Bermudagrass - Fescue Teamed Up For Maximum Beef Gain

Steers and heifers on growing programs in southeast Kansas do well on fescue in the fall, early winter and spring. Come warm months and gains go into a tailspin.

Cooperating farmers, county agents and specialists and scientists at Kansas State University want a partner for fescue that will carry the animals through the summer months. They may have found it in bermudagrass.

County Extension agents, supported by Extension specialists and KSU research at the Southeast Kansas Branch Experiment Station at Mound Valley, have been encouraging farmers to try bermudagrass on a limited basis.

Several demonstration plots have been established in the area, and the results at this stage of the game are encouraging.

Bermuda is not the most winterhardy grass, but the Midland variety appears to be sufficiently hardy to withstand winter temperatures in southeast Kansas.

And the stocking rate is something else. Gary Kilgore, Extension area agronomist, says 10 acres of bermuda will carry 40 yearlings from mid-May through August, at which time fescue is ready to come into its own again.

Kilgore is no novice when it comes to bermuda. He was a K-State researcher at Mound Valley for five years and remembers the promise it showed there.

"I'm encouraged by bermuda, but it requires attention," observes Kilgore. "Fertility and grazing management are important factors on the road to success."

Ted Wary, Cherokee county agent, concluded from a fescue-bermuda rate of gain demonstration on the Harold Duff farm south of Columbus last year that "fescue is nutritious until about June 1, when it runs out of gas."

He found that bermuda has "tremendous potential during June, July, and August and is gaining in popularity in our county."

A similar demonstration was conducted again this year on the Duff farm. The fact it ended with some puzzling results doesn't change Wary's thinking a bit.

A pasture was divided in half, with each plot getting 60 pounds nitrogen last fall and 70 pounds this spring. One plot was mowed and received two 35 pound nitrogen applications (on April 17 and May 15). The un-

mowed pasture received all 70 pounds at one time, in late March.

The test began on April 14, and cattle placed on the pastures were weighed every two weeks. Gains began falling off immediately, which was expected, but the cattle on the mowed pasture were doing better than those in the once-fertilized and unmowed pasture — until a June 23 weighing. At that time the cattle on the unmowed grass gained 1.29 pounds per day compared to only .71 pounds for those on the split fertilized and mowed grass.

"This was a reversal of what we had been getting and what we expected," says Wary. "Why, is beyond me."

He does have a theory, however. Cherokee county had a dry spell during the test period that helped throw the demonstration off course.

"I still believe that with normal rainfall, the split fertilized and mowed pasture will put on more gain than the pasture receiving less attention," says Wary.

Meanwhile, cattle on a 10-acre bermuda-fescue pasture on the Duff farm were doing well this summer, an early weighing indicating a healthy 2.71 pounds per day gain. Results of the bermuda test will be known later in the fall.

While interseeding bermuda with fescue has possibilities, Wary believes the fescue-bermuda combination in separate pastures offers the best potential for southeast Kansas ranchers.

Dr. Robert Hyde, Extension range management specialist at K-State, agrees. He does raise the question, however, of whether the extra land is worth the investment.

Labette county agent Don Chisam, an avid bermuda promoter, is assisting farmer Lloyd Green in a fescue-bermuda grazing study that shows promising results.

Midland and common bermudagrass varieties were interseeded with K-31 fescue and the pasture (17.3 acres) took on 22 purebred Hereford heifers weighing an average of 700 pounds on March 21. In February Green had fertilized with 110 pounds of nitrogen, 55 pounds of phosphorus and 70 pounds of potassium per acre.

In 78 days the heifers added 2,464 pounds of beef, for an average of 1.44 pounds per head per day.

Gross income was \$42.60 per acre, and return above fertilizer cost was \$26.92. In addition, a bull was allowed to graze during the test period and Green got 300 bales of hay with a cutting on the 65th day.

Chisam believes that under normal rainfall conditions the heifers would have gained con-

siderably more weight. Rainfall during the period was 5½ inches below normal, Chisam said.

"If this test isn't a testimonial for fertilizer on grass, then I don't know what it is," commented the county agent. "Fertility is the thing, I'm convinced. A lot of people in our area are considering the fescue-bermuda mix."

Glenn Newcomer, Bourbon county agent, also put out a call to farmers who were interested in sprigging bermuda on an experimental basis.

One of several farmers who responded was Lou Ermel of near Bronson. After sprigging about three acres, he applied post emergence herbicides to help combat the weed problem. Karmex and simazine were used.

While simazine controlled crabgrass, it was no match for Karmex in killing velvet leaf, difficult for any herbicide to control.

Not only did Karmex at 2½ pounds per acre do better than simazine, it was just as effective when applied at the 1¼ pound rate.

Kilgore explained herbicides are vital in bermudagrass spriggings because weeds increase shading (bermuda won't spread into shaded areas) and compete with grass for moisture.

Newcomer is sold on bermudagrass. "I told our farmers not to go wild over it at first but that we needed to try it because of the

results at Mound Valley," recalls Newcomer. "I'm encouraged. I think bermuda will be excellent for our county."

A bermuda advocate who practices what he preaches is Harold Rice, an Allen county rancher who has 200 acres of bermudagrass, perhaps as much or more than any rancher in Kansas.

Rice was one of the first persons in Kansas to own a bermuda sprigger, and he recently traded it in for a new one. Although he custom-sprigs, Rice has the same philosophy as that expressed by Allen county agent Tom Maxwell, who says: "I tell people if they don't want to fertilize and puts lots of cattle on it not to sprig bermuda. If you don't, it won't pay. Worked right, it'll pay big."

Maxwell, who realized the possibility of bermudagrass a few years ago, began a demonstration plot on land owned by Stanley Dreher Jr. Rice sprigged the 10 acres free to dramatize what the grass can do.

Word is spreading, and Rice estimates he has sprigged 700 acres since March of this year, and 1,500 acres over the last three years.

"We have 35 or 40 people in a 6 or 7 county area who are taking a pretty good look at bermuda now," says Rice. "I feel fescue and bermuda make a good combination, but I prefer them in separate pastures. If you could irrigate, the two might be

OK in the same pastures. I caution that because of the attention required by everybody will succeed."

Another demonstration in Crawford county is being conducted by a question of limiting the stands of fescue on soil.

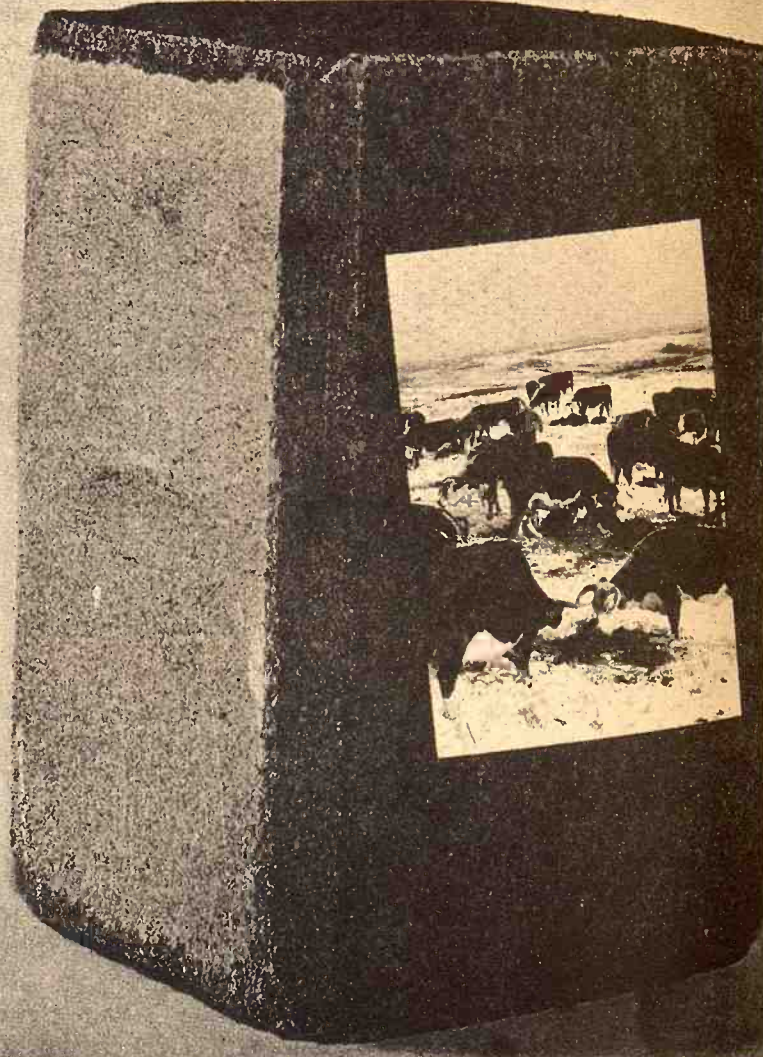

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Beef Gambling The Great Plains Should Repay Ranchers For Their Investment

It's inevitable that they'll overgraze pasture close to the river and undergraze the higher ground.

Another solution

Some Logan county farmers and ranchers have found another solution: pumping water to their rangeland and holding it in storage tanks. Some have chosen to use Rural Environmental Assistance program cost-sharing provided through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation service to obtain a dependable water supply, and others are using the Great Plains Conservation program.

Lawrence Nieman, SCS district conservationist at Oakley, believes in the Great Plains Conservation program.

To qualify for guaranteed cost-sharing under the program, landowners sign an agreement to carry

out a total conservation program on their land over a period of 3 to 10 years.

As important as a water-storage system is, Nieman feels that a total conservation program is mighty important too. Proper grazing distribution on range and pastures as well as erosion-control measures on cropland should not be overlooked.

