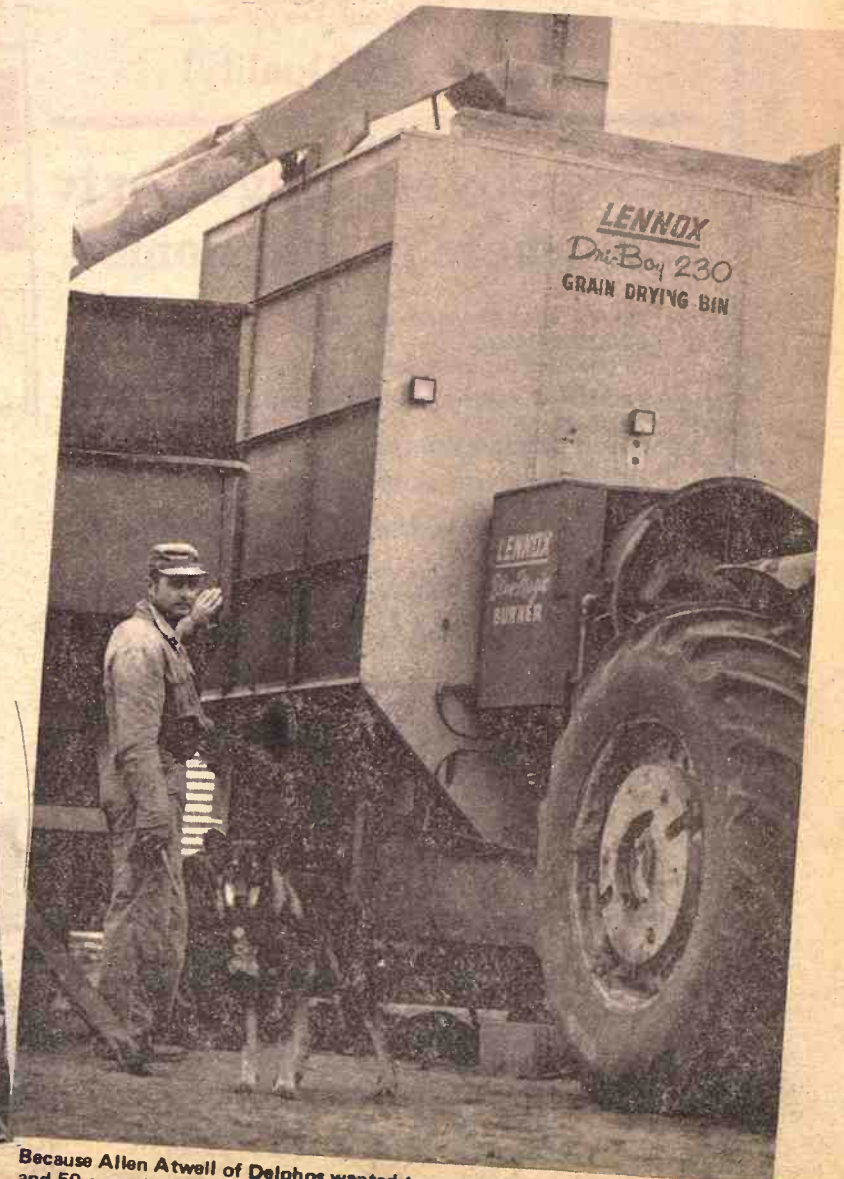
## Late Milo Harvest

The G&G area finally got enough dry weather that a repeat of last year's delayed milo harvest seems to have been avoided. But some early cold weather, an accumulation of moisture from the early Fall, and generally damp mornings were major concerns to G&G area farmers, many of whom remember harvesting a year ago after Christmas a shattered crop that had once seemed so promising.

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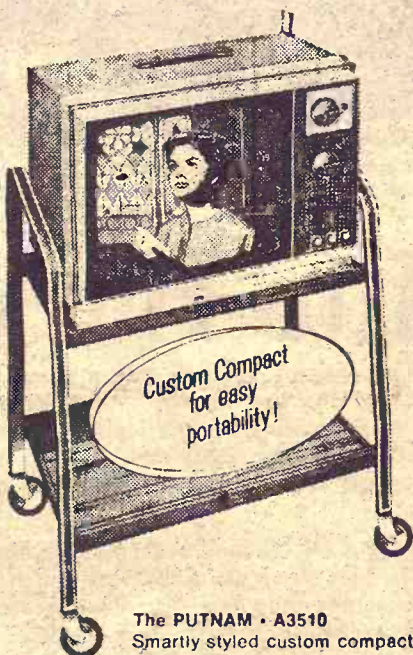
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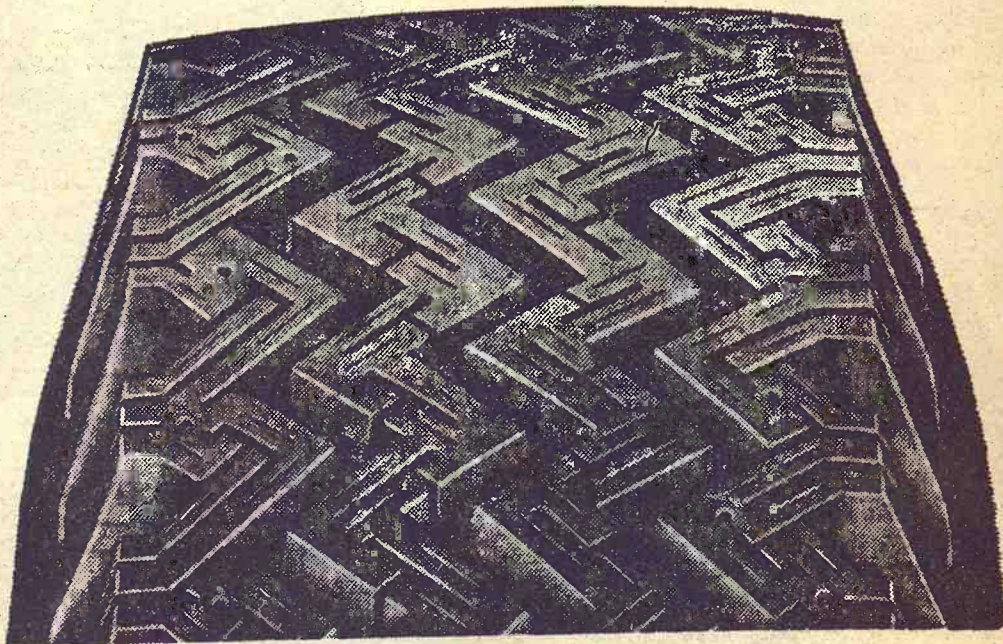
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# Labor Dispute At Beef Plant Is For Keeps

DAKOTA CITY, Nebr. — A trench four feet deep surrounds the Iowa Beef packing plant here, and a union office in nearby Sioux City is stacked high with canned food — signs of a long siege for both sides in a 3-month strike that has triggered dynamitings, firebombings and countless fistfights.

The dispute between Iowa Beef Packers Inc., the nation's fifth-largest meat processor, and about 1200 workers at its modernized plant could alter the course of the whole meat-packing industry.

Iowa Beef officials say the company was picked for a show-down strike by packinghouse workers because of its desire to streamline meat processing.

Survival is at stake, the company believes.

The company will slowly disappear if the union wins its demands, said Currier Holman, chairman of the board of directors.

Arden C. Walker, vice-president for industrial relations for Iowa Beef, said the company was struck because it wants to get out of the traditional "kill and chill" role of packinghouses and wants to prepare meat for the table. This, he said, would lower the cost to the consumer.

Walker said the union wants continue simply splitting the carcasses and sending them to retail butchers and wants to abolish the assembly-line process in-

stituted at the Dakota City plant because the process allows the company to hire less-skilled workers.

Keith Jensen, Dakota City president of Amalgamated meat cutters and Butcher Workmen of North America, called such talk "a bunch of hooey."

He said the Dakota City plant was struck because base pay there ranged from \$2.12 to \$2.43 an hour while the industry-average base pay was \$3.53. The company had offered a 30-cent raise across the board, but the union is holding out for \$3.53.

The national union recently won bargaining rights at the plant. The strike, called August 24, came after its first negotiations there.

Tensions have run high, and vandalism and violence have reached such an extent in Sioux City that police have enlarged night and weekend patrols.

Dynamite recently ripped up the yard of Sheriff Allan Bligh after he had investigated two dynamitings that cut power lines to the Iowa Beef plants.

Firebombs were tossed at the homes of two employees who re-

mained on the job.

A striker has been charged with murder in connection with the fatal shooting of a 16-year-old girl. The victim's sister, who was wounded, was a striker who had been furnishing information about strikers to the company, Holman said.

A picket, Raymone Gonzales, 24, of Sioux City, was shot twice in the abdomen as he and five other men approached a car at the main gate of the plant.

Beside the trench at the Dakota City plant, armed guards with police dogs patrol the grounds.

The lawyer for the union, Harry Smith, said the company has created "an armed camp that has a tendency to invite violence."

