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

Not enough farm boys with vocational agriculture training enroll in our agricultural colleges.

A few of you Future Farmers have visited the beautiful campus of Kansas State College in Manhattan while attending the State FFA Convention or participating in the state judging contests held there. Many of you will have this opportunity as you finish your last year of high school. The scope of the work in agriculture at Kansas State College and its experiment stations is large. It is one of the finest and best equipped colleges in the nation. Its aims and purposes bear similarities to the aims and purposes of your FFA organization.

There is a strong demand for college-trained young men in the field of agriculture. A good record and a degree from Kansas State College will help develop your capacity and ability as a leader in the field of farming. All of you cannot return to the farm but your farm background plus your high school training and a college degree will increase your opportunity to accept a position of responsibility and service to farm people.

The following list will give you an idea of a few of the job opportunities available to ag graduates:

The above plan may be greatly modified if the need arises. In order to keep up interest in the pictorials the State Office will need the cooperation of local FFA advisers and members in sending glossy prints of good pictures of outstanding activities of Future Farmer groups. Good pictures of interesting and outstanding FFA activities will be "sandwiched" in regardless of the major emphasis theme for any special issue. Address all pictures intended for the Newsletter together with descriptive material to A. P. Davidson, Department of Education (Vocational), Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

1955-56 STATE FFA PROGRAM OF WORK

- 1. One hundred per cent of the Kansas vocational agriculture departments establish chapters of FFA and strive for one hundred per cent enrollment of eligible members.
- 2. Each chapter have a definite program of activities for the year and submit this program to the State Office not later than October 31, 1955. Each chapter to present an achievement report at the annual meeting of the State Association. Only chapters submitting activity programs by October 31 will be eligible for State Farmer or American Farmer candidates, and to participate in the State FFA Public Speaking Contest.
- 3. A farming program of maximum size and scope for each boy commensurate with the ability of the boy and the home farm opportunity.
- 4. As a means of inculcating sound thrift principles, the State Association encourages careful selection, management and financing of supervised farming programs.
- 5. A continuous program of repair and construction of farm machinery and equipment.
- 6. Prevent waste of all kinds (conserve soil and other natural resources; control farm fires; control livestock losses, eradicate pests).
- 7. Each chapter have a definite safety program, including goals and ways and means of attaining same.
- 8. Six issues of the FFA Newsletter to be published, beginning with September and distributed over a period of nine months. Copies of each issue will be sent to the officers of the National Organization of Future Farmers of America, to all state advisers, and to a select list of agricultural teacher trainers and agricultural leaders.
- 9. Encourage parliamentary proficiency among local chapters, and encourage ritualistic proficiency throughout the State Association. It is recommended that each chapter own sufficient copies of both the FFA Manual and Stewart's Parliamentary Procedure to furnish a copy of both for each officer. It is further recommended that sufficient copies of both publications be owned by the chapter to make both readily available to all local members.
- 10. One hundred per cent of chapters meet the minimum requirements for the Standard Chapter Award.
- 11. Fifty per cent of chapters meet the minimum requirements for the Superior Chapter Award.
- 12. Encourage one hundred per cent of the chapters to use official FFA secretary's books and official FFA treasurer's books.
- 13. Support FFA contests of state and national scope.
- 14. Support the National FUTURE FARMER Magazine.
- 15. Publicity 100 per cent of chapters participate in National FFA Week, February 19-25; encourage local chapters to keep the public informed as to worthwhile activities; and State Association give publicity to activities of state and national interest.

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1955-56 State FFA Program of Work (continued)

- 16. Encourage home improvement by members of local chapters to include landscaping, beautification, repair, electrification, providing comfort and conveniences to make the farm home more livable.
- It is recommended that each chapter provide and use the following list 17. of paraphernalia: U. S. Flag, Owl, Ear of Corn, Plow, Gavel and Block, FFA Felt Banner (3' x 6'); framed under glass - Charter, Pictures of Washington, Jefferson, and Groseclose, Washington's General Order on Profanity, Creed, and Purposes; Secretary's Book, Treasurer's Book, FFA Manuals (minimum of seven), Shield for Sentinel Station, FFA song, and filing case.
- 18. Encourage scouting.
- 19. Encourage the establishment of FFA chapter libraries and recommend the minimum requirements to be (figures in parentheses indicate publishers listed):
 - FFA Manual, 1954 edition, for each officer. (1) 15¢ a.

