

## USDA Fear Of Heavy Fall Marketings

This fall's slaughter market of fed cattle is expected to continue "very large" and could be accompanied by weaker prices, the Department of Agriculture says.

Though stronger consumer demand has helped hold the price line this summer, the department said in August livestock outlook, increased sales in a few months could not out-

pace the demand.

There was 8 percent more cat-cattle being fattened in feedlots on July 1 than a year earlier, the department said. These cattle usually comprise about 60 percent of the supply for slaughter in the fall.

In addition, as the department has noted before, feeders are at present shipping cattle to market at heavier weights, add-

ing to the supply of fed beef. Pork production this fall also is expected to be seasonally higher from a year ago.

So far this year fed cattle prices have been higher than in 1967 despite an increase of about 4 per cent in sales. Choice steers at Chicago averaged \$27.25 a hundred pounds the first half of 1968, about \$2 more than a year earlier, the department said.

Total cattle numbers appear to be holding steady, around the 108,800,000 estimated on January 1. This year's calf crop, however, is estimated at 1 percent above 1967.

Hog slaughter this summer is about the same as a year ago. On June 1, the number of pigs expected to reach slaughter weight this summer was up three percent over a year earlier, but the supply of pigs for the fall market was down about 3 percent.

The department said producers indicate next winter's supply of hogs for slaughter will rise again over year-earlier levels. On June 1 they reported having 2 percent more sows for farrowing in the June-November season.

Pigs born in these months will supply the bulk of hogs for slaughter during January-June, 1969.

Lamb slaughter for the remainder of this year is expected to be down from a year earlier because of a 4 percent smaller lamb production. Prices are expected to continue above a year earlier, the department said.

## Traders See Futures In Iced Broilers

The Chicago Board of Trade, unhappy over badly sagging trading volume in grain futures, thinks it may have come up with a contract that will bring new life to the pits.

On Aug. 1, the board opened trading in iced broiler chicken futures, and there are indications that the new contract will gain popularity with the industry and the speculators, both essential to a successful market. Through a full two weeks of trading, 291 contracts changed hands in the iced broiler section of the board's soybean pit.

That would bring the board's broiler trading volume fairly close to the total 336 trades made on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange in 1962-63, the last time broiler chickens were listed in a futures market. The Mercantile exchange dropped its broiler contract for lack of interest. (But it went on to score big with contracts in frozen pork bellies and live choice cattle. The Board of Trade has become a little jealous of these successes.)

Warren Lebeck, executive vice president and secretary of the Board of Trade, figures the Mercantile's broiler contract failed to catch interest because it called for frozen broilers. The board's contract is for 25,000 pounds of iced, whole, ready-to-cook broilers. Iced broilers are the major factor in the broiler industry, accounting for 80% of

the 9 billion pounds of broilers sold last year.

As a result, the big, integrated concerns that grow and process broiler chickens are showing great interest in the new contract. "This market is the best thing that's come down the road for chicken processors in a long time," says an official of Allied Mills Inc., a livestock feed manufacturer with a large interest in broiler chickens.

About half of the annual broiler production comes from a dozen big companies such as Ralston Purina Co., Swift & Co., Pillsbury Co., Textron Inc., Central Soya Co., Armour & Co., and Wilson & Co. They are called integrated producers because they control all aspects of their broiler production, from fertilized eggs and feed to marketing the finished product. Producers that have shown greatest interest in the new broiler contract are those that already are familiar with the workings of futures markets through their grain trading.

The processors, of course, are particularly anxious to develop the new contract into a solid hedging market to insure their production against price declines. (Indeed, the industry trade group, the National Broiler Council, first suggested creating the contract to Board of Trade officials.) In the past, chicken processors didn't have any means of forward pricing, with the result that during some periods of overproduction, broiler prices fell to below-cost levels. In the past 30 months, broiler prices have fluctuated 40% from the low to the high.

A year ago, chickens were in oversupply and broilers delivered to Chicago brought 24 cents a pound wholesale; since then, the industry has cut back output somewhat and prices have moved higher. Currently, Chicago-delivered broilers are priced at 27 cents a pound wholesale.

By its very nature the broiler industry has a sensitive price structure. First, broilers are produced on a rigid timetable of 12 weeks from the time an egg is set in an incubator, until a bird is slaughtered. Second, iced broilers are highly perishable, and start to spoil after a week.

As a result, processors couldn't materially alter the volume of their marketings until 12 weeks after burdensome supplies occurred and prices already had fallen.

Reinforcing the swings in chicken prices was the uncertainty of chain store demand. Over half of all broilers are sold to supermarkets and many of these chickens are aggressively marketed at irregular intervals during price specials. When chicken consumption varies seasonally (highest during the summer cookout months and lowest during the winter holidays), the level of retail sales is heavily dependent on the frequency of grocery store specials.

But while supermarkets can schedule chicken specials almost at whim, the processors have to keep moving their iced birds before they spoil. This has left the processors at a disadvantage in hard-nose bargaining with the big chain stores, especially when supplies are plentiful. Their choice, as one chain store poultry buyer puts it, is to "sell 'em or smell 'em."

The futures contract will both allow processors to "lock in" prices of their birds (sometimes even before the eggs have been laid) and to gear their production to anticipated demands as expressed through the futures prices.

The same benefits apply to the ever-expanding chains of carry-out fried chicken outlets. An official of Kentucky Fried Chicken Corp., Nashville, says the company will be using the new market in the near future. "We are meeting with a brokerage house this week to learn more about the intricacies of hedging. We can't constantly change the prices on our printed menus so that anything which helps us project and set our main cost item, chickens, will certainly aid our operations."

