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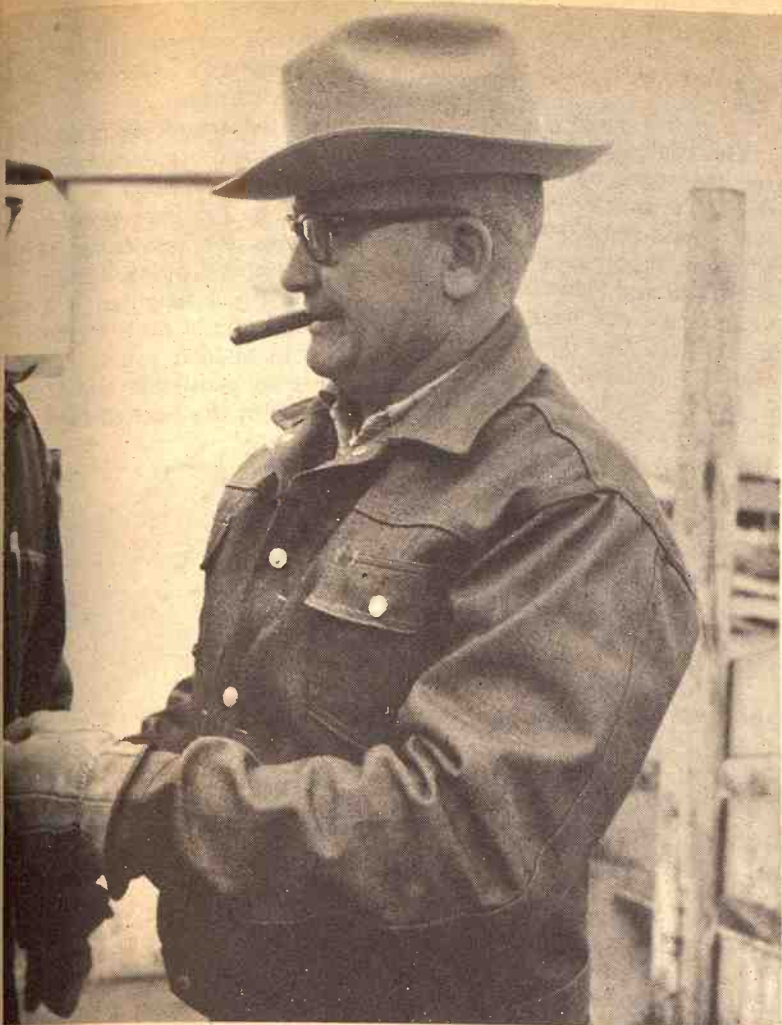

ASCS Sees Early Signup

State officials believe about 95 percent of the Kansas wheat allotment for 1969 will be "signed-up" for the federal programs before the deadline March 21.

Frank Hooper, program supervisor and production adjustment director for Kansas in the State Agriculture Stabilization Conservation (ASC) office in Manhattan, said the first reports on sign-up will be in the state office early this week.

The state sign-up on an allotment of 9,670,690 acres of wheat for 1969 programs began Feb. 3. The allotment is down 13 per cent from 1968 when it was

11,117,320 acres. The 1967 allotment was 12,785,718 acres.

Total United States wheat allotment under the last year of the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 will be 51.6 million acres.

The state's 140,000 farmers going to county ASC offices to sign up for wheat also will be figuring their feed grain crop for the year.

Base for Kansas barley, corn and grain sorghum is 9,451,631 acres. A minimum diversion of 20 percent of the acreage is mandatory to enter the program, and up to 50 per cent diversion is permitted.

Fed Bank Sees Farm Income Improvement

A cautious prediction for some improvement in net farm income during 1969 was forecast recently by the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City.

There was a big "if" in the prediction, however. Gene L. Swackhamer, who wrote the article in the bank's "Monthly Review," said the improvement is possible "if livestock prices do not succumb to the pressure of heavy red meat production

and crop production is held close to anticipated demand."

In taking a bankers' look at the "Approach of the 1970s," Swackhamer noted that the export of produce from nearly one acre in every four in the United States adds a greater degree of vulnerability to the future of farm income.

The favorable export situation of recent years will be hard to maintain, barring an international drought such as occurred a few years ago, the writer said.

The bank report estimated farm income for 1968 probably exceeded that of 1967 by about \$800 million, to a new high of \$15 billion. He pointed out that gross farm receipts generally have risen faster than expenses in recent years, although production expenses have risen rapidly.

It was pointed out that the agricultural problems of the 1970s probably will be just as difficult as they were in the 1960s because of continuing technological transformation.

The economist believes that farm policies of the 1970s will face major obstacles — both old and new.

He said policy makers will be hard pressed to justify the high cost of government farm programs, the current rising costs of programs for diverting land from production and the need for a long-term solution rather than the stop-gap measures of the past.

"Farm policy in the 1970s may continue to move closer to free

markets, with price supports held near world market levels or rescinded, and direct payment programs used to soften the burden of economic adjustment," Swackhamer wrote.

The wheat and feed grain programs for 1969 are about the same as others in the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965. But, Swackhamer says, the price may be decreased from the current \$2.50 a bushel to curtail production.

The fact that soybeans, highly exportable in the past, have been carried at a high support level, has encouraged overproduction of this crop and a rapidly increasing surplus.

The most dynamic area of farm production in this section has been livestock — and it remains full of possible change.

Data presented by Swackhamer indicates a rapidly growing area of cow-calf operations in the states to the south and southeast of Kansas. This, however, is being replaced by the rapid increase in feedlot operations for the Great Plains area including Kansas.

In the 10th Federal Reserve District (Colorado, Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming, most of Oklahoma and New Mexico and part of Missouri), the livestock factor of the economy is larger than the average in the rest of the U.S. The district level is about 65 per cent of total farm income from livestock, while in the rest of the nation, the average is about 55 per cent.

"A question of major importance in 1969 is whether consumer demand for red meat will be strong enough to absorb larger beef and pork production without substantial price weakness," Swackhamer wrote.

J. E. Pallesen, Topeka, state statistician, and Prof. Wilton Thomas of KSU will present information concerning trends in Kansas agriculture. Mel Gray of the State Board of Health will speak on the topic of "Water Pollution and Agriculture." A field trip to illustrate methods of water pollution control will be conducted by Gray.

Also given on the program will be Gary Heskett, game warden, who will give an illustrated lecture on "Aldo Leopold-

Meat Imports Over USDA Estimate

The Agriculture department is expected to publish soon figures showing that last year's total of meat imports subject to quota regulations actually exceeded the last quarterly estimate by nearly 11 million pounds.

A department official disclosed unofficially that 1,000,972,000

pounds of quota type meat were imported in 1968, compared with the estimate for the year of 990 million pounds made October 1 by Orville L. Freeman, former secretary of agriculture. The final tally was well within the limit of 1,045,300,000 pounds, which was the point at which quotas would have been imposed on a

country-by-country basis.

