## FFA Honor To Concordia Youth

MANHATTAN — An 18 year old North Central Kansas farm youth, W. Benson Keil, has been named "Star Farmer of Kansas" for 1969. Keil is a senior at Concordia High School and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis Keil, Route 3, Concordia. The Star Farmer honor was announced at the 41st annual convention of the Kansas Association of FFA House of Delegates. The state association was holding its annual convention in Manhattan in conjunction with

Kansas State University's 46th annual state high school vocational agriculture judging and agricultural mechanics contests. A near straight-A student at Concordia high school, Keil presently is serving as president of the North Central Kansas District FFA organization and he has participated in numerous FFA events during the past four years, including public speaking, farm mechanics, crops and meats judging and newswriting.

Keil started his farming program in 1965 with two registered Herefords and a quarter horse. He now has a program that includes 40 head of beef cattle, three Quarter Horses, and 80 acres of cropland. His net worth was estimated at \$7,561 as of January 1, 1969.

Keil will enroll in Kansas State University's College of Agriculture next fall. He plans to return to farming after earning a college degree.

## More Competition For Japanese Farm Trade

Exports of U. S. farm products to Japan last year totaled a near-record 932 million dollars, but the outlook for 1969 and beyond is for much tougher competition from other nations, the Agriculture department says.

The 1968 value of farm exports to the major Far Eastern market was second only to the 942 million dollars worth bought by Japan in 1966, the foreign agriculture service reported.

## Dog, Horse Clinic In Riley County

MANHATTAN — A companion animal clinic has been set here for May 12 and May 14. The first will cover dogs and the second, horses.

Dr. Homer Caley, extension veterinarian, and Dr. John Clifford, KSU School of Veterinary Medicine, will conduct the clinics.

The May 12 meeting will cover the care, treatment, and general health of the dog, including the nutrition and vaccination schedules for puppies. Dr. Clifford will also discuss the problems and care of hunting dogs.

At the May 14 meeting Dr. Caley will discuss the selection of a horse and precautions for young horses. Also discussed will be feeding tips, internal and external parasites, and diseases.

Charlie White, agricultural agent, said both sessions will be at 7:30 p.m. at Pottorf Hall at Ci-Co Park.

## HUTCH TEACHERS BASE PAY TO \$6100

Hutchinson will boost its basic pay for teachers next year by \$450 to a \$6100 floor for beginning teachers with a bachelors degree. With increases for teachers with more experience and more education, the average pay hike will be \$566.

Part of last year's large volume was attributed to Japanese stockpiling in anticipation of the U. S. dock strike which began last December 20, the FAS said. But a major factor was "competitive prices and qualities" of U. S. products, the report added.

Record quantities of corn, soybeans, beef tallow and hides and skin were included in 1968 shipments, the FAS said.

Two trends have helped Japan emerge as the best cash customer of the American farmer, the report said. The country's gross and per capita incomes have gained consistently, and at the same time Japan's agricultural self-sufficiency is declining.

This means, the FAS said, a larger demand for food. At present, Japan supplies only about 75 per cent of its needs.

But competition to fill this market has increased sharply, since Japan has embarked on a trade policy aimed at diversifying its overseas buying.

Officials said Japan has set up more than 20 trading companies in Southeast Asia countries to provide technical and other assistance to help develop production projects.

As these projects develop, officials said, more of the pro-

ducts can be expected to compete in the Japanese market.

The magnitude of the Japanese market for the American farmer is reflected in 1968 shipments of some major commodities. The United States provided about 2 million tons of the 2,400,000 tons of soybeans imported by Japan last year, and half of the 4 million tons of wheat.

During the current 1968-69 marketing season, Japan is expected to buy a record 2,600,000 tons of corn from the United States, plus about 1,800,000 tons of the country's 2,400,000 tons of sorghum grain requirements.

Corn has recently been a better buy for Japanese feed manufacturers than sorghum, the FAS said. As a result, U. S. corn shipments have risen while sorghum grain exports to Japan have fallen.

"In addition," the report said, "a bumper crop of grain sorghum in Argentina has attracted Japan, and arrangements have already been made for delivery to Japan of nearly 500,000 metric tons of Argentine sorghum during the present marketing year."

# Cheer In Coming Beef Market

One of the most important agricultural reports at this time of the year is the USDA report of Cattle on Feed April 1. It shows that farmers in the U. S. were fattening some 11,419,000 cattle — 7 per cent more than a year earlier.

While this figure promises that consumers will again have an abundant supply of fine steaks, prospective supplies of

beef are not large enough to cause any big decline in cattle prices. We will come back to this point later.

The number of cattle on feed in the Corn Belt (12 North-Central States) was estimated at 7,277,000 — up only 3 per cent from last year. But the number in the 13 Western States was 3,859,000 — up 18 per cent.

Steers on feed April 1 were estimated at 8,017,000 — 9 per cent above the 1968 figure. The estimate on heifers was 3,367,000 — up 3 per cent. The larger increase in steers is noteworthy, since the greatest percentage of increase has been in heifers during most recent years.

Fewer heavy cattle. The number of heavy cattle (steers

weighing over 1,100 pounds plus heifers over 900 pounds) was estimated at 701,000 — 4 per cent less than a year before. Most of these cattle will be sold in April.

(We combine each weight group of steers with heifers that are 200 pounds lighter because heifers weigh about 200 pounds less when marketed. Hence, they will be sold during the same months as the heavier steers).

**More mid-weight and light cattle.** The number of steers weighing 900 to 1,100 pounds plus the 200-pound lighter heifers was listed at 3,225,000 — 7 per cent more than last year. These cattle, together with the heavier group mentioned earlier, will be sold mostly in April and May.

Steers weighing 700 to 900 pounds plus heifers 200 pounds lighter numbered 4,205,000 — up 5 per cent. Most of these cattle will be sold in June, July, and early August.

Steers weighing 500 to 700 pounds totaled 2,866,000 — 15 per cent more than a year earlier. Although this increase may

appear rather large, it is no cause for alarm, since the marketing of these cattle — along with others not yet in feedlots — will be spread through August, September, and October.

**Marketing intentions and price prospects.** Farmers reported their intention of marketing 6,006,000 cattle during this quarter (April, May and June) — 6 per cent more than during this time last year. The increase in beef output, however, may be less than 6 per cent — perhaps no more than 2 or 3 per cent.

We can compare the present situation with that of the first quarter of this year. On January 1, farmers reported 10 per cent more cattle on feed than one year before. They also reported the intention of marketing 6 per cent more fed cattle during the first quarter.

Farmers did market 6 per cent more fed cattle. But the total beef output increased only 2 per cent. And cattle prices averaged about \$2 per hundred pounds higher than in 1968.

Prices of choice steers at Chicago averaged about \$27 in May and June last year, then climbed slowly to around \$30 in March of this year. Prices may range a dollar or so higher this year, but probably with a different seasonal pattern.

The biggest danger is that when retail prices are marked up, some of the nation's housewives will stage nonviolent "walk-outs" from the retail beef counters.

## Less Than Usual Insect Damage

With the crop growing season just getting under way in Kansas, the outlook is not overly serious for insect damage this year, according to Kansas State University specialists.

In their first insect report of the year, Dell E. Gates, extension entomologist, and Leroy Brooks, extension specialist in insecticides, say that a survey of overwintering adult chinch bugs in bunch grass revealed low counts which would not indicate that these bugs would be much of a problem this year.

Grasshoppers do not now pose a serious threat, a winter egg count indicates. However, the right kind of weather for a big hatch (dry weather in late May and June) might worsen the situation. A light infestation is indicated in the northeast part of the state.

Most of central and western Kansas counties are rated light while there could be a threat in parts of Sherman, Thomas, Graham, Rooks, Osborne, Russell, Barton, Rush, Ness, Wichita, Greeley and Edwards counties.

Gates and Brooks report no indications yet of overwintering populations of greenbugs. Texas and Oklahoma already have had some damage from these insects but the Kansas specialists are of the opinion Kansas wheat will escape without serious harm.

Pea aphids have been showing up in eastern Kansas. With the right kind of conditions, these little pests could develop to the point of trouble.

Only traces of brown wheat mites have been observed in wheat. Cutworm damage, if it is going to appear, should be showing up soon.

## Less Than Usual Insect Damage

Gates and Brooks report indications yet of overwintering populations of greenbugs in Oklahoma already and some damage from these insects but the Kansas specialists are of the opinion that the wheat will escape without harm.

Leafhoppers have been shown up in eastern Kansas. The right kind of conditions, these little pests could develop to the point of trouble.

Only traces of brown wheat weevils have been observed in wheat. Cutworm damage, if it is to appear, should be showing up soon.

## State Dairy Cash Receipts At \$83 Million

Kansas cows set a new record for high milk production in 1968, earning state producers \$83.8 million for milk and cream — another record, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service says.

In a summary of 1968 Kansas dairying, the agency said average per-cow milk production was 8100 pounds, up 300 pounds from 1967. The cash receipts total was seven per cent above 1967, and the highest on record. The new mark was set despite a continued downward trend in the number of cattle in the state dairy herd and a slightly lower total production figure. Production amounted to 1717 million pounds. Dairy farms averaged 212,000 head of cattle in 1968, compared with 221,000 in 1967.

Dairymen sold 1535 million pounds of whole milk to plants and dealers, also a record high. Average price per hundred-weight was \$5.15 for milk and cream, also a new record, while \$86,498,000 gross farm income from dairy products was the highest in 16 years. That figure included the value of milk, cream and butter consumed on the farm and cash receipts from marketings.

The value of all milk produced, including whole milk fed to calves, was \$88,426,000, the highest since 1952. Milk used on farms was estimated at 91 million pounds, compared with 98 million pounds in 1967. It included 38 million pounds fed to calves, 48 million pounds consumed as fluid milk and cream and five million pounds used as farm-churned butter.

