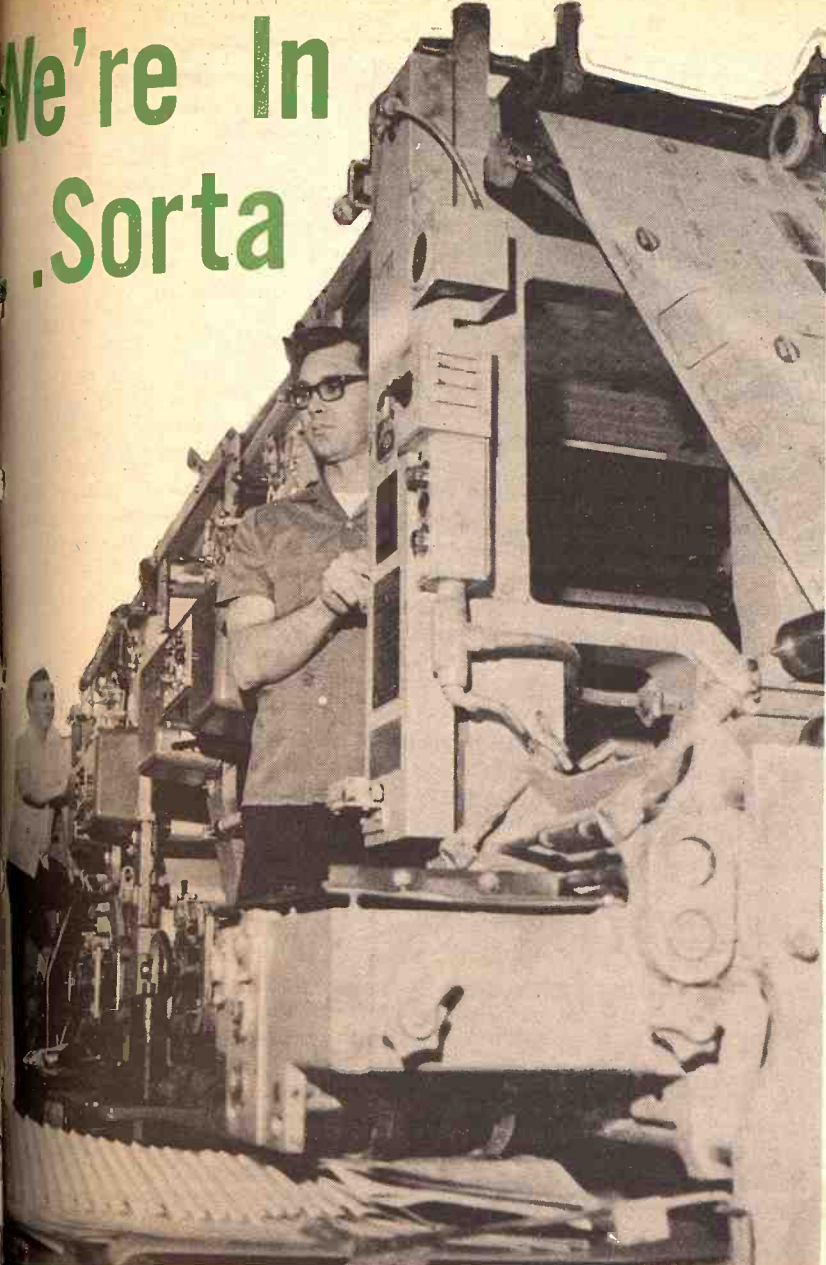

YET TO MOVE
Previous schedules on the press which prints Grass & Grain and other newspapers, as well as full-color printing of various shopping center and furniture mailers, has kept that equipment in the old quarters. Grass & Grain begins publishing this week at a new location, 16th Yuma in Manhattan. We locked the office doors last Thursday at our former plant at 1207 Moro as well as the adjacent quarters at 14th Laramie.

Part of the moving has been going on for three weeks now, and the commercial printing wing of Ag Press, publishers of Grass & Grain, has been in partial production in the new plant for a couple of weeks.

Amidst crates and unpacked boxes the office facilities and most of production have been completely transferred to the new plant. We expect the transfer of all production to be completed by October 5. Allow us a little time, however, to get fully settled in our new place.

The telephone number is still the same, 913/539-7558. We had earlier advised that our phone number would be changed, but found out later that if one talks to the right man at Southwestern Bell, almost anything is possible. Mail will still reach us at post office box 1009, Manhattan, Kansas 66502.

If you want to come see us, and we hope you will, the address is 16th & Yuma. That's about one mile from our former locations, which were southeast of the Kansas State University campus. The new one is southwest of there, four blocks south of Poyntz Avenue, on the principal east-west street thru Manhattan. The plant is about two blocks off K18, at the bend from which it turns to Fort Riley.

G&G readers who have used this newspaper as a major source of livestock market information, with weekly reports from a dozen or more area auctions, will note a change in positions of two of the ads from longtime advertisers in Grass & Grain. If you reside in the eastern end of the G&G area, the weekly report from Resac Livestock Commission at St. Marys will be found on the back page of the center section and the Farmers & Ranchers of Salina report will be found on the page across from the first page of the classified section. At the western end of the circulation area, the positions of the two ads will be reversed.

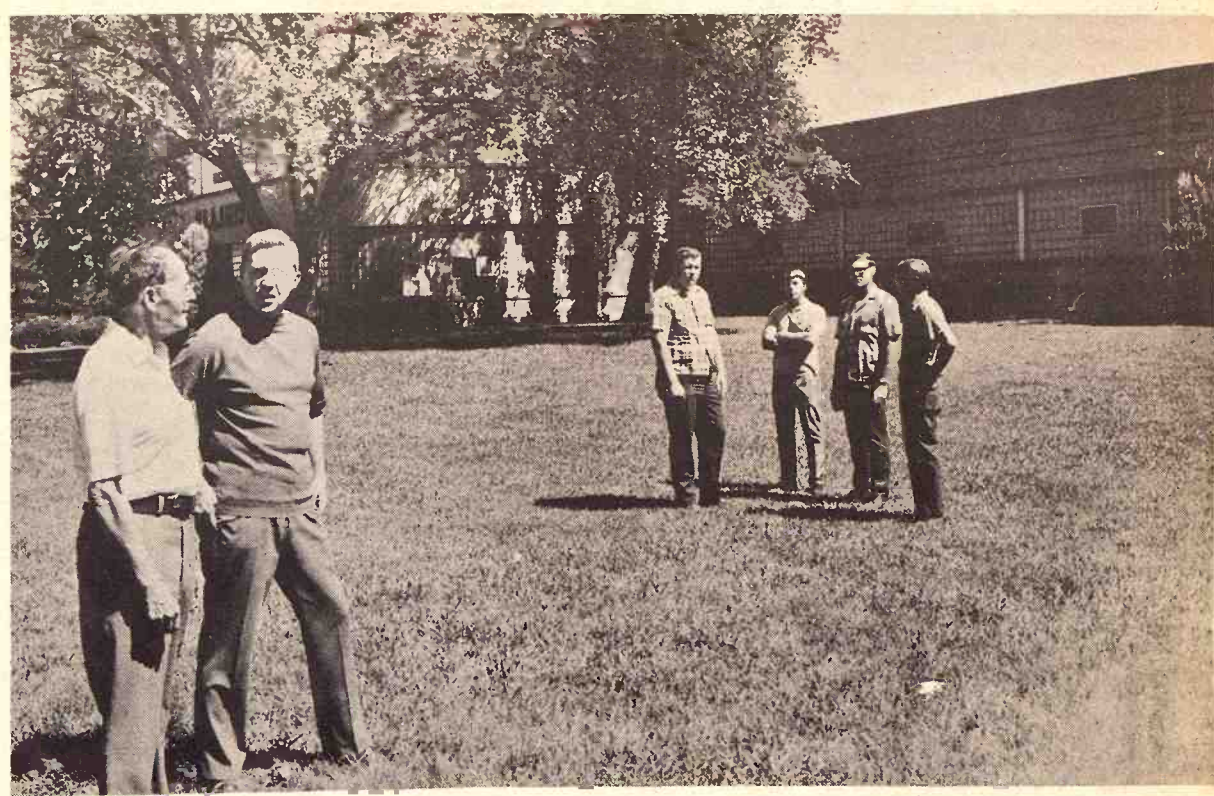

Dixie Dairymen Get Processors To Put It In Writing

One of the South's largest milk processors has signed a controversial new purchasing contract with a 9,600-member cooperative of Dixie dairy farmers that recently demanded processors sign a written price agreement in a business traditionally conducted on the basis of weekly oral agreements.

