### Kansans Now Own 100,000 Horses

Politicians aren't the only people that need a horse to ride. Kansans now own more than 100,000 horses valued at approximately \$30 million. This is about one horse for each six persons.

This surge in horse numbers brings a revitalization of some near-extinct services specializing in horse trade, but this also means that many people must learn about proper care of horses explains a Kansas State University Extension veterinarian.

The expression "no feet, no horse" was never more true than at the present time, explains Dr. Homer K. Caley. The value of a horse is dependent on its ability to move. Most of the riding today is on good surfaces and in arenas, but foot trouble occurs even under ideal conditions.

Since horses' feet are often ne glected during winter, long hooves with large cracks and broken areas are common this time of year. Hard riding without proper care of feet may cause damage that will render a horse unfit for use for the entire season, Caley stresses.

Feet should be properly trimmed now, he says. If the horse is to be ridden on abrasive surfaces (gravel roads, concrete), shoes should be applied without delay.

Inexperienced horsemen should contact a competent farrier and have him trim the feet and shoe the horse. If extremely bad cracks and breaks are present, consult a veterinarian, who in cooperation with the farrier, can properly care for your horse's

The need for shoeing is largely manmade, Dr. Caley says. The change from free range to confinement and forced work has contributed to foot problems. The basically sound horse may break down under present day

Horseshoes provide several different functions. They are not

designed for the horse's comfort. They prevent excessive foot wear, give relief of pain from injured parts, increase traction, and correct defective stance or gait. In some cases, shoeing will aid unsound horses in performing satisfactory service.

Tips for proper care of the feet: Provide dry, clean quarters. (Standing in wet stalls contributes to foot problems); Shoe when necessary; Trim feet and reset shoes every 30 to 60 days; Foot and leg trouble may be caused by faulty conformation; If the horse is stabled, the feet should be cleaned daily and the stall rebedded: Improper shoeing may cause lameness and infection; Dry, cracked feet can be treated with hoof dressing.

### Chains Turn To Poultry

When beef prices go to 17-year highs and hog prices to their highest point in two years, one knows what the supermarkets will be doing.

They'll be out buying poultry. filling heavy demand created from some resistance to beef and pork prices.

Poultry raisers and wholesalers say current price levels will be maintained for the next two months, or may firm a bit. They expect outdoor barbecue stands to be decorated with the broilers rather than red meats.

### Critics

The pesticide DDT, once hailed as the weapon which would give man dominance of his insect enemies, is being widely recast in the role of a villain. Many states are banning or sharply limiting

Evidence is piling up that DDT is a fee of fish and bird life and thus poses a threat to the balance of nature.

DDT is a chlorinated hydrocarbon, a synthetic organic poison. One of the first of the insecticides, it was conceived as a moth preventative and used extensively against insects during and after World War II.

DDT and pesticides of its type are persistent — that is, they do not break down and dissipate readily.

Moreover, pesticides of the DDT family are cumulative, so that they tend to persist in bird or animal tissue in larger and larger amounts as subsequent doses are received.

As to the effect of the pesticide on man, a scientific team which made a study for the federal government reported to the Agriculture Department that

"knowledge is incomplete."

"Available evidence does not indicate that present levels of pesticide residues in man's food and environment produce an adverse effect on his health," added the report compiled by a committee of the National Academy of Sciences National Research Council.

However, health and wildlife authorities in a number of states feel that the risks from DDT are too dangerous to tolerate further.

Use of DDT and related pesticides will be banned in homes and gardens in California after Jan. 1. Also banned will be the agricultural use of DDT in dust

Rhode Island plans to ban DDT as soon as a safer substitute can be found. Alfred T. Hawkes, executive director of the state's Audubon Society, said wild bird censuses have disclosed that the usual nesting osprey population in one area declined from 200 pairs in 1940 to 61 pairs in 1961 to half a dozen this year.

"I'm absolutely sure the reduction was due to the use of DDT,"

Hawkes said:

In Texas, Mexican cantaloupes have been rejected and some milk dumped because of high DDT content. The state legislature has set up a special committee to study the problem and to "direct attention toward the possible contamination of the waters in the state, toxicity to humans from consumption of fruits, vegetables and other foodstuffs treated with DDT, harmful or fatal effects on the wildlife of Texas and other environmental hazards which might be attributable to DDT or similar chemical derivatives."

Illinois licenses persons who spray farm fields with chemicals. requiring them to pass written and oral tests. But it has no power to bar pesticides, and there are no regulations governing home use.

Agricultural experts in Illinois and four other Midwestern states are compiling a report on pesticide levels in Lake Michigan fish, a survey requested last month by a governor's conference. It is due

County Engineers and street supervisors have basic problems of finding competent workers and setting up schedules that can be adhered to. But there should be some help in one basic problem area this fall — the matter

Of the two extra cents per galof gasoline applied July 1, half of the money is to come back to the counties and towns. The first of those funds are to come back in October and to be dispensed every three months thereafter.

Present estimates are that the two extra cents of tax will raise something over \$22 million. The state will take half. The rest is returned on a formula basis, so that present estimates figure county engineers will get something over \$5 million to spend in their road and bridge funds and cities will get a little over \$6 million a year to use on street work.

