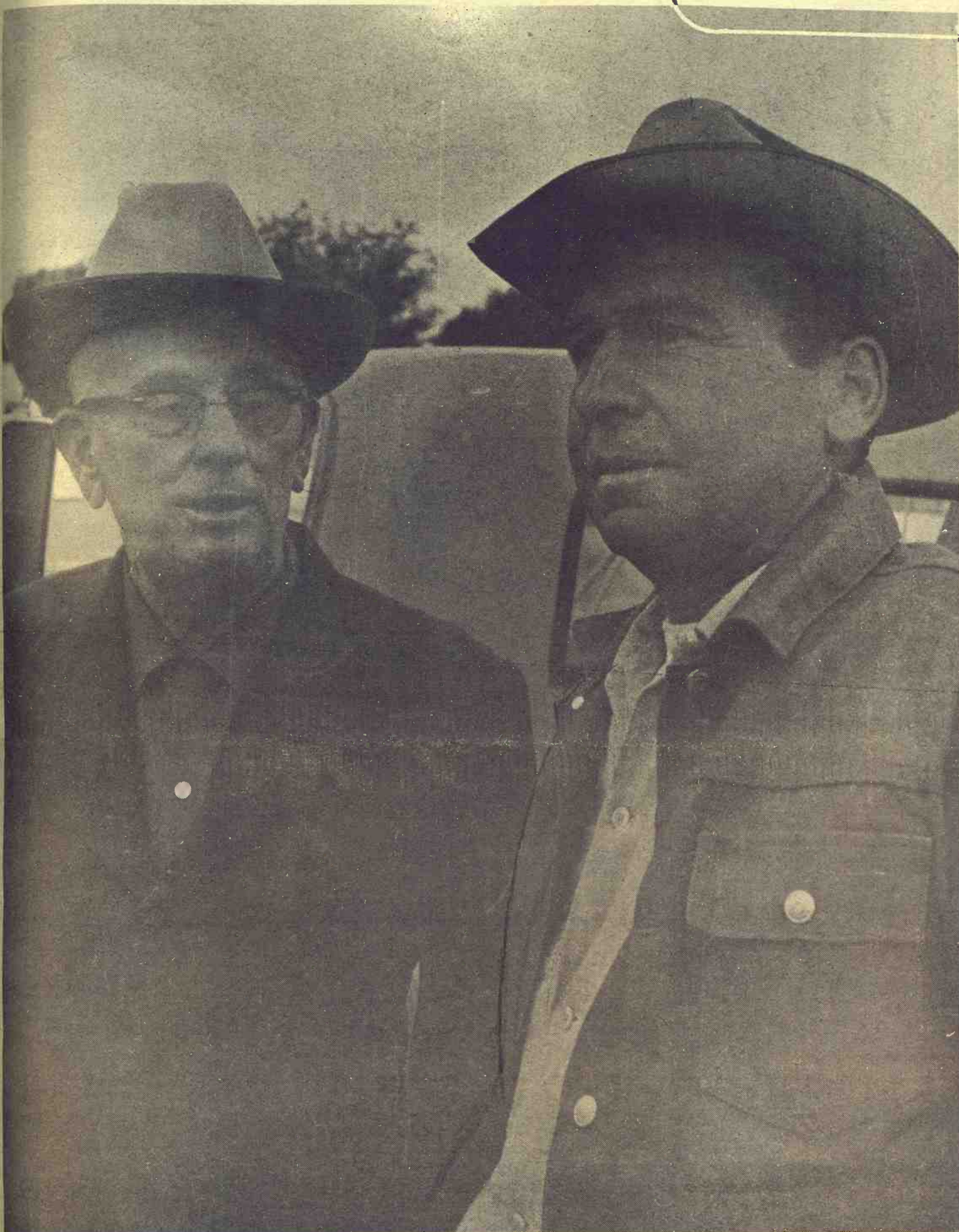

## Cold Weather

The first good cold snap of the season in the G&G area last week changed a lot of work schedules.



## High School Cornland

The land on which this corn was grown near Topeka will become the site of a new Seaman High School, but it has already been a classroom for an FFA class under the guidance of James Hundley, agriculture instructor at Seaman, right.

With him are Gene Berg and David Lamott, two leaders of the FFA group which formed a cooperative to farm 30 acres of the land on which the school is to be built.

With Hundley guiding them, the students secured a loan of \$700 from the Production Credit Assn. at Holton. The first loan paid for fertilizer from a Meriden cooperative and a small amount of seed. Later an additional \$400 was borrowed.

Equipment came on loan from the Kansas Farm Machinery Co., John Deere agency nearby the field. In mid-May, the boys planted 27 acres of milo, saving three acres to plant to corn later.

The project was expected to gross about \$2000, making a profit of \$900 on the \$1100

investment. The land use was free, with the Seaman school board allowing the boys to farm the land in exchange for keeping the entire 65 acres of the plot free of weeds. Each of the boys was to receive a portion of the profit based on the amount of time he put into the project.



## Anti-Trust Test Of Regional Dairy Co-ops

A suit charging violation of anti-trust laws against two milk producing groups, one of which has a Wichita office, has been filed in U.S. District Court in Houston, Tex.

The suit was filed by a Hous-

ton area association of dairy-  
men and two Waco, Tex., dairy-  
men against the two largest  
milk producing groups in the  
Midwest and Southwest, the  
2,000-member Milk Producers  
Inc., and Harold Nelson of San  
Antonio, general manager of  
both groups.

Marketing Assistance Plan  
Inc. (MAP), a Houston associa-  
tion of 70 dairymen, and David  
Simons Sr., and David Simons  
Jr., of Waco, filed the suit seek-

ing \$3,054,000.

The suit asks \$3 million dam-  
ages for MAP and \$54,000 for  
David Simons Sr., who alleges  
he was forced out of business  
by the associations when he re-  
fused to join. The younger  
Simons is a party to the suit  
because he alleges he was of-  
fered a bribe by the larger  
groups to join and to persuade  
his father to join.

The suit alleges violation of  
the Sherman-Clayton Act in that

it contends Milk Producers Inc.,  
forms "a gigantic super co-oper-  
ative," designed to stifle compe-  
tition by smaller groups such as  
MAP.

MAP, in the suit, said the two  
large groups have "virtually  
absolute control over production  
and sale of milk in Texas, Ar-  
kansas, Oklahoma, New Mex-  
ico, Kansas and Tennessee" as  
well as control of production  
and sales in other states not  
named.

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## Tragedy Stays With Area Family

LINN, KANS. — Plagued by farm tragedies, the Calvin Wilgers have suffered their worst. Their only son, Bradley Wilgers, 17 years old, was killed when a tractor turned over and fell on him. Two years ago one of Calvin

Wilgers' legs was lost when it caught in the power takeoff of a grain trailer.

Three weeks ago, a grain auger fell on him and broke one of his arms.

The exact details of the accident which killed Bradley last Friday are not known. He was working alone, using a scoop on the tractor to pick up silage around the silo. It is believed the scoop hit a little knoll and flipped the tractor over.

It took several hours to extricate Bradley's body.

He was born August 9, 1951, at Concordia and was a lifelong resident of the Linn community. 25 miles north of Clay Center. He was a senior at Linn high school.

In the accident which cost Calvin Wilgers his leg, he endured excruciating pain for more than an hour while keeping himself from being pulled into the power takeoff as it ground his leg away.

Then he got on a tractor and drove to his home for help.

## IH To Open A Salina Store

SALINA — International Harvester will open a new company-owned store here after an agency void of several years.

The store will be at I-70 and US81 just east of a Skelly truck stop.

J. F. Sullivan, Wichita, International's district manager, said the store will be ready for customers around January 1. It will handle a complete line of farm equipment, trucks, farm tractors and light-duty industrial equipment, he said.

George Frost, Hays, will manage the store. Frost, the retail manager at Hays for 10 years, has been an International employee 27 years. He will move to Salina this month.

## Late Year Surge By Purina

Ralston Purina earnings have risen sharply in the fourth quarter, offsetting a poor first half and bringing profit for the year ended September 30 some 17% ahead of a year earlier.