Farmbest Inc. of Jacksonville, Fla., a unit of International Utilities Corp., Philadelphia, formally contracted with Dairyman Inc. to supply its fluid milk processing plants in Atlanta and Savannah, Ga., Orangeburg, S.C., and Bristol, Va. The four plants buy an estimated 20 million pounds of milk monthly.

Company and co-op officials both said the agreement isn't likely to mean any increase in prices to consumers, but that it will ensure a steady flow of milk to the processor.

J. Edgar Spielman, president of Farmbest, said the contract with Dairyman simply "was really confirming understandings and arrangements we've had with them over the years."

He said the contract doesn't cover the company's other processing plants at Birmingham and Montgomery, Ala., and at Jacksonville, Miami and St. Petersburg, Fla., as they buy from other suppliers.

Many other processors haven't signed the agreement, some because they're still dicker over it. A spokesman for Pet Inc., St. Louis, said that company will be negotiating with the co-op.

On the other hand, Borden Inc. of Columbus, Ohio, said it will resist what it described as "pressure on us to accept a long-term raw-milk-supply contract" because, the company alleged, such an agreement would raise costs and tend to eliminate other suppliers.

Also, when the co-op moved to quit supplying three Borden plants in Mississippi, the company won a temporary restraining order in federal court that has since been extended to Sept. 30.

Meantime, a federal court in Louisville, Ky., began hearing an injunction proceeding brought against the co-op under similar circumstances last week by an Indiana processor, Holland Dairy, which the co-op has continued to supply under a temporary restraining order.

The co-op, which annually markets 5.2 billion pounds of milk a year for its farmer-members to more than 180 processing plants in 12 states, had notified the processors that as of Sept. 1 the customary weekly "verbal agreements would

no longer represent commitments to deliver" milk to them. Instead, the co-op said it would first supply processors who have signed contracts and then other processors only to the extent that supplies are available as allocated by the co-op between fluid and non-fluid milk product uses.

The three Borden plants and Holland Dairy were among several processors without contracts whose milk supplies the co-op attempted to re-allocate.

The Dairyman Inc. contract ties the milk prices paid by processors to the Minnesota-Wisconsin price series published by the Agriculture Department and regarded by the co-op as the national price trend setter. The contract also imposes on the processors certain service and delivery schedule charges. But processors who buy milk five days a week and get 95 per cent or more of their supply from the co-op are exempted from delivery schedule charges.

The co-op also has agreed, however, that it won't do anything to increase processors' costs so long as processors can't raise their prices during President Nixon's wage-price freeze.

Appeals Put Average School Hike Over 5%

A sampling of 282 of the state's 311 unified school districts today showed the property tax for the 1971-1972 school year is expected to jump 5.37 per cent over the previous school year.

The study was prepared by Dale Dennis, director of the Kansas Education Department's Statistical Services Section, for the Joint Legislative Committee on School Finance.

Dennis noted that the increase could change slightly due to lower actual expenditures or audit adjustments.

He said the actual property tax is expected to jump by 6.19 per cent for the new school year. However, the

per cent of increase over the previous year would be only 5.37 per cent when the special education fund, which began this year, is subtracted.

Dennis said the adjusted property tax expenditures for the 1971-1972 school year for the 282 districts will be \$158.65 million, compared with \$150.57 million for the 1970-1971 school year.

The state statistician attributed the increase primarily to additional expenditures allowed through appeals to the state board of tax appeals for construction authority, the additional funds required to absorb students from non-public schools which were closed, increases in assessed valuation and increases in levies from the 1970-1971 school year.

At the same time, Dennis told the legislative Finance Committee that the average general fund budget for the 282 school districts is up 4.05 per cent over the 1970-1971 school year

budget. Budgets for all 311 unified school districts for the 1970-1971 school year were 5.42 per cent higher than the previous year.

Dennis said the general operating fund for the districts which have been submitted increased from \$295.6 million for the 1970-1971 school year to \$307.6 million for 1971-1972.

A table accompanying Dennis' report showed 92 or 32.6 per cent of the reporting districts have budgets that are 5 per cent higher than the previous year. However, for the 1970-1971 school year, 188 of the 311 districts had 5 per cent or more increase in assessed valuation and 60.4 per cent had 5 per cent or more increase in levies from the 1970-1971 school year.

The table for the current school year showed 12.8 per cent or 36 of 282 districts have budgets less than the previous year.

Only 17 or 6 per cent have budgets more than 5 per cent larger than the previous year's.

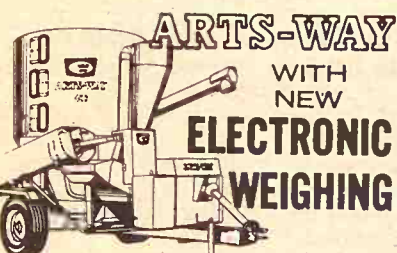
APPLES ON A STICK

Wash apples in hot water and dry. Insert a skewer in blossom end of each apple. Mix sugar, corn syrup and water in a saucepan. Cook, stirring until sugar dissolves, add oil of cinnamon and coloring. Continue cooking without stirring, until a small amount of mixture hardens when dropped in cold water. Dip each apple into syrup, remove and whirl apple until syrup covers it smoothly. Stand apples on plate to cool and harden.

