



More Families Look For Home Away From Home

Due to increased leisure time, tages or homes are built for less than vacation homes are luring many families "away from it all"-from a few miles to a few hundred miles from home.

Dr. Jim Stiegler, Extension specialist in land utilization at Kansas State University, points out that ownership of leisure cottages is now above three percent nationally, or more than 1.7 million families.

Interestingly enough, vacation homes are more common in the northeast and north central states than in the south and west.

Even so, there is a large number in Kansas and it is increasing each year. Nearly 150,000 cottages are being created each year in the U.S.

Vacation homes vary from a \$28,000 condominium in Florida to a \$1,000 family-constructed A-frame in the back pasture. In addition, approximately one in three has from one to three rooms and approximately half has four or five rooms, according to a recent U.S. Department of Commerce and the Census Bureau report.

While most second homes have electricity (91 percent), only 58 percent have running water, toilet or bath facilities. Only 20 percent have a central heating system, indicating a strong single season use. Approximately two-thirds of the cot-

McMinimy says Pile's ability as a manager has helped him hold costs in line. "Crop costs have been over \$12 per acre only once in the last seven years," the fieldman says. "All in all, it costs him about \$60 to gross \$100-much better than the average for the state."



Fall Good Time To Transplant Trees And Shrubs

Fall is a good season for transplanting ornamental trees and shrubs. Just be certain to wait until the plants are dormant before starting.

Balled and burlapped plants can be transplanted earlier in the fall and later in the spring than bare root plants. Deciduous trees should be moved only after their leaves turn color and drop off.



Here are some other suggestions that may help you enjoy a higher survival rate with the trees and plants that are transplanted this season:

Select the planting site carefully. Consider not only where a plant would look good, but also where it will grow most successfully. Make sure that your plant can adapt to any changes in sun, shade, wind exposure and soil moisture.

In addition, avoid these common mistakes: placing plants too close together in an effort to get quick screening effects, setting young trees under windows, and crowding the walls of buildings.

Provide enough space above and below the ground to allow for future spreading and growth of the top and roots of the plant. Later, crowding may deform it, stunt its growth or eventually kill it.

Transplanting: When digging up a deciduous tree or shrub, avoid injuring roots. Any extra soil taken up with the roots will help to retain the fine "hair" roots which absorb moisture.

Evergreens must have a lot of soil around the roots and should be taken up with a ball of soil. Deciduous plants should have this rootball also, if the trunk diameter is greater than three inches or if they are considered difficult to transplant.

It is essential that the plant roots aren't allowed to become dry. If they dry out, either during transplanting or following transplanting, they almost certainly will die.

To help hold the soil on plant roots and to conserve moisture, wrap the rootball in burlap. This may be kept on the plant when it is transplanted. Just loosen it at the base of the tree or shrub and pull it back slightly after it is in the ground.

If the plant or tree being planted is barerooted, be sure the soil is firmly pressed around and under the roots.

Fill in the hole about threequarters full, pour in water and then finish filling with soil.

Prune the plant or tree to compensate for the roots lost in digging it up.

Covering the ground around the plant with a good mulch, such as pine needles or bark, can help conserve moisture. Don't forget—don't let the roots of the new transplant dry out. This means watering during the winter, if there is insufficent rainfall.

Hog Cost More Than Congressman To Ship To Russia

It costs more to ship a 300-pound hog to Russia than it does to send a United States congressman.

Illinois Gov. Richard B. Ogilvie's office announced it will cost \$943 to ship "Ambassador," the grand

champion barrow of the Illinois State Fair, to Moscow as a gift to Soviet Premier Alexei Kosygin.

Each member of a farm trade delegation accompanying Ambassador—including U.S. Rep. Paul Findley—will pay about \$1,200. But that figure is for a round-trip flight plus rooms and meals. The hog is going only one way.

The state is picking up the tab for Ambassador's flight.

Since the fair, the animal has grown from 215 pounds to 300. With packing, it tipped the scales at about 400 pounds upon departure from O'Hare International airport.







In addition to producing highquality milk, the Bowmans sell breeding stock. In fact, Herb credits much of his success to his purebred breeding program.

Herb pursues a vigorous artificial Extension office are sponsoring the insemination program. "And the veterinarian plays an important part in my operation," adds Bowman. "He helps with the longevity of my cows.'

The Bowmans operate a "compact farm of 160 acres" and rent an additional 25 acres for heifers to graze through the summer.


Herb won't discuss dairying without mentioning the Dairy Herd Improvement Association's production testing program. He's downright emphatic about it:

"Production testing is a must if you are to stay ahead in this game."

The Bowman herd was the second best butterfat producing herd in Kansas on production testing during the past year, DHIA records show.

