## State Growth Second Greatest of 60s

TOPEKA — The growth rate for Kansas — and the nation — exceeded expectations during 1968, the sixth annual economic report of the governor said today.

The report was prepared by Dr. Jarvin Emerson, chief economist of the State Office of Economic Analysis, and was released by Gov. Robert Docking.

Emerson said the 1968 growth in Kansas personal income was the second largest in the last decade, with an eight per cent increase pushing the total state personal income above \$7.5 billion.

This compares with a 6.1 per cent growth in 1967.

"The major portion of the gain in personal income was a result of a more than nine per cent increase in wages and salaries," Emerson said.

"Property income and transfer payments were also substantially higher.

"Farm income and wage and salary payments in the aerospace industry had the most significant dampening effect on personal income growth. However, a resurgence in construction activity and an overall growth in employment in the state resulted in an income growth rate above average."

despite this, personal income did not grow as rapidly in Kansas as the nation, but was close to the average for the plains states.

Docking, summarizing the report's projection for this year, said: "The outlook for 1969 indicated a growth rate of personal income about equal to the average of the past decade. The forecasted 6.6 per cent rise in Kansas personal income would raise state income to about \$8 billion in 1969."

The report said net in-migration on population occurred for the second consecutive year, a reflection of employment increases.

Net in-migration means that the state's population grew more rapidly than the natural increase in population.

The report showed largest population increases were in the four largest counties of the state, Johnson, Leavenworth, Sedgwick, and Shawnee. The increase in Shawnee County was from 148,808 to 160,749.

On the other hand, 65 counties registered a decrease in population.

"This population redistribution phenomenon has been a long-run trend," the report said.

"The state's population is becoming increasingly concentrated in the populous counties.

"The three standard metropolitan statistical areas, Shawnee, Sedgwick-Butler, and Johnson-Wyandotte, contain more than 42 per cent of the state's population."

The report said total employment in Kansas increased more rapidly in 1968 than in 1967.

The employed civilian work force in 1968 was 844,000, an increase of 7800 over 1967.

Farm employment continued its persistent decline, and total manufacturing employment declined only moderately despite a sharp drop in employment in the aircraft industry.

Net farm income, which dropped more than eight per cent in 1967, stabilized in 1968 despite low wheat prices, the report said.

## Lowest Ever U.S. Birth Rate

Births in the United States totaled 3,470,000, the fewest since 1946. Marriages continued to rise, however, reaching 2,059,000 in 1968. These are provisional estimates just released by the National Center for Health Services and Mental Health Administration.

Although the number of birth in 1968 was 19 per cent below the record total in 1957, it was only a little more than 1 per cent lower than in 1967. This represents the smallest annual decline since 1963-64. The number of marriages in 1968 was the second highest on record and nearly 8 per cent higher than in 1967.

The 1968 birth rate of 17.4 births per 1,000 total population continues the decline from the 1957 peak of 25.3. It is the lowest rate ever observed in the United States.

The fertility rate — the number of births per 1,000 women in

the reproductive ages (15-44) — was 84.8 in 1968. Although the fertility rate has also been declining since 1957, it is still well above the rates of 76-79 during the period 1933-1939.

At the present time, women 15-44 years old constitute only 20 per cent of the entire population, as compared with 24 per cent in the 1930's. As a result of the decline in this proportion, the substantially higher fertility rate of today's women is only large enough to maintain the birth rate per 1,000 total population at a level that is somewhat lower than that of the 1930's.

Another factor in the current decline in the birth rate is a drop in the unusually high rates observed at the older childbearing ages (30 years of age and over) during the 1950's. These high rates were due to the making up of births postponed by couples who were in the early childbearing ages during the late 1930's and the early 1940's. Most of these couples are no longer having children. The couples who followed them are now having lower birth rates at the older childbearing ages because they tended to marry earlier and have their children sooner after marriage.

In addition, there has been a drop in the birth rates among younger couples. This trend is thought to be caused partly by a tendency toward wider spacing of births and partly by a decline in the total number of children wanted by younger couples.

ples. However, the causes of the decline have not yet been established with certainty.

Currently the number of young women is rising rapidly. In mid-1968 there were 14.3 million women at ages 20-29, where childbearing is most heavily concentrated. According to projections prepared by the United States Bureau of the Census, this number will rise to 15.5 million by 1970 and to 18.3 million by 1975. Unless age-specific birth rates fall well below their present levels, the projected changes in the number of women will tend to raise the number of births. But even though the decline in age-specific birth rates has slowed down, it has still been sufficient to more than offset the effects of the increasing numbers of young women thus far, and it is difficult to determine precisely when the decline in the annual number of births is likely to end.

The current "marriage-boom" is related to the high numbers of marriages and subsequent births of the immediate post-World War II period. As a result of that phenomenon, the number of youths moving increased rapidly. In the resident population of the United States there were 4.9 million more persons in the age group 15-19 in 1960, and 4.3 million more in the age group 20-24.

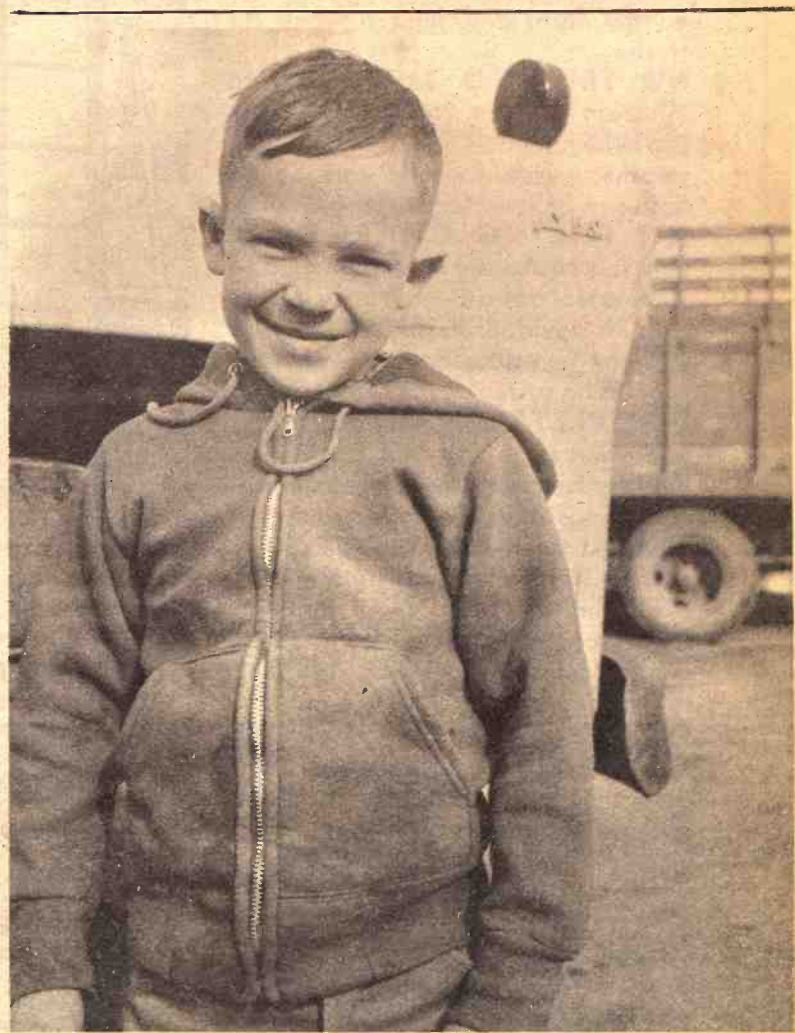

# Farm Lobby Punch Thru Coalition

The votes may not be down on the farm any longer, but the farm lobby still packs a powerful wallop on Capitol Hill.

How? By resorting to that old stand by in the political world: Coalition tactics.

With half as many farmers in

the United States as there were 30 years ago, the farmer's fate rests increasingly with urban members of Congress.

However, while farm groups know they must court the urban vote to promote rural interests, they're often poles apart on what those interests are.

The "farm bloc" is often no bloc at all. Its Washington lobby speaks with one voice at times; more frequently it speaks with several. Bitter ideological differences and diverse memberships split the three national farm organizations.

The way they've met problems created for their members

by the nation's move to the city, compounded by rifts in their own ranks, offers an object lesson in the workings of representative government.

Their method: to ally with nonfarm forces as fluctuating circumstances dictate. The differing philosophies of government of the farm organizations themselves, give lawmakers from the cities a lever in return.

Even when many of the rural interests team up on an issue, they may find themselves at odds with the largest farm group of all — the American Farm Bureau federation.

