Together, the three have 16 draft horses they've collected in the last six years. "We try to make most of the pulling contests in the Grass & Grain area," Randy said.

3rd-4th Class Kansas Postoffices Open On Sunday

Daily newspaper owners can relax because the U.S. Postal Service has rescinded, at least temporarily, its plan to end Sunday service in Kansas 3rd and 4th class postoffices. The Postal Service plan would have affected 287 Kansas postoffices which traditionally provide Sunday service.

Among other things, this means that rural postal patrons can pick up their Sunday paper at the postoffice. In an announcement from Washington, Sen. James Pearson said "I am pleased the Postal

Service has recognized that effective postal service in rural Kansas should not be sacrificed for minimal economic savings."

Pearson previously had written Postmaster General Winton Blount expressing disapproval of the proposed closings.

Rep. Keith Sebelius last week voted against funding the Postal Service and said it was in protest of plans to curtail Sunday delivery in the 3rd and fourth class offices.

"The Postal corporation is acting penny wise and dollar foolish," Sebelius said then.

"It terminates Sunday mail service in 3rd and 4th class postoffices to save \$188,000 a year in Kansas — and yet asks \$17.5 million to have 2 New York advertising companies handle public relations."

In its announcement, the Postal Service said its decision will be re-

examined in "light of the issues raised by opponents to the measure."

"This is a significant victory for people in our rural area. In opposing this decision, I think we sent the Postal Corporation a message it could understand. I voted in opposition to funding the corporation for the next fiscal year and pointed out this decision was penny-wise and dollar-foolish," Sebelius said.

The corporation had said discontinuing the service in Kansas would save \$188,000 annually.

In opposing this decision in a speech on the House floor, Sebelius noted the corporation spends over \$17 million annually in public relations.

"The best public relations the corporation could have would be to improve postal service," Sebelius said.

Winner, Mrs. Lillie Rebiskie, Alma, submitted this recipe:
HUNGARIAN CABBAGE & NOODLES

- 5 slices bacon, diced
- 2 teaspoons sugar
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 6 cups chopped cabbage
- 3 cups cooked noodles (4 ounces, uncooked)
- 1 cup sour cream
- Paprika

Cook bacon until crisp in large frying pan. Remove bacon pieces and set aside. Stir sugar and salt into bacon drippings and add cabbage to this. Turn cabbage until coated with drippings. Cover and cook for seven minutes. Add cooked noodles and bacon pieces to cabbage and turn into baking dish that can be tightly covered. Bake covered in slow oven about 45 minutes at 325 degrees. Spoon sour cream over top; sprinkle with paprika and return to oven for five minutes more.

UPSIDE DOWN CHOCOLATE CAKE

- 2 cups tiny marshmallows
 - 1 cup brown sugar, packed
 - 1/2 cup cocoa

 - 1 package (1 pound, 2 3/4 ounce) devil's food cake mix
 - 1 cup chopped walnuts
- Place marshmallows in bottom of a greased pan, 13x9x2-inch. Combine sugar, cocoa and hot water and pour over marshmallows. Spoon cake batter (prepared according to directions on packages) over marshmallow mixture. Top with walnuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes or until done. Cool in pan on cake rack for ten minutes. Turn out on tray.

 - 6 ounces stuffed olives (cut)
 - 4 hard-cooked eggs (cut)
 - Green pepper for flavor (cut)
 - 1 1/2 cups whipped cream
 - 1 cup Miracle Whip

- Mix vinegar, sugar and horseradish. Add coloring to desired shade. Add Certo. Stir constantly. Bring to a full rolling boil. Boil 30 seconds then let stand one minute. Skim; put into sterilized jars and seal.

Feet Need Special Care During Summer

Good summer foot care means keeping the feet clean and dry. Bathing the feet with a good germicidal soap is recommended by many doctors. When used regularly, the soap helps prevent infection and perspiration odor.

Liberal use of foot powder is also good. Frequent changes of shoes and stockings is advised. Because feet swell in hot weather, many people find comfort in buying summer shoes which are a little larger than usual. Well-ventilated shoes, such as sandals, help keep perspiring feet drier and more comfortable in hot, humid weather.

Herbed Chicken

Place 1 broiler-fryer chicken (either halves, quarters or pieces) skin side down on broiler pan. Sprinkle with salt, ground white pepper, 1 teaspoon crumbled tarragon, basil or thyme. Broil approximately ten inches below broiler heat for about 30 minutes. Turn chicken, sprinkle with same amounts of seasoning. Broil 30 minutes longer or until done.

Store Cantaloupe In Plastic Bag

To keep cantaloupe smell from invading the entire refrigerator, wrap each melon in a plastic bag and tie or seal with a rubber band.

They may then be placed in refrigerator without the danger of spoiling the flavor of other foods.

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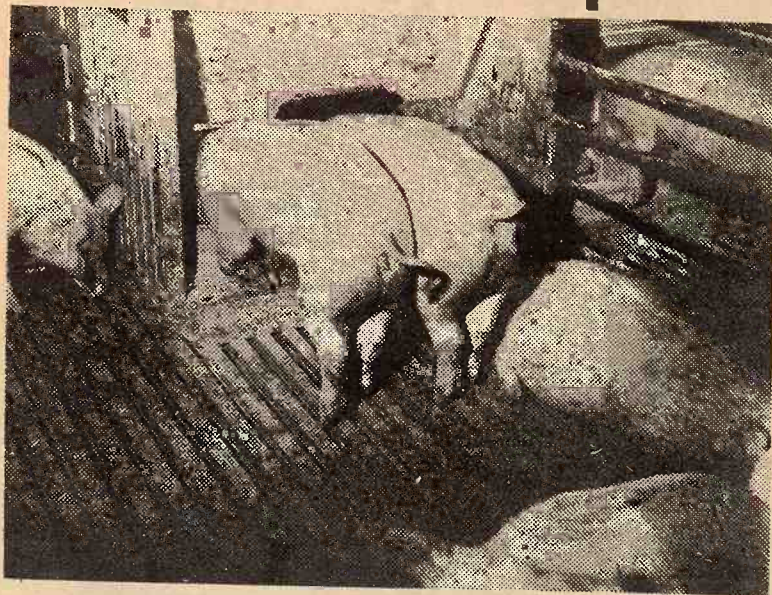

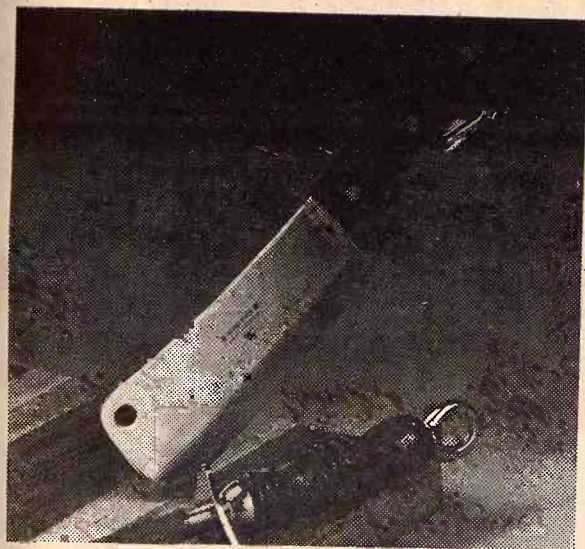

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Kansas Hog Numbers Steady

The number of hogs and pigs on Kansas farms on June 1 was 1 percent below a year ago, but showed considerably less decline than the 9 per cent on March 1, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

March through May farrowings were up 2 percent from a year ago and prospective fall farrowings are moderately above those in 1971. If

for breeding purposes and 1,789,000 head for market.

Breeding hogs were up 7 percent from a year earlier, while market hog numbers were below June 1 last year in all weight groups except those under 60 pounds.

Sows farrowed during the March-May quarter at 125,000 head were 2 percent above the same quarter a year ago. There were 984,000 pigs

more sows farrowing than last year. If intended farrowings are realized and pigs per litter are average adjusted for trend, the June-November pig crop would be 1,659,000 head, 4 percent above last year and the largest since 1932.

In the June-August quarter 90,000 sows are expected to farrow, compared with 88,000 last year. For the September-November quarter

124,000 sows are expected to farrow, 4 percent more than during the same quarter of 1971. The combined Spring and Fall pig crop for 1972 is indicated to total 3,361,000 head, up 3 percent from last year.

Hogs and pigs on farms in the United States on June 1, 1972 were estimated at 61.6 million head, 7 percent less than a year earlier. Hogs and pigs kept for breeding purposes were estimated at 9.3 million head, down 6 percent from last year. Market hogs and pigs at 52.3 million were down 7 percent.

The December-May 1972 pig crop is estimated at 48.3 million head, 8 percent below the same period last year. A total of 6.6 million sows farrowed during this period, 9 percent less than last year.

Hog producers intend to farrow 6.0 million sows during June-November this year, 5 percent less than during the same period in 1971. Intended farrowings and average pigs per litter adjusted for trend, if realized, would produce a June-November pig crop of 44.1 million head. This would be a decrease of 4 percent from 1971. The 1972 pig crop (December 1971-November 1972) would total 92.4 million head, 6 percent below last year.

Gypsy Moths Hitch Rides On Campers And Mobile Homes

Quarantine restrictions have been placed on mobile homes and recreational vehicles moving from areas infested by gypsy moths, the Agriculture Department has announced.

The action, has been taken because the moths have been found on equipment, camper vehicles and

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mobile homes moved from the Northeast to seven states, including Missouri.

Mobile homes and recreational vehicles leaving "infested parks and campsites" must be certified free of the pests by agriculture Department inspectors before they can be moved interstate. Not all campsites quarantined counties are infested and the department said vehicle owners could find out which ones were from federal and state inspectors.

