

Wheat Belt Down US81

Sumner topped other Kansas Counties in wheat production for the fifth consecutive year in 1968, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Sumner's output of 11,538,000 bushels established a new record for the county and exceeded last year's crop by 78 percent.

Reno County, with 11,078,000 bushels, ranked second and Sedgwick was third with 8,143,-

Completing the top 10 counties were: Harper, McPherson, Kingman, Dickinson, Rice, Marion and Ottawa.

Eight counties in Kansas produced over 5 million bushels of wheat and 16 counties exceeded 4 million bushels.

The state's 1968 output of 243,775,000 bushels was the largest crop since 1961 and topped 1967 by 10 per cent.

Summer Perennial Leader Sumner has been the leading

wheat producing county for 8 of the last 10 years and during the decade has averaged over 8 million bushels per year.

In 1962 and 1963, Reno County was tops in production and has continued to occupy the second position during the last 5 years.

McPherson, Sedgwick, Harper, Thomas, Ford, Finney, Barton and Dickinson counties have consistently been among the top producers during the last decade.

For acreage harvested in 1968, Sumner was the leading Kansas county with 392,000 acres. Reno was second with 331,000 acres, followed by Harper's 242,000, Barton's 236,000, Ford's 231,000, McPherson's 226,000 and Sedgwick County's 223,000 acres. Ford was the only western Kansas county to harvest over 200,000 acres.

In Eastern Kansas only Cowley County harvested more than 100,000 acres.

The central crop reporting districts accounted for 58 percent of the State's harvested acreage, western districts, 28 percent and eastern districts 14 percent.

For the state's 1968 crop, wheat was planted on 11,963,000 acres and harvested from 9.751,000 acres, 12 percent less than in 1967.

ricts, but down significantly in the western districts.

Highest yields per harvested acre were in the northeast district, with Brown's 45 bushels leading all other counties. Doniphan's 42 bushels ranked second. Butler County in the southeast district had the third highest yield, 41 bushels.

Other top yielding counties included: Washington, 41; Anderson, Miami and Nemaha, 39; Chautauqua and Greenwood, 38 bushels.




The state yield per acre averaged 25 bushels, the fourth highest of record and exceeding 1967 by 5 bushels.

Wheed seeding during the fall of 1967 lagged behind normal in early September, but gained momentum following rains and was nearly completed by the end of October. In extreme western Kansas, dry weather resulted in some spotted stands.

Continued lack of moisture into early spring, coupled with greenbug and cutworm damage, caused sharp acreage losses and sharply reduced yields in some western counties. Elsewhere, ample late spring moisture and a favorable period of filling weather produced exceptionally good wheat yields.

A rather slow start of harvest was followed by favorable weather and combining was completed sooner than usual.

Milo Belt Key To Area Beef Boom

Banks in those cities and smaller ones west need cattle experts in their loan departments.

persons in any other part of the United States, because the Midwest has the greatest and fastest-growing interest in U.S. foreign trading policies.

Those are a few of the developments that Dr. Paul L. Kelley, professor of economics and head of that department at Kansas State University, Manhattan, sees now and in the immediate future for the hybrid mile belt of the U.S. The mile belt is roughly Nebraska, Kansas, western Oklahoma and Texas, with Kansas in its center.

Dr. Kelley, speaking to directors and managers of cooperatives, at their 19th annual conference on the K-State campus last week, backed his predictions with convincing data.

Three national trends support his ideas on more and faster beef steak from the milo belt.

1. As your income goes up,

you eat more meat, fruit and vegetables.

2. U.S. population is increas-

3. Production of meat in other areas has established or is declining so the mile belt is furnishing a lion's share of the increased meat needed.

Kelley and economists in his department predict an 80 per cent increase in beef production in Kansas by 1980. That is based on a 5¼ per cent annual increase but the state increase in 1966 was 14 per cent.

What happened, Kelley explains, is that the corn belt was the specialized meat-producing area until hybridization of sorghums made the milo belt competitive. Additionally the fastest growing areas of the United States are in the South and Southwest, both closer to the milo belt than the corn belt, which gives the milo belt a strategic location advantage.

"Although meat production already is by far the greatest income producer in Kansas, that segment of the state's production might double by 1980.

