11% Less Wheat Acres Planted

This fall 9,583,000 acres of winter wheat were seeded in Kansas for harvest in 1970, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. Seeder acreage was down 11 percent from a year ago and the smallest since 1957. Acreage declines from a year ago were general over the state, accompanying decreased acreage allotments, but were sharpest in eastern districts.

The 1970 wheat crop is forecast at 240 million bushels, 21 percent smaller than the 1969 nearrecord crop but 5 percent more than the 1959-68 average of 229 million bushels.

The 1970 production forecast represents a prospective yield of 25 bushels per seeded acre, 3.4 bushels below 1969 but 4.6 bushels above 1968.

The production forecast is based on conditions of the growing crop as of December 1, currently available moisture supplies, and assumes that weather and other factors between that date and harvest time will be normal.

Seeding of the 1970 wheat crop started slowly this fall, but with ample soil moisture available

progressed rapidly in late September and October. Most planting was completed by the end of October although wet fields delayed some plantings in eastern areas. Considerable replanting was necessary in some southwestern and south central areas because of army worm damage.

Plant emergence and stands were mostly good to excellent, although heavy rains caused local washouts in a few areas. Top growth was slowed by cool fall weather in later seeding areas and reseeded fields. Condition of wheat on December 1 was the best in four years, being exceptionally good in west central and northwest Kansas.

However, condition was only fairly good in a half-dozen southeastern counties where seeding was delayed by wet fields and in some southwestern counties where insect damage made reseeding necessary.

Rye

Kansas farmers seeded 220,000 acres of winter rye for all purposes this fall. Seedlings were 30 percent greater than a year earlier and largest in four years but only about two-thirds the acre- year earlier.

age planted in the early 1960s. Rye seeding got off to a good start in September and progressed rapidly over the state. Adequate moisture favored early seeding in western and central areas but wet fields slowed plant-

ing in the southeast and some east central areas.

Stands were good but cool weather slowed growth in October. Condition of rye on December 1 was 4 points above a year earlier and equaled the best for the date since 1961.

United States

The nation's 1970 winter wheat crop was seeded on 38.3 million acres compared with 43.1 million acres a year earlier and a range from 39.0 to 54.3 million acres during the preceding decade.

The U.S. winter wheat production in 1970 is forecast at 1030 million bushels on the basis of December 1 conditions. The forecast, if realized, will be 10 percent below the 1969 crop and 17 percent below 1968. Rye seedlings for the United States this fall totaled 4435 thousand acres compared with 4070 thousand acres a

The previous record was 160 percent set in 1960. Record large sorghum grain, sugar beet and popcorn crops in 1969, the second largest wheat crop and the third largest soybean and hay crops helped to boost this year's total crop production.

Production was above a year ago for all major grain crops except oats and soybeans. Crop production was stimulated by well above normal precipitation during the growing season in all but northwest Kansas.

Excessive rains made harvesting difficult at times, damaged considerable hay, and made weeds a problem in many row crop fields. Insect and freeze damage to crops was much less than in some recent years. The total value of crops produced in 1969 was \$899 million compared with \$794 million in 1968.

Record high yields per acre were set for several crops in 1969. The 31 bushel average wheat yield, 56 bushel sorghum grain, 19 bushel rye, and 3400 lb. popcorn yields were all new records. Yields per acre of barley and hay equaled the previous records while the oat yield has been exceeded in only one year.

Acreage Harvested Harvested acreage of all crops in 1969 was 19 million acres, about 1 percent less than last year and was the second lowest in 3 decades. Sorghum acreage harvested was down 8% from last year while soybeans and oats were each down 11 percent.

On the other hand, several Kansas crops recorded sizeable acreage gains in 1969 including corn, 6%; barley 65%; rye 80%; sugar beets 24%; and dry beans 20%. Wheat acreage harvested was up 1% despite a decline of 10 percent in plantings.

Seeding of small grains in the fall of 1968 for harvest in 1969 proceeded about normally after a slow start. Stands were mostly good to excellent but suffered from lack of moisture in the western tier of counties and lo-

cally from excessive rains. Acreage losses through the winter were generally light outside the western tier and ample spring precipitation resulted in good progress of the developing

Cool, damp weather during the filling period in late May and early June resulted in exceptional yields of small grains. Combining started slowly because of wet fields and lagged during much of June. Progress was rapid during the first part of July and harvest was completed near the usual date despite considerable lodging in central and eastern areas.

