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Choosing your life work

Many young people are wondering what line of endeavor or what profession they should consider for their future life. They wonder, too, how to go about making the choice. What should be considered? What factors should be weighed in the decision

In conversations with school counselors, school administrators, and members of boards which make scholarship awards, I am struck by a common theme in their suggestions and recommendations to young people. It is something which I personally have always believed fervently. Perhaps that is why I am glad to see that they agree: when you select your life's endeavor you should give high priority to what you "like"—to what you will be really, truly happy doing for the rest of your adult life.

Recently I had the opportunity to hear an address by Chancellor Archie Dykes of the University of Kansas. He was talking to a group of honor students, and in his address he emphasized to them the importance of continuing their pursuit of knowledge after high school-both within and outside the classroom-in order to develop themselves to become the very best human beings they can be. His strongest point, in my opinion, was his recommendation that they become exposed to many interests, many fields of endeavor so that they are then enabled to choose more wisely their life work, selecting a vocation that is both pleasant and challenging, as well as of course one in which a person can earn a good living for his family.

This, to me, is an ingredient leading to a rewarding and successful life-that is, to choose a field which one enjoys. Usually if a person thoroughly enjoys what he is doing he is much more likely to be a success in his work than if he is spending his time

and energy in a field in which he is not happy.

After choosing a field of work in your interest area, then set high standards for yourself. Set a high commitment rate. It is wise, however, to keep your goals within the bounds of reality and attainability. Only by achieving them and then by setting and reaching new goals of performance can there be continuing satisfaction.

The splendid thing about 4-H is that it offers you abundant opportunity to participate in many kinds of activity and interests. You have the opportunity, too, to set your own goals and standards, and to learn the satisfaction of meeting those goals and standards. Besides learning good habits in applying yourself, you are having the chance to find out what different types of program interest and challenge your abilities.

4-H gives you training and experience in working with people, both as an individual alone relating to others and as a member of a team with similar goals. Your learn leadership.

Most of all, 4-H gives you, as an individual, an opportunity to develop your own talents and your sense of values. This helps you, by experience, to be able to select that which holds your interest and continues to challenge and satisfy you.

4-H Around the State

Leavenworth County-A large club of more than 100 members, and a sizeable number of beginning age boys and girls led to the development of an Explorers 4-H Club at Tonganoxie. The "juniors" have a club of their own, but participate in special activities with the older "parent" club, the Happy Helpers. Most of the younger members in Explorers are in the 7-9 age group, and after one or two years of "exploring" they become members of the community club. Their ranks are quickly filled with more eager second to fourth graders, who get their first taste of 4-H with their own age level.

Coffey County—A check of more than \$1,000 for the State 4-H Fund Drive gave Coffey County the distinction of being the fourth county in the southeast area—following Cherokee, Linn, and Elk—to complete their goal. A number of other southeast area counties are working on their self-determined goals and some are within reach of their objective of 100 per cent or more.

Manhattan-A Bicentennial Reunion of the Master 4-H Club is being planned for June 2, during State 4-H Round-up. The Master 4-H Club is composed of those Kansas 4-H members who were delegates to the National 4-H Conference in Washington, extending back into the 1920s. The present National 4-H Conference delegates, Mary Jane Smith, Pottawatomie County; Bill Beems, Shawnee County; Jim Swanson, Wyandotte County; and Laura Lee Keller of Cheyenne County become "alums" following their attendance at National 4-H Conference the week of April 24-30.

Manhattan—The State 4-H Advisory Committee composed of 15 county Extension agents has requested a joint meeting with the members of the Youth Advisory Committee—three youth from each of the Extension areas. The meeting is scheduled for June 2, when the committee meets with a steering committee composed of Tom Whitson, Margaret Wilson, Sue Verdoorn, Mary Lou Gibbs, and

Manhattan—The Annual 4-H Family Camp, a long time favorite for midsummer relaxation with the entire family, will have an additional feature this year. A bicentennial program, prepared and presented by the Rock Springs Ranch staff, will be the highlight of the 4th of July celebration. Family camp begins near noon on Saturday, July 3, and ends with lunch on Monday. Families attending can take part in many recreational activities such as swimming, archery, canoeing, fishing, rifle range, and other games and sports. Many people just prefer to relax, enjoying the relief from the normally noisy weekend.

Washington D.C.—The Board of Trustees of the National 4-H Foundation in Washington have accepted a bid to completely remodel and rebuild the front of the main administrative building at the Center. Those who have attended conferences and short courses at the Center will recognize the ad-

ministrative building as the middle structure with the tall white columns. The Center began life as a girl's junior college, quite a long time ago. When completed the main administrative building will be known as J.C. Penny Hall.