County and city road and street funds vary considerably, of course. A county's road and bridge fund will be higher, clearly, in counties on the unit system, than in a comparable county in which townships maintain and pay separately for some rural roads.

The number of streams across a county and the geological makeup of a county also affect these budgets, of course. Presumably the efficiency of the road department itself makes its mark, particularly where good

mulated over many years.

The amount of help coming the population of the county. from the extra gasoline tax might amount to half of one town's budget and less than 5% in another. On the average, county departments should receive close to 10% of present budgets as new working money. The average for the cities will be higher than that. In both cases, the will go to the county and 25% percentage of the new money to the existing budget will vary

widely. But taxpayers should be aware that the extra pennies they are paying at the gas pump should show up, in many cases in a major way, in improved city streets

and county roads. As in any formula system, some places have some advantages just out of the simple application of mathematics. In the apportionment of the extra gasoline taxes, the initial division is based on the amount of vehicle registration fees in that county. Counties which have some industry, especially ones which may register a good number of trucks, will get some extra money, that will not be proportionate to population, road budgets, miles of roadway, or similar cri-

teria McPherson county, for example, will get about \$90,000 for its county road and bridge fund, compared to \$71,000 in Harvey and \$73,000 in Lyon counties, altho the latter two have larger populations.

Barton county, for another, will get \$151,000 for its county fund, more than Saline, which has 40% more population.

The money that is returned to the local area is divided to the

county road fund and to town street budgets, on the basis of

Counties with smaller populations will get more of the money for the city streets, less in proportion for county roads.

Over half of the counties in the state have populations of less than 10,000, and in these counties 75% of the local distribution to the towns. But in the four larger counties - Sedgwick. Wyandotte, Johnson, and Shawnee, 75% will go for city streets and only 25% for county projects.

In 25 counties in which the population is less than 20,000 but more than 10,000, the distribution will be 60% to the county and 40% to the towns. In counties over 34,000 (like Barton, Riley, Cowley, Butler, Douglas, Leavenworth, Montgomery, Saline and Reno) the division will go the other way - 60% to the towns,

40% to the county. In eleven counties of population between 20,000 and 34,000, the apportionment will be 50-50.

The smallest county in the G&G area, Chase, gets one of the smaller portions, \$17,000 for the county and about \$6000 to be distributed to the towns in the county.

Counties of populations around 7000 (like Jewell, Ellsworth, Morris, Osborne, Smith, Lincoln and Wabaunsee) will get about \$30,-000 for the county and close to \$10,000 for the towns to share.

Slightly larger counties like Mitchell, Republic, Clay, Coffey, Linn, Phillips, Greenwood, Pottawatomie, Brown, Jefferson, and Osage will get around \$40,000 for county help.

Comparatively low vehicle registrations in Doniphan, Washington, Jackson, and Nemaha will make their county help slightly lower than that. A county like Russell, with many oil field vehicles registered there, will get a little larger share.

Counties of around 15,000 population will get about \$50,000 for the county road department to spend. This includes counties like Rice, Cloud, Marion, Marshall, Allen, and Bourbon.

Also around the \$50,000 portion for counties will be Miami, Geary, Franklin, and Dickinson, Neosho, about that size in population, will get a little more.

The factor of the vehicle registrations shows up in a comparison of Riley and Barton counties, both about 34,000 in population, Barton, with heavy oil company registrations, will get about \$100,000 for the county and \$151,000 for Great Bend and other towns. Riley will get more like \$55,000 for the county and \$82,000 for Manhattan and the smaller towns to share.

Saline county will get about \$100,000 for county use and \$150,000 for Salina and other towns. Reno county's share will be around \$330,000 - \$200,000 of it for Hutch and other towns.

Topeka will get close to \$500,-000 for city streets and towns in Wyandotte and Johnson counties will share more than that. In Wichita the city share will be well over \$1 million and Sedgwick county will have close to half a million.

For use in town and city streets, look for distributions about like this:

For towns like Cottonwood Falls, Chapman, Enterprise, Sol-

omon, Ellsworth, LaCrosse, Alma, and Hanover, amounts less than \$5000.

Lincoln, Council Grove, Smith Center and Washington will get a little more than that. Seneca, Marion, Belleville, Osage City, Wamego, Beloit and Sabetha will get a little more, but less than \$10,000 each.

Towns like Hillsboro, Lindsborg, Hiawatha, and Herington should get something over \$10,-.000 apiece. More than but less than \$20,000 will go to Clay Center, Eureka, Holton, Marysville,

A town like Iola will get \$21,-000 and Concordia and Russell somewhat more: Atchison, Fort Scott and Abilene will be close to \$30,000 each

Ark City, Junction City, Newton, and McPherson can expect about \$50,000 wandfalls. There will be more at Manhattan, El Dorado, and Leavenworth.

In almost all cases, a taxpayer can reasonably expect that the new money into the town and county should be enough to counteraffect inflationary costs and that road and bridge fund levies and city levies for streets should remain steady.