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MEETING OF THE STATE FFA OFFICERS

The State FFA Officers held a meeting at Manhattan, September 10. They approved the State Program of Work, set up plans for district FFA leadership schools, and planned activities in connection with the National FFA Convention.

CHAPTER ACTIVITY PROGRAM

October 31 is the deadline date for filing local chapter activity programs with the State Department. Address same to State Deputy Adviser A. P. Davidson, Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Official Activity Program Blanks in sufficient quantities to supply a copy of the local chapter activity program for the State Office and an extra set to be made and kept in the chapter files were mailed all chapters August 26.

Helpful Suggestions for building the chapter activity program will be found in the Official FFA Manual, 1954 Edition, p. 36-40. A cross section of the activities planned and executed by the 1954 Kansas Gold Emblem and Silver Emblem winners will be found on p. 4-12 of the April, 1955, issue of the Kansas Future Farmer Newsletter.

In planning chapter activity programs for 1955-56, requirements of the National Chapter Award Program should be kept in mind. More specific information concerning this program will be found on p. 8-11 of this Newsletter.

<u>Committee Appointments</u> for building the chapter activity program should include all members of the chapter. Every effort should be made to have a program built and endorsed by the chapter, and not merely a program set up by the officers and adviser.

<u>Calendaring Activities</u> for the year, by months, is important. Too many activities at a given time will likely result in a scattering of effort and a lowering of standards. Too few activities will cause loss of interest. Fit your program of activities in with the school and community programs. This will avoid conflicts and the possibility of demanding too much time and energy on the part of certain members of your chapter. The 1955-56 Calendar of Activities for the Kansas Association of FFA will be helpful in building local chapter activity calendars.

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ADDITIONS TO VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE STATE STAFF

We are pleased to announce that two assistant supervisors of vocational agriculture were added to the state staff at the close of summer school. Their appointment was effective August 8, 1955.

This will mean more individual in-service help to the teachers than has been possible in the past. The new men are John Lacey, vocational agriculture instructor at Hillsboro, and Harold Shoaf, from Fredonia. Mr. Lacey will work in the northwest part of the state and Mr. Shoaf in the northeast. Mr. Whipps, a present member of the staff, will work in the southeast part of the state. All three men will help Supervisor Eustace with the supervisory work and problems in the southwest section. All of the men will be headquartered in the Kansas State Board for Vocational Education, 1025 Kansas Avenue, Topeka.

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CHANGES IN CHAPTER AWARD PROGRAMS

I. NATIONAL CHAPTER AWARD PROGRAM. Action was taken at the 1954 National FFA Convention to change the National Chapter Contest. Kansas FFA chapters entering the 1955 National Chapter Award Program will conform to the new plan which was approved at the 26th National FFA Convention.

The new plan* for conducting the National Chapter Award Program is designed to enable every chapter in the United States to participate and be scored. The general plan includes:

- 1. Standard Chapter Award
- 2. Superior Chapter Award
- 3. National Emblem Awards: Gold, Silver, and Bronze

AWARDS

Awards will be made to chapters by the National Organization of Future Farmers of America as follows:

A. TO ALL NATIONAL EMBLEM AWARD CHAPTERS:

A National FFA plaque the year the chapter is an initial winner.

TO GOLD EMBLEM AWARD CHAPTERS: A Gold Emblem in miniature for attachment to plaque.

TO SILVER EMBLEM AWARD CHAPTERS: A Silver Emblem in miniature for attachment to plaque.

TO BRONZE EMBLEM AWARD CHAPTERS: A Bronze Emblem in miniature for attachment to plaque.

B. TO ALL STANDARD AND SUPERIOR CHAPTER AWARD WINNERS:

A special "5-year" certificate designed to hold 5 seals of the official emblem.

