Plan For Rangeland Fire Danger Forecasts

The U.S. Weather Bureau, with assistance from the forestry division of the Kansas State University Extension Service, has developed plans for releasing forecasts of very high and extreme rangeland fire danger conditions this fall.

The forecasts will be distributed by the Environmental Science Services Administration weather fire service following issuance of the early morning zone forecasts.

Warnings will be available for broadcasting by radio and television stations for the information of organized rural fire districts.

Weather forecasts will be issued for eastern or western Kansas as weather conditions dictate, with U.S. 81 highway serving as the dividing line.

C. R. (Randy) Biswell, assistant state forester at K-State, noted that fall rangeland fire danger season can develop rapidly with the curing of grasses and other vegetation and the beginning of drier weather.

Kansas now has 272 organized and equipped rural fire districts. Some are organized on a county basis, others are township districts.

About 37.3 million of the 49.8 million acres of rural Kansas are in these districts, which are manned almost exclusively by trained volunteers.

Biswell said success of the fire danger warning system will depend on the cooperation of news media.

Philco Drops Home Lines

The Ford Motor Co.'s Philco-Ford Division is getting out of the home laundry, kitchen range and dishwasher business.

The move will cost 15 cents a share, Ford said, or about \$16 million after taxes which will be a nonrecurring charge in Ford's third-quarter earnings.

Philco-Ford said the discontinued items account for less than 3 percent of the division's business which is split among consumer products and military electronics.

Despite Record On Feed Beef Market Expects To Hold

More than six million beef cattle are waiting on the nation's ranches and in the feedlots to be turned into steaks and hamburgers. But these swollen numbers are not expected to bring the housewife lower prices very soon.

The cattle supply is 11 percent more than it was last year. At least 15 percent more cattle are being fattened for the choice cuts than a year ago.

The total number of cattle slaughtered in the packing houses

reached a record high and wholesale beef prices, for the first time this year, began to show some decline.

Under the laws of supply and demand, the nation's harried housewives should soon begin to benefit from all this.

But none of Chicago's market analysts expect this to happen.

The analysts expect prices in the supermarkets to stay where they are now, despite the insistence of farmers and packers that they are still not making

any encouraging profits and despite the efforts of consumers to organize boycotts against meat.

Farmers last week were getting \$26 per hundred pounds for their hogs, the highest price levels they have enjoyed this year.

There is a seasonal decline in the amount of pork moving into the packing houses, so there appeared to be little hope of lower pork prices.

Despite the attempt to organize meatless weeks, the country's appetite for beef continues to increase, as it has every year since 1957. The demand continues even though prices jumped more than 12 percent in the first six months of this year.

Last year each American, in theory, consumed a record total of 182.7 pounds of beef. This year the per capita consumption is expected to increase by at least 1 percent.

"With that big rise in the number of cattle headed for market, you certainly should expect some benefits for the consumer," an economist for the American Meat Institute said. "But I can't honestly foresee any real break-in prices," he added. "We think the insistence on eating beef is going to grow and the extra amounts that do come on the market are going to be eaten up, even if nobody really wants to pay those prices for it."

Last month cattle feeders were getting \$35.50 a hundred pounds for choice grade beef animals. This was the highest price they had received since the great beef

shortage in 1951.

By the end of last week, the price to farmers had dropped to \$30.25. The wholesale price for dressed beef had dropped from \$55 per hundred pounds in July to \$47.

Clover Seed Harvest Up, But Still Small Crop

Production of sweetclover seed in Kansas during 1969 is forecast at 675,000 pounds, 5 per cent more than last year's small crop, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

If realized, the 1969 crop will still be the second smallest production since records began in 1924. Production has been sharply reduced during recent years due to a low market price for

the seed and substitution of fertilizer for sweetclover in soil improvement work.

Sweetclover seed will be harvested from 4,500 acres this year or 500 acres more than a year ago. The expected yield of pounds per acre of clean seed compares with 160 pounds per acre for last year's crop. Sweetclover is expected to be biennial in blossom sweetclover and 15 per cent biennial white blossom sweetclover.

UNITED STATES

Sweetclover seed production in 1969 is forecast at 10,910,000 pounds — 26 per cent more than last year's crop. However, production this year is expected to be 11 per cent below the 1968 crop and is the second smallest crop in more than 20 years.



Farmers Show Little Interest In Safety Equipment

Farmers of the G&G area may not be as safety-minded as they could be, according to special equipment dealers at Kansas State Fair.

Ralph Nader, attorney who gained national prominence pointing out ways consumers had been duped, aimed his latest attack at farm tractor manufacturers.

Accident statistics show a major portion of farm machinery fatal accidents involve tractors overturning on operators, he said. But, the experience of men who sell roll bars as safety equipment for tractors shows that seldom do they find a tractor owner who wants one on his tractor.

Leland Osborn, salesman for Price Brothers Equipment Co., Wichita, demonstrating the firm's line of "Full-Vision" tractor cabs at the fair, said few farmers buy cabs that are equipped with heavy roll bar equipment.

He was unsure about whether extra cost or lack of safety consciousness was the reason for the failure of safety bars in appealing to farmers.

Dozens of farmers visiting the tractor cab display showed no interest in the roll bar safety features in cabs. Their interest seemed to be in comfort items more than safety.

The safety style rollbars in tractor cabs have been available several years, Osborn said. But sale of roll bars among tractor cab manufacturers including tractor manufacturers' own brands have been light, he said.

Osborn predicted that in the future law may require installation of rollbars and safety belts both on all tractors manufac-

ed. Since the center of gravity in tractors necessarily is high, because of a necessity for clearing ridges and crops being tilled, safety equipment will need to be manufactured and placed on top, was the general comment.

But, if interest shown at the fair display is an indicator, the failure of tractor operators to "fasten their safety belts" may be as widespread as it is among operators of autos.

No One In State Death Row

LANSING — For the first time in 25 years, death row is vacant at the Kansas State Penitentiary.

William Frederick Zimmer, Topeka, had been held there for

September 23, 1969

nearly four years following his conviction in the kidnap-slitting of a seven-year-old Topeka girl in 1965. His death sentence was set aside last week by Shawnee County District Judge Michael Barbara.

Records show there have been 19 executions at Lansing since 1944, when capital punishment was reinstated in Kansas. Four of the 19 men hanged were military prisoners under federal death sentence. At one time the state agreed to execute prisoners for the Army, but that policy has been discontinued.

OUR DAILY BREAD

— by G&G Area Cooks

Earlene Riley, Oak Hill, Is Winner Of Prize

Earlene Riley, Oak Hill, is the winning cook this week. She writes, "I am sending my favorite recipe for rolls."

ROLLS

- 1/2 cup milk
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup warm water, not hot
- 2 packages active dry yeast
- 3 eggs, beaten
- 6 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg

Scald milk. Stir in sugar, salt and margarine or butter. Cool to lukewarm. Sprinkle yeast into warm, not hot, water. Stir until dissolved. Add lukewarm milk mixture. Add beaten eggs, 3 cups of flour and nutmeg. Beat until smooth. Add and stir in remaining flour. Turn dough out onto lightly floured board. Knead dough until smooth and elastic (10 minutes). Place in greased bowl; brush top with soft shortening. Cover. Let rise in warm place until doubled in bulk (one hour). Punch down; turn out onto lightly floured board. Divide dough in half. Cut each half into 12 equal parts and using palms of hands, form each into a ball. Place about two inches apart on a greased cookie sheet. Brush lightly with melted margarine. Cover. Let rise until double in bulk (one hour). Bake in hot oven (400 degrees) about 20 minutes.

Mrs. Kermit Johnson, R 4, Frankfort, sent the following recipe:

NUT BREAD

- 1/2 cup sour cream
 - 1/2 cup hot water
 - 2 beaten eggs
 - 2 cups brown sugar (pack in cups) (sweeter if you use)
 - 1 cup of white sugar and 1 cup brown sugar
 - 3/4 cup black walnuts
 - 1 teaspoon soda in hot water
 - 3 cups flour
- Bake one hour at 350 degrees in loaf pans.

The next recipe is from Mrs. John R. Larson, R 2, Concordia: **EASY LIVER STROGANOFF**
1 pound liver, cut in finger-size strips
2 tablespoons butter

Flour liver and brown in butter. Mix these ingredients with the liver:

- 1/2 package onion soup mix
 - 1 can mushroom soup
 - 1 cup dairy sour cream
- Place in greased casserole and bake 45 minutes at 350 degrees. Serve over mashed potatoes, rice or noodles.

