## Europe Considers Major Land Retirement Also

Those picturesque landscapes of Western Europe are going to change radically over the next 10 years if the planners get their way.

Tourists may love the poppy-studded wheatfields and the vineyards climbing up the hillsides, but a lot of them will have to go. They aren't economic.

The grain costs too much to grow. Much of the wine is unsaleable and some is undrinkable — it has to be bought up by the government and made into industrial alcohol.

A proposal for a massive cut-down came last year from Sicco L. Mansholt, the vice-president in charge of agriculture on the executive commission of the European Common Market. He suggested that by 1980, some

12½ million acres ought to be taken out of cultivation by the six countries in the area.

That would be the equivalent of the land area of Denmark.

Mansholt thinks the land should go into timber or be used for recreation areas.

Said one American expert interested in promoting the sale of U.S. food in Europe:

"It would be nice if they built a big chain of golf courses."

Mansholt's proposal ran into opposition from traditional farm organizations. For the present it seems to have little chance of adoption.

But younger farmers in Europe are thinking of the large numbers of their generation who are leaving the land for the cities. They see little future in marginal agriculture. The manpower will not be there, and the city populations will not support the payment of huge subsidies out of tax funds.

Between 1960 and 1970, Mansholt points out, 4.7 million West Europeans will have left farming. Five million more are expected to go in the ensuing 10 years.

Now a new report has come out in France, the biggest producer of farm products in the Common Market. It has been in preparation for almost two years by a team of 24 experts under Georges Vedel, former dean of law at the University of Paris.

The report carries extra weight because two of the experts are on the personal staff of Jacques Duhamel, the French minister of agriculture.

The Vedel report goes much further than Mansholt. It proposes that by 1985 France alone should take out of production as much as 30 million acres — a third of the country's farmland and more than a fifth of its whole territory.

How would the land be taken out of use? Vedel estimates that much of it will come on the market as farms of 50 acres and less are abandoned with older farm-

ers retiring and younger farmers taking jobs in town. He wants to prevent the land from being bought up by bigger farmers whose own properties are not too profitable as it is.

Vedel recommends big reductions in the government-supported prices for grain and sugar, which are in heavy surplus. So are dairy products.

Duhamel suggests more emphasis on products that command high prices on the market: mushrooms, rabbits, geese for foie gras. He suggests special kinds of cactus to feed sheep in dry areas.

When such changes can be brought about is doubtful since the farm vote is still highly important in Western Europe. The vineyards are already disappearing from some French hillsides, but it probably will be a while before cactus replaces them.

## Area County Names A Sheriff's Investigator

ABILENE — Jim McKinney, member of the Dickinson County sheriff's staff, has been named to the new post of county investigator by Dickinson County Commission.

Commissioner Elmer Jones said the new job was created on a one-year trial basis because "there have been numerous times that detailed or long-term investigation of a situation needs to be made — either after a law has been broken or where a crime might be prevented."

Present county lawmen try to do this, but are constantly interrupted for calls to other duty, according to Jones.

Jones said that it is hoped McKinney will be able to stay on cases which need continuous investigation. "The marijuana and drug situation makes it imperative that the county expand its enforcement force," he added.

McKinney, a sheriff's deputy since May 1968, will still be on Sheriff M. A. Anderson's staff but will work closely with County Attorney Max Hinkle.

The new job carries a salary of \$500 per month.

## Africa A Major Milo Market?

Always looking for feed grain markets, U.S. producers are now eyeing North Africa as a potential major customer.

North Africa is striving mightily to increase livestock and poultry output, but there is little land for expanding feed grains production because nearly all grain output must go for human food.

That's the appraisal of Paul Ferree, who recently returned from four years as U. S. agricultural attache in Morocco, writing in a Foreign Agriculture Service report.

"The mere fact that the area's

livestock and feed industries are at such a low stage of development offers room for optimism about feedgrain sales," Ferree said.

"They can only improve — they have to improve. Annual meat consumption in the North African countries (he mentions Morocco, Tunisia, Libya and Algeria) probably averages no more than 25 to 35 pounds per capita; consumption of dairy and poultry products is similarly low," he said.

Ferree reported that governments in the area "have made good starts" toward improving livestock through breeding programs and by importing foundation stock.

He suggested that U. S. investors — perhaps some of the co-operators working with FAS to expand exports — could help speed up North African livestock production by participating in projects of mutual interest.

"I would not propose the investment route for influencing trade if there were a good chance for U. S. sales of meat, poultry

and dairy products in the area," Ferree said.

"However, the relatively limited market for these products is currently supplied by European countries, which are able to undersell the United States because of their lower freight costs and export subsidies."

Moreover, Ferree added, it is the policy of most of the countries to move toward self-sufficiency in animal products as well as other basic food and fiber requirements.

"Therefore," he said, "U. S. agricultural investments would not displace potential sales. Quite the contrary, investments in such areas as livestock production and feed manufacture could eventually improve our balance of payments by creating a market for breeding stock, various equipment and machinery, feed ingredients and veterinary products."

"Hopefully, improvement in the livestock industry would be sufficient to result in increased demand for feedgrains," Ferree said.

## See A Smaller Soviet Harvest

The Soviet Union is expected to have an average grain harvest totaling about 150 billion tons this year, about 9 million less than last year, western experts say.

The experts noted that cutting and threshing, according to latest figures issued Oct. 2, was lagging well behind the 1968 position at the same date. But they added there was no reason why the farmers should not catch up.

# Corn, Soybean Pictures Flip-Flop

The corn situation and outlook differ considerably from that of a year ago. Supplies of old corn appear to be smaller, demand is stronger, and prices are higher. The new crop was estimated in early September at 4.3 billion bushels — slightly less than what was produced last year.

Many farmers have asked whether this year's crop, as in 1968, may not be overestimated. This is possible, but doubtful. The latest estimate was made on the basis of conditions reported September 1. At 4.3 billion bushels, this figure is 7 per cent less

than the official estimate made on the same date last year, and 1.5 per cent less than the estimate made last December.

The carryover of old corn on October 1 may be around 1 billion bushels — down from 1.16 billion a year ago. Of this carryover, about 600 million bushels may be under price support, leaving some 400 million bushels in the "free" supply. A year ago the "free" portion of the carryover was estimated at 432 million bushels.

