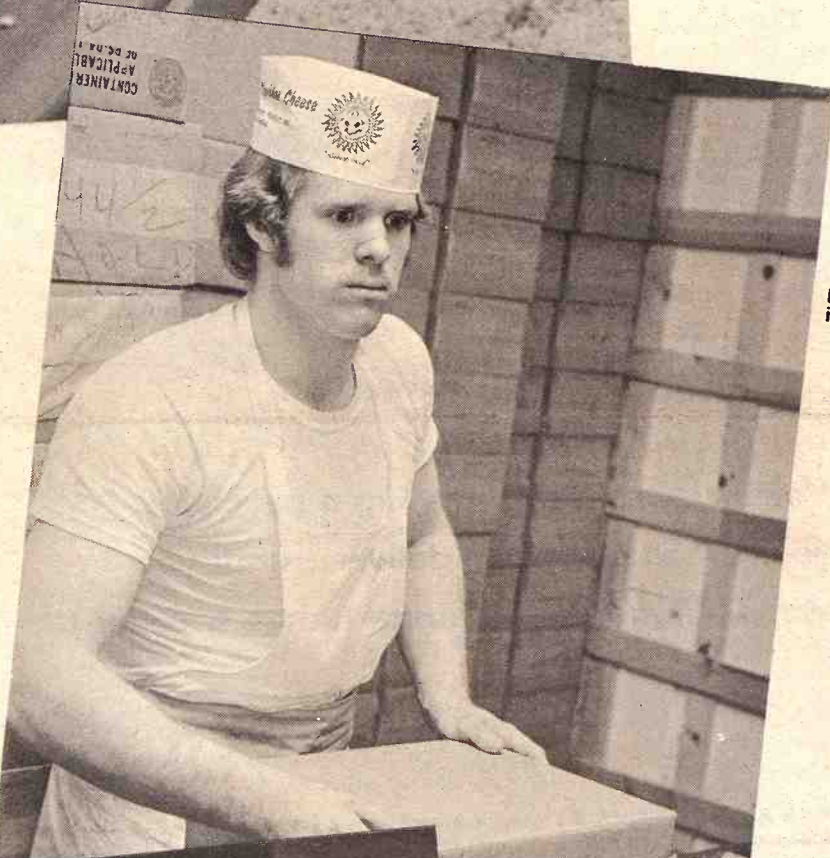

One of the food processors that many people in the Grass & Grain area have been acquainted with for many years is Dwight-Alma Dairy Products, Inc. at Alma. Known simply as the "cheese factory" to most folks, the plant has been in operation at Alma since 1947. The plant at Dwight merged with the Alma facility in 1961.

The plant produces American Cheddar cheese for general distribution and Monterey Jack for local sale. From 175 to 200 dairymen in the surrounding area send milk to Alma. Some milk from near Topeka and as far as Wichita is also used. The largest volume is in April, May, June and July. From six to seven thousand pounds of cheese per day is produced during this peak period. About 3000 pounds per day of dried whey is produced as a by-product. This is sold to be used in cattle feed.

The factory operates six days a week. From twenty to twenty-five people are employed including six milk haulers.

Cattle As Radar For Low-Flying Pilots

Most Air Force pilots are secure in their world of slide rules and sophisticated electronic equipment, but navigators of the 313th tactical airlift wing at Topeka admitted that they have been checking their positions on low level flights by watching cows.

"Our planes have flown these routes so many times," said one navigator, "that the cows are used to us. If a herd starts to run, we know we're off course."

Maj. Frank Kubik, wing navigator, said, "this is a fact. When we add new routes we get a lot of calls from farmers telling us we spook their cattle. After a while, the cows ignore us. In fact, we brief our men going out that if they see cattle move they're off course."

Cattle are also helpful as wind vanes, Major Kubik noted. The Kansas countryside is sometimes devoid of trees or lakes to indicate the wind direction.

"Cattle don't let any wind get in their eyes," the major laughed.

Major Kubik said in flying low-level routes that are below the minimum altitude needed for the function of the GCI and FAA radar systems, navigators use dead reckoning along with precision map

reading to determine their position. That is, they take the wind course and airspeed to compute the ground speed and drift, checking this against an accurate map.

"Even with a million dollars worth of equipment, knowing that cattle stand with their backs to the wind is a helpful item of information," he said.

The wing uses the prop jet C-130 Hercules aircraft. It has been flying low-level routes in Northeast Kansas since 1964 as an essential part of combat training. This training is preparation to avoid enemy radar defense, enabling aircraft to arrive at objectives with an element of surprise.

The tactics are essential in combat operations such as Vietnam for air delivering troops and supplies. In combat, the aircraft fly at tree-top level, but for training no flight goes below 500 feet. The routes are carefully chosen and changed to avoid population centers and all noise sensitive areas.

U.S. Using Oil Faster Than It's Finding It

The domestic demand for petroleum products reached a record high of more than 5.4 billion barrels in 1970 — or about 1,100 gallons of oil products for every man, woman and child in the United States, the American Petroleum Institute said.

Frank N. Ikard, president of the institute, said the demand for

petroleum has increased 51 per cent in the last decade. He said the 1970 demand was 4.9 per cent above the 1969 need.

Ikard said increases in the amount of production enabled the oil industry to stay ahead of the nation's oil needs but cautioned that the country could eventually face an energy crisis.

In six of the past 10 years, he said, the United States has used up proved oil reserves more rapidly than new discoveries have been made. Natural gas reserves have dropped in the last two years, he said.

Domestic production of crude oil during 1970 was estimated by the API at more than 3.3 billion barrels. Total domestic production of liquid hydrocarbons, including crude oil, lease condensate and natural gas liquids, exceeded 4.1 billion barrels.

The production of natural gas also was up with the 1970 figure reaching 22.5 billion cubic feet — about 6.8 per cent over 1969's production, the American Gas Association reported.

Crude oil imports dropped the past year but total imports jumped, the API reported. Crude imports were down from 513 million barrels in 1969 to 475 million in 1970. Total imports jumped from 1,154 million barrels to 1,263 million, the institute said.

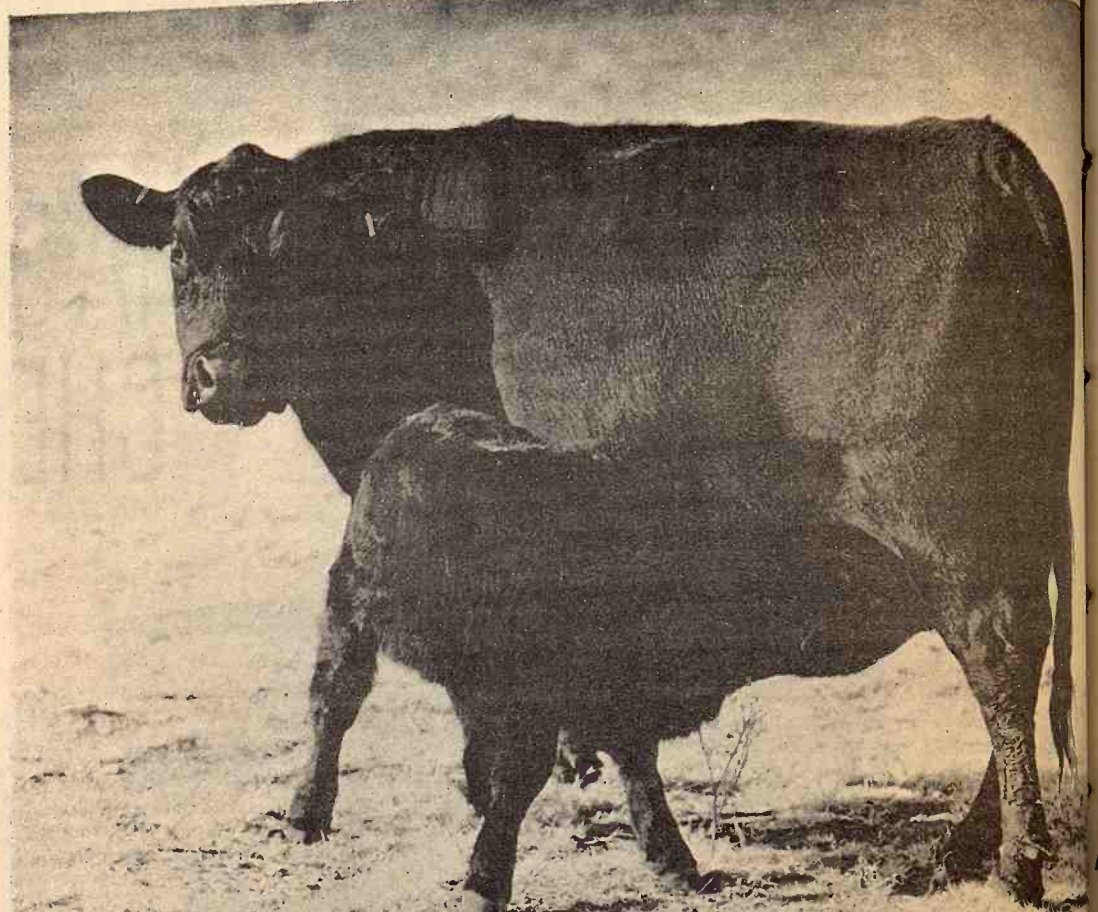

Ikard said experts agree that United States has abundant potential reserves of oil and natural gas.

