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## OUT OF THE POPPER

Joe Clemence watches popped milo flow into a hopper. Four tons of popped milo an hour are produced by the 800-degree metal popper. It comes out at four to five percent moisture and "should keep forever," says Clemence. Generally it is stored for a day before the ration is mixed and fed.

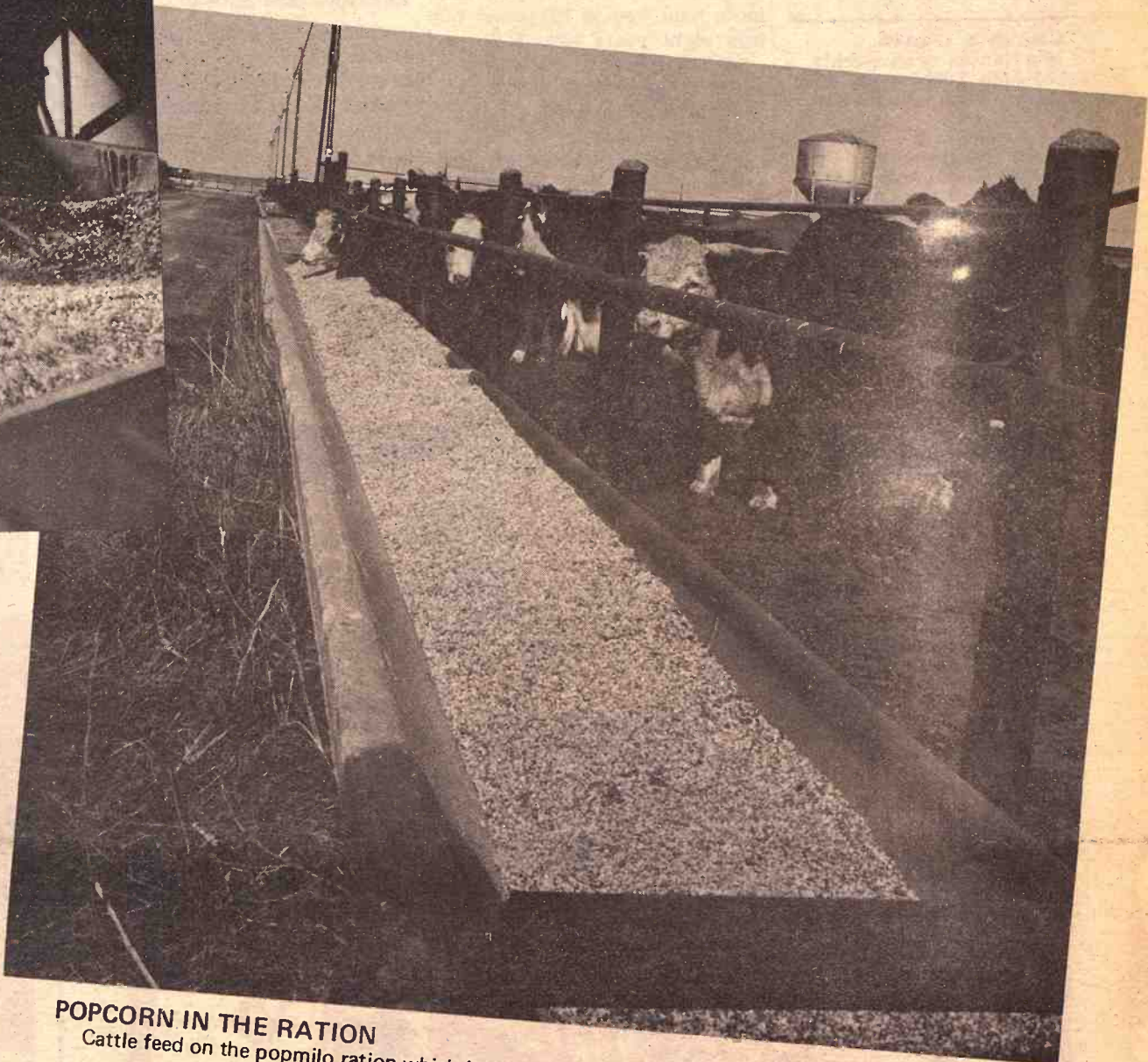
## Without Seasoning or Salt

The location is no movie theatre, and the stuff isn't quite popcorn. The place is a former airbase turned to a cattle feedlot, and the stuff is popped milo.

Mixed with commercial supplements and sorghum silage, the popped milo is the ration for the cattle at the Herington Cattle Co. feedlot, located on an abandoned World War II airfield.

The popped milo is not at all unlike popcorn. It rather tastes like it, and it is popped in an 800-degree metal popper grandly proportioned from a theatre popcorn popper.

Owner Joe Clemence has been using the ration



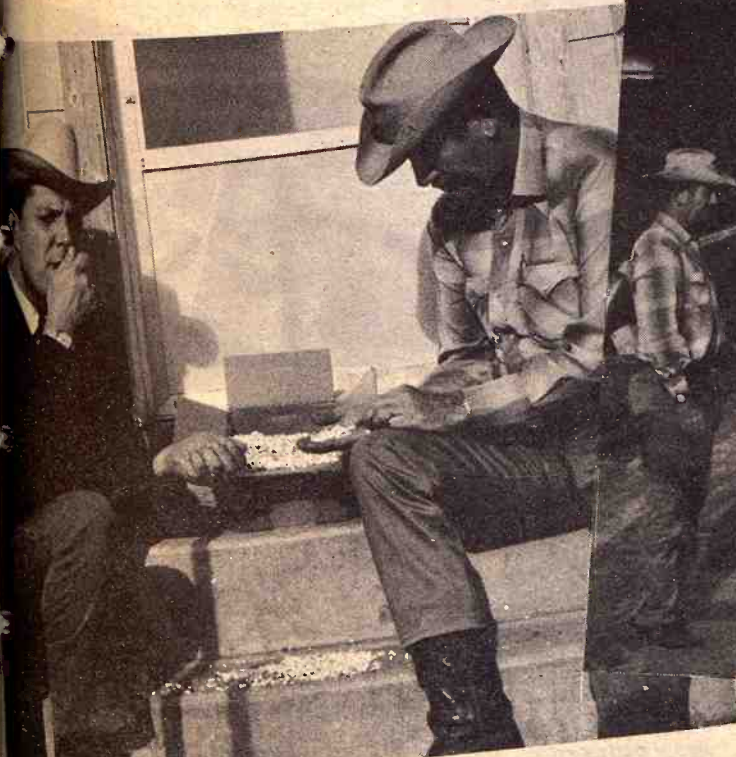
## POPCORN IN THE RATION

only a few weeks and he says it is too early to tell about gains and cost, but he figures it will be as good or better than the dry rolled ration of corn, wheat and milo he fed previously.

Cargill, Inc., which has worked with Clemence in starting the popped milo ration, says the Herington

operation is one of the first in the country to try the popped milo. Cargill claims that popped milo is easier for cattle to digest than the tiny brown milo kernels, that it is more palatable because it is partly cooked and easier for the animal to break down in its paunch.

## Nearly 7% More Lean Cuts On Modern Hog

RALEIGH, N.C. — There may be more to the pork industry's "hogs are beautiful" slogan than a lot of promotional drum beating.

Today's trim, slim and sleek animal is, indeed, the fairest of the species in all of recorded swine history.

Purebred breeders have placed a high premium on body conformation and blood lines in selecting and promoting breeding stock.

Borne out in eight years of

data from the Swine Evaluation Station operated by North Carolina State University, these figures show what has happened in the last eight years:

— The amount of lean cuts of live weight has increased 6.8 per cent. This means that a 200-pound hog today has over 13½ pounds more red meat than the same size hog of eight years ago.

— The amount of lean cuts as a percentage of chilled carcass weight has jumped a big 9.4 per cent. This is like getting a third shoulder.

— This amount of ham as a percentage of chilled carcass weight has increased 2.5 per cent. This means that a 150-lb. carcass today has 3¼ pounds more ham than a 150-pound carcass eight years ago.

— The amount of shoulder as a percentage of chilled carcass weight has increased 4.2 per cent.

"These figures are clear indication of how our breeders have been selecting their animals," observed Ray Woodard, NCSU swine specialist. "They have

placed great emphasis on body traits. As a result, the entire pork industry and the consumer have benefited. Producers have trimmed the fat off the animal and put more muscle on, and the consumer has a higher quality pork product."

But there is a sour note in this story. Hogs definitely have become more "beautiful" but, according to evaluation station figures, they haven't made the desired improvement in performance.

"We've got to put more emphasis on selecting for performance. There should be some happy medium between selecting for body and performance traits that will make improvements in both conformation and growth."

Reasonable goals for producers to shoot for, the specialist believes, is feed conversion of around 2.6 or 2.7 pounds of feed per pound of gain and a daily gain of 2 pounds.

"This is the direction the industry will be moving during the next few years," Woodard believes.

## Two-Thirds Of Farmers Don't Really Have Farms

An interesting sidelight to a rapidly changing American agriculture is the extreme variation in relative size and economic importance of the nation's three million farms.

According to the Economics Research Service of the United States Department of Agriculture, roughly one third of these farms are commercial farms producing gross sales of \$10,000 or more per farm per year. These farms receive about 85 percent of the total cash receipts from farming.

Another third of the farms account for about 12 percent of

farm output. Their operations rely on \$3 of off-farm income for every \$2 of farm income they generate.