This frequent alignment of farm forces stems from — and points up — a basic factor in the farm picture: The existence of conflicting views on the proper role of government in the market place.

The controversy finds the three national farm groups far apart on a central issue they face: How to insure an adequate income for the farmer while modern rural abundance tends constantly to push farm prices and incomes downward.

Nor is the farmer, often heavily invested in equipment and land, invulnerable to rising costs and falling purchasing power in a period of inflation. Here, too, the views differ sharply as to solutions.

"Occasionally we come out on the same side of an issue, but it's generally for the wrong reasons," says one farm group spokesman.

A look at the major groups which speak in Washington for various sectors of the declining rural populace suggests reasoning behind their reliance on coalition strategy, with an eye al-

ways on the urban factions.

The big three are the Farm Bureau, the National Farmers Union and the National Grange. Besides those, there are commodity groups, co-operatives and trade associations. Memberships can overlap and often do. The farm groups represents varying producers and rural townspeople, who also rely on agriculture for their livelihoods.

The Farm Bureau strives for an eventual return to a free market for agriculture, without government price supports or production controls. The Farmers Union and the Grange, on the other hand, have said price supports must be maintained to prevent more "family farmers" from being driven from the farm by low income.

In practice, this philosophical divergence and its extension into various farm issues has placed the Grange and Farmers Union on one side of many issues, with the Farm Bureau on the other.

The groups frequently find themselves more closely attuned to the positions of nonfarm factions holding political outlooks to their liking than they do to one another.

This provides a major impetus toward coalitions before Congress and the nation.

The trend is enhanced by the exodus from rural America. As the rural population has declined, so has the number of representatives from the farm areas. One Capitol Hill source says the House has just 47 members from congressional districts containing a farm population of 20 per cent or more, compared with 250 in 1920.

These conditions have farm groups trading support with their city brethren on such issues as labor measures in exchange for backing on agricul-

tural questions. A notable instance was an alliance between farm state Democrats and city Democrats in 1965. Urban members reportedly voted for an omnibus farm bill involving varied price supports in return for support by rural members on proposed repeal of section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley act, which permits states to enact "right-to-work" laws, banning the union shop.

A recent Farmers union analysis of votes in the House on four major farm bills showed that from 76.5 to 91.4 per cent of Democratic nonfarm members supported the Farmers Union's position.

While the Grange and the Farmers Union have been particularly active in putting together coalitions, both farm and nonfarm, the Farm Bureau contends it has been successful over the years in putting together the votes of Southern Democrats and Mid-Western Republicans.

The prospects are that, with all concerned keenly aware of the diminishing numbers of farmers, the farm lobbies will look more and more to urban delegations for mutual support on key issues.

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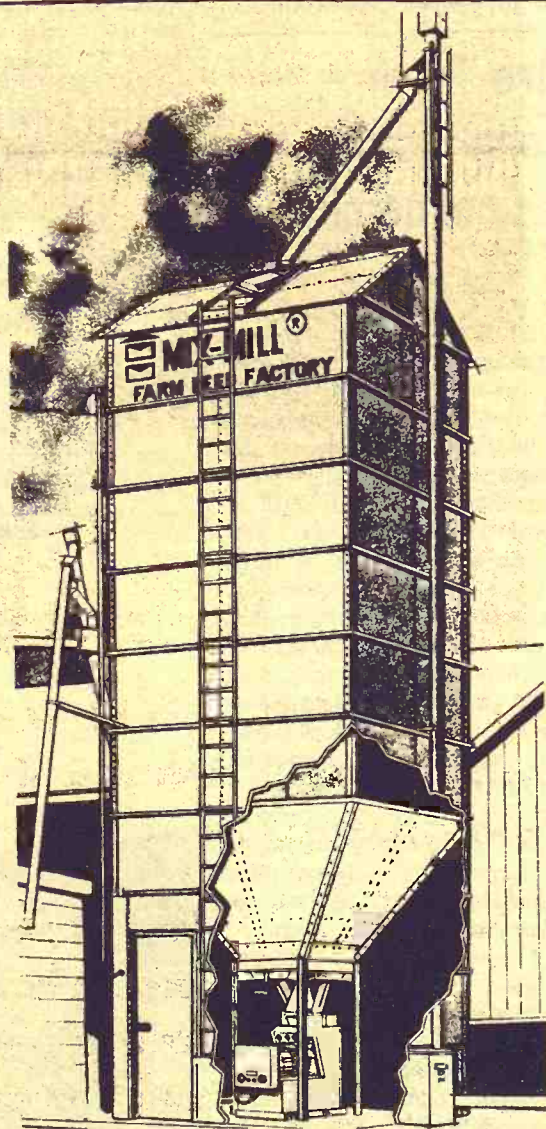


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## Viruses May 'Smolder' For Years

Government scientists have reported a breakthrough in virus research may shed some light on the causes of a wide variety of ills, ranging from some forms of cancer to maladies like multiple sclerosis and Parkinson's disease.

The breakthrough suggests, they reported, that a host of still-unsolved maladies may be due to "smoldering" viruses left over from some common infection early in life, such as measles.

The development was reported by scientists of the National Institutes of Health. I concerned the isolation — after almost four years of research — of a virus suspected to be the cause of a rare and mysterious brain disease that annually strikes between 100 and 200 Americans.



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of high school or early age, always fatally.

The virus, isolated from brain tissue of a youthful victim, turned out to be identical with the virus long known to cause common measles. At least it proved to be identical by every known laboratory test, the researchers said, adding that it could be a measles virus that had changed to a new strain within the body.

"For all practical purposes, it is the same as the common measles virus," Dr. John L. Sever, of the National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Stroke, told a news conference.

He and his colleagues explained the significance this way:

The finding means that the rare brain disease — called subacute sclerosing panencephalitis, or SSPE for short — is apparently caused in certain people by a slowly acting virus left over from a cured measles infection of long ago. Somehow, the smoldering virus producing SSPE gets into the brain, whereas the measles virus very rarely does.

Dr. Wolfgang Zeman of Indiana University Medical Center, who reported confirming much of the NIH work independently, said the development apparently represents first evidence of the existence of at least one "slow-virus" infection in man.

Dr. Sever said work will now be pushed intensively on the theory that other strange diseases of the central nervous system may be caused by other types of smoldering viruses.

## NFO Claims Gains For Potato Growers

The National Farmers Organization is claiming some major success in negotiating contracts for potato growers and raising the price from the 1967 to the 1968 crop.

The NFO in the current edition of its monthly newspaper, The Reporter, claimed a "fantastic potato price breakthrough." It said "at least 25 potato contracts were signed and filled by NFO members with their 1968 potato crop. As a result of NFO collective bargaining efforts, potatoes that sold for \$1.75 a hundredweight in 1967 realized net returns to farmers of up to \$4.50 per hundredweight by crop year-end 1968.

the antiballistic missile system (ABM). The Kansas Senator voted for the bill to establish the system last year.