The first of two water-storage systems built last summer under GPCP contracts was on the 2359-acre ranch operated by Blair Kough and his son Mike. Their 200 head of cattle had been depending on three inadequate wells on the ranch, plus hauled water.

Now they are supplied by three, 2800-gallon stock tanks, about a mile and a half apart, which are gavity-fed from a 6000-gallon storage tank on the highest point of the ranch. The water is pumped 4 miles to the storage tank from a 20-foot-deep well in the river flood plain. The 1 1/4-inch pipe is buried about 4 feet deep.

The three stock tanks are 15 feet in diameter and have shutoff float valves and overflow pipe to prevent water waste and mudholes around the tanks.

At their own expense, the Koughs ran a lateral line to the house for home-water supply.

Unique

The second system in Logan County is similar to that on the Kough ranch but is unique in one respect: three ranchers shared equally in the cost of one complete water-storage system for all of their grasslands.

"The three ranchers happen to be brothers," says Nieman. "But the same sort of contract can be worked out with any neighbors and at considerable cost saving. Each would be sharing the same well, pump, line, and storage tank. Their only added cost would be extra laterals and tanks."

The Repshire brothers own three separate ranches totaling more than 2800 acres. Formerly, their 300 head of cattle had to walk 2 miles a day one way and pass under a state highway to reach the river.

"To say that the pasture between the highway and the river was overgrazed is an understatement," comments DeWane Repshire.

The three brothers with help from SCS worked out a water-storage system that includes seven 12-foot watering tanks and more than 23,000 feet of pipeline. Their 5200-gallon storage tank is located 210 feet above the river level. Estaments to

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run the line beneath the state highway and a county road were no problem to obtain.

The Repshires paid the full cost of the storage tank and its concrete base, the pump, and pump fixtures. They also did a lot of the work themselves—like laying concrete, backfilling trenches, and installing the plumbing. GPCP shared in the cost of the well, the pipeline, and the tanks.

Plumbing on the plains, no doubt, will repay these Logan county ranchers many times over for their investment.

Wichita Lion Faces Big Task Replacing California Frasier

A Wichita lion named Rufus is facing a king-sized task.

He has been purchased from the city's Riverside Zoo by Lion Country Safari in California as a replacement for mighty Frasier, the aged king of beasts who fathered 35 cubs and became a household name.

Rufus, who came to Wichita in May, 1961, from Clifty Acres game farm in Madison, Ind., heads west Thursday to face the challenge of inheriting seven widows of the late Frasier and the 35 cubs.

Frasier died several weeks ago. He achieved his international fame when at the age of about 20, which is more than 85 in a human male, he won over the pride of seven lionesses.

Previously, the females had rejected a host of young males.

Frasier increased Lion Country Safari's lion population by a third in an astonishing 16 months.

Jerry Korbin, Lion Country vice president, said that Rufus will arrive in Los Angeles by air freight. He said Rufus looks like a worthy successor.

"He has always displayed the willingness but lacked cooperative mates and the proper breeding environment," Korbin, Lion Country Official said.

Ed Scofield, zoo keeper at Wichita's Riverside Park, said Rufus should fit into his new role as head of the pride if he is given a little time to adjust.

Rufus, Scofield said, has fathered three cubs at Wichita's zoo. But in each case the mother of the cubs killed them before the zoo keepers could remove them from the mother.

Soviets Launch Campaign To Stop Waste of Bread

With a disappointing grain harvest looming, the Soviet Union has launched a drive to stop people from wasting bread.

Newspapers, filled with reports on the grain harvest also have been

printing stories decrying the waste of bread and proclaiming "it is necessary to respect every piece of bread."

Pravda, the Communist party paper, told of two men in the Ukraine each sentenced to a year in jail for trucking 1,000 loaves of stale and moldy rye bread to the garbage dump.

Vechernaya Moskva—Evening Moscow—claimed that cafeterias in Moscow delivered 114 tons of leftover bread to farms for animal feed in six months, "a bitter sight to those who had to haul the bread away."

All such articles are quick to say there will be no shortages of bread and that Soviet citizens will "never hear the words 'no bread' that our people heard during the war."

But such assurances make Russians uneasy, especially with the heightened official concern about the grain harvest and occasional newspaper references to "a difficult agricultural year."

Soviet Purchases of U.S. and Canadian grain show the effort to insure grain supplies. There is no indication the 1972 crop may be so bad that bread supplies are so endangered. Still, there is worry about any waste of bread.

Russian leaders from the time of the ancient tsars down to Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev have found political peril.

Bread holds almost a hallowed place among Russian foods. No meal is complete without it and bread and salt are the traditional gifts in this country.

Newspaper stories contain such phrases as: "Bread wasted is the most gross violation of our ethics,"

or: "The bread that lies on your table unites all who take part in its creation."

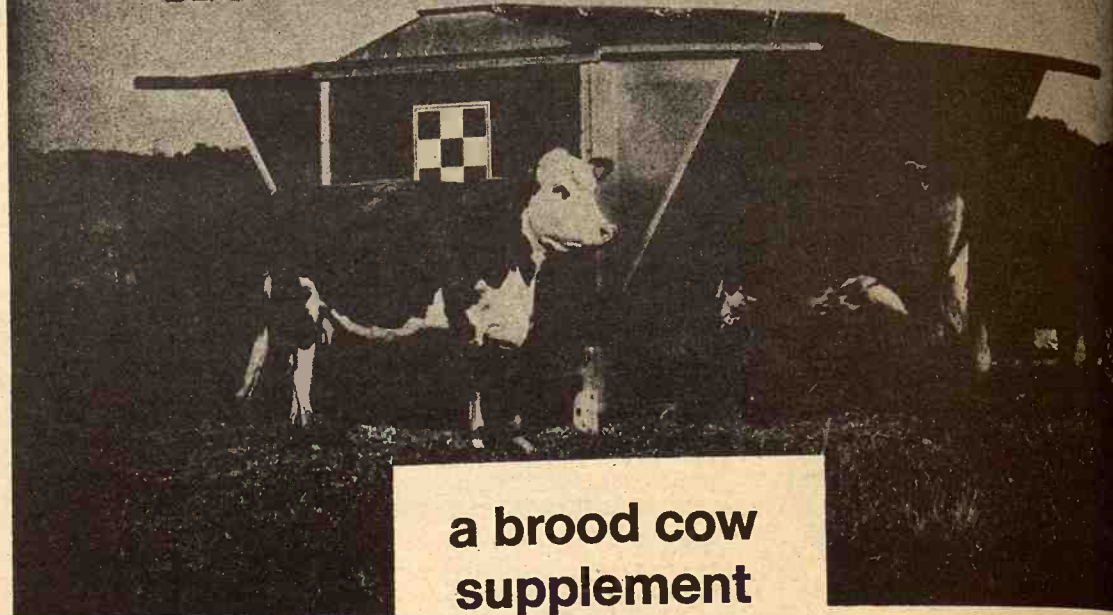
Searching for proper words to honor a young tractor driver who

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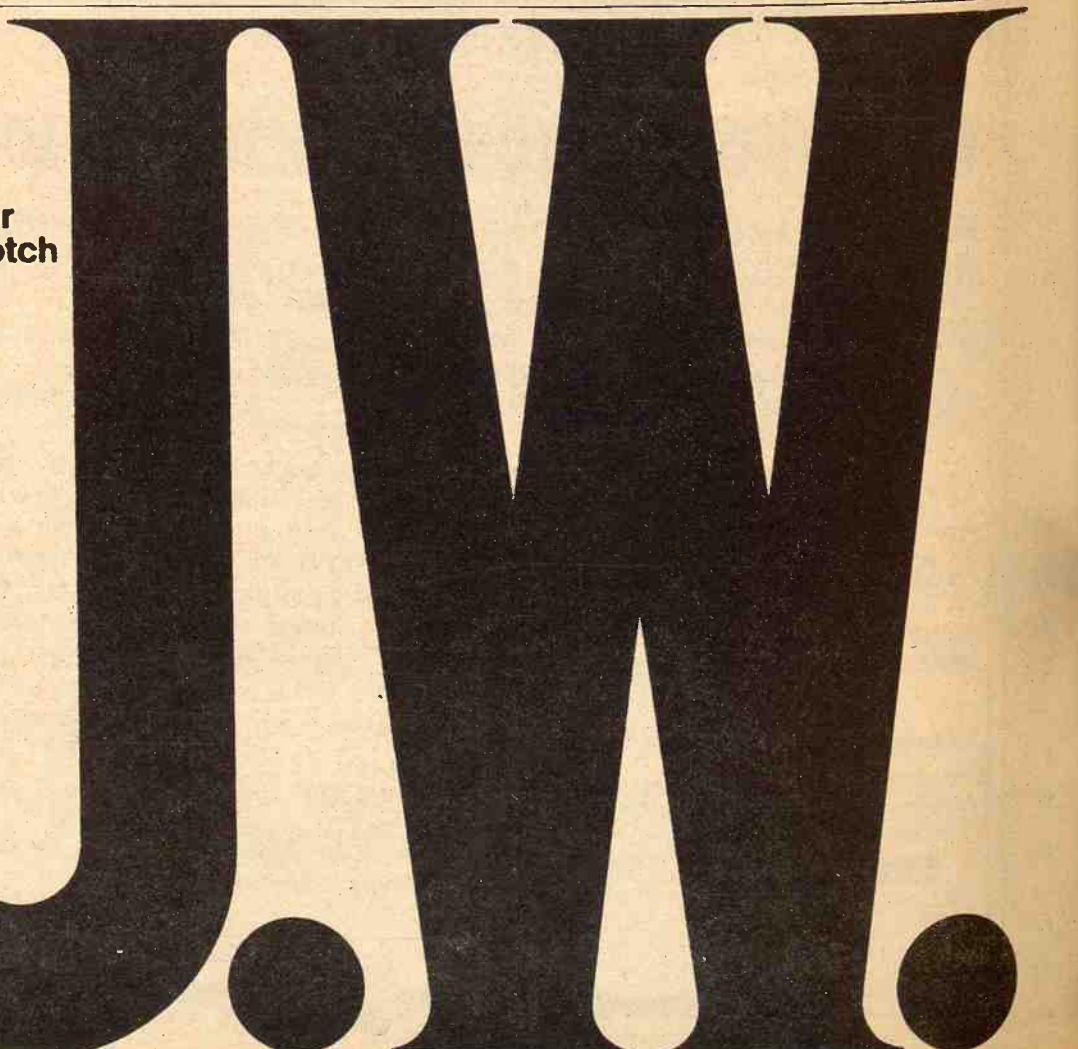