The following recipe was received from Mrs. Frank Bergmeier, R 2, Wakefield:

QUICK FRESH PEACH PIE

- 8 large ripe peaches
 - 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 3 tablespoons flour
 - 3/4 cup sugar
 - 1 baked 9-inch crust, your choice, chilled
- Slice peaches thin and add

the lemon juice. Place in Presto pan and cook two minutes at five pounds pressure. Have ready the sugar, flour and salt, mixed dry. Stir into peaches and cook one to two minutes or until thickened. Cool and put in crust. Top with whipped topping or ice cream.

Mrs. Kenneth Kern, 337 Parker, Osawatomie: "This is a quick cake to make and it's extra good with whipped cream on each serving."

FRUIT COCKTAIL CAKE

- 1 cup flour
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 teaspoon soda
 - 1 egg
 - 1 No. 303 can fruit cocktail and syrup
 - 1/2 cup brown sugar
 - 1 cup chopped nuts
- Sift together dry ingredients. Add eggs and beat well. Add fruit cocktail and syrup and mix well. Pour into an oblong ungreased cake pans. Sprinkle with brown sugar and nuts. Bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Serves eight to ten.

How To Get The Most From The Roast

Shrinkage! Watch out for it when you cook a costly roast or you'll shrink return on your investment.

If cuts such as standing or rolled rib roast of beef are put in the oven at high temperature, the meat literally shrinks up in the heat and your money with it. Once everyone used a method by which roasts were seared at very high temperature, then finished at reduced heat. Experiments revealed so much

loss of the meat that this practice has been largely abandoned, particularly in these days of high meat prices.

Two things give you the most roast for your money. Use a slow oven (300-325 degrees F.) to avoid shrinkage of the meat and use monosodium glutamate to bring out the full robust flavor of high quality meat and make it seem juicier allowing 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate per pound of meat. A meat thermometer is optional but consider it a more scientific way to get degree of doneness preferred, as compared to allowing a certain number of minutes per pound.

Keep Toothbrushes Germ-Free

Keep the family's toothbrushes in a sanitary condition by frequently dipping them into boiling water and, as an added precaution, every two or three weeks pour hydrogen peroxide over the bristles, then rinse well with water.

New Iron Provides Extra Steam When You Want It

Fabric guides indicate the right temperature setting for each type of fabric.

Wrinkles from the clothes dryer smooth away easily with the "shot of steam" feature. One of these new irons, made by a leading company, is called the "shot of steam" iron. Other features include a "heel rest" handle to minimize tipping; 36-vent soleplate for all-over steam coverage; water level gauge and stainless steel water tank.

Serve Youngsters Hearty Sandwiches

Appease the youngsters' appetites with a nourishing sandwich and a glass of milk.

Here's a zesty sandwich filling that can be spread between split frankfurter rolls whenever the gang is ready.

For eight sandwiches, combine 3 tablespoons milk, ¼ cup American blue cheese (about 4 ounces, crumbled), and 1 3-ounce package cream cheese; blend until smooth. Add 1 cup chopped celery, 3 slices crisp bacon, chopped and 2 tablespoons chili sauce. Cut rolls in half lengthwise; remove part of center. Butter each side of rolls and heap with filling. Place halves together.

Use Tape To Keep Buttons Together

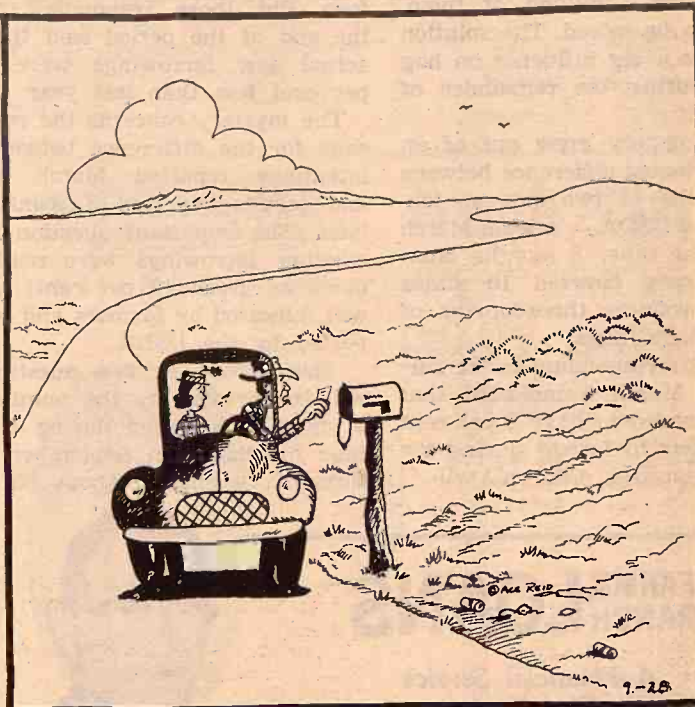

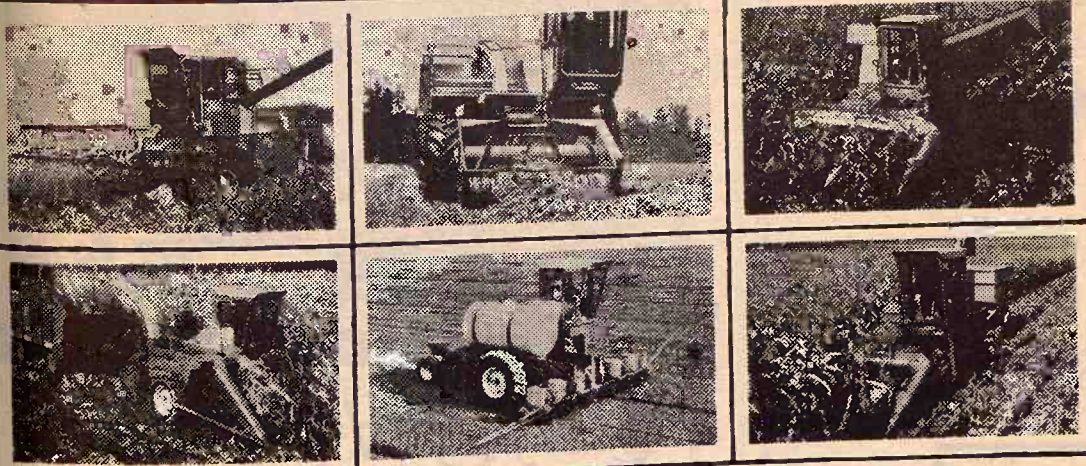

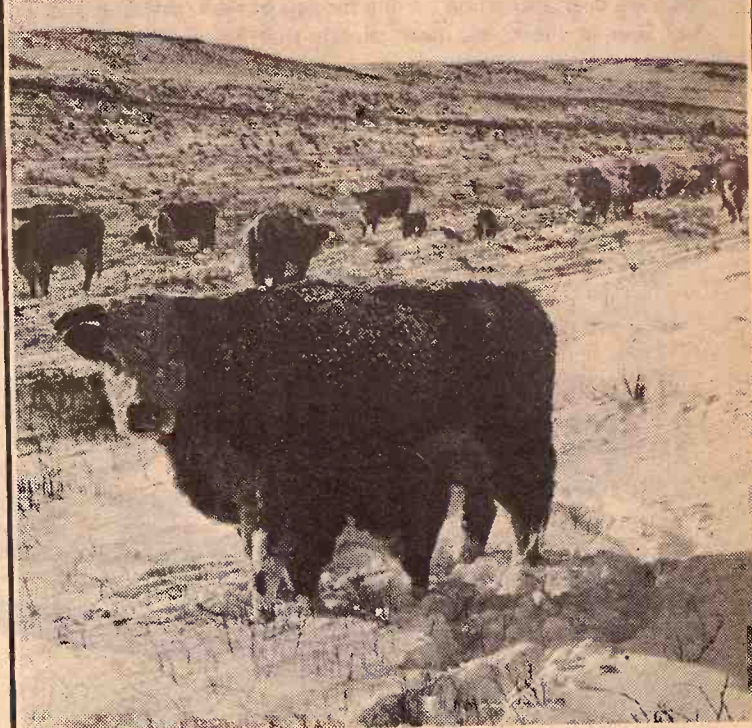

Where Are 3 Million Pigs?

The mystery of the missing pigs, about 3 million of them, will soon be solved. The solution will have a big influence on hog prices during the remainder of this year.

The mystery grew out of an unprecedented difference between the results of two surveys taken by the USDA — one on March 1 and the other 3 months later. The survey covered 10 states which produces three-fourths of the nation's hogs.

Farmers responding in the survey on March 1 indicated that they intended to have 5 per cent more sows to farrow during the spring quarter (March-April-

May) than they had a year before. But those responding at the end of the period said that actual sow farrowings were 9 per cent less than last year.

The mystery concerns the reasons for the difference between intentions reported March 1 and results reported 3 months later. The important question is whether farrowings were really down as much (9 per cent) as was indicated by farmers and reported by the USDA.