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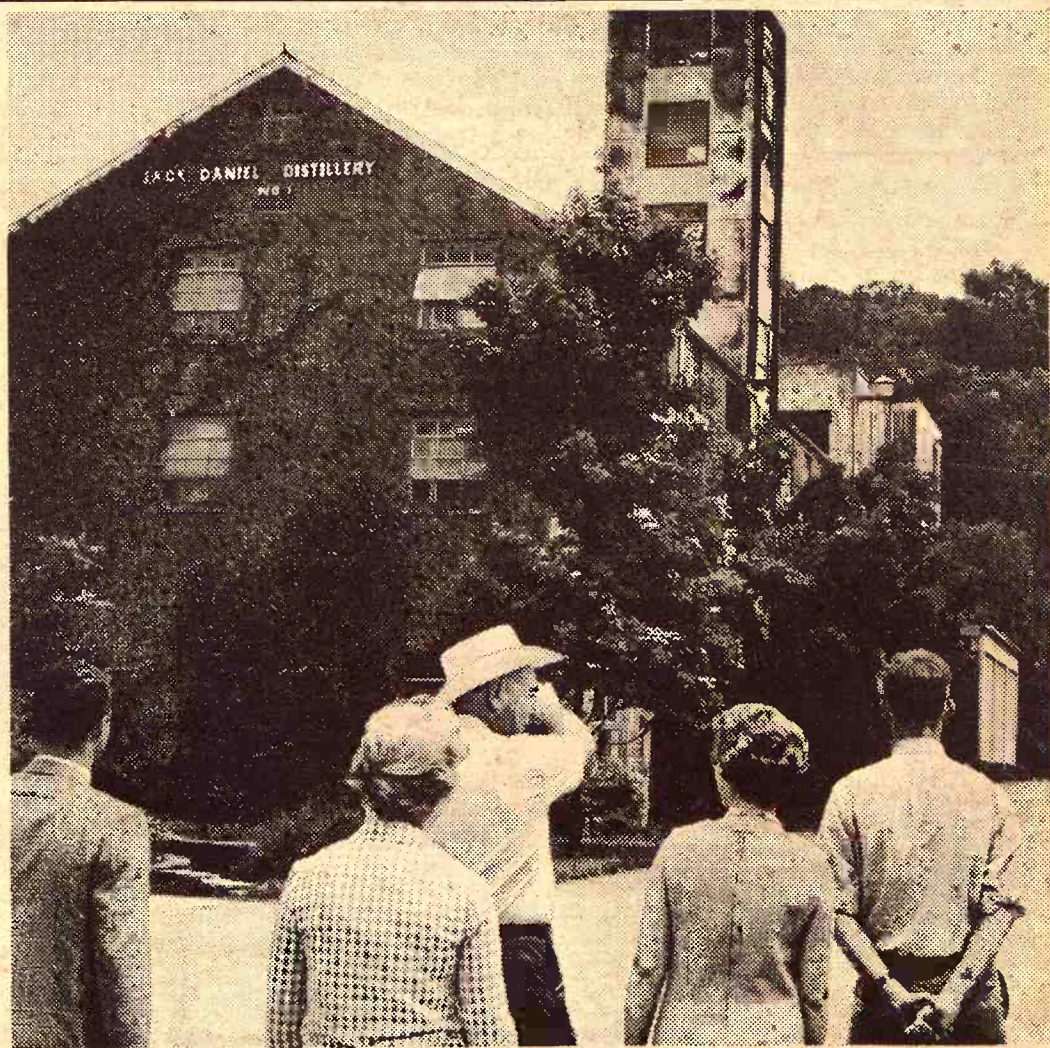
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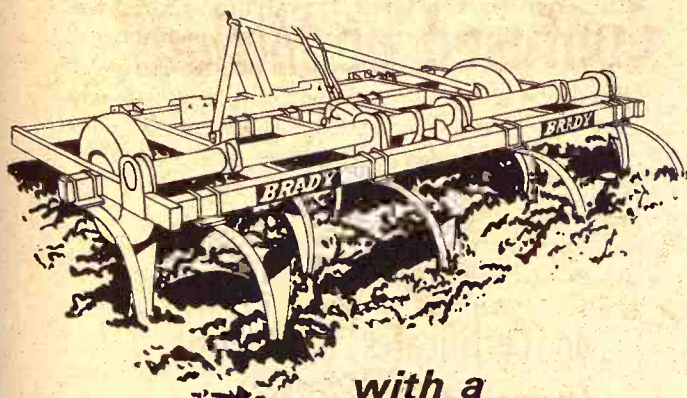


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## Expect Slow Change In Farm Program

In recent years many farmers have been hoping for a new farm program to boost farm prices and income. Interest in this subject has increased lately because there is a new administration in Washington.

Of course, we don't know what changes, if any, will be made. There are, however, good reasons for expecting small changes in farm programs, but not large ones.

Why small changes? This is the pattern that has been followed for the past 30 years. We have had new farm legislation every few years since 1929. Despite many new features, present farm programs are much like those worked out during the 1930's.

There are other reasons for expecting no drastic changes in farm legislation. Let's consider some of them:

1. It is Congress, not the President or the Secretary of Agriculture, that passes farm bills. This Congress, controlled by a

party that is in opposition to the President, is not greatly different from those of the past several years. Recent Congresses have been willing to maintain appropriations for agriculture, but not to increase them.

2. The "farm problem" no longer ranks high as a public concern. Our citizens are concerned about the war in Vietnam, violence and crime in the cities, anarchy in the schools and universities, and pollution of the air and water. There is some talk about "rural poverty," but those referred to are the ex-sharecroppers of the the south and the poor people in the Appalachian Mountains. Our citizens are also concerned about "high" taxes.

3. Most of our people are also concerned about rising costs — inflation. They are more concerned about the constant rise in prices than about the cost-price squeeze on farmers. Remember when housewives in many cities picketed their food

stores.

4. Many members of Congress and other government officials know that "commodity" programs — those concerning corn, soybeans, wheat, cotton, etc. — help the big operators most, and do little to aid the small farmers.

5. Farmer's interests are more divided than ever before. The general farmers have been replaced by specialists who produce only one or two major products for sale. Legislation to help one group would not help other farmers, and could even be injurious.

6. Farmers and political leaders have widely differing views concerning what, if anything, should be done to help farmers. Some would stop all, or most, production-control and price-support programs. Other farmers want more rigid controls and higher supports. Between these extremes are supporters for dozens of different proposals.

Considering the economic, social, and political problems that now beset our citizens and the members of Congress, it is not likely that there will be any drastic changes in farm programs. Changes seem likely to be as they have been in the past — slow and gradual, not abrupt or revolutionary.

1 8-ounce package of broad noodles  
2 cups of cooked chopped bits of ham  
1 tablespoon of pimiento  
1 egg beaten  
3 tablespoons of butter or margarine  
1 1-pound 4-ounce can of cream style corn  
1 1/2 cups of potato chips or corn flakes  
1 cup of diced process cheese

Cook noodles, according to package directions. Combine ham, beaten egg, butter and chopped pimiento, add corn, noodles, cheese. Spoon into casserole and add potato chips or corn flakes. Bake in 350-degree oven 50 minutes. Makes six generous servings.

in large mixer bowl. Add

## Tartar Sauce Is Ideal Complement For Fried Fish



We can thank the French for the invention of Tartar sauce — the mayonnaise-based sauce that is nearly always served with fish and is ideal with this marinated Pan Fried Fish.

### MARINATED PAN FRIED FISH

1/2 cup corn oil  
1/2 cup tarragon vinegar  
1 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1/2 teaspoon pepper  
bay leaf  
(1-pound) package frozen fish fillets  
Flour

Mix together 1/2 cup corn oil, vinegar, salt, Worcestershire sauce, pepper and bay leaf in shallow dish. Add frozen block of fish. Cover and refrigerate, turning frequently, until fish is thawed, 5-6 hours. Remove from marinade. Cut into serving pieces. Dip into flour, coating evenly. Heat 1/2 cup oil in medium skillet. Fry fish in hot oil over medium heat, turning once, until lightly browned and easily flaked with fork, 4-5 minutes on each side. Drain on absorbent paper. Serve with a bottled tartar sauce. Makes four servings.

## Soil Must Be Well Prepared Before Planting

Before you even think of planting seeds, think of preparing the soil to receive them. This involves first turning it over with a spade or spading fork. Then the clods of soil are broken by hitting them with the back of a rake.

Finally, the smaller chunks that result are reduced in size by the rake's tines. Back and forth you rake, as you do so, the soil particles become ever more nearly the size of the seeds you are going to sow.

That and loosening the soil so the roots can grow are the chief reasons for soil preparation. A third is in the final leveling, also done with the tines, that means on high spots to dry out, no low one in which water can settle.

Seeds are not very large, in fact some of them, like those of

petunias, are fine as dust. These little bits of life cannot be expected to sprout until they have moisture. That comes from the soil, the tiny particles which closely contact the seeds.

## Heated Mat Aids In Starting Seeds

Bottom heat, so necessary for quick starting of certain seeds, is newly available in form of an electrically heated mat, resembling a heating pad, but sturdier in construction; tougher in covering.

It is used under pots, flats or

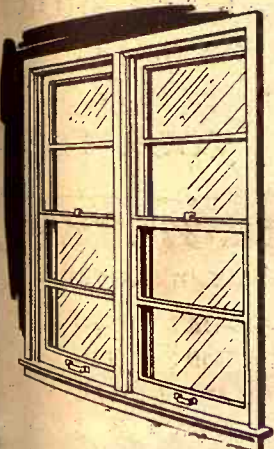

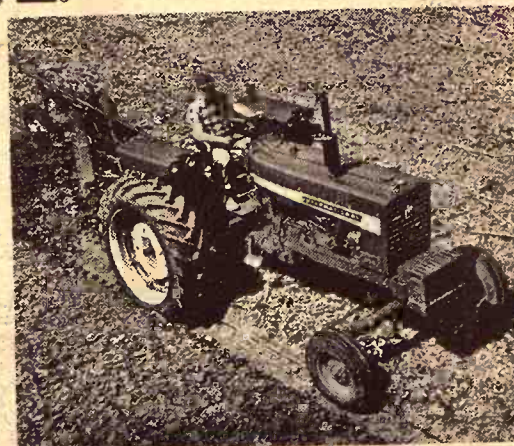

## Dig A Deep Hole, Plant A Tree

Warm spring days always start an itch in a homeowner's green thumb so he has to start digging. When this happens to you this spring, dig the hole deep and plant a tree, advises James J. Nighswonger, Extension landscape architect at Kansas State University.