Its effect on the development of Kansas' total economy is too vast to be readily comprehended," Dr .Kelley said. As the milo region specializes more in meat production, farms will increase in size, specialize more and use vastly more capital than now.

Meat production's capital needs (both short run and long run) could more than double by 1980, Dr. Kelley explained, because competition forces producers to substitute capital for labor. That's the way they get efficient, low-unit production. That's where banks and other lending agencies help with the development.

Th tremendous increases in meat production and in all farm production being accomplished by large, efficient, specialized units will create a surplus of farm youth but they will be needed by the banks, fertilizer, machinery, chemical, advertising, feed, seed, meat packing cooperative firms and other agribusinesses whose growth must parallel meat production in the state.

Agricultural colleges and commerce, business, and economics departments train youth for such positions, so enrollment in those areas should double during the decade ahead.

Specialization in agriculture, along with substituting machinery and capital for labor, will put a premium on managerial skills, Kelley pointed out. To be a part of specialized agriculture, youth will need specialized knowledge.

The agribusinesses prefer to hire those with farm back. grounds but many city youths also be needed to fill the specialized jobs, Kelley said.

The K-State economist listed several reasons for interest in foreign countries and in US public and trade policies being highest in the Midwest.

Trends he predicts, Kelley emphasized, can be influenced by farm programs and public policies the U.S. adopts in the 1970's.

Before World War II, cotton and tobacco dominated U.S. ag exports. Since then Midwest products have become increasingly important. Exports of feed grains have tripled since the early 1950's. Wheat exports have doubled Before World War II the U.S. share of world trade in wheat and feed grain was 9 per cent. In 1957 the U.S. had 57 per cent of the world trade in feed grains, 37 per cent of flour, 90 per cent of the world's soybeans exports.

Midwest farmers produce 80 per cent of the feed grains, 75 per cent of the soybeans and 55 per cent of the wheat exported.

Midwest farms accounted for \$3.1 billion of the total \$65 billion of U.S. farm exports in 1967.


Kansas farmers, in the middle of the milo belt of that Midwest exporting area, have a critical stake in trading policies the U.S. develops during the coming decade, Kelley said.

The Midwest now has the most vital stake in policies that expand foreign markets and speed up the economic development of emerging nations around the earth.



Oats at 74 cents per bushel were 1 cent above December but 2 cents below a year earlier. Barley averaged 91 cents per

bushel compared with 92 cents last month and \$1.00 last year. Sorghum grain brought \$1.67 per cwt., up from \$1.62 a month earlier but slightly below the

\$1.69 last year. Soybeans averaged \$2.37 per bushel compared with \$2.32 last month and \$2.43 a year ago.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index at mid-January was 326 per cent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 321 in December and 289 a year ago.

The meat animal price index was 373 per cent at mid-January compared with 368 per cent last month and 337 last year.

Hog prices averaged \$18.60 per cwt., \$1.10 above December and \$1.20 above January 1968.

Beef cattle brought \$23.80 per cwt. compared with \$23.70 per cwt. last month and \$21.40 per cwt. last year. Steer and heifer prices at \$25.80 per cwt. were 10 cents above last month and \$3.00 above last year.



Closer Link Between Federal and State Returns

Income tax time is just around the corner, and a new Kansas Income Tax Law is now on the books.

The new Kansas law conforms closely with the Federal Income Tax Law, says John H. Coolidge, Extension economist at Kansas State University. This means new tax reporting procedures and new state tax forms this

Here are some of the new procedures:

Federal tax return first. Then attach a copy of Form 1040 and all supporting schedules to your

Kansas return is your "Total Income" as reported on Page 1, Line 9 on Form 1040.

· You may have some addifrom Kansas tax, such as state and municipal bond interest, fedincome tax refund, etc.

• There may be subtractions on items which are exempt from Kansas law, such as interest on federal savings bonds, Kansas



income tax refunds, dividends

exempt from Kansas tax, etc. Kansas still allows all your medical expenses in excess of \$50. So if you itemized your deductions, subtract out your medical allowance on your federal return and add back on your medical expenses over \$50.

• Kansas has adopted the federal standard deductions (10 percent of income or the minimum standard deduction), both limited to \$1000, in lieu of itemizing your personal deductions.