Speculators, too, are showing some interest. On the Board of Trade floor, a trader who already has taken a speculative position in broilers says he plans "to go heavily" into chickens as soon as he has a chance to study the contract further.

"There's a wealth of informa-

tion on broiler supply and some on the demand for chickens relative to pork and beef and levels of disposable income," the trader explains. "With the seasonal price swings this market has, a lot of speculators will be coming into the market soon," he predicts.

Of course, if the processors succeed in mastering the broiler contract as a future demand indicator, prices aren't likely to fluctuate as sharply as before. Nonetheless, the Board of Trade is confident the contract will gain popularity. Mr. Lebeck, of the Board of Trade, says he isn't too concerned over the new market's modest trade volume. "The pork belly market languished for several years before it took off," he observes.

## Some Points On Stocking Private Ponds

It won't be long until the Fish and Game Commission will be making its annual delivery of fish for the stocking of

private ponds around Kansas. The fish are furnished to applicants who qualify on a free-of-charge basis.

Anyone desiring fish for a pond would be wise to remember these 10 points:

1. There is no use stocking fingerling or smaller fish in a pond with an existing fish population. The larger, established

fish will only wipe them out. (The Commission will not furnish fish for a pond which already has fish in it.)

2. The Commission furnishes only bass, bluegill and channel catfish, and provides them in the right numbers, depending on the size of the pond being stocked, to keep it in balance for a period of several years. However, whether it stays in balance depends largely on the owner and those who catch fish from it.

3. Stocking a pond with fish from the Commission does not require that it be open to the public. The landowner, alone, determines who can fish his ponds.

4. After stocking a pond should not be fished for two summers. This allows the fish to grow to good catchable size.

5. "Good" fishing can be maintained in a pond only by fishing it. A pond which is not fished, once the fish reach "catchable" size, will soon get out of "balance," meaning it will have a few large fish and thousands of small ones, but nothing in between.

6. Crappie are no longer stocked by the Commission in ponds, and they are not recommended. Why? They reproduce too rapidly, and soon a pond will be over-populated with hun-

dreds of them — all small. 7. Bluegill are placed in ponds along with black bass as a source of food for the bass. A good idea, when you fish a pond, to take out several bluegill every time a bass is caught. This will insure "balance" and give you bigger, healthier fish in both species.

8. Channel catfish will spawn naturally in ponds, provided you give them some tight enclosure, such as a small barrel or cream can, in which to lay their eggs and protect the nest. Cream cans are best, because of the narrow neck. The vessels should be placed in about four feet of water in the pond, and need not be left there the year around. The fish generally spawn in June and July, so you're safe if you put the cream barrels, old culverts, etc., the water about May 1, and take them out after mid-July.

9. The only way to receive fish for stocking a pond is to make application with the Fisheries Division, Kansas Fish and Game Commission, Box 1028, Pratt, Kansas 67124. Applications must be made out in full for each pond to be stocked, before fish can be secured.

10. Fish to stock ponds are normally delivered to county seat cities throughout the state in mid-October. Pond owners must meet the delivery trucks with vessels sufficient to haul their stock fish to the ponds.

There's just one more thing to remember. Pond fishing is hard to beat. Records prove it. In Kansas, for example, the state record largemouth bass, bluegill, bullhead and white crappie were hauled from ponds

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
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### TIGHT CREDIT SHOULD EASE UP

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

# Export Boom Has Flattened Out

The big surge in the exports of farm products seems to have flattened out. The value of agricultural products exported during the 10 years that ended with 1964 more than doubled, but has not increased much since then. Foreign markets, however, are still highly important to American farmers. The big three in our agricultural exports are wheat, soybeans, and corn. The next five are animal products, tobacco, cotton, fruits and vegetables, and rice.

The total value of agricultural exports in 1967 was \$36.4 billion, to be more exact — \$6,383,318,

000). This amount was more than \$6,000 for each of the approximately 1 million farmers who produce most of our food and other essential agricultural products.

The value of farm exports in 1967 was 7 percent less than in 1966, and only 0.5 percent greater than in 1964. So far this year, the value of exports has been just about the same as in 1967.

**Wheat.** Our 1967 wheat exports were valued at \$1,250 million. This included some flour and other primary wheat products. In 1967, wheat exports to-

talled nearly 700 million bushels, or 58 percent of the crop.

**Soybeans.** The value of soybeans and soybean products exported last year was \$1,150 million. This included 263 million bushels of soybeans, 1,135 million pounds of oil, and 2,717,000 tons of soybean meal. Altogether, the exports of soybeans and the soybean products were equivalent to about 400 million bushels of soybeans, or about 41 percent of the crop.

Dr. T. A. Hieronymus of the University of Illinois recently pointed out that the foreign demand for soybean protein is now about equal to amount used in the United States. To put it another way, the soybean meal used in the U.S. is almost equaled by our exports of soybeans and soybean meal.

**Corn.** The value of our 1967 corn exports totalled about \$728 million. We exported some 526 million bushels. This was equal to 11 percent of the huge crop that was produced last year, and it was nearly one-fourth of the corn sold by farmers.

Exports of other feeds included sorghum grain, 299 million bushels (39 percent of the crop); barley, 47 million bushels; and oats, 6 million bushels.

The total value of feed grains and other feeds exported was \$1,093 million.