Winter ice, wind, or storms may have damaged some trees to the point they must be replaced. Or you might need to add some new trees for shade, enframement, or background.

Whatever the reason for planting trees, be sure to select the right species — ones that are adapted to Kansas conditions.

You may have lost a Chinese or Siberian elm from ice or wind this winter. Replace this "short-lived" specie with a better tree variety. There are several available trees that are more durably wooded, longer lived, and deeper rooted than the elm. Some will also grow nearly as fast.

One of the best trees for Kansas is the hybrid locust. There are several varieties of this tree on the market. The better ones include Moraine, Skyline, and Shademaster locust.

These varieties are thornless and podless, very fast growing, strongly branched, and very clean trees. The hybrid locust is adapted statewide and makes an excellent tree for shade, enframement, or background.

Another excellent tree for the eastern two-thirds of Kansas is the American sycamore. This is a very large specie and rapid growing. It, too, is durably branched and makes an excellent large tree for shade, enframement, or background. Due to its very large ultimate size, it is best suited to farmsteads, large suburban sites, and near public or commercial buildings.

Its main disadvantage is its untidy character. The ground beneath is frequently littered with pieces of bark, seed balls, and large leaves. However, the tree is easy to grow and relatively free of harmful pests and diseases.

London plane tree is a hybrid sycamore. It is also an excellent choice for shade.

Another good specie, adapted statewide, is hackberry. This tree is medium in growth rate, strongly branched, very hardy, and easy to grow. The bark is

interesting to view as it has an unusual texture. Hackberry is shallow rooted, making it difficult to grow a dense lawn beneath, but this is its greatest disadvantage.

Homeowners should not overlook pecan as a tree for landscape usage. Pecan is medium in growth rate and has a very good form for shade production. It, too, is a strongly branched

tree and usually easy to grow. Pecan should be irrigated regularly in dryer areas of the state.

There is no "ideal" tree for Kansas. Any specie can have its

faults. However, when weighing advantages and disadvantages of many species, the four or five are probably best suited for landscape use in the state.

# Grange Builds On Lake

The Kansas Grange Organization has announced the signing of a construction contract for a \$150,000 headquarters and youth camp building complex at its 17-acre site on the west bank of Perry Reservoir.

Trojan Construction Co. of Topeka was awarded the contract for a 60 by 100-foot state headquarters building and the two 42-person capacity camp dormitories which will flank it.

Kansas Grange Master James W. Ingwerson said completion is estimated in mid-July.

The site, bordering federally-owned land around the reservoir, is five miles east of Meriden.

den. It was given to the Grange in 1964 by the late Claude Brey, a longtime officer of the organization in Ozawie.

The land has been used for a camp site since it was deeded to the Grange.

The headquarters building will house offices for organization officers and staff, a record storage vault, living quarters for a building and camping manager, reception and work rooms, kitchen and a 150-person capacity dining room which will overlook the main body of the lake.

The facilities will be used by Grange administrators as of-

fices and for record storage, officer training programs, youth camps and conferences and Junior Grange Summer Camp.

Eventually, use will be expanded to include picknicking, camping and recreational areas in addition to the headquarters and conference center.

Leasing of the camping facilities at the center to other organizations and groups is planned when such use does not conflict with Grange programs.

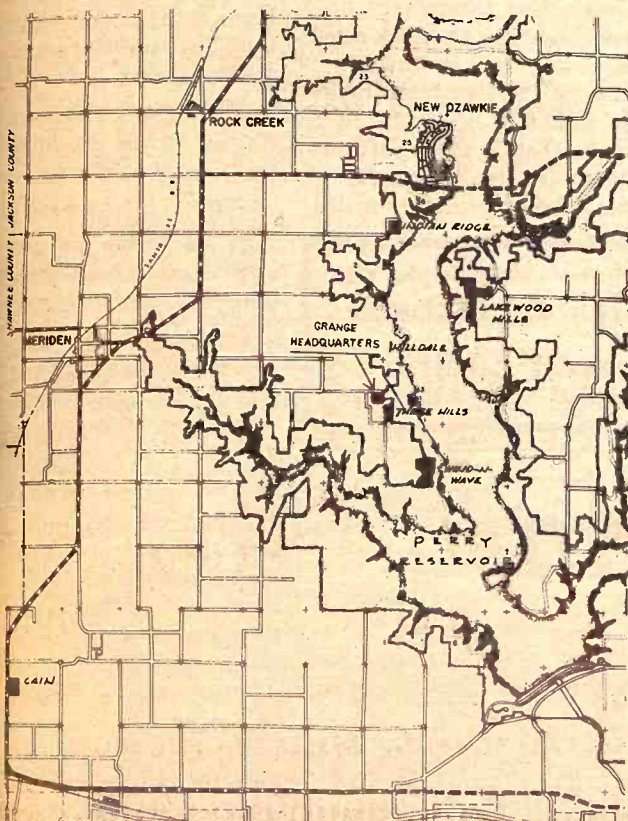

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## 'Fantastic Livestock Potential,' Says Governor

Kansas has "fantastic" potential in the livestock industry because of its geographic location and natural resources, Gov. Robert Docking said in Wichita last week.

In remarks prepared for delivery to a session of the Kansas Livestock Convention, Docking said:

"Population pressures moving in from the east and west coasts are taking land out of production in vast areas of our nation.

"That places greater emphasis on the productive capacity and the productive talents of this fertile midwestern food belt."

"Our potential is fantastic," he added.

Docking praised the livestock men as being "well informed, aggressive, hardworking and

sincere."

These factors, he said, have given the state "one of the top beef production programs of any state in the nation," and made the industry in the state "a rapidly-growing, ever-changing industry."

The swine industry in Kansas, Docking said, "has not reached its potential.

"Stockmen of Kansas perhaps are not so well known in hog production as are stockmen of Iowa, Illinois, or Indiana. The picture in regard to swine, however, is changing rapidly."

Docking told his audience the vast areas of land not used for crop production assure a strong livestock industry in the United States.

"Much of the livestock industry of Kansas," he said, "is unique in that it uses portions of our land that otherwise might not be so profitably utilized."

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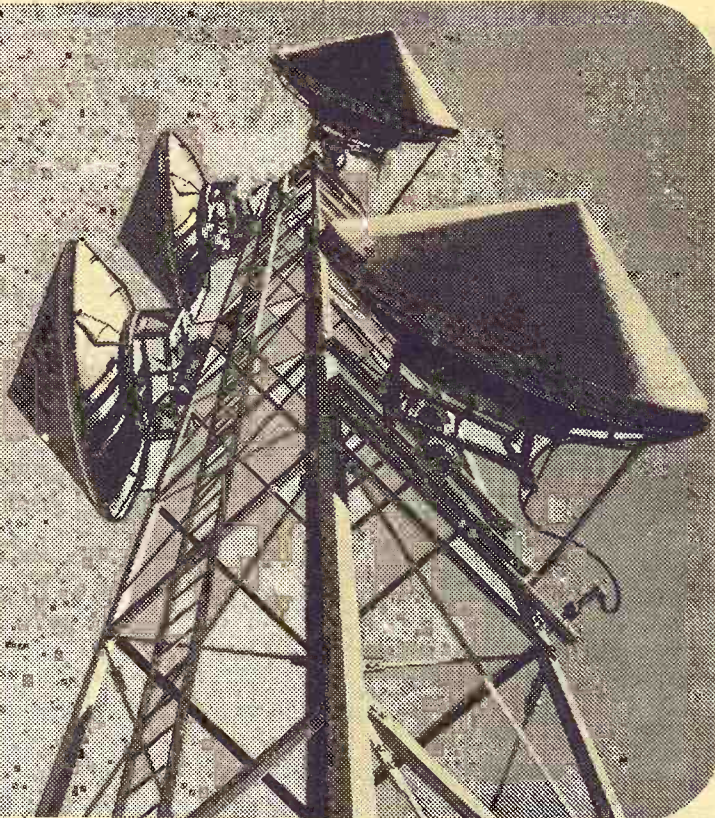
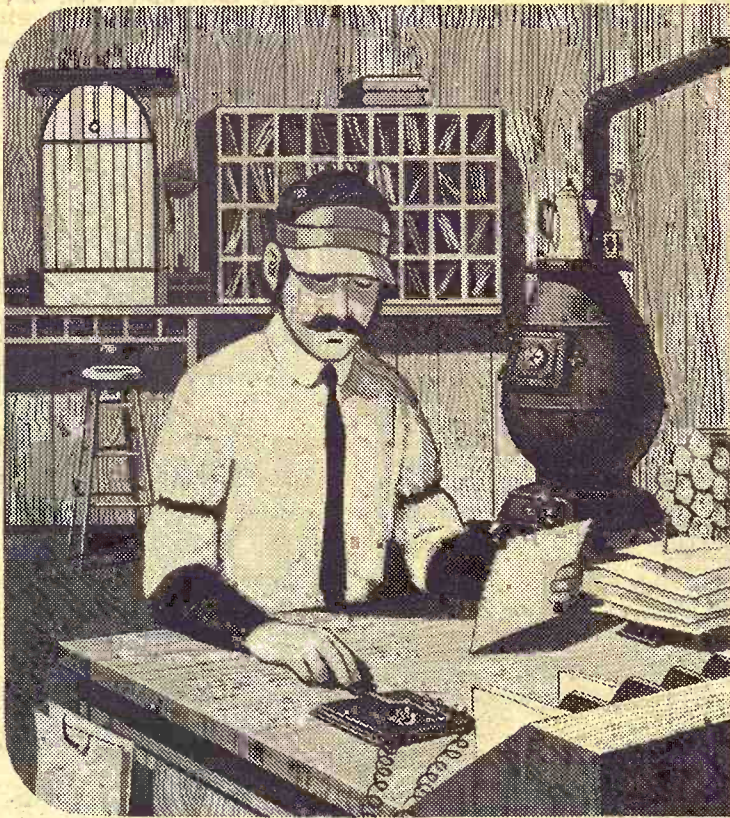
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The livestock industry in Kansas, Docking said, generates \$1 billion in the state's economy every year.

