## 11% Less Wheat Acres Planted

This fall 9,583,000 acres of winter wheat were seeded in Kansas for harvest in 1970, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Seeder acreage was down 11 percent from a year ago and the smallest since 1957. Acreage declines from a year ago were general over the state, accompanying decreased acreage allotments, but were sharpest in eastern districts.

The 1970 wheat crop is forecast at 240 million bushels, 21 percent smaller than the 1969 near-record crop but 5 percent more than the 1959-68 average of 229 million bushels.

The 1970 production forecast represents a prospective yield of 25 bushels per seeded acre, 3.4 bushels below 1969 but 4.6 bushels above 1968.

The production forecast is based on conditions of the growing crop as of December 1, currently available moisture supplies, and assumes that weather and other factors between that date and harvest time will be normal.

Seeding of the 1970 wheat crop started slowly this fall, but with ample soil moisture available

progressed rapidly in late September and October. Most planting was completed by the end of October although wet fields delayed some plantings in eastern areas. Considerable replanting was necessary in some southwestern and south central areas because of army worm damage.

Plant emergence and stands were mostly good to excellent, although heavy rains caused local washouts in a few areas. Top growth was slowed by cool fall weather in later seeding areas and reseeded fields. Condition of wheat on December 1 was the best in four years, being exceptionally good in west central and northwest Kansas.

However, condition was only fairly good in a half-dozen southeastern counties where seeding was delayed by wet fields and in some southwestern counties where insect damage made re-seeding necessary.

### Rye

Kansas farmers seeded 220,000 acres of winter rye for all purposes this fall. Seedlings were 30 percent greater than a year earlier and largest in four years but only about two-thirds the acre-

age planted in the early 1960s.

Rye seeding got off to a good start in September and progressed rapidly over the state. Adequate moisture favored early seeding in western and central areas but wet fields slowed planting in the southeast and some east central areas.

Stands were good but cool weather slowed growth in October. Condition of rye on December 1 was 4 points above a year earlier and equaled the best for the date since 1961.

### United States

The nation's 1970 winter wheat crop was seeded on 38.3 million acres compared with 43.1 million acres a year earlier and a range from 39.0 to 54.3 million acres during the preceding decade.

The U.S. winter wheat production in 1970 is forecast at 1030 million bushels on the basis of December 1 conditions. The forecast, if realized, will be 10 percent below the 1969 crop and 17 percent below 1968. Rye seedlings for the United States this fall totaled 4435 thousand acres compared with 4070 thousand acres a year earlier.

## Here's Resume Of Record Crop Year

Production of all crops in Kansas in 1969 was the best in records dating back more than 4 decades, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The 1969 index of all crop production was 169 percent of the 1947-47 average compared with 145 percent in 1968.

The previous record was 160 percent set in 1960. Record large sorghum grain, sugar beet and popcorn crops in 1969, the second largest wheat crop and the third largest soybean and hay crops helped to boost this year's total crop production.

Production was above a year ago for all major grain crops except oats and soybeans. Crop production was stimulated by well above normal precipitation during the growing season in all but northwest Kansas.

Excessive rains made harvesting difficult at times, damaged considerable hay, and made weeds a problem in many row crop fields. Insect and freeze damage to crops was much less than in some recent years. The total value of crops produced in 1969 was \$899 million compared with \$794 million in 1968.

Record high yields per acre were set for several crops in 1969. The 31 bushel average wheat yield, 56 bushel sorghum grain, 19 bushel rye, and 3400 lb. popcorn yields were all new records. Yields per acre of barley and hay equaled the previous records while the oat yield has been exceeded in only one year.

Acreage Harvested Harvested acreage of all crops in 1969 was 19 million acres, about 1 percent less than last year and was the second lowest in 3 decades. Sorghum acreage harvested was down 8% from last year while soybeans and oats were each down 11 percent.

Hay acreage declined 1% from 1968. Favorable weather during pol-

ination and good late summer moisture resulted in exceptional yields of most fall harvested crops. The major portion of the fall crops reached maturity before killing frosts were received. Corn harvest generally made good progress, while combining of sorghums and soybeans moved slowly but was virtually completed by mid-December.

Wheat Production Kansas wheat production in 1969 was 305,319,000 bushels, the second largest crop of record. This year's crop was 20 percent larger than in 1968, and was exceeded only by the record crop of 1952.

Wheat was seeded on 10,767,000 acres, 10 percent less than a year earlier. However, due to less abandonment, acreage harvested totaled 9,849,000, 1 percent above 1968. Yield per harvested acre in 1969 averaged 31 bushels, 5 bushels above 1968 and 2.5 bushels above the previous high set in 1958 and 1960.

Wheat seeding in the fall of 1968 got off to a slow start but moved ahead rapidly and was virtually completed by the last of October. Stands were generally good except in a few extreme western counties where lack of moisture slowed development and in the southeast areas where excessive moisture created problems.

Winter freeze and insects did not cause as widespread damage as in some recent years. Moisture was generally abundant during the spring and favorable weather during filling produced

## Corn Under Loan To Be Needed

The corn market has performed about as expected so far this season. During recent weeks, prices have been near year-before levels. They seem likely to continue near 1969 levels — 5 to 15 cents above the price-support loan rate.

The supply of "free" corn (that is not under price support) appears to be a little short of the

needs for this marketing year. Furthermore, farmers are putting some of their new corn under loans, thus further reducing the "free" supply. Hence, the question: "How will the corn required to meet market needs be obtained from stocks under price support?"

Supply and needs. Let us review the basic figures. The total

supply of corn available for this marketing year (beginning October 1) has been estimated at approximately 5.6 billion bushels. Of this amount, 736 million bushels of old corn was reported under price support, leaving a "free" supply of about 4.8 billion bushels, which is being further reduced as farmers place some of their new corn under loans. Some 200 to 300 million bushels may be placed under loan, leaving 4.5 to 4.6 billion bushels in the "free" supply.

The total need for this marketing year may be around 4.9 billion bushels. The expected need includes nearly 4 billion bushels for domestic use, 600 million for exports, and 300 million for working stocks at the end of the season. Therefore, needs may exceed the "free" supply by 300 to 400 million bushels.

**Meeting the deficit.** The deficit of "free" corn will be made up from three principal sources: (1) Farmers will redeem and sell some of the 1969 corn they are now placing under loan. (2) They will redeem and sell some of the corn from previous crops now being held under resale loans. (3) The Government (CCC) will sell some corn that it now owns, and some that it will obtain by calling resale loans.

**New corn to be redeemed.** Last year, farmers redeemed and sold about 264 million bushels of 1968-crop corn, about two-thirds of the total placed under loan. Most of the remainder, some 120 million bushels, was resold. Only 10 million bushels were delivered to the CCC. The large redemption occurred with market prices 10 to 15 cents above the price-support loan rate. Similar develop-

ments will probably occur this year.

**Old corn may be redeemed.** Farmers held about 440 million bushels of old corn under resale loans on October 1. This amount included grain from five different crops — dating back to 1964. Farmers can sell some of this corn at a few cents profit when prices reach \$1.20 a bushel in central Illinois. Most of it could be sold profitably at \$1.30.

**CCC sales of corn.** The CCC owned about 295 million bushels of corn on October 1. Additional corn probably will be obtained by calling resale loans on the older corn now held by farmers. The CCC will sell some corn — that declared to be in unsuitable condition for further storage.

Large sales of other corn will probably be made if prices rise sharply. In December, the CCC offered to sell corn at \$1.36. This was for corn in storage in central Illinois, and was for the redemption of Domestic Payment-in-Kind Certificates.

A cake recipe was sent by Mrs. Freida Donaldson, Oak Hill, who wins the prize.

