



Watershed District's Lake Open For Fishing

A cooperative effort between a watershed district and the Kansas Fish & Game Commission has opened up Lake Nebo in Jackson County for public fishing.

Here, Game Protector Roy McKinsey, Holton, and Noble Smith of Muscotah and Harry Moore of Holton, representing the Delaware Watershed Board of Directors, prepare to make an inspection of the lake.

The 38-acre lake and 42 acres of land around it are owned by the watershed district and managed by the Fish & Game Commission. It is the first such cooperative effort in the state.

The commission stocked the lake with fish and has developed the area around the lake for the convenience of fishermen and picnickers.

The on-farm treatment of the 2658 acres draining into Lake Nebo is nearly complete. The lake has 280 acre feet of water, while the dam has a flood-retarding capacity of another 705 acre feet.

CLAY CENTER CO-OP BUYS FERTILIZER YARDS

CLAY CENTER — The Farmers Union Cooperative Association has purchased fertilizer facilities here from the Phillips Petroleum Co. The facilities had previously been leased by Phillips to Roy Martin. Included in the facilities are a 30,000 gallon anhydrous ammonia tank; an 18,000 and a 4000 gallon tank, both for liquid fertilizer; and a warehouse.

Crop Plantings To 7-Year High

With allowances for drought and fears that massive production would severely depress prices, it appears now that U.S. farmers plan to boost the acreage they plant to major crops to a 7-year high.

This forecast is based on a preview of the USDA report of

1967 planting intentions, which is due out this week.

But as always government economists will hedge their forecasts with comments that the actual seeded acreage can vary sharply from the forecast, due to weather conditions at planting time, changing prices of farm commodities, labor supply, and the effect that the planting report might have on farmers' actions.

But the initial forecast will guess that planted acreage for 59 of the nation's major crops will total around 320 million acres. This would be 7% more than 1966 seedings—the smallest on record—and the most land in crop production since 325 million acres were planted in 1960.

Because of steadily improving farming techniques, cropland has decreased from the 480 million acre peak of the 1920s. In the past dozen years, harvested acreage fell about 15% while crop yields per acre climbed more than 30%.

As always, the big question is weather. With no rain of consequence thru the fall and winter, winter wheat country will have prospects fall off each week from now on.

The government estimates 54 million acres were planted in winter wheat, about 25% more than last year. With normal rainfall this land could produce a record 1.6 billion bushels of wheat, adding about 110 million bushels or so to 1967-68 wheat carryover, which by next July is expected to be 400 million bushels, the smallest in 15 years.

Corn is likely to show the biggest upturn among key crops. Trade sources estimate an additional 5 to 6 million acres will be planted this year, an increase of nearly 10% above the 66.3 million acres seeded in 1966. That could produce a crop of 4.8 billion bushels, another record.

Because corn makes up some 60% of the total feed grain acreage, a big crop could be expected to end the decline in feed grain stocks, which have dropped from 85 million tons in 1961 to an expected 25 million tons by next September.

Grain sorghum acreage is not expected to climb markedly, but if wheat farmers plow up their drouth-stricken acreage and plant feed grain instead on the same land, then that prediction could be wrong.

Soybean acreage is expected to increase for the eighth consecutive year. Plantings now

look as if they will be 2 to 2½ million acres more than last year's record 37.4 million. With favorable weather this could mean a billion bushel crop.

Cotton acreage is likely to be unchanged. Federal cotton programs still require major diversions, as much as 35%.

Government economists figure hay acreage probably will remain unchanged from the 65.2 million acres planted in 1966, tho some trade observers think hay acreage will decline a bit.

Potato, tobacco and cane sugar acreage also aren't expected to vary much from last year.

Beet-sugar acreage, from which all federal restrictions have been lifted, may increase to 1.4 million acres from 1.2 million last year.

If bumper crops do go along with increased plantings, these are the most likely results:

- Great wheat production would hold down the cost of flour, which now wholesales for 3% more than a year ago.

- Abundant supplies of feed grains would tend to lower costs for livestock feeders.

- Corn and soybean meal are key cost items in production of red meat, poultry, milk and eggs, and lower prices could spur output of most of these foodstuffs.

CUTWORM COUNT IS HIGH IN COWLEY CO.

If the wheat survives the drouth, it may also have to fight cutworms. A state survey shows cutworm infestation is heaviest in Cowley County, in south central Kansas. The count there runs as high as 8 to 15 per square foot. Spraying conditions are usually indicated when cutworm counts get past three per square foot.

50th Year For Emporia FLBA

The first federal land bank loan was made 50 years ago, and one G&G area association which was organized a year after, started into its 50th year with its annual meeting at Em-

poria last week. The meeting attracted 603 people from Chase, Coffey, Osage and Lyon counties. Included among those in attendance was Mrs. Samuel Wingert, 92, whose

husband was president of the first Land Bank Association for the Emporia area founded in 1918.

Recognition was also given the late W. M. Price, an Empor-

ia banker, who was manager of the Emporia association from 1918 to 1933. The present 4-county organization, started about 1950, involved merger of another group managed by the

late James Dwelle.

At the meeting Leon DeDonder of Reading and William J. Williams, Emporia, were re-elected.

Why Feedlot Runoff Has Become Problem

Why feedlot runoff has become the state's biggest water pollution problem got some detailed description at a pollution symposium at Topeka last week.

Basically the problem is this: 1) Livestock excrete a mountain of waste; 2) livestock are more concentrated than before.

Melville Gray, Assistant direc-

tor of the State Department of Health, gave these figures: "On January 1, 1967, there were 5.5 million cattle, 1.3 million hogs and pigs, and 452,000 sheep in the state of Kansas. These animals excrete daily wastes equivalent to what would be produced by 70 million people."

In comparison, in 1940 there were 2.7 million cattle, and cattle feedlots did not develop in Kansas until the early 1950's.