The secretary of agriculture by law is required to make quarterly estimates on the total of imported for the entire calendar year. If at any time the estimate exceeds a base level by more than 10 percent, quota restrictions must be imposed.

The basic quota for last year for the types of meat in question — primarily beef and mutton — was 950,300,000 pounds. Foreign suppliers — mainly Australia and New Zealand — voluntarily cut back on shipments late last year to forestall U.S. quotas.

Before he left office last month, Freeman announced the 1969 meat quota base at 988 million pounds, which would mean a trigger level for tight restrictions at 1,086,800,000 pounds for this year. At the same time Freeman estimated total 1969 quota-meat imports at 1,035,000,000 pounds.

The total quota-meat figure for 1968 included December imports of 35,600,000 pounds, the department source said, compared to 95,800,000 in November and 72,400,000 in December 1967.

Australia and New Zealand, which supply about 70 percent of the quota meat, were reported to have aimed for large January shipments to the United States under the new yearly quota.

The department spokesman said preliminary estimates of last month's imports show them to be "about the same as for December" because of shipping tied up at U.S. ports on the East and Gulf coasts.

January quota-meat imports during January totaled 80,700,000 pounds in 1968; 77,400,000 in 1967, and 51,400,000 in 1966. It recent years five or six months have totaled more meat imports than January.

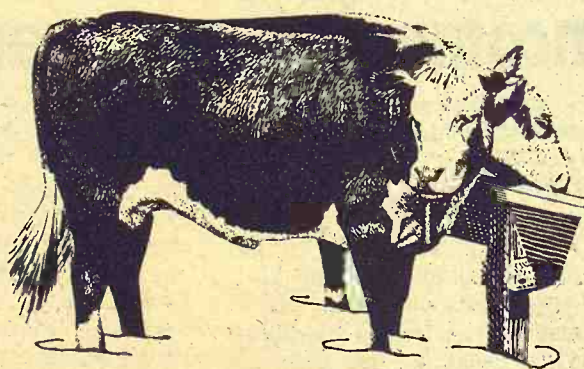

School Lunch Buys Help Meat Prices

This winter's higher level of livestock prices is getting support from government purchases of pork and beef for the National School Lunch Program and for distribution to needy persons.

Purchases of one week totaled some 89 million pounds of red meat at a cost of \$61 million, says USDA.

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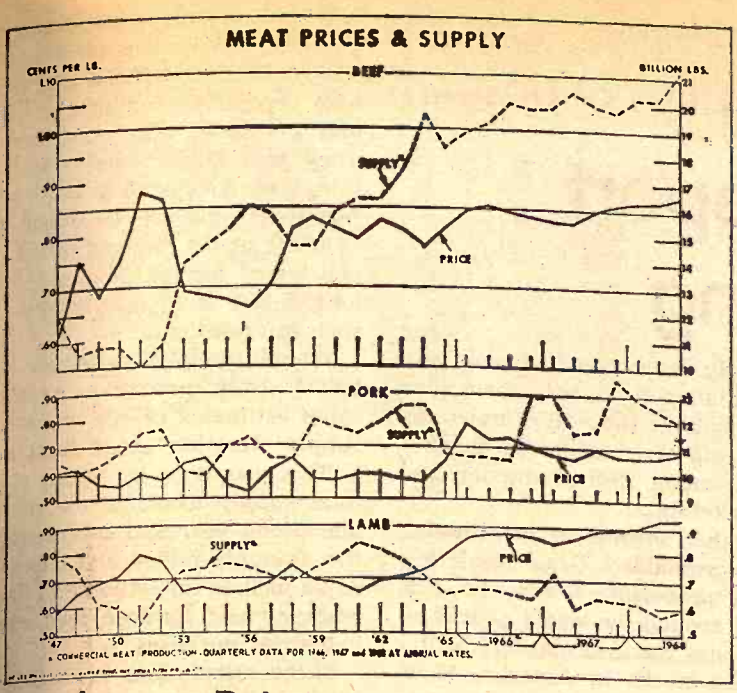
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Supply vs. Price

Red meats supply and retail prices generally move in opposite directions. As the above chart shows, a sharp increase in supply of any one of the three red meats usually has resulted in lower retail prices of that meat. Often the reduction in price has been relatively more than the increase in supplies. Conversely when supplies have been smaller, retail prices move upward. In recent years supplies have been steadier and the amount of movement in price has been smaller.

Present Farm Bargaining Bill

A farm bargaining bill has been introduced in the 91st Congress again by Sen. Walter Mondale, Minnesota Democrat. Last year, the bill failed to get out of committee.

The bill would provide a new legal framework and procedures for bargaining by farmers and make any agricultural commodity eligible for a marketing order if a majority of the producers of that commodity so elect in a referendum.

When the price of a commodity was unfair, farmers could initiate a referendum to select a committee to negotiate prices in bargaining sessions with a committee representing processors or other purchasers.

Expanded Backtagging Proposed

WASHINGTON — Identification

WASHINGTON — Identification regulations governing the interstate movement of cattle have proposed to provide further safeguards to animals moving through markets, the USDA reports.

The proposed amendment, published Feb. 1 in the Federal Register, will help the cattle industry by expanding surveillance of the brucellosis and tuberculosis testing on farms and ranches, says USDA.

Under the proposed amendment, all cattle two years or older moving interstate for slaughter — except steers and spayed heifers — must be identified by a USDA approved backtag or a registered brand. Each shipment must be accompanied by a waybill or brand certificate stating the origin of the cattle, their destination, the number of animals in the shipment, and the name and address of the owner or shipper.

Any person wishing to submit written data, views, or arguments concerning the proposal may do so by sending them to the Director, Animal Health Division, Agricultural Research

Service, USDA, Federal Center Building, Hyattsville, Md. 20782, within the next 60 days.

Hog Cholera In Republic County

BELLEVILLE — Hog cholera has been diagnosed in Republic County.

Dr. George Wreath, Belleville veterinarian, said the disease

caused the death of a hog on a farm between Belleville and Cuba. Wreath said the diagnosis came Wednesday from the State Diagnostic Laboratory at Manhattan.

He urged the vaccination of all hogs in the area. The disease is highly contagious.

Wreath said this one case probably would cause the loss of the bulk of that herd.

Kansas statutes do not require vaccination for the disease.

No Grain Report
Limits Planning

At this time in previous years, we have prepared and distributed a summary of the stocks of various grains on hand as of January 1, and the apparent rates of use and exports during the previous months. We cannot do that this year, because the U.S. Department of Agriculture did not make its usual survey and report of stocks of grains on hand (on farms and at elevators and mills) as of the first of the year.

There are two possible reasons for omitting the report. (1) It has saved the Government some money. (2) It may please some farmers who believe that knowledge about the supply of crops tends to depress prices.

