
Big Day For G&G Area Dairymen

Smiles were in order for several hundred G&G area dairymen last week. Not only was \$400,000 distributed to patrons of the Nemaha Cooperative Creamery Association at Sabetha last week, but the giant area dairy co-op voted to merge with the Pure Milk Producers association of Kansas City, enlarging the market and bargaining power of area dairymen.

The picture below and center was taken before the 37th annual meeting of the Nemaha co-op, which is owned by 1100 milk producers, principally in Nemaha, Marshall, Brown, Jackson and Pottawatomie counties in Kansas, and Richardson, Pawnee, Nemaha and Gage counties in Nebraska. At left, check in hand, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Sextra of Netawaka leave the meeting, after the \$400,000 distribution was made. The dairy had sales of \$8.5 million in 1966.

Not in attendance at the meeting, but no less a part of it were herds like these Holsteins (top), viewed from a silo-ladder vantage.

Major business at the meeting of course was the affirmation of the merger with Pure Milk Producers, a marriage which will produce a new name, Mid-Continent Dairymen Inc., after July 1.

Farmers Union Serious About Plow-Up Talk

Despite scorn from other farm organizations, the Kansas Farmers Union has let it be known it is serious about urging farmers to plow up all wheat they planted above allotted acreage.

The eight directors of KFU voted unanimously to take such a position last week, recommending such plowing "unless a wheat export certificate of 65 cents a bushel is a reality before May."

President Bill Daniels of Cimmaron said he hopes to meet with other farm organization leaders this week to enlist their support in the plow-up campaign.

George Meeker, Garden City, president of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, had already urged farmers to go slow with any plowing talk.

Ray Frisbie of the Kansas Farm Bureau said his organization had no policy on the subject, but it was not thought likely Farmers Union would get any support from Farm Bureau.

Directors of KFU are Cecil Jones, Hanover; Kenneth Kir-

win, Delia, Joe Bonin, Dorrance; Alvin Otte, Cawker City; Ed Barstow, Larned; Dayton Yoder, Conway; Joe Vollmer, Parsons; Loren Cline, Lyons; and Daniels.

KFU claims to speak for 35,000 to 40,000 Kansas farmers, and a spokesman said about 200 letters had been received signifying support of the plowup.

Soviets See 4% Farm Gain

Soviet agricultural production will increase 4 per cent this year compared with 1966, a Soviet magazine reported.

Last year, the increase was 10 per cent, resulting in total agricultural production worth \$68.3 billion.

Under the 5-year plan to end in 1970, agriculture is supposed to increase only 4.6 percent annually. Last year's good showing was due mainly to favorable weather.





'Don't Give Up Kansas As A Poultry State'

Kansas can become a leading midwestern poultry state.

This is the opinion of M.E. Jackson, Extension poultryman at Kansas State University. He spoke to 80 producers, feed suppliers, and marketing people at the second annual Poultry Industry Conference on the KSU campus last week.

To become a leader, Kansas must sell the program already here and become competitive enough to develop more mar-

kets, Jackson said.

This bright outlook for the poultry industry is shared by James Petr, director of marketing for the State Board of Agriculture, who also talked to the group.

Kansas producers are moving ahead commercially with marketing contracts, large production units, mechanization, and improved housing, Jackson said. Financing is becoming more available for egg producers, too, he pointed out.


In a span of little more than 10 years, Kansans have moved away from small farm flocks to the concentrated commercialized operation, Jackson explained.

There are 63 farms with more than 10,000 birds in production in the state. Some commercial units have 70,000 layers. Contractual organizations have up to 175,000 birds producing eggs.

However, marketing is the weak link in the poultry business in Kansas, he explained. Marketing organizations are doing a reasonably good job of packing and delivering a quality product to retail or wholesale outlets.

But, merchandising has been overlooked. "We must keep Mrs. Housewife informed and encourage her to use the product we are producing," he said.

Jackson adds that natural resources, feed grains, and moderate climate are in favor of

the poultry business becoming one of the most important industries in the state. The one limiting factor is desire.

Petr discussed reasons why the Midwest egg industry has had to change from the traditional small flock to the large commercial unit. This change began about 1950.

The many small producers and marketers elevated the cost of egg procurement and feed distribution, he pointed out. Average egg quality has been low in the Midwest area.

With consolidation of production and greater volume come greater efficiency and lower per unit costs. Petr said the area has lacked production density. High plant costs have been common, he said.

Centralized handling of eggs at large warehouse operations has brought about better merchandising of the product, Petr explained.

The desire for efficiency tends to lead to increased interest in contract production and even fully integrated operations, he said.

Kansas egg production has remained stable over the past several years.

The Midwest has a distinct advantage over other areas in the production of feed grains, Petr said.