#### APPLE AND NUT CAKE

- 1/4 cup shortening
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1 egg
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup nutmeats
- 2 cups apples, peeled and chopped fine
- 1 cup raisins (optional)

Cream shortening and sugar, beat in egg. Sift together all dry ingredients and add to creamed mixture. Stir in apples, nutmeats and raisins gradually. Spread mixture in buttered and floured 8x8x2-inch pan and bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes. Cool slightly and eat as it is or top with whipped cream or cool thoroughly and frost with a butter cream frosting.

#### CHOCOLATE FUDGE COOKIES

- 1 1/2 packages (6 oz.) chocolate bits
- 2 tablespoons shortening or butter

Melt this in a double boiler. Pour one (15 ounce can of Eagle Brand milk in a bowl, then add the above mixture and stir. Then add:

- 1 cup flour,
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup nuts

Drop by teaspoon on cookie sheet and bake eight minutes in 350 degree oven. (Do not overbake.)

The recipe below was submitted by Mrs. Harvey Pfizenmaier, Green:

#### DATE BARS

- 3 well-beaten eggs
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup flour
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 1/2 cups pitted, chopped dates
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Beat eggs with sugar until very

thick. Add sifted dry ingredients; Beat smooth. Add dates, vanilla, and nuts. Bake in waxed-paper lined 9x13-inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for about 30 minutes. While warm, cut in 1x4-inch bars; roll in confectioners' sugar. Makes two dozen.

The next recipe was sent by Mrs. Everette Morrison, Osborne:

#### MILE-HIGH STRAWBERRY PIE

- 1 small box frozen strawberries, thawed
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 3/4 cup white sugar
- 2 egg whites
- 1/4 teaspoon salt

Place these ingredients in a large mixer bowl and beat for 15 minutes. (Don't underbeat) Fold in 1/2 cup cream whipped with 1 teaspoon vanilla. Place on a vanilla wafer crust in a 9x9x2-inch baking dish. Top with more wafer crumbs. Place in freezer immediately.

This recipe is from Mrs. Raymond Latzke, Huron:

#### VEGETABLE & MEAT CASSEROLE

- 1 pound hamburger
- 1 onion chopped
- 3/4 teaspoon salt
- dash pepper
- 1 can green beans (drained)
- 1 can tomato soup
- 5 potatoes, cooked
- 1/2 cup warm milk
- 1 beaten egg

Lightly brown meat, add onion till tender. Add seasonings, beans and soup. Pour into greased casserole. Mash hot potatoes; add milk and egg. Season. Drop in mound over meat. (If desired sprinkle with 1/2 cup shredded cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes.

Mix and place in tube cake pan and heat in oven while mixing the cake. Prepare any 1 pound, 1 ounce orange cake mix as directed on the package. Place over mincemeat mixture in tube pan and bake at 375 degrees for about 25 minutes. Let stand a few minutes and turn out. Best served

warm with whipped cream.

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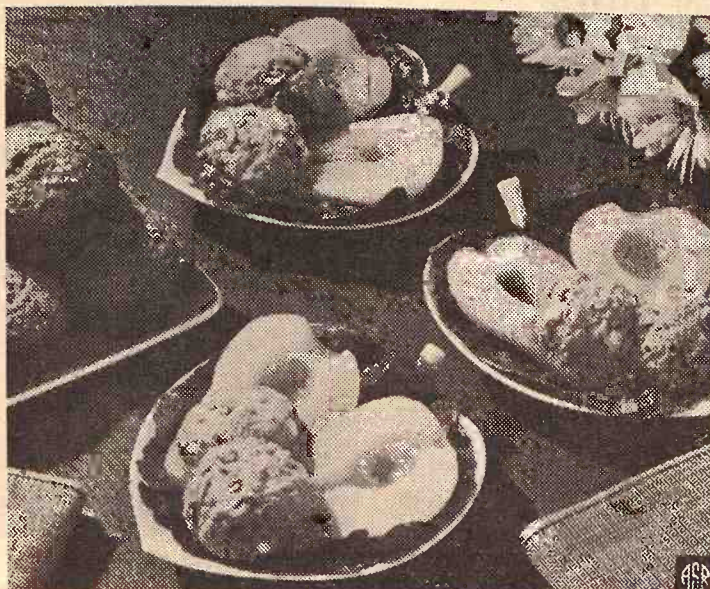

## Frosty Pear Salad Can Play Dual Role



Here's a refreshing new idea to brighten mid-winter menus. It's a frosty dessert salad featuring canned Bartlett pears. Perfect for a luncheon or bridge party, this luscious pear combination is as much a dessert as it is a salad.

Pear halves are topped with a frozen mint-flavored cream. The mint frost may be prepared a day in advance and spooned over the pear halves at serving time.

Accompany this salad with bran muffins and let it play the dual role of dessert and salad.

**MINT-FROSTED PEAR SALAD**  
1 1 pound 13 ounce) can Bartlett pear halves  
1 1/2 teaspoons unflavored gelatin  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1/4 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 cup miniature marshmallows

1/4 cup chopped nuts  
1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped  
1/4 teaspoon mint flavoring  
Drain pears, reserving syrup. Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup pear syrup. Heat until dissolved. Cool. Add lemon juice and mayonnaise. Fold in remaining ingredients. Pour into freezer tray. Freeze until firm. To serve, arrange pear halves on lettuce-lined plates. Top with scoops of frozen mint mixture. Makes four to five servings.

### Checkpoints For Choosing Hairbrush

Women spend more money on hairbrushes each year than they do on such glamor items as nail polish or perfume.

The best type brush to choose depends essentially on the type of hair. But whatever type it is, remember these two checkpoints:

- The rows of bristles should be spaced so they glide through the hair smoothly without tangling.

- Gentle is the word in brushing so that the scalp doesn't become irritated.

For thick or long hair, the half-round style brush works best. It flares widely to allow maximum space between the rows of bristles, enabling the brush to penetrate the hair mass and gather larger sections with each stroke.

For short hair or hair that lacks body or is only medium thick, the professional-style brush is the one to choose. It has only a slight flare and is very slim and compactly constructed, with longer rows of bristles.

### Foil Saves Spills In Oven

If a fresh fruit pie looks as though it might run over in the oven, place a piece of aluminum foil on a shelf well below the one holding the pie.

Cut the foil about an inch larger all around than the pie pan and turn up the edges of the foil. The foil will catch the drips without interfering with the browning of the crust.

### Protect Garbage Can With Paint

For a longer lasting garbage can, give it a coat of paint. First scrub the can, then prime the metal inside and out with zinc-dust paint. Cover the can, inside and out, with two coats of exterior enamel in one of your favorite colors. This brightens the can and makes it more enduring.

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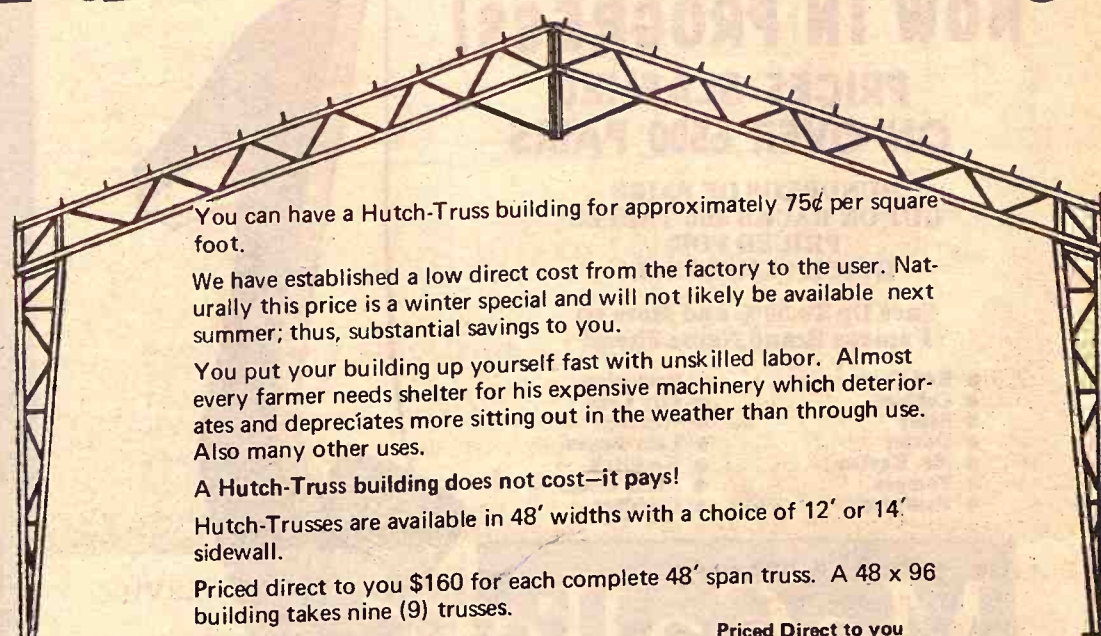


