PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Future Farmer members of Kansas can rightfully foel proud of the many important contributions they have made to the war effort. Victory now seems near at hand. However, continued loyal support by every FFA member will help bring the conflict to a close sooner. Let's all be good finishers, with no let-down in our efforts.

Our goal for 1944-45 in the FFA Victory War Program is to surpass last year's good record. To accomplish this goal each FFA member will need to do his full part in carrying on such important activities as machinery repair, farm labor recruitment, bend and stamp purchases, feed production, conservation, and salvage.

Already some World War II voterans have returned from service and many more will likely come home during the year. F.F.A. Chapters have an opportunity and a responsibility to aid these returning veterans in solving some of their problems. I suggest that each chapter include this activity in its program of work for the year.

Every member should set his leadership, scholarship, farming program, and cooperative activity goals high; and work diligently toward achievement of those goals throughout

the year.

Plans for improvement of chapter records and reports, parliamentary and ritualistic proficiency, publicity, and chapter libraries deserve our attention in this year's

program.

Because we will have fewer active chapters than we had last year, it is highly important that we have 100% cooperation on the part of chapters in the matter of securing F.F.A. membership. It is equally important that we have full cooperation of all chapters in carrying out the State Association program of work.

It is hoped that each chapter will be represented at one of the District Leadership Schools which will be held early this fall. These schools should be of real value to

all now F.F.A. Chapter Officers.

With a realization of the many worthwhile opportunities open to every FFA member in Kansas, let us all resolve to go forward together and make this FFA year one of outstanding accomplishment.

1944-45 STATE FFA PROGRAM OF WORK

- 1. A farming program of maximum size and scope for each boy commensurate with the ability of the boy and the home farm opportunity.
- 2. A continuous program of repair and construction of farm machinery and equipment.
- 3. Prevent waste of all kinds. (Conserve natural resources; Control Farm Fires, Livostock Losses; Eradicate Pests.)
- 4. So far as possible produce on the farm all the needs of the farm and farm family.
- 5. As individuals and as chapters purchase all War Bonds and Stamps possible.
- 6. Take every precaution against farm accidents. They result in suffering, less of manpower, damaged equipment, and sometimes cost lives.
- 7. Carry on a continuous salvage campaign. The scrap metal and rubber from American farms can be vital factors in winning the war.
 - 8. Assist returning veterans in becoming established in farming.
- 9. One hundred per cent of the Kansas vocational agriculture departments establish chapters of FFA and strive for 100 per cent enrollment of eligible members.
- 10. Each chapter to have a definite program of activities for the year and this program to be submitted to the state office not later than November 1, 1944. Each chapter to present an achievement report at the annual meeting of the State Association. Only chapters submitting activity programs by November 1 will be eligible for State Farmer or American Farmer candidates, and to participate in the state FFA public speaking contest.
- 11. Nine issues of the FFA newsletter to be published, beginning with September and monthly thereafter for nine months. Copies of each issue will be sent to the efficers of the National Organization of Future Farmers of America, to all state advisors, and to a select list of agricultural teacher trainers and agricultural leaders.
- 12. As a means of inculcating sound thrift principles, the State Association encourages careful selection, management, and financing of supervised farming programs.
- 13. Encourage parliamentary proficiency among local chapters, and encourage ritualistic proficiency throughout the State Association. It is recommended that each chapter own sufficient copies of both the FFA manual and Stewart's Parliamentary Procedure to furnish a copy of both for each officer. It is further recommended that sufficient copies of both publications be owned by the chapter to make both readily available to all local members.

1944-45 State FFA Program of Work (Continued)

14. Encourage 100 per cent of chapters to use official FFA secretary's and official FFA treasurer's books.

15, Support FFA contests of state and national scope.

- 16, Publicity-Encourage local chapters to keep the public informed as to worth while activities, and the State Association to give publicity to activities of state and national interest.
- 17. Encourage home improvement by members of local chapters to include landscaping, beautification, repair, electrification, previding comfort and conveniences.
- 18. It is recommended that each chapter provide and use the following list paraphernalia:

CHAPTER ACTIVITY PROGRAM

Nevember 1 is the deadline date for filing local chapter activity programs with the state department. Address same to Executive Adviser A. P. Davidson, Kansas State College, Manhattan, Kansas.

Official Activity Program Blanks in sufficient quantities to supply a copy of the local chapter activity program for the state office will be mailed all chapters at an early date. In former years the state office furnished sufficient copies of the official activity program blanks to provide one copy for the local chapter. This year, due to scarcity of paper, the local chapter will be expected to furnish its own paper for the program of work going in the chapter files.

Helpful Suggestions for building the chapter activity program will be found in the special issue of the Kansas Future Farmers, October 1, 1938, and in the

official FFA Manual, pp 31-36.

Committee Appointments for building the chapter activity program should include all members of the chapter. Every effort should be made to have a program built and endersed by the chapter, and not merely a program set up by the officers and advisor.

Calendaring Activities for the year, by months, is important. Too many activities at a given time will likely result in a scattering of effort and a lowering of standards. Too few activities will cause loss of interest. Fit your program of activities in with the school and community programs. This will avoid conflicts and the possibility of demanding too much time and energy on the part of certain members of your chapter.

All-Cut-War Effort should be given increased emphasis this year. The purchasing of war bonds and stamps, the repair of farm machinery, collecting scrap and waste materials, prevention of waste, and increased food production should be MUST features of the 1944-45 FFA activity programs.

KANSAS FFA PUBLIC SPEAKING WINNER KILLED

We are sorry to announce to our FFA members and friends that Earl Mitchell, Lawrence chapter, the 17 year old winner of the 1944 state FFA public speaking contest, was struck by a train on August 1, while driving a pick-up truck across the railroad tracks on his home farm and died without regaining consciousness. Funeral services were held at Lawrence, August 4. The state association of FFA sent flowers. Executive Adviser A. P. Davidson and Dr. Howard T. Hill of KSC attended the services.

Earl Mitchell was rated by Kansas adult FFA leaders on a par with the 1942 national winner from Kansas, Kenneth Engle, of the Abilene chapter. Earl's subject was "My World", and in his speech he painted the picture of the kind of a world he wanted to live in. He had high hopes for the important part he visualized the FFA taking in the shaping of his now world.

A copy of the winning speech will appear in the October issue of the Kansas Future Farmer Newsletter, and we urge every FFA member in Kansas to read Earl's splendid visualization of "My World", the kind of a world FFA members want to live in and have a part in helping build. The October issue of the American Farm Youth Magazine will carry a review of this speech.

Earl has left a living message in his winning speech which should be a challenge to every FFA member in Kansas, and while we mourn his loss, we do appreciate the idealism left us by him through his exemplorary life and his conception of the kind of world he visualized.

KANSAS FFA BOY HAS BEST FAT LAMB