The gypsy moth is a foreign pest that defoliated two million acres of trees, mainly in the northeast U.S. last year.

The quarantine covers all of Connecticut, Rhode Island, Massachusetts and New Jersey and parts of Maine, Vermont, New Hampshire, New York, Pennsylvania, Maryland and Delaware.

current farrowing intentions are carried out, the total 1972 pig crop will be a little above last year.

There were 2,080,000 hogs and pigs on Kansas farms June 1, down 1 percent from the 2,100,000 on the same date a year ago, but otherwise the largest for June 1 in records dating back to 1954. Included in the total were 291,000 head being kept

saved during the quarter, 4 percent more than last year.

Pigs per litter for the quarter averaged 7.87, the highest on record. The Kansas spring pig crop (December 1971-May 1972 farrowings) totaled 1,702,000, up 2 percent from last year.

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Kansas Teacher Salaries Ranked 37th In Nation

Kansas ranks near the bottom of the pile on average teacher salaries, National Education Assn. finance commission report says. There are only thirteen other states with lower average salaries.

With an average of \$8,580 Kansas ranks 37th among the 50 states and is 566 behind the national average of \$9,146, according to the annual study released at the NEA convention.

vention.

Kansas has slipped in rank since 1961-62 when it was 36th, the study shows, despite the fact the average salary has gone up 74.2 per cent in 10 years.

The 311 unified school districts spend an average of \$854 for every pupil in attendance, the NEA said. Kansas expenditures reached a peak in 1965-66, when they were one per cent above the national average.

Wichita budgeted \$762.65 per pupil for 1971-72, NEA said in a section on the major cities with over 50,000 enrollment. Oklahoma City budgeted about \$479 and Tulsa \$619.54. Kansas City, Mo. did not

report its student costs.

Confusion and crisis characterize the past school year said commission chairman Wilbert V. Bollinger, Pomona, Calif., teacher. Urban cities have cut their staffs and programs, he added.

There were 80 per cent more new teacher applicants this past school year than there were teaching positions available, he said, or 229,000 applicants for 125,000 positions. The commission maintained there is no teacher surplus — only a shortage of money to fund necessary programs and hire them.

NEA's solution to the money problem, it said is a "national standard of education" with one-third of the cost of education financed by the federal government. Price tag for reaching this goal would be more than \$20 billion. The federal government now finances about 8 per cent of the cost of education.

NEA has promoted the one-third federal funding idea in the past, but lobbyists said Congress is becoming more receptive to the idea. A bill, not yet written, is to be introduced in January or February.

"The NEA has set 1976, the 200th anniversary of the nation, as the target date for full operation and funding" of the one-third aid plan, the commission reported.

"Basically we have no trouble funding national defense at any level," said NEA Executive Secretary Sam Lambert, suggesting that education deserves a higher priority. A United States Supreme Court decision within a few months on use of property taxes for school financing should help convince Congress of the need for more federal aid, the commission said.

The report raises doubts about chances of passage of bond issues such as the one the Wichita Board of Education is studying.

Voter approval of bond issues reached a record low in 1970-71, the commission said. The most current figures available show only 41.4 per

cent of the amount and 46.7 per cent of the number of issues offered were approved. The high was reached in 1964-65, when 74.7 per cent of all issues were approved.

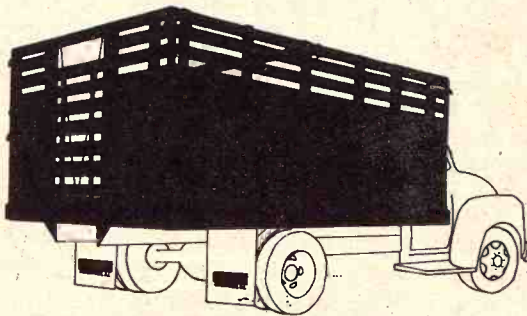

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Minimum Tillage, Key To Saving Farm Dollars

With farm cost soaring, minimum tillage systems are beginning to look even better. Besides cutting costs minimum tillage helps conserve the soil and moisture without sacrificing yields.

Over the state, practices vary from "no tillage" — planting grain sorghum or corn on stubble — to minimum tillage to deep plowing. Farmers in northern and northeastern Kansas practice "no tillage" in some cases and control weeds with herbicides. Practices seem to depend on the crop and soil.

"Every farmer has to be his own judge," says KSU Crop Specialist Verlin Peterson.

"In this day and age when operating costs are high, if farmers can eliminate some of their field operations, it will be a real saving."

Conservationist Guy Morrefield believes through minimum tillage costs can be cut, and soil and moisture conserved without sacrificing yields. "By reducing

tractor trips across the field, there also is less soil compaction which increases yields, and water storage is increased by limiting tillage," said Moorefield.

Annual deep moldboard plowing has, in many cases, been eliminated in favor of chiseling or springtoothing or discing, a check of farmers indicates.

Minimum tillage is not all on the plus side. This system must rely on chemical weed control, but with the variety of herbicides available, this is not the problem it once was, according to Moorefield.

Spring Field Day held at the Sandyland Experiment Field operated by Kansas State University at St. John, revealed minimum tillage problems.

"Depending solely on herbicides in sandy soil is questionable and expensive," agronomist Marvin Lundquist told farmers attending. "It takes tillage to keep sandy soil weed-free."

"Northern Kansas may have good luck on weed control in grain sorghum, but we have had no consistent weed control with the residual herbicide," said George TenEyck, field superintendent.

The field that serves a nine-county surrounding area has experimented with minimum tillage the past 18 years using chiseling or V-power blades to leave a residue on the surface to keep the soil from blowing, he said.

The field runs into a "cheat" and brome problem. To avoid this, a cropping system of wheat for two years followed by grain sorghum for two years followed by a year of summer fallow is practiced.

TenEyck uses undercutting blades and chisels with a 16-inch sweep to keep down the weeds. There is only a slight advantage in using six-inch depth of cultivators over three-inch depth in the sandy soil, said Lundquist.

The experiment field has used Paraquat (\$30 a gallon) the first year on wheat with yields comparing favorably on the "no tillage" method. But yields depreciated due to lack of weed control in the second year, TenEyck said.

The field has gone over to a

minimum tillage plus crop management system, he added.

"At some time in the future, experimenters may come up with a herbicide or develop one that will give adequate weed control at an effective depth of the soil," TenEyck said.

Other experiments at the field are:

- Irrigation — date of planting corn and tests on 50 varieties of hybrids.

- Fertilizer studies on corn and multiple application of nitrogen. Time for application of nitrogen.

- Application of lime on the soil for corn, and herbicide studies on corn and grain sorghums.

- Sorghum and alfalfa varieties and muskmelon varieties.

Wetta Egg Farm Pickling Eggs For Wichita Consumers

Wetta Egg Farm, Andale, in Sedgwick County this week took a long step in bridging the gap between the producer and consumer by placing "pickled eggs" on the market.

The hard-cooked eggs with the shells removed were placed on the market for institutional delivery last June and met with such success the farm is attempting with a new process to reach the direct retail trade with pickled eggs.

The pickled eggs, in sealed air-tight containers, will soon be available in refrigerated cases of food markets here.

The eggs are fresh-packed in a solution of water, salt, vinegar, and

polysorbate 80 and spices.

The eggs are converted easily into deviled eggs, salads, sandwiches or eaten whole with lunches or beer.

Wetta Egg Farm has tested the market on the eggs and found ready retail demand, Wetta reported.

The eggs have been made available at Carl Bell's East market and will soon be available in other stores.

The Wetta Egg Farm is supplying the Wichita market with 36,000 eggs daily from their 50,000-bird flock.

The new product of pickled eggs delivered in air-tight, sealed jars in addition to Wat-A-Egg (a hard-boiled, cooked, peeled and packaged process) and fresh eggs delivered the market.

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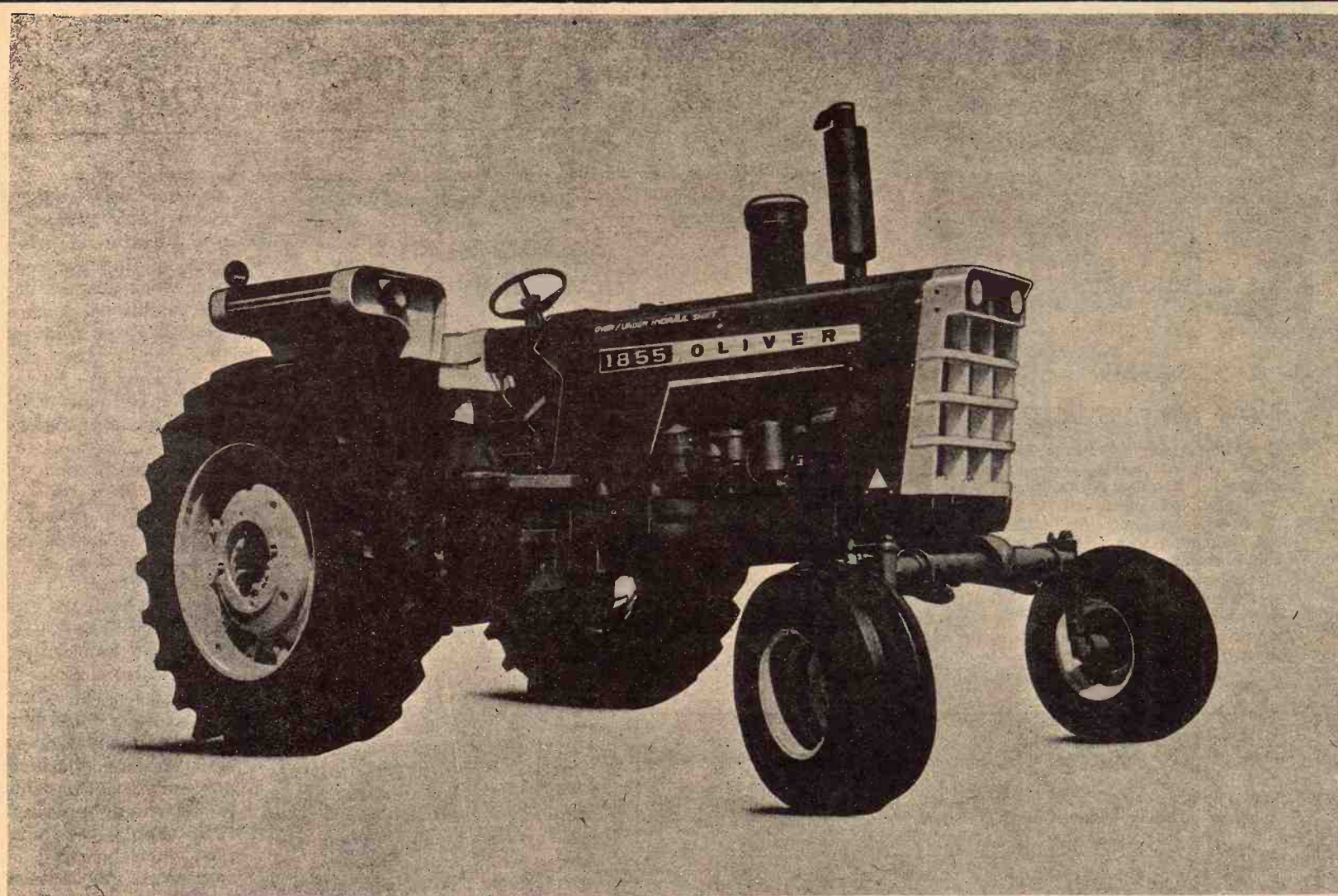

