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

Loading Feed

The operation uses in excess of 1 million bushels of corn a year plus hundreds of tons of silage. Location of Bostwick Irrigation District helps make this feed available nearby. Some silage is raised on the farm but much has to be purchased elsewhere. Silo capacity is 18,000 tons.

State Feedlots Bulge To Over Half Million Head

For the first time in history Kansas has over a half-million cattle on feed, with the Kansas Livestock Reporting Service estimating the total of cattle and calves on feed in the state as of January 1 as 586,000, up 22% from a year ago.

Of this total about 275,000 are on farm feedlots which feed less than a thousand head. Commercial feedlots feeding more than a thousand head had about 311,000 head on feed as of January 1.

The pictures on this page were taken at one of the several dozen large feedlots in the state. This is the Republican Valley Feedlot west of Scandia, in Republic County, on US 36. Located on 320 acres, the lots and feed facilities themselves cover about 90 acres

The operation was begun in the early 1960s by George Rooney of Belleville, and now has 30 stockholders and employs 18 people, operating on a 24-hour schedule.

Sometimes You Have To Pay

If you sold or traded machinery last year on which you took investment credit, you may have to re-compute the credit when you file your 1966 tax re-

If you didn't keep it as long as you intended, there's a good chance you'll have to pay up some of the credit you used against your tax liability for

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for feedlot operators:

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the year you acquired the property.

Here's an example. Suppose John Smith bought a new tractor in 1962. He set it up for an 8-year life. But he bought an additional quarter section of land last year. He needed a bigger tractor to farm the extra acreage, so he traded the 1962 model for a more powerful new one.

Smith will have to re-figure

the investment credit on the old tractor. He'll have to repay some of the credit he used against his tax when he bought the tractor in 1962.



It would work like this. Suppose Smith paid \$6,000 for the tractor in 1962. He claimed an investment credit of \$420 (\$6000 x7 percent) on his 1962 tax re-

But Smith kept the tractor only 4 years. Thus, only a third of the investment is eligible for the credit. He claimed \$420 in 1962, so he must now repay twothirds of this amount. He'd have to add to his 1966 tax the extra \$280 he claimed on his 1962 return. In effect, this is a delayed payment of part of his 1962

tax liability.

For purposes of determining actual life, investment credit property is considered as having been placed in service on the first day of the month in which it was purchased. Thus, had Smith purchased the tractor on June 30, 1962, and traded it on June 1, 1966, he would have had it 4 years for determining investment credit.

If there have been other investment credits earned but not used, the amount of the additional tax now due would be reduced by the amount of any unused credits from prior years. If Smith had carryover investment credit of \$70, he could apply it to the \$280 and add only \$210 to his 1966 tax liability.

If you traded the machine in on a new replacement, you would first have computed your 1966 investment credit on the new machine. This would be a credit against your 1966 tax.

If you keep a machine longer than you intend, and really earn more investment credit than you claimed when you acquired it, you cannot later claim the extra credit. This is a one-way

Despite the recent suspension of investment credit, you can still claim the credit on \$20,000 worth of eligible purchases made between October 10, 1966,

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

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Big Enid Elevator Sold

The 51/4-million bushel elevator at Enid, Oklahoma, has been acquired in total by the Johnston Grain Elevator Co., which has purchased the half interest belonging to Enid oil man Joe Champlin. The Johnston company had owned the other half and had administered the elevator since 1954.

No purchase price was announced. On January 20 an ad had appeared in the Wall Street Journal announcing an auction of the elevator. The ad produced several prospective buyers to Enid but Johnston immediately announced he had no intention of selling his firm's half interest.

Rare Bald Eagle Sighted Near Ramona

RAMONA - Nathen Bailey, Ramona, saw a bald eagle on his farm one mile west of Ra-

Bailey said the bird was perched in a tree near a pond in a pasture.

According to recent publicity, bald eagles are becoming scarce in the United States. Pesticides have been blamed for the decline in population as well as encroaching civilization.

Not so in Kansas, according to Dr. John Zimmerman, professor of Zoology at Kansas State University, Manhattan.



"Although the eagle population in Kansas is probably down from several years ago, there are still numerous birds in the state, particularly in the winter," Zimmerman said.

It usually nests in areas where there is a lot of water. Alaska has the largest eagle population, followed closely by Canada, Florida and the Dako-


"These birds get a lot of traveling done," Zimmerman commented.



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
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Western Kansas Is Irrigating Faster Than Its Ground Water Recharges

Ground water in Western Kansas is dropping faster than it is being recharged.