Iowa Beef has imported Mexican-Americans from California and Texas to keep the Dakota City plant operating at about 50 percent capacity. It says about 500 persons are on the job but won't say how many of them are imported.

The union claims Iowa Beef is building low-cost homes for strike breakers.

The nonunion contractor who is building the homes said five of

his machines on another project were damaged by explosives. Walker said the company had decided on the housing prior to the strike.

The union has gathered food stocks to tide over needy strikers but by and large, Jensen says, "People have been able to find something to do and they'll continue to get by."

Jensen said about 500 of the strikers are women who were working to supplement family income.

"They get \$50 a week for six hours of picket duty," he said. "They're not hurting."

"We're not only fighting for ourselves. We're fighting for the people in other packing houses around the country," said Dave Blair, 34, a striker.

"It's going to be a long, tough strike. But it'll be worth it," he said.

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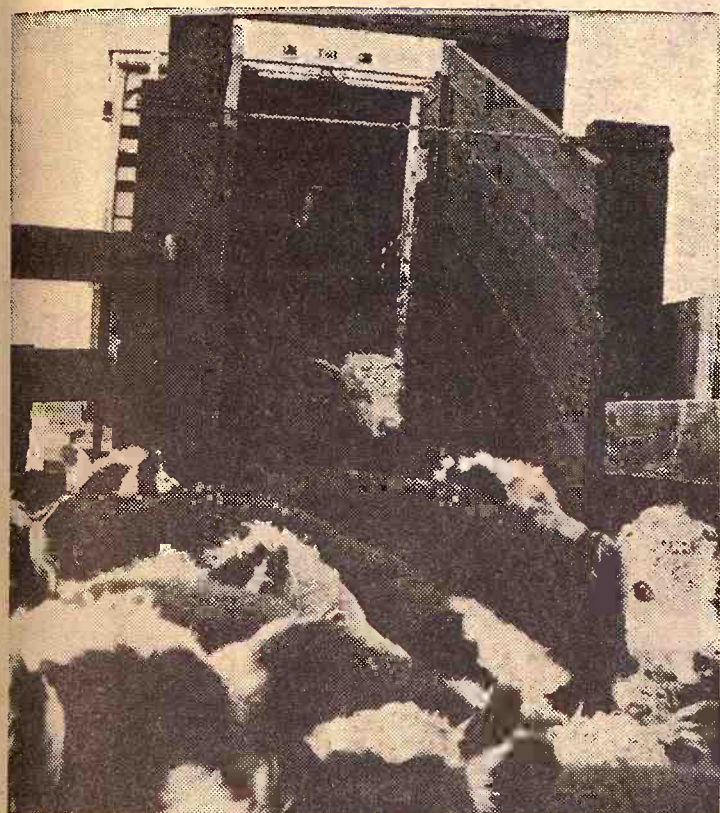
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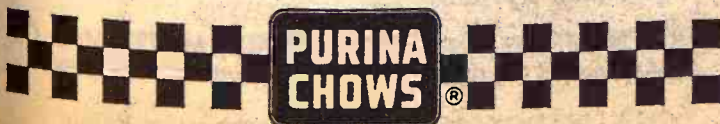
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# Need Care For Winter Lice Control

Before the full onslaught of winter arrives, cattle should be carefully examined for louse infestations, suggests Dr. Leroy Brooks, Extension entomologist at Kansas State University. Infested animals usually scratch and rub against buildings, fences and other objects to relieve irritation.

Lice are best detected outdoors during a bright, sunny day. They can be found in the hair around the neck, brisket, back, inner surface of the thighs, over the withers, at the tail head, and near the nose, eyes and ears.

When lice are discovered in a herd of cattle, all animals must be treated. Any remaining on an untreated animal will only reinfest the entire herd. A second treatment should be made three to four weeks later to kill new lice hatched from eggs not destroyed.

In many herds one or two animals carry the heaviest lice infestations. These "carriers" frequently infest other animals in the herd. Carriers are difficult to keep louse-free and are usually slow gainers. They probably should be culled from the herd as a good management practice, says Brooks.

Several insecticides effectively control cattle lice. The choice of

the insecticide depends upon whether the treatment is for dairy or beef cattle, and whether the insecticide is to be applied as a spray, dip, dust, or in a rubbing device.

For dairy cattle during cold, adverse weather when they should not be chilled, use dusts of three percent Ciodrin, or one percent rotenone. Repeat dust applications in two to four weeks if needed. Don't treat calves under six months of age with three percent Ciodrin dust, the entomologist cautions.

Backrubbers containing one percent coumaphos (Co-Ral) are good dairy cattle controllers. Mix four quarts Co-Ral 11.6 percent in 13 gallons of No. 2 fuel oil or No. 2 diesel fuel oil. Use about one gallon of prepared solution per 20 foot of cable. Place the backrubber in a place where animals travel regularly.

Sprays are usually more effective than dusts or backrubbers. Mix two quarts of Ciodrin EC (1.1 lbs. per gallon) in six gallons of water. Apply one to two pints of prepared solution per animal using a power or hand sprayer. Do not apply to cattle more often than once every seven days except as a mist spray. Use at least two spray applications about three weeks apart to

prevent recurrence of lice.

A wider variety of insecticides and methods of application can be used on beef animals since milk contamination is not a problem. However, it is important to strictly adhere to waiting periods from last application to slaughter to prevent meat contamination with residues.

Spray treatments do the best job and are most frequently used. Sprays of lindane, toxaphene, coumaphos (Co-Ral), malathion, ronnel (Korlan), or methoxychlor all give good lice control when animals are sprayed thoroughly according to label recommendations. Do not spray animals less than 1 month old with malathion or animals less than 3 months old with lindane, toxaphene, or coumaphos (Co-Ral). Do not spray with lindane within 30 days, toxaphene within 28 days, or ronnel (Korlan) within 56 days of slaughter.

Where weather conditions do not permit spraying, dusts, backrubber applications, or ruelene pour-on are satisfactory louse control measures.

A dust of three percent Ciodrin may be used on beef animals as well as on dairy animals for louse control. Sprinkle dust on poll, back, or sides of animal or place dust in a dust bag. Dust

bags should be located in barnyards, in barn doorways, in gate passage ways, around mineral boxes, or in shade where cattle congregate or pass once or twice a day.

Do not treat calves under 6 months of age or make application on older animals more than once every three weeks.

Backrubbers containing one percent Ciodrin, one percent coumaphos (Co-Ral), five percent methoxychlor, one percent ronnel (Korlan), or five percent toxaphene are recommended. There is no waiting period from application to slaughter when using Ciodrin, coumaphos (Co-Ral), or methoxychlor. There is a waiting period of 14 days for ronnel (Korlan) and 28 days for toxaphene.

Do not use toxaphene on animals less than 3 months old. A dip treatment with lindane 25 percent WP, or 20 percent EOP gives very effective lice control. Never dip calves less than 3 months old. There is a 60-day waiting period after application before slaughter with a lindane dip.

Ruelene 8R or 25 percent pour-on will give lice control (recommended for beef cattle only). There is a 28-day waiting period from last application. Pour this chemical evenly along the animal's backline with a marked dipper, according to label directions and precautions.