The remaining third of the nation's farms would be more properly termed rural dependences since the operators are almost wholly dependent on non-farm or retirement income.

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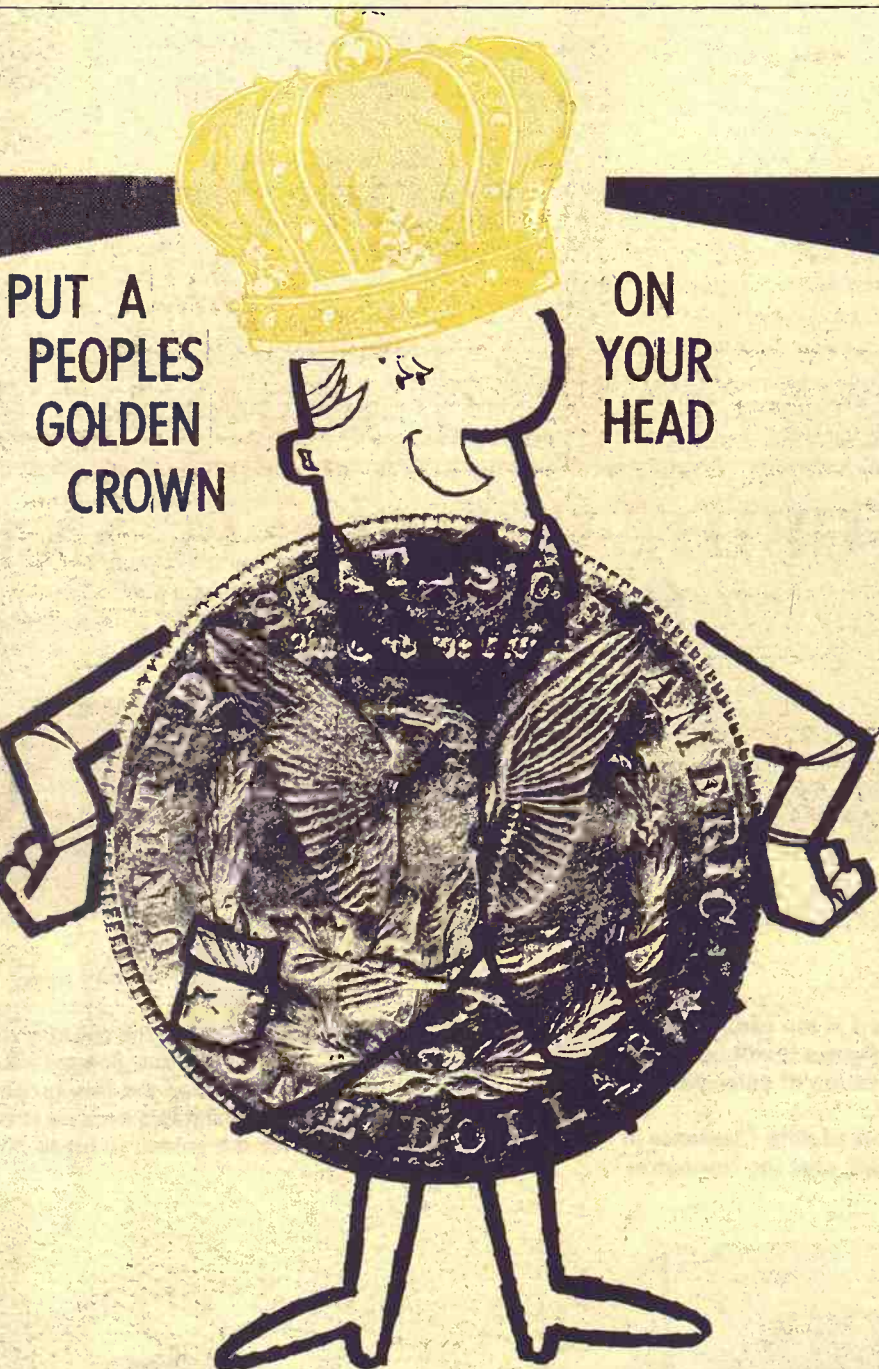
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# Here's Latest Fall Crop Forecast

Record or near record yields per acre were expected for the major fall crops in Kansas but harvest was behind normal because of unfavorable weather, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

As of November 1 production of sorghum grain and sugar beets was expected to reach record highs and soybeans and dry beans to be the second largest on record.

Corn production was indicated to be the largest crop in 25 years. Some 182 million bushels of sorghum grain was expected to be harvested, 12 percent above last year and a third more than average.

Corn production was expected to be 88 million bushels, more than 40 percent above average for the past five years.

Soybean production was estimated at 22 million bushels compared with a record 24 million last year and an average of 16 million. Yield per acre prospects continued excellent with sorghum grain record high, corn equalling the record and soybeans the second best on record.

Harvest of sorghum grain, soybeans, sugar beets and dry beans was well behind usual on November 1 because of wet fields, but drier weather in early November was permitting resumption of harvest.

Seeding of the 1970 winter wheat crop was virtually completed by November 1 and stands were good to excellent except for some scattered localities where

heavy rains or insects damaged stands.

Soil moisture supplies in wheat fields at mid-October were the best in eight years. Grazing of volunteer wheat has been extensive this fall and prospects are good for pasture from seeded wheat which is just beginning to be used. The State's second largest hay crop of 5.5 million tons coupled with good silage and other forage crops should provide adequate supplies of roughage for livestock during the winter.

## Sorghum Grain

On November 1, production of sorghum grain was indicated at a record 182,229,000 bushels, 12 percent larger than last year and 9 percent greater than the previous record set in 1960.

Production prospects were good throughout the state despite some losses from insect damage, lodging and mold. Expected yield per acre on November 1 was a record setting 57 bushels, 10 bushels above last year and 8 bushels above the previous record set in 1966.

Killing freezes around mid-October stopped growth over most of the State. Some late fields failed to reach full maturity but damage was fairly limited. Wet weather in late October slowed harvest and this coupled with snow in northwest Kansas resulted in considerable lodging.

## Corn

Corn for grain production was estimated at 88,425,000 bushels, 4 percent above last year and the

largest crop since 1944. The estimated yield per acre of 75 bushels was down a little from earlier expectations but equal to last year's record high.

Corn harvest was nearly three-fifths completed by November 1 and progressing about normally. Some lodging and ear droppage resulted from snows in northwest Kansas and heavy rains elsewhere.

## Soybeans

Production of soybeans is estimated at 22,011,000 bushels, 8 percent below the previous record crop set last year. The yield per acre this year of 23 bushels was second only to last year's 25 bushels.

Wet fields in the main soybean growing areas slowed combining and only two-thirds of the acreage had been harvested by November 1, well behind usual.

## Other Crops

Sugar beet production for Kansas was estimated at 782,000 tons, resulting from a slightly above average yield of 17 tons per acre on the state's largest acreage to date.

The state's dry bean crop of 180,000 cwt. compares with last year's crop of 170,000 cwt. Yield prospects declined from a month earlier as wet fields continued to delay completion of the dry bean harvest.

Commercial apple production is expected to total 16.0 million pounds, slightly more than the 15.9 million pounds produced in 1968 and will be the largest crop since 1951.

## Pasture Condition

Pasture feed was good to excel-

lent in nearly all areas of the state. On November 1 pasture feed condition was reported at 86 percent of normal, 8 points above last year.

## Milk and Egg Production

Milk production in Kansas during October totaled 134 million pounds, 1 percent above the September output. Eggs produced on Kansas farms during October were estimated at 71 million. This was 2 million more eggs than in September and the same as in October last year which was the lowest for the month since 1936.

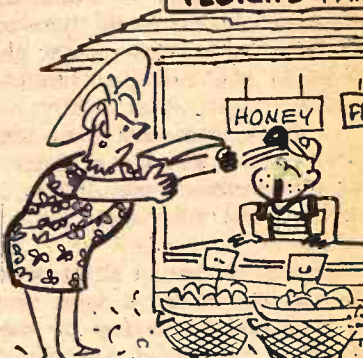
## United States

Production of sorghum grain in the United States is forecast at a record high 757 million bushels, 3 percent above last year.

Corn grain production was estimated at 4444 million bushels on November 1, up 2 percent from last year but 7 percent be-

low the record crop of 1967. Soybean production is forecast at a record 1094 million bushels, 1 percent more than the previous record set last year.