Wilson County-As a special interest attraction for the bicentennial, sunflower seeds are being offered to all 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th grade students in the county. The 'growing contest' will culminate with three classes at the 4-H fair, featuring the largest sunflower (in circumference), the heaviest sunflower head, and the tallest sunflower stalk. There will be three prizes in each of the classes. In addition, contestants who compete and show at the fair will be eligible for pumpkin seeds in another growing contest, with which the Fredonia Garden Club will be involved.

Springs and Garden Rock City-"Goodbye, Mr. Whipps" was the theme at both locations in April as farewell parties were held honoring Loren Whipps, retiring effective as of June 30 as Southwest Area 4-H Specialist. Loren served as county agent in Ottawa and Sherman counties, in vocational agriculture positions, and as Extension economist before completing a prestigious Extension career as Area 4-H Specialist.

Columbus and Garden City—4-H agents Jimmy Biles and Mike Ouart have resigned their respective positions in Cherokee and Finney Counties. Jimmy leaves to join the Arizona Extension staff in Cochise County, hoping that the climatic change will improve their daughter's health. Mike is taking a liaison position in the office of Dean of Agriculture Carroll Hess at Kansas State University.

Ford County—the Richland Cappers (as in handicappers) 4-H Club in Ford County is very special to a number of people, the members all being trainable mentally retarded. The club meets during school and all the projects are completed during a workshop period at school.

Dr. Glenn M. Busset

State Leader, 4-H Youth

Responsible for the administration of the total 4-H and other Extension youth program, Glenn



Busset guides the developing philosophy of Kansas State University's educational program for youth. He serves as liaison person for state and area 4-H and youth specialists.

The photogra-

phy project and Clovia 4-H Scholarship House are two areas to which the state leader gives direct assistance, as well as serving as trustee for the Kansas 4-H Foundation.

The first Kansas 4-H'er to become state leader, Dr. Busset joined the KSU Extension Service in 1941 and became leader in 1966. His writing and public speaking abilities contribute much to state, area, and county meetings for leaders and 4-H'ers, and publications, including the Kansas 4-H Journal.

Dr. J. Dale Apel

Associate State Leader, 4-H and Youth

The "idea man, the innovator" describes Dr. Apel as he gives leadership to new trends, programs,



and ideas in the long range plans for Kansas 4-H.

Scheduling, programming, compiling, and interpreting statistics of the 4-H program are some of Dale Apel's responsibilities. He

took a leadership role in planning and initiating the current five year fundraising program of the KSU Cooperative Extension Service, in cooperation with the Kansas 4-H Foundation.

Before becoming associate state leader in 1966, Mr. Apel was a county 4-H Extension agent, editor of the Kansas 4-H Journal, and an assistant state 4-H and youth leader. He was a Kansas 4-H member and a national 4-H conference delegate.

Extension Specialist, 4-H and Youth

4-H day camps—

Places for special moments

Summer is upon us and with school out, soon the back yards, playgrounds, parks, creeks, and lakes in our counties will be filled with that curious adventurer amongst us, the 7-9 year old.

Fidgeting in their school room chairs from the first warm day of spring, our 7-9 year olds await the glorious days of summer when they are free to explore and roam the outdoor world around them. It is summer when they enjoy going to a ball game, swimming in the pool, eating watermelon, and going to camp. Day camp is particularly a fun and worthwhile learning experience. Programs are usually planned well in advance by 4-H junior leaders who enjoy working with the younger kids in the community. They choose a central location in the county such as a city park, school yard, nature center, or lake for the experience.

Programs may differ from county to county. They represent the gamut of creative learning experiences. Some day camps might feature camp craft skills such as axemanship, firebuilding, and outdoor cookery, or other nature activities such as sensory awareness hikes, wild animal stories, water bug collecting, nature sketching, and scavenger hunts. If the day camp is located near a swimming pool or lake, kids look forward to that refreshing swim during the middle of the day. Arts and crafts are popular, particularly those activities using natural materials such as rock art, painting, and wood carving.

When the weather is cooler, kids enjoy participating in active games and contests such as capture the

Occasionally, the day camp might have a carnival or circus theme where everybody gets dressed up in crazy costumes, including the neighborhood dogs. The carnival might have several skits and freak shows such as the world's tallest man.

Occasionally, assistance is given through adult resource people in the county who might put on a demonstration in a variety of activities such as archery, fishing, bee keeping, crafts, puppet shows, or goat roping. Sometimes the local fire department will bring its pumping truck out to demonstrate how it operates.

There is plenty of fun at day camp.