Oriental Exports Hit Record High On U.S. Markets

U.S. imports of agricultural commodities from the Far East reached a record \$922.7 million last year, 7.7 per cent above those of 1970, the Agriculture Department reports.
 The Philippines, India, Japan and Indonesia accounted for most of the increase. Sugar rubber, coconut products, canned fruits and vegetables, cashew nuts, tea and coffee were the major imports from this region.
 The first substantial imports of agricultural commodities from the People's Republic of China in more than 20 years occurred in late 1971. Total U.S. imports of all items from Mainland China last year were

valued at about \$5 million, including almost \$4 million of agricultural products.

The department said, in order to acquaint the U.S. trade with their quality, samples of Chinese products, including goatskins, and cashmere goat hair, were sent to American importers free.

U.S. agricultural imports from Hong Kong increased by 26 per cent in 1971 to \$4.3 million, a large part of which originated in the People's Republic of China, especially prunes and processed vegetables, the department said.

It is said that although the leading import in 1971 from the People's Republic of China — in terms of value — was hog bristles, other items might surpass it in importance in the near future.

Some of the most important nonagricultural imports from the People's Republic of China last year included antiques, carpets and other

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items used as household decorations.

Substantial U.S. imports of Chinese products arrived only during September, November and December in 1971. If imports arrive this year at the same rate, U.S. imports from Mainland China would reach \$20 million. During the first three months of 1972 U.S. imports of farm products totaled \$4.5 million.

The department said the U.S. also is increasing agricultural imports from Outer Mongolia. In 1971, these imports totaled \$895,000 still below imports of \$3.5 million from this source in 1965. Leading items imported from Outer Mongolia in 1971 included camel hair, cashmere goat hair and furs.

The U.S. imported a record \$381 million worth of agricultural products from the Philippines, \$90 million from India, \$46 million from Japan and \$128 million from Indonesia.

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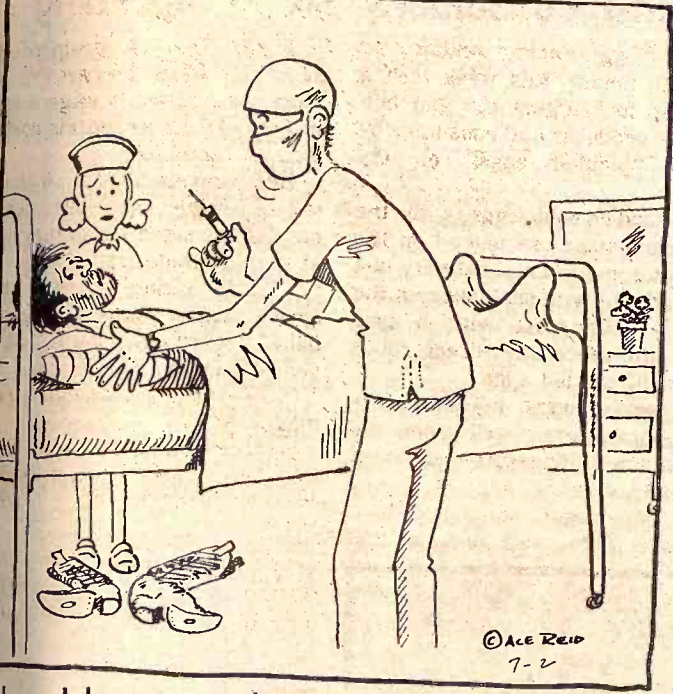

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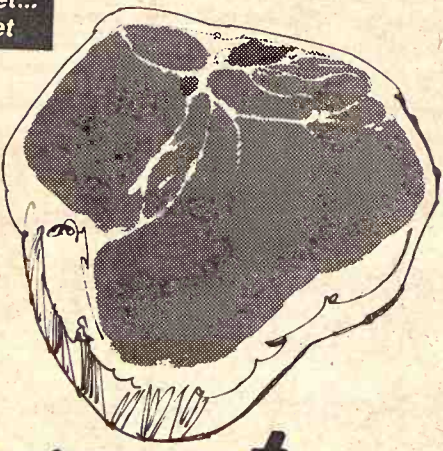

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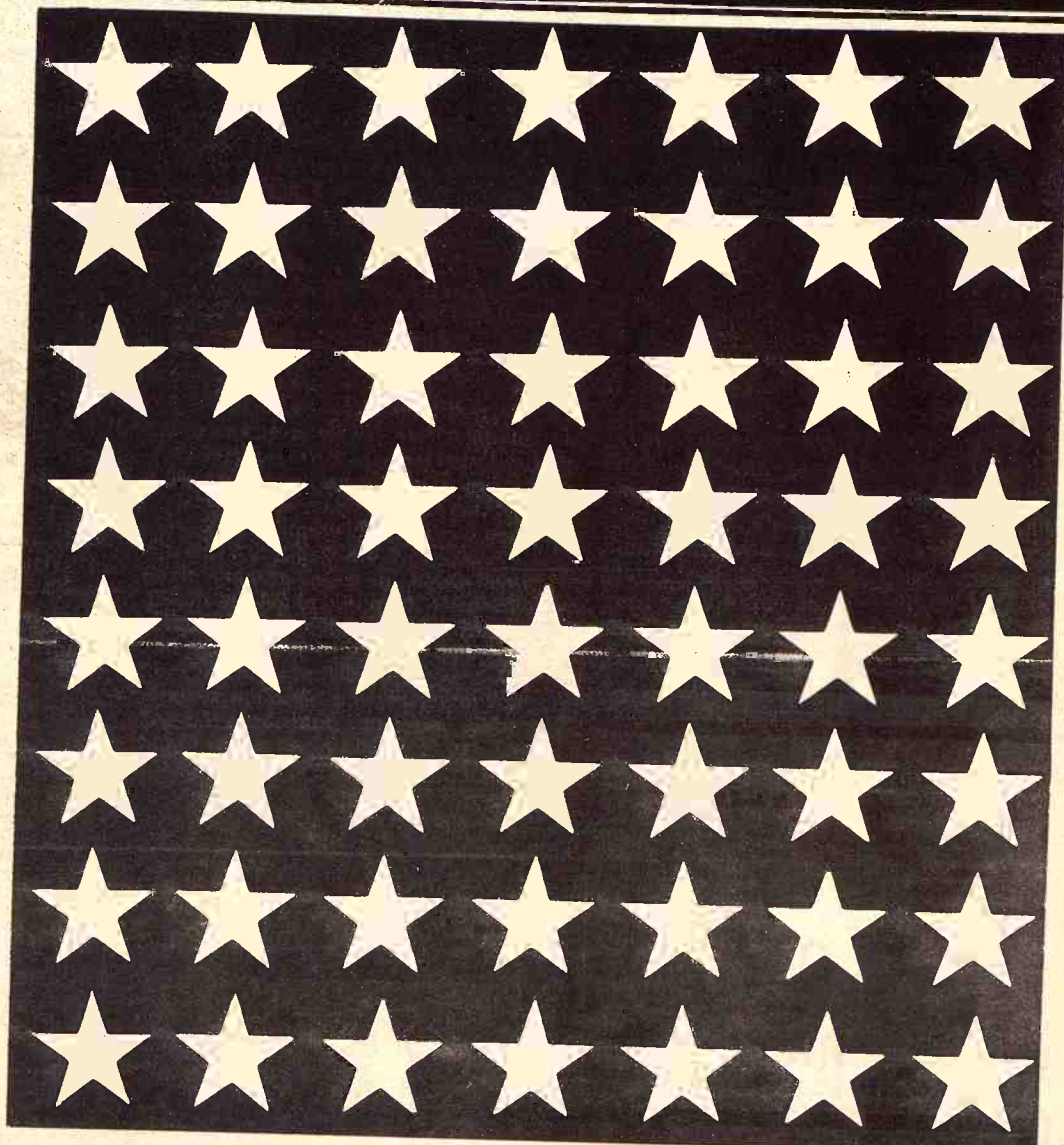


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Extensive Plant Damage At Council Grove Lake

Extensive damage to plant life around the Council Grove Reservoir are becoming evident after aerial herbicide application a month or two ago, according to a pesticide specialist of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

Application of the herbicide, thought to have been 2, 4-D, apparently occurred while an aircraft was spraying adjoining pasture land for brush control.