In many other cases, the aid from the extra gas tax should make a deeper impression than that. A taxpayer who does not see marked improvements in county roads and bridges or in city street maintenance, or get lower taxes for these functions, in counties where the aid amounts to 20% or more of old budgets, should be able to ask some difficult questions to an-

But Hill-Burton is coming in for more frequent criticism, that may surprise some. The complaint comes from the cities, and many medical organizations, which say that Hill-Burton funds are too frequently used for hospitals and medical facilities

A total of 173 hospitals which have received \$50 million in Hill-Burton aid over the past two decades are listed as half-empty or worse in the latest available American Hospital Association figures on occupancy rates. All but a handful are in rural areas.

The program was set up in the late 1940s to fill critical needs of rural America. The formula upon which aid was given was deliberately loaded to favor the poor

For example, on a scale of wealth, Mississippi is rated twice as "poor" as New York. Under the formula this factor is squared; that is, the poor state gets four times as much aid per person as the state which is figured

to be twice as rich.

Under the formula, the nation's More than 150 hospitals built eight poorest states have made great gains in hospitals. But California, the nation's most populous state, has gone the other direction. The eight poorest states now have higher averages than California's 3.5 hospital beds per 1000 persons. In fact, California's rate is now lower than the national average when the program started.

In another factor of the formula, rural areas are favored. Funds are awarded greater priority to an area which has a greater "percentage" of need. Suppose a small county has one hospital with 40 beds, but all are adjudged to be below standard. The county's needs are determined to be 25 beds. It needs 25 beds and has none up to standard. Its need is

But consider a larger county that has five hospitals with 4000 beds, of which 1000 are rated up to standard. The need in the

county is for 5000 beds. The centage of need is 80%, 4000 % of 5000.

Partly because of an increa ingly greater urban voice in Congress, Hill-Burton formula are being questioned in Wash ington now as they never ha been before.

Many critics also point out that small towns frequently to hospitals as inducements to ge doctors to town. In the G&C area, some towns which have built new medical facilities with Hill-Burton funds have unabash edly cited the hospitals as 1000 industries."

Rural areas which know the fears of not having a hospital within the county or a doctor the nearest town are rather amazed to find some resistance to a program that they had fie ured was universally well re ceived.

FERMENTED FRUIT (Rum Pot)

Put 2 cups of well-drained fruit (do not use pears, bananas or citrus fruits) and 2 cups sugar into a 2-quart glass dish that has a cover. Barely cover with rum; cover dish and let stand at room temperature for at least rum; cover dish and let stand at room temperature for at least two weeks. At this point the sauce may be used over ice cream or other desserts. Replenish with additional fruits, using equal parts of drained fruit and sugar (it is not necessary to add more rum). Fresh, frozen or canned fruits can be used; all fruits should be well drained. Favorite fruits are bing cherries, blueberries, pineapple, frozen or fresh raspberries. In using fruits from the pot, be sure to leave at least 1 cup to serve as a "starter" for replenishing fruits and sugar; if sauce is used too quickly, more rum needs to be added.

Seed Shakers

When planting the hotbed or seed flats, use a salt or pepper shaker. The amount of seed for one flat can be measured into the shaker for even planting. The pepper shakers are reserved for the smaller seeds such as petunias.







Take care. Turn off power tols such as lawn mowers, if you have to leave the machine even for only a moment. Don't use electric-powered machines in wet grass. Be sure children and others are at a safe distance.





Good Grooming Essential To Cat's Health

A cat's nine lives may depend upon good grooming. If cats are not brushed daily, they will, in washing themselves, swallow considerable quantities of loose hair. These may form balls in the animal's stomach and obstruct the digestive tract.

To groom kitty, it is recommended that you approach her while she is dozing. It is easier by far to groom a relaxed cat than one in a playful mood.

Good grooming tools are essential. A rubber or plastic comb is recommended for short-haired cats like the popular Siamese. For such long-haired cats as the Persian, a long-toothed steel comb is suggested.

When combing cat, brush against the grain of the fur. If against-the-grain brushing annoys Her Majesty, try brushing downwards, using short, brisk strokes.

As you brush, remove loose hair from the comb and put it someplace where the cat cannot get at it. The cat can be considered completely groomed only when you have removed all the loose hair from her coat.

Cats should be brushed five minutes every day. In the case of long - haired cats, additional grooming sessions may be necessary.

The subject of grooming rais-

es the question, "Should cats be bathed?" The answer is unequivocally, "No!" If you feel your cat needs a bath, wipe her off with a damp towel, then brush her until she's snug and dry.

The rewards of cat-grooming are twofold: a healthy cat and one with a clean, shiny coat.





> The smaller crop expected this year is the result of reduced acreage. Farmers are expected to have only about 37 million acres of winter wheat to harvest - 13 per cent less than last year. The average yield per acre was estimated at 31.3 bushels - 2.4 bushels more than a year ago.

Winter wheat usually provides about four-fifths of our total wheat production; spring wheat, the other one-fifth. The leading winter wheat state is Kansas, but USDA estimated the production

comes from the other states. The leading spring wheat state is North Dakota, which produces nearly three-fifths of the spring wheat crop.