The problem, Ikard said, is that it will take between 150 and 200 dollars within the next 10 years to find and develop these reserves. 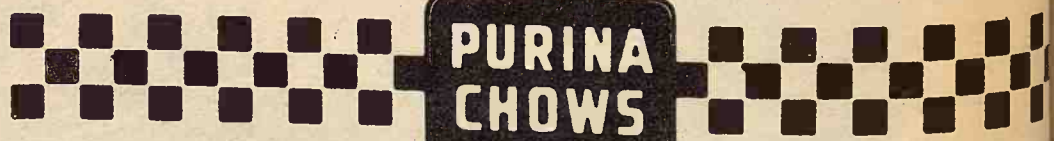

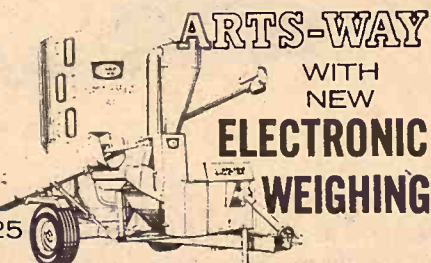

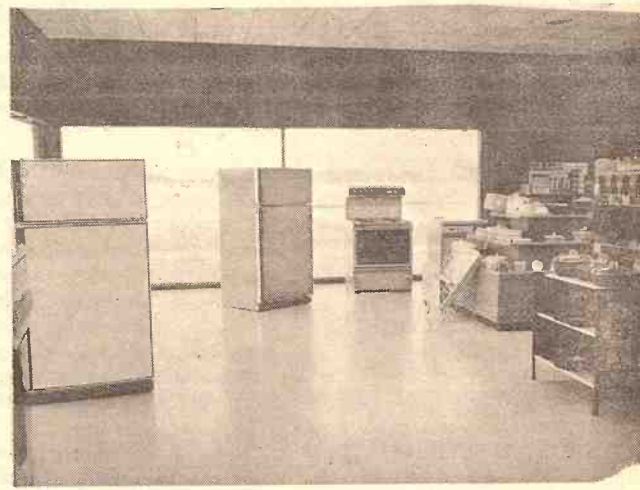

CRUMB PIE

("This is a very simple no-crust pie. The pie can be made several days ahead of time and refrigerated until you are ready to top with whipped cream.")

- 3 egg whites
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 cup sugar
- 11 graham cracker squares, crumbed
- 1/2 cup chopped nuts

Beat egg whites until frothy, beat in sugar and baking powder until stiff. Add graham cracker crumbs and nuts. Pour into pie pan and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Cool and top with good thickness of whipped cream or Dream Whip. Refrigerate for several hours before serving.

MOTHER'S MOLASSES COOKIES

- 2 1/2 cups white sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- Put this in bowl and add one egg at a time and beat well after each egg until 4 eggs have been added. Then add 1 cup sour cream and 1 large cup of molasses. Sift together 6 cups flour, 1 teaspoon soda (heaping), 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon ginger and 1/4

teaspoon allspice. Add flour, soda, and spices to first mixture and add more flour if necessary as these should be rolled out on the table and cut with cookie cutter. Put a chocolate chip or raisin in the center of each cookie before baking. Also sprinkle each cookie with white sugar before baking as it makes them taste so much better.

COOK RANCH SPECIAL

- 1 tablespoon fat or shortening
- 1 pound ground beef (fine grind)
- 1 medium onion, chopped

- 1/4 cup catsup (hot)
- 2 teaspoons tabasco sauce
- 1 handful brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon chili powder
- Salt and pepper
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 1 can tomato soup
- Brown onions and meat in melted shortening. Add seasonings. Let simmer slowly for 15 minutes. Add soups. Serve over hot spaghetti or rice. For variations add chili beans and short macaroni or Lasagna dumplings to meat sauce and serve in skillet. Serve with large tossed salad, hot bread and fruit compote.

ICE CREAM SALAD

- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 gallon ice cream, more if you like
- 1/2 cup oatmeal, quick cook
- 2 cups flour
- 1 cup chopped nuts
- 2 cans caramel
- 2 sticks oleo or butter

Mix oleo, sugar, oatmeal, flour and nuts. Pat into a cookie sheet and bake 15 minutes at 325 degrees. When done crumble all up and put half of the crumbs on bottom of pan, then pour 1 can of caramel over crumbs, then take the 1/2 gallon of ice cream and spread over the crumbs and caramel mixture. Add the other can of caramel; now sprinkle the rest of the crumbs over the mixture then put in the freezer and freeze. "This is very good."

PINEAPPLE COOKIES

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup brown sugar
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup drained crushed pineapple
- 1/2 cup broken nuts
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla flavoring
- 2 cups flour

Cream shortening with sugar. Add egg, pineapple and flavoring. Beat thoroughly. Sift flour, measure and sift with baking soda, baking powder and salt. Add nuts to flour mixture. Add dry ingredients to creamed shortening. Mix thoroughly. Drop by teaspoons onto well oiled baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees) for ten minutes.

PEANUT BUTTER COOKIES

- One-third cup oleo
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup packed brown sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 6-ounce package chocolate chips
- 1/2 teaspoon vanilla

Beat butter and peanut butter together. Gradually add sugar and brown sugar, creaming well. Add eggs, beat well. Add flour, baking powder and salt. Mix well. Add chocolate chips and vanilla. Bake in greased 9-inch pan 30-35 minutes at 350 degrees. Cool and cut.

SUPER CASSEROLE

- Then add the dates and 2 1/4 flour, 1 cup coconut, 1 cup nuts up. Drop by teaspoon onto sheet. Bake in moderate oven, 375 degrees until lightly browned.

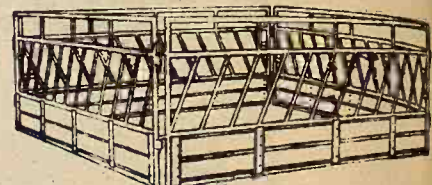

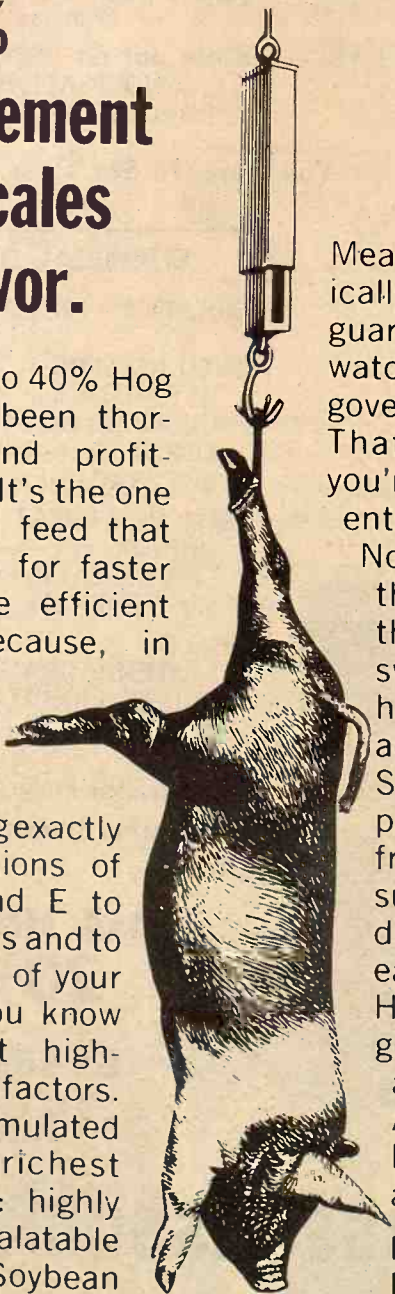

Creamy Curried Beef Recipe Easy To Prepare



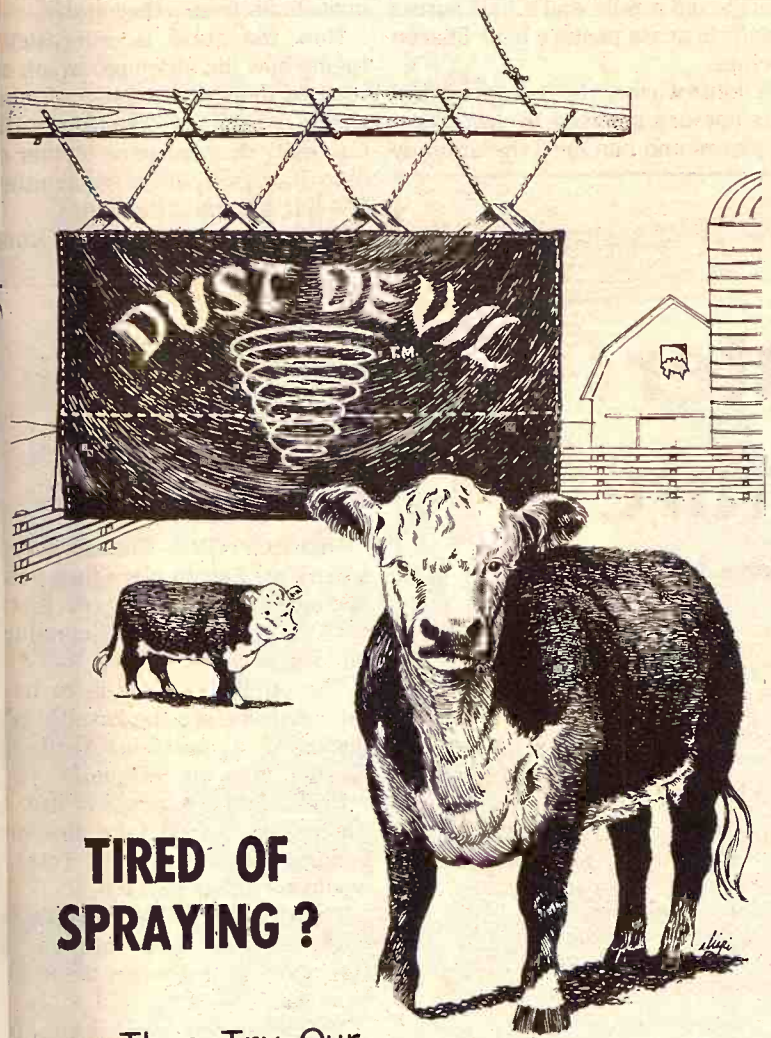

1/2 teaspoon curry powder
1/4 teaspoon ginger
Hot cooked rice

Heat corn oil in skillet. Add meat. Brown on all sides over medium heat, turning as needed. Add hot water. Cover and simmer about one hour and 15 minutes, or until meat is tender. Drain meat. Basement Cedar Closet Can Also Serve As Divider

A cedar closet, useful in itself, can also serve as a divider between the laundry and recreation room in the basement.

