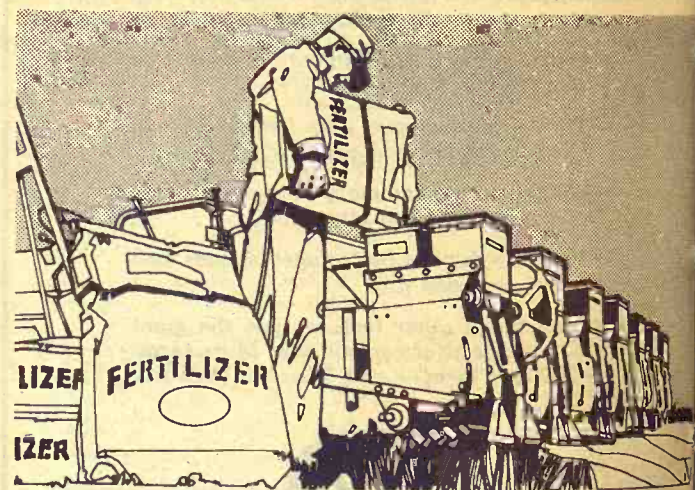

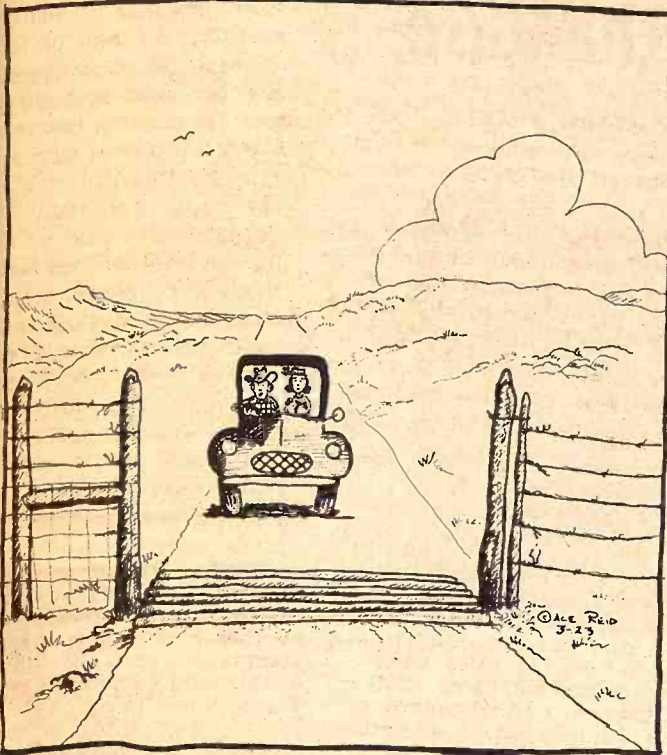

Kansas Only 7th In Hail Losses

The crop hail insurance industry paid U.S. farmers \$70 million to cover losses in 1968, Richard G. Muncie, Member of the board of Crop Insurance Research Bureau, said in a year-end summary.

Kansas, one of the leading hail-prone states, fared better than usual standing seventh with \$3,537,684 loss payments and a loss ratio (losses to premium income) of 60.56. Losses were particularly heavy in Cloud, Marshall and Mitchell counties, north central Kansas, and Cowley on the Oklahoma border east of Wellington.

Iowa and Nebraska led all the states in total loss payments to farmers with \$12,458,711 and \$7,320,176 respectively. Texas was third with \$5,908,475 loss payments and Illinois fourth with \$4,935,941.

The figures compiled by Crop Hail Insurance Actuarial Association, Chicago, include experiences of both stock companies and mutuals which insure for the full amount of the loss. The totals do not include government insurance which has a large deductible and insures only production costs.

Muncie recalled the May 13th storm of last year which covered an area 30 miles long and six miles wide in the Concordia-Beloit area of Cloud and Mitchell counties.

"Hailstones ripped into wheat fields decapitating heads and leaves," he said. "There was little left on many farms but stubble, a great many total losses."

Losses in the four mentioned counties totaled \$764,752. However, the largest payment by Muncie's company, KFB Insurance Inc., of \$25,891.40 went to a young wheat grower, Richard Pittman of Satanta in Haskell County, southwestern Kansas. Pittman's 800 acres of maize was insured for \$111,000. A Chicago reinsurance group, Rain and Hail Bureau, stood half the loss.

Farm mergers and the trend to large acreages often with irrigation under one operator is revealed in large hail policies

with liabilities in excess of \$100,000 and premiums of \$10,000 or more per policy. Farmers with irrigation plant both corn and maize for grain and silage incurring costs up to \$80 an acre. Hail is about their only hazard and a destructive hailstorm could bankrupt a young farmer without reserves.

Crop hail companies and government agencies are cooperating in experiments with cloud seeding and the use of rockets

fired from planes and the ground to prevent or lessen damage from hail. A conference of meteorologists was held at the University of Colorado, Boulder, recently in anticipation of federal fund allocations. Special planes capable of flying in powerful updrafts and down-drafts often associated with hailstorms and extreme turbulence distressing to commercial flights are to be used in gathering data useful to the airlines.

