Cost Study On Diverting Poor Land

An Agriculture Department study says farmers use government control programs to sideline their poorest land which

would produce only 80 or 90 per cent of an average yield anyway.

The study was made by the Economics Research Service on land taken from production in major crops.

That year, the report said, some 63 million acres of cropland was diverted — taken from production — under various federal programs, including about one-fourth of the total under long term programs.

Compared with the cropland left in production, the report said, the diverted acreage had only 80 to 90 per cent productivity.

The study showed the crop-producing potential of the idled land for major crops, compared with land left in production, included: wheat 90 per cent; sorghum grain 85; barley 83; corn 82; and cotton 80.

Not all crop land diverted under programs in 1966 qualified for federal compensatory payments to farmers since much of it had to be taken from production as a minimum qualification for price support and other benefits under the various programs.

However, department records show that for 1966 — a period of tighter acreage requirements — about 25 million acres was diverted from the five crops for which diversion payments were made.

They included: Corn 14.9 million acres diverted and a total payment of \$579 million; sorghum grain 4 million; barley 1.5 million acres and \$26.7 million; and cotton 4.6 million acres and \$284.6 million.

Diversion payments for the idled land are computed on the basis of average yields per acre on all land used for a particular crop on a farm, department officials.

This means that the poorer land is averaged with the best, with the payment rate based on the average production.

In other words, the report questions whether the taxpayer is getting his money's worth when payments are made for idled land which does not produce as much as average yields say they do.

Costs of land diversion on an range retirement proposals, are annual basis, as well as for long being examined closely by Nixon administration experts in an effort to come up with a workable plan to offer Congress next winter.

Farmer's Share Of Food Dollar Up To 40c

Farmers received an extra two cents of each dollar consumers spent on food during the

first quarter of 1969, the Agriculture Department reported.

The average farm share was 40 cents for the three months, compared with 38 cents during last October-December and 39 cents estimated for all of 1968. Only during two of the last 11 years — 1958 and 1966 — have farmers averaged as much as 40 cents of the nation's food dollar over a 12-month period.

The department reported that retail food prices are expected to rise an average of "around three per cent" this year from 1968. The first quarter retail price of all foods was reported last week at 1 per cent higher than in October-December and four per cent more than the first quarter of 1968.

In the report officials said higher prices for animal products accounted for all of the increase to farmers.

The report was based on a "market basket" list of farm-originated food and did not include prices for all retail food commodities. Officials said the cost of marketing the specified food — including all costs after it leaves the farm — declined during the first quarter "because returns to farmers from market-basket foods increased more than retail prices."

The farm-retail price spread — the difference between what

consumers pay and farmers receive — declined 1.5 per cent during January-March from the previous quarter, but was 1.4 percent more than in the first three months of 1968.

Another Try On Frozen Meat Merchandising

Frozen meats, which have never gone over well with the housewife, are getting a new test for buying acceptance at two Manhattan groceries.

The tests are being researched by Kansas State University to see if a different process — freezing fresh meat at 20 degrees below zero — will not prove to receive greater acceptance from the housewife.

The cuts being sold are rib chops, loin chops, sandwich steaks, boneless shoulder roasts and boneless leg roasts. Customers are asked to complete a questionnaire and return it to K-State after they consume the product.

Especially watching the returns are sheepbreeders, who think that a better method of merchandising frozen lamb may increase sales of their product.

The tests are being conducted in May at the R&G and Blue Hills supermarkets. S. E. Trieb, retailing marketing economist at K-State, says the pilot test may be extended to other cities if acceptance of the frozen lamb and other frozen red meats show signs of being accepted by the housewife.

Lottery Draft Might Not Change Much

President Nixon's proposal for a random, lottery draft system calling 19-year-olds first in a one-year period of eligibility will make little difference in Kansas, an administrative officer in the U. S. Selective Service says.

Lt. Col. Junior Elder, staff officer for the state Selective Service headquarters, said the proposed system would simply reverse the age-groups, with 19-year-olds being called on first instead of the 26-year-olds.

The system still would require the same number of men, he said.

"As soon as they ran out of 19-year-olds, they would go to the 20s and then 21s. It would include all age groups anyway," he said.

Because Kansas has a high proportion of high school graduates going on to college, those students would still not be available until age 22, he said noting that under the present system Kansas is drafting 19- and 20-year olds now.

"I can't see much difference," he said. "When they come out of college, they will be tossed back to the 19-year-old group for vulnerability."

Under Nixon's proposal, 19-year-olds would remain eligible for the draft for only one year, rather than for seven years, as under the present system.

Nixon said the ideal of an all-volunteer armed force would have to be temporarily deferred, but draft reform would reduce the impact on individual lives of long-term eligibility.

265 Lobbyists Advised 1969 Legislature

There were 100 more lobbyists working the 1969 session of the Kansas Legislature than there were elected senators and representatives, and surprisingly that's not unusual.

The secretary of states registration at the end of the 1969 session showed there were 265 lobbyists advising, counseling and pressuring lawmakers during the three months.

There are only 165 legislators (40 senators and 125 representatives), the so-called "lobbyists of the people."

Despite some charges that the recent Legislature gave in to the special interests, if it did,

it wasn't because there were more lobbyists than usual. Although as usual, there were some skilled and experienced men among them.

In addition to many veteran lobbyists, there was also a former Senate president pro tem, Paul R. Wunsch, now a Kingman attorney, and a former governor, John Anderson, now an Olathe attorney. Wunsch represented the Florence, Kans., School District and Anderson a Kansas City area rural water district.