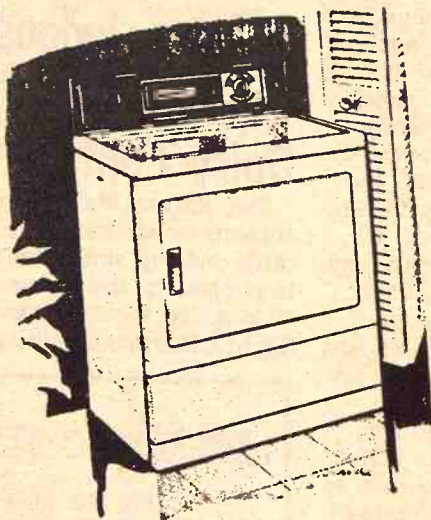

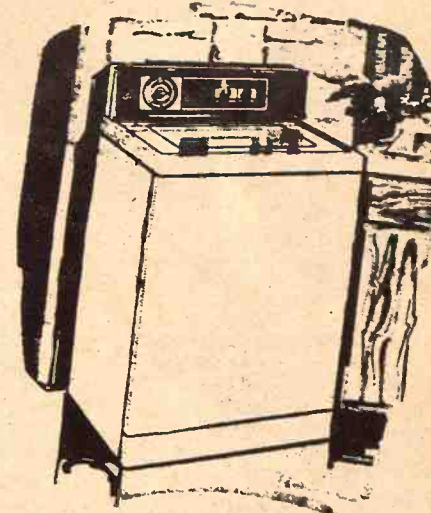

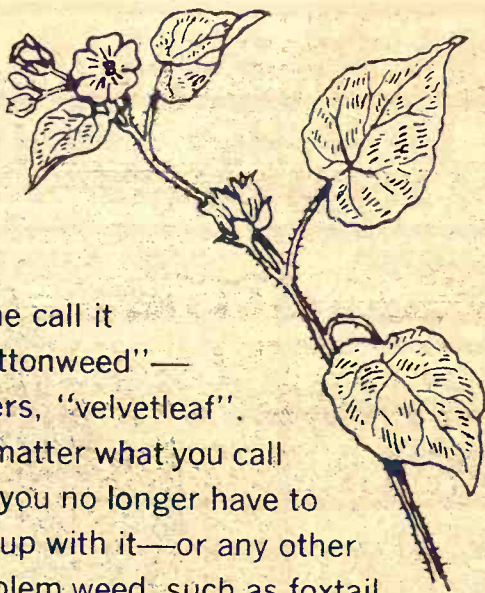

## U.S. Meat Output At Record \$12.8 Billion

Stockmen produced a record 12.8 billion dollars worth of cattle, sheep and hogs last year, a gain of 5 per cent in value from 1967, according to the Agriculture department.

Output of all meat animals last year also was a record — 58.8 billion pounds, compared with 57.7 billion in 1967, the crop reporting board said. Production was lower only for sheep and lambs, officials said.

Cattle accounted for 62 percent of the meat output; hogs 36 percent, and sheep and lambs 2 per cent, the same proportion as in 1967.

Production of cattle and calves was a record 36.5 billion pound, 2 per cent more than in 1967; hogs 21.2 billion pounds, up 3 per cent and the best year since 1959; sheep and lambs about 1.1 billion pounds, 2 per cent less than in 1967.

Actual cash receipts from livestock marketing last year were a record 15.4 billion dollars, up 6 per cent from 1967, the report said.

Cattle receipts in 1968 were 11.3 billion — a boost of 8 per cent from a year earlier — and reflected an average price of \$23.40 a hundredweight compared with \$22.30 in 1967. Calf prices averaged \$27.60 compared with \$26.30 a year earlier, officials said.

Hog receipts were 3.8 billion, up 2 per cent from 1967, with prices averaging \$18.60 per hundredweight compared with \$18.90 in 1967.

Cash receipts from sheep and lambs totaled 316 million in 1968 compared with 300 million the year earlier. Sheep prices averaged \$6.60 a hundredweight, up from \$6.30. Lambs were \$24.40 compared with \$22.10 in 1967.

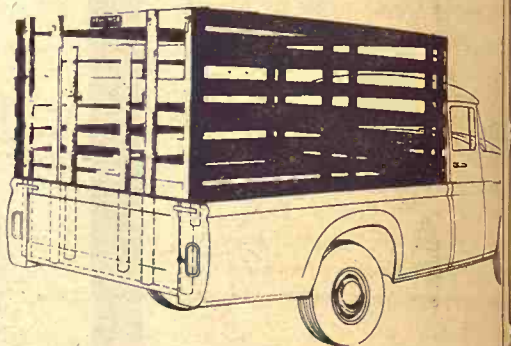

## First Of Trucks To Geary Rural Fire Districts

JUNCTION CITY — The first of eight rural fire trucks for Geary County Rural Fire District was delivered Wednesday to Geary County Sheriff Harvey Schmedemann, Junction City, who also is rural fire chief.

Mrs. Margie S. Howard, 311 Oregon, Hiawatha, wins this week's prize. She writes, "I am enclosing a recipe I have used for over 20 years. So easy to make and needs no frosting."

#### COWBOY CAKE

- 2½ cups general purpose flour
- 2 cups brown sugar ("I prefer dark brown")
- ½ teaspoon salt
- ½ cup shortening
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- ½ teaspoon soda
- 1 cup sour milk
- 2 eggs, well beaten

Measure the flour, brown sugar, salt and shortening into a mixing bowl and rub or work to fine crumbs. Remove ½ cup of crumbly mixture and reserve to sprinkle over the top of the cake. To the remaining crumbs add the blended baking powder, spices and soda, mixing thoroughly. Add the beaten eggs to the sour milk then stir this into the dry mixture until it is very smooth. Spread the batter in two greased pie pans or layer cake pans and sprinkle with the reserved crumbs. An additional teaspoon of cinnamon and a few chopped nutmeats may also be sprinkled over the crumbs. Bake in a moderately hot oven (375 degrees) for 15-20 minutes. Serve hot. "I often use a flat cake pan, oven 325-350 degrees."

#### KANSAS SWISS STEAK

- 1½ pounds top round, 1 inch thick

- 1 cup onions, sliced
- ½ cup carrots, diced
- 1 No. 303 can tomatoes (1-lb.)
- 1 tablespoon brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce

Spread steak on flat surface. Combine mustard and flour. Spread over steak and pound thoroughly. Sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste. Brown on both sides in hot fat in skillet or dutch oven. Combine remaining ingredients and spread over meat. Cover and bake in slow oven (325 degrees) for 1½ hours or until very tender.

#### PERRY, GLEN ELDER GET NORTHERN PIKE

Over 3 million northern pike fry have been stocked in Kansas lakes by the Fish & Game Commission, with most of them going into the Perry reservoir

and Waconda Lake, formed by the Glen Elder dam. The commission reported that its 1969 hatch was below expectations because of poor weather conditions during the spawn-taking period.

## Kansas Last To Get Water Plan OK - Partially

Kansas has become the last of the 50 states to have part of its water standards approved by Interior Secretary Walter Hickel.

Hickel announced that Kansas standards were approved with some exceptions with some problems remaining to be worked out.

Secretary Hickel, in a letter to Gov. Robert Docking, expressed his appreciation of the governor's personal interest and leadership in the development of the state's water standards.

"I believe our mutual interests are directed to the same goal of protecting and enhancing the quality of Kansas' water resources. In this regard, I am pleased that a provision to protect high quality waters has been adopted as a part of the Kansas standards," wrote Hickel.

Hickel said he could not approve a completion date of 1985 for providing secondary treatment facilities for 17 municipalities which discharge wastes into the Missouri River.

He noted that the state is requiring secondary treatment facilities for waste discharges along the Arkansas, Republican, Blue and Kansas rivers by 1975.

"I would find these schedules acceptable for other waste sources," he told Docking.

Hickel also withheld approval of the bacteriological and temperature limits for all interstate waters of Kansas and for the dissolved oxygen limits for the Missouri River.

He urged that state officials work with the Federal Water Pollution Control Administration to solve these problems.

He also noted that the annual state program plan, which the Kansas Environmental Health Services Department submits to the Pollution Control Administration for grant assistance,

will provide a guide to progress being made in implementing the standards.

## Revise Upward Forecast On Food Prices

Government experts are having second thoughts about their previous optimistic forecast that the increase in food prices this year might be held to between 2 and 2.5 percent.

The Agriculture Department is in the process of re-examining its earlier projections, "and it may be that we'll find the outlook for food prices will rise as much as 3 per cent over last year," an official said. This still would be an improvement over last year when food prices soared 4.3 per cent.

Last week it was reported that food prices went up four tenths of one per cent in March

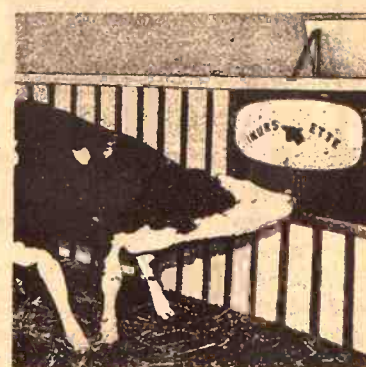
— a month in which grocery prices normally remain level. The previous month had shown a drop of two-tenths of a per cent.

Department sources say prices paid to farmers during the first quarter of this calendar year were stronger than economists had expected. This, coupled with continuing inflation in other areas, had caused the concern among some experts that their previous outlook for food prices was too low.

Last week, the Bureau of Labor statistics announced that the Consumer Price Index — including food as well as other items — rose in March by eight tenths of one per cent, an annual rate of 9.6 per cent, the steepest monthly rise in 18 years.

