



He Likes Late-Planted Milo

Roland Lundquist of Clyde is a believer in the late planting of milo. "On dryland you'll increase your yield 30 bushels or more."

Last year Lundquist planted milo on May 26 and he says he got 100 bushel yields on most of it. "It doesn't take big heads to make 100 bushels, but full ones," he says.

The Cloud county farmer favors late planting (the last week in May, or even the first two weeks of June) for three reasons: 1) less threat from charcoal rot; 2) better durability during hot July and less bloom damage in August if there is moisture; 3) lack of a second growth which may delay harvest.

Lundquist said he fertilizes with 100 pounds of actual nitrogen and 20 pounds of phosphate. "It has paid off for me," he says.

He Sees Signs That Farm Prices Will Swing Upward

Farm prices have gone down lately, but they're not likely to stay there. So says John J. Heimbarger, former counsel of the House Agricultural committee, who, after 22 years in Washington in which he helped shape laws affecting food production and prices, recently retired to private practice. Heimbarger says prices are very likely to go up — and up. The consumer has some surprises coming, he says.

I think it's time we Americans stopped kidding ourselves about the price of food.

For more than 15 years now, we've been buying groceries for something less than a reasonable price. We've been getting a free ride.

Now that free ride is about over.

Everything I've learned in more than 22 years of close work with the food and farm economy convinces me that both farm and food prices from now on are heading up.

Farm prices this year have fallen off from 1966 levels and farmers are complaining, but I think this setback is going to be temporary. Consumers and their spokesmen in Congress had better begin getting used to the fact that food is going to be more expensive in the future unless they want the Treasury to pay a bigger consumer price subsidy than Congress has ever been willing to consider in the past.

Few people recognize or concede that the government now is paying heavy subsidies from its tax revenues to help hold down the cost of food at the supermarket checkout counter.

That's because we've been calling these payments farm subsidies since the mid-1950s. Since 1956, when we started making direct payments to farmers on a substantial scale, the federal government has handed out more than \$13.5 billion.

You can call these farm subsidies and you will be technically correct because they are paid to farmers — about \$3.5 billion last year. But I consider this money basically a consumer subsidy. The real effect of the system is to allow farmers to stay in business even though their market prices remain at 1950 levels — and this makes it a subsidy for the ultimate benefit of the consumer.

The rise in treasury subsidies has been only one of several factors which helped keep farm prices relatively low over most of the past 15 years. The amazing boom in farm efficiency was a factor, too. Through the 1950s, production per hour by workers in agriculture jumped 5.4 per cent a year while efficiency in non-farm industries was rising 2.1 per cent a year.

At the retail counter, prices did go up. But they didn't go up as fast as consumer income. In 1950, about 22 per cent of consumer income went for food; today it's 18 per cent. If consumers had been paying the 1950 percentage in 1966, their

grocery bill would have been \$20 billion higher.

Now we're facing a new situation. I think, though not everyone agrees, that we've passed the peak of our productivity explosion. I doubt that Congress in the near future is going to be willing to increase the direct payment subsidies. And this means that as the population here and abroad grows and food needs keep going up, farm prices are going to rise.

Consumers got a taste of what this kind of trend can mean during 1966, and they didn't like it much.

Our farmers today are a new breed of cats.

There are fewer of them than ever before. Most of our food and fiber for a nation of nearly 200 million people today comes from less than 1 million commercial farms.

I think today's breed of farmer-businessman is making management decisions the same way any businessman does. He decides how to invest his capital — owned or borrowed — on the basis of what kind of profit he can make from his investment. The total result of these individual management decisions is already beginning

to be felt, and it will be felt to a greater degree in the future. Want an example?

Beef may or may not seem cheap to you at the retail store now. But to cattlemen, farm prices recently have been too low in comparison with today's operating expenses. And at least two significant reactions are under way in the cattle business.

The American National Cattlemen's Association has recently begun developing a marketing information program which it says will eventually let farmers and ranchers be "price-makers" instead of "price-takers."

On an allied front, the National Farmers Organization has planned a direct action program under which farmers who think beef prices are too low will be given a chance to sell off some of their producing cows for immediate slaughter.

Our economists are beginning to change some of their old ideas about how farm production responds to price changes. A year ago, for instance, hog prices were high enough to encourage expansion. But instead of the boom in pig production we might have expected a decade ago, we saw a compar-

atively moderate expansion. Hog farmers are just not going to blindly destroy their own prices any more by over-reacting to good prices.