It is a place of special summer moments.

". . . fun and camp are synonymous;

both = summer"

A special kind of day camp which "made 40 first, second, and third graders think that fun and camp are synonymous, and both equal to summer," took place in Greeley County this past summer. The camp for 7, 8, and 9 year olds was a Rip Rocket nutrition camp. Carolyn Herl, Tribune, who has helped with the camp for two years, describes the camp:

Camp began each of the three mornings with a flag-raising ceremony and then some songs to wake everybody up. The first day of camp we all took an ecology walk. This walk took us through Pride Park, and Wayne Brenn showed us the different kinds of trees and grasses, explained about the value of soil, and answered any questions about the various plants found there.



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Some other events of our first day were watching a nutrition film, making nutrition folders, preparing hot dogs, corn, and smores for dinner, and beginning work on an ecology box in crafts.

On the second day of camp, we made homemade bread to go with our noon meal. Making bread was one of the highlights of our camp, and everyone enjoyed not only making the bread, but also learning why each of the ingredients went in the dough, and what food group the bread was in. Other events of the day were watching an ecology film, preparing hamburgers, banana boats, and carrot sticks for lunch, and again working on our ecology boxes in crafts.

The third and final day of camp brought making and eating homemade ice cream. The first events of the day were group competition. We had water balloon tosses, duck-walk relays, a "people knot'' race, and various other games. After this we began making our ice cream to eat later on in the day. We had all "hand-crank" ice cream freezers and so we all took turns turning the ice cream. We then saw another nutrition film, and played a game of food charades. For our dinner, we made cornbread and peach surprises to go with the "Hobo Beans" already cooking in the kitchen. Each afternoon we all went over to the swimming pool to swim for an hour, and then came back for a snack. Usually the swimming snack was an apple or an orange, but Thursday we all had a dish of homemade ice cream. Our last day of Rip Rocket ended with each group giving a skit, and then we all sang the "Music Concert Song" for the last time.

Rip Rocket was a lot of fun, not only for the children attending but also for the counselors, the kitchen help, and everyone else who helped with the camp. We feel that camp is a very important factor in these kids' summer, and since nutrition is a vital part of our lives, it is important to teach good food habits to these young people. Throughout the camp we stressed eating foods from the basic four food groups, and taught always to wash your hands before working with food in any way. The children all enjoyed preparing their own meals and are all better educated in nutrition and food safety.

State Youth Conservation Camp

These include a wide range of interests such as wildlife, photography, creative nature crafts, bird identification, trapping and fur harvest, stalking wild edibles, night sounds and animal communications, and canoe techniques, to name a few.

A special bicentennial program entitled "THAT'S IT . . . '76" will be presented as a feature of the Monday night program. This pageant is a tribute to the celebration of America's bicentennial. Dances, skits, songs, and other music combine to depict the significant contributions made by many groups to the America of today.

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





Unfortunately, because of the limits of space, we are unable to list the large number of persons who contributed to memorials during 1975, but their generosity is as appreciated as if their names were listed.

In 1952 the Kansas 4-H Foundation, a non-profit educational corporation, was established to make it possible for all citizens and organizations to share in furthering the 4-H program of the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service. The Foundation is dedicated to getting the highest return from each and every donor's investment in our State's number one resource-its youth.

Uncle Sam: Have you noticed all the different people in my country? There are many colors, black, yellow, white, and brown. Even here in Ottawa County we have many accent colors in hair and eyes. Where did all my people come from? Where did my people in the Woodsdale 4-H Club come from?

Anna: Some of us came from Germany. German people are known to be hard-working, thrifty, and to like things neat and clean. They are fond of sports and emphasize physical fitness. They like music and dancing. The waltz originated in Germany and Austria in the late 1700s. Our club has learned a German dance called "Klapptanz." This dance represents a quarrel between husband and wife. (Club dances "Klapptanz.")

Jerry: Some of my heritage is from Ireland. Ireland struggled for freedom until 1900. The Irish people have known much poverty. They were pagan people until St. Patrick brought Christianity to them in 432. They accepted Christ eagerly and have been strong in their faith. The Irish love horses and are known for their beautiful manuscripts and woven fabrics. Our 4-H sextet will sing an Irish melody "Danny Boy." (4-H sextet sings "Danny Boy.")

Brian: Many of our forefathers came from England. English people have a deep love of tradition and are proud of their royal family. They encourage games of wit, courage, and skill. Some of our 4-H'ers have Dutch and French heritage, too. This song "Let it be Me" was written in France and later translated in English.