Farmers put 403 million bushels of their 1968 corn crop under loan, but they redeemed 216 million bushels by September 1. A substantial part of the remaining 174 million bushels has also been redeemed (but not yet reported).

Older corn under resale loans on September 1, 1969, totaled 278 million bushels — 31 per cent more than last year. CCC stocks on hand at mid-September totaled 284 million bushels — 71 per cent more than a year earlier.

Domestic use and exports of corn in 1968-1969 apparently totaled about 4.5 million bushels — nearly 100 million more than in

the previous year and over 100 million bushels greater than 1968 production.

Looking ahead, use and exports may take about 4.6 billion bushels during the coming year. If so, the carryover will be reduced again next year, possibly around 700 million bushels. Apparently, prices will have to be high enough to induce farmers to redeem some of the old corn now under resale as well as most of the new crop that is placed under loan.

**Soybean carryover larger than expected.** The carryover of old soybeans on September 1 has been estimated by the USDA at 322 million bushels. This is a little more than was generally expected, and nearly twice as much as was carried over a year ago. The 322 million figure suggests that the 1968 crop was slightly larger than official estimates indicated. Most of the carryover was under price support.

The new crop was estimated in early September at 1,055 million bushels — 2 per cent less than last year. This amount is probably in excess of the needs for domestic use and exports during

the year ahead, which seem likely to be near 1 billion bushels.

The excess of production over use and exports, and more, will be placed under price-support loans. Later on, prices will rise sufficiently to induce farmers to redeem most of the beans they place under loan.

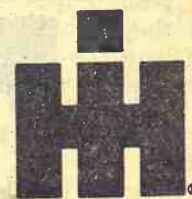

## \$1.80 Milo By Spring

The cattle feeding boom may boost grain sorghum prices.

Dr. Norman Whitehair, Kansas State University Extension economist, sees sorghum grain head-

ing for \$1.80 and higher by next spring.

He says that even though larger supplies of sorghum are in prospect, domestic consumption is climbing fast. He thinks the U.S. will use up some 650 million bushels of grain sorghum during the present marketing year — 20 million bushels more than last year.

Whitehair explains exports have dropped during the last three years due to reduced commercial demand for sorghum and smaller exports under Public Law 480.

Last year the U.S. exported about 85 million bushels — the smallest amount since 1960-61. Much improvement in the export situation can be expected this year, the economist believes.

Whitehair points to an increase in demand from feeders. Commercial feedlots not only are growing in number but existing lots are boosting their capacity.

About 17.3 million acres are planted to sorghum in the U.S., down slightly from last year.

## Area Native Max Dowdy With Guernsey Club

A native of the G&G area, Max L. Dawdy has been named secretary-treasurer of the American Guernsey Cattle Club. Dawdy was reared on a farm at Washington, Kansas, and graduated from Kansas State College in 1942.

Since 1963 Dawdy has been editor of the Jersey Journal, publication of the American Jersey Cattle Club.

Prior to that, Dawdy was with the Guernsey organization as a field representative in the midwest. After World War II service in the Air Force and graduate work at the University of Minnesota, Dawdy was an instructor at Penn State before associating with the Guernsey organization.

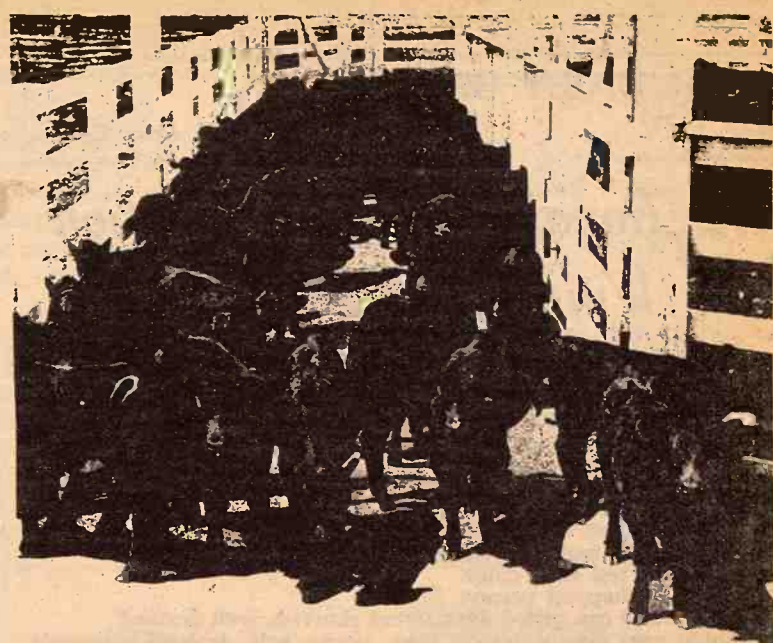

#### PAPER CUP FROZEN SALAD

2 cups commercial sour cream  
2 tablespoons lemon juice  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 8-ounce can crushed pineapple, well drained  
2 medium bananas, sliced  
4 drops red food color  
1/2 cup chopped pecans  
1 1-pound can pitted dark sweet cherries, well drained  
Combine sour cream, lemon juice, sugar, salt, drained pineapple, banana pieces and red food color to give a pink tint. Lightly fold in nuts and cherries. Spoon into fluted paper muffin cups (large size) which have been placed in 3-inch muffin cup pans. Freeze. Cover with plastic wrap and store in freezer. Remove from freezer about 15 minutes before serving to loosen paper cups from pan. Peel off paper cup and place salad on greens. Fills twelve large paper muffin cups.

#### CHICKEN BREASTS

8 chicken breasts  
1 1/2 cups rice, uncooked  
1 stick butter or oleo  
1 can cream of celery soup  
1 can mushroom soup  
1 can cream of chicken soup  
1 can filled with water  
Melt butter or oleo in large saucepan. Mix all soups and

water into butter and stir well. Spread rice in large ungreased casserole (13x9 inch). Pour half of the soup mixture over rice and mix with it. Lay chicken breasts on top. Bake uncovered at 275 degrees for three hours. If it becomes a little dry, a little more water may be added as it bakes."