On your 1968 Kansas returns, you will deduct any 1967 federal income tax paid in 1968 and also the 1968 income tax which you have just calculated and are paying on your 1968 return. Most farmers, therefore, get to deduct two years' federal

income taxes on their Kansas returns this year.

Grass & Grain

 Kansas allows the same \$600 exemptions and has the same dates for filing declarations of estimated tax and final returns as are required for federal income tax returns. Therefore, you cannot wait until April 15 to file your Kansas return unless you filed a Kansas estimate by January 15. If estimates were not filed by January 15, both Kansas and Federal returns are due by February 15.



Polled Herefords To Have Their Own State Fair Show

HUTCHINSON — The Amer- then the strongest Hereford orican Polled Hereford Association (APHA) has won its battle of several years for equal standing with the American Hereford Association (AHA) in the Kansas State Fair show ring.

The fair board voted to take control of the Hereford show away from the American Hereford group, which had previously dictated the rules for showing Herefords at the state fair. The action will take effect at the 1970 state fair.

An American Hereford Association register of merit show scheduled at the state fair the first four days this year will not be affected by the action.

The feud between the two Hereford associations began when the AHA ruled that polled Herefords were not eligible to show unless registered in both association registries. Most polled breeders refused to compete in the show ring at the fair last year after the AHA refused in last minute arbitration meetings to relax its rules.

A motion by board member Andrew Erhart, Stafford, which won unanimous approval, declared "the state fair have a Hereford show in 1970 with the only requirement being that animals must be registered in either the American Polled Hereford Association or the American Hereford Association."

> Erhart also added a clause to invite both registries to offer additional premium money to be applied to the winnings of members of their respective reg-

"We told them that we want to run this fair and they can run their associations," said A. T. Sanger, board member from Moreland.

Previous fair boards have handled the topic of recognition for the polled Hereford breeders in low tones. They were generally afraid of offending the AHA.

Earlier, Walter Lewis, Larned, president of the APHA, and three other Kansas polled breeders, Lloyd Clarkson, Winfield, Elton Fisher, Seward, and Arnold Wittorf, Inman, appeared before the fair board's executive committee.

Lewis first proposed that the fair board authorize a separate classification for polled Herefords. He said his association would consider sponsoring a polled Hereford standard of perfection show, the equivalent of the AHA register of merit show, at the Kansas State Fair.

Fair President Andrew Olson, Dwight, informed Lewis that the sponsoring association of new classifications must provide premium money during its trial two years of showing at the fair, under present fair policy.

Although Lewis said the APHA would sponsor half of \$10,000 for the proposed standard of perfection show, he was certain it would not accept establishing a new classification under those terms. Lewis did not push for entry in the state fair this year.

"I think it would be best, even

if we start this off with a standard of perfection show," he said.

Lewis said he felt the gap of disagreement was being closed between AHA and APHA. He said polled shows in the East have accepted minority groups of horned Herefords although AHA withdrew its premium support. AHA has also approved joint shows this year where less than 100 head were shown last year, but AHA officials have not favored Kansas State Fair becoming a joint show, Lewis said.

Avoid These Common Setups for Upsets

Select safe speed for each job. Slow down when turning. Cut speed when working on slopes, near ditches or on rough, uneven




Cross slopes slowly. Look-out for dips, raises, rocks, gullies, etc., that could trigger upset. Set wheels wide as practical for job.



Go up slopes carefully. Use power gear if pulling heavy rolling load. On grades, engage clutch smoothly -don't jerk. Back the tractor up really steep grades.



Use lower gear, especially with heavy rolling load. Keep loads within ability of tractor to control and stop them. Wagons hauling heavy loads should have brakes.



Drive slowly when crossing or working along shallow ditches or grass waterways Stay safely clear of irrigation or large open drain-

Add front end weights for balance.

Handle tractor carefully on slopes, when crossing ditches, on rough ground. Avoid hitting rocks, stumps, etc., with trailing vehicle.



Hitch only to drawbar or regular hitch points. Set drawbar no high-er than 17 inches from ground. Engage the clutch smoothly, not



Observe traffic rules. Signal intentions. Identify rig with SMV emblem. Turn corners slowly. Shift down when going up or down grades with load.