**Other products.** 1967 tobacco exports were worth \$498 million — 21 percent of the crop; cotton exports, \$464 million — 52 percent of the crop. Exports of rice were worth \$319 million, 68 percent of the crop.

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
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**Animal products.** Livestock producers know about imports of meats. Few farmers, however, realize that we also export large amounts of livestock products. In 1967, exports of livestock and livestock products brought \$676 million. The biggest returns were from the export of meats, tallow, dairy products, and hides. The value of these exports equaled 68 percent of the imports of meats and all other competitive animal products.

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
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# '68 Farm Income To Be Slightly Higher Than '67

The Agriculture department says slightly higher average prices, a larger volume of marketing, and an increase of about 10 per cent in government payments indicate that realized net incomes of farm operators for 1968 will increase slightly from 1967.

This is indicated, it said, despite the continuing uptrend in production expenses. Although government payments to farmers in January-May totaled below a year earlier, they are expected to be up about 300 million dollars for the year. Larger feed-grain acreage diversion is the principal reason for the increase.

## States Latch Onto Cigarets For New Funds

If your vacation took you through several states this summer you might have discovered something that has the cigaret people doing a slow burn: State cigaret taxes have risen sharply.

Within the past year 15 states have voted increases, a few of them to figures round as smoke rings. Florida's tax jumped to 15 cents from 8 cents, and California's to 10 from 3.

Three states lifted the tax by five cents a pack, one by four and another by three and a half cents. West Virginia raised its tax by only one cent.

### Critical Role

Industry spokesman say they believe considerations other than public health have motivated the legislators. But a lot of people feel a desire to discourage smoking has played at least some small but critical role.

The suspicion was expressed this way by a man closely associated with the industry, who asked, incidentally, that the statement not be attributed to him:

"We're a good industry to pick on. Everyone is out to get us, and so if you need more money you might as well get it from someone nobody likes."

Few instances can be recalled, however, when tax increases were asked for reasons of public health. One of these involved a presidential candidate, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York, who in 1965 sought for an increase to 10 cents a pack for two announced reasons: to discourage smoking and to increase revenue.

### Hard Pressed

It is usually the latter reason that is given as the motivation, for most states are hard pressed to find additional revenues for new services and for old projects grown more costly.

Regular increases of one, two or three cents a pack were the pattern until a few years ago. But in the past couple of years the increases have been nearer a nickel.

The reason for the bigger increases, said Herb Mattock, a field director for the Tobacco Tax Council, is that "legislatures, have taken the attitude that if they increase the tax by two or three cents a pack the vending machine industry will raise their price five cents and keep the change."

### Affect Pattern

Have the higher taxes hurt sales: "They affect the pattern rather than the amount," Maddock replied, offering the following illustration:

In Oregon the cigaret tax is four cents. In neighboring Washington it is nearly three times as much at 11 cents. In Oregon, per capita sales if cigarets is 165.1. In Washington it is 99.7.

California 3 cents to 10 cents; Florida 8 to 15; Oklahoma, Pennsylvania and Rhode Island 8 to 13; New Mexico 8 to 12; Arizona 6.5 to 10; New Jersey 11 to 14; Alabama 7 to 10; Iowa and Maine 8 to 10; New York 10 to 12; Ohio 5 to 7; Illinois 7 to 9; and West Virginia 6 to 7.

performed well in controlled laboratory experiments.

J. N. Wiltbank, an animal science professor at Colorado State University, is quoted as suggesting use of the contraceptive in helping producers hold down beef cattle numbers.

The coil could be used in cows being culled from herds for the slaughter market, Wiltbank suggests. So far the contraceptives aren't available commercially.


The intrauterine coil or loop has undergone experiment also in India in hopes of finding an effective, acceptable way of controlling the country's cattle population, the largest in the world.

For many Indians, cattle are sacred and therefore not to be slaughtered. Recent estimates place India's cattle population at around 210 million head, nearly twice that of the United States.

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## Beef Supply Management Thru Birth Control?

The use of mechanical birth control devices to limit the number of cattle during times of oversupply of beef is suggested by some scientists as an alternative to the time-honored procedure of keeping bulls from cows.

Agriculture department tests show that the simple intrauterine plastic coil—advocated for human use by some authorities—is virtually fool-proof as a contraceptive device for cows.

The coil still is in the research stage of livestock use, the department says, but so far it has

sugar and cinnamon, (about 1 cup sugar). Dot with oleo. Add 1/4 cup water. Mix together the brown sugar, oleo, oats and flour until crumbly and put over the apple slices. Bake about 45 minutes, or until brown in 350 degree oven. ("I use 9-inch cake pan.")

Hints To Follow When Traveling With Children

Motor trips with infants and children require just a few extra precautions to assure a safe

and comfortable journey. If possible, limit your travel to only 200 or 300 miles a day and choose stopover points with facilities for recreation and infant care. Stock your car with a sufficient supply of disposable diapers and sealed jars of baby food. Make certain milk is pasteurized and water is pure. Also, see to it that your children's immunization shots (tetanus, polio and whooping cough) are up to date.

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


### Food Poisoning

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

## Cigarette Use On Decline

Consumption started back up the next year, however, reaching 572 billion cigarettes last year. Per capita consumption dropped back ever so slightly in 1967 to about 214 packs per person aged 18 or over.


Trade sources cite effective advertising by anti-smoking groups as cutting into total cigarette use. Profits of tobacco companies generally declined last year, and all of them have been shifting into non-tobacco sales. American Tobacco, for example, has recently acquired Mott apple products and Russ Togs, a large apparel maker.