The Fish and Game specialist,

Steve Capel, McPherson, said plant life is important because it is a supply of food and cover for wildlife.

He said members of the Fish and Game Commission likely will consider legal action against the plane's owner at their July meeting.

U.S. Army Corps of Engineers spokesmen said their Tulsa office still is contemplating a civil suit against the sprayer.

Capel said, "There is no cause for concern about public health in use of

the lake. The fish are perfectly safe to eat. There was no direct damage to wildlife or to fish in the lake.

"There was wildlife food killed and when you do this, you are essentially destroying wildlife."

Capel said results on water samples sent by the Army Corps of Engineers to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency have not come back. But he said after looking at the damage and containers found at the scene where the airplane operator was working, there is not much question in his mind that the herbicide was 2, 4-D.

The herbicide 2, 4-D is a chemical commonly used for brush control in pastureland. An aerial application of it would kill broadleaf plants and leave grass unharmed.

The State Department of

Agriculture classifies 2, 4-D as a safe chemical for humans and animals and desirable because it breaks down naturally in the environment.

Capel said one of the aerial applications of herbicide occurred May 24 on Corps land only. The second application to the lake area May 31 was on both Corps land and federal land leased by Fish and Game Commission, he said.

Corps areas affected were by the spillway and on the White Park Peninsula. A Corps spokesman at the lake said he preferred not to discuss damage there until it is clarified what legal action might be taken. An official at the Corps offices in Tulsa, Okla. said the Corps would have comment later.

Capel said the Fish and Game land affected was north of the Canning Creek Cove Recreation Area. He said 200 plants in long rows planted this spring, mostly autumn olive and multiflora rose for wildlife cover and food, were damaged. "Only three or four plants aren't hurt."

He said, "There was also damage to mature stands. Two to four acres of plants were killed. There was Black and Honey Locust, sumac, dogwood and walnut. Food plants like dock and ragweed were killed."

"There was additional damage to six to eight acres of fairly good wildlife cover. It won't kill the woody plants there although they will be defoliated."

Capel said the true extent of the damage may not be known for a year. He said some trees could die back to the ground and then rejuvenate themselves with branching suckers. "The thing is even if the area isn't totally destroyed, things are impaired for a long while. It might be 20 years before a walnut tree produces nuts for food again."

Capel said small animals like quail, rabbits, doves and song birds, are the ones most likely to suffer from the herbicide application.

He said there is little likelihood fish in the lake will be affected. "A little plankton could have been killed." Plankton are floating, minute animals and plants that supply food for shad, which larger fish feed on.

But Capel said the amount of plankton killed would be small since the lake is large and only a small

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area of it was sprayed. He said there would be little danger of an oxygen shortage that would kill fish either because of the size factors or because wind on a large lake keeps the water whipped up and adds oxygen in it.

"Fish are killed sometimes in farm ponds since those are smaller. This isn't an isolated incident. Spray drift from aerial spraying does occur on private land but nothing is usually done about it. This points out the need for caution and skill in aerial application."

Farm Exports At Record Pace

Farm exports are continuing to move at a record pace this year and stand a good chance of shattering the all-time high value of \$7.8 billion set during the 1970 season, according to the latest Agriculture Department figures.

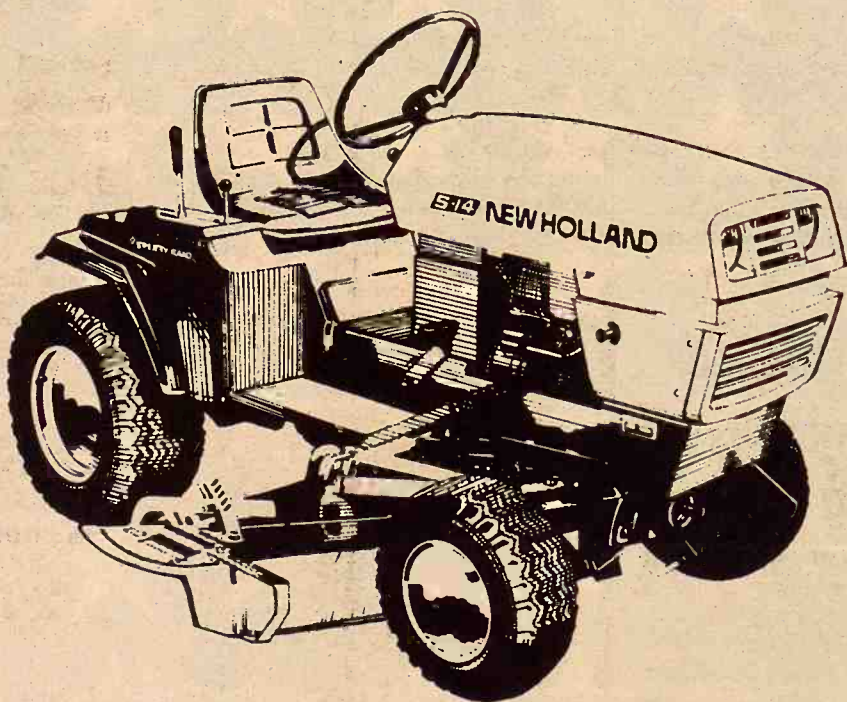
A spokesman for the Economic Research Service in USDA said Tuesday that the cumulative value of farm exports for 11 months of the year beginning last July 1 was \$7.22 billion, up from \$100 million from the July-May period during the record 1970-71 year.

That means exports this year will have to total less than \$1 billion to break the old \$7.8 billion record. In May, according to preliminary figures, exports totaled \$712 million, compared with \$612 million in May last year.

Even so, according to the April report, some key commodities such as grain are down sharply in value and volume from a comparable period in 1970-71.

Total grain exports through April this season were valued at about \$1 billion, down 12 per cent from a year earlier. Strikes at some Gulf and western ports were blamed for part of the reduction.

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No-Fault Insurance in Federal Level Draws Kansas Fire

The president of the Kansas Trial Lawyers Assn., James M. Barnett of Overland Park, said that auto insurance rates in the state will increase by 30 per cent if a pending \$100 million from the federal no-fault bill is enacted.

Motorists will have their rates

hiked 30.2 per cent if this bill passes the Congress and is forced on the states. Drivers with medium coverage, which also includes collision insurance, will experience a 54.2 per cent increase," Barnett said in his prepared statement.

A federal no-fault auto insurance bill recently was approved by the Senate Commerce Committee.

Barnett said, "A number of well-meaning public officials are being duped about no-fault auto insurance. They have been told that no-fault is a 'consumer protection' measure and are afraid to oppose it in an election year because they also have been told that the public wants it."

"The Kansas Legislature studied this matter extensively and rejected

it during the 1972 session," Barnett said. "Our lawmakers know of the problems and false claims surrounding the radical no-fault concept."

"They also know that Kansas now has some of the lowest auto insurance rates in the country, and that the motorists in our state do not want to pay for accidents caused by negligent and drunken drivers."

The trial lawyers organization nationwide is strongly opposed to the no-fault concept, which bars lawsuits to recover damages resulting from automobile accidents in cases where the amount sought for injuries is below certain figures.

A recent story said the trial lawyers are assessing their membership nationwide to obtain funds for lobbying against the federal no-fault measure before Congress.

Barnett said that Fletcher Bell, the state insurance commissioner, "has said that he feels the state's present auto insurance rates are 'reasonable.' Bell has warned the motorists of Kansas not to expect rate reductions under no-fault insurance."

The state insurance commissioner said in a statement last week that he is opposed to a federal no-fault measure, and called for the states to enact legislation tailored to their individual needs.

Gov. Robert Docking also has urged Congress to let the states come up with their own no-fault automobile insurance plans.

Walt Biddle, Topeka, executive director of the Kansas Trial Lawyers Assn., said figures on the alleged increase in rates that no-fault would cause in Kansas were prepared by the Allstate Insurance Co. for the Senate Commerce Committee.

Kansans Overlook Money Gain By Harvesting Trees

City dwellers and farmers alike may be missing a money gain if they cut down their trees without consulting a county extension agent, Harold Gallaher, state extension forester, said.

Gallaher said sawmills are frequently prejudiced against "city grown" trees because of a high occurrence of metal in them. "People are always pounding nails in them."

Gallaher even advised people to check out the value of American elms killed by Dutch elm disease. "An elm would need to be moved before it was dead long. The wood boring insects associated with the disease damage it quickly," he said.

The realm of forestry in the city has just been entered recently by the

State Forestry Dept. headquartered at Kansas State University, Gallaher said. He said sometimes city questions concern beautifying main street but lately most concern is with replacing dead elms.

"We're recommending cities pick 18 to 20 species of trees to plant," he said. "They should plant them in alternate blocks so we won't have a continuous grove of one species open to disease again."

Gallaher said the Kansas forestry program is just beginning to expand because until now "few people here realized we had forests."

"We haven't done a good job managing forests in Kansas," Gallaher claimed.

But he believes correction possible because most woodland here is in small plots of perhaps 40 acres per owner.

"Only a fourth of the annual growth in wood in the state is being utilized. Kansas is second in the production of high quality walnut veneer and number one in the overall production of walnut," he said. "The state ships out 10,000 train carloads of cottonwood a year to Texas and Louisiana."

Gallaher explained that paper plants there need the short fiber of cottonwood to produce slick magazine paper.