(Solo)

Uncle Sam: In my country all these nationalities blended together. They soon found common forms of recreation. The square dance was a favorite in many communities. When the fiddlers began to play, everyone, young and old, squared up. Some dances were quite easy like this one called "Hinky Dinky ParlezVous."

(Three squares dance.)

A dance that's a little harder is "Proud Mary."

(Two squares dance.)

Still more complicated is "Glory Hallelujah."

(An advanced square group does this.)

Uncle Sam: But why did my people

come to America? The trip was dangerous—they left everything they had, including their family and friends. Many died as they fought for survival in America. Why did they come?

Everyone shouts: FREEDOM!

Uncle Sam: Yes, they wanted freedom—freedom to work, to have their own land, and freedom to worship God. They had a great faith, much like the children of Israel during their exodus from Egypt.

(Solo: The Exodus)

Uncle Sam: Today all of us could learn from our forefathers about spirit-200 years ago they had a spirit of Godliness. The church was the center of each village. The Bible was the main source of America's national identity. The children learned to read the Bible and to live by it. George Washington said "To attempt government without God is impossible." Our national motto is "In God we Trust." America realized how great God really is! (During the speech above, a pioneer family comes in with a cross and a Bible.)

(Chorus sings "How Great Thou Art.")

Uncle Sam: My people had a spirit of hard work. They worked from sunup to sundown. They strived to see how much they could get done and they took pride in doing their work well. They wasted nothing—wornout clothing became quilts and rugs. They helped their neighbors and realized that all people had the same rights as they did. Our Declaration of Independence says:

Kent: We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain inalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

Uncle Sam: Yes, where the spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty and where the spirit of work is—things get done and done well. The 4-H motto shows the spirit of work.

Everyone says "To Make the Best Better."

(Chorus sings "Across the Nation:")

Uncle Sam: My people had a spirit of patriotism. What does patriotism mean? In an old time dictionary it said, "Patriotism is the spirit of acting like a father to one's country." My people did act like a father to me. They loved me and were proud of my symbol—the flag.

(Band plays "Grand Old Flag." The flag is brought in while the band

plays.)

Uncle Sam: Yes, my people were proud of America. From the east to the west, they fought for me, and protected me. They have always done their best to care for me. Are you doing your part? Are you really proud to be an American?

(Chorus sings "This Land is Your

Land.")

Uncle Sam: You need help to bring back the spirit of your forefathers. There is still hope—"for like a tree that is cut down there is hope that it will sprout again." The American spirit can sprout again if you seek God's help, work hard, and feel the pride of being a father to your country.

Join us as we sing "God Bless

America."

June 1776

One June 7, 1776, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia submitted to the Continental Congress three resolutions: one, "That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown;" two, that the colonies should seek the aid of foreign powers; and three, that a confederation should be formed to join the colonies more closely together.

After vigorous debate, a committee was appointed on June 11 to write a declaration of independence from England. Committee members were John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, Robert Livingston, and Roger Sherman. Thomas Jefferson asked John



As we approach our country's Bicentennial date, July 4, 1976, the make-up of America's freedom train is something about which we should do some deep thinking.







1. Any 4-H member may submit one entry in any or all categories. Identify on the material itself the name and number of the category for which it is submitted.

2. Entries may be neatly written or typed; if typed, please double space.

3. Entries must be postmarked August 15 or earlier.

4. Write your name and address and the name and address of your community 4-H leader on a separate sheet of paper and attach it to your entry or entries; do not put your name on the entries themselves.

5. No material will be returned unless a stamped, self-addressed envelope is included.

6. Entries will be judged by a committee of former or older 4-H

7. The entry judged to be the best in each category will receive a \$2 bill as a prize.

Adams to prepare the draft of the declaration, but Mr. Adams refused, insisting that Mr. Jefferson should do it because he was a Virginian and New Englander Adams thought a Virginian should be in charge; second, Mr. Adams said Mr. Jefferson was much more popular than himself; and third, "You can write ten times better than I E can."

"Well," Thomas Jefferson replied, "if you are decided, I will do as well as I can."

4-H girl is a "Waste Watcher"

Karon Hammarlund, St. Marys, has joined the Waste Watchers. To conserve energy, she shuts off lights when no one is in a room. When cooking, she uses a pan which fits the size of the heating element of the stove. Clean motors use less energy than dirty ones, so she has learned to clean motors, a job which she says is not hard to do if you know how.

Sixteen year old Karon has been a 4-H member for nine years, in the electric project for seven years, and a junior leader in this project for three years. She helped in Jackson and Pottawatomie counties, as well as in her own club in Wabaunsee County.

Karon's other 4-H projects are safety, beef, public speaking, and citizenship.