There are other signs. Interest in farmer bargaining associations, especially among farmers who contract in advance to produce fruits and vegetables for canning and freezing, is rising steadily. There's strong pressure in Congress this year for passage of a bill which would make it illegal for a processor to discriminate against a bargaining association member because of the farmer's enrollment in the association.

Beside this mushrooming of moves by farmers who intend to take a direct hand in making prices, we still have a series of government production — adjustment programs. The old hangover surpluses of grains are gone, but the control programs remain. The administration's farm officials contend they're still needed — even though in loosened form — to prevent runaway production and the buildup of new surpluses.

With farm prices almost inevitably trending up over the next few years, we will probably see a new wave of resistance by consumers.

Sheep Day At K-State April 3

MANHATTAN — Predators, often a problem to sheep producers, is one of the afternoon topics of the 5th Annual Sheep Day, Monday, April 3, at Kansas State University, Manhattan. John Meyers, Oklahoma City, Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, will explain the "Federal Predator Control Program."

The 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. program will be in Weber Hall on the campus. Registration begins at 9:15 a.m. A noon lunch will be served.

The morning program will center around the status of sheep production in Kansas. Byron Taylor, Denver, will report on the recent meeting of the American Sheep Producers Council.

Mrs. Joe Greene, Beverly, will add a feminine touch by explaining the activities of the Ladies Sheep and Wool Auxiliary.

Leslie Kohl, Wichita, will report on the Kansas State Sheep and Wool Growers Association, and Robert Lukins, Beloit, will discuss the Kansas Quality Sheep Program.

Producers will hear about the coming new KSU sheep facilities from Dr. Carl Menzies of the animal husbandry department. Building will begin this year to replace facilities destroyed by the June 1966 tornado.

In the afternoon, George Ahlschwede, Extension meat specialist, will help sheepmen learn more about "Evaluation of Lamb Carcasses," by using samples from the KSU slaughter facility.

Evaluation of live lambs will feature animals brought in by producers. Discussion will be led by Ahlschwede and Menzies. The lambs will be slaughtered following the Sheep Day and data sent to the producers.

Plan More Acres For Sorghum, Beans, Beets

Kansas farmers are expected to plant more sorghums, soybeans and sugar beets this spring than last but fewer acres of corn, oats and barley, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service reported.

Sugar beet increases are expected to be up 10 per cent over a year ago while sorghum and soybean acreage plantings should be up four per cent each. Corn plantings are expected to be down one per cent from a year ago; oats down 20 per cent and barley down 48 per cent.

Reflect Wheat Increase

The acreage decline in barley and oats would reflect, in part, the large increase of 19 per cent in wheat acreage sown last fall. The acreage of hay expected to be cut this year is three per cent less than cut last year.

Some Federal Government Farm Program sign-ups were recorded this month but all programs are expected to idle between 2.25 and 2.5 million acres this year, about one-half that idled last year.

Feed grain acreage expected to be planted this year is estimated at 5.647 million acres, about one per cent less than last year.

Record Estimated

Soybean acreage planted this year is estimated to be 967,000 acres, which would be a record and four per cent above last year and 19 per cent above the average.

The 1967 sugar beet acreage is expected to total 24,000 acres, which would be the second large-

est acreage of record and 10 per cent more than last year and 30 per cent above the average.

Potato acreage is expected to total 2,000 acres, down nine per cent from last year. Intended sweetpotato acreage is estimated to be 1,600 acres — the same as last year. Dry bean acreage this year is estimated to total 12,000 acres, unchanged from last year. Acreage of all types of hay intended to be cut by Kansas farmers and ranchers this year is expected to be

2.478 million acres compared with 2.555 million acres cut last year.

HANOVER TO VOTE ON HOSPITAL BONDS

HANOVER — This Washington County town will vote April 18 on a \$198,500 bond issue to finance a 32-bed addition to the Hanover hospital. The bond issue assumes there will be additional federal funds to give the local hospital a total capacity of 49 beds.