**FAVORITE GOULASH**  
1 1/4 to 1 1/2 pounds hamburger  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1 large clove garlic or 1/2

teaspoon garlic powder

1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
1 cup uncooked small shelloni  
2 small cans Hunt's tomato sauce  
Combine hamburger, onion, salt, and pepper and cook till hamburger is browned. Drain excess fat. Add remaining ingredients except shelloni and simmer while cooking the shelloni till tender. Drain shelloni and add to above. "Delicious served with vegetable and combination salad."

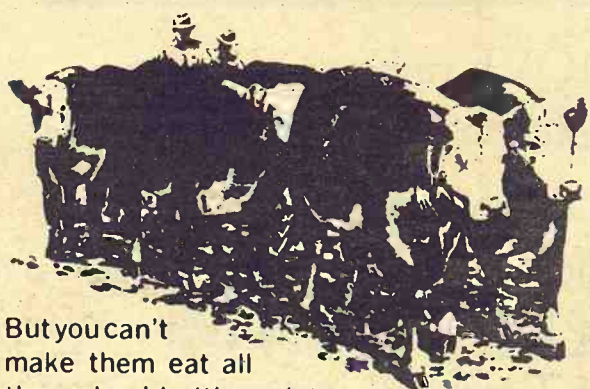

## Apricot Drop Doughnuts A Rewarding Treat



Doughnuts are perennially popular for coffee breaks and school snacks. A typically American treat, they were especially favored in colonial New England. Early "doughnuts" were drop doughnuts a bit larger than the modern ones, made of walnut and spherical in shape. These tempting Apricot Nut Puffs retain the size and shape of their New England ancestors but take added flavor from rolled oats, chopped apricots and lemon peel.

**APRICOT DOUGHNUT PUFFS**  
1 cup chopped dried apricots  
1/2 cup sugar  
1/2 cup milk  
2 tablespoons vegetable oil  
1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1/2 cups baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 cup quick or old-fashioned

oats, uncooked  
1 teaspoon grated lemon peel  
Cover apricots with boiling water and let stand about five minutes. Thoroughly drain and squeeze out excess liquid. Beat eggs; gradually beat in sugar. Stir in milk and oil. Sift together flour, baking powder, salt and nutmeg; stir in oats and lemon peel. Add dry ingredients to egg mixture; blend well. Stir in apricots. Drop batter by tablespoonsful into hot deep fat (375 degrees F.) and fry until golden brown, about three minutes. Drain on absorbent paper. Sprinkle each with confectioners sugar. Makes three dozen.

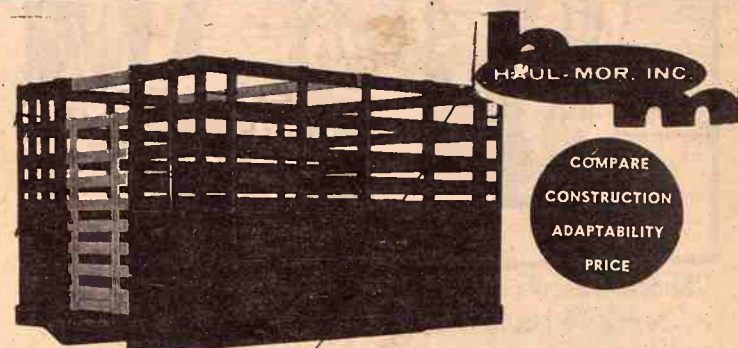
bright colored thread, making up your own decorative design.

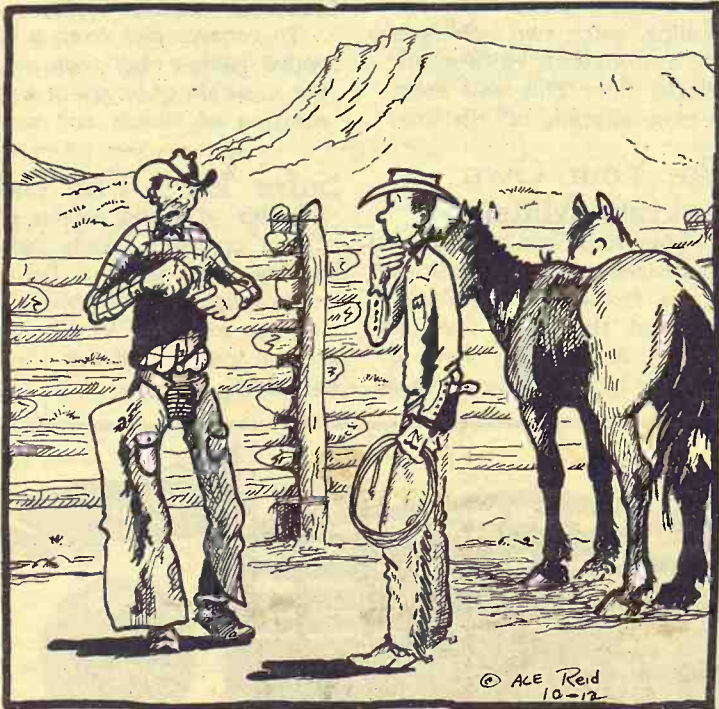

## Traveling Cowman May Bring Back Disease

Nearly all countries outside North America contain some livestock diseases which at present do not exist in the United States, says the United States Department of Agriculture.

The department says in a recently released pamphlet that the traveling stockman should stay away from his cows and pigs for at least a week after he returns home.

Recommendations given by USDA to avoid disease contaminations, including foot-and-mouth disease, which is among the most prominent, are:

—Avoid unnecessary contamination of your person, clothing and equipment at foreign fairs or

other livestock events.

—Wear disposable boots and rubbers which can be discarded if you must visit rural areas.

—Don't bring back meat, animal products or equipment around foreign animals.

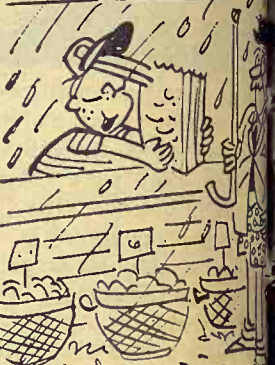
—Stay away from livestock at least seven days after leaving foreign soil.

The pamphlet also suggests that stockmen help foreign visitors observe similar practices while on U.S. farms.

"Discourage handling of animals by all visitors," the pamphlet said. "Make sure no animal products of foreign origin are brought on your property."

