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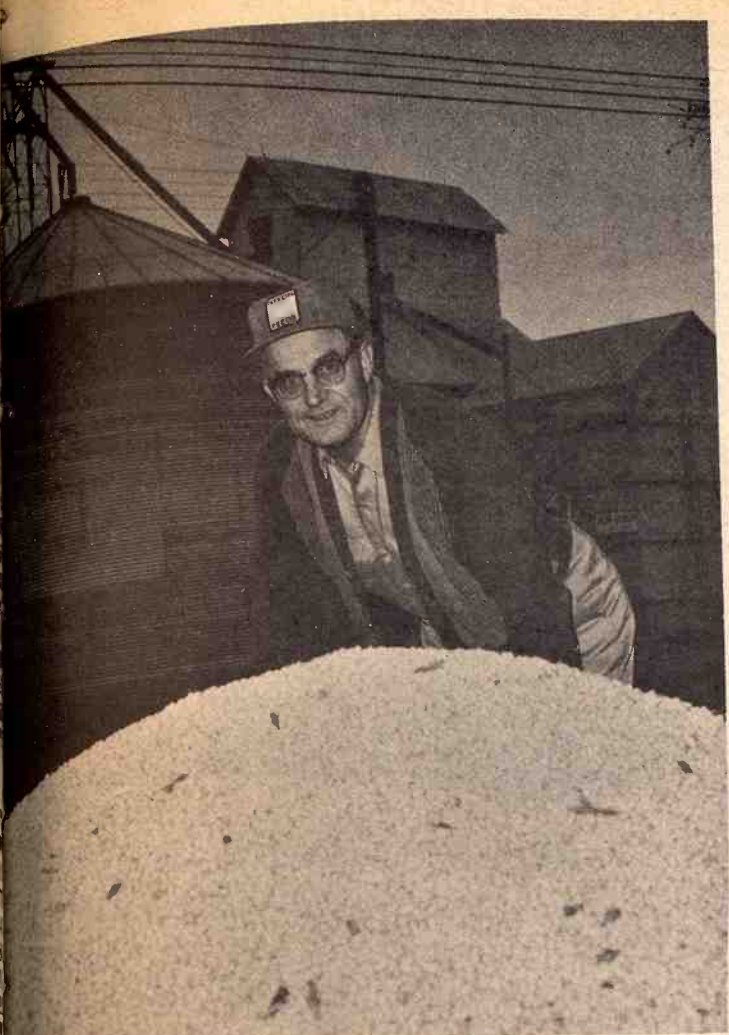
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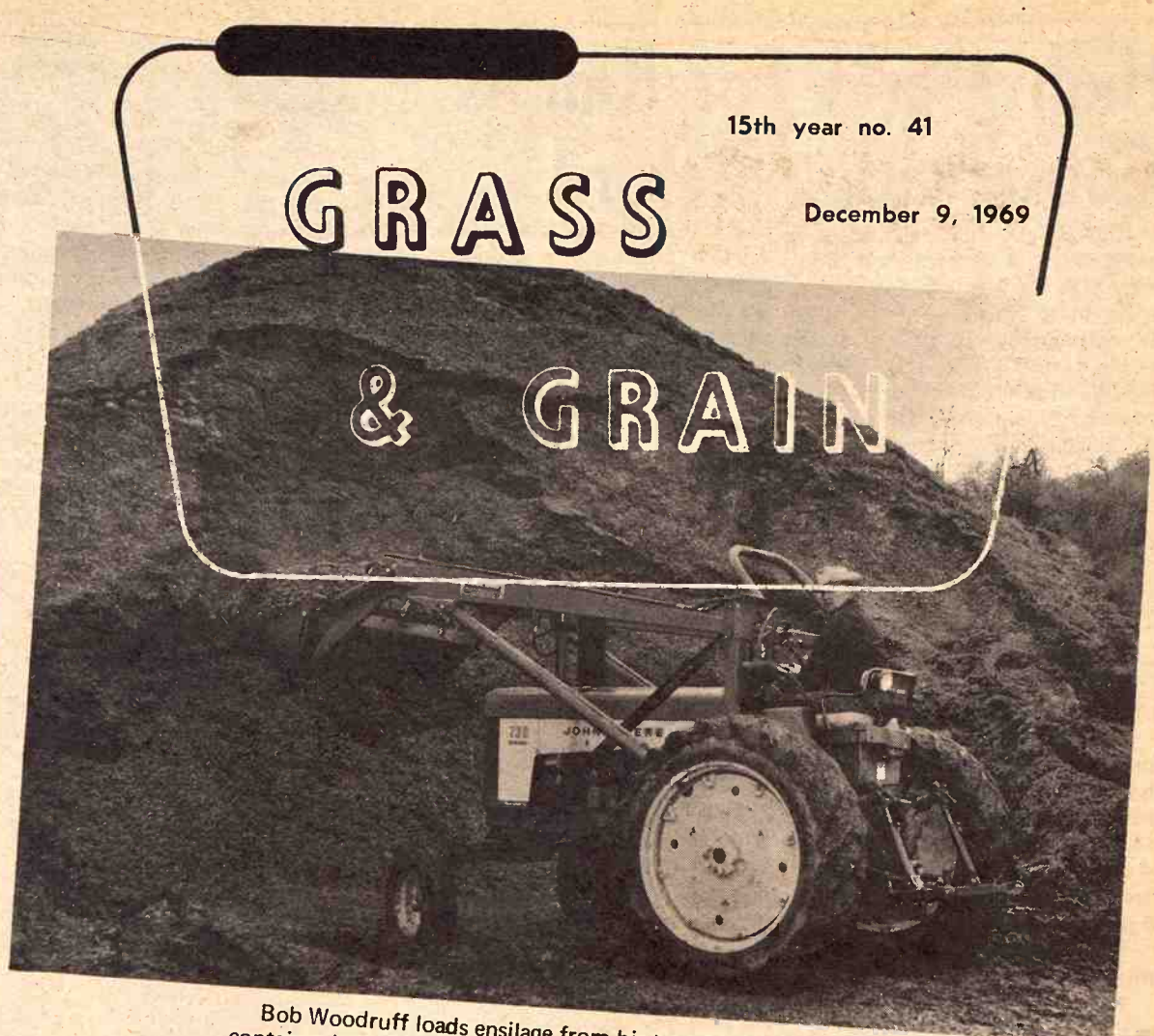

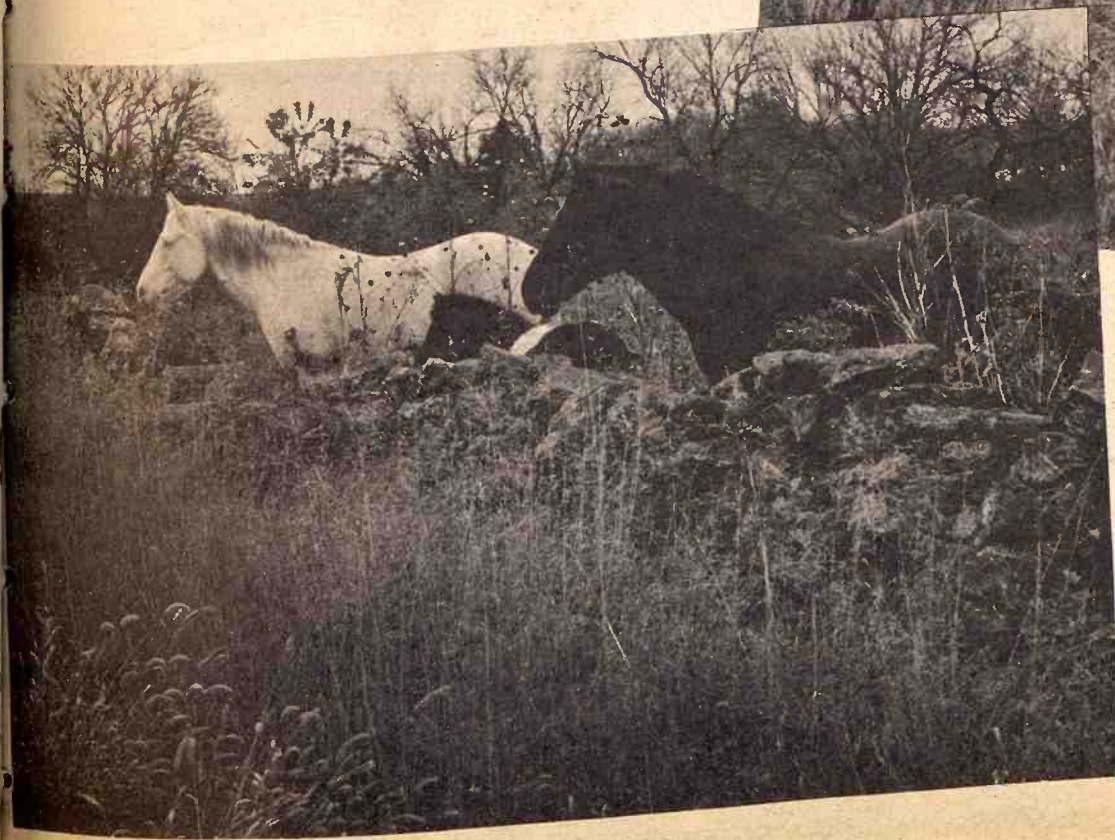

# High Marks For Kansas Conservation Record

Kansas got high marks last week from a federal Soil Conservation Service official.

The state "has one of the leading conservation programs in the nation," said William B. Davey, deputy administrator for field services, Washington. He spoke at Wichita at the annual Kansas Association of Soil Districts convention.

Davey said, "Kansas leads the nation in miles of terraces and diversions and in acres of grass waterways established. One-

fourth of the national total of stubble mulching of cropland is practiced here. Kansas also leads in the nation in the proportion of federal cost-sharing assistance devoted to permanent conservation measures. The progress in small watershed development here in Kansas has been inspiring."