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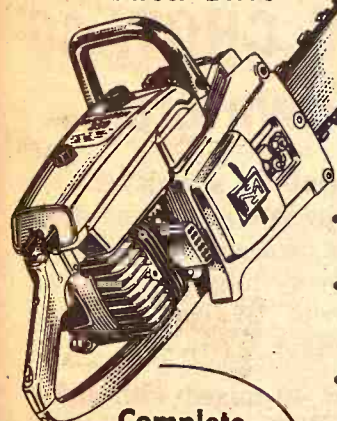
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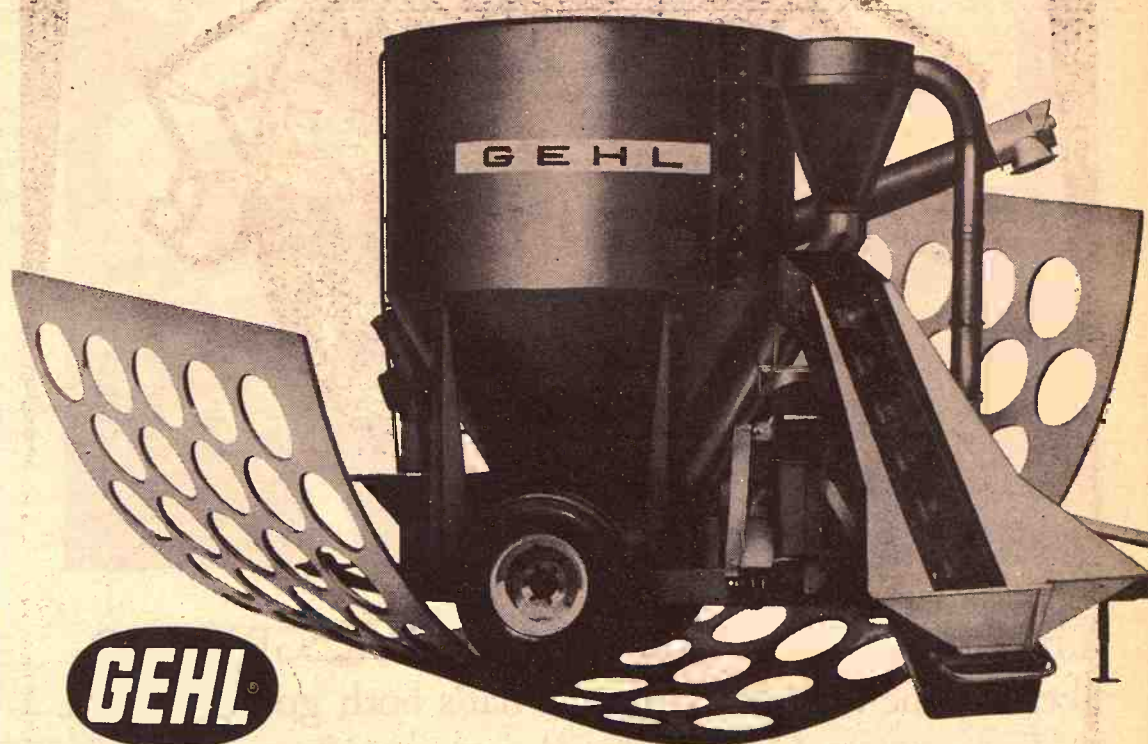
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# Review Study On Feedlot Wastes

DETROIT, Mich. — Fattening cattle in feedlots, rather than on the range as in earlier days, has increased the need to control feedlot runoff — especially in areas of concentrated livestock operations — lest the effluent adversely affect soils, water supplies, and ultimately public health.

"Effects of Feedlot Effluent on Four Kansas Soils," a paper read at the annual meeting of the American Society of Agronomy in Detroit, Mich., was a preview of research at Kansas State University aimed at finding effective controls for feedlot waste disposal. Presented by David O. Travis, recently a research assistant at KSU and now at Northeast Missouri State College, the paper is based on a pilot study of uncontaminated loam-soil cores.

Feedlot effluent, or waste, containing various concentrations of sodium, potassium, ammonium, calcium, and magnesium, was passed through the soil cores to

determine flow rate, chemical concentrations at various depths, and amount of effluent required to "plug" the soils, or to make them impermeable. One finding of the laboratory tests was that the effluent significantly increased the total nitrogen content of the surface three centimeters of the cores.

The pilot study is the first phase of a cooperative project being conducted by the KSU Departments of Agricultural Engineering Administration, Agronomy, and Civil Engineering and being supported by a grant from the U.S. Department of Interior.

Research goals are to determine: (1) Methods for disposing of solid feedlot nutrients; (2) maximum amounts of nutrients that soils will take; and (3) chemical effects of the materials on the soils. Soils being tested — in the laboratories at Manhattan and in field-research stations at Pratt — are those receiving wastes from the Pratt feedlot, one of the most modern

in the country.

Results of the study should be useful in planning feedlots that can accommodate effluents without contaminating either cropland soils or surface and ground water supplies.

This cake is real moist and has a wonderful flavor."

#### GREEN TOMATO MINCEMEAT CAKE

- 2 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 3 cups bread flour
- 1 cup sweet milk
- 3 eggs
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- 4 tablespoons molasses
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup green tomato mincemeat

Cream shortening and sugar, then add eggs, one at a time. To this mixture, add the flour, baking powder, salt and flavoring alternating with the milk and molasses. Mix well and last stir in the green tomato mincemeat. Bake in a 9x13-inch pan at 350 degrees for 45 minutes.

Mrs. Carl Noble, R 7, Topeka, sent a timely recipe for those of you fortunate enough to have prairie chicken in the freezer or whose husbands plan to bring some home in December:

#### PRAIRIE CHICKEN

Wash chicken carefully. Pat dry with absorbent paper. Fill cavity with celery leaves and half an apple. Truss into shape; salt and pepper. Place in small roasting pan with 2 cups water. Baste with margarine or butter and roast for 60 minutes in 425-degree oven. Remove celery leaves and apple before serving. "This is delicious."

Mrs. Oscar Richter, Maple Hill, sent the following recipe:

#### FROSTY CRANBERRY SALAD

- 1 16-ounce can whole cranberry sauce (2 cups)
- 1 8 1/4 ounce can (1 cup) crushed pineapple, drained
- 1 cup dairy sour cream
- 1/4 cup sifted confectioners' sugar

Combine cranberry sauce and crushed pineapple. Stir together sour cream and confectioners' sugar; add to fruit mixture. Line a 3-cup refrigerator tray with foil; pour in fruit mixture. Freeze firm. To serve, turn out frozen salad and let stand a few minutes at room temperature. Remove foil and cut in six wedges. If desired, cut three well-drained pineapple rings in half; place one half atop each cran-

berry wedge. Six servings.

#### BROWN SUGAR MUFFINS

- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/4 cup white sugar
- 1/4 cup brown sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 3 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 beaten egg
- 1/2 cup cooking oil
- 1/2 cup milk

Mix dry ingredients thoroughly. beat egg and add milk. Make a well in flour mixture and pour in oil, egg and milk. Stir just enough to moisten. Bake at 400 degrees F. for 20-25 minutes. Makes 16 medium-sized muffins. Use greased tins or cupcake forms. For holiday breakfasts. Leftovers stay moist.

Mrs. Philip Novak, Blue Rapids: "We sure enjoy the Grass & Grain and I look for the recipe page first. Here is my holiday recipe:"

#### BRIOCHE

- 1 cup scalded milk
- 1 cup oleo
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 cakes yeast
- 1/4 cup warm water
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 4 1/2 cups flour

Scald milk. Add oleo, salt, sugar. Stir until oleo melts. When lukewarm, add yeast that is dissolved in lukewarm water. Add beaten eggs. Beat flour into mixture. Let raise in warm place six hours. Braids: Dust a bread board lightly with flour. Cut into small strips and twist into a circle, then pinch together and let raise. Then put a small amount of green and red cherries in the center and bake at 400 degrees for 20 minutes.

#### KENTUCKY COLONELS

Melt 1 stick butter or margarine. Add 3 tablespoons bourbon and 1 1/2 cups nuts, chopped fine, and 1 pound powdered sugar. Add 1 teaspoon vanilla. Mix well and roll into small balls. Place on waxed paper and let chill.

Second part: Melt 1 package German chocolate and 1/4 cake paraffin in top of double boiler and dip pieces in chocolate mixture and place on waxed paper to chill. "Real good."

#### CHRISTMAS DESSERT

- 1 pint cream, whipped
  - 1 tablespoon gelatin
  - 1/2 cup sugar

  - 1 8-ounce package miniature marshmallows
  - 1/4 cup chopped walnuts
  - 1 small can pineapple
  - 14 graham crackers, crushed
  - 5 tablespoons melted oleo
  - 1 box red gelatin
- Mix together whipped cream, sugar, gelatin (which has been softened in hot water), marshmallows, nuts and pineapple. Pat the graham crackers and butter mixture in the bottom of a 9x13x2-inch baking dish. Add whipped cream mixture and smooth over the surface and place in refrigerator until set. - 1 tablespoon brown sugar

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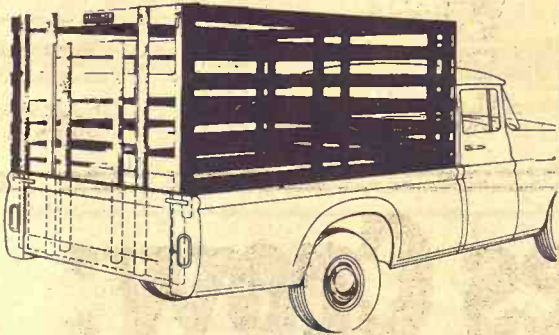
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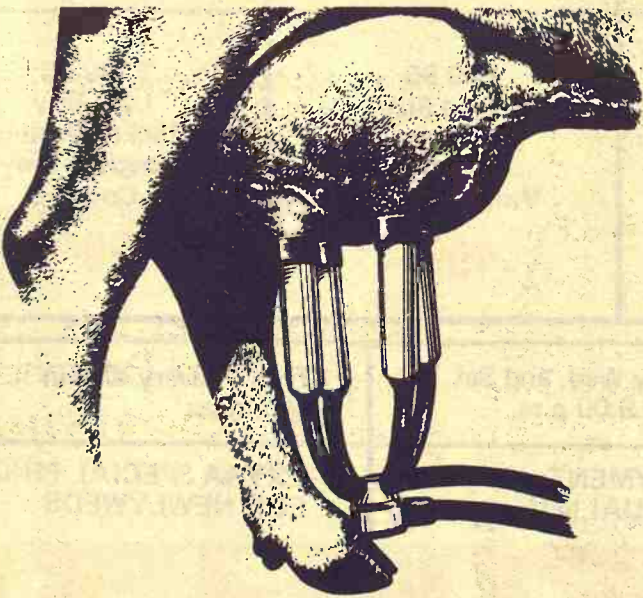