It's common knowledge that having a closet lined with aromatic red cedar is a good thing. It's a moth-safe place for woollens and other storage and its aroma is delightful to humans as well as a deterrent to moths and their larvae.

A basement room divider closet can be ordinary size or it may be constructed to provide double storage with doors on two sides. It depends on the size of the family and the basement.

In either case, it's fun to build. Begin by making a "foundation" of 2x4 lumber nailed together on edge to form the perimeter. Anchor the base to the concrete. To the foundation nail, in order, floor, sides, back side and ceiling — 3/4-inch exterior plywood.

To support low cost hollow core doors, install a 2x4 at each side of the closet front. Line the closet with aromatic red cedar, applying pieces in random lengths, horizontally, for a pleasing effect.

It's a good idea to cover ceiling and floor with the moth repellent, fragrant wood. Also, before hanging doors, cover them with red cedar,

using nails or a cartridge type adhesive, since the surface of a hollow core door is very thin. The rule is: The more cedar, the better the protection.

Finally, add a cedar shelf and the clothes rod centered between doors and back. Add magnetic catches to keep doors closed. Insure an airtight closet by installing stripping around doors. Also, finish the doors and closet interior, but avoid finishing the cedar, as this would seal in the pleasant odor.

Store Brown Sugar In Plastic Bag

If you buy brown sugar in the box and are often annoyed by having it harden before being used up, here's what to do:

Remove the sugar from the box and place it in a plastic bag before storing it in your cabinet.

Tasty Topping

Whip equal parts of honey and peanut butter and use as a topping for toast, waffles, hot rolls or muffins.

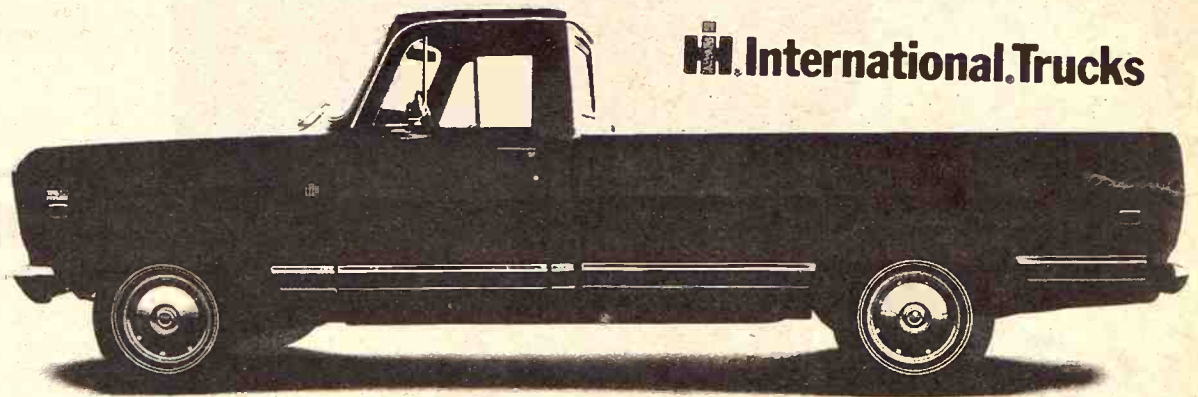

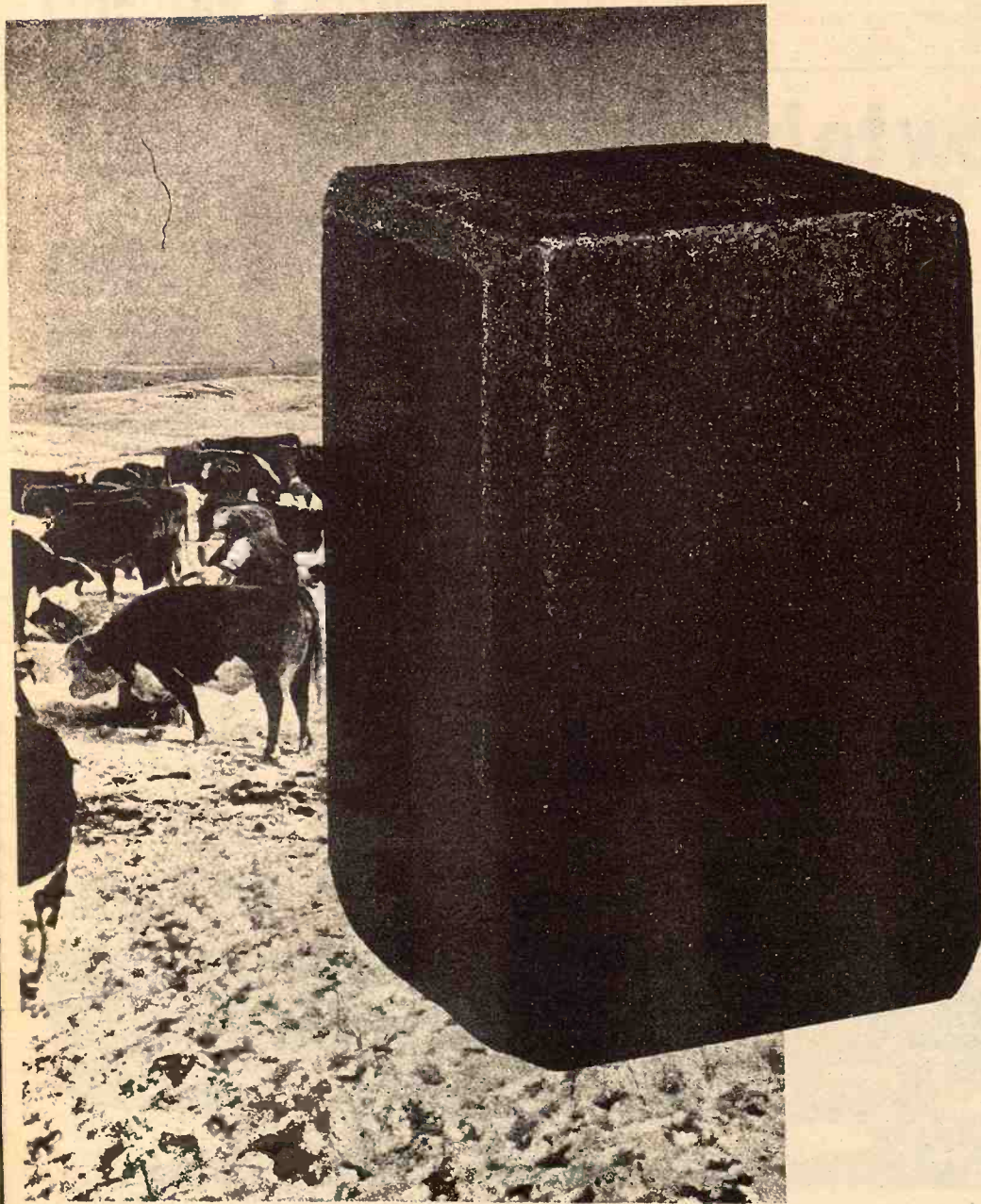

Miss Chance To Trap Antelope And Stock In Flint Hills

Kansas' efforts to transplant antelope within the state may have failed.

Bill Hlavachick of Hays, antelope project leader for the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission, held little hope an attempt would be repeated.

The commission hoped to trap a herd of antelope in a nylon-mesh net borrowed from Colorado and truck the pronghorns to the Flint Hills region near Strong City.

With the help of about 14 men, three or four vehicles and a rented airplane, a herd of about 30 animals was moved a mile and a half across a buffalo grass pasture near Sharon Springs.

Wildlife workers have learned that antelope are spooked by low-flying airplanes and can herd the animals

just about anyplace.

"Everything went good got right up to the trap," Hlavachick said. "I think the plane got it crossed up. They thought we were in the trap and backed out."

The antelope, seeing that harassment had left, scattered four winds.

The antelope in Wallace were the first in the state's program to build an herd started with 75 imported area in 1964.

Since then there have been trapping and translocation operations from other states.

Now the state is interested in seeing how the antelope, which roamed the state in great numbers, would adapt to the Flint Hills. Currently they range no farther than Barber County, discontinue few left around Ellsworth.

The latest count indicated there has about 400 antelope.

Many Schools Dropping Dress Codes — An Long As They Wear Shoes

A survey of high school officials indicates Kansas schools are relaxing their dress standards. High schools in Wichita, Manhattan, Topeka, Independence and El Dorado reported dress codes are "nil" for all practical purposes. Flexible dress codes exist at Great Bend, Hays, Dodge City, Garden City and Hutchinson.

"We depend on the students and the parents to decide what is appropriate," said Topeka Highland Park High School Principal Robert Jennings. Jennings said some teachers in Topeka wear pant suits in class.

David McElhiney, director of secondary education in Wichita, said, "Wichita does not have a dress code." Wichita school board policy requires only that students wear shoes, for health reasons.

"We conform to court case decisions across the nation," said North High School Principal John Asper. "The weight of court cases are on the side of the student," he said.

East High Principal Vernon O. Kirby said "We leave it up to the discretion of the individual rather than school officials."

"Anything that is a health hazard is not permitted," said Manhattan High School Principal James L. Szac. He said the school experienced fewer discipline problems after doing away with dress codes.

Independence High School has few guidelines and no formal dress code according to Principal Bill Scofield. El Dorado High School no dress code exists, but students take

recommendations from the student council. Principal Robert H. McCollum said, "The only thing students are not permitted to wear is shorts."

Hutchinson High School Principal Clayton Powers said dress codes are more lenient now than in the past. He said boys are occasionally sent to get haircuts and must be clean shaven. Girls may wear slacks.

Great Bend Vice Principal Cecil Dryer said girls are required to wear skirts no more than six inches above the knee or they may wear slacks. Boys may wear sideburns to the bottom of the earlobes and hair must be cut two inches above the collar and kept off the eyebrows. Shirts must be buttoned within one button of the collar and shirt tails must be tucked in.