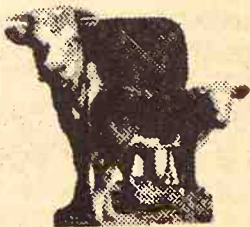

'Check-Off Promotions Often Don't Sell Merchandise'

Selling more farm produce thru mass merchandising methods isn't always an answer for producers of surplus and low-priced commodities.

That's an opinion of the American Farm Federation, thru its president Charles B. Shuman, in the current issue of the organization's national magazine, Nation's Agriculture.

Shuman sees a trap in check-off programs, which automatically deduct a small portion from a farmer's receipts for the purposes of promoting the consumption of the product:

Wrote Shuman:

"Farmers and ranchers have been sold a 'bill of goods.' The high-powered Madison Avenue advertising agencies have been fabulously successful in boosting sales and creating new markets for industrial products. Many farmers have been sold on the idea that these same sales-promotion methods can be used to boost consumer demand and cure the surplus-low price problems which government farm programs have created. A few supporters of bureaucratic supply management probably hope that this new panacea will divert attention from the failure of the control and subsidy schemes.

"Farmers caught in a relentless cost-price squeeze, are ready to try almost anything and advertising promotion has worked for automobiles, cigarettes, deodorants and hair spray — why not for milk, pork, wool and cotton? The problem is where to get the 'big' money to pay the bill. The ready answer is government-enforced check-offs to be deducted from each farmer's receipts.

"There are two of these compulsory Federal 'deduct' programs in operation covering lamb, wool and cotton. Research and promotion, when it is farmer directed and controlled, has been of great value, but most of the funds from the compulsory programs go for advertising. The lamb and wool check-off has collected over \$35 million in 14 years of operation. A look at results should be in order.

"The purpose of the program was to increase the per-capita consumption of lamb and wool in the United States and thus check the decline of the sheep industry. Sheepmen were told that they could not hope to compete with New Zealand, that the way to survive was through government subsidy payments, restrictions on imports and advertising promotion. What are

the results? Per-capita consumption of lamb and wool has steadily declined and foreign producers have obtained a larger share of the market.

"The \$1.00 per bale mandatory cotton check-off is of more recent origin but the 'take' is much greater. Two-thirds of the money withheld from farmers' returns was used for expensive advertising designed and placed by an agency which, of course, was well paid for its expertise. Despite the millions spent on advertising, in 1968 the per-capita consumption of cotton took the sharpest drop ever experienced.

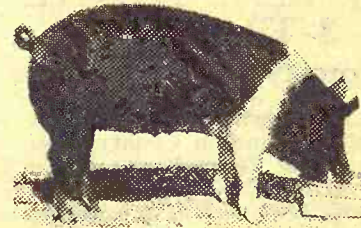
"Cotton's share of the market fell from 50 per cent in 1967 to 44 per cent in 1968 and, for the first time, synthetic fibers had over one-half of the market. Not only did advertising fail to stimulate consumption at home but export sales were down one million bales (25%). This disastrous trend cannot, of course, be charged to advertising; rather it is the result of a government program that

priced cotton out of its market and thus created a shortage of certain grades by cutting production. However, it would appear the millions of dollars spent on cotton advertising failed to check the decline in cotton's popularity.

"Why does advertising produce results for the product of industry and not for cotton and wool? Tobacco companies do not urge the public to smoke more cigarettes — they spend their money on brand name ads. Automobiles are sold by extolling the merits of a particular make and model. Advertising alone will not sell any product, as well demonstrated by Ford's ill-fated Edsel.

"The greatest market development success story in agriculture is the broiler industry where the advertising is done by the retail outlets. Consumer acceptance must be based on quality and competitive pricing. The sickness in cotton and wool is too deep-seated to be corrected by a razzle-dazzle advertising campaign."

