Merchandising Improves Dairyman's Prospect

The outlook for the dairy farmer and the industry is good, say experts in the field. Milk production in 1969 will equal 1968's estimated 117.850 billion pounds, may exceed the total for last year if conditions and trends in the farm economy continue, according to a Hoard's Dairyman article.

In 1968, milk-feed ratio was most favorable, decline in cow numbers slowed, and rising milk production per animal was noted. A healthy situation for some time is also foreseen by Dr. Wallace W. Wilcox, director of economic department, USDA, quoted in Pure Milk Products Press. He names a variety of causes, among them, high milk prices, aggregate farm income rise, percent higher net equities in land and machinery than in 1960 for farmers.

Milk prices to producers and consumers continue to rise but drastically — 1968 prices to farmers were about 4 percent above the previous year. Home delivery continues to lose ground to retail milk sales but at a slower rate.

Packaging of milk began in 1944 with the Thatcher, N.Y.,

milk bottle, has evolved to today's plastic and plastic-coated containers. More changes are sure to come as packagers try to find and answer the preferences and needs of the retail customer.

Americans are eating well and in variety, a fact reflected to some extent in the kinds of milk being sold: 3.5 percent, 2 percent — even a 1 percent milk has been marketed.

The future may hold introduction of other milk drinks, some now popular in foreign countries — carbonated whey; kefir; enzyme-treated, special protein or exotic-flavored milks, but D&ICF predicts, "Basically, the milk of tomorrow will be the milk of today with more attention paid to its flavor. Despite milk's nutritional qualities, most people, children especially, drink milk because they like it."

Meantime, in the frozen dessert field, per capita consumption remains a little above 21 quarts for ice cream, ice milk and sherbet, a little above 15 quarts for ice cream alone. Among these products, ice cream accounts for 65.7 percent of total production, ice milk for 22.2 percent, and sherbet for 4.1 percent. Look for increases emphasis on novelties and novelty packages. Vanilla is still the favorite flavor, accounting for nearly half of sales, but there's a trend to premium ice cream with intriguing extra ingredient additions.

In fermented milk products, cottage cheese is still the giant but per capita consumption, which increased from 3.1 pounds in 1950 to 4.6 in 1958, has remained virtually constant since then. Production has increased in pace with the population increase. Predicted for this product: a trend away from large curd cottage cheese, constantly improving shelf life, and more complete knowledge of the product's nutritional values.

There are few figures to go by, but all indications are that sour cream has been one of the fastest-growing sellers among dairy foods in the past 10-15 years — if not, indeed, the pop-

Here's Summer Bluestem Report

Grazing provided by pastures in the 14-county Bluestem area of Kansas was excellent on June 1 this year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Pastures were slowed by cool temperatures during the early

spring. However, above normal moisture and warmer weather have made prospects look excellent for summer grazing. Demand for Bluestem pastures was good but not as strong as in some recent years on June 1.

Pasture feed condition in the Bluestem area was reported at 93 percent of normal, up 3 percentage points from last year and equal to the best in 17 years. The supply of grass was plentiful on June 1 as good moisture and warm weather made prospects look excellent for summer grazing. There has been plenty of run-off to fill ponds and start creeks running.

Combined Bluestem and Osage Pastures of Kansas & Oklahoma
The June 1 condition of grazing feed on the Bluestem pastures of Kansas and the Osage pastures of Oklahoma is the highest since 1952. A cool spring with plentiful rain has been nearly ideal for grass growth.

Stock ponds have ample water and stream flow is good. Movement of cattle into the Bluestem-Osage area during January thru May totaled 197,000 head, 4 percent above a year earlier.

The January 1, 1969 inventory of cattle and calves in the area was 1,246,000 head, up 1 percent from January 1, 1968. Cattle are in above average condition and making good gains.

Oklahoma Osage Pastures
Osage pastures were providing very good supplies of grazing feed on June 1. Temperatures during the spring have been below normal but rainfall plentiful, promoting rapid growth of grasses. Pasture feed condition on June 1, at 93 percent, is up 3 points from last year and 7 points above average.