In 1956, Kansas had 182,000 cattle on feed of which less than one-sixth were in large feedlots

—that is ones with 1000 head or more.

At the start of 1967 there were 586,000 cattle on feed in the state and well over half of them were on large lots.

"Animal wastes are no longer sparsely deposited over large areas conducive to natural stabilization with minimum prob-

lems," Gray said, "but are restricted to small areas which are worked by the animal hoofs to provide maximum dissolution and carriage of constituents by water during periods of rainfall."

Additionally, said Gray, the nutritionally-balanced feed results in a body waste having

greater water pollution than found with grassland-grazed cattle.

He said feedlots usually have a density of 200 to 300 cattle per acre. A feedlot with a capacity of 10,000 produces wastes every day equivalent to a human population of 100,000 persons.

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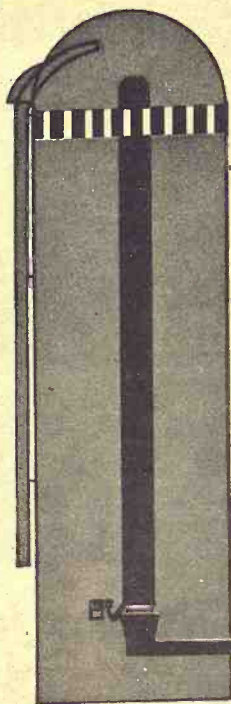
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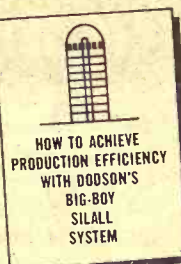
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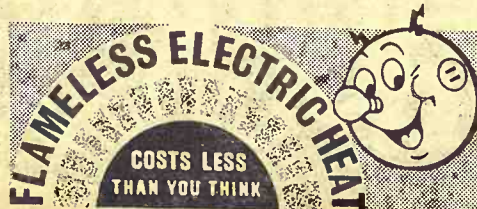

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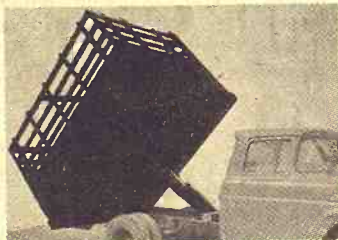
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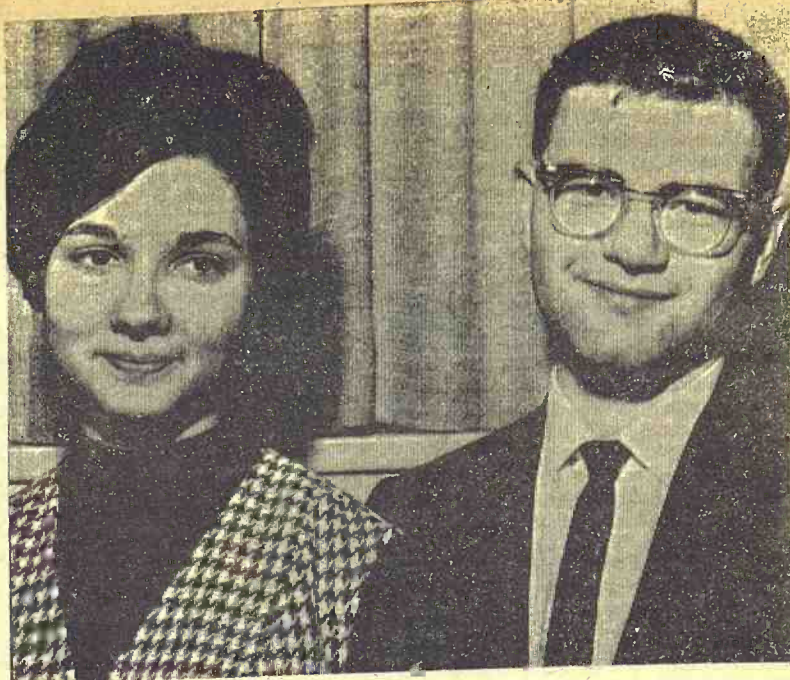
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Best At Science Fair

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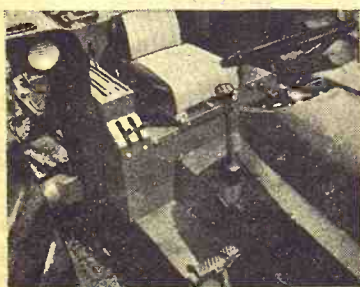

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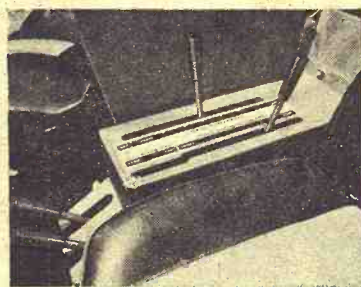
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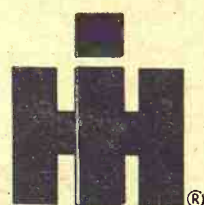

Mrs. V. R. Shellenberger, Bushong: "This is a very easy dessert to make and we like to fix it pretty often."

CINNAMON PUDDING CAKE

Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes.

Combine in saucepan:

- 1 1/4 cups firmly-packed brown sugar
- 1 1/2 cups cold water
- 2 tablespoons butter

Bring to boil and cool.

Sift together:

- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon

Cream together:

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 cup sugar

Add the dry ingredients alternately with 1 cup milk. Blend well after each addition. Spread into a greased 9x12x2-inch pan. Pour brown sugar mixture over batter. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup nuts. Serve warm with whipped cream. Serves eight to ten.