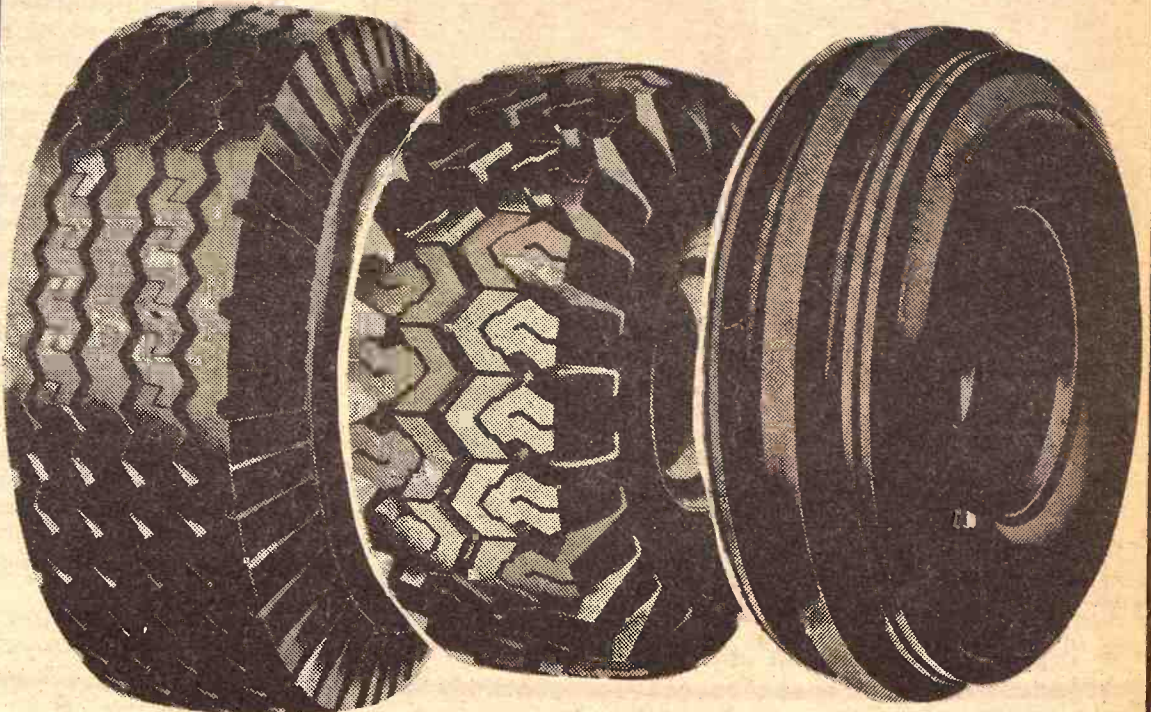

U.S. May Forget World Wheat Agreement Too

Agriculture Department sources claim there is a good prospect that the United States will go along with increasing pressure to reduce the minimum price for wheat set forth in the International Grains Agreement.

The IGA is a treaty among major wheat nations which sets up minimum and maximum price ranges. It took effect last July 1, but has had a stormy eight-month history because of much larger world wheat production and selling below the minimum by countries trying to unload surpluses.

Almost from the start some countries have been selling wheat below the fixed minimum prices, causing critics to charge the agreement has failed and that the United States should withdraw.

The IGA minimum prices for U.S. wheat generally are 20

cents a bushel more than provided by previous agreements. Under the plan, hard red winter wheat graded No. 2 — the main type sold abroad by U.S. exporters — is priced at not less than \$1.73 a bushel, delivered at Gulf ports.

Since this price is higher than that at which exporters can buy wheat at inland markets and move it to the ports, they are required to pay the government an "inverse subsidy" in return for the higher price specified by IGA.

U.S. wheat exports are lagging far below last year's level and may total only 600 million bushels or so for the year ending June 30, compared with 761 million for 1967-68.

Critics claim the higher IGA prices have contributed to the export lag.

Among the recent indications of discontent with the higher IGA wheat prices was Canada's announcement that it would sell wheat below the treaty price.

Some observers think Canada's new price may be up to six cents or more per bushel below the IGA minimum for some types of wheat. They also are watching closely how other major exporting nations — mainly Australia, Argentina and the European Common Market — may react to the Canadian price cutting.

Danger In Cures For Farm Tax Laws

KANSAS CITY — Some of the proposals advanced for correcting abuses and inconsistencies in farm tax laws could produce problems much greater than those deemed to be in need of solution.

So said Orville K. Sweet, executive secretary of the American Polled Hereford Assn. in a letter addressed to Congressman Wilbur Mills, chairman of the powerful House Ways and Means Committee, which currently is considering new legislation covering so-called "tax-loss" farming.

Sweet attended committee hearings in Washington in March as spokesman for the 52 member associations of the National Society of Livestock Records as well as the American Polled Hereford Assn., with combined representation of more than 400,000 registered livestock breeders.

"Conscientious livestock people do not condone the existence of any system which would allow (tax) abuses at the expense of legitimate operators," Sweet told Mills. "However, those of us who are close to the pulse of the industry realize the sensitivity which exists and the detrimental effect of an emotional response to highly publicized sweeping reform."

"The tax-dodger and the legitimate operator are miles apart as seen by the discerning eye, but they may be swept into the same net by one lacking the capability for discernment."

"Although we realize Senator Metcalf and Rep. Culver are conscientious in their efforts to correct inconsistencies, we are concerned about the results of such broad axe methods."

"We feel that the problems created will be greater than those we seek to solve. We are

somewhat amazed at the arbitrary figure of \$15,000 being used as a maximum for deductible farm losses in one year when an average feedlot operator encountering adverse conditions can lose many times this amount within a few days time.

"Our plea is that logical and acceptable measures are taken to identify and separate the legitimate operators from the gimmick guy in order that:

"1. We do not place prejudicial restrictions on the farming industry that we are not willing to impose on all other industries.

"2. We do not attempt to classify persons in America today by their accumulated assets or their motive or character by the amount they have to invest. The one-horse operator and the greatest benefactor may have the same motive; however, the degree of accomplishment may depend on the number of talents one has to invest.

"3. We do not impair the ability of the farmer to make a living for himself and his family by placing a fixed ceiling over his head concerning his farm income or non-farm income.

"4. We do not seriously affect the market price of farm real estate by creating an emotional response to a highly publicized tax reform program.