Some farmers can get all the information they want from talking to their neighbors — at farm sales and at other places. Other farmers, however, will

surely wish they had more information — to help them plan the sale of their 1968 crops and to help them make decisions concerning 1969 production and marketing.

Other sources of information are available. Grain dealers and processors — in the U.S. and around the world — will also miss the information about grain stocks in America. However, most of them have other sources of information. They have buyers and agents in many parts of the U.S. and in foreign countries. They will get private reports from farm areas, figures showing the amount of the various grains in elevators and mills and CCC bins. They will get official reports showing how much grain is being placed under loan, and how much is redeemed.

The buying side of the market

will have weekly reports of exports and inspections for export. They will study official and private reports of supplies, use, and prices in other countries. They will know about such things as dock strikes long before they begin, and they will also know about changes in the policies of foreign governments long before most farmers get such information.

Wheat supply estimated. USDA grain men have made some estimates of the wheat supply situation as of January 1. This was done by taking the total supply available for this marketing year and subtracting the amounts milled and exported as well as an estimate of the amounts used for seed, feed, and industrial purposes.

These calculations indicated that on January 1, the amount of wheat available for milling, export, and carryover was about 1427 million bushels. This is some 24 percent more than was available a year earlier, and 8 percent more than was available two years before.

Exports and inspections for wheat export (including flour) from July 1 to January 17 were about 300 million bushels — 29 percent less than a year earlier.

More wheat under price support. At the first of this year, the amount of wheat under price support totaled about 535 million bushels. This is more than twice as much as a year earlier.

Select House Colors To Suit Personality

Whether psychedelic swirls, the "in" shades of high fashion, or traditional black and white, color has become an increasingly important element of contemporary life.

Even architectural design has joined the color revolution, with building materials that run the gamut from pastel pink to ebony.

Psychologists say that color selection reflects our personality, our social environment and our cultural background. For instance, most people find cool colors — blues and greens — relaxing; warm colors — reds and yellow — stimulating and neutral colors — browns and greys — comfortable.

Whatever your color preference, there's no reason not to indulge in it. Color consultants say it's a mistake to use colors that are "wrong" for your personality even if particular hues happen to be in fashion.

Probably the most "color caution" should be used when selecting "long-term" colors — as for house decor. You'll want to live with roof, house siding and floor colors for a long time.

The influence of color on home design is well accepted by manufacturers of house products and building materials and research aimed at developing a wider color range has, for some time, been an essential

part of the industry.

Bake. Cool. Finish with cooked white frosting made with cherry juice in place of water. Decorate with red stemmed cherries.

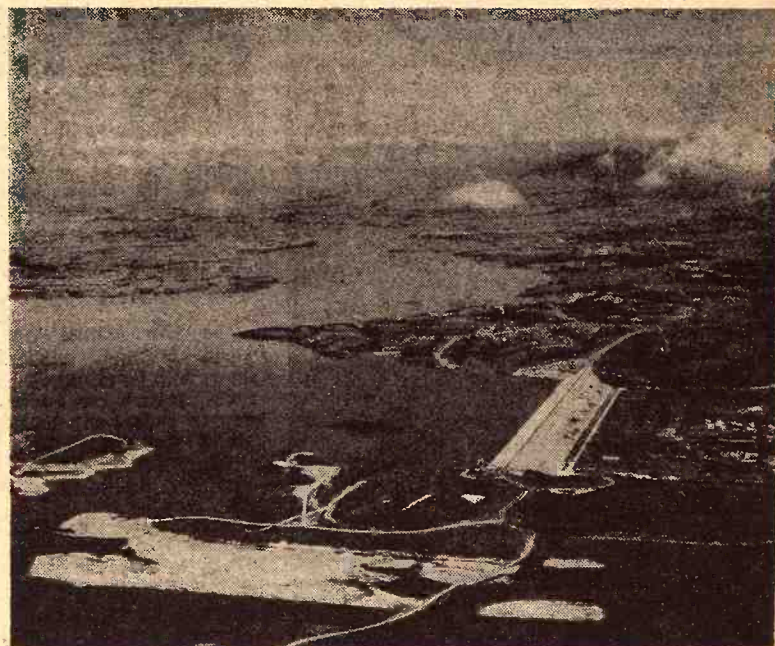

Big Grain Co-ops Merge

Two grain cooperative organizations concerned with developing export markets and the physical shipping of grain overseas have combined their efforts through a merger.

Stockholders of Producer's Export Company, at a recent meeting in Kansas City, approved a proposal to merge their company into Farmers Export Co.

James H. Dean, Hutchinson, who was president of Producer's Export, said that foreign grain purchasers found it confusing that there were two cooperative export companies.

"And in a sense we were both working the same territory at additional expense to the regional cooperatives we were trying to serve," Dean said in explaining the merger.

Farmers Export Company was formed in early 1967 to construct a grain export elevator at New Orleans.

The five million bushel elevator began operations last fall.

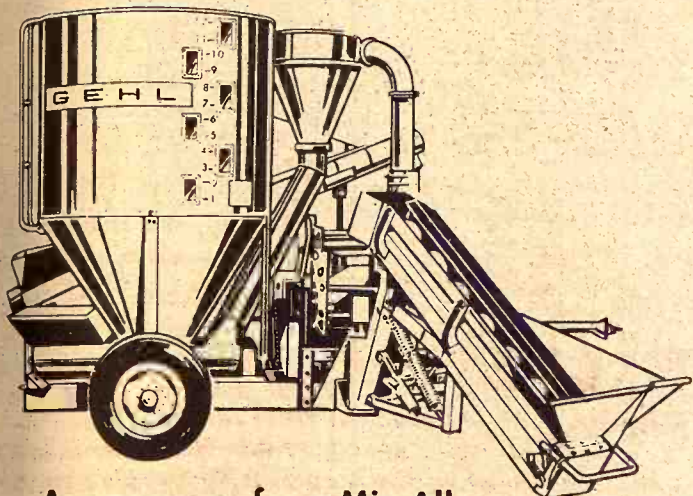
Fred V. Heinkle, Missouri Farmers Association, Columbia, Mo., is president of FEC which is owned by eight regional grain cooperatives.

Producers Export Co. was formed more than 10 years ago to provide a foreign sales organization for regional grain cooperatives interested in export merchandising.

Seven of the eight members of Producer's Export joined in the merger with Farmers Export.

According to Dean the new organization, although its elevator is in New Orleans, will provide an export sales organization operating from all coasts in the development of grain outlets abroad for grain handled by member cooperatives.