There were also at least five former legislators working as lobbyists.

Many of the more influential Kansas pressure groups were also represented by more than one lobbyist. Some of these groups had as many as four representatives registered.

A few of the significant groups represented during the 1969 session were the Kansas Bankers Association, Kansas State Teachers Association, Kansas Association of School

Boards, Kansas Farm Bureau, Kansans for Modern Alcoholic Beverage Control, Kansas United Dry Forces, The Kansas Credit Union League, Kansas State Chamber of Commerce, and Kansas State Federation of Labor.

Despite the seemingly large number of lobbyists working the recent session, there have been more. During a similar regular 90-day session in 1967, there were 266 — one more than this year.

In recent years, the largest number was during the 1965 regular session when there were 400 persons lobbying the lawmakers.

Mrs. Lavina McDonald, assistant secretary of state, believes the drop was due to a 1965 law which required all lobbyists to wear identification badges. Beginning this year they were also required to have the name or names of the groups they represented on the badge.

GM Gives Up On Corvair

General Motors Corp. gave up on a one-time success — the rear-engined Corvair, suffering from sales anemia since industry critic Ralph Nader jumped on it in his book, "Un-

safe at Any Speed," in late 1965. The Corvair line was killed off — 1,710,000 vehicles sold since its introduction in fall 1959.

The terse announcement gave no explanation other than: "It is our regular practice to review our product offerings."

The Corvair nameplate thus becomes something of a graveyard marker, like that of Ford's ill fated Edsel — 1957-59 — and the De Soto — 1928-60 — Studebaker, Packard, Hudson, Hupmobile and Maxwell, among others.

Nader insisted in his book the Corvair, first air-cooled, rear-engined American make, was unstable in design and unsafe. Scores of damage suits followed against GM by Corvair owners.

GM vigorously defended the Corvair as safe and a spokesman said the company never had lost finally a Corvair damage suit based upon any alleged design fault.

Between October and December 1959, GM sold 47,395 Corvairs, and sales hit 235,000 in 1960, climbed to 317,000 in 1961.

But after Nader's attack, Corvair sales plummeted from 205,000 in 1965 to 86,000 in 1966 and to 12,977 last year. Through April only 2,183 Corvairs had been sold this year.

GM has announced plans to introduce an even smaller car, now designated the XP 887, in mid-1970, to compete with Ford's minicar, the Maverick. GM said Corvair production facilities will be switched to turning out Chevy II Nova, a hot seller in the Chevrolet line.

Police Have Civil Rights Too

Police chiefs have civil rights too.

That's the basis of a lawsuit filed by Topeka police chief Dana Hummer against the University of Kansas and several individual students. Hummer's suit says the students disrupted a police seminar on the KU campus, violating the Federal Civil Rights law.

The move, apparently the first of its kind in the nation, was made, says Hummer, because "someone has got to take a stand somewhere."

CORNMEAL DINNER ROLLS

- 2 cups milk
- $\frac{3}{4}$ cup cornmeal
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar
- 1 stick margarine or butter
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoons salt
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 2 packages dry yeast
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup water

Enough flour to make a soft dough (about 6 cups)
Add milk slowly to cornmeal. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add sugar, salt and margarine. Let cool to lukewarm. Dissolve yeast in water and let stand 10 minutes. Add yeast mixture to beaten eggs. Then add cornmeal mixture. Add flour until easy to handle. Knead. The dough should be very soft. Let rise until double in bulk. Roll out to $\frac{3}{4}$ -inch thick. Shape as for Parkerhouse rolls. Let rise in greased pan. Bake 15-20 minutes in a 400-degree oven.

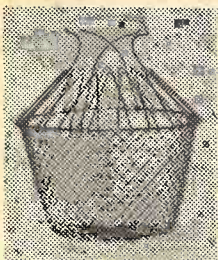

STRAWBERRY DESSERT CAKE

Mix 1 large package white cake mix as directed on package and bake in a 9x13-inch pan. While baking, mix 2 packages (3-ounce size) strawberry gelatin with 2 cups boiling water. Let stand at room temperature. When cake is done, immediately punch full of holes with a fork. Pour the gelatin over the cake very slowly. Reserve $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of the gelatin to use in the topping. Put the cake in the refrigerator and let set until cold. Whip 2 packages of Dream Whip as directed on package. Add 1 box (10-ounce) package of thawed frozen strawberries and the $\frac{1}{2}$ cup gelatin to the topping. Spread over the chilled cake. Return to refrigerator and let set two to three hours before serving. (Makes 12-15 servings.)

STRAWBERRY GELATIN CAKE

2 packages strawberry gelatin dissolved in 2 $\frac{1}{4}$ cups boiling water. Set aside. Bake a 9x13 inch white cake. As soon as it is taken from the oven, poke holes in the top with a fork. Pour the gelatin slowly over the cake. Let cool. Then top with 1 package of frozen strawberries mixed into 2 packages of prepared Lucky Whip. Chill "This can

also be frozen quite satisfactorily."

To Produce More And Earlier Tomatoes

Experienced gardeners know well that the first truss of blooms on a tomato plant rarely results in tomatoes. Instead the flowers usually drop. This can happen when the temperature falls below 60 degrees, apparently the temperature required for fruit set.

But there's a way to keep blooms on the plant and make them set fruits even during

cold or inclement weather when bees do not fly.

This is by spraying the faces of the flowers (not the backs) with a fruit-setting hormone which may be bought in liquid form, to be diluted with water, or as an aerosol.