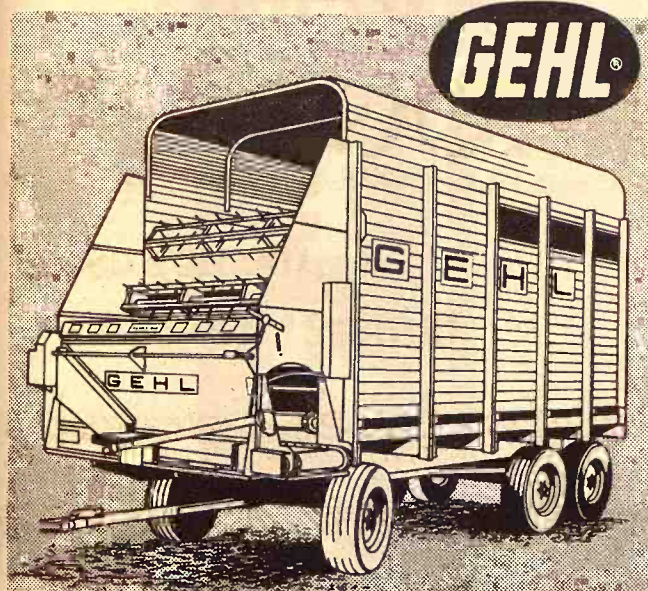

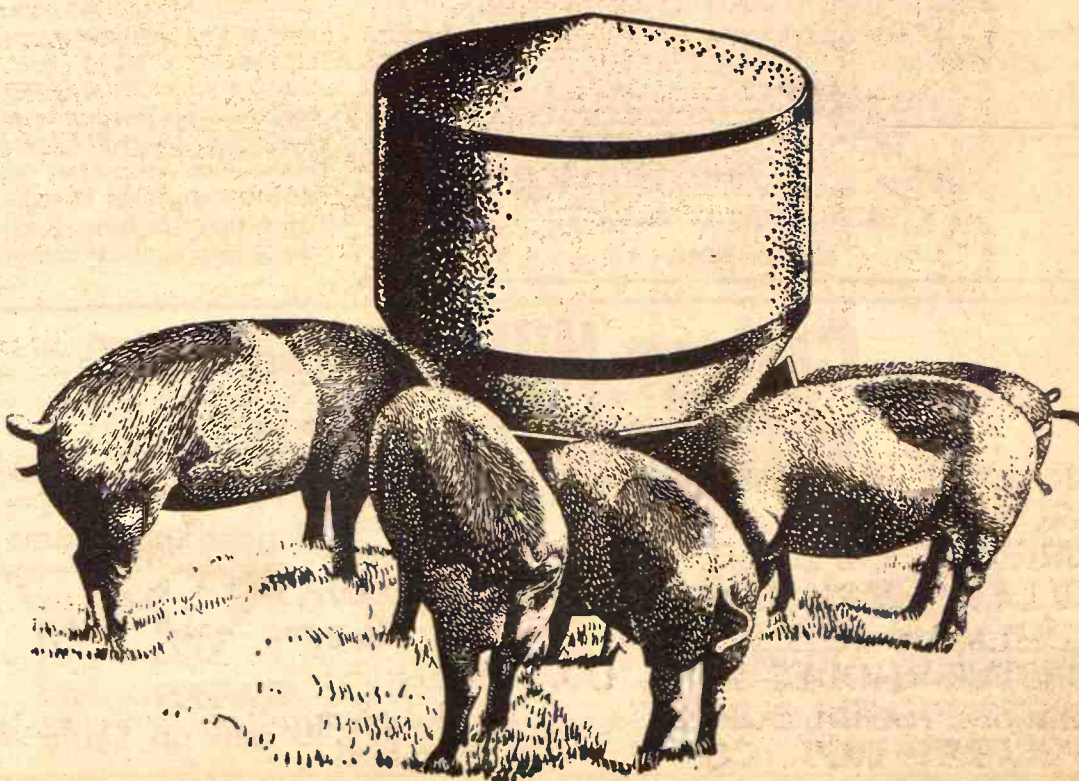

## Corn, Soybean Bins Most Full

April 1 stocks of corn and soybeans held in all storage positions in Kansas were record high but stocks of most other grains were at moderate to below average levels, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Wheat stocks were the largest

in 4 years but less than half April's stocks in the early 1960's.

Sorghum and oat stocks were the largest in several years but close to the 1963-67 average.

Rye stocks were the smallest since 1957, and barley stocks the third smallest in 15 years.

Wheat stored in all Kansas positions on April 1 totaled 195,309,000 bushels, 57 percent above a year earlier and the

largest holdings since 1965.

Off-farm storage of wheat was 163,618,000 bushels, 64 percent more than at the same time a year ago but well below average for April 1.

Farm stocks of wheat for this date were 31,691,000 bushels, 30 percent above those on hand a year earlier and largest since 1962. Rye stored in all positions totaled 426,000 bushels, 15 percent less than a year ago and the smallest since 1957.

Total stocks of the four major feed grains — sorghum grain, corn, oats and barley — in all positions on April 1, 1969 totaled 166,464,000 bushels, 19 percent above a year ago and largest holdings for this date since 1964.

Sorghum grain stocks of 93,255,000 bushels were 10 percent more than a year earlier and largest for April but slightly smaller than the 5-year average. Off-farm positions contained 60,590,000 bushels of sorghum grain were 32,665,000, largest since 1960.

Stocks of corn in all positions totaled 68,154,000 bushels, 33 percent above last year and record large for April 1. Off-farm corn stocks of 42,639,000 bushels were 40 percent above last year. Farm corn stocks totaled 25,515,000 bushels, largest for April in a half dozen years.

Stocks of oats on April 1 in all positions were 3,332,000 bushels, the largest since 1965 and 25 percent above last year. Total barley stocks of 1,753,000 were 18 percent above a year earlier but the third smallest in 15 years.

Soybean holdings of 16,731,000 bushels were 96 percent more than a year ago and a new record high for April 1. Off-farm storages held 12,903,000 bushels, more than double April stocks in any other year of record. Farm stocks were 3,828,000 bushels, also a record for the date.

## Many New Cars Not Ready For Driving

Consumers Union says that many new cars reach their buyers "in a sorry state."

The nonprofit organization told a Senate subcommittee this has been its experience in buying cars for testing from franchised dealers and is borne out by reports from subscribers to its magazine Consumer Reports.

"Pre-test inspection of our cars usually reveals from 25 to 40 defects and deficiencies in their manufacture, assembly, and preparation for sale," said Robert D. Knoll, head of the organization's automotive test division.

About one-third of 50,000 subscribers who respond to an annual questionnaire report dissatisfaction year after year with the condition of their cars when they got them, Knoll told the Senate antitrust subcommittee.

Knoll was one of several witnesses at the subcommittee's continuing inquiry into car repair problems and costs.

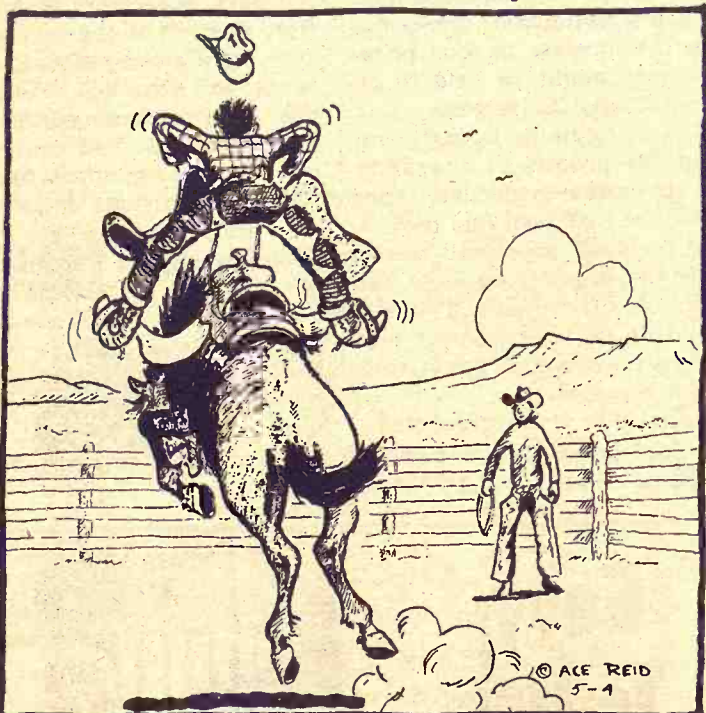

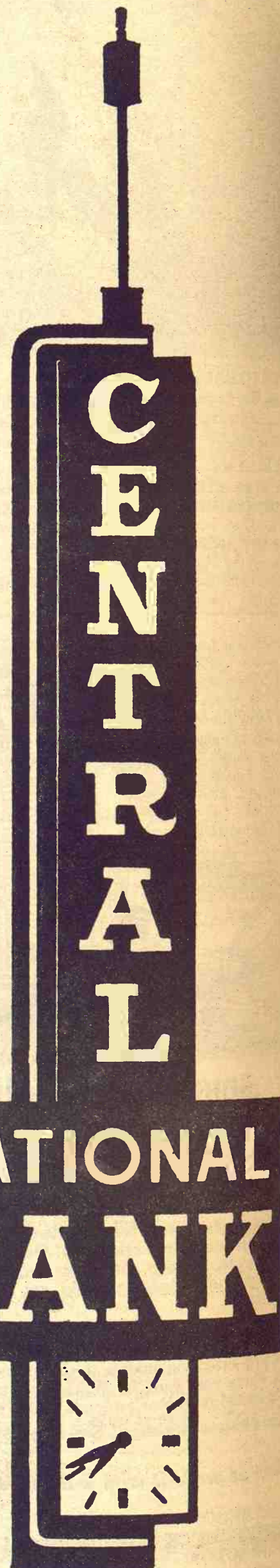

## Two-Thirds Of Wheat Land Is Not Fallowed

Kansas farmers summer fallowed 5,830,000 acres of cropland in 1968, or three per cent more than a year earlier, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said.

But the agency summary said last year's total was still seven per cent below the record high 6,279,000 acres fallowed in 1964. Wheat was seeded on 88% of the summer fallowed land, compared with 93% seeded to wheat a year earlier.

Wheat seeded last fall on

summer fallowed land amounted to 47% of the 10,886,000 total acres seeded, compared with 44% of all wheat seedlings a year earlier. About three per cent of the state's wheat acreage was seeded on irrigated land, while 50% was on continuously cropped dryland.

Summer fallowed acreage in the western third of the state was up 22,000 acres in 1968 from 1967, while the central third went up 134,000 acres in summer fallow. In the eastern third, virtually no land is in cultivated summer fallow.

In the western third, 86% of the fallowed acreage was planted to wheat while in the central third 93% was seeded in wheat.

In the western third of the

state, 79% of the area's 1968 wheat crop was harvested on summer fallowed land, while in the central third the total was 26%.

Wheat produced on continuously cropped dryland amounted to 67% of the state's total production. Irrigated wheat amounted to only three percent.

An average 41% of the wheat acreage seeded on summer fallow and 52 1/2% of that sown on continuously cropped dryland was abandoned in the western third of the state, while in the central third, abandonment percentages were four each.