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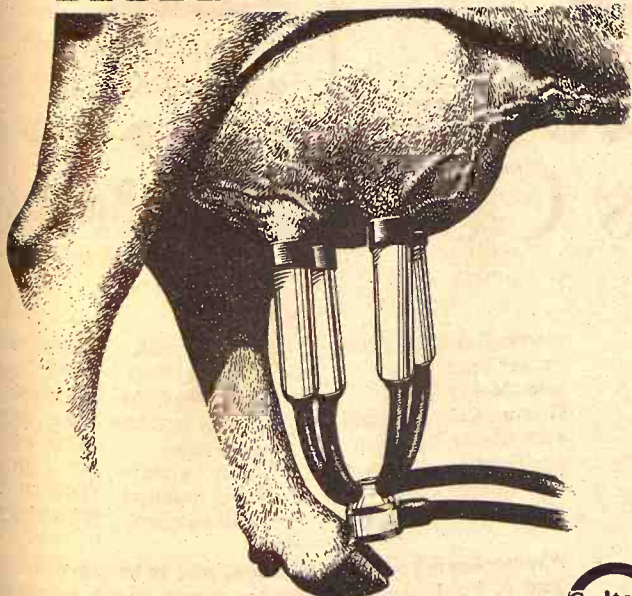

Area Walnut Tree To Germany For Fancy Uses

MADISON — A black walnut tree which was a landmark here for more than 75 years is on the way to Germany where it will be used in furniture manufacture.

The tree, 60 feet high with a limb spread of 80 feet, was cut last week on property owned by Mrs. Fred Kipfer. It stood south of an old two-story brick house on the east side of old highway K-99, just south of the Santa Fe railroad crossing.

The straight trunk produced a log 94 inches in circumference and 14 feet long. A veneer lath in Germany will convert it to an estimated 20,000 square feet of material, one thirty-fifth of an inch in thickness.

A five foot section located 18 inches above the base will be made into fancy burl gunstocks. Several of the larger limbs were salvaged to be sawed into furniture lumber.

Based on the growth rings on the log, it is thought the tree was planted soon after the house was built in 1884.

Risk In Buying Bonds From Some Religious Organizations

A warning to Kansans to investigate the background and financial status of non-profit religious organizations before buying security issues from them has been sounded by the Kansas Securities Commissioner.

Michael G. Quinn said his of-

fice is becoming increasingly concerned about the proliferation of such issues. He said many non-profit religious organizations issuing bonds and securities have been induced to do so by promoters acting as financial consultants.

"Inadequate assets of the or-

ganizations make particular bond issues most risky to say the least," Quinn said.

Kansans have lost \$2 million in the last five years on such bonds that have been defaulted, Sen. Lester C. Arvin, R-Rose Hill, said in support of a bill he introduced in the Kansas Senate.

The securities commissioner said that in most cases promoters working with non-profit religious organizations charge

them exorbitant commissions and fees and assist them in preparing brochures "which are, in almost every case, grossly deficient and in many cases fraudulent."

Quinn said the problem is compounded by the fact the average investor in securities is unsophisticated in such matters, having never purchased any before.

Under existing statutes, securities of non-profit organizations

are generally exempt from registration with the securities commissioner, he said.

Sen. Arvin's Senate bill would require that securities on non-profit religious corporations be listed with Quinn's office. It would also require an opinion from legal counsel that the securities are backed by property, that they are a lawful obligation on the part of the corporation and that only a licensed broker could sell them.

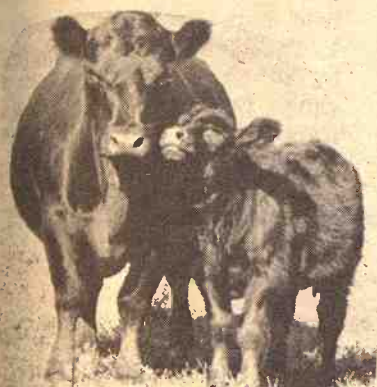

Study Shows Low Investment Return On Varied Farmland

Returns to investment in farm land have been surprisingly low on a number of Kansas farms during the past few years, a Kansas State University study shows.

Where \$4000 per operator was allocated as a charge for labor and management, returns averaged about 4 percent per year for some 200 farms in the southern half of the state between 1963 and 1967. But where \$6000 was allowed, the returns were negative.

The study considered stock ranch cow herd operations in southeastern Kansas, cash crop irrigated farms in southwestern Kansas, and cash crop farms in the southern half of the state. All farms were enrolled in K-State's Farm Management Association program.

The amount allocated to operator's labor and management makes a substantial difference in the resulting returns to land, says Wilton B. Thomas, one of several K-State economists who conducted the study. Return for labor and management may be considered the farmer's salary for the year, he says. The return to investment in farm land also reflects an allowance for return to operator's working capital.

Where \$6000 per operator was allocated as a return for labor and management, all five groups of farms showed a negative return to the land. Where \$4000 was allocated, all groups gave some return.

However, returns for the cash crop dryland farms in southwestern Kansas were just above the break even point — 1/2 of one percent for the five-year period, Thomas says. Extreme drouth and severe insect damage to crops contributed to the extremely low returns during this period.

Returns to the land in the other four areas varied from slightly more than 1 percent for the stock ranch cow herd farms in the southeast to more than 9 percent on irrigated farms in the southwest.

Here are the average yearly land returns for the five groups of farms for 1963-67:

Cash crop dryland farms in south central Kansas — 3.19 percent for \$4000 for labor and management per operator; minus 1.61 percent for \$6000 per operator.

Cash crop dryland farms in southwestern Kansas — 0.54 percent for \$4000 per operator; minus 4.06 percent for \$6000 per operator.

Cash crop irrigated farms in southwestern Kansas — 9.32 percent for \$4000 per operator; minus 0.07 percent for \$6000 per operator.

Cash crop dryland farms in southeastern Kansas — 7.81

percent for \$4000 per operator; minus 0.08 percent for \$6000 per operator.

Stock ranch cowherd farms in southeastern Kansas — 1.08 percent for \$4000 per operator; minus 1.81 percent for \$6,000 per operator.

Returns were highest on irrigated farms in southwestern Kansas. Where \$400 per operator was allocated, rate of return ranged from a minus 4.53 percent in 1963 to 18.75 percent in 1966. Where \$6000 was allocated, the range was a minus 15.68 percent in 1963 and 11.78 percent in 1966.

Irrigated farms also had the highest average net income per year (\$12,500) and the most operators per farm (almost 2). The higher number of operators per farm explains why average returns to the land varied so widely between the \$4000 and \$6000 allocation for operator's labor and management.

Thomas says another factor

-- increasing land values -- contributes to the long-run returns to land. Kansas farm land has appreciated at a compound annual rate of about 5 percent a year between 1958 and 1968.

Adding this 5 percent to the return to investment in farm land would result in a more satisfactory return for combined yearly income and growth.

It is this increase in land values that has made farm real estate attractive to the long-term investor. However, Thomas believes it is risky to assume that land values will continue to appreciate this rapidly in the future.

The economist adds that long-term land appreciation gains do not benefit low equity farmers in the short run. These operators must have income immediately to meet family living expenses and farm operating expenses, pay taxes and make

payments on the farm mortgage.

It takes a minimum of several years to realize a tangible benefit from increased land values, he says. Younger farmers in particular find this feature of the current situation to be a serious problem.