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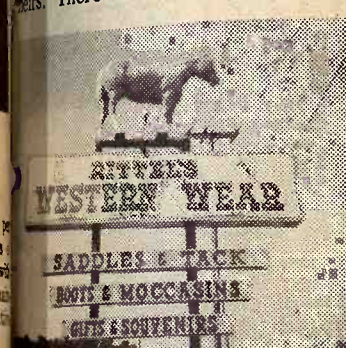
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State Farm Bureau President Blasts Kansas AFL-CIO

"Corporation farming is a straw man issue in Kansas." This was the opinion of the president of the state's largest general farm organization to charges made by the Kansas Federation of Labor, AFL-CIO, that corporations are "allowing up family farms."

John Junior Armstrong, president of the Kansas Farm Bureau, said that the U.S. Department of Agriculture's 1969 Census of Agriculture reveals that there are 328 corporation farms in Kansas, less than one percent of the more than 70,000 farms in the state. Further, the Census reveals that 287 of those corporations are of the farm-family type, that is, corporations owned by 10 or fewer stockholders.

Said Armstrong, "This is hardly what any intelligent, discerning person would call a menace to Kansas agriculture. Many farm families have chosen to incorporate so that their farm enterprises can more easily be handed on to their heirs. There are also some ad-

vantages in securing bank financing that comes with incorporation. It's obvious that the corporation route is being used by a number of our farm families in our state to preserve and strengthen family farming."

Armstrong went on to say that he felt the major reason the state AFL-CIO has taken up the corporation farming issue was "to vent their spleen" because a farm labor law has been passed in the last session of the Legislature.

"When the vice-president of the state AFL-CIO says his organization has no interest in organizing farm labor in Kansas, it's like the fox saying he has no interest in the chickens in the chicken coop. It is just not so. Spokesmen for the United Farm Workers National Union, an affiliate of the AFL-CIO, have stated time and again that they want absolutely no rules to govern how they go about organizing farm labor; that they do not want workers to have the right of secret ballot; that they do want to have the club of the secondary product boycott to use on farmers and ranchers, a device which has been declared illegal for industrial unions governed by the National Labor Relations Act. We aren't opposed to farm unionization. We're opposed to union techniques which deny workers their civil rights and farmers and consumers their economic rights. The members of the State Legislature saw the need for reasonable rules here and passed them. We're glad for that. The AFL-CIO is just bitter because they lost the vote," Armstrong said.



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Farmers Almanac Notes Women's Role In '73 Issue

The Farmer's Almanac has spent 156 years poking gentle fun at women with lines like, "Many women would be more spic if they had less span."

But times have changed, says

editor Ray Geiger.

"The belief that 'it's a man's world' quite evidently becomes less valid with every passing day and year," Geiger said.

Not that the Almanac is going to give up its one-liners aimed at women, but Geiger has written a two-page article for the 1973 edition, available Sept. 17, which is quite complimentary of a woman's role in the world.

Among other things, Geiger, 62, points out that tests have shown a woman's intelligence is equal to a man's and that women control the purse strings of the United States, making 80 percent of all consumer purchases.

Geiger also observes a "startling change in the timehonored belief that women are not fitted for handling more responsible jobs in business and for some reason should be paid less money than men for equal performance. Nowadays, women with special expertise are being moved up into high executive positions."

Geiger said in an interview Thursday he included the article because of a letter from a Maryland woman complaining that certain jokes, bits of verse and capsules of wisdom in the 1972 Almanac were insulting to women.

Barbara Collier of Bethesda, Md., cited 36 items she said were demeaning of women, including this

bit of advice: "One of the best ways for a woman to catch a man is to keep her trap shut."

A man's meaning behind that, she said, is "women are always after men, and women talk too much."

She said she did not believe there was "conscious intent behind this. Most men and many women (even little girls) have the popular cliches so ingrained that they simply do not realize what they are doing."

"However," she wrote, "I find it hard to believe that many men find jokes using all the tired old stereotypes uproariously funny, and I am sure most women are not terribly amused."

Geiger said the woman's letter

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"got me thinking" and article was the result.

The 1973 Almanac, with a circulation of 4.5 million, still contains one-liners on women.

"My wife leads a double life—hers and mine" and its usual round of helpful hints and predictions.

It says the 1972-73 winter will be milder than last year's version and there will be an early spring next year.

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Railroads Seek Bigger Share Of Truckers Load

Railroads are chalking up some major victories in a rate war they are waging to win a larger share of the nation's grain-harvest movement.

Lower rates for grain-hauling are making railroads newly competitive with trucking operations in some

parts of the country and significantly cheaper than trucks in others. The result is a sudden and sharp reversal of a long-standing trend away from railroads for moving the nation's grain crops from field to market.

Complete statistics on grain

shipments aren't available because most grain truckers aren't required to report their shipments. However, it is indicative of what has been happening that rail shipments of grain from 1965 through 1969 declined 17 percent to 111 million tons, according to the Association of American Railroads. In the same period, reported trucking shipments of grain rose 40 percent. When a few railroads began offering 50 percent rate reductions for efficient unit-train export shipments of grain, the railroads' traffic improved slightly to a level of about 118 million tons in 1971.

This year most railroads have jumped on the bandwagon, offering a whole range of bargain-basement rates to grain shippers, each tailored to the geographic situation the individual railroads are serving. It is too early in the harvest season to assess the full impact of the new rates, but it is certain to be substantial. "We expect the railroads to win back a great deal of the traffic they have lost," a Railroad Association official says.

Carrying More Wheat

That is certainly the case in North Dakota, a major wheat-growing state. Last year about 60 percent of that state's crop was hauled to market in trucks. Because of new, lower railroad rates, however, "there's been a remarkable turnaround," says Charles A. Nelson, acting administrator of the state's wheat commission. "So far this year, the railroads are carrying 63 percent of the harvest," he says.

Hauling boxcars full of grain across the prairie may not seem very glamorous, but it is vitally important to most railroads west of the Mississippi River, which depend on grain revenues to help pay the high fixed costs of running a sprawling rail network. Nationally, only coal accounts for more rail-freight volume than grain. Even fairly small percentage charges in the amount of grain hauled can make a big difference in profits for the "granger" railroads.

In years past, chronic shortages of graincarrying hopper and boxcars have developed in mid-July and lasted through the harvest season. This year, however, serious shortages haven't developed partly because the crops are maturing at different times in different parts of the country. A major reason, though, is that cars are being used efficiently, officials say. The addition of new cars to the railroads' fleets and new computerized car-locating systems are also helping avoid car shortages in rural areas.

These improvements couldn't have come at a better time. The recently announced Soviet grain

purchases would have strained the nation's transportation system well past the breaking point had they been made even a year ago, observers say. This year, though, they expect the railroads to be able to handle the load. "It depends on the entire transportation system working well," says David L. Henderson, a traffic official with Illinois Central Gulf. "For instance, if things bog down at the ports because ships can't get into the docks fast enough, then the rail cars will back up. But if everything works the way it should, we'll be in good shape."

Rates and Efficiency

The rate war is fiercest this year in the upper Midwest, where railroads faced the stiffest competition from trucks. The Burlington Northern, the largest grain-hauling railroad in the U.S., is offering reductions averaging about 10 percent to northern Midwest wheat shippers. The railroad says the move has boosted its share of wheat shipments in those areas to 48 percent from 48 percent last year. Most other railroads in the area, including the Soo Line, the Chicago

North Western, and the Milwaukee Road also are offering rate reductions this year for the first time.

North Western, and the Milwaukee Road also are offering big rate reductions this year for the first time.

Naturally, railroads can't afford to cut their rates without doing something to make their operations more efficient. Some roads are doing that by offering the lower rates only to big-volume grain shipments moving from one location directly to a terminal point without intermediate stops, switching cars

and so forth. That's the approach the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific Railroad and the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad are taking. The Rock Island's new 54-car rate on export grain shipments "has had a tremendous impact on car utilization," an official says. "It's cut our round-trip time from the elevators to Gulf port destinations and back from 31 days to fewer than nine. That's just like getting a whole lot of new cars in our fleet without

paying for them."

Other railroads such as the Burlington Northern are offering lower rates in return for "no-frills" handling of single grain cars. Instead of getting 48 hours to load cars, country elevators now have only 10 hours. Unloading times were cut to two days from seven days. The new service also eliminates time-consuming grain inspections that added a week or more to the transit time for grain shipments. "We're keeping the cars out on the main line instead of sitting on a siding somewhere," a Burlington Northern official says.

Hurting the Truckers

The Illinois Central Gulf also is offering low fixed rates—no mileage charges—to shippers that supply their own cars. And in a few weeks the Illinois Central also will institute a new volume rate for shipments as small as three cars. Other railroads' volume discounts for grain typically apply to shipments of 25 to 50 cars.

