Grain Stocks Up But Nothing Like Early 60s

October 1 stocks of most grains in storage in Kansas were the highest in 5 years or more but considerably below levels reached in the early 1960's, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Combined farm and off-farm stocks of wheat were highest for the date since 1964 but only three-fifths of the peak in 1961.

Stocks of the four major feed grains — corn, oats, barley and sorghum — totaled about one-sixth larger than a year earlier but were less than half October 1 holdings in 1961.

Corn stocks were second largest of record but sorghum grain stocks were below a year earlier and second lowest in a dozen years.

Wheat stored in all Kansas positions on October 1 totaled 404,165,000 bushels, 47 per cent above a year earlier and the largest holdings for this date in 5 years.

Off-farm stocks of wheat in mills, elevators and warehouses or under C.C.C. control, totaled 325,107,000 bushels, 52 per cent more than last year and largest in half a decade.

Farm stocks of 79,058,000 bush-

els were 30 per cent above a year earlier and largest since 1961.

Total rye stocks of 1,222,000 bushels were double those of a year ago and the largest since 1964.

Stocks of the four major feed grains — old crop sorghum grain, old crop corn, oats and barley — stored in all positions totaled 75,738,000 bushels, 16 per cent more than last year but still considerably below comparable holdings from 1959 to 1965.

Old crop sorghum grain in all storage positions on October 1 totaled 32,376,000 bushels, 1 per cent less than last year and the second smallest holdings for the date in 12 years.

Stocks of old crop corn on October 1, at 30,618,000 bushels, were 42 per cent more than a year earlier and the largest holdings in any year except 1961.

Oat stocks of 7,935,000 bushels were 16 per cent above last year and the largest in a half dozen years.

Barley stocks of 4,809,000 bushels were 14 per cent more than a year ago and largest since 1964 for the date.

Stocks of old crop soybeans were published as of September 1, 1969.

United States

The nation's stocks of grain on October 1 were above a year earlier, except for corn and sorghum grain.

Stocks of all wheat were up 11

per cent from a year earlier and largest in a half-dozen years.

Despite lower corn and sorghum grain holdings, total stocks of all feed grains (corn, oats, barley and sorghum grain) were above a year earlier.

The 67.6 million tons on hand October 1, 1969, compared with 66.1 million in 1968 and 51.5 million in 1967.

Farm Bureau To Add To State Office Building

MANHATTAN — Expansion of the Kansas Farm Bureau headquarters here by 22,000 square feet has been approved by directors, Ward Wright, chief of insurance service, says.

The \$500,000 project will include adding two floors of office space to the trust building and construction of a five-story tower. Bids will be opened in March and completion is expected to take a year.

The expansion will provide 30 per cent more space for the headquarters building that was first occupied in 1954. At that time part of the 50,000 square feet was rented to governmental agencies and an engineering firm.

Since then the office force has grown to 300 persons and it became necessary to convert part of an auditorium into offices, according to Wright.

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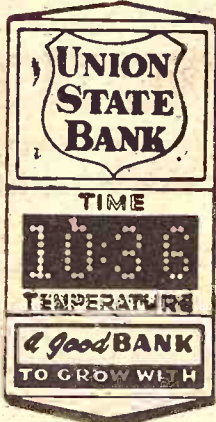

Fall Grazing On Diverted Acres

MANHATTAN — Acreage diverted under the 1969 Feed Grain and Wheat Programs may now be used for livestock grazing, announced E. R. Patton, chairman of the Kansas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

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He reminded farmers that under normal circumstances, no grazing is permitted on acreage still under contract in long-term land retirement programs such as the Conservation Reserve and the Cropland Adjustment Program.

In counties designated for emergency assistance because of natural disaster, county ASC committees may permit haying and grazing on these lands.

The announcement affects only livestock grazing on land diverted under annual commodity programs.

No diverted acreage may be harvested, again with the exception of those counties designated for the emergency program, where both grazing and haying may be permitted by county committees.

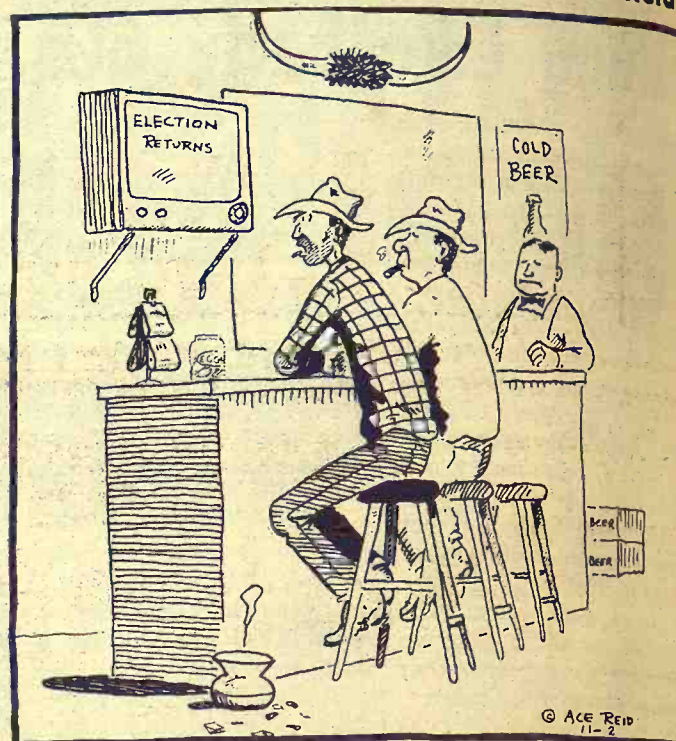
Diverted acreage is land set aside from crop production by farmers participating in voluntary commodity programs. Diverted acreage must be kept in conserving uses.

Among other provisions, this means no livestock may graze during the growing season. Vegetative cover is required to be maintained to protect the diverted land from erosion.