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## Quick Tricks To Aid In Wall-Painting Project

When planning a painting project keep these quick tricks in mind so that you may undertake the project with confidence and have the pleasure of a newly painted room quickly and effortlessly.

First, check the walls and if they are fairly clean merely dust them off. However, if dust, grease or soap film has accumulated, as in a bathroom or kitchen, the walls should be washed down with a sudsy solution of detergent and warm water. Rinse the walls with clear water and let dry.

For cracks and holes, use spackling compound as a filler. Simply apply the compound with a knife and let it dry, then sand it down smooth with the surface.

For best results, paint your room in this order: Ceiling first, walls second, trim last.

Painting ceilings is a snap if

you use a long-handled roller. Or if you prefer, place a wide, 1½-inch thick plank on the treads of two solidly footed open step-ladders. This will allow you to paint without the bother of having to run up and down ladders.

For the fine "edge between the ceiling and walls, follow the pros with this "fool-the-eye" trick. Just draw the line free-hand with a small brush. You may find this a quicker, more satisfying way of getting the illusion of an even edge.

When using a roller, line the tray with aluminum foil to save yourself a cleanup later on. Foil also makes a good protector for your brushes when they are clean, dry and ready to be stored again.

## Seek Lower Wheat Freight Rates To Coast

Several leaders of the Kansas milling industry met in Washington, D.C., last week with members of the Kansas congressional delegation to discuss unfavorable rail freight rates on wheat and flour.

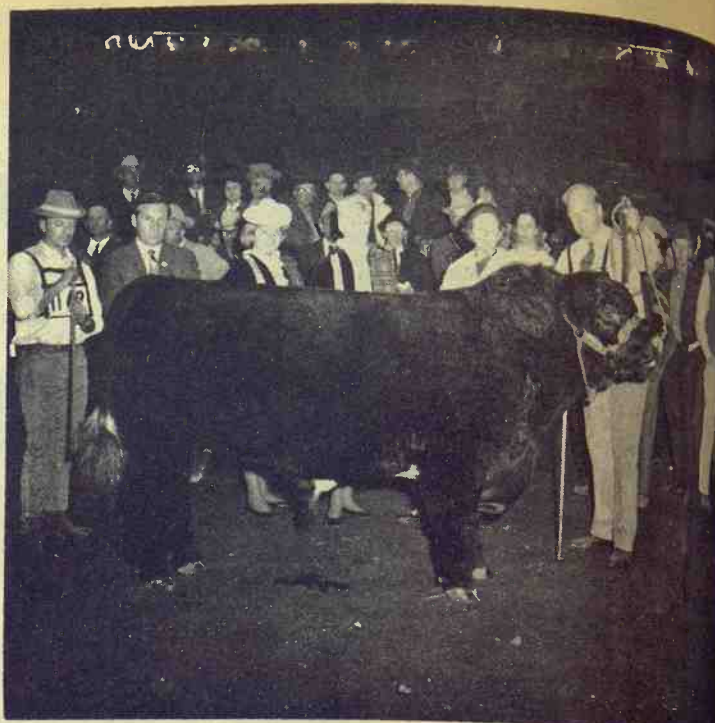
Members of the milling industry and wheat growers have voiced growing concern over the rate structure, particularly to the West Coast. They say the structure makes it impossible for Kansas milled products to be priced competitively with flour milled outside the state.

Interstate Commerce Commission recently approved a request of the Santa Fe Railroad for reduced freight rates on wheat and flour to West Coast points.

This was followed by a court case challenging the ICC decision, and the reduced rate was rescinded. In the meantime Santa Fe has filed a petition with the ICC for reconsideration.

Sen. Bob Dole, in whose office the meeting was held, said he feels the next step in this continuing problem is to present the matter and its urgency to the White House, either directly to President Nixon or a member of his advisory staff.

During the past 10 years there have been several mill closings



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in Kansas because of the competitive differences that evolve from rate differentials on milled and unmilled grains.

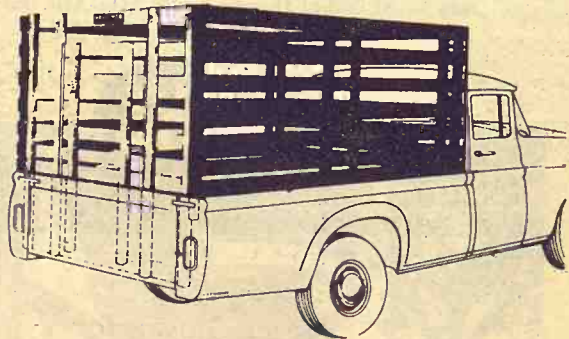

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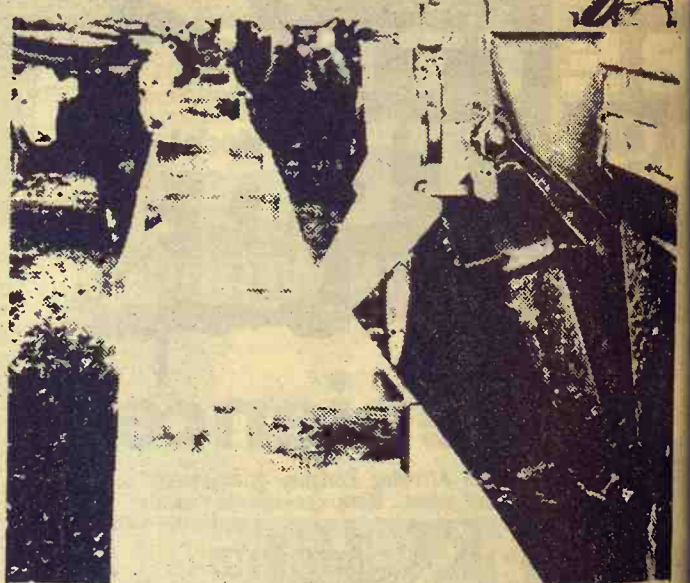
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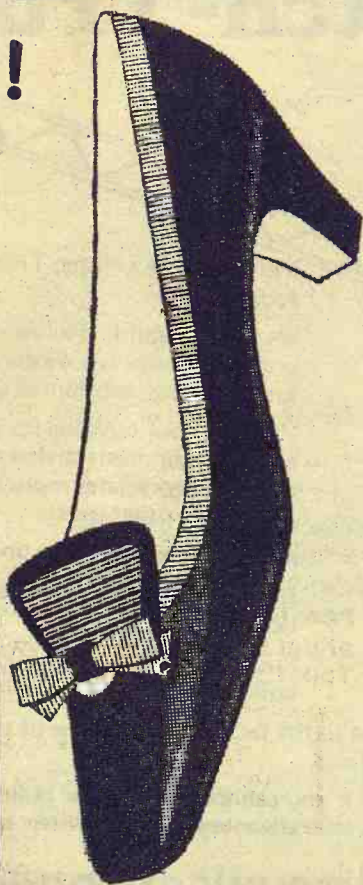

Exceptionally good wheat yields. Harvest was slowed considerably in many areas by wet fields but was virtually completed by the third week of July. Weight per bushel of the 1969 crop was a record 61.2 pounds, production average 61.2 pounds, production content of this year's crop was a below-average 10.9 percent and dockage and grade deductions were not excessive. Leading varieties seeded for 1969 crop were Scout, Tri-State, Bison, Kaw and Wichita.