TO STANDARD CHAPTER AWARD WINNERS: A Bronze Emblem seal for affixing to "5-year" certificate.

TO SUPERIOR CHAPTER AWARD WINNERS: A Gold Emblem seal for affixing to "5-year" certificate.

The National Emblem Awards will be presented at the Annual National FFA Convention.

Each State Association shall determine the place and manner for presenting the Standard and Superior Awards to local chapters.

The certificate and seals for the chapter awards shall be sent to each State FFA Adviser, upon request, for distribution to the winners in his state.

Changes in Chapter Award Programs (continued)

REQUIREMENTS FOR NATIONAL AWARDS FOLLOW:

1. Standard Chapter Award (Form I)

- a. Local chapter must meet Item 1 Program of Work submitted October 31.
- b. Must meet 18 of the remaining 20 requirements.
- c. Form I will have to be filled out and signed by the chapter president, chapter secretary and chapter adviser, and approved and signed by the State FFA Adviser before being sent to the National FFA Office.
- d. Standard Chapter Award winners will receive a special 5-year certificate designed to hold 5 Bronze emblem seals.
- 2. Superior Chapter Award (Form II)
 - a. Chapter must meet the first 12 requirements set forth in Form II and at least 5 of the remaining 9 requirements, plus the requirements for a Standard Chapter (Form I) to qualify for the Superior Chapter Award.
 - b. Form II will have to be filled out and signed by the chapter president, chapter secretary and chapter adviser, and approved and signed by the State FFA Adviser before being sent to the National FFA Office.
 - c. Superior Chapter Award winners will receive a special 5-year certificate designed to hold 5 Gold emblem seals.
 - d. Kansas chapters filling out Form II, "Superior Chapter Award," will be required to submit a copy of the chapter's achievements (Form III) to the State Office.
- 3. National Emblem Awards: Gold, Silver, and Bronze (Form III)
 - a. In evaluating a chapter's final report (Forms I, II, and III) for a National Emblem Award, consideration will be given to the following points:

The number of standards met The extent of membership participating in meeting the standards

b. To all National Emblem Award chapters a National FFA Plaque will be given the year the chapter is an initial winner.

To Gold Emblem Award winners: A Gold Emblem in miniature for attachment to the plaque.

To Silver Emblem Award winners: A Silver Emblem in miniature for attachment to the plaque.

To Bronze Emblem Award winners: A Bronze Emblem in miniature for attachment to the plaque. Changes in Chapter Award Programs (continued)

- c. Kansas chapters entering the National Emblem Award Program will be required to submit a copy of the chapter's achievement program (Form III) to the State Office.
- d. The number of chapters from a state that may participate in the National Emblem Award Program is based upon the same membership requirements that were operative in 1954 - two chapters for each 5,000 members; an additional chapter for each major fraction thereof.
- II. KANSAS ASSOCIATION AWARD PROGRAM.
 - 1. Standard Chapter Award
 - a. The Kansas Association will not make Standard Chapter Awards but the State Adviser will be required to sign Form I setting forth the chapter accomplishments before forwarding same to the National FFA Office.
 - 2. Superior Chapter Award
 - a. The Kansas Association will not make Superior Chapter Awards but the State Adviser will be required to sign Form I setting forth the chapter accomplishments before forwarding same to the National FFA Office.
 - b. Before a Kansas chapter will be certified for the National "Superior Chapter Award" (Form II), said chapter will have to submit along with the application a copy of the chapter's achievement program (Form III) to the State Office.
 - c. <u>NOTE</u>: Kansas chapters submitting Form III <u>may</u> or <u>may</u> not, at their discretion, enter the Kansas Association Emblem Award Program.
 - 3. National Emblem Awards: Gold, Silver, and Bronze
 - a. Chapters indicating a desire to participate in the Kansas Emblem Award Program will be classified into Gold, Silver, and Bronze. State Association Certificates will be awarded.
 - b. For certifying Kansas chapters for the National Emblem Award Program a pattern similar to the one in force will be used.
 - c. It is highly desirable to continue with the State Association Emblem Award Program since items applicable to Kansas may be added at the discretion of the State Association.