Hays Principal Jack D. Roberts said a dress code set down by the student council requires that hair be cut above the shirt collar.

Students at Dodge City High School are expected to be clean shaven and neatly dressed, "but nothing else," according to Principal Laurence Stanton.

At Garden City, the dress code has been revised to accommodate hair length. Hair must be off the collar in back and above the eyes and ears. Girls may wear slacks or pant suits.

In Valley Center recently, 12 students were sent home to get haircuts and trim sideburns after they rebelled against a dress code adopted by the district school board Dec. 17.

By the weekend all but one had conformed to the dress code. Supt.

Odes Sapp said no complaints had been heard from parents.

The code requires that boys keep hair off the collar and sideburns above the lower part of the earlobe. Girls are required to wear dresses, skirts, slacks, or pants suits. Skirts must be no shorter than mid-thigh. Sapp said the temporary dress code will remain in effect until a new one is worked out through the school board.

Beet Growers See Higher Sugar Prices

Sugar beet grower associations and the Great Western Sugar Co., Denver-based subsidiary of Great Western United Corp., have announced agreement on terms of the 1971 sugar beet purchase contract.

Prospects for the highest per ton returns in history in Colorado,

Kansas, Montana, Nebraska and Wyoming were discussed at negotiating meetings held in Denver.

Richard W. Blake, Greeley, Colo., executive vice-president of the National Sugarbeet Growers federation, and Robert R. Owen, Great Western Sugar president, talked of a strong possibility that total cash returns to growers for the 1971 crop "could exceed \$18.50 a ton of beets of long-term average sugar content. The prediction is based on current sugar prices and recent market trends."

Blake, principal spokesman for growers, said the outlook was good for an increase of more than \$1.50 per ton of beets, basing his expectations upon a return to normal sugar content and continuance through Sept. 30, 1972, of annual sugar price improvement which has occurred since 1965.

Beets in 1968 were above-average in quality but sugar content in the last 2 years was depressed by poor weather conditions.

New beet seed varieties which have shown "the potential for substantial increases of sugar production per acre" during testing in the 5-state area, will be available for about 25 per cent of the 1971 acreage, Owen said.

The new seeds, called Mono-Hy, were developed by Great Western plant breeders.

At least one variety of the newly approved seeds will be available in each district of the 5-state area.

Owen also said the Great Western agricultural staff is starting an all-out campaign to seek improvement in sugar content of beets.

Company fieldmen will stress to growers the importance of reaching optimum levels of available nitrogen in the soil.

"Too much nitrogen has been proven to have a depressing effect on sugar content," Owen said.

Rescind Rule That Would Have Plowed Up Idle Land

Kansas farmers have been relieved of the necessity for plowing up some 300,000 acres of land formerly in "conservation reserve" or "permanent grassland" — so called "soil bank" land — this year.

U.S. Department of Agriculture told Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service officials at the Southwest Area conference in Phoenix, Ariz., regulations in the 1970 Agriculture Act will not be applied in 1971.

A rule — part of the 1965 Act never applied — was included in the 1970 legislation. The rule made it necessary for farmers having land

in one of the categories mentioned to take a crop off the land at least one of every three years to retain it as productive land in a diverted status.

At the end of December 1969, the last effective year, Kansas farmers had 245,000 acres in the conservation reserve, and 57,000 acres in permanent grassland.

A department spokesman said that since most farmers had planned their 1971 crops on the basis of former law experiences, the ruling will not be placed into effect for 1971. No mention of future years was made.

In 1960, the height of soil bank

days, there were 1,445,000 acres of Kansas land in the Conservation Reserve program. By 1967, the amount had dwindled to 751,000 acres.

The grasslands part of the program coming from the Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP), had a top acreage of 60,000 acres in 1966.

Under the rule, if a farmer let the land stay in "soil bank" status more than three years without getting a productive crop, he lost acreage on the productive history of his land — called "base" acreage for his farm.

Applying the rule was a part of the Nixon Administration plan to shift emphasis of the farm program from payment for diversion to payment for production only. In this way farmers will be paid to "produce" rather than paid to "not produce," spokesmen said.

Survives 54 Days In Idaho Wilds

Lost for 54 days, Robert Bailey ate raw meat and buried himself in snow one night to keep from freezing in a high mountain wilderness.

He made it back, his deer-hunting companion didn't.

"God took real good care of me," Bailey said.

The 28-year-old hunter told from a hospital bed of trekking some 30

miles in 25 days across rugged mountain ranges covered with waist-deep snow.

The ordeal that began Nov. 27 ended when Bailey reached a guest ranch on Big Lost River, about 15 miles northeast of Sun Valley.

"Bailey was in extremely good condition for what he had been through," said Danny Danielson, a helicopter pilot who picked up the survivor at the ranch and flew him to Sun Valley.

Bailey's hunting partner, Joe Conquest, 34, of Jerome, Idaho, later was found dead where the two became stranded by a snowstorm in an area known as Copper Basin, about 30 miles east of the ranch.

"He was in the car," said Danielson. "It was right off the side of the road...only the roof was showing above the snow."

Bearded, frostbitten, but at times smiling, Bailey told this story:

"We got caught in a snow-storm the first night and decided to stay overnight. But the next morning the snow was too deep to get out."

Shortly after they were stranded, Bailey and Conquest shot a deer and survived on raw venison until the day after Christmas.

"Then I told Joe I was going for help. Joe's feet were frozen and so swollen that he couldn't get his boots back on. He had plenty of meat when I left him and I understand when they found him today they said he had done all the right things. He was all wrapped up in blankets, but he was frozen."

"We kept track of the days by making marks on the inside of the panel truck. We were perfectly aware when it was Christmas Eve and had saved heart, tongue and brains — real delicacies — for our Christmas dinner."

"Joe and I got along real well all the time we were together. We never argued, maybe partly because we didn't think we would get back."

Cost of educating Kansas' school children went up 6.3 percent from \$688 per pupil to \$731.

Total expenditure on elementary and secondary education in Kansas was \$397 million last year and \$400 million this year.

Local government foots about 60 percent of this cost, state government about 32 percent and federal government 6 percent.

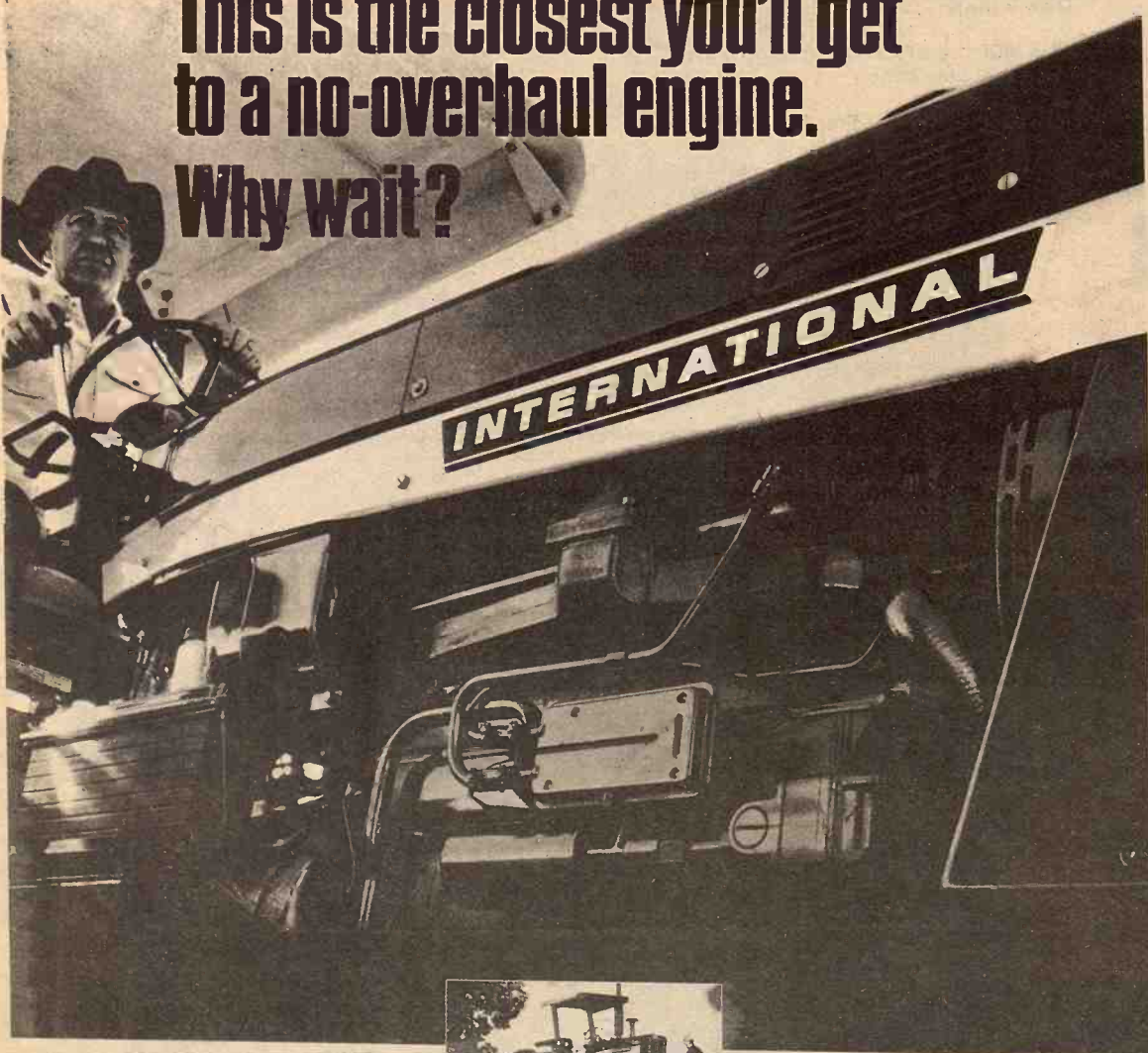

Hope For Vaccine To Control TGE In Hogs

Hog producers should be alert for signs of a viral disease among their herds. The disease is transmissible by contact, or TGE. It occurs more frequently in late winter or early spring and usually affects

every pig in a herd. Dr. Homer Caley, Extension veterinarian at Kansas State University, explains that when TGE strikes, most pigs under 10 days old die while sows may go off feed, vomit, and get diarrhea. Sows seldom die from TGE, however. Hog producers looking for a successful treatment probably will not find one at the present time. "Treatment of TGE is discouraging and usually unsuccessful," says Caley. He

suggests supportive therapy with antibiotics and electrolytes — materials which restore the body's mineral balance. Pigs old enough to wean should be separated from the sows because sows don't milk well after having TGE. Surviving pigs are usually stunted and don't feed out well. "Because of the various means of spreading, TGE is difficult to prevent, too," says Caley.