Back in March, farmers reported the intention of planting 11.4 million acres of spring wheat -14 per cent less than in 1968. Soil conditions in early June were generally favorable for spring

Corn planting delayed. Wet weather in April and early May delayed corn planting in many parts of the Corn Belt. Conditions may average a little better than last year in the Eastern Corn Belt, but not so good west of the Mississippi River.

In March, farmers' reports indicated their intention of planting about 64 million acres of corn 1 per cent less than last year. The actual, total planting may have been cut 1 or 2 per cent by the unfavorable weather in May. The reduction in the acreage planted probably will be offset by greater yields per acre. 

# Hog Cholera Threat Brings Added Import Restrictions

TOPEKA - A. G. Pickett, Kansas livestock sanitary commissioner, has announced that no swine can be imported into Kansas except with a special permit from his office.

Pickett said cholera was diagnosed during the week in four Kansas swine herds. He said all four cases originated in feeder pigs imported into Kansas from Missouri.

Pickett said his office has discontinued issuing permits on swine from any market.

"We are also discontinuing the issuing of permits except under the most favorable circumstances, direct from clean herds," he said.

The order came the same day as an admission by the Missouri Department of Agriculture that there is an outbreak of hog cholera in Missouri.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Missouri office ordered an emergency hog cholera disease program June 13 on the basis of "numerous laboratory confirmed cases of hog cholera in Missouri during the first half of June," said Dr. J. H. King, assistant to the Missouri state veterinarian, George C. Stilles.

King said announcement of the new program was delayed because of a "work overload."

The veterinarian described the disease as a highly infectious virus specifically of swine which month ago, in no way affects humans or other animals.

King said incidence of the disease was low during the first five months of the year but during the first two weeks of June. 25 cases were confirmed in the southern part of the state.

Under the new program, feeder pigs and breeding swine may not be transported from one farm to another farm or to market. Butcher hogs are exempt.

Kling said restrictions have been placed on Missouri swine by Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Iowa and South Dakota. Missouri farmers normally sell 80 to 90 per cent of their feeder pigs in the neighboring states.

In Oklahoma, where an estimated 10,000 hogs have died, the Board of Agriculture Saturday extended for 90 days a ban on the movement of hogs within the state and against importing hogs from Texas and Mississippi, The ban originally was imposed a







DeKalb Ag Research, Inc., last year said it had successfully produced 15 hard red winter wheat hybrids and distributed the seed to farmers in 11 states. There will be more for this fall, how much depending on the forthcoming harvest.

Tom Roberts Jr., DeKalb president, is confident that hybrids will yield 25 to 30% better and will have higher protein content. release of hybrid seed, Roberts figures the breeder will likely produce only the foundation seed and farmers will grow their own

With the foundation seed approach, hybrids should be within the reach of all farmers, he said. But selling hybrid wheat seed presents more problems than are found in corn and sorghum seed sales.

Roberts believes hybrid wheat seed can't be put on the market seed, pays the breeder the equiin the same manner as corn for less than \$8 per bushel. Assum-

On the large-scale commercial ing that a hybrid will yield 20% more than ordinary wheat, a crop selling at \$1.25 a bushel will bring the farmer \$1.15 for every \$1 he has spent, on the basis of 20 to 30 bushel yields — far short of what it takes to be economically feasible.

For this reason, he favors the foundation seed approach, which would put hybrids within reach of all farmers. Spelling out the economics involved, he said that if the farmer buys foundation valent of \$1 for each bushel of hybrid produced and even takes

a 50% yield reduction in his own seed production field, his seed costs over his standard seed at \$1.20 per bushel are only \$2.20 per bushel more than he is paying now.

On this basis, farmers could expect returns on their investments in hybrids to approach the level they are accustomed to get with hybrid corn. Hybrid wheat seed, he said, must be a do-ityourself business.

Since introduction of hybrid corn in 1935 and development of hybrid sorghum in 1956, researchers have been searching for a hybrid wheat which would do for wheat growers what hybrids have done for corn and sorghum. Hybrid corn first acquainted farmers with the efficiency and profitability of hyhrid vigor.

The discovery that first made hybrid wheat commercially feasible came a decade ago when Dr. James Wilson and Dr. W. M. Ross at the Fort Hays branch of the Kansas Experiment Station discovered a useful form of cytoplasmic sterility and fertility restoration in a relative of wheat, Triticum timopheevi. DeKalb hired Dr. Wilson in 1961. He is director of wheat research for the firm.

Triumph remained in second place with 14.7 percent of the state's acreage, Bison was third with 8.6 percent, Kaw was fourth with 6.3 percent and Wichita was fifth with 5.3 percent.

These four varieties declined moderately from the previous year in contrast to the increase in Scout.

The 5 leading varieties were seeded on 77 percent of the state's total seeded acreage.

Gage with 3.6 percent, Apache with 3.5 percent, Lancer with 3.0 percent, Parker with 2.5 percent and Kiowa with 2.4 percent all showed increases from the previous year.