The company had profits of \$37.2 million on sales of \$1.28 billion, compared to a \$31.8 million net on sales of \$1.3 billion in the previous year.

Lower poultry prices and lower soybean margins had hurt the company's first half results but company officials noted "improved economics" in the latter part of their fiscal year in animal agriculture, including broiler prices, and consumer products, including pet foods, cereals and frozen foods.

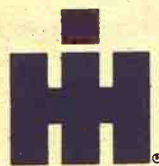
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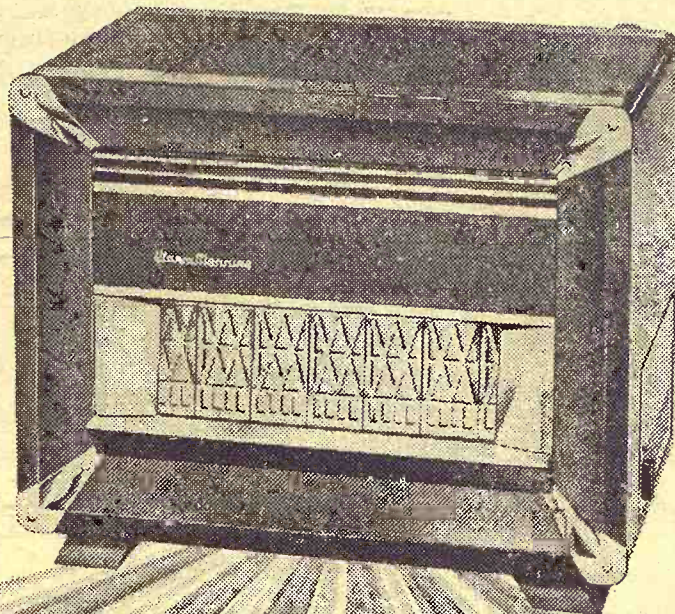

## Some Bargains In Steel

Steel buyers — many of them, but not all — say they are getting some bargains in steel

these days.

It's not exactly a price war, but large users of some types of steel have been getting it for less than posted prices, say financial reporters.

If it builds up, it could mean

the first sustained price competition among U.S. steel companies in decades.

The cuts have not been passed on to the consumer, and some users have been reluctant to talk about it because they have used "higher steel prices" as a reason for hiking prices of their products, as for example, the automakers.

The price shading, which goes back to last spring, started originally to put a little pressure on Japanese and European steel imports which generally are about 15% cheaper than U.S. steel.

The pricing takes many forms, all of them short of announcing decreases in prices. Announced increases in various steels, such as cold-rolled, have not been enforced or postponed. Cold-rolled steel lists for \$150 a ton, but some users say they have been unable to buy it for \$15 to \$20 less.

Behlen Manufacturing Co., Columbus, Nebr., producer of farm buildings and a heavy buyer of foreign steel for the past several years, says domestic mills have offered to sell galvanized sheet at \$20 below the domestic list price. "They don't put it in writing, and they don't say how long they'll do it, but they're certainly feeling their way," says Gilbert Behlen, vice president.

Other forms of lowering prices have been by foregoing extra charges on various special products, by offering price guarantees for up to 12 months, or by warehousing orders and holding back billing until a buyer needs his steel, a departure from traditional practice.

## Blue Cross Rates Just Won't Quit

State officers of Blue Cross-Blue Shield have announced that Kansas Blue Cross subscribers in many categories will face increased rates early next year.

The new rates were approved by the Blue Cross Board and will be filed with the State Insurance Department at a later date. There will be no rate increase in the Blue Shield Plan.

The rate increases will affect:

- All non-group individual members.
- Subscribers through Marm Bureau.
- Employee groups where there are less than 50 employees.

• Subscribers under the "Plan 65" program, which complements Medicare. This is expected to be about 65 cents per person per month.

Increases in other categories ranging from \$5.35 to \$7.75 per family per month, will depend on the member's contract and the benefits he carries.

Officers said the major reasons for the increase are rising hospital costs and a continuing increase in the use of services.

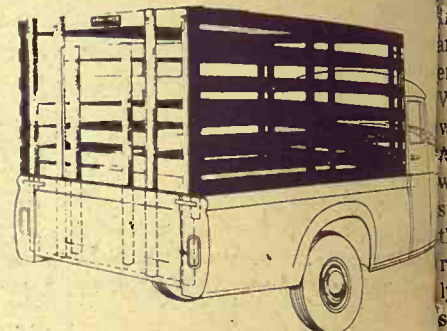

## Pickett Scorn On Current 4H Judging

For many years secretary of the Kansas Livestock Association, A. G. Pickett now has the title of vice president emeritus. That title suggests semi-retirement, it doesn't mean that Mr. Pickett isn't still rather forceful with an opinion.

In the October issue of the Kansas Stockman, the magazine of the association, Pickett takes aim at what he thinks is unsatisfactory judging in 4H livestock shows. Here is part of what he had to say:

Fat steer judges who are uninformed, misinformed or who are following a false standard are heading junior steer feeders down a rough road to ruin. We have seen steers weighing well under 800 pounds that wouldn't grade average good in a class with choice grade steers standing at the foot of the class. A qualified market representative reported recently that about 50 percent of the steers at a county 4H show, if shipped to the market would be sold back to the feedlot for finishing. Many of these were high-placing steers in the show.

A buyer who supported several junior sales in his area this fall stated that the packers lost considerable money on the steers because they wouldn't grade and did not have enough cover to hang in the cooler for aging. 4H baby beef, in the past, was considered something special and commanded a premium. What will happen to this image and reputation, where the champion steer will not even grade choice? What will a local business man think if he buys a club steer for his locker and the beef grades commercial?

Many of our leading retailers in recent years have handled choice grade beef exclusively because this is what the consuming public wants. A large por-

tion of our production is consumed in hotels, restaurants, steak houses, and these places demand choice or prime steaks and roasts.

Feedlot operators know they must finish cattle to the grade comparable to the quality and feeder grade of the animals being fattened. They want an animal that will put on an efficient gain which means a rapid gain and when finished will bring the top dollar. This doesn't mean selling good and choice feeder cattle out of the feedlot weighing 700 or 800 pounds and grading good or lower. An animal finished to a choice grade weighing a thousand or 1,100 pounds is still ideal from the packer's standpoint.

Producers may be partly responsible for judging trends. We probably have talked too much about fat and have not stressed the importance of quality, marbling, and finish, in order to produce the kind of beef the consuming public wants. Someone may refer to the American National Cattlemen's Association Marketing Program which advocates marketing at lighter weights. In reality, the ANCA goal is to market cattle just as soon as they reach their respective grade. Their program is — don't overfeed or overfinish. They certainly don't advocate marketing choice grade feeders for slaughter at

800 pounds before they are finished.

We must remember we can produce choice and even prime carcasses that are not too fat and are not wasteful. This is largely a problem for beef cattle breeders. It is not any easy job and the difficult task purebred breeders face is the production of cattle that will finish to the choice grade at the proper weight with a carcass that will cut out the maximum amount of red meat with sufficient fat covering and marbling without any excess fat.

Agricultural universities appear to be receiving at least most of the blame for turning out steer judges who are placing these underfinished steers at the top. If they are guilty they should do something about it. If the goal for 4H projects is something less than choice, they should start feeding "okies" and not feed the best calf they can find. We are well aware of the fact that methods and products have been developed that will

help tenderize and make less tender beef more edible, but as yet, nothing will replace steaks and roasts from a properly-finished, well-aged carcass.

## Crop Strips For Lease Around Fort Riley

Fifteen narrow strips of land totaling 406 acres on the perimeter of Fort Riley are to be leased by the Army for farming. Bids will be taken until De-

cember 4 at the real estate office of the Corps of Engineers at Junction City.

Cropping is restricted to forage sorghums, alfalfa or soybeans and specifically excludes all crops under price support programs.

The strips of land, each only 150 feet wide, extend around most of the perimeter of Fort Riley and function as firebreaks. The fifteen plots vary in size from 11 to 40 acres.

Exact details can be obtained from the Corps of Engineers office in Junction City.