### Sorghum Production

The 1969 sorghum grain production totaled 182,896,000 bushels, the largest crop of record. This year's crop exceeded last year's production by nearly 20 million bushels and the previous high in 1960 by 15 million bushels.

Yield per acre averaged 56 bushels, also a new record high. This was 9 bushels above last year and 7 bushels above the previous record set in 1966.

Acreage harvested for grain totaled 3,266,000 acres, 6 percent below 1968. Acreage planted for all purposes, including grain, silage and forage, totaled 4,066,000 acres, 9 percent below a year

earlier.

Sorghum silage was harvested from 269,000 acres and yielded a record high 12.5 tons per acre but total production of 3,362,000 tons was the smallest since 1956.

Sorghum forage was harvested from 462,000 acres with a yield of 3.5 tons per acre. Production of forage totaled 1,617,000 tons, 36 percent above 1968 and the largest since 1957.

Sorghum plantings progressed slowly early in the season as wet fields hampered planting operations. As fields dried out during late May and early June, momentum picked up rapidly and most of the state's acreage was seeded by July 1.

Greenbug infestations damaged rep'anting but widespread spraying of the early seedlings sufficiently to cause considerable ing kept later outbreaks under fairly good control. Most areas had adequate moisture during the growing season with only a few scattered areas suffering from hot, dry weather during July and August.

Ripening of the crop was slowed by cool weather but the bulk of the state's acreage was mature before a killing frost hit. Harvest was delayed by wet fields with progress running about a week behind normal until after mid-November. Some lodging occurred, but harvest moved along well in late November and only scattered fields remained unharvested by December 1.

### Corn Production

Production of corn grain in 1969 totaled 91,464,000 bushels, topping 1968 by 8 percent and the largest crop in a quarter cen-

tury. The yield per acre was 74 bushels, 1 bushel below the 1968 record high.

Grain was harvested from 1,236,000 acres, 9 percent above a year earlier and the largest since 1963. Corn silage was harvested from 252,000 acres with an average yield of 13.0 tons per acre for a production of 3,276,000 tons, 3 percent below last year.

Corn planting was delayed early by wet weather, but moved ahead rapidly and was virtually complete by mid-June. Stands were exceptionally good in early planted fields while some later planted fields suffered from excessive rains and standing water. Insects caused some damage but losses were generally light.

Summer rains hampered cultivation and some fields became extremely weedy. Moisture was generally adequate throughout the growing season and most of the crop reached full maturity before killing frosts occurred. Harvest made good progress during October in spite of wet fields and dry weather in November permitted virtual completion except for scattered late fields.

### Other

Soybean production in Kansas in 1969 was 19,596,000 bushels, some 18 percent below last year. Acreage harvested totaled 852,

000, a decrease of 11 percent from 1968. Yield per acre was 23 bushels, the second highest of record but 2 bushels below last year. Crop development was especially good on early planted fields but cool weather slowed growth on late plantings.

The barley crop totaled 6,105,000 bushels, up 65 percent from last year. Yield per acre, at 37 bushels, equaled last year's record high.

Oat production in 1969 totaled

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6,080,000 bushels, down 11 percent from the previous year. Yield per acre averaged 38 bushels, equaling the best since 1883. Rye production totaled 1,121,000 bushels, more than double last year's and the largest crop since 1964. The average yield of 19 bushels per acre was 3.5 bushels above 1968 and a new record high for the state.

#### Hay Production

All hay production on Kansas farms totaled 5,112,000 tons, up 8 percent from 1968 and the third largest crop on record. Hay was cut from 2,387,000 acres in 1969 and yielded an average of 2.14 tons per acre which equals the 1967 record. Alfalfa hay accounted for 64 percent of the State's total hay production, wild hay contributed 18 percent and all other hays accounted for 18 percent.

#### Other Crops

Kansas' sugar beet production was a record high 850,000 tons, 42 percent above last year's previous record crop. Beets were harvested from 48,300 acres topping last year's acreage by 24

percent. Yields averaged 17.6 tons per acre, the State's second best.

Dry beans were harvested from 20,000 acres, a sizeable increase from 1968, but yield per acre was low and production was 170,000 cwt., unchanged from last year.

Popcorn production totaled 23,120,000 pounds, nearly double last year and a new record high.

Irish potato production totaled 108,000 cwt., 13 percent below 1968 and the smallest crop of record.

Alfalfa seed production totaled 5,130,000 pounds, 28 percent above 1968. Production of red clover seed was 675,000 pounds, a little below last year, while sweetclover seed production, at 980,000 pounds, was slightly above 1968.

Production of apples totaled 14.4 million pounds, 10 percent below last year's large crop.

Peach production amounted to 9.5 million pounds, sharply above last year and the largest crop since 1935.

## Catches Fish Off A Stringer

MANHATTAN — If awards were made for the top fish story of the year, 17-year-old Mike Brockman of Manhattan would be a leading contender for 1969.

He's telling this gem:

Fishing for crappie at Tuttle Creek Reservoir, near his home, he was having fair success.

He had put about 10 fish on his stringer, when he noticed it was being pulled into deep water from the shoreline where he was fishing and had it anchored.

Mike waded into the water but couldn't retrieve the fast-moving stringer. Alertly, he cast to the spot and snagged it on his line and reeled it in.

He rescued more than the 10 crappie. A nine-pound northern pike had tried to swallow one of the crappie on the end of the stringer, and couldn't disgorge it.

Mike's grandfather, Lloyd Johnson of Manhattan, and several other anglers witnessed the event.

## Kansas Cholera Program Appears To Be Working

Kansas is tightening the reins in an all-out drive to stamp out hog cholera, according to Dr. Ray Pyles, Wichita, chief state veterinarian.

No cases of the disease have been reported since June, when six cases were reported as a result of bringing in feeder pigs from Missouri, Dr. Pyle said.

Since that time, feeder pigs have not been permitted to come from Missouri or Oklahoma unless they have been vaccinated three weeks in advance and inspected twice before crossing the line, Dr. Pyle said.

So-called "junk pigs" that move from one sales ring to another are not permitted in the state, according to Dr. L. S. Poley of the Animal Health Division of the Department of Agriculture. Dr. Poley is supervising veterinarian for the Wichita Union Stockyards.

Many hogs are shipped into Kansas for immediate processing, but these are not permitted in any of the terminal stockyards, Dr. Poley said.

Three years ago, USDA undertook a program to stamp out the disease on a nationwide basis.

A new non-virulent vaccine has greatly reduced the frequency of the disease, Dr. Poley said.

A four-phase program has been undertaken including preparation, reduction of incidence, elimination of outbreak and protection against re-infection.

At present, Kansas is in third stage of the program fight to eliminate the incidence.

Dr. Poley said research has shown cholera is caused mainly by movement of infected hogs who carry the virus in their bloodstreams.

"We must keep visitors away from hog lots as the disease sometimes transmitted by coming it on shoes," he said.

Another cause is being eliminated by cooking raw garbage, sometimes the carrier of the disease, when used as hog feed.

Kansas is in good shape in hog cholera program, Dr. Poley said, but vigilance must be maintained. "We've nothing to worry about if we are careful."