Scout increased in all districts of Kansas and was the leading variety in every district except the southeast. Seeded on only 0.2 percent of the state's acreage in 1965, it has been one of the fastest increasing varieties in recent

Scout was used to seed 70 percent of the wheat acreage in Morton County, 62 percent in Phillips County and 50 percent or more in 29 other counties in the western two-thirds of the

Triumph, planted on 14.7 percent of the state's acreage, decreased in importance in all areas but remained the leading variety in the southeast. As summarized in this report, Triumph included the various strains such as Improved Triumph, Triumph-64, and Super-Triumph.

Many welfare authorities anticipate that a recent Supreme Court ruling eliminating established residence as a criterion for obtaining aid will increase welfare loads in cities.

Wyandotte County authorities say the amount of this increase is unknown but they have made some allowance for it in the next budget.

Other factors which increased the budget by a record amount: elimination of financial responsibility of parents for institutional care of disabled or incompetent adult child; upward adjustment of welfare standard-of-living by 11%; increased adjustment of rent allowances; greater participation in medical assistance; increasing from 80% to 100% the budgetary needs of those on general assistance; administration of a new program for training mothers of dependent children.

Change May Cut Kansas Medicaid Pay By 50%

Payments to physicians and medical practitioners in Kansas under the state's Medicaid program are almost certain to be reduced starting July 1, welfare department officials said Wednesday.

Marvin Larson, director of the department, said the payments to doctors could be cut by as much as 50 percent if Medicaid plan changes now under consideration by the federal Health, Education and Welfare Dept. are adopted.

Larson said he received a telegram from HEW indicating concern in Washington over the rocketing costs of Medicaid and notifying him that changes in the reimbursement of physicians and medical practitioners will be

The Medicaid program is financed largely by the federal government, which pays the cost of Medicaid treatment for welfare recipients and also for nonwelfare recipients who might otherwise be thrown onto public assistance rolls by heavy medical

The program is expected to run around \$28.9 million in Kansas during the current fiscal year, if federal, state and county contributions are included in the

Larson said the wire he received said, "The administration has had under consideration several proposals to curb the rising costs of Medicaid, one of which deals with alternative approaches to reimbursement of physicians and other practitioners."



If his payments were computed to be \$15,000, he would get the first full \$10,000 plus 75 per cent of the next \$5000. If his payment schedule called for between \$15,000 and \$25,000, he would percent of the amount between \$10,000 and \$15,000 and 50 per cent of the amount between \$15,000 and \$25,000.

On payments above \$25,000, the farmer would get only 25 percent under the same pattern.

As Quie explained his proposal to the farm editors, it would not have a maximum limit—the bigger the farmer's allotment under the law, the more he would get in payments, but he wouldn't ceiving under the present program. There would be some incentive for the big farmer to continue to cooperate in the pro-

There is precedent for slidingscale payments in the sugar act and the old soil bank program. he mentioned.

Quie recognized that some authorities contend the government couldn't get compliance from the larger farmers if there were a payment limitation, particularly on cotton. Perhaps the cofton program would have to be changed, he said. Cotton farmers can stay out of the program now and produce for the world market. The larger ones, especially those in Arizona and California, might be willing to do this if they could not get the government payment, he surmised.

Quie's main points were that he thought a plan could be worked out for the ceiling on payments and that such action should be taken to save the farm program.

"We're not going to drop farm the farmer, the nation and the party in power."

Godfrey (no longer in a government office) was more emphatic in his statements.

"The main issue," he said, "is not payment limitation, but should we have farm programs. It should be settled now. We need programs to assure the public an adequate supply of food and fiber. We need programs to preserve the capacity of the producer. We need programs to support farm income. We need programs because it is in the national interest.

"If the payment type program is best, and it is," Godfrey said, "then why limit payments."

"You don't limit payments on other government contracts. If

"In my judgement, such limitation would be class discrimination in the first degree," Godfrey went on. "It would be discriminatory. Further, it is my opinion limitation would be impossible to administer. It would cause a switch from crops on which there was a limit to those where there was none. Cotton farmers would switch to cattle, hogs or soybeans. Then we'd have new problems with these

"A payment limitation would hurt the small farmer you would be trying to help simply because the production from the big farm not in the program would put pressure on prices. Prices would drop to the support level and never rise above it."

Another member of Congress who is convinced a payment limitation is coming is Sen. Jack Miller (R-Ia.)

"There's too much resentment against the big payments to a few farmers," he commented in an across-the-table conversation.

When told how Godfrey had defended the present program


and its payment schedule, Miller said that the former ASCS administrator and Secretary Freeman both were in a peculiar position because of a study that had been made on payment limitations. The issue became hot in 1968 and President Johnson ordered the study made just to see what might happen to the farm program if a cutoff were made on the size of the sums that might go to farmers.

"This study never has been made public, but apparently members of Congress know or think they know what the conclusions were.

While he didn't mention the level, Miller said the study revealed that a limitation could be put on payments without seriously interfering with the operation of the farm program.

### Bats A Livestock Threat In South America

Deadly vampires that bear no resemblance to a black-caped count from Transylvania are destroying the livestock of South America.