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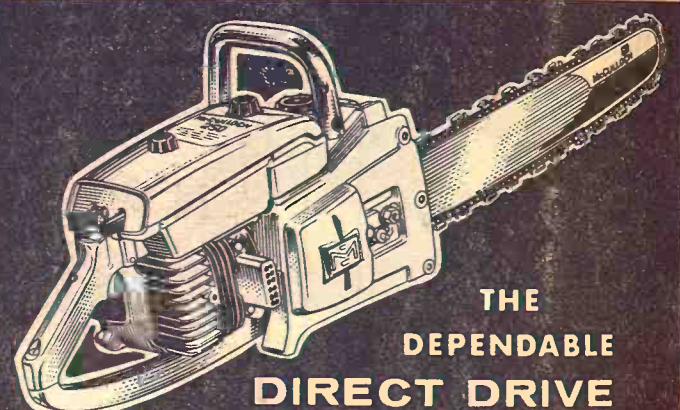
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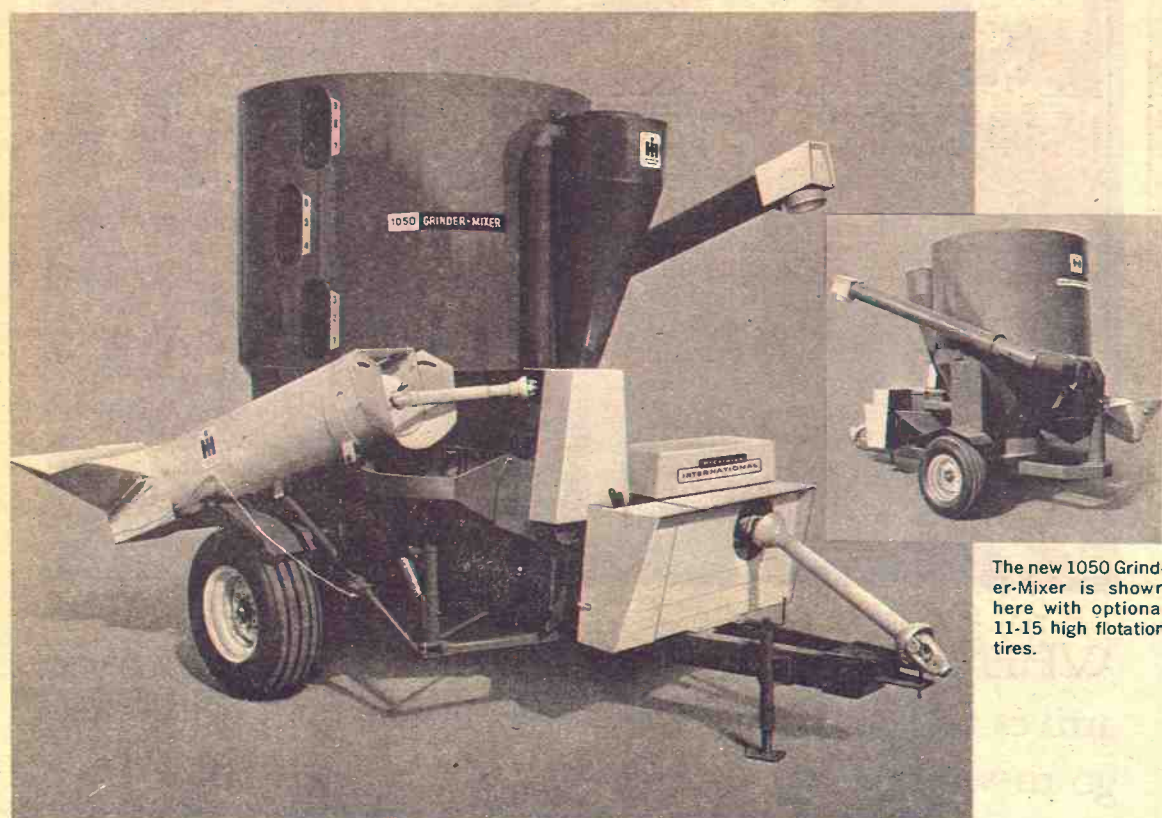
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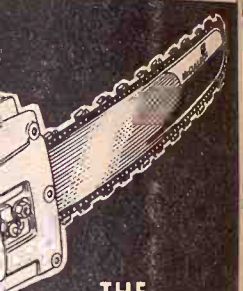
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## Cotton Velvet: A Natural For Holiday Wear

### SOAP

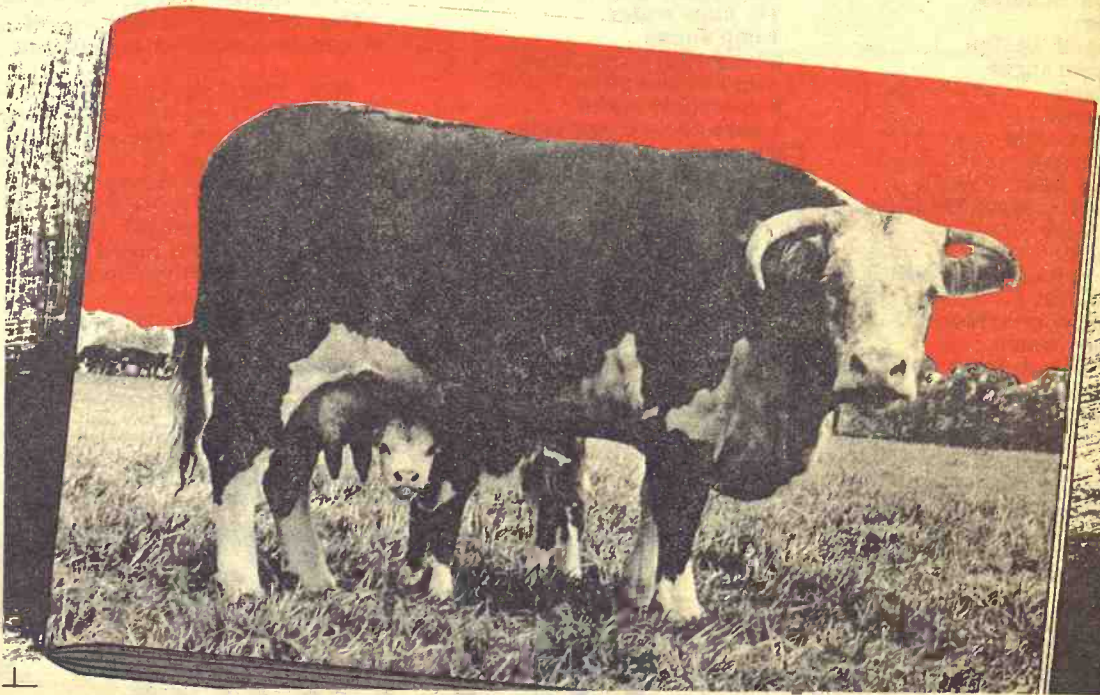
- 2½ quarts melted fat (about body temperature)

# Farm Appropriation Bill Ends At \$7.48 Billion

President Nixon signed last week a compromise \$7.48 billion agriculture appropriation bill which has been stripped of a House-imposed \$20,000 farm payment limitation before final passage by Congress.

The over-all total in the bill is about \$251 million above Nixon's proposed budget for the fiscal year which ends next June 30. It also compares with \$6.8 billion originally approved by the House, \$7.6 billion voted by the Senate and last year's appropriation of \$8.2 billion. The House, back in May, voted to clamp a \$20,000 limitation on individual payments under the farm program. There is no limitation now. The measure was rejected by the Senate and cast

aside by House-Senate conferees. The money bill also contains \$610 million for the food stamp program in this fiscal year. Congress earlier voted to raise the spending ceiling for the food

stamp program from \$340 million to \$610 million, the maximum amount the administration

said it could use in this 12-month period, which already is about half gone.

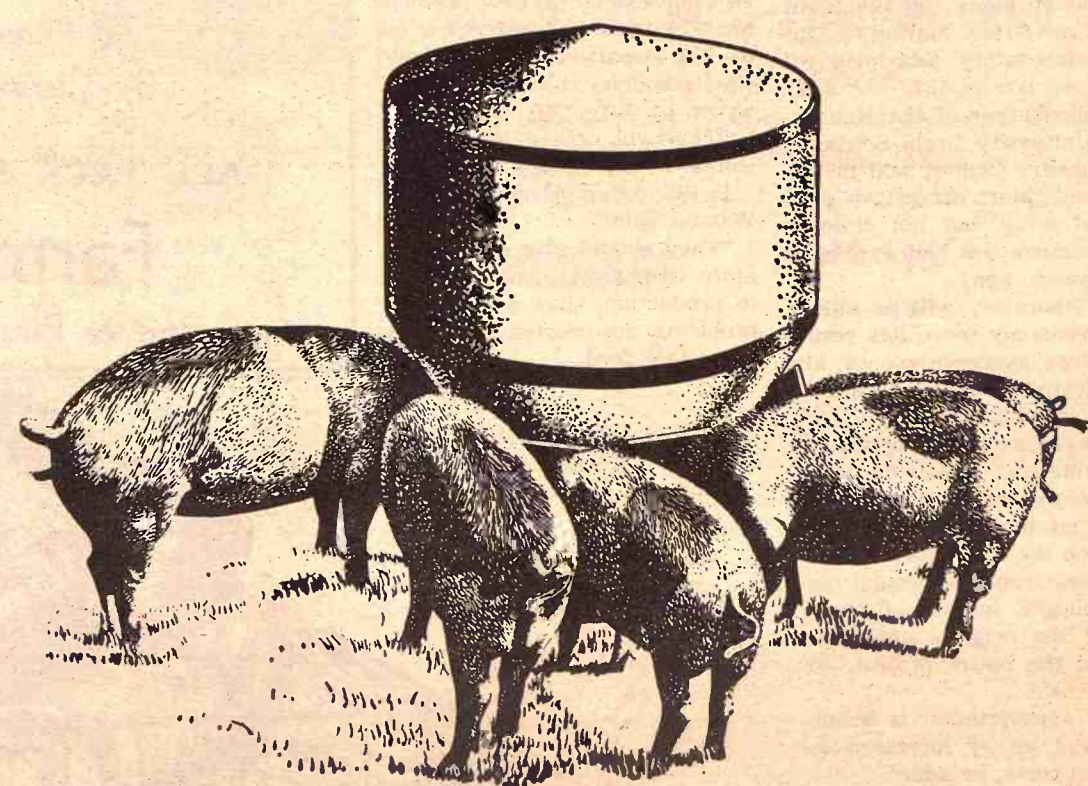

## Spending Cuts Making Nick In Plans Of Grain Marketing Research Lab

MANHATTAN — Nixon administration cuts in federal spending will effect some of the operational plans for the 3-million-dollar Grain Marketing Research laboratory scheduled to open here late in 1970. Dr. John A. Shellenberger of the Kansas State University Grain Science and Industry Center, said the facility will "start off with a pretty good setup, but not close to the optimism we had expressed three years ago."