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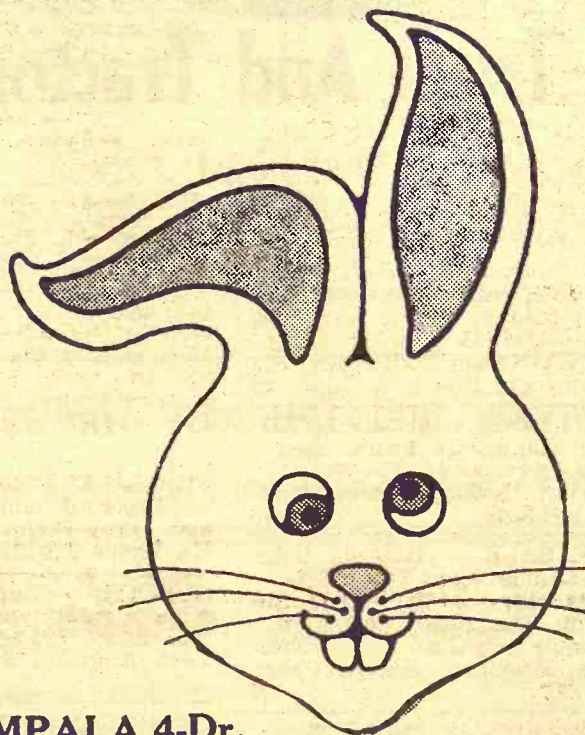

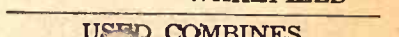

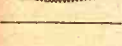

years "perfecting an agricultural policy which is . . . incompatible with the objectives of expanding world trade."

A key issue is the European proposal to tax imported soybean oil and cakes. Ioanes told a Senate subcommittee reviewing his department's budget. Ioanes said a clash would come if the tax is actually levied. No final decision has been made.

He said the Common Market's agricultural policies "are becoming noticeably unrealistic, even to itself." Officials of the Common Market "clearly understand that, if they do impose the tax, then the United States feel that . . . we will have no choice but to take countermeasures," he said.

"Our target will have to be European industry," Ioanes added.

"The community's decision on its proposed consumption tax on oilseed products will be a pivotal decision," he said. "If it decides to withdraw the proposal, this will be a hopeful sign that the community is beginning to listen to the voices of moderation."

Another Side To White Corn

Those high prices for white corn look pretty good to a lot of farmers right now. But you'll want to do some careful thinking before switching over to the crop this spring.

Three factors — expected price next fall, differences in yield and availability of markets — need careful consideration, suggests Don D. Pretzer, Extension economist at Kansas State University.

White corn prices soared from around \$1.35 - \$1.45 to more than \$2.25 per bushel in some parts of the state within a few weeks. But it may be a different story at market time next fall, Pretzer warns.

There are no future markets for hedging white corn, the economist says. This means that contract selling is the only way to lock in present prices for next fall's harvest.

Historically, high winter prices have stimulated overproduction in white corn the following year forcing prices down to near yellow corn. This happens because there is a limited market for white corn.

Yellow corn generally out-yields white corn by several bushels per acre. So it's a good idea to check these differences in your area, if you have not previously raised white corn.

Pretzer suggests that you talk to a neighbor who has raised both types. Or see the people at the nearest experiment station.

If differences in yield are very great, a considerably higher market price is needed to warrant raising the white corn, he says.

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LOOKING AHEAD

Many local elevators will not take white corn during the fall rush season, Pretzer says. This means hauling the crop a considerable distance or storing on the farm until after the harvest season.

If after considering all these factors you decide to plant white corn this spring, Pretzer has one final suggestion: Check with your seed dealer right away. Many dealers report their supply of white corn seed is nearly exhausted.

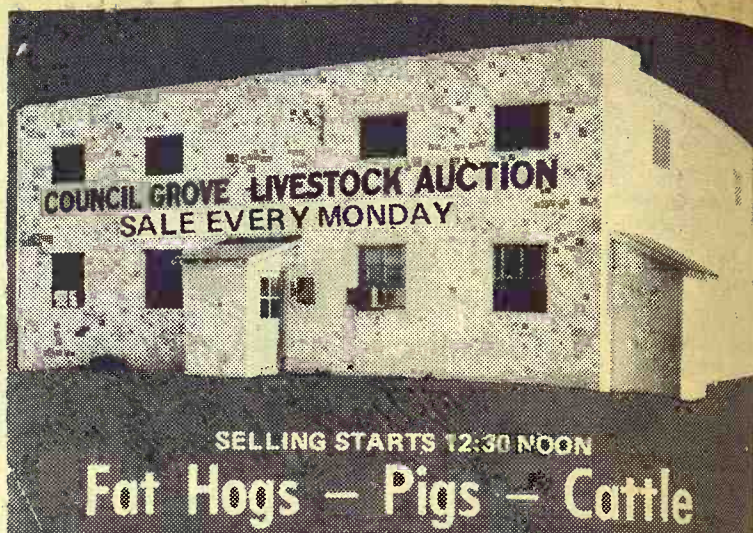

Marshall Again Top Milo County

Marshall County, with 6,528,000 bushels, was the top sorghum grain producing county in Kansas in 1968 for the second consecutive year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Stevens County's 4,969,000 bushels again ranked second and Nemaha County was third with 4,968,000 bushels.

Completing the 10 highest sorghum grain producing counties were Butler, Washington, Republic, Finney, Morton, Haskell and Marion.