Public benefits are provided by conserving use of diverted acres, Patton said, as well as protection of the farmer's land. By helping prevent soil erosion, conserving uses help keep water run-off more silt-free than if the land were left idle but unprotected. Diverted land also provides many thousands of acres of wildlife habitat.

BOHEMIAN STEAK

1 pound ground beef
1/2 cup tomato paste
2 tablespoons chopped onion
salt and pepper
1/2 cup chicken broth

Mix together and blend. Cook 1 1/2 cups wide noodles (crumble) and cool in cold water. Add to above mixture. Make into patties. Mix 1 can mushroom soup and 1 cup chicken broth and pour over patties. Bake one hour at 325 degrees. One pound makes 10 patties.

APPLE CIDER PIE

2 1/2 cups sliced apples
1/2 cup light brown sugar
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
1/2 cup coarsely chopped blanched almonds (optional)
1 package lemon-flavored gelatin

1 1/2 cups hot cider
1/2 cup heavy cream
1 9-inch baked pastry shell
Cook apples with sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg until apples look slightly transparent. Add grated orange rind. Cool. Add almonds. Dissolve gelatin in hot cider. Cool until slightly thickened. Fold in apple mixture. Pour into baked pastry shell. Chill until firm. Whip cream and top pie just before serving.

RAISIN CAKE

1 1/2 cups sugar
2 eggs
2 cups cooked raisins
1/2 cup shortening
1 cup raisin water
3 cups flour
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

After cooking the raisins let stand until cool and add them last to the cake mixture. Use the water in which the raisins were cooked as moisture for the cake. Cream sugar and shortening; add eggs. Mix other ingredients and pour into greased cake pan. Bake about an hour in moderate oven. Nuts may be added if desired and you can use an angel food pan.

HEAVENLY HASH

1 pint cream
25 large marshmallows, cut into fourths
12 English walnuts or almonds
1 small can pineapple tidbits, drained
1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla flavoring
1 cup sugar
Beat cream until stiff, then add rest of ingredients.

Add Salt To Starch

On a windy day, add a little salt to the starch to prevent its being blown out of the clothes while drying. When starched clothes get wet on the line, let them stay there until dry so the stiffness stays.

Extra Hangers

If you need more hangers for children's clothes, bend down the ends of regular-sized wire coat hangers about three inches from each end. The hangers then fit a child's dress and keep clothing looking neat.

Makes Thimble Fit

If your thimble is too large to work comfortably, slip the tip of a worn-out rubber or kid glove on the thimble finger and place the thimble over it. Generally, this is all you will need for a perfect fit.

To Mend Apron

If the top corner of a pocket tears into the material of a dress or apron, use matching or contrasting bias tape for mending. Stitch it flat all around the pocket.

Quilts Will Last

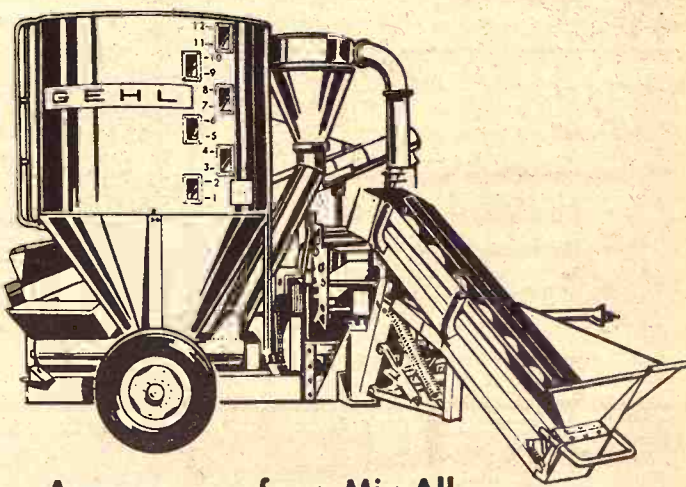
To make your favorite quilts last longer and look better, never

Emergency Water Bottle

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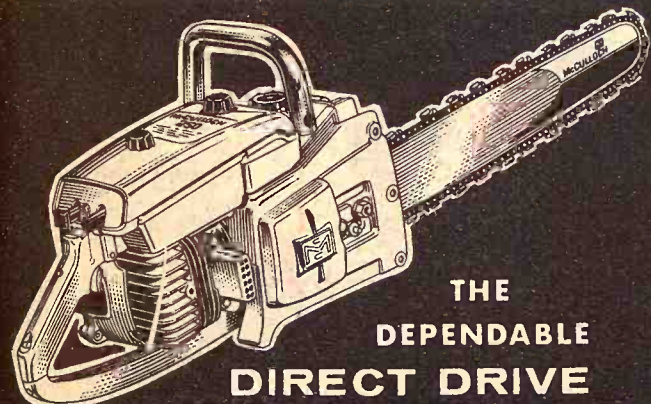
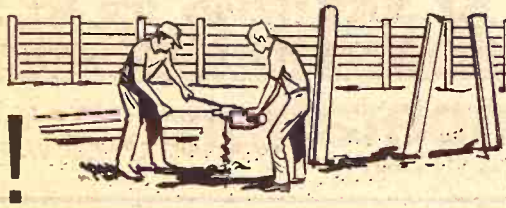

It isn't necessary to wear gems. There are many pieces of attractive costume jewelry on the market that is in good taste.