The laboratory will be unique. The economy move has resulted in less available money and an indicated slowdown in staff hiring, said Dr. Clifford Watson, U.S. Department of Agriculture representative overseeing the laboratory's construction.

Most of the research equipment for the laboratory will be purchased from the normal operating budget, instead of from part of the original appropriation for the entire project, Dr. Watson said.

That appropriation is being swallowed up by increased construction costs, he added.

A cutback in new positions for the agricultural research service, which will staff the laboratory, also casts doubt on whether a full staff will be on hand when it opens.

Original plans were to employ ultimately 150 to 160 persons.

"If present trends continue we'll not meet our employment

goals, Watson said. "I had estimated a staff of about 120 for fiscal 1974. ARS this year asked Congress for 20 new positions but Congress had ordered a cut of 262 Department of Agriculture positions throughout the nation by July 1970.

"This will necessitate reorganization of the agency."

In discussing the program, Dr. Watson said:

"They should give as much or more emphasis to marketing as to production, since a lot of our problems are related to distributing this food.

The cost of raw materials for a loaf of bread averaged 3 to 4 cents. The remainder of the cost

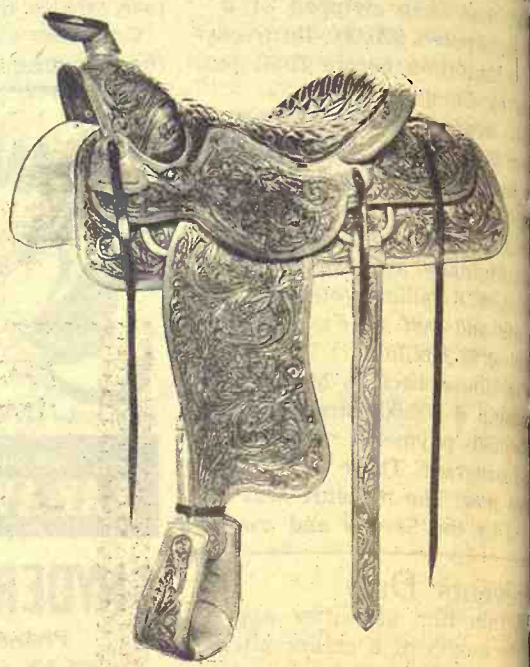
is for marketing and processing. Ways need to be found to make these steps more efficient."

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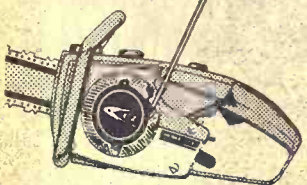
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# Loophole In Draft Lottery

President Nixon's draft lottery system may give many deferment-holders a perfectly legal way to duck the draft entirely, a White House aide acknowledged.

Peter Flanigan, Nixon's staff expert on the draft plan, said that a deferred draft registrant could choose the year he wanted to be most exposed to the draft by deliberately timing the loss of his deferment — by dropping out of school or quitting a job, for example.

And he could do it, Flanigan said, near the end of a year in which it already is apparent his number is not likely to be called. The result: A loophole big enough to drive a truckload of college students through.

The student could give himself four years to choose from by starting college and his deferment at age 19 — when his draft liability begins. If, during one of those four years, it appears from the lottery his number will be bypassed, he could simply drop out of school or fail his courses, join the 1-A pool, and wait out the year for the draft notice he is pretty certain won't come.

When the year runs out, so does his biggest chance of being drafted. For all practical purposes he's in the clear unless the draft pool is swept by unexpectedly massive draft calls.

An occupational deferment could be managed the same way.

Asked if this loophole in the lottery might be abused by registrants seeking to escape the draft, Flanigan replied: "I guess it could."

The plan signed into law by Nixon directs the establishment of an order of draft-call each year by scrambling dates and alphabet letters — the dates signifying birthday, the alphabet names.

Once a man gets a number that way for any particular year, it determines his place in line for future years as well.

Depending on the size of the draft pool and the size of the draft calls, some part of those eligible for draft will actually be called each year, while the others will be bypassed and will become progressively less liable in future years as new registrants step forward.

The hitch arises when a man who is deferred loses his deferment and rejoins the 1-A pool. He brings with him the place-in-line number he drew in the year he turned 19 — no matter how many years or new scrambled lists have gone by.

No matter how late in the year he loses his deferment, Flanigan said, he rejoins that year's pool — in effect, his draft exposure becomes largely retroactive.

A man with a low number probably could not escape the draft unless calls were cut sharply.

But a deferred man with a number higher than, say, the first one-third of the list, could simply wait until late in the year and then drop out of school or quit his job in time for his draft board to reclassify him 1-A once he knows his number will not come up.

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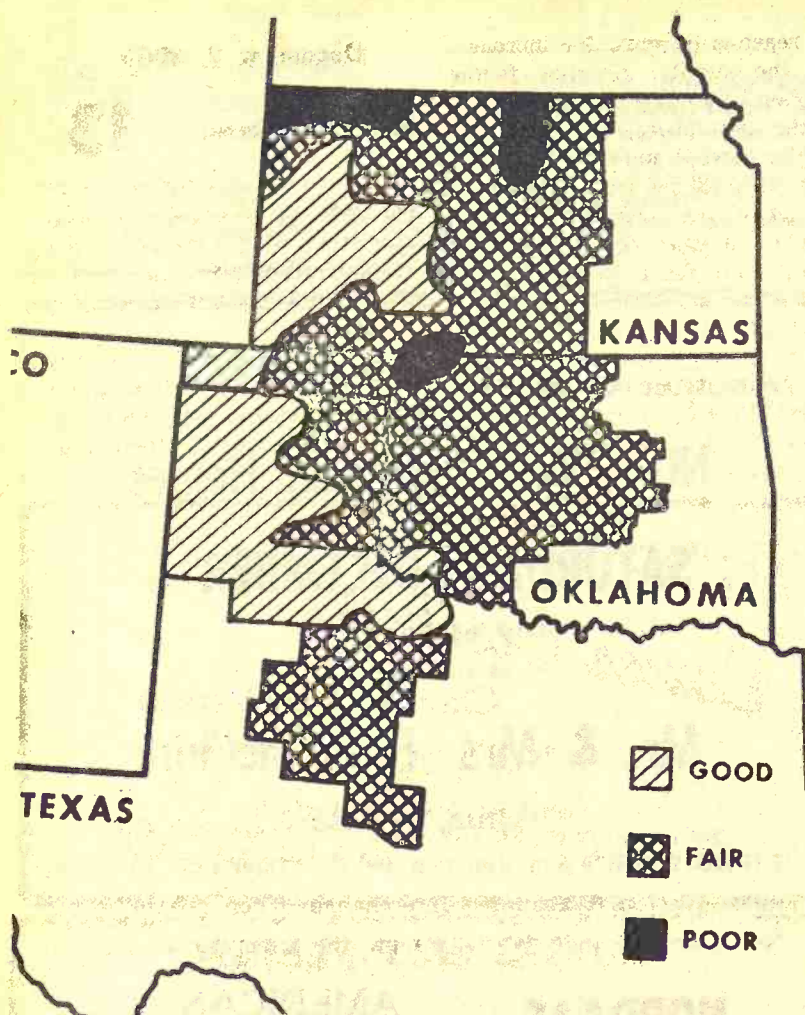
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#### WHEAT PASTURE ABOVE AVERAGE

Much of the wheat-pasture areas of western Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas has above grazing conditions going into the start of winter. Only northwest Kansas, a belt around Mankato and Beloit, and a section along the Oklahoma border near Medicine Lodge were rated as poor by the Crop Reporting Service.

On November 15, the Service rated about 28% of seeded wheat acreage in the western two-thirds of the state as having sufficient growth to warrant grazing.