An estimated million head of cattle perish each year from rabies inflicted by vampire bats. At least 60 people are believed to have contracted rabies from bats in the last 15 years.

A research station, financed by the United Nations and the Mexican government, has been

established near Mexico City in an effort to combat the menace. Scientists hope to improve available rabies vaccines and to find ways to control or eliminate the elusive bats.

Vampire bats inhabit every Central and South American country and the island of Trini-

The flying mammals feed solely on blood - usually an animal's but occasionally a man's. Their narrow, razor-sharp teeth cut so painlessly that the sleeping victim seldom wakens. A bat laps up no more than an ounce or two of blood, but its bite actually an incision - may transmit rabies or other diseases.

optera) includes only three vampire genera - Desmodus, Diaemus, and Diphylla.

Though some bats range up to a foot in length with wingspreads of five feet, vampires are tiny creatures, about three inches long with wingspreads of eight inches or so.

Long before a 19th-century Irish novelist, Bram Stoker, created the gruesome and restless Count Dracula, vampire bats terrified men and killed animals. Columbus had scarcely arrived at Trinidad before he received reports of bat bites there.

Bats attacked the men and horses of Vasco Nunez be Balboa on the way to the Pacific. Vampires horrified the Aztecs, and distressed Hernan Cortes and his men during the Spanish Conquest.

An 18th century writer recorded that bats wiped out a shipment of horses and cattle sent from Europe to Ecuador.

Even today, superstition surrounds these eerie creatures so long associated with tales of the living dead. A belief in batlike, human vampires lingers in a few areas of the Balkans.

Some jungle inhabitants of Trinidad, when wounded by bats, blame "jumbies" for the evil deed. Jumbies are bloodsucking spirits that assume the forms of women by day and flying balls of fire by night.

Bats are the best known, but not the only vampires.

The candiru, known to Brazilians as the "vampire fish," poses a greater hazard to Amazon bathers than the notorious piranha. The sharp teeth of the 21/2inch-long catfish cause excruciating pain.

Even moths have their vam-

A moth recently discovered in Malaya uses a barbed, pointed proboscis to extract blood from water buffalo and other animals. A human guinea pig, who subjected himself to the moth's bite in a laboratory test, commented. "It felt like being stabbed with a hot needle."

Fortunately, the nocturnal insect seems to prefer water buffalo to human blood.

#### State Collects More Tax Than It Expected

Fiscal 1969 state general fund receipts are expected to run \$6 to \$7 million ahead of estimates.

A report from the Legislative Council's research department said actual general fund receipts exceeded the revised budget estimate by almost \$1.9 million at the end of May.

"Present indications are that for all of 1969 (ending June 30) actual receipts will be \$6 to \$7 million more than estimated if sales and use tax collections attributable to June are close to the amounts estimated," the report said.

Richard Ryan, assistant research director, said "If we have a good sales tax month in June we could go over \$7 million."

Ryan said the U.S. Department of Commerce has reported that personal income of Kansans in 1968 rose 9.8 percent over 1967 while the increase nationally was only 9 percent.

#### State May Have 9-Day Teal Season

WASHINGTON - The Interior Department offered the states of the Central and Mississippi Flyways today a nine-day teal hunting season in early Sep-

Dr. Leslie L. Glasgow, assistant secretary of fish and wildlife, parks and marine resources, said the bag limit would be four daily and eight in possession.

States accepting the early season would define specific dates and open areas for hunting.

Glasgow said those states which accept "must agree to: conduct a hunter education program to improve hunter performance and waterfowl identification and compliance with the regulations; step up their enforcement program; implement a hunter observation program to provide data for an analysis of the season; and complete a report to the director of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, covering hunter success, compliance with regulations and reaction to the season."

The Mississippi Flyway includes Alabama, Arkansas, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Ohio, Tennessee and Wisconsin.

The Central Flyway states are Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, Oklahoma, South Dakota, Texas, and parts of Colorado. Montana, New Mexico, and Wyoming east of the Continental Divide.

S. corn is shipped to many countries. The leading buyers are the Netherlands, Japan, England, Canada, Germany, Italy, Spain, and Belgium.

The use of corn for food and industrial uses in our country totals about 375 million bushels per year, or about 8 per cent of the total amount used. Of this 350million total, about 210 million bushels are used for starch, syrup, and sugar; 110 million bushels, for corn meal, hominy, and grits: 20 million for breakfast foods; and 35 million for alcohol and distilled spirits. ### Necks Bow At Mandatory Auto nspection Despite U.S. Pressure

you might think it would be beyond dispute that regular inspection of autos would enhance safety. Certainly that view underlies the requirement of the Department of Transportation that all states set up vehicle inspection programs to detect auto

han

rain

ads

and truck safety defects.
But in some of the 19 states that still don't have periodic inspections, officials are balking at adopting them, even though the Highway Safety Act of 1966 mpowers the Government to urtail Federal highway aid to tates that fail to establish a somiled total highway safety program. The deadline is Dec. 31. The state officials say they are willing to risk the loss of Federal ands because they have some doubts about whether the Gov rnment will actually use its juscle. Moreover, many say hey question the value of mandatory inspection of cars or see drawbacks.