Thirteen Kansas counties produced over 3 million bushels of sorghum grain in 1968 and 28 counties exceeded 2 million bushels.

The State's 1968 sorghum grain output of 163,325,000 bushels was the second largest crop of record, exceeded only by the 1960 crop. Of the 1968 sorghum grain, 36,246,000 bushels were produced on irrigated land and 127,079,000 bushels on dryland.

Highest Average Yields Per Acre

In Northeastern Counties Doniphan's 73 bushels per acre was the highest average grain yield among Kansas counties in 1968. Jefferson ranked second with 72 bushels per acre. Jackson third with 71 bushels and Haskell fourth with 70.6 bushels.

Fourteen counties had yields of 65 bushels or better and 25 counties averaged at least 60 bushels. Yields per acre on irrigated acreage were reduced significantly by greenbugs in many western counties, but were 80 bushels or more in 15 Kansas counties.

The state's average yield of 72.5 bushels per acre on irrigated land compared with 42.7

bushels on non-irrigated land. Combined effects of dry weather and insect damage sharply reduced yields per acre on non-irrigated acreage in many western counties.

Southwestern Counties Lead In Sorghum Grain Acreage

Four of the 5 top counties in acreage of sorghum harvested for grain in 1968 were in southwest Kansas. Stevens ranked first, with 144,000 acres harvested, followed by Morton's 114,000 acres.

Marshall, in northeastern Kansas, was third with 96,000 acres. Completing the top 5 counties were Hamilton with 93,000 acres and Finney with 85,000 acres.

Ten Kansas counties harvested over 70,000 acres of sorghum for grain. One-half million acres of sorghum grain were harvested from irrigated land, representing 14 percent of the state's acreage.

Two-thirds of the irrigated acreage was in the southwestern district of the State. The 3 leading counties in sorghum acreage harvested for grain on irrigated land were: Grant — 47,100 acres; Stanton — 45,100 acres; and Haskell — 43,700 acres.

Gove County led other Kansas counties in sorghum tillage production in 1968 with 156,000 tons from 15,000 acres. Reno County was second with 144,400 tons and Pottawatomie third with 136,000 tons.

The State's total sorghum silage production was 3,717,000 tons, harvested from 354,000 acres, with an average yield of 10.5 tons per acre. Sorghum forage production in Kansas totaled 1,187,000 tons harvested from 516,000 acres. Stevens

County seeded the largest acreage of sorghums for all purposes at 151,000 acres, followed by Hamilton with 130,000, Morton with 126,000 and Marshall with 103,000.

Planting of the State's 4,468,000 acres of sorghum for all purposes started ahead of schedule and was nearly completed by July 1, slightly ahead of average. Ample rainfall during June promoted good growth but scattered sections suffered from hot, dry weather during July and August.

An unusual greenbug outbreak, coupled with dry weather, resulted in abandonment of some acreage in extreme western Kansas and appreciate yield production in many western counties.

Killing freezes came later than normal and allowed most of the crop to reach full maturity.

Just Six Census Questions, Asks State Committee

A committee of the Kansas House has voted to recommend passage of a resolution that in effect would ask Congress not to put so many personal questions on its 1970 federal census form.

Explaining the resolution to the Federal and State Affairs Committee, Rep. J. W. Patton, R-Hiawatha, noted that the federal census, taken every 10 years, has some 60 questions that must be answered under penalty of law.

Among other things, the respondent must tell how many toilets his house contains, what "mother tongue" the family speaks, means of transportation used, and other "extraneous" details, Patton said.

The resolution recommended for passage would notify Congress that the Kansas Legislature supports a bill originating in the U. S. House that would cut the federal census to six questions.

The questions would be name and address, sex, date of birth, marital status, relation to the head of the household, and visitors in the home at the time the census was taken.

Winter Wind Damage Slight

The amount of land damaged this winter by wind erosion in the Great Plains totaled 610,090 acres in 204 counties reported, compared with 459,030 acres in 211 counties a year earlier, says the Agriculture department.

The survey by the Soil Conservation Service includes the period from last November 1 to February 28.

Of the damaged acres, 94.3 per cent were crop land and the remainder range and other types, the department said. Texas had the largest total damage, 387,820 acres, and Kansas the least, 5900.

The Wichita Chamber of Commerce will honor Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Nicks of Maize as farm Family of the Year in the Wichita area. Nicks farms 1032 acres, owning 80 acres and renting the rest. Besides raising wheat, milo and alfalfa, he has a herd of cows and a ewe flock.

In Kansas Aussies, Canada

Canadian and Australian wheat growers may find out what it is like not to plant as much wheat as they choose.

Both Canada and Australia are talking about acreage controls. For years the U.S. has been the only nation paying its farmers not to grow wheat. This has been done, of course, as an effort to hold down surpluses and bolster prices.

The effect of this over the years has been to make the U.S. a residual supplier of wheat on the export market — we could sell after other exporters got rid of their excess supplies.

Right now Canada has a carry-over of about 750 million bushels, nearly as big as the U.S. surplus. But the U.S. carry-over amounts to little more than half the record 1968 crop, while Canada's stored grain is the equivalent of a better than average yearly crop.

Australia too has a surplus — about 200 million bushels, more than double any surplus it ever had before.