Producing fruits by this method, since they are formed from the very first flowers, results in a harvest sometimes as much as three weeks earlier than normal.

The hormone spray works as well on later flower clusters as it does on the first ones and on any variety of tomato you may be growing.

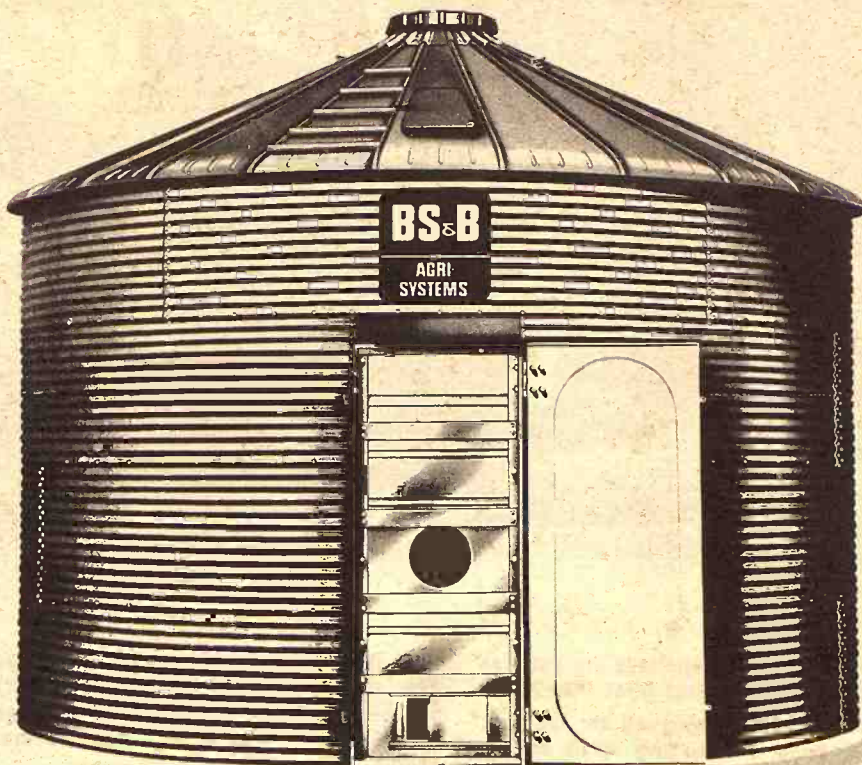

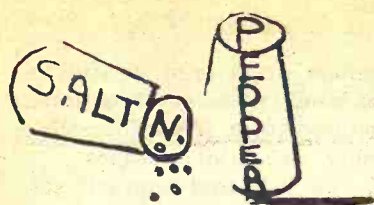

when many of the extra activities would cease for the summer months so I'd have more time for myself. Now that it's happened I've begun to wonder what in the world I'll do with all that free time.

Happened to be in Pittsburg during the time of the latest (as of this writing, that is) big blaze and watched as firemen battle the holocaust. Those men are something else — perched precariously atop ladders, walking into rolling black smoke and working beside walls that are on the verge of collapse. I, for one, now realize that the

firefighters don't get the pat on the back they most assuredly deserve — only when we need their help are we apt to be aware of the invaluable services they perform.

Unmolding Is A Cinch

To unmold gelatin, dip the mold in warm (not hot) water to the depth of its contents. Loosen around the edge with the tip of a paring knife. Place a serving dish tightly on top of the mold and turn it upside down. Shake, holding the serving dish to the mold. If gelatin does not readily slip out, repeat the procedure. The same process applies for unmolding loaf pans.

For family service, you may use a bowl or individual dessert dishes for any recipe that calls for a mold. This eliminates unmolding: For the bowl, just scoop out with a large spoon.