January-May shipments of cattle and calves into the Osage pasture area are estimated at 32,000 head, the same as a year earlier. There were 144,000 cattle and calves in the area on January 1, 1969, compared with 141,000 head on January 1, 1968. Condition of cattle was reported at 89 percent, 3 points above last year and average. Stockmen report peak marketings are expected around September 5. Osage pastures were 95 percent filled on June 1, the same as a year earlier but 2 points above average.

Yogurt, nearly unknown outside large eastern metropolitan areas until recently, is now being marketed in increasing quantities in the midwest and on the west coast — in some markets, it's available in a variety of flavors.

Cheese, with its steady increase in recent years in production and per capita consumption, is a particularly bright spot in the dairy product picture. About 14 percent of all U.S. milk is used for cheese, and because consumers are becoming more and more aware of its variety and charms, if the industry remains adaptable, the future looks heartening. No wonder dairy farmers and producers smile when they say, "Cheese!"

Hutch's Baker Hotel Goes Hilton

HUTCHINSON — The Baker Hotel, convention site for many G&G area organizations, is no more.

The hotel is still there, but the name Baker has been changed to Hilton Inn. The Baker became a franchise of the Hilton Hotel system last week. There was no change in ownership. Reuben Knight of Wichita Falls, Texas, is owner.

The Baker was financed thru \$1.2 million raised by the selling of stock to some 1700 people in the 1940s and 1950s. The hotel was opened in 1953 and turned over to a Dallas, Texas, firm of investment bankers and hotel operators. After several years of operation, reportedly all in the red, the structure was sold to Knight with the Hutchinson stockholders' permission. None of the stockholders received any money on his investment.

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Lay Some Ground Rules For Possible Constitutional Convention

Congress has taken the first tentative step to prepare for a possible Constitutional Convention, the first since the Federal Charter was originally drafted in 1787.

A bill to establish for the first time how such a convention would be called and the rules under which it would operate was reported by the Senate Subcommittee on Separation of Powers. The vote was 4 to 1.

Under the Constitution as it now reads, an amending convention must be called by Congress if the legislatures of two-thirds of the states request it. At present, 33 of the 50 legislatures have approved some form of convention resolution, just one short of the required number.

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., chairman of the subcommittee that reported the convention bill, pointed out that some sort of ground rules for such a gathering were essential because "the final petition could come at any time."

The question of whether a convention should be called at all is wrapped in political controversy. The chief sponsor of the idea is Sen. Everett McKinley Dirksen, who regards such a meeting as a vehicle to rewrite the courts' requirement of apportionment on a one-man, one-vote basis.

Critics of the convention proposal include those who do not want to see the apportionment laws changed and those who fear that the delegates, once assembled, might write all manner of unfortunate new provisions into the Constitution.

As a result of this basic disagreement, the state capitals where legislatures are still in session — there are about eight of them — have become battlegrounds for the proponents and opponents of the Constitutional Convention. In several capitals where resolutions have already

passed, revision drives are under way.

One of the many problems involved is the fact that there is no real precedent for an amending convention and absolutely no rules in the Constitution or in federal law for how delegates would be chosen, how they would

The Constitution, in Article 5, provides that "The Congress . . . on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which . . . shall be valid to all intents and purposes as Part of this Constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several states or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other Mode of Ratification may be proposed by the Congress. . . ."

Until Congress approves the bill that came out of subcommittee Friday or something similar, there is nothing more than this single sentence to guide either the men who favor holding a convention or those who oppose it.

Ervin emphasized in a statement that his bill would eliminate any possibility of a "runaway convention," one that would go beyond the subject matter specified in the states' requests to convene one.

Workmen's Comp Risks Are Down

Workman's compensation insurance will generally cost Kansas companies less after July 1. Frank Sullivan, state insurance commissioner, said new lower rates submitted by the 215 insurance companies that write workmen's compensation in the state average about 2.7% less than old rates.

Rates for manufacturers will

go up nearly 1%, but contractors will get a 6% cut, and there is a 2.5% decrease for other firms which do not fit into manufacturing or contracting classifications.

Kansas companies have been paying about \$28.9 million for coverage, which insures workmen for on-the-job injuries, and the decrease will total about \$783,000 less in premiums.

The reduction is based on experience — that is, claims have amounted to less than the premiums paid to cover the risk.


Rates have been lowered or remained the same for six consecutive years based solely on experience, altho there have been benefit changes which have increased rates in some years.