"If any farmer suspects that his hogs might have the disease he should notify his veterinarian immediately and steps will be taken," Dr. Poley urged.

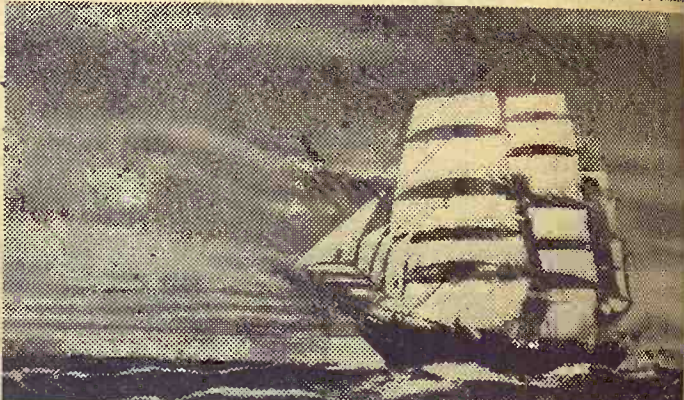

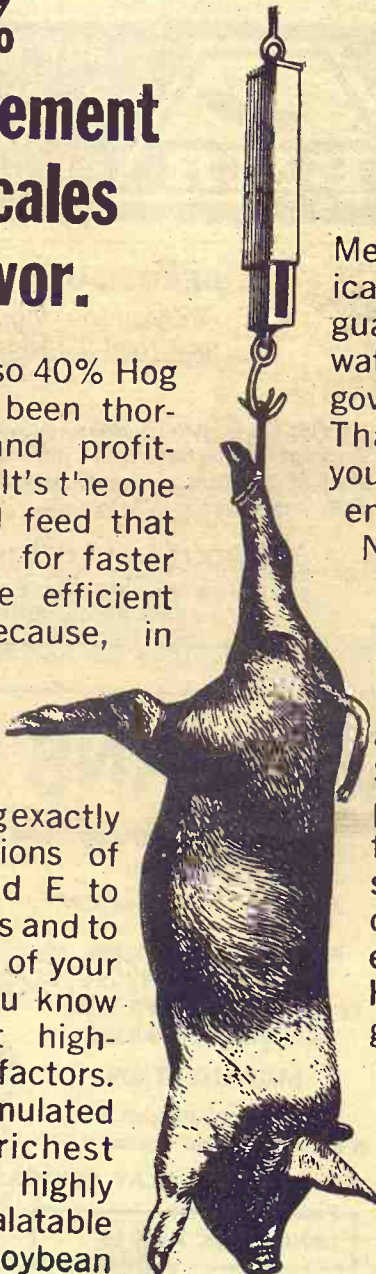

## United States

## Europe Agrees On Farm Plan

European Common Market ministers have agreed on a plan for financing farm price supports into the 1970's, clearing a way for negotiations on Britain's entry.

The agreement came in a marathon negotiating session that kept European Economic Community ministers in almost constant session for a week.

The Common Market summit meeting December 2 at The Hague made preparations for starting negotiations with Britain and three other candidates. That was dependent on a farm settlement, which was demanded by France.

Britain long has sought membership in the economic community, but for years the way was blocked by President Charles de Gaulle of France.

The new French president, Georges Pompidou, however, has taken a favorable attitude toward expanding Common Market membership.

Prospects for Britain's entry were improved further when it reported a 513 million dollar trade surplus for the first nine months of this year.

Ireland, Denmark and Norway also are seeking admission to the community composed of France, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, the Netherlands and Luxembourg.

The basic arrangement hammered out after long hours of bargaining included these provisions:

• In 1970 the six Common Market members would pay a direct contribution from their national treasuries to the 3 billion dollar Common Market fund, about 90 percent of which goes for agriculture.

• From then until 1975 the fund would be increasingly fed by revenues from levies on farm products imported from outside the community and from tariffs on industrial imports. Direct contributions from national treasuries would play a diminishing role.

• After 1975 all levies and industrial tariffs would go into the Common Market fund. At some point a share of each country's sales tax collections would become a part of the community's financial resources, replacing the direct contributions from the national treasuries.

## Four Alternate Plans For Payment Limits

Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of Agriculture, says a limitation on the size of government payments to individual farmers is "primarily a congressional concern."

Hardin told a news conference he has submitted four possible limitation plans to Congress for consideration but did not elaborate on what they included.

Asked if a flat \$20,000 limitation, a ceiling twice approved by the House but rejected by the Senate, could be included in a sound farm program, Hardin said it was possible.

But, he added, such a ceiling would force some of the largest farms from production-control programs and acreage cuts

would have to be adjusted among smaller producers remaining in the programs.

Hardin evaded questions on how new farm legislation is developing. He said that in the case of wheat no decisions have been made on the levels of government price support loans or direct payment rates.

At present wheat producers who cooperate in the control program are guaranteed a price support loan of \$1.25 a bushel national average.

In addition, they may receive direct payments on part of their production to boost the price to parity or full purchasing power in relation to their costs.

This year the payments were \$1.52 a bushel on about 43 percent of the wheat crop going into domestic trade channels.

The administration has indicated it favors a reduction in the basic support loan rate on the major crops so they can move more freely on the market and compete more readily in world trade.

Hardin said that while the wheat price support loan rates and payments had not been decided the thinking has been that "the same order of magnitude" would be maintained between the two price tags.

Though he would not elaborate, Hardin seemed to suggest that the parity concept for at least part of the nation's wheat production has not been scrapped.

Administration officials and congressional farm leaders have met privately many times since last spring in an attempt to develop new farm legislation ac-

ceptable on as many fronts as possible.

The current farm law, the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965, is due to expire at the end of next year.

### KP&L PROPERTY TAXES AT \$8 1/4 MILLION

The Kansas Power & Light Co. says its 1969 property tax bill in 63 counties totals \$8 1/4 million. KP&L says it is either the first or second largest taxpayer in most of the Kansas counties it serves. Counting \$10 million in federal income taxes and a half-million in state income tax, 24 cents of every dollar KP&L collects goes for taxes.

### Vote Could Close Two Salina Area Schools

**SALINA** — Patrons of the New Cambria and Verdi grade schools will vote Jan. 27 on proposals to close the schools.

New Cambria, in northeast Saline County, and Verdi, in southeast Ottawa County, are in Unified School District 393. Both schools serve students in grades 1 through 6. Older students attend Solomon junior high and high schools.

New Cambria has 15 students and two teachers. Patrons are paying off bonds issued 10 years ago to construct a three-classroom school with multipurpose room, office and restrooms.

The unified district's special education program, with seven students in grades 2 through 6, is housed in the New Cambria facility.

Verdi's current enrollment of nine students doesn't meet state standards which required an enrollment of 10 for accreditation. The one-room, one-teacher school is more than 20 years old.

Supt. Francis Stanley said the New Cambria building may be used for a cooperative regional special education program if a proposal now being developed is approved by the State Board of Education.

Six participating unified districts report 80 potential students in a speech therapy program and an additional 60 students would benefit from grade and secondary school programs for mentally retarded children.