For several years the Future Farmers of America Foundation, Inc., has approved the Emblem Chapter Program in Kansas as qualifying for the "State Award for Improving Agriculture and Leadership." We hope the Foundation will continue this approval. Changes in Chapter Award Programs (continued)

The 1955 Foundation "State Award for Improving Agriculture and Leadership" for Kansas will total \$999.10. Sixty per cent of this award money will be distributed equally among the 1955 Gold Emblem Chapter Award winners and 40 per cent will be divided equally among the 1955 Silver Emblem Chapter Award winners. All award moneys must be spent for chapter betterment.

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FUTURE FARMERS OF AMERICA OFFICIAL CALENDARS

Our attention has been called to the existence of confusion on the part of some vocational agriculture teachers concerning the fact that two companies are distributing official Future Farmers of America calendars. I hope you will take whatever steps are necessary to clear up such misunderstandings in your own State.

The two companies authorized to publish and sell official FFA calendars are the Osborne Company, of Cincinnati, Chio, and the Custom Cal Company of Atlanta, Georgia. The type of calendar sold, and method of selling, is different with each company. There should be no conflict in the sale of the calendars.

The Osborne Company has been producing official FFA calendars since 1948. Their "home" calendar has a four-color reproduction of an FFA painting on the cover, followed with 12 pages of color photographs on the inside. Three sizes of "wall" calendars also are produced by Osborne, featuring the reproduction of the same painting used on the cover of the "home" calendar, but without any other color pages.

The Osborne Company is responsible for selling sponsorship of its calendar, and is permitted only one sponsor in a community. Osborne Company salesman are required to consult the local vocational agriculture instructor before the selection of the sponsor is made. Generally, the FFA chapter agrees to distribute the calendars when they arrive, and for this service the chapter receives a small commission based on the number of calendars purchased by the sponsor. <u>Development of public relations through distribution of an</u> <u>attractive calendar is the primary function of this line of calendars</u>.

The Custom Cal Company was authorized by the FFA Board of Directors last January to begin selling FFA fund-raising calendars. Their calendar is a single sheet that features a group picture of the FFA chapter members. It includes space for advertisements by several merchants in the community. With the Custom Cal calendar, members of the FFA chapter are asked to handle the selling of advertising space. It's primary purpose is fund-raising. The chapter retains most of the money collected from advertising.

The FFA Board of Student Officers and Board of Directors, in approving the plan of the Custom Cal Company to sell fund-raising calendars, felt that this type of calendar should in no way conflict with those that are sold by the Osborne Company.

ESTABLISHING FFA CHAPTERS

The following information will be of interest to local FFA advisers who are faced with the problem of establishing local FFA Chapters.

- I. ESTABLISHING FFA CHAPTERS IN SCHOOLS WHERE VOCATIONAL AGRICULTURE IS BEING OFFERED FOR THE FIRST TIME.
 - a. Acquaint the vocational agriculture students with the Future Farmers of America Organization through study lessons, FFA Official Manual, FFA Newsletters, National FFA Proceedings, etc., in an effort to create a desire to organize a local chapter of Future Farmers of America.
 - b. Elect temporary officers from upper class groups. Use a nominating committee if feasible.
 - c. Through committee assignments and study of mimeographed material from the State Office, build tentative chapter Program of Work.
 - d. Write State Office at Manhattan for petition blanks to petition the State Association for a local FFA chapter and for Program of Work blanks.
 - e. Collect State and National dues (10¢ National, 20¢ State total 30¢), list membership in accordance with directions on petition blank and forward the petition blank with State and National dues and tentative local chapter Program of Work to the State Office at Manhattan, Kansas.
 - f. Upon receipt of petition blank, dues and local Program of Work, the State Office will issue the local FFA charter and will send the local chapter free the following material: George Washington's General Order on Profanity, Purposes, Creed, Picture of Henry Groseclose, all to be framed under glass. The State Office will also send letters to be forwarded to Swift and Company and Deere and Company which will enable your chapter to procure a miniature steel plow and framed pictures of Washington and Jefferson.
 - g. In accordance with the National Constitution, all local officers except the Sentinel must hold the degree of Chapter Farmer. In case of newly chartered chapters, the Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America has ruled that all officers in such FFA chapters shall be elected from the Green Hand Degree group. During the second year of the local chapter's history it will be possible to elect officers from the Chapter Farmer Degree group, which will be in full accord with the Constitutions of both the National Organization and the State Association.
- II. SUGGESTED PATTERNS FOR DEGREE RITUAL WORK.
 - a. Take the officer group to a neighboring chapter and have them initiated into the Green Hand Degree. Then the Chapter Green Hand officer members can initiate the other members of the chapter into the Green Hand Degree.