PEANUT-BUTTER MUFFINS

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup chunk-style peanut butter
- 2 tablespoons butter or margarine
- 2 well beaten eggs

- 3/4 cup milk
- 1/4 cup currant jelly, melted
- 1/3 cup finely chopped peanuts, toasted

Sift together dry ingredients. Cut in peanut butter and butter till mixture resembles coarse crumbs. Add eggs and milk, all at once, stirring just till flour is moistened. Grease 2-inch muffin pan or line with paper bake cups; fill two-thirds full. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees, 15 to 17 minutes or until done. Immediately brush

tops of muffins with melted jelly; dip tops in peanuts. Serve warm. Makes 20 small muffins.

Mrs. Jerry Schwartz, R 2, Randolph: "This is a very good muffin recipe. It can be made either with sugar or artificial sweetener for less calories or sugar restricted diets."

APPLE MUFFINS

- 2 cups sifted flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon ginger
- 1/4 cup sugar or 1 or 2 teaspoons artificial sweetener
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/3 cup vegetable oil or melted shortening
- 1/2 cup milk
- 2/3 cup sweetened (or diabetic) applesauce

Sift dry ingredients together. Make a well in center of dry ingredients. In separate bowl beat egg; stir in oil, milk and applesauce. Pour into well in dry ingredients. Stir only enough to mix dry and liquid ingredients. Batter will be lumpy. Don't overmix. Spoon batter into muffin pan cups that have been lightly greased on bottoms only, filling cups to about two-thirds full. Sprinkle tops with cinnamon and sugar mixture (2 tablespoons sugar and 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon) or cinnamon and Adolph's granulated artificial sweetener. Bake in hot oven, 400 degrees, 20-25 minutes. Makes one and one-half dozen medium muffins.

PEANUT BLOSSOMS

- 1 1/4 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon baking soda

- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine
- 1/2 cup peanut butter
- 1/2 cup white sugar
- 1/2 cup brown sugar

1 egg
1 teaspoon vanilla
3 dozen chocolate kisses
Sift together flour, soda and salt. Cream shortening, sugars and peanut butter; add egg and vanilla. Beat well. Blend in dry ingredients, shape into balls using one rounded teaspoon of dough. Roll in sugar and bake on ungreased cookie sheet eight minutes. Remove from oven and place one chocolate kiss on each. Return to oven two to five minutes in 350-degree oven.

MEAT LOAF

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 cup fresh bread crumbs
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1 medium onion, chopped
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/2 can tomato sauce (15-ounce size)

Mix ingredients and form loaf. Place in shallow pan. Mix following tart sweet sauce:

- 1/2 can tomato sauce
- 2 tablespoons vinegar
- 2 tablespoons mustard
- 1 cup water
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar or syrup

Mix and pour over meat loaf. Bake one and one-half hours at 350 degrees, basting occasionally.

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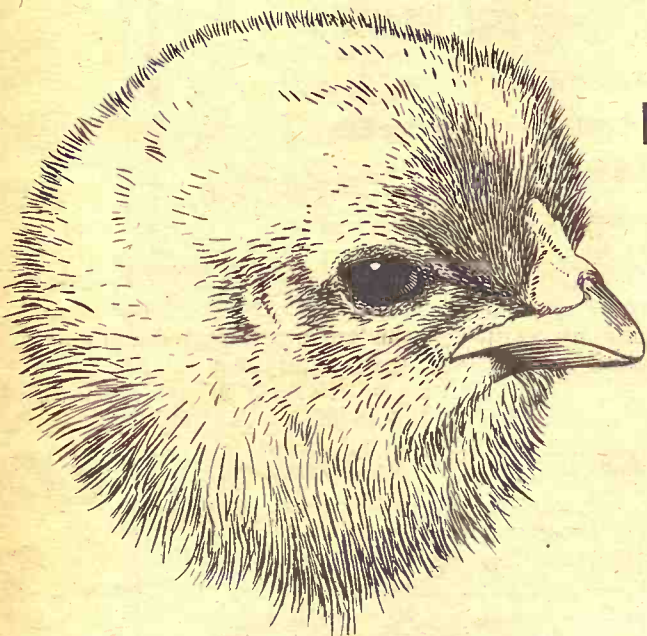
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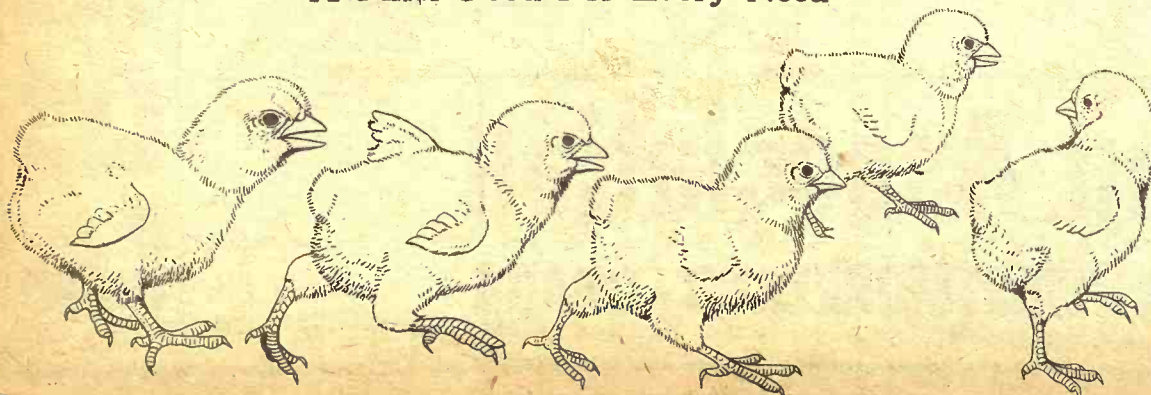

'3 Ways For Farm Plans To G

Present administration farm commodity programs undoubtedly will come under "severe attack" by some farm groups and some members of Congress, Orville Freeman, secretary of agriculture, said last week at Oklahoma City.