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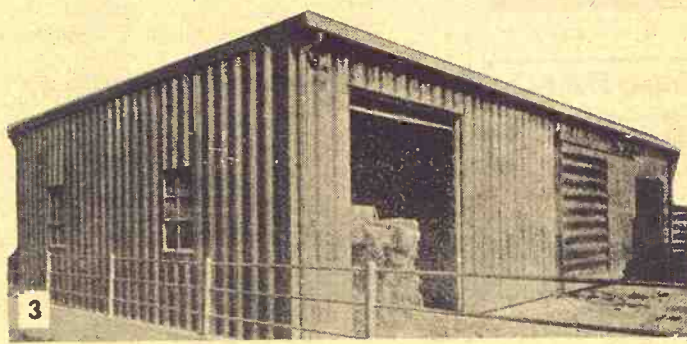
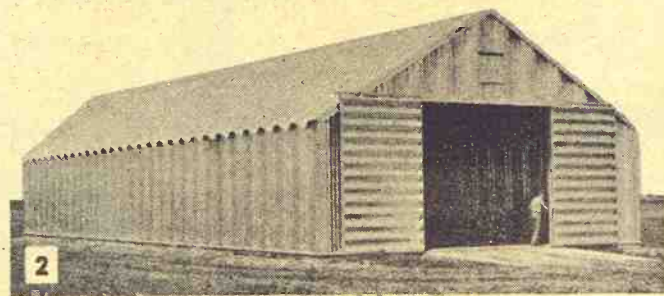
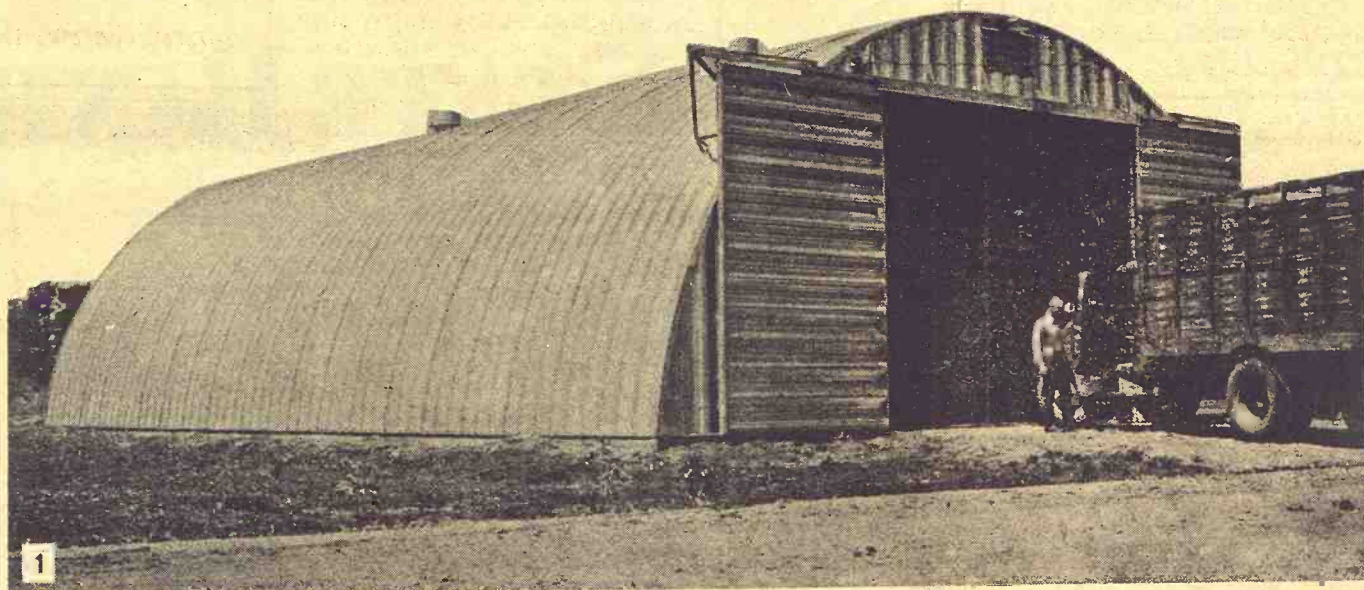

Thousands of guys like you and me will take to the fields of Kansas, in quest of feathered friends Mother Nature has seen fit to provide during the last year.

Hunting is forgetting to "lead" a bird, to stop your swing and miss by a mile, to try to shove a shell backwards into the chamber of your gun.

Hunting is pulling the trigger with the safety still "on", missing "the easiest target in the world," and a single quail (or sometimes even a covey) bursting from under you when you're climbing a fence or crossing a creek.

Hunting is the watching of the breaking of a frosty dawn, the honk of a Canada goose or the call of a mallard swishing over your blind just before the

Mix all ingredients by hand. Bake in 400-degree oven 15 minutes. Stir once in awhile; it will be a light golden brown. Press in a 9-inch pie pan while warm. Save a little to sprinkle on top of the pie.

**Filling:**  
 1/2 cup sugar  
 1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
 4 egg yolks, beaten  
 3/4 cup water

Combine all in pan and cook until it comes to a boil. Cool (with cover on) then pour over the 4 egg whites, stiffly beaten with 1/2 cup sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cream of tartar. Pour into pie crust and sprinkle with remaining crunch mixture. Keeps in the refrigerator for several days. This is a rich dessert.