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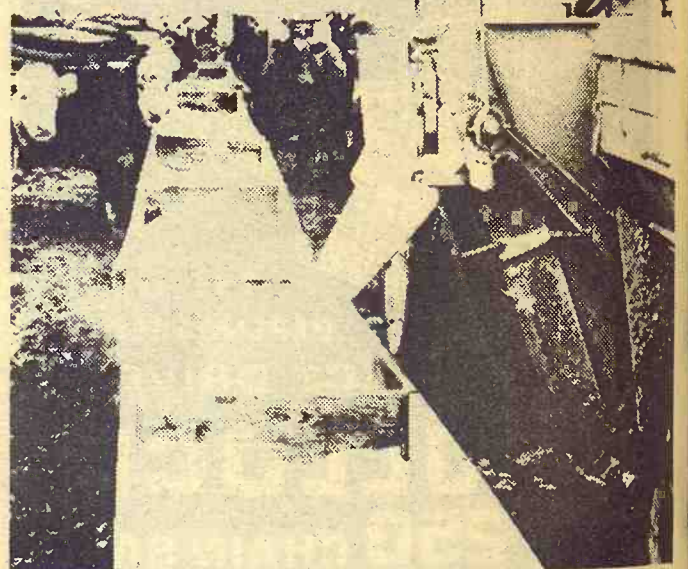

FRUITED HAM RING

- 1 pound ground ham
- ½ pound ground pork
- ¾ cup evaporated milk
- ½ cup rolled oats
- 1 egg
- 1 9-ounce package frozen Italian beans
- 1 cup cherry preserves
- 1 8-ounce can fruit cocktail, drained
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- ½ teaspoon dry mustard
- ½ teaspoon salt

Combine remaining ingredients; cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Spoon over ham ring. Makes five to six servings.

Get Lambs Off To Fast Start

MANHATTAN — Once the critical lambing period has passed, sheep flock farmers should turn their attention to getting the lambs off to a fast start, urges V. E. McAdams, Kansas State University Extension livestock specialist.

Lambs begin eating grain at two to three weeks, so a creep feeder with corn, sorghum, barley, wheat or a mixture of grain and alfalfa hay is a good idea.

Locate the creep in a shed or close to where the ewes are fed.

Keep the shed dry, moderately bedded, well lighted, and have clean, fresh water near.

McAdams notes that lambs can be fed whole grain after they are accustomed to eating; however, if a mixed grain ration is fed, he suggests coarsely grinding it.

If lambs have had urinary calculi problems, a mixture of 45 percent ground grain and 55 percent ground alfalfa hay is an excellent feed. This ration was tested successfully at the KSU Experiment Station at Colby.

Pellets can be fed lambs with good results, but they add to the production costs.

Lambs will gain one-half to three-fourths pound a day with grain supplement and ewe milk. Wheat or other small grain pasture cheapen gains.

If lambs are hand fed, feed what they will clean up in 20-30 minutes twice daily. Don't let feed spoil in bunks. If necessary because of low quality legume hay or early weaning, protein supplement can be added to the ration as lambs approach market weight.

Pork Producers Are Optimistic

"Hog people mean business — they're developing more pride in their industry."

Speaking was Marvin Garner, executive vice-president of the National Pork Producers Council during a swine seminar at Wichita. About 100 persons, including NPPC staff members, Kansas hog producers, Extension personnel and Kansas Swine Improvement Association officials were on hand to hear about prospects for the swine industry.

Garner said the pork industry faces an exciting future and complimented farmers for supporting the national swine organization.

"The National Pork Producers Council is no flash in the pan," Garner remarked. "It is here to stay."

In stressing the need for more swine research, Garner commented:

"Some of the best research facilities I've ever seen are located at Kansas State University but more research funds are necessary."

Other observations made by speakers at the day-long session:

—More research is needed in regard to such swine diseases as mastitis-metritis-agalactia (MM-A), transmissible gastroenteritis (TGE), and colibacillosis (white scours).

—Reproduction efficiency is no greater problem among pigs than other farm animals, but there is still room for improvement.

—Per capita consumption of pork hasn't kept pace with other meats but signs are encouraging.

—Most research has dealt with pure breeds, while 90 percent of the hogs going to market are cross breeds.

—Changes in various types of pig housing and waste disposal systems are being made at a rapid rate.

id rate.

—Restricted feeding, either over the entire feeding period or a few weeks before slaughter, has been shown to have a detrimental effect on pork quality. But limited feeding of gestation herds may be valuable.

—A new vegetable protein product which is supposed to take

the place of bacon is on the market in some areas. However, it was pointed out that the synthetic product doesn't taste like bacon and won't replace pork at the breakfast table.

Among speakers at the day-long session were Creighton Knau, program director for NPPC; Leo Wendling, Kansas

State University Extension engineer; Al Leman, University of Illinois Extension veterinarian; Emmett J. Stevermeyer, Iowa State University Extension specialist; and Richard Epley, University of Missouri graduate student. Don Sailors, president of KSIA, presided at the seminar.

Rewritten Mass In Use By Catholics By Lent

Roman Catholics will get a new, simplified mass in 1970, a rewritten rite using totally new prayers for the first time in 400 years.

One of them is a closing phrase in the Lord's Prayer from the early Christian days of the catacombs, although it has a Protestant ring in Catholic minds. "For Thine is the Kingdom, and the Power, and the Glory," Protestants and Orthodox have said it that way for centuries.

The changes in the mass, central act of all Catholic worship, were authorized by Pope Paul VI last April 3 in a Latin document containing the entire new formulation.

The bishops of the United States and 11 other countries where English is spoken assign-

ed experts to translate the papal document into a common English text.

Questioned on what to expect and when, the American experts said the new mass would begin for their country's 48 million Catholics sometime during Lent, which runs from February 11 to Easter on March 29.

The U.S. Catholic bishops will vote a precise starting date next month at their semiannual meeting in Washington. Their liturgy

experts have recommended Palm Sunday, March 22.

The final version of the English text will be sent out to all 280 American bishops, said the Rev. Frederick R. McManus, director of the U.S. Bishops Committee on the Liturgy.

"What's really being changed is the structuring of the mass, and most significantly its Scripture texts and prayers," he said.

The two biggest physical changes, already made, dealt with

how mass is said rather than what is said. Modern languages replaced Latin in 1965 and the priest was put behind the altar facing the people, instead of in front of it with his back to the worshippers.

There was no elaboration over the differences from Hansen or the directors. Hansen had operated livestock operations at Plainville, Beloit and Hutchinson before coming to Belleville in 1968 while the new barn was under construction and permits to operate were being obtained.

Hansen said he would continue to live in Belleville and operate an auctioneering and real estate business.