Under the safety act, state programs that don't satisfy Federal uthorities could lose 10% of their Federal highway construc tion money and all of their Federal highway safety funds.

State officials are mindful of complaints in states such as Pennsylvania, where inspection s done by private garage own ers instead of state inspectors. Sometimes the garage owners are accused of forcing unneeded repairs on motorists.

Compulsory inspection also omes under fire from farmers. who may be required to fix up vehicles used sparingly and usually off the highway.

Other critics say that in places where inspections are the law, they have sometimes tended to become so perfunctory as to be worthless - flick on the lights, beep the horn, pump the brakes and pay the fee for the sticker. Inspection legislation nas been introduced in some of the states that don't now require auto

checks, but political observers see little chance that many states will pass new laws before the deadline, already extended once. In a number of states, there appears to be considerable skeptieism that Transportation Secre-

tary Volpe will get tough.

One reason some states remain hesitant to pass inspection legislation in the face of such threats is that lawmakers are confused about how strong they can make inspection laws without stirring the wrath of the motoring public.

In some of the 11 states that have approved compulsory inspection legislation during the last three years, laws have recently been watered down or temporarily suspended as a result of public outery.

In Oklahoma, for example, a stiff inspection law went into effect on Jan. 1 of this year. It quickly brought grumbling, particularly from farmers, who complained that it would force them to replace worn tires on vehicles used for only brief periods during harvest time.

Only a few weeks passed before state lawmakers felt compelled to suspend the inspection law. The inspections were resumed in March but gone were strict checks on tire wear, exhaust and suspension systems and headcompulsory inspections (15% of light adjustment.

the nation's autos are located in these 19 states) have random roadside police checks similar to the program in California, where motorists are required to make quick repair of any defects spot-

But officials at the National Highway Safety Bureau, the agency that administers the Federal programs, contend that the random check method is superficial and that too few cars are actually checked. In Michigan. for instance, only 3% of the state's vehicles are inspected annually, while in California, only 16% of the cars are checked.

Besides California, Michigan and Ohio, the states that have no compulsory inspection laws are Minnesota, North Dakota, Oregon, Washington, Wisconsin, Alabama, Illinois, Iowa, Tennessee, Alaska, Arizona, Connecticut, Kansas, Maryland, Montana and

#### Unearth Indian Village At Caldwell

CALDWELL - Archeologists began digging July 1 at the site of an old Indian village west of Caldwell near the Oklahoma bor-

Research officials said one survey showed 77 percent of all retail produce departments were self-service. One out of three supermarkets sell all - or nearly all - produce pre-packaged.

The trend to pre-packaging continues to rise. It is expected that by 1970 from 60 to 75 percent of all fresh vegetables will be packaged before they arrive at retail food stores.

When wet weather in late spring held back corn and milo planting, many a farmer considered trying aerial planting. One who did more than consider it was M. R. Hudson, below left, Kansas City oil man who has a farm near LaCygne. Hudson hired Glenn Erwin, right, Mound City pilot, to broadcast seed corn over 300 acres of land.

Erwin flew at an altitude of 85 feet, about 90 miles an hour, and broadcast the seed in a 30-foot swath - at a rate of about 33,000 kernels per acre. The planting was done in a normal working day and Hudson figures the cost at about the same as tractor-drawn

The success of the planting won't be known for a while. The land, of course, cannot be mechanically cultivated, as the stalks come up in a jungle, without rows. Weedicides were also applied by

Unusual farming methods are not new to Hudson. A year ago, Hudson decided to convert 3340 acres of timberland to rangeland. He had a 220-foot ship's anchor chain stretched between two bulldozers to clear the dense woods. It did the job - 100 acres in 20 hours, at a cost of \$4 to \$5 an acre.

### Set Ad Rules On Interest Rates

Rules governing interest-rate advertising by banks and savings and loan associations were

adopted by the three Federal agencies that regulate these institutions. The rules take effect Aug. 1.

The only major change from the proposals announced in March to implement legislation passed last year is a prohibition of advertising yields in excess of one year. Originally, institutions were to be allowed to advertise yields up to five years. The Federal Reserve Board said the tighter restriction was adopted "in the interest of greater clarity."



But this plan has difficulties too, because Canada's quarantine facilities are limited.

Simmentals were developed in the valley of the Simme river in Switzerland. There is a breed society at Berne. Of 830,000 head of cattle in Switzerland, about half are Simmentals. The animals have red bodies, white faces and white spots, rather like a Hereford.

Every country in Europe has some of these cattle. In France, Austria, Czechoslovakia, the Soviet Union and some other countries, they are called Pie Rouge.

Mature bulls reach weights of 2500 to 3000 pounds and cows run around 1700 pounds. Cows give up to 15,000 pounds of milk a year, There are no Simmentals in Europe on grain, but a 2 to 3 year old steer on grass may weigh 1800 pounds.

The demand in the United States and Canada is based on the huge size and beef quality of the Simmentals. The theory is that they can be used to increase the size of British breeds in this country

where consumer demand for beef is at unprecedented heights and where the commercial cow man is looking for ways to produce more beef for each dollar invested.