As a result, Kansas, Colorado and Oklahoma are cooperating in a survey to determine how fast the water table is dropping in Western Kansas, Eastern Colorado and the Oklahoma Pan-

Investigators from the states are now in the field and a group of geologists and engineers from state and federal agencies in Kansas are at work, too.

Fifteen men from Colby and Garden City offices representing the U.S. Geological Survey, in the Kansas Geological Survey, and the Kansas State Board of Agriculture's Division of Water Resources are handling the assignment in Kansas.

"Groundwater is being mined in parts of Western Kansas and in the adjacent areas of Colorado and Oklahoma," Dr. Frank C. Foley, director of the Kansas Geological Survey said.

"This means water is being withdrawn from underground reservoirs faster than it is being replenished."

"The amount of water in underground reservoirs is large, but not unlimited."

"We had hoped heavy rains in Western Kansas during the Summer and Fall of 1965 would have brought a significant decrease in pumping for irrigation and a significant increase in the amount of natural recharge, resulting in a rise in ground water levels. Despite these heavy rains, however, the ground water levels declined because the amount of pumping continued to exceed the amount of recharge.

"Because of below normal" precipitation in 1966, and a further increase in pumping for irrigaton, we expect a further demline of water levels for the year."

Water level measurements are made on a large number of observation wells and irrigation wells in late January each year to provide information on annual changes in ground - water levels. Pumping for irrigation is at a minimum in the Winter months and water level measurements made at the end of this period are most representative, Dr. Foley explained.

Present irrigators are concerned about how long their water supply will last and prospective irrigators wish to be as sured of a supply before investing in wells and equipment. The

decline has been rapid enough that some irrigators are deepening or rehabilitating wells, and some are drilling additional wells to maintain their supply.

"In time the quantity of

ground water in Wester sas aquiers may be enough that irrigation longer be practical" warned.

The extent and impo the decline of ground was els has led to a program study of the area's gro er resources.

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

For dairymen, the situation improved substantially in 1966. This change began in the fall of 1965. By the last quarter of 1966, prices received for milk averaged \$4.90 a hundred pounds - 75 cents higher than before the rise began, an increase of 30 percent. The pricesupport level has been raised 23 percent, to \$4.00 a hundred pounds for manufacturing milk. This level of support is scheduled to continue through March of 1968.

Producers of feeder cattle had a good year in 1966. They sold most of their calves and yearlings for \$24 to \$28 a hundred pounds. These prices were 10 to 15 percent higher than a year earlier, and up 20 to 30 percent from two years before. They were the highest prices received since 1958 and 1959. Prices for feeder calves and cattle may average even higher in 1967 than in 1966 - because of the expected cyclical contraction of

beef output.

Cattle feeding in the United States must be the biggest "Put and Take" game in the world. Since last spring it has been mostly "put, put, put . . !" Cash losses appear to have been \$30 to \$50 per head on most cattle sold in recent months. Despite these losses, cattle feeders have great confidence in the future, judging from the way they have been building feedlots and buying replacement cattle.

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

1 can cut okra 1 cup milk ½ pound sharp cheese salt

pepper 4 tablespoons butter

2 tablespons flour 1 cup fine dry bread crumbs

1 can corn

Drain the water from the okra. Fry the okra in two tablespoons of the butter for about ten minutes, stirring often to prevent scorching. Place the okra and corn in alternate layers in a greased baking dish. Sprinkle each layer with salt and pepper. Make the sauce of the two remaining tablespoons butter, 2 tablespoons of flour and the milk. Add the cheese and salt and stir until the cheese has melted. Pour over the okra and corn and cover with the crumbs. Bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees) until the mixture is hot through and the crumbs are brown.





Hard as stone were the bottles and nipples used to feed babies in the past. Pewter, pottery, silver and porcelain feeding devices were common. Nursers were even carved from wood, gourds and animal horns.

One company has also gone a step further by making available to hospitals ready-to-use, sterilized forms of palatable fluids such as tea, bouillon and cola which have been used for decades for infants suffering from digestive upsets.

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Squelch Feeding Tax Gimmick

A cattle investment tax benefit has been disallowed by an appeals court.

Some higher-income-bracket taxpayers seek low-taxed capital gains by investing in cattle to be fattened by professional feeders for sale. An advantage is that the owners take bigger than usual deductions from current income both for depreciation and for costs of feeding and caring for the animals.

Under some plans, moreover, taxpayers step up expenses by making substantial prepay. ments shortly before the end of a year for feed to be supplied the next year.

The Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals has just upheld a Tax Court ruling barring this latter move. Nudge Should Start Bank Rate Decline

A borrower in the G&G area probably should be able to get a loan at a lower rate of interest following moves last week by some metropolitan banks in reducing their prime rates.

The move in the U.S. started with the Chase Manhattan Bank in New York City, which cut its prime rate from 6 to 51/2%. By no means was there a rush by other banks to follow suit, but many major banks did and presumably others will have to fol-

Several banks in Kansas City, including Commerce Trust the city's largest, cut their prime rate to 51/2% the next day following Chase's announcement, as did the Union National in Wichita. The Fourth National Bank in Wchita, Kansas' largest bank, did not immediately announce a cut, saying it "would watch the situation.'

While the announcements concern only prime rates — that is, the interest charged on what banks consider their "best" loans — the effect should filter three-fourths of the total on within weeks to other types of business, farm and individual

586,000 Cattle In Kansas Feedlots

For January 1, 1967, the number of cattle and calves on feed for the slaughter market was a record 586,000 head, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This was 22 percent more than the number on feed a year ago and 41 percent above the 1961-65 average for the date.

Farm feeding operations accounted for 275,000 of the total while there was a record 311,000 head on feed in large feedlots with a capacity of 1,000 head or

Marketings of fed cattle for slaughter during October, November and December 1966 totaled 260,000 head, a sharp increase from a year earlier. Cattle and calves placed on feed during the October-December quarter amounted to 370,000 head, a 12 percent increase from the comparable quarter in

Cattle on feed January 1 were classed by weight groups as follows: 31,000 head weighing 1100 pounds or more, 191,000 head weighing 900-1099 pounds, 238,000 head weighing 700-899 pounds, 108,000 head in the 500-699 pound group and 18,000 weighing under 500 pounds.

The total of those weighing over 900 pounds increased 17 percent while those under 900 pounds was up 25 percent from a year ago. Steers and steer calves on feed accounted for January 1 or 437,000 head, while heifers and heifer calves totaled 149,000 head. Cattle on feed

January 1 by length of time on feed were classed as follows: less than 3 months, 358,000 head; 3 to 6 months, 211,000 head: and on feed more than 6 months 17,000 head.

Kansas farm feeders reported a daily average feeding ration as follows: 17.2 pounds of grain, 15 nounds of high protein feed,

2.0 pounds of hay, and 13.4 pounds of silage. These averages are all above a year ago except for hay which is down 1.5 pounds from last year.

Intentions of Kansas farmers were to market 320,000 head of those on feed January 1 during the January-March quarter and the remainder in later months.



Tax On What Land Earns Not What It Costs'

TOPEKA — A past president of the Kansas Livestock Association last week called for assessment of farm land on the basis of what it earns rather than what it sells for.

Bill House, Cedar Vale, spoke before the House Assessment and Taxation Committee.

"Land has two values," said House, "what it is worth to you to work it and what you get for it when you sell out."

House said both federal and state governments take out a good sized slice on the basis of sale value. Farmers and ranchers can't live on that unless income doubles, he added.

House said farmers do not own land for development purposes but to make a living.

"In California," he said, there has been a constitutional amendment permitting land to be assessed on an earning basis as long as it is used for agriculture.

"If it is used for development, they go back three years and assess at the higher rate.

"We are asking you to divide the two values and let us live on assessment of earning value, not sale value."

House told committee members that the agriculture industry now pays about 25 percent

on its earnings. He said the industry would be happy with 3 percent, the rate used for taxation of the earnings on stocks and bonds.

House said the cattle feeding industry is not in any danger of moving out of the state now, though a \$10 differential in the cost of operation is enough to cause feeders to shift from one place to another.

This could be in taxes, labor or feed cost among other factors, he explained.

"If we're on the high side," said House, "you can kiss the industry goodbye, and that includes packing houses.

"We have enough feed in Kansas for 2 million to 3 million cattle. At the same time we are shipping feed to the West Coast. We think the industry here could triple as long as the freight rate on beef is equal to the rate on live animals. I would hate to see us lose out because of taxation."

"House said it takes \$12 to \$14 in taxes to produce a calf in Kansas compared to \$2.50 in New Mexico. He said cattlemen in the Flint Hills have been able to compete with this because they get a heavier calf.

"We have picked up four packing houses in Kansas,' House said. "Our elevators will stay in business only if we keep our feeding industry. This is important."

Since then, city officials have called on the Sylvan Grove water supply as a temporary solusoutheastern United States, those competitive to Kansas, exempt cattle from assessments.



A New Wheat Variety Released

MANHATTAN - Seed of a new hard red winter wheat variety called Parker will be available in Kansas and Missouri ths fall.