COWLEY COUNTY VOTES DOWN JUCO BONDS

WINFIELD — A \$3.7 million Cowley County Community Junior College bond issue has been defeated by a vote of 5224 to 4272. The bonds would have helped build a \$5.1 million facility for 1200 students. The present facility at Ark City will be closed, since the bond issue failed, as it does not meet accrediting requirements calling for a junior college to own its buildings and campus.

Area Guidance Center Says It Needs Support

CONCORDIA — Sunflower Guidance Center here is in jeopardy of closing because of lack of support from surrounding counties and private donations, Cloud County commissioners say.

Kansas Department of Health division of institutional management, which approved the center in 1967, wants it to continue, the commissioners added.

"The county commission, governing body of the center, and many others in the area are con-

vinced there is a need for the facility in Concordia," the commissioners said. "Without support from other counties and from local persons and organizations this will be the last for the Sunflower Center."

In 1968, more than half of 865 patient-therapy sessions were for persons outside of Cloud County. The schedule of fees ranges from 25 cents to \$20 an hour, depending on income and number of dependents.

Commissioners said the charges for out-of-county patients had been much higher than for those in Cloud County.

The center is supported by tax levy, fees for services and donations.

State law allows other counties to join the center and levy a fee for its support.

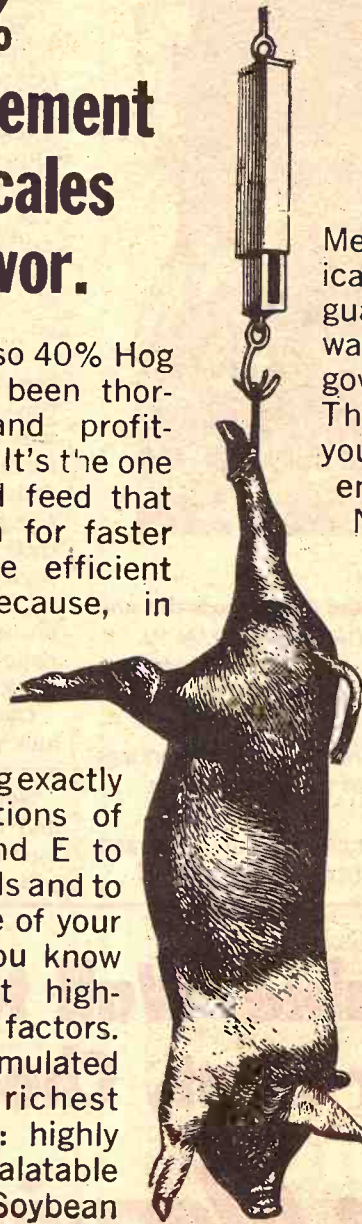

One of the first Simmental bred calves in the G&G area is this one owned by Delmar Gerdes of Wymore, Neb. Gerdes and Dr. M. U. Pettit, Wymore veterinarian, had the Hereford cow artificially bred with semen from a registered Simmental bull imported into Canada from Switzerland in 1967.

Simmentals are colored rather like a Guernsey with head markings somewhat similar to a Hereford. Promoters of the breed aver its early growth and mature size are superior.

Dr. Pettit has contracted to buy the heifer calves from Gerdes and intends to start a breeding herd. The first offspring was a bullcalf.

Mail Burden On 1970 Census

The 1970 census, the most ambitious and in some respects the most controversial head-and-housing count in the nation's history, is scheduled to take place next April 1.

The census will employ 120 million census forms, 185,000 temporary workers and a variety of modern data-processing techniques to collect and tabulate 4 billion facts about population and housing in the United States. The total cost will be about 211 million dollars or about a nickel a fact and about a dollar for every American who will be counted.

Most Americans will never see a census taker. For the first time, the Bureau of the Census will rely on the mail for most of its feedback. Letter carriers will deliver questionnaires to each occupied house or apartment on their routes in "mail-out, mail-back" areas which are primarily in metropolitan locales and embrace about 60 percent of the population. Enumerators will work primarily in rural areas.

Challenges to census questions and procedures have caused minor changes in both in 1970.

Some members of Congress and the press have campaigned against census questions and procedures on the grounds that

the method and the content of the census constitute an unnecessary and undue intrusion into the privacy of citizens.

But federal officials and other users of census data, including businessmen and state and local officials, have defended the census as a vital function, specifically authorized by the Constitution and essential as a tool for decision making in the political, economic and social life of the nation.

Several forms of different lengths will be employed in 1970. The most common form, which will go to four of every five households, contains 23 questions and takes about 15 minutes to complete. Seven questions relate to each individual, three questions make sure everyone has been tabulated, and 13 questions relate to the home.

Every fifth household will have additional questions — some will face up to 66 questions and others as many as 89 questions. These forms take 45 minutes to complete.

Critics led by Rep. Jackson E. Betts (R-O.) sought unsuccessfully to reduce the mandatory part of the census to six basic questions — name and address, relationship to head of household, sex, date of birth, marital status, and visitors in home at the time of the census.

However, the House voted September 25 to eliminate a jail penalty for refusal to answer questions, and ruled that the secretary of commerce must submit census questions for congressional review three years be-

fore the next census. This was strongly opposed by the administration as a violation of the separation of powers. The Senate has not yet acted on the bill.

The most famous and controversial question for 1970 is "Do you have a bathtub or shower?"

—Yes, for this household
—Yes, but shared with another household
—No bathtub or shower.

This question was cited by some Congressmen as an example of intrusion into personal matters, and was widely interpreted as saying "With whom do you share your shower?" The ensuing outcry prompted the Bureau of the Census to change the wording. The "share" clause in another household clause read "used also by another household."