Sullivan said, "Based upon the experience figures for the past several years, there is continued evidence to indicate a leveling off of the accidents and loss payments that serve to increase rates."

New Dishwashers Eliminate Hand Pre-Rinsing At Sink



cleaning up after a brunch or banquet is a snap today with automatic dishwasher doing the dirty work for you.

WICHITA SCHOOL BUDGET UP; LEVY DOWN

The Wichita schools have a budget of \$51.8 million for the 1969-70 school year, up about 6% but the local property tax will go

down about 3½ mills because of more funds coming to the system from the state. About \$3.8 million new money from the state will come in to counterbalance an increase of \$3.28 million in the budget. Teachers salaries account for about 70% of the total budget — some \$36 million.

Western Ranges Look Good

Warmer weather and frequent rains during May have boosted livestock grazing prospects in 17 western states to the most favorable level in recent years, says the agriculture department. The average condition of pas-

tures on June 1 was 85 compared with 82 on May 1, an average of 82 a year ago and a 10-year average of 80, the Crop Reporting Board said.

Index ratings include: 60-69 poor; 70-79 fair; 80-89 good; 90-99 very good; and 100 or over excellent.

The survey said lack of moisture had hurt development of pasture grasses in parts of the Northern Plains by June 1, but that generally "prospects for early summer grazing are very good."

"Livestock improved seasonally during May and on June 1 cattle and sheep were in good condition in all the western states," the report said. Supplemental

feeding of roughages was reduced significantly as many livestock were turned out on lush pastures and ranges. Newborn calves and lambs are doing very well."

The report said pastures in Oklahoma were rated the highest on June 1 since 1949, and that Texas ranges were rated second highest in 20 years.

The June 1 pasture condition index ratings, by states, on June 1 compared with a year earlier, included: Nebraska (west) 82 and 81; Kansas (west) 91 and 77, and Oklahoma 90 and 88.

ACP Payments Appear To Have Held Ground

The Nixon administration's plan to eliminate the 200 million dollar agricultural conservation program (ACP) has run into stormy ground in Congress, and may have been wrecked for this season.

The House last month turned down the administration's recommendation for elimination of the program next year and gave advance approval for \$195,500,000 — the same as appropriated for 1969.

It is up to the Senate now to decide whether elimination is a worthwhile part of the drive to curb inflation or a breach of faith with a conservation-minded public.

Secretary Clifford M. Hardin of the Agriculture Department said in an interview April 17 that the move to cancel ACP was strictly "a pure case of where we had to get down to a level, and we had to pick some big pieces in an effort to create a budget surplus."

The ACP permits a farmer to plan specified conservation programs on his land and receive government financial help, usually around 50 percent of the costs.

The projects generally involve construction or planting to reduce soil erosion by water and wind.

In the most recent official tabulation of these projects it was reported that 87 percent were of enduring benefit to the land, farm operators and the public in general.

In House hearings, Rep. Jamie L. Whitten (D-Miss.), chairman of the appropriations committee considering the Agriculture department budget for 1969-70, took a dim view of the Nixon proposal to cut out ACP. Nor did he approve what the Johnson administration had urged in January — a reduction of ACP money next year to 100 million dollars.

"It is sometimes said that under ACP we are paying farmers for work they should be doing

themselves," Whitten said. "If they hadn't signed up for the program, it is doubtful many farmers would have done the work. And we must also remember that we all have an interest in preserving the land for future generations."

Whitten's subcommittee report to the House noted another negative aspect of the proposed suspension: A loss of government employees and other officials in the states and counties who have been geared to carrying out the conservation program. Estimates are that elimination of ACP would mean a loss of 10,000 jobs in the Soil Conservation Service the first year and the next.

In addition, an estimated 500,000 other employees — nearly all state and county offices, would lose their jobs if ACP were ended.

Congress may trim the \$195,500,000 program a bit, but persons in the Agriculture department believe ACP will survive as a Nixon anti-inflation

Lindsborg Wants To Rebuild Old River Mill

LINDSBORG — The Smoky Valley Historical Society plans to restore a wheat mill built in 1898 on the Smoky Hill river.

The mill was built after two other mills, one constructed in 1872 and the other in 1889, were destroyed by fire.