The state, Davey said, also has an "outstanding record of assistance to farmers and ranchers" under the Great Plains Conservation Program with the threat of another Dust Bowl era nearly eliminated. Wind erosion damage in Kansas during the last winter was the lowest on record, he said.

Among factors listed by Davey as producing these results were "viable" soil conservation districts, conservation-minded citizens, effective local-state-federal working relationships and local and state funding. He also praised the state's congressional delegation for "playing an important part in resolving the watershed impasse and co-sponsoring the Great Plains Program extension."

Another speaker was Richard C. Longmire, south central vice

president of National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

"Rural people are the chief custodians and owners of land and related resources — but they are not the chief users of the finished products," he said. "Both rural and urban people must necessarily be involved in resource management because both have vital interests to protect."

"Ten years from now, it is estimated that our population will be 245 million. We will have to make a piece of land serve more than one purpose at the same time. This multipurpose use concept accentuates the need for both the technology and the political and social arrangements that will insure the wise selection and efficient management of these resources."

Agreeing was Paul Hilpman, chief of environment geology, State Geological Survey, University of Kansas. He said, "We must now plan environmental conservation throughout all land-

use regions, across regional lines.

"Erosion is serious in urban areas. Septic tank drainage is another urgent conservation problem. The quality of the environment is everyone's business. Seventy percent of the population is urban. These people on 2 percent of the land will have the say on all the land. These people need to understand conservation."

It is the second triple-yolk egg from the Fuller flock in recent years. The Fullers live 8 miles southwest of Miltonvale.

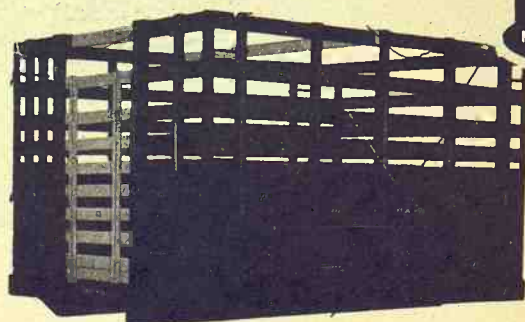
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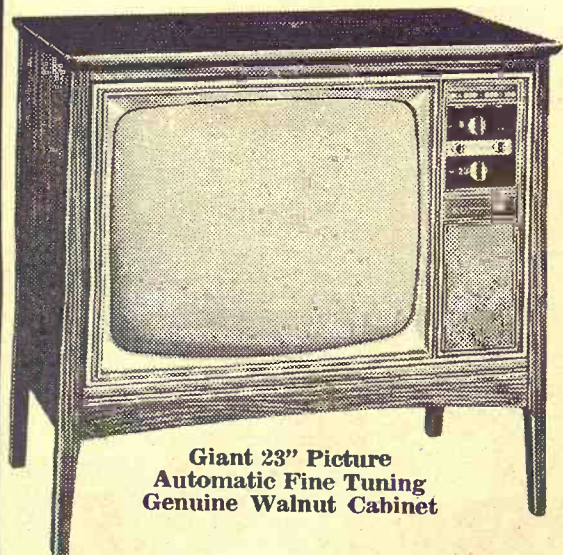
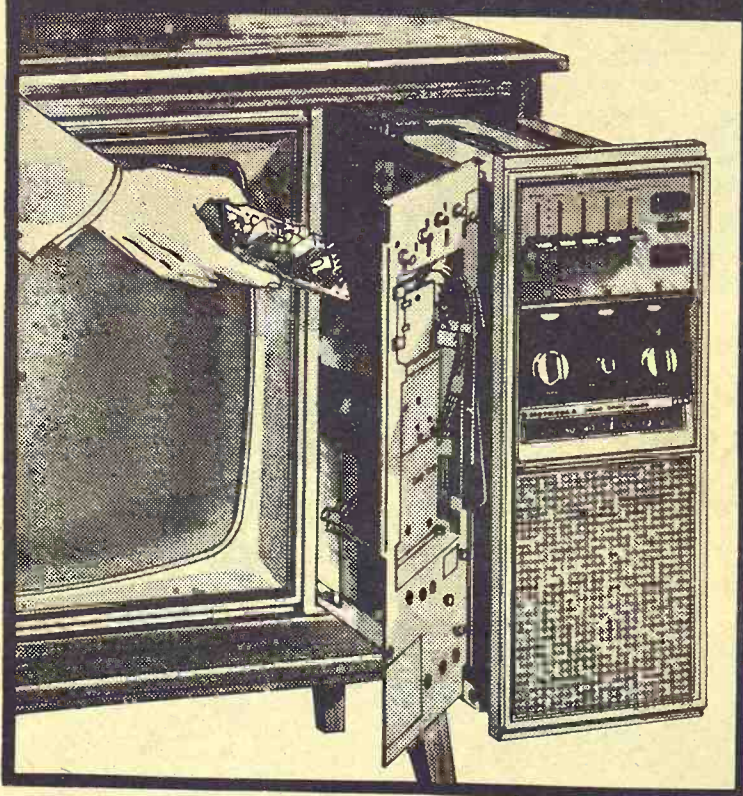
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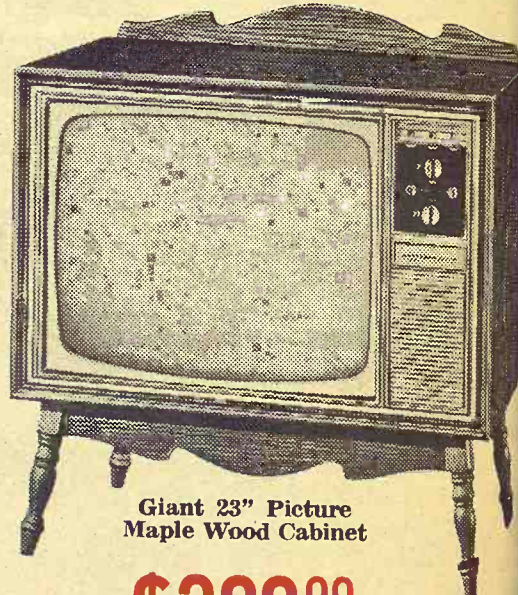


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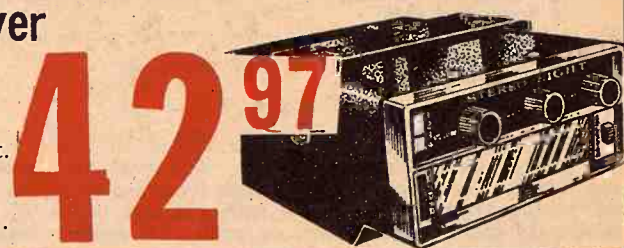
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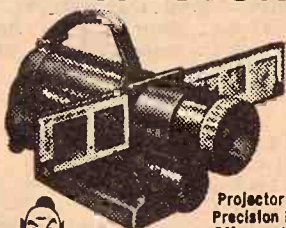
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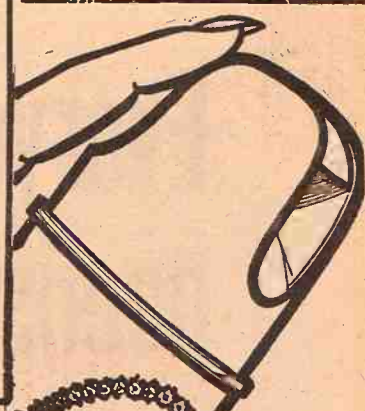

- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup nuts
- 1/2 cup buttermilk

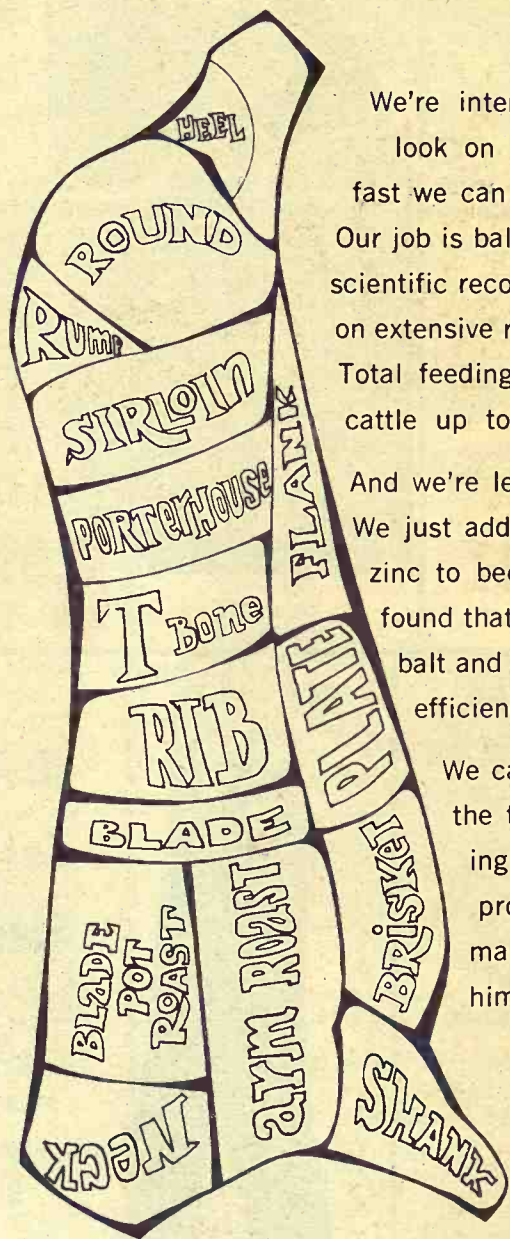

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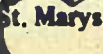

## Decorations Can Reflect Color, Gaiety Of Mexican Christmas

Let the decorations on your holiday tree reflect all the color and gaiety of a Mexican Christmas.