The answer to this question will be revealed by the number of hogs slaughtered during the four months from September through December. About 90

per cent of all hogs are slaughtered in federally inspected plants where they are counted. Most other processors report the numbers slaughtered each month.

On the basis of the survey made on March 1 we could expect the number of pigs saved to be about 4 per cent more than in 1968. But the survey made 3 months later showed that the number of pigs saved was down 11 per cent. Thus, the reported difference between expectations and performance was about 15 per cent. Such a decrease in market supplies might raise hog prices by 15 to 20 per cent over what they would have been had the increase of 4 per cent indicated on March 1 actually occurred.

Prices of hogs, barrows, and gilts at eight markets averaged close to \$19 during the last 4 months of 1968. If this year's spring crop was cut as much as was indicated in the June report, we would expect prices to average 12 to 15 per cent higher than last year. That would put hog prices in the \$21 to \$22 range for the remainder of this year.

There are some doubts as to whether the spring farrowings were cut so much as the survey of farmers indicated. Never before was there such a big change from intentions reported March 1 and actual farrowings reported on June 1. Some farmers have told us that they report erroneously — as a method of protest. (It seems that everyone else is protesting. Why not hog producers?)

Survey workers, however, believe that most farmers turned in accurate reports. They checked many of the returns by telephone and by on-the-farm visits with the farmers. They concluded that many of the sows that

were expected to farrow did not breed, or were sold before farrowing. There were many reports of losses from disease. Some sows may have been sold before farrowing because of the sharp increase in the price of corn.

Hog producers will get answers to some of their questions by comparing hog slaughter during coming weeks with that of a year earlier.

cerned with the quality and wholesomeness of food products. He organized and administered the program for enforcing the Kansas Egg Law, which prescribes handling and other factors to insure wholesome, quality eggs for the consuming public. He is a graduate of Kansas State University.

Doctor Huffman brings a background of many years experience in administration of state and federal meat inspection work throughout the Midwest. Currently Federal States Coordinator for the states of Illinois, Ohio, Michigan and Indiana, he obtained his academic training at Michigan State University and Wisconsin University.

Doctors Price, Weaver, Hensley and Meredith each have 10 or more years practical experience in the practice of veterinary medicine in this state.

The new Kansas Law became effective December 1, 1968. The State Department of Agriculture assumes responsibility for Kansas meat inspection that date. Purpose of the legislation passed by the 1969 Legislature is to bring Kansas slaughter and processing plants into compliance with the Federal Wholesome Meat Act.

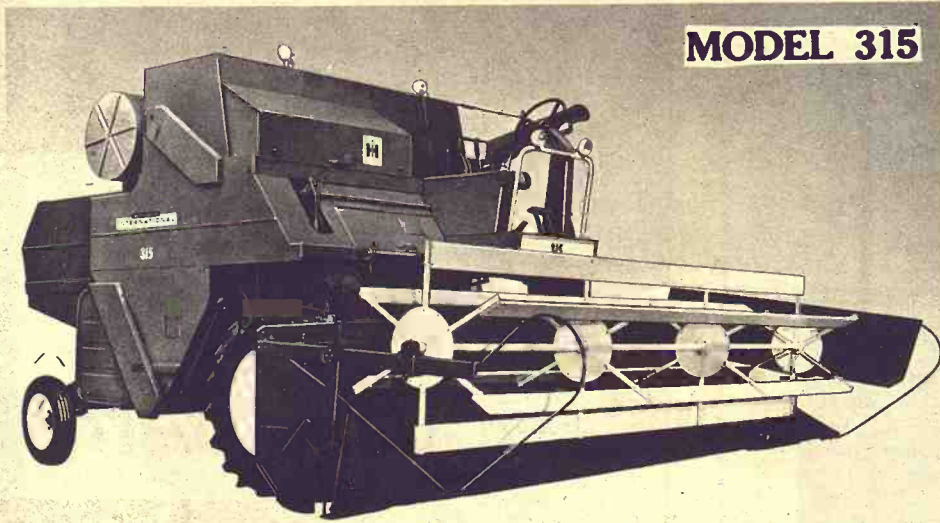

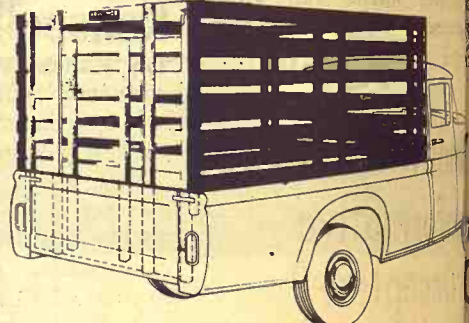

Small Crowds at Fair

Members of the Board of State Fair managers have admitted concern over the small attendance at evening grandstand shows.

"I am sorry to see that not out the Midwest people have availed themselves to see the night show," said president of the fair Andrew E. Olson of Dwight.

The first of three night shows scheduled for the new nine-day fair completed its last performance Tuesday night. This four-night show starred Gordon McRae, Weaver, and The Brothers and Sisters.

Comments by persons attending the first show generally indicated the quality of the show was good. However, the largest crowd it drew — on Saturday — filled more than half of the 11,000-seat grandstand. Sunday night, the show attracted an estimated 3000 persons. Monday, the estimated 2500 attended — indications were that Tuesday night was no better.

John Beach, of Associated Advertisers Agency, public relations executive hired by the fair, advised the board that it should consider carefully its policies and choices of headliners for future night shows.

Beach said many teen-agers had inquired at the fair public office, located along the midway, if any rock-and-roll performers were on the night show. He said they appeared disappointed when told there were not.

A proposal was made to the board after the 1968 fair to plan grandstand show specifically for teenagers on the first Friday night, charging only \$1 admission at the outside fair gates. The proposal reportedly was giving a cool reception.

G.M., faced with a 750-million dollar damage suit by the state of California, refused to discuss an FTC staff complaint that its suggested retail prices are a fraud designed to allow "fictitiously high trade-in allowances on used cars.

Ford, meanwhile, defended the list price system as "reasonable and neither misleading or deceptive." It claimed the practice is geared to the peculiar nature of the automotive industry.

The position statements were read by top marketing officials of the two leading auto makers as the FTC opened hearings on allegedly deceptive price advertising practices in the highly concentrated industry.

John J. Nevin, a Ford vice-president, said his company welcomes the FTC inquiry and would not object to some rules that might be laid down as a result of the proceeding.

But he added that Ford does object to a proposed rule that would require manufacturers to post the true price for which cars are sold instead of the suggested retail price posted by the manufacturer.

Surveys presented to the FTC showed only 1.3 percent of GM cars are sold at the sticker price, while 75 percent are bought at discounts of 10 to 20 percent below the suggested level. Nevin conceded that less than 5 percent of Ford's cars are sold at the suggested retail price.

Money For Kanopolis Parks

The Kansas Park and Resources Authority will receive \$40,800 for continued Kanopolis State Park development.

Rep. Keith Sebelius' office announced it had received word of approval of the land and water conservation grant from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation of the U.S. Department of Interior.

The money, to be matched by

state funds, will finance phase 2 construction including sewage system expansion, bathroom roof replacement, water treatment plant and paving of existing roads and parking areas.

A previous \$8239 grant provided for a sewage lagoon and extension of the water line to the marina area.

Soviets Back Down On Large Wheat Purchase

The Soviet Union has defaulted on a large wheat agreement with Canada that could cost Canada up to 300 million dollars in wheat sales.

Under an agreement signed in June, 1966, the Russians agreed to buy nine million metric tons over three years at a cost of 500 million to 700 million dollars, but Canada has sold and delivered only about 5.2 million tons thus far, the Times said.

The Soviet deficit is about 3.8 million tons, or 42 percent of the original purchase agreement the Times' Moscow correspondent, Richard Reston, wrote. The tract was to expire July 31, 1969.

The Russians bought 57.2 million bushels of wheat the first year — 40 million bushels in 1968 and have contracted for only a few more sales covering limited wheat shipments to Cuba, Reston wrote.

Canadian and Soviet officials met last in December, aside from a long-distance meeting early this summer, and don't plan another meeting until late in the year, the newspaper said.

Neither nation is conceding default. The troubles are couched

in diplomatic language about continuing talks and the recognition by both sides of existing financial obligations.

The initial contract, however, contains no stretch-out clause.

The Times said informed sources attributed the default to three good agricultural years which have enabled Russia to export more wheat than it imports and sharp competing pressures for limited hard currency reserves inside the Soviet econ-

omy, an indication of an intense internal struggle for the allocation of resources.

More Pressure On Export Forecast

The specter of large crop surpluses in Australia and Japan this year and possible effects on U.S. farm exports has been raised in an Agriculture department report.

The foreign Agricultural service said the wheat carryover in Australia on July 1 was "far in excess" of markets and storage capacity and that by the time the new harvest begins in December the government will have a surplus of more than 7 million tons, or about 260 million bushels.