The rate war has been hard on trucking operators. Last year in Minot, N.D., "we had 15 truck operators in town," a grain-elevator manager there says. "This year there's only one left. They've been devastated."

Most of the trucking outfits that have disappeared are one-man, one-truck operations, but even some bigger truckers have taken their lumps. Raymond J. Cossette, owner of a 50-truck fleet in Fargo, N.D., is one. Late last year, Mr. Cossette spent \$60,000 to build a new grain-

handling terminal in Superior, Wis., and bought 25 expensive new truck-trailers to carry the extra traffic that grain shippers said they would be giving him this year.

The business never materialized. "All the shippers that said they'd stick with us went running to the railroads when they cut their rates," he says. "We never even opened the doors of our new terminal, and all our trucks sat around in our parking lots for months." He has finally gotten his big rigs back on the road by hauling other things. But the new terminal in Superior is still gathering cobwebs. "Our grain-hauling business has dropped off about 70 percent this year," he says glumly.

- 1 red sweet pepper
- 1 onion

DRESSING

- 6 tablespoons flour
- 4 tablespoons dry mustard
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 6 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup water
- 1 cup vinegar

Grind vegetables before measuring. Add 1 cup water and cook until tender. Drain and mix vegetables with dressing. To make dressing: Blend flour, mustard, salt and butter. Add beaten egg yolks, sugar, water and vinegar. Cook over hot water until thick. Pack into hot jars. Process 30 minutes in hot water bath; then complete seal. Yields approximately 2 3/4 pints.

Proper Care Of Dishes Ensures Long Life

Careful handling of dinnerware is good insurance for longevity. Tableware was made to be used and by knowing what kind of care is best, you can enjoy creative table settings whatever the occasion.

China is stronger than earthenware but designs are prone to scratches and fading because, for technical reasons, they are applied over the glaze. These overglaze decorations may be affected by certain foods, harsh abrasives and improper cleaning methods as well as by careless handling.

Fine china should be stacked with protective separators between the plates. Cups with gold handles

should not be hooked for storage. Dishes should be warmed only in a warming oven or by using hot water.

To avoid scratches, watch the method of scraping and stacking. Use a sponge, paper towel, cloth or rubber scraper to remove leftovers and food particles.

Acid foods may change the color of fine china if left on the plates for long spells. Immediately rinse or soak those that have been exposed to acidic sauces, dressings and fruits. Avoid using steel wool or abrasive powders. Undiluted liquid detergent will usually wipe out stubborn stains.

Make Book Covers

Make protective covers for cookbooks, dictionaries and other books with clear sheet plastic found in hardware and supply stores. The titles can be seen and the covers can be wiped clean with a sudsy sponge.

No Marring

To remove transparent tape from paper or cardboard without marring the surface, run a warm iron over the tape to soften the adhesive. Then gently pull off tape.

Non-Slip Map

Give your mop a non-slip handle by putting a bicycle handlebar grip onto the handle. This makes it easier to hold onto the handle when your hands are wet.

Use Tape On Frayed Collar

Sometimes even a turned shirt collar will begin fraying before the

rest of the shirt is worn out. Make the turned collar last as long as the rest of the shirt by pressing on a piece of mending tape.

USDA Stops Wheat Subsidies For U.S. Exporters

The Agriculture Dept. took action to brake the soaring wheat prices that have resulted from huge sales to the Soviet Union.

U.S. Bakers had asked the Price Board to grant them increases in the retail price of bread, claiming export sales have reduced the domestic supply and have driven up wheat prices. The bakers asked a 1-to 3-cent-a-loaf increase.

The action taken by the Agriculture Dept. changes the subsidy program for wheat exports. The department will no longer guarantee U.S. exporters a sliding scale of subsidies that pays the difference between the domestic and the world price.

Since July, when the U.S. and the Soviet Union reached a wheat sale credit agreement, exporters have sold the Soviet Union an estimated 400,000 bushels of wheat—about one-fourth the total American crop.

In the same period, the domestic price of wheat has climbed from about \$1.50 per bushel to more than \$2.

Carroll Brunthaver, assistant secretary of agriculture for foreign trade, said the new policy on export subsidies was not aimed at reducing domestic wheat prices but might prevent further price rises. If the new policy causes exporters to sell less wheat, he said more will be available in the U.S. market.

The actual policy change is quite

technical. Until recently, USDA had been increasing the subsidy after rises in domestic prices so that the exporter never had to pay more than about \$1.65 per bushel for wheat and could sell competitively in the world market. For example, an exporter could pay \$2 a bushel for wheat but have his actual cost reduced to \$1.62 by a 38-cent federal export subsidy.

The new policy will provide a one-week grace period during which exporters will be given a 47-cent a bushel subsidy to help them fill previous sales they have made.

Five More Months Before State Cloud Seeding Evaluated

Cloud seeding experiments in Northwest Kansas are about a month old now, but it will be another five months at least before evaluation of what the project has accomplished will be completed.

The experiments will continue through September, according to W. E. Steps, assistant chief engineer for planning in the Kansas Water Resources Board.

Cost for August was approximately \$31,000, and \$44,000 is budgeted for September's activity. The project was financed by \$100,000 approved by the State Finance Council and was funded from the state's emergency fund.

"It will take several months

before the project can be evaluated before all the factors are weighed," Steps said.

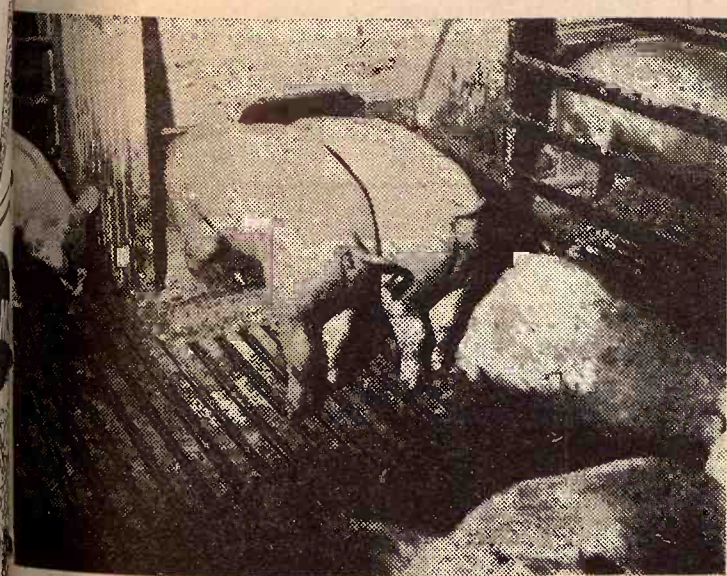
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Wheat Prices Boost August Farm Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-August 1972 were up slightly from July this year and moderately above August last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The index of prices received for all farm products was 299 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 295 in July and 261 in August 1971.

A sharp price increase from July to August was largely offset by lower prices for beef cattle. Compared with a year earlier, wheat,

soybean, meat animal and wool prices were up substantially while sorghum grain and egg prices were down moderately and corn down slightly.

The crop price index was 184 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-August, 24 points above both July this year and August last year.

Wheat in mid-July averaged \$1.56 per bushel, 25 cents above July and 28 cents above August 1971.

Sorghum grain was worth \$1.85 per cwt., 4 cents above a month earlier but 33 cents below August a

year ago.

The corn price at \$1.20 per bushel was unchanged from a month earlier, but 8 cents below a year earlier.

Soybeans averaged \$3.30 per bushel, 2 cents above July this year and 33 cents above August 1971.

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-August was 431 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 450 a month earlier and 376 in August a year ago.

The meat animal price index was 540 percent in August, down 28 points from July but 85 points above August last year.

Beef cattle averaged \$34.40 per cwt., \$2.50 below a month earlier but \$4.20 above August 1971.

Hogs brought \$27.70 per cwt., 50 cents above a month earlier and \$9.00 above August a year ago.

The dairy product price index was 344 in August compared with 337 in both July this year and August last year.

A preliminary wholesale milk price of \$5.70 per cwt., was 10 cents above the previous month but unchanged from the previous year.

Eggs averaged 20 cents per dozen, 1 cent below a month earlier and 4 cents below August a year ago.

Prices paid by the farmers for high protein supplements were up from August 1971 but those for bran and most mixed feeds were lower.

United States

The index of prices received by the Nation's farmers for farm products at mid-August was 325 percent of the 1910-14 base period, up 2 points from mid-July and up 39 points from August 1971.

Prices increases from July were noted for wheat, sorghum grain, hogs, wool and milk. Prices were lower for oats, barley, rye, eggs, lambs and beef cattle.

The index of prices paid by farmers for commodities and services (including interest, taxes and wage rates) was 433, unchanged from mid-July but up 21 points from a year earlier.

The parity ration in August was 75, unchanged from July but up 6 points from August 1971.