Besides Thomas, other K-State economists who worked on the study were John H. McCoy, Don D. Pretzer, Dale A. Knight and Frank Orazem, Department of Economics.

The GAO report comes at a time when landowners in the areas of proposed reservoir construction continue to protest that more land is being taken than necessary. It is a particularly sore point in the area of the Kaysinger Bluff reservoir project in Missouri.

The GAO made its report based on studies at seven reservoirs, including the Elk City and Milford dams in Kansas. As an example, it said, after studying 388 tracts for which the government paid 8 million dollars, 2.7 million could have been saved if some of it were under a flowage easement arrangement. It did not make an overall estimate of land in all even projects.

The engineers' counterargument was that easements sometimes end up costing more than purchase and that an additional difficulty is the possibility of damage suits.

At the Milford dam, as an example, the auditors said they studied 9400 acres of land. Of that total, acquisition was required for 3800 acres but easements would have sufficed for 700 acres. The rest of the land — 2900 acres — went for recreation or fish and wildlife and was not needed for water control purposes.

The estimated additional cost by purchasing all 940,000 acres was \$720,000. The GAO believes some of the recreation and fish and wildlife costs should be assessed to local interests. Also, some of that land could be obtained by easement instead of purchase.

"Under its current land acquisition policy," the GAO said, "the corps of engineers has not been identifying or justifying the additional cost resulting

from acquiring greater interests in land than we believe are needed for water control purposes. In our opinion, this practice is contrary to sound project formulation. . . ."

The auditors also suggested Congress stipulate at the time of project authorization how much acreage would go to fish and wildlife and recreation and how much it would cost. The engineers said they were willing to do that. That way Congress can decide how much land it wants devoted to other than water control purposes.

The Army in its reply said the House committee on government operations had gone over the ground and concluded that the 1953 policy was ad-

verse to the government's interest.

The Army said fee purchase of the land was needed "to provide for optimum requirements of our reservoirs, even when recreation and fish and wildlife aspects are omitted. Therefore, we feel that the 1962 policy should be continued. . . ."

The Reclamation Bureau said it opposed a return to the 1953 land policies that were tried and found wanting. It pointed out congressional hearings in 1957 found that old policies were detrimental on conservation and public recreation and reduced ability to make available to the public the conservation and recreation values of a project area.



The Milford lake project on the Republican river near Junction City was too costly, says the General Accounting Office, because the Corps of Engineers and the Bureau of Reclamation spent too much on land acquisition. GAO said there should have been a greater use of easements and leases rather than outright buying of land adjacent to the lake.

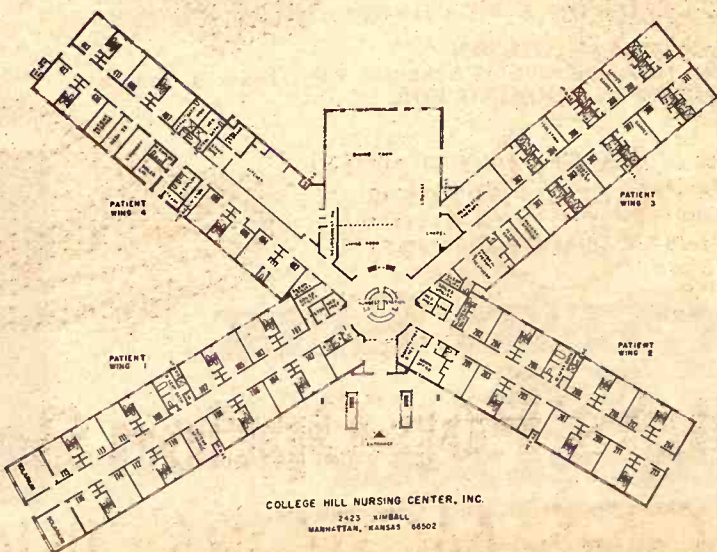

Farm Yields Soar In Undeveloped Nations

Former Kansas Congressman Clifford Hope, acknowledged as a bona fide expert in agriculture with expertise in the technology, sales and politics of the subject, recently noted in a newspaper column he writes of some tremendous changes in yields made by many undeveloped nations.

In the fast moving world in which we live today one thing upon which we can depend is the inevitability of change. Some of these changes appear to be sudden and violent but in most cases they are the result of the operation of powerful but slow and largely unnoticed forces over a considerable period. I have been reminded of this fact in reading an article, entitled "The New Era in World Agriculture" by Lester R. Brown in the January 13, 1969 issue of Foreign Agriculture, a weekly publication of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Mr. Brown is the Administrator of the International Agricultural Development Service of the department. In that position he has a ringside seat in observing what is going on in the field of agricultural development throughout the world.

The significance of what Mr. Brown says is enhanced by comparing it with an article by him in the January 30, 1967 issue of Foreign Agriculture. The subject matter of that article is indicated by its sub-title, "Time is now the critical new dimension in the world food situation as the population juggernaut continues to gain momentum in the less developed world."

In that article Mr. Brown called attention to the fact that world surpluses of wheat, rice, feed grains, soybeans and dairy products which had existed for several previous years were gone although world population was increasing at the rate of 65 million per year, most of it in the developing countries where food shortages were the greatest. The general tone of the article was pessimistic although Mr. Brown pointed out some encouraging developments, among them substantial advances in agricultural production in Mexico, Taiwan and Israel. He feared, however, that in most countries, especially in Asia where more than half the world's people live, improvement would come too little and too late.

However, at that very time the tide was turning. In 1966 the world harvested a wheat crop of 10,490,000,000 bushels, the first ten billion bushel crop in history and more than a billion bushels more than any previous crop. This has been followed by crops in excess of ten billion bushels in 1967 and 1968. The 1968 crop was ten billion, eight hundred million bushels.

The particular significance of the 1967 and 1968 crops is the increased production in the developing countries where it is most needed. In commenting on this Mr. Brown says "The new era is characterized by explosive increases in production of principal crops in the larger developing countries of Asia. The 1968 Pakistan wheat harvest was up 37 percent over the previous record, possibly an increase without precedent in any major country. India's 1968 wheat crop was up 35 percent over the previous record; its to-

tal food grain harvest up 12 percent. Ceylon's rice crop was increased 34 percent during the past two years. The Philippines, with two consecutive dramatic gains in its rice crop, has apparently ended half a century of dependence on rice imports."

While favorable weather contributed to these increases in some countries like India, it was only one factor. Increases in per acre wheat yields in Pakistan and of rice yields in the

Philippines, over the past two years appear to have exceeded those of the preceding several decades.

While the most rapid advances have taken place in Asia where the need is the greatest — other countries are also benefitting, including Mexico and Kenya and the Ivory Coast in Africa.

As to the permanence of these changes Mr. Brown comments as follows. "Are the recent agricultural advances in the developing countries a temporary phenomenon or a new trend? They appear to be the latter. The agricultural revolution seems to have gone too far now to be arrested. Too much is at stake, too much has been invested, the ex-

pectations of too many people have been aroused."