Operate front end loader according to instruction manual. Handle rig smoothly—avoid abrupt turns, jerky starts and stops. Don't over-load. Add rear wheel weights.

Use tractor for the jobs it's designed to do-not for running errands, herding cattle or just plain



When you can't back out, get help. Don't chain blocks to drive wheels -chassis can revolve around the axle if wheels stick. Avoid muddy spots when possible.



Medicaid Use Exceeds Funds

At the present rate, expenditures by the state of Kansas to secure medical aid for the needy may reach \$35 million for the

current fiscal year .Only \$27 million was budgeted, and medicaid funds (Title 19) will likely run \$7 million in the red.

ernment will cover about \$4 million of this shortage — if the state can come up with \$1.5 million and the counties nearly the same amount.

If the state cannot make up the shortage, says State Director of Social Welfare Marvin Larson, it will have to cut the benefits of the program or prorate the losses back to the doctors and hospitals.

Funds from the federal gov-

"We think, because of the flu epidemic the spending might have been higher than ordinary and we might go that high (\$7 million in the red) but we will if we continue to spend as we have been," Larson said.

Eligibility for medicaid for the needy varies with circumstances, but as an example, a family of four cannot have an income in excess of \$3000 a year to get the benefits.

Payments to doctors treating the needy jumped when the state went from the old medical assistance program to medicaid two years ago, but it was a normal jump because the law now confines payments to what is "usual, customary or ordinary" in fees. Before medicaid, the fees were restricted by law, and were generally about one. third of what a doctor was charging the general public.

"The increase in payment to doctors has been as expected, so it is not a part of our problem," Larson said.

But, he added, hospital costs that had been expected to increase about 10 per cent have jumped 17 per cent.

Many states are having money trouble adjusting to medicaid, Larson said, and "Kansas is in better shape than most.

But, he added, his department is concerned about the projected deficit.

Meanwhile, in another area connected with medicaid payments, Attorney Gen. Kent Frizzell has sent a directive to the Social Welfare Department that his office plans to prosecute any medical professional found abusing the program.

"As far as we know — our auditing staff is small - fraud is not showing up in any measurable proportions. Some is obvious. It isn't done in the overcharge, but we have to watch






Letter From Contest Winner



34 cup sifted all-purpose flour

½ teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon baking soda ½ teaspoon ginger

½ teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon cloves

½ cup granulated sugar ½ cup light molasses

Proper Planning Is Key To Kitchen Efficiency

Most homemakers agree that the kitchen is their major work centers - where they spend a majority of their time.

Actually the kitchen is divided into a number of "work centers," which must be properly located in a relation to the sequence of work to be performed there. The major 'work centers' are the refrigeration center, clean-up center and cooking cen-

Refrigeration: This center should have sufficient drawer, shelf and counter storage to handle its share of the numerous kitchen utensils common in today's kitchen. There should be a minimum of 15 inches of work counter at the opening side of the refrigerator, and more if possible.

Clean-Up: This center handles half the chores performed in the kitchen, being used in both preparation of three daily meals and the clean-up that follows. It should be located between the range and refrigerator and should hav at least 24 inches of space on each side of the sink, whether the sink is double or single bowl. In addition to the dishwasher, space must also be planned to store detergents and cleaning equipment, as well as utensils.

Cooking: The best location for the cooking center is near the dining room and breakfast area. A counter at each side of the range is important for best work patterns and safety. There should have at least 24 inches of es of counter at the side away from the sink and 24 inches minimum at the other side. A large amount of storage is required in this area for pots, pans, trays, utensils, dry foods and condi-

Tuma, meats specialist, and a team of researchers as they examine trends and methods for marketing lamb. They believe the same thing will happen to beef and pork in the coming

"I would expect that in the future, within the next 10 years, we would have almost a complete line of frozen meats at the retail level so that the housewife can go in and purchase almost any meat item on a frozen

"We have some trends in this direction and as we visit with the people that are making the decisions in the large packing plants throughout the country, and as we visit with manufacturers of equipment and the retailers, they all favor and they all see this trend," Tuma said.

"In the interim there will be an evolution, not a revolution, in this area of meat marketing."

He said industry representatives indicate it will take at least five years to advance the marketing of retail frozen cuts of meat so that the housewife can shop in this manner.

