BLUERMONT COLLEGE. This is the somewhat ambitious name of an institution that will for some years yet be nothing more than a first class academy, but its location is such that it is valuable to the cause of education in Kansas. It is near the center of that territory in the town of Manhattan, at the junction of the Big Blue and Kansas rivers on the great line of western emigration and the central route to the gold regions. An academical school is already in successful operation there and a substantial stone building is nearly completed. Of the sum of \$15,000 deemed necessary by the gentlemen of different denominations who have the matter in charge, \$12,700 has already been raised, and Rev. J. T. Goodnow, for eighteen years a well-known teacher in Massachusetts, is in town soliciting funds. He brings from Boston and elsewhere the very highest testimonials in favor of both himself and his cause.

A COLLEGE is about to be established in KANSAS in the town of Manhattan, in the center of the territory. It is intended, at first to supply the wants of a scholastic education to the young citizens of Kansas, and will eventually rise to be the leading educational institution in the incipient state. It is called Central College and stands at the junction of the Big Blue and Kansas Rivers, on the line of the travel to the Western Gold Mines. A large donation in land has been made to it. Professor ISAAC T. GOODNOW, once a teacher in Wilbraham Academy, Mass., is now in the city. He wishes to sell the land belonging to the college and to obtain other donations for the use of the institution. He has been highly successful, but still needs some \$2500 towards making up the \$15,000 required for the college. He will present this subject, to our citizens and we hope will receive the encouragement he deserves. Several of our shrewd operators have already invested in Manhattan lots.

BLUEMONT COLLEGE.—Mr. Isaac T. Goodenow, formerly a teacher in Wilbraham, and later in Providence Conference Seminary, is now in this city in behalf of a college located at Manhattan, Kansas Territory. This enterprise has, as we said enlisted very many eminent men from whom Mr. Goodenow brings the highest testimonials.

BLUEMONT COLLEGE, KANSAS.—Professor Goodenow, now of Kansas, but for many years a resident of this State, and an instructor in Natural Science and Chemistry at the Methodist Conference Seminary, East Greenwich, a gentleman whose former position among us and the testimonials with which he is provided, give him the highest claims to our respect and confidence, is making an appeal to our citizens in behalf of the cause of education in Kansas. He has established an Academy at Manhattan, a town in Kansas, settled, in great measure, by emigration from Rhode Island, and now asks us for aid in sustaining it. Those who have made their homes in this territory have been more than usually drawn from the educated classes, and are desirous of reproducing on Kansas soil, for themselves and their children, the institutions under which they were reared. They, moreover, occupy a central position in our Republic, whose future destinies are therefore intimately concerned with the raising there of an intelligent community. But this Territory is at present destitute of educational advantages, and there are few in the adjoining States. Settlers are unable to educate their children in consequence of the limited means they have carried there, and the political disturbances and the recent failure of the crops, which have still further impoverished them. They have not received any public grants of land for educational purposes, and the Territory being recently settled requires more foreign assistance than older communities. These reasons, and many others that might be adduced, seem peculiarly to command to our charities, the enterprise of Professor Goodenow.

BLUERMONT CENTRAL COLLEGE.—This is the name of a seminary lately established in Manhattan, Kansas. Professor Isaac T. Goodnow, for many years a teacher in the Wilbraham (Mass.) Academy, and later, a teacher in the East Greenwich, (R. I.) Seminary, is now in Norwich, engaged in raising funds for the benefit of this new institution. \$15,000 is the amount now desired, and of this sum about \$13,000 is already raised. This cause is commended to all intelligent and patriotic men. Nowhere in the country is such an institution more imperatively demanded than in the portion in which Manhattan is situated. This town is located at the junction of the Kansas and Blue rivers, in the geographical centre of the United States, surrounded by a fertile and beautiful territory, and in the direct track to the gold regions and the Pacific slope. There, in the very midst of the Union, it is of the highest importance that an academical institution should be established, so as to afford educational advantages to the children of the pioneers of our empire, which is slowly but steadily taking its way across the continent to the Pacific slopes. Of course it is not supposed that such an institution will vie for the present with the older Academies and Colleges of the east, but it is hoped that it may be the germ of a future great university, which shall from its very foundation prove a fountain of incalculable good to Kansas and to the nation.

A STRANGER.—We were favored, yesterday, with a call from our old friend, ISAAC T. GOODNOW, formerly, for several years, a teacher in the East Greenwich Seminary, but more recently a citizen of Kansas. Mr. Goodnow went to Kansas amongst the first of the emigrants from this State, with the view of settling down as a farmer. He located in what is now the beautiful town—perhaps we should say, city—of Manhattan, near the junction of the Big Blue River with the Kansas. While pursuing his other avocations, our friend has lost none of his interest in Education; and his visit to his former home, at this time, is prompted by a desire to promote the educational interests of the new country in which he has recently lived. The BLUERMONT CENTRAL COLLEGE, which has been established in Manhattan, is not yet completed, and the object of Mr. Goodnow's visit is to raise two thousand dollars, which are now wanting to complete the enterprise. The college has been organized, and already promises great results. It is located in the centre of that portion of the new State lying beyond Topeka, and on the direct line of travel to the gold regions and the Pacific slope, in one of the most beautiful countries to be found on our continent. We presume Mr. Goodnow will find little difficulty in raising the money which he needs. While Kansas has suffered immensely, the present season, as an agricultural district, and feels the need of assistance as she may never feel it again, our own people have enjoyed a year of unusual prosperity. Kansas is now, moreover, at peace. It is much better to promote education than to promote fighting. Let us help on the Bluemont College.