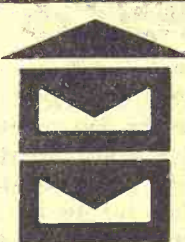

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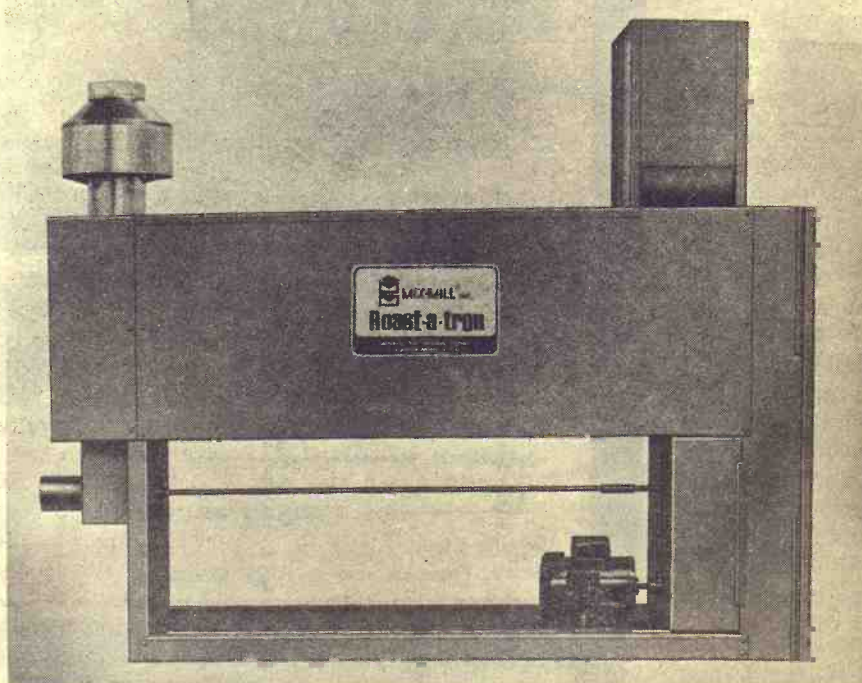

# More Beef Supplies Must Come From Larger Cow Herds

Herrel DeGraff, president of American Meat Institute, national trade association for the meat packing industry, gave United States housewives little encouragement toward a general downturn in the price of beef when he appeared before a special House subcommittee investigating beef prices six weeks ago. "With all due sympathy for their problems (the consumers)," DeGraff said, "I have to say to consumers that on a continuing

basis they cannot have both the beef supply they seem to want and the level of beef prices they seem to want. The two are not compatible in terms of beef-producing economics.

"We indeed must distinguish between the short-term and the long-term relationship between beef prices and beef supply. This is a very fundamental and very serious point," he added.

He listed two points in this context:

• If farmers and ranchers become discouraged this year over future prospects for cattle prices, they logically would start to liquidate some of their breeding herd. This would result in an immediate increase in beef supply, resulting from both heifers and cows being liquidated; prices immediately would be lower. But in a year or two or three, fewer calves can be marketed, beef supply will be reduced and prices will move proportionately higher.

• If producers this year are encouraged instead of discouraged they could be expected to respond by holding back some heifers to add to their cow herds. This would result in a reduced supply of beef available, short term higher prices; then in the next year, or two, or three, more calves would be born, more beef produced and fed — and since supplies would be expanded, consumers could expect some relative reduction in prices.

DeGraff said early in his appearance before the House investigating committee that a major part of the sharp price rise in spring 1969 was the fact that a bad winter had been experienced over much of the calf producing area.

Steer prices peaked in June at 6 cents above February live-weight prices per pound; wholesale prices the same week were 10 cents above February levels; and retail prices were 13 cents a pound over February levels. Weekly volume of beef production continued at lower levels this year through Aug. 1.

Through charts, DeGraff showed the committee that the packing industry had operated the past 20 years on a margin of 9.7 to 10.8 cents a pound from live-weight to wholesale carcass weight. In the same period, retail mark-up ranged from 16.7 to 23.8 cents, according to U.S. Department of Agriculture figures he used.

He added that a peak in cow numbers (the plant from which beef must be produced) came in 1955 with a few more than 49 million head. The factory produced a supply of 82 pounds of beef per capita — the most of record to that time.

In 1969, he said, the cow herd is only 2 percent higher than it was in 1955, yet beef production this year was above 21 billion pounds, while in 1955 it was only 13.5 billion pounds.

The changes from dairy to beef cows, the fact that 88 calves of every 100 born are saved now compared with only 86 calves saved per 100 in 1955, were ma-

the rate of 3 percent a year, consisting of 1 percent increase in population and 2 percent increase in per capita demand, he said.

But he believes the end point has been reached "where more beef production will have to come from an expanded cow herd."

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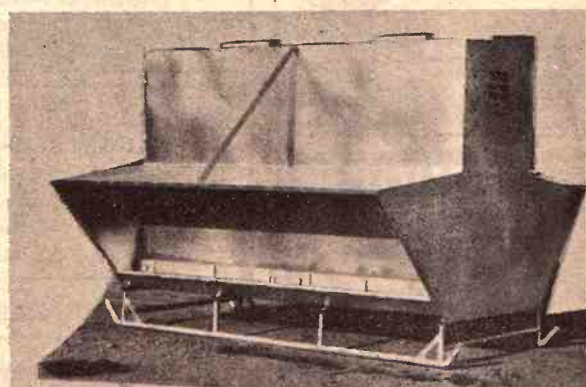
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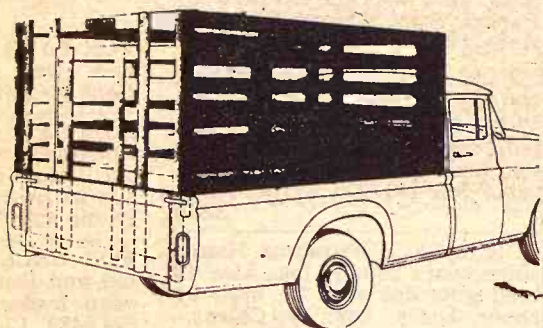



## Wood Decay Prevention Better Than Cure

Decay is the No. 1 "disease" of wood used in construction of homes and other buildings. Preventing this problem can be much less expensive than "curing" it.

Moist climate is ideal for wood decay. Moisture is the key element in that the fungi that cause decay cannot work in dry wood, explained Dale Schindler, Extension architect at Kansas State University.

He said serious decay often is due to one or more of the following, errors in construction or maintenance:

—Undrained soil and insufficient ventilation under basement houses.

—Wood such as grade stakes, concrete forms or stumps left on or in soil under houses.

—Wood parts of the house in direct contact with the soil, especially at dirt-filled porches.

—Wood parts embedded in masonry near the ground.

—Use of unseasoned and infected lumber.

—Sheathing paper that is not sufficiently permeable to moisture vapor.

—Inadequate flashing at windows, doors and roof edges.

—Poor joinery around windows and doors and at corners, and inadequate paint maintenance.

—Lack of rain gutters, and roof without overhang.

—Unventilated attics.

—Roof leaks; leaks around shower-bathtub combinations, kitchen fixtures and laundry rooms.

—Failure to use preservative treated or naturally durable wood where moisture cannot be controlled.

As a general safeguard against decay, the structure should be

built in a way that will keep wood dry most of the time.

The decay-causing fungi are always present in the air and cannot be kept away from wood. But fungi can grow in wood only when it contains more than 20 percent moisture. Air-dry wood is regularly below this danger point.

## Check On Overpaying For Medical Welfare

The Kansas Department of Social Welfare is putting into effect new regulations designed to guard against overpayments for medical services.

The regulations include one provision saying that there will be no payment for unnecessary services by medical vendors. Another provision states that welfare patients shall not be charged more than nonwelfare clients for the same service.

The regulation states: "No payment will be made for care or services determined to be the result of unnecessary utilization and no payments will be made in excess of reasonable cost or reasonable charges consistent with efficiency, economy and quality of care."

Dr. Robert Harder, director of the department, said — "We're trying to get the medical service program on a plateau where costs will become more predictable, where the only adjustments that will have to be made are for additional case load."

"We are not interested in any way in jeopardizing health care for welfare-connected persons. But we are interested in paying only what is necessary for the client."

The regulations put emphasis on utilization and review committees at the local level to check on whether care prescribed was reasonable and necessary.

They also set up a state committee to review decisions of the local committees.

"In the past we have accepted the review of the local utilization committees," Harder said. "Now that will be subject to review by the Department of Social Welfare."

The new rules and regulations are subject only to the approval of the emergency regulation board, and its approval is considered a formality.

## Favor A Bill To Require 100 H.S. Enrollment

Since Kansas' school unification program has been in effect, there has been a decrease in school districts from nearly 2000 to 311.

These districts have about 400 high school centers in them, and a House Education subcommittee thinks that's about 150 too many.

The subcommittee has recommended that high schools of less than 100 enrollment be closed by 1975. There are 157 high schools now which have less than 100 students.

The move is backed by the Kansas Department of Educa-

tion, Kansas State Teachers Association, and the State Association of School Boards.

Raymond King, Republican from Hesston, chairman of the subcommittee, says that the House Education Committee chairman, John Bower, R-McLouth, is also for such a bill.

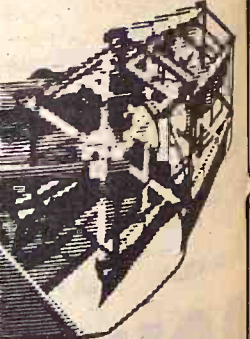

## State Likely To Hold Five Seats In House

Kansas, which lost one Congressional seat each after the federal census of 1930, 1940 and 1960, figures to hold its five seats in the House of Representatives after the 1970 census. The state had eight seats in the House from 1890 to 1930, but lost seats to other states which grew more rapidly.

Current predictions are that the 1970 census will reach about 204 million persons compared to 179 million in 1960. That's a gain of 14%, while Kansas figures to gain by about 5% in that time — from 2.18 million to some over 2.29 million. Nevertheless, the redistribution of House seats will likely

affect several states before it will Kansas.