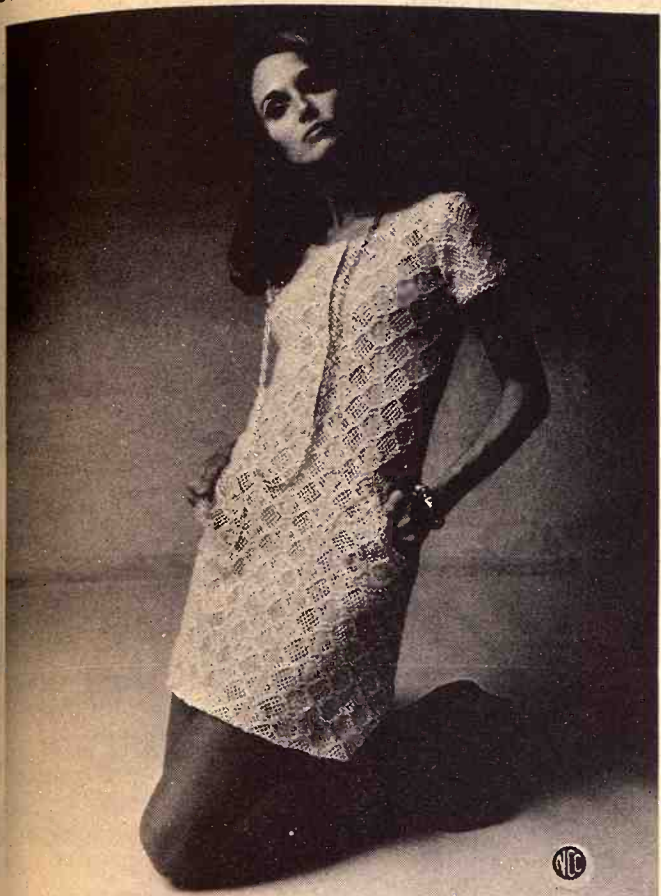

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## Electric Blanket Maintains Constant Temperature Thru Nite

Control of environment for man's comfort is a goal of today's scientists and highly sophisticated solutions are being planned. Excitement over such developments can overshadow the environmental controls already available — such as the electric blanket.

The electric blanket is engineered to maintain a constant temperature throughout the

night. Single or dual controls at the head of the bed set the desired temperature and regulate the flow of electric current thru strong waterproof plastic insulated wires threaded through channels in the blanket. Thermostats placed at intervals along the wiring automatically cut off the current if the blanket becomes too warm.

Most of today's electric blan-

kets are soft, light acrylic. They machine wash well and should not be dry cleaned; improper dry cleaning fluids may corrode the insulation. Fitted electric blankets are also becoming increasingly popular. They add a tailored finish to a bed and eliminate bulky folds at the bottom which are the usual cause of unwanted heat.

As with all electric equipment, look for the Underwriters Laboratories (UL) seal when selecting an electric blanket. The seal indicates that it has been checked and certified for safety. Also,

be certain that the blanket is guaranteed for a reasonable length of time.

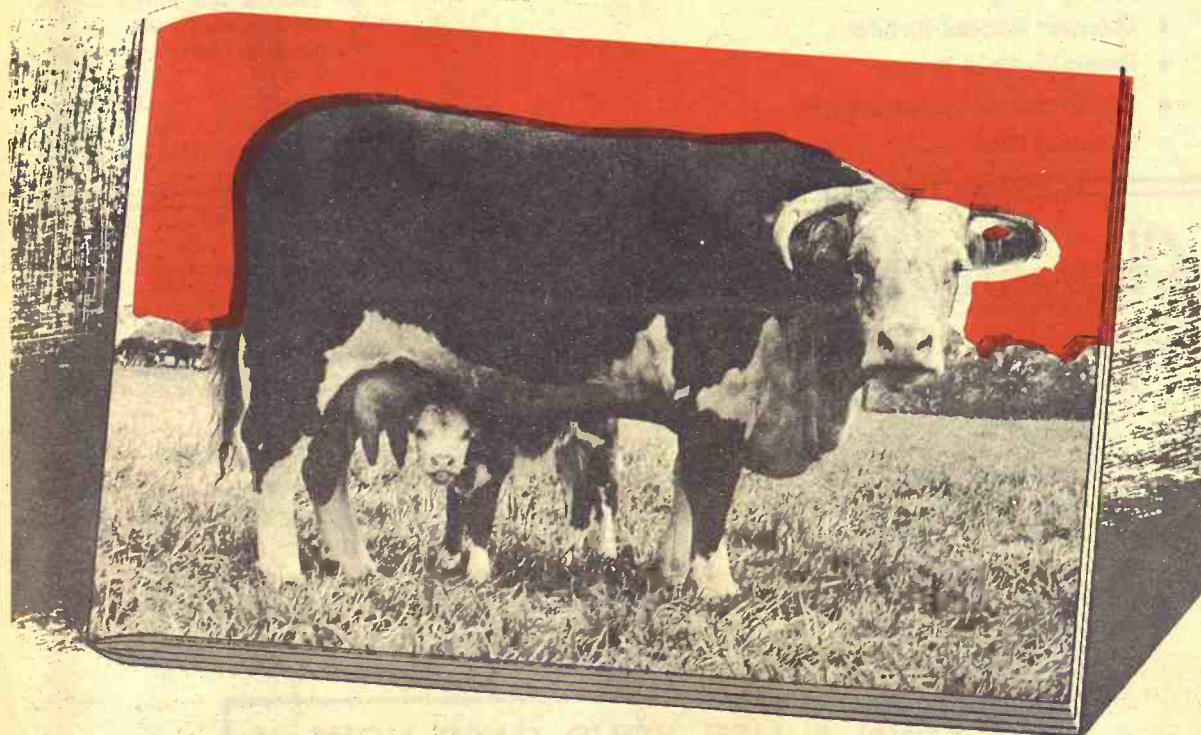
## Safe Bathrooms

You can prevent many of the accidents that frequently occur in homes. Redecorate your bathroom with safety in mind. Use suction-type bath mats or non-slip strips in tubs and shower stalls to prevent falls. Wall-mounted grab bars or hand rails near showers and tubs can break a fall. Be sure the shower curtain rod is fastened securely to the wall. You're likely to grab for the curtain if you slip. Keep special containers for razor blades. Never drop them in the waste basket. Don't keep glass in the bathroom; use plastic glasses and containers.

Thinking of taking up this winter? Get into it first. Start working out on a regular basis long before you begin skiing. Your workout should include toe-touching exercises, deep-knee bends, and strenuous bodybuilding exercises. Equip yourself with skis and boots that fit properly. When you get to the slopes, go up for instruction. No one is a "born skier." You've got to be taught. And as a beginner, be sure you stick to the beginner slope.

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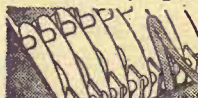

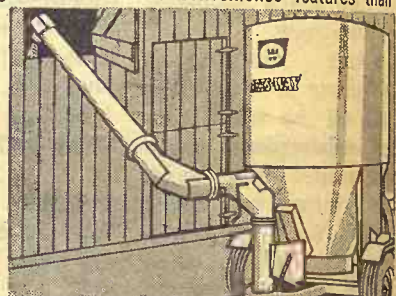

Smallpox Shots  
For Kids? Experts  
Debate It

Two researchers from the National Communicable Disease Center have recommended that

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routine childhood smallpox vaccination be discontinued.  
The benefits, they declared, no longer outweigh the risks.  
The recommendation came from Dr. J. Michael Lane, chief of the domestic branch of the center's smallpox eradication program, and Dr. J. D. Millar, director of the program, in a report to a meeting of the American Public Health Association.  
The recommendation does not represent the official viewpoint of the Communicable Disease Center. The center, in Atlanta, is part of the Health, Education and Welfare Department.

A similar report from Dr. Lane and Dr. Millar is to appear in the November 27 issue of the New England Journal of Medicine, along with rebuttal from Dr. Samuel L. Katz, chairman of the pediatrics department at Duke University, and Dr. Saul J. Krugman, New York University pediatrician.

Dr. Katz was quoted in the latest issue of Medical World News, a weekly journal for physicians, as saying he feels that reactions to smallpox vaccine, which cause seven to eight deaths a year, are no justification for stopping mass vaccination.

Dr. Lane and Dr. Millar argued that the United States can expect a minimum of 210 deaths from vaccination reactions in the next 30 years.

They said eliminating the vaccination of children, while continuing it for such high risk groups as health workers, travelers and military recruits, would reduce the figure to about 60 deaths.

Dr. Lane and Dr. Millar said "vigilant surveillance" and rapid control of any outbreaks are the keys to keeping a nation free of smallpox.

"In the rare event that a mass vaccination campaign has to be

carried out," they said, "it could be done rapidly and inexpensively."

