





## CHAPTER AWARD PROGRAM REPORT

The Kansas Association has continued to use the State Gold Emblem, the Superior, and the Standard Chapter Awards in recognizing the merit of local FFA chapter programs.

The Kansas Gold Emblem chapters were selected from the chapters that ranked in the Superior Division of the National Chapter Awards Program. Only ten percent of the State's chapters can receive the Gold Emblem Award. Each chapter which receives the Superior Award for the first time will receive a plaque from the National FFA Foundation. A chapter receiving either the Standard or Superior Award will receive a smaller plastic classification plate for attachment to their plaques. The Gold Emblem chapters receive a State certificate. Each chapter which receives the Gold Emblem Award for the first time will receive a plaque from the Sears-Ro-buck Foundation. A chapter receiving the Gold Emblem Award



after receiving the award earlier will receive a spur to be attached to the original plaque.

There was a total of 83 chapters who submitted reports of their chapter programs during the 1966-67 FFA year. The results of these National Emblem Award reports are as follows:



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#### GOLD EMBLEM PLAQUE AND SPUR CLARIFICATION DEPENDENT

In 1966, when the new Gold Emblem plan was put into effect, it was planned to present a plaque (Figure A) to the top ten percent chapters each year. This was done at the 1966 Convention. Later, it was concluded that some chapters might receive a plaque nearly every year, and plaques might become meaningless and take up too much space in vocational agriculture classrooms. Therefore, spurs were provided for chapters receiving the Gold Emblem classification in 1967 that had received the plaque in 1966. The spurs should be attached as shown in Figure B. The top two chapters in 1966 did not receive this type of plaque, but individual arrangements will be made with them at a later date.

Chapters receiving the Gold Emblem classification in 1967 but not in 1966 received the type of plaque in Figure C. This type of plaque should present no problem for adding spurs in the future.



## CO-OP ACTIVITIES AWARDS

The Kansas Cooperative Council has sponsored the Cooperative Activities Contest Awards for the seventh year in 1967. The chapter in each district which is judged to have had the best cooperative activity program receives a wall plaque and a \$50 cash award. Second place receives \$35, and third place \$15. The advisor of the top chapter in the State wins an all-expense paid trip to the National AIC Meeting. This year's AIC Meeting is to be held at Purdue University at Lafayette, Indiana. The State winner also enters the National Cooperative Activities Contest.

The following is a summary of the programs of the State Foundation Award Winners.

Mike Hahn of Altamont was declared the State FFA beef winner for 1967. Mike has carried out an extensive beef feeding project and fed out 234 cattle last year. He produced 63,000 pounds of beef. An automatic feeding system has been installed by he and his father, and their 600 cattle can be fed in less than one hour.


Mike not only has been active with his beef cattle project, but has been president of his local FFA chapter and has participated in land judging contests. He plans to enroll in college and major in animal husbandry.



Melvin Nolting of Effingham was declared the 1967 State FFA crops winner. Melvin had 166 acres of crops last year with an average yield of 92 bushels for milo, 36 bushels for wheat, and 34 bushels for soybeans. He is the third generation of his family to farm the 180-acre farm. Melvin uses fertilizers and insecticides to get his high yields.

#### Swine

David Altwegg of Randolph was declared the 1967 State FFA swine award winner. David has a herd of thirteen sows with an average litter size of 8.4 pigs. He produced 43,000 pounds of pork in 1967. He owns twenty-one hog feeders, six farrowing crates, and three hog houses. By crossbreeding and careful selection, he has increased efficiency in his hog enterprise. He plans to have fifty sows in the next two years.







Beef



Farm Mechanics

Alvin Hess of Burlington is the 1967 FFA Foundation farm mechanics award winner. Alvin owns a complete set of shop equipment, some of which he has built. In the home and school shop he has built a hay feeder, trailer, loading chute, sprayer, hog shade, and repaired numerous farm machines.

Alvin has been a member of district and State shop teams and has exhibited shop projects at both State fairs.

#### Home Improvement

Mike Nettingham of Effingham was declared the 1967 FFA home improvement winner. Mike owns considerable equipment and has been in charge of landscaping and keeping the yards of his family's home and that of his grandparents. He has seeded, landscaped, and cared for the yards. The rose garden and flower beds were planted and maintained by



Mike. Although Mike has cared for the yards of two homes, he has a large farming program of hogs, sheep, and grain sorghum.

#### Farm Forestry



Alan Gail Abram of Columbus is the 1967 farm forestry winner in the State FFA Foundation Program. Alan has planted 94 trees on his farm and maintained a large windbreak. He has transplanted native cedar trees in the farmstead windbreak. Alan also has pruned and removed trees in the farm woodlot.

