

MARSHALL SCHIRER WINS REGIONAL FFA SPEECH CONTEST

Marshall Schirer, Newton Chapter, 1946 winner of the Kansas FFA Association Speech Contest speaking on the subject, "Soil: Our Wasted Heritage", won the Central Regional FFA Speech Contest, held August 26, at LaFayette, Indiana, 13 states competing. Congratulations, Marshall. Your Kansas FFA friends as well as all the FFA members of the Central Region will be pulling for you to win the National FFA Speech Contest to be held at Kansas City, Missouri, October 21, 1946.

The thirteen state contestants were divided into two groups, one group with six contestants and the second group with seven state winners competing. Marshall was in the group with seven contestants. He ranked first in this elimination trial, with Carl W. Staser of Michigan ranking second. The high two contestants of each group competed in the final which was held at 3:30 p.m. In the final contest a representative from each of the following states competed: Kansas, Ohio, Kentucky and Michigan. The final rank of the group winners together with subject follow:

The judges were: Harold Hedges, Farm Credit Administration; Donald L. MacDonald, American Institute of Cooperation; Lowell S. Hardin, Agricultural Economics Department, Purdue University.

All speakers and coaches were dinner guests of the American Institute of Cooperation, in the Lincoln Lodge on the beautiful Wabash river. At this dinner meeting, Marshall gave his winning speech as the first number on the program. There were approximately 2000 persons present, representing every state in the Union.

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NEW RECORDINGS

1946 VICTORY CONVENTION

The Victory Convention will be held in Kansas City, Missouri, October 20-24. The convention headquarters will be the Municipal Auditorium, between 13 and 14 on Central and Wyandotte streets. Hotel headquarters for the National FFA officials will be the Hotel President. The Kansas delegation will headquarter at the Aladdin Hotel. No provisions have been made for sleeping for Kansas FFA members. In fact, Kansas members are urged not to remain overnight in Kansas City. No provisions have been made for meals for FFA members from Kansas.

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FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA FOUNDATION INCORPORATED, AWARDS

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With 20 Grand champion ribbons to their credit since 1940, the Doak Bros. of Olathe, again carried off top honors at the Mid-West Fat Lamb Show at Kansas City, August 29 and 20 this year. CHAPTER ACTIVITY PROGRAM-

November 1 is the deadline date for filing local chapter activity programs with the state department. Address same to Executive Adviser A. P. Davidson, Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Official Activity Program Blanks in sufficient quantities to supply a copy of the local chapter activity program for the state office will be mailed all chapters at an early date. In former years the state office furnished sufficient copies of the official activity program blanks to provide one copy for the local chapter. This year, due to scarcity of paper, the local chapter will be expected to furnish its own paper for the program of work going in the chapter files.

Helpful Suggestions for building the chapter activity program will be found in the special issue of the Kansas Future Farmer, October 1, 1938, and in the official FFA Manual, pp 31-36.

Committee Appointments for building the chapter activity program should include all members of the chapter. Every effort should be made to have a program built and endorsed by the chapter, and not merely a program set up by the officers and adviser.

Calendaring Activities for the year, by months, is important. Too many activities at a given time will likely result in a scattering of effort and a lowering of standards. Too few activities will cause loss of interest. Fit your program of activities in with the school and community programs. This will avoid conflicts and the possibility of demanding too much time and energy on the part of certain members of your chapter.