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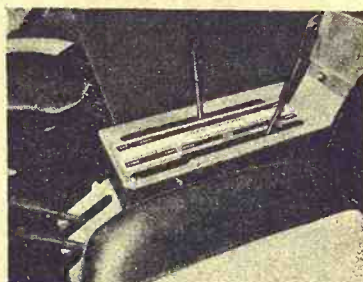
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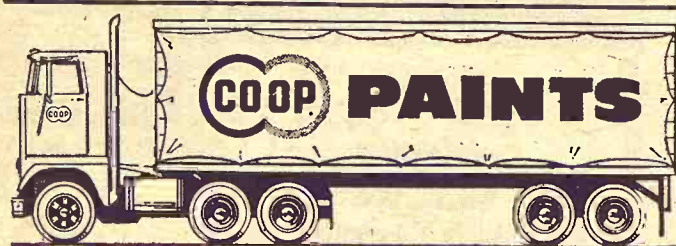

Computerized Farming By Year 2000

Whirling overhead in the year 2000 will be space satellites supplying basic information for agriculture, predicts Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman.

"While the farmers of tomorrow study reports in their air-conditioned offices, relieved at last of the physical drudgery and occupational anxiety so traditionally theirs, and the Secretary of Agriculture takes unaccustomed ease at his desk in Washington, these shining space satellites, equipped with the most sophisticated remote sensing instruments, are supplying the information needed to make key decisions," the secretary said today in a talk prepared for a convention of the National Associations of Science Teachers.

The sensors of the satellites would be able, he predicted, to detect differences in soil; identify different crops and kinds of forest trees; determine damage by diseases, insects and drought, and assess crop stands and vigor in order to predict production.

"Information gathered from throughout the world will be transmitted to computers for analysts and immediate use. The soils of the world will have been inventoried, and each crop will be grown either on the soil best suited for it, or on soil chemically modified for maximum productivity," he said.

"Through information gathered by the satellites, the government will be able to make accurate predictions to guide marketing and distribution of farm products to avoid waste and local shortages and surpluses."

He gave this example: "Suppose the control station requests a check on the maturity of the North American wheat crop. A signal is sent to the spacecraft sensor, and within a few minutes the results are in."

"The grain in Oklahoma is ripening fast and threatens to glut local markets. So information goes out to farmers to en-

able them to manipulate artificial light and apply growth-regulating chemicals.

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Demand For Horses Grows In Spring

Got a hankering to own your own horse? A lot of people get this urge every spring.

The muscular and fast Quarterhorse is in strong demand by Kansas riders. Crossbreeds, too,

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make good pleasure horses. The small and gentle Shetland is still a good "kid" pony.

During this horse-hunting season, a Kansas State University Extension veterinarian recommends that "prospective buyers should shy away from the glib salesman with a good deal."

Unless you are an experienced horseman that knows animals "deal only with reliable owners who are known in the local community," warns Dr. Homer K. Caley.

"A trustworthy dealer will often allow you 1 or 2 weeks to try out the animal before the sale is closed," maintains Dr. Caley. "During this time you should ride the animal often

and have a veterinarian inspect it."

Seek a healthy steed that is suited to your size, riding ability, and personality. If you are 6 feet tall and weigh 200 pounds, pick a horse that is at least 15 hands high, Dr. Caley advises. A youngster should buy as big a horse as he can mount and control with ease.

In selecting a horse, beware of unsoundness in the feet and legs and bad habits, such as kicking, rearing, running away, stall walking, and cribbing (latching teeth on the stall and sucking air because of boredom), he says.

"Buy the best animal you can afford," advises Dr. Caley, "and don't become so attached to any horse that you won't trade up." Whichever horse you finally chose, you will need to provide him with:

- Housing — a sturdy stall that is 12 feet square and 10 feet high.

- Running space — a paddock ¼ to 1 acre in size or 2 acres of pasture on which he can run at least 2 miles a day. Lack of such exercise will cause his feet, ankles, and legs to swell.

- Feed — a food supply that is equivalent to 2½ or 3 pounds of hay a day for each 100

pounds of body weight. One pound of corn, oats, or mixed horse feed equals 1½ pounds of hay in nutritive value. Reduce or eliminate hay if the animal

is on lush pasture.

- Foot care — regular foot trimmings and shoeings.

ROUNDUP REPORT

Our Catlemen's Roundup, March 8th, was a great success as attendance and interest was high. Those attending the afternoon discussion were especially impressed by the quality of information presented by members of the panel. Topics of interest involved feedlot drainage control, nutrition, non-feed costs, handling cattle, and the future of the beef industry.