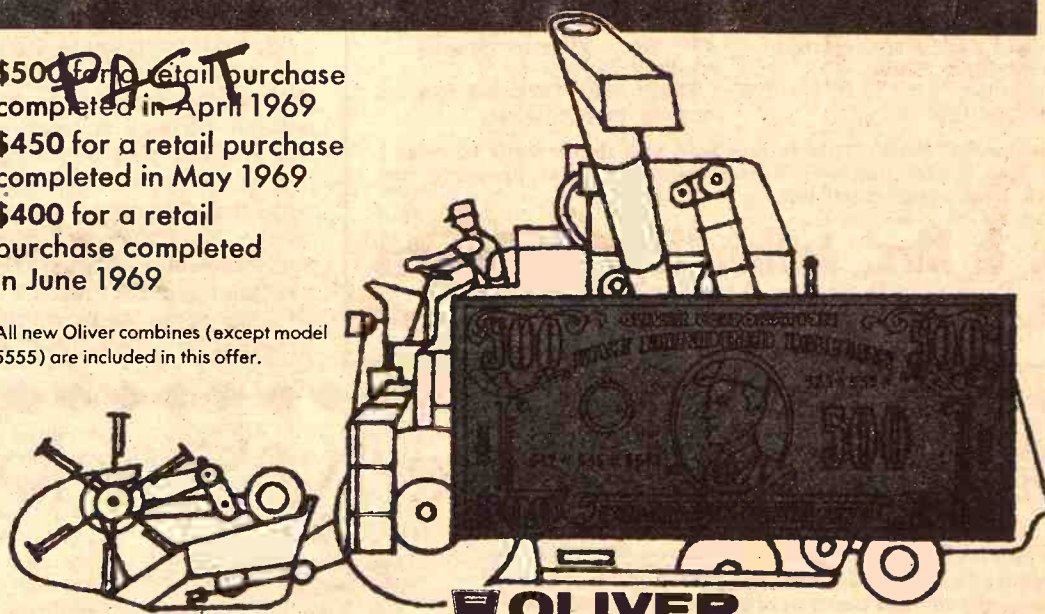

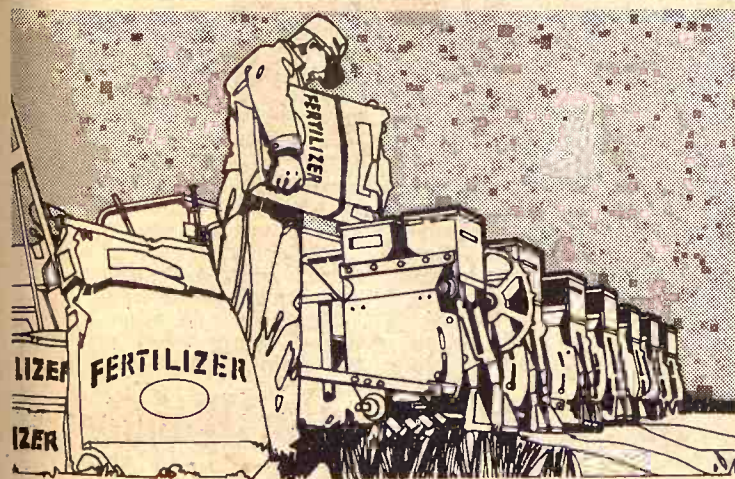

# Undeserved Reputation As Cyclone State

May 6, 1969

Although Kansas lies in the region of maximum tornado frequency in the world, its reputation as "the Cyclone State" is undeserved and misleading. So says Merle J. Brown, state climatologist for Kansas who maintains offices on the Kansas State University campus at Manhattan.

Brown's records reveal that 295 Kansans have lost their lives in tornadoes since 1916.

"This is an average of six deaths a year and ranks Kansas way down in 12th place among the states."

The heaviest death tolls for the period, 1916-1967, occurred in Illinois, with 1,016, and Arkansas, with 1,002. These states are followed by Mississippi with

946 deaths, Texas with 887, Alabama with 797, and Oklahoma with 788. The records show Missouri with 569, Georgia with 554, Indiana with 398, Tennessee with 373 and Louisiana with 364.

Kansas did rank first in number of tornadoes reported prior to 1961, but Brown says this probably was due to the fact that Kansas had a more efficient reporting service than did other states.

"Some states reported very few tornadoes during the early part of this century whereas we know, from accurate records kept since 1953, that they must have had many more tornadoes," Brown says.

Since an accurate system of

reporting tornadoes was adopted in 1953, Kansas has averaged 54 tornadoes a year, ranking it third in this category, behind Texas and Oklahoma.

For 1968 Kansas recorded only 25 tornadoes. There were no deaths and only minor property damage. "In fact," says Brown, "the last really damaging tornado occurred nearly two years ago when Garden City suffered one death and more than \$6 million in property damages from a storm which struck June 23, 1967."

Kansas' 25 tornadoes in 1968 ranked it in ninth place for the year, along with Michigan, which also had 25. Texas recorded 149, followed by Oklahoma with 58, Florida with 56, Minnesota with 39, Missouri with 30, Iowa and Wisconsin with 27, and Arkansas with 26. Right behind Kansas and Michigan were Alabama, South Dakota, Georgia and Louisiana, each with 23.

The greatest frequency of tornadoes for unit of area is in Oklahoma.

The low death toll in Kansas is due, in part, to the time when these storms occur. Brown points out that the maximum frequency for tornadoes in Kansas is late afternoon or early evening.

"Day-time tornadoes can be observed more readily than night-time storms. Too, the unobstructed horizon over most of the state, the awareness of the tornado danger by Kansas residents, and the relatively small number of populous cities are other significant factors in the low death rate from Kansas tornadoes," Brown says.

The greatest single disaster of recorded Kansas history occurred the night of May 25, 1955, when a tornado entered from Oklahoma and moved through Sumner and Cowley Counties, almost wiping out the town of Udall, where 75 lives were lost.

The tornado which struck Topeka on June 8, 1966, was one of the world's most damaging single tornadoes. There were 16 killed with a property loss estimated at \$100 million. This was approximately two-thirds of the property loss suffered in Kansas during 1953-1968.

"Even though most Kansans are aware of the tornado danger, injuries and deaths can be reduced through a more effective warning and educational program," Brown says. "This is why the Commerce Department's Environmental Science Services Administration (ESSA) has launched SKYWARN."

"This ESSA-Weather Bureau program is a concerted effort

of public preparation for tornado outbreaks. Under the SKYWARN program networks of volunteer tornado spotters are being expanded and the widest possible participation in preparedness programs is being developed."

Brown points out that the period of greatest tornadic activity in Kansas comes in May and June, followed by April and July. Tornadoes can occur in Kansas during any month of the year, although they are rare during the winter months.

Tornadoes have been recorded in all counties of Kansas, although the frequency is greatest over the eastern two-thirds of the state.

The "Tornado Safety Rules" issued under the SKYWARN program emphasize that when a tornado approaches, immediate action may be the difference between life and death. Individuals should seek inside shelter, preferably a tornado cellar, underground excavation, or steel-framed or reinforced concrete building of substantial construction. In office buildings and schools occupants should go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Auditoriums, gym-

nasiums or other structures with wide, free-span roofs should be avoided.

In homes the basement usually offers the greatest safety. Shelter should be sought under a sturdy workbench or heavy table, if possible. If there is a basement, shelter should be sought under heavy furniture in the central part of the house. Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to the storms.

In open country one should path at a right angle. If there is no time to escape, a person should lie flat in the nearest depression, such as a ditch or ravine.

## Hays Roundup Reports Better Milo, Feeding

**HAYS** — Progress toward aphid-resistant varieties of grain sorghum and excellent results from feeding high-moisture sorghum silage were revealed to the more than 1000 stockmen and others attending the 56th annual Roundup program at Kansas State University's Fort Hays branch experiment station here.

It was reported that the plant breeding work of researchers Hackerott, Harvey and Ross has laid the groundwork for resistance to the pesky sorghum aphid. This genetic material will be made available to

plant breeders and should be a stepping stone to aphid control in the future.

In the steer fattening trials, excellent results were obtained from ensiled high moisture milo. The grain was combined at the 25 percent moisture level, processed through a screenless hammermill, and ensiled in a concrete-lined trench silo. When fed with sorghum silage, three pounds alfalfa hay, and one pound of a protein supplement, the steers made an average daily gain of 3.15 pounds over a 99 day period. This was 1/4 pound more gain and 6 percent higher feed efficiency than the dry rolled grain check lot.

High urea supplements for high grain fattening rations were a much more economical source of supplemental protein than cottonseed meal and re-

sulted in comparable cattle performance.

A number of procedures to improve adaptation to urea were studied. This included pelleting with wheat and sorghums for wintering steer calves. There was a slight disadvantage in feeding urea supplements as a pellet instead of a meal. However, in wintering rations with a high silage component the substitution of high urea supplements for cottonseed meal consistently reduced performance. The use of an inoculant from a pre-urea adapted donor steer seemed to be beneficial in the early stage of full feeding.

Steer calves with an initial weight of about 500 pounds made wintering gains of over two pounds per head per day on a number of high quality fortified silages. Included were for-

age sorghum silages made with cottonseed meal, rolled milo, combination of the two, and rolled wheat. As last year, the steers tended to perform better when milo was ensiled rather than when fed the dry grain. The test showed that there are a number of wintering rations that produce excellent gains, the key is to have a quality feed.

An all urea protein source was compared to cottonseed meal as the basis for a range supplement for cows with fall calves wintering on a native grass pasture. Both were pelleted with rolled milo, prairie hay was fed; otherwise, only

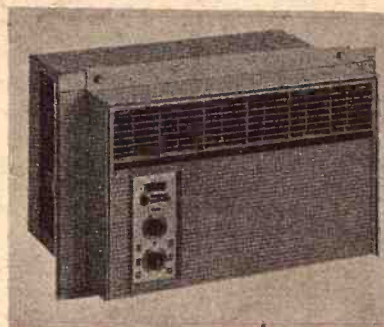

pasture grass was available for roughage. Little difference in gain of calves or weight of cows was noted; however there was more hair "bloom" on the CSM group by winter's end. Wintering costs favored the urea fed cows.

When cows with spring calves were supplemented with two pounds of cottonseed meal, made into cubes, from Aug. 7 to Oct. 17 there was little advantage in the weaning weights over the non-supplemented herd.