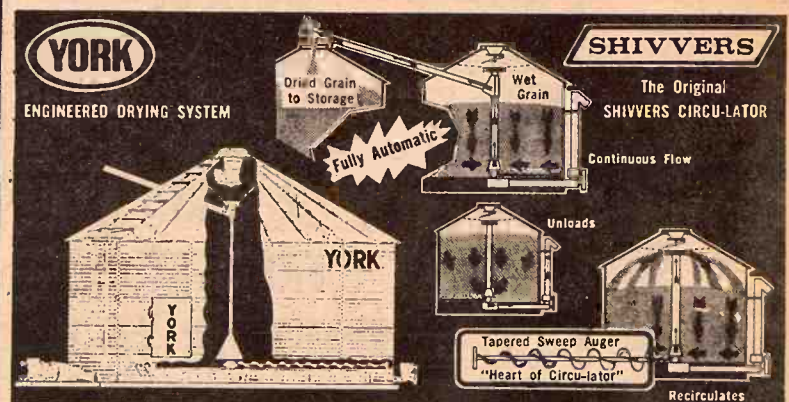

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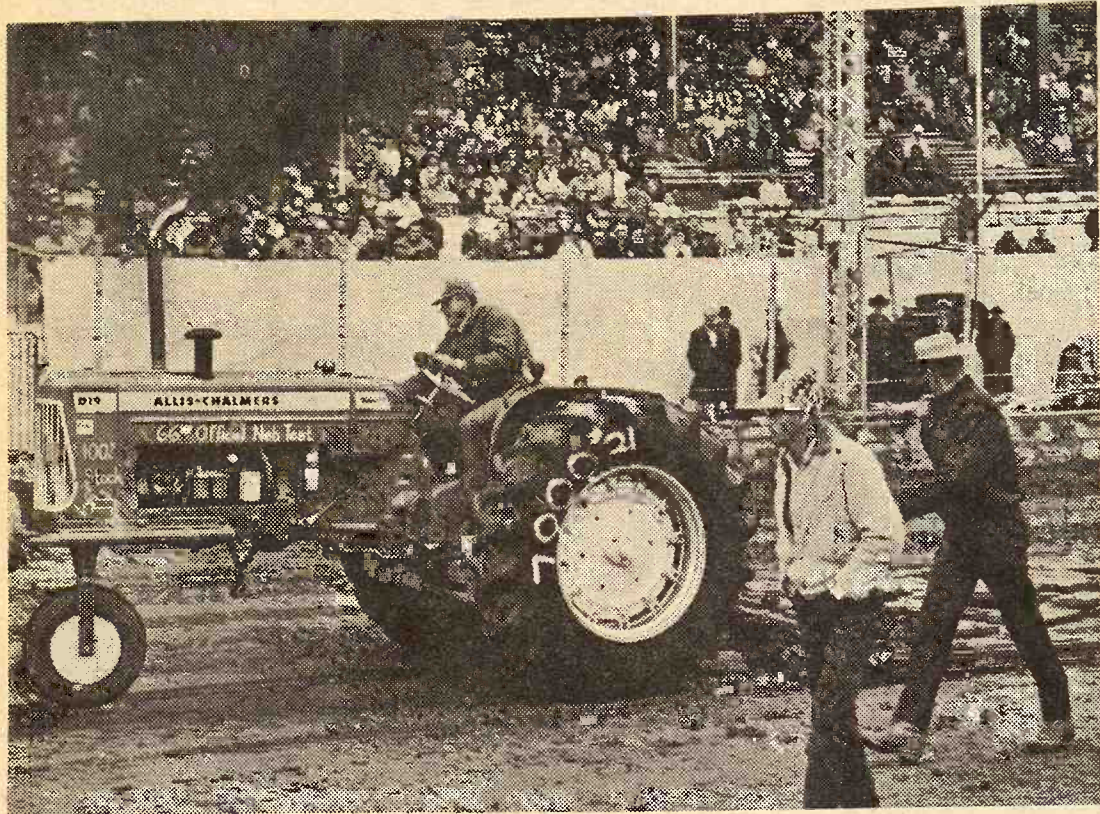

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ASCS Pilot Stored Grain Loan Program Includes Kansas

Kansas and Illinois were recently selected by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in Washington to conduct a 1-year pilot program involving proposed changes in the Commodity Credit Corporation loan program.

The purpose of the pilot program is to determine feasibility of granting farm-stored grain loans based on a certification by the farmer on the quantity of grain in storage on his farm.

Under existing regulations, farm-stored grain loan applications cannot be processed until county ASCS personnel have made an actual measurement and visual inspection of the grain to be placed under loan. The new procedure under consideration would permit immediate disbursement of funds to the farmer upon completion of his loan application and grain quantity certification, according to Frank A. Mosier, State Executive Director of ASCS in Kansas.

Loans will be disbursed on up to 90 percent of the certified quantity. To obtain a loan, the farmer must certify not only to quantity but he must certify that the grain is in storable condition. The farmer will be expected to make periodic inspections of the grain under loan to assure that it is in marketable condition.

The pilot program is a continuation of National, State, and county ASCS efforts to improve service to the nation's farmers, Mosier said.

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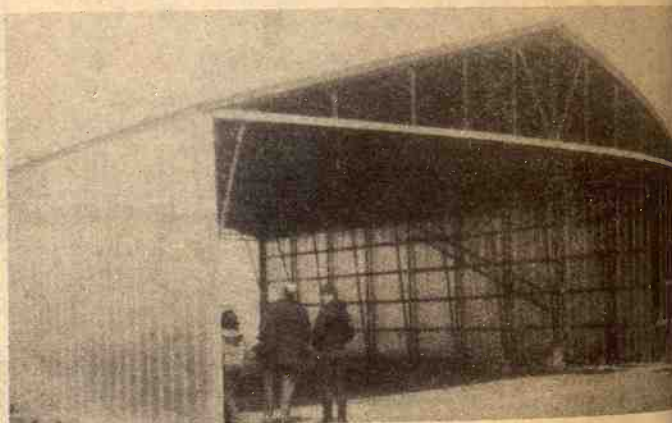

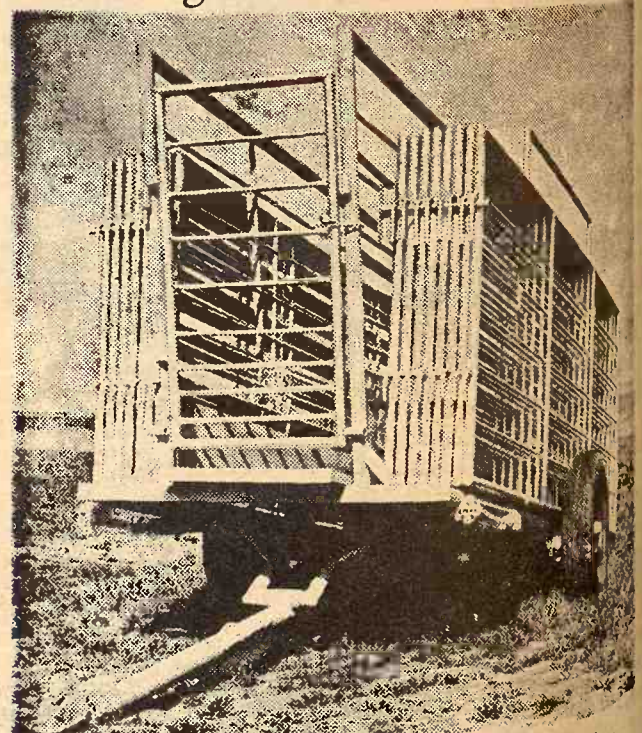

Overall Crime Rate Slows But Violent Crime Increases

Crime in the United States last year rose at a slower pace—7 percent—than in any previous year since 1965, the FBI reported.

At the same time, new statistics showed a steady increase in crime committed in the suburbs. There also were marked increases nationwide in the numbers of murders, rapists, robbers and persons making serious physical attacks on others. Guns, especially pistols (51 percent) remained the principal weapons of death in the country. Approximately 17,630 murders were committed in the country. Most were the result of disputes among friends or within families.

All of the good news in the slowing crime rate resulted from a dip in growth rates of property crimes—burglary, larceny over \$50 and theft. A mere 2 percent hike in the number of cars stolen was registered from 1970 to 1971. Bicycle thefts were up by 17 percent, however.

Regionally, the crime rate went down 9 percent in the Northeast and West and 6 percent in the South and North Central states. The South recorded more murders proportion to its population than any other area, with 12.2 victims per 100,000 persons, a rise of 9 percent over 1970.

Among 69,000 persons arrested in 1971 and considered in a separate study, 68 percent had been arrested before, an average of four times each, the FBI said.

In another category of crime, policemen were murdered in 1971, a dramatic 26 percent increase over the 100 killed in 1970. One hundred twenty-one of those killed last year died of gunshot wounds. Only 11 last year's police murders remained unsolved.

The almost 6 million crimes reported in "Crime in the United States: Uniform Crime Reports 1971" were reported voluntarily by local police forces. Some critics of the report system have said the rising crime rate is more the result of better statistics than a real increase in crime.

ATCHISON—For the first time in the state's three-year history, Kansans are able to purchase whiskey distilled and processed in their own state.