Once water flowed over a dam, moving wheels which, in turn, ground the wheat farmers brought to the mill.

Pioneer mill employees spent their spare time building a native rock archway and wall from the mill along the river. One couple was married beneath the rock arch.

Couples continue to stroll along the river bank, fishermen cast their lines in hope of a catfish catch, and visitors still look at the mill, now a museum.

But the wheels no longer turn, most of the dam is gone and the river bed has risen nearly five feet because of sand and silt.

The historical society wants the mud-covered, water-powered turbine cleaned so the mill wheel will run again. Malcom Esping, Lindsborg silversmith, agreed and then went members one better.

He wants to rebuild the dam, dig a channel through the mud and let water finish washing out the mud. The mill was closed in 1955 and donated to the McPherson County Fish and Game Association.

Lumber Prices Drop Back To Normal

Lumber and plywood prices, which went through the roof last winter, are back in the cellar again.

The explosive rise in prices that triggered attention and criticism from such places as the White House has completely evaporated and quotations are now well below their year-ago levels.

Index grades of West Coast lumber and plywood are down more than 50 percent from the peaks they reached in mid-February and, in many cases, are as low as they have been in five years.

Industry sources attribute the sharp slide to the increasing sparseness of money available for mortgage loans. The principal impact of the money shortage, they note, has been on the construction of single-family homes, which represent the largest market for lumber and plywood.

"Mortgage money isn't available and the market for single-family homes has evaporated," declares Robert Smith, president of C. C. Crow Publications Inc., a Portland, Ore., publisher of lumber and plywood journals.

Smith reported quarter-inch panels of sanded plywood were being quoted at \$62 a thousand square feet, compared with \$144 in February and \$76 a year ago.

In lumber, Douglas fir two-by-fours that sold as high as \$123 to \$125 a thousand board feet in February slumped to \$85 to \$87 early this month, Smith added. A year ago, the same products sold in the \$90 to \$91 range.

The price slide in lumber, where quotations had been holding up more than in plywood, deepened when the Weyerhaeuser company, one of the major West Coast producers, made further sharp cuts.

Industry sources reported that Weyerhaeuser had made one of the sharpest cuts in memory by reducing lumber prices on shipments to East Coast destinations

by about \$15 a thousand board feet for rail cargoes and \$35 for ship cargoes.

The depressed level of prices is expected to accelerate the closing of many of the smaller West Coast lumber and plywood plants that operate only when prices warrant.

Unlike larger producers, most of the small producers do not own timber supplies and buy timber from the federal government.

While prices of manufactured products have fallen, however, timber prices have continued at high levels, partly because of the increasing demand for logs in

the export market, particularly to Japan.

The cost-price squeeze will be exacerbated by recent labor agreements reached by major producers, which will push wages higher.

Under present conditions, said Smith, the break-even point for plywood manufacturers requires a market price of about \$74 a thousand square feet against the present market price of \$62.

Other industry sources note that last winter's high prices reflected a number of abnormal conditions: Heavy buying last fall by dealers anticipating a continued strong trend in hous-

ing, unusually severe winter weather that disrupted logging, manufacturing and shipping operations, and a continuing shortage of railroad freight cars.


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
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

Oil Industry Fights Cut In Shrink Allowance

Representatives of the Kansas petroleum industry have registered opposition to further reduction in the gasoline shrinkage allowance by the state at a hearing before the House and Senate roads and highways committees.

The hearing was part of a series of meetings to explore all lies of meetings to carry out a directive by the last session of means of financing road construction and for taxation of fuels in cars and trucks.

The last session reduced the shrinkage allowance for gasoline distributors from 3.5 percent to 3 percent of the fuel total that is tax free in Kansas. The move met with strong opposition at that time from the petroleum industry.

At the outset of the hearing, the legislative research department presented figures showing that reduction of the shrinkage allowance by one half percent by the last Legislature should mean a revenue increase of \$588,000 a year for the state.

A report also was presented stating that the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads allows only one percent shrinkage, with the report adding that federal taxing authorities consider that any amount over that figure represents gasoline sold and used on public roads.

Spokesmen for the industry said they preferred use of the term "handling allowance," rather than shrinkage.