The virus has been found in hogs as long as eight weeks after apparent recovery from clinical signs of the disease. It has also been isolated from the droppings of starlings 32 hours after they ate infective material.

Dogs and foxes have shed the virus for one and two weeks respectively after eating the virus. "It is apparent that good sanitation is necessary," says Caley. "It is also important to control bird, dog and fox traffic and avoid the introduction of new stock into a herd during farrowing."

During some outbreaks, owners have claimed some results by feeding sows that have not farrowed the internal organs from pigs which

died from TGE. "This practice needs to take place at least three weeks prior to farrowing," says Caley, adding that it could spread other diseases.

There may be a ray of hope on the horizon. The Extension veterinarian says a new vaccine approved in October of 1970 could be an asset to the swine industry.

In the trial program sows are vaccinated twice — usually six to three weeks before farrowing. The vaccine will be evaluated in October of this year.

Kansas May Have Best Auto Safety Record

Traffic fatalities in Kansas declined 18 percent in 1970 from 1969, Col. William Albott, superintendent of the Kansas Highway Patrol, says.

Albott said he thought the record would surpass any of the other 49 states. He said fatalities declined about 2 percent nationally.

Speaking to a division meeting of

highway patrolmen, Albott said North Dakota was closest to the Kansas record with a 16 percent decline. He did not have the exact figure on traffic fatalities at hand, he said, but there were 132 fewer deaths in Kansas than in 1969.

The superintendent said three factors were responsible for the improvement: An increase in road time by his 320-man patrol force, statewide holiday programs concentrating on roads where many accidents have occurred and a decline in time spent by patrolmen on other than patrol duties.

Albott said there were fewer radar citations issued but a high number was not necessarily indicative of good traffic control.

"Nothing beats drivers seeing patrolmen out on the road," Albott said. "It makes them think. It makes them alert."

State Reaching Billion-Dollar Spending

The state of Kansas may very well become a billion-dollar spender in the next year.

If the increase in expenditures go up anything like they have in the past few years, that amount of spending by the state government will be almost sure to reach that 10-figure mark — 1,000,000,000 — in fiscal 1972.

If the reader suspects that the increase in state spending has been considerably faster than inflation, he is correct.

Here is the amount of state spending in the last 10 years. The year is the fiscal year, with that accounting year actually starting July 1 of the year preceding. Just to keep you oriented, the name of the governor is included with the figure.

The 1971 figure, for the year which will end June 30, is an estimate. It is the estimate Governor Robert Docking gave in his recommended budget for 1972.

Had the state expenditures increased at the same rate as inflation over the 10 years, the spending for the current year would be about \$500 million instead of the estimated \$935.

The taxpayer should note that the figures being compared are for state expenditures. He is not paying this amount out of sales taxes and income taxes, the principal sources of revenue for state government operation, and sundry other liquor, cigaret and specialty taxes.

The amount includes welfare and

highway funds, much of which is paid from federal funds, which the taxpayer will note that he contributed in the first place, but not directly to the state. Highway funds of course come from gasoline taxes, which are used only for that purpose.

The spending figures include revenue from other than tax sources. Some construction on university campuses, for example, is financed by student fee revenue fees, and a number of research and special study projects on campus are funded by federal money or by grants from private sources.

Unemployment compensation benefits are included in the spending figures too, and these funds come from employer contributions, not direct taxes.

Some of the spending too reflects bookkeeping changes, though these should tend to cancel themselves out over several years' time. An example would be a delay in capital expenditures, first budgeted in one year but delayed and not spent until the next year.

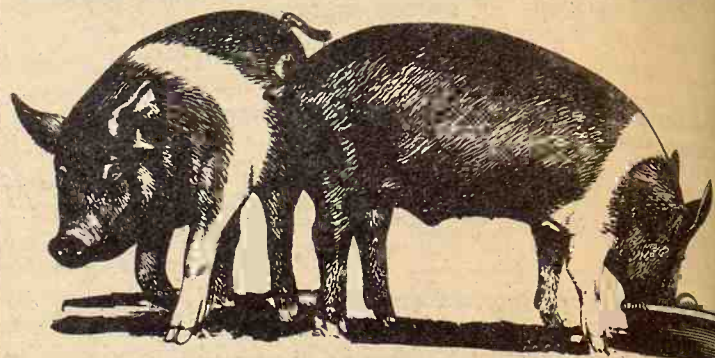
The spending over the 10-year period shows increases in taxes prompted by law changes, such as higher rates on sales taxes and income taxes. Much of these tax increases were aimed at increasing state aid to public schools, and the increase should have had the effect

of decreasing local property taxes, a large part of which support public schools.

Whether the taxpayer thinks that the greater state aid to schools lowered his local taxes or not is another matter. Certainly the

figures here show that state spending has increased beyond inflation or the growth of the economy total. It would surprise many people if that increase doesn't push spending to the billion-dollar figure next year.

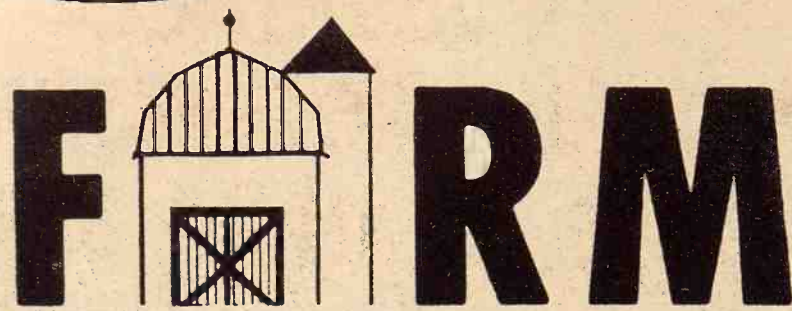

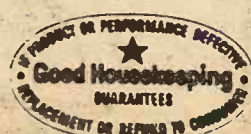

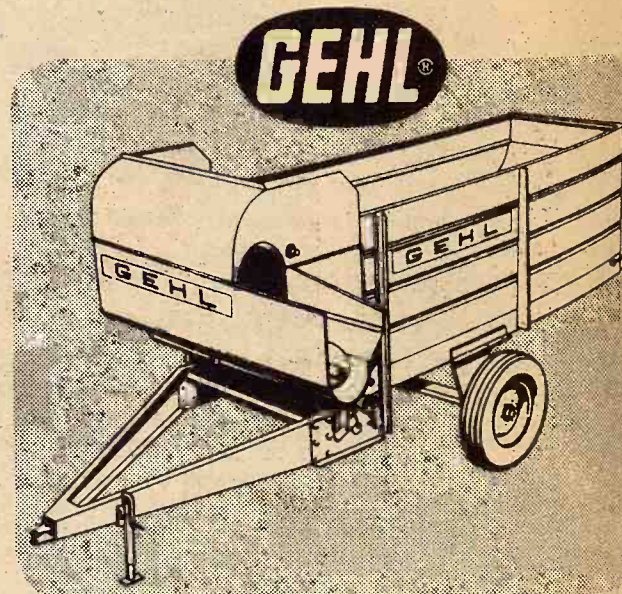

FEEDLOT HONORED

Frank G. Smith of Pratt has been honored by Feedlot Magazine as "Commercial Feeder of the Year." He'll receive a trophy from the magazine at the convention of the American National Cattlemen's Association at Las Vegas.

The Pratt feedlot was cited for cleanliness, maintenance and facilities, smooth and efficient operation, new construction projects, a large number of long-time satisfied customers and the fact that the feedlot has remained at least 90 percent full since it opened in 1962.

Warmth Helps Hogs Grow

Keeping hogs comfortable during cold weather could mean more money in the pockets of Kansas hog producers.

Extension agricultural engineers at Kansas State University point to an Illinois study which involved controlled heat vs. no-heat in growing and finishing houses.

In the heated houses, the temperature was maintained at 60 degrees. Hogs weighing 25 to 110 pounds gained 7 percent faster and ate 8 percent less feed in the heated houses than hogs placed in houses without heating. Feed conversion was improved by 16 percent, too.

Hogs from 110 pounds to market weight gained 10 percent faster and ate 12 percent less feed than those

placed in non-heated houses. Feed conversion improved 12 percent.

An enclosed shed, without controlled heat, is better than an open shed, according to Arkansas tests. Pigs fed during the winter months in an enclosed shed gained one-fourth pound faster per day and used 50 pounds less feed per 100 pounds of gain than did hogs that were kept in a shelter open on the south and east.

In a Purdue study, pigs bedded in an open shed gained two-tenths of a pound faster per day and used 30 pounds less feed per 100 pounds gained than did hogs that were kept in the same building without bedding.

Cottonwoods On Seedling List Too

While the cottonwood — the state tree of Kansas — isn't as valuable as many trees grown in this state, it will always be important to the area for a number of reasons.

It grows rapidly — reaching maturity in 80 to 100 years — and is a popular species for the manufacture of crates, boxes and basket veneer. It is also vital for use in light construction and in the manufacture of paper pulp.

Extension foresters at Kansas State University say cottonwood is native to all areas of the state. The eastern variety and the plains variety occur in the east and west, respectively, and overlap in central Kansas, where they cross-pollinate freely.