The number of cattle in Kansas totaled 5.6 million head in January this year, Docking said.

"There now are 766,000 cattle on grain feed in Kansas, nearly four times the number of 10 years ago. The value of all Kansas cattle and calves is more than \$812 million, an increase of seven percent over 1968."

There are 1.7 million hogs on Kansas farms, Docking said, an increase of 11 percent over 1968.

"The value of all hogs and pigs on farms in the state approximately \$50 million, 22 percent above a year ago."

Kansas' meat-packing industry is valued at \$555 million annually, the governor said, with more than 7000 persons employed.

"The volume of Kansas meat packing has increased 40 percent the past seven years, raising Kansas from 12th to 9th among the states.

"But this is only the beginning," Docking promised. "We are told that new plants and new additions to old plants now under construction will expand the Kansas red meat industry by an additional 50 per cent, bringing the value of the industry to considerably more than \$800 million a year."

The two-day convention, the association's 56th, concluded Friday afternoon with committee reports and election of officers and directors.

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# No Rush On Bluestem Leasing

Pasture leasing in the Kansas bluestem country is proceeding rather slowly this year under rather unusual conditions.

The pastures should be in almost perfect conditions when the grass greens and the grazing season starts late in April or early in May. Little streams and springs are running and the ponds are full. There's been enough snow this winter to put some nitrogen into the top soil. Lots of moisture plus the nitrogen suggests a quick start for the grass.

And prices on cattle are relatively high.

The situation could suggest a rush to lease the grassland for the summer.

The trouble is, prices are just a little too high according to Wayne Rogler, Matfield Green, who has had long experience in handling bluestem pasture land.

Feeder cattle prices and interest rates are so high that cattlemen who usually lease pastures are being cautious, Rogler explained. One reason the prices are high is that the commercial feedlots as well as the pasturemen are bidding for the feeder cattle.

Normally it is cheaper to put gains on cattle on grass than in the feedlots, but the spread isn't as wide this year, Rogler said. It must be considered that the cattle have to be moved from ranches to the bluestem pastures and then from these pastures to the feedlots this fall. Cattle don't go from pastures to slaughter as they once did.

Rogler said the leases he knows about this spring have been made at a rate of \$6 an acre, with four acres allotted to each yearling steer. This price is about the same as it has been the last two years.

Don Stephens, Hoxie, said pasture leasing was slow in his area too, which is short grass country. He listed the same reasons as Rogler. The short grass is being leased at \$4 an acre with six acres to the head.

Both Rogler and Stephens believe most of the pastures will be leased by the time the grazing season starts. There have been slow years before, they explained, and the situation usually results in some dickering before grazing contracts are signed.

Hundreds of thousands of acres of Kansas grassland are leased each summer for cattle grazing, but the business isn't as large as it once was because more cow herds are maintained in the state than ever before. Thus Kansas ranchers utilize more of the pasture land with their own herds.

## How To Raise Farm Exports? USDA Asked

Farmers who have visited Washington since the Nixon administration took office in January seem to have at least one question in common: How can the United States boost farm exports?

"They may want to know about wheat or cotton, depending on where they're from," an Agricultural Department official said, "but they all seem to want to know about exports."

Hundreds of farmers, mostly members of major organizations, have met with depart-

ment officials in recent weeks, listening to high-level views on various programs, ranging from food for the hungry to dairy price supports.

Spokesmen for the three major general farm organizations — American Farm Bureau, National Farmers Union and National Grange — collectively estimate up to 2500 of their members visit Washington annually.

Not all meet with Agriculture Department officials, but a large percentage do, and most apparently visit home-state congressmen and senators on Capitol Hill.

Organization spokesmen say most arrangements for meetings are done in advance of a delegation's appearance to help guarantee constructive visits during the tour, which usually

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is longer than three days.

The ground rules vary. Some groups are given full freedom to arrange individual schedules. Others are tightly supervised to provide fullest exposure to Washington officialdom.

The growing interest in farm exports has a sensitive ear with the agriculture Department and farm legislators.

Some farm leaders say exports can be expanded to \$10 billion annually, but at present they have slid to around \$6 billion from a peak of \$6.8 billion two years ago.

# Feed Grain Planting To Be Largest Since '64

March 1 planting intentions for the 1969 spring crops in Kansas show sizeable acreage increases from 1968 for corn, sugar beets and barley, no change in sorghum, soybean and hay acreages, but a slight decline in oats and dry bean plantings, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Prospective corn plantings were up 9 percent, sugar beets up 17 percent and barley up 50 percent from last year.

Farmers expect to plant the same sorghum and soybean acreage but reduce oats and dry bean plantings slightly.

The acreage of all hay expected to be cut in 1969 should equal that a year earlier.

Last fall's seeded wheat acreage was down 9 per cent from a year earlier.

Combined acreage of all crops grown, including spring plantings and expected harvest of hay and fall seeded grains, is expected to total 19.5 million acres in 1969, about the same as last year.

During the preceding decade, Kansas total crop acreage has ranged from 19.4 to 22.2 million

acres.

Government farm program signups were still in progress during the March survey, but all programs are expected to idle about 4.6 million acres this year compared to 3.1 million last year.

The 1969 expected plantings of feed grains — sorghums, corn, barley and oats — in Kansas of 6,454,000 acres, if realized, will be 3 percent above last year and the largest since 1964.

Sorghum plantings for all purposes are expected to be the same as last year's 4,468,000 acres, with smaller plantings in western Kansas offset by increases elsewhere in the state.

Intended corn plantings of 1,578,000 acres are 9 percent more than in 1968 and largest in half a dozen years. The increase reflects continued expansion in western irrigated areas and some increase in northeast Kansas.

Prospective acreage of barley, including that sown last fall plus intended spring seedings, was 188,000 acres, 50 percent above last year and the largest in 3 years, but is still only about one-fifth of the acreage

planted in the early 1960's.

The intended oats seeding of 220,000 acres is 1 percent less than last year and continues the very low level of the past several years.

Farmers' intentions on soybeans, projected before the recent announcement of lower support prices, were for an acreage equal to last year's record high plantings of 973,000 acres.

Prospective sugar beet plantings of 48,000 acres represent a new record large acreage and an increase of 17 percent from a year earlier.

Dry beans are expected to be planted on 17,000 acres compared with 19,000 acres last year.

The expected 1969 potato plantings of 1300 acres are down a little from a year ago and sweet potatoes at 1000 acres are unchanged. Total acreage of all hay intended to be cut by Kansas farmers and ranchers in 1969 is unchanged from the 2,419,000 acres cut in 1968.