They said shrinkage is only a part of the loss in handling gasoline from the refinery to the user's vehicle. Other losses include spillage, leakage and bad credit, they told the joint hearing.

A demonstration through the use of pouring a quantity of gasoline between several flasks to represent the steps in handling from the refinery to the filling station showed that a 3 percent allowance would barely cover evaporation losses through handling.

There are additional losses from atmospheric conditions, barometric pressure and temperatures, it was stated.

It was added that the state makes no allowance for costs in collecting and remitting the gasoline tax to the state. The committee was told that Nebraska,

for example, allows not only a 3 percent shrinkage allowance but an extra 2 percent for collecting the tax.

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



51 Farm Deaths Listed In '68

The Kansas State Department of Health says 51 fatal work accidents occurred on Kansas farms during 1968.

In its 39th annual report on farm deaths, the department noted that farm work deaths, declining over the last 10 years, now appear to be leveling off.

It defined a farm work accident as one occurring while a person works at a farm activity. It excluded auto accidents on farms.

The report said tractor accidents still account for 54.9 per cent of all fatalities. Work deaths of farmers were the most of occupational groups, accounting for 42.9 per cent of all occupational deaths.

The report said Thursday was the worst day for the deaths. Thirteen of the 51 occurred on that day. It also said 80 per cent of deaths were those of persons over 40.

Lyon County had the most deaths with four; Jackson County was runner-up with three.

Why Soybean Prices Lagging

Soybean prices have not made the spectacular advance, such as was made by corn. There are two principal reasons: The 1968 soybean crop was much larger than needed for domestic use and exports. The corn crop was a little short of these.

The price-support rate for the 1968 soybean crop will be 30 cents a bushel lower. The loan rate for corn will remain unchanged.

The 1968 soybean crop totaled 1080 million bushels — about 120 million bushels more than the amount being used and exported this year. U.S. processors are using about 5 percent more soybeans than last year. At this rate, they will require around 600 million bushels. Exports have been running about 14 percent above last year, so they may total around 300 million bushels. Seed and feed usage is expected to be around 60 million bushels.

The total disappearance of soybeans now appears likely to be near 960 million bushels, or 120 million bushels less than the crop that was harvested last fall. Hence, the carryover on September 1 may be around 275 to 300 million bushels.

Price-support developments. Farmers put 334 million bushels of their 1968 soybean crop under price support. By May 1, they had repaid the loans on 49 million bushels, leaving 285 million bushels still under loan. Farmers who own these beans want to sell them at prices higher than

the loan rate, but if they hold them too long they will get only the loan rate. The price-support loans will be due on July 31, so farmers must sell or reseed their beans before that date, or deliver them to the CCC.

The CCC will have 62 million bushels of older soybeans available for sale beginning September 1. The minimum sale price will be the new price-support loan rate plus 10 percent and carrying charges. The availability of these soybeans will tend to restrict any run-up in the price of soybeans at the end of this marketing year.

Prospects for 1969-1970. Soybean production this year is very likely to once again exceed the amount needed for domestic use and exports. Farmers reported the intention of planting 3 percent more acres this year, which would be in line with the trend of recent years. Actual plantings usually come close to reported intentions.

The average yield is more uncertain. But if it is close to the pattern of the past 12 years, this figure would be about 25 to 25½ bushels per acre (compared with the record of 26.6 bushels recorded in 1968).

Soybean production this year seems likely to be some 1050 to 1075 million bushels. This amount would probably be 25 to 75 million bushels in excess of the

needs for processing and exports during the 1969-70 marketing year. Such an excess would be smaller than the surpluses produced in each of the past two years.

The prospective 1969 production of soybeans, therefore, is only slightly beyond the probable needs for domestic use and exports. A tightening of the supply-use balance could hold prices high enough so that sales by the CCC could set an upper limit, or ceiling. Likewise, a larger crop or reduced utilization could bring prices down to the new support level.



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

QUIET AFTER PENITENTIARY DISTURBANCE

The cycle requires 3 to 5 years, after which the process can commence again, the FAO said.

Flood Damage Not Great Near Junction City

JUNCTION CITY — Flood damage in the Lyon and Clark Creek areas west and east of Junction City June 11 was not enough to justify declaring them disaster areas, Steve Carr, chairman of the Geary County - U.S. Department of Agriculture disaster committee, said Tuesday.

