



MESSAGE FROM ADVISER L. B. POLLOM

In perhaps no other industry has there been more change than in farming. Comparatively these changes have come most rapidly. The past two or three decades farms have come from a business requiring little equipment to one in which a high degree of mechanization obtains.

It is not unusual to find from one to three tractors on a single farm. There is power drawn and power driven equipment for almost every phase of farming activity. Many thousands of dollars are invested in tractors, combines, ensilage cutters, pick up balers, etc. The farm that is not so equipped is often considered backward and nonprogressive.

This mechanization has created a tendency to exploitive farming. It has added much to the cost of equipping for farming.

The Future Farmer who contemplates becoming established in farming would do well to ask himself a few pertinent questions. "If I make the necessary investment will it make a profit for me?" "What will be my sources of income and approximately what income can I reasonably expect?" "Will it pay for the investment in machinery and its maintenance?"

Since the key to success in farming is low cost production, "What can I do to keep production costs low?"

To many of these problems the Future Farmer gains an insight through his farming program.

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CHAPTER ACTIVITY PROGRAM

November 1 is the deadline date for filing local chapter activity programs with the state department. Address same to State Deputy Adviser A. P. Davidson, Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Official Activity Program Blanks in sufficient quantities to supply a copy of the local chapter activity program for the state office and an extra set to be made and kept in the chapter files were mailed all chapters Sept. 1.

Helpful Suggestions for building the chapter activity program will be found in the Official FFA Manual, 1952 edition, pp. 36-40. The Kansas Gold Emblem and Silver Emblem chapter winners in 1953 will be found in the April 1, 1953 issue of the Kansas Future Farmer Newsletter, pp. 13-18.

Committee Appointments for building the chapter activity program should include all members of the chapter. Every effort should be made to have a program built and endorsed by the chapter, and not merely a program set up by the officers and adviser.

Calendaring Activities for the year, by months, is important. Too many activities at a given time will likely result in a scattering of effort and a lowering of standards. Too few activities will cause loss of interest. Fit your program of activities in with the school and community programs. This will avoid conflicts and the possibility of demanding too much time and energy on the part of certain members of your chapter. The 1953-54 Calendar of Activities for Kansas Association of FFA will be helpful in building local chapter activity calendars.

1953-54 STATE FFA PROGRAM OF WORK

- 1. A farming program of maximum size and scope for each boy commensurate with the ability of the boy and the home farm opportunity.
- 2. A continuous program of repair and construction of farm machinery and equipment.
- 3. Prevent waste of all kinds. (Conserve soil and other natural resources; control farm fires; control livestock losses, eradicate pests.)
- 4. Take every precaution against farm accidents. They result in suffering, loss of manpower, damaged equipment, and sometimes cost lives.
- 5. So far as practical, produce on the farm all the needs of the farm and farm family.
- 6. Assist veterans in becoming established in farming.
- 7. One hundred per cent of the Kansas vocational agriculture departments establish chapters of FFA and strive for one hundred per cent enrollment of eligible members.
- 8. Each chapter to have a definite program of activities for the year and this program to be submitted to the state office not later than November 1, 1953. Each chapter to present an achievement report at the annual meeting of the State Association. Only chapters submitting activity programs by November 1 will be eligible for State Farmer or American Farmer candidates, and to participate in the state FFA Public Speaking Contest.
- 9. Six issues of the FFA newsletter to be published, beginning with September and distributed over a period of nine months. Copies of each issue will be sent to the officers of the National Organization of Future Farmers of America, to all state advisers, and to a select list of agricultural teacher trainers and agricultural leaders.
- 10. As a means of inculcating sound thrift principles, the State Association encourages careful selection, management, and financing of supervised farming programs.
- 11. Encourage parliamentary proficiency among local chapters, and encourage ritualistic proficiency throughout the State Association. It is recommended that each chapter own sufficient copies of both the FFA Manual and Stewart's Parliamentary Procedure to furnish a copy of both for each officer. It is further recommended that sufficient copies of both publications be owned by the chapter to make both readily available to all local members.
- 12. Encourage 100 per cent of the chapters to use official FFA secretary's books and official FFA treasurer's books.
- 13. Support FFA contests of state and national scope.
- 14. Support the National FUTURE FARMER Magazine.
- 15. Support special U. S. Postage Stamp Commemorating the 25th Anniversary of the FFA.