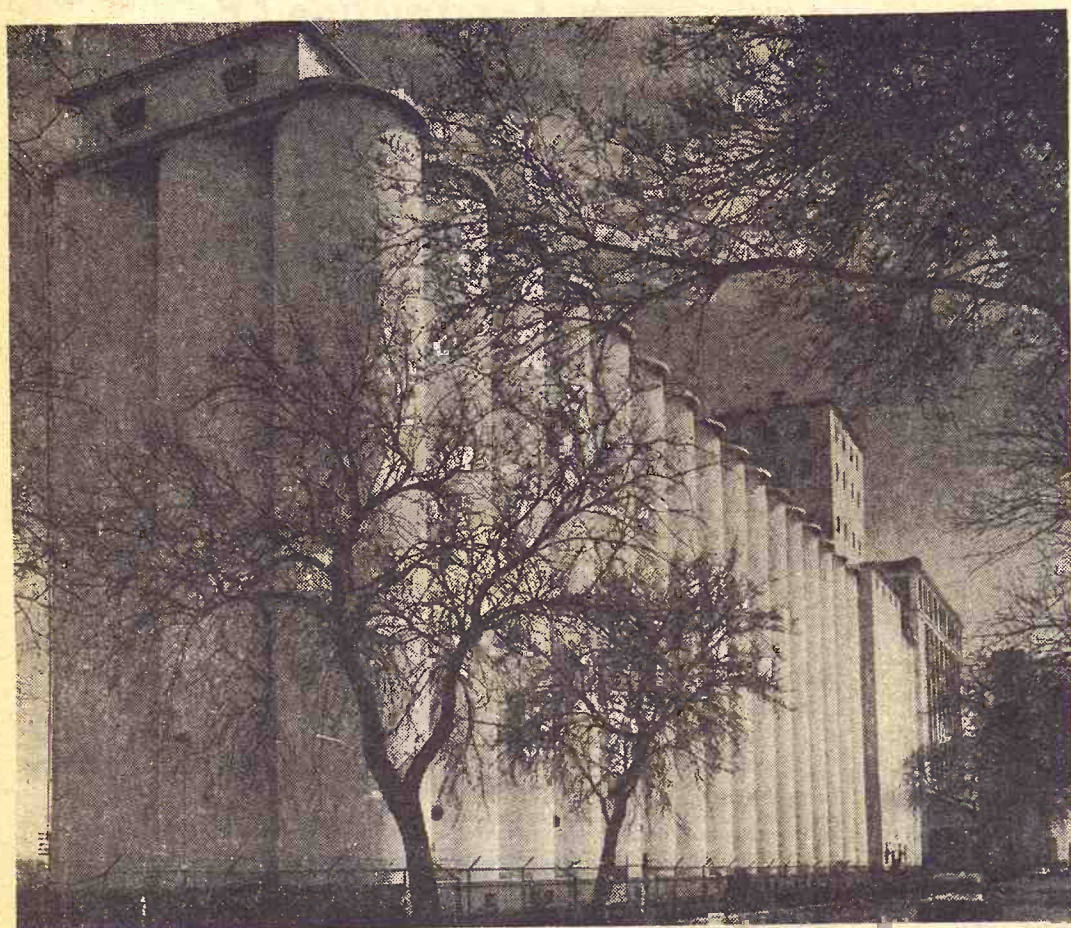

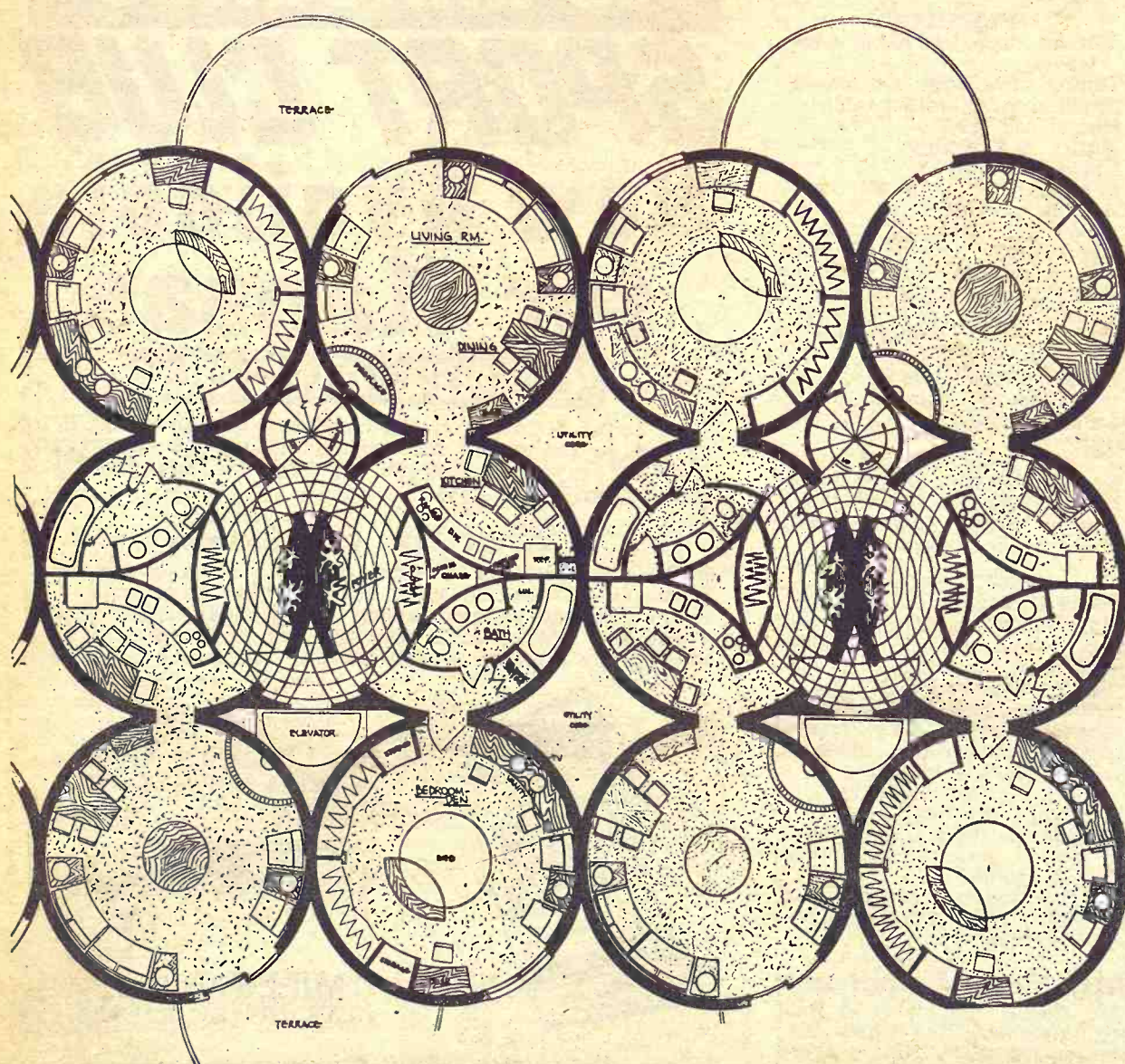




How the exterior of the high-rise grain elevator apartments would look.

# HIGH RISE

from a  
grain elevator

Unused grain storage space is not difficult to find, and there is at least one owner of some wheat elevators who thinks they might be better used for people than for grain.

He's Dwight Krehbiel of Wichita, who has had an architect work out rough ideas to convert an elevator into a highrise apartment building.

The particular plans were made for a grain facility at Wichita, whose 54 elevator units could be converted to 180 3-room apartments.

"The key to the idea is pouring 4 to 6-inch floors in the 54 tubes," the architect, Larry Roney, figures.

"The elevator is 10 stories high, but the problem is not as big as it sounds because of the repetition involved. You start at the bottom and cut openings for windows and terrace doors. Then install channel iron on the inner circumference of the 6-inch concrete and then set forms. Now, pump the concrete thru the openings onto the floor forms. The procedure is then repeated all the way to the top."

Elevators, stairways and utilities would be located in the spaces between the tubes that are called interstice bins. The "head house" for the elevator could be used for shops, offices, clubs, dining rooms or recreational facilities for the high-rise, Roney suggests.

Roney has worked out floor plans for several sizes of apartments within the 18-tube-long, 3-tube-deep elevator. Basically each of the tubes would form a 270-square foot "room" and the proper number of tubes would be connected to form an apartment.

Simplest plan would be to create 180 3-room apartments in a parallel fashion the length of the elevator.

The center tube would house foyer, kitchen, bath and hallways leading to a living room-dining room in one adjoining tube and bedroom-den in the other. Living rooms of the apartments would be on opposite sides of the elevator so that each would have access to a private terrace balcony.

"We've dug into this project far enough that we feel the conversion of the elevator into apartments could be done for a third to half as much money as it would take to build a new 10-story, 180-unit high rise," Krehbiel says.

It's a swell idea, Krehbiel thinks, but not for him. He intends to sell the facility at Wichita as a grain elevator by auction May 8 unless someone comes forward with the capital and idea to develop the storage facility for people before that date.

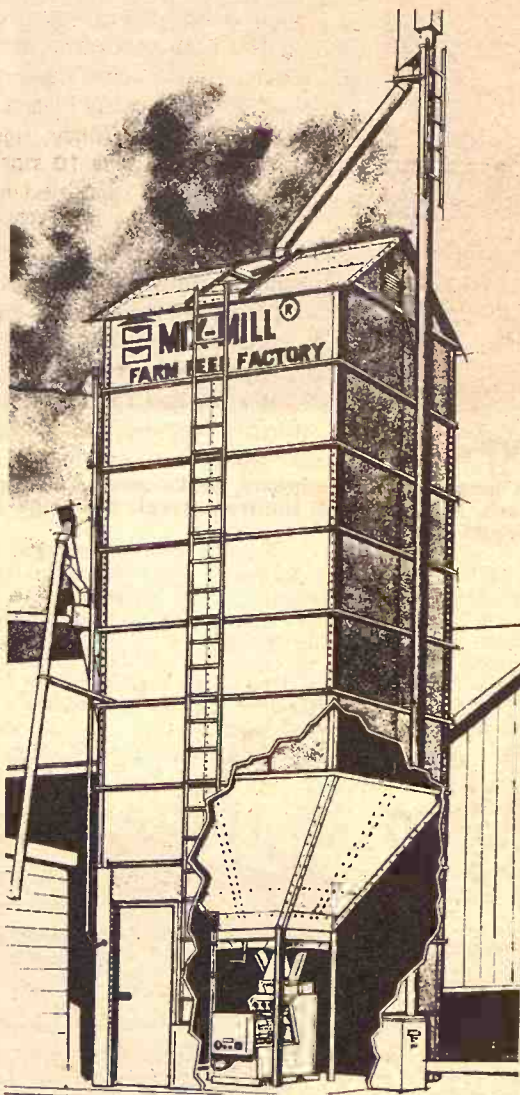

## State Income Withholding Tax Rate Too Low

The income tax refunds paid to Kansans so far this year are about half of what they were in 1968, indicating the state's withholding tax rate is too low.