Pennsylvania and Ohio are each expected to lose two seats — Pennsylvania dropping from 27 to 25 and Ohio down to 22 from 24.

Other states which figure to lose one seat, with their new number, are Illinois 23, Iowa 6, Michigan 18, New York 40, North Dakota 1, Oklahoma 5, West Virginia 4, Wisconsin 9.

California appears to be the big gainer. It will probably add six seats, reflecting clearly its status as the nation's largest state — a rank it gained from New York during the decade.

Other states which figure to gain are Florida, which should gain two seats to a total of 14; and the following with increases of one: Arizona 4, Massachusetts 13, New Jersey 16, and Texas 24.

Six states will have only one representative after the census: Alaska, Delaware, Nevada, North Dakota, Vermont, and Wyoming.

Kansas' five congressmen have an average 436,000 in each district according to 1960 census figures. The smallest of the districts based on 1960 figures is

the 3rd district served by Larry Winn Jr. of Overland Park. That is the district which figures to gain the most in population, probably putting it in line with the others which range from 435,000 (the 1st, served by Keith Sebelius of Norton) to 453,000

December 2, 1969

(the 4th, served by Garner Shriver, Wichita).

Changes in congressional districts to meet federal requirements that they be substantially equal in population may be minimal.

# Wheatgrowers Ask 'Drastic' Tax Changes

DODGE CITY — The Kansas Association of Wheat Growers has called on the 1970 Legislature to make "drastic changes in the Kansas tax system."

The stand against state taxes has become traditional with farm groups the past several years. But the wheat growers went beyond their usual position

of demanding 60 percent state support for elementary and secondary schools to come from income taxes.

They also ask for revision of the formula for distributing elementary and secondary state aid, for 25 percent of all sales tax residue to be returned to local tax units to reduce ad valorem taxes and for property tax assessments on all real estate to be on the basis of earning ability.

KAWG called for a "complete review" of the International Grains Arrangement (IGA) because of the "policy of price-cutting competition" being followed by signatory nations. Traditionally, KAWG has favored the IGA and proposed its approval by the Senate less than two years ago.

In another move toward market development, KAWG asks intensive and comprehensive research by Kansas State University on commodity marketing in hopes of bettering farm incomes.

The growers asked, too, for expanded research on use of

wheat as a livestock feed, a project they were told is underway at Fort Hays Branch Experiment Station, KSU.

The group took issue again this year with the executive order requiring at least 50 percent of Public Law 480 export wheat to be shipped in U.S. registry ships and all commercial shipments of wheat to Communist bloc countries in U.S. ships.

Fearing that further inroads into farmer income may come from a 6 percent increase in rail freight rates to pay for new rolling stock, KAWG recommended that payment for new equipment come from public funds rather than a rate increase passed along to consumers.

In one other reversal of stance, KAWG recommended that all food stamp, school lunch and Soil Conservation Service and Forestry programs be retained as part of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. In earlier years, the group advocated a separation of expenditures so agriculture's cost to government would not be mixed with the cost of

aiding the poor.

In other resolutions at the growers' annual convention held last week, KAWG:

- Recommended support of the 1965 Food and Agriculture Act as a farm control program

- Urged continuance of Public Law 480.

- Asked that agriculture programs be administered on a farmer fiscal year rather than the calendar year.

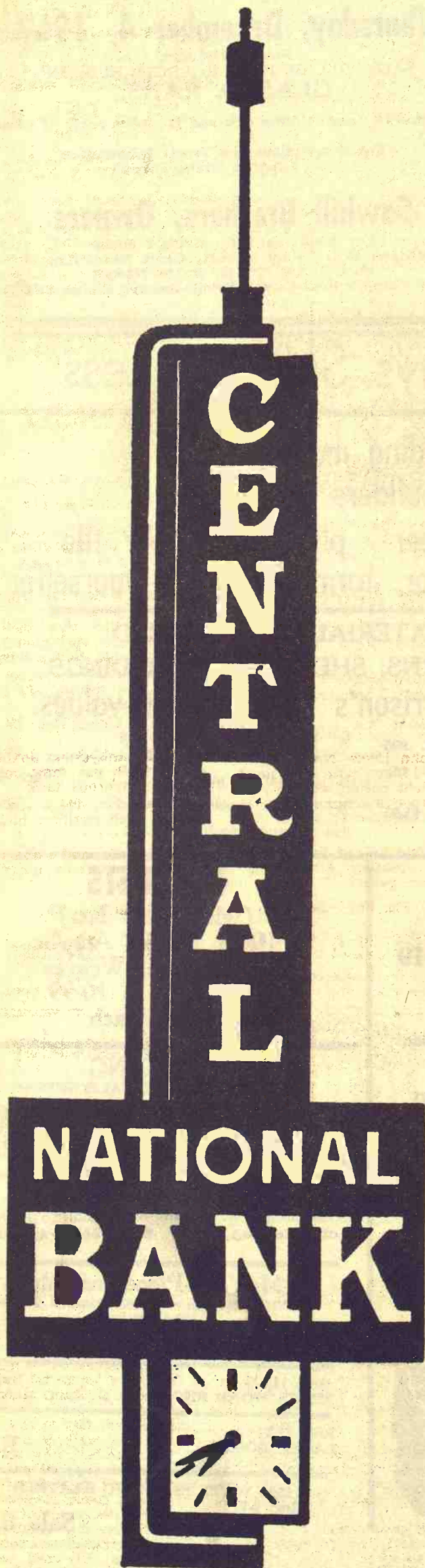
- Opposed unlimited corporate rate farming.

- Proposed use of a symbol of wheat heads in addition to the words "The Wheat State" on Kansas auto license plates.

- supported use of a limited land retirement program as a means to accomplish equity in agricultural income.

- Recommended organization of a national agribusiness council including farm organizations, processors, business organizations and others to promote a better joint public relations program for agriculture.

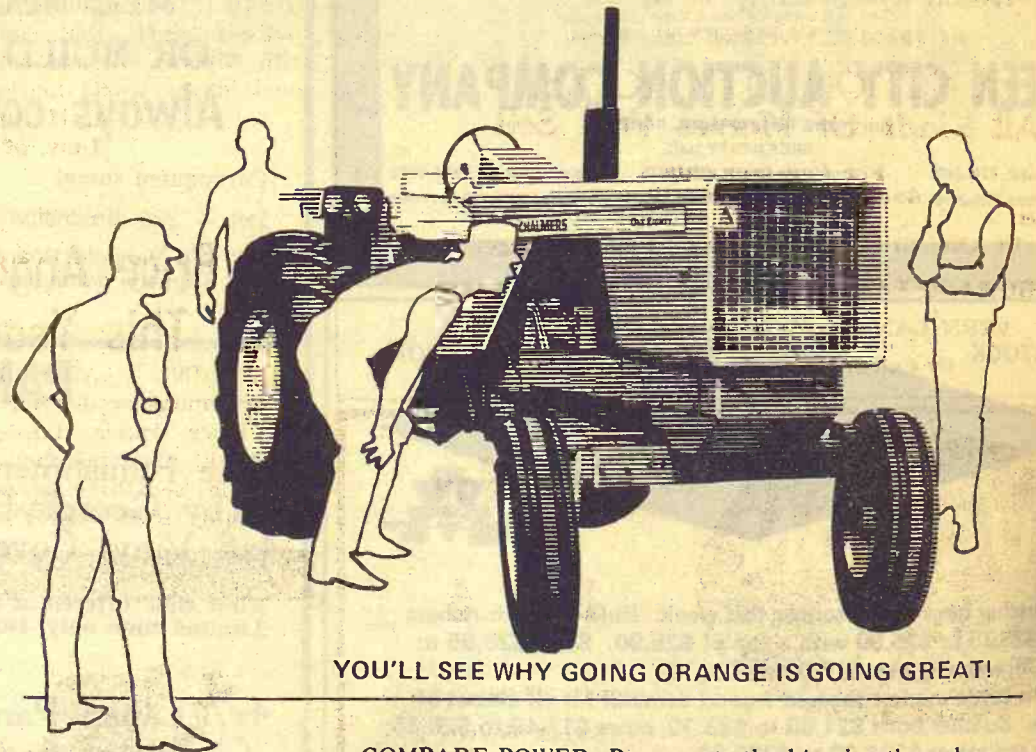

Soybean prices have held up much better than was expected earlier this year. Last March, when the announcement was made that the price-support level would be lowered by 30 cents a bushel, many people believed that the market price would drop by a similar amount. So far, however, prices have been only about 10 cents lower than last year.

There are several reasons for the unexpected strength in soybean prices. The most apparent is an increase in the price of soybean oil. In early November, prices were around 11.5 cents a pound — 3 cents higher than a year before. This upped the value of oil per bushel of soybeans by 32 cents. A bushel of soybeans usually yields about

10.7 pounds of oil.