## Soybeans Looking Up Again

Soybean prices have been very strong this fall. Although prices are lower now than they were a year ago, they have not come down nearly as much as the price-support loan rate. A year ago, the loan rate set the price of soybeans. Similarly, the cost of soybeans to processors largely determined the prices of soybean oil and meal. This year, it's the other way around. The value of the products is having a strong influence upon the price of soybeans.

Several factors have combined to sustain soybean prices. The harvest was slow. The domestic demand for meal and oil has been very strong. Also, export sales have been brisk. Wet weather during September and October stretched out the har-

vest period. This, in turn, prevented overloading the market facilities at any one time.

**Sales of meal increase.** The average price of soybean meal in October was over \$75 a ton — only \$3 less than a year before. (The quotation is for 44 percent meal at Decatur, Ill.) While the price is a little lower than last year, the demand is stronger. This is shown by the greater volume of sales, which have been around 10 percent greater than a year ago. When livestock prices are high, farmers feed their animals generously.

The export demand for soybean meal has been very strong. September, exports totaled 185,000 tons — 18 percent more than a year before. During the past twelve months, more than 20 percent of our soybean meal out-

put was sold in other countries. About 42 bushels of soybeans are required to produce a ton of meal. Therefore, the decline in the price of meal has reduced the value of the meal obtained from a bushel of soybeans by 7 cents.

**Soybean oil prices rise.** Recently, the price of soybean oil has been around 11 cents a pound — up some 43 percent from a year before. (A pound is about a pint.) Prices of competing oils and oils are also higher this year. Lard has been at 12 cents a pound — up 55 percent. At 15.5 cents, peanut oil is up 23 percent. Coconut oil, at 14.5 cents, is up 12 percent.

Since a bushel of soybeans usually produces about 10.7 pounds of oil, the higher price for this year added around 36 cents to the value of the oil obtained from one bushel of soybeans. Subtracting the 7 cent loss because of the lower price for meal still leaves a gain of about 29 cents a bushel in the combined value of products.

Soybean oil is used mostly in making food products — shortening, margarine, and salad cooking oils. About 16 percent of our output of soybean oil last year was exported.

**Supplies of competitive products.** The Russian sunflower crop is now estimated at 310,000 tons — 5 percent smaller than last year. The rapeseed crop in France is very short. While Canada has an abundant supply of rapeseed, there was some weather in that country at harvest time. The U.S. cotton crop (cottonseed meal and oil) as estimated in October at 4 percent below the 1968 level. Stocks of Peruvian fishmeal are reported to be down, and fishing prospects are uncertain.

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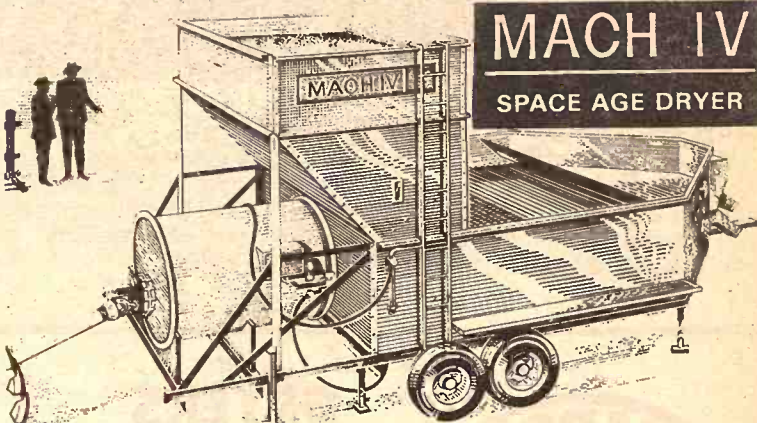

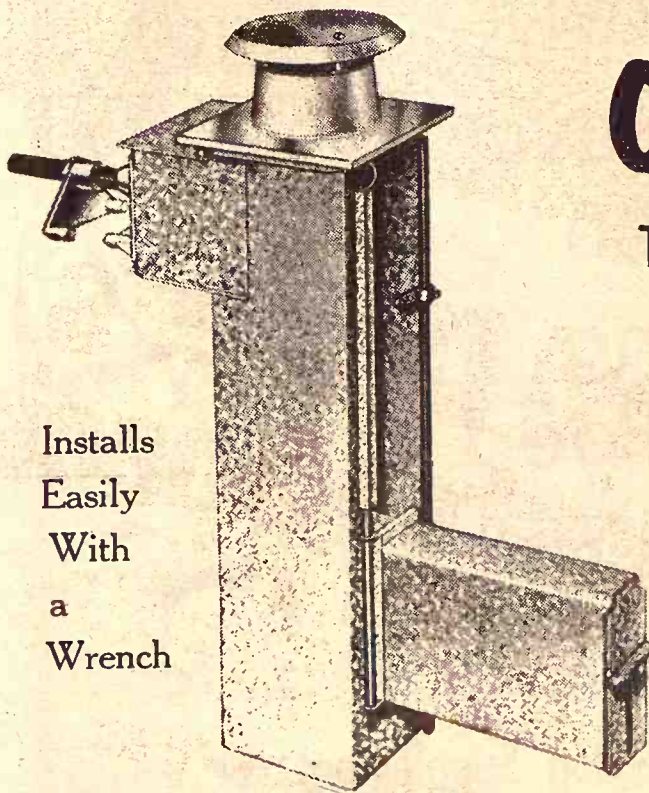

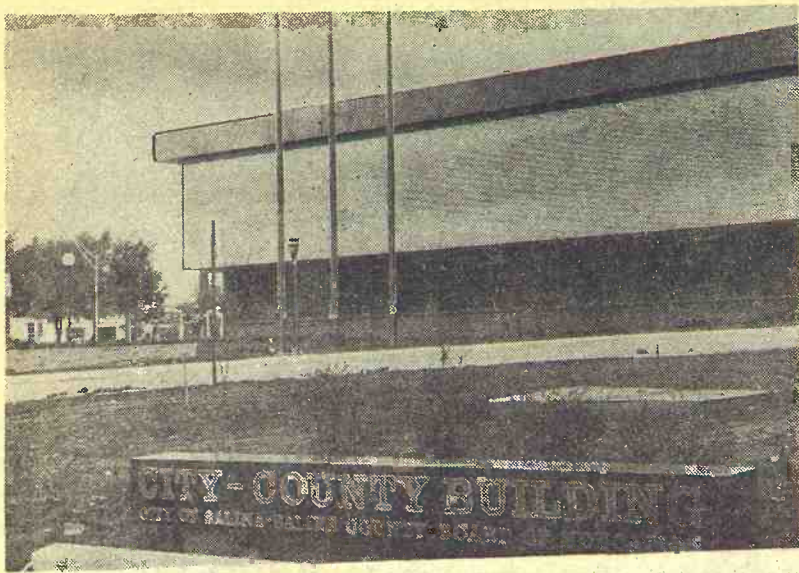

## Bids On Start Of Turkey Creek Watershed Dams

**ABILENE** — Bids will be opened Dec. 9 for work on the first 2 sites of 15 dams planned in long-range development of Turkey Creek watershed.

Approval has been given to "go ahead" for 10 of the sites, according to Louis H. Guthals, drainage district contracting officer. Sufficient soil conservation work has been completed behind the 10 proposed dams and land easements and other details are ready.

The first 2 sites ready for construction are No. 3, less than a mile northeast of the Dillon community, and No. 13, on the Morris Lorson farm 1 mile south and 1½ miles east of Elmo.

Each of these first dams will form pools of 25 to 30 acres in size. The 15 dams will range from smaller pools than these up to 50 to 60 acres.

Construction time on the first 2 structures is 85 calendar days after work begins. Local labor will be used whenever possible.

The Turkey Creek project engineer's office will be in Abilene. It was leased to the federal government through the Soil Con-

servation Service.

The watershed district office is maintained at Hope. The bids will be received there.

The Turkey Creek Watershed District includes 163 square miles or 104,517 acres. The total area covers 68,517 acres in Dickinson County and the remainder in Marion County.

The area runs about 25 miles from about 5 miles south of the Marion County line to where Turkey Creek empties into the Smoky Hill River at Brown's Park just south of Abilene.

Hog producers should not use

erinarian, says that's the latest  
word from the U.S. Department  
of Agriculture.  
Dr. Caley said the USDA re-  
ported that since hog cholera  
vaccines are being phased out, a  
number of producers have in-  
quired if USDA-licensed bovine  
virus diarrhea vaccine can be  
used as a substitute.  
The answer from Dr. John M.

Hejl, director of the Veterinary  
Biologics Division of USDA's  
Agricultural Research Service,  
is "definitely not."  
He said that farmers or vet-  
erinarians who use BVD vaccine  
against diseases other than bo-  
vine virus diarrhea of cattle do  
so at their own risk.  
He added that it could be a

dangerous practice to vaccinate  
one class of animal with a vac-  
cine intended for a different spe-  
cies unless the use is carefully  
tested and approved.

The USDA veterinarian said  
no manufacturer has applied for  
or received permission to mar-  
ket BVD vaccine for any addi-  
tional purpose.