One Canadian has anticipated the tremendous demand for Sim-Travers Smith of mentals Cardston, Alberta, Canada. He imported five Simmental bulls before the recent tremendous demand developed. Recently he has added three more bulls.

Smith has sold semen to KAB. SU at Kansas State University, to Curtiss Breeding Service, and a few others.

Ancil Armstrong, the KABSU manager, said more interest had developed in the artificial insemination of the Simmental breed than all other breeds put together to date. K-State's charges for Simmental semen are three to five times higher than for other breeds and currently back orders will take all semen available well into the fall months.

Armstrong estimated that by January 1, 1970, 20,000 crossbred calves would be born in the United States. The females will be kept in breeding herds - they will be bred again to Simmental bulls thru artificial insemination.

The second calves from the crossbreeding would be threequarter Simmental. Three-quarter heifers bred back to purebred



trong, Inventory Method of Assessment During the 1959 session the legislature was asked, in connection with the change in assessment dates, to grant to the livestock industry the privilege of making a choice in methods of listing livestock for tax purposes. This was done in statute 79-307a. and the change made the livestock industry comparable to other segments of the Kansas economy which make their return of personal property on the basis of average monthly inventories. Although we recognize that livestock brought into the state for grazing or for feeding has in the past developed substantial ad valorem tax revenue for local school districts and local units of government, we must also recognize that there is a strong national trend to exempt livestock from ad valorem taxation. If Kansas is to compete with other states, we cannot afford to ignore this trend. For that reason we will support the complete exemption of livestock from ad valorem taxation

In support of the 1968 resolution, the following information is available concerning the assessment of livestock in some other states. The following states do not assess livestock for ad valorem tax purposes: Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, New York, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Michigan (removed in 1966), Minnesota (removed in 1967), Alaska, Haneadow waii and Connecticut.

The proponents of this proposal argued that some states were removing livestock from their tax rolls or had more liberal exemptions than Kansas. 
Use of the Average Inventory

Many stockmen have taken advantage of the average monthly inventory option passed in 1959 and have found that it was to their advantage. In using the "average monthly inventory," the stockman makes an inventory each month of those cattle subject to taxation by classes as defined by the director of Property Valuation Department (Ex: cattle rough fed, which are at least one year old and less than two years old; half or full fed cattle one year old and less than two years old: half or full fed cattle two years old and older). As the cattle are finished, they change in classification and value. If they were in the full fed class on January 1, the assessed value would be higher by an actual count on January 1 than by using the average month ly inventory method.

Another factor to consider is that these animals might not be 12 months old until May or June and therefore would not be on the inventory record for a full year. 



Prices now are at the longer end of the range of the past 10 years. During the 1950s, when prices were high, extra blast furnaces were built to produce pigs which could substitute for scrap. This drove the price down and the introduction of oxygen melting, which can use only 30 percent of scrap, has kept them

The paper on the economics of new steel furnaces was written by Gerald R. Curtis, Wallace M. Rankin and Dr. Charles R. Taylor. They pointed out not only how the new method has pushed down prices but also that electric furnaces may furnish a \$28 a ton floor under future quotations. "One prerequisite of a success

ful electric furnace installation,' they wrote, "is the availability of a sufficient quantity of low cost scrap. This condition cannot be met if the demand for scrap exceeds the local supply. For example, a steel plant producing 2.4 million net tons per year of liquid steel from an all scrap charge would require a yearly scrap purchase of about 2.2 mil lion tons.

"This quantity of scrap is sim ply not available at low cost in most areas. The alternative is to supplement the scrap supply with high quality 'metalized' ore or pellets.

"It has been assumed that the use of scrap at \$28 per net ton is more profitable than using



#### Don't Try To Sell Treated Wheat Seed

If you get the urge to add your leftover seed wheat to a load of newly harvested grain going to the elevator - don't.

That's the advice of Claude L. King, Extension plant pathologist at Kansas State University who points out that from twothirds to three-fourths of all wheat sown in Kansas is mercury treated before seeding.

This treated wheat cannot be sold or fed to livestock. In fact, one kernel of treated wheat can cause an entire carload of wheat to be condemned.

For on-the-farm storage, be sure to remove any remaining seed wheat from the bin before new grain is added. King advises a last minute bin cleaning just before harvest to prevent accidental mixing.

Wheat is treated at planting time for a definite and useful purpose, the K-State plant pathologist says. Mercury treatment protects against smuts and seedling diseases.

However, when treated wheat, known as "pink wheat," is found at terminal markets, the entire carlot is seized and condemned. It is considered contaminated with a poisonous material and is returned to the local elevator in an attempt to trace the cause.

If you had some leftover seed this year, change your procedure a little when you start to plant wheat this fall, King suggests. Pre-treat enough wheat at planting time to handle about 90 per cent of your acreage.

Then use drill box treatments to complete the job and seed all wheat that has been treated. Ceresan MDB, Panogen PX, and Ortho HCB, when used as directed, are three of the chemicals that can be used for this