Early seeding of spring planted small grains has lagged considerably behind usual this year as wet, muddy field conditions delayed seedbed preparation and planting. By March 8, only 2 percent of the expected oats acreage was sown compared with 22 percent on the same date last year.

Spring barley seeding was only 1 percent finished on March 8, compared with 5 percent last year.

Pre-season seedbed preparations for later planted spring crops was also well behind schedule.

Fall sown grain crops were seeded about the usual time and generally got a good start except in a dozen or so extreme western counties where lack of moisture curtailed development and in southeast Kansas where excess moisture created problems.

In most of the state fall sown crops came through the winter in good condition, although some local winterkill of barley and wheat was reported, mainly from dry western areas.

Late February and early March snows increased surface moisture supplies in these dry western areas and bolstered crop prospects. Soil blowing and insect damage to fall sown

crops has been light to date. Farmers are generally quite optimistic on the crop outlook but are "champing at the bit" to get into fields as soon as snow goes off and soils dry sufficiently.

## United States

Planting intentions of the Nation's farmers for the 17 crops included in the March 1 survey totaled 254 million acres compared with 253 million last year.

Expected feed grain acreage was down slightly, with small decreases in sorghums and corn but slight increases in oats and barley.

Food grain acreage was down 12 percent, reflecting lowered wheat allotments.

Intended acres of soybeans were up 3 percent from a year earlier and there was a substantial increase expected for sugar beets.

Hay acreage to be harvested appeared closely in line with last year.

## Meat Trade Up On Both Sides Of Ledger

Both U.S. exports and imports of most categories of livestock and meat products in 1968 were above year-earlier levels, according to the USDA Foreign Agricultural Service.

However, the total value of U.S. exports of all livestock and meat products fell from \$459.9 million to \$427.3 million, 7 percent below the 1967 level. Larger world supplies forced prices down for many categories of livestock products in 1968.

U.S. livestock and meat product imports were below last year's level for the month of December, but 1968 imports were up substantially. Total red meat imports for 1968 were up 12 percent from last year. Beef and veal accounted for most of the increase, but beef cattle prices remain well above year-earlier levels.

In response to the strong demand for replacement animals, live cattle imports — primarily feeder cattle — totaled 1,039,150 head in 1968, up 38 percent from 1967, FAS reports.

Total U.S. red meat exports in December were more than double the level recorded in December 1967, bringing 1968 exports up 31 percent from last

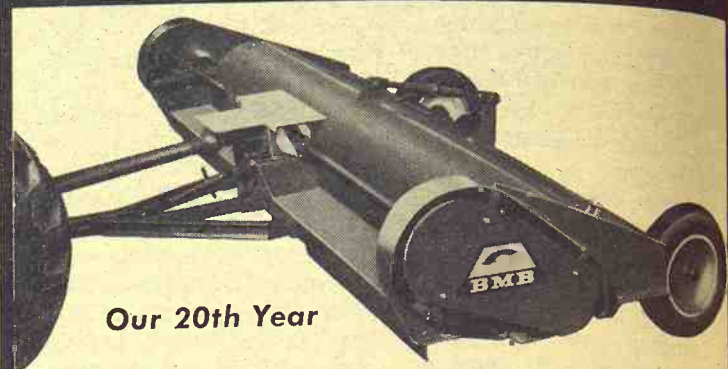
year. The value of U.S. red meat exports rose from \$47.7 million in 1967 to \$61.9 million in 1968 — an increase of nearly 30 percent.

U.S. exports of tallow, hides

and skins, and variety meats were up in 1968. However, the value of all these products was below the 1967 level. Sales of U.S. breeding cattle were off slightly in 1968, FAS concluded.

### K-Staters Suggest Tips On Landscaping

MANHATTAN — There is still time from now through early May for Kansas homeowners to add ornamental plants to their landscapes.

Almost anyone who buys good quality plants and follows these eight planting and care suggestions can develop a "green thumb," promises Larry L. Leuthold, Extension ornamental horticulturist at Kansas State University.

1. Plant when the soil isn't too wet. Container or balled and burlaped plants can go out anytime — even during the

summer.

2. Dig holes half again as deep and half again as wide in order to accommodate the ball of soil around the roots of the plants.

Set your plant the same depth it



grew originally. Shallow-rooted plants are exceptions. Plant them slightly more shallow to allow for setting.

3. Water thoroughly. Shape the soil to make a saucer-shaped area around the plant. Water thoroughly once every 10 days to 2 weeks during dry weather.

4. Prune back the plant, often as much as one-third to one-half. Roots lost in digging should be balanced by removing some of the top.

5. Do not fertilize the first year after planting, since roots should be well established before fertilizing.

6) Mulch to conserve moisture, to prevent soil from packing, and to help control grass and weeds.

7. Stake trees that are more than 5 feet high. Use a wire threaded through a garden hose or soft cord to tie your tree to the stake.

8. Wrap the trunk if trees are more than about 6 feet high. This gives some protection from the sun and borers. Use burlap strips or special waterproof pa

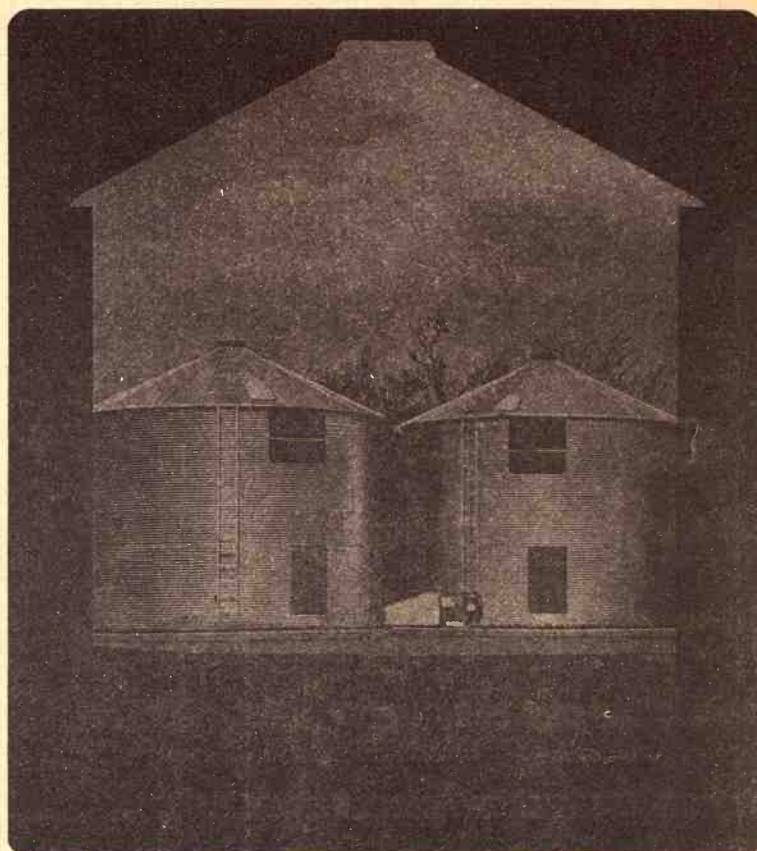

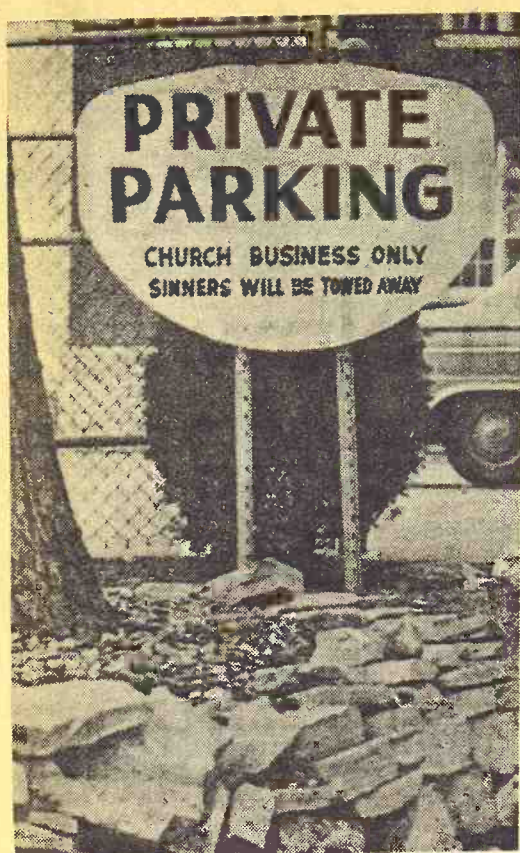

## Tougher Test For Drunkenness?

Passage of a bill before the Kansas Legislature could mean two drinks less in a night on the town for the average motorist.