1953-54 State FFA Program of Work (continued)

- 16. Publicity- encourage local chapters to keep the public informed as to worthwhile activities, and the State Association to give publicity to activities of state and national interest.
- 17. Encourage home improvement by members of local chapters to include land-scaping, beautification, repair, electrification, providing comfort and conveniences to make the farm home more livable.
- 18. It is recommended that each chapter provide and use the following list of paraphernalia: U. S. Flag, Owl, Ear of Corn, Pictures of Washington and Jefferson framed under glass, Plow, Gavel, Seal, Charter framed under glass, Creed, Secretary's Book, Treasurer's Book, where practical, FFA Manuals minimum of six, Filing Case, Mounts for Officers Emblems, FFA Song, Purposes framed under glass and picture of Henry Groseclose framed under glass.
- 19. Encourage scouting.
- 20. Encourage the establishment of FFA chapter libraries and recommend the minimum requirements to be: (figures in parentheses indicate publishers listed.)
 - a. FFA Manual, 1952 edition, for each officer. (1) 15¢
 - b. Stewart's Parliamentary Procedure, one for each officer (2) 20¢ or A Guide to Parliamentary Practices (4) 15¢ Henderson & Rucker.
 - c. History of Kansas FFA 1929-1943, Davidson. State FFA Office, KSC.
 - d. Complete file of the Kansas Future Farmer for the past year.
 - e. Most recent issue of the Proceedings of the National Convention.
 - f. Forward FFA, by W. A. Ross. (4)

ESTABLISHING FFA CHAPTERS

The following information will be of interest to local FFA advisers who are faced with the problem of establishing local FFA Chapters.

- I. ESTABLISHING FFA CHAPTERS IN SCHOOLS WHERE VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE IS BEING OFFERED FOR THE FIRST TIME.
 - a. Acquaint the vocational agriculture students with the Future Farmers of America Organization through study lessons, FFA Newsletters, National FFA Proceedings, etc., in an effort to create a desire to organize a local chapter of Future Farmers of America.
 - b. Elect temporary officers from upper class groups. Use a nominating committee if feasible.
 - c. Through committee assignments and study of mimeographed material from the state office, build tentative chapter Program of Work.
 - d. Write state office at Manhattan for <u>Petition blanks</u> to <u>petition</u> the State Association for a local FFA chapter and for <u>Program of</u> Work blanks.
 - e. Collect State and National dues (.10¢ National, .20¢ State total .30¢); list membership in accordance with directions on Petition blank and forward the Petition blank with State and National dues and tentative local chapter Program of Work to the State Office at Manhattan, Kansas.
 - f. Upon receipt of Petition blank, dues and local Program of Work, the State Office will issue the local FFA charter and will send the local chapter free the following material: George Washington's General Order on Profanity; Purposes, Creed, Picture of Henry Groseclose, all to be framed under glass. The State Office will also send letters to be forwarded to Swift and Company and Deere and Company which will enable your chapter to procure a minature steel plow and framed pictures of Washington and Jefferson.
 - g. In accordance with the National Constitution, all local officers except the Sentinel must hold the Degree of Chapter Farmer. In case of newly chartered chapters, the Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America has ruled that all officers in such FFA chapters shall be elected from the Green Hand Degree group. During the second year of the local chapter's history, it will be possible to elect officers from the Chapter Farmer Degree group, which will be in full accord with the Constitutions of both the National Organization and the State Association.

II. SUGGESTED PATTERNS FOR DEGREE RITUAL WORK

- a. Take the officer group to a neighboring chapter and have them initiated into the Green Hand Degree. Then the Chapter Green Hand officer members can initiate the other members of the chapter into the Green Hand Degree.
- b. Have a neighboring chapter bring its officers to a meeting of the local chapter and have them initiate the entire group into the Green Hand Degree.