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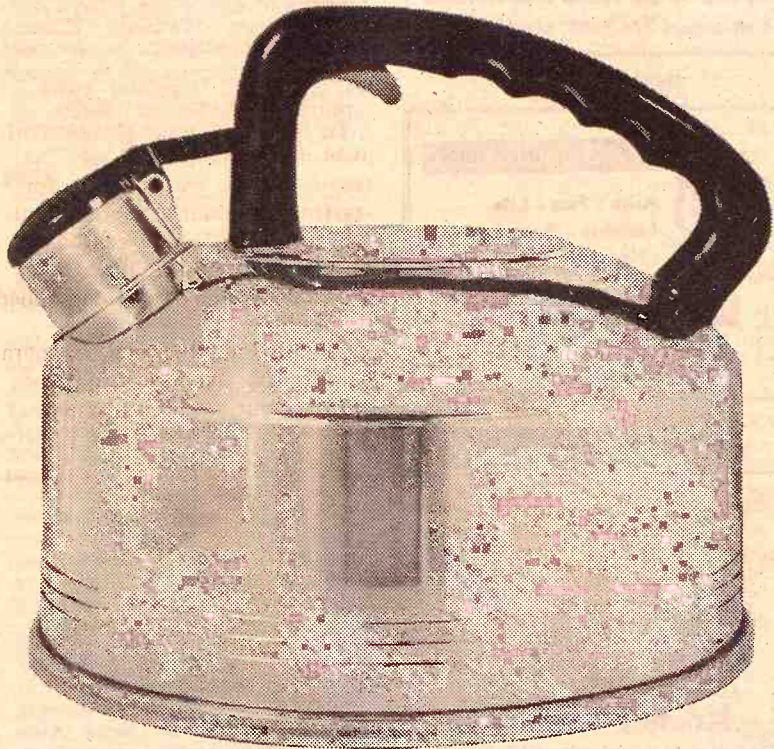

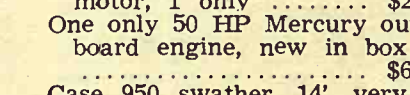

## Wheatgrowers Agree With Tax Protests

DODGE CITY — The president  
of the Kansas Association of  
Wheat Growers said yesterday  
that his organization is in sym-  
pathy with protest action taken  
recently by taxpayers associa-  
tions in the state.

"Many taxpayer association  
members also are members of  
KAWG, and had a hand in shap-  
ing our resolution calling for the  
1970 Kansas Legislature to make  
drastic changes in the Kansas  
tax system," said Donald E.  
Crane of Wright.

The wheat association leader  
said Kansas population is 14 per-  
cent rural but farmers pay 32  
percent of all state property tax-  
es.

"High property taxes are one  
of the forces driving farmers  
from their land, as well as dis-  
couraging industry from coming  
into Kansas," he said.

Crane said that farm values

have declined 30 percent since  
the reappraisal of real estate in  
Kansas.

"In the light of this, KAWG is  
asking for legislation to assess  
property taxes on the basis of  
the earning ability of all real es-  
tate in Kansas."

He listed other tax changes  
asked by KAWG:

- That 60 percent of the oper-  
ating cost of elementary and sec-  
ondary schools be raised from  
graduated income taxes.

- That the formula for distri-  
bution of state aid to elementary  
and secondary schools be revised  
to take into consideration higher  
costs of transportation and edu-  
cation in rural areas.

- That 25 percent of all sales  
tax receipts be returned to local  
tax units to reduce ad valorem  
taxes.

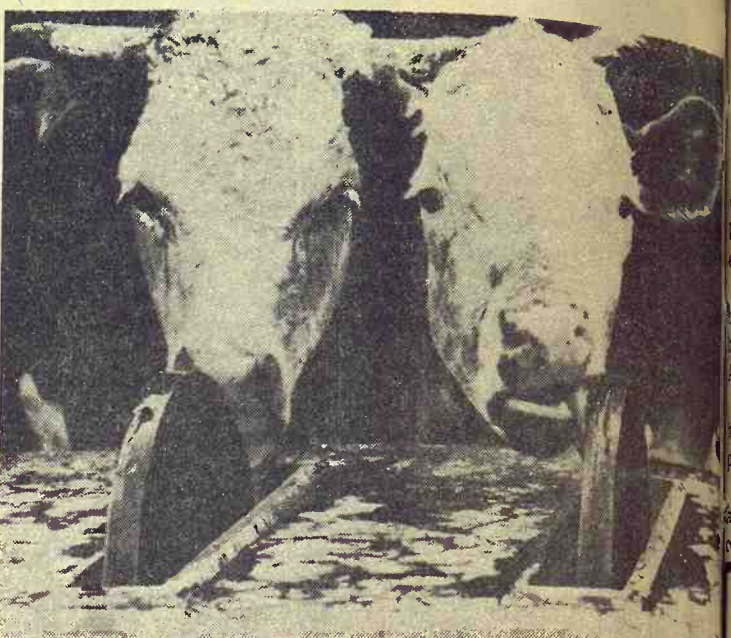

Dr. John F. Hudelson of Ottawa has been appointed the new Kansas livestock commissioner effective Feb. 1, 1970. The appointment was announced by Nelson H. Poe of Peabody, chairman of the Kansas Animal Health Board. Hudelson, a veterinarian, will head a new Animal Health Department. The department was created by an act of the 1969 Legislature to consolidate the offices of live-



stock sanitary commissioner and brand commissioner.

Docking contended the old law delegated to the association, a private organization, the governor's power to appoint.

A. G. Pickett, who has been livestock sanitary commissioner since 1949, will retire Jan. 31.

Poe also announced that Doyle J. Heft of Coldwater, livestock brand commissioner since May 1969, has been selected assistant commissioner in charge of brands.

## Redeeming More Wheat Loans

Redemptions of 1969 crop wheat loans during November

exceeded new entries, resulting in a net decrease of more than 4 million bushels in 1969 wheat outstanding under loan for the month.

Entries of the current year's

crop were 10.6 million bushels and redemptions amounted to 14.7 million bushels. This was the first month in the 1969 season that a net decrease had been registered in outstanding wheat loans.

Total impoundings of the 1969 crop stand at 346,964,052 making 24 percent of the crop under loan. Wheat prices in the high producing Kansas counties range in the lower \$1.20's.

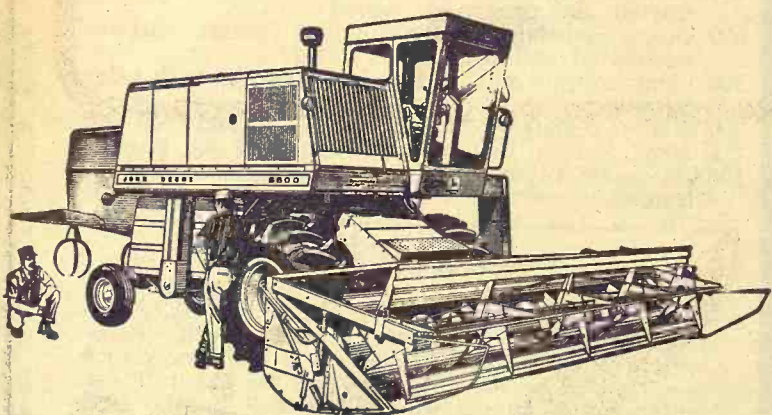

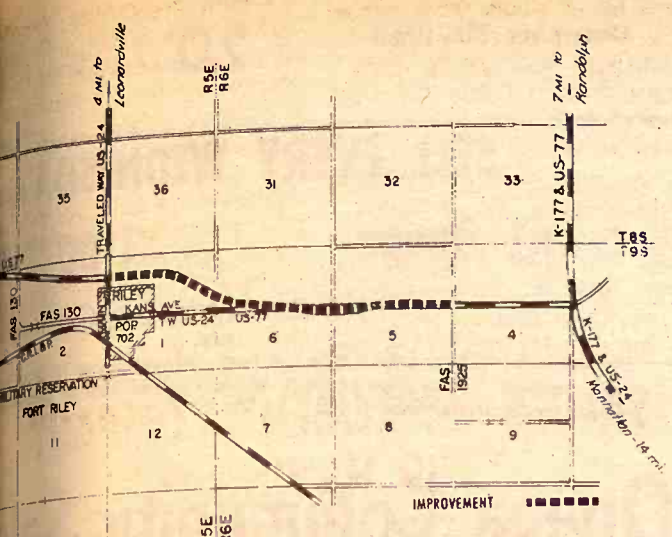

**PROPOSED RELOCATION OF US 77 NEAR RILEY**  
A relocation and design of US 77 around Riley has been proposed by the Kansas Highway Commission. A public hearing on the effects of the relocation will be held only if there are requests received by the Division Engineer at Topeka before January 19.  
The proposed project will begin just north of Riley and extend east 3 miles to junction with FAS 1925. The route would be partially on a new location. Tentative construction calls for two 12-foot asphalt surfaced lanes with 10-foot stabilized shoulders.  
No additional right of way will be required, altho additional partial access control would be acquired.