It also is virtually certain, the FAS said, that Australia's new crop will be a bumper 14,400,000 tons, back-to-back with last season's record output of 14,700,000. Australian production is a major factor in the current difficulty over world wheat marketing, a deteriorating situation which has brought price-cutting and sagging exports to all participants, including the United States, Canada and the European Common Market.

The FAS also suggested that Japan's thriving economy has contributed to a decline in rice consumption and that now the country is faced with a record 5,100,000 tons surplus on November 1, equal to an 8-month supply for domestic use. Japanese farmers have produced two record rice crops in a row, the FAS said, while exports have declined along with domestic use. The government has taken steps to pay farmers for taking rice land from production but these efforts so far have not had full effect.

Department officials said there is the possibility that the Japanese government may decide to sell off as much as one million tons of rice at reduced prices as livestock feed. If this occurs, officials said, the competition with U. S. feed grain, particularly sorghums, could cut into American farm markets.

Salina Starts Fluoridation Quietly

SALINA — The fact that Sal-

ina drinking water has been fluoridated for more than two weeks was belatedly revealed to the city commission this week by Norris Olson, city manager.

Olson said the first dose of fluoride was put in city water August 21. Fluoridation equipment at the municipal water plant is "working very effectively and efficiently," he added.

Commissioners decided early this year to fluoridate the water as a dental health measure. The decision was controversial and irate protesters aimed occasional volleys of criticism at the commission.

Apparently in an effort to avoid controversy, city officials made no announcement of the start of the program August 21.

The announcement was made only after a newspaper reporter overheard Norris and the commissioners discussing the matter at a private meeting.

The fluoridation decision won widespread support from Salina doctors and dentists. Olson told the commissioners the city water contains eight-tenths of a part of fluoride per million gallons.

The level will be gradually in-

creased to one part per million recommended by the state board of health.

Canada Making Wheat War Too

An American wheat farmers' spokesman charges the Canadian Wheat Board with moving the world closer to an all-out wheat war by making a cut-price deal with the Philippines.

Richard K. Baum, executive vice president of Western Wheat Associates, said the Canadian board has negotiated a secret agreement directly with Philip-

pine flour mills for the sale of minimum 150,000 metric tons of wheat at concession prices with credit terms far more liberal than justified.

Revise Farm Income Figures Upward

This apparently will be one of the better years for total farm income in the United States, but not a record.

On the other hand, for the simple reason that there are fewer farmers to divide up the total, the average net income to the farm will be the best ever.

These are conclusions indicated in a report by the economic research service of the Department of Agriculture which looks back at the first part of the year and makes estimates on the remaining fall months.

If current projections turn out to be accurate, then total farm income will be better than the economists had predicted at the beginning of the year. At that time, they were saying that 1969 farm income probably would match that of 1968.

The figures for the first half of this year showed net farm income was running at an annual rate, seasonally adjusted, of around 15.5 billion dollars, which would be about 1 billion dollars above a year earlier.

The economists of the USDA say a rate well above 1968 is likely through the second half of 1969.

This would indicate that the projection of 15.5 billion should be reached or exceeded.

The peak in net income from farms was \$17,300,000,000 in 1947. Incidentally, gross farm income that year was \$34,352,000,000.

Net farm income has exceeded 15 billion four times, in 1947, 1948, 1951 and 1966.

In 1968, farmers had a net income of 14.8 billion out of a gross of 51.1 billion dollars.

Gross will be up substantially this year, perhaps as much as 3 billion dollars. But costs of production will be up too, about 2 billion. Thus the economists' conclusion that farm net will be boosted 1 billion over a year ago.

The highest average income to the farm in the United States was in 1966 when that figure was \$5044. This year, the USDA economists feel certain, that record will be exceeded, because, as mentioned, there will be fewer farmers to divide up the total.

Livestock producers and the bigger farmers will do better than the average this year compared with a year ago, the economists say.

Higher prices for livestock and livestock products have set the pace for increased farm income this year. In addition, there has been a slight increase in the marketing of farm products generally. Also, government payments will increase some.

Present indications are that when all crops are harvested this year, the total yield will be the greatest in history and about 1 percent over the record set last year.

Kansas farm cash receipts the first half of this year ran about 11 percent above those for the first half of 1968. It is estimated they are running from 8 to 9 percent over for the last half. If this rate is achieved, then the total for 1969 will be at or near 2 billion dollars, which would be anew high for the state's gross.

A sort of damper on how

good farm income is came a few days ago in Chicago in a speech given by Sen. Jack R. Miller (R-Ia.) Senator Miller spoke at the 50th anniversary celebration of the American Farm Bureau Federation. He noted that 50 years ago in 1919, national net farm income totaled nearly 9 billion dollars. That was a year of good farm prices, too, with the parity ratio averaging 110 for the year.

Today, the parity ratio stands at 74 and farm income this year is expected to total in excess of 15 billion dollars.

"But," the Iowa Senator said, "if one shrinks out the inflation in those 15 billion dollars and puts them on an equal dollar value with the 1919 dollar, the amount would come to only 7.5 billion, or 1.5 billion less than 50 years ago."

Michigan Loses Cholera Status

Michigan has lost its hog cholera free status because of spread of the disease within the state, according to USDA. Four outbreaks of the disease have been confirmed since mid-July. The

first occurred in a group of imported feeder pigs and the disease spread from there to three

nearby farms. All of the breaks occurred in Cass County in southwestern Michigan.