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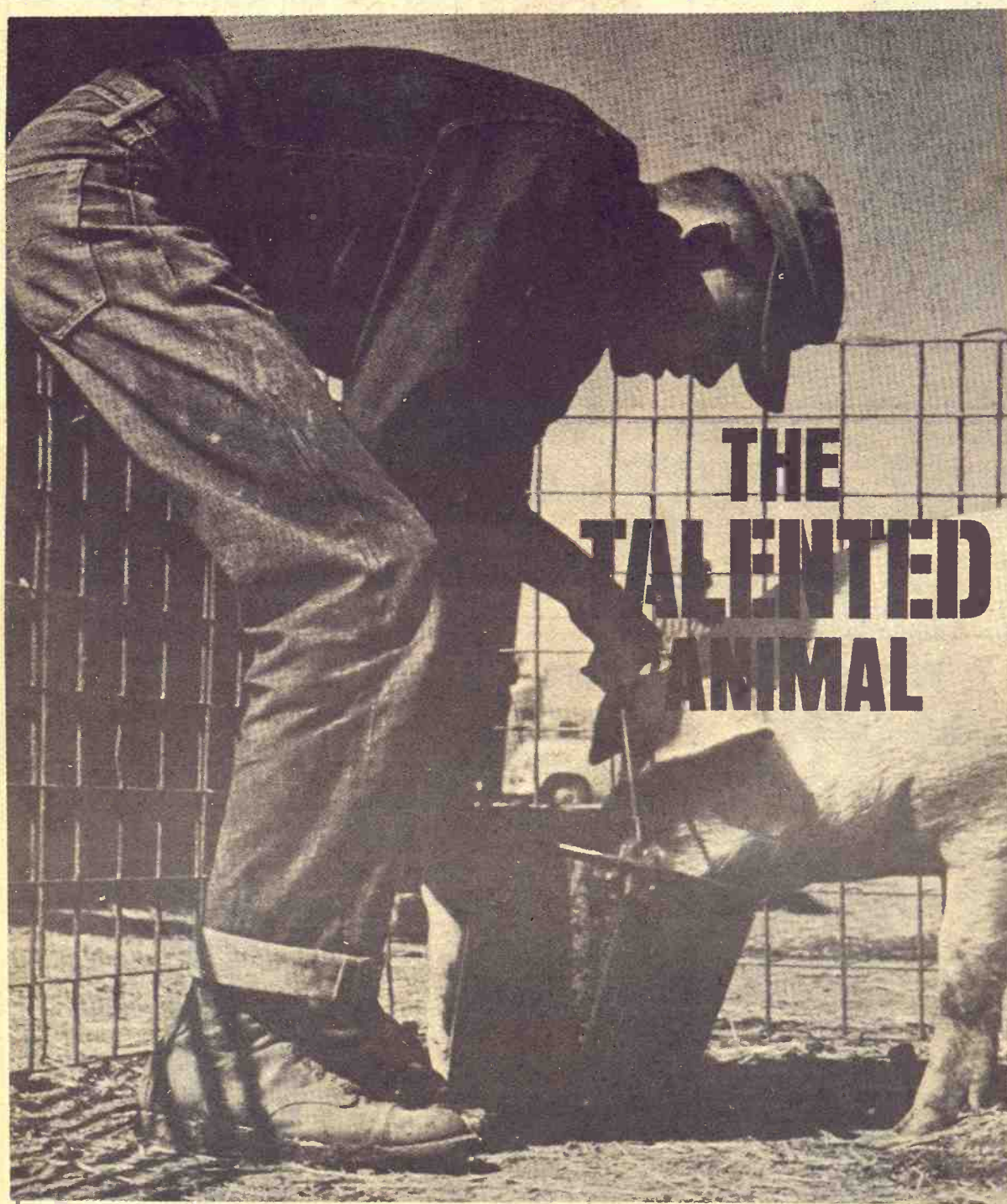

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IBP Emporia Plant Opens

EMPORIA — Slaughter operations have started at the Iowa Beef Packers, Inc. plant at Emporia.

The first animals to go through the plant were from the Anderson Cattle company feed yards which are adjacent to the packing facilities.

The Emporia plant is among the largest in the nation and is completely modern, Howard McLean, plant superintendent, said.

The packing facility was built originally in the early 1960's by Armour & Co. Armour closed it down in 1967 and the property was sold to Iowa Beef Packers. Since that time a multi-million dollar modernization and expansion program has been carried out.

The plant is approved for the slaughter of 175 head of beef animals an hour. It should be ready for operation at full capacity on an 8-hour shift within six months, McLean said, and a second shift is contemplated for a later date.

Iowa Beef Packers, whose headquarters are at Dakota City, Nebr., has five other slaughtering plants. The corporation's first plant was opened in 1961 in Denison, Iowa.

The Emporia plant will be strictly a beef operation. For the present, the cattle will be slaughtered and the carcasses, in quarters, will be shipped to market outlets. Still to be completed, McLean said, is a beef breaking and processing division in which the carcasses will be cut into primal cuts and packaged for the retail, hotel, and restaurant trade.

The plant expects to purchase most of its cattle direct from

large feedlots in the area.

As part of the modernization program, the plant has developed its own sewage system. The system includes a series of lagoons on 140 acres of land which the company owns.

Nebraska SPF Program At Top

LINCOLN, Nebr. — The Nebraska SPF (Specific Pathogen Free) swine program, after a decade of operation, remains tops among 16 states raising accredited SPF stock recognized by the National SPF Swine Accrediting Agency, according to Richard Coupe, University of Nebraska veterinarian and SPF coordinator.

Nebraska's is the only state program offering non-biased performance-tested information on every animal and a strict health examination at slaughter.

"As a result of its reputation, the program has sent Nebraska SPF swine to all 50 states and 10 foreign countries. Performance testing is largely responsible for the Nebraska program being number one," Coupe said.

He pointed out that the accreditation certificate in Nebraska signifies several things:

- The animal is truly SPF when purchased.

- It has been performance tested for rate of gain and carcass quality characteristics.

- It has been cleared of profit-robbing diseases.

- The animal has a non-biased performance and health record.

- It is accompanied by an insurance policy.

- It will produce the kind of product that will upgrade the pork industry and its image in the mind of the consumer.

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Plan To Get Counties Out Of Welfare Business

A proposal which could reduce Kansas welfare costs as much as 20 million dollars a year and

would eliminate the county-wide welfare levy of 3 to 5 mills in Kansas counties has been introduced in the Kansas Legislative Council.

The proposal, introduced by Rep. Rex Borgen (R-Asherville), chairman of the House public health and welfare committee and chairman of a simi-

lar committee in the council, will be studied by the council in the next several months with recommendations to the Legislature.

The proposal would call for a study by the council into the possibility of eliminating the present county participation in the cost of welfare programs and the local government share of such programs by the state.

Budget department officials and others in Kansas have said that savings of up to 20 million dollars a year could be obtained through improved efficiencies in administration of the welfare programs rather than continuing such programs by the state.

They have said also that the undertaking by the state of the funding of the complete local government share could be of

help in providing property tax relief at a time when legislators are concerned about soaring property taxes.