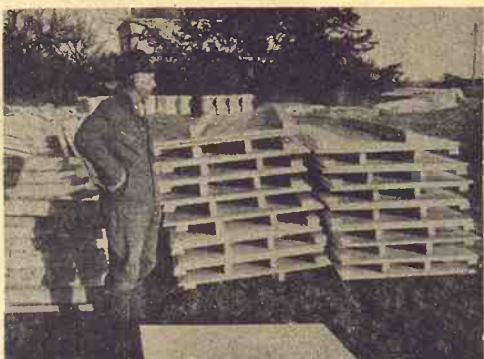

Stockmen Propose Reorganization Of Commission

Kansas Livestock Association (KLA) Board of Directors voted legislative support for a reorganization bill which would make several changes in state law for directing the livestock sanitary and brand offices.

Reorganization, taxes and school financing bills came in for scrutiny and action by the board in a day-long session preceding the Fourth Annual Cattle Feeders Conference at Wichita.

Presently there are two sets of commissions and commissioners.

The reorganization bill calls for a seven-man livestock commission to include automatically the president of KLA. Six members would be recommended by KLA for the governor's appointment.

The commission would hire a state administrator for livestock affairs, combining responsibilities of the livestock sanitary commissioners and the brand commissioner. The administrator would name a chief brand commissioner.

The reorganization effort by KLA indicates a conciliatory attitude. A similar bill was introduced last year after a months-long disagreement with Gov. Robert Docking concerning reappointment of the livestock sanitary commissioner and the brand commissioner two years ago.

The board voted to submit enough recommendations to the governor so that "regardless of politics" men well acquainted with various phases of the industry would be represented on the board.

The board also voted to support Kansas Farm Bureau in efforts to gain passage for a school finance and distribution bill to be introduced in the next few days.

It voted to favor increasing income tax instead of property tax, assessing land values on income-producing ability rather than current methods, advocating support of schools from an income tax base rather than through property tax and opposing urban moves to gain city income or sales tax rights.

CPA EXAMINATIONS TOUGH TO PASS

It's apparently difficult to become a certified public accountant. Only 58 of 252 persons passed the CPA examinations at Wichita and Lawrence last November. There are about 1400 practicing CPAs in Kansas.

Concave Tire To Be On Market

A new tire concept debuts next month when Firestone markets its LXX.

The new approach involves a tire mounted on a large diameter wheel. The wheel itself has a narrow rim, giving the tire concave sidewalls instead of the usual rounded sides. In case of a blowout, the tire drops straight in against the rim and runs true instead of flopping and possibly causing loss of control, says Firestone Tire & Rubber Co. The construction also provides a wide flat tread surface said to give up to 75% more tread wear than conventional tires and up to 30% more traction. Detroit shows interest because the larger wheel diameter will accommodate larger brakes.

But the new tires will be expensive. A full set of five spe-

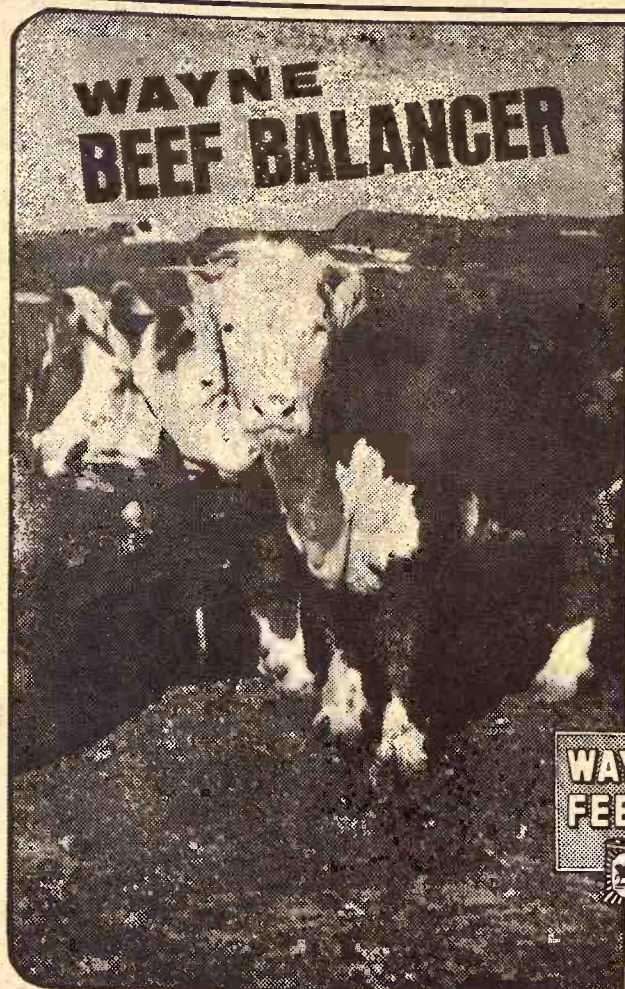
cial cast aluminum wheels factory equipped with the LXX tires will cost about \$500, Fire-

stone says. Trading in a new set of conventional wheels and tires should lower the cost to

\$250 or \$300.

The LXX comes out at a time when critics are charging a

number of tire makers with failure to meet safety standards.



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No Set Rules On Choice Of Fertilizers

Kansas farmers who want nitrogen fertilizers to stimulate growth of their crops have four main sources of this plant nutrient, says Dr. Harold E. Jones, Extension soil fertility and management specialist at Kan-

sas State University.

These include ammonium nitrate — a 33½ percent nitrogen solid; urea — a 44 percent nitrogen solid; nitrogen solutions — approximately 28 percent liquid mixtures of urea and ammonium nitrate; and anhydrous ammonia — an 82 percent gas that becomes a liquid when stored in a pressurized tank.

Each of the nitrogen fertilizers have different properties

but produce about the same yield results if properly applied to the soil, the K-State agronomist points out. Generally, the price of the fertilizer and specific conditions for application determine the farmers choice.

Anhydrous ammonia, because it is a gas, must be stored in pressure tanks and applied under the surface of the soil to prevent nitrogen losses. The ammonia is readily held by the clay in the soil, but must be converted to nitrate nitrogen by soil micro-organisms before plants can use it.

If the ammonia comes in contact with seeds, or growing plants, it will damage germination and growth. So anhydrous ammonia is not as easily used in growing small grains or grass crops as some other nitrogen forms. However, it is ideal for fall and winter applications because soil organisms will not change the ammonia to nitrates at temperatures below 50 degrees.

Nitrogen solutions are more adaptable for direct application to crop residues immediately before turning under straw or stubble. They are also recommended for application in sprinkler or other pipe irrigation systems because they will not cause as much metal corrosion as ammonia.