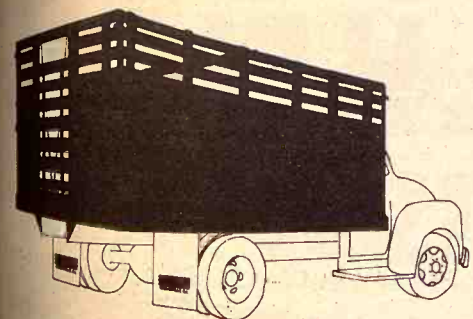

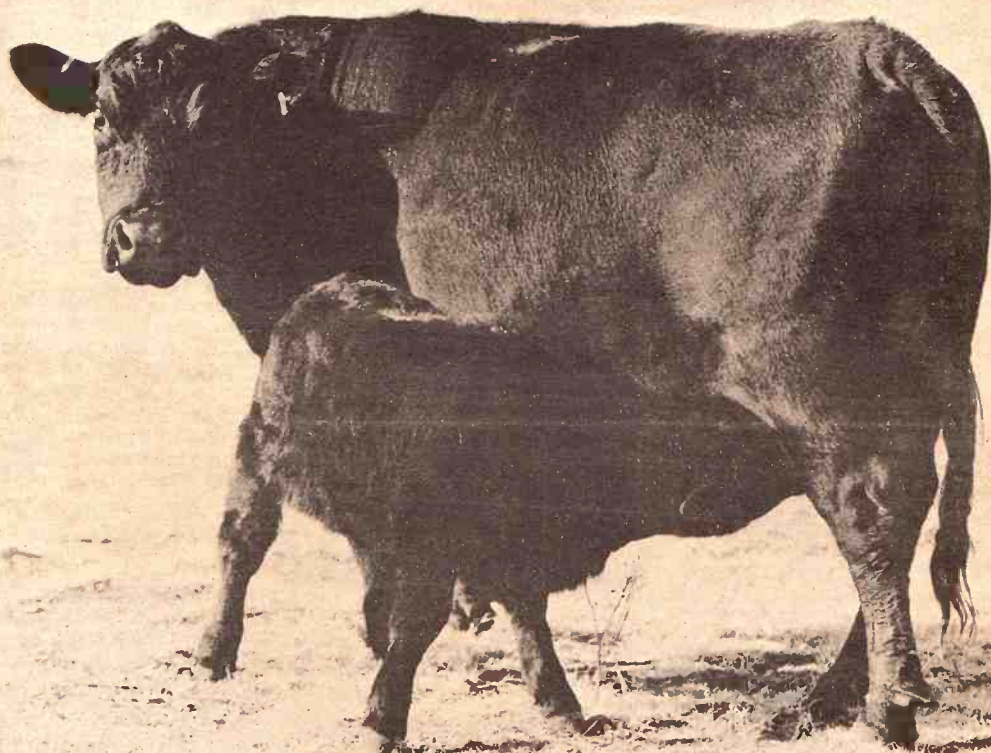

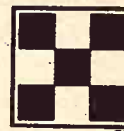

Kathy Gatz, Newton, did the best job in fitting and showing her lamb and won the championship in that division of the show. Duane Wedel was the reserve champion showman.

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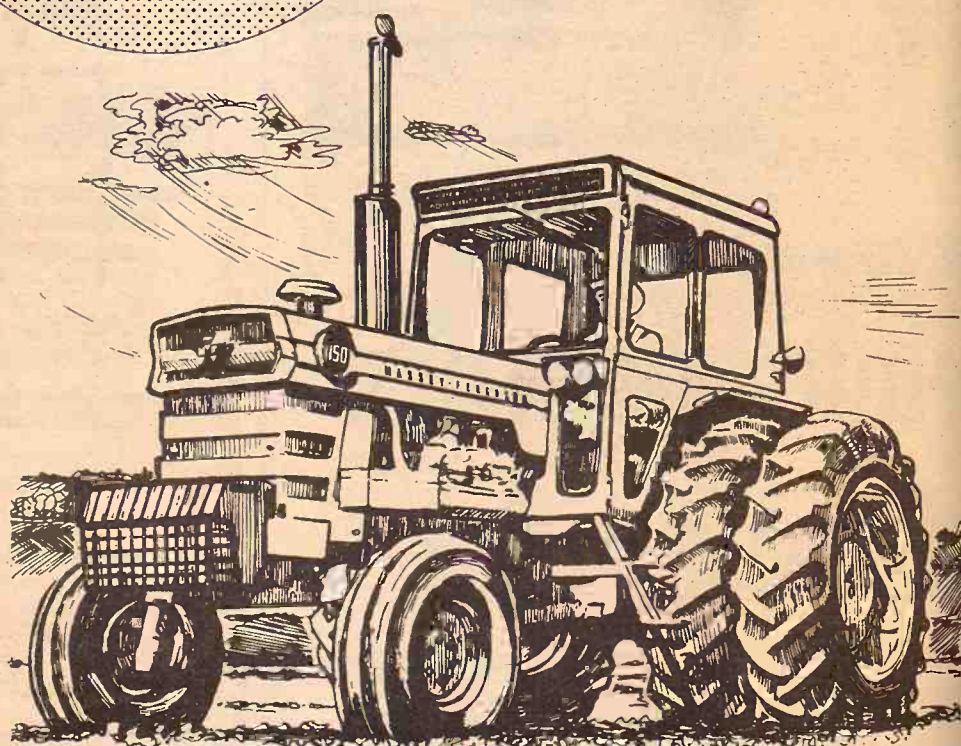
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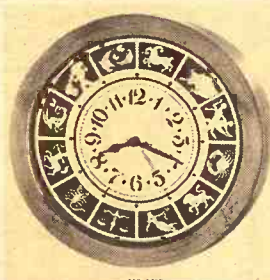

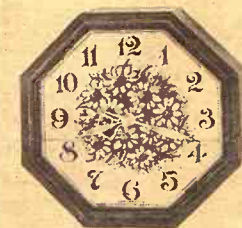
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Imports, Crossbreeds Making Mark

Despite the U.S. beef industry's long crusade to limit beef imports, some cattlemen themselves are buying beef from overseas.

The beef they're importing is still on the hoof, however. More and more cattlemen are using big bulls from Europe for breeding with their Hereford and Angus cows, the breeds that supply most of this nation's beef.

Such cross-breeding usually produces calves that are superior to either parent in their ability to convert feed into beef efficiently. These cross-breeds are bigger at birth and grow faster than their mothers. They yield tastier roasts and steaks than their fathers. Their carcasses also show a higher ratio of red meat to fat than do many straight-bred cattle. Cattlemen say these advantages help them to operate profitably despite higher overhead costs.

Industry observers say that the trend is part of an industrywide attempt to upgrade the efficiency of the nation's beef cattle. If the bid is successful, the result could be greater beef supplies and lower retail prices than otherwise might have been the case in the next few years. But the use of the new breeds isn't widespread enough to make noticeable differences at the meat counter yet.

The imported breeds, which cattlemen call the exotics, include Charolais, Simmental, Limousin, Maine-Anjou, South Devon, Lincoln Red, Chianina, Gelbvieh, Blond D'Aquitaine and Fleckvieh, a German Simmental. Only one, the Charolais, exists in the U.S. in large numbers, because it was brought to North America before a ban on cattle imports that lasted from the 1940s until 1965.

Even now, imported cattle must stay three years in quarantine in Canada before they can be brought to the U.S. So the other exotic breeds still are extremely rare here. Nonetheless, their influence on U.S. herds is increasing dramatically because of artificial insemination. This year, for example, 275,000 cows in the U.S. will be bred to the 56 Limousin bulls in Canada, compared with 175,000 in 1970, the North American Limousin foundation estimates.

The exotics aren't the only breeds used for cross-breeding. Many cattlemen report favorable results from crossing Anguses with Herefords, or even with Holsteins, a dairy breed. One Midwestern beef packing plant estimates that Hereford-Angus crosses account for about 10 percent of its annual slaughter. An additional 3 percent are Charolais-Angus crosses, and

about 1 percent are other crosses.

But the exotics' boosters claim their breeds offer more hybrid vigor than the established breeds in the U.S. In many cases, the more dissimilar the parents, the more pronounced the improvements in the offspring, researchers say.

For example, in preliminary tests at the Agriculture Department's Meat Animal Research Center, cross-bred offspring of Hereford and Angus cows and exotic bulls averaged 492 pounds at weaning, compared with approximately 471 pounds for Hereford-Angus crosses. During the first 164 days in the feedlot, average daily weight gain by the exotic-sired crosses was 2.64 pounds, compared with 2.45 pounds by the Hereford-Angus crosses and 2.40 pounds by Hereford and Angus straightbreds.

"In the future, a high percentage of the nation's beef cattle will be cross-bred," predicts Keith Gregory, director of the center. "The hybrid vigor of some of the exotics appears to be of sufficient magnitude to pursue."

U.S. beef cattle generally have been short, blocky animals with a heavy cover of fat. By contrast, many of the exotic breeds are taller and leaner. Moreover, European cattlemen use some of the exotic breeds for dairy purposes as well as for beef, so the cross-bred daughters

of these breeds are better able to nurse their calves than are the straight-bred U.S. beef breeds. "Beef cows in the U.S. need milk real bad," asserts Dale Lynch, founder of the American Simmental Association. "We've just bred it out of them."