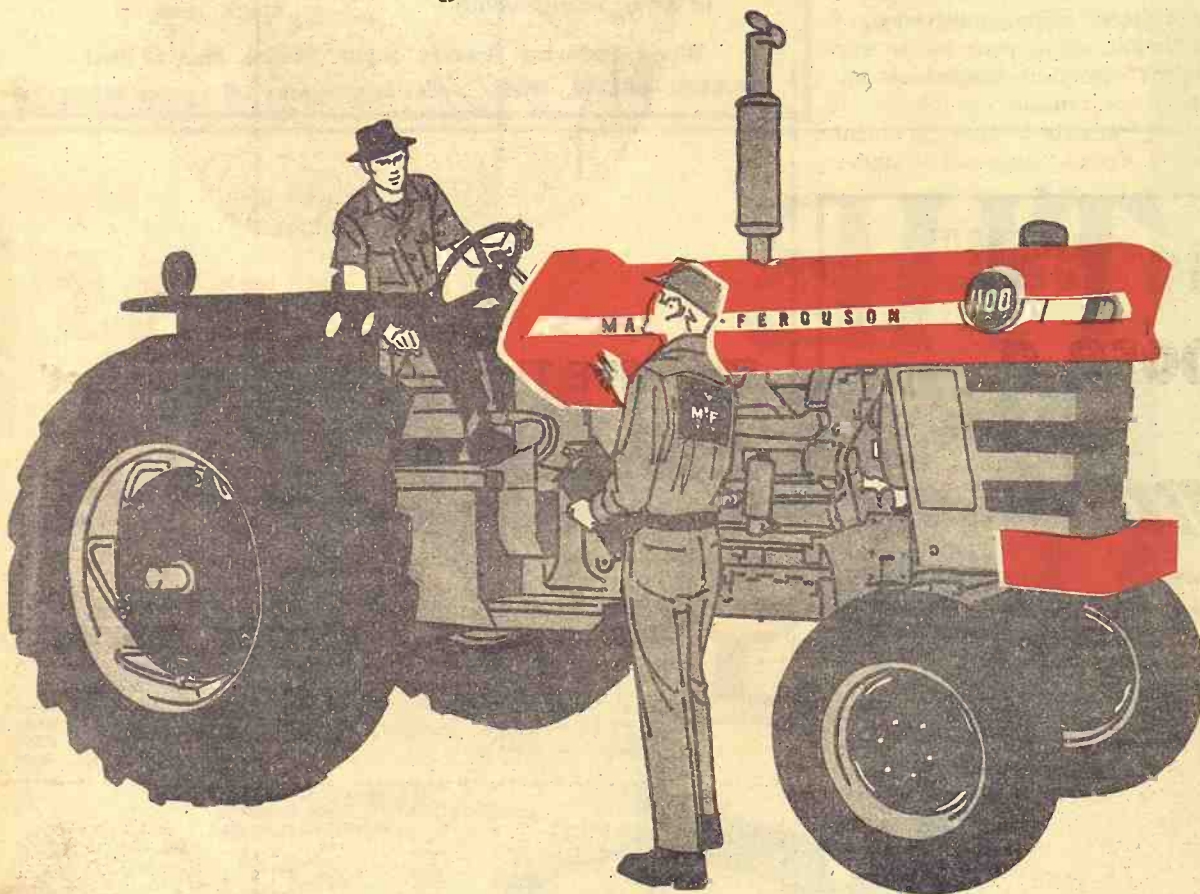

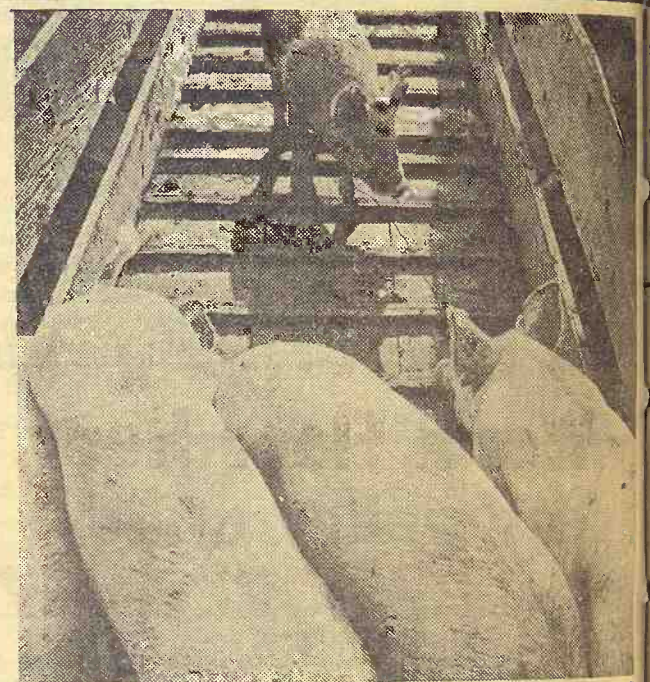
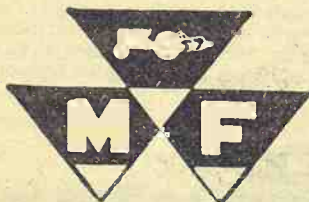

## Kansas 9th In Angus Registry

Kansas ranks 9th in registrations with the American Angus Association.

The Angus organization, headquartered at St. Joseph, reports that Missouri continued to lead in both registrations and transfers in the fiscal year just ended. Texas ranked 2nd in both categories. Nebraska ranked 8th in registrations.

The association reported 388,000 new calves registered during the year, down about 4% from last year. A change in registering age gives breeders a longer period to decide if an animal is worth registering or not. The association also hiked fees in the past year.

The average sale price of some 30,000 Angus cows sold during the year at auction averaged \$466, up from \$439 in 1968. About 18,000 bulls averaged \$531 at auction, up from \$510.

## Call Off Bond Vote At Lawrence

LAWRENCE — The Douglas County Commission has called off a special \$3.5 million bond election which had been scheduled this fall to finance a joint city-county law enforcement building.

Commissioner Arthur Heck said the main reason for the delay of the vote is that "a statute does not exist at present under

which we could have a legal bond election."