Do it with Mexican-inspired tree ornaments in the charming folk art tradition . . . ornaments you can make yourself from brightly colored cotton fabrics cut in simple animal shapes. For added color, trim them with lively zig-zags of cotton rick-rack and fringe.

No sewing is required for these easy-to-make tree trims.

To give body to the ornaments, use heavyweight non-woven interfacing between front and back of the fabric designs. Cut two 6x7-inch rectangles of cotton fabric and one of interfacing to form a base for the designs.

Join fabric and interfacing together with a new iron-on product — a web of fibers on trans-

fer paper that fuse materials together with the aid of a steam iron.

Then trace an animal shape on the fabric base and cut out. Simple outlines of birds, owls, lambs, fish or Mexican burros are most effective.

Glue appropriate rick rack trims to the animal shapes, making identical designs on both sides of each ornament. Use sequins for eyes.

For example, an ornament in the shape of the traditional Mexican stone bird can be cut from bright red cotton. Outline the bird's tail and wings with black baby rick rack. Add rows of white baby rick rack on the wings and tail for contrast. Glue one-point of rick rack on each side of the bird's beak and black sequins for eyes.

Make hang loops for the or-

naments from four strands of cotton thread in the same color as the fabric.

## Black Complaints Over Lack Of ASCS Voice

The U. S. Agriculture Department is still raising bumper crops of racial discrimination, according to a civil-rights research organization.

Indeed, charges the Southern Regional Council, the department is the Federal Government's "worst offender in discriminating against Negroes."

It cites the continued near-absolute absence of blacks in determining crop quotas that are for many farmers, "a matter of economic life and death."

The council reports that an expected 1969 black breakthrough in representation on county committees of the department's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service failed to materialize and that of 4,100 members serving on such committees in the South, only two are Negroes.

The county committees determine individual crop allotments and administer farm programs

that, nationally, total \$3.5 billion a year.

Each September, farm owners elect members of local committees in their communities. These committees, in turn, elect the county committees, which in their turn control the agricultural destinies of farmers throughout each county.

As the result of the election this September of the second Negro to a Southern county committee, the council said, "Black representation has risen to slightly more than one-twentieth of 1% on the county committees where Negroes are 13% of the farm owners."

Moreover, it reports, Negroes lost ground on the community level, retaining only 380 of the 418 positions they had held among the 30,000 alternate and regular community committee memberships.

The council adds that not a single community committee in the south can claim a black majority, although blacks comprise more than half the rural population in 256 counties across the region.

The report credits the Farmers Home Administration with having "done more than any other branch of the Agricultural Department to correct racial inequities."

Nonetheless, it concludes, "the fact that Negroes have not had any control over ASCS and other agricultural program decisions, as well as the fact that there is continued discrimination in program services, undoubtedly

ly influences the continued migration of blacks from rural areas."

And while there are some signs of change in the department, it adds, "until the U.S. Department of Agriculture moves forcefully to end patterns enforced by decades of dominance by Southern white supremacists, black Southern farmers will be denied equal protection under the law."

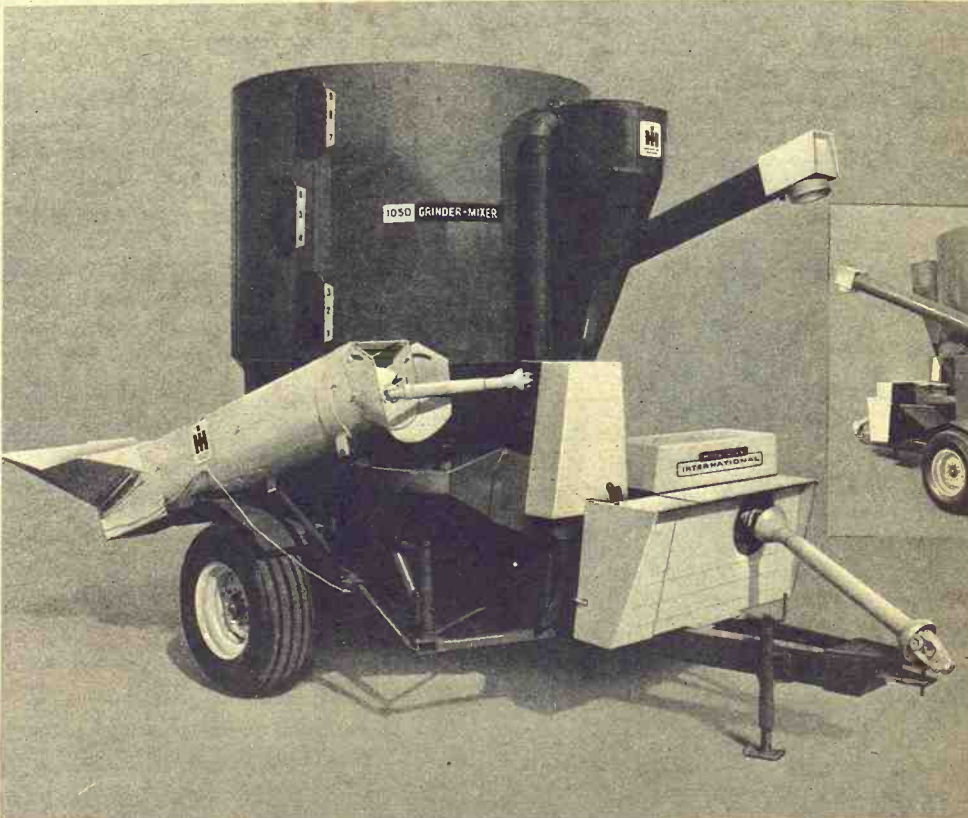

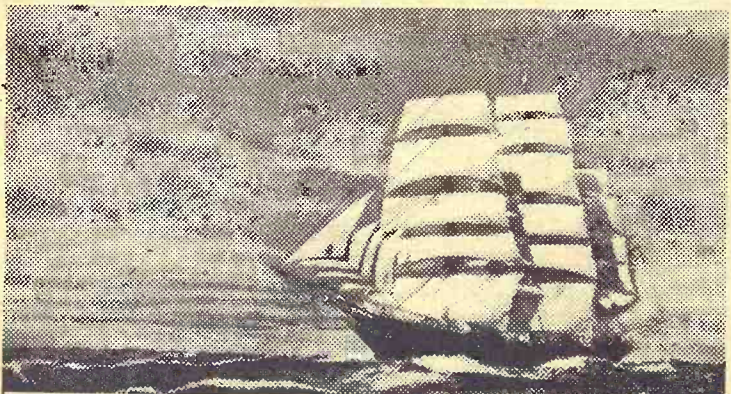

of Foreign Wars, and covered specifically property owned by VFW organizations.

But Frizzell said the opinion would apply equally to the YMCA and YWCA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls and faculty and student housing owned by denominational universities and colleges.

Frizzell said the 1969 Legislature repealed laws granting specific tax exemptions to the faculty and student housing of the denominational schools and to property owned by the organizations.

"Since there is no longer any specific statutory provision allowing this exemption to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, it will be necessary for the VFW to claim and prove such exemption in order to receive it," Frizzell wrote Wagner.

The Kansas Constitution exempts from taxation all property used exclusively for educational, benevolent and charitable purposes.

It would be necessary for the affected groups to prove that their property is used for one of the exempt purposes if they are to obtain a tax exemption.

## PROTEST A RACING TRACK NEAR SMOLAN

SMOLAN—Protests have been filed from this Saline county town against a proposed dirt race track approved by the county planning commission. The track would serve drag and sports car racers. Protests from Smolan and nearby Mentor, both of which would be near the track, are based on noise, dust and traffic problems.

## ELMDALE BANK CONTROL IS SOLD TO TWO

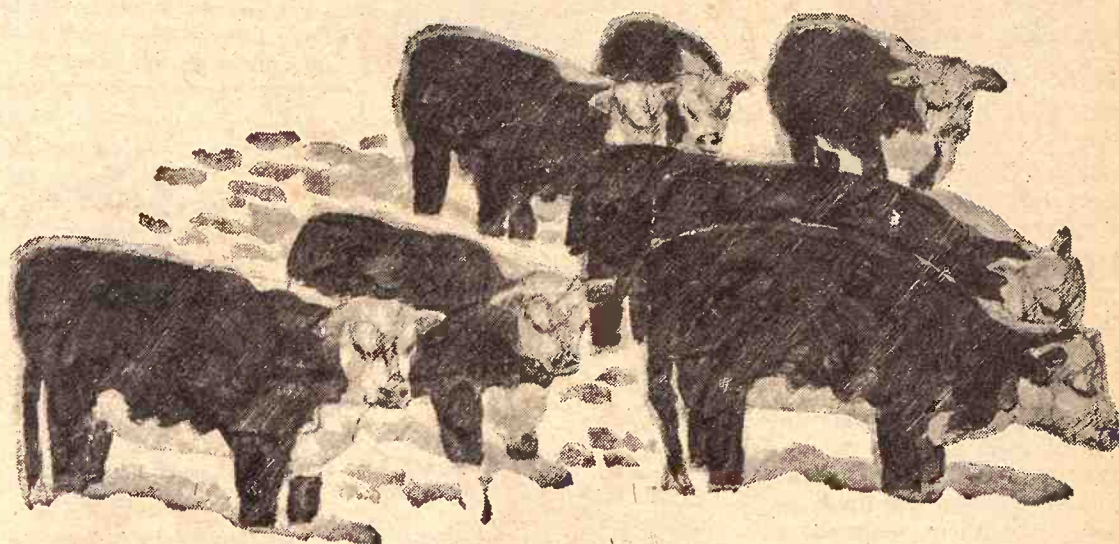

# Area Training To Handle Giant New Jet

If you see an airplane over the G&G area that looks bigger than anything you've seen before, it is.