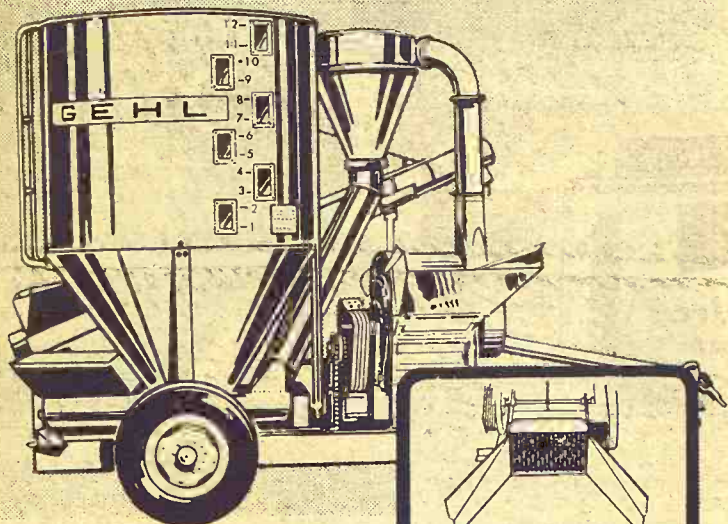

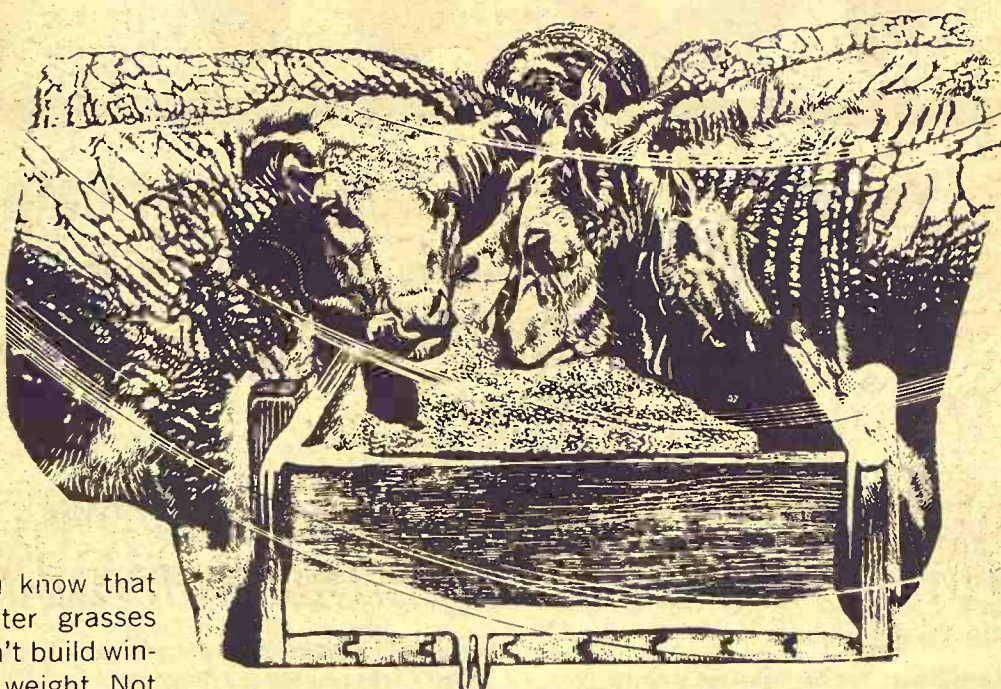

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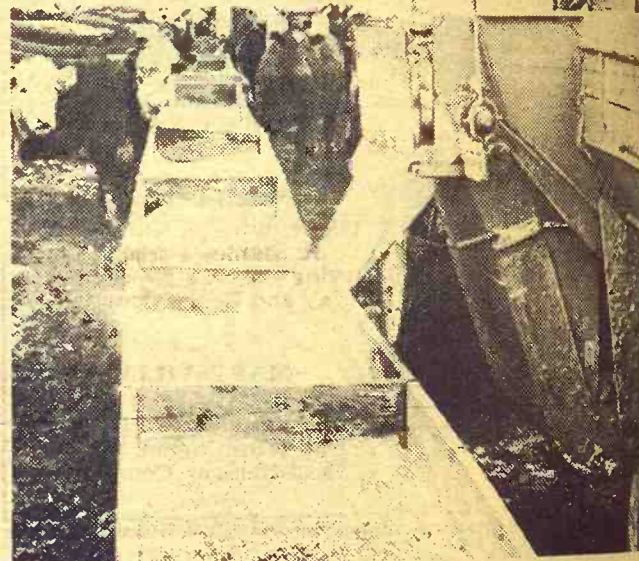

## Cash Sale Of Wheat To India

The United States has approved the immediate sale of 500,000 tons of wheat to India as part of a 2.3 million-ton food-aid agreement still to be negotiated between the two countries, the Agriculture department has announced.

The 500,000 tons — almost 19 million bushels — will be paid for in cash by India until the new agreement is signed. At that time India will be reimbursed and the early shipment charged against the full amount to be paid for through long-term credit.

Department officials said the authorization was issued "to meet urgent needs of India" and to permit orderly procurement and shipment.

The authorization included 200,000 tons of hard red winter wheat; 200,000 tons of white and 100,000 of soft red winter or soft white wheat.

It was announced earlier that India was renewing a food aid agreement with the United States that provided for the shipment by June of 2.3 million tons of wheat.

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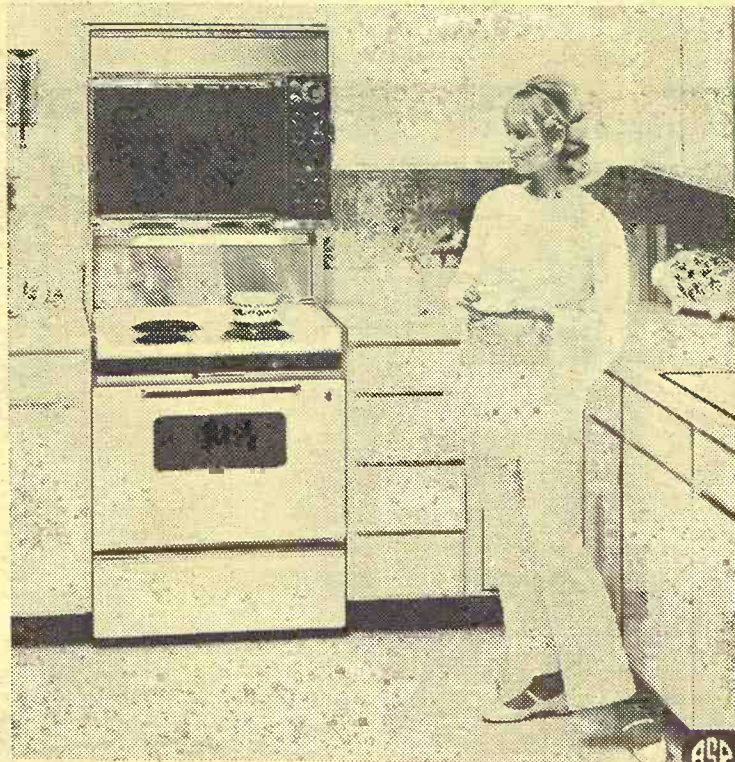

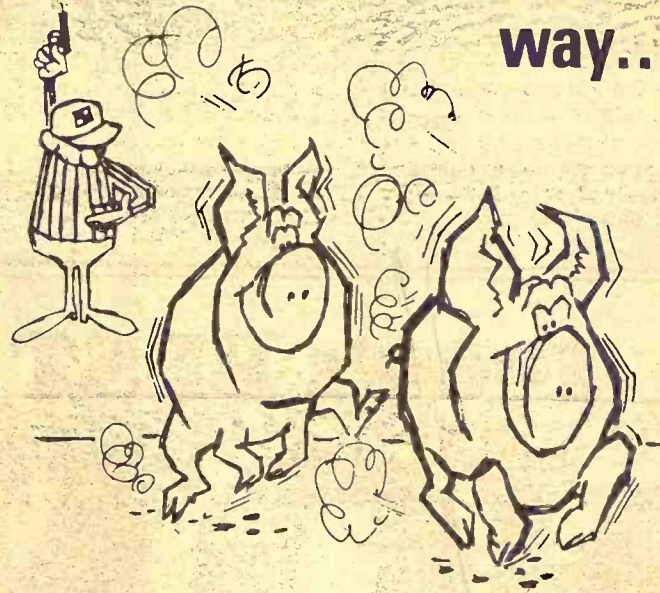

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# Farm Groups Weigh And Await Nixon Role

Officials of the American Farm Bureau Federation, which complained constantly that Democrats overmanaged agriculture, said they're looking forward to working with president-elect Richard M. Nixon.

Since the Democrats took over in 1961 and instituted far-reaching production control and price support programs for farmers, the Farm Bureau has been mostly on the outside looking in.

But with the election of Richard M. Nixon, the organization expects to be closer to the White House than it has since the Eisenhower era and the programs administered by Agriculture Secretary Ezra Taft Benson.

"We hope to cooperate with the new President and the Congress in any way we can," said Roger W. Fleming, a Farm Bureau officer and director of its Washington office.

"And there is likely to be more cooperation because the new President is less likely to be twisting arms in support of unsound farm proposals."

However, Fleming said, the Farm Bureau traditionally looks to Congress for much of its support and this is expected to continue.

Fleming said Midwestern farmers helped re-elect President Truman in 1948 but that

they didn't respond this time in favor of Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey.

"There has been a lot of comparison between this year and 1948, when Truman won in the Midwest farm states," Fleming said. "But the farm vote went to Nixon rather than Humphrey — and that made a big difference."

The National Farmers Union,

which has disagreed basically with Farm Bureau officials on government farm programming, had no official comment, but its Washington office said a statement may be issued later.

The Farmers Union, in particular, has viewed the Democratic farm programs administered by Secretary Orville L. Freeman as "generally in the right direc-

tion," but the Farm Bureau has been a consistent critic of Freeman and what it sees as the over-management of agriculture by the federal government.

Next month the Farm Bureau will hold its annual convention in Kansas City, Mo., during which the group's policy for 1969 will be developed.

Fleming said the convention

will discuss alternatives available to agriculture, adding it would be premature to be specific about them at this time.

Among those mentioned were Nixon's agriculture secretary, Rep. Albert H. Quie, R-Minn., who, the Farmers Union spokesman said, "would be several above Benson."

"Of the possibilities seen now," he said, "Quie would be acceptable to us and would be a constructive friend of the farmer."

## Frontier Airline Still Battling Money Problems

Frontier Airlines, the local-service carrier which provides the principal air service to the G&G area, has not yet weathered its 1968 financial woes. It reports a \$3.7 million loss for the first nine months.

A year ago earnings were \$335,124.