However, the secretary said, a recent study showed that without these programs by 1970 "net farm income might well fall by one-third, some 5 billion dollars below the 1966 figure of 16.3 billion dollars . . ."

Freeman, speaking at the annual National Farmers Union convention, said when farm legislation comes up for consideration again in 1969 there will be "three broad alternatives."

He outlined these alternatives as:

- "A continuation of voluntary programs with price supports as realistic levels near the world market and direct payments to farmers who cooperate by taking land out of production when oversupply threatens.

- "A termination of commodity programs, or mandatory programs with strict government controls on marketings."

Freeman said advocates of elimination of all farm commodity programs say they no longer are needed "because the surpluses are gone."

They overlook, he said, the fact that supplies are "down to manageable size largely because

of the programs."

A new study on commodity programs in the years immediately ahead, Freeman said, shows that without some type of government-supported commodity program, by 1970, the price of corn would fall to around 70 cents a bushel, cotton to 18 to 20 cents a pound and wheat to about \$1 to \$1.10 a bushel. The price level for livestock, he said, would decline nearly 10 percent, and the overall price level for crops would drop more than 20 percent while farm production expenses would continue to rise.

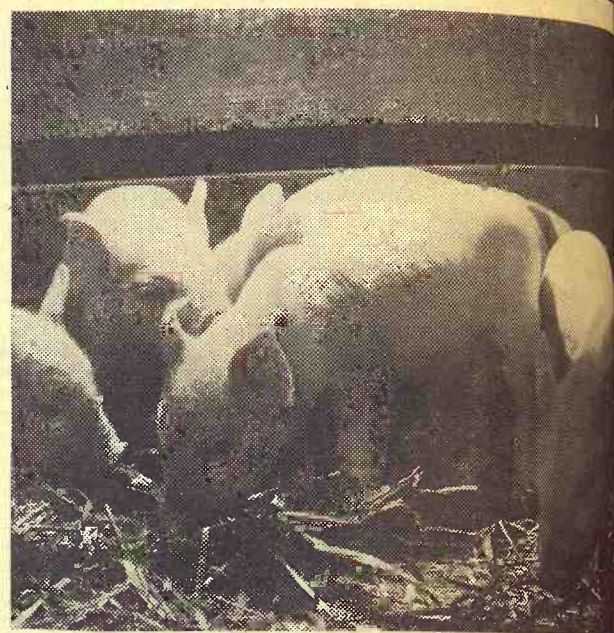
Congress, he pointed out, rejected mandatory programs for feed grains in 1962, and wheat

growers in 1963 turned down mandatory wheat programs.

The Johnson administration program, Freeman said, helped the farmer.

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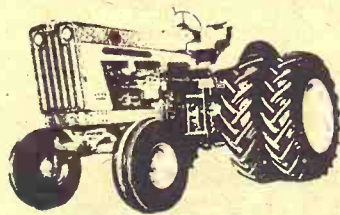

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Why Corn Prices Have Disappointed

Corn prices have been disappointing to many farmers with corn to sell. Prices ran up about a dime right after harvest, but they have been steady to weaker in most areas since then. Exports slow. Exports, which

took about one-third of the corn that farmers sold last year, have been slow. From October 1 to February 10, exports totaled only 179 million bushels, one-third less than a year before.

Four reasons have been given

for the cut in exports: (1) Buying countries had bigger feed crops, and didn't need to import so much. (2) Our corn is of poor quality this year: It did not dry normally in the field, and some spoiled in cribs and bins. (3) Despite the poor quality, corn prices have been higher than last year. (4) Relatively speaking, supplies of sorghum grain have been more abundant than supplies of corn.

More sorghum grain. The carryover of sorghum grain on October 1 was 391 million bushels. This amount was equal to 46 percent of the quantity used and exported in the previous 12 months. The 1966 crop totaled 720 million bushels — 7 percent more than the year before, and a new record high. From October 1 to February 10, exports of sorghum grain totaled 107 million bushels, 34 percent more than a year earlier.

Bullish factors. The strongest factor in the corn market is the increase in livestock numbers. Last year, 79 percent of all corn used and exported was fed to livestock and poultry in our own country.

At the first of this year, farmers had 51 million hogs and pigs, 8 percent more than a year earlier. Earlier, farmers had indicated they would raise about 3 percent more spring pigs than last year. (We think the increase will be a little more than 3 percent.)

Poultry numbers on hand January 1 totaled 428 million, up 9 percent from a year earlier. Since then, however, placements of broiler chicks have been only slightly greater than last winter.

The number of cattle on feed at the first of the year totaled 11.3 million, up 7 percent from a year before. Most of the increase was in the heavier cattle which use the most grain. Feed required by dairy cows is about the same as a year ago.

Bearish items. The northern and western parts of the Corn

Belt had big crops last fall. They market corn later in the season than many of our farmers in central and southern Illinois.

Many farmers who have been holding corn need money to pay 1966 bills and this will encourage some selling.

New crop prospects. Crops in Argentina and South Africa are reported to be good to excellent. Since these nations are in the southern hemisphere, they harvest their corn during our spring. They compete strongly

for foreign markets.

Early reports of the signup in the Feed-Grain Program indicate that one-third less corn acreage may be held out of corn this year than in 1966. New crop market prices in late April and prospects will begin to influence May.