The state director of revenue, James T. McDonald, said the state has processed 242,173 refund requests as of April 28.

This compares to 322,775 refund applications processed through the same date last year.

The amount of money refunded this year also is significantly lower.

As of April 29 last year, the state had refunded \$9.6 million to Kansas taxpayers. As of April 28 this year, the state has returned about \$5 million.

Kansans have their state income tax withheld at a rate that is equal to 10 per cent of the federal tax withheld from their checks.

McDonald said he believes the optimum state withholding rate should be around 12.5 percent of the federal withholding rate in order for the bulk of Kansans to pre-pay their state tax obligations as the withholding tax laws contemplate.

The revenue director said he is not ready to recommend that the rate of state withholdings be increased.

He said it will be June sometime before revenue department statisticians are able to sit down and analyze this year's withholding experience.

But he added that if the experience shows state withholding should be increased by two or three percent, he probably would make such a recommendation.

McDonald said the recommendation probably would be made to the joint legislative committee on tax structure, a special committee of the Legislature that is scheduled to consider state income and sales taxes between sessions.

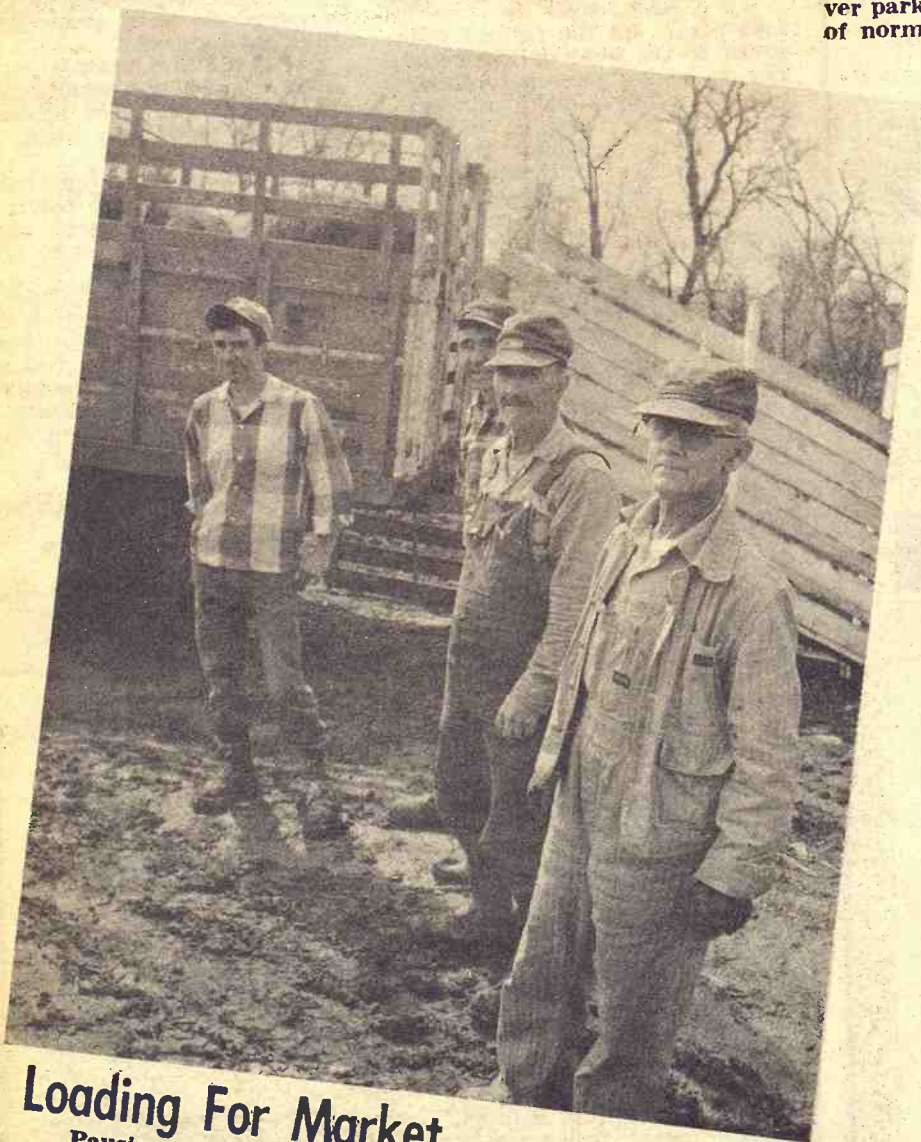

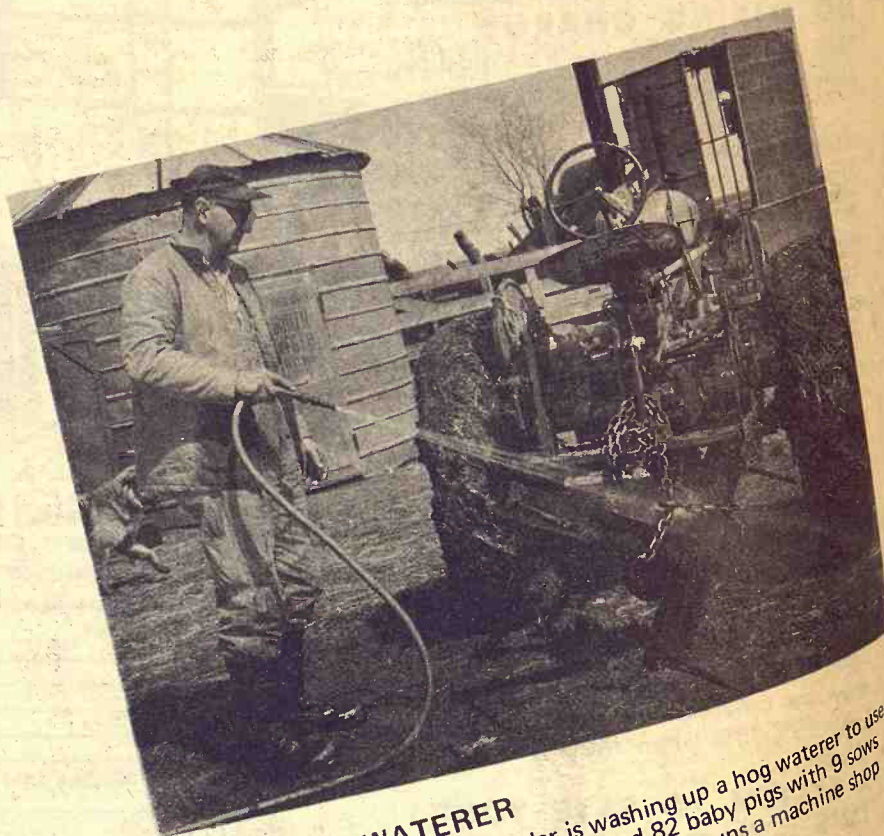

## Shortage Ups Feeder Pig Prices At Hutch Sale

**HUTCHINSON** — Reflecting a shortage of feeder pigs being marketed at the semi-annual Mid-Kansas Swine Improvement Association spring sale at the Kansas State Fair grounds, prices were higher than previous sales.

There were 2445 feeder pigs marketed compared to 3800 in November 1968.

Prices averaged \$24.50 per head at the spring sale, up from the \$19.50 per head average of last November.

Total sales receipts were near \$59,400 for the 2445 head of feeder pigs, which averaged about 60 pounds.

The top-selling lot was offered by Gerald Simons, Nashville, who accepted a bid of \$29 each from Scott Hughs, Scott City.

Tying for the top spot with

Simons was Bill Becker, a Cunningham swine producer, who also received \$29 per head from Steve Longnecker, Burns.

The high prices reflected the greater demand for feeder pigs and the lesser number available, Gene Sturgeon said.

"We could have sold more if we had had them," Ed Clarke, Lyons, said.

The price was higher than the March average of \$20.10 set at the Kingman Feeder Pig Association sale which is held the first Tuesday of September and

March at Kingman.

At the Mid-Kansas Swine Improvement Sale prices ran between a low of \$17.50 per head to the high of \$29. Average was about \$24.50 per head.

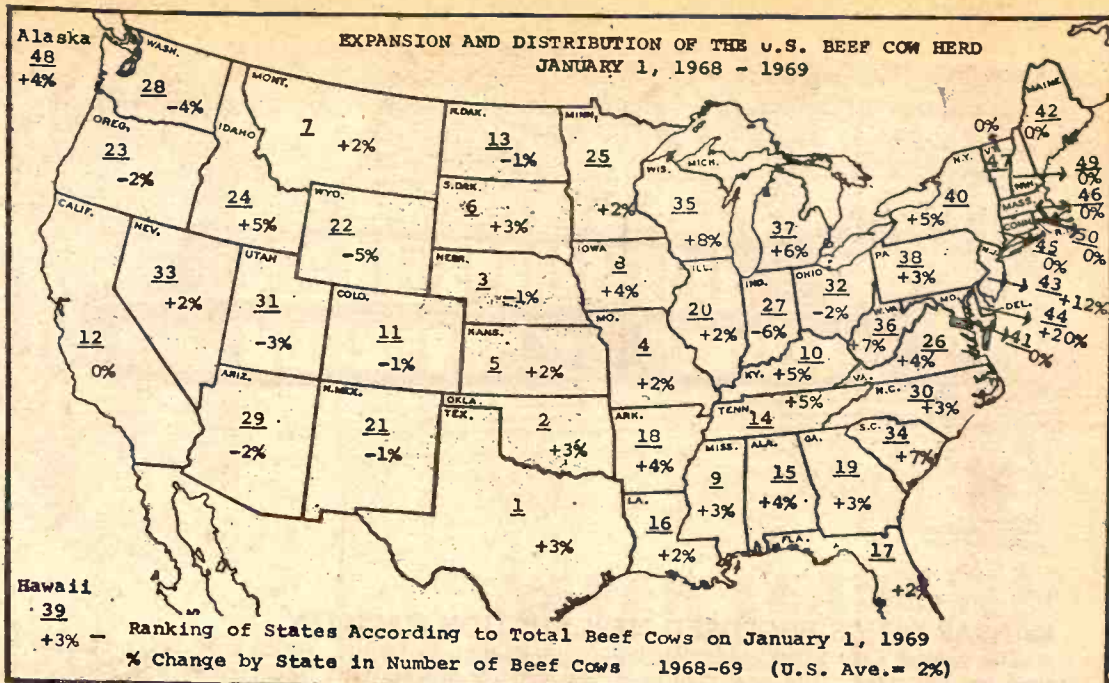
Auctioneer was Larry Geifer, Cheney, assisted by John Nagel and Gene Rutherford, Reno County agents.