Several present state laws affect the issuance of bonds for construction of county buildings. A check by legal advisers showed all were too limiting for the planned joint structure, commission-

ers said.

The commission said, however, it is not scrapping plans for the project. The legal details of the bond issue will be worked out in the near future, commissioners said.

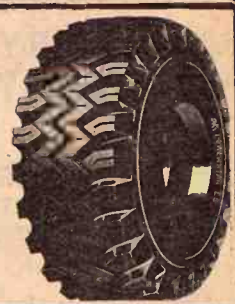

## Insurance Loss On 4-On-Floor, Souped-Up Cars

Those superpowered motor cars with the big engines, air scoops, fat racing tires and "4-on-the-floor" are racking up 56 percent larger accident losses, an insurance executive says.

Dean Jeffers, president of Nationwide Mutual Insurance Company, the nation's fifth largest car insurer, then announced at a Senate hearing his firm is increasing by 50 percent insurance rates on these cars to discourage their appeal. He called them "motorized missiles."

Jeffers said his firm doesn't consider owners of these cars unsafe drivers and acknowledged that "all these cars are not purchased for fast driving thrills."

But, he said, "these cars cer-

tainly are not conducive to moderate driving. Indeed, they are powered well above the needs of the prudent defensive driver and above the traffic capacity of most streets and roads."

Among cars listed under Na-

tionwide's superpower category by Jeffers are the Corvette, Mustang Mach I, Oldsmobile 442, Pontiac GTO, Plymouth Road Runner, Dodge Charger 500, AMX, Malibu SS 396 and the Mercury Cougar Eliminator.

Jeffers said the increase in rates on this type of car was prompted by a special actuarial study made by his firm over a 3-year period.

It showed, he said in testimony before the Senate antitrust mon-

opoly subcommittee, that highpowered cars Detroit out to appeal to the "under set" produce an average of percent more in accident than standard-powered cars.

## Slow Pay On Specials Puts Salina Tax Short

**SALINA** — The City Commission has changed its mind and now wants Saline County to conduct a tax foreclosure sale.

City officials said Salina is in a financial bind because of unexpected revenue shortages and will seek permission from the State Board of Tax Appeals to finance a \$25,000 bond and interest payment in December with no-fund warrants.

Revenue for the bond and interest fund comes from special

assessment taxes as well as ad valorem taxes on general obligation bonds.

City Atty. L. O. Bengston said the city normally expects some unpaid taxes each year and provides a budget cushion. "We've gotten ourselves in a bind because there were so many unpaid specials (assessments)," he added.

Salina expected some relief from a tax foreclosure sale, which the state requires annually for property which has been three years delinquent in payment of taxes. Saline County's last sale was in 1967.

County Commission chairman Carl Ramsey said the county planned a 1969 sale but put it off

after talking to city officials.

"We passed a resolution for such a sale. I believe it was in March of this year," Ramsey said. "But the last time we talked to city officials they asked that we put it off for a while. We planned to have one but decided not to after talking with the city."

The city normally would collect revenue quickly from a tax sale since many owners would redeem their property up to the time of a sheriff's auction by paying back taxes.

Salina would receive the de-

linquent city tax payments.

"We assumed there would be a tax sale this year," said Bengston. "There hasn't been one and the city is now short back taxes on some property for 1963, 1964 and 1965."

The city attorney said a tax foreclosure sale couldn't be held for eight months even if the county started proceedings immediately.

The city will have to include funds in the 1971 budget to repay the no-fund warrants issued for the bond and interest payments in 1969.

The commissioners, who are members of the North Central Kansas Highway Officials Association, held the fall meeting in Junction City Friday. They did not take a stand on a proposal by

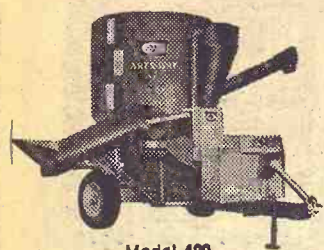
Gov. Robert Docking that such a marijuana eradication law be passed.

## Continue Gain In State Tax Collections

Paced by a substantial gain in state withholding, total taxes and fees collected by the state during the first three months of this fiscal year are running more than 13 percent ahead of collections during the same period last year.

The State Revenue Dept. said that taxes and fees collected during July, August and September totaled \$88.4 million, compared with total collections of \$78.1 million during the same months last year.

It was a gain of \$10.3 million and represents an increase of 13.2 percent in overall collections during the first quarter of this fiscal year.

Revenue Dept. fiscal analysts pointed out the state withholding tax increased by \$2.5 million during the period and commented, "This is the best indication we have of increased personal income in 1969 as compared to

last year. It indicates we will have a substantial increase in withholding collections during the coming fiscal year."

Last fiscal year the state collected \$52.2 million from the withholding tax.

Sales tax collection, another of the state's economic indicators,

also increased during the first three months this fiscal year, the Revenue Dept. summary said.

It showed sales tax collections running \$1.6 million ahead of the same three months last year.

Revenue Dept. analysts said the bulk of the sale tax increase this year, \$1.1 million, occurred during September, easing what had been a downward trend in sales tax collections during the first two months of the fiscal year.

The department did not estimate how much in total taxes and fees the state might collect during the present fiscal year, which runs until June 30, 1970.

