

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



The Collegiate 4-H Club was organized December 12, 1927, by a group of former 4-H club members and leaders attending college. The purpose of the organization is to promote a wider acquaintance among its members, to maintain and increase their interest in club work, to develop leaders in the field of club work, to aid in any campus activity relating to club work, to further the best interests of the Kansas Agricultural College, and to interest other club members to come to this college.

During the first semester of the organization's existence the organization set forth as a goal the establishment of a 4-H Club Loan Fund for 4-H club members attending college. This goal was reached on December 20, 1929, when the Club turned over to the Alumni Association for administration the sum of \$1,000.

In the fall of 1928, the Club took over the editing of the Who's Whoot, a year book of Kansas 4-H club members and their achievements. The book was enlarged from forty-eight pages to sixty-four pages. The price was lowered, and instead of only two hundred and fifty copies, fifteen hundred were printed and distributed to all the State 4-H Club Departments and the club members attending the State 4-H Club Round-up in the spring.

The Club fosters the broadcasting of 4-H Club programs over the radio every Monday and Friday from 4:30 to 5:00. The aim of the program is to interest 4-H Club members throughout the State and elsewhere in the Kansas State Agricultural College and inform them of the experiences of those attending college.





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








Leaders



Leonard Rees of Dickinson County was declared the outstanding boy in Advanced 4-H Club Leadership work in Kansas for 1929. By virtue of this distinction he won the \$150 Folger scholarship to the Kansas State Agricultural College. This scholarship is offered annually by the Folger Coffee Company of Kansas City, Missouri, for the outstanding leader in 4-H Club activities.

Rees has been a 4-H Club member since 1925. Included in his activities of 4-H Club work is the completion of eleven different projects. He holds the unusual distinction of having assisted in the leadership of his club ever since he became a 4-H Club member. One of the most notable trips awarded him was a trip to the National 4-H Club Encampment, Washington, D. C., in 1928. For two years he was president of his community 4-H Club.

At the present time this youthful farm leader is especially active in 4-H Club activities along with his college work at the Kansas State Agricultural College, being one of the best boosters of the Collegiate 4-H Club.














Of Merit



Edith Painter of Meade County was awarded the Folger scholarship for being the outstanding girl leader in Kansas 4-H Club activities for 1929. Like the award for the outstanding boy leader this \$150 scholarship to the Kansas State Agricultural College is given annually by the Folger Coffee Company of Kansas City for Advanced Leadership work in the 4-H Clubs of Kansas.

Since 1922, Miss Painter has been actively engaged in the 4-H Club activities in her county. She has completed three years of sewing, three years of foods, and three years of leadership work. She was a member of the judging team that competed at the National Club Congress and International Livestock Show in Chicago in 1925. She was State Home Economics Champion in 1925 and president of the State Who's Who 4-H Club in 1926.

While attending the Kansas State Agricultural College the past two years she has continued her interest in 4-H Club work, and is one of the leaders in the Collegiate 4-H Club, an organization comprised only of former 4-H Club boys and girls who are now attending college.
















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














1929 4-H Club Round-Up

The seventh annual 4-H Club Round-Up was the most successful in the history of club work in Kansas. More than thirteen hundred outstanding 4-H Club folks, representing sixty-six counties gathered on the Kansas State Agricultural College campus, June 2 to 8 for this notable feature of 4-H Club work. The usual custom of housing the boys in the Nichols Gymnasium and the girls at Van Zile Hall was followed. All meals were taken at the College Cafeteria.

The program consisted of a series of interesting features such as instructional work on 4-H projects or those related thereto, music contests, nature studies, sight seeing trips, athletics, educational tours, and a number of similar projects of interest and help to 4-H Club people. With this special entertainment and the influence of competent leaders, every boy and girl was inspired with new and

greater ideals.

In connection with the program, special attention should be given to visitors of merit who gave an added stimulus to the Round-Up through their worth-while contributions. Some of these outstanding personages are given below: Miss Margaret Streeter of the Victor Talking Machine Company; Mrs. Edna Bowling Bush of the Farmer's Wife; Mr. James Hartley of the Hohner Harmonica Company; Miss Ellen Pennell of the Successful Farmer; Mr. George Catts, Agricultural Commissioner of the Chamber of Commerce, Kansas City, Mo.; Mr. L. B. Pollom, Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture. More than twenty-five departments on the campus co-operated and assisted with the program at the Round-Up. Thus the entire affair was truly an all-college activity. A special program was arranged for the 200 leaders who were in attendance for the entire time during the four mornings of the Round-Up week.

Sincere appreciation should be expressed for the enthusiastic support and encouragement given by President Farrell, Dean Umberger, and the entire exten-

sion division in connection with the Round-Up.

Competition was practically doubled in the contests which fact made them more interesting as well as more satisfactory.

These members can rightfully be proud of their new organization as it is the first of its kind to be organized in the United States.



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








NATIONAL ENCAMPMENT DELEGATES TO WASHINGTON, 1930
































Kansas 4-H Club Radio Program

Reports from club members and leaders throughout the states show the Kansas Club programs are interesting and entertaining and have proved a great success.
















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

