The principal reason for the rise in soybean oil prices seems to be a shortage of competitive fats and oils in foreign countries. A recent report by the USDA shows that the upward trend in the production of fats and oils outside the U.S. was interrupted in 1969. During the 1964-68 period, production increased at an average rate of 3.6 percent per year. But in 1969, production decreased by 1 percent. The largest decrease was in the output of peanut oil. There were short peanut crops in several countries during 1968.

More recently, there have been reports of short supplies of other oil-producing materials. The 1969 Russian sunflowerseed crop is reported to be a small one.

The European rapeseed crop is also short, and bad weather has delayed the harvesting and shipment of the large Canadian crop.

While these conditions helped raise the prices of soybean oil from July to early November, they provide no assurance that prices will advance — or even hold at recent levels. This was illustrated by the mid-November price declines.

Part of this year's increase in oil value has been offset by lower prices for meal. During the first three weeks of November, soybean meal prices averaged about \$69.50 a ton — \$4 less than a year earlier. A bushel of soybeans yields about 47.7 pounds of meal, so 42 bushels are required to produce a ton. Thus, the decline in the price of meal was equivalent to a drop of about 10 cents a bushel for soybeans — much less than was expected earlier.

Farmers will have considerable control over soybean prices during the remainder of the 1969-70 marketing year. They will influence prices by their decisions to sell beans or to put them under price-support loans.

The 1969 crop was estimated at 1090 million bushels in early November. This amount probably exceeds domestic needs and exports by 50 to 75 million bushels. But farmers are expected to put this excess — and more — under price-support loans. If this happens, the market price will go up enough that farmers will redeem the amount of beans needed to meet domestic and foreign requirements.

Soybean prices will also be influenced by new developments affecting the supplies of the many products that compete with soybean oil and soybean meal in the world markets.

## Safety From Rubberized Bumpers?

Improved bumpers that will reduce collision damage and repair costs are being designed, and may be on cars in two years, according to an official of the Ford Motor Company.

But the public will not save any money unless insurance companies cut rates. If they do not pass on the savings being engineered in Detroit, the new bumpers may add to a buyer's total cost.

Some insurance company witnesses in recent congressional hearings criticized the automobile industry for the lack of protection from bumpers and high repair costs.

They said the bumpers were largely decorative; that they did

not match up in different models so that one car's bumper was likely to hit another car's tail lights instead of its bumper, and that rather than absorbing crash energy — a bumper's purpose — they allowed it to be passed on to the car.

Detroit's engineers do not disagree. Thomas J. Feaheny, a Ford chief systems engineer, said bumper design had moved up on the Ford priority list. Three moves are underway at Ford, he said.

Beginning with the 1972 model year, Ford's new body shells will be designed with bumpers of a more uniform height, so they will be more likely to match up against the bumpers of other cars. This will mean less grille and rear-end damage.

Second, a "high-flex" rubberized bumper is under development and may be ready for 1972, too. This bumper is a steel frame wrapped in a rubber compound. The rubber is porous and in a sense air-filled, Feaheny said. Such a bumper could absorb some crash energy, just as a rubber ball absorbs energy when squeezed.

Present steel bumpers are said to protect cars from damage in a 2.8-mile-per-hour barrier crash, the equivalent of hitting another car at 5.6 miles per hour. But in higher speed accidents, fenders or hoods are crumpled. The rubberized bumper would be aimed at preventing damage up to a 5-mile-an-hour barrier crash, the Ford official said.

The third move is the development of energy-absorbing bumper mountings. These could be bumpers extending somewhat from the car with the mountings

absorbing crash energy upon impact, just as steel springs absorb energy when pressed upon.

Feaheny said if such systems proved feasible they might be available on the 1974 models and might protect cars from damage in 10-mile-per-hour barrier crashes, equivalent to a 20-mile-an-hour crash into another car.

Independent inventors have demonstrated such energy absorbing mountings, but Ford thinks they still need much study and work.

Among the problems, even with the rubberized bumper, is appearance. They do not look good, and, because of the added materials and redesign, they will cost more.

The Pontiac and Chevrolet divisions of the General Motors Corporation have put rubberized bumpers on a few models for several years, and the Chrysler Corporation is offering a few for 1970.

Ford plans a similar type of rubberized bumper for some 1971 Mustang models, but this is basically a styling change, and the company will not claim major improvements in damage protection.

But the main purpose here is styling — the bumpers are painted the color of the car body and while they do absorb minor dents, insurance companies say there is not enough difference yet to justify a rate cut.

There also may be a safety problem. The crumpling of metal absorbs car crash energy that may make a vehicle safer for a rider in an accident. The crash energy is expended in crumpling metal.

Thus a rigid structure that would resist body damage but

pass the crash shock on to the car occupants will not be acceptable, Feaheny said.

## Cattle Feed Out Of Masonite Waste

Kansas State University scien-  
tists are trying to turn a former  
pollutant into a better cattle  
feed.

Masonex, a byproduct of the  
Masonite process of producing  
hardboard, was at one time  
dumped by manufacturers as a  
waste product. Now Masonite  
Corporation has granted to K-  
State more than \$33,000 for re-  
search on Masonex as a cattle  
feed.

It is already available to cat-  
tle raisers as a livestock feed  
and is used in the same manner  
as cane molasses. The study at  
K-State is an attempt to im-  
prove its nutritional value while  
reducing or eliminating any  
detrimental qualities.

A wood syrup, Masonex is sim-  
ilar in consistency to blackstrap  
molasses. Previously considered  
a waste with no practical use, its  
further potential as a food for  
ruminants is being investigated  
this year at K-State.

Dr. David R. Lineback, carbo-  
hydrate chemist and associate  
professor of grain science and  
industry, is utilizing \$28,400 over  
a three year period to study  
the amount and types of sugars  
present in the syrup.

Dr. Ronel Meyer, research as-  
sociate in the dairy science de-  
partment, will use \$5000 in lab  
work determining the value of  
the product as a nutrient source  
for cattle.

"Masonex is very rich in car-  
bohydrates," said Lineback, but  
we don't know in what form  
these sugars are present. To  
identify these we will use paper.

column and gas-liquid chroma-  
tography. These are means of  
identifying components of a  
complex mixture.

"I'm fascinated by the idea of  
this research because it has both  
theoretical and applied applica-  
tion. One interesting feature will  
be to determine the proprieties of  
Masonex which may have unus-  
ual effects on its utilization."

"The composition of Masonex

can vary according to the area of  
production," said Dr. Meyer.

"Starting with samples from  
Mississippi and California, we  
will do lab work testing the val-  
ue of different Masonex syrups  
as a nutrient source. Later we  
will be screening fractions sep-  
arated by Dr. Lineback.

"We want to find how the mi-  
crobes in the rumen utilize Ma-  
sonex and fractional carbohy-  
drates of Masonex."

## World Wheat Price 'Stabilized' Exporters Say

The International Wheat Council says it endorses exporter countries' views that the world market for the grain has now been stabilized and further price declines aren't expected.

Despite an expected slow solution to the commodity's serious underlying problems, some increase in world wheat trade in the 1969-70 crop year can be anticipated, the council said in a statement issued after its annual conference in London November 24-27.

The council reported world wheat production, except for mainland China, for the 1968-69 crop year at a record 308 million tons, up by 37 million tons from 1967-68. Similarly, world trade in wheat and flour fell to

45 million tons from 51 million tons.

Stocks of the seven major exporting countries rose by nearly 20 million tons during 1968-69 to 65 million tons, the council said.

On prospects for the next crop year, 1969-70, the council said total area sown to wheat had dropped for the first time since 1966-70. Output so far was lower than in the like 1968-69 period but above the average for the past five years. It didn't give specific figures. But Canada and Asia have had crop increases so far during the crop year, while output elsewhere is down from the previous year, the council said.

## U.S. Keeps Up Chicken War

The Nixon administration announced Friday it will pay sub-

sidies on exports of chicken to Greece, thus escalating the U.S. chicken war with the European Common Market.

The announcement was made by the Agriculture Department, which handles the export subsidy program.

Until now, U.S. exporters have been paid subsidies only on chicken shipped to Switzerland. This was started in 1968 by the Johnson administration as a retaliation to Common Market subsidy policies.

Clarence D. Palmby, assistant secretary of agriculture, said the subsidies on chickens to Greece will be "an additional step in our continuing drive to maintain a fair share of the world's market" in the face of heavily subsidized competition.

Palmby said the subsidies on chickens sold to Switzerland also will continue.

By Nov. 1 nearly 21 million pounds had been subsidized at a

cost of \$3.6 million. Recent subsidies paid by the department to exporters have been 16 to 18 cents a pound.