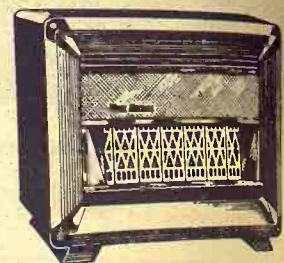

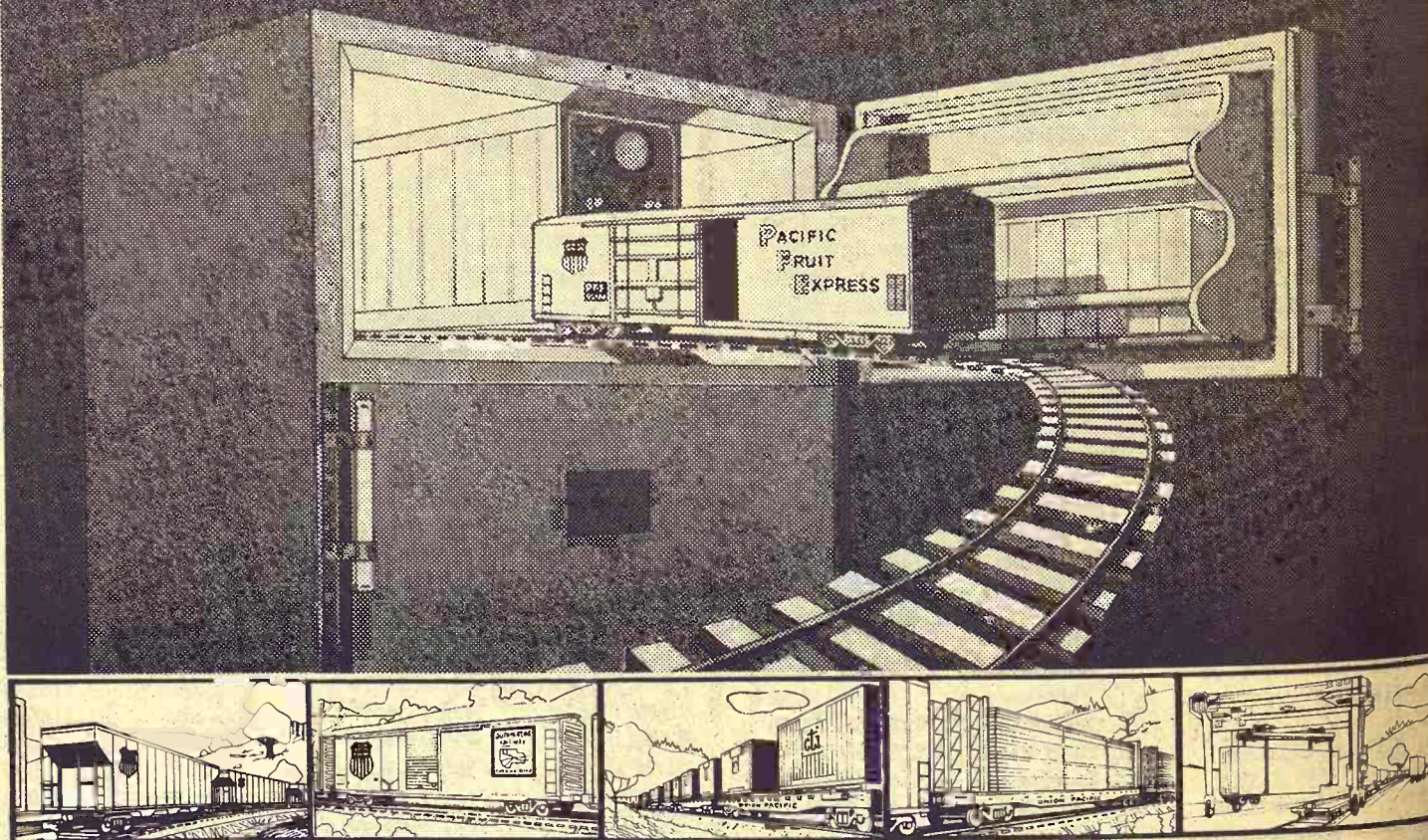

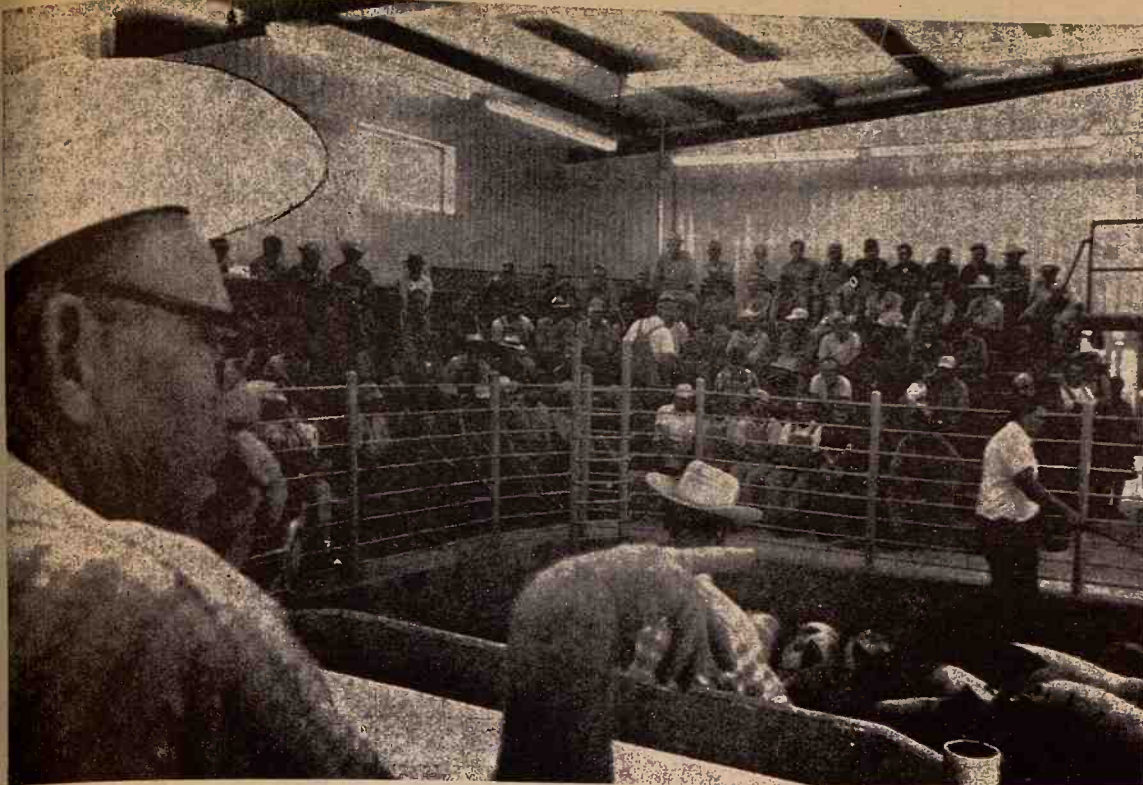

Household Goods Are Tax-Exempt —But You May Have To Prove It

It appears Kansas citizens must file a new form with local assessing officials unless they want to start paying taxes on household goods and personal effects.

The federal government also must file a form outlining the tax exempt property it owns if

it wants to avoid a tax bill from some county official.

The same holds true for the state, cities, counties and other governmental units which own property exempted from the tax rolls.

The 1969 Legislature apparently misfired in an effort to catch questionable cases of tax exempt property.

The new law requires all property — real and personal — that is considered exempt from taxation must be justified by filing a form with local assessing officials in the counties.

The Legislature inadvertently covered the waterfront with sweeping language that has many officials scratching their heads.

Several officials asked Atty. Gen. Kent Frizzell for a way out. He offered no help.

In an opinion issued recently, the attorney general said the law is clear — to be exempt from taxation, persons owning the property must file a statement with the county assessor or county clerk on or before Jan. 1 of the year in which the tax is levied.

"We do not view the procedural requirements of Section 2 of the act as being in effect an unconstitutional limitation of those exemptions granted by the State Constitution. The burden of es-

tablishing an exemption is on the one claiming it," Frizzell said.

The property valuation department has been charged with developing forms to be used by local assessing officials in implementing the law.

"I think we have some problems," said Clarence Malone, department chief attorney.

Malone said he was particularly worried about how to contact persons who now enjoy the exemption on personal effects and household goods, granted under a 1964 amendment to the State Constitution.

McPHERSON SCHOOL POPULATION DOWN

For the second year running, McPherson county schools have a decline in enrollment. Six districts operate in McPherson county and current enrollment is around 5865 — about 100 less than a year ago. There was a similar size decline last year. The major part of the decrease is in McPherson.

JUNCTION CITY TABLES STREET IMPROVEMENT

JUNCTION CITY—An improvement of West Eighth street has been tabled here because of protests from property owners along the street. The taxpayers apparently favor the improvement but want the city to pay a greater share of the cost than planned. Under the original improvement plan property owners would have paid \$42,000 of the total \$72,000 cost.

TRACTOR PULLING CONTEST RULES

- Contest is open to all Agricultural Farm tractors equipped with rubber tires.
- Tractors must be farmer owned.
- (a) Tractors under 6,500 pounds will pull in T-1. Tractor pulling greatest percentage of its own weight will be the winner.
(b) Tractors 6,500 pounds and under 9,000 pounds will pull in T-2. Tractor pulling greatest percentage, regardless of weight of tractor, will be the winner.
(c) Tractors 9,000 pounds and over will pull in T-3. Tractor pulling greatest percentage of its own weight will be the winner.
(d) T-4 Exhibit Class — Any farm tractor of any weight may enter. Any special equipment such as duals, locks, 4 wheel drive, etc. can be used in this class. Gear and RPM change allowed as long as tractor does not stop after pull is started. Tractor pulling greatest percentage of his weight will be the winner.
- Weight includes driver. No weight changes, weight shifting or driver changes after weigh-in. All weights must be bolted or other wise fastened securely to the tractor chassis. Official weight, slips from any authorized scale must accompany each entry, and signed by driver and an authorized weigher.
- Weigh-ins must be made at the Riley or Leonardville elevators on the day of the contest. Entry fees are payable at scales at the time of weigh-in. All weigh-ins must be complete before 12:00.
- No dual wheels permitted except in exhibit class.
- All rear tires must be inflated to 14 pounds or more.
- Maximum drawbar height 16 inches from ground, unless standard drawbar. Drawbar must be locked. The tractor must pull on a standard length drawbar that is 14 inches from the end of power take off to hole in drawbar.
- Driver may pull in any gear, cannot change gears after starting pull except in exhibit class. There will be no mechanical change in engine RPM except in exhibit class.
- Pull is ended when tractor engine stalls or forward motion stops.
- Driver will be stopped if magnetic marker leaves the ground or if tractor leaves its assigned track.
- Driver will be stopped by the judges when in their opinion, the rear tires are causing excessive damage to the track.
- Contest will be governed by three judges. All decisions of judges will be final.
- Judges have the right to stop a contestant, if, in their opinion his tractor is being operated in an unsafe manner. Riley County Young Farmers will not be responsible for any accidents.
- Minors must have a written consent of parents or guardians to enter contest.
- An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged for each pull by a tractor. Any entry can have one repull for \$2.00 if not satisfied with first pull. The final pull only will be considered.
- In case of a tie, a free second pull will be given.

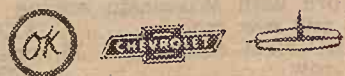

Set Hearings On Floodplain Bill

Steel Imports Vex Industry

Unless Japanese and European steel manufacturers cut sharply their shipments to the United States they will fail to meet agreed-on limits set earlier this year, Sen. Vance Hartke (D-Ind.) said.

Hartke, who represents an important steel producing state, said also the overseas steel makers are shipping the most expensive steel, a move he said violates a pledge not to change the type.

Steel producers in Japan and the European Economic Community agreed earlier this year to limit steel imports in the United States to 14 million tons a year.