Even to the people who fly them, they seem mighty big.

The plane is the Boeing 747, one or more of which will be seen regularly over the G&G area for the next six months, as they are used to train crews how to handle the big new 490-passenger jet.

The Salina airport — the former Schilling Air Base — is being used to train crews how to handle the leviathan which weighs 357 tons, is 227 feet long, and is six stories tall at the tail.

Handling the plane requires some getting used to, and that is why the special training.

For example, the cockpit is 30 feet up, compared with about 15 feet for the conventional 707. This may cause some pilots to hit the runway sooner than they should.

Even taxiing around can be a problem when the pilot is three stories up. It's difficult to judge how fast the plane is moving by watching the ground move by. Normal taxiing speed is about 20 to 25 mph, but pilots handling the jetliner say they have found themselves moving at a brisk 50 mph, which causes the plane

initial plane will handle 362 passengers. It will have economy seats two inches wider than those in current planes plus an upper deck lounge and bar in the first class section, twelve rest rooms, and six movie screens.

Speeds will be 600 miles per hour, cutting perhaps 30 minutes off a New York to London flight, now a 6¼ hour trip.

Fourteen stewardesses will be on the plane. The cabin is about 20 feet wide, nearly twice as big as a 707. Economy-class passengers will sit nine abreast with two aisles separating sections of two, four, and three seats.

Tho there is a lot of comfort built in, there are likely to be some massive problems to the logistics of servicing at the airport itself.

Pan Am figures to have eight flights on a Friday out of New York. That means close to 3000 passengers, plus an estimated 10,000 people to see them off, crowding into the terminal within a 2½ hour period.

That suggests a mighty crush in the terminal itself, and no imagination to conjure up the amount of traffic to and from the terminal at departures.

Not even the big air terminals in the country — O'Hare at Chicago and Kennedy in New York — are ready to handle the 747. Most smaller airports can't even come close.

Just handling baggage poses new problems. A fully loaded 747 will carry more than 720 pieces of luggage, and that amount at one time will tax any airport, particularly one in

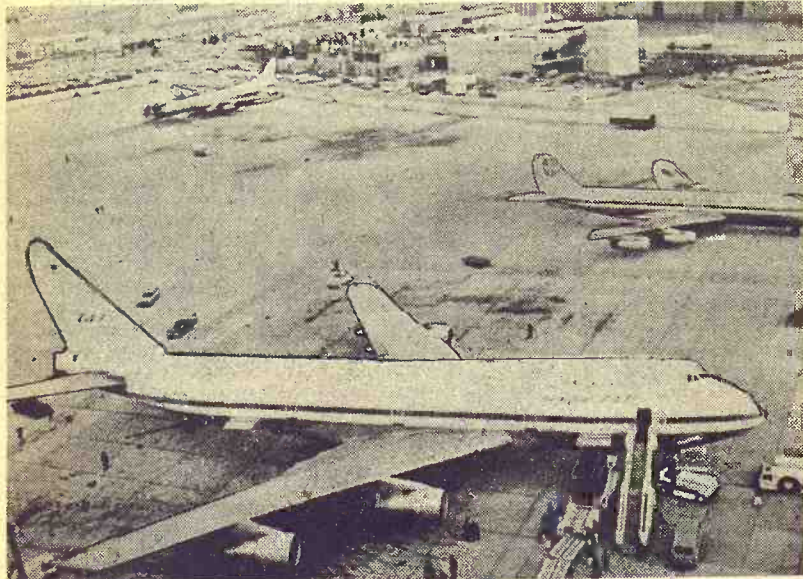
which several airlines share arrival facilities.

With many airlines often having lower occupancy rates than will give profits, some airline officials wonder what the new seating capacity will do to rate.

On the initial flight anyway there is no worry. Pan Am says that it has 5300 requests to be on the opening flights.

to lurch a bit on turns.

There are major problems besides pilot handling involved in the new plane. Present boarding ramps aren't high enough. Tractors aren't big enough to haul the 747 about. Old techniques in handling baggage, serving meals, and even cleaning out the ashtrays aren't sufficient for the 747.

It is TWA that is using the Salina facility for training. Pan American will likely be the first line to get the new plane in use, sometime after the first of the year. Twenty-five other lines have ordered the big plane from Boeing, which has a current price tag of \$23 million each on them.

Tho the plane has been billed as capable of handling 490 passengers, most airlines will have designs calling for considerably less than that. Pan American's

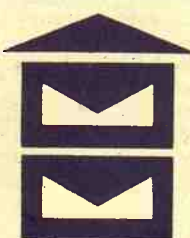

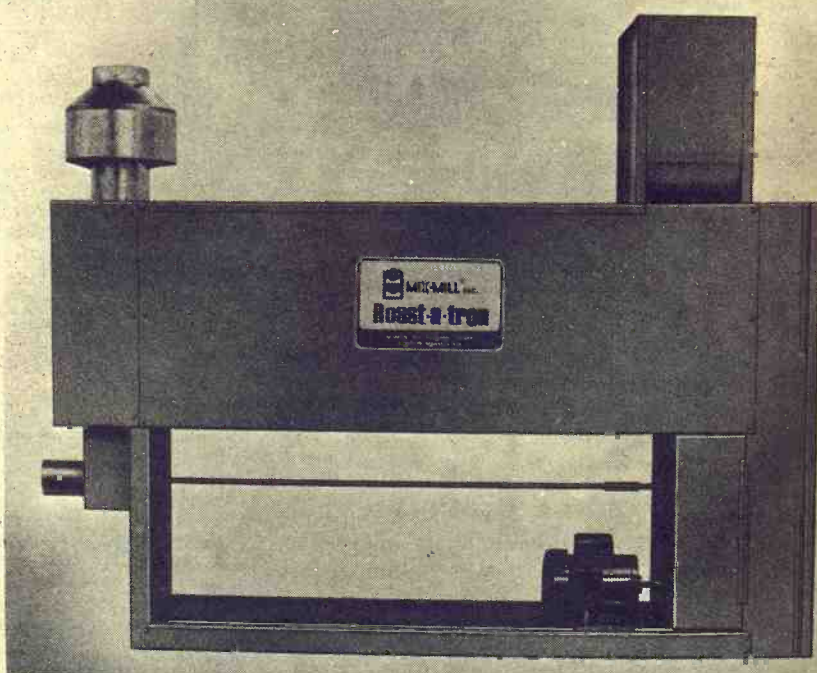

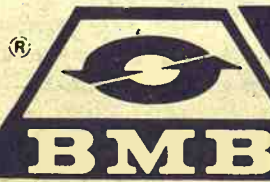

The Town House Hotel, Kan-sas City, Kansas' attempt to bring a first class hotel to the Kansas side of the river, has had a foreclosure action filed against it.

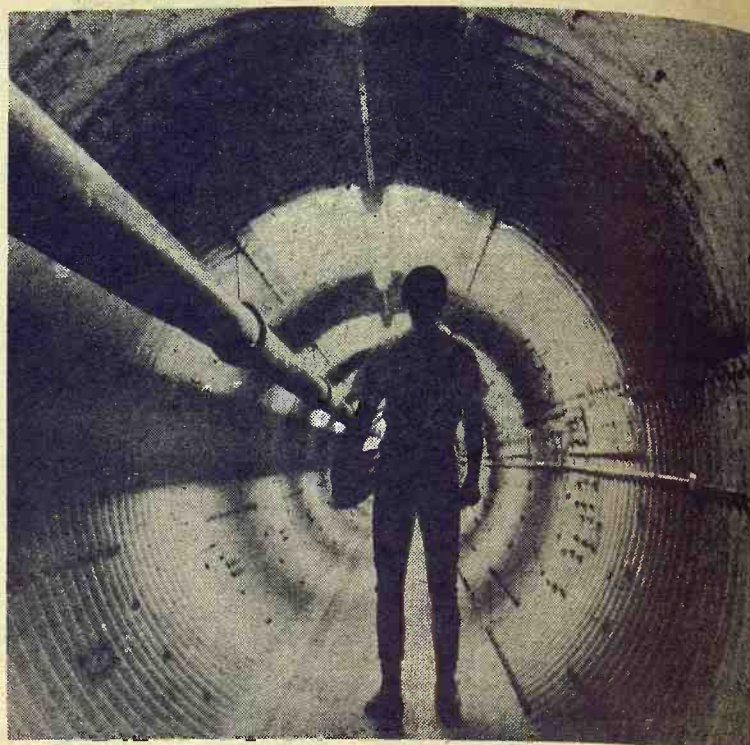
The Equitable Life Insurance Co. of Iowa has filed in district court a suit saying the hotel owes \$514,867 plus interest on the 1951 note.

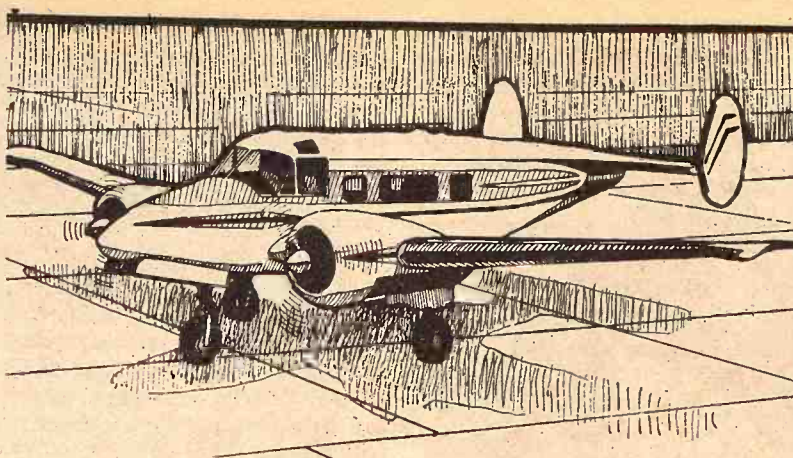

### BEECH QUILTS ITS TWIN 18

First produced in 1937, the Twin Beech model 18 has been discontinued in production by the Beech Aircraft Corp. The plane, recognized by many because of the "Training wheel" (tricycle gear) up front and the big, widely spaced vertical stabilizers, was a classic in the private aviation field. There were 7088 built in 33 years, brining more than \$385 million to Beech.