The panel inspected the areas for crop and fence damage and soil erosion, Carr said.

"The damage was much less than we had anticipated," he added. "It was much less than the losses sustained in floods last September."

One farm had about 30 acres of soil erosion in two places as deep as tilled topsoil, but generally individual farms had less than 20 acres damage, the committee found.

Disaster area designation would have entitled farmers to low cost federal loans and cost sharing on various agricultural conservation programs.

Will Lending Bill Make Any Difference?

The new federal truth-in-lending law which becomes effective July 1 won't make credit any cheaper, but it could encourage borrowers to shop around for the best possible deal.

Leaders for the first time will have to furnish potential borrowers with complete and detailed figures on how much credit will cost and a realistic statement of the interest charge.

They also will have to be more specific in advertising. No longer will it suffice to advertise a \$1 down and \$1 weekly payment. The ad will have to say how long the payments must be made and what the iron will cost when the final payment is made.

The stated purpose of the new law is to let borrowers and customers know the exact cost of credit. It does not fix maximum minimum charges for credit. The law applies to banks, savings and loan associations, department stores, credit card issuers, credit unions, motor car dealers, residential mortgage brokers and anyone extending or arranging credit for which a finance charge is payable.

Exempted from its provision are business and commercial credit, except agricultural credit, and credit over \$25,000, except in real estate transactions.

The Federal Trade commission, the primary enforcement agency, expects credit grantors to encounter difficulties adjusting to the new requirements.

The Federal Reserve board sent about 800,000 copies of its "Regulation Z" to affected creditors to explain the law.

Here are some questions raised and the answers provided in "Regulation Z":

Q — What is the finance charge?

A — The total of all costs the borrower must pay, directly or indirectly.

Q — What costs are included in the finance charge.

A — Interest, loan fee, any amount paid as a discount, ser-

vice or carrying charge, credit investigation fee, cost of life or other insurance. The dollar and cents total of these charges, and the percentage they represent must be stated in writing except that only the annual percent rate must be included in the sale of dwellings.

Q — What is the annual percentage rate?

A — The relative cost of credit in percentage terms, with all costs included.

Q — What is open-end credit?

A — Normally it covers most credit charges and revolving accounts in retail stores where finance charges usually are based on unpaid balances each month.

Q — What information must be given an open-end customer?

A — The period in which payment may be made without incurring a finance charge, the method used to determine the balance on which the charge is made, how the actual charge is calculated, description of any lien the lender may acquire on a customer's property, and the minimum payment that must be made on each billing.

Q — How is the annual percentage rate determined on open-end credit?

A — A typical charge of 1.5 percent on the unpaid balance of a monthly bill would amount to 18 percent a year. Multiply the monthly charge by 12.

Q — What other types of credit are involved?

A — Loans and sales credit for a specified length of time where the amount, the number of payments and the payment dates are agreed on by both parties. These loans usually are made for the purchase of big items such as motor cars or major appliances.

Q — What information must the lender provide for such credit?

A — The total amount of the credit charge, the annual percentage rate, the number, amount and due dates of payments, the charges made for late payments, and difference between

Gasoline Tax Now Totals 11 Cents

Beginning July 1, Kansas motorists will be paying \$1.10 in taxes for every 10 gallons of gasoline they buy.

The state tax is 7c a gallon after July 1, and the federal tax is 4c. It means the tax is about one-half of the retail price of gas before the tax is applied.

The oil and gas industry, anxious that the tax increase not be called a price increase, has noted that the current average pre-tax price — about 26 cents — is only two cents more than it was 50 years ago, before there were any taxes levied on the fuel.

Q — How is the annual percentage rate calculated on credit other than open-end?

A — By the actuarial method, with payments applied first to interest due and the balance us-


ed to reduce the principal. A bank loan for \$100 payable in 12 monthly installments at 6 percent, actually would cost about 11 percent, since the borrower has use of the entire \$100 for only one month, and less and less each month as payments are made.





Co-ops Deplore Bank Costs

The president of a large Kansas City-based farm cooperative said today that the boost in the prime interest rate by major banks "is more than American agriculture should be asked to bear."

Monday to promulgate new rules governing the interstate shipment of household goods.