All segments of the industry with which these researchers have talked across the country believe this method of meat marketing is coming and indicate that they would like it very

The American Sheep Produccrs Council at Denver currently is financing research into the possible marketing of lamb in this fashion. Tuma said there is strong likelihood that the beef and pork segments of the industry will sponsor research in this direction also.

Tuma said representatives of the sheep, beef, and pork segments of the meat industry sat down together last May, talked over the future and decided that retail cuts of meat - pre-packaged, pre-cut, pre-trimmed and ready for cooking - would be the next move.

Much of the meat in the hotel and restaurant business now is pre-packaged and frozen, then purveyed, jobber-style to the restaurant kitchen.

Tuma explained that the current method of freezing leaves

the meat a darker color while it is inside the vacuum-sealed package. Color is restored after the meat is returned to open air.

Research being carried on at K-State currently is designed to learn methods for freezing meat, putting it into air tight containrs — and yet retaining the bright red color the modern American housewife demands.

Uniformity and quality control are likely to be the keys in meat sales of the future, Tuma believes. While selections of various cuts or items the housewife wants may increase, she will be assured that the packaged meat quality and one package is essentially just like another.

This control and uniformity will lead to yet another advance. ment in the meat industry, Tuma said.

This development will be toward assuring the packer, processor and retailer of uniform quality and quantity to place in display cases.

This likely will bring about the development of centralized processing and packaging - possibly at the packing house itself.

One packer, Iowa Beef Packing, already has begun this idea. It foresees a time when a car load of cattle will be unloaded at a slaughtering, processing, packaging plant and will come out the delivery door as pre-cut pre-trimmed, pre-packaged, prefrozen cuts of meat for delivery to a grocery store.

Uniformity in frozen meats will be like frozen orange juice or similar items now, Tuma believes. The new processing and distribution also will mean better returns for producers and processors as well as retailers.

And consumer costs will be comparatively lower.

Aussie Wheat To Red China To Help U.S. Sales

HUTCHINSON — The recent sale of 2.2 million metric tons of wheat by Australia to Red China may help United States wheat markets, G. C. Fowler of Hutchinson said,

Fowler is administrator of the Kansas Wheat Commission.

Fowler said U.S. wheat producers could not be hurt by the sale because the government has prohibited wheat sales to Red China.

"With this much wheat going into Red China it means just that much less competition for the rest of the world wheat market," Fowler said.

Huge Wheat Sale By Australia To Red China

A wheat sale of 2.2 million metric tons to Red China by Australia has been announced.

Shipments will begin in February and conclude in March 1970.

The contract called for a possible 10 per cent variation, a decrease or increase, in the amount of wheat taken.

G. C. Fowler, Kansas Wheat Commission administrator, said the sale represented one-sixth of Australia's total production in 1968.

The news of the huge sale could have an optimistic reaction on American wheat market. It could not hurt American wheat producers because the government has prohibited wheat sales to Red China.

"It means just that much less competition for the rest of the wheat market," Fowler said.

The sale amounts to about

145.2 million bushels of wheat. The sale price is not known yet.

Australia, pressing heavily to move her over-production of wheat, has whittled the International Grain Agreement world prices "pretty closely" from time to time, Fowler said.

Australia has harvested substantial crops for the last three years and, since they lack storage facilities, are being pressed at home for an aggressive wheat sales movement.

Tulsa Port Makes Kansas Vulnerable

sas is a sleepy stream that seeps across the southwest and leaks cut on the southern border below Wichita.

Once the river crosses the state line, its personality changes. For Oklahoma, Arkansas and points south, the river will hold major sea ports that promise to hypo economies. It will be one of the major economic rivers in the world.

That same needle that will shoot Oklahoma and Arkansas full of vitamins will draw blood from Kansas, according to state economists and industrialists.

The reason is simple: Kansas

The Arkansas River in Kan- will not be able to offer industries the low freight rates that will be available in Oklahoma and Arkansas.

> A Northwestern University survey showed that rates for long haul, large-volume goods such as wheat, sorghum, petroleum and other resources - elements of Kansas' life blood are far cheaper by barge.

The survey listed barge rates at three mills per ton-mile, rail carload rates at seven mills per ten-mile, and truck rates at 25 mills per ton-mile.