Release of the wheat was announced by the Missouri Agricultural Experiment Station, the Crops Research Divison of the USDA, and the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station.

Seed of Parker, developed by the Kansas Station and the USDA Crops Research Division, was released to registered Kansas and Missouri seed growers last fall, so limited supplies of Parker seed should be available after harvest this summer.

Crosses that produced Parker include Quivira, Kanred, Hard Federation, Prelude, Kawvale, Marquillo, and Tenmarq. Parker matures early, has short, stiff straw, and resists leaf rust and hessian fly. It is susceptible to soil-borne mosaic, wheatstreak mosaic, stem rust, bunt

and loose smut. Parker is expected to compete favorably with Triumph in both Kansas and Missouri. It is recommended in Kansas only for south-central and central areas.

Parker's milling and breadbaking qualities are satisfactory; it has long mixing time and moderate loaf volume potential.

Original Parker seed came from the Kansas wheat breeding program; Missouri increased the foundation seed last year.

In Total Farms

The 3,258,000 farms operating in the U.S. during 1966 represented a 4 percent drop from the total a year earlier and were nearly 25 percent below the 1959 total of over four million.

Despite the cutback in farm numbers, however, land in farms — at 1.14 billion acres - was down less than 1 per cent from a year earlier.

During 1967, it is expected that the number of farms operating in the U.S. will show a further decline — dropping to 3,176,000, or a 2.5 per cent decrease.

Average size of farms is expected to continue upward to 359 acres in 1966, compared to 342 acres in 1965 and only 288 acres in 1959.



"We feel compelled to offer this resolution early in this Congress because it seems apparent that this administration places a very low priority on the nation's agriculture," Reps. Robert Dole, Chester L. Mize, Larry Winn Jr., Garner E. Shriver and Joe Skubitz, said in a statement.

Contending the administration last year used the farmer as "a whipping boy for its inflationary policies," the statement said the Secretary of Agriculture continually depressed grain and livestock prices by dumping government owned commodities on the market

At the same time, the Kansans said, the administration's domestic fiscal policies pushed farm production costs to record heights.

They said farm prices now are at only 77 percent of parity and the farmer is earning only about 60 percent as much as his city cousin. Administration farm policies will cause net farm income to drop by at least 5 per cent during 1967, the group said.







"Some of the legislators think the sale price of property has been used more in arriving at the ratio of tax assessment when the productive value of property should have had more consideration," Slocombe said.

Slocombe's committee is considering a bill recommended by the legislative council to impose a nominal state tax on transfers of title to real estate.

Kansas has relied upon a federal tax on such transfers for obtaining information on the sale prices of real estate for use in the assessment ratio stu-

The federal tax is expiring, however, and the state tax is being proposed as a substitute method of acquiring the infor-

"I think some members would

just as soon see this bill fail so the assessment ratio study could no longer be performed as it has been in the past," Slocombe said.

Rep. Thomas Van Cleave, D. Kansas City, agreed with Slocombe that the assessment ratio study may be in trouble.

He said some alternative must be found in the distribution of state funds to take the place of the assessment ratio study if this is discarded.

"There have been discussions of possible alternatives," Van Cleave said, but no one has come up with anything acceptable so far."

Half Of Rural Poverty In South

Only 29.1 percent of the nation's population lives in rural areas but 43.4 percent of America's poor are found there, the National Association for Community Development reported last week.

The association reports that in rural America, 26.9 per cent of the people are poor - family income under \$3,000 annually or individual income below \$1500compared to 14.4 percent in ur-

More than half of rural poverty is found in the South," the report says. "All but three of the 250 counties in which rural families had the lowest median incomes in 1959 were in the 14 southern and border states."

The report says three out of four of the rural poor are white

but poverty to greater proportionately among Negro and other nonwhite rural residents.

The report, in a booklet entitled "Dimensions of Rural Poverty," was issued in advance of the association's three-day conference on rural poverty which opens Monday.

Rural areas most in need of economic development, according to the report are southern tobacco and cotton areas, Appalachia, the Ozarks, upper Great Lakes region, northern New England and Indian reservations.

"In many of the poor rural areas, the greatest undeveloped resource is the people who live there," says the report. "This is especially true in the South."



NEBRASKA FU JOINS PROPOSED BOYCOTT

The Nebraska Farmers Union board last week voted to join the North Dakota FU in a boycott against new cars, trucks and farm machinery.

First Land Bank Loan Was Made 50 Years Ago To Larned Farmer

TOPEKA - Kansas is the home of "firsts" in the nation's Federal Land Bank system.