## Area Polls Dominate Fair In Missouri

It was Missouri's State Fair, but it was nearly all Kansas in the Polled Hereford judging at Sedalia. Riffel & Sons of Enterprise, Alfalfa Lawn Farms of Larned, and Serrians Double S Ranch of Lincoln won 22 of 23 blue ribbons. Riffels got 13 ribbons, Alfalfa Lawns 7, and Serrien 2. Riffel showed champion heifer and champion bull with Miss Deluxe Worth by Deluxe Mixer 3, and CPH Woodrow 206 by CMF Domestic Woodrow.

## Salina Tax Up 23 Percent

Of all the tax increases announced in the G&G area, few match the one facing Salinians. The new tax bill there will be \$109.29 per \$1000 valuation — an increase of 23 percent.

A tax bill of \$500 by last year's levy will be up to \$615.

An increase of nearly 18 mills — to \$46.65 — in the school district levy accounts for most of the increase.

## Test Boar Sale Averages \$239

Superior boars and spirited bidding by Kansas hogmen combined to climax summer tests at the Kansas Swine Improvement boar testing station on the Kansas State University campus.

An average price of \$239 paid for the 58 animals sold is indicative of the quality of the boars. This is one of the highest sale price averages in the station's 11-year history, and quality of animals ran high, according to Wendell A. Moyer, Extension swine specialist at KSU.

Two littermate Duroc boars rated first and second in the sale. Emery Berry, Minneopolis, took his choice for \$460, and Alfred Link, Yates Center, bought the other animal for \$405. These boars were bred by the Gooch Research Farm, Manhattan, gained about 2 pounds a day, and made a gain for each 2½ pounds of feed.

Highest price paid was \$510 for a Hampshire hog bred by John Weir, Geuda Springs. The animal was bought by Dean Funston, Abilene, who has been a regular participant in the test

station work. A littermate to this boar sold to Melvin Casey, Toronto, for \$380. This pen of animals gained about 2 pounds a day and consumed less than a pound and a half of feed for each pound of gain.

A Yorkshire boar, bred by Lauer Farms, Hope, sold to Rex Christie, Ottawa, for \$350, top price for that breed. Also selling at this price was a Yorkshire bred by Floyd Meyer, Palmer, and bought by Neil Hupe, Perry.

Most of the boars went to commercial breeders; however, a few were bought by purebred herd owners. Buyers represented most sections of the state. The sale was an evening event with a barbecued pork chop lunch, served to more than 400 people prior to the auction.

The sale marked the close of summer tests at the Swine Testing Station operated in Manhattan by K-State for KSIA. The winter tests will begin in October at the station. Breeders can get information about the operation from the KSU Animal Science and Industry Department or from county Extension agricultural agents.

The station was started in 1958 by the KSIA in an effort to better evaluate purebred stock. Rate of gain, feed efficiency, and meat-type characteristics are the important production factors considered, Moyer said.

In the tests, two littermate boars and a full or half-brother barrow are fed together. They are fed to an average weight of 200 pounds to determine feed efficiency and rate of growth.

Barrows are slaughtered when the tests are completed to determine carcass length, backfat, loin eye area, and percent of lean cuts. The boars are probed for backfat and sonoray tested for loin eye area. Prospective buyers are furnished this infor-

mation before the sale. The index for each pen of three is based on the individual index of both boars plus the Ham-Loin Index of the littermate barrow.

"The fact that most of the boars in this sale were purchas-

ed for use in commercial herds is an indication that Kansas swine producers are recognizing the value of tested boars in an efficient operation," Moyer said.

## Some Early Deliveries Off Flint Hills Grass

EMPORIA — Scattered early cattle deliveries already are being made off of Flint Hills grass to feeders needing cattle now.

Some contracting continues for September and October deliveries, altho activity has slowed. Observers figure that Flint Hills yearlings are about two-thirds sold.

The better steers have been selling for \$25.50-\$26.50, a few operators holding out for \$27 but reportedly not getting it. Heifer mates are generally \$24.50-\$25.50. Plainer cattle have brought less.

Dealers who contracted cattle for resale say they have found it harder to sell than to buy the last few weeks, especially of heavier weights.

Most contract deliveries begin about Sept. 10 and will finish about October 1. Pasture men delivering early have expressed some dissatisfaction over weights, but most expect cattle held the normal term to average about 200 pounds gain for the summer. Flint Hills grazing conditions have been good all season, water plentiful.

If anything, grass may have remained a little too green. Stockmen hope it will strengthen in the final days of the grazing period.

One dry spot, covering most of about four counties in the Smoky Hills, west of the Flint Hills, has remained subnormal dry all summer. This includes Lincoln, Ellsworth, Ottawa and Salina.

Mitch McClure, Tescott, said he had received only four inches of rain fall all year. Most of the Flint Hills area, however, has had normal or better moisture.

McClure said he bought 300 more of the E. D. Webster & Sons cattle at Tescott and Coun-

oil Grove in late August for \$26.25, for animals weighing around 675.

Pursuant to Article 14, Section 1 of the Constitution and in compliance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 1063, adopted by the legislature on March 7, 1968, a proposition will be submitted to the voters at the November 5, 1968, General Election for their approval or rejection to amend Section 2 of Article 4 of the Constitution as follows:

"Sec. 2. General elections and township elections shall be held biennially on the Tuesday succeeding the first Monday in November in the years bearing even numbers. All county and township officers shall hold their offices for a term of two years and until their successors are qualified: Provided, One county commissioner shall be elected from each of three districts, numbered 1, 2, and 3, by the voters of the district, and the legislature shall fix the time of election and the term of office of such commissioners; such election to be at a general election, and no term of office to exceed six years."