More than 80 buyers were on hand to keep bids moving vigorously during the afternoon sale.

The pigs were consigned primarily from three counties — Reno, Pratt, and Kingman — with a few head also coming from Rice and Stafford counties.

The association, composed of 185 members in the Central Kansas area, semi-annually holds the largest feeder pig sales in the state.

Sales are held the first Thursday of May and then again in November.

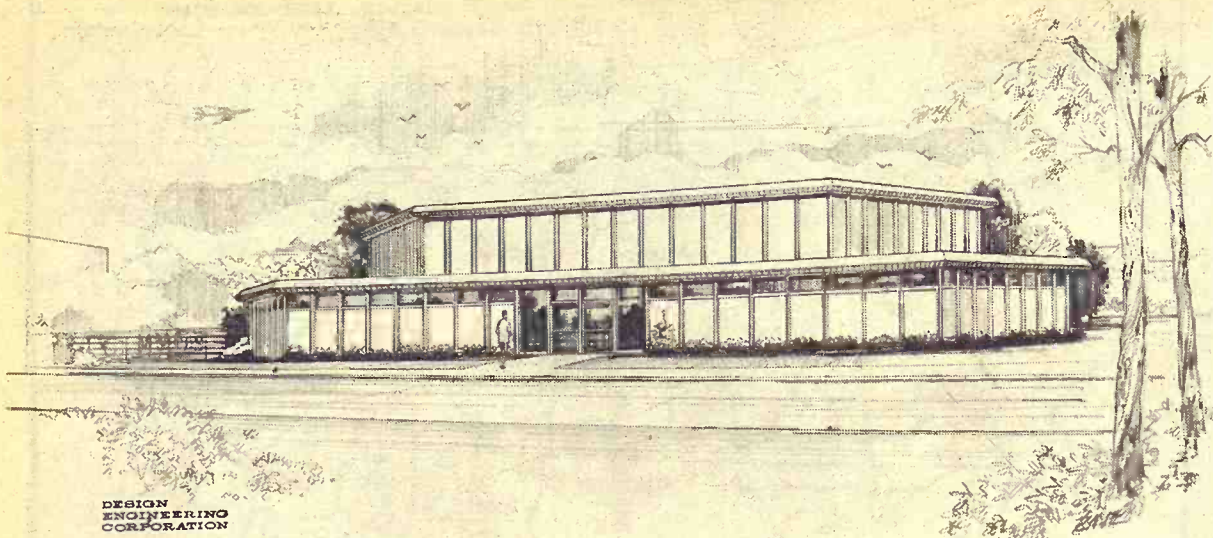

### KANSAS CITY'S PROPOSED NEW AUCTION FACILITY

The Kansas City Stockyards will build a new auction facility, which may be completed in time for fall sales. The new facility is designed for stocker and feeder cattle and calves and will be just west of the Livestock Exchange Building and a quarter-mile north of the present auction barn.

Kansas City Stockyards added auction selling in 1957. Last year's sales were 260,000 head. A Wednesday cattle sale for all classes, especially for small consignments, was started in 1968.

The present auction barn and some pens will be preserved for use, among other things, as a supplement to present American Royal building facilities for the fall livestock and horse show.

### Valiant Fights Back With Price Cut

Chrysler Corp. cut the prices

of its lowest priced car line, the Plymouth Valiant, touching off the possibility of industry-wide price cuts. The cuts ranged from \$167 to \$193.

Ford, General Motors and American Motors said they had no plans for similar price slash-

es, but Chrysler's surprise move appeared certain to have widespread effects on the auto market.

Glenn E. White, Chrysler vice president, said the price cuts were designed to "keep the Valiant competitive."

He parried questions as to whether the advent of Ford's subcompact car, the Maverick, which hit the sales market Apr. 17, had cut into Valiant's market and made the slash necessary.

The 3.4 percent reduction for two-door, six-cylinder Valiants brought the new figure to \$2095 — \$99 more than the advertised base price of Ford's Maverick.

For Valiant's 170 cubic inch, six-cylinder engine, here is how the price cuts went: V100 2 door sedan, down \$193, \$2093; V100 4-

door sedan, \$180, \$2154; Signet 2 door sedan, \$180, \$2253; and Signet 4 door sedan \$167, \$2313. Reductions in the 8-cylinder line varied from \$167 to \$193.

A survey of auto sales showed that Valiant was having the fight of its life in the so-called family small car market — one of the hottest segments of the auto market.

### LACROSSE MAY HAVE BARBED WIRE MUSEUM

LaCrosse is becoming the barbed wire capital of the country thru efforts of Bill Robbins, LaCrosse banker and president of the Kansas Barbed Wire Collectors Association.

Robbins is talking of developing a world museum of barbed wire in LaCrosse. Robbins says he hopes major manufacturers of barbed wire may be interested in preserving the history of their product and offer support for establishing the world museum at LaCrosse.

One major steel company which produces barbed wire has indicated an interest in sponsoring barbed wire splicing contests at all of the major fairs in the country and bringing the winners to LaCrosse annually for a final contest.

Robbins said a Texas barbed wire collector and author, Jack Glover of Crystal Beach, is attempting to organize an international barbed wire collectors association. Glover has asked LaCrosse to be host to the international event, Robbins said.

"We were second in the nation to form an association. Texas had theirs before we did. How far this thing will go, we just don't know. The only concern I have is how long barbed wire will be a collectors' objective. Older collectors have already gotten all 600 patented wires and are branching out to other things like collecting insulators and catalogs.

"We never thought this thing (the Kansas association and convention) would become sizable, but each year it has doubled."

Robbins said the Kansas association has members from 18 states. More than 200 collectors from 15 states attended the 1968 convention.

The Kansas Barbed Wire Collectors Association gained national attention about one and a half years ago when its first president, LaCrosse attorney Ivan Krug, appeared on the Tonight Show with Johnny Carson.

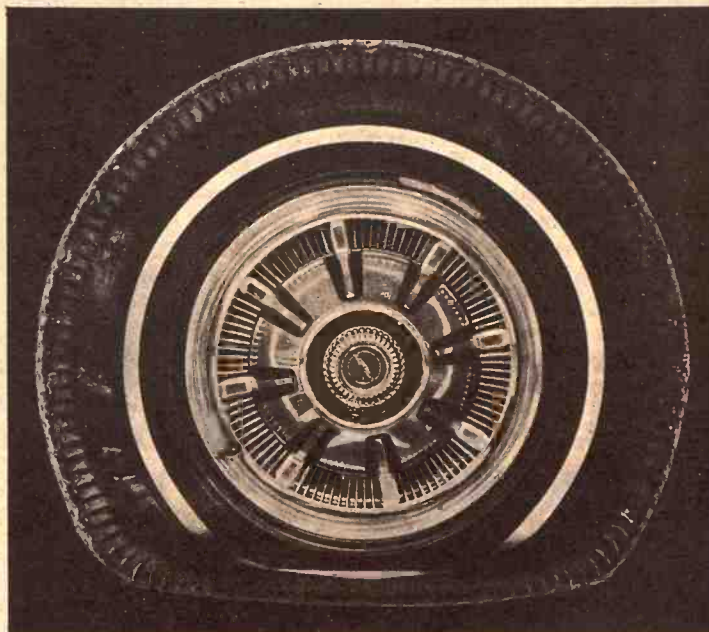

## Highway Patrol Head Seeking Black Troopers

TOPEKA — Col. Robert N. Woodson says he plans to launch a concentrated recruiting campaign to attract qualified Negroes to the all-white Kansas Highway Patrol.

None of the patrol's 291 officers and men is black. The patrol employs only one minority group member as a trooper and he is a Mexican-American who joined the patrol last year.

Woodson, superintendent of the KHP, is anxious to bring black troopers to the patrol, possibly as many as 10 this year.

The 1969 session of the Kansas Legislature authorized the patrol's strength to be increased by 15 troopers in fiscal 1970 beginning July 1.

In addition, there are 11 vacancies from resignations and retirements.

Woodson said he plans to consult with Lt. Tim Edwards, the KHP's safety and training officer, to work out a plan for recruiting minority group members.

"We're going to try. We've got to do something. I've asked the division officers to spread the word to all our troopers to see

"We can get some good Negroes to apply," Woodson said. "The thing we've got to do is convince these people that we want them and they're going to be treated right," he added.

The superintendent said he plans to talk with Homer Floyd, executive director of the Kansas Commission on Civil Rights in an effort to formulate methods of reaching the state's Negro community.