Presently in Kansas, all but a pittance of the natural resources leave the state by rail

or truck. Some go to the port of Chicago; some go east to the Missouri River and on to the port of New Orleans; some go west for San Francisco and the Pacific Ocean; most head by rail and truck to Houston, and thereby into international commerce.

All of this movement costs the seven mill or 25 mill rate, a price that few industries are willing to pay if there is an alternative.

The port of Catoosa near Tulsa, the rest of the Arkansas River and other waterways provide an alternative. Industries are taking advantage of it.

Jack Lacy, director of the Kansas Department of Econo-

mic Development, said, "We just went through a disastrous realignment of the flour milling industry, all because of realignment of the nation's transportation. I have begun to fear it in the petroleum industry. I pray that it doesn't happen in the cattle feed industry.'

This realignment Lacy talked of evidenced itself in 1964 when millers in Salina, Newton, Kingman and Winfield closed down.

According to industry-minded men in the state, Kansas needs to become more of a "processing" state, rather than a "resource" state...

"Less emphasis should be placed in this state on producing raw materials and more should be placed on processing raw materials," Lacy said.

Lacy's point is that Kansas should handle its materials twice - when its produced and when it's processed. In that way, taking things out of the ground won't be the only source of revenue.



The farmer, like the businessman and consumer, sees his purchasing power decline each year as inflation takes a bigger bite out of his wallet.

But inflation has been especially rough on the farmer by raising the cost of things he must buy at a time when prices have been falling for many of the commodities he produces and sells.

Wheat prices have fallen to their lowest levels in a generation. Interest rates, on the other hand, are at their highest level in years. As a result, the parity ratio has dipped to depression levels.

Paying a debt is one of the best illustrations of how farmers are affected by inflation,

says Ruth Clifton, research economist at Kansas State University

In 1947, it took 437 bushels of wheat to pay off a \$1000 debt, she says. In 1950, 500 bushels of wheat were required, and last June it would have taken 806



bushels.

Mrs. Clifton looks to the Nixon administration as one of the main factors that may hold hope in halting the inflationary trend.

Too Much Scotch, Too Many Volks And Nikons

A passion for scotch whiskey, Japanese cameras and foreign sportscars nearly changed the U.S. from an exporting nation to an importing country in 1968.

The margin of exports over imports in 1968 was only threequarters of a million dollars, down from the \$3-\$4 billion surplus of recent years. The trade surplus was the lowest since 1937,

Imports were up nearly onefourth last year. Exports were up too but only by 9%. Trade experts said U.S. exports last, year would have been higher except for strikes and threats of strikes by longshoremen and strikes within domestic copper, steel and aluminum industries.

RED CROSS ASKS MORE FOR BLOOD

Hospitals will have to pay \$13 instead of \$10 a pint for blood from the Wichita Regional Blood Program administered thru Red Cross. The program supplies blood to hospitals in about three-fourths of Kansas. The raise will become effective in March. Hospitals have additional charges to process blood which vary from an additional \$10 to \$23 per pint.

A slowing down of the inflationary spiral has been accented as one of President Richard Nixon's prime objectives, she says. That would ease the farmer's cost-price squeeze from the cost side, given even the relatively low prices farmers now get for their products.

She sees the new Congress most probably following conservative economic policies, with Republicans and conservative Democrats holding the balance of power.

This probably means no drastic change in farm policy or prices, she says, but may result in a slow-down in those rising prices of things farmers have to buy.

Savings From Veterinary Research

Veterinary medicine researchers are striving to overcome millions of dollars in losses for livestock producers in a series of projects at Kansas State University.

Dr. Charles Cornelius, dean of the College of Veterinary Medicine, said practical application of the research underway at the college will make huge savings in the feedlots, among the herds and flocks of Kansas.

Dr. Stanley Leland and Dr. William Lindquist, parasitologists, are attacking the problems of parasites in commercial livestock.

One of the great problems among parasites in livestock, they said, is the fact that much of the damage is done in a way that is difficult to detect. This is called sub-clinical parasitism.

Complicating the problem, of course, is the fact that many parasites which annually cost stockmen millions of dollars

in Kansas alone do not kill the donor animal. They don't even make the animal noticeably ill.