Even so, some cattlemen are wary of cross-breeding because the calves often are too big for the cow to deliver without assistance. The tests at the Meat Animal Research Center showed that calves sired by Charolais, Limousin and Simmental bulls averaged 10 pounds heavier at birth than those sired by Hereford and Angus bulls. More than 60 percent of the two-year-old Hereford and Angus cows bred to Charolais bulls needed help with delivery, compared with about 40 percent of those bred to Angus bulls.

Researchers say such difficulties are less frequent among older cows that have had several calves. They recommend that only cows that have already calved be bred to exotic bulls.

Another complaint is that cross-breeds' meat lacks marbling, the streaks of fat that are believed to make meat tastier. This is because the crosses grow more quickly than straight-bred cattle and consequently are younger and less mature when they reach the typical slaughter weight of 1,100 pounds.

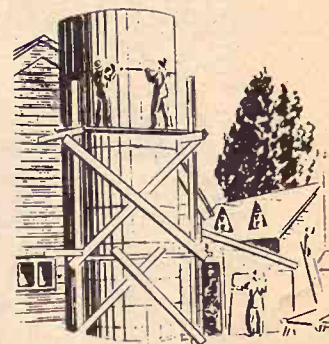
Cattlemen say the solution is to feed the crosses to heavier weights, which allows time for the necessary marbling to occur, and some packing plants are changing their processing lines to accommodate a wider range of carcass sizes.

Some cattlemen's objections to the exotics are more emotional. "Once a man gets converted to a breed, it's as if he'd joined a church," says one Colorado rancher. "The exotics have had a difficult time horning in."

But observers say that even these cattlemen are taking the influx of the exotics seriously. "The exotics

are showing that in order to compete, U.S. cattle have got to change," asserts Lyle Springer, an official of the American Angus Association. Mr. Springer maintains, of course, that careful selection within the established breeds is the best way to improve the nation's herds. "The best use of the exotics is in herds of lower quality than they are," he declares.

Dale Nichols, an Iowa rancher, disagrees. "Improving straight breeds through selective breeding is a painfully slow process," he argues. "It's easier to get these cattle from Europe. It's a genetic shortcut."



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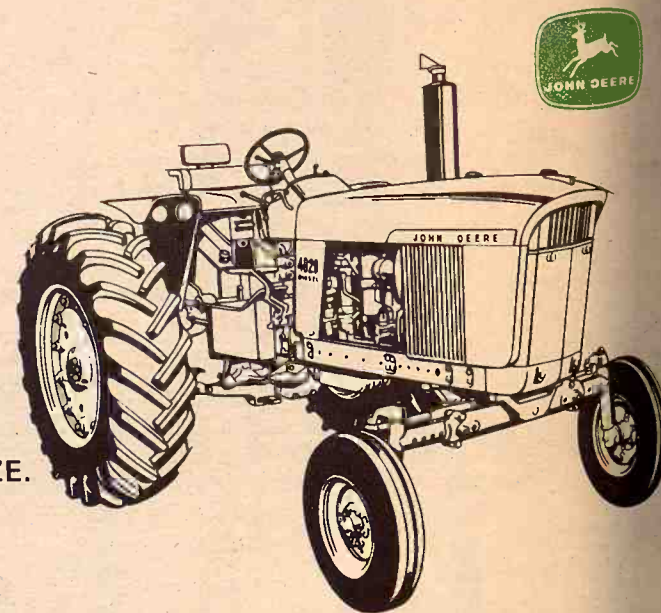

October Seminar for Charolais Breeders At Dallas

DALLAS, TEX.—Cattle breeders from all over will blend their thoughts and recommendations with special research reports in a worldwide Charolais breed improvement seminar during the annual meeting of the International Federation of Charolais breeders Oct. 10-14. Internationally-known American animal scientists and researchers will join specialists and breeders from France, England, Italy, and Argentina to lead the

conference discussions. In all, more than 150 breeders of Charolais from nearly 40 countries, plus another 600 from the United States, are expected for the conference.

"It is only appropriate that this World Breed Improvement seminar be held in the United States," observed J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary of American International Charolais Assn. "No country in the world has made as much progress in beef producing technology—including Charolais—as has the U.S."

Charolais numbers in the United States are second only to those in France, the breed's birthplace, where some two million animals are in the Charolais herd book. There are nearly 700,000 in the United

States, and is the nation's fourth largest beef breed. The AICA ranked as the fastest-growing beef breed in the U.S.

Edward P. Shurick of Charlottesville, Va., a past president of the AICA, and first vice president of the International Federation, will moderate a panel discussion the morning of Oct. 11, featuring American scientists and a South American breeder.

In the afternoon, researchers from France and other European countries will report to the convention on similar research from those countries.

Dr. O. D. Butler, chairman of the animal science department of Texas A & M University will open discussions on use of Charolais in

crossbreeding programs in the United States. Use of Charolais in crossbreeding management and systems has brought new thinking within the American beef industry because of the resulting improved growth, feed efficiency and profit traits of the big white breed.

Genetics and their role in breed improvement will be discussed by Dr. Robert DeBaca of Iowa State University. Dr. Tom Sutherland of Colorado State University will lead discussions on recessive or defective genes and their influence in breeding programs.

Seldom discussed at public meetings of breed or beef industry organizations is the subject of plants and forages (teratogenic) and their effect upon livestock. This

discussion will be led by Dr. Wayne Binns, director of the USDA Agricultural Research Service team at Logan, Utah.

Methods of beef processing and sales of beef in the United States is the subject of a discussion to be led by Dr. A. M. Mullins, of the University of Idaho animal science department. Dr. Raymond Podesta Wilmark of Buenos Aires, will outline the growth, development and adaptability of Charolais in South and Central America.

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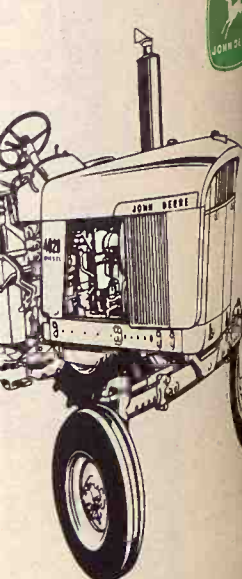

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Restore Brushland Or Let It Go?

LUBBOCK—Rangeland turned to brushland is a plague to ranchers and costly to all the economy. Using intuition, ranchmen decide which

land to rescue and which to let the brush have, but there is a better way. The computer can help ranchers make decisions that specify

profit.

In a recent soil conservation Service poll, Texas farmers and ranchers voted weeds and brush on

grasslands their number one problem.

Dr. Rex P. Kennedy of the agricultural economics faculty at Texas Tech University has developed a computer technique which will tell a rancher not only what part of his land to clear of brush but also what type of control will net the most profit.

"When you're talking about root-plowing, raking and seeding," Kennedy said, "you might as well be buying the land a second time. The cost runs about \$20 an acre, but on some good range sites this can be a good investment."

On other types of land, the computer method might suggest an aerial herbicide application at \$3 an acre, and on still other sites the "best buy" could be tree-doing at \$10 an acre.

A computer can evaluate a great many brush control alternatives, reducing the rancher's chances of making a mistake. Timing and future livestock prices, however, can alter profit forecasts, Kennedy emphasized.

His computer-based technique was developed through an extensive study of the Rolling Plains of Texas where more than 40 ranches were surveyed in a 28-county region.

Brush on the land was measured in terms of canopy—roughly the area of shade if the sun were directly overhead.

The first 25 percent of the canopy

cover is the most expensive to remove, Kennedy said.

RANCHER, Kennedy said. If 50 to 75 percent of the rangeland is covered by brush, the rancher gains only 2 percent productivity for each 5 percent of the brush removed. If 25 to 50 percent of the land is brush, the gain is a 5 percent increase in productivity for each 5 percent of the canopy removed.