The bill (SB 347) would lower from 0.15 to 0.10 per cent by weight the amount of alcohol that can be in a person's blood before he is considered intoxicated.

The 0.15 per cent reading is used by Kansas police court judges in assuming intoxication or drunken driving.

Under the proposed bill, a 180-pound person would be considered intoxicated after five one-ounce drinks of 100 proof liquor. In comparison, a 180-pound person can down seven drinks under the existing law and still register 0.146, slightly below the intoxication level.

Dr. B. L. Glendening, chief chemist for the Kansas State Board of Health, said an 0.15 per cent alcohol level impairs a person's ability to operate a motor car. The National Safety Council and American Medical Association suggest the one-tenth of a per cent be applied to determine intoxication.

"Really," Dr. Glendening said, "when a person tests out at 0.15 per cent, he's fairly plastered. He should not be driving anything."

Glendening said it takes about 10 hours to burn up alcohol in a person with an 0.15 reading. Based upon the normal .015 dissipation, two hours is required before a person can drop from an 0.15 to one tenth of one per cent level.

Lowering the level is not unique, Col. Allan Rush, assistant superintendent of the Kansas highway patrol, said nearly half the states use a one-tenth of one per cent standard. In addition, Canada, Great Britain and the Scandinavian nations use an 0.08 law, harsh by U.S. measures.

Objections to a year-round experimental school program were voiced by parents at a Board of Education meeting as they presented petitions signed by 924 persons against the program.

Under a plan being studied, students would go to school for four quarters, then have one quarter vacation.

Larry Wolf, a parent opposed to the program, said that Bryce Stallard, superintendent, asked him if he would serve on a citizens committee to evaluate a revised survey after its distribution.

A survey to get community reaction to a year-round school plan is being financed under a grant from the Kansas Department of Education.

"This is the age-old way of

our administration," Wolf said, "that if a person opposes some action, the administration simply consumes him by appointing him to a job, then making it look like he's working for them."

However, Wolf said he would work on the committee.

The threat of a growing enrollment and costly school taxes led the district to consider the 12-month school idea, Stallard said.

Richard Studer, board vice-president, told the patrons that the board is "only committed to a survey. This is a preliminary study. We're a long way from implementing any such project," Stallard said later "no board member has endorsed the year-round school. Most teachers are opposed."

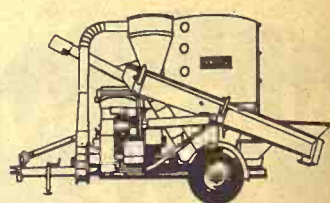

## 36 Years From Bank Holiday

I will recall 36 years ago yesterday and today, March 11 & 12, 1933 that President Roosevelt closed the banks of the United States. Also on these dates, March 11-12, 1933, I, with my two brothers and five other musicians played in a Czech Brass Band and had an appointment to play over the radio station KGBZ, York, Nebr., and KMMJ, Clay Center, Nebraska.

The eight of us made this trip to Nebraska with about \$10 each to our names. It was 450 miles round trip. We stayed two nights and came home the third day with some money left. We made this trip to forget what was going on. I remember receiving 50c to \$2.00 a night each playing for Czech dances. I could not buy a job if you wanted to. We just played to pass the time and to forget our troubles. What we could not

buy and pay for we just did without — period. I will recall that my father bought some Registered Hereford cows with calves at side in September 1929 for \$100 each and borrowed the money. It wasn't too long the bottom fell out of everything. In the spring of 1933 the drouth came and in June my father was forced to sell those same cows for \$35 each with calves at side. He did not lose any land but we worked ten years for nothing and learned a hell of a good lesson.

Today, March 12, 1969, we are in financial trouble again. The former international financial powerhouses — the United States, Great Britain and France — are all struggling to keep from devaluing their currencies by keeping precious capital from flowing out of the countries. Today West Germany can for the first time in history regard themselves as the bankers of the world. Primarily from its

huge surplus exports over imports, now running at an annual rate of \$2.6 billion.

I am informed that President Nixon on his recent trip to Europe is or was trying to borrow money from West Germany so that our country can keep her head above the water.

In closing, my oldest son who has been in the Navy medics three years and was transferred to the Marine medics, is in route flying over the West Pacific to Okinawa and on to the battle fields of Vietnam. This affair reminds me and goes back to Bible history and King Herod. May I ask one civil question? What is behind the present gun law and threatening of gun registration?

## Letter To Congress On Pay Hike

Dear Congressman:

Wheat was posted at the elevator at \$1.42 a bushel this morning. That means your new salary is equivalent to 30,000 bushels of wheat today. I can't make myself believe anybody's time is worth that much.

My neighbor and I got on that subject again last night — it is almost as if there isn't anything else to talk about. Ordinarily, Jim is a pretty level-headed fellow; he always looks for the kind thing to say to or about people, but Congressman, that salary business really got to him — believe you me.

"Many," he said to me, "why don't you get on him again. This time figure how many loaves of bread that 30,000 bushels of wheat could be converted into." Well, Sir, it's a little surprising at that — the number of them. I mean.

Here is what I came up with: 30,000 bushels of 60-pound wheat is 1,800,000 pounds of wheat. According to my encyclopedia, about 74% of that comes out of the mill at flour — white flour, that is. So that meant we could get about 13,300 sacks of flour (100-pound sacks, of course). To make the flour into bread would take water — lots of it — some milk solids, salt, sugar, yeast and what not, and assuming that these necessary ingredients are available we could convert those 13,300 sacks of flour into 1,862,000 loaves of bread (I figure we can get 140 20-oz. loaves per sack).

The average 20-oz. loaf measures one foot long by four inches wide by four inches high. To store 1,862,000 loaves of bread

would require a warehouse 40 feet wide by 30 feet high by 173 feet long. It's hard to realize but that much bread occupies a volume of 207,000 cubic feet which in turn converts to a little less than five acre-feet of bread.

Any way you slice it, Congressman, cross-ways, length-ways, or diagonally, that really is a lot of bread. We should get that much snow cover every year. If it didn't melt too fast, we'd have enough moisture to give the crops a good start, anyway.

Rep. Keith Sebelius, R-Ks., has challenged Kansas wheat farmers to come up with a material as good as the corn-soya dried milk mix called CSM being issued to hungry nations.

He issued the challenge in a talk before the Norton County and Kansas Wheat Growers Association board of directors.

"This product, called CSM, is being manufactured as a new product and is going to Biafra and many other nations to furnish protein diet," Sebelius said.

"It does not contain wheat —

it is not going to move wheat," he continued. "But this is a challenge for the wheat growers to come up with a product that will move wheat."

Krause Milling Co. of Milwaukee is headquarters for manufacturing the product, according to Sebelius. But he said Grain Products Inc., Dodge City, also will be manufacturing CSM.

Apparently the National Association of Wheat Growers had somewhat the same idea of coming up with new products at their meetings at Boise, Idaho, in January.

They voted to pool research efforts of the various state member organizations to increase research and to do more nutritional studies and — above

all — promote the use of wheat.

G. C. "Jerry" Fowler, Kansas Wheat Commission administrator, was in Chicago attending a committee meeting of wheat-grower representatives to further planning on this program.

Also in the same week, George Meeker, Garden City, former president of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, and the National Association of Wheat Growers, was in Chicago, where the Wheat and Wheat Foods Foundation meeting gave the go-ahead to an even bigger research program designed to promote research for new uses and new markets for wheat.

The foundation is backed by wheat grower, millers and bakers, a combination surely strong enough and potentially well enough funded to do the job for which the Kansas congressman issued his challenge.

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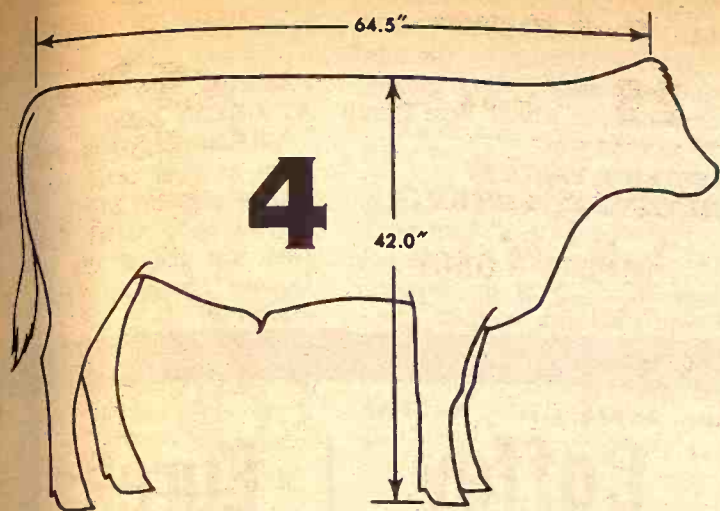

## Surprise Support For Limits On Farm Payments

Dr. John A. Schnittker, former undersecretary of agriculture, says he favored some type of limitation on government payments to farmers during the later years of the Johnson administration.