Gallaher believes Kansas could have a great potential in forest production.

"An acre of land here along good creek bottom can produce as much wood as a section of land in Colorado," he said.

He said there are no indications the need for wood will go down with the nation's growing population and increasing demand for paper.

Wood from Kansas is going for many other demands, too. Gallaher said Kansas elm is exported to make

coffins in Scandinavian countries. Excess pecan wood in southeastern Kansas is used to make charcoal. The state produces Scotch pines for Christmas trees "as good as you'll find anywhere."

"We ship burr oak to make barrels. Kansas has the only large supply of burr oak left," he said.

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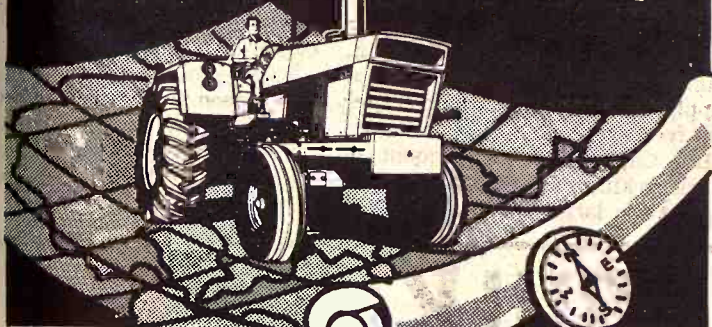
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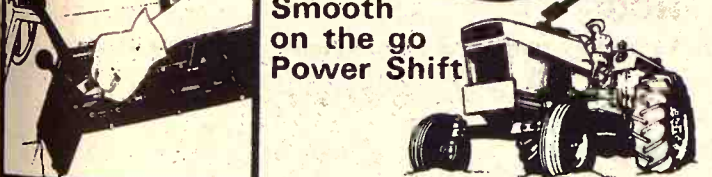
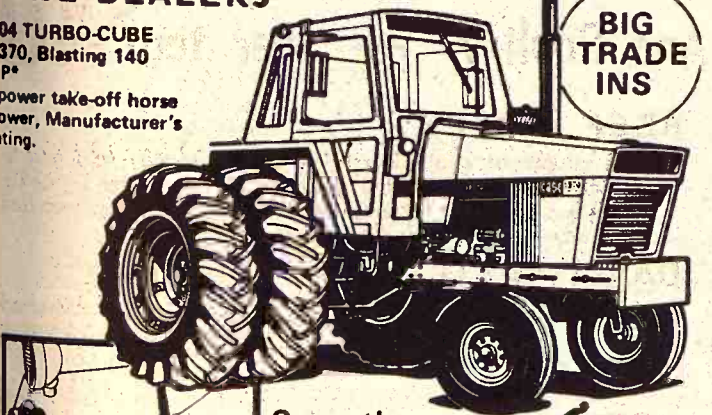
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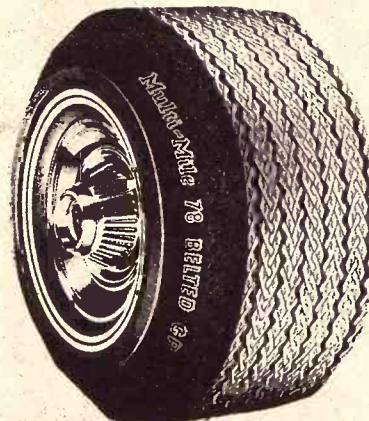
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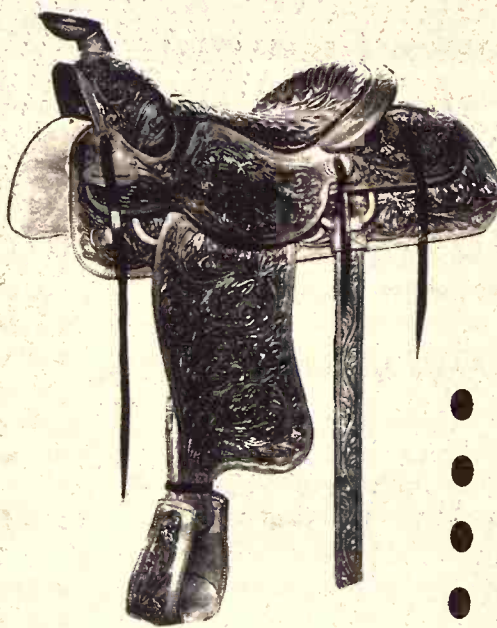
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Bloat Guard Protects Cattle Grazing Alfalfa

If there are any new ways to prevent legume bloat in cattle — an affliction that has been causing production losses of \$100 million a year for U.S. farmers and ranchers — it is a good bet that Dr. Erle Bartley, a Kansas State scientist, will help develop them.

Bartley and KSU already have had a hand in developing three successful methods by which cattlemen can safely feed their animals on lush, nutritious alfalfa — a tempting and unpredictable legume which frequently causes bloat resulting in death or production losses for the cattle who eat it.

K-State's success in bloat research is based on Bartley's discovery in 1966 of a drug called "poloxalene," considered to be the most effective bloat-preventive agent known. That discovery earned the university international recognition and has attracted many scientists, including several from other countries, to view the experiments at Manhattan.

Each of the three methods of preventing bloat by use of poloxalene is now being marketed by commercial firms who provided assistance to the KSU research.

Bloat Guard (the registered trademark of Smith, Kline & French

Laboratories of Philadelphia for its brand of poloxalene developed by Bartley) was approved for use as a top dressing on feed by the Food and Drug Administration in March, 1966, and for use in molasses-salt blocks (manufactured and sold by A.E. Staley Manufacturing Co., Decatur, Ill., under the trade name of Sweetlix Bloat Guard) in 1967. Since that time millions of doses of poloxalene in these two forms have been fed successfully to cattle.

Now, through research, a molasses liquid supplement has been developed as still another way of administering poloxalene to cattle that graze legume pastures. This new supplement, recently approved by the FDA, is called Mol-Mix Bloat Guard and is manufactured by National Molasses Company of Willow Grove, Pa.

According to Phil Winslow, a National Molasses vice president, field trials during the past two years have shown that the use of high-protein alfalfa dramatically increases the production of meat and milk. The safety of cattle eating alfalfa when used with Bloat Guard is well-documented, Winslow added.

Economic returns from growing cattle on alfalfa with poloxalene for legume bloat control have been

outstanding, Winslow said. The average of three university and ranch feeding trials with growing cattle on alfalfa has shown a net return of \$191.07 per acre with a range of \$157.84 to \$283.61 per acre.

Two studies conducted with lactating dairy cows at the Southeast Kansas Branch Experiment Station of KSU compared alfalfa pasture with alfalfa hay. Cows grazing on alfalfa pasture produced significantly more milk (five and one-half pounds more per cow, per day) than those fed excellent quality alfalfa hay. There was no bloat in the cows fed on alfalfa pasture with Bloat Guard.

Mol-Mix Bloat Guard also provides a labor-saving advantage in that it can be fed free-choice from free-turning lick-wheels (at least one wheel for every 25 head of cattle) and provides a ready supply of bloat protection 24 hours a day.

Bartley, recognizing the primary cause of legume bloat is excessive foaming of rumen contents, began

his search for an effective agent to control bloat foam in 1958 at Kansas State University. He has been at KSU since 1949 when he received his PH.D from Iowa State University.

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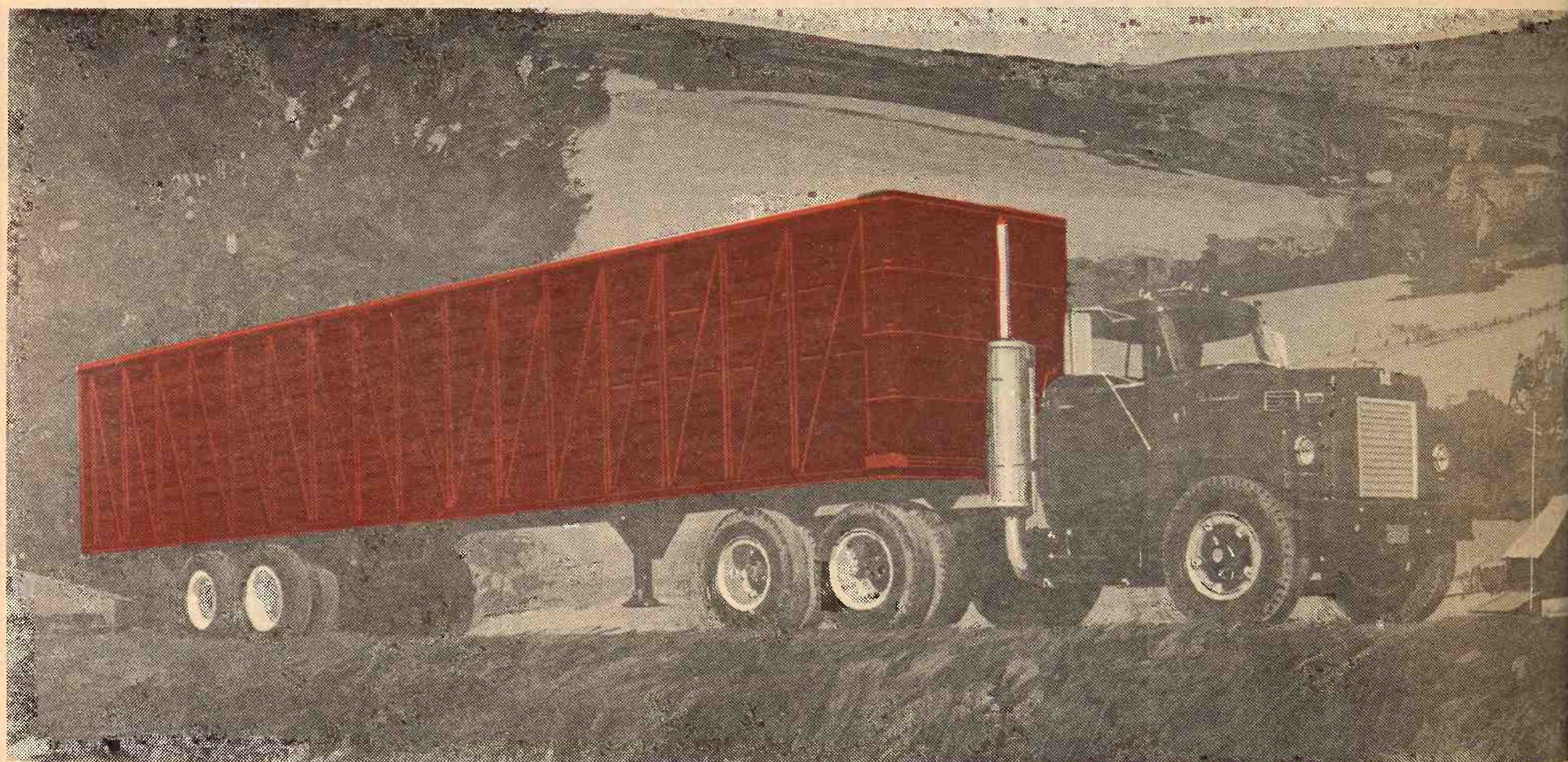