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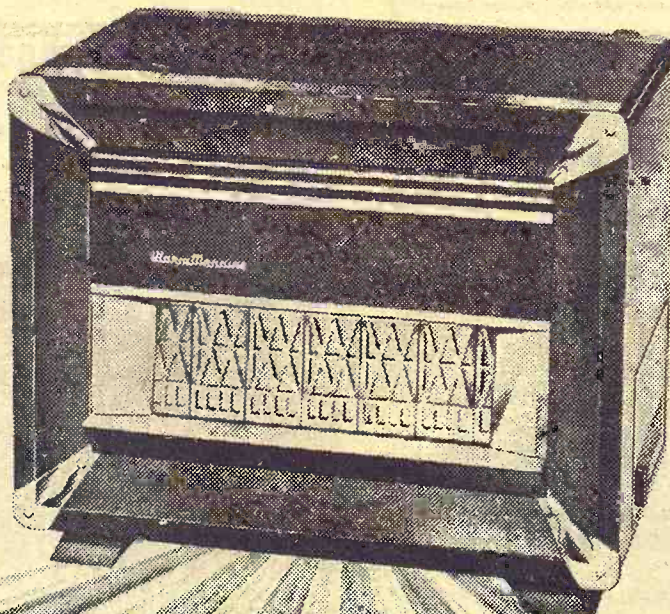

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Price Index 10% Over A Year Ago

Prices received by Kansas farmers at mid-October 1969 were down slightly from the previous month but were moderately above October last year, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Prices of beef cattle, milk cows, hogs, corn and sorghum grain were down moderately from a month earlier but slight gains were registered for small grains, lambs and eggs.

Compared with October last year, prices for virtually all livestock items, corn and sorghum grain were up substantially, but those for small grains and soybeans were down moderately.

The index of prices received by farmers for all commodities at mid-October was 242 percent of

the 1910-14 base period, compared with 245 in September and 222 in October 1968.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 146 percent at mid-October, up 3 points from September but unchanged from last October.

Wheat at mid-October averaged \$1.19 per bushel, 3 cents above September but 4 cents below October 1968.

Corn was worth \$1.10 per bushel, down 3 cents from a month earlier but 12 cents above a year ago.

Oats brought 69 cents per bushel, up 1 cent from September but 2 cents below October a year ago. Barley, at 82 cents per bushel, was 2 cents above September but 8 cents below October last year.

Sorghum grain was worth \$1.77 per cwt., down 2 cents from a month earlier but 28 cents above October last year.

Soybeans averaged \$2.16 per bushel, unchanged from September but 8 cents below October last year.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index in October was 353 percent of the 1910-14 base period, down 7 points from Sep-

tember but 44 points above October 1968.

The meat animal price index at mid-October was 411 percent compared with 426 percent in September and 356 percent in October last year.

Hog prices averaged \$24.20 per cwt., down 30 cents from September but \$6.80 above October 1968.

Beef cattle prices, at \$25.20 per cwt., were \$1.20 below September but \$2.40 above October 1968. Steer and heifer prices averaged

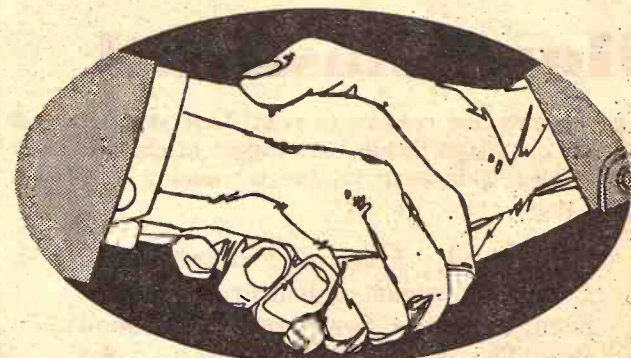

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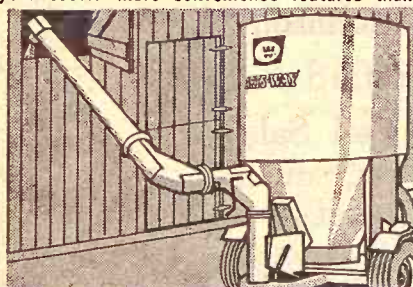

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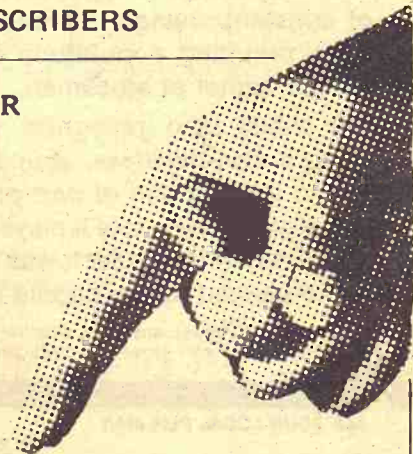

Feedlot Report Not Bad As It Seems

Many cattlemen were concerned by the USDA quarterly report of cattle on feed issued in mid-October. It showed that on October 1, farmers were fattening 10,082,000 cattle — 10 per cent more than one year before. Even more disturbing was the fact that the number of heavier cattle, those headed for market this quarter, was up 12 per cent. These cattle included steers weighing over 900 pounds plus heifers weighing over 700 lbs. They will make most of the beef for October, November, and December.

In response to another question, cattle feeders said that of the cattle on feed October 1, they intended to market 5,817,000 before January 1. This number would be 12 per cent more than the number marketed during the third quarter last year. All of this is good news for consumers. It promises them a record supply of high-quality beef during the remainder of this year. What prices for beef producers? The outlook for cattlemen may not be so bad as some farmers expect. Increases in the num-

ber of cattle on feed and in marketing intentions are not always followed by similar increases in market supplies. For example, there were 10 per cent more cattle in feedlots as of January 1 this year than one year before; 7 per cent more on April 1; and 15 per cent more on July. Furthermore, earlier this year, farmers reported the intention of increasing their marketings as follows: first quarter, 6 per cent; second quarter, 6 per cent, and third quarter, 11 per cent. Despite all this, the actual production of beef during the first nine months of 1969 was no greater than during the similar period a year earlier. One factor that may support cattle prices is a shortage of pork: USDA surveys on the first of June and September indicated that hog marketings in this 4th quarter would be 7 to 9 per cent less than last year.