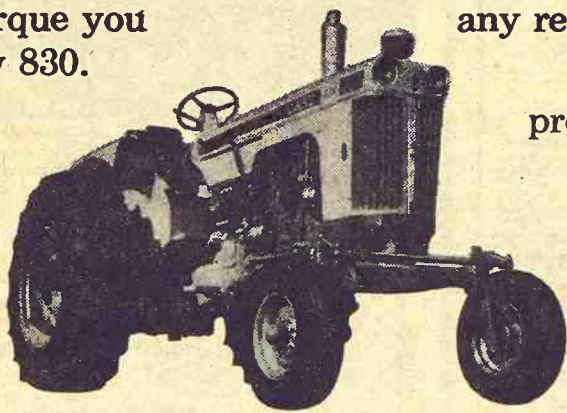

Torque comes from true tractor-engine design: big bore, long stroke, comparatively low rpm. This *big-leverage* muscle takes you through heavy going that would make other tractors shift or stall. You take a bigger "bite"



of the field, with bigger implements or at higher speeds—with confidence that you'll handle any reasonable overload without a stop.

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Turnpikes Could Seal Off Industry

Jack Lacy, director of the Department of Economic Development, told a Senate committee last week the state may isolate some of its industrial sites by building more toll roads.

Appearing before the Senate Highway Committee, Lacy declared that before action is taken to "wall off" industrial development in any section of the state by toll roads, a study should be made of the advantages of a freeway system.

"In four years we have seen 27 new industrial plants and 20 industrial expansions along Interstate 70," he told the committee. "Along I-35 we have seen 36 new plants and 30 expansions."

"Once you wall off and isolate any given area, restrict access to only those who pay toll, the development of the adjacent property comes to a standstill," he said.

Lacy said toll roads have the advantage of moving heavy traffic through the state as fast as possible.

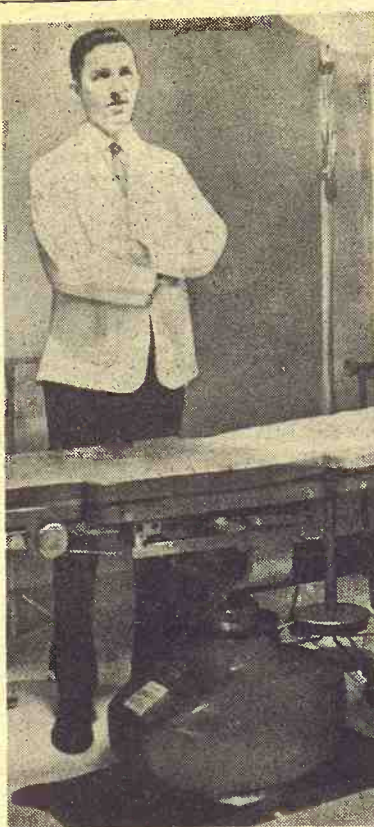
"But they contribute little to the long-range development of the resources of the state and the provision of new jobs along the route."

He added: "Industry does not locate where commuters must pay toll or where all incoming and outgoing freight must pass through toll gates and the cost of toll must be added to the cost of freight."

Nationally realized net farm income averaged \$5024 last

year compared with \$4200 in 1965.

The average realized net income per farm in other states last year and the percentage change from the year before included:

Illinois \$8043, up 30 percent; Iowa \$7778, up 24; Minnesota \$3878, up 17; Nebraska \$3378, up 17; Kansas \$4450, up 18; Oklahoma \$3444, up 11; Colorado \$3949, up 5; and Arkansas up 11.

Big Drop In Sheep On Feed

Sheep and lambs on feed in Kansas for market totaled 46,000 head on March 1, 1967, less than half the number on feed a year earlier, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Early "new crop" lambs destined for market by early summer are estimated at 164,000 head, 7 percent less than last year.

Kansas

The number of sheep and old crop lambs on feed in Kansas on March 1, 1967 was estimated at 46,000 head, the decline is due to a considerably smaller number on feed in western Kansas this year and a sharp reduction in the south central feeding area.

The drop of 61 percent in number on feed from January 1 to March 1 was about the same percentage as last year.

A shortage of wheat pasture during the winter grazing months along with reduced hay supplies and other roughage available for feed caused the sharp curtailment of feeding operations in western and south central areas.

The sheep and lambs on feed March 1 included 5000 head from 60-79 pounds; 34000 head 80-99 pounds and 7000 head weighing 100 pounds or more.

Major Feeding States

Sheep and lambs on feed on March 1 in the 7 major feeding states totaled 1,014,000 head. This was 20 percent less than the number on feed in these states a year earlier.

The March 1 number of sheep and lambs on feed showed a 41 percent seasonal decline from the 1,728,000 head on feed January 1, 1967. A year earlier the seasonal decline was 32 percent from January 1 to March 1.

Check The Milk Rack For Measure Of NFO Success

Is the NFO's milk holding action making an impression on the market?

There should be a pretty good way of checking the effectiveness of the NFO action. Just take a look at your grocer's dairy rack. If the milk section is empty, or if it is obvious that deliverymen are filling the section more times per day but with fewer containers than usual, or if some unfamiliar cartons show up in the case, then you can bet the NFO is making its mark.

As Grass & Grain went to press (on Monday) thus far there was little to indicate that the NFO action was curtailing supplies, but shortages, if they are forced, should show up by the middle of the week anyway. If the milk cases in the groceries appear normal by the end of this week, it would appear that the NFO cause did not pick up enough supporters to make its impression at the market place.

Previous NFO actions have left a mystery of no-decision around the results. Like two pugilists in a match with no knockdowns, one fighter claims

he gave the other a good mauling and the other asserts a glove was never laid upon him.

In the case of previous NFO holding actions, the organization has made strong claims for their effectiveness and processors have denied it. In the case of the milk action, however, it seems that any major effect would show up in the grocer's dairy case.

The holding action, planned by the NFO for several months, was called last Wednesday. NFO president Oren Lee Staley called on NFO dairymen and others sympathetic to the aim of the action to dump their milk or withhold it from the market. The idea was to force a higher price, with the NFO goal to raise the price by \$1 per hundred pounds of milk.

The response in Kansas and across the nation could not fully be determined in the first few days. NFO leaders were inclined to speak in generalities, while milk collectors avoided giving many exact figures. When numbers were used, milk collectors indicated that perhaps less than 10% of the dairymen on routes were holding milk.