Various proposals now are being discussed in Australia about restricting wheat production, but it is doubtful if anything will be done before the 1969 planting season. In fact, there may be about a million more acres planted this year than last.

The Australian Wheat Growers Federation is proposing a quota plan, an idea which has not gotten enthusiastic support. Many Australians are still hopeful of getting more export business and some simply think another drouth year will take care of a current surplus.

If either Canada or Australia actually puts a production control plan into operation, it probably will be thru more restrictive quota systems limiting how much a farmer can sell rather than programs of paying farmers to reduce acreages.

The U.S. has a voluntary wheat program, but to get government price support, farmers must stay within allotments.

The wheat situation around the globe is being complicated by the fact that the world had its greatest crop of this grain last year.

As a consequence, most ex-

porting nations have more to sell, but the importing countries don't need to buy as much as usual. The volume of world trade this year is being estimated as the lowest since 1964-65 or before.

try no compromise was worked
out.

"At your instance we have un-
dertaken a thorough review of

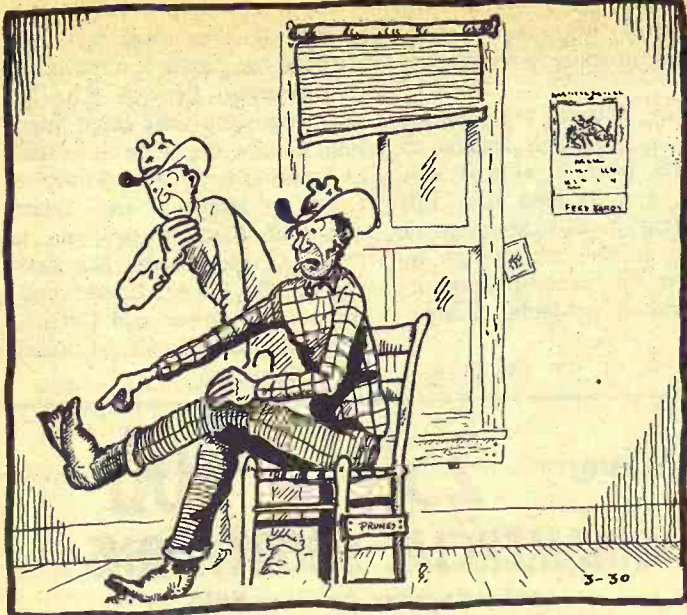

Big Feed Grain Diversion - But Still Not Enough

Farmers have agreed to take a record 38,900,000 acres of their land from livestock feed grains production this year under the government's price support and control program, the Agriculture Department reported.

But the report indicated wheat producers appeared to be lagging in reducing 1969 production the full amount department officials had hoped for.

The record feed grains sign-up for corn, sorghum grain and barley was tabulated as of last weekend, and compared with the previous high of 36,700,000 acres enrolled in the program in 1965.

About 17,100,000 acres of the feed grains sign-up represented the minimum required of participating farmers to qualify them for price support and other benefits this year.

Officials said an additional 21,800,000 acres were signed up as voluntary cutbacks for which farmers can collect payments on the idled land.

The feed grains and wheat program signups ended in most areas on March 21, but were extended to April 4 in 11 states where severe winter weather has limited participation.

Wheat farmers by last weekend signed up about 43 million acres of this year's national allotment of 51,600,000 acres, the report said.

Cotton signups, which ended in all producing areas on March 21, covered more than 14,400,000 acres of the 1969 national allotment of 16,200,000, the department said.

Citizens Patrol Working In Gypsum

GYPSUM — Citizens here have taken the law into their own hands. The move has the blessings of the Saline County attorney and county sheriff.

"It wasn't that we were having a crime wave here," said Mayor Dean Swisher. "It was

just that some things needed to be straightened out, and we decided to take care of it ourselves."

Two months ago, Mayor Swisher and the city council formed a volunteer "citizen's police force." The mayor says it

was "the best thing we ever did."

Gypsum, 20 miles northeast of Lindsborg, had a day marshal but no night police protection until the group was formed.

"The big problem was kids and cars," Mayor Swisher said. "I guess you couldn't really call them kids because they were 21 or 22 years old."

"The trouble was, they were tearing up and down the streets with loud mufflers about 2 or 3 a.m. and disturbing everyone. They were old enough to know better, but they kept at it, so we figured it was time to do something."

Under our city statutes, we can appoint any number of deputies who serve without pay. The citizens got interested and we deputized 24 volunteers."

Two volunteer deputies begin patrolling the town about 10 p.m. each evening. With the number of volunteers available, each man serves no more than one night in 12.

"We got lined up with the county attorney first," Mayor Swisher said. "We pretty well knew what we could or couldn't do before we started. He and the sheriff are going to come out and help us figure out some of the other things we've run into."

"So far, we've written some tickets and suspended one driver's license for a week. Of course, our authority doesn't extend beyond the city limits, but that one won't be doing any driving in town for a week. If that doesn't stop him, we'll suspend his license even longer next time."

Mayor Swisher also noted that small towns (Gypsum has a population of 400) are being

plagued by breakins and that the citizen force should have an effect on this.

"Assaria and Roxbury both were hit," he said. "We don't want to be next on someone's list."