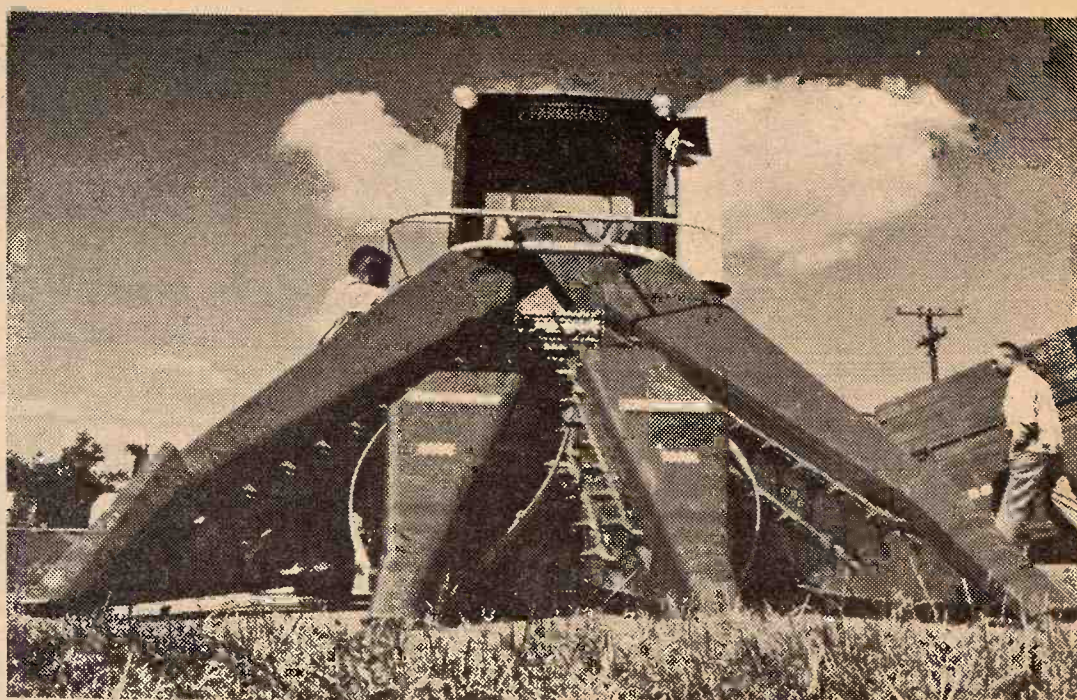

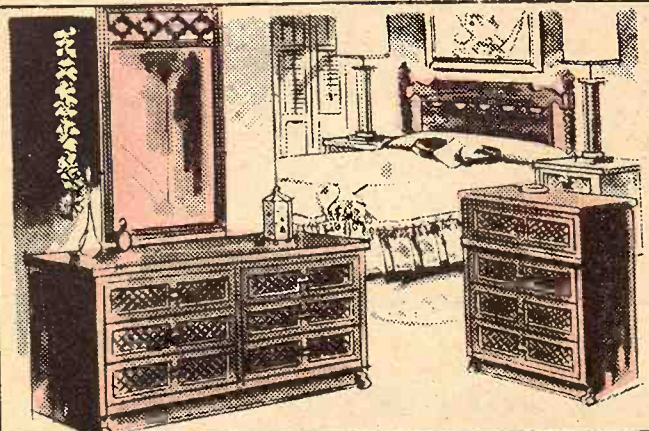

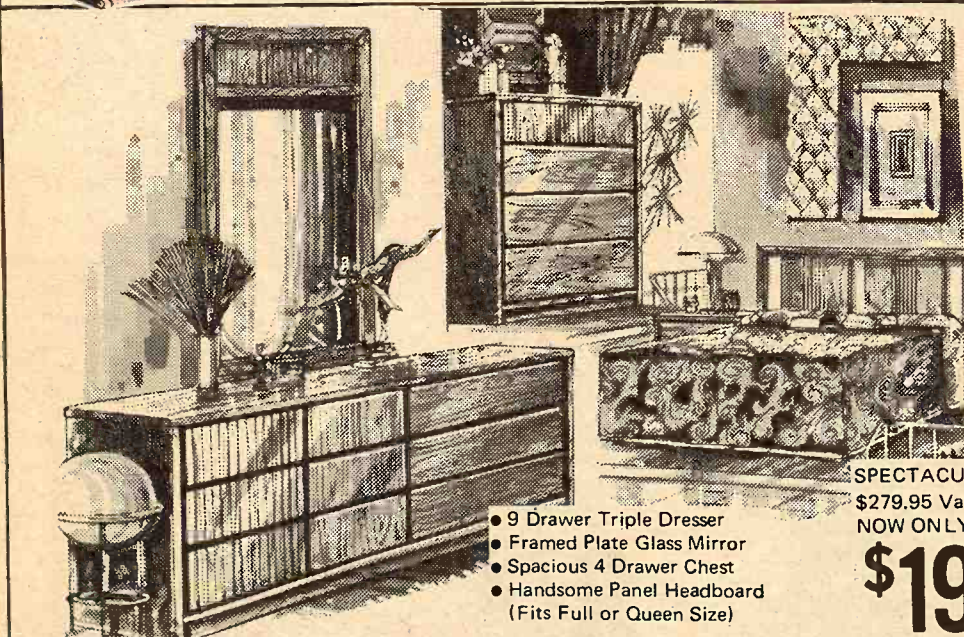

Beef Industry Expected To Gain Steam In 1973

The beef cattle market, which has held up in the face of greater production and higher imports, is expected to weaken seasonally during the rest of the year, then gain additional steam in 1973.

Richard Fenwick, Kansas State University Extension economist, attributes the higher prices to the demand for beef and the lower pork supplies.

If consumers continue to buy beef at current retail prices, slaughter prices should weaken only moderately between now and the end of the year, he says. But he expects prices to rebound in 1973.

Here's Fenwick's Kansas City fed steer price forecast for the next 10 months: September-October, \$36-\$37; November-December, \$35-\$36; January-March, \$36-\$37; April-June, \$35.50 to \$37.50.

If consumers continue to buy beef at current retail prices, slaughter prices should weaken only moderately between now and the end of the year, he says. But he expects prices to rebound in 1973.

Here's Fenwick's Kansas City feeder price forecast for the next 10 months: September-October, \$36-\$37; November-December, \$35-\$36; January-March, \$36-\$37; April-June, \$36.50 to \$37.50.

Logan Farmers Cash In Sunflowers

LOGAN—Several Logan area farmers have found the Kansas state flower can be a cash crop.

Although the sunflower is considered a weed in some areas, the oil-bearing seeds can bring \$3 per hundredweight. The normal seed yield is between 1800 and 2000 pounds per acre.

The variety of sunflowers grown for seed production grow only 4 to 5 feet tall with heads measuring 4 to 8 inches across. With their weedlike vitality the plants require no cultivation and thrive in 90 to 100 degree temperatures.

Land planted with sunflowers does not count against government acreage allotments. About 1500 acres are planted on 7 farms in the Logan area.

The sunflower seeds yield about 45 percent of their weight in light cooking oil, popular at health food outlets and in Europe.

New varieties of sunflowers are expected to yield between 3200 and 4600 pounds of seed per acre.

Kansas Ranks Seventh In Farm Products Exported

The Department of Agriculture reported Kansas farmers sold \$365 million worth of farm products overseas in the fiscal year that ended June 30.

Kansas was seventh among states listed. Illinois led the states with \$758 million.

Kansas sales were \$202.1 million in wheat and flour, \$60.6 million in feed grains, \$21.3 million in soybeans, \$3.4 million in soybean oil, \$5.9 million in protein meal, \$10.2 million in meat products, \$400,000 in poultry products, \$11.9 million in hides and skins, \$14.6 million in lard and tallow, \$100,000 in fruit, \$200,000 in vegetables, \$900,000 in dairy products and \$33 million in all other farm products.

Little Chance for \$2 Prices in Wheat Picture

Restrained optimism perhaps best describes the wheat price outlook for 1972-73 as farmers make final preparations for seeding next year's crop. There is little chance that farmers will receive the \$2.00 prices of a decade ago, says Roy Frederick, extension economist at Kansas State University. On the other hand, prices should average near \$1.60, up 20 to 25 percent from 1971-72 levels. 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Source of most of the optimism, the economist says, is the export picture, brightened by the Soviets' agreement to purchase \$750 million

worth of U.S. feed grains during the next three years.

Exports for 1971-72 totaled about 635 million bushels, up considerably from early-season predictions. Shipments were particularly heavy in May and June, after the first rumor of the sale to Russia was widely circulated.

Frederick believes 1972-73 exports will be considerably higher. At least one high USDA official looks for exports to be near 900 million bushels, he says. Key to the export picture, of course, is the Soviet purchase.

Most of the U.S. grain trade expects Russia to take at least 100 million bushels, with a 150 million bushel purchase a distinct possibility. If the total comes close to the latter figure, it would represent an outlay of nearly \$250 million.

Thus, it is quite possible that the

Soviet Union, which had been buying no U.S. grains, could become our largest customer within a single marketing year.

U.S. Farm Income Expected To Stay Above 1971 Level

Farm income in the U.S. has been up the first half of 1972, and is expected to remain above 1971 levels throughout the remainder of the year, according to a Kansas State University Extension economist.

Norman Whitehair looks for realized net farm income to reach the 18.1 billion mark this year, up 2 billion from 1971.

Average farm prices continue to hold above 1971 levels despite larger grain supplies and an increase in beef, poultry and dairy marketing. Consumers' demand for red meat, coupled with a substantial decline in pork production, will keep livestock prices above a year ago.

The picture for crops is a little more doubtful. Grain production is down from last year's record crop, but supplies will continue high, limiting price gains.

Feed grains and wheat prices are expected to be above a year earlier by the fourth quarter. Soybean prices are expected to remain at high levels.

Total cash receipts for livestock and crops are estimated at \$56.5

billion. Government payments and non-monetary income of \$8.1 billion will boost realized gross income to \$64.6 billion. Expenses are expected to increase about \$2.5 billion.

Report from Washington

YOUR TOP FIVE CONCERNS

You have been telling me that the principal issues of this campaign are the war, economic problems, health care, crime and drug abuse. By your thousands of letters and responses to my questionnaires, you have made it plain that these are your top priority concerns.

In capsule form, here is where I stand on these great issues. First, the war. I feel that the war in Southeast Asia has gone on far too long, at a tragic cost of both lives and dollars. Third, health care. The next few years will see the

most important legislation in history in this field. It has been a source of great pride to have co-authored the National Cancer Act, the Health Manpower Act, the National Institute of Aging Act, the Communicable Disease Control Act, and the National Heart, Blood Vessel, Lung and Blood Act.