1947-4 8 1946-47 STATE FFA PROGRAM OF WORK

- 1. A farming program of maximum size and scope for each boy commensurate with the ability of the boy and the home farm opportunity.
- 2. A continuous program of repair and construction of farm machinery and equipment.
- 3. Prevent waste of all kinds. (Conserve natural resources; Control Farm Fires; Control Livestock Losses; Eradicate Pests.)
- 4. Take every precaution against farm accidents. They result in suffering, loss of manpower, damaged equipment, and sometimes cost lives.
- 5. So far as possible, produce on the farm all the needs of the farm and farm family.
 - 6. Assist returning veterans in becoming established in farming.
- 7. One hundred per cent of the Kansas vocational agriculture departments establish chapters of FFA and strive for one hundred per cent enrollment of eligible members.
- 8. Each chapter to have a definite program of activities for the year and this program to be submitted to the state office not later than November 1, 1946. Each chapter to present an achievement report at the annual meeting of the State Association. Only chapters submitting activity programs by November 1 will be eligible for State Farmer or American Farmer candidates, and to participate in the state FFA public speaking contest.
- 9. Six issues of the FFA newsletter to be published, beginning with September and distributed over a period of nine months. Copies of each issue will be sent to the officers of the National Organization of Future Farmers of America, to all state advisers, and to a select list of agricultural teacher trainers and agricultural leaders.
- 10. As a means of inculcating sound thrift principles, the State Association encourages careful solection, management, and financing of supervised farming programs.
- 11. Encourage parliamentary proficiency among local chapters, and encourage ritualistic proficiency throughout the State Association. It is recommended that each chapter own sufficient copies of both the FFA manual and Stewart's Parliamentary Procedure to furnish a copy of both for each officer. It is further recommended that sufficient copies of both publications be owned by the chapter to make both readily available to all local members.
- 12. Encourage 100 per cent of chapters to use official FFA secretary's book and official FFA treasurer's book.
 - 13. Support FFA contests of state and national scope.
- 14. Publicity encourage local chapters to keep the public informed as to worth while activities, and the State Association to give publicity to activities of state and national interest.

- 15. Encourage home improvement by members of local chapters to include landscaping, beautification, repair, electrification, providing comfort and conveniences to make the farm home more livable.

PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA

The following proposed amendments to the national FFA constitution will be voted upon at the 1946 National FFA Convention.

I. Proposed amendments to the Constitution of the Future Farmers of America.

Amend Article III. "Membership," Section B. "Active membership," to read as follows:

"Any male student not over 25 years of age who is regularly enrolled in an all-day or day-unit class in vocational agriculture is entitled to become an active member of any chartered F.F.A. chapter upon receiving a majority vote of the chapter membership at any local chapter meeting. A member may retain his active membership continuously throughout his entire high school career and for three years after the first national convention following graduation from, or leaving high school; or until he may become 21 years of age, whichever length of time is greater. No individual, however, may retain his active membership beyond his 25th birthday."

- II. Proposed amendments to the By-Laws of the Future Farmers of America.
 - 1. It is proposed that Article I. "Duties of the National Officers," Section G. "The Treasurer," be amended by striking out the last sentence of this section entirely and substituting the following sentence.

"The National Treasurer's annual report on receipts and expenditures and the audit of the same, shall be for the period starting the first day of July of each year and ending the following thirtieth day of June of the next succeeding year."

2. Amend Article VI. "Procedure for Determining Standing of State Association, Chapters, and Members," paragraph No. 3, by striking out all of the second part of this paragraph and substituting the following:

"In case any association is not in good standing at the time of the opening of a national convention, the delegates in national convention shall have the power, upon recommendation of the National Board of Trustees, to withdraw or suspend the charter and refuse such association official representation at the annual national convention. When, and if, such action is taken, the association in question and chapters and members thereof shall be denied the regular privileges of the organization. By meeting the requirements for good standing, a State association may be reinstated by action of the National Eoard of Trustees not earlier than 10 days after the close of the national convention during which it was not in good standing."

3. Amend paragraph No. 3 of this same article under the heading of "A local chapter shall be considered in good standing ..." by striking out all of the second part of this paragraph and substituting the following:

"In case any local chapter is not in good stending with a State association at the time of the opening of a State convention, the delegates in State convention shall have the power, upon recommendation of the

State executive committee, to withdraw or suspend the charter and refuse such chapter official representation at the State convention. When, and if, such action is taken, the chapter in question and members thereof shall be denied the regular privileges of the organization. By meeting the requirements for good standing, a chapter may be reinstated by action of the State executive committee not earlier than 10 days after the closing date of the State convention during which it was not in good standing."

4. Amend Article VII. "Procedure for Choosing Candidates for the American Farmer Degree, * Section A, to read as follows:

"A State association may submit annually, two candidates for the American Farmer Degree for each 1,000 active members in the association or major fraction thereof computed on the basis of national dues received in the office of the National Treasurer by midnight of June 30. Each association in good standing shall be entitled to submit at least two American Farmer candidates."