"We just want to find out if some of these statements are actually justified and if the study shows that they are, to implement legislation to put the changes into effect," Representative Borgen said.

Soybean Source Of Ersatz Ham

It may look like ham, it may taste like ham but it may in fact be soybeans. Nutritionally, it may be better than ham.

The ersatz ham, along with chicken and corned beef made of protein derived primarily from soybeans, was shown for

sampling at the annual meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists.

Pork and bacon substitutes also are made of soybeans, and lamb is being developed.

William J. Downey, a vice president of Fritzsche Brothers Inc., New York, which displayed the meat substitutes, called them "the food of tomorrow."

Since the products are tailor-made, he said in an interview, they can excel the edibles they simulate in terms of nutrition.

But products cannot be sold to the public on the basis of their nutritional value alone, so it is necessary to make the substitutes look and taste like something else, Downey explained.

Robert J. Eiserle, another vice president of Fritzsche, said the substitute products would be in food stores in five to 10 years.

The price will go down with mass production so the poor can afford them, he said.

Dr. R. F. Robinson, technical director of Worthington Food, Worthington, Ohio, said ham burger meat is only 60 percent protein, but the soybean substitute is 90 percent protein.

He said the protein meat substitutes have less fat than the real thing and retain their texture better during cooking.

Want To Delay S.S. Increases

The Nixon administration has disclosed it wants Social Security recipients to settle for a smaller benefit increase next year than originally proposed so the budget surplus can be fattened.

In the budget proposals he made before leaving office, President Lyndon B. Johnson included a 10 percent Social Security cost-of-living benefit increase price-tagged at \$1.6 billion.

President Nixon proposes instead to hold the increase to 7 percent. By delaying the effective date of the boost from January 1970 to February and making other adjustments, the cost would be held to \$600 million, administration sources said.

The resulting \$1 billion savings comes close to being the largest proposed by the Nixon administration in its campaign to prune outlays from levels proposed in January by the Johnson administration.

The only larger reduction was in the area of defense spending, which the Republican administration wants to cut \$1.1 billion from levels outlined in the January budget.

Prices Lag On Western Land

Some recent western Kansas land auctions suggest that high interest rates and low reserves of ready cash have held back farmland prices. Auctioneers, realtors, and lawyers think that cash sales of promising 1969 crops will likely mean that a sale postponed until next fall will do better than one held this spring.

A major estate auction involving sales of 2330 acres in 14 quarters across five counties was watched carefully by appraisers. The land was the property of the estate of John B. Dickey Jr. of Newton. Successful bids ranged from \$50 an acre for a quarter-section of rough ground in Hamilton

County to \$451 an acre for a 90-acre tract near the southeast edge of Johnson where there is good irrigation potential.

A quarter section of property which is part of a unitized natural gas well location brought

\$162 per acre. One Finney County tract north of Kalvesta brought \$81 an acre. Another in that county came to \$86 an acre.

Another big chunk of real estate was sold in Meade County for the Alfred D. Frame estate

near Missler. The spread was 1200 acres.

The Frame property sold for as low as \$54 an acre and as high as \$170 per acre.

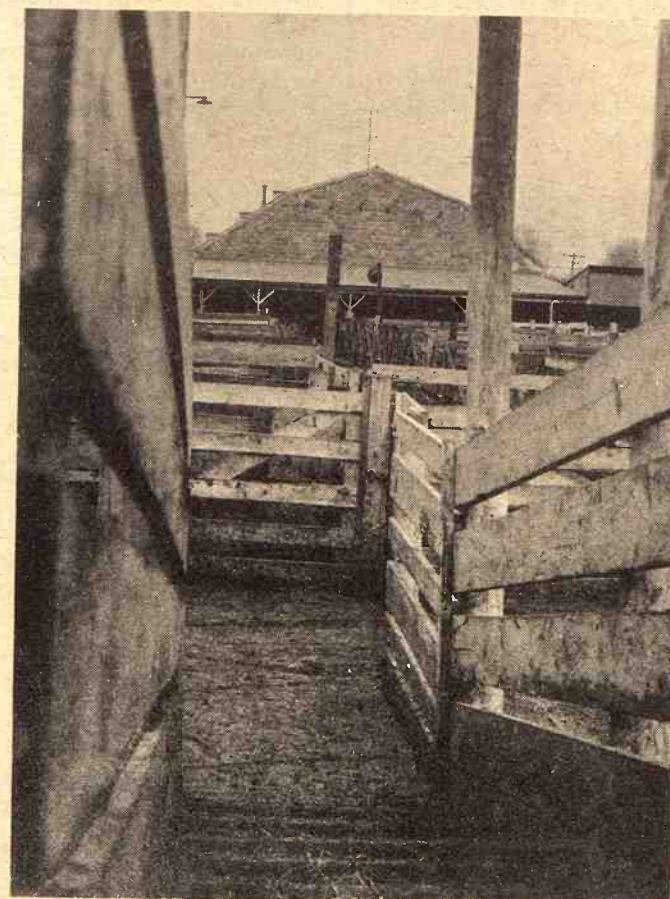

Sees More Dairy Crossbreeding In Cattle Feeding

Dr. J. W. Stiles, vice president for development, Agway, Inc., Syracuse, N.Y., speaking at the National Institute of Animal Agriculture banquet at Purdue University recently, said that commercial cattle feeders of the future will finish cross-bred animals carrying a high percentage of dairy blood and producing lean, tender, bright red meat.

Dr. Stiles said this would result from both consumer acceptance of a product and profit to the cattleman.