Frontier noted that revenue rose to \$54 million from \$42 million last year. The company added that 1967 results have been adjusted to include a pooling of interests with Central Airlines, merged into Frontier in October 1967. Frontier is 54% owned by RKO General Inc., a subsidiary of General Tire & Rubber Co.

The company began an economy drive in July, which included the paring of advertising expenses and selective fare increases. Later Frontier offered \$16.2 million in preferred stock to shareholders, renegotiated a \$15 million bank loan and cancelled orders for seven Boeing jets.

Later the airline announced it had furloughed 42 of its regular line pilots and eight pilot trainees, curtailed some flights and rescheduled others.

## Thru Threats To Managing Stored Grain

Although weather has been generally favorable for fall harvest with no grain drying problems, this does not mean that grain quality will be maintained without good storage management, a K-State engineer says.

Elwyn Holmes, Extension agricultural engineer, pointed out that storage management might well include protection from three main threats to stored grain — rodents, insects, and moisture accumulation.

Holmes also pointed out that grain in long-time storage should be aerated. This means moving 1/20 to 1/10 cubic feet of air per minute per bushel through the grain when needed during storage. This is not drying; however, aeration can take out 1 to 2 percent moisture under ideal conditions.

"Storage management might

well include protection from rodent and insect damage in addition to control of moisture accumulation," Holmes said.

Moisture accumulates in bin-stored grain that is not aerated during fall and early winter. The moisture gathers at top center of the bin as the walls cool rapidly and the center grain remains warm, with vapor movement up through the warm grain. "This moisture migration is reversed in spring, but in the meantime grain quality has dropped and mold may develop," Holmes said.

### Aeration Equipment

Grain aeration equipment for small circular bins (5,000 bushels or less) usually consists of a vertical duct in the center of the bin, with a suction fan at the top and a perforated lower section to draw air through the grain. For other bins, a perforated floor with a suction fan underneath is common. Air is moved downward through the grain to reverse the natural moisture vapor movement through the grain.

During a season of storage, power costs of aeration should be ¼ to ½ cent per bushel stored, the engineer estimated.

A temperature probe will help in determining the condition of the grain, and a humidistat can also be used as a tool for management.

### Aeration Management

The first step to maintaining quality grain is to store clean grain. Grain with fines and other foreign materials will tend to block air flow, and mold pockets can develop.

Newly stored grain should be aerated continuously until its temperature equalizes with the outside air. However, cut off the aeration fan during rain or periods of very high humidity. The aeration fan should be turned on whenever the grain gets 10 to 15 degrees higher than outside air, to again equalize the temperature.

"Grain should not be aerated at air temperatures below 30 degrees to avoid freezing the grain. These frozen pockets would mold when thawing be-

gins and also give trouble during unloading operations."

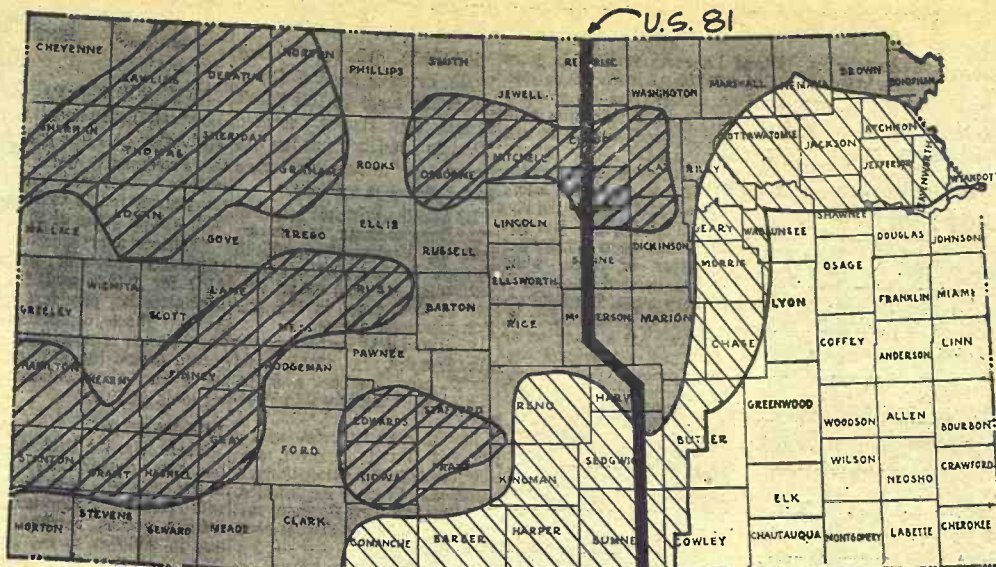

Marvin Lundquist, superintendent of the Sandyland Dryland Experimental Farm at St. John, shows off a field of no tillage milo grown this year on irrigated plots at the farm. The milo was planted with a Buffalo till planter after stocks had been shredded from the old crop. Pre-emergent fertilizer was 21P applied in bands at planting. The field produced well under flood irrigation conditions.

## Natural Gas For Auto Power

Developers have demonstrated a natural gas system for cars and say it reduces some kinds of air pollution by 90 percent.

Enough natural gas to produce the power in a gallon of gasoline costs only eight cents, they said, and maintenance costs drop too.

But conversion costs about \$300 per engine, according to Bob McJones, automotive research and development consult-

ant for Pacific Lighting Corp.

"We've found there's some loss of power, about 10 percent," he said, "but not many people utilize an engine's full power."

Fuel storage is a drawback, he added. Eight hundred cubic feet of tanks in a demonstration sedan took up much of the trunk.

Range is short. Cars using compressed gas can be compared "to battery-operated cars that have to be recharged each night," McJones said.

But Joseph R. Rensch, executive vice president of Pacific

Lighting, said "results were so gratifying that we are proceeding with conversions for 18 more vehicles."

He said the firm isn't thinking about a mass market for the system, but if it doesn't run into problems the company will switch about 1000 more vehicles in smoggy areas.