"You know, with all this talk of law and order there's also talk of what it will cost. The small towns just can't afford something like that."

"We decided that the best law enforcement — and the cheapest — would be to get the

citizens interested in it; to know that they have a real stake in it. It was the best thing we ever did because it's working."

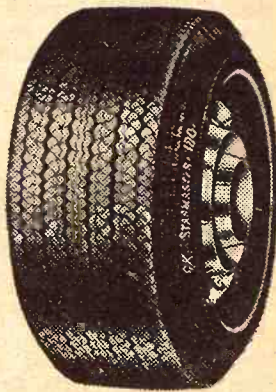

The Missile Defense System



ABM Plan Aims To Protect Missile Bases

President Nixon's revision of the Johnson administration's proposed Sentinel system has given the antiballistic missile project a new look and a new label - Safeguard.

The new plan shifts the defense shield from cities previously designated as Sentinel sites, indicated on map, to key points in the nation's nuclear deterrent complex - Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missile sites, air bases and the Polaris submarine base at Charleston.

Work will begin on two sites, Malmstrom and Grand Forks, first, and another 12, indicated on map plus Hawaii and Alaska, later. Sites will be equipped with both Spartan rockets, to intercept attacking missiles up to 400 miles from the target, and short-range Sprints, to pick off missiles missed by the Spartans.

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More Beef Output To Meet New Demands

LAFAYETTE, Ind. — American cattlemen will have to produce 26 million pounds of beef annually within a decade to satisfy demands of the nation's consumers, says Dr. L. S. Pope, associate dean of the college of

agriculture at Texas A&M University.

Pope, speaking at Indiana Cattle Feeders Day at Purdue University, pointed out that average per capita consumption of beef increases about two to three pounds a year. This increase is a result, he added, of greater feedlot output and larger breeding herds.

Noting that the midwest is responsible for nearly half the fed beef produced in this coun-

try, he said it is likely this area will remain a significant factor in cattle feeding despite pressure from large western feedlots.

However, he said the Texas Panhandle has been the most rapidly expanding area for cattle feeding. This area is ideally located in terms of the supply of southwest feeder cattle, cheap grain and a favorable climate for cattle feeding and mechanized operations, Pope ex-

plained.

Another important factor favoring the Plains has been relocation of packing plants close to the source of fed cattle, he went on.

As the demand for feeder cattle increases, we will need an increase of two million or more beef cows each year to meet the projected demands of the feedlot industry, he continued.

"... the future of cattle feed-

ing in the corn belt will see a continuation of extreme pressure from large commercial feedlots, chiefly on the Plains.

A new 'Beef Belt' appears to be emerging, stretching from southwest Texas to Nebraska.

"It is probable that by 1975 slightly more than 2000 large commercial feedlots will be responsible for two-thirds of the finished beef produced in the United States," he concluded.

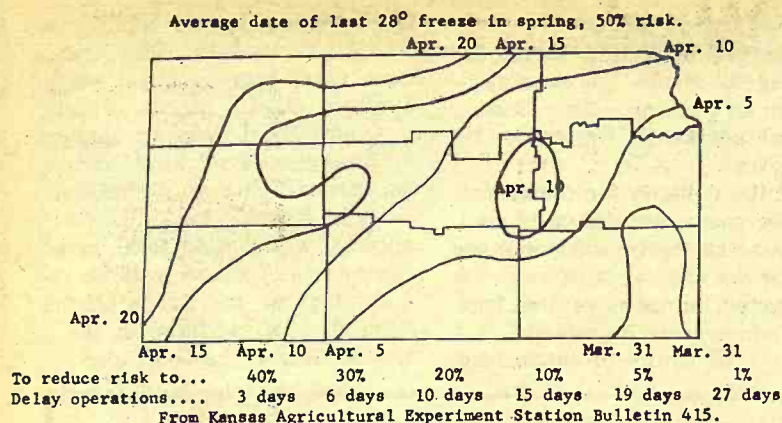

Record Entries For Salina Farm Show This Week

If the weatherman cooperates the Agriculture committee of the Salina Chamber of Commerce expects a big crowd for this big farm machinery show this week.

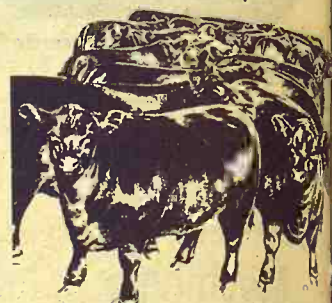

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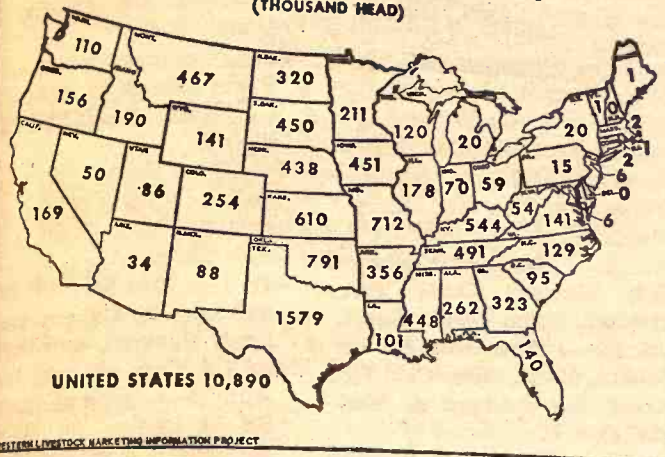

Farm Trade Head-Butting Over Soybeans

The United States appears headed for a major confrontation with the European Com-

mon Market over soybeans, an official of the Agriculture department said.