The Twin Beech trained more than 90% of American's World War II navigators, bombardiers and pilots and was the backbone of the burgeoning new corporate aviation industry.

There are still 1537 in the U. S. civil fleet alone and many figure to be flying for years yet.

## Peace Corps Now Says It Needs Farmers As Volunteers

The Peace Corps, associated with young idealists since the Kennedy days, is looking for farmers.

The Peace Corps has made several attempts recently to broadcast its search for experienced farmers to volunteer for service in the organization which presently has 10,000 workers serving in 60 different countries.

Most volunteers have been university trained generalists, drawn largely from urban centers and the white upper middle class.

The Peace Corps now says it wants to send abroad a wider cross-section of America. The new requests from countries being aided are for skilled and experienced farmers, laborers, professional people and women. Many of the people in these categories have not known that they were wanted in the Peace Corps program.

Qualifications for the Peace Corps are being liberalized to get the kind of people wanted. You must be an American citizen over 18, but there is no maximum age. Older couples with children of less than 18 years of age will be taken. Previously, if they had children under 18 they

were disqualified. A college degree is not necessary. Experience is, Peace Corps officials say. A man can take his wife with him now, even if she does not engage in Peace Corps work.

Service for volunteers is for two years altho under certain circumstances it may be for shorter or longer terms.

Participants receive an adequate living allowance while abroad and a fund is deposited for them at home so when a man returns he will have about \$2000 awaiting him.

A man and wife (who also served) would double that amount. Medical care and insurance is provided. Living conditions in the countries where the service is provided vary from comfortable to quite simple.

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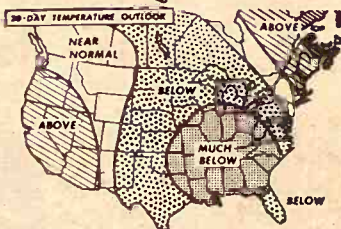
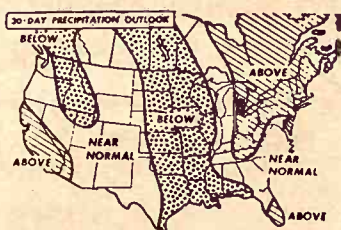

## Favorable Outlook For Hog Prices

Hog prices have been remarkably strong this year. They seem likely to continue at profitable levels through 1970. We will have more definite information on December 23 when the USDA releases the next quarterly report, Hogs and Pigs. Information for this report was collected by a survey of farmers made around December 1.

**Demand and prices.** Strong demand, rather than short supply, has been the big price-lifting force in the hog market. Consumers have been willing to increase their spending for pork by more than enough to offset the increases in marketing costs.

A comparison of supplies and prices in recent years shows the growth in pork demand. In 1963 and again in 1964, for example, the supply of pork was about 65

pounds per person, with hog prices averaging just over \$15 per hundred pounds. In 1967 and 1968, the pork supply was around 65 pounds again, but hog prices averaged a little over \$19.

The demand for pork has continued to increase this year. Figures for the first three quarters illustrate the point: Pork production during the period totaled 9480 million pounds — 2 percent more than a year earlier. But hog prices averaged \$23.16. This was \$3.54 higher than the average for a year earlier. Taken separately, third-quarter figures are even more impressive. Pork output totaled 3 billion pounds, the same as in 1968. But hog prices averaged \$26.30 — almost \$6 higher than last year.

**Controlling factors.** There may be several reasons for the increase in the demand for pork:

(1) Farmers have greatly improved the quality and attractiveness of the product. (2) Consumer buying power has gone up rapidly. (3) The supply of beef and other competing meats has not increased as much in recent years as it did previously.

**Outlook.** Hog prices may recede from recent high levels — just as cattle prices slipped from their early summer peaks. Retail sales of pork could be slowed by delayed mark-ups in retail prices. In addition, efforts to hold down inflation might restrict spending for pork and other meats.

There are no statistical signs of any major increase in hog marketing and production as yet. Farmers responding to a USDA survey in September reported that the number of pigs weighing under 60 pounds was 2 percent less than one year earlier. They also reported that planned fall farrowings (Sep-

tember-November) were 1 percent less than last year, with only 2 percent more sows expected to farrow during the winter quarter (December-February).

Another expansion in hog production is about due. The last one was in 1966. The result then was a 13 percent increase in slaughtering (in the year beginning in July of 1966). And the yearly, average price of hogs dropped to \$21.18 — some \$3.64 lower than for 1965. Monthly average prices showed a more spectacular decline — from \$28.07 in December of 1965 to \$17.29 two years later.

The Foreign Agricultural Service said production will be higher in Hawaii and Puerto Rico but that continental U.S. sugar cane output is expected to be down somewhat from last year.

A record sugar cane harvest was predicted for India, the FAS said, and the country is expected to rank as the world's fifth largest producer.

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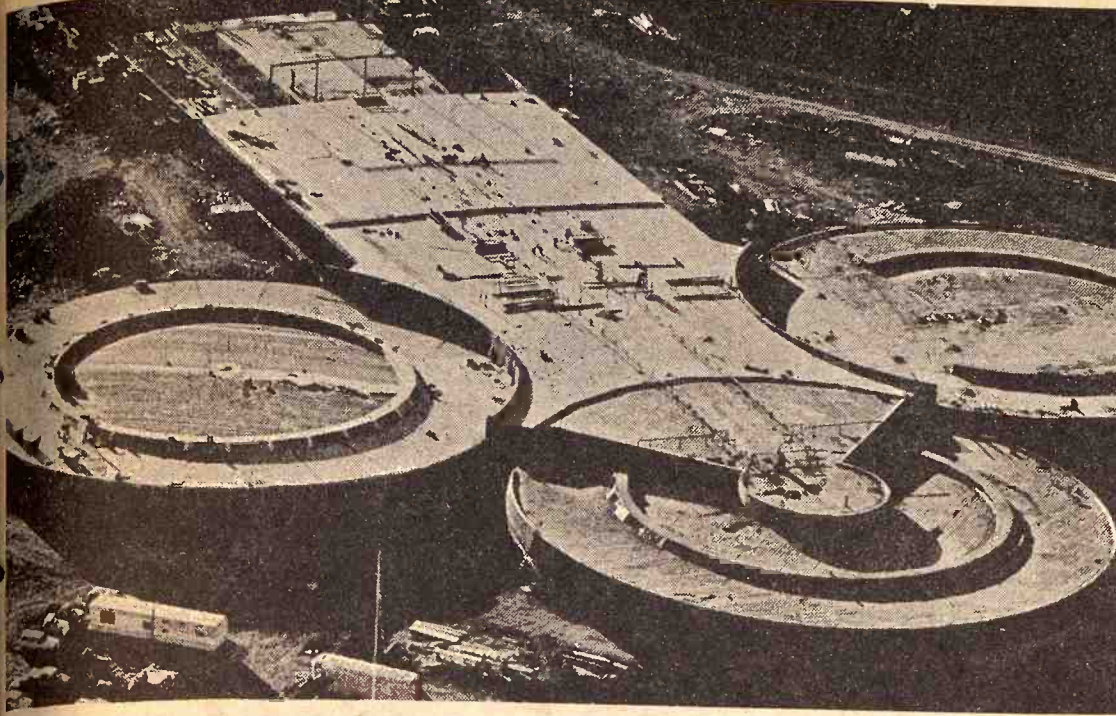

# World Sugar Output Up

A record world production of sugar in 1969-70 of 74.4 million tons has been predicted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. This is 5 percent more than the previous high last season. Officials said the most significant increase will be in Latin America, Europe and Asia. Cuban production was up at 8 million tons compared with 5.2 million in 1968-69. The Foreign Agricultural Service said production will be higher in Hawaii and Puerto Rico than that continental U.S. cane output is expected to be somewhat from last year. Japanese vessel which had been lying in an Indonesian harbor several weeks awaiting a copra shipment finally sailed without it. The vessel went to Manila where it loaded Philippine copra and this, in turn, caused a shortage there which was reflected in both European and U.S. markets.

The failure of Indonesia came on top of a long period of shortages. Coconut oil shipments to Europe have been averaging only about 15,000 tons a month, compared with 23,000 tons monthly in normal times.

The reason for this specific shortage is a drop of about 30 percent this year in Philippine copra production. The dried coconut meat is reported to be so short there that at least one importer is trying to buy back his contracts to ship copra.

The shortage is likely to continue at least a few months more. Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter, a trade weekly, quoted importers as saying, "Prices are firm and will continue so for the rest of this final quarter and into the first quarter of next year." But one importer was even more pessimistic:

"I can't see anything more than a little improvement if that. There just isn't enough oil in the world for everybody."

Consumers of oil, makers of margarine, soaps and food supplements, are reducing their coconut oil purchases as much as possible, using up accumulated stocks. Oil is selling in New York for 16½ cents per pound or more, compared with a spring price this year of about 12 cents.

and \$600,000; and asparagus 12.3 million and 4.5 million.

Though intermittent periods of crop shortages in the United States accounted for some of the takeover by other countries, the FAS said in a report, another factor has been the economic recovery in some nations which had been hard-hit by World War II.

Other reasons have been the technical and economic aid provided some of these countries by the United States; a rise in trade by the European Common Market; and the increase in preferential trade agreements among major blocs.

Suppliers such as Taiwan, Australia, South Africa, Greece and Israel have become formidable U.S. competitors for markets such as West Germany and the United Kingdom, the FAS said.