If only 25 percent of the rangeland has a brush canopy, however, the rancher gains 12 percent productivity for every 5 percent of the canopy removed.

"It's the first infestation of brush that costs the most," Prof. Kennedy explained, "and a lot of ranchers are just now finding this out."

"Control should be started early and there is a second factor that is often overlooked," he said. "Land management methods are critical after the brush is removed."

If a rancher pays \$20 an acre to root-plow, rake and seed his rangeland he "can't ever afford to let brush take it again," he said.

In deciding which land to clear and which to leave brush-covered for wildlife, Kennedy's computer technique uses a variety of data.

The Rolling Plains, he said, has different range sites, classified by the Soil Conservation Service according to type of soil, topography and the type of vegetation. Ranches in the area averaged about five range sites apiece, and none had less than three. Ranches average about 8,000 acres apiece.

The range site classification was used in addition to expected annual rainfall—in order to determine potential productivity of the site, the required herbage to produce a pound of beef, the price of beef and the cost of control.

Because the herbage potential is "very shallow," and "broken" or "gypland" sites are small, no common type of brush control will ever be profitable in these areas, Kennedy said.

On sandy or loamy bottomlands, however, the story is different.

In a 15-year period the investment would fully justify a \$20 per acre investment in brush removal.

FENCE LINE CONTRAST

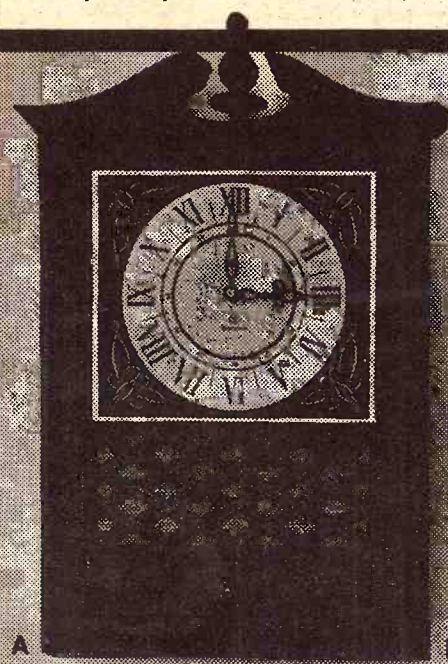
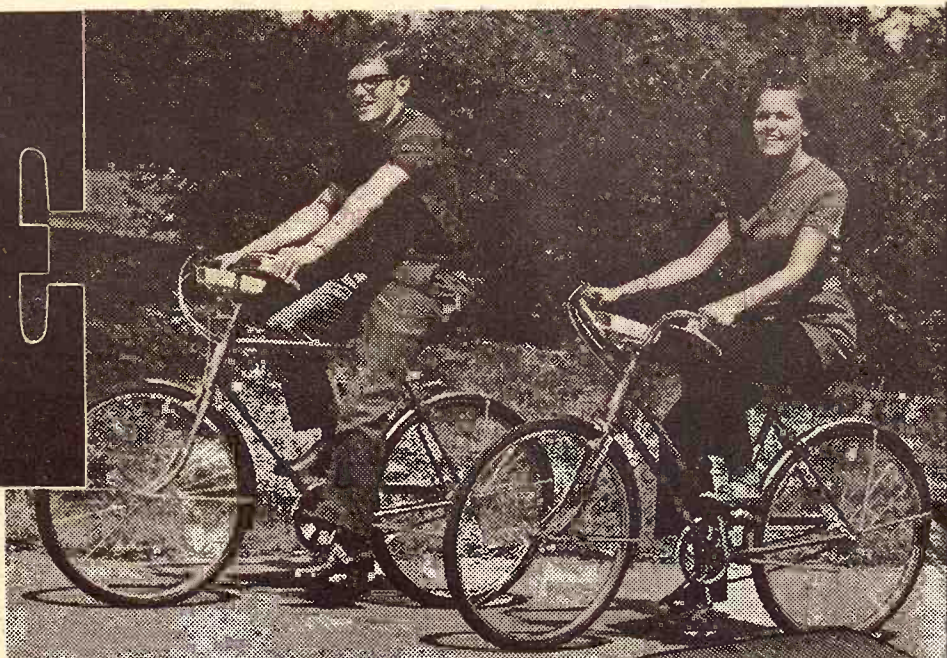

The 1971 crop will be the smallest in 48 years of record, slightly above the 800,000 bushels produced in 1967. In the last half dozen years sweetclover seed production has been low due to low prices and a decline in sweetclover for soil

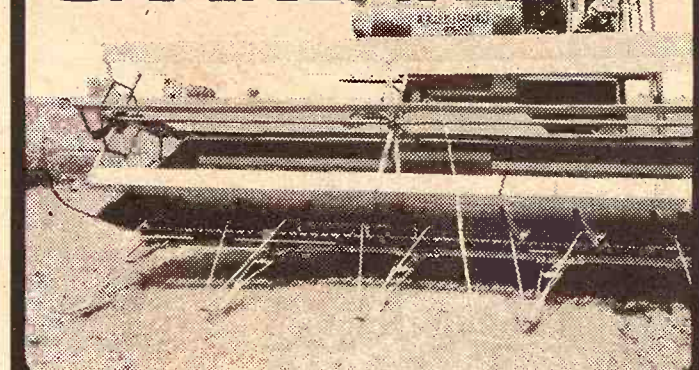

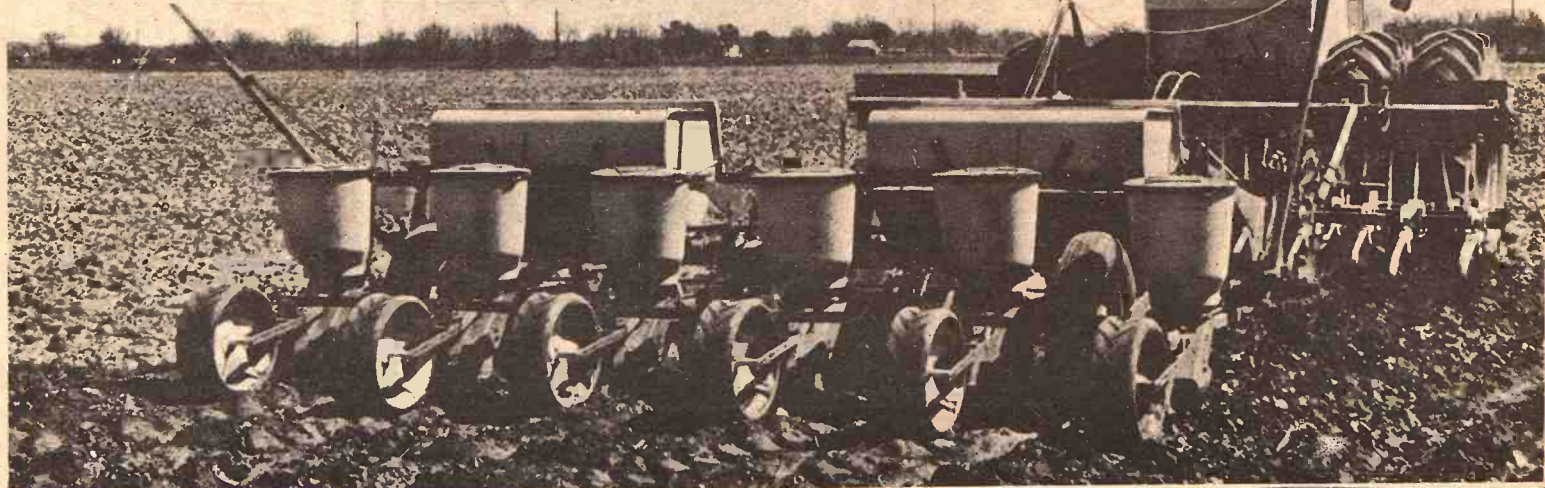
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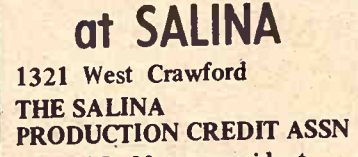
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Another Dairy Princess Title From Northeast