The commission has invited written comments, no later than July 7, on several changes in regulations that it is considering.

A major target of the new rule is the widespread practice of giving prospective customers deliberately low advance estimates of costs.

No such estimate is binding, and the actual cost to the householder is determined by standard charges for weight, mileage and such miscellaneous services as packing and unpacking. The rates, known as tariffs — are set on an industry-wide basis with ICC approval and do not vary from company to company.

The commission said it might bar advance estimates. An alternative proposal under consideration is the creation of weight-estimating services by groups of carriers. Still another is the encouragement of "do-it-yourself" estimates.

The commission has received many complaints of charges exceeding advance estimates by as much as several hundred dollars. Often, when this occurs, the householder is unable to pay the difference immediately, as cash is demanded unless arrange-





Hot Dogs? Chickenfurters? Still In Debate

A newly disclosed survey on frankfurter-eating shows that 7 of 10 persons asked believed the Nixon administration would limit fat in hot dogs. And indicated also that there is widespread ignorance about how much now is being put in. The survey, made in Philadelphia, was filed by officials with the Agriculture Department. Officials have proposed a fat limit of 33 percent for federally inspected cooked sausages, including hot dogs, bologna and frankfurters. There is no limit now, and fat content has increased steadily. The Philadelphia survey shows that of 530 families checked, 33 percent said they ate frankfurters. Most of the persons checked thought hot dogs contained less than 33 percent fat, with only one in eight guessing the content was more than 30 percent. The department's proposal to limit content to 33 percent represents the average of how much actually is being put into hot dogs at the present time, officials say. Records show that 30 years ago average hot dog was only 16 percent fat. But new processing techniques which emulsify the fat globules in the meat ingredients enabled processors to boost the content without the average consumer becoming aware of it.



BIGGEST BUG BOMBER

There are a couple of dozen aerial spray pilots in the G&G area, and the one who flies the most unusual plane for the type of work is Chuck LeMaster of Ottawa. Certainly it's the biggest for the spraying job.

Shown here at tree top levels over Seneca, LeMaster's plane is a Douglas C-39. The last of only 11 built, the C-39 has a 10-foot shorter span than the familiar DC-3. LeMaster's plane was built in 1939 as an Army Air Corps transport, later hauled coffee in South America, and was bought by LeMaster in Oregon, where it had been used for contract spraying for the U. S. Forestry Service.

LeMaster uses it principally for insect eradication over towns. Besides Seneca, the plane has sprayed Fort Scott, Yates Center, Lebo, and Elsmore, among other towns.

Agriculture department officials say taste tests have shown consumers prefer their hot dogs to contain at least 30 percent fat. The Johnson administration proposed a broad plan in December to revamp the federal sausage regulations. This included a plan to allow up to 25 percent poultry meat in sausages without the present requirement of spelling the contents out on the main labels, such as "Frankfurters, Chicken Added."

The December proposal asked also for a limit of 30 percent on fat content, and called for a series of public hearings across the country to hear consumers' views. But Nixon administration officials decided to split up the so-called chicken-dog and fat-dog proposals. They also boosted the fat limit to 33 percent. Also thrown out were the public hearings on the combined issues. The chicken-dog proposal was reduced to 15 percent poultry meat on April 4, with a 45-day period reserved for written comments from the public, but no hearings.



million doses by August.

Initially, the cost for Merck's vaccine is expected to be in the range of \$2 to \$2.35 a shot. But the price is likely to decline with increasing competition and bulk purchases by public health agencies to, perhaps, \$1.25 to \$1.50 after about a year, some industry sources say. Whatever the cost of the vaccine, the private patient is likely to pay the standard \$5 to \$7 vaccination fee for a shot by a physician.

German Measles Vaccine On Sale

Merck & Co. was issued the first government license to market a new vaccine against German measles.

The vaccine is expected to have widespread use because of the potential of the disease to produce birth defects.

"This initial licensing brings to fruition a seven-year government and industry effort to develop and make available a vaccine against German measles before 1970," Secretary Finch of the Health, Education and Welfare Department said. HEW said additional vaccines against German measles are under consideration and will be licensed by the department's Division of Biologics Standards as field-testing programs are completed.