I am certainly in agreement with Wilton Thomas, KSU Extension Economist, when he stressed that agriculture needs to concentrate on improving its marketing system to bring up farm prices more in line with the things farmers buy. He also stressed the need to reverse the image of food prices with consumers as we are spending less of our income for food than ever before in history. Let's let people know this.

Dr. Keith Zoellner, Extension Livestock Specialist, mentioned that we should continue to be critical of the product we are producing to make sure that it is readily accepted by the consumer.

Clarence Bartlett, Farm Management Fieldman, pointed out that "non-feed costs" vary greatly among various operators. Consequently, these costs might mean the difference between a profit or a loss.

Dr. Calvin Drake of the KSU Animal Husbandry Staff discussed some new developments in feedlot nutrition. He mentioned that corn has been the standard

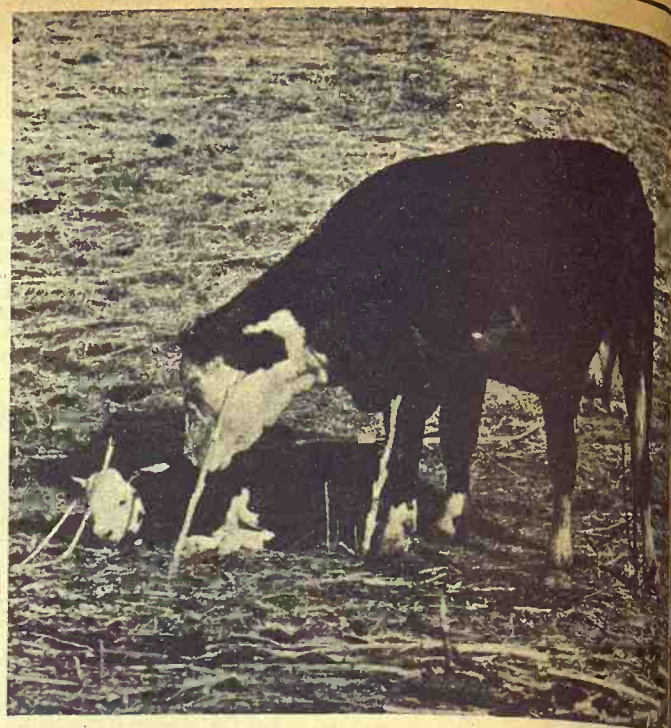

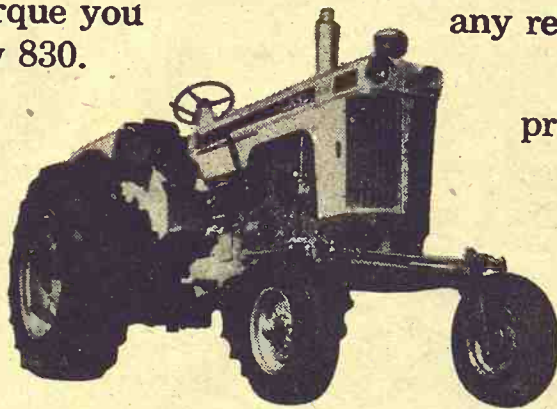

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Cut Back Hog Production

Hog farmers have begun to

cut back production as a result of declines in livestock prices. An Agriculture department survey forecast that pig production during the March-May

period this year in 10 Mid-Western corn belt states will be down about 3 per cent from a year ago. It predicted further that production during the June-August period will be 5 per cent smaller than a year earlier.

The pig crop in these states for the December-February period was 5 per cent larger than a year earlier, totaling 12,430,000. The survey found 3 per cent more hogs on farms March 1 this year than a year earlier, or 37½ million head.

States surveyed were Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas. They normally produce about 75 per cent of the nation's hogs.