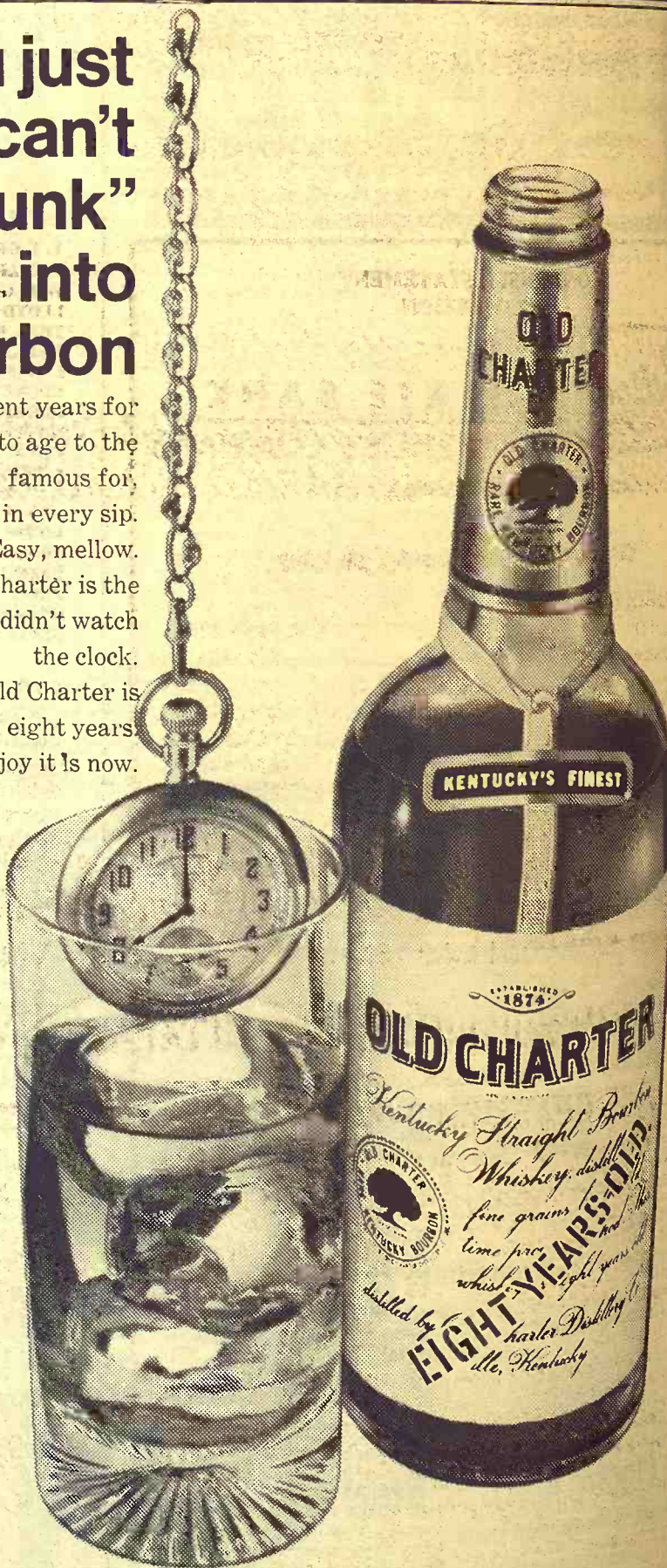

## CS Head To Retire In January

The Dust Bowl of the early 1930s spilled over most of the Great Plains — from Texas to Montana — spewing its dark, choking clouds across millions of acres of wind-stricken farm

land. There are strains of this awe-inspiring legacy when Don Williams, 63, speaks of soil and water.

It's a subtle respect some men reserve for great works of art, knowing that rarely in a lifetime can such creations be duplicated.

Williams will retire in January as head of the Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service, a position held since 1953. He will continue his ef-

forts two more years with the Ford Foundation in India.

Much of what conservation means in modern agriculture evolved during Williams' government career, which began in 1935 when he became superintendent of a Civilian Conservation Corps camp in his native South Dakota.

Congress created the Soil Conservation Service as a permanent agency of the Department of Agriculture the same year, as Williams was teaching young men to build dams while building themselves.

"Many people say the thing that triggered it off was the Dust Bowl situation, but actually many agricultural leaders had been calling attention to the problems long before that," Williams said in an interview.

"The dust bowl did bring it all to a head and in that sense caused public awareness of the problems we faced in soil and water conservation."

Conservation in the depression period of the 1930s embodied many of the public works concepts advocated by President Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal — to put unemployed men to work.

The CCC camp Williams directed at Presho, S.D., for example, employed about 200, mostly farm youths from Ne-

braska.

"The CCC was an excellent movement for that particular period," Williams said. "It was next to impossible for a kid to find a job and we were able to put him to work, to teach him something about equipment and conservation."

But the emphasis of the Soil Conservation Service and conservation slowly changed from the rectic forays against blowing dust and unemployment into a more deliberate, thoughtful campaign for preventing catastrophe instead of repairing damage after it occurred.

Today the service provides the technical assistance farmers need to carry out a wide range of conservation practices on small dams to reduce water erosion, to grass seeding and tillage methods for retaining moisture.

The key to the system is the local "soil and water conservation district" — more than 3,000 of them — which works with service to develop local programs for farmers.

Williams said it is the local district — a legal unit of government — that has provided the "cooperative relationship" between landowners and the federal agency.

"I think the fact that our people are trained to work with local people in assisting them — not dominating them — has

been very important," Williams said.

The insistence that his service work through locally run groups has resulted in relatively little political controversy over the years, Williams said.

"We diligently and constantly pursued this with state governments, irrespective of party politics," he said. "Conservation is not a partisan matter, locally, statewide or nationally."

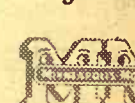

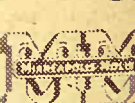

## Some Varied Pressures On For Small Car Production In U.S.

When it comes to putting wheels on things, American industry is pre-eminent. Long ago it learned that the way to add value to a product is to move it from where it's in surplus to where it's needed.

Probably because of the nation's great size this lesson was learned early, and so General Motors and General Electric now produce the most powerful railroad diesels and Boeing the biggest jets and Detroit the most cars.

Japan and Britain, being island nations, have built bigger commercial ships, but even at sea the United States holds some firsts. At least the know-how is there, as demonstrated by the Navy's supercarriers.

The thing that U.S. firms seemingly haven't been able to make and sell is a really compact low-priced car. And that, a government official says, is just what the nation needs.

Detroit has been reluctant to admit the situation exists, and it can point to some fine small cars that were produced domestically in recent years. But, small as these are, they are bigger than European and Japanese models.

That this difference might have an effect on buyers is suggested by the surge in the sale of imported cars, which might total close to one million this year. And this is where the government official comes in.

Imports mean money lost by American producers, as much as a half billion dollars by some es-

timates. Imports mean less tax revenue for the government and fewer jobs throughout the country. And they mean that more than a billion dollars in currency goes abroad each year.

John R. Petty, assistant secretary for international affairs in the Treasury Department, said the auto industry or the government must stop this dollar drain or else the balance of payments problem never will be licked.

Petty asked for new thinking, saying that the compact cars that Detroit now makes are far from what is needed and that consequently the British, French, Italian, Japanese, Swedish and German compacts are enjoying a boom.

Ironically, the small car market was thoroughly tested years ago by American Motors, which abandoned the field and its profits as well. Now it is said to be planning a return to the market.

Reports from Detroit also indicate that the Big Three — General Motors, Ford and Chrysler — also are studying the small car market. But the evidence released so far indicates some of their products might still be larger than the imports.

Detroit's problem really isn't technological; it is more one of pricing and sales. The car can be made, but can the profit be made? Most of the imported cars are built with labor that costs less than in the United States.

Even if Detroit learns som to keep down the sale price to something less than \$2,000 it still has problems. Will the volume market remain or even grow? It's there now, but how about two years from now? And will a compact line add to the total of cars sold or merely cut into the sale of other cars?

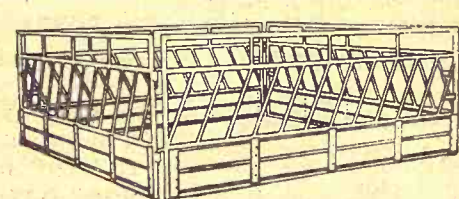

## Wildlife Award To G&G Area Farmer Turned Taxidermist-Scientist

EMPORIA — Richard Schmidt, who was once a high school dropout and has no college degree and has never taken a college course in biology, has been awarded the Kansas Wildlife Federation's Conservation Education Award.

The inscription on the trophy reads: "For outstanding contributions to the wise use and management of the nation's natural resources."

Schmidt, taxidermist at Kansas State Teachers College here, is responsible for the college's biology museum and teaches

his art to biology students. More than 650 of his specimens are now on display in the museum at KSTC, and 1534 study skins prepared by him are available

to students.

Another exhibit of 260 birds is on display at Hesston College and an exhibit of 140 birds is on display at Friends University in Wichita.

Schmidt once quit Marion County rural high school to farm but was lured back by a new principal who was a taxidermist. After he graduated, he farmed 27 years and practiced commercial taxidermy as a sideline, maintaining a small museum on his farm.

In the fall of 1929, the Canton, Kans., Boy Scout troop visited his museum and he was later asked to speak to the Canton Lions Club, starting him on a round of public appearances that soon made it practically impossible to get any farm work done.

He worked for more than 15 years with the Methodist Boys Camping Program as nature trails leader of Methodist camps in Kansas, Oklahoma and Colorado. After World War II, he began mounting collections for colleges, and in 1956 moved his museum, which then consisted of 225 specimens, to KSTC and joined the staff as a full time taxidermist.

His principal function at

KSTC is to continue building his museum. He conducts museum tours for visiting groups, serves as a resource instructor in the techniques of preparing study specimens of birds, mammals and fishes in various courses, and lectures in seminars and workshops.

In the summers of 1960 and 1962, Schmidt participated in Arctic expeditions as collector and taxidermist in the Canadian Northwest territories of Victoria

and Jenny Lind Islands. In 1962, he was commissioned to mount an extensive collection of migratory waterfowl as a memorial to Steve Fencannon, one of the young victims of a boating accident at John Redmond Reservoir.