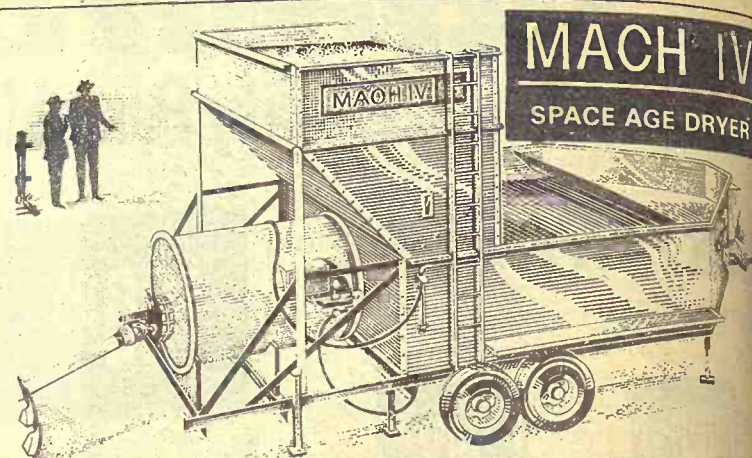

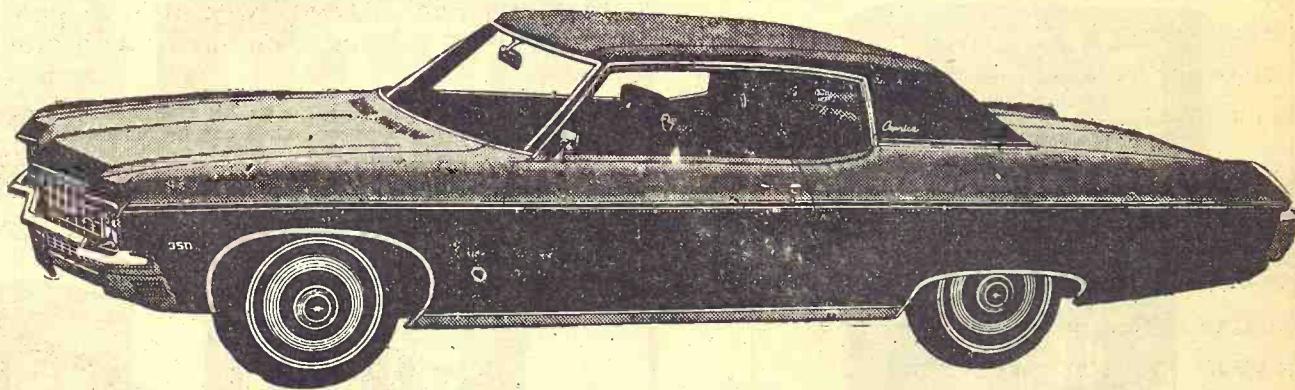

## Beet Growers Not Surprised By Acreage Cutback

**GOODLAND** — A reduction in the national sugar beet acreage allotment announced by the U.S. Agriculture Department was expected, said William A. Davis, the man largely responsible for bringing the \$15 million Great Western Sugar Co. factory here.

Davis was the northwest Kansas representative to the Mountain States Beet Growers Association which met with Agriculture Department officials in July to work out allotments.

"We felt there was a need to have allotments because the supply will exceed the demand this year," Davis said.

"We feel fortunate to get the 1970 1,450,000-acre figure, however we thought Kansas would get a bigger share of the allotment."

Department of Agriculture officials are talking about allotting

Kansas only about 39,000 acres for sugar beet production in 1970. This year, about 50,000 acres have been put into sugar beets in Kansas, Davis said.

"We're satisfied with that figure because it only puts us back to our '67 and '68 level. "This area has had a giant growth of the number of acres planted in recent years, and it was only natural for them to cut us."

Davis was one of the first sugar beet growers in northwest Kansas. He said his family has about 100 acres ready to be harvested this year.

# Factors Against Heavier Farm Exports Until Early 1970's

For a while U.S. farmers had some hope that surpluses and expanding production might be diverted to burgeoning export markets. Just three years ago, products of one-fourth of all U.S. acres harvested were going abroad.

Now the figure is down to one-fifth, and the peak of export business appears to be off, at least until the early 1970's.

The conclusion of Richard Rees, an economist for the Kansas City Federal Reserve Bank, is that this country will be hard pressed to maintain export levels for a while, although there are a number of variable conditions that could make this opinion vulnerable.

Writing in the monthly review of the K.C. Federal Reserve Bank, Rees noted that farm exports increased yearly from 1958 to 1966, reaching a value of \$6.8 billion in the latter year.

Exports went down in both 1967 and 1968 and likely will be lower this year also.

Among the factors which have contributed to lower farm exports the last three years have been record world grain crops, which resulted in less need for the U.S. products, lower grain prices, reduced government programs shipments (PL-480), the closing of the Suez Canal in June, 1967, and the U.S. dock strike last winter.

Most of the decline in export since 1966 has been in grains. Exports of animals and animal products, fruits and vegetables declined only by small amounts in 1967 and 1968, while cotton, oilseeds, and tobacco actually showed modest increases.

One thing Rees has done in his study is to indicate as near as possible what the farm export business means to the Tenth Federal Reserve District, which includes all of Kansas, the western part of Missouri, and Wyoming, Colorado, New Mexico, Nebraska and Oklahoma. Although not all of Missouri is in the Tenth District, the figures he uses are for the entire state. Rees explains it is difficult to pinpoint how much of any state's production goes for export, but he has attempted to make valid estimates.

His computations show that in fiscal 1968, 14.4 percent of all U.S. farm exports were produced in the Tenth District. These exports represented 13.4 percent of the district's cash farm marketings. On a commodity basis, about one third of wheat and flour exports came from the district with Kansas alone pro-

ducing about 15 percent of the wheat exported.

Among all states, Kansas ranked sixth in exports, Nebraska was ninth, Missouri 12th and Oklahoma 18th. The top five states were Illinois, North Carolina, Texas, California and Iowa in that order.

In fiscal 1968, the value put on Kansas' total exports was 296 million dollars. Kansas' exports amounted to 19.6 percent of its cash farm receipts.

Rees notes that population experts say the number of people in the world may double by the year 2000. Obviously, food supplies must increase sharply to feed all these people. In some of the developing countries, population is increasing faster percentage-wise than food production. It may be assumed, he observes, that population growth will be promoted by improved health practices and better diets, leading to a declining death rate.

On the other hand, some countries are embarking on family-planning programs which may offset some of the prospective

population growth. Such programs will take time to become effective.

Price competitiveness obviously is a factor in world trade. The United States, Rees relates, found itself in price trouble on wheat under the International Grains Arrangement. Corrections are being made. The wheat episode helped demonstrate the importance of being competitive.

Now to those factors which might inhibit the expansion of this country's farm business.

The first thing Rees mentions is that world production of agricultural products has increased significantly in this decade, although this increase hasn't been so pronounced when counted on a per capita basis. World grain production, Rees assumes, will, in the next decade, benefit greatly from the new wheat and rice varieties. His reference is to the new wheats that came from Rockefeller foundation work in Mexico, and the rices from the Philippines.