The solid forms of nitrogen, urea and ammonium nitrate, are better suited to application on growing crops and broadcast applications on the surface of the soil. However, if free lime — calcium carbonate — is present in the surface soil, nitrogen as free ammonia may be lost

to the air.

Certain soil conditions affect the efficiency of nitrogen fertilizers, Dr. Jones points out. Soil micro-organisms cannot work in very dry or in saturated soils. Under these conditions ammonia forms of nitrogen cannot be taken up and used by plants.

Very little microbial action takes place in soils with temperatures below 50 degrees or above 105 degrees. Under these conditions anhydrous ammonia is less effective. Acid soils, or those low in calcium, do not respond well to nitrogen fertilizers unless they are limed.

Many farmers burn wheat straw and sorghum stubble because it impedes seedbed preparation and decreases yields. As a result the soil tilth deteriorates over a period of years.

Applications of nitrogen fer-

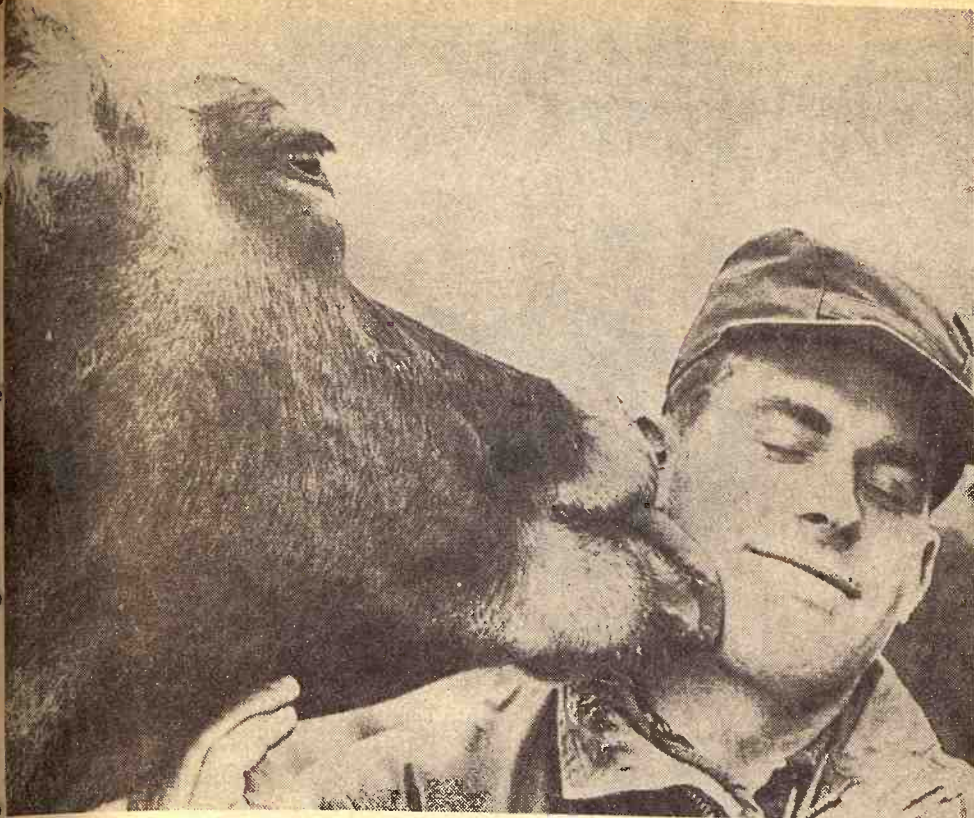

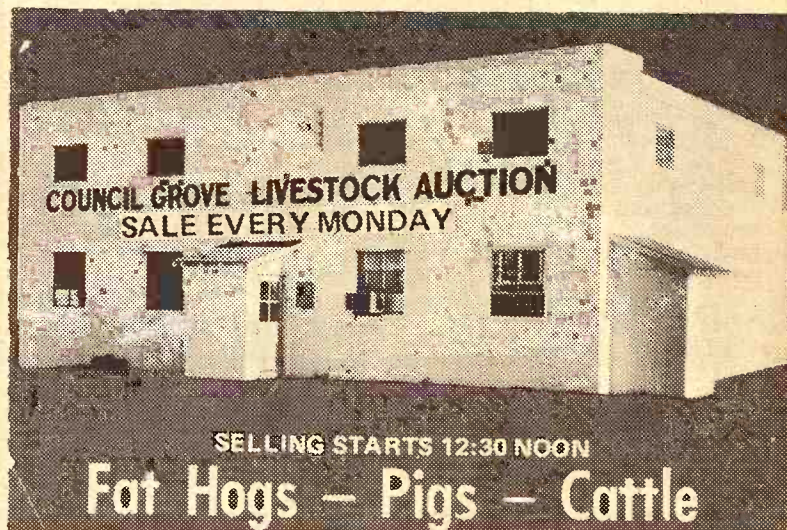

Sample Case Of Weeds

Samples of the noxious weeds of Kansas have been collected and sold as a project by the Wheat State Agronomy Club (WSAC) at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

Several members of the club spent last summer searching for the weed specimens. When complete sets of ten noxious weeds had been obtained, they were mounted on herbarium sheets with a full description of each plant.

Dr. Kurt Feltner, adviser to the club, said the demand for the samples was so high that all the samples are now gone.

"All the weed samples collected by club members last year are sold, but the club plans to continue this project for another year since it was so popular," Feltner said.

Principal customers included county agents, 4-H clubs and vocational agriculture departments in Kansas high schools, he added.

A noxious weed is defined by law as a weed especially undesirable, troublesome or difficult to control. There are ten such weeds in Kansas. These are Russian knapweed, field bindweed, hoary cress, Canada thistle, quackgrass, leafy spurge, bur ragweed, pignut, goatgrass and Johnson grass.

The WSAC also prepares crop samples each year which many vocational agricultural departments purchase, Feltner said.

"These samples are studied by crop judging teams in preparation for the state contest in Manhattan. The WSAC helps set up this contest and grades the contest papers," Feltner explained.

Hamburger By Any Other Name

Griff's, a hamburger chain with several outlets in the G&G area, has been given until Mar. 1 to comply with the state's definition of hamburger. The Department of Health has threatened to place embargoes and holdovers on meat patties at the Griff's drive-ins in Kansas.

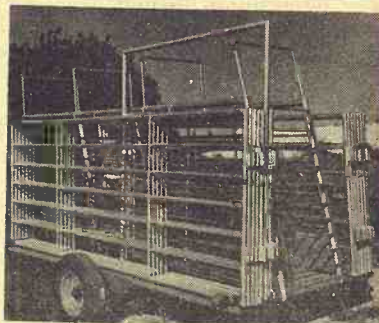
The Department alleges that the patties do not conform to the state's definition of a hamburger and that the patties contained additives of soya flour and additional water.

State law requires for meat to be called hamburger it must not exceed 30% fat content, and the ratio of water to protein not be greater than four to one.