The action was taken about a year after Hartke and others introduced legislation to limit imports to about 10 million tons annually.

Hartke said import statistics for the first seven months of

1969 indicate that if continued at the present rate, imports of foreign steel will total about 15 million tons.

"If they continue shipping steel at the present pace, the re-

sult will be the largest steel imports in any year since the exception of 1968," Hartke said in a statement.

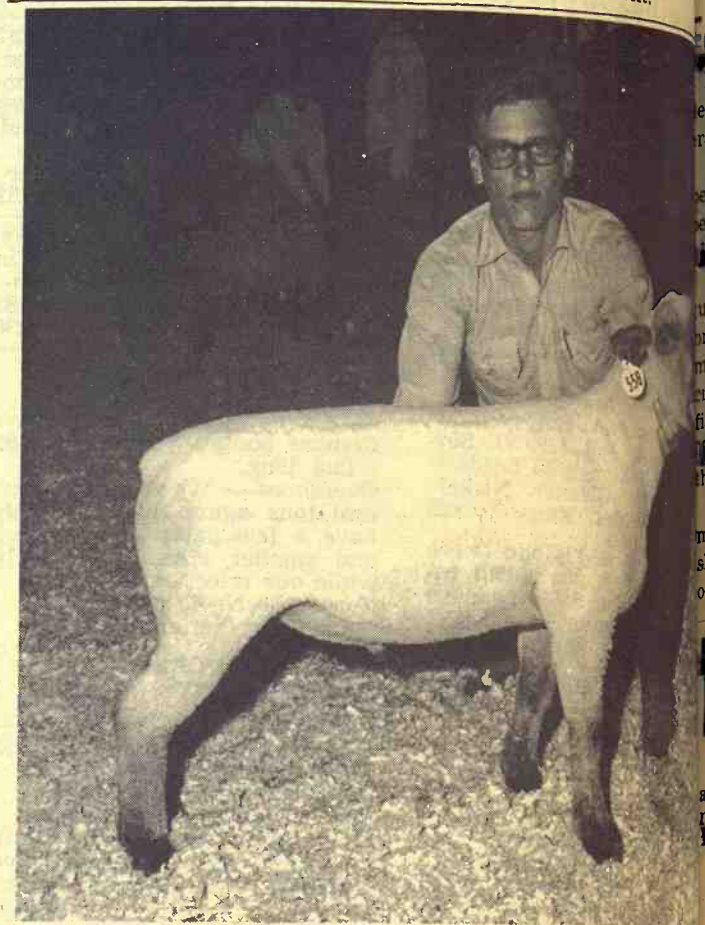

Hog Cholera Increase Despite Federal Program

Hog cholera is on an upswing despite a concerted federal-state eradication campaign.

Further outbreaks can be expected, government experts say, before the control program pays off fully.

The Department of Agriculture reported 1055 confirmed outbreaks of hog cholera in the 12 months ended June 30, an increase of 206 over the previous fiscal year. In July there were 100 cases, compared with 52 in the same month of 1968.

In Michigan's Cass County more than 1400 hogs were slaughtered in one week because of an outbreak of the disease.

Nineteen farms there have been placed under quarantine.

Missouri Agriculture Department officials slaughtered the 706 hogs in Robert Norton's herd at Silex, Mo. "Now we must start all over," Norton said.

The cholera situation around the nation was spotty. The fiscal 1969 rise in cases was blamed on sizable jumps in outbreaks in Arkansas, Florida, Kentucky, Mississippi, Missouri, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas and Puerto Rico, and less severe increases in Georgia and Virginia.

In contrast, 16 states reported no cases of hog cholera in the last fiscal year, eight states reported decreases and 16 reported no increases.

The fiscal 1969 levels over all were well below the 5000-6000 outbreaks a year reported before the start of the present eradication campaign.

The program provides reimbursements for farmers whose

herds are slaughtered. In the past fiscal year, federal and state governments spent \$4 million to repay farmers for 177,000 sick hogs slaughtered in 30 states and Puerto Rico.

Dr. E. E. Salomon, director of the animal health division of the Agriculture Department's research service, said: "As the nation moves into the final stages of the eradication program, we can expect to see upsurges in outbreaks from time to time before the incidence begins to drop."

Rural Fire District Fair At McPherson

A McPherson County rural fire district equipment fair, the first of its kind in Kansas, will be held in McPherson on Thursday, Sept. 25.

The fair will be held on the parking lot behind the McPherson Safety Center starting at 6 p.m. An informal program will start at 7 p.m., Harold Gallaher, state extension forester, will, will report on the rural fire program in Kansas.

A team from McConnell Air Force Base, Wichita, will demonstrate air crash rescue procedures. This demonstration will be chief at McConnell. Rural fire chiefs will discuss the equipment they have on display and give information on conversion costs and how the equipment has been used in their districts.

The districts will display equipment they have acquired through the Kansas State Extension Forestry excess military vehicle program. Each district has done its own conversion of these vehicles to meet fire fighting needs.

The fair is designed primarily for rural fire district personnel and boards. County commissioners have been invited and invited.

'Don't Harm Stockman To Help Grain Farmer'

Grain farmers have it tough, but a frequent spokesman for the cattle industry has warned that attempts to help them shouldn't be at the expense of the livestockman.

Bill House, president of the American National Cattlemen's Association, told the House Agriculture committee that grain farmers should not be subsidized for land taken out of production and then be permitted to graze cattle on it.

House, a Cedar Vale, Kans., rancher, said, "You should not artificially stimulate the production of beef to keep the grain farmer out of trouble."

Cattlemen, House said, have to rent land from the government on which to graze their herds and "it's the height of inconsistency to pay a man to graze his own land."

House was also critical of some tax reform proposals as "burning down the barn to get a few rats."

A House bill has aimed at reducing activities of "hobby" or tax loss farming by rich people who buy farms and ranches on which they know they will lose money but plan to write off losses against taxes on their major

income.

A tax reform bill with similar provisions could "inflict substantial damage on the entire livestock industry," House said.

Hardest hit would not be the hobby farmers and ranchers, House said, but the numerous small and medium size, family-owned corporations, trusts and estates engaged in farming or ranching which have even small amounts of nonfarm income."

House also stressed one other facet of the cattlemen's program: exportation of high grade beef, particularly to Japan and Australia.

He urged the Agriculture Committee to work for relaxation of foreign restrictions on imports of American beef.

Car Prices Hard To Compare

General Motors, Ford, and Chrysler have all posted their 1970 prices, and a reader may be pardoned if he's not sure he understands the price levels of the new models.

For the figures he reads about don't seem to jibe with the prices he's been paying.

A variety of factors make car prices difficult to analyze. Delivery charges vary, as do state and local taxes. And nearly all buyers seek extras — optional items not included in the base price. Finally, there's the matter of bargaining.

Less than 3% of all cars sold actually go for the amount listed on the window sticker. The rest are discounted from the window price, nearly 90% of them for 5% or more. Some discounts

go as high as 20%. Of course the costlier the car, the bigger the discount.

GM announced its "average" increase on a basic car was \$125 over last year. Ford said it had a \$108 boost; Chrysler, about the same.

But few people buy a stripped car — one with standard equipment only.

GM says the optional equipment purchased by a typical buyer runs the car price from \$3189 to \$3918.

Take a case of a big seller, Chevy's custom Impala, 2-door hardtop with an 8-cylinder engine. The base price is \$3266. With automatic transmission, power steering, power brakes, radio and air conditioning tacked on it, the price comes to \$4032.

Nearly 90% of all U.S. cars have automatic transmissions and V-8 engines. Nearly as many have radios and power steering. Nearly half have air conditioning and power brakes.

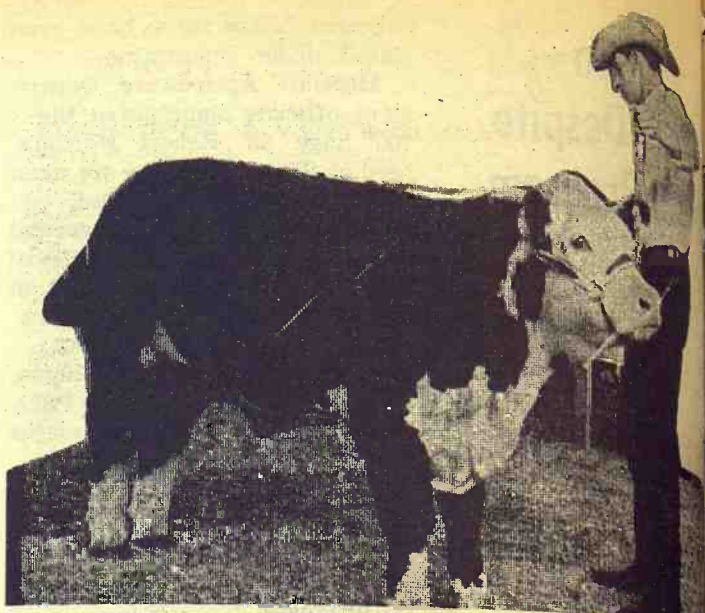
One break in the 1970 price boosts is that options generally are not more expensive. In fact, on several items, particularly automatic transmissions, all three companies made slight decreases.