**Canadian Wheat Farmers Bootleg Grain For Cash**  
Western Canadian wheat farmers caught in a pinch between expenses and a surplus in granaries of the Canadian Wheat Board, have taken to bootlegging their grain across international borders.  
The wheat board, when it buys, pays \$1.80 a bushel. But some companies and cattle producers are willing to buy bootleg

grain illegally for as little as 85 cents a bushel.  
"Sure I'll sell my grain in Alberta," said one Saskatchewan farmer who declined to be identified. "I'll do anything to get money. If I can't sell my wheat, where's my money going to come from?"  
"There's been a lot of pressure on farmers this year," J. O. Wright, Saskatchewan Wheat Pool secretary acknowledged. "Farmers are looking for cash."  
Wright said that even most feed merchants and cattle producers would like to see the wheat board's price prevail. The

president of the Western Stock Growers Association, Dr. Gordon Burton of Claresholm, Alberta, agreed. In the long run, he said, lower prices for feed are not going to help the cattle industry because "everyone is going to try to get into cattle, and we can easily flood the market."

Stan Price, a wheat farmer from Acme, Alberta, said he had been offered 85 cents a bushel for grain the wheat board would not buy. He said his average production cost is 80 to 85 cents a bushel.

"It's happening because some farmers need cash and they'll unload their grain at any price," said Paul Babey, president of the Alberta Farmers Union.

In addition to bootlegging grain in other provinces, some farmers who can't get their local grain elevators to handle their crop sell it at cost or below to farmers in other areas who pass the wheat along to their own local elevators, saying it is their crop.

"The farmer can't sell his wheat legally, but he can't live unless he sells it," Babey said. "So he sells it illegally."  
"The only solution," said Wright, "is more wheat sales outside the country so the wheat board can buy the grain farmers can grow."

### Easier To Get Angling Awards

Here's cheering news for fishermen in Kansas.  
It is going to be easier in 1970 to become a Kansas Master Angler.  
The designation is established by the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission. To the categories provided this year, two more will be added in 1970 with a one-pound catch of either

smallmouth bass or the warmouth variety qualifying the fisherman for the master designation.

Also, weight standards in other categories have been revised downward in six species. The minimums in 1970 will be: Spotted Kentucky bass, revised from two to one pound; flathead catfish from 55 to 50 pounds; wall-

eye, from eight to six pounds; white bass, from four to three pounds; bluegill, from 1.5 to one pound.

Other species in the program getting the master angler award will be: largemouth black bass, seven pounds; channel catfish, 15 pounds; northern pike, 15 pounds; and bullhead catfish, 25 pounds.

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## Inclusion Of Woodbine Dam In Water Plan A Blow To Lyons Creek Group

TOPEKA — Inclusion of the proposed \$16 million Woodbine Dam and Reservoir in the official state water plan has been recommended by the Kansas Water Resources Board, Keith Krause, executive director and chief engineer, said.

Also recommended is relocation of Grove Reservoir at Topeka.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has recommended moving the Grove Dam from a site near Delia, Kans., nine miles downstream to a site below Soldier and Little Soldier Creeks.

The original Grove project was part of the water plan.

The board had refused to include the Corps' proposed Woodbine project in past water plans. Congress has required such approval before it will authorize planning funds.

"The board felt Woodbine is now a necessary part of the state plan," Krause said.

Woodbine would be built on Lyons Creek, 15 miles southwest of Junction City, near the Rock Springs State 4-H Center.

Lyons Creek Joint Watershed District 41 has waged a 10-year battle against state authorization of Woodbine.

"Approval of the project by the state Water Resources Board is a real disappointment," said President Hays B. Beck, Junction City. He promised to take the fight to the Legislature which must approve the plan.

The Watershed District's general work plan, calling for expenditure of \$2.1 million in federal funds for 22 watershed structures, is awaiting Congressional approval of funds.

The district will build 46 flood control structures at a cost of \$2.3 million.

Beck said one structure already has been built, and the district has received donated easements for two more.

The federal program is expected to be complete in eight years. The district's program will cover a span of 25 years.

Before recent changes in membership of the water resources board, the panel had taken the approach that the watershed district should be given an opportunity to develop its program before Woodbine is approved.

The district contends it can do the same job of flood control as the larger dam at less cost. It encompasses 180,000 acres in Geary, Dickinson, Morris and Marion counties.

## Feedlot Managing In Curriculum At Garden City

The Kansas Livestock Association and the Garden City Community Junior College have announced a new cooperative program of specialized education in

the field of feedlot management of the cattle feeding industry.

The new educational courses recently approved by the Board of the Garden City Community Junior College and the State Department of Education will include practical courses geared to the rapidly expanding cattle feeding industry which provides many dollars of income into the state's communities and substantially contributes to the overall No. 1 industry — the beef cattle industry. As of October 1, 1969, Kansas ranks fifth in the nation as a cattle feeding state with 745,000 head of cattle on feed for slaughter.

Young men interested in this specialized education will be enrolled and be admitted as regular students in the Garden City Community Junior College and their curriculum will include special courses and part time work in area feed yards for practical on-the-job training. The students will be paid for their employment at the feed yards.

It is planned that the new curriculum will be started on a restrictive basis the second semester of this academic year and a full program in this field of education will be implemented in the fall semester of 1970.

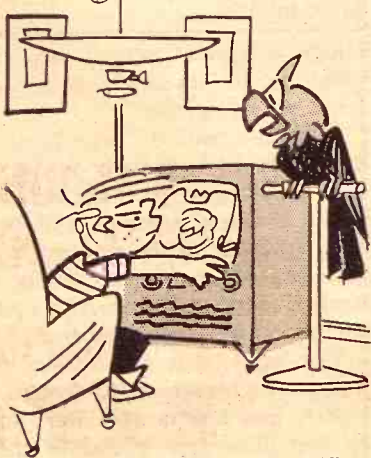

I don't like increased costs anymore than anyone else but I am anxious for the day to arrive where I'll be putting a price tag on my production. Start On Larger  
Co-op Fertilizer  
Plant At Lawrence

LAWRENCE — Construction of a new 1000-ton a day anhydrous ammonia plant here will increase the worth of the Cooperative Farm Chemicals Association at Lawrence to 60 million dollars, John F. Anderson, vice-

president and general manager, said.

Engineering work on the plant will start immediately and construction by M. W. Kellogg Company, New York, will get under way next spring.

Completion is scheduled for 1971 and startup of the new facilities is planned for September 1971, Anderson said.

The CFCA plant on K-10 east of Lawrence was built in 1954

with an original investment of 18 million dollars. It is rated among the top 10 businesses in Kansas from the standpoint of annual volume.

"In keeping with the policy of providing modern equipment, the single train, high heat recovery plant will replace the present ammonia plant," Anderson said.

It will be powered by three main steam turbines driving centrifugal compressors totaling 37,000 horsepower.