\$480,000 Payroll By State ASCS

The state office of the Agri-
cultural Stabilization and Con-
servation Service is in Manhat-
tan, not Topeka. The current
payroll is \$480,000 a year paid
to 46 fulltime employees and
five part-time. The part-time
employees include the three
state ASCS committeemen.

The employees are under fed-
eral Civil Service and the mon-
ey comes from federal funds.
All but one county also main-
tains an ASCS office, the pay-
roll of which is met by federal
funds altho staffs are employ-
ed by each county committee.
Some counties have as many
as nine employees. None has
fewer than three.

The state ASCS office and
the county offices administer
about 15 federal programs, dis-
pensing some \$200 million in
program payments to Kansas
farmers. They administered a
118-million bushel Commodity
Credit loan program for wheat
and a 15-million bushel loan

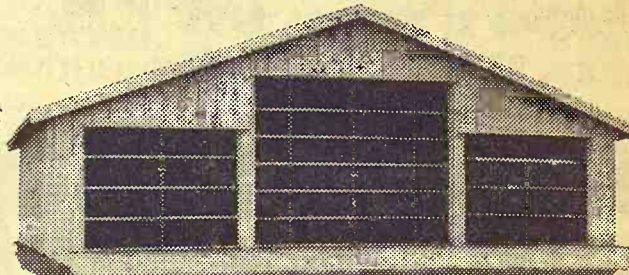

Good Prospects For Crappie

Fishermen who plan to pursue their sport at Tuttle Creek Reservoir this coming spring can look forward to some excellent crappie fishing, provided that water conditions are right. Bill Cole, northeast area fishery biologist for the Fish and Game Commission, states that test nettings at the reservoir last fall indicate excellent populations of crappie are present

in the waters with good prospects for the spring fishing season. The crappie will average between 8½ and 10½ inches in length, good frying pan size, with some larger specimens showing up. Cole also suggests that fishermen should try for walleyes this year since there is a good population of this species in the two and one-half to three pound class. Some large, lunker walleyes also showed up in the fishery investigations. Other good fishing prospects at Tuttle Reservoir are keyed

around an abundant population of largemouth bass averaging around two and one-half pounds and the usual numbers of channel catfish. Cole also reports that the abundant number of small white bass should gain weight rapidly this spring and summer with some reaching two pounds by late August. The fishery biologist does caution anglers that the key to good fishing will depend on water conditions. The extensive watershed of the Blue River collects rainfall over a large area of Kansas and Nebraska and the inflow of turbid waters can change this fishing success in Tuttle Creek Reservoir in a period of hours.

A disgruntled farmer apparently vented his anger on the Kansas Wheat Commission recently, leaving damage on the lawn in front of headquarters at Hutchinson a headstone which read, "Another wheat farmer has bitten the dust because of low prices and middlemen's lust."

"It was probably just some one real disgruntled with the price, which we all are," said Carl Dummer of Russell, president of KWC.

The KWC operation is maintained by a 2-mill per bushel levy that was the subject of legislative controversy two years ago. Bulk of the levy goes into state's general revenue fund, and there was an unsuccessful effort to get all of the money into the KWC's promotion of wheat.

Catholics Close Some Schools In G&G Area

SALINA — Six Catholic schools in the Salina diocese will close at the end of the current school year, Bishop Cyril J. Vogel, Salina, has announced.

Included are Notre Dame High School, Concordia, and elementary schools at Cawker City, Clyde, Gorham, Herington and Herndon.

They have been in operation for periods ranging from 25 years for the high school to 80 years for Clyde elementary.

Extensive studies of finances, personnel and population were made before the decision to close the schools was announced, said Msgr. C. J. Brown, Beloit, diocesan superintendent of education.

The six schools are the smallest in the diocese. They are staffed by Sisters of St. Joseph, whose motherhouse is in Concordia.

The order staffs nine other

grade schools and five high schools in the diocese. Other orders operate five grade schools and two high schools in the affected area.

Diocesan officials said present trends indicate fewer nuns

will be available for teaching assignments in the coming years. Parish studies showed none of the schools to be closed could pay the added cost of hiring lay teachers to replace nuns in operating the schools.

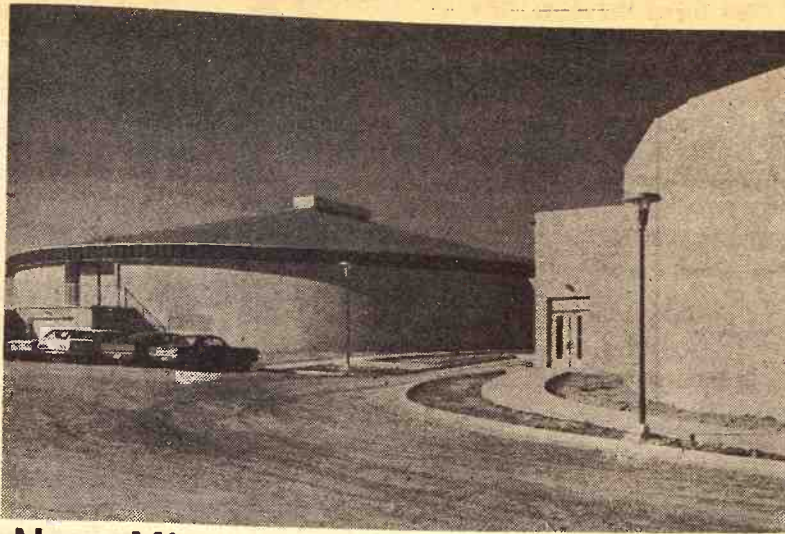

Third Of Soybeans On Loan

Farmers have placed nearly one-third of their record billion-bushel 1968 soybean crop under government price support loans, the Agriculture department has announced.

Officials said more than 307.5

million bushels of last year's crop had been taken off the open market under the loan program by February 1, compared with 183.4 million bushels from the 1967 crop at the corresponding time.

The department said the cumulative total of 1968 crop wheat under loan through January was 397.6 million bushels, compared with 238.2 million a year earlier.

Farmers, however, had paid

off loans on more than 41.7 million bushels of wheat by February 1, officials said.

Redemptions of soybeans totaled about 4.4 million bushels.

New-crop corn under loan through January totaled 329.5 million bushels, down from 347 million a year ago. About 2.8 million bushels of 1968 corn had been redeemed through January.

Sorghum grain under loan from last year's crop was reported at 38.8 million hundred-weight, compared with 33 million a year earlier.

Less than 2.2 million had been redeemed by producers, the department said.

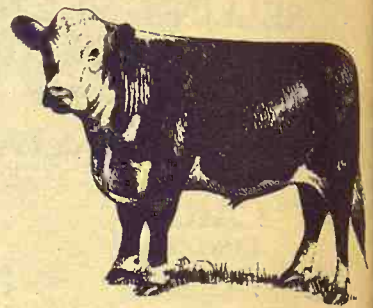