Chris Walker, one of the state NFO leaders, said about 100

farmers in northeast Kansas were participating in the milk holdout. About 1000 farmers in the area are in the dairy business, he said.

An Overbrook dairyman, Paul Davis, said he guessed that 60% of the dairymen in Osage County were dumping milk.

Some other reports:

• From Beatrice Foods in Topeka, H. D. McFarland, manager: "only two or three farmers didn't send in milk. Supply in the area is about 10% larger than in 1966."

• Pure Milk in Kansas City, which handles nearly all milk in the Kaycee area, Bernard McCracken, acting manager: "milk deliveries on a normal basis."

• Southwest Milk Producers, Wichita, which collects milk in more than 85 counties in Kansas, Oklahoma, and Missouri, Leo Suttle, manager: "no early effect in the Wichita area. Only a dozen out of 195 Sedgwick County dairymen are dumping."

• Shawnee Milk Producers, Bill Rankin, manager: "on the first day, only six of the dairy farmers who turn milk over to Shawnee failed to release it to market. The association has 150 milk pickups in 25 counties."

• Fairmount Milk at Council Grove, Dee Sammons, manager: "only nine of 275 members of Shawnee Milk Producers withheld milk on the second day."

The above reports, of course, are from processors or collectors, who doubtless would hope

to minimize the effectiveness of the holdout.

But the NFO had plenty of claims to counteract.

• Dale Howard, Labette County NFO chairman, said a dozen members had dumped 35,000 to 40,000 pounds of milk and he himself dumped 3200 pounds on Saturday at his farm south of Mound Valley.

• Paul Hunsaker, manager of the Whiting Cheese factory at Horton, said production at the plant was off 30% since NFO members began dumping milk. The Anco Cheese Factory at Garnett was off one half Saturday, said Gerald Ellis, manager. Hunsaker said he thought withholding was being done more by grade B producers (for cheese and other dairy products) than by Grade A producers (for bottled milk), while he thought the NFO intention was to affect the grade A market.

• Walter Lauer of Clearwater, Sedgwick County NFO chairman, said he poured out 280 gallons of milk on the first day.

• Franklin and Gregory Simon at Colwich poured out 800 gallons of milk the second day.

At the giant dairy co-op at Sabetha, the Nemaha Co-op Creamery, manager P. D. Turner, reported production was off about 2% the first two days of the strike.

The position of the Sabetha co-op — on the one hand a processor, and on the other a representative of dairy producers — was not an unusual one in the strike. Many processors indicated strong sympathy for the dairymen in their aims. Bill Rankin of the Shawnee Milk Producers Association at Topeka, said his organization is in agreement with NFO on the principle of seeking higher prices paid to dairy farmers.

Harold Moss of Southwest Milk Producers at Wichita said he sympathized with the dairymen. "They have a tough row to hoe and they are not making

any money."

Even the NFO found itself on both sides. The Greene County Mo., Milk Producers Association, made up of NFO members, found its supplies affected enough that the manager reported the organization would have to go outside the territory to milk for it.

Some NFO members thought they could make shortages appear a little faster by buying cartoned milk in some areas. There were scattered reports of this over the nation, some of it in four small towns in Reno County — Plevna, Abbyville and Arlington.

The NFO was coordinating a milk holdout in Kansas in four towns — Wakarusa, Wern, Wamego and Augusta. There is no doubt that the holding action has more cut aspects than previous strikes on livestock. Milk is sold in dollars lost, and dairymen cannot recoup their losses in the milk holding action to force higher prices.

In previous strikes the dairymen had much out-and-out opposition from farmers themselves. In the milk action, even processors seem to be sympathetic to the aims of the strike, thousands of dairymen watching and cheering. The NFO it is less a case of many are cheering but many are dumping.

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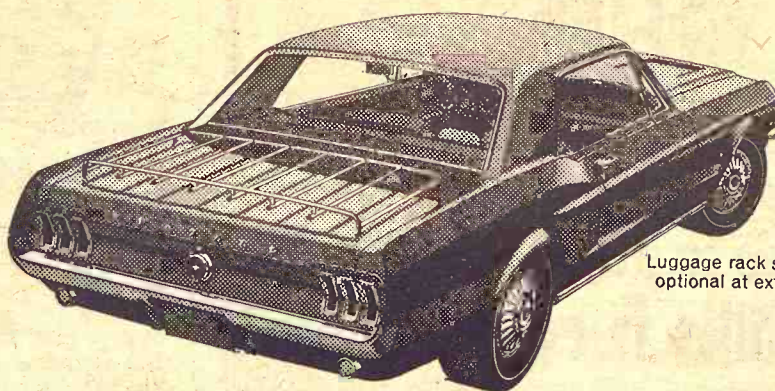

'66 Kansas Farm Income At \$1.6 Billion

Cash receipts from farming in Kansas in 1966 totaled \$1,611,387,000, up 14 percent from 1965 and a new high for the State, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Cash income from farming in 1966 includes \$1,384,842,000 received for marketings of crops and livestock and \$226,545,000 in Government payments to farmers.

Government payments represented 14 percent of Kansas total cash receipts from farming in 1966.

Production expenses of Kansas farmers continued to rise in 1966 and offset much of the gain in cash receipts.

Realized net income of Kansas farmers was about \$432 million in 1966, some 10 percent below the record high set in 1952 and also lower than in 1961 and 1962.

In 1966 the cash receipts of livestock and livestock products marketed by Kansas farmers was \$841 million, an increase of 16 percent from 1965. The increase reflected higher

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livestock prices in 1966 and a large volume of livestock production.

Cash receipts from farm crops totaled \$544 million in 1966, higher than in the previous two years but otherwise lowest since 1957.