Bond Vote For Osage County Bridges

LYNDON — A \$1.5 million bond issue to finance construction of 46 bridges in Osage County will be before voters Oct. 7.

Bucher and Willis, consulting engineers, of Salina, recently completed a study of 202 bridges in Osage County. The study claimed that at least 50 bridges are in need of replacement.

FARMERS OUTLOOK

Corn, Soybeans
'Just Fair'

The corn and soybeans crops are just "fair." This is the way we interpret the crop report made by the USDA on September 10.

Corn. The production of corn was estimated at 4312 million bushels — 1 percent less than the crop that was produced last year. The September estimate was the same as that made in August, and only a half a percent more than the first forecast made on the basis of conditions existing on July 1.

National average yield. This was estimated at 78.8 bushels — a tenth of a bushel more than the forecast made in August, and a half a bushel more than the first forecast (made in July).

The estimated yield of 78.8 bushels per acre is practically the same as those of the two previous years. The 1968 average was 78.5; the 1967 average, 78.6.

A yield of 78 to 79 bushels was very good two years ago, but it is below normal for 1969. On the basis of the upward trend of yields since 1955, a normal yield for 1969 would be around 82 bushels an acre.

Compared with last year, corn is better in Illinois, Indiana, Nebraska, Kentucky, and North Carolina, but poorer than a year ago in Iowa, Missouri, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, and Ohio.

Recent prices for corn were 15 to 20 cents a bushel higher than one year before. Prices have been higher this year because all of the excess stocks are locked up under the USDA price-support program.

Corn prices seem likely to sag 5 to 10 cents a bushel under the loan rate at harvest time. Farmers are expected to put enough corn under price support to lift prices to redemption levels by the following spring or summer. That would be 10 to 20 cents over the loan rate.

Soybeans. The September estimate of soybean production was 1055 million bushels, compared with 1080 million bushels in 1968. This is the first time in seven years that a new production record has not been established. Soybean production increased more than 50 percent in the four years from 1964 to 1968.

Soybean market. This has not kept pace with production. Hence the carryover increase from a skimpy 30 million bushels in 1965 to an excessive 300 million bushels on September 1 of this year. Most of this carryover is under price support loans.

The new crop is expected to exceed needs by 40 to 60 million bushels. All of the excess, and more, will be put under price support during the next few months. Later in the marketing year, prices are expected to rise enough above the support level to cause most farmers to redeem their beans and sell them.

The national average "loan rate" for the 1969 crop is \$2.25 a bushel for No. 1 beans. The loan rate for the 1968 crop was \$2.50 a bushel for No. 8 beans.

Average market prices probably will decline less than the reduction in the price-support level.

Auto Inspections

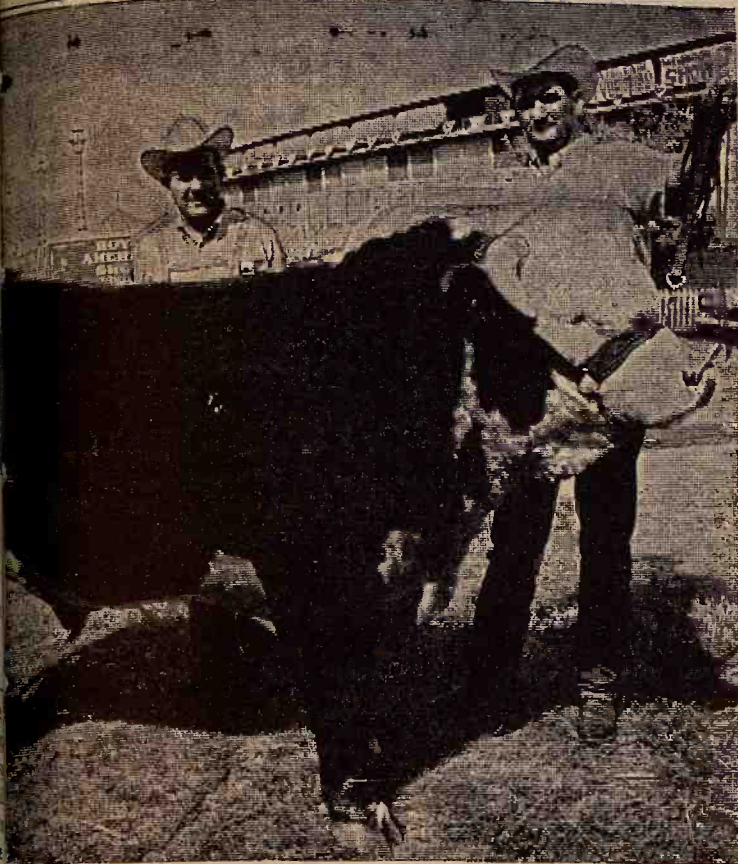
Auto inspections are eyed by some big companies as a new field.

RCA Service Co., an RCA Corp. division, makes proposals to Maryland and other states to operate their auto inspection systems. Bendix Corp. & Raytheon Co. are reported among several companies also interested in the idea. The companies wouldn't do any repair work themselves, but would only inspect autos and order motorists to get repairs done on their own.

RCA proposed to build efficient, assembly-line inspection stations, with expensive electronic gear, thus saving states huge capital investments. Backers of company-conducted inspections claim they would be an improvement over the practice in many states of licensing private garages to do both the inspecting and repairs.

WHAT? HOSPITAL CUTS
ITS ROOM RATES

A hospital in San Diego, Calif., is doing something unheard of in medical circles. The Doctors Hospital, a 219-bed facility, is reducing rates up to \$15 a day. Private rooms are being reduced from \$70 to \$55 a day. The administrator said the cuts were possible because of management efficiencies and streamlining operations.

See Grade A Over \$6 In '70

By Paul G. Christ

Kansas State University

Dairy farmers should continue to benefit from record high milk prices in the coming year. However, rising production costs may wipe out much of the gain from higher prices.

U.S. prices for Grade A milk should average 5.95 per cwt., up from \$5.69 in 1968. Prices may average \$6.10 in 1970.

Manufacturing milk should increase \$4.45 this year, well above the \$4.28 support price, and may increase to \$4.55 in 1970.

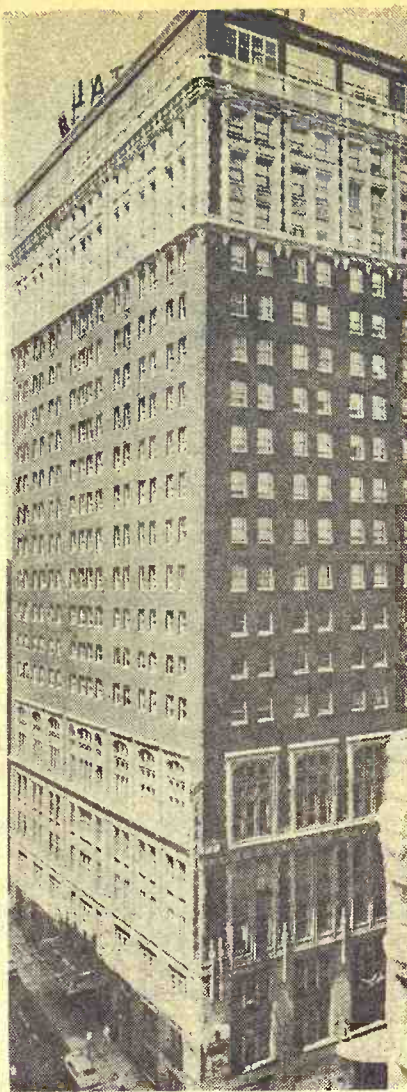
Kansas Grade A prices may jump to \$6.00 in 1969, 29 cents higher than 1968, and to \$6.10 in

1970. Manufacturing milk sells for less than the national average in Kansas, but should approach \$4.35 in 1969 and \$4.45 next year.

Most of labor and equipment will take the biggest jump among production expenses. Higher interest rates also will put pressure on dairy profits.

U.S. dairy production has dropped each year since 1964. Production for 1969 (115.6 billion pounds) will be 1.5 percent less than last year. The decline is expected to continue into 1970.

Kansas milk production also is declining, but at a slower rate. Last year's production (1717 million pounds) was 0.4 percent below 1967. Production is expected to dip to 1711 million pounds in 1969 and 1705 million pounds in 1970.