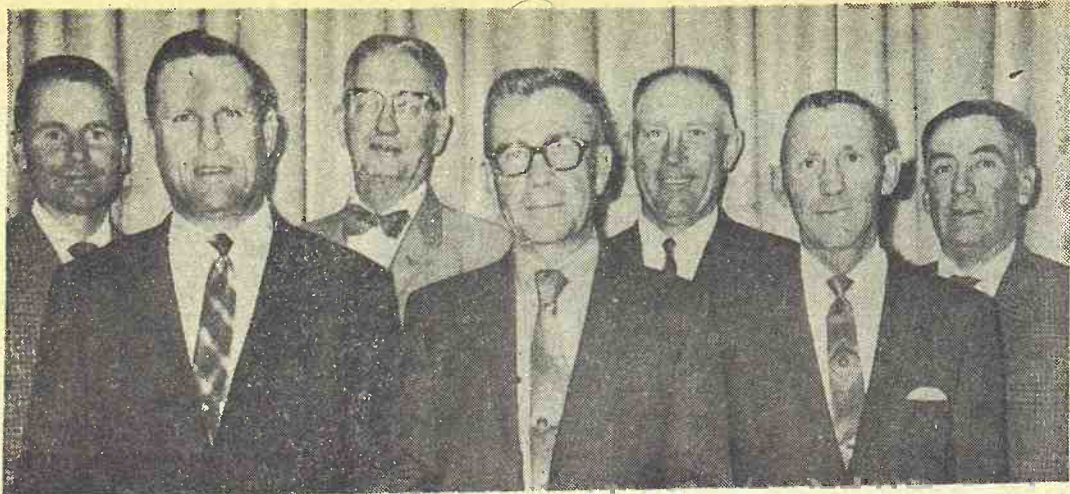

## See Lower Wool Prices Next Year

Wool prices paid farmers are expected to drop slightly next year because of rising competition from man-made fibers and a record world output, says the Agriculture department.

Prices through the first nine months of 1969 have averaged about 4 per cent more than a

year earlier but are expected to be "a shade below" this in 1970.

The department said U. S. wool production next year is expected to continue the decline of the past decade, though probably at less than the 6 per cent drop of 1969.

Total shorn wool output this year was estimated at 167 million pounds, grease basis. Mill use was estimated at 220 million pounds to 225 million pounds in 1969, compared with 238 million last year.

"The decline in mill use re-

flects increased use of manmade fibers, a slower advance in consumer income, slightly higher raw wool prices and decreased deliveries," the department said in a report.

Officials said, however, that "some recovery" in total wool use by textile mills is likely next year because of somewhat lower prices and an expected rise in consumer demand for wool apparel.

Imports of apparel wool textiles during January-August were 12 per cent more than for

the first eight months of 1968, the report said.

Imports of raw wool, however, dropped 29 per cent during January through August. For the year, the department said, raw wool imports probably will total 110 million to 115 million pounds, clean content, compared with 130 million in 1968.

The smaller output of wool reflects a longtime downtrend in the number of U. S. sheep and lambs. Officials estimated 21, 100,000 head on farms last January 1, compared with 22,100,000 a year earlier.

Sheep and lamb production rose during the late 1950s and totaled 33,200,000 in 1960, but have declined steadily each year since.

## Ausherman On 4-Day Week

BELLEVILLE — The Ausherman foundry here has switched to two shifts a day, with production workers on a 10-hour day, 4-day-a-week schedule. There will be no production for a 3-day weekend, starting Friday.

Ausherman does a variety of foundry work, being best known in the G&G area as a maker of combine cylinder bars. Annual payroll runs about \$110,000.

For the first time in its history the Kansas Highway Patrol will have Negroes among its troopers.

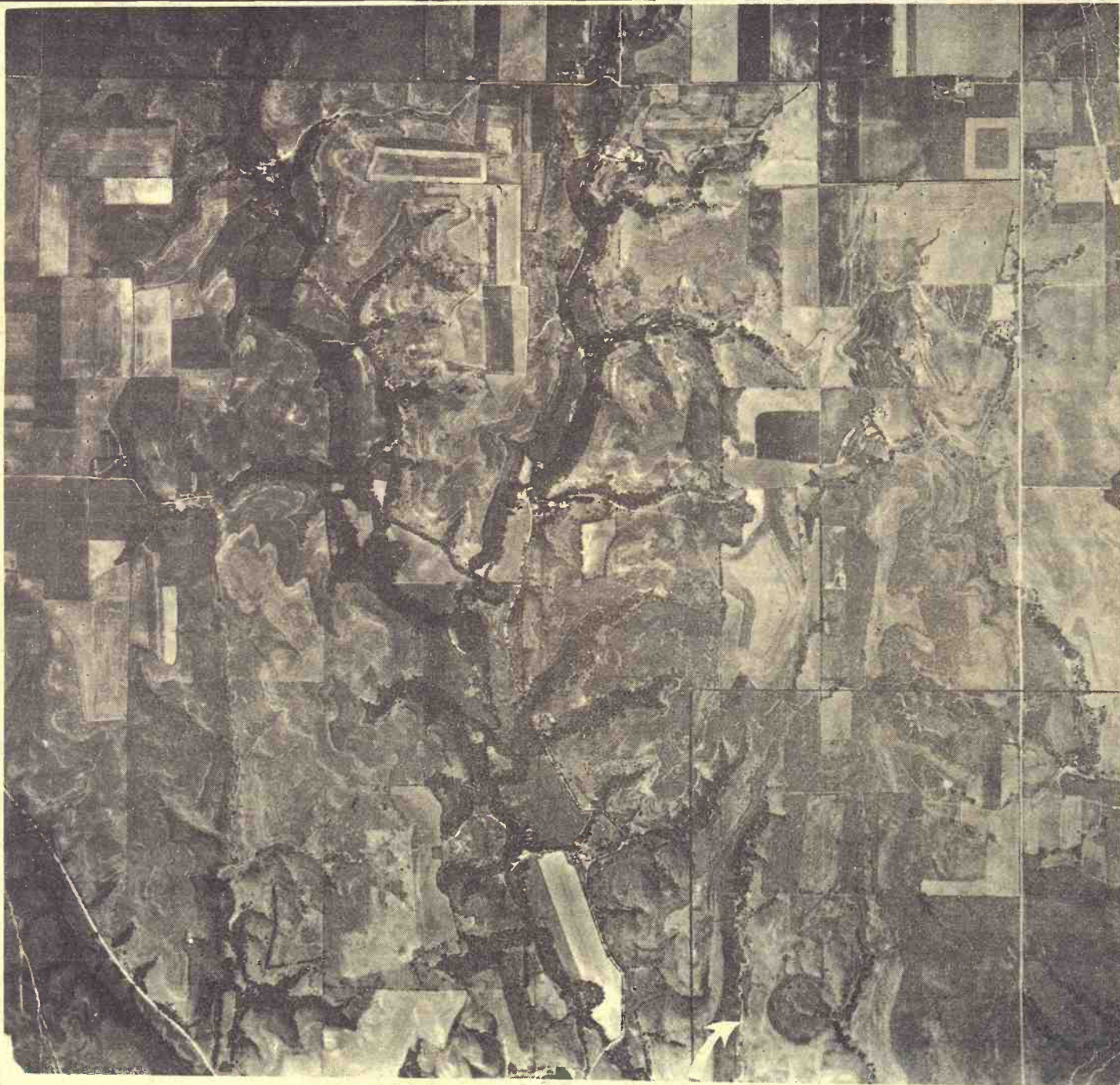

Bruce has been a fireman in Lawrence, and Hurst has been a traffic officer with the Topeka Police Department.

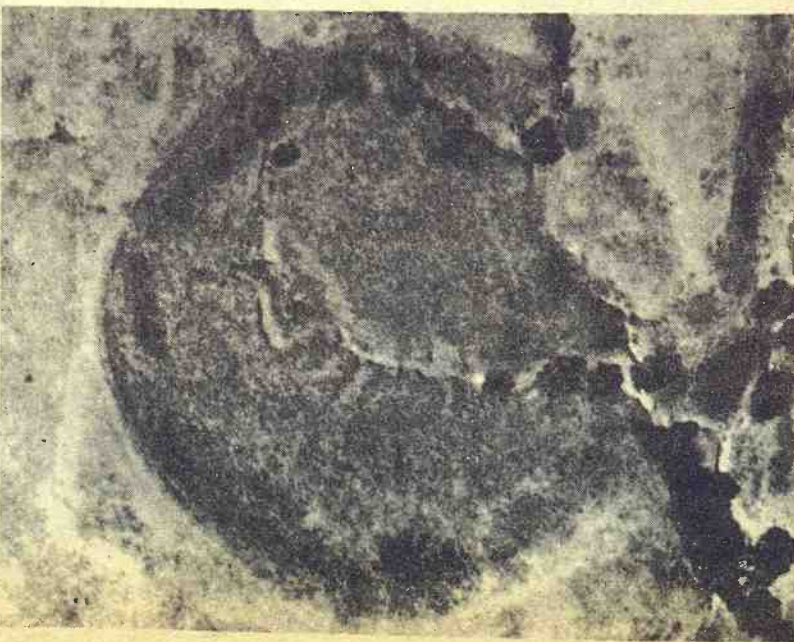

## LIKE A CRATER—BUT NOT ONE

WINKLER CRATER appears as an almost perfect circle on this aerial photograph of northern Riley County. Clearly identifiable near the bottom of the photograph, the crater lies just northeast of the small community of Winkler (not visible in photograph). It is about 35 miles north of Manhattan. The smaller photo is a blow-up of the crater. Although 950 feet in diameter and approximately 50 feet deep, in the field it is difficult to recognize the feature as a crater-like area. The feature has been included in published lists of possible meteorite sites but investigations this past summer by Dr. Douglas G. Brookins of Kansas State University have revealed that the "crater" is a surface expression of a kimberlite pipe. There are several known kimberlite pipes in northern Riley County.