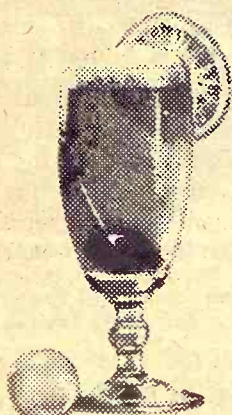

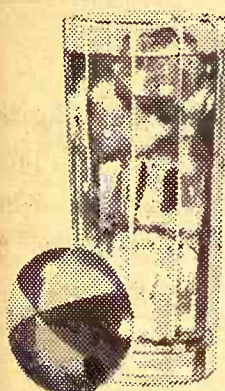

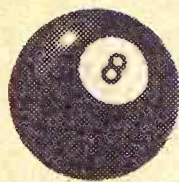

Here Is Farrowing Forecast

The largest winter-quarter pig crop in 17 years of record was produced on Kansas farms this year, but breeding intentions indicate smaller gains in farrowings in coming months, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The pig crop for the December 1966-February 1967 winter quarter totaled 474,000 head, 13 per cent more than in the same period last year and 7 per cent more than the 1961-65 average.

Sows farrowed during the December-February quarter totaled 64,000, 10 per cent more than the number farrowed the previous year.

Pigs per litter averaged 7.40

during the quarter, the highest recorded for this quarter and well above the 7.23 a year earlier.

Sows expected to farrow during the March-May quarter are estimated at 100,000 head, 6 per cent more than in this period a year ago.

Indicated farrowings by months show expected increases from a year earlier for March and April but no change for May.

The number of sows to farrow in March, April and May are indicated at 40,000, 37,000 and 23,000 respectively.

Prospective farrowings for the June-August quarter are estimated at 67,000 sows, 3 per

cent more than in the same period last year.

The inventory number of all hogs and pigs on Kansas farms is estimated at 1,379,000 head, 13 per cent more than a year ago. Hogs and pigs being kept for breeding purposes totaled 234,000 head, 6 per cent more than last year.

The remaining 1,145,000 head being kept for market purposes was up 14 per cent from last year. As of March 1, the number of market hogs and pigs by weight groups increased by 9 per cent for those under 60 pounds, 15 per cent in the 60-119 pound weight group, 29 per cent for the 120-179 pound size and 12 per cent for the 180-219 pound size group.

Corn Belt States

The number of hogs and pigs on farms in the 10 Corn Belt States on March 1, 1967 totaled 37.5 million head. This is an increase of 3 per cent from the year-earlier total of 36.3 million head.

The March 1 inventory decreased 13 per cent from the revised level of 43.1 million head on hand December 1, 1966.

This seasonal decrease is compared with 8 per cent for this period a year earlier and the average of 14 per cent.

Of the total March 1 inventory, 7,024,000 head were being kept for breeding, 4 per cent less than a year earlier. Hogs and pigs, other than for breeding, totaled 30,466,000 head, 5 per cent more than the 29,034,000 on hand March 1, 1966.

The December-February 1967 pig crop for the 10 States totaled 3,208,000 head, an increase of 5 per cent from the same period a year earlier.

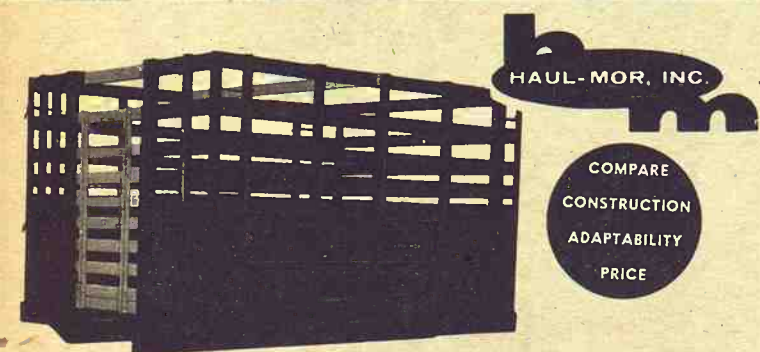
Sows bred and intended for farrowing during the March-May quarter totaled 3,208,000 head, 3 per cent less than a year earlier.

Breeding intentions are for 2,066,000 sows to farrow during the June-August 1967 quarter, 5 per cent below a year earlier.

Surprise! Chick Hatch Is Up

Commercial hatcheries in Kansas turned out 650,000 baby chicks in February — 37,000 more than for the same month in 1966, the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said Monday.

Egg-type chicks totaled 600,000 — 100,000 more than those hatched in January and 25,000 more than were turned out in February 1966. There were 50,000 broiler-type chicks hatched during February.

On Feb. 1, prices received by hatcheries averaged \$46 for 100 hybrid egg-type pullet chicks, \$33 for 100 pure bred egg-type pullet chicks and \$17 for broil-

er-type, straight run chicks, the service reported.