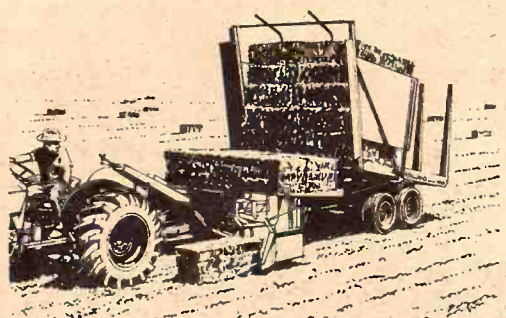

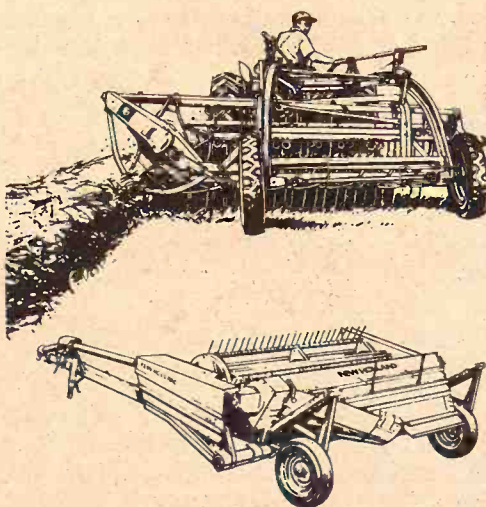

The number of hogs and pigs on Kansas farms September 1 was down slightly from a year earlier but substantially higher than in any of the previous 16 years for which September 1 records are available, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The June-August pig crop was down slightly from 1970 and prospective fall and winter farrowings are below those a year ago, but still relatively large.

Numbers Slightly Lower

There were 2,025,000 hogs and pigs on Kansas farms on September 1, a decline of 3 percent from last year

down from last year with decreases ranging from 2 percent in the 60-119 pound and 200 pound and over groups to 13 percent in the 180-219 pound group. Market hogs weighing under 60 pounds increased 4 percent. Pig Crop Slightly Smaller

Sows farrowing during the summer quarter (June-August) totaled 88,000 head, a decline of 2 percent from last year, but 21 percent more than in 1969.

There were 678,000 pigs saved during the quarter, 1 percent fewer than last year. The number of pigs saved per litter during the summer quarter was 7.70, up slightly from 7.60 last year and 7.65 in 1969.

earlier, while market hogs at 40.5 million head were down 7 percent.

The 10 States included in this report are Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, South Dakota, Nebraska and Kansas.

All 10 States had smaller inventories than a year earlier with declines ranging from a 15 percent drop in Wisconsin to a 3 percent decline in Indiana, Minnesota, and Kansas.

Iowa hog producers had 9 percent fewer hogs on hand than a year earlier.

The 10-State total of 2,294,000 sows farrowed during the June-August quarter was down 10 percent from the previous year with all States recording decreases. The number of pigs per litter was up from 7.18 to 7.25 resulting in a pig crop of 16,627,000 head, 9 percent below the previous year.

Farrowing Intentions Down 11 Percent

Hog producers in the 10 States intend to farrow 2,366,000 sows during the September-November quarter, 11 percent less than the previous year.

With the exception of Minnesota and South Dakota, all States are showing a decline with the largest drop indicated in Illinois.

During the December 1971-February 1972 quarter, intentions are to farrow 1,761,000 sows, 11 percent below the previous year.

Western Wheat Pasture Average

Volunteer wheat acreage in the western two-thirds of Kansas that had made sufficient growth by mid-September for grazing was near the average for recent years, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The proportion of wheat actually being grazed was also about

average. Both the harvested wheat acreage with sufficient growth for grazing and the percent of acreage now being pastured were above a year earlier but well below 2 years earlier.

The September 15 wheat pasture survey indicated that 7.4 percent of the 1971 harvested wheat acreage in the western two-thirds of Kansas showed sufficient volunteer growth for pasturing.

Of this acreage, only 1.5 percent was actually being grazed by livestock. The growth of volunteer wheat in central and western

Kansas was hampered by a lack of rainfall during August. In addition, much of the volunteer wheat was destroyed to control mosaic and Hessian flies.

Farmers indicated that prospects for wheat grazing were very limited and would show no improvement in the near future without a general rain. Moderate precipitation was received on September 17 and 18 and should promote some growth.

Increased Volunteer Wheat Acreage

The 1971 harvested wheat acreage with sufficient growth of volunteer wheat for grazing by September 15 was 7.4 percent compared with 3.2 percent last year and 32.4 percent 2 years earlier. Forage now available from volunteer wheat pasture was rated mostly poor. The 1.5 percent of volunteer wheat acreage being pastured as of September 15 compares with .9 percent a year earlier and a range since 1965 of .8 percent to 3.5 percent.

Seeded Acreage Prospects

Seeding of the 1972 winter wheat crop is somewhat behind a year earlier and the 10-year average. Planting and germination were delayed by a lack of moisture, especially in the southwest and central areas. The outlook was improved by recent rains but more moisture will be needed because both surface and subsoil moisture have been short in most areas.

Farm Bureau Moves To Chicago Suburb

The American Farm Bureau Federation has moved its headquarters out of Chicago to a nearby suburb in Park Ridge, Ill.

The move was made this week. The new home is a 2-story colonial style building constructed in 1960. It has 41,800 square feet of space on 3.7 acres of land and parking for 250 cars. The new address is 225 West Touhy Avenue, Park Ridge, Ill. 60068.

First Upturn In Smoking In 5 Years

Per capita cigarette smoking by Americans is expected to rise slightly this year for the first time since 1966 but the rise will not diminish the nation's stock pile of tobacco, the Agriculture Department says.

The department says Americans 18 years and older are expected to average 3,989 cigarettes (about 200 packs) each this year, an increase of four cigarettes from 1970.

According to USDA records, that will mean the first upturn in five

years. In 1966, per capita cigarette use was 4,287, or more than 214 packs, a rise of 29 cigarettes from 1965. Since 1966, the records show, the per capita rate declined annually until this year.

Even so, manufacturers in recent years have put less tobacco in cigarettes, thus meaning a smaller market for tobacco farmers.

Total use for domestic and export purposes during the year ended June 30 was 1.93 billion pounds. The department said in an outlook report that 1971-72 use may be "slightly below" last fiscal year, despite the small upturn in per capita cigarette smoking.

Exports are expected to be down

from 635 million pounds in 1970-71, the report said. No exact estimate was made.

Written OK To Hunt Not Always Necessary

Many hunters seem to think they must have written permission before hunting on any private lands. That simply isn't true. If the land is posted with signs that read "Hunting with Written Permission Only," then the hunter is obligated by law to have written permission before hunting on that land.

However, if the land is not posted in that manner, verbal permission on the part of the landowner is sufficient.

But as a matter of courtesy to the landowner, many sportsmen ad-

vocate getting written permission anyway.

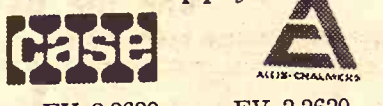

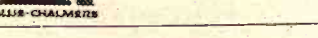

See Some Critical Dust Storm Problems In Western Kansas

The 1972 spring blow won't turn Kansas into a dust bowl but there will be some critical wind erosion in the western third of Kansas.