Supply Behind Demand For Meat On World Market

The press for red meat proteins is worldwide and demand is increasing as nations develop industrially. Unfortunately, the growth of the livestock industry has not matched the demand on a worldwide basis. World meat production in the early 1960's, a decade ago, was 110 billion pounds. Today it is 130 billion pounds.

Russian officials told Secretary of

Agriculture Earl Butz a few months ago when he visited there that they hope to boost their meat protein production by 25 per cent.

West Europe also is trying to produce more cattle and hogs to satisfy its population demand.

In the face of the increasing demand brought on by a more affluent world society it isn't strange that the price of red meat continues to increase.

For instance, in the past decade with a burgeoning demand for the more expensive cuts of meat, production of beef was 17.9 billion pounds in the early 1960's, and yet with strong demand, the increase by

this year is expected to total only 23.3 billion pounds.

A total of 42 other countries produced 57.4 billion pounds 10 years ago, now they produce 70 billion pounds.

Countries considered major meat exporters produced the following pounds of red meat a decade ago and now:

BEEF: Argentina: 4.9 billion, 6 billion.

France: 3.2 billion, 3.4 billion.

West Germany: 2.5 billion, 2.8 billion

Brazil: 3 billion, 3.5 billion.

Australia: 1.9 billion, and 2 billion.

PORK:

France: 2.3 billion, 2.4 billion.

Brazil: 1 billion, 1.25 billion.

United Kingdom: 1.8 billion, 2 billion.

China is a large producer, but no figures are available.

United States: 11.9 billion, 13 billion.

MUTTON AND GOAT:

Russia: 1.7 billion, 1.9 billion.

Australia: 1.3 billion, 1.5 billion.

New Zealand: 1 billion, 1.25 billion.

United States: ¾ billion, ½ billion.

With the high meat prices domestically, hog numbers on United States farms are declining this year. June 1 reports showed there were 61.6 billion head of hogs on farms. This is 7 per cent fewer than a year ago. It was estimated 9.3 million head are being kept for

breeding purposes, down 6 per cent from last year, and market hogs remaining were 52.3 million, down 7 per cent.

The pig crop estimated for May-December, 1972 is estimated at 48.3 million head, 8 per cent below the same period a year ago.

This means hog prices are going to continue upward, too.

Kansas, however, is doing more than its share to hold the line on production. The fall pig crop is expected to be up 4 per cent over last year. Earlier production was down 1 per cent however this year.

Kansas also continues to grow as a beef producing state. There 1.15 million head of cattle in Kansas feedlots June 1, some 70,000 head above a year ago.

In the United States on Jan. 1, 1972, there were nearly 118 million head of cattle and calves. This was a growth of 3 million head in the past year, a little more than 2 per cent increase.

Numbers of hogs had declined 5 million head to a total of about 63 million. Sheep and lambs were down to 18.5 million head from 19.6 the year before.

Beef cattle in the United States had declined from 48.9 million head at the start of 1970 to 51 million by

January 1972, almost a 6 per cent growth.

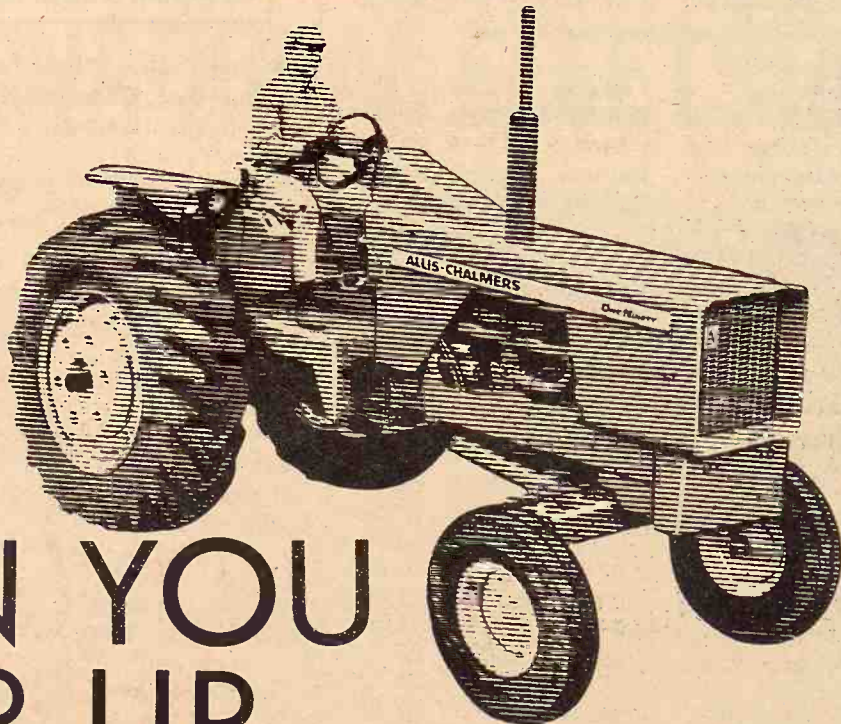
But, demand has outlasted production increases not only in the United States, but all over the world. And if one continues to eat meat, he is going to continue to pay more money for it to get the production going up faster.

The department's Economic
Research Service, in surveys of
Recordings for the first six months
of 1971 and 1,700 agricultural
counties, found that the total amount
of these large loans rose 37 per cent
between 1969 and 1971 to \$360

ERS says they also accounted for
a growing proportion of all new farm
mortgage loans recorded during the
six-month period — 14 per cent in
1971 versus 12 per cent two years
earlier.

The ERS report says that life
insurance companies last year made
34 per cent of their farm mortgage
loans in the \$250,000-and-up
category. It says 33 percent of the
loans from individuals and
miscellaneous lenders were large
loans. Production credit
associations had 25 per cent. Large
loans by three lenders — federal
land banks, commercial banks, and
savings and loan associations —
ranged from 7 to 10 per cent.

The larger loans carried slightly
higher interest rates, 7.74 per cent
for loans over \$250,000 and 7.38 per
cent for loans below this amount.

ERS says the biggest portion of
the large loans was in the Mountain
States. These eight states, with only
8 per cent of the U.S. total value of
agricultural land and buildings,
recorded 28 per cent of the total
dollar amount for large loans. Only
11 per cent was in the five Corn Belt
States, which have 23 per cent of the
total U.S. value of land and
buildings.

Registered Motor Vehicles Increase Over 4.5 Million

The Federal Highway Ad-
ministration said 112,922,354 motor
vehicles were registered in the
United States during 1971, an in-
crease of more than 4½ million
during the year.

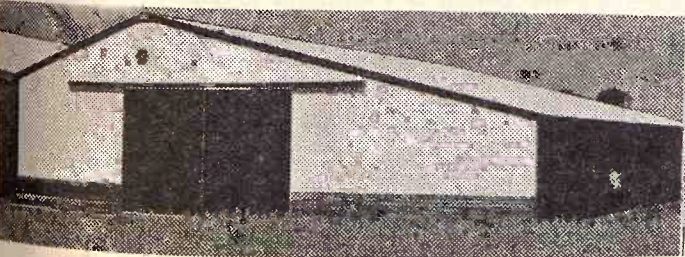

Farm View On Cattle Feeding Costs

EDITOR'S NOTE: A Grass and Grain area farmer-stockman, F. W. Anderson, of Burdick in Morris County gives his opinion on the cost of feeding cattle, and why he's still doing it now. His use of current cattle feeding figures makes his article even more relevant at a time when the import curb on beef has been lifted.

I am a small farmer and stockman, small enough, in fact, in this modern day of agriculture, that my size of operation is about as popular as Henry Ford's Edsel.

Having fed a few cattle of my own, in each of the last 25 years, I would like to donate my theory of where I think part of the high price of meat to the consumer lies.

First I would like to commend one of the leading retail stores, that has been advertising daily for some time now, that they have total discount meat prices with price cuts of 20, 30, and 40 cents a pound, and that their prices are down to stay. This sounds like a sizable cut in price and it's also amazing that they know the prices are down to stay.

