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












I. General Plan

Each of the seven FFA districts may enter a maximum of five contestants from their six-to-eight-minute division in the State FFA Public Speaking Contest. Where there are less than 15 entries in the district six-to-eight-minute division, then one third, or major fraction thereof, of the contestants are eligible to enter State competition. This policy insures that contestants in the State Speech Contest will have placed in the upper one third of their district contest. The following table is presented to clarify the above policy.

- F. Three typewritten copies of the speech entered in the State contest will be required. Manuscripts must be in the hands of Larry Erpelding, Holton Hall, Kansas State University, Manhattan, Kansas, by Friday, April 10. One original and two carbons will be acceptable. Please be certain that good carbon paper is used in order that the copies can be easily read.
- G. Contestants may choose any current subject for their speeches which is of an agricultural character (nature), and which is of general interest to the public. Official judges of any FFA Speech Contest shall disqualify a contestant if he speaks on a nonagricultural subject.

H. The State FFA Speech Contest winner will represent the Kansas FFA in the Central Regional Speech Contest held at 8:00 a.m. in the Little Theatre of the Municipal Auditorium, Kansas City, Missouri, on Tuesday of the week of the National FFA Convention.

II. Eligibility

- A. When selected to compete in the State FFA Speech Contest, contestants must be active members of FFA chapters that are in good standing with the Kansas Association of FFA and the National FFA Organization.
- B. The State Speech Contest will be open only to boys less than 21 years of age who are regularly enrolled in all-day high school classes of vocational agriculture during the current calendar year, or who are still in high school, but have completed all the vocational agriculture offered.
- C. Each contestant's manuscript will be the result of his own effort. It is expected that he will take advantage of all available training facilities in his local school in developing his speaking ability.

- 2. Deductions of 20 points per minute or major fraction thereof will be made from the score of each judge for a speech under six minutes or over eight minutes in length. This would mean that an individual should have points deducted if his speech ranged from 5 minutes, 31 seconds, to 8 minutes, 29 seconds.

- 2. Speech contestants who plan to participate in either the Agricultural Judging or Farm Mechanics Contest on Monday of the State Contests must obtain permission to compete in the speech contest from Larry Erpelding, KSU Ag. Ed. Office, at the time copies of the speech are submitted for judging.

1. All candidates in the FFA Public Speaking Contest should give credit to others where any direct quotes, phrases, or special dates are used in the manuscript in order not to be guilty of plagiarism.

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

Governor Robert Docking officially declared February 21 - 28 State FFA Week in Kansas. DISTRICT ACHIEVEMENT BANQUETS

FFA Week is traditionally celebrated beginning the Saturday before George Washington's birthday and ending the following Saturday. George Washington made significant contributions to American agriculture in addition to his military and patriotic contributions. The FFA recognizes him in their ceremonies and especially during FFA Week. The Kansas Association of FFA consists of approximately 7,000 members in 164 vocational agriculture departments. national organization consists of 450,000 students in 9,000 public schools. strength of the organization lies in the principles on which the organization operates.

STATE FFA GOOD WILL TOUR

The Good Will Tour on a national level started in 1947. For some reason there was not a national tour in 1948. Since 1949 the Good Will Tour has been an annual activity. Twenty-three Good Will Tours have been held by national officers including 1970. The 1970 National FFA Officer Good Will Tour will visit Kansas City February 9, 10, and 11. President Lauren Libby will join the national officers for this tour.

Kansas FFA State officers held their first one-day Good Will Tour on February 17, 1964. In 1965 the one-day tour was extended to three days at the request of the State officers. The three-day annual tour has continued each year. This was the

seventh annual State FFA officers Good Will Tour, which was used to become better acquainted with business and industry across the State and nation. The tour also provides opportunity for both State and national officers to meet and exchange views with leaders of our State and nation.

More important, however, the Good Will Tour enables officers to say a personal "thank you" to many donors and sponsors of FFA activities and awards. With the support of these distinguished friends, many FFA members have reached high goals in their FFA career.

The National FFA officers for the first time this year endeavored to visit more friends of the FFA by dividing the national officers into two groups. The 1968-69 State FFA officers suggested that Kansas adopt the plan of the national officers by dividing into two groups, so this year the officers were divided and some of the district officers attended the tour also. District officers making the tour were Jay Montgomery, northeast district president, Sabetha; John Womack, southeast district president, Iola; Merrill Crawford, east central district president, Seaman; Doug Deets, south central district president, Arkansas City; Tom Herbers, south central district secretary, Winfield; Rod Rahn, south central district treasurer, Arkansas City; Bob Schrag, south central district vice president, Moundridge; and Steve Lefever, south central district sentinel, Peabody.