"Positive action rather than a passive attitude will be required," he pointed out, "if the Midwest poultry industry is to take full advantage of the potential"



Farmers In A New Ball Game: Freeman

American farmers will be in a "new ball game," Agriculture Secretary Orville Freeman told them last week, promising greater rewards for farmers if they help prevent new price-depressing crop surpluses.

The occasion was a one-day conference at Washington

which 300 farm leaders attended at the invitation of USDA officials who wanted their views on administration farm programs and the future of farming.

About 100 of the group were invited to the White House for lunch, an occasion which President Johnson used to tell them the nation's farmers have a bright future even tho their income is lagging behind other segments of the economy.

"Farmers have been caught in a bind between high implement prices, high interest rates, and stable or lowering prices for farm commodities, but there are signs of hope for a substantial improvement in this situation," the President told the group.

The conference had more than listeners among the farm group. The president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, Charles B. Shuman, said he thought the administration had called the conference because it feared farmers want to get rid

of federal farm programs.

Freeman, in opening the conference, was met with a barrage of complaints.

The complaints dealt with what leaders described as inadequate prices for wheat, feed grain, milk, livestock, wool and some other commodities. Farm spokesmen urged stronger action by the government to raise agricultural prices.

Virtually all those who spoke favored government programs to help stabilize farm supplies and prices.

Here, Freeman inserted the thoughts about a "new ball game" for farmers. He said disposal of past surpluses coupled with rising world food demands present agriculture with new opportunities.

But he said "we must work together" so the present system of government programs for stabilization of farm supplies and prices will work. He referred to programs covering wheat, feed grains, cotton, peanuts, tobacco, rice and other commodities subject to government price supports.

In an apparent appeal to foes of government intervention in farm affairs, Freeman said


farmers had more freedom than any time in 30 years.

"Today, farmers operating under commodity programs that are largely voluntary possess more freedom of choice than they have had since the early AAA (Agricultural Adjustment Administration) days of the New Deal. Today, the market

operates more freely than has been the case for three decades."

Freeman said the twin forces of more people and economic progress give us "a basis for confidence that for the foreseeable future worldwide demand would increase for the products of American field and farm."



Actually Dropped In '66

does appear to be substance to the notion that money in Kansas did not get tighter during the year but actually eased off in the light of the massive increase in deposits.

In all of Kansas, deposits as of January 1, 1967, totalled some \$3.375 billion. This figure is an interpolation from the 59-bank sample. In previous studies in Grass & Grain, the 59 area banks, which account for 10% of all state banks, show 27% of the deposits in all banks in the state. The banks in the sample have also in the past been slightly more liberal in lending than state banks as a whole. On the basis of previous

record, loans by all banks in the state are reckoned at \$1.664 billion — about a 49% loan ratio.

Bank deposits in Kansas hit \$3 billion for the first time late in 1965. If the increase in deposits in 1967 is only half of the gain in the past year, deposits will reach \$3.5 billion by the end of the year.

While the gain in the past year was the most dramatic, Kansans have been putting money in the bank at an increasing rate for years. An accompanying chart shows how deposits have increased over the past decade.

In the past five years bank deposits have increased by 34%

In short, there is \$4 in bank accounts for every \$3 as on January 1962. Just to be average a bank must have had a one-third increase in five years.

Three area banks have had more than a 100% increase (more than doubled their deposits) in five years. Largest gain was made by the First State Bank of Salina with a 143% increase in five years. The Citizens State of Manhattan and the Riley State were not far behind.

The Salina and Manhattan banks both showed their gains off expansion of operations. The Citizens moved from Randolph to Manhattan in the late 1950's after the Tuttle Creek exodus. The First State at Salina took on commercial bank status about the same time but had

been a trust company before.

All of the banks in the sample showed a five-year deposit increase but one — the Council Grove National Bank, which for many years has had the lowest loan ratio in the state.

Lending practices by banks have changed markedly in the past decade. In 1959 the state had 607 banks which were lending 39% of their deposits. This

figure inched up steadily until it reached 52% at the start of 1966.

Backing up the assertion that money didn't actually get tighter in the past year is the record of 33 banks out of the sample 59 which decreased their loan ratio during 1966.

With allowances for local situations, loan ratios in general reflect a bank's willingness to lend money to its customers. In an expanding economy — as in the past decade — this has generally resulted in banks with the highest loan ratios having the greatest increase in deposits.

While country banks, which often get loaded with cattle loans, often reach above 70% in loan ratios, it doesn't follow that larger banks are tougher to borrow from. The state's largest bank, the 4th National at Wichita, usually has over a 60% loan ratio. The McPherson & Citizens State Bank was the state's first \$10 million bank to have a 70% loan ratio, and that as far back as 1961.