Stiles said a consumer research test in Elmira, N.Y., pitted Holstein beef against a "national brand which graded high good or low choice." This "new brand of beef priced the same as Western beef accounted for 50 per cent of the sales through three supermarkets," he reported.

Holstein bull calves are a by-product of the dairy industry, they are efficient converters of feed and their carcasses have unusually high cutability.

"The commercial feeder of the future, it appears, will be using an animal carrying a high percentage of dairy blood. It will also be a crossbred animal. However, there will continue to be a place for top quality purebred beef animals and for Holstein steers."

Stiles said that the most successful producers and marketers of animal products would be producing for "a specific market" and that "production and marketing will be closely coordinated."

Buildings and equipment will gain new importance, he added. "We have the knowledge now to put together a milking parlor whereby one man can do a good job of milking 75 or possibly 100 cows per hour," Stiles noted.

A future development in detecting sick animals in large operations "could be the monitoring of temperature of each animal from a central station," he suggested. Ensiling of high moisture feed grains for fattening beef animals also holds promise.

Fabrication of carcasses will continue to grow smaller until most of the consumer packaging will be done in a central location, Stiles asserted.

Addressing the NIAA luncheon, Dr. Thomas Carney, senior vice president, G. D. Searle Co., Chicago, said the nation could not have healthy animals and wholesome food without chemicals. Chemicals, he pointed out, were in large measure responsible for increased efficiency in production and decrease in disease.

Surprise Boom In Steel Exports

U.S. steelmakers, who figured they just weren't in position to compete for export markets, are suddenly selling steel in Europe. Exports in the first quarter were 746,000 tons, more than twice the total for the first

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part of 1968.

The principal reason is a shortage of semifinished steel in Europe, combined with less competition from Japanese steelmakers, who are busy supplying their own boom.

U.S. steelmakers say their profit margins on exported steel are small. Some executives say they fear that the spurt in export sales could undercut efforts to obtain a quota bill to limit foreign steel entering the U.S.

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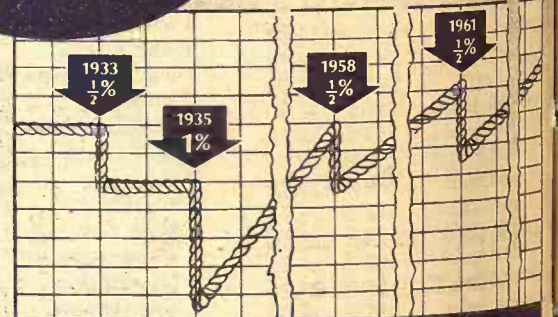

Mounting Fraud In Medicaid

State officials say that under the Kentucky Medicaid program, prescriptions average \$3 each.

On that basis, two tiny drugstores in Letcher County, Kentucky, are filling roughly 10 for every man, woman and child on welfare in the county.

One of the drug stores, a 12-foot wide store in Neon, received \$328,290 for Medicaid prescriptions last year. At nearby Jenkins, another store owned by William Clarke, who owns the Neon store, Medicaid prescriptions totaled \$126,000.

What congressional investigators fear is that the story in Kentucky is not unusual. There are reasons for thinking that many millions of dollars are being milked from the Medicaid program thru abuses by doctors, dentists, druggists and nursing homes.

Senate hearings are planned shortly after staff investigations have unearthed some fantastic examples of fraud and abuse in the \$5 billion, 38-state program of free health care for the poor.

Medicaid, the federal-state program paying for private medical care for welfare recipients and other poor patients, was passed almost unnoticed in 1965 as part of the law creating Medicare for the elderly. Its costs have run far beyond predictions, climbing at almost a billion dollars a year.

New Mexico has become the first casualty of the program this month, pulling out when it ran out of money to meet its share of the medical bills.

Officials agree the cost of Medicaid has skyrocketed since passage because patients could go to the doctor anytime they wanted without worrying where the money was coming from.

With few exceptions the policing of the Medicaid program is done on a catch-as-catch-can basis.

The federal program lets each state set up its own Medicaid program while paying for 50 to 83% of the cost. The states decided what care to offer at the start, how to make payments and how to guard against abuses.

In most cases the states have given only lip service to watchdog duties. There have been several examples of fraud unearthed in California, Kentucky, New York City, and Maryland, but states in which scandals have emerged may not be the worst. Instead, they may simply be the states which have them first.

Some of the worst cases already known:

- A dentist in New York's Harlem district getting \$400,000 in Medicaid payments in two years.

- Nursing homes in southern California ordering dentures for dying cancer patients, special shoes for bedridden invalids, and expensive prescription sunglasses for a blind man.

- A foot specialist in New York City collecting \$2000 a month for clipping toenails of patients in a nursing home.

- Wholesale forging of prescriptions in Maryland.

- A rush of dentists to the ghettos in New York since the Medicaid program started, with dentists in New York, collecting \$82 million last year, compared to \$38 million for doctors.

The case of the two tiny drug stores in Kentucky which collected \$454,000 for prescriptions in two towns, neither larger

than 800 in population, may top them all.

Said William Clarke Jr., owner of the two drugstores at Neon and Jenkins, Ky., "I think

Medicaid has been good to me, and I think I've been good to it."

How much good each has been for the other, Mr. Clarke did not elaborate.