### Only Half Of State Business Pays Sales Tax

The Kansas sales tax is collected only on about half the gross sales of businesses filing tax returns with the state revenue Department, a legislative

council research report says.

The report was presented to the legislative council's legislative budget committee.

The report said a survey made by the department of revenue two years ago showed that deductions amounted to 49 per cent of gross sales on a state-wide basis.


It said examples of deductions are sales for purposes of resale

or processing; sales in interstate commerce; sales to the United States, the state of Kansas and its political subdivisions; sales of motor vehicle fuel; sales to charitable, educational and religious organizations, and allowances for returned goods and trade-ins.

Of the \$108,309,000 collected in sales tax in the fiscal year ending last June 30, the largest source of sales tax revenue was from sales of food — \$27,430,000.

The automotive business was the next largest source of sales tax, \$21,542,000.

General merchandise was next at \$17.31 million; unclassified retail \$11.31 million; public utilities \$10.1 million; lumber and building \$6.14 million; furniture \$4.60 million; apparel \$3.87 million; manufacturing

## Wheat Growers' Meeker Resigns To Put Time Into Congressional Campaign

DENVER, Colo. — George Meeker, Garden City, resigned last week as president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, during an executive meeting of the association here.

Meeker said he made the announcement "with deep regret," and urged farmers across the country to become "active in the political arena."

Meeker, Kansas state representative and wheat farmer-business man, is a candidate for Congress in the sprawling First District of Kansas.

### Can't Do Both

"I feel I can't devote full time to this organization, and campaign full time for Congress," Meeker said.

"It has been a great honor for me to serve as the leader of an association that is dedicated to gaining the American wheat farmer a just position in the market place," he said. He was elected president of the national association in January.

"This is a time when the ur-

ban crisis is overshadowing the rural crisis," Meeker said, "and a time when men who realize the interlocking needs of both, need to be sent to Washington."

"The farmer's strength has been eroded away by false prophets who want to throw him into a system of buying and selling that will kill off the remaining family farmers in this country."

"These are the same false prophets who were telling us to throw it on the open market to let it seek its own solution," Meeker said.

"Both crises are real, and the one compounds the other. My objective as a Congressman will be to attain the same fine goals we have tried to achieve through Wheat Growers."

"But my objective cannot end there, because this nation must realize that putting one farmer against another in a complex market place — or pitting a ghetto dweller against the police in the cities — is not the



Is the sorghum-damaging aphid a greenbug or not? After a month of concern about this destructive insect that inflicted heavy damage on grain sorghum plants in Kansas and other Great Plains states, the entomologists in these states have agreed that the light green aphid really is the greenbug (*Schizaphis graminum*) that adapted to a new environment.

Dr. H. Leroy Brooks and Dell Gates, Extension entomologists at Kansas State University, indicate that the sorghum greenbug is probably a new biotype that is lighter in body color, has little or no color on the tips of cornicles (tailpipes), and survives at temperatures above 90 degrees F.

The question of proper identification may seem somewhat academic to farmers who are concerned about destruction of their crops, Dr. Brooks notes, but positive classification is necessary before adequate control measures can be devised.

In the meantime, large numbers of beneficial insects, which are the natural enemies of the greenbug, are taking care of the current crises in Kansas. A survey through Reno, Pratt, Kiowa, Ford, Gary, Haskell, Finney, Scott, Logan, Gove, Trego, Ellis, and Russell counties this week show that 75 to 80 percent of the aphid populations are rapidly being destroyed by such enemies as the ladybirds beetle adults and larvae, green lacewing fly larvae, syrphid larvae, and tiny parasitic wasps.

Trace numbers of aphids will be present in some sorghum fields for some time to come, Gates believes. Light colonies of aphids are still found in the whorls of small plants and a few behind leaf sheaths. The variance in sorghum planting dates makes plants in some fields still at the correct stage of growth to attract the aphid attack. And in a few fields, there still are not enough beneficial insects to cope with the situation.

Of great concern to many wheat farmers at this time is the possibility of a greenbug attack on their early plantings of small grains. A serious greenbug infestation on wheat — if one develops — appears most likely in the western third of the state, Dr. Brooks says, but there is some chance for a statewide problem.

The K-State entomologists suggest that Kansas farmers consider three ways to meet the problem of fall greenbug control — 1) plant small grains at the normal recommended time, 2) use a systematic insecticide at planting time, or 3) apply a foliar spray if necessary at a later date.

Early planted wheat will be in the greatest jeopardy of greenbug attack, but K-State agronomists point out that planting too late increases haz-

ards of wind erosion, reduced tilling, thinner stands, and poor root development. So, they suggest that farmers check with local county Extension agricultural agents for the correct planting date.

Systematic insecticides — Di-Syston or phorate (thimet) granules — may be applied at planting time and give several weeks of protection against greenbug attack. Recommended rates are 1 pound of actual phorate or Di-Syston per acre by drilling, broadcasting, or banding each side of the seed row at planting time. Make sure that the insecticide does not come in direct contact with the seed, Gates warns. And do not graze wheat fields that have been treated with phorate.

If no insecticide is applied at planting time, make weekly inspections during the early growth of the wheat plants, the K-State entomologists advise. Should greenbug infestations become large enough to warrant foliar sprays, use methyl parathion, ethyl parathion, or malathion, but do not graze for 15 days.