A "pioneer" species, cottonwood grows on base soils exposed by floods and on fresh silt deposits. Normally thought of as a wet-land tree, it is hardy in windbreaks and shelterbelts in central Kansas.

Cottonwood tree seedlings are available again this year from the Division of State and Extension Forestry at Kansas State University. Application forms are available at your county Extension office.

Sharp Fall In World Wheat Stocks

Wheat stocks at the end of the present 1970-71 crop year of the world's major wheat producing countries will total 49 million tons, a sharp fall from the 65 million tons the year before, the International Wheat Council said.

Commenting on this sharp decrease, the council said:

"The decrease in volume of available supplies has been influenced by adverse weather conditions and by the measures taken by Australia, Canada and the United States to curtail production."

Experts forecast some of the pressure will have lifted when delegates meet in Geneva to negotiate a new world grain pact. The minimum floor price written in the Geneva International Grain Agreement of 1967 had encouraged wheat overproduction by binding the parties to a minimum floor price. But when production snowballed, some of the signatories began undercutting, making the IGA inoperative. The present IGA expires in June this year.

Taxpayer Still Not Good At Following Income Tax Instructions

The federal government is having more trouble with its bestknown publication — the new, revised, simplified, easier-to-understand tax form 1040.

It seems large numbers of Americans filing their income tax forms early this year are overlooking a new peel-off mailing label of 1040. It isn't being peeled

off and the International Revenue Service is disturbed.

In the first week of 1971, IRS officials said, up to 10,000 out of 100,000 early filers either failed to use the peel-off label or list their names, addresses or Social Security numbers at the top of 1040.

The peel-off label, attached to the basic tax package mailed to millions of taxpayers by IRS, includes the name, address and Social Security number as recorded on a taxpayer's 1969 return.

IRS is asking taxpayers to peel it from the front page of the package and paste it in the proper place at the top of 1040. If the label isn't used, taxpayers must fill in the section themselves.

In past years, no peeling was required. The label was in the proper place, saving taxpayers the trouble of filling out their names, addresses and Social Security numbers if the information on the label proved correct.

IRS went to the peel-off label this year when it made another revision in form 1040 in hopes of making it easier for taxpayers to read and easier to fill out. Using the label

speeds processing, IRS says.

But officials indicated the habits of a number of taxpayers haven't changed.

"All we have in some cases is a signature," the spokesman said. "In such cases, we don't know how to get in touch with them."

If the trend continues, it could mean a lot of delayed refunds, a slowdown in processing, and a mass of defective returns.

W-2 forms usually, but not always, include the information about a taxpayer required by IRS, the spokesman said. The W-2 forms are supposed to be clipped to the back of form 1040.

Expect More Rock Music At County Fairs

Rock music groups will headline the entertainment at many Kansas fairs next summer, according to Everett Erhart, Kansas State Fair Association secretary.

Contemporary music was given recognition at the annual convention of the association which ended Wednesday in Topeka.

Along with the new music will be expanded 4-H and FFA programs.

Of high interest among some groups is the development of tractor pulling competition, Erhart said.

More fairs in the state will conduct tractor pulling contests next summer using a newly adopted set of rules which will enable local winners

to compete at state and national level contests later, he said.

Loren Noel of Abilene was named association president and Gary Misch, Coffeyville, was chosen vice president. Erhart, of Stafford, was renamed secretary.

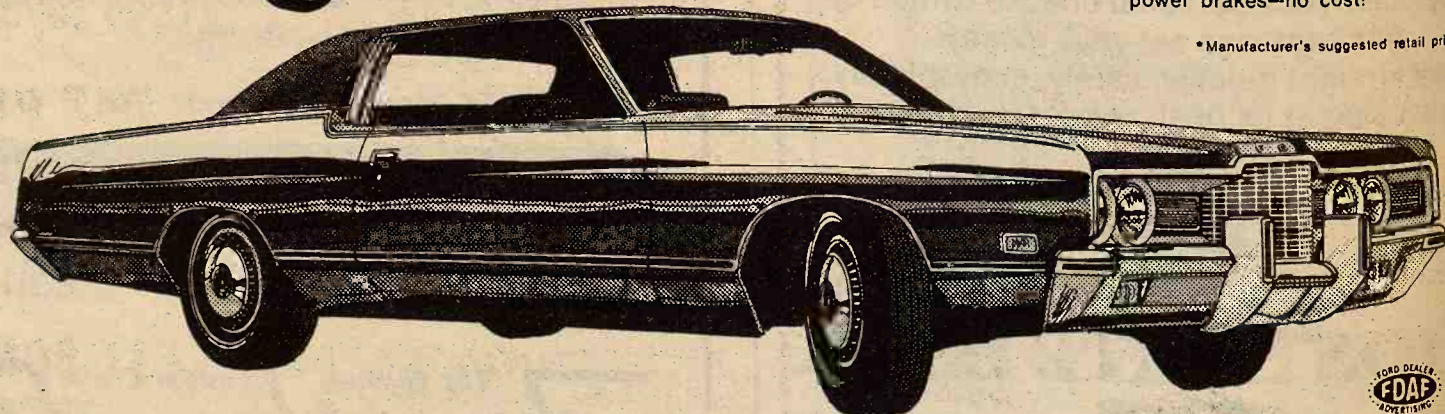

Forecast A Quail Dropoff

The recent storm which blanketed much of the state with snow, imposed hardships not only on the human population but on native wildlife as well.

Severe winter weather of this type can set the stage for a quail population "bust," according to Oliver Gasswint, chief of game for the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

The last time quail numbers dropped off on a statewide basis was

during the winter of 1959-60.

Following that winter, it took two years for quail populations to recover. They eventually hit an all-time high in 1966.

Sportsmen should bear in mind that Kansas has maintained a high quail population for the past eight years.

"During this time, annual quail harvests have varied from 2,100,000 to 3,900,000 birds," Gasswint noted. Then too, winters during this

period have been relatively mild. True, there were occasional blizzards with low temperatures but these storms were short-lived and quail losses low.

Biologists say a drop in numbers, occurring through the interaction of severe weather, coupled with inadequate habitat is inevitable.

The winter danger period is yet to come. Cover quality deteriorates progressively and food becomes less abundant, reaching a low at winter's end. Severe weather from late January to mid-March can do the greatest damage.

Sleet or freezing rain is usually of short duration but snow storms may persist up to three days. During these storms, wildlife is forced to hole up and is denied the opportunity of obtaining food until the storm passes.

Afterwards, species must face additional stress of finding food when the land is covered with ice or snow. Ice is usually more serious than snow but snow depths may become so great that even pheasants have difficulty scratching through to food.

In the past, a great deal of effort has been expended on crash programs aimed at feeding quail and other wildlife.

Although such programs may benefit a few coveys, they do little toward solving the primary problems of inadequate habitat and insufficient food supply.

"Although the intent is good, this expenditure of cash and sweat would be more productive if spent on the establishment of new and improvement of existing cover," Gasswint concluded.

Pearson Bill To Ease Gun Laws

Sen. James B. Pearson, R-Kan., has announced he will introduce legislation to exempt .22-caliber rimfire ammunition from the record-keeping provisions of the 1968 gun control act.

This bill will implement legislation support by Sen. Pearson and passed by the 91st Congress to exempt sporting rifle and shotgun ammunition and their component parts from the same record-provisions of the law.

The bill will be introduced this week and the Kansas senator will push for early action on the measure.

Pearson said retailers now must keep records on no less than eight items including date, manufacturer, quantity, caliber, name of buyer,

address and age each time they sell as much as a single box of .22 caliber rimfire ammunition.

The box of ammunition costs about \$1, he said.

"Treasury Department testimony on the legislation last session clearly indicated that these particular records have been of no help in solving gun crimes," Pearson said.

"There is no way to trace a spent cartridge back to the seller and yet it is the seller who carries the burden of all recordkeeping."

Sen. Pearson said the legislation "will not change the fact that it is a serious crime to sell arms or ammunition to any known felon or the mentally defective. Nor will it change the mail-order restrictions of the original gun control law."

The House of Representatives passed identical legislation in the last session and the House bill was reported out for favorable action by the Senate Finance Committee, but it never came to a vote by the full Senate.

Kansas Taxes On Cow Herds Among Highest

Taxes represent a pretty hefty share in the production of a beef calf, and Kansas, now nearing the top as a beef state, is among the states where cowherd taxes are the highest.

Personal property and real property taxes have an impact upon a cow-calf enterprise. This impact could become greater as profit margins for cowherd operations narrow.

To determine how Kansas compares in this regard with other ranking beef producing states, Frank Orazem, professor of economics at Kansas State University, came up with these figures.

California leads the 14 states studied in estimated costs for producing a beef calf in 1969. Taxes were as high as \$58.55. Idaho was second with a tax cost of \$21.91 per calf. Iowa barely nudged out Kansas with \$16.83.

The estimated Kansas tax cost per calf, Orazem found to be \$16.30. He based this on figures for 1968. Other states trailed off with Texas being the lowest, \$5.83 per calf. Oklahoma

stood at \$8.47, while Nebraska was higher with \$13.81.

The significance in these figures is that as competition increases, higher tax costs could bring about a shift in beef production to states with more favorable tax legislation.

Unfavorable economic consequences could evolve if states, or areas in states, which have no alternative land uses than pasture, should suffer a comparative tax disadvantage for cowherds. The Flint Hills represent such a large land area with natural advantages for cowherds and with few existing alternative uses for the land.

The K-State economist pointed out the difficulties in arriving at a fair comparison of calf taxes in the various states. Some reasons for variations in taxes, he said, are fluctuating land values, differing needs for buildings and equipment depending upon the climate, differing investment required per-cow unit due to the size of the operation and varying assessment rates and practices from county to county as well as from state to state.

Swine Assn. Meets At Salina February 4

The annual meeting of the Kansas Swine Improvement Association will be held Thursday, Feb. 4, in the Hilton Inn in Salina.

Jim Henry, Longford, program chairman, reports that registration

begins at 9:00 a.m. and the annual business at 10:00.