Taiwan, where the Nationalist China government was set up following Communist takeover of the mainland in 1949, was one of the major benefactors of U.S. aid programs.

Now, Taiwan is a prime U.S. competitor in some major markets. It is the world leading exporter of canned mushrooms, asparagus and pineapple, much of this output going to the United States.

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## Oil Shortage To Help Soybeans

A world-wide shortage of vegetable oils has pushed copra prices to near-record levels and resulted in a brisk demand for sunflower and soybean oils as well.

"There just isn't enough oil in the world to satisfy everybody," said one importer. "If people turn to another source they just create another shortage and the circle goes around."

The world shortage is due to wars, drought, and politics. Drought cut the Philippine copra crop. Copra is the dried coconut meat and coconut oil is pressed from it. The Nigerian civil war has interrupted normal supplies of palm kernel oil. The Argentine sunflower oil crop is small and Russia has reduced her shipments of sunflower oil for some reason. Expected coconut oil shipments from Indonesia have not materialized.

The result has been that copra prices have increased from \$192 per ton to about \$216 in about a month. This sharp increase was touched off when a

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## U.S. No Longer World's Fruit, Vegetable Basket

The last decade has been rough for U.S. fruit and vegetable exports, mainly because of the emergence of new competition on the world trade scene, says the Agriculture Department.

The Foreign Agricultural Service notes that 10 years ago the United States was the undisputed world supplier of many fruits and vegetables, particularly processed items.

In 1960-63 the U.S. export average for peaches was 25.5 million dollars a year; last year it was 12.5 million. Other examples included pineapple 13.1 million and 9.5 million; pears 1.7 million and \$900,000; apricots 1.7 million

#### U. S. Ranks 6th In Fish Haul

The world's total haul of fish gained nearly 5 per cent in 1968, the U. N. Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) says.

Peru, with nearly a sixth the tonnage, was again the leading producer but Japan was close behind. Japan has passed all other countries for the value of its catch more than \$2 billion, according to private estimates.

The Soviet Union was third, passing the six-million-ton level for the first time after decreasing its fishing activities in the southwest Atlantic in favor of more fertile areas.

Communist China was apparently fourth, while Norway and the United States held their own,

placing fifth and sixth respectively.

FAO's yearbook of fisheries statistics put the total catch for 1968 at 64 million metric tons, against 60.7 million in 1967. A metric ton is 2,204 pounds.

The 1968 catch was almost twice as much as the 32.2 million tons brought in during 1958.

Peru, the No. 1 fishing nation in terms of volume for five years, hauled in 10.5 million tons of fish, up from 10.1 the previous year. Almost all the Peruvian catch is anchoveta, used for

fishmeal, which is later exported.

Japan took 8.6 million tons, up from 7.8 million tons. The Soviet catch was 6 million tons compared to 5.7 million in 1967.

For China FAO continued to use the 1960 figure of an estimated 5.8 million tons.

Norway's 2.3 million tons was down from 3.2 million in 1967. The United States increased its catch only slightly from 2.43 million tons to 2.44.

Iceland, which vaulted to 1.2 million tons in 1966 and dropped to 900,000 tons in 1967, hauled in 600,700 last year. The northeast Pacific was by far the fruitful area, yielding 145 million tons compared to 13.8 million in 1967.

#### Pipeline Milker Best Friend Of Cull Cow

A Kansas State University Extension dairy science specialist says the "pipeline milker is the best friend a cull cow ever had."

According to Ralph Bonewitz, the cull cow strolls in with the good producers, gives only enough milk to color the line, eats as much feed as the best cows, and then goes her merry way and is not even suspected as a thief of the dairyman's limited profits until she is extremely sleek and fat.

Bonewitz says that while low production should be the prime factor used in culling dairy cows in Kansas, most practical dairymen should add the following list as sufficient reasons to cull a cow:

- Poor breeders.
- Cows that are slow or otherwise difficult milkers.
- Difficult to detect.
- Kicks or difficult to handle
- Chronic bloater.
- Any other factor that would increase the cost of produc-

tion or labor.

Is the production level of your herd less, the same or more than it was three years ago?" Bonewitz asks.

"If it is not greater, you prob-

ably would obtain higher profits by establishing a culling program starting based on some type of production record."

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# Farm Index Highest Since 1952

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-November were higher than a year ago, according to the monthly index of prices compiled by the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

On the scale with 1910-14 prices at 100%, the November index was 246 compared to 228 a year ago and 242 a month ago. The index is the highest since September 1952.

The Kansas price index continues to run about 12% less than index for the U.S. as a whole. The increase for the year, however, is about the same, with the U.S. price index gaining from 264 to 285 — also a 8% gain.

Egg prices were up sharply from October, and there were gains also for most grain crops, hay, milk cows, hogs, chickens and dairy products.

Prices for beef cattle and lambs decreased slightly from the previous month.

The decline in beef prices was the fifth consecutive month of losses after cattle prices in June hit the highest level — a \$29.60 average — since the Korean War.

While overall, Kansas prices are lower than U.S. averages, livestock prices in the state average out about the same as the national figure.

The crop price index was 149 percent of the 1910-14 base at mid-November, up 3 points from a month earlier but 3 points below a year earlier.

The wheat price was \$1.22 per bushel, 3 cents above October but 5 cents below November last year.

Corn averaged \$1.11 per bushel, 1 cent above October and 7 cents above a year ago.

The price of oats was 69 cents per bushel, unchanged from October but 3 cents below last year. Barley, at 85 cents per bushel, was 3 cents above last month but 8 cents below a year ago.

Sorghum grain prices averaged \$1.80 per cwt., 3 cents above October and 21 cents above last year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.21 per bushel, 5 cents above the previous month but 8 cents below a year ago.

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-November was 356 percent of the 1910-14 base, up 3 points from October and 41 points above a year ago. The meat animal price index on November 15 was 405 compared with 411 in October and 365 in November last year.

Hog prices, at \$24.60 per cwt., were 40 cents above October and \$7.30 above last year.

Beef cattle prices, at \$24.70 per cwt., were 50 cents below mid-October but \$1.20 above a year ago. Steer and heifer prices, at \$26.70 per cwt., were down 10 cents from the previous month but \$1.50 above November last year.

Cows sold for \$18.20 per cwt., down 80 cents from October but \$1.90 above November 1968. Calf prices averaged \$30.50 per cwt. compared with \$31.00 last month and \$27.20 in November last year.

The dairy products price index was 339 percent of the 1910-14 base, up 8 points from mid-October and 18 points above a year ago.

The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$5.70 per cwt., was 23 cents above October and 20 cents above a year ago.

Egg prices averaged 41.0 cents per dozen, 8 cents above October and 14 cents above a year ago.

Chicken prices averaged 7.0 cents per pound compared with 6.7 cents last month and 5.9 cents a year ago.

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for most feeds were slightly higher than a month earlier although dairy feeds showed small decreases.

## Irrigators Want Research Facility

GREAT BEND — A resolution to urge establishment of a state supported water research facility in southwest Kansas, someplace where underground water tables are receding, highlighted the 6th annual meeting of the Kansas Irrigation and Reclamation Association (KIRA) in Great Bend.

The more than 100 Kansas irrigators in attendance unanimously agreed to promote a research station which would study the organization, development and workability of underground water management districts and also find the most effective and economically beneficial methods of managing underground water.

Another resolution was to urge the State Legislature and state water agencies to support research to find ways of controlling water pollution from sediment, wastes, chemicals, and natural gas.

KIRA also resolved to request the KSU Agricultural Experiment Station to increase research and education relating to water management in north-west Kansas.

Another resolution was to urge study of all ways of supplying irrigation water to western Kansas — including importation of water — and to study ways of prolonging the life of available underground water supplies — including recharging those supplies.

The irrigators also requested that Kansas State University establish a practical course in irrigation farming and that the Division of Water Resources in Topeka be adequately staffed to keep administration of Kansas water law up to date.

They will urge the State Legislature to investigate methods of land taxation other than the present ad valorem basis. They also voted to support continued development of the Kanopolis, Glen Elder, and Round Mound projects.

New 1970 officers for the Kansas Irrigation and Reclamation Association are Fred Dumler, Oakley, president; Jim Ford, Hugoton, vice-president; Ray Cudney, Trousdale, secretary, and Guy Caldwell, Harlan, treasurer.

# Is There A Henry Ford In Housing's Future?

American industrial genius is about to solve another one of those insurmountable technological obstacles: How to build a house anybody can afford.

What Henry Ford did for the automobile a growing band of businessmen is prepared to do for the old homestead. They are going to turn it out on an assembly line. Moreover, one of Ford's descendants, Henry Ford II, will be among those modern homebuilders, along with other big names in business like Penn Central, Boise Cascade and Inland Steel.

There has been talk for years that factory-built housing was coming, but few persons would have predicted a year ago that the trend would develop as fast as it has. Several of the Nation's biggest homebuilders, along with a variety of big manufacturing concerns, are working on prototype homes, purchasing mobile home factories and preparing to build new factories. A few are in production.

What has turned the talk to action is the sharp rise in the cost of building a home. Costs have jumped 10 to 15 per cent in each of the last two years compared with a 4 per cent increase in most prior years. Low-cost homebuilders who used to offer models in the \$15,000 to \$20,000 range now price their homes at \$25,000 to \$30,000. With interest rates also higher, many a would-be homebuyer cannot qualify for a loan.

On top of that, two of the biggest barriers to moving home construction from individual sites into a central plant area are coming down. One is building trade unions' objections. At least two factory home builders have been able to settle with the unions. They will pay lower rates than those required for on-site work but the men will benefit by having steadier jobs, unaffected by such things as the weather.