CONTINENTAL SOLD

Renewable 4 year scholarships, in addition, are provided by about 400 corporations and others. The 4-year winners receive up to \$1500 a year, depending upon individual need.

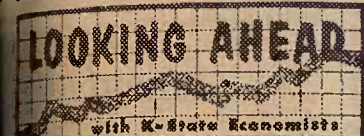

Tough Talk In Egg Forecast

By M. E. Jackson
Poultry Marketing
Kansas State University

Prices down, production expenses up — that's a capsule summary for the outlook for egg marketing during the next 12 months.

U.S. farm prices for eggs are expected to average about four cents below year earlier levels.



Higher interest rates and feed prices likely will boost egg production costs by one-half cent a dozen.

Look for egg prices to average 34 to 35 cents a dozen during October-December 1969, about 35 cents during January-March 1970; dropping to about 30 cents during April-June.

Kansas producers can expect prices to be 3 or 4 cents a dozen below the U.S. average. This would indicate a market price of 26-29 cents a dozen during the middle part of 1970. Prices for the current receipt producer will average near 20 cents a dozen during this period.

Turkey prices should average 22-23 cents a pound this fall, up from 20.7 cents in 1968.

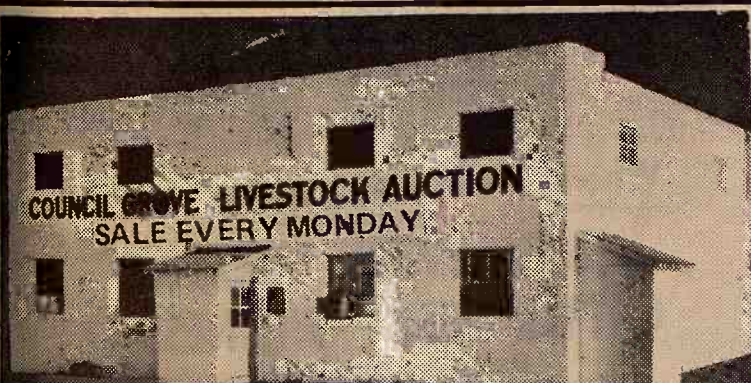

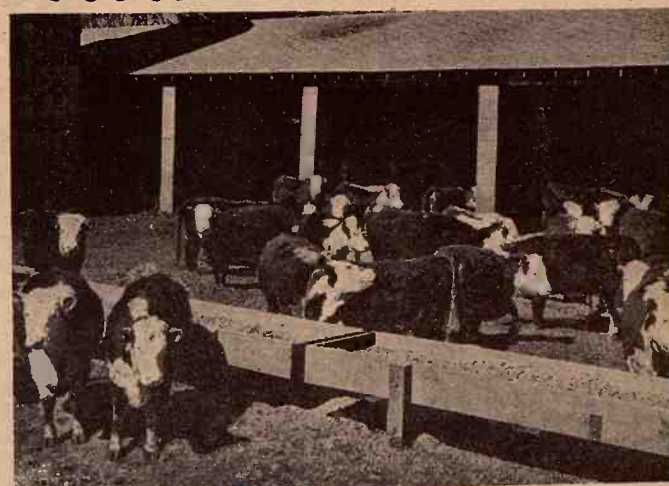

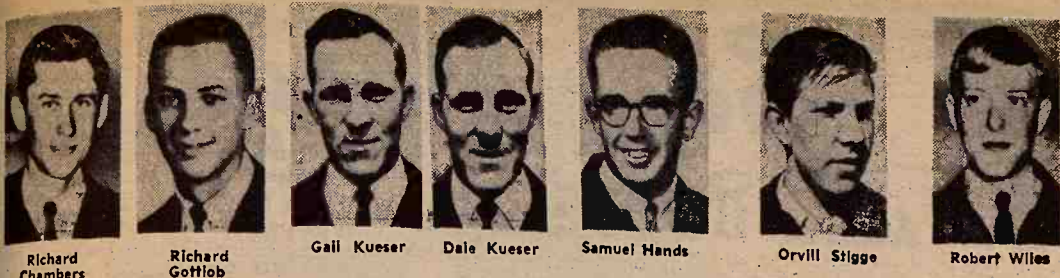

KANSANS TO GET FFA'S AMERICAN FARMER DEGREE

Seven Kansans are included in the group of 480 FFA'ers who will receive the organization's highest award, the American Farmer Degree, at the convention at Kansas City next month.

Included are twins, Dale and Gail Kueser of Garnett. They farm in partnership with their father, James Kueser, on nearly 3000 acres of land in eastern Kansas. Each of the men has a swine operation of more than 250 hogs, about 100 head of cattle, 200 acres in corn, 80 in wheat and 130 in soybeans.

From Washington is Orville Stigge, second from right. He is in partnership with his father John and a brother, handling about 3000 head of cattle, nearly 1000 acres of pasture, plus grain crops. Orville's brother got his American Farming degree last year.

A young man fully in charge of his own farming operation is Richard Gottlob, second from left, of Ark City. Richard is married and has one son. He operates 700 acres of farmland in Southern Kansas where he has beef breeding herd, stocker cattle and wheat.

Three western Kansas boys are on the list: Richard Chambers, Oberlin; Samuel Hands, Garden City; and Robert Wiles, Leoti.

Choice Of Risks In Taking 'Pill'

To future generations, the 20th century will be known for man's walk on the moon, the release of atomic energy, transplantation of human organs, breaking of the genetic code, and development of the airplane

and car.

But, in the opinion of Dr. Louis Hellman, famed New York obstetrician, the nick-of-time discovery of an easy-to-use contraceptive in the second third of this century will be more significant than anything else. For if man is to have a future beyond the 20th century, he has to control his runaway fertility.

Since birth-control pills were introduced for general prescription in 1961, about 8½ million American women have taken them.

So prominent has it become

that of all the medications that humans swallow, only this has attained the prominence of an exclusive designation: "the pill."

Never have so many apparently healthy people taken so potent a drug voluntarily over so long a period for objectives other than control of disease.

The reason for the pill's popularity is a virtual 100 percent effectiveness in preventing pregnancy.

Yet it was inevitable that so potent a drug, packing 75 to 80 micrograms of estrogen, the female hormone, in a package the size of an aspirin tablet would affect the body's physiology.

Such side effects are not worrisome because they disappear. Of concern is the link of the pill to blood clots that can travel to the lungs and cause death.

Oral contraceptives are blamed for three embolic deaths a year for every 100,000 American women who take them. But the Food and Drug Administration said "the ratio of benefit to risk is sufficiently high to justify the designation 'safe.'" But it advised caution in selecting patients and recommended continuing study.

Pharmaceutical houses, while insisting the hazard is lower than the death rate from pregnancy itself, are hedging their bets with research on a new generation of "safe" oral contraceptives.

G. D. Searle & Co., whose Enovid was the first of about 20 oral contraceptives, has a new "mini-pill" almost ready for market. Four or five other companies are about ready to produce the new-type contraceptive that will contain no estrogen.

Some doctors and their patients who have abstained from the pill awaiting "miracle pills" will be somewhat disappointed, however.

No pharmaceutical company

has been able to make the new agent completely effective.

Estimates are it will be from 92 to 98 percent protective, meaning that pregnancies will occur in 20 to 80 users for each 1000 in a year.

Present oral contraceptives are near-perfect in this respect, permitting only one pregnancy in a thousand each year, according to the new FDA report.

Thus, the physician and patient will have an option: Complete effectiveness and some risk or incomplete effectiveness and no risk.

Food Stamp Shift From USDA

Food stamps will apparently stay a part of the federal welfare program, even if President Nixon's proposed income-maintenance system is accepted.

But the stamp program will be taken from the Agriculture Department and become a part of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

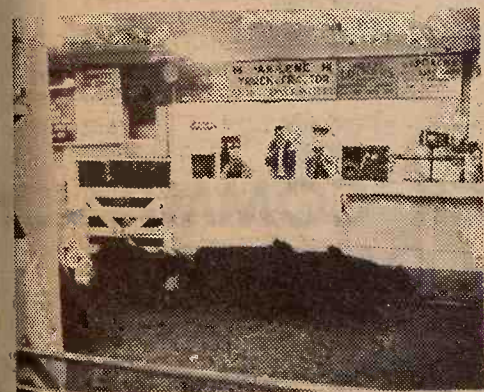
Some critics have seen the Nixon proposals as meaning the end of food stamps.

Needy persons pay a fraction of the face value of food stamps, which are then used to purchase merchandise at neighborhood stores.

Both Agriculture Secretary Clifford Hardin and HEW secretary Robert Finch said it was logical to shift the food-stamp program to HEW because that department would administer the new family-assistance system.

The shift would not come until after enactment of the program.

Liberals in both parties have long urged that a department other than agriculture administer the stamp program, contending the Agriculture Department is interested primarily in farmers and not hungry people.