Establishing FFA Chapters (continued)

c. In the case of small groups, it might be desirable to take your entire membership to a neighboring chapter and have them initiated into the Green Hand Degree.

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MEMBERSHIP IN NATIONAL FFA ORGANIZATION

Membership in the Future Farmers of America has reached a new record total of 363,369 during the organization's 25th anniversary year, according to records compiled in the national FFA office at Washington, D. C.

The 1953 membership topped 1952 by 10,453, or nearly three percent. Figures are based on the amount of dues (10 cents per member) paid by the State FFA Associations to the national organization.

Thirty-one States increased their FFA membership during the year. The organization is active in all the 48 States, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Texas leads the nation with 36,322 members, followed by North Carolina with 21,914, and Illinois with 17,421.

ENPLANATION OF THE POLICY OF THE KANSAS ASSOCIATION OF FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA GOVERNING THE FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA FOUNDATION INC. AWARDS

I. The only Future Farmers of America Foundation Inc. cash award on the State level accepted by the Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America has been the cash award for "State Initiated Projects". This award was divided equally between the State Gold Emblem chapter winners to be used for chapter betterment.

Beginning in 1953 the "State Initiated Project" was designated as the "State Awards for Improving Agriculture and Leadership". The amount of award money for 1953 was greatly increased, and the Kansas Association requested and received permission to include State Silver Emblem Chapter winners in the distribution of the award money. The State Gold Emblem Chapter winners will receive 20 per cent more than will the State Silver Emblem chapter winners. All award moneys distributed for this project in Kansas is to be used for the betterment of the local FFA chapters.

- II. The American Farmer award of \$50 for each successful American Farmer candidate, is given to help defray expenses to the National Future Farmers of America Convention, and is made direct to the individuals concerned all of whom have been out of High School for at least one year.
- III. The Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America acts as an intermediary for distributing the Future Farmers of America Foundation Inc. award moneys to assist in paying travel expenses for the National Future Farmers of America Judging Contests.
 - IV. The Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America does not accept Future Farmers of America Foundation Inc. cash awards on the State level for individual FFA members enrolled in high school.

SPECIAL U.S. POSTAGE STAMP COMMEMORATING 25TH ANNIVERSARY FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

SUGGESTIONS FOR LOCAL CHAPTER ACTIVITIES

General Information

On October 13, at Kansas City, Missouri, during the first full day of the Future Farmers of America National Convention, the Post Office Department will introduce and begin "First Day Sale" of a special postage stamp commemorating the 25th anniversary of the FFA.

In keeping with the usual procedures of the Post Office Department in issuing commemorative stamps, they will be offered for sale only in Kansas City on October 13.

However, on the following day, October 14, the FFA stamps will be placed on sale throughout the country at Post Offices where the local Postmaster has requested a supply.

Local FFA chapters can schedule special promotional activities in connection with the commemorative stamp and receive considerable publicity for the organization in local newspapers and radio stations. Advance planning is required if chapters are to receive the maximum benefit from the stamp.

SUGGESTIONS FOR ACTION - IMPORTANT

THE FIRST STEP to be assured of a local supply of the stamps is to contact the local Postmaster and request that he order a large enough supply to fill the community needs. This should be done several weeks in advance of October 14. Unless requested to order them, many Postmasters will not have the FFA Commemorative Stamp for local sale.

Make plans for WIDE LCCAL USE of the stamps:

- 1. FFA members visit local business concerns, tell them about the commemorative stamps, and ask them to purchase enough of them to supply their stamp needs for the rest of the year.
- 2. FFA members and their parents plan to purchase enough stamps to use on their personal correspondence for several months. Urge other students to buy stamps. This activity might be stimulated by holding a contest to see which FFA member, or team of members, can sell the most stamps.
- 3. Chapter should buy supply of stamps for official correspondence.
- 4. Urge school superintendent and principal to buy supply of FFA stamps sufficient enough to supply the school's postage needs for remainder of year.

Special U.S. Postage Stamp Commemorating 25th Anniversary (Con't)

5. Prepare poster for downtown display calling attention to the FFA stamps and their availability at the Post Office. (A sheet of 50 stamps enclosed in cellophane might be used to illustrate the poster.)