During lunch, the new Kansas Pork All-American and the new Kansas Pork Queen will be announced.

At 1:30 Marvin Garner, executive secretary of the National Pork Producers Council in Des Moines, Ia., will discuss activities of the council, especially new pork promotional programs launched with funds provided by hogmen from Kansas and across the nation through a nickel donation for every hog sold.

At 2:00 Wendell Moyer, Extension swine specialist at Kansas State University, will report on his six-month European trip during which he studied European swine production and research methods.

Use More Recent Base On U.S. Economic Indexes

The first in a series of expected changes in the methods of computing major price indicators, including the Gross National Product and the Cost of Living indexes has been announced by the Labor Department.

The department's Bureau of Labor Statistics announced it is

charging the reference base period for the Wholesale Price Index with release of the January 1971 data.

The period will shift from a 1957-1959 base to a 1967 base equaling 100, the Bureau said.

"The U.S. Office of Management and Budget established the new reference base for use by all government statistical agencies..." the Bureau said in a statement, indicating all government indexes will move to the 1967 base.

Among those expected to change are the Cost of Living - Consumer Price Index, which now operates on the 1957-1959 base; the Federal Reserve Board's Industrial Production Index, which deals with changes in the physical output of plants and facilities; and the real Gross National Product, which currently is based on 1958 dollars. The real GNP is adjusted to take out inflation factors.

KU Students Withhold Aid To Athletics

The University of Kansas Student Senate has cut the traditional allocation to the KU Athletic Dept. from its 1972 budget, eliminating about \$164,000 in revenue for KU athletics.

In the past, half of each student's \$12 per semester activity fee went to the Athletic Dept.

Wade Stinson, KU Athletic Dept. director, said the revenue loss would force the department to raise substantially the prices for basketball and football season tickets.

Instead of paying \$5 for football season tickets and \$4 for basketball season tickets, students now will be charged \$18 for football and \$15.50 for basketball tickets.

Stinson said he hoped the price increase would make up for the loss, but he added that higher prices may result in decreased ticket sales. He said such a decrease has occurred at other universities where student financial support for athletics had been withdrawn.

The only funds going to the Athletic Dept. will be 50 cents per student for "minor sports" such as

track and swimming.

Last summer the senate attempted to delete the athletic allocation from this year's budget, but the Kansas Board of Regents overruled the action, saying it was too late to implement.

Student body president Bill Ebert, Topeka told the senators before the vote that the regents had indicated they would allow a cut this time.

The KU Athletic Board had anticipated the loss of funds and they told senate officers the Athletic

Dept. could adjust if necessary, Stinson said.

"The senate's action will certainly cost the students more money," Stinson said. "We had hoped for a student referendum on the matter but apparently the senate decided against such a move."

Stinson said the higher ticket prices will be the same as for faculty and staff.

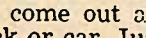

Cartoon Selling Of Seedling Program

Woodie Wildcat has a job in Kansas and the state is going to be a greener because of him.

Woodie has gone to work for the Kansas State University Division of Extension Forestry as a management specialist. His professional goal is to get Kansans to plant more trees and make them better.

Creating Woodie was the idea of Extension forester Hank Mutsch in Hutchinson. KSU Extension artist Ernie Peck breathed life into Woodie with his talented ink.

State Extension forester Harold Laher describes Woodie as "a mascot to the KSU mascot Willie and a close working associate of Smokey The Bear."

Woodie has the job of protecting the forest; Woodie's job is tagging them."

Woodie started working in January and he's finished his first task — starring in a new 4-H forestry project manual. He's busy on his next job — tagging Kansans to order trees from KSU Division of Extension

Forestry during its annual tree distribution program.

Woodie will be appearing soon on television, radio, newspapers, and magazines urging folks to order their trees now and begin making plans for planting them this spring. His slogan is "GROW PRIDE, GROW TREES."

He reports there are 28 species of tree and shrub seedlings for landowners to order from this year. The seedlings are either bare-rooted or potted in thick tarpaper pots.

The trees are to be planted for windbreaks, shelterbelts, woodlots, erosion control, wildlife habitat, farm ponds, or Christmas tree plantings — not for ornamental or landscaping purposes.

Landowners can order from seven evergreen, 13 deciduous, and eight shrub species. Popular bare-root species distributed in past years include Scotch pine, Austrian pine, white pine, Eastern redcedar, black walnut, Russian olive, silver maple, lilac, Nanking cherry, and American plum.

Native pecan and black walnut nuts — specially treated to hasten

germination — are other popular items.

Five evergreen species — Scotch pine, white pine, ponderosa pine, Austrian pine, and Eastern redcedar — will be available in small tarpaper pots. "Potted trees survive and grow better in dry conditions," Woodie explains.

A new feature for the 1971 tree distribution program is a wildlife bundle — a ready-made package of 50 American plum, 50 fragrant sumac, and 50 common lilac, plus a mixture of six evergreen and deciduous trees and five ponds of mixed native grass seed.

"When planted near a food supply such as a grain field, they make life

easier for my wildlife friends," Woodie explains.

Woodie says you can get complete ordering and pricing information from your local county Extension office. "Be proud of Kansas. Plant trees and make the state an even better place to live," he urges.

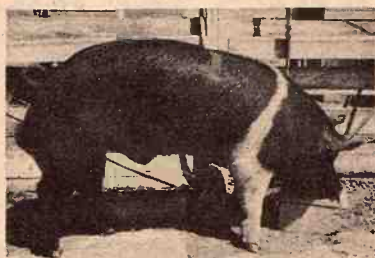

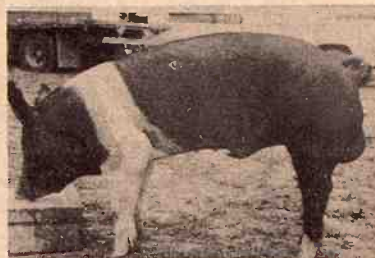

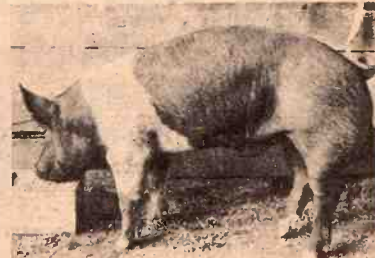

Continue Trend To Bigger Feedlots

New statistics on cattle feedlot operations show that the 20-year trend toward production by larger operations of an increasing share of the nation's beef continued last year.

The report, published by the Agriculture Department, shows that more than half of the fed cattle marketed last year came from feedlots with 1,000-head capacity or more.

Also, the report showed, the number of the larger feedlots continued to increase while smaller operations of 1,000 head or fewer capacity declined in 1970.

The survey was made among 22 states that produce fed beef, the kind

most preferred by consumers.

The 1970, the report said, nearly 24.8 million cattle were marketed from 182,550 feedlots in the 22 states. Nearly three-fourths of the country's beef now comes from cattle fed for the market, compared with less than half in 1950.

Of the feedlot total, 180,329 were of the smaller, 1,000-head capacity and under. In 1969 the smaller feedlots totaled 187,725.

Last year, the report said, the smaller lots marketed about 11.1 million cattle, compared with 11.4 million in 1969.

By contrast, the report said, the 1,000 head and larger operations totaled 2,221 and accounted for 13.6 million cattle sold last year. This compared with 2,069 feedlots in the 22 states in 1969 with marketings of about 12.3 million head.

States with feedlot marketings last year of one million or more included: Iowa 4,584,000; Nebraska 3,563,000; Texas 3,138,000; California 1,966,000; Colorado 1,915,000; Kansas 1,890,000 and Illinois 1,167,000.

An earlier department study, made on a national scale, noted "relatively small" feedlots still dominate the cattle feeding industry although their numbers have gradually declined.

Using Iowa, the top producer, as an example, the report said the total number of feedlots in the state has dwindled substantially in recent years. But all of the decline, officials said, has come in feedlot groups that

sell fewer than 50 cattle a year.

On the other hand, the earlier study — made on the basis of 1968 data — showed that the number of Iowa feeders marketing more than 100 head of cattle annually has increased more than half since 1959.

The new report, far less comprehensive, did not include a breakdown or analysis of feedlot numbers of fewer than 1,000-head capacity.

Again, using Iowa as a benchmark, the total of 1,000-head or less feedlots in that state decreased in 1970 to 41,829 from 43,837 in 1969. These accounted for 4,124,000 head of feed cattle last year, only slightly fewer than the 4,131,000 marketed in 1969.

Most of the super-size feedlots of 32,000-head capacity and larger are concentrated in the plains and West.

Not Everyone Agrees On Dating Food Packages

Have you wondered about the numbers and letters stamped on food product packages or containers? Or why there is controversy over their use?

While there is no universal coding system, the numbers and letters on packages and containers are intended primarily as inventory and

quality control devices for use by food producers, processors or retailers.

Mildred Walker, Extension consumer-marketing specialist at Kansas State University, says the codes are usually established by the processor, and may provide various kinds of processing information, including dates.

She explains the controversy over coding concerns whether or not the processor should be required to "open date" all packaged perishable foods so consumers could have some idea of product freshness.

Open dating advocates say the information would help the shopper in the store and the homemaker as she stores and uses the products in the home.

Miss Walker says proponents also point out open dating would make stock rotation and out-of-date food removal jobs easier for the retailer.

Opponents believe open dating would not be of too much benefit to the consumer, because product quality is also dependent upon temperature conditions and handling.

"They also feel open dating would be costly because shoppers would search through products on the shelf to find the most recent date," notes Miss Walker.

"This would cause acceptable products to be rejected and eventually reach their expiration date...increasing product waste substantially."

Some people feel the increased waste due to selective buying would lead to higher food prices. Also, retailers might delay restocking until all products on the shelf were sold.

In reply to the selective buying idea, it is argued there would be no problem once the shopper became accustomed to readable dates.

"Data from experiences in this country and in Europe tend to substantiate this opinion," observes Miss Walker.