Poultry flocks in Kansas produced 81 million eggs during February — 4 million less than was produced in January, but 9 million eggs more than in February 1966.

Crop Insurance Cut Off In Part Of Oklahoma

Federal crop insurance policies are not being sold in six western Oklahoma counties because of the drought.

The state director of the federal insurance program said the insurance will not be sold to farmers in Texas, Tillman and Cotton counties for 1966 wheat sales, or to Kiowa, Tillman and Washita and Beckham counties for 1967 spring crop sales.

Farmers, under the insurance, are protected from finan-

cial loss against any natural hazards.

Any farmers who already hold the insurance will be protected, Myron Moore, state director of FCIC, said.

Moore said if the drought continues the sales cutoff may extend to other counties in the state.

Answer To Egg Problem Is In The Kitchen

Wondering why the price of eggs has gone down during the past 10 years, even though the cost of most other food products has risen sharply? The answer lies no farther away than your kitchen table.

People are eating fewer eggs than they used to. And it doesn't take an economist to figure out the relationship between price and demand.

The average American ate a little more than an egg a day in 1955. Yearly per capita egg consumption was 375. By 1965, this figure had dropped to 308.

Price of eggs followed a similar pattern during the period. In 1955, the farmer was getting an average of 41.3 cents a dozen for his eggs. The same dozen eggs cost the consumer 63 cents. Just 10 years later, the farmer's average price had dropped to 33.7 cents and the retail price to 52.7 cents a dozen.

The demand for eggs is inelastic. This means that a given percentage change in produc-

tion results in a larger percentage change in prices. As demand slacks off, producers cut back production and prices also go down.

Eggs have always been a breakfast food. Most eggs consumed are eaten during the morning meal. But eating habits have changed during recent years. More housewives are working outside the home than ever before. They have less time to spend making breakfast. Many have switched from eggs to breakfast cereal, or to no breakfast at all. And housewives are doing less home baking than ever before.

The egg industry will have to make a concerted promotional effort to regain this market. With an inelastic demand for eggs, it will take a stabilized price to provide a reasonable profit for all segments of the industry.

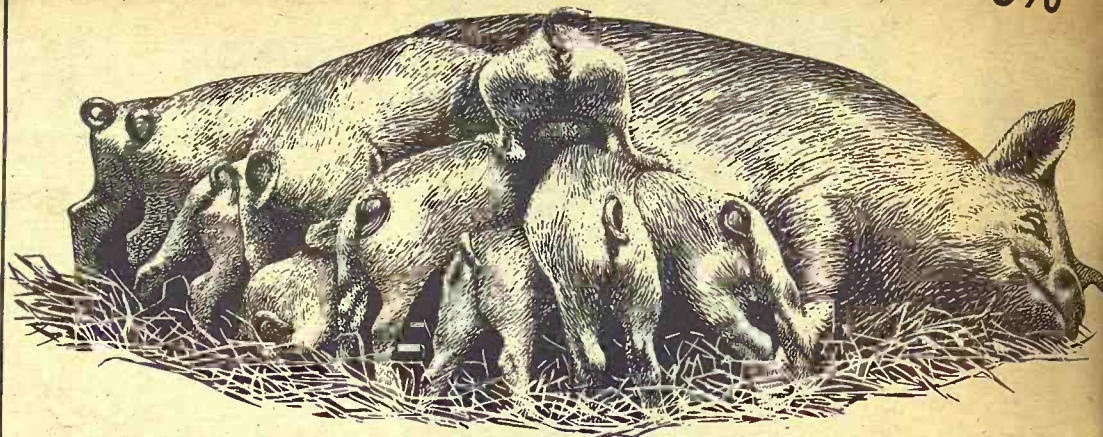

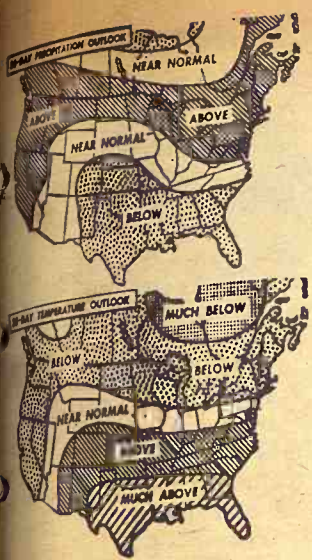

Still Milk In The Grocery Dairy Cases

The NFO's milk holding will move into its third week, with as yet no sign that the strike is making a dent on the target: the supermarket milk case.