Prices paid by American housewives for broiling chicken last month averaged 42.5 cents a pound, down a bit from the August average of 44.5 cents, according to the Bureau of Labor Sta-

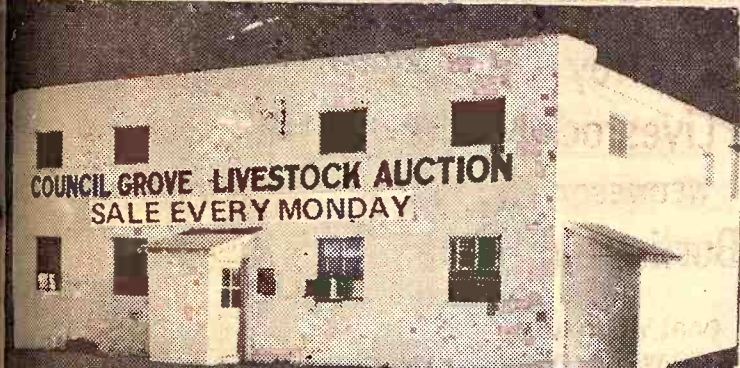
#### READY FOR BUFFALO ROUNDUP

The 120 tests sponsored by the government as a check on company-certified safety compliance showed 30 failures involving endurance, high-speed performance and strength.

A spokesman for the tire industry immediately countered that "fragmentary reports on a few early tests can give a very misleading and distorted view of the overall situation."

"The favorable experience of millions of motorists over many years with good, safe tires far outweighs a few isolated laboratory tests," said Ross R. Ormsby, chairman of the Tire Industry Safety Council.

The government has taken no action against any of the four tire manufacturers. Civil penalties up to \$400,000 can be sought from firms that violate federal auto safety standards.

B. F. Goodrich's Silvertown 660 flunked six of 18 tests. The firm's Custom Long Miler, Trail-maker, Silvertown 770, Silvertown 990 Radial and Silvertown Wide Profile were found defect free in 14 tests.

An earlier summary of all laboratory reports to be released on tires showed 6.1 percent failure. But a 22.7 percent failure rate was reported on one special test.

The laboratories reported five failures in 26 tests of the PT100 and PT120 tires manufactured by Armstrong Rubber Co.

The Champion and Deluxe Champion brands of Firestone Tire and Rubber Co. failed one of 14 tests.

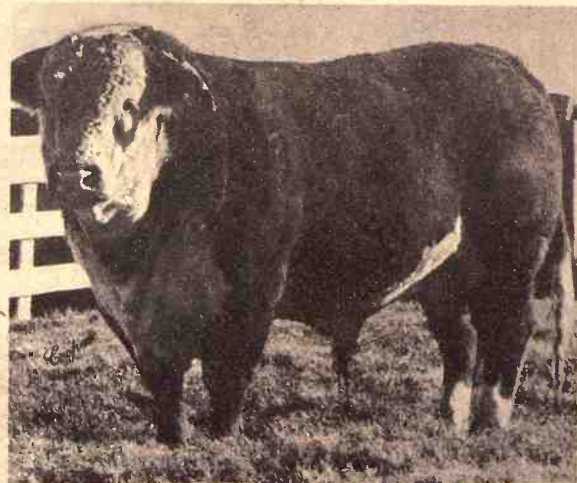

### Soy No Protein Threat To Meat, Say Bean Experts

CHICAGO — That little yellow pearl, the soybean, is versatility personified, but yield-wise it has presented a tough problem.

So a group of farm editors were told at the First Soybean Seminar here, sponsored by the American Soybean Processors Assn.

The problem that might have been most interesting to meat producers — how much competition soybean products may provide for meat — was not quite resolved. One opinion was that soy foods will be just a "help-mate to the entire spectrum of the food processing industry," as Roy E. Martin, Swift & Co., put it. They will be important mainly to meet the protein gap concentrated in South America, Central America, Asia and India, where over 70 percent of the world population will be living by 1970, he said.

While the soybean has the potential to IMITATE meat, vegetables, fruits, and dairy products, it can rarely REPLACE

them competitively, he claimed. But at 11c per pound of protein, for soy flour, compared to beef protein (at retail) of \$4.44, chicken (dressed) \$1.50, and wheat flour 50 cents, the consumer can expect to see its wider use in

new product introductions.

While soybean products may be important mostly for the protein-gap nations, the more sophisticated new foods seem to be aimed squarely at the domestic market. Martin touched on the new textured vegetable protein (TVP), and Dr. Michael M. Handy, Archer-Daniels-Midland, went into considerably more detail.

Before luncheon he provided a table of hors d'oeuvres, made up basically of variations of the TVP product. Later he explored the subject verbally. The big con-

tribution, in his words, of TVP would be to "take protein out of the luxury class."

The morning session was taken over by the production scientists concerned with hiking soybean yields, a nut that has been tough to crack. One of the major causes of the slow rise in yield, many seem to think, is the fact that soybeans do not have the ready response, yieldwise, to heavy fertilization that the corn plant does.

would have a guaranteed income and pensions, as well as insurance payments for temporary disabilities, as Russia held its first conference on collective farms in 34 years.

Delegates to the conference came from the 36,000 collective farms, and they approved the rules the government had prepared for them.

There were changes in procedures governing the collectives. Peasants will continue to be allowed to have private plots on which they can supply themselves or earn some personal income.

Tho the 4500 delegates elected a 125-member advisory council, it is presumed the central government will continue to make major decisions regarding the collectives.

Some of the collective farm problems were outlined by Leonid Brezhnev, Communist party general secretary. He said, "In the course of developing the collective farm system, we did not avoid errors. But these were errors of seeking, errors caused by lack of experience."

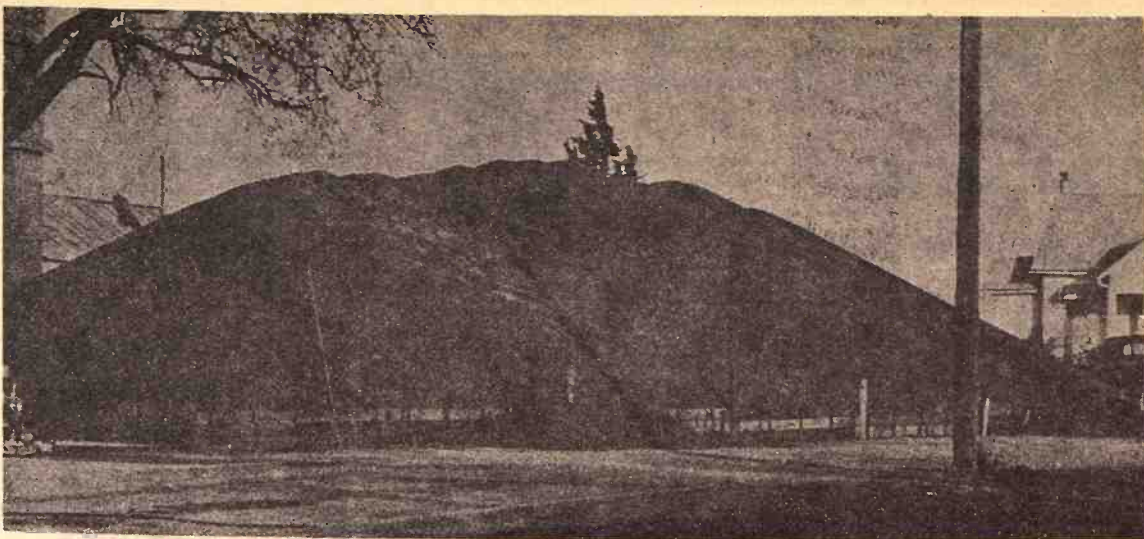

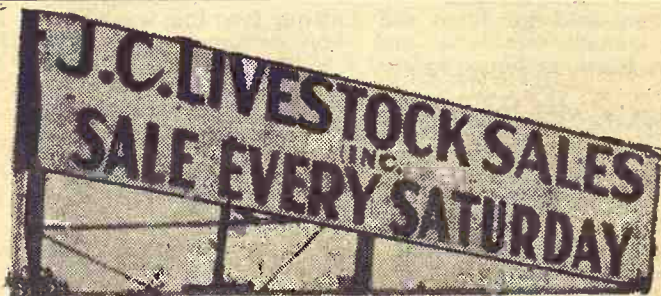

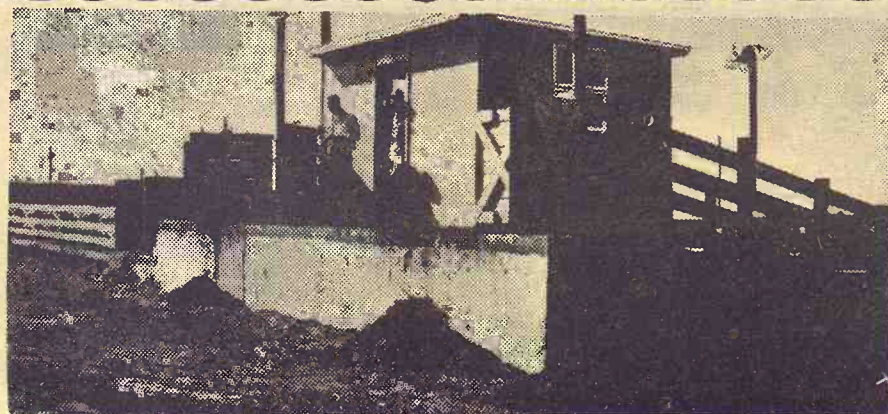