Spring plantings of corn and sorghum were delayed at first by wet fields but then moved ahead well and were completed by about the average date. Plantings of soybeans lagged through the entire season with some acreage not getting in because of wet weather delays. Greenbugs caused some replanting of sorghums and some damage later in the season but much less severe than

in 1968. Favorable weather during pol-

lination and good late summer moisture resulted in exceptional yields of most fall harvested crops. The major portion of the fall crops reached maturity before killing frosts were received. Corn harvest generally made good progress, while combining of sorghums and soybeans moved slewly but was virtually completed by mid-December.

Wheat Production

Kansas wheat production in 1969 was 305,319,000 bushels, the second largest crop of record. This year's crop was 20 percent larger than in 1968, and was exceeded only by the record crop of

Wheat was seeded on 10,767,000 acres, 10 percent less than a year earlier. However, due to less abandonment, acreage harvested totaled 9,849,000, 1 percent above 1968. Yield per harvested acre in 1969 averaged 31 bushels, 5 bushels above 1968 and 2.5 bushels above the previous high set in 1958 and 1960.

Wheat seeding in the fall of 1968 got off to a slow start but moved ahead rapidly and was virtually completed by the last of October. Stands were generally good except in a few extreme western counties where lack of moisture slowed development and in the southeast areas where excessive moisture created problems.

Winter freeze and insects did not cause as widespread damage as in some recent years. Moisture was generally abundant during the spring and favorable weather during filling produced

Supply and needs. Let us re-

supply of corn available for this marketing year (beginning October 1) has been estimated at approximately 5.6 billion bushels. Of this amount, 736 million bushels of old corn was reported under price support, leaving a "free" supply of about 4.8 billion bushels, which is being further reduced as farmers place some of their new corn under loans. Some 200 to 300 million bushels may be placed under loan, leaving 4.5 to 4.6 billion bushels in the "free" supply."

The total need for this marketing year may be around 4.9 billion bushels. The expected need includes nearly 4 billion bushels for domestic use, 600 million for exports, and 300 million for working stocks at the end of the season. Therefore, needs may exceed the "free" supply by 300 to 400 million bushels.

Meeting the deficit. The deficit of "free" corn will be made up from three principal sources: (1) Farmers will redeem and sell some of the 1969 corn they are now placing under loan. (2) They will redeem and sell some of the corn from previous crops now being held under reseal loans. (3) The Government (CCC) will sell some corn that it now owns, and some that it will obtain by calling reseal loans.

New corn to be redeemed. Last year, farmers redeemed and sold about 264 million bushels of 1968crop corn, about two-thirds of the total placed under loan. Most of the remainder, some 120 million bushels, was resealed. Only 10 million bushels were delivered to the CCC. The large redemption occurred with market prices 10 to 15 cents above the price-support loan rate. Similar develop-



Choosing Hairbrush

Women spend more money on hairbrushes each year than they do on such glamor items as nail polish or perfume.

The best type brush to choose depends essentially on the type of hair. But whatever type it is, remember these two checkpoints:

• The rows of bristles should be spaced so they glide through the hair smoothly without tangling.

• Gentle is the word in brushing so that the scalp doesn't become irritated.

For thick or long hair, the halfround style brush works best. It flares widely to allow maximum space between the rows of bristles, enabling the brush to penetrate the hair mass and gather larger sections with each

For short hair or hair that lacks body or is only medium thick, the professional-style brush is the one to choose. It has only a slight flare and is very slim and compactly constructed, with longer rows of bristles.

Foil Saves Spills In Oven

If a fresh fruit pie looks as though it might run over in the oven, place a piece of aluminum foil on a shelf well below the one holding the pie.

Cut the foil about an inch larger all around than the pie pan and turn up the edges of the foil. The foil will catch the drips without interfering with the browning of the crust.

Protect Garbage Can With Paint

For a longer lasting garbage can, give it a coat of paint. First scrub the can, then prime the metal inside and out with zincdust paint. Cover the can, inside and out, with two coats of exterior enamel in one of your favorite colors. This brightens the can and makes it more enduring.