The 1972 dust storm prediction for Kansas has been calculated earlier than usual so farmers would have time to prepare for the blow season, says Neil Woodruff, soil erosion research leader of the agricultural research service at Kansas State University.

For those in doubt, soil scientists have predicted with 85 percent accuracy how many dust storm or dusty days will occur at a given location.

Two equations help soil scientists estimate conditions and tillage measures needed before the blow season arrives. What's more, these equations apply to many different soil types, over an area from North Dakota to Texas, Woodruff said.

The dust storm prediction equation combines the index of precipitation, temperature, and wind velocity over a three-year period, ending May 31, 1971, to predict the number of storms to be expected next spring.

The second equation shows how much soil erosion can be expected from a certain field. Factors included in the calculation are the size of the soil aggregates, vegetative residue, soil roughness, width of the field, orientation of the field to prevailing winds, barriers, and wind velocity.

"Farmers can use the soil erosion

equation with the help of their local Soil Conservation Service to determine the condition of their farmland," Woodruff said.

Four Kansas locations are included in the dust storm forecast for this winter and next spring.

Wichita and Concordia: Very little wind erosion is expected in North Central and South Central Kansas, even though the potential for wind erosion has increased slightly. One dust storm is predicted in the Concordia area and two storms are forecast for Wichita and the surrounding area. Precipitation was lower and wind velocities higher during the 1970-1971 period, indicating slightly more potential wind erosion. No special precautionary measures should be necessary in these regions, Woodruff said.

Dodge City: The wind erosion hazard in the southwestern part of the state is classified as "slight to moderate" in severity. The number of dusty days predicted is 13, which is 4 more than last year. The climatic index indicates a deterioration in conditions that prevent soil erosion. Precautionary measures on fields susceptible to wind erosion are recommended.

Goodland: Moderate to severe wind erosion is forecast for the northwestern part of the state. As many as 17 dusty days are predicted. The 1970-1971 climatic index is slightly higher than last year, but the three prior year index is still

strongly influencing the situation. Precautionary measures are advised prior to the coming winter and spring blow season on fields that are highly susceptible to wind erosion.

Forecasting soil erosion is just one of the ARS responsibilities at Kansas State University. Soil stabilizers are being tested, for instance.

"We have proven the value of stabilizers in our laboratory but the field studies this summer weren't successful. In one instance the weeds became a problem, and in a study on sandy soil we didn't use enough of the stabilizer because of equipment problems," Woodruff said.

If farmers have questions concerning the use of stabilizers or how to obtain stabilizers, they can contact the ARS at Kansas State University, Manhattan, Woodruff added.

ARS will be coordinating its efforts with other agricultural research services across the nation to help solve the wind erosion problems of West Texas, which has been stricken by a drought situation.

"If we can help solve the problems in Texas, then maybe we will have better information on handling drought problems if they move into Kansas," Woodruff said.

Big Soviet Purchase Of U.S. Cattle

What was believed to be the largest shipment of cattle from the U.S. to the Soviet Union left Richmond, Va., last week. Included were 338 head of Shorthorn, Angus and Brown Swiss animals selected from herds in Maryland, Virginia, Ohio, South Dakota, Illinois, Wisconsin, New Jersey and Missouri by representatives of the Soviet Union.

The deal, amounting to about \$300,000 which the Soviets paid in cash, resulted from talks between Cyrus S. Eaton, owner of Acadia Farms, Northfield, Ohio, and the prime minister of Russia, Alexei Kosygin.

Mr. Eaton, whose farm representatives accompanied the Soviet buyers, said he is optimistic about the possibility of Russia becoming a good cattle customer of the U.S. He said the Soviets recognize the need to increase their cattle population and upgrade its quality and are actively considering purchases from abroad to do this. A group of Soviet experts visited this country last January to look at cattle

and study cattle handling methods here.

The Acadia owner said he believes the Soviet Union may purchase as many as 100,000 registered beef cattle and an equal number of dairy cattle in this country if they are satisfied with the results of this first purchase.

Aim For New Federal Farm Plans By October 15

The Agriculture Department has summoned officials from 29 states to Washington to hear their views on guidelines for the government's 1972 feed grains and cotton programs.

Members of two advisory committees—one on cotton and another on feed grains, wheat and soybeans—held closed-door talks with USDA policy makers on commodity prospects and requirements for next year.

The information from those discussions will be fed to this week's gathering, which will include one representative from each of 29 state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committees, the units which oversee federal farm programs at the state level.

Those invited for the session last week represented major feed grain and cotton producing areas.

After that, a spokesman for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service said, policy makers and program technicians will begin hammering out details of the 1972 programs for cotton and feed grains. The department already has announced the 1972 wheat program.

Clarence D. Palmby, assistant secretary of agriculture, said that the target for announcing the new

programs is about Oct. 15. However, Palmby said, the report could be delayed if the next crop production report by the department, set for Oct. 12 shows a drastic departure from output patterns indicated in August and September.

The most sensitive and perplexing task for USDA planners is to come up with new set-aside acreage requirements for 1972 that will do

the job of cutting back on feed production and yet coax farmers into producing more soybeans.

The cotton situation calls for a different approach. Demand recently has been running larger than the annual crop, and both USDA and industry officials want to see more production next year.

Palmby said the cotton and grain committees universally applauded

the "set-aside" concept in the administration-backed Agricultural Act of 1970, in effect this year. It scrapped stiff acreage allotments and lets farmers plant as much as they want after taking a percentage of their crop land from production.

Approval of the general program by the committees did not come as a great shock to observers. Members are appointed by each secretary of agriculture and historically are sympathetic with prevailing administration policies.