#### Sheep


John Jones of Kingman was declared the 1967 FFA sheep production winner. John has a flock of 70 range ewes and produces fat lambs. He has been a district winner in the Sears Range Ewe Program. He has attained high efficiency by using up-to-date practices.



#### Ornamiental Horticulture

Jerry Longren of Manhattan is the winner of the Ornamental Horticulture Award this year. Jerry has worked 6,000 hours in a nursery and gained skills in every line of horticulture. He plans to attend college and become a landscape designer.





#### Poultry

Mark Finkeldei of Fowler is the 1967 FFA poultry winner. Mark had 1,700 turkeys and produced 21,000 pounds of turkey last year. He produced a pound of meat with four pounds of feed at a cost of eighteen cents a pound. Mark showed the grand champion bird in the youth division at the Wichita Turkey Show.


The tom weighed 35.5 pounds. Mark plans to get a better education and become a farmer.

#### Soil Conservation

Terrell Handke of Effingham is the 1967 FFA soil conservation winner. Handke farms with his father at Horton. The 1,185 acres they farm has been terraced and other soil conservation practices accomplished.



Terrell has established fifteen acres of waterways and built one farm pond, as well as supervised the construction of 34,000 feet of terraces. The conservation practices have increased production and made possible the farming of many additional acres.



#### Farm Electrification

Ed Bogner of Winfield is the 1967 FFA electrification winner. Ed has wired the family home as well as built several electrical gadgets for the farm shop. He has won numerous prizes for his electrical equipment at the State fair. He has been a member of the Winfield farm mechanics team that won first in the farm power and machinery contest.



Dairy

Gerald Wedel of Lawrence has been named the 1967 FFA dairy award winner. Gerald has a herd of seven dairy cows with an average production rate of 15, 300 pounds of milk and 552 pounds of butterfat. Gerald started in 1960 with a Holstein heifer. From this calf he has built his herd. In 1965 this cow produced 17,000 pounds of milk and 650 pounds of butterfat. Gerald uses approved practices in feeding, handling, and milking. He plans to become a dairyman.

### THE KANSAS FUTURE FARMER

This camp will help train, motivate, and inspire new chapter officers to carry out their duties and responsibilities. This activity will also assist candidates applying for State Farmer, American Farmer, State officer, and in Superior Chapter Awards. # Larry Goss--Garden City

Larry Goss, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dennis Goss of the Garden City community, is a 1964 graduate from Garden City Senior High School and was an active member of the Garden City FFA Chapter. Larry's program consists of twenty-five Holstein dairy cows, fifty market hogs, fifteen feeder pigs, twenty feeder calves, thirteen baby calves, twelve Angus cows, five Angus heifers, forty acres of irrigated milo, twenty acres of wheat, and eighty acres of dryland milo. The irrigated milo and corn, and the wheat ground is owned by Larry while the eighty acres of dryland milo is owned in a partnership. Larry's net worth on January 1 was \$36,137.

Larry has been very active in his local chapter's FFA activities, judging contests, and has shown livestock at numerous events. Larry has also attended Garden City Junior College where he has majored in agricultural subjects.

### NEW AGRIBUSINESS PROGRAM

Arkansas City Area Vocational-Technical School is endeavoring to do something for students interested in employment in the feed, seed, fertilizer, and agriculture chemical business, so states Harold Walker, chairman of the Agriculture Advisory Committee, Arkansas City. This is the first course of its kind approved in Kansas by the State Board for Vocational Education. Employment opportunities are excellent according to surveys run with employers in Kansas.

Vocational agriculture students and others interested in this field should not overlook the opportunity to profit from this training. The cooperation of vocational agriculture instructors in informing students of this course is essential. Vocational agriculture students need to be informed of this course, as they will probably make up 75 percent of the enrollment.

The tuition cost per year for Kansas students will be approximately \$135. A desirable aspect of the training program is employment experience. The opportunity to gain practical experience during the program allows the student to become aware of employment requirements, to personally discover the opportunities for permanent employment, to finalize his occupational goals, and to insure his educational level will offer satisfying and successful employment. Training stations will be franchised dealers, independent owner-operators, or company outlets that cooperate voluntarily to provide the needed experiences for the student.

Any student that may profit from this course may enroll.

An agriculture and a distributive education instructor will be employed to develop competencies in the students.

In order to insure quality in the program and to meet the needs of students in Kansas for employment, only one program is planned for the State. It is hoped that other area schools will offer other quality posthigh agribusiness programs in which we have definite need.

Election of officers for 1967-68 was held. Also Chapter Farmer Degrees were presented.

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
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### IN MEMORIAM