First, check the walls and if they are fairly clean merely dust them off. However, if dust, grease or soap film has accumulated, as in a bathroom or kitchen, the walls should be washed down with a sudsy solution of detergent and warm water. Rinse. the walls with clear water and let dry.

For cracks and holes, use spackling compound as a filler. Simply apply the compound with a knife and let it dry, then sand it down smooth with the surface.

For best results, paint your room in this order: Ceiling first, walls second, trim last.

When planning a painting pro- you use a long-handled roller. Or if you prefer, place a wide, 11/2. inch thick plank on the treads of two solidly footed open stepladders. This will allow you to paint without the bother of having to run up and down ladders.

For the fine "edge between the ceiling and walls, follow the pros with this "fool-the-eye" trick. Just draw the line freehand with a small brush. You may find this a quicker, more satisfying way of getting the illusion of an even edge.

When using a roller, line the tray with aluminum foil to save yourself a cleanup later on. Foil also makes a good protector for your brushes when they are clean, dry and ready to be stored again.

Seek Lower Wheat Freight Rates To Coast

Several leaders of the Kansas milling industry met in Washington, D.C., last week with members of the Kansas congressional delegation to discuss unfavorable rail freight rates on wheat and flour.

Members of the milling industry and wheat growers have voiced growing concern over the rate structure, particularly to the West Coast. They say the structure makes it impossible for Kansas milled products to be priced competitively with flour milled outside the state.

Interstate Commerce Commission recently approved a request of the Santa Fe Railroad for reduced freight rates on wheat and flour to West Coast points.

This was followed by a court case challenging the ICC decision, and the reduced rate was rescinded. In the meantime Santa Fe has filed a petition with the ICC for reconsideration.

Sen. Bob Dole, in whose office the meeting was held, said he feels the next step in this continuing problem is to present the matter and its urgency to the White House, either directly to President Nixon or a member of his advisory staff.

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

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

Corn Production

Production of corn grain in 1969 totaled 91,464,000 bushels, topping 1968 by 8 percent and the largest crop in a quarter cen-

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tury. The yield per acre was 74 000, a decrease of 11 percent bushels, 1 bushel below the 1968 record high.

Grain was harvested from 1,236,000 acres, 9 percent above a year earlier and the largest since 1963. Corn silage was harvested from 252,000 acres with an average yield of 13.0 tons per acre for a production of 3,276,000 tons, 3 percent below last year.

Corn planting was delayed early by wet weather, but moved ahead rapidly and was virtually complete by mid-June. Stands were exceptionally good in early p'anted fields while some later planted fields suffered from exvessive rains and standing water. Insects caused some damage but losses were generally light.

Summer rains hampered cultivation and some fields became extremely weedy. Moisture was generally adequate throughout the growing season and most of the crop reached full maturity before killing frosts occurred. Harvest made good progress during October in spite of wet fie'ds and dry weather in November permitted virtual completion except for scattered late fields.

Soybean production in Kansas in 1969 was 19,596,000 bushels, some 18 percent below last year. Acreage harvested totaled 852,

6,080,000 bushe's, down 11 percent from the previous year. Yield per acre averaged 38 bushels, equaling the best since 1883.

Rye production totaled 1,121,000 bushels, more than double last year's and the largest crop since 1964. The average yield of 19 bushels per acre was 3.5 bushels above 1968 and a new record high for the state.

Hay Production

All hay production on Kansas farms totaled 5,112,000 tons, up 8 percent from 1968 and the third largest crop on record. Hay was cut from 2,387,000 acres in 1969 and yielded an average of 2.14 tons per acre which equals the 1967 record. Alfalfa hay accounted for 64 percent of the State's total hay production, wild hay contributed 18 percent and all other hays accounted for 18 percent.

Other Crops

Kansas' sugar beet production was a record high 850,000 tons, 42 percent above last year's previous record crop. Beets were harvested from 48,300 acres topping last year's acreage by 24

percent. Yields averaged 17.6 tons per acre, the State's second best.

Dry beans were harvested from 20,000 acres, a sizeable increase from 1968, but yield per acre was low and production was 170,000 cwt., unchanged from last year.