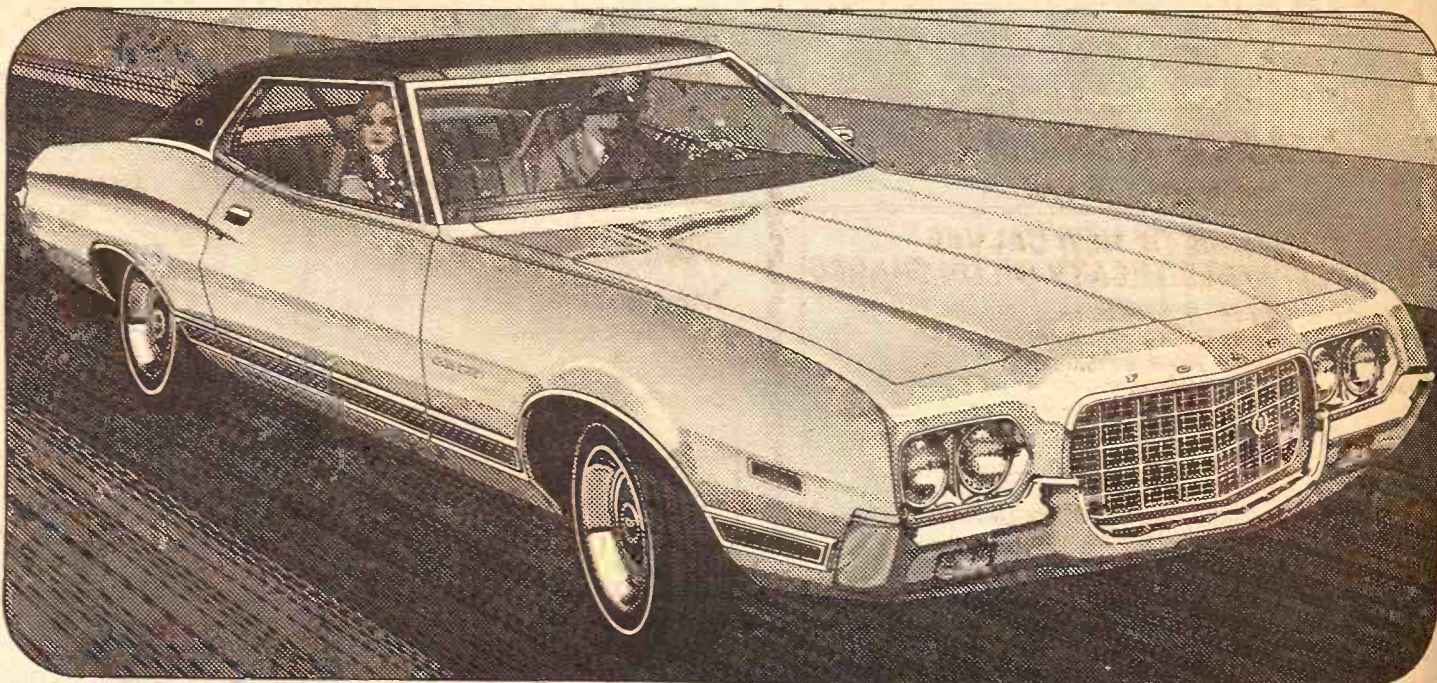

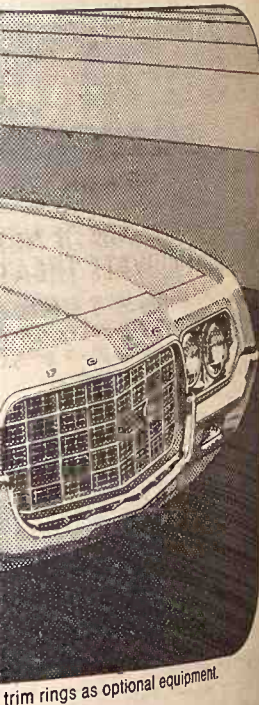

Heavy Production Cuts Into Freeze Farm Advantage

Farmers are production so much this year that the agricultural exemption from the Nixon administration's price freeze is making little difference in their pocketbooks. And while an Associated Press survey shows farmers and their organizations generally support President Nixon's new economic moves, serious reservations exist among them on how the wage-price freeze may force food processors to react. Another worry is that the administration's 10 per cent surcharge on imports may invite retaliation from such leading overseas buyers

of U.S. agricultural products as Japan and the Common Market nations. The harvest from one of every four U.S. crop acres goes abroad this year.

But farmers like the new policies because they believe they will help control the rising cost of farm production that has offset much of the increase in farm productivity in recent years.

Agricultural products, as long as they walk or are sold in their natural shape, are not affected by the price freeze.

So a steak or roast in a store must be sold at the price covered by the freeze, but the steer it came from, exempted as a raw farm product, is free to soar or drop to rock bottom in price.

No drastic fluctuations have occurred in livestock. Fattened cattle are selling in major markets at prices higher than a year ago. Hogs,

although recovering somewhat from the major market slump of last winter, still are behind last year's prices.

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CA Gives Up Battle With IBM

CA's attempt to take on IBM in the computer business did not meet enough success and RCA has decided to pass out of the computer industry. Industry analysts figure IBM not only met the challenge but will be the major beneficiary of RCA's backing away.

RCA had tried to meet IBM head-on and had designed its computers to be directly compatible with IBM's. For young and old computer companies left in the field will have more difficulty in giving

programming and service support, and trade sources say IBM should reap the benefits.

GM Figuring To Blur Divisions

General Motors Corp. is reported to be moving on a deliberate course toward a strong centralization of operations that would reduce its five passenger car divisions largely to marketing arms.

The report was contained in a copyright article to be printed in the Sept. 20 issue of Automotive News, a trade paper. Asked about the

report, GM spokesmen said, "conclusions are being drawn which are based on speculation and we would not wish to comment on the story."

The paper said GM is heading toward an operating plan that bears a striking resemblance to those of GM's chief competitors—Ford and Chrysler. If the plan is carried through, Automotive News said, "the centralization will find GM operating with a single engine division, for example, supplying engines for all car lines a single assembly division building the cars and supplying the finished product to the sales division."

"Consolidation of other operations, now spread among various divisions, could result in single divisions for forgings, chassis, transmissions, suspensions and so on."

The trade paper noted that as of Oct. 1, G.M. will take away Chevrolet's last three remaining car assembly plants and reassign them, along with the adjacent Fisher Body facilities, to the fast-growing General Motors Assembly Division. This will give G.M. Assembly Division control of 18 of the corporation's 24 assembly plants, ac-

cording to Automotive News, which said that only the home plants of Buick, Cadillac, Oldsmobile, Pontiac and G.M.C. Truck and Coach Divisions and the Flint Chevrolet Truck facility will be operating independently.

"These plants, too, are expected to be reassigned to the G.M. Assembly Division, perhaps within six months," the paper said.

The trade paper said centralization could aid in forestalling efforts by "would-be trust-busters" to break up the huge

corporation. It said GM's decision to centralize also stems from rising costs of material and labor, the ecology and consumerism movements, rigid engineering and quality standards laid down by safety and emission regulations and the ever-changing marketplace.

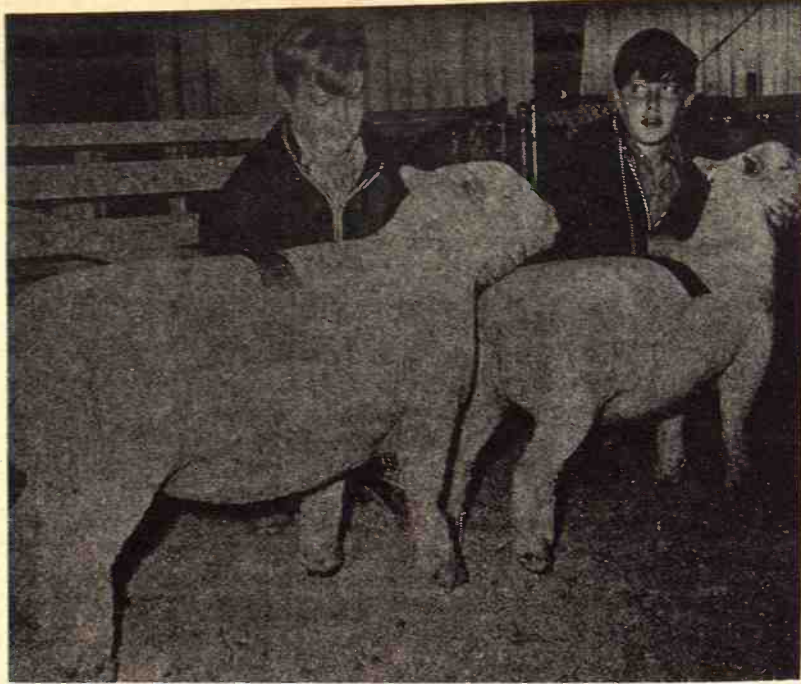

Retired Moore Takes Shot At Game Commission

ABILENE—The long-range program of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission has been set back five years because of George Moore, the retiring director says.

There have been cases of "too much politics where it didn't belong," Moore told the Milford Lake Association directors last week.

Moore is resigning under fire after 10 years on the commission. He says he has had at least two job offers in Kansas as well as opportunities elsewhere. He said his plans are indefinite.

"On various occasions, commissioners and others seemed more interested in programs," Moore declared.

As an example, he "pressures to build the lakes where there was not a chance in the world of them holding water just to please local interest."

He mentioned no names. Charles Hulme, Great Bend district commissioner, has been a frequent critic of Moore and has pressed for construction of a lake southwest Kansas.

"Other programs of waterfowl and game development have been only half way," Moore said. "The long range program of the commission has been set back five years due to the weaknesses of the year or two."