All versions of the German measles vaccine confer protection by use of a live but weakened virus that gives a mild infection, stimulating the body's natural immunity processes. The same technique is used in the oral polio vaccine, although the German measles vaccines must be injected.

In field trials, the vaccines have been shown to be about 95% effective and to confer protection for at least three years. Most experts believe immunity will last much longer, but continuing observations will be necessary to prove precisely how long.

Merck's initial licensing gives the company a significant competitive advantage. Merck said nationwide distribution of its vaccine would begin today with shipments of more than 650,000 doses. The company said it plans to distribute more than two

'Weeks Away' From New Farm Program

Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of agriculture, says he has been meeting with some congressional farm leaders on possible new farm legislation but that the Nixon administration proposals are weeks away from completion.

Meantime, W. R. Poage (D-Tex.), chairman of the House agriculture committee, said he expected to begin farm program hearings July 15.

"I don't know how soon we will be able to be more specific," Hardin said, but it will be some weeks yet."

Hardin said if Poage's committee insists on hearing from the administration right away then he would comply.

Hardin indicated, however, he would like to delay administration testimony until after Congress returns in September from its summer recess.

Hardin has not made clear publicly what details the administration has in mind. He had referred on a number of occasions to the possibility of a long-range land retirement program aimed at curbing excess production.

The present basic farm law — the Food and Agriculture act — expires at the end of next year.

Hardin also announced the resumption of a series of "listening conferences" around the country to hear what farmers want.

The first two were held in April at Lincoln, Nebr., and Pullman, Wash. The third has been set for July 9 in Fresno, Calif.

Hardin also told newsmen that his visit with European Common Market officials in Brussels was informal, relaxed and generally informative.

A proposed Common Market internal tax on oilseed products was among the major topics, he said. The tax, aimed at boosting larger use of European products, would hit hard at U.S. soybean exports.

Hardin said he did not think there would be any sudden move to impose the tax, but added that the matter has not been settled.

Longer State Fair Means More Livestock Events

HUTCHINSON — Livestock exhibitors will benefit in many ways by the extension of the Kansas State Fair to nine days, a move taken last winter by the Board of State Fair Managers.

The longer fair will relieve congested facilities, particularly for cattle and horse departments. It also opens up opportunity for additional livestock events, one of which will be a Hereford "Register of Merit" show sponsored by the American Hereford Assn.

"This will be our second Register of Merit show, and we are

delighted to be host to that event again," declared Fair Secretary Wallace M. White.

The first ever held here was in 1964, the year the fair's Exhibition Center building was completed.

More than 300 Hereford cattle from at least 10 states are likely to be entered in the show, which will be held the first four days of the Fair, Sept. 13, 14, 15 and 16.

Following the "Register of Merit" show, other beef cattle breeds will move in for shows the remaining five days.

Dairy cattle, sheep and swine will be shown throughout the 1969 fair, with greatly increased premiums offered in all these departments.

Four separate horse shows will be held: Pony of the Americas on Saturday, Sept. 13; Quarter Horses on Sunday, Sept. 14 thru Monday, Sept. 15; Appaloosas on Wednesday, Sept. 17 through Thursday, Sept. 18; and a 4-H Club Horse Show on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 20 and 21.

"The longer fair permits more time for one horse breed to move out and another to move in," explained White. "Best of all, it permits us to make the 4-H show to our big arena. This, in turn, will free the 4-H Livestock Building for staging, for the first time, a livestock show by Future Farmers of America."

That competition will start Thursday, Sept. 18.


Totally, about \$9000 more will be offered in livestock premiums at this year's Kansas State Fair than was offered a year ago.

Entries in the five open livestock departments were up sharply last year. There were 753 exhibitors, an increase of 24 percent over 1967, and 2556 animals, a 13 percent boost. Facilities were particularly taxed to accommodate dairy cattle and horses.

DRIVE-IN CHAIN STARTS PACKING PLANT

HOLTON — Aristo Foods Inc., a Topeka-based drive-in eating chain, has started construction of a \$1 million meat packing plant here. It is expected to handle

about 200 head of cattle daily when it opens in January. The plant is expected to employ about 80 people when it first opens. The city of Holton issued \$1 million in industrial revenue bonds for the plant. Payments by Aristo will retire the bonds.