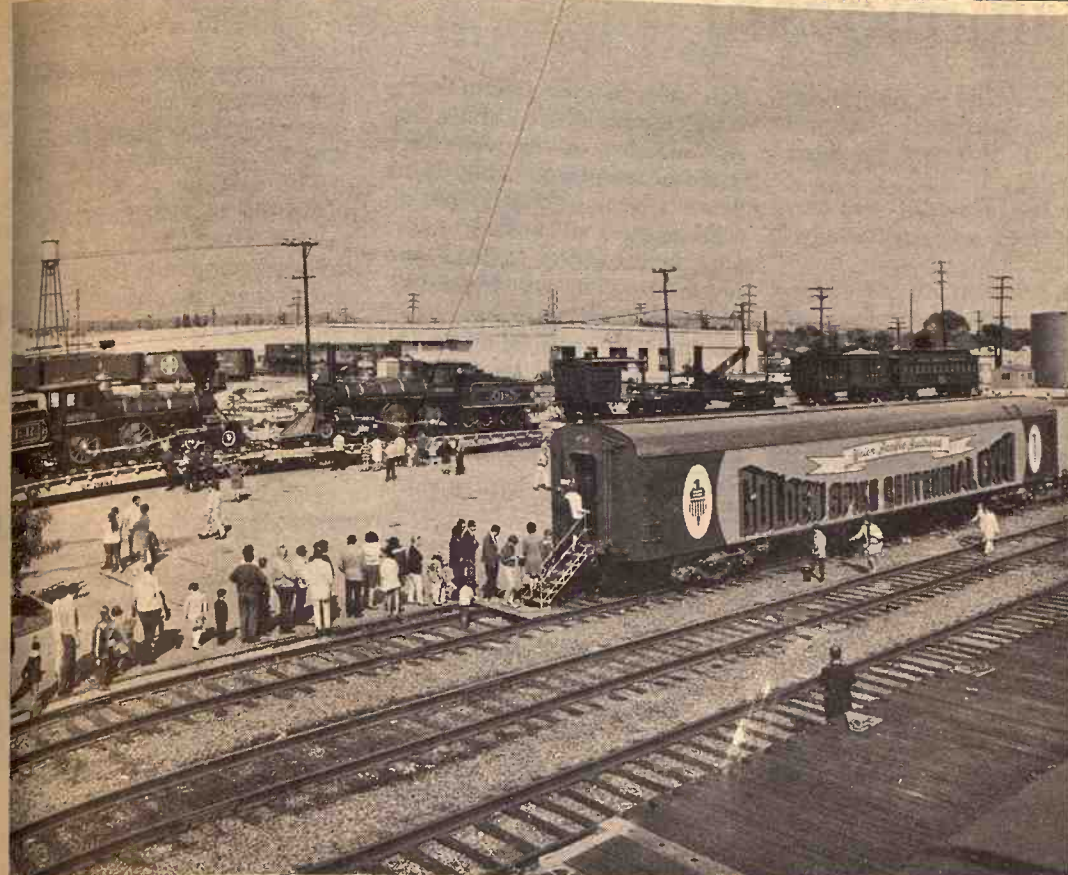

# Australia Rough For U.S. Immigrant

"The last 10 years have been the best years of my life," said Stanley Yankus, \$68-a-week electrical appliance salesman and Australia's best-known American immigrant.

Ten years ago, Yankus was the most publicized chicken farmer in Michigan and perhaps in the world because he gave up on the United States in dis-

gust, and moved his family to this continent "down under."

Federal acreage controls were the things that bugged Yankus. He wanted to use a greater part of his 100-acre chicken farm in Dowagiac, Mich., to grow wheat for chicken feed.

The government said no. Yankus went ahead anyway and was fined \$5070. He angrily packed up his family and headed for Adelaide, on Australia's south coast.

At 50, the husky, bespectacled Yankus is still there, living in the suburb of Grange with his wife, Mildred; sons Russell, 23, and Dennis, 21, and daughter Karen, 13. His sales job is the third he has held since emigrating, and his \$68 base salary is \$4.35 under Australia's average weekly wage.

The saga of Stanley Yankus is not unique, but it is exceptional. Few Americans emigrate to Australia — 2700 in 1967, the same year that 1700 Australians moved to the United States. But Yankus says he has no regrets about his long flight from U.S. governmental controls.

One-fourth of the Americans who do emigrate here, however, return home disillusioned — a higher percentage of returnees than for any other national group. They grumble about low wages, high prices and high taxes, a rigid social structure and the Australian version of bureaucratic controls.

Yankus has become an Australian citizen, and his daughter has applied for citizenship. The others in the family are still U.S. citizens.

His first job in Australia was as a \$38-a-week clerk in a factory. He quickly abandoned the idea of starting a chicken farm because of the expense.

Yankus made a 2-week inspection visit to Australia before bringing his family here. So did the Thomas Enright, who emigrated to Brisbane from Chicago in March. The Aus-

tralian government helped to pay the cost of emigration in each instance. It is called "assisted passage."

When the inspection was over, Yankus told an Australian newsman: "Your wages are very low, manufactured goods cost more and food prices are only slightly cheaper than in the United States."



On the way to Australia about 10 years ago, Stanley Yankus of Dowagiac, Michigan, paused to explain why he was selling his farm in the U. S. and planning to buy a farm in Australia.

What he said still holds true. But Americans remain inquisitive about this continent, anyway.

The United States ranks sixth among nations supplying immigrants to Australia — behind Britain, Germany, Greece, Italy and Yugoslavia. And apparently there are many misconceptions.

"Most Americans are under the impression that this is an underdeveloped part of the world," said Mrs. Virginia Er-

win, wife of the liberal party whip, Dudley Erwin, and a former member of the New York board of education. "They think this is a hunk of country sitting wide open, just waiting for some smart cooky to come and develop it. They are dreamers."

Negroes seeking to emigrate run into the so-called "white Australia" policy. When Sir Reginald Sholl returned home in February after three years as consul-general for the Eastern United States, he argued that Australia would be crazy to open its doors to colored immigrants. He said the time he spent in the United States had shown him clearly that a racial minority would only produce disorder and chaos. The minister for immigration, Billy Snedden, said it would be "social masochism" if a multiracial policy were forced on Australia, adding, "we should avoid people who are not socio-economically the same as we are. The people who enter must be substantially Australian in their own generation, and wholly Australian in their second generation."

Australia wants white Americans, however, and is setting out to woo them. The immigration department expects 5000 to emigrate from America this year, twice as many as in 1968.

More than half of the 12-million people in the country live in four cities — Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane and Adelaide. Australia is open country, with a population density of 4 per square mile, about the same as America in 1830.

Bush country land occasionally is offered at \$5 to \$10 an acre. In northern territory a

few years ago, the government was offering 50-year leases on land for ten cents a square mile.

The average weekly wage in Australia is \$72.35 (all figures in this article are in American dollars, computed at one-eighth more than the Australian dollar). For industrial workers, the weekly average is \$52.48, including overtime.

Women are paid less than men, sometimes considerably less.

If Australia's wage level is lower than America's so are its housing and land prices. One-bedroom apartments can be rented for \$10 to \$25 a week. The average cost of building a house, including the land, is less than \$13,000.

As for supermarket prices, they show some similarity to those in America.

Bread is 20 cents a 2-pound loaf, sirloin 68 cents a pound, large eggs 75 cents a dozen, pork chops 72 cents a pound, butter 57 cents a pound, milk 11 cents for a 20-ounce bottle.

Restaurant prices are lower, however. A filet mignon at one of Melbourne's finest restaurants is \$3.05.

And as for Stanley Yankus, the ex-farmer from Michigan, he says he won't go back even if the U.S. government refunds his \$5070.

"I've burned my bridges," he said firmly.

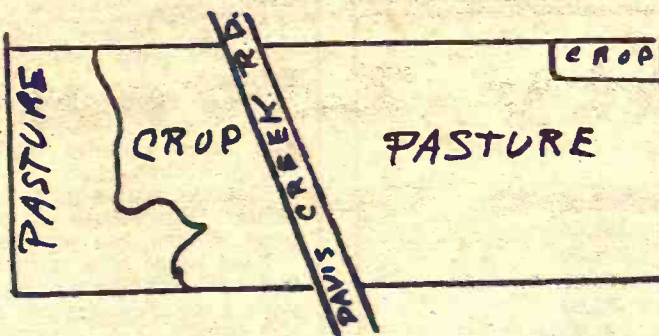

# Beef Hike Nudges Price Index Up

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-April 1969 were slightly above the previous month and moderately above April last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Beef cattle prices were substantially above a month earlier while slight price increases were noted for sheep and lambs, milk cows, hay and soybeans. However, wheat and hog prices were up sharply and prices for most other livestock were up moderately but wheat, sorghum and soybean prices were down considerably.

The index of prices received by farmers for all commodities was 241 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 238 last month and 228 a year ago.

## Crop Prices

The crop price index was 148 percent at mid-April, 3 points below March and 6 points below last year.

Wheat, at \$1.21 per bushel, was 3 cents below March and 6 cents below April 1968.

Corn averaged \$1.12 per bushel, 1 cent above last month and equal to April a year ago.

Oats, at 75 cents per bushel, was unchanged from March but 1 cent below a year ago. Barley, at 90 cents per bushel, was down 1 cent from the previous month and 11 cents below last year.

Sorghum grain brought \$1.71 per cwt., up 1 cent from last month but 10 cents below last year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.41 per bushel, up 3 cents from March but 9 cents below last year.

## Livestock Prices

Livestock and livestock products index at mid-April was 347 percent of the 1910-14 base period, 10 points above March and 33 points above April 1968.

The meat animal price index on April 15 was 412 percent

compared with 394 percent in March and 372 percent last year.

Hog prices averaged \$19.50 per cwt., 50 cents below March and \$1.20 above April 1968.

Beef cattle brought \$26.50 per cwt., compared with \$25.00 per cwt. the previous month and \$23.70 per cwt. last year.

Steer and heifer prices, at \$28.50 per cwt., were \$2.00 above March and \$3.50 above last year.

Calves, at \$30.00, were up \$1.50 from the previous month and \$3.30 above April of last year.

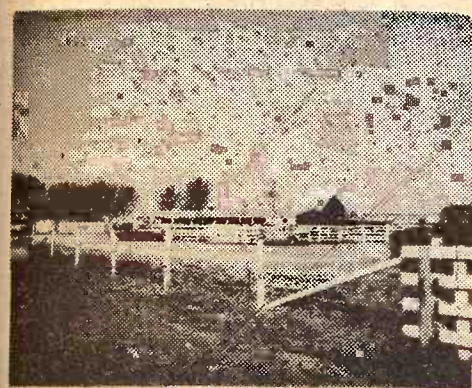

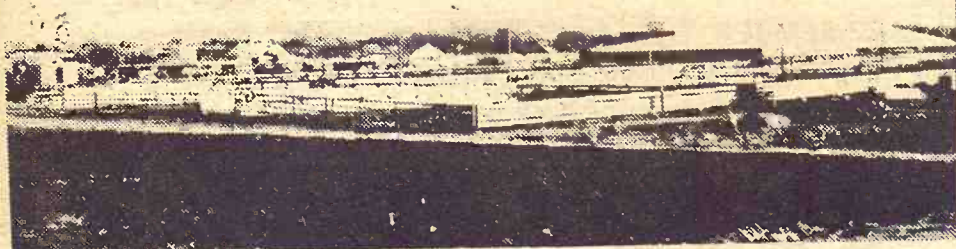