But he said he kept silent because it would have been against Democratic policy to speak out.

Johnson farm policies, spearheaded by former Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, were strongly opposed to any ceilings on direct farm pay-

ments, which last year totaled about \$3.5 billion.

Schnittker, an agricultural economist, is now with the Alfred P. Sloan School of Management at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Cambridge.

He said that when large surpluses of major crops such as wheat, cotton and feed grains existed in the early 1960s "there was some merit in opposing payment limitations," but that after 1964 or so when stockpiles were reduced "that's when I came around to having some thoughts about limitations."

Schnittker said he dissented privately with the Johnson administration on this subject, but now, he said, there is need for a public airing. He said he would be glad to testify at any congressional hearings if asked.

Schnittker said that for the first time Congress has enough facts to determine the question and that he "would try to show that limitations would not wreck farm programs."

Freeman and other Johnson farm leaders contended that restricting payments would force large scale farmers from federal production control programs and that their participation was essential in tailoring crop production to demand.

# 6-Year High Cattle Market

Cattle prices have hit 6-year highs at G&G area auction barns.

The price peaks were general, with packers and shippers competing actively for reduced steer offerings.

In Chicago, packers paid \$33.50 for prime steers last week and a peak of \$30.75 on choice steers. Cattle prices for the week were up about \$1 to \$1.50 from 10 days before and were \$3.50 to \$4 over year earlier levels.

The strong live cattle prices

created heavy demand for cattle futures contracts on the Chicago Board of Trade and the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. Prices rose 25 cents to 50 cents, setting seasonal highs for all contracts.

Wholesale dealers said heavy demand for fresh beef caused prices to rise a penny a pound. Choice beef was quoted at 47 cents — 1½ cents to 2 cents above a week earlier and four cents above last year's level.

Last week's wholesale meat prices were the highest since

December when snowstorms disrupted cattle shipments.

Movement of cattle had not been slowed by snow over widespread areas of the country. Early March cold weather had also cut — or even halted — the rate at which animals gain weight.

As a result, it may be several more weeks before many cattle are ready for marketing.

## Frontier Seed Owners To Join One Corporation

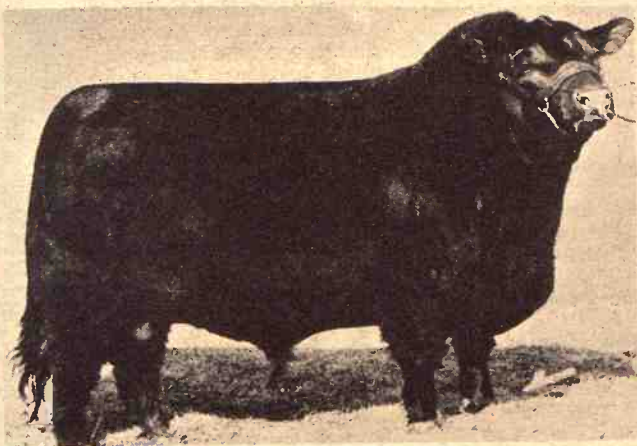

## Farm Bureau Plan To Phase Out Ag Program

A long range farm program intended to strengthen markets and increase net farm income has been proposed by the 27-member board of directors of the American Farm Bureau.

The plan, authorized by delegates of the member state farm bureaus at the 1968 national convention, would phase out present feed grain, wheat and cotton control programs.

The Farm Bureau, largest general farm organization in the nation, said it would press for action on the program in Congress this year.

The plan proposed by the board would go into effect January 1, 1971, as an amendment to the current farm program, the food and agriculture act of 1965, which expires December

31, 1970.

Essentially, the Farm Bureau program provides for a 5-year transitional period in which acreage controls, base acreages, marketing quotas, processing taxes and direct payments for wheat, feed grains and cotton would be phased out.

The program would ease the transition to a market price system and will mean higher net income for farmers, the Farm Bureau said.

The bureau said all farmers producing wheat, cotton and feed grain regardless of income, could take advantage of the program and farmers whose average gross annual sales of farm products were no more than \$5000 and whose off-farm income was eligible for one or more of four special programs. These are:

- Compensation for acreage allotments and base acreages surrendered for permanent can-

cellation.

- Retraining grants not to exceed \$1000.

- Adjustment assistance of not more than \$2500 a year for two years.

- Loans under existing credit programs to further facilitate the transition of eligible farmers to more gainful employment.

The bureau said 574,000 farmers, according to the 1964 census, would be eligible for the special programs.

## Fewer State Traffic Deaths

Fifteen fewer traffic fatalities occurred in Kansas in 1968 than in 1967, a state highway official has reported to Gov. Robert Docking.

Fred Burr, state safety coordinator, said in his report

that 664 deaths were recorded in 1967, compared with 649 in 1968.

By comparison, nationally, traffic deaths rose from 53,000 to 55,000, Burr said. He added that the cost of traffic accidents — in lost wages, medical expenses, property damage and higher insurance rates — dropped an estimated 3.2 million dollars in 1968 in Kansas from 1967 figure.

# 'Profit Emphasis, Instead of Volume'

In Lincoln, Nebr., Bill House, Cedar Vale, Kans., rancher who is second-term president of the American National Cattlemen's Association, told the National Livestock Conference at the University of Nebraska a thing or two.

House declared, "The greatest error made by all of us the past twenty years has been that of concentrating on production ra-

ther than on money — on volume rather than price."

"The net result of this great error has been to prevent any price rise in order to accommodate the government's cheap-food policy, at the same time that it increased the indebtedness of operators ten times over since 1950," he added.

He called for self-discipline, organization and dissemination

of accurate information to feeders, and the "exercise of adequate control of imported products that can influence supply and demand."

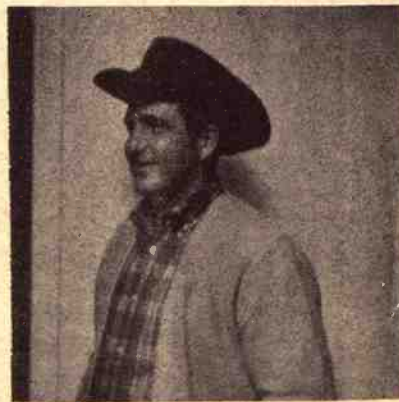

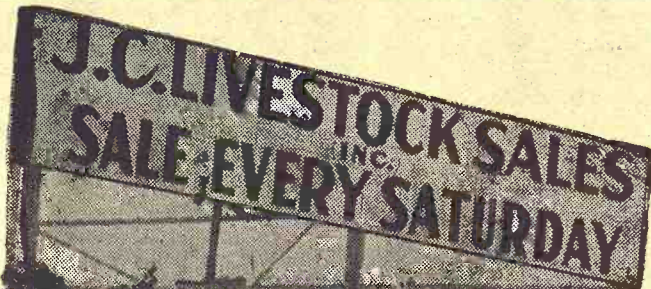

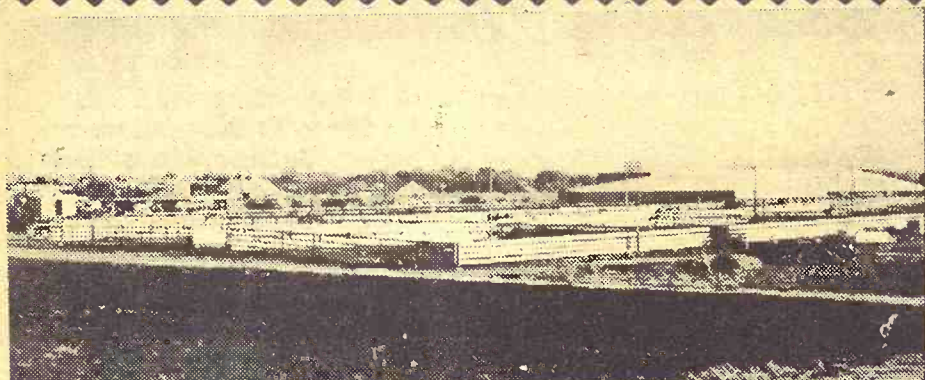