Few more heavy cattle. The increase in the number of heavy cattle being fattened is moderate. At the first of October the number of steers weighing over 1,100 pounds plus the heifers over 900 pounds was estimated at 745,000 — 6 per cent more than one year before. Most of these cattle will have gone to market before November 15.

The second-heaviest group consisted of steers weighing 700 to 900 pounds and heifers 200 pounds lighter. This group numbered 3,748,000 — 13 per cent more than last year. Most of these cattle will be marketed before January 1. More mid-weight cattle, too. pounds lighter, numbered 3,596,000 — 11 per cent more than a year before. Mostly, these cattle will be marketed between December 1 to April 1.

Steers weighing 500 to 700 pounds plus the heifers 200 pounds lighter totaled 1,588,000 — 2 per cent more than in 1968. Most of them will be marketed next spring and summer. Recent prices for cattle are about equal to those of a year before. Since prices have already dropped about \$6 from their high, we do not expect much the way of a further decline.

KANSAS CITY'S STOCKYARDS HOTEL CLOSES

Once the largest hotel in the Kansas City stockyards district, the Stockyards Hotel has closed after 61 years of operation. The 100-room, 3-story hotel was right across the street from the Livestock Exchange Building.

At one time, when Kansas City ranked second only to Chicago as a livestock receiving and slaughtering point, there were several hotels in the stockyards district, including the Drovers and St. Louis. Now there is only one, the West End.

Owners of the hotel cited the decline of Kansas City as a slaughtering center for the closing of the Stockyards Hotel. While agreeing that cattle receipts have diminished over several years, stockyards officials noted that the hotel was closed directly for failure to comply with health and hotel regulations. Rates when the hotel closed started at \$1.60 a night.

Automakers See Safety From Redesigned Bumpers

Improved bumpers that will reduce collision damage are being designed and may be on cars in two years, according to an official of the Ford Motor company. But the public will not save any money unless insurance companies cut rates. If they do not pass on the savings being engineered in Detroit, the new bumpers may add to a buyer's total cost.

Some insurance company witnesses in recent congressional hearings criticized the automobile industry for the lack of

protection from bumpers and high repair costs.

They said that the bumpers were largely decorative; that one car's bumper was likely to hit another's tail lights instead of its bumper, and that rather than absorbing crash energy — a bumper's purpose — they passed it on to the car.

Detroit's engineers do not disagree. Thomas J. Feaheny, a Ford chief systems engineer, said that bumper design had moved up on the Ford priority list and three moves are under way.

Beginning with the 1972 model year, Ford's new body shells will be designed with bumpers of a more uniform weight, so they will be more likely to match up against the bumpers of other cars. This will mean less grille and rear-end damage.

Second, a high flex rubberized bumper is under development and may be ready for 1972. This bumper is a steel frame wrapped in a rubber compound that is porous and, in a sense, air-filled. Such a bumper could absorb some crash energy, just as a rubber ball absorbs energy when squeezed.

The third move is the development of energy-absorbing bumper mountings. These bumpers would extend from the car with the mountings absorbing crash energy upon impact, just as steel springs absorb energy when pressed upon.

Feaheny said if such systems proved feasible they might be available on the 1974 models and might protect cars from damage in 10-mile-an-hour barrier crashes, equivalent to a 20-mile-an-hour crash into another car.

Independent inventors have demonstrated such energy absorbing mountings but Ford thinks they still need much study and work.

Among the problems, even with the rubberized bumper, is appearance. They do not look good and because of the added materials and redesign, they will cost more.

The Pontiac and Chevrolet divisions of General Motors have put rubberized bumpers on a few models for several years. The Chrysler Corporation is offering a few for 1970.

Ford plans a similar type of rubberized bumper for some 1971 Mustang models. The main

purpose here is styling — the bumpers are painted the color of the car body.

While they do absorb minor dents, insurance companies say the bumpers do not create enough difference yet to justify a rate cut.

There also may be a safety problem. The crumpling of metal absorbs car crash energy that

may make a vehicle safer for a rider in an accident.

A rigid structure would resist body damage but pass the crash shock on to the car occupants.

Aussies To Skimp On Exports To Stay In Meat Quota

Big meat exporting countries such as Australia and New Zealand will have to cut back U.S. shipments more sharply than they did last year at this time if they want to avoid quotas.

The Agriculture department said that quota-type meat imports in September were 121 million pounds, making a nine-month total of 855 million.

Under the law, imports can total 1087 million pounds in 1969 before quotas are automatically triggered. This leaves only 222 million pounds which can be received between October 1 and December 31, compared with a December 31, compared with 233 million actually imported during the fourth quarter last year. The September imports of 121 million pounds compared with a record 141,800,000 in August an \$115,500,000 pounds in Sept. 1968. The nine-month total of about 855 million compared with 767,500,000 a year earlier. "They'll be down sharply from now on," a department spokes-

man said. "We're looking for imports to be within the quota limit."

The quota meat import law is adjusted annually on the basis of U.S. meat production. The basic allowance this year is 988 million pounds. But the law also permits an additional 10 per cent before quotas are triggered, making the 1969 limit about 1,087 million pounds.

The secretary of agriculture must estimate every three months the total of quota-type meat expected to be imported during the entire year. If any estimate exceeds the trigger level, quotas are imposed for the remainder of the year.

Thus far Clifford M. Hardin, Agriculture secretary, has estimated 1969 imports at 1,035 million pounds — more than the basic allocation but less than the limit allowed by the 10 per cent override. The 222 million pounds remaining in import allowances during the last three months of 1969 appears to be within the

voluntary adjustments sought by the U.S. and the exporting countries.

This system was started a year ago when meat imports appeared to be headed for the trigger point. Under agreements worked out between U.S. and foreign representatives, shippers voluntarily cut back on meat sales the last couple of months of 1968 to avoid quotas. Voluntary agreements have been worked out again this season in an effort to dodge quotas and pacify meat-hungry consumers who have been paying near record prices for beef, including hamburger.