The other obstacle has been the variety of local building codes on a production line. California has a new law substituting state

code for local codes where factory homes are concerned. Ohio, New York and Massachusetts also have legislation that helps to offset the local ordinances, though not as fully as California's.

Housing experts forecast a rapid revolution in the industry. "A good 50 per cent of your housing is going to be factory built by 1975 — things are really going to take off," predicts Charles R. Lemanager, director of the California State Department of Housing and Community Development.

Another industry leader contends it will be more like 70 per cent in three to four years.

Federal encouragement will help the trend. The Department expects to announce soon the dozen or so winners of competition for federal grants under a program called Operation Breakthrough. The program, budgeted for \$15 million in the coming year, is intended to create new methods for producing, delivering and marketing low-cost housing.

Weyerhaeuser Co., the Tacoma wood products concern, is experimenting with a house that could be erected without a saw and with only a handful of nails. It

would be glued together.

And the Universal Papertek Corp. of Hatfield, Pa., has developed a paper house. Actually, it is a chemically treated corrugated cardboard coated with glass fiber. The house is delivered in large boxes.

The company hopes to make its material tough enough to qualify the houses for 20-year FHA mortgages. And as for glue, some high-strength modern versions are being used to hold parts of airliners together, so why not houses?

New materials are only half the answer, experts say. The best way to get housing prices down, they insist, is to turn out houses on an assembly line. And this means going further than just prefabrication, which involves precutting parts and putting together some wall panels in a shop. They want to see a whole house, in sections, with only quick assembly work left for on-site completion.

Stirling Homex of Avon, N.Y., is convincing a lot of people. A year ago the company switched from conventional to factory homebuilding. It builds modules, wraps them in a plastic bag and ships them as far as Akron, Ohio.

The company's first homes went into upper middle class neighborhoods but now the Akron Metropolitan Housing Authority has contracted for 1,500 lower cost versions for publicly supported housing.

Another builder relatively far advanced into factory housing is National Homes of Lafayette,

Ind. The company has turned out about 350 modular homes from its plant there and has plans for five other five factories scattered around the country. It expects to be turning out 10,000 units a year by 1971.

Only those persons with money to burn on custom home designs are going to be in the market for anything but a factory-built home in the near future, says George E. Price, National's president.

One thing factory building cannot do, of course, is reduce the

cost of land. And Robert J. Williams, superintendent of the Angeles Building and Safety department, wonders how factory homes will get in cities with high property values. "I've a number of companies over years with factory houses. I've built one or two and then never heard of them again."

Williams concedes, however, that "if companies can put a product the public will buy this may be an answer to the housing problem."

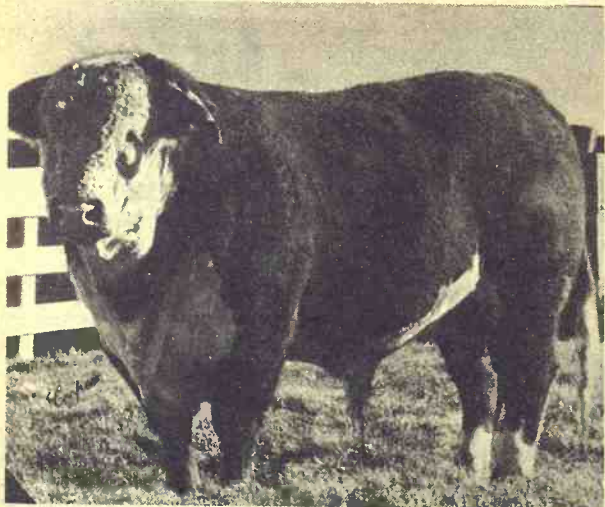

## Change In Standards For Lumber Sizes

The Commerce Department, ending two years of indecision and after two rejections by the industry, said it will put new lumber size standards into effect next March.

Their effect will be to reduce slightly the standard size of boards but, more important to the industry, they will draw a

distinction for the first time between dry and green lumber.

The ultimate effect on home-building was difficult to assess, although no industry estimate forecast a change of more than \$175 in the cost of an average \$30,000 home.

Lumber industry officials have estimated that the smaller board sizes might result in saving \$166 per house, but a home builder said requirements for meeting strength specifications, particularly in floors, might add \$50 to the lumber cost for the same house.

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Secretary Maurice Stans called the revised standards, which replace a version adopted in 1953, "an important step for the consumer," largely because the old guidelines did not take into account the fact that green lumber shrinks as it dries, "so that the lumber user never could be sure of the performance of the product he was purchasing."

Under the new standards, a dry two-by-four board, which has been neither two inches thick nor four inches wide since 1904, will become 1 1/2 by 3 1/2 inches. Green two-by-four — ones containing 19 per cent or more moisture — will be 1 9/16 by 3 9/16, with the extra 16th of an inch allowed for shrinkage.

Under the 1953 standard, a two-by-four is about 1 5/8 by 3 5/8 inches, so the new rule will allow lumber about an eighth of an inch smaller on each side.

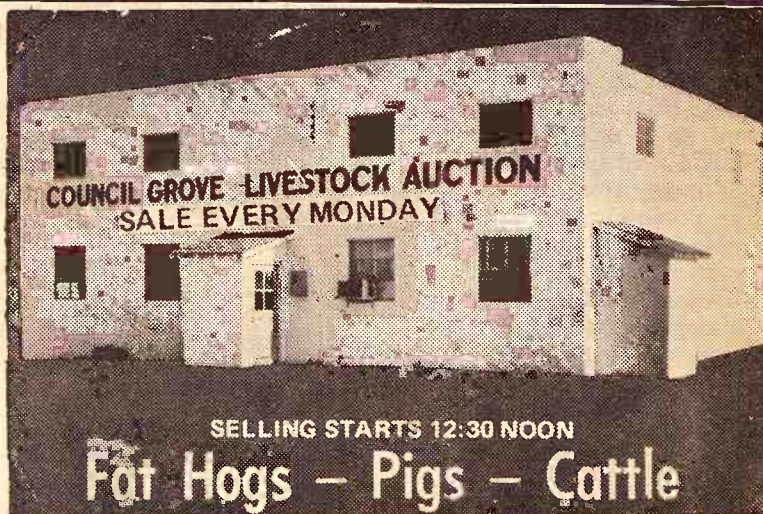

## Farm Program? Coming—But When?

Agriculture Department officials appear to have exhausted their reserve of predictions on when the Nixon administration will announce the 1970 feed grains programs.

A month or two ago they were saying "any time now" or "it's in the mill." Now they profess less certainty, but a few are quietly suggesting the administration

may wait now until after Jan. 1 to announce the program.

One official said this week that the program announcement may wait until the House Agriculture Committee completes its current round of hearings on new farm legislation.

On the other hand, as some have suggested, the whole thing could be held up by the White House budget bureau which wants to see tighter spending on government programs for corn, sorghum grain and barley.

There is no real pressure to announce the program now, despite the fact that farmers always want to know as far in advance as possible just what their government will be up to during the coming crop season.

Last year the 1969 program was announced by then Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman on Dec. 26. Most crops affected by the plan are planted in the spring.

Farmer signup for the 1969 program was held Feb. 3 thru March 21 during which growers agreed to divert 41 million acres from feed grain production this year.

### CK Ranch Hereford Gross To \$167,564

BROOKVILLE — Thirty bulls sold for more than \$800 each as the CK Ranch's fall Hereford sale grossed \$167,564, with 212 bulls averaging \$614 and 199 commercial heifers averaging \$188.

An October 1968 bull topped the sale at \$2200, selling to Jack Delaney and Clarence Caraway, Lake Benton, Minn.

The bulls were sold to buyers from all over the U.S., with Pawnee Springs Ranch, Maxwell, Nebr., the volume buyer, shelling out \$9575 for nine bulls.

Among the other volume buyers was Jack Stanhope of El Dorado.

The commercial heifer prices topped at \$220 each for a group of 10 to Wa-Hi Ranch of New Bloomfield, Mo. Willis Yeager of Council Grove paid \$195 each for another group of 10.

George Morse and Ike Hamilton were auctioneers.

## Be On Lookout For Signs Of Hog Cholera

Swine producers and feeders should continue on the alert for signs of hog cholera, even though Kansas has had no reported cases of the disease since last June. Cases at that time were confined to imported feeder pigs.

This warning comes from state and federal officials who point out that some states have experienced heavy cholera outbreaks in the past few months.

"Farmers should take extreme caution in buying out-of-state feeder pigs or replacement breeding stock," say A. G. Pickett, state livestock commissioner, and Dr. D. O. Manley, Federal veterinarian, USDA Animal Health Division.

Dr. Homer Caley, Kansas State University Extension veterinarian, reports that Kansas requires a "special" permit from the state livestock commissioner for all feeder and breeding pigs

brought into the state.

All feeder pigs must be moved under a "permanent" quarantine granted by the commissioner to a specific feedlot where they must remain until fed out and sent to slaughter, Caley notes.

All the officials stress that replacement pigs be kept isolated from the rest of the herd for at least 30 days.

They advise farmers to contact their veterinarians at the first sign of sickness in their hogs. The quicker cholera is located, the faster it can be eliminated and lessen the chance for spread.

Prompt cholera reporting is important from the farmer's financial standpoint too, because indemnity for hog cholera losses cannot be paid on animals that die before the first visit of a state or federal inspector. Hogs imported in violation of Kansas laws and regulations also are not eligible for indemnity.

## Dampen Alaskan Oil Boom Scope

All the vast oil reserves of the Alaskan North Slope may amount to only a 2-year supply for the voracious appetite of the American industrial society, T. F. Bradshaw, head of the Atlantic Richfield company said.

A top British oilman agreed and said the center of world oil production would remain the Middle East for many years, perhaps until it shifts to Soviet Western Siberia, which "potentially has the largest reserves of natural gas and crude oil in the world."