Highest loan ratio among the sample banks in the past decade was 89% at the Talmage State Bank in western Dickinson County. This ratio was apparently excessive and the bank has since been reorganized with a marked decline in its lending.



- 2 cups white sauce
- 6 hard boiled eggs
- 1/2 cup buttered bread crumbs

White sauce: Drain juice from asparagus. Add 1 1/2 cups milk and 1/2 cup cream. Bring to a boil. Add thickening. Add alternately asparagus and white sauce and thinly sliced eggs. Top with buttered bread crumbs. Bake 30 minutes, 350-degree oven. Serves 8.

- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons soda

Cream butter. Add eggs, Sucaryl and vanilla which have been beaten together. Sift dry ingredients together and add to other mixture. After everything has been mixed, beat with electric mixer several minutes at high speed. Turn into a buttered loaf pan and bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees for one hour.





Walnut Is Once Again Furniture's Favored Wood

Walnut retained its position as the favored wood at recent furniture markets for the 15th consecutive year.

Nearly one-fifth of the 2,334 bedroom and dining room suites were walnut, according to a survey made by a team of wood experts at the Fall Southern Furniture Market. Approximately the same preference for walnut veneers and solids was shown in the spring market.

This means that homemakers again will have a wide selection of walnut groupings to choose from in 1967.

Pecan and hickory, paired as a "family" group, supplanted cherry as No. 2 in popularity. They were well represented in 18.9 percent of the suites, a 2.4 percent gain in the last six months. Cherry slipped to third place with a modest decline from 16.6 to 15.7 percent. Maple

repeated in fourth place, although it gained fractionally to 13.1 percent.

Oak, in holding the same 6.7 percent of the market showings, advanced a bit in the standings from sixth place to a tie with painted woods for fifth and sixth. Prints and plastics moved a notch ahead of their eighth place position of April, being found in 5.5 percent of the suites, compared to 3.4 percent in the spring market. Mahogany gained slightly to 5.3 percent, but dropped to eighth place.

Continue Co-op Ewe Procurement

The Kansas Quality Sheep Committee held its annual business meeting in Topeka last week to work out the details for this year's procurement of yearling spring ewes for replacement.

ments in Kansas flocks.

Robert Lukens, Beloit, chairman of the committee which was formed in 1961, indicated that the educational demonstration program is designed to provide a source of high quality western replacement ewes that can be bred to mutton-type rams.

During March and early April information is sent to local sheep associations including the approximate cost of ewes in Texas this year. Interested sheepmen across the state then place purchase orders through other local contacts.

In late April, Ray Hoss, Manhattan, makes a trip to Texas to personally inspect and purchase the desired yearlings. Buyers are notified of the approximate time and place of arrival of the ewes in Kansas.

Hoss started acting as purchase agent in 1951 while the Cooperative Extension Service was carrying out procurement as an educational program. This activity had started in 1937 through the efforts of Carl Elling, an Extension livestock specialist.

In appraising the function of the Kansas Quality Sheep Committee today, Lukens stressed that "the committee does not want to discourage or take over the services provided by legitimate livestock dealers. In fact, the committee brings only a fraction of the ewe breeding stock into Kansas each year."

Other officers of the KQSC are Paul Dutton, St. Joseph, Mo., vice chairman, and A. G. Pickett, Topeka, secretary-treasurer.



Who's That Man In Grey Flannel Suit?

The day will soon come when the man in the grey flannel suit is just as likely to be a farmer as he is a banker or a broker. The thought was advanced last week by Raymond Doll, vice president of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City, who looked ahead to farming in the 1970s, as he told the National Peach Council in prepared remarks that within 15 years a farmer producing \$20,000 worth of products annually would need an investment of about \$225,000.

Estimates indicate 15 percent of today's farmers are in the \$20,000 production category, but he said the figure will grow to 40 percent by 1980.

"They are becoming more occupied with managerial tasks and less with physical labor,"

Doll said of farmers.

The farmer's future will depend more and more on cold business decisions than on the weather, heavens, hard work and good or bad luck, he said.

Doll cited the position of many wheat farmers who now find it more profitable to hire the harvesting of grain rather than have money tied up in expensive combines which are used

only a few days out of the year. The average investment per farm, he said, has risen from \$17,378 in 1950 to \$66,000 at the start of this year.

"In my opinion agriculture will continue to use more credit



Bull Test Top Sells At \$1150

FREDONIA — The 6th annual sale from the Bull Test Lot here produced a \$435 average with 48 bulls selling. Total receipts were almost \$21,000. Tom Timie of Girard paid \$1125 for the top-gaining bull, a Charolais owned by Rorabaugh and Rorabaugh of Balko, Oklahoma. The bull had a 3.57 pound per day gain on the 140-day test, eating a 40% grain ration.