The cattle industry has objected for years to what spokesmen consider loopholes in the import law, particularly the 10 per cent override method. At the same time, consumer groups have sought a relaxation of the quota law to permit a large source of low-quality beef to help satisfy the hamburger demand and take the heat off prices for more expensive cuts.

But there appears to be little chance that the system will change soon. Andrew J. Mair, an Agriculture department deputy assistant secretary, said the voluntary cutback on meat shipments by the producing countries "is working very well," and that the administration thinks this is a proper method. The U.S. demand for meat remains strong," Mair said, "and so do our cattle prices. We do not foresee, under present conditions, any change in the present system of limiting meat imports."

One of the contentions by cattlemen is that official USDA meat quota estimates have missed the mark, that even when the secretary estimates shipments at a particular level they actually end up the year in excess. Last year the fourth quarter estimate was 990 million pounds but the quota-meat total for the year was 1001 million: in 1967 it was 860 million and 895 million; and in 1966 it was 800 million and 823 million. Only in the first year of the law's operation — 1965 —

did the final estimate exceed the final shipments, 630 million and 614 million pounds.

**Extra Bucks In
State Coffers**

The Kansas legislative budget committee has been told that the state's general fund has received nearly 11.3 million dollars more revenue than had been forecast at the end of the 1969 legislative session.

The report was from Richard Ryan, a fiscal authority in the research department of the Kansas Legislative council.

Ryan said general fund receipts were 8.2 million dollars over estimates at the close of fiscal 1969 on June 30. In addition, he said, receipts surpassed estimates by 3.08 million during the first quarter of the 1970 fiscal year. This quarter ended September 30.

Ryan said that sales tax collections in the first quarter exceeded estimates by \$296,000.

Income taxes were 1.5 million dollars over estimates, but the cigarette tax produced \$200,000 less than estimated.

**Cotton Stocks
Shrink To
Lowest Since '53**

The Agriculture Department says the carryover supply of cotton at the end of the marketing

year next July 31 may drop to six million bales, the smallest stockpile since 1953.

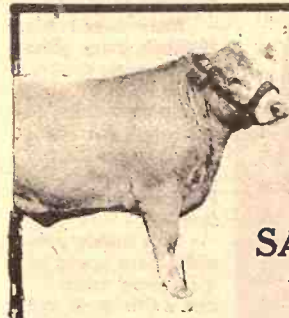
Officials said in a summary report that total use of all U. S. cotton during 1969-70 may total about the 11 million bales of last season.

Use of cotton by domestic mills was estimated at 8,250,000 bales,

the same as last year, while exports also will be the same — 2,750,000.

The 1969 cotton crop has been estimated at 10,500,000 bales, about four percent less than last year and nearly 16 percent below average.

APHA To Broaden Data On Registry

KANSAS CITY — What is hailed as the first performance ancestral certificate ever offered by a breed organization has been announced by the American Polled Hereford Association in the form of its new Certificate of Performance Ancestral Registry. This will be a part of the APHA Guidelines Program.

The new "PAR" Certificate for guidelines will feature not only the performance data accumulated on the animal in question, but similar data on both its dam and sire, according to Orville K. Sweet, executive secretary of APHA.

"Since many performance traits are highly heritable," Sweet went on to say, "readily

available data contained on the certificate will go a step further in taking the guess work out of the selection of replacement cattle or purchased seed stock."

The certificates will be available for use not only for breeders of registered Polled Hereford Cattle, but to commercial operators running any breed of cow so long as they use Polled Hereford bulls on them.

"The association sees the new Performance Ancestral Registry as being as important to the beef cattle producer of today as original ancestral recording was to the breeders of 100 years ago," Sweet added. "In today's market, in which efficiency, growth rate, and red meat production are the keys to a profit, cattle have to perform or the men who own them are going to be out of business."

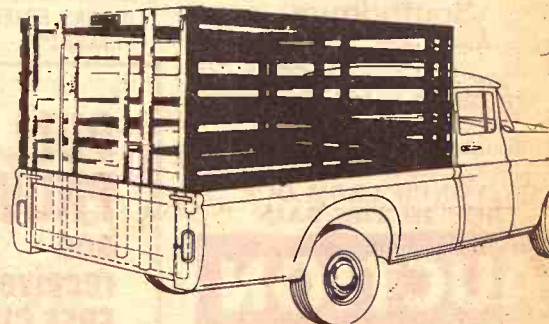

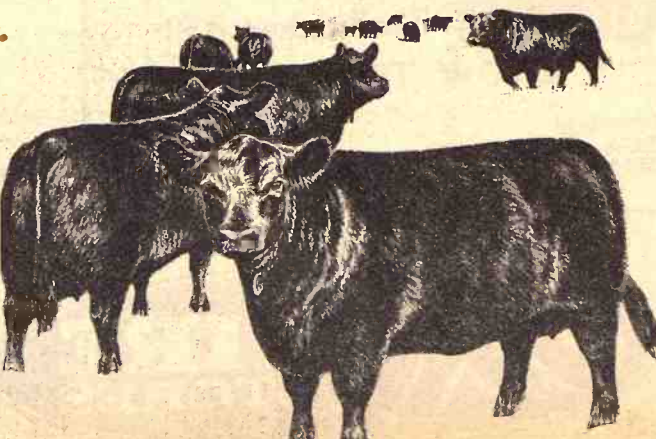

View Of Grain Export Potential Distorted

An Agriculture Department analyst said the currently bleak view that U.S. farm exports face a tough time in the future may be wrong, because the extraordinarily high levels of recent years are not proper benchmarks.

Donald Chrisler, Economic Research Service analyst, wrote in a report that a phenomenal 55 percent rise between 1961 and 1966 in world grain trade "could easily have led to the conclusion

the long-run outlook for grain exports was highly optimistic."