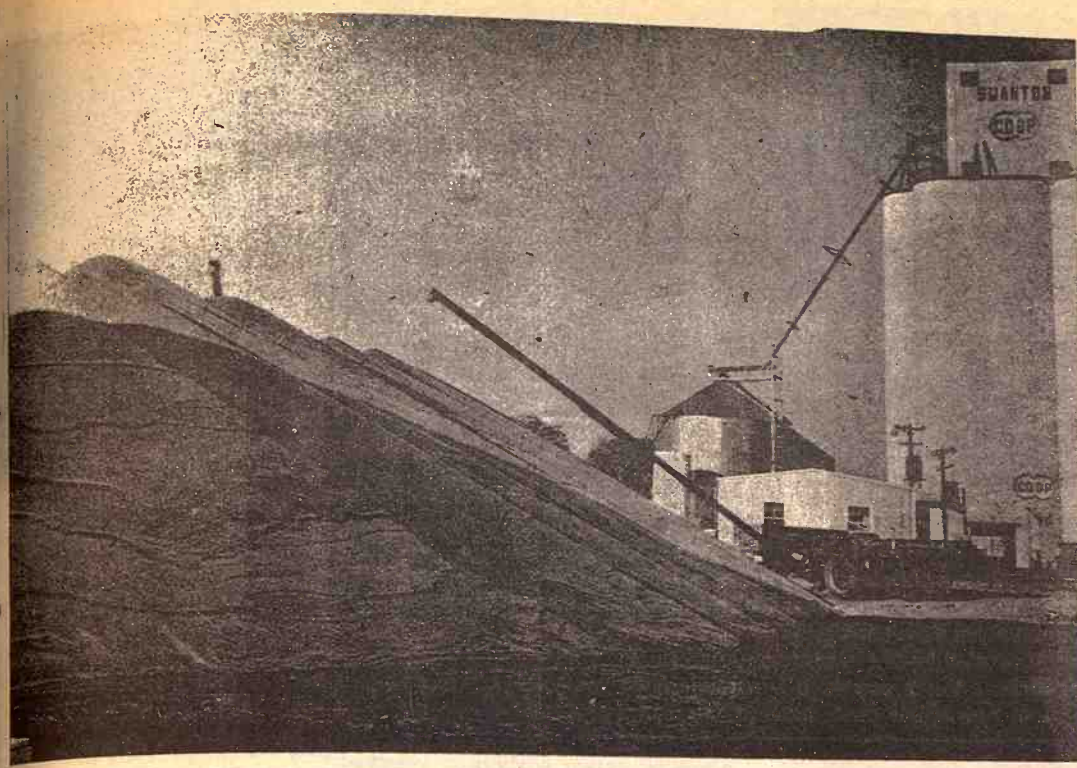

France for opening talks with Britain for the island's membership in the Common Market, as the European Economic Community is informally known. France has removed its political veto on London's membership, but is trying to extract as high a price as possible in the farm sector from the five other market members who desire England's membership. France is the community's largest agricultural supplier. Divisions among the six states, particularly Germany's disaffection over its large treasury contributions to French farmers, had raised grave doubts that any common view could be taken before the deadline. Under the present financing

regulations, farmers are paid from a community pool supplied by levies on agricultural imports and by direct budget contributions from the member states. Last year France received 343 million dollars from the pool, while Germany, as the major food importer, had to contribute 324 million. ## OKs Lawsuit For Fish Kill

Atty. Gen. Kent Frizzell says the state can seek damages from

persons or companies which pollute waters in the state and cause fish to be killed.

Frizzell, in an opinion released Thursday, said as far back as 1872, the Kansas Supreme Court

recognized that if the public suffered a wrong, it is the duty of the state officials to right that wrong.

"The Legislature has expressed a clear desire to protect and propagate the fish life of this state. Since ownership of fish life not legally acquired by another party is declared to be in the state, the state has the right of private property in these fish," Frizzell said.

The attorney general said a suit for damages might be the only effective way to remedy a situation before the actual damage has occurred.

"Therefore, although the question is not free from doubt, we are of the opinion that the state possesses sufficient ownership of the fish in its waters to support an action for damages should the fish be harmed," Frizzell said.

The opinion was prepared for Noel Mullendore of Howard on behalf of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission.

growth in Kansas, the state legislature (during fiscal years 1969 and 1970) has allocated \$250,000 to Kansas State University, Manhattan, for the establishment of an Evapo-Transpiration Laboratory.

This has been supplemented by \$50,000 from the federal government and \$50,000 from existing resources of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station at K-State. More important, the state legislature probably will continue to grant a \$100,000 yearly extension for some time.

According to Dr. Floyd W. Smith, director of the agricultural experiment station, "The water in Kansas available for agricultural use is dependent primarily on precipitation, and, in the western half of the state, is supplemented by underground resources. The biggest source of moisture loss is water transpired by the leaves of the plant; however, when without a vegetative cover, the soil loses almost as much water by simple evaporation. Therefore, by reducing evapo-transpiration, we can greatly extend the use of available water resources."

Before the end of November, construction will begin at K-State on an Evapo-Transpiration Laboratory north of Waters Hall Annex. Projected completion date is the spring of 1970.

Available funds will be channeled into the costs of building the laboratory, obtaining new equipment and hiring research scientists.

K-State already has an evapo-transpiration project area at the Ashland Bottoms Agronomy Farm, south of Manhattan. Much of the field data for the

new laboratory will be collected there.

Work to be done in the building includes "analytical activities, statistical compilation and other types of laboratory experimentation," noted Smith. "Furthermore, extensive use will be made of the computer service on campus."

Dr. Hyde Jacobs, director of Kansas Water Resources Institute, will serve as director of the project. Dr. Ed Kanen, microclimatologist, and Dr. Teare, crop physiologist, will help in the study.

Involved in research at Ashland Bottoms Agronomy Farm are Dr. Edward Skidmore, U.S. Department of Agriculture scientist, and Dr. William Powers, soil physicist in agronomy. Both will work closely with the new laboratory.

# DDT Sales Were Lagging Anyway

The pesticide DDT has been slipping badly as a commercial product in recent years. It still brings its producers about 20 million dollars in sales a year, but this is only a pittance compared with the one billion dollar over-all pesticide market. Manufacturers of DDT said if its sale is banned — as contemplated in a government announcement — there would be

very little effect on their earnings.

The National Agricultural Chemicals Association said sales of DDT have declined by 50 percent in the last five years as criticism of its long-lasting effects mounted. Department of Agriculture figures show DDT sales dropped from 140,785,000 pounds in 1965 to 103,411,000 pounds in 1967, the latest year for which statistics are available.

About two thirds of current DDT production is exported to developing countries for use in fighting malaria and other diseases.

The association said it had no immediate comment on the possible ban but that its stand has been in favor of "proper regulation on a crop-by-crop basis, replacing any pesticide when it could be shown another less persistent pesticide would do as good a job."

The biggest DDT producers include Montrose Chemical Corporation of Newark, N.J.; Diamond Shamrock Corporation of Cleveland, and Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation of New York.

Samuel Rotrosen, president of Montrose, said: "If only domestic agricultural users are to be affected, the effect on our company would not be great. Most DDT is exported for public health uses." He said about 75 percent of Montrose's DDT is exported.

Diamond Shamrock Corporation of Cleveland said: "If in the final analysis scientific evidence should indicate that the suspension of use in DDT is desirable, Diamond Shamrock Corporation of course would respond accordingly."

"The proposed banning of domestic use of DDT would have very little effect on the corporation's sales and profits since domestic sales represent less than one half of one percent of the total annual sales of Diamond Shamrock."

A spokesman for Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation of New York said DDT represented only a small percentage of its production and a ban would have

minor effect.

Geigy Chemical Corporation of Ardsley, N.Y., which held the original DDT patent in this country, said it quit manufacturing it when the patent ran out in 1966. Allied Chemical Corporation of New York said it quit producing DDT a year ago because it had become such a minor item.

## Ft. Riley Plans Multi-Million New Commissary

# All Wet' Hope Says Of Shuman Wheat Talk

Clifford Hope, the former U.S. congressman from Garden City, Mo., is known in his days in the house as a knowledgeable man and he was never histrionic about it. Hope didn't mince any words about some statements made by Charles Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau, made at the recent convention in Wichita of the Kansas Farm Bureau. Shuman was "all wet," Hope wrote in a column he writes for some state newspapers. Shuman was quoted as saying, "The price of wheat would increase by 60 cents almost immediately after Farm Bureau policies adopted by Congress."

national Grain Agreement) the 15 cents tax on exports would be removed to allow a 45 cent a bushel increase in wheat prices. Removal of the processing tax would add another 40-50 cents a bushel to prices — so prices would go up 50 to 60 cents a bushel immediately."

Wrote Hope: "Everyone connected with wheat except possibly Mr. Shuman knows that nothing of the kind will happen. Let's get this thing straight. As long as we are on an export basis on wheat the price in this country will be the world price except as it may be modified by our own price support programs. This is because there is no way of segregating wheat that goes in the domestic market and what goes on in the world market. It is this situation

that the McNary-Haugen bill in the 1920's and subsequent legislation was designed to cure.