These two researchers are keeping parasites alive in test tubes. This allows them to study the life cycles of these little beasts and come nearer to checking their absolute reactions to drugs, chemicals, and other means of control.

These men, along with Dr. Harry Anthony, head of the animal disease laboratory, are hoping for a breakthrough at an early date.

Anthony is working toward a vaccine which will control keratitis (pink eye) in cattle. This disease is infectious and can sweep through a commercial feedlot causing animals to lose weight or fail to gain rapidly because of the pain from their sore eyes.

Pink eye is responsible for upwards of \$5 million in losses annually in Kansas alone, according to Cornelius. It is hoped an early breakthrough to control of the disease will come from the research of Dr. Anthony.

The veterinary medicine college has implemented and strengthened its approach to attacking commercial livestock diseases in recent years.

Latest development is a new section in the clinical areas of the college. This section is termed a meat animal medicine department. This group of researchers is devoted to finding controls for current commercial livestock diseases.

In the realm of research that may apply to man, but is devoted primarily to livestock, is a herd of leukemia cattle at K-State.

This herd of cows is being studied with an eye to learning exact causes of leukemia in

Dr. Al Burroughs is research. ing the leukemia project. He is isolating viruses and trying to learn their cause and control. Several viruses have been iso. lated and their effect on the leukemia cattle studied.

Of particular interest to the rising feedlot approach to animal feeding in Kansas is the work being done on shipping fever and the whole complex of diseases that affects animals in their respiratory systems, Cornelius said.

Dr. Claire Hibbs, another researcher at K-State, is devoting much effort to the control of salmonella. He is studying its habitat, the ways it is spread. and how it may be controlled especially in the livestock and red meat areas as well as around poultry and eggs.

Although it is most difficult to predict when success may be reached in pure research on disease control, Cornelius said he is hopeful that the next few years will bring controls to many of these problems.



Milo Output And Use **Coming Out About Even**

Exports of livestock feed grains for 1968-69 are lagging well behind last year's pace and may be down 5 to 10 per cent from the 23 million tons shipped last season, the Agriculture department predicts.

Officials said the balance between total feed grain use and production last year and this year is expected to be closer than in most recent years. Despite large yields of feed grains such as corn, sorghum grain and barley last season, the department said, more is being fed to livestock and may boost total domestic use by as much as 6 million tons over 1967-68.

The marketing year for corn and sorghum grain ends September 30, and that for oats and barley June 30. Current stocks in use include 1968 production for these crops. Officials said the over-all supply available for 1968-69 is 216 million tons, which includes 168 million produced ast year and 48 million tons car-







CBK Making Ripples With Corporate Farms

CBK Industries Inc., which announced in early 1967 that it intended to get into farming in a big way, has bought its first major production facility. CBK has bought for \$2.5 million in cash and term notes, Arizona Cottonseed Products of Phoenix.

Arizona Cottonseed owns 10 cotton gins in Arizona and California and a pre-pressed solvent cottonseed oil mill near Phoenix that handles annually 120,000 tons of cotton seed. The gins handle 100,000 bales in season.

In less than two years more than 30,000 acres of land have been leased or purchased and 13 companies operating in varied industries and services have been sold or closed down.

Recently, CBK also acquired Universal Helicopters of Houston. CBK president J. R. Dominick said about \$250,000 will be spent this year on aerial application of weed and pest controls and ownership of its own fleet of helicopters will prove economical.

Funds from the sale of the companies plus long-term debt have been used to acquire land. To help finance the latest acquisitions, CBK has privately placed with investors \$2.4 million or 7.65% convertible preferred stock and \$600,000 of common stock. The company has issued warrants for 353,000 shares of common, which may be exercised within five years at \$12.75 a share.



Trends In Farm Economy

These five charts show trends in the farm outlook for 1969. There is little in the current situation to suggest any drastic changes. The farm program remains almost exactly the same as before. The general economy continues to boom, foretelling increased demand for farm products. But the boom's inflation will continue to increase farm expenses.

Larger supplies of beef, pork, chicken, citrus fruit and processed vegetables are virtually assured for the coming months.

Feed grains were harvested in massive proportions in the fall of 1968 but there was record use also, actually cutting supplies by one million tons, despite the record output.

On the whole, it would appear that U.S. farmers can expect 1969 to be a lot like 1968.