In other words, Chrisler concluded, the boom period for exports in the early 1960s "was abnormally high" and should not be held up as a hard-and-fast pattern for the future. World grain production was below the long-term trend during 1961-65, Chrisler said. The result was a rapid expansion in exports from surplus-producing countries to fill needs among developing nations.

But the boom in grain exports actually exceeded the decline in production. In 1965-66, for example, production fell 5 percent while world exports actually rose 12 percent, an illustration of the "abnormally high" export rate to which Chrisler referred. Since 1966, he said, world grain production has risen above the long-term trend while exports have declined. Again, this reversal resulted in a paradoxical situation in which 1967 production rose 3 percent and trade fell 9 percent.

These overreactions to long-term trends have contributed to the near-panic expressed by some farm leaders that U. S. exports are deep in the woods and that daylight may be years away.

Chrisler put it this way: "Though many observers are using data for these recent years to support gloomy views for trade in the longer run, too little attention is paid to long-term trends in world production, and opinions of the future are based too much on most recent events." Chrisler admitted, however, that for now the world farm trade picture is crowded and that plentiful supplies will require time to be worked off.

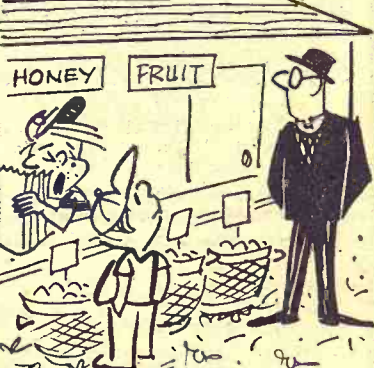
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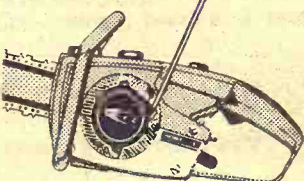

Chinks In Euro Farm Policy

One of the twin pillars of the European Common Market, its joint farm policy, is crumbling badly. Some observers took consolation in the thought that it was due for rebuilding anyhow, especially if Britain was to join.

France and West Germany, the two biggest countries in the organization, are no longer uniform, and there are new barriers to the free movement of their products.

The other main support of the organization still stood: the cus-

toms union of the member countries for trade in manufactured products. But French leaders often have made it plain that their interest in the Common Market was centered on what its agricultural policy would do for its over-all economy. Some economists think a persistent excess of French imports of industrial goods could lead France to impose a border tax to discourage them, just as West Germany taxed foreign farm products when it set the mark free to float.

Over more than a decade, the joint farm policy had developed to a point where nearly all farm production was being sold at uni-

form prices throughout the six member states. The damage to their joint farm policy was caused by their failure to build a third pillar: a single Common Market currency. A convenient "unit of account" — the U.S. dollar — was set up for bookkeeping purposes. But when the French franc and the West German mark changed value in relation to the dollar, the six governments proved unable to adapt. When the value of the mark went up, West German farm prices had to go down. But cancel-

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There is a growing realization in the Common Market that something basic will have to be done. Britain, which keeps its own farm prices low, will try to lower them in the Common Market too — both in the negotiations for membership and afterwards, if the negotiations succeed.

Extension Opts For Wider Role

An urge for Extension to become "more people oriented rather than production oriented" highlighted a session of the 55th annual Kansas State University Cooperative Extension Conference held last week on the KSU campus.

Dr. Francena L. Miller, a consultant in continuing education from Rochester, N.Y., told the nearly 500 members of the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service that a recent report of a national committee to study the goals of Extension identified disadvantaged and alienated groups of Americans as proper Extension clientele.

"There are 14 million rural poor people, hunger and malnutrition is too widespread, housing is substandard, health care needs improvement, rural schools are inferior, the aspirations of rural youth are low, and the resistance to change by the poor is high. There are problems Extension must cope with in the future," she suggested.

"Many of our urban problems stem from the displaced rural poor who move to the cities. That is an Extension problem, too," she went on.

She said Extension, as a tax-supported organization, should accept the responsibility of contributing to all society, not to

special groups such as agriculture and home economics.

"To be successful in our move to cope with these social and humanistic problems, I believe many present Extension workers will need to change their working goals, be responsive to new educational alliances with other social and government agencies, and be willing to accept regional, rather than county programs."

She questioned whether Extension would shift the direction of its mission to meet the challenge of new problems or whether it would "remain within the comfortable realm of traditional agriculture."

"I see encouragement in Extension's continuing willingness to look at itself, to recognize change, to wrestle with the unfamiliar, to accept enlarged responsibility, and to acquire new skills," Miller said, "but then when I look at the allocations of resources and people within Extension today, I get discouraged again."

As supportive evidence, she pointed out that in 1966 Extension

applied 38 percent of its total effort to commercial agriculture production and that projections for 1975 show about the same emphasis.

"What kind of commitment is Extension making when it endorses the development of new responsibilities, asks for new money, but appears unwilling to reallocate existing resources to reflect the redefinition of goals?" she questioned.

She noted that Extension "can ill afford to direct over one third of its effort to a decreasing number of commercial farmers who are better than ever able to solve their own problems with assistance from commercial concerns."

Miller concluded that to solve the new problems it faces, Extension will need persons trained in the social and behavioral sciences. "To date there has been a reluctance on the part of administrators to hire Extension personnel outside of agriculture and home economics. In the future, they will not only need to hire such persons, but actually include them in policy making decisions."

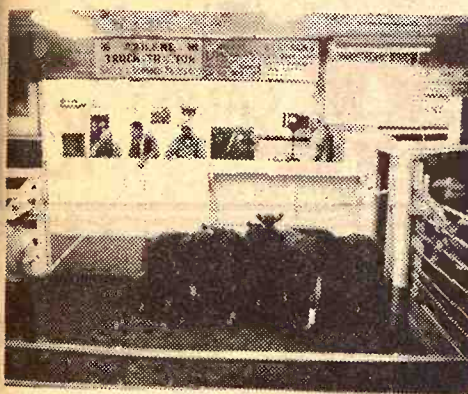