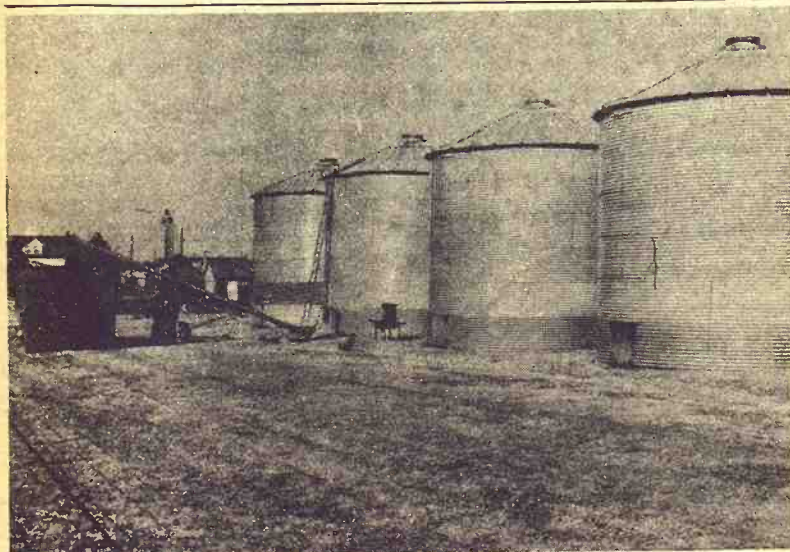
Cattle and wheat continued to be the most important individual commodities in cash returns to Kansas farmers, and normally represent about seven-tenths of the state's total farm cash receipts.

The increase in total cash receipts over 1965 reflected larger receipts for cattle and calves, wheat, soybeans, sor-

ghum grain and dairy products.

Average net income per farm for 97,000 Kansas farmers in 1966 averaged \$4450, about 11 percent above the 1960-64 average but less than the record high of \$4461 set in 1962.

Realized net income per Kansas farm was only about one-fourth of realized gross income, which in 1966 set a new high record of \$17,354. Production expenses per farm in Kansas were at an all-time high in 1966.



Last CCC Wheat From Bin Sites

USDA has taken out the last government wheat to be stored in CCC bin sites in Kansas, removing 90,000 bushels of 1952-crop wheat from storage in McPherson County. The government still has some old wheat in terminal elevators but none in bins. The wheat had been kept in storage at McPherson so long because of a 3-year experiment in the use of various types of insecticides.

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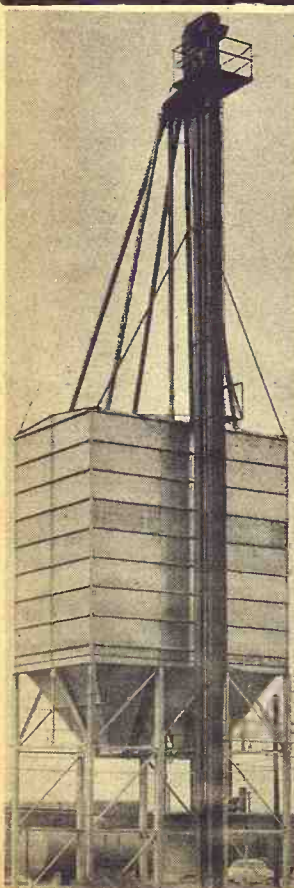
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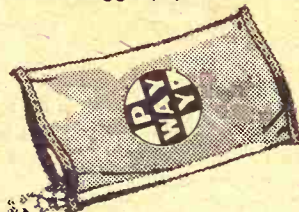

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Clay Center Co-op Gathering

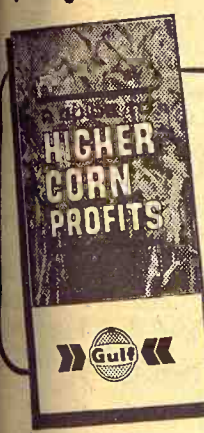
Part of the gathering at the annual meeting of the Farm-Union Cooperative Association of Clay Center is shown at the meeting there last week. Members heard that the association showed a net savings of \$98,000 on gross revenues of \$4.56 million during 1966. The volume was up from \$4.39 million the previous year. The auditors' report showed that local operations had a loss of \$2665 for the year but that savings from regional cooperatives amounted to nearly \$100,000 and other miscellaneous income brought the savings to \$98,000. Manager Phil Barker reported to the group that loss of grain storage business and additional depreciation, taxes and cash discounts accumulated to \$57,000, of which \$44,000 was made up in increased sales and tighter cost controls.



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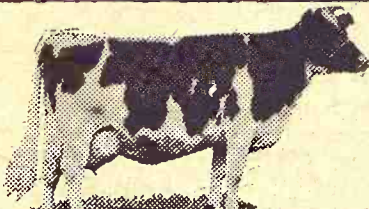

Split In Ranks Of Watershed District

WOODBINE — A split in the ranks of the Lyons Creek Watershed District has been disclosed Tuesday by Hayes B. Beck, Junction City, district president.

Beck acknowledged a protest petition containing 327 names on a two mill tax levy adopted has been filed requesting a vote last month to finance the district share of watershed project construction costs.

The petition was filed March 2, Beck said. He said the board had not planned to make it public until names were checked for validity. A total of 238 valid signatures will force a vote on the tax levy.

A similar two mill levy was defeated by a 24-vote margin in a vote Dec. 6 1966. A protest petition forced that referendum.

The watershed district has waged a successful six-year battle against authorization of the \$17.6 million Woodbine Dam and Reservoir proposed by the Corps of Engineers. It would be built on Lyons Creek 15 miles southwest of Junction City.

Beck and other members of the district were the only persons to testify against inclusion of Woodbine Dam in the state official water plan during a hearing conducted last Thursday by the Kansas House Water Resources Committee. Representatives from Kansas City, Lawrence, Topeka, and Manhat-

tan testified in favor of including Woodbine during a hearing March 7.