Kansas Cholera Program Appears To Be Working

Kansas is tightening the reins in an all-out drive to stamp out hog cholera, according to Dr. Ray Pyles, Wichita, chief state veterinarian.

No cases of the disease have been reported since June, when six cases were reported as a result of bringing in feeder pigs from Missouri, Dr. Pyle said.

Since that time, feeder pigs have not been permitted to come from Missouri or Oklahoma unless they have been vaccinated three weeks in advance and inspected twice before crossing the line, Dr. Pyle said.

So-called "junk pigs" that move from one sales ring to another are not permitted in the state, according to Dr. L. S. Poley of the Animal Health Division of the Department of Agriculture. Dr. Poley is supervising veterinarian for the Wichita Union Stockyards.

Many hogs are shipped into Kansas for immediate processing, but these are not permitted in any of the terminal stockyards, Dr. Poley said.

Three years ago, USDA undertook a program to stamp out the disease on a nationwide basis.

A new non-virulent vaccine has greatly reduced the frequency of the disease, Dr. Poley said.

A four-phase program has been undertaken including preparation, reduction of incidence, elimination of outbreak and protection against reinfection At present, Kansas is in third stage of the program



Wheatgrowers Agree With Tax Protests

DODGE CITY — The president of the Kansas Association of Wheat Growers said yesterday that his organization is in sympathy with protest action taken recently by taxpayers associations in the state.

"Many taxpayer association members also are members of KAWG, and had a hand in shaping our resolution calling for the 1970 Kansas Legislature to make drastic changes in the Kansas tax system," said Donald E. Crane of Wright.

The wheat association leader said Kansas population is 14 percent rural but farmers pay 32 percent of all state property tax-

"High property taxes are one of the forces driving farmers from their land, as well as discouraging industry from coming into Kansas," he said.

Crane said that farm values

have declined 30 percent since the reappraisal of real estate in Kansas.

"In the light of this, KAWG is asking for legislation to assess property taxes on the basis of the earning ability of all real estate in Kansas."

He listed other tax changes asked by KAWG:

• That 60 percent of the operating cost of elementary and secondary schools be raised from graduated income taxes.

• That the formula for distribution of state aid to elementary and secondary schools be revised to take into consideration higher costs of transportation, and education in rural areas.

• That 25 percent of all sales tax receipts be returned to local tax units to reduce ad valorem

Redeeming More Wheat Loans

Redemptions of 1969 crop wheat loans during November

exceeded new entries, resulting in a net decrease of more than 4 million bushels in 1969 wheat outstanding under loan for the month.

Entries of the current year's

crop were 10.6 million bushels and redemptions amounted to 14.7 million bushels. This was the first month in the 1969 season that a net decrease had been registered in outstanding wheat

Total impoundings of the 1969 crop stand at 346,964,052 making 24 percent of the crop under loan. Wheat prices in the high producing Kansas counties range in the lower \$1.20's.



TOPEKA - Inclusion of the proposed \$16 million Woodbine Dam and Reservoir in the official state water plan has been recommended by the Kansas Water Resources Board, Keith Krause, executive director and chief engineer, said.

Also recommended is relocation of Grove Reservoir at Topeka.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has recommended moving the Grove Dam from a site near Delia, Kans., nine miles downstream to a site below Soldier and Little Soldier Creeks.

The original Grove project was part of the water plan.

The board had refused to include the Corps' proposed Woodbine project in past water plans. Congress has required such approval before it will authorize planning funds.

"The board felt Woodbine is now a necessary part of the state plan," Krause said.

Woodbine would be built on Lyons Creek, 15 miles southwest of Junction City, near the Rock Springs State 4-H Center.

Lyons Creek Joint Watershed District 41 has waged a 10-year battle against state authorization of Woodbine.

"Approval of the project by the state Water Resources Board is a real disappointment," said President Hays B. Beck, Junction City. He promised to take the fight to the Legislature which must approve the plan.

The Watershed District's general work plan, calling for expenditure of \$2.1 million in federal funds for 22 watershed structures, is awaiting Congressional approval of funds.

The district will build 46 flood control structures at a cost of \$2.3 million.