But area leaders of the National Farmers Organization indicated the boycott would continue.

After a meeting at which a reported 400 persons attended at Chanute Saturday, Don Evertson of Melvern, a national di-

rector for Kansas, said: "Members are the ones to decide how long the holding action will continue. As long as they continue to vote for the action, we on the board of directors will comply with their wishes."

While milk dumping has gone on for nearly two weeks in at least a dozen G&G area counties, it remains as conjecture how many NFO dairymen are dumping milk, how many non-members are aiding them, and whether either have been dumping milk on a daily basis or merely once or twice.

If, as some observers neither with the NFO nor processors have observed, that any effective action should have made its impression by emptying grocery milk cases, then it would

appear at this stage that not enough dairymen joined the action to bear on the market with enough force to gain the 2-cent a quart increase in bulk milk that they hoped for.

In one area — Nashville, Tennessee — there was a sign that the NFO action was making its mark. Major milk processors halted operations over the weekend with apparently not enough milk delivered to the plants to continue normal operation.

The Nashville scarcity came in part, at least, because of picket lines set up by union

truck drivers sympathetic to the NFO.

Some creameries in Minnesota indicated they had signed NFO contracts calling for the 2-cent a quart increase but the contracts required the NFO meeting volume requirements which were not publicly detailed.

In Corning, Iowa, NFO headquarters, president Oren Lee Staley — without elaboration — said: "Contracts are being signed at NFO prices. This is good and it's the whole reason we called the holding action."

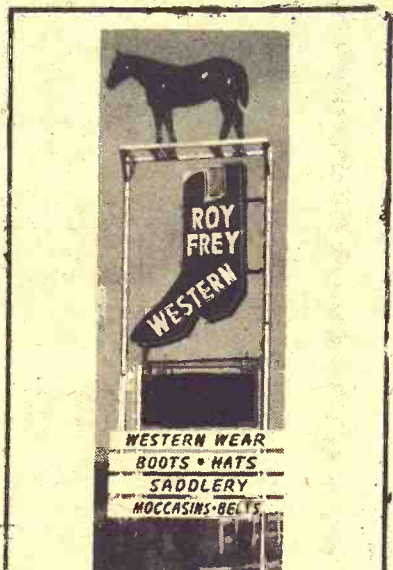

counties gave a favorable vote for the project.

The vote in Clay was 81 to 31 against; Ottawa 54 to 4 against; Dickinson 68 to 32; and Cloud 8 to 8.

Five years ago, a petition for the formation of the district got the signatures of enough landowners with enough land to make it appear the district would be a sure thing.

But in the intervening years there were a number of legal challenges and enthusiasm for the district apparently waned.

Walter Mugler, Clay Center, chairman of the watershed board, "The people have spoken and that's that."

He indicated no effort would be made to revive the district.

He said he thought defeat was caused by "the threat of more taxes and the threat of the

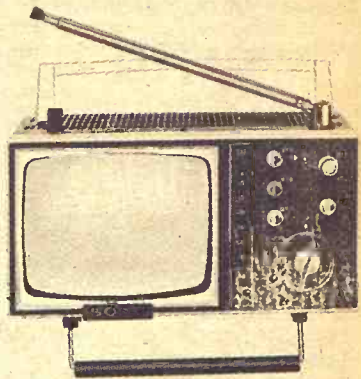

Move Along To Allow Farm Incorporation

A perennial bill to allow corporate farming has been approved by the Kansas Senate acting as a committee of the whole. Sen. Jack Barr, R-Leoti, and Sen. Claude Bell, R-McDonald, are sponsors of the bill.

Barr said the bill removes all restrictions on incorporating farming operations. Under existing law some farming operations could be incorporated by using such legal maneuvers as land holding corporations.

Barr said lifting the corporation barrier will allow farmers to receive the same corporate tax privileges as other businesses.

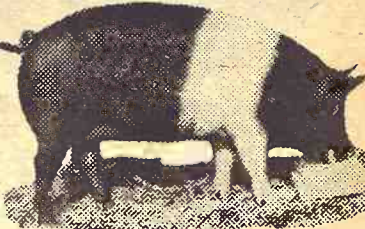