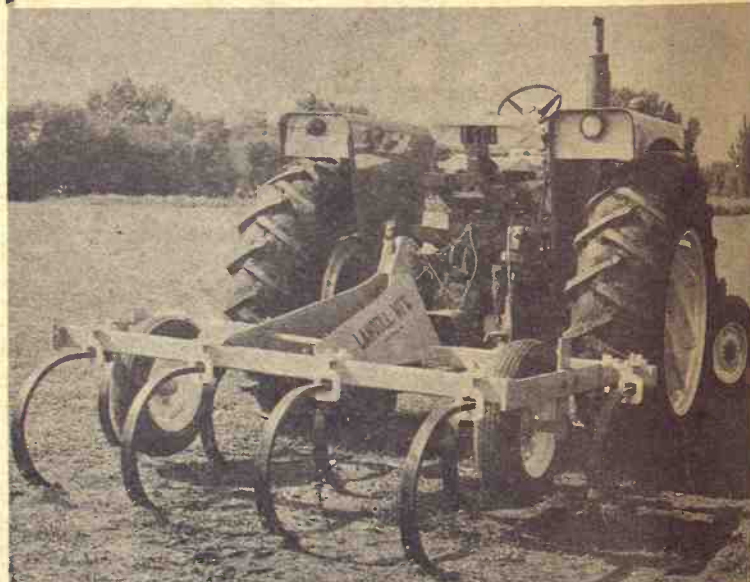

Second Report Says Corporations Only Minor Farm Factor

Corporations control only a small segment of U.S. agriculture, the U.S. Department of Agriculture insisted in the second part of a special study on corporate farming just released.

This latest report covered 25 states and coincided closely with the first report issued last August on 22 states. At least one farm organization, National Farmers Union, has taken exception to the reports, claiming the USDA is looking at the situation through rose-colored glasses and that corporation farming is a bigger threat to family farm type units than the USDA studies indicate.

The current survey by USDA's Economic Research Service reports 4850 corporation-designated farms operating 13 million acres in the Northeast, Appalachia, Southeast, Delta, and Southern Plains.

These corporate enterprises represent less than 1 per cent of the commercial farms, work less than 5 per cent of the land, and take a 6 per cent share of gross farm product sales.

Findings are nearly identical with those in the study of Corn Belt, Lake, Mountain, and Pacific Northwest states, where corporations were responsible for less than 1 per cent of commercial units, less than 7 per cent of the acreage, and sold about 4 per cent of the agricultural commodities.

Nearly two-thirds of the corporate farms in this study were family-owned, 15 per cent individually held, and 21 per cent run by other types of corporations. The first study found 71 per cent controlled by families.

The report indicates livestock was favored over crops by corporate farms, especially in the Southern Plains and Northeast. Cattle feeding was frequently noted and operations, while relatively small except in Texas, tended to be larger than typical farmer-feeder units nationally. Corporations operated large-scale poultry farms in most surveyed states but concentrated in the Appalachian and Southeast regions. Of the crop land held by corporations in the Delta states, 80 per cent was in soybeans, cotton, and sugar cane. Corporations handled large sugarcane acreages in Florida and Louisiana.

Agricultural production was the most important business activity for more than two-thirds of the corporate farms in the 25 states. And, while the remaining corporations had other interests, most such ventures were tied to agriculture: manufacture and sale of feed and fertilizer and other agribusiness activities.

The 25-state study shows about one-third of the corporate units were in Florida and Texas. Regionally, corporation holdings ranged from less than 0.5 percent of the commercial farms and 2.3 percent of the land in farms in Appalachia and the Southern Plains, to 2 per cent of the units and 11 percent of the acreage in the Southeast.

Corporations generally control a greater share of the land they operate than do other commercial farms — more than three-fourths of the corporations owned all the land they farmed. Corporations owned by individuals were dominant in full ownership operations.

About one-third of the corporations had estimated sales of less than \$40,000 and one tenth had sales of \$500,000 or more. The report states slightly over half the corporate units in this latter category were family controlled. The earlier study found about 40 percent of the corporations had gross sales of under \$40,000 and 6 percent with at least \$500,000.

Corporation-run farms have increased in number in recent years because a changing technology and marketing system demands greater capital investment.

The first cattle to be run thru the new Iowa Beef Packers plant at Emporia go down the chute under the attention of Lowen McDonald, a worker there. The plant is opening with limited production but expects to process 175 head of cattle an hour at peak.

Need More Financing In Rural Areas

Rural banks need a better way to tap the nation's money markets if they are to meet the needs for capital in rapidly changing rural communities, Dr. Raymond J. Doll said in an address prepared for presentation at the Kansas Bankers Assn. convention at Topeka.

"There is no question but that financing difficulties have retarded economic growth in

The rural bank manager with these services available in one location would be in a more nearly comparable position with money center bank personnel to obtain up-to-date information and compete more effectively in national financial markets, Dr. Doll said.

He added that for most effective operation, it would be desirable to have a system of unified regional markets operating under the supervision of a national unifying agency, similar to the type of organization now used by such agencies as the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, the Farm Credit Administration and the Federal Reserve System.

"It is realized that the proposed changes are quite sweeping, but not more so than the changes occurring in rural areas," Dr. Doll said.

"However, if the commercial banking system is to remain viable and adapt to the changing needs of rural areas — and they are changing more rapidly than ever — it will need some type of market similar to that proposed," he added.

many rural areas," said Dr. Doll, vice president and senior economist for the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City.

Increased mechanization of agriculture and the development of farm-related industries in small towns call for larger supplies of capital than many rural banks can supply readily, he said.

He proposed a system of unified markets to facilitate "exchanging a wide variety of bank assets and liabilities and tapping the nation's money markets."