Just for fun, let's you and me buy some feeder cattle, feed them, and see how we come out. We'll buy steers weighing 675 pounds choice grade and pay the current price of \$42 a hundred pounds — this is \$283.50 plus \$1.50 to get them home so we have \$285 invested. We feed the steers for 150 days and hope to

have them gain two and a half pounds a day, so at the end of 150 days they will weigh 1,050 pounds on the farm. We'll feed the steers 20 pounds of milo daily. We're lucky there because milo is about as cheap as it's been for a long time — we're lucky that is, unless we're trying to raise it at these prices. We'll figure the milo at two cents a pound, that is 40 cents a day, or a total of \$60 a head. Two pounds protein at four cents a pound totals out to \$12 a head. We now have \$357 invested in our steers, plus \$10 interest at the bank or \$367. Maybe we have a friendly feed man and can get by without interest on the feed for 150 days, most feed men, however, don't stay friendly for more than 30 days. The cattle should have had 8 or 10 pounds of silage daily and a pound or two of prairie hay, but we'll say we had some extra, so we'll throw that in free.

Now we have \$367 invested in each steer. This is when you wake up at night and wonder if the steer that was bloated last night when you fed is better or worse, or if the bolt of lightning you just saw happened to hit in the corner of the lot where 100 steers were standing. I've been lucky, I guess, I've only lost three from lightning since June.

If we ship the cattle to market and they shrink only four to five per cent we will be paid for 1,000 pounds. Let's assume we top the market at \$39.25 as they were last week. This is a 21 year high; in other words we'll

get as much for our steers as we were getting 21 years ago. So, we have \$392.50 minus \$8 a head trucking and commission, or \$384.50 minus the cost \$367, which leaves us a profit of \$17.50 per head. This profit of course does not include the cost of the feed lot, bunks, elevator, grinder, feedwagon, tractors, silo, silage, hay, salt, mineral, labor, grain hauling, water tanks, water pump, electricity, grinding, deathloss, vet bills, medicine, depreciation or property tax. We pay property tax each year on all this equipment whether we show a profit or not. We also pay a tax on the cattle of three or four dollars a head if we have them on the first of January.

The cost of this equipment is unbelievable and when you get it home and start to use it the value drops about as fast as a paratrooper when his chute doesn't open.

These 1,000 pound steers should grade choice and yield 60 per cent meat, which would mean 600 pounds meat per steer. At \$17.50 profit, this means the feeder has made a profit of three cents a pound for the meat he has produced.

Now we come to the part I cannot understand. If the feeder's profit is three cents a pound and we've topped the market at a 21 year high, how can a retail store cut the price of the same meat as much as 40 cents a pound, still maintain a profit, and still the feeder gets the blame for the high price of meat. If you would

check your meat costs 21 years ago, when the feeder received the same as now, and then deduct 40 cents per pound, I think you would find your meat cost quite reasonable. The increased cost you are now paying would have to be between the feeder and the meat market, and this is due to higher labor costs. These were created by the people who are buying the meat.

It seems cattle feeding is one way you can produce two kinds of stinks, one from the cattle and one from the meat consumer, but I believe the two are closely related.

Perhaps by now you wonder why I stay on the farm. Maybe it's because

I feel I have a different kind of wealth, wealth that lets you see the sun come up each morning and each night through smog free skies. I like the feel of sweat through my shirt and the feeling of accomplishment after a long hard day. I have a good wife with a lot of strong faith and encouragement and I farm the land my father farmed before me and his father before him, and it was through my father's hard work and success and success working together when we were living that we are able to do the things we have and do the things we love to do.

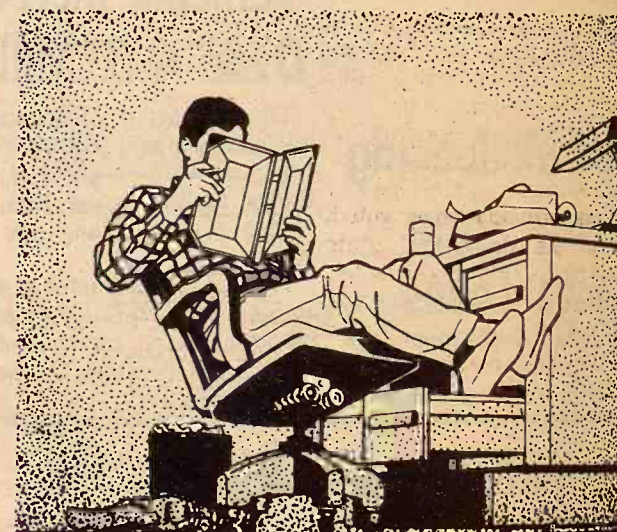

Australians Happy With Nixon's Beef Quota Lid Removal

Although a precise estimate is uncertain, trade sources say Australia may be able to exceed its share of the U.S. beef-import quota now that President Nixon has ordered the lid removed.

An Australian trade official who asked not to be named, told a reporter "we're happy" with the White House order and an allotment attempt will be made to Australian

exporters to secure their share of the U.S. market.

The order lifted meat quota restrictions for the remainder of 1972 as a move by the administration to help soften rising food prices, particularly retail meat costs. Under a 1964 law, certain kinds of meat, mostly fresh, chilled and frozen beef, are subject to annual quotas based on U.S. production.

Until the lid was suspended, the revised 1972 quota was 1.24 billion pounds, estimated at about 7.3 per cent of U.S. output. Australia, the biggest supplier, was authorized to provide about 600 million pounds.

"I think it's safe to say we'll do all

we can to exceed that level," the trade official said. "By how much, at this time is difficult to say."

Last year, due mainly to U.S. dock strikes, Australia fell short by 48 million pounds of meeting the 1971 quota of 1.16 billion pounds.

But this year, through April, meat imports have risen sharply. During the first four months, according to USDA figures, the shipments totaled 3483 million pounds, an 8 per cent boost from a year earlier.

Australia's share of the January-April total was 165 million pounds, up 40 per cent from a year earlier. With that momentum, the trade official said, Australia is in good shape to boost total 1972 U.S. shipments sharply.

Further, the official said, Australian beef exports normally pick up during the second half of the year.

Removal of the import restrictions, regardless of its effect on consumer meat supplies, is a psychological weapon and could have some effect on U.S. prices for live cattle.

Moreover, if USDA analysts are correct, more fed cattle are moving to market and prices at the farm level probably will slip downward this summer and fall.

Dentists Wage War On Heart Disease In U.S.

A group of dentists are checking the blood pressure of patients under a pilot program aimed at early detection of heart disease, the No. 1 killer in the United States.

Fifteen dentists who have volunteered to take part in the program during the next two months will measure their patients' blood pressure and refer those with high readings to physicians. The purpose is to find undiagnosed cases of hypertension, also known as high blood pressure, a major factor in heart disease.

Medical experts have indicated that 10 million Americans are unaware they suffer from high blood pressure.

"Dentists are specially equipped to detect high blood pressure because people are sold on going to a dentist two or three times a year," says Charles L. Berman, a dentist credited with starting the program. "This just isn't so in medicine."

Bergen County health officials will present the results of the program at the meeting of the American Dental Association in San Francisco later this year. It has already been endorsed by Dr. Campbell Moses, medical director for the American Heart Association.

Berman got the idea for the program a year ago after reading about the problem of hypertension. He immediately began testing his patients' blood pressure.

He said that during the last four months he has detected 14 cases of previously undiagnosed hypertension and referred the patients to physicians.

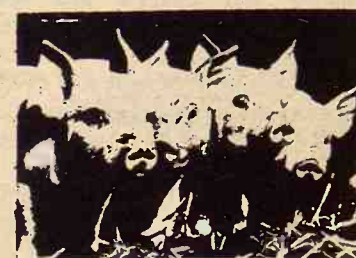
There is no direct link between hypertension and going to the dentist, although some people may become nervous and their blood pressure may rise a bit. But it is not significant.

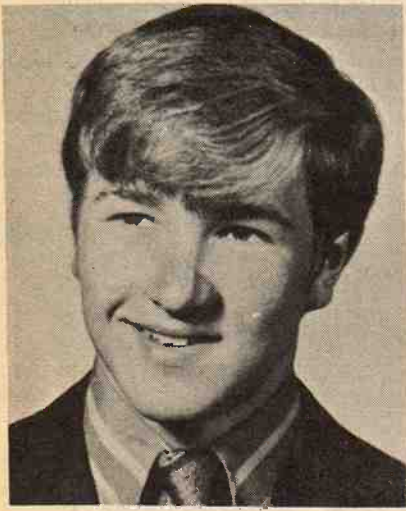

Cattle Prices Push Farm Income To All-Time High

Led by another upsurge for cattle and hogs, farm prices in June shattered an all-time high mark set more than 20 years ago, the Agriculture department reported.

The June index for all raw farm products was up 1.5 per cent, the department said. In May it rose 3 per cent. Compared with a year earlier, farm prices in June were 11 per cent higher.

Administration price curbs do not apply to raw products sold by farmers. Middlemen, despite markup restraints, can pass added costs along to consumers.

The June index was reported at 316 per cent of a 1910-14 historical base used to measure farm prices and costs.

According to USDA records, the previous high — equalled in May — was 313 per cent in Feb. 1951 when Korean War inflation pushed up farm prices to record levels.

"Higher prices for cattle, hogs, lettuce, potatoes and calves contributed most to the increase," the Crop Reporting Board said.

Lower prices were reported for watermelons, wheat, green peppers, milk and cabbage.

The report said meat prices rose 3 per cent during the month ended June 15. Hogs rose 1 per cent to a record high for the month of \$25.40 per one hundred pounds of live weight.

Cattle averaged an all-time record of \$34.20 per one hundred pounds compared with \$33.10 in May and \$28.90 a year earlier.

Meanwhile farm expenses rose 1 per cent in June and averaged 5 per cent more than a year earlier. In May, expenses held steady.