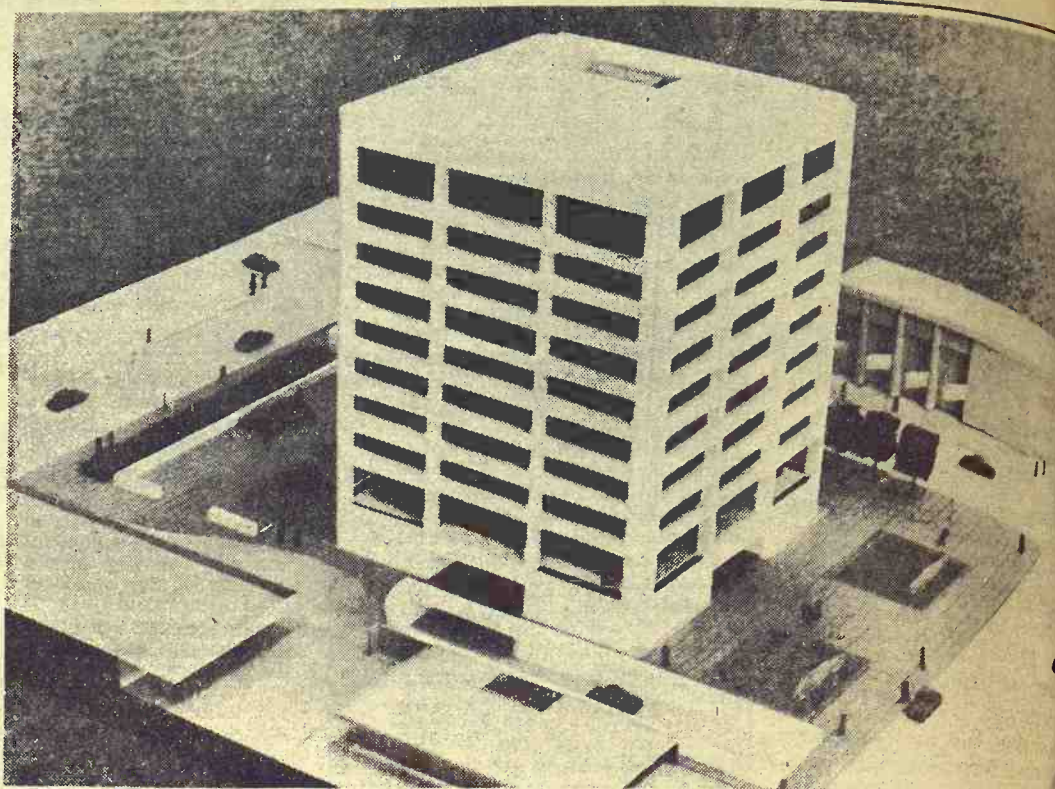

obtain a special permit when it plans to use its newly designed trucking equipment.

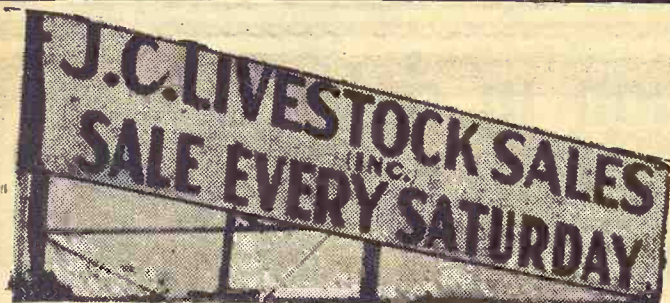

# Land Prices Leveling Off At Least In West

The price of farmland in Kansas and Oklahoma is leveling off for the first time in more than three decades.

A combination of economic factors has turned farm sales from "sellers' to a buyers' market" in the past several months in the opinion of most observers.

Downturns in prices of dryland wheat farms in the two-state area have been noted as continuing poor outlook for the food grain keeps buyers skeptical of larger investments.

Bill May, vice president of the Wichita Federal Land Bank, was optimistic for the 1970 decade, admitted that year-end figures probably will show a "leveling off" of prices in certain areas of the state.

May listed four factors that probably effect the trend in land prices:

A large number of estates have hit the market in the wheat areas in the past several months forming an almost "glut" on the demand.

High interest rates on borrowed money for land investment have caused some lower-bidder eagerness in high-price areas.

Outlook for wheat prices is generally inclining upward and a generally inclining in farming costs makes margins lower.

• A pattern of increasing taxes on farmland has occurred.

He added a fifth factor that might make some difference in farmland pricing — the returns on other investments have a greater net possibility in the short-term outlook.

May stressed the idea that future prospects are bright, not gloomy, and that the 1970's will bring further increase in land prices.

"The farm real estate market seems to have shifted in recent months from a sellers' market to a buyers' market with some softening of the sale prices in parts of the wheat belt," he said.

"This trend is not too apparent in the Flint Hills grassland areas and among diversified farms favorably located with respect to population centers and areas of good non-farm income," he added.

The combination of factors means that if a piece of land has no irrigation possibilities, is suited to wheat production or dryland feed production only, and is situated quite a distance from a major population center, the prices are going down.

Some observers noted that land prices in the western one-third of Kansas — dryland acreages — were off as much as 15 percent, and strictly grain farms in south central Kansas and north Central

Oklahoma off from 5 to 10 percent.

But these same auctioneers and appraisers were quick to report that although this was true in some instances, in other instances land of the same kind a few miles away was selling at earlier prices.

"What it means," one observer said, "is that the buyers are becoming more picky and this is more of a response to the net income possible from differing kinds of agriculture as well as possible higher net returns from alternate investments."

The reversal of the upward trend in land prices is the first since the mid-1930's when on the heels of nationwide depression, land prices began a decline of from 6 to 9 percent a year.

It has been said in recent years as land prices continued to react to inflation that "farmers can live off the appreciation in price of the land they hold."

A favorable situation for livestock fattening and raising has kept grassland prices stable or higher throughout the two-state area, observers reported.

High incomes in population centers have made purchase of retirement farms possible, and therefore have kept land prices in these areas stable or inclining too.

But, in the more remote farming areas, land prices definitely are leveling and in some cases declining.

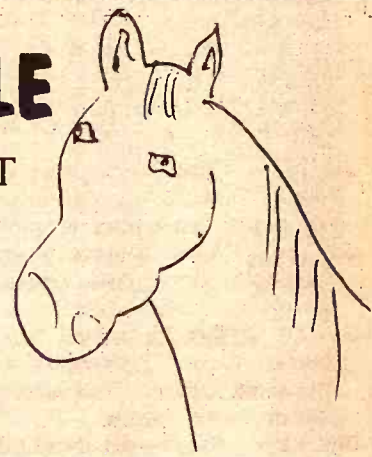

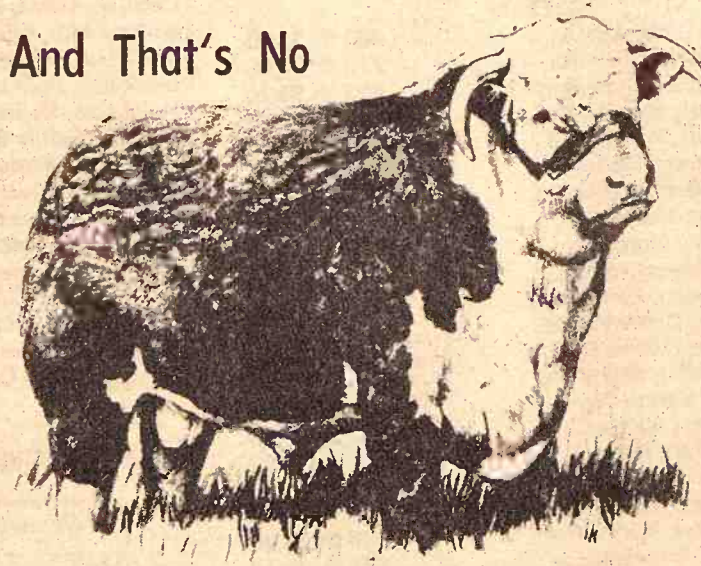