Farm Warning From Elmo Mahoney

DORRANCE - Elmo Mahoney, president of the Russell County Farmers Union, predicts that if farm income doesn't improve "We'll lose a third of the farmers in Kansas in the next three years and half of them will be gone in five years."

He added, "Then what will you do with the economy out here? This is serious! They talk about the Dirty Thirties. The only difference now is that we don't have the dust storms, but the economy is the same."

Mahoney said he strongly supports a taxpayers protest march on Topeka, but he said he thinks plans for a taxpayers' meeting in that city this week are a bit premature.

"Half the towns in the county are looking for new industry," he said. "The greatest industry they have is the agriculture in the county. If farmers in the county had a million dollars

more, they'd spend it in the towns."

Mahoney predicted that unless the farm economy is improved, and soon, corporations would take over the small farms of Kansas. "When that happens you won't need your banks and implement companies. They'll fly their Lear jets and go do business in Kansas City and St. Louis."

If the 900 or so farmers in Russell County were reduced to 10 or 15 large corporations, Mahoney said, "there wouldn't be any need for a single town to exist in the county after that."

Earlier Mahoney took to task Ray Frisbie of McDonald, Kansas Farm Bureau president.

Frisbie told a leadership meeting in Russell County that a taxpayers' march on Topeka was not necessary.

Frisbie declared, "If you spend your time on something con-

structive, you don't have time to spend it on things like marching on the state capital. We don't plan to have 25,000 members in Topeka. Who would listen to them?"

Mahoney countered, "The only way you can influence legislators is by paying them a personal visit and lobbying for your

Mahoney said that State Sen. Warden Howatt, D-WaKeeney, is working on a tax valuation bill which taxpayers could support. He added. "I understand the Farm Bureau also has a bill in the hopper regarding the school situation. If it is okay, we would be willing to support

He declared that the property tax can no longer support public schools alone.

He said farmers wouldn't be griping about reasonable tax increases. "My taxes under the new state appraisal deal went up just \$12 more than 100 per cent. At the same time my income has gone down," he said.





'Cautious Optimisim' From Feeders

Cautious optimism for the cattle feeding business in the immediate years ahead was expressed by Charles Phelps, Hastings, Ia., president of the National Livestock Feeders Association, at the association's annual convention at Kansas City.

Phelps, serving his second term as president, recalled that year when conditions were somewhat depressed for the cattle feeder. But the year started out pretty good and then got

Prices were reasonably good, he said, and the market was stable throughout the year.

"In fact," Phelps said, "fed

he spoke at the convention last cattle prices throughout 1968 were far more stable than in eny year as far back as 1964."

The year of good prices and a stable market occurred at the same time that cattle were being slaughtered at record levels. Domestic beef production was increased by 3 per cent over 1967 and imports were up 17 per cent. Yet overall fed cattle prices averaged around \$1.50 a hundred pounds higher than in 1967, there were many instances when the increase reached \$3 a hundred.

"In 1968," Phelps said, "we marketed about 6 per cent more fed cattle than we did in 1967. Yet on January 1, 1969, we found we had 10 per cent more cattle in our feedlots than on January 1, 1968.

In addition to this growth, we also see rapid development and construction of new feedlots in certain areas, with corresponding phenomenal expansion of numbers on feed wherever this is occurring."

Any business will expand in areas where it is economically feasible to do so, Phelps agreed. But he also warned that this economic feasibility may well be overdone.

"Should that occur," he said, "the healthy position of the entire industry over the whole country could be seriously impaired.

"As this rapid expansion in some localities is taking place, we are not seeing a decline of feeding in other areas. In other words, there is not a transplant of the feeding business from one region to another and I sug-

gest that this is not going to happen except to a limited extent.

"Cattle feeding will continue in the older traditional areas where grain and forage supplies are abundant because it is economically feasible to conduct the feeding operation there."

Phelps said the beef industry had enjoyed a huge increase in demand, both from the population increase and from increased per capita consumption. Per capita beef production had nearly doubled in the last 17 years, he said. He doubted that the next 17 years would see a similar increase.

"We may be able to increase production in the years ahead as we have in the years just past, Phelps said, "but let's not assume the same rate can take place. I propose that we don't produce this year in a volume February 11, 1969