Fourth, crime. Our need is both for stronger law enforcement and to cure the basic causes of crime. My work includes co-sponsoring seven bills to aid law enforcement, including the Police-man's Bill of Rights and the Emergency Crime Control Act.

Fifth, drug abuse. My Subcommittee on Health is responsible for dealing with this tragic problem. We recently wrote a new law creating a federal agency for drug abuse prevention. I introduced two bills to severely punish nations which supply heroin to this country.

You have a right to expect of me more than just being a poll watcher who shifts position with every change in public opinion.

You deserve to be told the truth. And you have a right to expect leadership from your Congressman. I sincerely try to provide both truthfulness and leadership.

So, I do not always vote as you might, please understand that I do my very best not only to reflect your interest but also to exercise good judgement in the national interest.

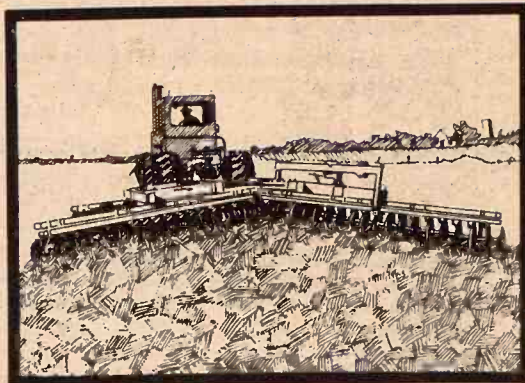

Swine Producers On Alert For Hog Cholera

Following confirmation this week of several scattered outbreaks of hog cholera in Kentucky, North Carolina, and South Carolina, the U.S.D.A. has warned swine producers to remain alert for signs of the disease.

Officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) recommended that all swine moving through areas of confined cases should go direct to slaughter, or should be kept separate from other swine on the farm for 30 days and observed closely for signs of sickness. APHIS veterinarians said this is especially true for producers participating in swine shows at state or county fairs. The Kentucky cases were the first found in that state since December

10, 1969. The first outbreak in the intervening 31 months was confirmed on Aug. 21, when a case was diagnosed in Breckenridge county. This was followed closely by confirmation of a case in Hardin county on Aug. 23, and cases in Larue and Monroe counties on Aug. 24. State quarantines have been placed on 13 counties, and all livestock markets handling swine in the counties have been closed to help prevent further spread of the disease.

Regulatory officials in Indiana and Ohio have been notified that feeder pigs sold at markets in the area surrounding the confirmed cases had moved into their states. Officials of all three states are tracing all pigs sold at these markets, and are watching these animals closely for any sign of sickness.

The cases in North and South Carolina have been in counties where cases were reported this year. They are Columbus and Nash counties in North Carolina, and Anderson county in South Carolina.

Confirmed cases of hog cholera have increased from one in April to four in May, eight in June, eight in July and 11 so far in August. Single cases of hog cholera in August came from Adams county in Nebraska, and Lafayette Parish in Louisiana. All infected and exposed herds have been destroyed and their owners paid State and Federal indemnities, USDA said.

New Milk Plan Sets Minimum Price To Dairymen

The Dept. of Agriculture has recommended a new classification and pricing plan for milk in the central part of the nation which includes Kansas.

Orders set minimum prices to be paid to farmers for milk they sell to dealers, who must pay for it based

on its use for bottling or manufacturing into dairy products.

The recommendations are based on public hearings held last fall in several cities.

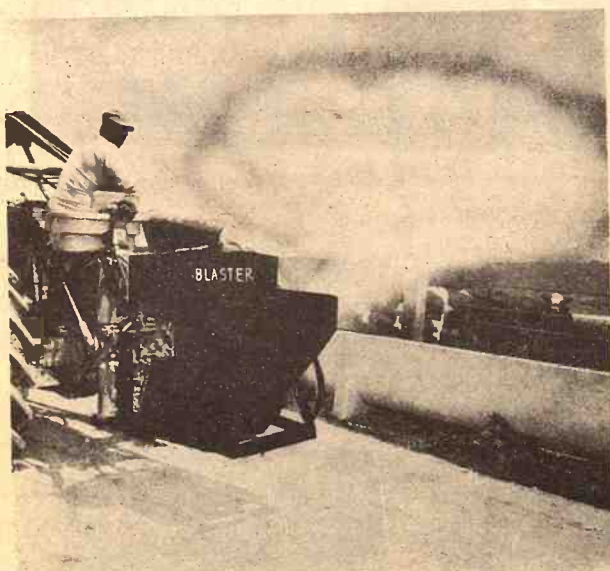

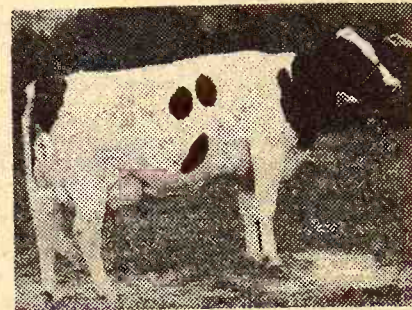

Record Breaking Popcorn Harvest Expected This Year

Another record breaking Kansas harvest is on the way as popcorn nears maturity, reports Milam Jones, horticulturalist at Ulysses. Kansas popcorn acreage is up 22 per cent over last year when farmers produced 36,080,000 pounds of popcorn worth over \$1.1 million from 8,200 acres.

This year Kansas popcorn acreage is expected to exceed 10,000 acres harvested.

Bulk of the record crop last year came from irrigation acreages in 12 western Kansas counties. Leading the pack was Grant County with 1,700 acres; Haskell County, 1,190 acres; and Thomas County, 1090 acres.

Western Kansas popcorn producers lead the nation in per acre yields, averaging well over 4,600 pounds of shelled corn per acre.

Butter & Cheese Production Climbs, Ice Cream Drops

Butter production in Kansas during July totaled 910,000 pounds, compared with 829,000 pounds in July 1971, according to the Kansas

Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cumulative production during the first seven months of this year was 7,810,000 pounds, compared with 7,503,000 pounds a year ago.

Kansas American Cheese production in July was 4,200,000 pounds, up considerably from the 3,100,000 pounds produced during the same month last year.

In the first seven months of 1972, production totaled 26,920,000 pounds, compared with 17,615,000 pounds during the same period in 1971. Ice cream production in Kansas during July totaled 625,000 gallons, compared with 822,000 gallons in July 1971.

From January through July this year, production totaled 4,145,000 gallons, down moderately from the 4,730,000 gallons produced during the same period a year ago.

Production of butter in the United States during July 1972 is estimated at 89,436,000 pounds, virtually unchanged from July 1971.

In comparison with a year earlier in the four leading butter-producing States, July production was down 7 percent in Minnesota, while Wisconsin showed a 7 percent increase, California was up 6 percent and Iowa gained 3 percent.

Production of American Cheese in the United States for July 1972 totaled 164,211,000 pounds.

This was 16 percent above the previous record for the month set a year earlier and 22 percent above July 1970.

Production of ice cream during July is estimated at 76,057,000 gallons. July output was 4 percent less than a year earlier and 3 percent below two years earlier.

In the three leading ice-cream-producing States, output was up 1 percent from a year earlier in Pennsylvania, the top producer, but down 3 percent in California and down 8 percent in New York.

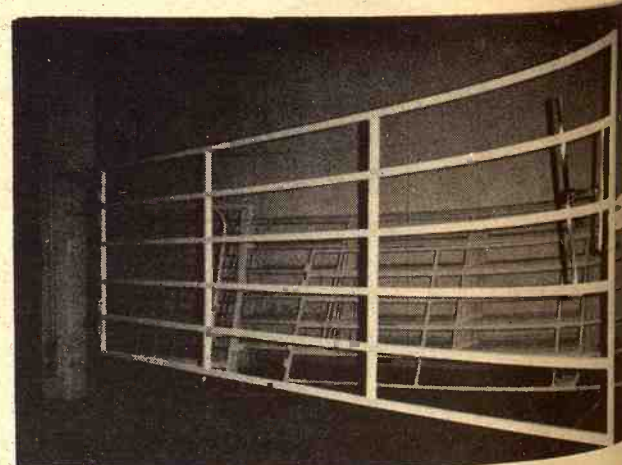

Kansas Dairymen Get More Milk From Fewer Cows

Kansas milk production during

July totaled 150 million pounds, 2 percent above the same month last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Cumulative production during the first seven months this year totaled 1,022 million pounds, 1 percent below the same period a year earlier.

The number of milk cows on farms in Kansas during July totaled 189,000, compared with 194,000 in July 1971.

Milk production per cow in July averaged 795 pounds, the highest average production of record for the month of July.

U.S. milk production in July is estimated at 10,503 million pounds, 2 percent more than a year earlier. Daily average production for July was down 8 percent from June, the same decline as a year earlier.

Total milk production during the first seven months of 1972 is a 2 percent more than 1971.

Milk cows on U.S. farms totaled 12,202,000, down 1 percent from July 1971.

National milk production per cow averaged 861 pounds during July, 3 percent more than last year.

The July rate per cow reached a record high level in 28 of the 33 States with monthly estimates.

Two new sires have been added to the KASU roster of Limousin bulls. Also the Manhattan operation has expanded office and lab facilities to help them supply 600 "jugs" statewide this year.

Peak Return For Farm Produce Expected To Drop

Farmers in July received 41.1 cents from every dollar spent by consumers for food, the most in more than two years. But the lofty peak may not last long.

Higher market prices for hogs, frying chickens, eggs and some fresh vegetables helped boost the farm share of the consumer dollar from the 40.6 cents reported for June.

The farm share had not risen above 41 cents since early 1970, according to USDA records, and most of the time has been in the 36 to 40-cent range.