Demeton (Systox) and phosphamidon are also labeled for use on wheat and have some systematic action. These have 21- and 30-day waiting intervals,

respectively, before grazing. Liquid Di-Syston may be applied as a foliar spray at a rate of 1/4 to 1 pint of 6 pound Di-Syston LC formulation per acre, but treated fields cannot be grazed.

In effect, then, there is no increase in price to the dairymen.



# Mushrooming Mergers Put Co-ops Among Biggest Industries

A midwest farm writer recently noted the irony of complaints from farmers and small businessmen about trends to larger farms and corporate farms, at the same as they were growing themselves.

Few fields of business are growing faster than farm co-

ops, which are beginning to rival giant industries. In fact, in the face of frequent and major mergers and consolidations, co-op officials now are wary that they might have to tread lightly to avoid anti-trust involvement.

One of the most recent, and broadest mergers, involves the creation of Mid-America Dairy-men, which brought together co-ops in Kansas, Iowa, Missouri, Oklahoma, Illinois, Texas, Minnesota and Nebraska.

Some of pioneer milk-handling co-ops started 40 years ago, gradually becoming the exclusive broker for dairy farmers in their areas. When the bulk milk tank came into the picture about 20 years ago, the co-ops bought big glasslined tanks on trucks and leased them to drivers. Farmers who installed bulk tanks got a premium for their grade A milk, and gradually nearly all of them did.

Co-ops like this were formed, as the Shawnee Milk Producers at Topeka and the Nemaha Creamery at Sabetha. Some of these co-ops — at Topeka, Sabetha, St. Joseph, Springfield, and Chillicothe — later formed a loose federation to bargain for higher prices than those set by federal milk handling orders.

Another federation of regional co-ops across several states was formed, and finally a year ago there was a consolidation of Pure Milk in Kansas City, Shawnee Milk Producers at Topeka, and Nemaha Co-op at Sabetha.

The Nemaha plant gave the organization its own processing

plant, and presently they bought the Bennett Creamery at Ottawa, giving it a second plant which could utilize surplus milk.

Several consolidations were taking place elsewhere in the Midwest, and the most recent consolidation brought together the Kansas group with associations at St. Louis; Highland, Ill.; Chillicothe, Mo.; and Springfield, Mo.

The name Mid-America was adopted by the consolidated group. The general headquarters is at Kansas City.

The new consolidation brings to Mid-America Dairy men several processing plants. Officials explain that one of the major advantages of this will be that the co-op will be able to shift surplus milk, that is milk not needed for grade A bottling purposes, to a nearby processing plant for use in making ice cream, cottage cheese, or frozen dessert products.

Formerly, a weakness in the milk marketing setup was that a surplus in a given area could hurt the local market while such milk perhaps could have been used advantageously some place else.

In effect, the dairy farmers thru their consolidated co-ops are taking steps toward managing their own surpluses rather than leaving the entire task to the government.

There is a similar regrouping of regional cooperatives in the grain marketing field. A new association, called Far-Mar-Co. Inc., was formed from the old CMA of Kansas City, Equity Union of Lincoln, Farmers Cooperative Commission Co. of Hutchinson, and the West Central Co-op at Omaha.

Jimmie Dean, the manager of the Hutchinson Co-op, became general manager of the new organization, which by its size figures to compete with the world-wide exporting companies.

About half the wheat produced in the U.S. is sold overseas, and major facilities like barges, hopper freight cars, and giant elevators right at the harbor are needed to get a share of the market.

Far-Mar-Co. owns 40 percent of the stock and controls a new elevator just above New Orleans on the Mississippi river. Eventually, Far-Mar-Co. will have an elevator and marketing facilities in Europe too.

The buildup of facilities and bankroll in this mushrooming consolidation can be seen thru Far-Mar-Co. One of the consolidating group was the Cooperative Marketing Association of Kansas City, which a few years before had acquired Dannen Mills at St. Joseph, a soybean processing mill and feed mill.

When the Hutchinson association became a part of the group, it contributed a processing plant which makes bulgur, a wheat food product.

Of course, best known of the regional co-ops is Farmland In-

dustries, which is a supplier to local co-ops and one of the largest of the type in the nation. Fortune magazine in its annual ranking of industries placed Farmland 237th in the nation.

Farmland owns some of its own processing facilities, such as fertilizer plants and oil refineries.

Recently it took over entirely a co-op meat packing plant at Garden City, which had started with Farmland's help only a few years ago, with pledges of stock and cattle marketings from local people.

The plant had operated successfully but it soon developed a need for more capital and more management skills. In an exchange of stock July 1, Farmland took the Garden City plant over, illustrating how the cooperative movement has steadily accelerated into larger areas.

## Wheat At 25-Year Low

Here's one indication of the problem Kansas farmers are up against these days. Wheat slumped to \$1.23 a bushel in mid-June, the lowest price in 25 years.

On a parity basis, the average U.S. farm price of \$1.24 in June was 47 percent of parity, compared with 61 percent for June 1967.

A number of factors are behind the general decline in wheat prices: Large world wheat supplies, a softening of export demands, and a build-up of wheat supplies in the U.S. and Canada.

Favorable growing conditions the last two years have resulted in record or near-record crops in most grain producing areas. In the U.S., this largely offset the 1968 acreage reduction. This year's crop is estimated to be about the same size as last year's record 1.5 billion bushels.

A carryover of about 545 million bushels provides a total supply of nearly 2.1 billion bush-

els.

As for exports, the U.S. is running into increasing competition in foreign markets, and our stocks of grain are building up.