Beck said one structure already has been built, and the district has received donated easements for two more.

truck tire cost me \$55. You all know the story of increased costs - taxes, interest, operating and living expenses. Now we in N.F.O. are doing something about the other end. We are blocking our production and our marketing specialists are making volume sales in all Commodities and these sales are occurring clear across the United States. We farm 280 acres. It is not a large operation but the sale of my wheat and hogs through NFO netted me about \$800 more than if I sold through old conventional markets.

NFO is talking about putting a full time employee in each of 3,000 counties. Our effectiveness will be much greater, if the member is aware of what is going

on and is participating.

There is such a thing as being penny wise and pound foolish. I don't like increased costs anymore than anyone else but I am anxious for the day to arrive where I'll be putting a price tag on my production. It will be cost of production plus a reasonable profit. I believe we have a reasonable chance, based on past performance for NFO to get the job done for us.

Start On Larger Co-op Fertilizer Plant At Lawrence

LAWRENCE - Construction of a new 1000-ton a day anhydrous ammonia plant here will increase the worth of the Cooperative Farm Chemicals Association at Lawrence to 60 million dollars, John F. Anderson, vicepresident and general manager,

Engineering work on the plant will start immediately and construction by M. W. Kellogg Company, New York, will get under way next spring.

Completion is scheduled for 1971 and startup of the new facilities is planned for September 1971, Anderson said.

The CFCA plant on K-10 east of Lawrence was built in 1954

with an original investment of 18 million dollars. It is rated among the top 10 businesses in Kansas from the standpoint of annual volume.

"In keeping with the policy of providing modern equipment, the single train, high heat recovery plant will replace the present ammonia plant," Anderson said.

It will be powered by three main steam turbines driving centrifugal compressors totaling 37,000 horsepower.



Stretch Trucking Law For Liberal Meat Packer

The State Highway Commission said it will help a branch of the world's largest meat packing company with its transportation difficulties.

The commission agreed to an emergency regulation which will allow the National Beef Packing Co. plant at Liberal to use trailers which exceed the legal maximum length to bring cattle to the slaughter house.

Even with the emergency regulation, the company still must

obtain a special permit when it plans to use its newly designed trucking equipment.

John Jacobson Jr., vice-president, said the company wants to use the longer trailers because of their extra capacity and because the fat cattle shipped in them do not bruise so easily. Bruised cattle increase the cost per pound by about two cents.

The legal limit for trailers on Kansas highways is 42 feet, 6 inches, and the new trailers are 46 feet. The law prohibits the over-all length of trailer and tractor from exceeding 55 feet. The Liberal company's rig is within that limit. Gross weight of the special outfits is several thousand pounds below the limit set by law for a standard trailer.

Jacobson said he thought the highway commission had approved the company's request for authority to use the equipment

He added a fifth factor that might make some difference in farmland pricing — the returns on other investments have a greater net possibility in the short-term outlook.

May stressed the idea that future prospects are bright, not gloomy, and that the 1970's will bring further increase in land prices.

"The farm real estate market seems to have shifted in recent months from a sellers' market to a buyers' market with some softening of the sale prices in parts of the wheat belt," he said.

"This trend is not too apparent in the Flint Hills grassland areas and among diversified farms favorably located with respect to population centers and areas of good non-farm income," he added.

The combination of factors means that if a piece of land has no irrigation possibilities, is suited to wheat production or dryland feed production only, and is situated quite a distance from a major population center, the prices are going down.

Some observers noted that land prices in the western one-third of Kansas - dryland acreages were off as much as 15 percent, and strictly grain farms in south central Kansas and north Central

Oklahoma off from 5 to 10 per

But these same auctioneers and appraisers were quick to report that although this was true in some instances, in other instances land of the same kind a few miles away was selling at earlier prices.

"What it means," one observer said, "is that the buyers are becoming more picky and this is more of a response to the net income possible from differing kinds of agriculture as well as possible higher net returns from alternate investments."

The reversal of the upward trend in land prices is the first since the mid-1930's when on the heels of nationwide depression, land prices began a decline of from 6 to 9 percent a year.

It has been said in recent years as land prices continued to react to inflation that "farmers can live off the appreciation in price of the land they hold."

A favorable situation for livestock fattening and raising has kept grassland prices stable or higher throughout the two-state area, observers reported.

High incomes in population centers have made purchase of retirement farms possible, and therefore have kept land prices in these areas stable or inclining