"The tax on exports which Mr. Shuman mentions is necessary because the support price, low as it may be, is still higher than the world market. This means that an exporter who buys on the domestic market can't export because the price he gets on the world market is less than he paid. In order that he may export, the government must pay him the difference between what he paid on the domestic market and the world price. This would be true whether there was an International Grains Agreement or not, although I do not hold any brief for that organization.

"With respect to the repeal of the processing tax, Mr. Shuman's statement that this would increase the price of wheat by 45 to 50 cents per bushel would be valid only if the millers and other purchasers of wheat would voluntarily increase the price paid to the farmer by 45 to 50 cents a bushel.

"Anyone who believes in that would believe in fairies. Exporters, of course, could not under any circumstances pay that much above the export price and competition would keep domestic millers from doing so, even

in the unlikely case that some of them might want to do it.

"Also, if Mr. Shuman has read his organization's bill, he knows that the provisions for the repeal of the processing tax call for a five year program with twenty percent of the tax to be taken off each year. Just how this would raise prices immediately by 45-50 cents I will leave to Mr. Shuman to explain.

"Mr. Shuman also digs up another old chestnut when he says that the adoption of the Farm Bureau Plan would enable 'farmers who depend on wheat to plant all the wheat they want without the competition from the new wheat areas in the corn belt and eastern parts of the

## Phase Out DDT Use

The Nixon administration plans to phase out all but "essential uses" of the pesticide DDT over the next two years in a far-reaching attempt to clean up the nation's food and environment. The program will be built around a coordinated campaign involving the Departments of Agriculture, Interior, & Health, Education and Welfare. Robert H. Finch, secretary of the Council on Environmental Quality, called DDT a pervasive threat to human life and environment. DDT were outlawed tomorrow, Finch said, "it would take 10 years or longer" to purge the country of effects already caused by the insect killer.

The recommendation for phasing out DDT, one of the most commonly used pesticides and among the longest lived, was made by a commission headed by Dr. Emil M. Mrak, former chancellor of the University of California, Davis.

Some states, including California, Arizona and Michigan, already have put limits on DDT. The move, however, will not be immediate nor a complete ban on the manufacture, sale and use of DDT.

Finch said administration officials were "not interdicting the manufacture of DDT" and he noted that most — up to 70 percent a year — is exported for use in other countries. But the Mrak commission report, to which the administration officially has lent support, was clear in seeking drastic reductions in use of DDT in ways that can contaminate food crops and animals.

The DDT phase-out was the highlight of the 44-page report, but the commission also laid out guidelines for control, review and study of a variety of the most persistent pesticides now in common use.

The report said a reduction of DDT use could result in increased applications of other harmful chemicals. They include aldrin, dieldrin, endrin, heptachlor, chlordane, benzene hexachloride, lindane, and compounds of arsenic, lead or mercury, the report said.

But the commission also cautioned persons against going overboard in setting tighter tolerances for pesticide residues permitted in human food.

"In reaching such decisions," the report said, "consideration must be given to both the adequacy of the evidence of hazard to human health and possible consequences to human welfare that flow from the imposition of restrictions on human exposure to pesticides."

"As it stands the legal authority to register pesticides is vested in the secretary of agriculture," Finch said, "but we are working toward a new agreement that would preclude the registration of any pesticide on which either the secretary of HEW or of the interior is not fully satisfied."

Average telephone bills paid by farmers have risen 5 percent from last year, according to an Agriculture Department study. The Crop Reporting Board said the survey, which is conducted each summer, disclosed an average rate for local service of \$5.55 per month, compared with \$5.30 in 1968. The report excluded Alaska and Hawaii.

Regionally, New England farmers paid the most — \$6.67 per month — and those in the western north central areas the least, an average of \$5.24 per month, the report said. The national average rate for local service was \$4.42 per month in 1960. About 83 percent

## A Major Effort At Cloud Seeding In Colorado

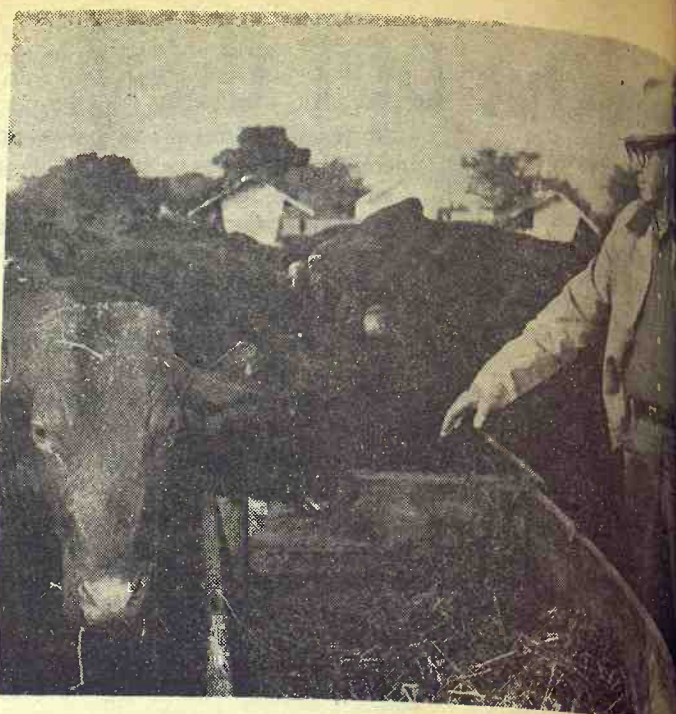
The Bureau of Reclamation is beginning work on the most ambitious cloud-seeding project in its history — one which it hopes will relieve the chronic water shortage in the arid Southwestern United States.

The project calls for squeezing another 10 or 15 percent of precipitation from winter clouds

which are blown eastward across Colorado and drop some of their moisture as they rise to skim the Continental Divide.

Success of the pilot test could add half a million acre-feet of water to the flow of the Colorado River, helping insure irrigation and domestic water supplies which are threatened whenever mountain snowfall is below normal.

The target is a 3300 square mile area, in Southwest Colo-



## FROM WHITE TO RED

The white Charolais which formerly dotted the grassland at the Lauright Ranch near Douglass in Butler county have been replaced by bright red Santa Gertrudis since the 2600-acre ranch was sold by the Shawver family to Dr. Owen Robinson.

Dr. Robinson now has 900 head—500 females, 100 bulls, and the balance of calves—at the ranch.

Dr. Robinson here looks over some Santa Gertrudis steers at the Jim Taylor feedlot near Douglass. Taylor says the Santa Gertrudis steers gained at a rate 25% more than the average steers in his feedlot.

The Santa Gertrudis breed, a cross between Shorthorn and improved Brahma, was first developed by the King Ranch of Texas. The tests on the Taylor lot are to be completed by January.

rado, mostly in national forest land. It encompasses four small but historic mining towns — Telluride, Rico, Ouray and Silverton.

Just outside of it is the city of Durango, where headquarters probably will be set up.

So far, the only step beyond the planning phase is the placing of measuring devices in the mountains. Within a couple of weeks, the federal agency intends to call for bids for seeding clouds with silver iodide — a million-dollar job. The seeding will be done from generators on the ground.

Actual seeding will start in about a year, under the bureau's

timetable, and will continue four years.

In charge of the operation is Dr. A. M. Kahan, chief of bureau's office of atmospheric sources.

The design for the seeding which will be carried out during the normal snow season is being completed by the atmospheric Science Department of Colorado State University.

Seeding will be done under controlled conditions so that scientists can determine at the end of four years whether the fall has been increased in target area at specific times whether such increases are economically feasible.

## Research Pays Pecan Dividends

Kansans need only to look at the pecan industry for proof that research pays dividends.

The importance of research was pointed out rather vividly recently during a pecan field day at the Kansas State University Southeast Experiment Field near Chetopa.

Field Supt. Jack Winzer said that in 1965 a native pecan grove of 6 one-half acre plots was marked off so pecan thinning (removal) and fertilizing could

be studied. After three years, the results are rather convincing.

Plots that were unthinned and received no fertilizer produced only 4.03 pounds of nuts per square foot of trunk area. Unthinned plots which received 500 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre yielded 13.51 pounds.

Thinned plots with no fertilizer produced 14.40 pounds, but plots that were both thinned and fertilized (1000 pounds of ammonium nitrate per acre) yielded 26.47 pounds of nuts.

Gene Grey, KSU Extension Service's assistant state forester, discussed the principles of thinning pecan trees. He concluded that there should be no rigid spacing rules in native pecan stands but that the guiding principle must always be that individual tree crowns or crown clumps need open daylight.

Frank D. Morrison, KSU Extension horticulturist, said producers should remove all poor-yielding trees that produce poor quality nuts. "Good records are important in evaluating both nut quality and yields," he added.

based on an experiment in which three pollinator and three male sterile grain sorghum lines were flamed at three growth stages. At each stage the traveling speed of the flame equipment was varied to achieve different flaming severities. The variations in treatment delayed flowering: not at all, from 4 to 10 days, and from 9 to 12 days.

The most severe treatments achieved the longest delays but also were responsible for reduced crop stands and grain yields. The KSU researchers are continuing their experiment, testing several sorghum lines to determine exact treatments to achieve desired delays with least loss to crop stand and grain yield.

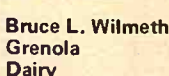

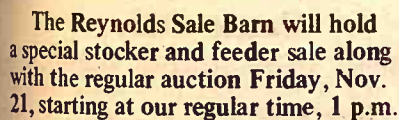