Of great importance for the future is the rapid progress being made in the wheat producing capacity of India and Pakistan. Introduction of new varieties, use of more fertilizer and better soil, and water management practices have boosted yields considerably.

This year's crop in these countries contrasts sharply with the food shortages in previous years which resulted in large food aid shipments from the U.S.

# Best Wheat Output Since '61

Kansas has produced its biggest wheat crop in seven years, with total production at 254 million bushels, according to the preliminary report of the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

The figures will be revised later in the year when the Reporting Service gets more detailed figures.

Seventeen counties produced four million or more bushels, with most of them reaching that figure for that first time in history. The G&C's research was not complete, it is likely that records were set in Dickinson, Rice, Marion, Harvey, Saline, Ottawa, Mitchell, and Cloud counties.

The perennial leader, Sumner county (Wellington), again

led the list with 12.8 million bushels. Reno was a strong second with 11.6 million and McPherson, Harper and Sedgwick followed.

The accompanying map shows how the south central and central areas of Kansas had all the best of the 1968 harvest. Starting at Wellington, a line of seven counties northward on US81 had four-million or better bushel production, and all other counties with that much output were adjacent to it.

Among the major producers, Harvey and Butler counties both averaged 40 bushels, a yield topped only by the areas around Garnett and Mound City, both with smaller acreages. The average yield in the state was 25.5 bushels.

## Where Wheat Grew In Kansas

These two maps detail the preliminary report of the 1968 wheat crop in Kansas. The map above shows the total wheat production in each county in millions of bushels with the smaller figure in each county showing the average yield.

The map at left shows how the counties running from Wellington and Winfield in a strip two to three wide north dominated the wheat production. All of the black counties produced four million or more bushels. Next best production was adjacent to this bumper strip and northwest.

# Cull Quickly Or Not At All, Says Iowa Research

AMES, Iowa — It may not pay in dollars and cents to cull slow-gaining cattle after the first 56 days of the feeding period, and similarly there's no advantage to limiting the feed intake of finished steers that are being held off the market in hopes of realizing a better price.

So said researchers addressing Iowa State University's 50th annual Cattle Feeders Day crowd.

The idea that only early culling of slow-gainers is a paying proposition was emphasized in a report given by Prof. H. L. Self, in charge of ISU's outlying experimental farms, who

said test results show that any economic advantage that might be gained from culling is largely lost after the first two months or so on feed and then that the feeder might as well save himself the trouble of trying to spot and eliminate them after carrying them that long.

#### Four Tests

Self explained that four separate tests were conducted with uniform yearling steers weighing 600-650 lbs., with weights checked at 28-day intervals. Tests lasted 143 days.

Similar results were obtained from all four tests. During the first 56 days the "fast" group outgained the "slow" group 1.25, 1.8, 1.6 and 1.9 pounds per head

per day for the four respective tests. However, the advantage of the "fast" group over the remaining portion of the feeding period was only 0.2, 0.15, 0.1 and 0.2 pound daily gain.

Over-all, the "fast" gaining animals were more desirable to feed because of the advantage obtained during the first 56 days. However, there seems to be no dependable way to determine which animals will be the fast gainers until they have been in the feedlot for a while, Self said. By that time the major portion of the adverse effects of the poor doing cattle have already accumulated.

#### Best But...

The animals with the highest rate of gain for the first 56 days of the feeding period tended to have the highest average daily gain for the entire period. Picking out the fast gainers before putting the cattle into the feedlot would be very desirable but does not appear to be possible at our present level of knowledge, according to Self.

Once a feeder has invested 56 days of time, feed and capital in the slow gainer, it seems to be a questionable economic practice to identify and cull the slow gainers at that time. Those animals as fast gainers may not continue to perform at a rate superior to the other animals in the group, Self pointed out.

Similarly, the slow gainers during the first 56 days may improve sufficiently in rate of their time in the feedlot to make some of them more desirable than some animals identified at fast gainers during the first 56 days, Self concluded.

#### "Holding" Feed

With respect to holding finished steers on short rations while waiting for a market upturn, researchers emphasized that the economic advantage, in fact, is on the side of continuing such animals on full feed.

The experiment in question involved 15 steers that had been on full feed of corn for nearly six months and weighed an average of 1,329 pounds at the start

of the rest. Three of the steers were slaughtered, and their carcasses graded average choice.

The remaining steers were divided into groups of three steers each. Two groups were limited-fed, and two groups were full fed. Average length of the feeding period was 63 days.

The limited-fed cattle consumed about 45 per cent as much feed, but put on only about 30 per cent as much live weight as the full-fed cattle — about two-thirds pound per day gain for limited-fed cattle against 2 pounds per day for the full-feds. Feed requirements and feed cost per pound of gain favored the full-fed steers.

#### More Profit


The full-fed animals also showed more profit. Based upon steady cattle prices and feed prices and no discount for heavier carcass weight, the full-fed steers showed \$4.25 per head profit over cattle "sold"

earlier. The limited-fed steers under similar circumstances showed a loss of \$.75 per steer to advance \$1.30 per cwt marketing delay of two months. Both groups showed a profit over feed costs. However, full-fed steers would show per head more profit than limited-fed steers.

Examination of the carcasses showed that limited versus full feeding had little influence on carcass changes. However, both groups tended to produce retail beef per pound of sale carcass than cattle marketed immediately after a normal finishing period.

The most important difference was that the full-fed steers had carcasses 83 pounds heavier than the limited-fed steers. These 83 pounds were worth \$33 per animal.