Raymond A. Ioanes, administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service, said the European bloc has spent the last eight years "perfecting an agricultural policy which is . . . incompatible with the objectives of ex-

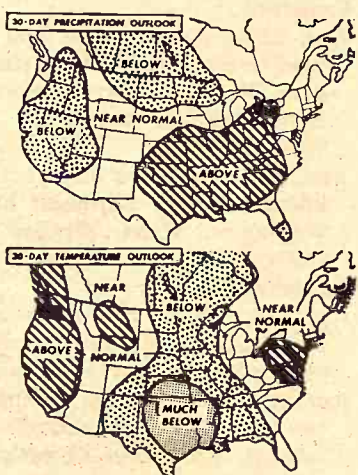
panding world trade."

A key issue is the European proposal to tax imported soybean oil and cakes, Ioanes told a Senate subcommittee reviewing his department's budget. Ioanes said a clash would come if the tax is actually levied. No final decision has been made.

He said the Common Market's agricultural policies "are becoming noticeably unrealistic, even to itself." Officials of the Common Market "clearly understand that, if they do impose the tax, then the United States feel that . . . we will have no choice but to take countermeasures," he said.

"Our target will have to be European industry," Ioanes added.

"The community's decision on its proposed consumption tax on oilseed products will be a

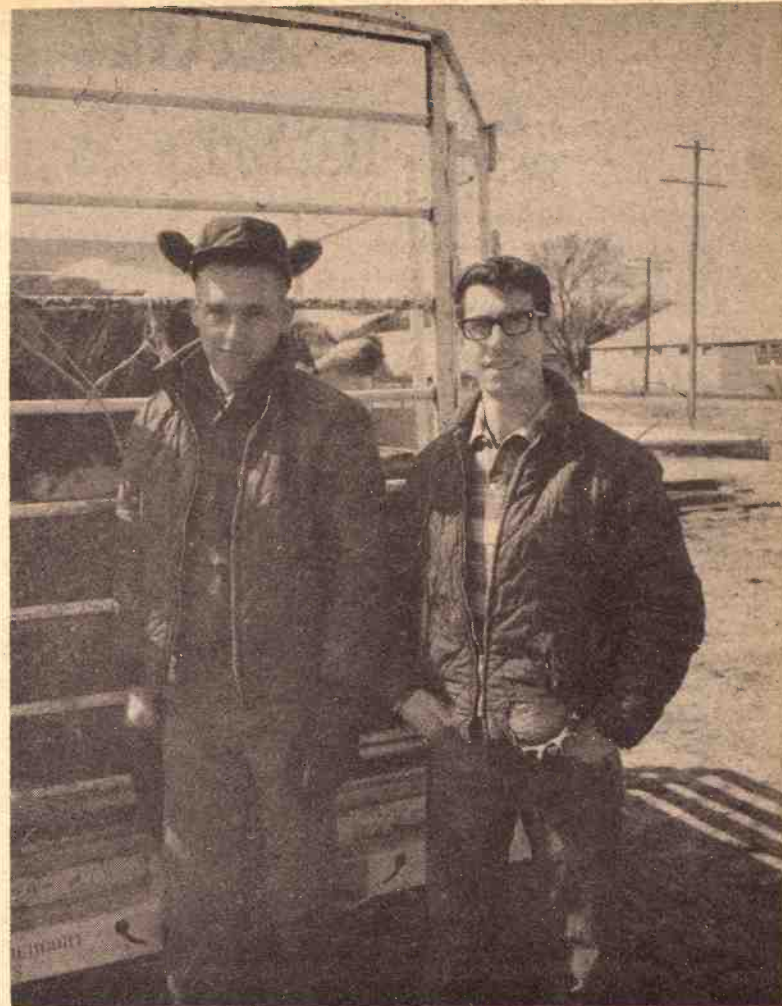

Meat Import Level Close To Quota Trigger

Clifford Hardin, secretary of agriculture, announced that 1969 meat imports subject to U.S. quotas are estimated at 1,035,000,000 pounds, the same as predicted in December.

The secretary is required to make quarterly estimates of total meat imports for the year. If the estimate exceeds a base allowance of 10 per cent, the President must impose quotas for the remainder of the year. The 1969 basic allowance is 988 million pounds and the triggering level — allowing a 10 per cent override — is 1,086,800,000 pounds. Thus Hardin's estimate is less than the level which would require quota action.

Basic quotas are adjusted annually to reflect U.S. meat production and consumption, which have risen steadily in recent years. The 1968 basic allowance was 953.3 million pounds, and the trigger level 1,045,300,000 pounds. Meat imports subject to the quota regulation — mostly beef and mutton — last year totaled 1,001,000,000 pounds, which was more than the basic allowance but less than the trigger level.