A comparison of farm product prices and costs, expressed as a "parity ratio" based on the 1910-14 formula was 73 per cent in June, unchanged from May because of the rise in expenses. A year earlier the parity ratio was 70 per cent.

Under the parity guideline, the costs and prices theoretically are in balance when the ratio is 100 per cent.

Although the over-all price in June broke the 1951 record, farm expenses in the past 21 years have far surpassed gains in prices farmers received.

According to department records the parity ratio for Feb. 1951 was 68 per cent, 40 pounds higher than the latest reading.

A more recent measure, using 1957 as a base, showed the price-cost ratio at 99 per cent in June compared with 98 in May and 94 a year earlier.

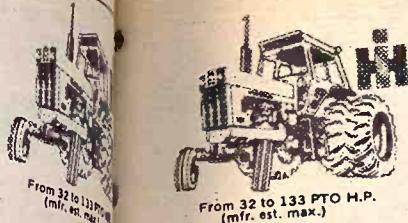

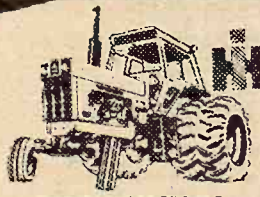

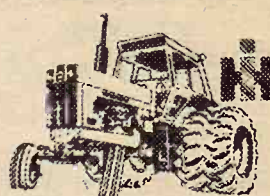

Beer Cans, Lumber Replace Original Car Bumpers

Forty University of Arizona engineering students have combined 20 used beer cans with \$2 worth of lumber to develop a bumper they

say will leave cars undamaged in collisions of five miles an hour.

"Admittedly it's not very attractive, but I think people are beginning to be more willing to try cars that aren't necessarily as practical," Lawrence Scott, chairman of the project, said.

The cans are sandwiched lengthwise between two pieces of lumber, and Scott said, can be attached to conventional cars to replace original bumpers. "If you take a beer can and stand it on end, you'll find it absorbs a lot of force — about 100 pounds of it in fact," he said. The principle of our bumper is to let the cans absorb the impact instead of the car.

FARMERS OUTLOOK

Corn Market Recovery?

The market will nearly always give you a second chance," is a well-known saying in the grain market. Many farmers are asking whether they will have another chance to sell 1971 crop corn above loan price, or whether they will have to go through the less convenient process of delivering it to the elevator for storage. Some producers would also like another opportunity to sell 1972 corn at \$1.12 to \$1.15 for harvest delivery or \$1.25 to \$1.30 for stored corn.

Previously letters have emphasized that corn prices will fluctuate around the loan-redemption cost for 1971 corn in coming months. However, futures prices are about 8 cents below post-harvest highs. The July contract, which is now at \$1.21, traded at \$1.28 \$1.29 during December and January and again in late March and April. In those periods the 1972 corn future contract was also at those prices, which permitted country grain dealers to bid \$1.12 to \$1.15 for harvest delivery corn and \$1.25 to \$1.28 for corn delivered in April or May, 1973.

So, barring a crop disaster, another chance in the corn market means only a few cents recovery. At the same time, lower prices for 1972 corn are possible. A typical price pattern when a crop equals prospective market use the following year is for harvest prices drop to the net loan price, that is, the loan price less storage costs. That is to about \$1.00 for No. 2 corn, and the equivalent December future price is \$1.12 to \$1.15 or about 8 cents below the current price of \$1.21 to \$1.22. The question is, what factors could push corn prices 5 to 8 cents above the loan price either way from current prices?

Let's begin with the bullish factors. First, the demand for U.S. corn, both for feed use and export is strong. Exports in 1971-72 are forecast by the USDA to be 650 million bushels, 133 million more than in 1970-71. Since exports through June 16 were already ahead of those a year earlier by this amount (133 million bushels) and are likely to stay above a year earlier in coming weeks, 1971-72 total exports are likely to exceed 650 million bushels.

U.S. feed use of corn is expected to be 3,902 million bushels, 376 million more than the relatively small quantity fed in 1970-71. As a result of the big gains in exports and feed use, the USDA puts 1971-72 disappearance of corn at 4,954 million bushels.

Other price-supporting forces are: (1) the large amount of 1971 corn under loan, (2) the anticipation of a further increase in U.S. corn use in 1972-73, (3) the cut-back in 1972 corn acreage and the prospects that the 1972 crop will be less than 1972-73 use, and (4) the high proportion of 1972 producers eligible for price support loans.

Sizable feed grain sales to Russia in 1972-73 are already reflected in current prices. Nearly one-fifth of our 1971-72 feed grain export shipments through April were to Russia. The potential price-depressing forces are these: (1) The addition of nearly 600 million bushels of 1971 corn to carryover stocks, with problems of storage space, may cause more free corn to be available for market use than the statistics

tendering of deliveries in settlement of July contracts could temporarily depress prices.

In recent years he has been herd consultant at Wye Plantation after being manager of Staley Farms and livestock manager for the American Royal Livestock Show.

Nixon Lifts Curb On Meat Imports

President Nixon lifted all quota restrictions on meat imports "in an effort to remedy a short-term shortage" and curb rising meat prices.

But Nixon ruled out a freeze on meat and other food prices, Secretary of the Treasury George Shultz said.

Removal of the quotas for the rest of 1972 "may not fully solve the problem," Nixon said in a statement. "Further measures will be taken as necessary and appropriate."

Most of the imported meat is lower-cost cuts which go into processed products such as hamburger, hot dogs, salami and sausages.

Officials questioned whether the decision would have an immediate impact on surging meat prices, saying it could take weeks or months for any increase in imports to be felt in the United States.

Shultz, who heads Nixon's Cost of Living Council, offered little optimism that the action would result in reduced prices. The main objective, he said, is to stabilize meat prices by eliminating repeated surges at the wholesale level.

Beef supplies and prices appeared to be the main target of Nixon's decision, although such meats as mutton and veal also are covered. Australia supplies about half the 1.2 million-pound import level set for 1972 and Secretary of State William P. Rogers, who now is in that country, will discuss with Australian

officials the possibility of increasing the flow of meat to the United States, Shultz said.

The President said the "recent rise in the price of meat is in part due to an improving economy here at home causing increased demands for meat which have not been matched by increased supplies."

Although he rejected the proposed price freeze on meat and other food products, Nixon said "I intend to monitor this situation closely, and I want to assure every American housewife that this administration is firmly determined to prevent unjustified increases in the cost of food."

Earlier this year, Nixon increased meat import quotas by 11 per cent from 1971 levels. But since then, he said, "the continuing shift in

demand and supplies has become more pronounced."

In words beamed to the farm belt, Nixon said his action "is not aimed at the American farmer; his income has only begun to approach reasonable levels."

Rather, the President continued the move "is intended to remedy a short-term shortage which is beyond the ability of our farmers to fill."

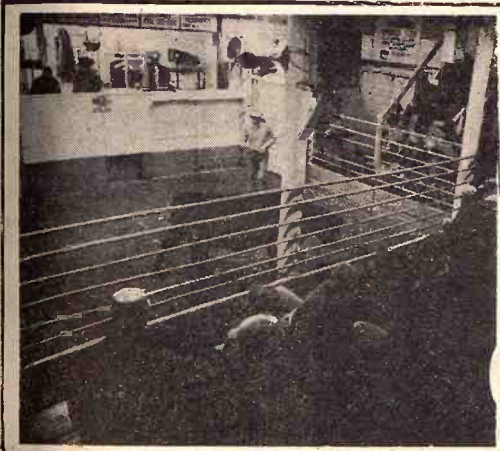

Wheat Weight Above Average, Protein Down

Quality tests on the 1972 wheat crop arriving at terminal markets from 29 Kansas counties showed well above average weight per bushel, average protein content, and a relatively high percentage of No. 1 grade, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service and the Kansas and Missouri Grain Inspection Departments.

Test results on 1,207 cars sampled, largely from southern districts of the State, showed an average test weight of 62.3 pounds. This compares with 62.4 pounds in the same counties last year and the 1961-70 average of 61.6 pounds. Protein content was 11.5 percent, compared with 12.0 percent in 1971 and average of 11.5 percent. Moisture content of the early arriving new crop averaged 13.4 percent.

Dockage in this year's early samples was moderately above that of recent years with 40 percent of the 1,207 cars showing 0.5 percent or more dockage. Total grade defects of the wheat averaged 2.1 percent, the same as last year. The grade defects of this year's wheat included 0.1 percent damaged kernels, 0.1 percent foreign material, and 1.9 percent shrunken and broken kernels. Of the 1,207 cars, 86 percent graded No. 1, 13 percent graded No. 2, and the remaining 1 percent No. 3. By subclasses, 2 percent of the early arriving wheat was dark hard

winter, 63 percent hard winter, and 35 percent yellow hard winter.

This is the first in a series of wheat quality releases to be made during the 1972 wheat harvest. Test weight, protein content, grade and defect

determinations were made by the State Grain Inspection Departments.

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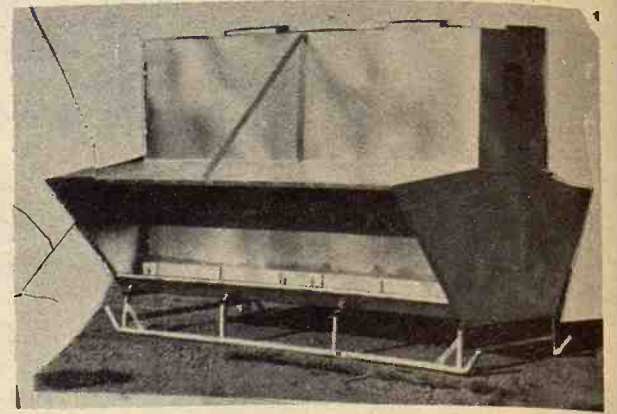