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# Irrigation Marking Courtland Area

COURTLAND — Ten years ago, farmers along the Republican River in this area west of Belleville, got a good crop of corn, milo or wheat when the weather was good and there was enough rain.

At the annual tour, some 300 farmers from all across Kansas and part of Nebraska, toured the area viewing corn fields that average 120 bushels to the acre, milo averaging 87 bushels, soy-

beans 32 bushels and silage at 19 tons.

And the fields do it every year now.

Ten years ago, the Kansas-Bostwick Irrigation District began operation. It had been several years in conception and building.

It consists of a canal from the Guide Rock Diversion Dam at Superior, Nebr., which lets water from Harlan County Reser-

voir flow into the waterway to Lovewell Dam on White Rock Creek in Kansas.

From Lovewell Dam, constructed for irrigation and recreation north of Courtland, canals now carry water to 250 farmers' 40,000 acres of land.

Ray Clark, farming near the Nebraska border north of Republic, told the group his crops used to vary from "100 bushels an acre to nothing."

Now, he has 400 acres of irrigated corn along with his other farming operations, farrows 24 sows four times a year, feeds about 900 beef cattle annually, finishes about 900 head of hogs and has a steady farming operation at all times.

The tour was conducted under auspices of the Kansas Irrigation, Reclamation Association, the Kansas-Bostwick Irrigation District, Kansas State University and the Agricultural Extension Councils of both Republic and Jewel counties.

Those attending ranged from dryland farmers across the state to irrigators of both ditch and spray variety.

Dr. Robert Bohannon, director of extension at Kansas State University, a speaker at a noon luncheon near Lovewell Dam, told the group he recalled the date in 1954 and meeting at which the plans for the irrigation district were adopted.

In those days, he said, research had reached the point where they believed the limit of nitrogen application was about 90 pounds to the acre. Now, he said, applications are ranging near the 300-pound mark and still climbing.

Farmers saw fields of corn where population irrigation, row spacing and fertilizer studies were cracking the 200-bushel production mark with regularity.

Orvin Marquardt manager of the irrigation district, explained that each farmer buys 15 inches of water a year per acre. The cost is \$4.30 an acre for the top

graded soil ranging downward through four levels.

In addition, after the first 10 years of use, the farmers supposedly have recovered part of their cost of buying irrigation machinery and rebuilding leveled soils. Then, they must repay the federal government for cost of the dam and canals. This is repaid at the rate of \$2.70 to \$2.90 an acre per year for 40 years.

After 40 years, the farmers will have repaid the entire cost of the dam and irrigation project.


Currently the big irrigation district has 16 full-time employees, four buildings, and 33 pieces of major equipment for repair and maintenance of the 250 miles of canals and laterals serving the 40,000 acres.

The cost of maintenance is about \$160,000 a year. Value of the crops from the project in 1967 totaled a gross of \$3 million, Marquardt said.





## Onaga Gets New Plant With 40-Man Payroll

ONAGA — This town of 900 people in northern Pottawatomie county has opened a garment factory which is expected to employ 40 people and have an annual payroll of \$160,000.

The plant is the 65th in the state to locate in a rural community in the past two years, says Jack Lacy, director of the State Department of Economic Development. Lacy said in many cases towns of 5000 or less have been doing a better job of prospecting and landing new industry than larger cities.

"This is a reflection of small towns firing up their individual capabilities and acting positively over comments that the small towns are dying," Lacy said. "Onaga, with its 879 population, is a typical example of what small Kansas towns are doing to improve their own image and bring in new businesses."

Lacy said the new plants in smaller towns since January 1, 1967, have produced 1025 new jobs and boosted the state's economy by \$6.5 million in payrolls. He said the most important benefits, however, have been to the towns themselves by creating a new sense of progress.

The plant was opened last week. Plant managers are Ken Schrick and Dave Sporn.

### Not Enough Improvement In Trade Balance

United States exports exceeded imports by 139 million dollars in July, the Commerce department reported, reversing the deficit division that had been recorded in foreign trade the

month before.

While there was an increase in exports, on a seasonally adjusted basis, the accompanying decline in imports was equally good news to government economists worried by the rising level of U.S. purchases from other countries.

Adjusted July export and import figures were given at \$2,803,000,000 and \$2,664,000,000, respectively.

For the first seven months of the year, the Commerce department said, exports have been running at a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$32,800,000,000, and thus should more than match imports running at an adjusted annual rate of \$32,100,000,000.

But the projected surplus of 800 million dollars looks weak beside last year's figures showing exports of \$30,900,000,000 and imports of \$26,800,000,000, a surplus of \$4,100,000,000.

The Johnson administration had been hoping for the traditional dominance of U.S. exports over imports to bolster the overall balance of payments stance this year. The comparatively

poor performance in foreign trade during 1968 — when two months showed an actual deficit — has given the administration little hope that this will occur.

### Kansan Back As Great Plain Wheat Chairman

Carl A. Dumler, chairman of the Kansas Wheat commission, was elected president of Great Plains Wheat Inc., at a directors' meeting.

Dumler, who is from Russell, succeeds Mearl Jifford of Gardner, S.D., who was elected secretary.

Elmore Bathurst of Blackwell, Okla., secretary during 1967-68, was elected vice-president.

Great Plains Wheat, Inc., is a market development association and says it represents more than 400,000 wheat producers in six member states — Colorado, Oklahoma, Kansas, Nebraska and the Dakotas.

Dumler is a past chairman of the Russell County Wheat Growers association in Kansas and farms a 1,400-acre layout of which 600 acres is wheat.