David Miller of Smithville, Mo., sold one of his five Angus bulls for \$900 to C. W. Wayman of Vale, Colorado. This bull had an average daily gain of 3.18 pounds and a weight per day of age of 3.03 pounds.

Six more Angus bulls were involved in a mishap on the test. A short in an electric heater on the automatic water fountain gave this pen of bulls quite a shock when they attempted to drink. Lack of drinking water reduced the gains for that pen considerably for a 28-day period.

Manley Webb of Fall River paid \$610 for the top Hereford gainer, owned by Emmett LeFors of Pampa, Texas. This bull gained 3.07 pounds per day on the 140-day test.

Here's March Farm Price Forecast

Lambs and feeder cattle will show the best price prospects during March, according to the monthly forecast by Kansas State University economists.

Corn and grain sorghums are also expected to show some strength. Eggs, hogs, slaughter cattle, and wheat will remain steady.

Specific summaries on major Kansas commodities are as follows:

LAMBS — Steady to Slightly Higher. Slaughter is high compared to a year ago. Little chance for large-scale price recovery.

FEEDER CATTLE — Steady to Slightly Higher. Optimism about late fall prices plus approach of grass season will lend strength.

CORN-GRAIN SORGHUMS — Steady to Slightly Higher. Advance by amount of storage costs.

EGGS — Steady. Processors will be buying to fill contracts. Production should remain high.

HOGS — Steady. A slight increase ordinarily expected this time of year, but heavy supplies and competition from beef will keep pressure on prices.

SLAUGHTER CATTLE — Steady. Cattle on feed reports indicate continued heavy slaughter for immediate future.

WHEAT — Steady. Awaiting April crop report. Bearish trend will continue into new crop.

MILK — Steady to Slightly Lower. Prices to start normal seasonal price decline.

ALFALFA HAY — Slightly Lower.

They'll Pull Up This Vein Of Copper

There's a "vein" of copper which slithers thru the G&G area for 250 miles, and the copper mine goes on sale today, February 28.

The copper vein is the underground communications cable which linked the 12 Atlas missile sites to headquarters at the former Schilling Air Force base near Salina.

General Services is taking bids on recovery of the line, which should add up to a lot of copper. There's lead in the cable too, to sweeten the deal.

The cable is buried under three feet of Kansas earth. It crosses rivers and creeks, highways and railroads. It bisects wheat fields and pastures.

The cable was installed to provide bomb-proof communications between the underground missile silos and the command post. It's about 1½ inches thick

and contains from 10 to 60 pairs of copper wires in paper covering and sheathed in lead. Some of the cable is "submarine" for use under water.

Exactly how the mining operation will be done isn't known, but Paul Wall, who has been an engineer at Schilling for a number of years, believes a router will loosen the earth above the cable and it will be pulled up and wrapped on reels. The lead and copper will be salvaged.

"There has been an enormous interest in this sale," Wall said. "I know we've never had a salvage sale during my years at Schilling that has created such interest."

Wall said inquiries had come from New York to Texas. "I've had at least 30 calls about it."

USDA Quits Quoting Price On Wheat Inventory

The Agriculture Department has announced it has stopped quoting prices for the sale of government owned wheat and will make sales only on the basis of offers submitted by buyers.

Prior to this change, wheat in the government inventories has been available for export sale at daily quoted prices.

Officials said this change is designed to hold the sale of government wheat to a minimum and to encourage exports from non-government stocks, which they said are adequate to meet domestic and export needs during the coming months.

This change in pricing policy could have some price bolstering effect on wheat prices.

The department said any sales it makes will be made at not less than the current market price as determined by it.

Caution, Dole Tells Electric Co-ops

SAN FRANCISCO — Legislation to provide supplemental federal financing for rural electric cooperatives will travel a road "at least as controversial this year as it did in 1966."

Rep. Bob Dole brought this message to 9000 members of the National Rural Electric Cooperatives Association at their annual meeting here. Dole is a member of the U.S. House of Representatives Agriculture Conservation and Credit sub-

committee which handled similar legislation in the last session of the 89th Congress.

The financing measure died in subcommittee on a 5 to 5 vote. Dole voted in favor of the legislation.

Rep. Dole urged a realistic policy on the financing legislation "based both on the realities of the situation and on the realization that no one segment of this great industry can have the whole legislative cake."

He emphasized that if such financing legislation is to pass this year certain factors must be considered.

Support in Congress from both political parties is a necessity. Total opposition from private power companies will endanger passage, while broad support from groups of citizens is a necessity, he said.

Dole challenged the cooperatives to work with members of the House committee to develop "solutions and compromises to many of the problems which certainly will arise during hearings on the legislation."