The Federal Land Bank of Wichita was the first of 12 organized in the nation, and a loan to a Larned, Kans. farmer was the first made under the new program 50 years ago, William G. Plested Jr. told a group of business and state leaders here Tuesday morning.

Plested was here for the kickoff of his organization's 50th anniversary . . . part of the yearlong program to call attention to the contributions farmers and ranchers make to the nation's economy.

He and his staff are conducting similar breakfast meetings with key business leaders in Oklahoma City, Denver, Colo., Albuquerque, N.M., and Wichita covering the four states served by the bank of Wichita.

Plested said tentative plans call for the meeting to be held in Wichita about March 1.

One of the highlights of the 50th anniversary year is set for March 27 in Larned with festivities marking the golden anniversary of the First Federal Land Bank Association, chartered there March 27, 1917.

Plested said he expects the remaining 11 presidents from the other federal land banks to participate along with representatives from the appropriate federal agencies in Washington.

A parade is planned and a day-long exhibit of art carrying out the theme "America's Farmers: Providers of Plenty."

Reporting on its 50 years of service to Kansas, Oklahoma, Colorado and New Mexico, Plested said the Federal Land Bank of Wichita has made 172,838 long term loans amounting to \$1.1 billion.

Long-term loans now outstanding from the bank total more than \$420 million to more than 32,000 borrower-members of the 63 federal land bank associations in the four states. Approximately 25 of these associations are located in Kansas.

Plested said his bank, in the face of the tight money market, is determined to meet the needs of farmers and ranchers desirous of increasing their production through land acquisition, but is continuing its policy of recent months to eliminate loans for speculative ventures.





After his election as president of the Kansas Farm Bureau, Frisbie conferred with his own board of directors and with members of the commission, who felt that he could complete his appointed term on the commission, Dumler said.

His term on the commission expires June 30.

Aiming At Auto Tax Loophole

A proposal under study in the Senate Highways Committee could result in collection of an additional \$5 million annually, Sen. Jack Quinlan, R-Topeka, said last week.

Quinlan, one of the committee members looking into the possibility of tightening vehicle taxing machinery, said the idea is to prevent automobile owners from escaping assessment.

Currently a car owner canlegally avoid paying vehicle property tax by selling his auto before Jan. 1 and not taking title to a new one until after that

Quinlan said L .A. Billings, Motor Vehicle Department superintendent, had estimated the legal dodge cost the state \$5 million last year.

The new plan would be linked to a staggered license tag purchase system suggested by the Motor Vehicle Department, and would eliminate the possibility of owners escaping the vehicle





Farmers In Squeeze "Farmers are again increasingly caught in the old squeeze between the prices they receive and the high cost of farming,"

Freeman said that steps already taken by his agency to-

He said that other steps that could be taken included increases in government farm price supports. He emphasized, however, that he had no proposed increases under consideration now. But, he added, the door is open to possible increases.

Freeman said there were strong indications that farm prices in 1967 would average little if any above current levels. He said, however, that farm costs were expected to continue edging upward

No Relief Seen

"There appears to be little or no chance," the secretary said, 'consumers will benefit from lower farm prices. Other costs are such that food prices will continue to edge upward-although more moderately than last year."

Freeman said that continued heavy programming of food for shipment abroad under assistance programs should provide some strength to farm markets. Likewise, he said, a planned expansion in the food stamp program should help. Under this program, needy persons would receive supplemental food buying power in the form of government stamps usable at grocery stores.

Young said the Dodge City plant will serve cooperatives in western Kansas, Western Oklahoma, the Texas Panhandle and eastern Colorado.

The Dodge City location was selected after considering supply of natural gas, needs of local cooperatives and their members, transportation facilities and rates, he said.



Miniature meat loves, with a surprise garnish baked into each one. Unbelievably simple to make, Midget Meat Loaves use onion soup for flavor and corn flake crumbs for tenderness and bonus nutrition. MIDGET MEAT LOAVES

3 cups corn flakes or 34 cup packaged corn flake crumbs 1½ pounds ground beef

1 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper 11/4 cups 101/2-ounce can) condensed onion soup

3 stuffed olives, halved 6 34-inch cubes Cheddar cheese

If using corn flakes, crush into fine crumbs. Mix together corn flake crumbs, ground beef, seasonings and soup. Spoon mixture into 12 ungreased 3inch muffin cups; press lightly

to shape. Press olive halves into half the meat loaves; cheese cubes into remainder. Bake in moderately hot oven (400 degrees) about 20 minutes. Yield: six servings, two midget loaves each.