Arrange SPECIAL SCHOOL ASSEMBLY program in connection with stamp issue.

- 1. Get Postmaster to speak briefly and present sheet of stamps to the chapter.
- 2. Have members tell about the history of FFA, its activities and accomplishments, and about the work of the local chapter.
- 3. Present Honorary Chapter Farmer Degree to Postmaster.

PLAN PUBLICITY in local newspapers.

- 1. Talk with editor before stamp goes on sale; give him story about stamp and plan coverage of October 14 activities.
- 2. Arrange for photograph to be made of Postmaster presenting sheet of stamps to chapter president in school assembly program. (For best results, work with the newspaper photographer and Postmaster to "fake" the picture in advance of the actual presentation. For small newspapers that do not have their own engraving plants this may need to be done several days in advance.)
- 3. If no special program is scheduled, get picture of FFA members lined up at post office window buying stamps from Postmaster. (The same advance arrangements listed above may be desirable for this picture.)

PLAN RADIO PUBLICITY

1. Arrange special program.

2. Provide radio news announced story about stamp to be read on the air.

Information For Stamp Collectors

Many FFA members are stamp collectors and will want "first day covers" from Kansas City. First day covers are envelopes with special printing and art work calling attention to the organization featured on the stamp. Companies that produce such "covers" will buy a stamp on the first day they are sold, stick the stamp on the "cover", or envelope, and have it cancelled by the post office with a special mark showing that it was cancelled on the "First Day of Issue." They mail the "cover" to the person who has ordered it.

Fleetwood Cover Service, Pleasantville, New York, has been designated to produce the official "First Day Covers" for the FFA Stamp. Members who are interested in obtaining such covers should write Fleetwood for their prices and handle arrangements directly with that company.

PRESIDENT DWIGHT D. EISENHOWER WILL ADDRESS THE NATIONAL FFA CONVENTION

President Dwight D. Eisenhower heads the list of distinguished speakers expected to participate in the 25th Anniversary national convention of Future Farmers of America at Kansas City, Missouri, October 12-15.

The President will address the final convention session on Thursday night, October 15.

Groups of FFA members who plan to attend the convention on October 15 only, should arrive sometime before 2 p.m. so that they can register. Because of the public interest in hearing President Eisenhower, it will be necessary to restrict attendance at the Thursday evening program to those persons who have registered for the convention.

We hope that as many as possible of the Kansas FFA members will remain to hear Eisenhower. It is strongly urged that as many members as possible wear their FFA jackets and, of course, the chapter adviser will be expected to accompany his boys.

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CABINET MEMBERS ON NATIONAL FFA CONVENTION PROGRAM

Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield, or one of his top assistants, will participate in the program during the morning of October 13 when the first presentation will be made of a special three-cent postage stamp commemorating the FFA's 25th Anniversary.

A third cabinet member, Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby, Secretary of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, will address the convention during the afternoon of October 15.

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ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS OF 1953 FFA CONVENTION

Boys who arrive in Kansas City early will register during the morning of October 12, and embark on specially conducted tours to points of interest in the city during the afternoon. The first convention program will open that night when five Future Farmers will vie for honors in the national finals of the FFA public speaking contest.

Features Tuesday, October 13, in addition to the commemorative stamp presentation, will include presentation of awards in the national chapter contest and conferring of American Farmer Degrees. The evening session will feature the presentation of Star American Farmer awards, followed by special entertainment.

The gigantic silver anniversary pageant will be featured Wednesday morning, and during that afternoon most of the boys will go on tours of the city while the official delegates work in committee sessions. Regional and national winners of Future Farmers of America Foundation awards in Farm Mechanics, Farm Electrification, Soil and Water Management, Farm Safety, and Dairy Farming will be presented Wednesday night, followed by another top-notch entertainment program.

Thursday's program, in addition to the addresses by President Eisenhower, Secretary Benson and Secretary Hobby, will include, during the morning, a Buffalo Grass Dance staged by Indian members of the Browning, Montana, FFA chapter. Business matters to be covered during the final day include the election of new national officers.