Both Bradshaw and Davis H. Barran, managing director of the Royal Dutch-Shell Oil Group, spoke in a panel discussion on whether the new North Slope oil discoveries mean a shift of the center of gravity of the petroleum industry to the Arctic.

Both men answered: "No."

Bradshaw said the Alaskan Prudhoe Bay field in which his company has several valuable concessions "is by far the largest ever discovered in North America, but it is not the an-

swer to a nation's need. In future years the United States is going to need Prudhoe Bay and other North Slope discoveries, plus a lot more," he said.

American dependence on oil from sources outside North America is growing rapidly, Bradshaw said. "To help maintain a balanced supply, which I believe means so much to the economic security of the United States, we will undoubtedly begin supplementing conventional oil with synthetic crude hydrocarbons within the next 10 years," he said.

The National Farmers Organization will hold its national convention at Louisville, Kentucky this week, December 10-11.

General sessions begin Wednesday with reports throughout the day and Oren Lee Staley, national president, due to make his annual report that evening.

The open session continues Thursday with election of officers and other business. Committee meetings start early in the week, and leadership sessions and other work will continue through the week.

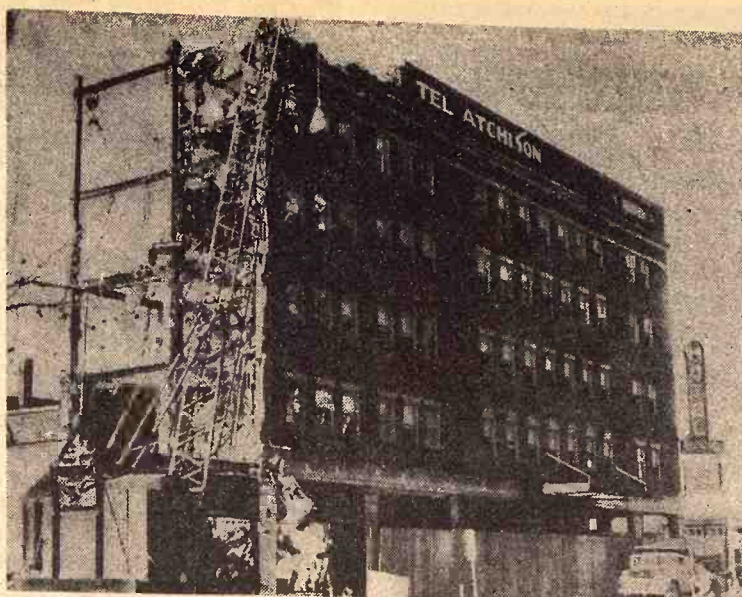

"Sound of Music," panned by the movie critics but loved by U.S. audiences, has been put away in the vaults after setting financial records in a time in which moviemakers have had a poor record in making money.

But "Sound of Music" has cer-

tainly made money for 20th Century Fox and all the people who figured in its production.

Fox has had the movie in circulation for 4½ years. It has brought in gross receipts of \$112 million — \$44 million of it overseas. The movie cost \$8.1 million to produce. After deducting advertising and distribution costs, Fox figures to have made some \$50 million.

It is by far the greatest financial success in moviemaking.

"Gone With The Wind" has

come close but it has been released seven times in a 30-year period. "Sound of Music" has been put into the vaults until 1972. If its re-runs are anything close to being as successful as "Gone With The Wind," its profits will be out of sight.

It wasn't just Fox which trailed to the bank so regularly. The writers, Richard Rodgers and the late Oscar Hammerstein, got 10% of the gross as well as an original \$1.25 million for film rights. Producer-director Robert

Wise got 10% of the gross too — that's \$11.2 million. The script writer, Ernest Lehman, has had to be content with only \$2.8 million.

So far. In 1972, the trips to the bank may start again.

## Big New Jet In Training Over G&G Area

One of the largest airplanes in the world will be flying over the G&G area this month.

It is the huge new Boeing 747, which TWA will use for jet training during December at the Salina airport.

The huge aircraft will actually be based in Kansas City, but Salina's facility will be used to conduct training operations — touch-and-go landings and use of the airport's instrument landing systems.

The Salina airport — part of the former Schilling Air Force Base — is used by a number of commercial lines for training. FAA and Northwest Airline jets have been using the facility recently for training on Boeing 720 and 727 jets.

The 747 is so long that a 1000-

foot-long airframe overhaul building being readied for it. TWA's headquarters at Kansas City had to be remodeled to house it. A 20-foot hole was cut in the hangar doors to permit 231 feet of the mammoth jet to be enclosed, leaving 78 feet of the tail section exposed.

The 747 will have a passenger capacity of 490 compared to less than 200 for most of the larger airliners now.

Tho it's bigger, the 747 is alleged to be quieter than the 707 and 727. It may be around the area for six months.

drawal of offerings of the milo  
for sale and the next day prices  
lowered even though only a few  
deals were made.

Within two days, the govern-  
ment rescinded its announce-  
ment. Then the department an-  
nounced that it would sell milo  
for export at the Gulf at \$2.20 a  
hundredweight or the market  
whichever was higher. This was  
a lowered price and caused the  
cash market to drop here. How-  
ever, some sales made at the  
Gulf were at \$2.26, the market  
price rather than the govern-  
ment minimum.

Hardin said the market reac-  
tion had been greater than they  
expected to the announcement  
on termination of the resale on  
the 1967-68 grain. Because of

this, and not because of pressure  
from farm organizations and el-  
evator interests, the order was  
canceled. Now the grain may be  
kept in storage until normal ter-  
mination of the loans.

"We made a mistake," Hardin  
said. "Under the circumstances,  
the best thing to do was to cor-  
rect it promptly."

He added the export potential  
for milo is good, particularly to  
Japan, but that this country  
must remain competitive on the  
foreign markets. The depart-  
ment is attempting to have milo  
available at a price that will be  
competitive.

Asked if it might not be better  
to make a flat statement that the  
government contemplated no  
more changes in milo policy, the  
secretary said: "I just did."

## Fewer Students In Public Schools

For the first time in years, enrollment in Kansas public schools has declined. The current enrollment is slightly under a half million — 499,801, the State Dept. of Education says.

The count a year ago was 502,732. The decline of slightly less than 3000 amounts to about 0.6 of one percent.

Tabulation by grades has not been completed, but presumably the decline is accounted in the kindergarten and first grades.

The decrease hit all but Shawnee Mission among the larger school systems. Wichita, Kansas City, Topeka, Salina, Hutchinson and Manhattan each had reductions in enrollment.

The kindergarten and first grade enrollments showed tendencies for decrease in the past two years, there were indications the enrollment decline was not anticipated by the number of appeals filed by districts to exceed the 104% budget increase limit because their enrollment did not reach the figure on which their budgets were based.

When a district's enrollment does not reach the figure on which the budget is based, it may not spend the money it would have cost to educate the missing students without an appeal to the State Board of Education.

22 districts already have made successful appeals for this reason and 15 appeals are pending.

Further appeals are expected by the board.

Tho there are fewer students, the number of certified teachers increased. The current figure is 28,660 compared to 28,305 a year ago.

USDA says it will not force food stamp programs on counties which do not want it, but a spokesman said the department will "use every means at our command to get food into all counties by next June 30."

## Best Apple Crop In 30 Years

The Agriculture department says exceptionally large apple production in Washington and Oregon helped make the 1969 national crop the biggest in more than 30 years.

Nationally, the crop is estimated at about 6.7 billion pounds, about 24 percent more than in 1968. Officials said in a special report that Washington and

Commercial output by Washington growers this year was estimated at 1.69 billion pounds, compared with 1.025 billion in 1968, the report said. Oregon output was estimated at 160 million compared with 87 million pounds last year.

Washington, which produced about one-fourth of the crop, was followed in production this year by New York, 14 percent, and Michigan, 10 percent. Production was up 14 percent from last year in the East; 18 percent in the Central States, and 41 percent in the West, the report said.

The leading variety nationally was Delicious, which accounted for about 30 percent of produc-

tion, officials said. Half of were harvested in Washington.

Golden Delicious ranked second, accounting for 13 percent. Other leading varieties included: McIntosh 10 percent; Beauty 8; Jonathan 6; and Imperial 5.

Boughton served as assistant director of the division and became acting director when W. J. (Jim) Petr was named director of the new Meat and Poultry Inspection Division.

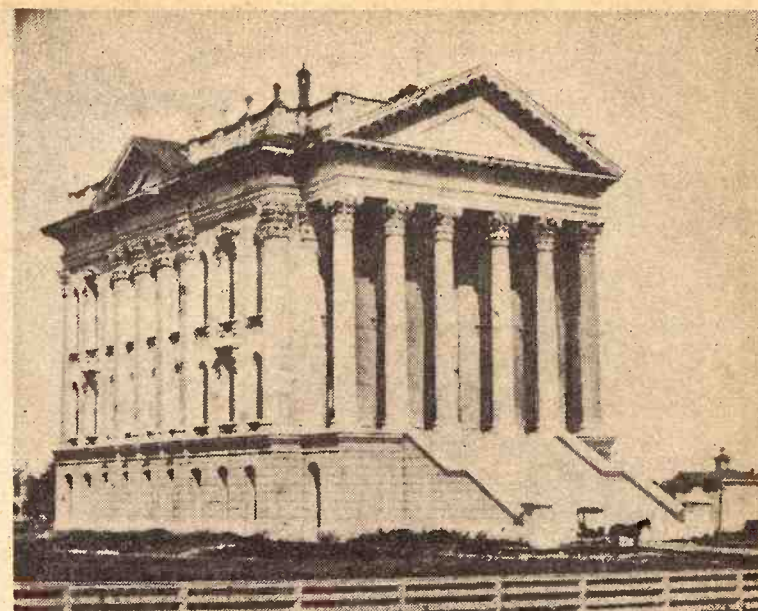