Establishing FFA Chapters (continued)

- b. Have a neighboring chapter bring its officers to a meeting of the local chapter and have them initiate the entire group into the Green Hand Degree.
- c. In the case of small groups, it might be desirable to take your entire membership to a neighboring chapter and have them initiated into the Green Hand Degree.

- I. The Future Farmers of America Foundation, Inc., has approved the plan proposed by the Kansas Association of FFA for using the 1955 award money for "Improving Agriculture and Leadership." The amount allotted to Kansas for this purpose is \$999.10. The plan for allocating this money for 1955 will be the same as the plan used in 1954. Under this procedure sixty per cent of the award money will be divided equally between the Gold Emblem Award winners, and forty per cent of the award money will be divided equally between the Silver Emblem Award winners in the 1955 State Chapter Contest. The award money will be paid the chapters out of the State FFA Treasury, and a short statement of accomplishments of the award winners together with a reimbursement voucher will be sent the National FFA Office. The State Association will then be reimbursed for the maximum amount allocated for this purpose. All award money distributed for this project in Kansas is to be used for the betterment of the local FFA chapter.
- II. The Kansas Association participated in the 1955 Farm Safety (Chapter Award) Program of the Future Farmers of America Foundation, Inc. Chapters should keep in mind the fact that the Kansas Association will participate in the chapter safety program for 1956 and should include increased emphasis on chapter safety activities for the current chapter year. The chapter award on the state level will be \$100, which must be spent for chapter improvement.
- III. The American Farmer award of \$50 for each successful American Farmer candidate is given to help defray expenses to the National Future Farmers of America Convention and is made direct to the individuals concerned, all of whom have been out of high school for at least one year.
 - IV. The Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America acts as an intermediary for distributing the Future Farmers of America Foundation, Inc., award money to assist in paying travel expenses for the National Future Farmers of America Judging Contests.
 - V. The Kansas Association of Future Farmers of America does not accept Future Farmers of America Foundation, Inc., cash awards on the state level for individual FFA members enrolled in high school.

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PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO FFA NATIONAL CONSTITUTION

Under the provisions of the FFA National Constitution, all proposed amendments to the National Constitution must be submitted by the National Adviser to the several State Associations "at least 30 days prior to the next succeeding National Convention, be reviewed by the Board of Student Officers and the Board of Directors, and submitted by the National Officers with recommendations to the delegates in the National Convention."

A proposed amendment from the South Carolina Association of Future Farmers of America is as follows:

Amend Article XI, Section B of the constitution by inserting "and one additional delegate for each 5,000 active members or major fraction thereof, over the first 5,000 members" in line 4 after "convention". The rest of Section B would remain the same.

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MEMBERSHIP IN NATIONAL FFA ORGANIZATION

Membership in the Future Farmers of America has reached a new record total of 383,219 during the Organization's 27th year, according to records compiled in the National FFA Office in Washington, D. C.

The 1955 membership topped 1954 by 11,627, or approximately 3.13 per cent. Figures are based on the amount of dues (10 cents per member) paid by the State FFA Associations to the National Organization.

Forty-one states increased their FFA membership during the year. The organization is active in all the 48 states, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Texas leads the nation with 37,718 members, followed by North Carolina with 22,606, and Illinois with 17,578.