"Even is open dating becomes a widespread practice, there is little chance for agreement on what date should be used."

"Possibilities include the date the product was processed, the date it is put on the shelf, the expiration date for selling, or the expiration for use in the home."

Mills says Sterling was born in Kansas to have a large sale, held at the Coleman barn on November 24, 1911. He was active in the business for 49 years, and spent 49 years as an auctioneer. He points out that jacks usually brought \$1,800.

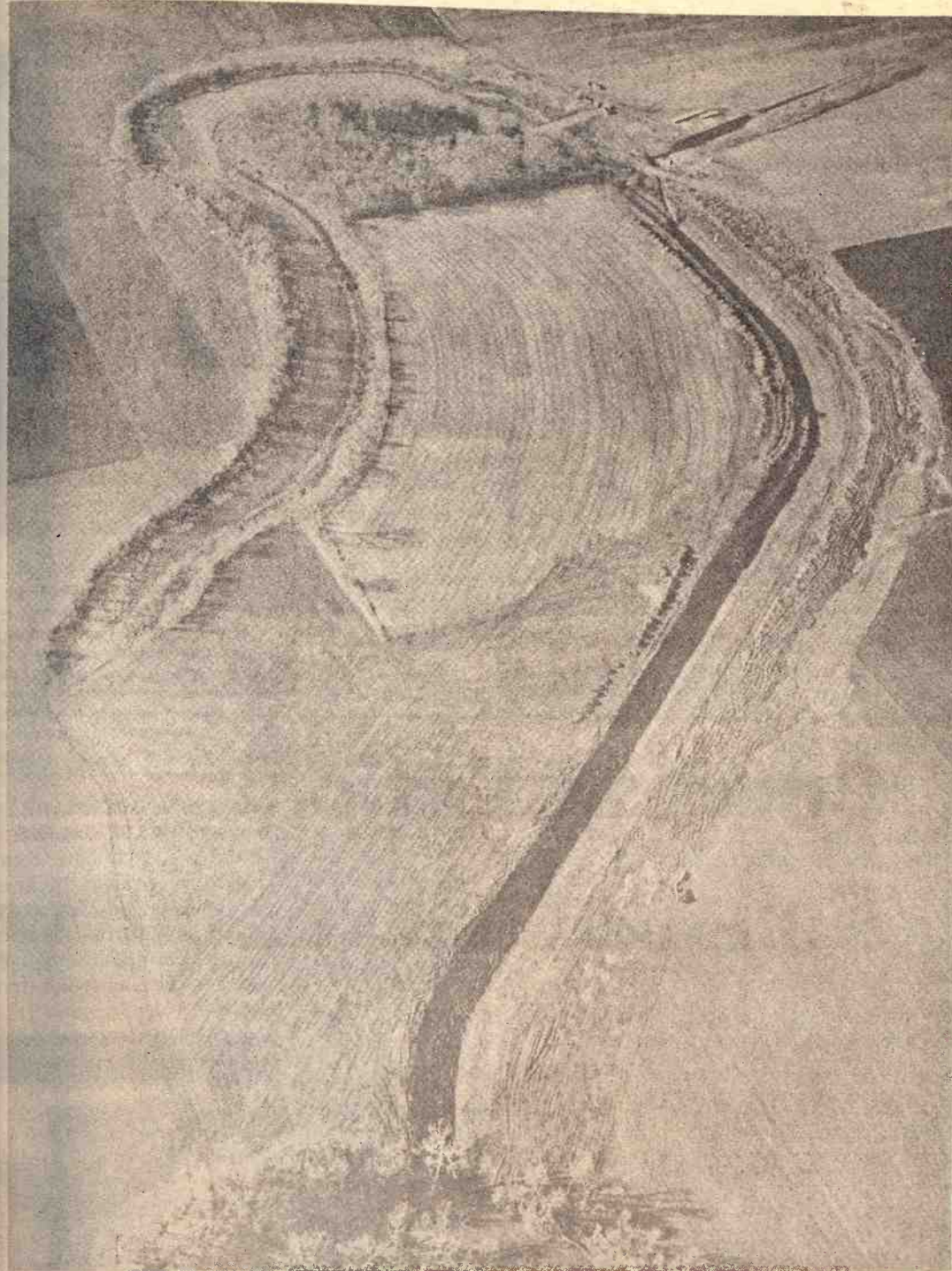

Testing A Cooled Truck Tire

General Tire & Rubber Co. said it's testing truck tires containing a coolant that run appreciably cooler than conventional tires. Heat is a major destroyer of tires.

The new concept involves a coolant that is vaporized by the heat of the tread and then condensed by the cooler steel rim, General Tire said. It results in the rim's passing off some of the heat built up by friction and flexing of the tire.

In controlled tests tires using the system have run up to 38 degrees cooler than normal truck tires, which reach temperatures of about 240 degrees in summer over-the-road hauling, General Tire added.

Broiler Producers To Cut Back

The Agriculture Department and poultry industry officials have agreed in recommending a further cutback in broiler production during the second quarter of this year.

The USDA broiler guidelines for April-June called originally for an eight percent cutback from a year earlier. Now, because of near-record competing supplies of pork and other meat, a revised guideline will be issued soon calling for a 12 percent reduction.

The plant employs about 1000 persons and has a payroll of \$10 million.

Hesston Profit Down 39 Percent

The G&G area's largest machinery maker, Hesston Corp., had a 39 per cent drop in its profit in 1969.

The farm implement manufacturer which started out less than 25 years ago had an increase in sales of nearly 5 per cent, up to \$39.1 million,

but earnings were down to \$920,000 compared to \$1.5 million in 1969.

Hesston president Lyle E. Yost said the gain in sales was the 17th consecutive yearly increase for the company, which started with a grain harvester pickup attachment and has added to its worldwide line since.

Yost said the decline in profit was caused by several factors. "The economy generally, including the farm equipment industry, was in a downturn and the company's operating costs at the beginning of last year were geared to a level of sales which was not sustained."

Yost said Hesston had added to its product line two forage harvesters, a silager and the Stakhand 30. A

lawn and garden tractor, the Front Runner, was introduced in 1970 as Hesston's first entry in this market.

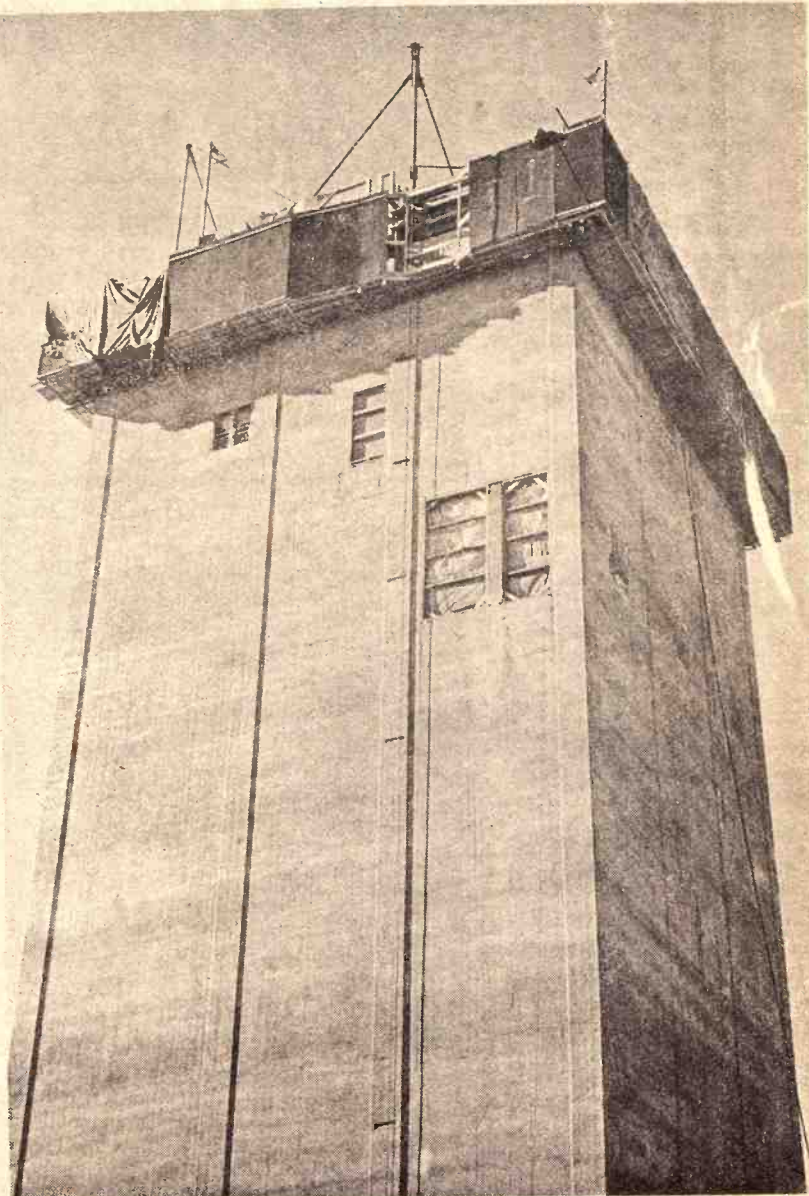

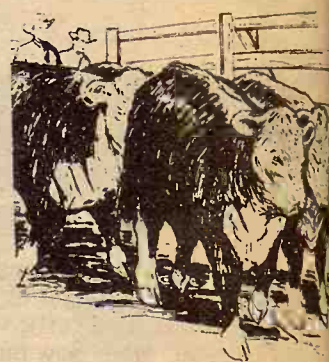

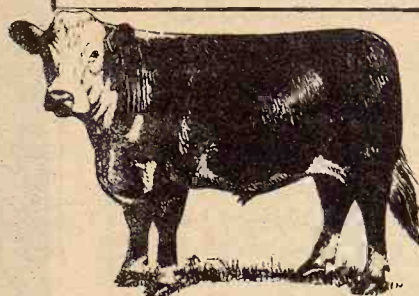