The Kansas Water Resources Board has recommended against the inclusion of Woodbine in the state plan. The Senate included the project in a bill that passed two weeks ago and which is now being considered by the House Committee.

The Lyons Creek Watershed project would cost \$4.1 million. Included is land in Geary, Dickinson, Morris and Marion counties. Beck said the two mill levy for construction could not become effective until the petition is declared invalid or a second election is conducted, if the petition contains sufficient signatures.

Government Into Market To Give Away Wheat

For the first time the federal government has gone into the market place to buy grain to give away abroad.

The first purchase was made last week, the government buying 45000 metric tons (over 1.6 million bushels) of No. 2 hard winter wheat of ordinary protein at a price of \$1.99 3/4 a bushel free on board vessels in gulf ports.

Delivery will be taken the first half of April.

This is the first time the government has purchased wheat on the market for donation abroad since it was announced recently that such a policy would be followed rather than taking the grain from surplus stocks.

For years the government has been supplying wheat for donations and sales to needy nations from surplus stocks accumulated under the price support program. These stocks are now getting low, and it will be an apparent policy to limit or

completely halt sales from surplus stocks.

The wheat purchased last week will go to Morocco. Another amount, smaller and to be bagged and ready for export, will go to Turkey and Iraq.

Lawmen Eye Errant Driver

Now that basic safety requirements for new cars are on

the federal law books, some states are taking a second look at the drivers.

Are drivers the loose nuts which cause accidents? The thought seems implied in much pending legislation. The road

ahead looks bumpy for the driver who takes to the bottle before he takes to the road. Here, tofore, it's been difficult to obtain proof of drunkenness against the hail fellow who's still in sufficient control of his facilities to refuse a blood test.

Several legislatures are considering the implied consent law, drafted by traffic safety organizations. It would suspend or revoke the driving license of any motorist refusing to take an alcoholic determination test. Application for a license to drive, it says, implies consent to such examination if police believe a driver is intoxicated.

This proposal is on the legislative agenda of Michigan, Maine, Indiana, Colorado, Ohio, Wisconsin, Washington, South Carolina and Texas.

Bills to provide for alcohol blood tests on the bodies of drivers and others killed in car accidents are under consideration by the legislatures in Texas and Hawaii.

Such tests, made routinely in Chicago by order of the Cook County coroner, showed that 23 of 41 drivers killed in one-car smashups during an 18-month period had been drinking.

In California a study showed that seven of ten drivers killed by smashing into something other than another car had been drinking.

Car inspection and periodic examination of drivers to reassess the fitness of both for the highway's rigors is getting wide-spread attention of the states again this year. There's a wrinkle in some states which involves spot inspection of both driver and vehicle.

The state of Washington has pending a bill which would authorize the state patrol to stop a motorist at any time to check the driver's license and the

mechanical condition of his car. California initiated such an inspection program last year. There is no attempt to set up

the surprise road block testing which caused outrage among motorists in Illinois a few years back.

Can Hold Old Grain Another Year

The government will allow farmers to hold close to 500 million bushels of grain off markets for another year under price support programs.

This action is designed to bolster current market prices.

Involved will be about 303 million bushels of corn, 103 million bushels of wheat, 39 million bushels of oats, 14 million bushels of barley and 21 million hundredweight of sorghum grain from recent crops.

All this grain is stored by farmers under price support loans which normally would come due this year.

The Department of Agriculture will allow farmers to extend these loans another full year. In addition, it will make payments to farmers for storing the grain.

If the department allowed the loans to expire, the growers would have to repay the loans or surrender the grain to the government as payment of the loans.

The action reduces the market supply of the grains until mid-1968, thus likely holding prices higher during this period than if the loans were allowed to expire now.

The action comes when there is unrest among farmers over declining prices and income.

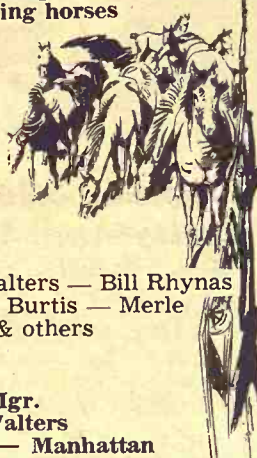

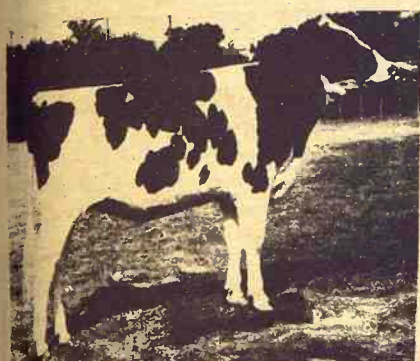

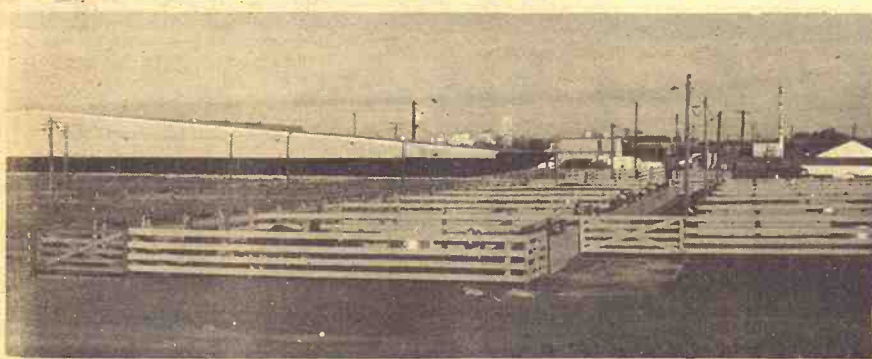