The better rices were developed by the International Rice Institute in the Philippines which was established by the Rockefeller and Ford foundations along with the Philippine government. The increased production from these better varieties of seeds will compete with U.S. exports.

However, in Rees's opinion, continued shipments will be needed for some time as the Asian nations, such as India and Pakistan, the chief recipients of U.S. aid in the past, build up ample grain reserves.

It might be, Rees comments, that if the economies of the less-developed nations can be improved, demand for farm products could expand more rapidly than

their ability to expand domestic production.

Another factor the Federal Reserve economist mentions is shipping strikes.

Protectionism in Europe, about which so much has been said lately, is still one more factor Rees mentions which will affect the U.S. farm export trade.

Summing it up, Rees says the current protectionist mood in Europe and elsewhere, fewer U.S. funds for aid shipments and increased world production make expansion in our farm export trade difficult in the short run.

Late in the 1970s, as nations continue to develop, exports, he predicts, likely will again trend upward. More economic growth, larger populations, possible unfavorable weather conditions —

causing reduced world production — and trade negotiations could again stimulate larger agricultural shipments.

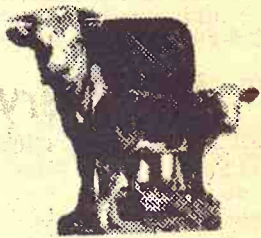

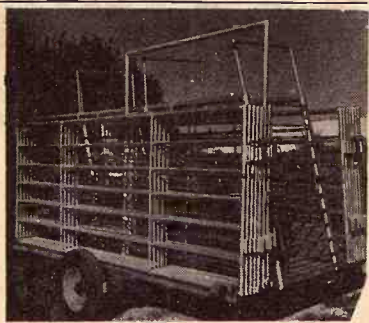

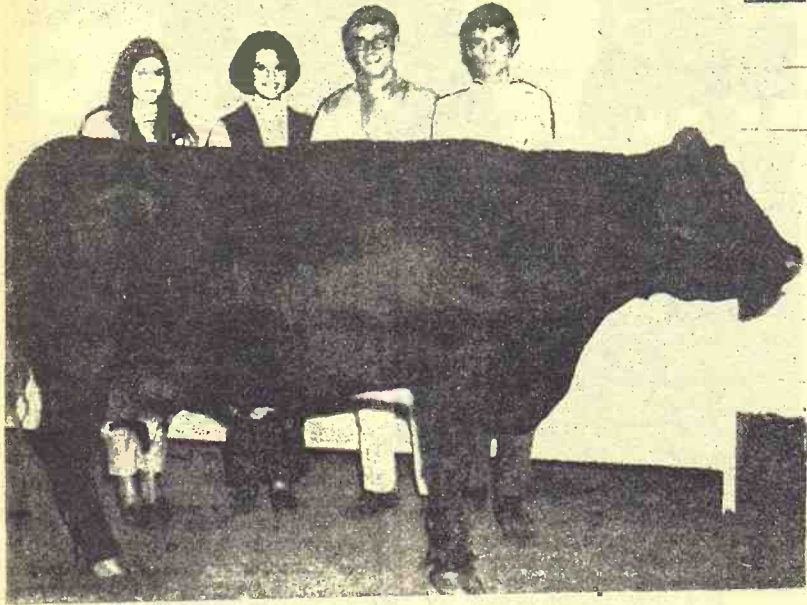

## Cancer Patient May Have His Own Treatment

Scientists have reported first tests showing that white blood

cells from a cancer patient can kill that patient's cancer cells. They say the tests might lead to a new way of treating malignancies.

A team of researchers from the University of Washington medical school said they cultured tumor cells from 12 patients with neuroblastoma, a cancer of the nervous system.

When disease-fighting white cells called lymphocytes were taken from the same patients' blood and placed in the culture, they said, the number of tumor cells was reduced 50 percent.

"The results demonstrate for the first time that live tumor cells taken from a patient and grown in the laboratory can be killed by lymphocytes obtained from the same patient," Dr. George E. Pierce said.

He said the action of lymphocytes against tumor cells outside the body is similar to the role they play in attacking heart or kidney transplants or other foreign material in the body.

In cancer patients, however, there apparently is some unknown factor that interferes with the lymphocyte action and permits tumors to grow.

Development of a vaccine to protect soldiers, farmers, hikers and others from snake bite was reported by Dr. Clifford Snyder, professor of surgery at the University of Utah.

He said the vaccine, derived

from the venom of rattlesnakes and copperheads, had proved effective for more than two years in five human volunteers.

Unlike current remedies, which combat venom after one has been bitten, the vaccine can be administered prior to trips into snake-infested areas, he said.

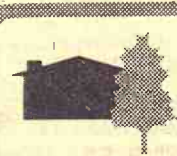

## Texas NFO Move To Hold Milo

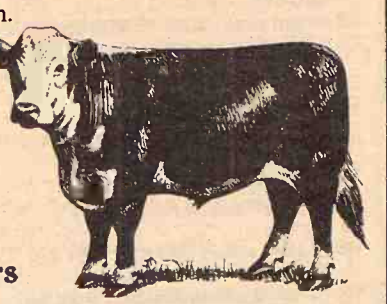

They voted last night at their meeting at Hereford, Texas. The organization's local Texas president, Don Kimball, said prices on their products are being slashed and big grain companies are applying heavy pressure to keep the prices from going up. Spokesmen for the organization said growers presently are being paid a top of \$2.10 per hundredweight for grain sorghums. They said they want at least \$2.30.

# Level Cattle Prices, Higher Hog Market, Sees USDA

The Agriculture Department predicted farm prices for hogs will be higher this fall and that cattle prices will level off at about current quotations.

Officials said in a summary report on the livestock and meat situation that pork output

through December was expected to be substantially below a year ago, but that slaughter of fed cattle will be larger.

These trends have been indicated for months by weekly and monthly reports on livestock marketings, pig crop intentions and slaughter rates.

The situation adds up to less total red meat output than last year during the October-December period, the department said. The increase in beef output will be more than offset by declines for pork, veal and lamb.

Officials also said pork production during the first half of 1970 will be slightly less than a year

earlier, thus causing prices to farmers to continue strong.

A moderate seasonal decline in farm prices for hogs was indicated as supplies move to slaughter, but these will be more than last fall, the report said.