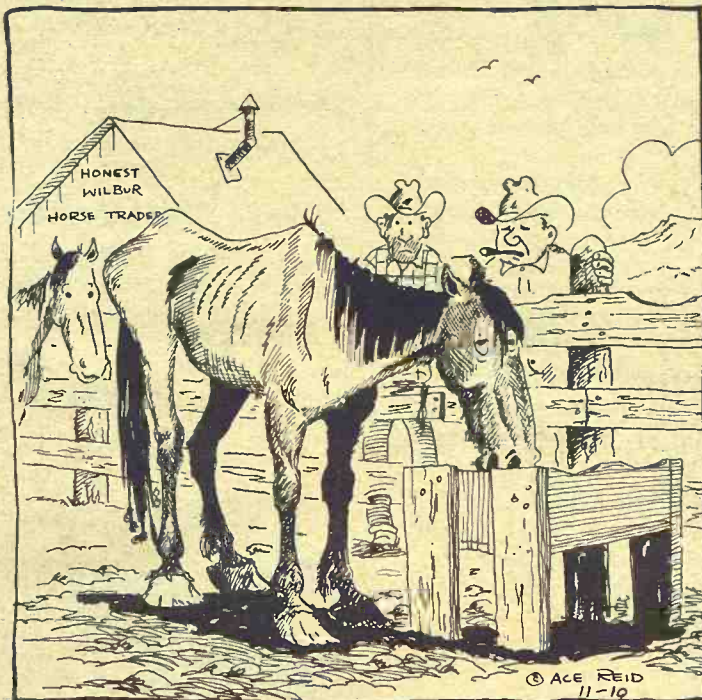

# Wheat Prices Reflect Size Of World Crop

Look at the world wheat production figures for 1968, and you see one of the major reasons for those low wheat prices farmers have been complaining about lately.

This year's world wheat crop was the biggest ever — an estimated 294 million tons, says Frank Orazem, professor of eco-

nomics at Kansas State University. That's 9 million tons more than the previous record crop of 1966.

This record crop comes from both an increased wheat acreage in the world and increases in per-acre yields, Orazem says.



The U.S. share of that world figure — 43.5 million tons — came from a 5 percent smaller acreage than 1967. Yet the 1968 total was record high for this country, the economist points out.

Favorable weather and moisture conditions are credited with the worldwide boost in yields this year. Yields in North and South America were up 2.4 bushels an acre, according to the USDA's Foreign Agricultural Service figures. African countries showed a 2.3 bushel increase. Australian production is up sharply.

Only in Europe was the 1968 per-acre yield down from a year earlier. But that drop of a little more than 2 bushels an acre was almost made up by an increase in acreage, Orazem says.

# Limit In Efficiency To Extra Large Farms

There is a trend toward the consolidation of small farms into larger, more efficient farming units, but according to a Kansas University professor, there is a point beyond which large farms do not operate efficiently.

Roy D. Laird, a professor of political science and a member of the Slavic and Soviet Area Center staff, bases his conclusions on observations made during recent trips to countries of Eastern Europe.

He has studied farming efficiency of Polish and Russian collective and state farms for

more than a decade.

Some state farms in Poland have more than 1000 workers, all under the direction of one manager, he said.

The manager is responsible for farm decision making and the men and women who do the actual farm work do as they are told, with little or no discretion as to how to perform their duties, he said.

Because of the lack of direct contact with the needs of the large state farm, the manager is less able to keep in contact with all the functions of the farm, and production suffers, Laird said.

Smaller state farms in Poland, those containing about 600 acres, provide the greatest food production per acre, said Laird, adding that a portion of the increased efficiency must be given to the more efficient management. Other factors influence the operation of farms in Poland, he said. There is relatively little mechanical power used on either state or private farms in

Poland, with the result of less production per man hour in Poland than there is in the United States.

Comparing Polish and American farms, Laird said that the few Polish private farms are much smaller than those in the United States, but the state farms are often much larger.

Much land in Poland and the Soviet Union is not as fertile as land in America, nor is it as

abundant when compared to the population it has to support, and the inadequacy of land is another factor in insufficient food production, said Laird.

Because of these factors keeping food production low, eastern European countries have been importing significant quantities of food for several years, and will probably be forced to continue to do so in order to feed their populations, he said.

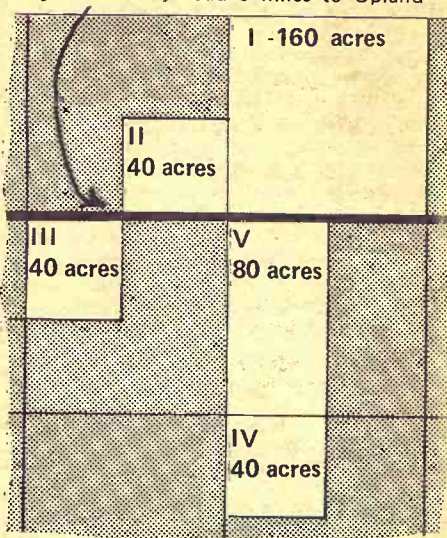

# Delay In Indian Wheat Sales

Signing of a new Food for Peace agreement with India has been put off until later than in any year since 1962, prompting growing speculation over the future of the program.

Involved are up to 100 million bushels of American wheat and the possibility of a healthy boost for U.S. wheat prices at a time when they are near an all-time low.

Agriculture Department sources say no decision has been made on the question of another agreement with India.

A major reason is the bumper wheat crop harvested in India this year. There is some doubt as to whether grain can be exported under the Food for Peace program for storage only.

The primary purpose of the program is to provide foodstuffs

to countries unable to satisfy their domestic needs.

In the past five years, with India running consistent wheat shortages, annual Food for Peace agreements have been signed no later than Oct. 14, and usually in September.

Indian interests have advised the Agriculture Department they would like to continue purchases under the program in order to establish reserves against possible future crop failures.

But several other factors would be considered in any decision, according to Agriculture Department sources connected with the program.

They include:

— Possible reluctance to sign an agreement before election and risk criticism that it was designed as an appeal to wheat farmers in behalf of the Democratic presidential nominee, Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

— The high cost of shipping wheat halfway round the world to a country which has just had a record harvest.

— The wisdom of making in such circumstances more wheat sales which will be paid for in Indian currency — rupees — when the government has a large account of unspent rupees from previous sales.

But, there is activity on be-

half of American wheat farmers to spur signing of a new agreement — and soon.

The shipment could boost wheat prices several cents per bushel, officials say.

# Grange Must Fill Newsom Role

Farmer politics in Washington, D.C., won't be quite the same after Nov. 19 when a new master of the National Grange will take office.

Herschel Newsom, national grange master, and the grand old man of national farm politics, will resign during the annual convention Nov. 11-19 of the National Grange in Peoria, Ill.

A new master will be elected during this 102nd annual convention of the grange. Newsom has been master since 1950.

He gained considerable stature and made many national political level friends during his tenure as head of this oldest of U.S. farm organizations.

He has taken an appointment of the U.S. Tariff Commission by President Lyndon Johnson. The term is for six years.

Newsom has had a colorful tenure in Washington and holds these presidential appointments: Public Advisory Committee on U.S. Trade Policy; President's Commission on Employment of the Handicapped; Citizen's Commission on International Cooperation; President's Rural Safety Council; and Citizens Committee for International Development.

In 1963, Newsom was elected the eighth president of the International Federation of Agricultural Producers (IFAP), a federation of farm organizations from five continents. He retired as president of this group in 1966.

He is chairman of the U.S. Food for Peace Council; chairman of the World Food Crisis Committee; trustee of the American Freedom from Hunger Foundation; director of Crusade for Freedom; member of the Committee on Trade, Monetary and Corporate Policy of the Atlantic Council of the United States; a director, Transportation Association of America and

Transportation Council of the Department of Commerce; trustee, Joint Economic Council on Economic Education; a charter Member of the Advisory Coun-

cil of the International Movement of Atlantic Union Inc.; and a member of Inter-American Economic Policy Committee on Canadian-American Relations.

He also is a member of the Advisory Committee on Agricultural Cooperation to the Agency for International Development and 25 other foundations committees and boards.