According to a report on retail "market basket" food costs issued recently, prices farmers received for the raw item rose three percent from June. Cattle however, failed to gain in average price for the month.

Cattle prices have slipped since their peak last month from around \$40 per hundredweight at Omaha to less than \$36 by mid-August. That points to a slippage in the farmer's share of the consumer food dollar when the August market basket is reported next month.

The market basket report, based on farm-produced items needed to feed a typical family for an entire year, showed retail grocery prices in July averaged 4.5 percent higher than a year earlier and 1.8 percent more than in June.

The so-called "farm value" of the market basket was reported up 11.9

percent from a year earlier.

Based on July surveys, the entire market basket list cost \$1,322 with farmers getting \$544 and middlemen \$778. In June, the basket cost \$1,299 with farmers getting \$528 and middlemen \$771.

96 Magic Number For 1972 Draft

The Selective Service has announced the final military draft call for 1972 and it could be the last for the foreseeable future.

Some 15,900 men will be drafted during the October-December period. None will be sent to Vietnam unless they volunteer.

The callup will put the year's draft total at about 50,000, the lowest in 10 years.

The final draft lottery ceiling is 95 this year, which officials said means that three-fourths of the young men who faced induction this year will not be called. The number reached 125 in 1971.

Included in the latest group will be prime draft candidates classified at 1A or 1A0. A Selective Service official said all those with numbers 95 and below who do not have exemptions or deferments can expect to get draft notices before mid-November. Authority to draft men into the

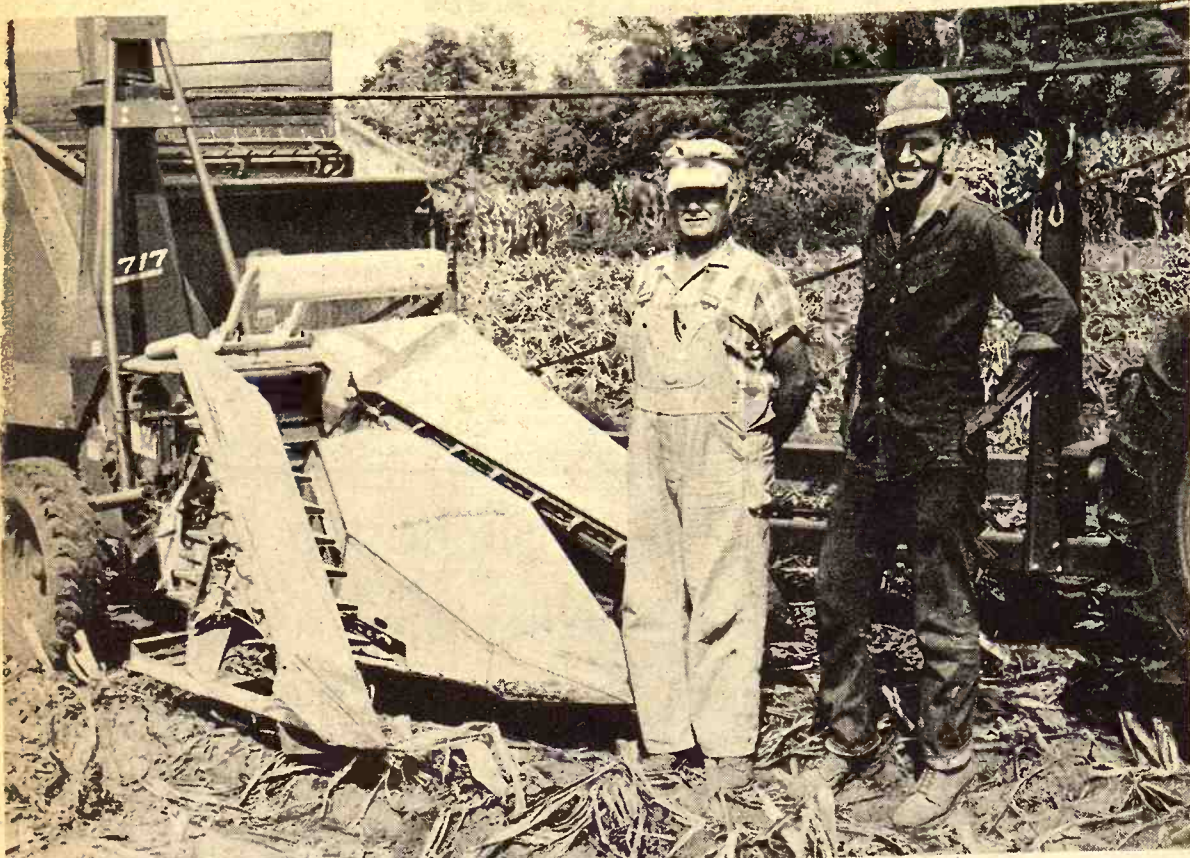

Market Strong For Feedlot Cattle

Although market prices for feedlot cattle are expected to weaken a bit this summer, they will average

"well above" last year through the remainder of 1972, says the Agriculture Department.

Choice grade steers at Omaha, Neb., rose to \$36.50 per 100 pounds last winter then dropped to \$34.25 in the spring, the department said Wednesday. Prices resumed

climbing, however, and rose to almost \$39 by early July.

Looking at the second half of 1972, officials said in a "livestock and meat situation" report that choice steers currently are about \$37.25 per 100 pounds, \$4.25 higher than a year earlier, and probably will average more than the \$33.10 for last July-December.

A major reason for the cattle outlook, the report said, is the continued reduction from a year earlier in pork supplies. Hog producers, the report said, also can expect some drop in prices this summer, but a recovery is signaled later in the year.

Slaughter hog prices at major markets in late July were about \$28.50 per 100 pounds, \$8.50 more than last summer's peak when supplies were larger.

"Hog prices will slip as slaughter picks up seasonally later this summer and fall, but Oct.-Dec. prices likely will average \$2 to \$3 above last fall's \$20 average. Prices may show a late fall-early winter rise as slaughter rates reflect the seasonal downturn in summer farrowings," the report said.

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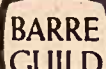

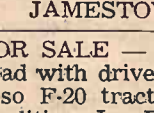

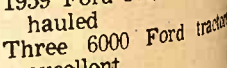

Soybean Producers Notice Competition from Palm Oil

Palm oil, extracted from a tropical plant, is expected to grow as a major competitor of U.S. soybean according to Agriculture department analysts.

Already large, the world palm oil production is being expanded by Japanese investors, who are financing a new plantation and plant in the South Pacific, the Foreign Agriculture Service said.

The Japanese, who have been seeking foreign agricultural investment opportunities in recent years, plan to spend nearly \$6 million for development of a 5,000-acre palm plantation in Papua, New Guinea, the FAS said.

Production of palm oil could exceed 20,000 tons a year by 1977, officials estimated. That will mean further competition for currently troubled U.S. soybean oil, which has been limping badly because of over supply and low prices.

Extremely large demand for whole soybeans and meal, however, has kept prices to farmers at the highest level in nearly a quarter of a century.

But the palm-oil situation is a persistent worry for government and industry soybean officials. It is growing in popularity as an ingredient for the U.S. shortening market and other uses.

Only five years ago, palm oil imports were 100 million pounds. This year, says the department, they may exceed 350 million, up 50 per cent from 1971.

The Japanese development in Papua, with production increases in some African countries, is expected to remain a problem for soybean oil for some time, according to department officials.



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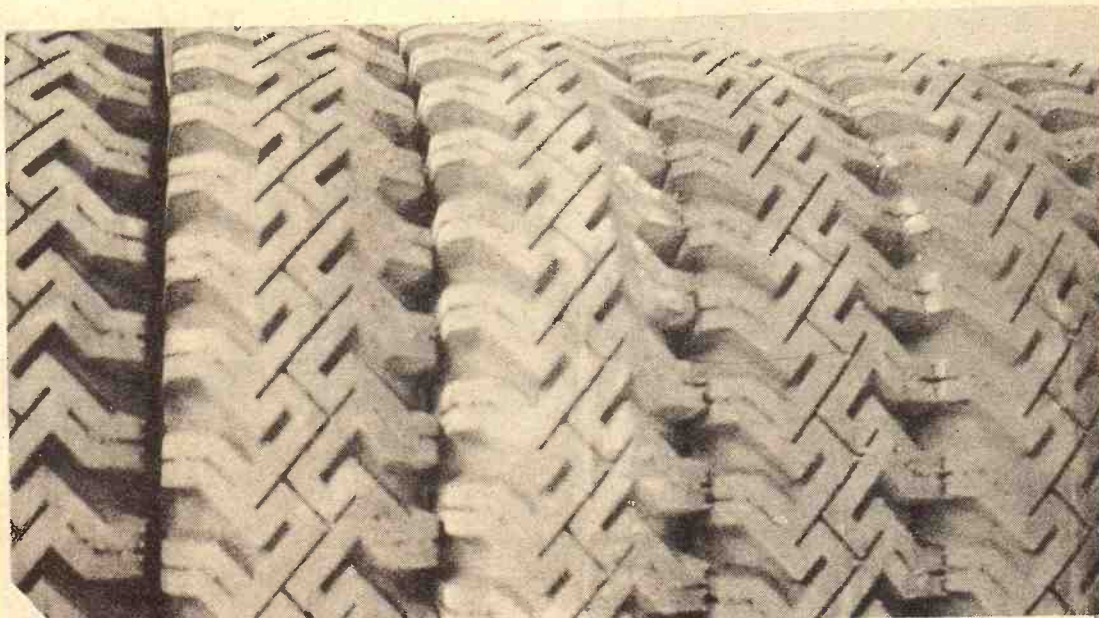