During the last quarter of 1968, hog prices averaged \$18.30 per hundredweight in major markets. During the first six months of this year they averaged \$21.60, an increase of \$2.40 from a year earlier, and in September the average was \$26 per hundredweight, up \$6 from last year.

Officials said the usual gain in hog slaughter this fall will be less than the usual 15 to 25 percent increase from summer marketings. On September 1, Corn Belt producers reported about 7 percent fewer pigs in weight groups that usually provide most of the fall slaughter marketings.

"Fed cattle prices this fall are expected to continue near late-summer levels," the report said. "Fed cattle marketings this last summer continued above a year earlier and further gains are likely this fall."

On July 1, the number of cattle being fed in weight groups which usually supply more than half the fall sales was up 23 percent from last year. However, the number of cattle being placed on feed dropped during July and August.

The report noted that prices of fed cattle rose sharply last spring to a high of \$35.10 per hundredweight in early June but have dropped to around \$29.50 in late September. However, the report said, this was \$1.35 more than a year earlier for choice steers at the Chicago market.

## Health Alarm Over Sweeteners

The Food and Drug administration, nearly a year after government scientists reported a possible health hazard, is showing signs of concern about cyclamate, an artificial sweetener used by an estimated 175 million Americans.

The sweetener, known as cyclamate, has been linked most recently to severe birth defects in chickens. Cyclamate is found in a wide range of products from bacon to children's vitamins to diet soft drinks and diet foods.

FDA scientists reported in late October 1968 that a cyclamate breakdown product formed by one of every five humans who use the sweetener causes a shattering of genetic material when given to rats. Comparable genetic breaks in humans are associated with birth deformities and cancer.

FDA Commissioner Herbert L. Ley Jr. called for a 30-day hurry up evaluation of cyclamates by the non-governmental National Academy of Science (NAS).

On its delivery, said Ley: "I will decide the best methods of restricting the use of cyclamates."

Consumer spokesmen on Capitol Hill, led by Sen. Warren G. Magnuson, D-Wash., have complained the FDA has reacted too slowly to cyclamate danger signs.

The agency failed to alert a NAS panel to the FDA chromosome damage study, the critics say. The NAS panel issued a generally favorable report on cyclamates in December.

And, the critics point to the fact that Ley waited four months after the report before proposing what they say are mild labelling restrictions on cyclamate use.

Products would have to show cyclamate content, and adults and children would be advised to limit their intake of the substance. The proposed regulations have not been put into effect yet.

Dr. Jacqueline Verrett, an FDA scientist, found that 15 percent of chicken eggs injected with even tiny amounts of cyclamate produced deformed embryos. There were crippled spines, underdeveloped eyes, dwarfed and missing wings and

Dr. Verrett and others cautioned that the chicken studies are not directly comparable to man.

Nevertheless, she advised pregnant women to avoid cyclamates until and unless all doubt is removed.

## Europe Grows U.S. Oil Anti-Trust Suit

Antitrust action by the United States government has threatened one of the worst economic splits in a generation between the United States and Europe. At the center is antitrust action, aimed at British Petroleum interests, and it is causing some high-level re-thinking in Europe. The present difference of opinion is the worst in America's economic relations with Europe since the London economic conference of 1923.

At that time the U.S. failed to accept measures proposed by European countries and was widely blamed on the Continent for the worsening economic climate which ensued.

B.P.'s U.S. subsidiary last year made a deal to combine with Standard Oil Company of Ohio. In return for an ultimate 54 percent interest in Ohio, B.P. gave the U.S. company an interest in its big oil find on the Alaska coast. The deal also gave B.P. some 3000 Sohio filling stations.

Antitrust authorities have announced they will ask a court to ban the combination. Sohio, which is getting a rich source of

crude oil from the deal, says it will go ahead anyway and let the matter be tested in court. B.P., which needs the retail outlets in the rich U.S. market, says the deal is perfectly legal.

European economic thought is not as opposed to monopolies. Europe feels that cartels, cooperative organizations of manufacturers, may have a positive benefit by keeping production facilities in line with the size of the market. Thus, even if B.P.-Sohio were a monopoly, which even the government does not claim, there would be nothing wrong with it in the European view.

Just what the government will claim about the deal is not yet known, pending the filing of the papers in the suit. However, the antitrust division has taken the view that any large combination of companies in a certain field reduces competition. It thinks that if a newcomer, B.P. in this case, is not allowed to combine with an existing company it would start its own company and thereby increase competition. B.P. already has bought some 10,000 former Sinclair stations in the East.

If B.P. is blocked, it is quite possible that U.S. companies could find themselves blocked from European investment in reprisal. Also, the U.S. has been

counting on investment from overseas to improve its unfavorable balance of payments.

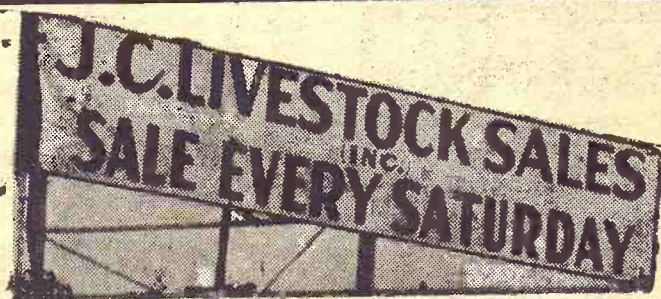

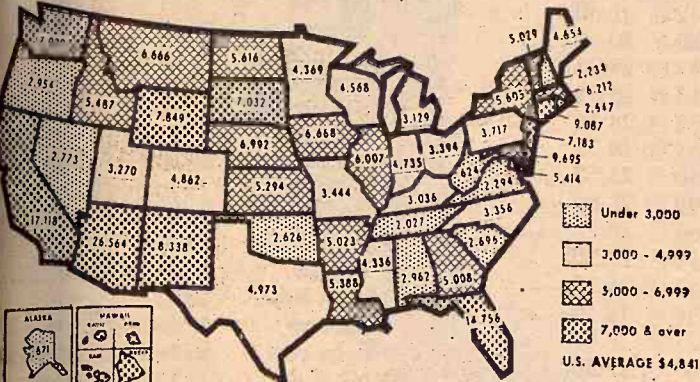