# Marketing Stretch From Wheat Price To Bread Cost

A bushel of wheat brings the farmer about \$1.25 and makes enough flour for 69 loaves of bread. But at 30 cents a loaf, four loaves of bread is about all that can be bought by a farm wife with the \$1.25 her husband gets for the bushel of wheat.

That is the extreme conflict between the price of farm raw materials and the cost of the finished consumer product that so easily infuriates both the farmer and the consumer.

The gap is most pronounced in the bread-baking industry. While farm costs account for about 40% of all food prices, the farmer's share of the retail bread dollar is so small that if farmers gave away their wheat it would little more than cancel 2-cent increases in bread prices

in many cities recently.

In some cities in the east, a major brand of bread sells for 40 cents for a 1 1/4 pound loaf.

Generally, bakers blame production costs, citing wage contracts and the like. But actually, the principal problem in bread prices is marketing — getting it to the consumer.

The cost of moving a loaf of bread from the bakery to a housewife's grocery cart exceeds the cost of growing the wheat, milling the flour, and baking the bread.

Major brands of bread are distributed by driver-salesmen, paid mainly by commission, who not only deliver the loaves but stack and arrange them on the grocery shelves as well.

At each stop along a route, a bread salesman must jostle for shelf space with salesmen from other bakeries. They must pick up unsold loaves left from the day before, present a daily bill to the store manager and often turn to the store late in the afternoon to straighten and restack the shelves. The result, many industry sources agree, has been to perpetuate a marketing system geared to the corner grocery of 40 years ago.

Bakeries recognize the problem but have been slow to do something about it.

A major threat to them now is the supermarket chain that bakes its own bread, distributes it in trailer-truck quantities, and lets the store stack the shelves itself.

For the same wages, a food chain driver can move four times as much bread as his wholesale counterpart, who drives a smaller van. As a result, private-label bread under-sells the advertised brands by as much as six cents a loaf and already accounts for 25% of all bread sold.

Such competition, oddly, often tends to inflate marketing costs and bread prices. The major brands strive for volume, and in order to keep their bread on a grocer's shelf often must scramble to keep him happy. One way obviously is to give him more profit.

Of the 2-cent hike in retail bread prices imposed in many cities this fall, the bakers allowed a half cent of it to go to the grocer for additional profit. This puts the grocer's profit at around five cents a loaf, which makes it one of the more profitable items in the supermarket.

Neither farmers nor millers nor bakers think they are getting much for their part in the loaf of bread. All look for ways to beat their basic costs.

Wheat grown in the central part of Kansas may sell for less than \$1.20 a bushel and cost 20-30 cents to get it to a city miller. East coast bakeries may pay \$1 a hundred pounds to ship flour from Kansas City to their plants.

The miller for years has contributed only six-tenths of a cent to a loaf of bread, and net profits of millers average only 1/4 of 1% of sales.

In fact, ingredient costs would actually show a decline over the past decade were it not for the wheat tax imposed on millers in 1963. The Federal levy, which helps underwrite the government's price support program for wheat, amounts to 73 cents per bushel of wheat, a figure that millers and bakers trans-

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late into one cent a loaf in the price of bread.

Salesmen typically get a rather low base pay of \$40 to \$50 a week, and then get 10% commission on the wholesale value of sales. When bread prices go up, the salesman is getting 10% of the action without any increase in sales.

Whatever progress bakers can make in cutting marketing costs could have a substantial impact on profits and consumer prices as well. The average American eats 92 pounds of bread a year and spends nearly 7% of his grocery budget on the staple. According to the Federal Trade Commission, postwar price increases for bread have been over three times greater than the average hike for other food products and have accounted for nearly one-fifth of the rise in grocery bills since 1945.

## Comeback By Alfalfa Seed Crop

The 1968 alfalfa seed production in Kansas was forecast at 5.6 million pounds — more than 2 1/2 times last year's small output, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

The indicated 1968 crop of alfalfa seed is only three-fifths of the 1962-66 average of 9,083,000 pounds. This year's crop is expected to be harvested from 70,000 acres, compared with 25,000 acres harvested last year but 22 percent less than the 5-year average of 89,800 acres. The expected 1968 yield per acre of 80 pounds compares with 85 pounds per acre last year and the 5-year average yield of 110 pounds per acre.

## Major Shakeup At Allis Chalmers

A take-over target for the past two years, Allis-Chalmers is taking drastic steps to improve its profits. Newly elected president David Scott has said the company will have a pretax loss of \$50 million or about \$25 million after taxes for 1968. Plans call for a sharp cutback in employment,

closing of obsolete facilities, relocation of some operations, and dropping of some product lines.

Allis has been a poor earnings performer for several years, and there have been unsuccessful merger attempts in the past two years with Ling-Temco-Vought, Inc., General Dynamics, and City Investing Co.

The \$50 million loss itself stems from sizable writeoffs of plant and machinery and major

changes in plant manufacturing allocations. Aside from the re-organizational maneuvers, profits were less than three-quarters of a million dollars on \$610 million in sales for the first nine months of this year.

Scott said there would be major cuts in nonproduction workers and the corporate staff would be reduced from 1500 to 100, as there would be a major effort to decentralize the company.

Allis-Chalmers employs about 32,000 people, and nearly 18,000 of them had been nonproduction workers.

The company makes a long list of products. About one-third of sales in 1967 was contributed by farm, industrial tractor and outdoor power equipment; another 27% by industrial equipment; 24% by construction

earthmoving and processing equipment; and 16% by electrical equipment.

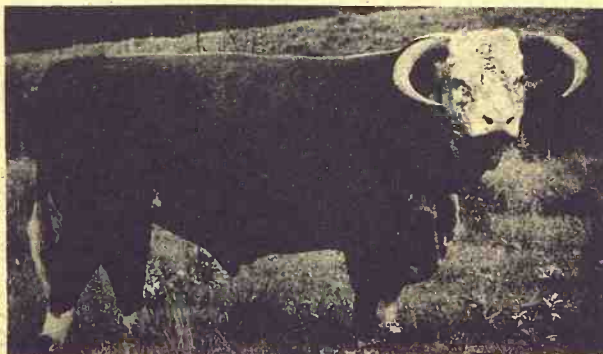

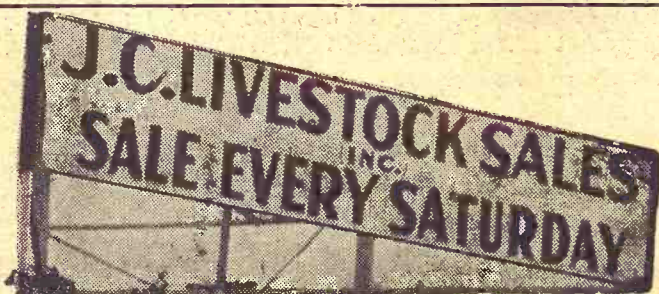

## To Market Device Which Measures Lean-ness Factor

ITHACA, N.Y. — Which little piggy will go to market? The one that "sounds" the best, according to agricultural scientists here.

The scientists have perfected a device that allows them to "hear" whether a chop or steak is good while it is still on the hoof.

The device, an ultrasonic animal scanner developed by Dr. James R. Stouffer, promises to provide the consumer with more lean meat and less fat for his

money. It is about to be produced commercially.

Dr. Stouffer's development portends ill for those who save or their meats dripping with fat, but it is expected to help meet the demand of cholesterol-conscious Americans for lean meat.

The scanner reveals if a living animal's meat is fat or lean by analyzing echoes from its muscles. The echoes are translated simultaneously into visual form on Polaroid film.

The result is an X-ray-like view of the quality of meat the animal would yield.

### Saved For Breeding

Amidst the squeals of his experimental pigs, Dr. Stouffer explained in Cornell University's animal barn that animals diagnosed as likely to yield the most lean meat would be singled out for breeding in hopes that they would transmit their desirable meat characteristics to future generations.

"We're aiming to take the guesswork out of animal breeding," said the scientist.

Dr. Stouffer and his colleagues at the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University have used the scanner to predict within a tenth of an inch the amount of fat and lean in cuts of beef, pork, and lamb.