"To be effective, such a system of markets would need to be organized so all commercial banks could buy and sell a wide variety of portfolio items on a competitive basis in units which correspond to needs of different kinds of banks," Dr. Doll said.

"Such markets could provide isolated rural banks with both information and trading facilities for such items as federal funds, certificates of deposit, U.S. and municipal securities and secondary marketings of loan paper."

TV Station To Test Lottery Law

Is a telephone jackpot program of a television station a lottery, by Kansas statute? The attorney general thinks it is. And the lawyers for television station KTSB in Topeka think not.

The consumer protection division of the Attorney General's office has filed an injunction to keep KTSB from its game, alleging that it is a lottery. The station has said it would go ahead with a program, "Dialing for Dollars," despite a legal opinion of Attorney General Kent Frizzell that it was a lottery.

The law under which the suit is brought will be replaced when the new criminal code becomes effective July 1, 1970.

The new code outlaws a lottery but specifically loosens some of the prior definitions of "consideration," as part of a lottery. The new code will state that "mere registration without purchase of goods or services; personal attendance at places or events, without payment of an admission price or fee, listening to or watching radio and television programs, answering the telephone or making a telephone call and acts of like nature are not consideration."

Further USDA Pesticide Pinch

The Agriculture department has outlawed several pesticide chemicals for all use in food production and has tightened limitations on 56 others because of residue on food products.

The department's action involves withdrawal of federal registration, required when such chemicals are sold in interstate commerce.

Dr. Harry W. Hays, director of pesticide regulation, said the cancellations affect companies that received one-year extensions in 1968 but did not submit new information or progress reports.

A department spokesman said the pesticide chemicals for which federal registration is cancelled are anthracene oil, citronella, EMMI, nabam, phenylmercury monoethanol, ammonium acetate, phenylmercury nitrate, phenylmercury urea, potassium cresylate, 8-quinolinol benzoate and sodium cresylate.

Tours and programs in two of the eight undergraduate colleges of their choice is a part of the program. The other educational highlight is 11 hours of special interests sessions, also of their choosing.

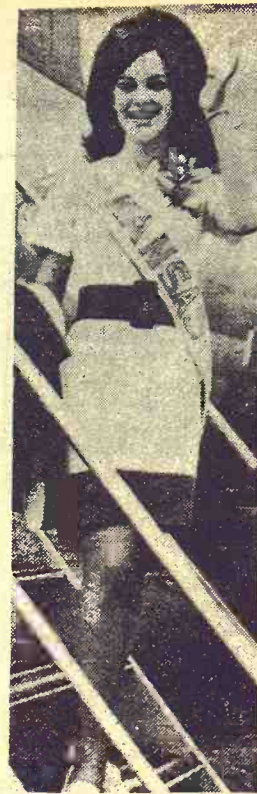

25 Average Farm Debt \$16,500

It costs more to farm these days than ever before. And an increasing share of farm expenditures are being made with borrowed capital.



The average farm in the U.S. showed a debt of \$16,500 last year. That's up sharply from an average of only \$6000 just eight years ago, says Frank Orazem, agricultural economist at Kansas State University.

Changes in agriculture are responsible for most of this increase, he says. These include a decline in number of farms and the corresponding increase in average size, as well as spiral-

ing land prices and increased investment in capital equipment.

Income from farming, however, has not kept pace. Net cash income from farm sales averaged about \$3000 per farm in 1960. By 1968 — primarily because of fewer and larger farms — net income had risen to just over \$5000 per farm. That increase — 70 percent — was less than half the increase in debt per farm.

Some figures compiled by Orazem suggest that debt is concentrated in the hands of those farmers with the greatest capacity for repaying it.

Only about 65 percent of all commercial farm operators — those with at least \$2500 a year

in farm receipts — were indebted in 1966, he says.

Furthermore, larger farmers tend to carry more farm debt than smaller farmers. Those selling more than \$20,000 worth of farm products, for example, while comprising only 12 percent of all farmers, account for almost half the total operator debt.

But they also sell three-fifths of the farm products. In addition, they account for nearly 30 percent of the off-farm earnings of commercial operators.

Thus, even though larger farmers may have a much higher debt-to-income ratio, a greater proportion of their income is available for repaying debts and making additional investments.

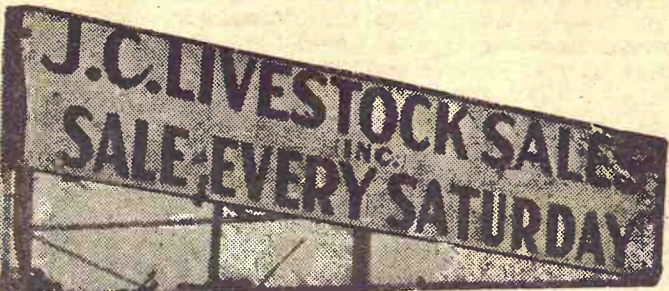

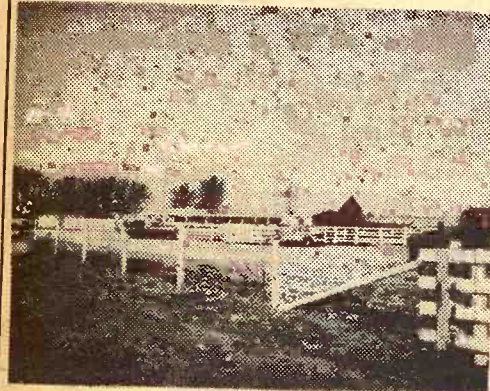