"Herb and Kathy Bowman are not only good dairy operators but they are also outstanding community people," boasts Cliff Manry, Pawnee county Extension agent. "They've been 4-H Club leaders for



Kansas State University scientists have been studing nitrogen fertilization of hay meadows in eastern Kansas for years, with less than sensational results.

The researchers do not recommend native grassland fertilization because 1) weeds and cool-season grasses may invade, and 2) response of desirable grasses has not been consistently high.

If farmers insist on fertilizing native grasses, they should wait until early May in southern Kansas and mid-May in the north, after desirable vegetation has initiated new growth.



Ironically, it was wheat from plains of Kansas by Mennonite immigrants a century ago-that led

to the situation today.

Kansas and other plains states, Russia-painstakingly carried to the stretching from Texas to the Dakotas, account for most of the "winter" type, the kind planted in

the fall and harvested the following summer.

The plains version has a hard kernel favored by bakers for breadmaking because of its abundance and quality. Winter wheat also is the type mostly being sold to Russia.

Of a total wheat crop this year, winter wheat comprised about 1.2 billion bushels, 309 million of it produced in Kansas.

Winter wheat also is grown in the Eastern and Southeastern states, but it is "soft" because of higher rainfall in those areas. It is used for cookies, crackers, cake mixes and for mixing with hard wheat in bread-

Another kind is durum wheat, grown mostly in Minnesota, the Dakotas, Montana and Idaho. Grass & Grain

Amounting to about 286 million bushels in this year's crop, it also is hard and is suited for macaroni, spaghetti and noodles.

Consider, again, the size of the Soviet wheat sale, If taken only from bins in Kansas and Nebraska, the two states would barely have produced enough this year.

The crops from Delaware, Maryland, Virginia, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa and Missouri would make up only about half the Soviet



Farm Bureau President Says Average Farmer Dosen't Feel Sold Out

Most Kansas farmers who grew all that wheat now being sold to the Soviet Union and Red China don't seem to be brooding over any windfalls which speculators may have reaped on it.

'The average farmer doesn't feel that he's been sold out," says John Armstrong, president of the Kansas Farm Bureau.

Oliver Brown of Liberal, Kan., who oversees a wheat operation that involves 320,000 acres in the high plains of western Kansas, eastern Colorado and the Oklahoma panhandle, sees the furor in Washington over inside information as politically-based.

Two things seem to underline the reaction:

The wheat grower has a deep-set philosophy that his business is a gamble and he has no one but himself to blame if he doesn't sell his wheat at the right time.

-A great many Kansas wheat growers are cutting in on the mighty price boom which developed after the announcement of the big sale to the Soviets on July 8.

About 10,000 of the 320,000 acres which Oliver Brown oversees belong to him. He sold the wheat from those acres when it was harvested and got \$1.25 a bushel at the local elevator. Today he probably could get almost

"What I did in July was based on my own judgement and all of the cards were on the table," Brown says. "I have been managing and operating wheat farms for 32 years. We have found that your best price turns out to be at harvest time. That gets down to a matter of personal judgement. Obviously, now I wish I hadn't sold."

But most wheat growers-and even some of the land owners for whom Brown works-did not sell all of their wheat at harvest time. The rough estimate is that half the 1972 crop still is in the farmer's bins or his rented storage.

John Armstrong is not a typical wheat farmer because he comes from the little town of Muscotah in

northeast Kansas, where hogs and corn or even apples are apt to be bigger than wheat. But what happened to the Farm Bureau president and his wheat apparently is typical. Armstrong sold half at harvest time for \$1.38. He marketed the other half

Reporting to the Farm Bureau directors after meeting with key members from 50 counties in western Kansas was Paul Fleener, Farm Bureau's legislative director.

"It's a philosophic reaction," Fleener said. "The grower who sold is sorry he did, but he thinks it is great for those who are able to take advantage of the higher prices."

Fleener said the big reaction is to the prospect that continuing sales to the Soviet Union and Red China will keep wheat prices up next year and lead to a general expansion of foreign markets.

"We have to have new markets," Armstrong said. "The only way to expand is through exports, and this is our greatest opportunity."

Among the dissenters is Cecil Rogers of Pretty Prairie, in the heavy producing area in southcentral Kansas.

"I think the government withheld information about the Soviet sale to get our wheat before the farmers heard about it," Rogers says. "The big grain companies and the big terminals are making the money. The individual farmer who sat back and waited will profit too."

Charles Rayl, a wheat grower who lives in Hutchinson, said:

"It looks to me like the government knew and waited until wheat was sold before the price was allowed to go up."

Gilbert Rundell of Stafford, is the exception who never sells his wheat at harvest time. He was holding out for \$2 this year.

"I think people should have expected something like the grain sale when the President was making all those trips around to other countries," Rundell says. "It takes a while for diplomats to make up a

Jasper Dunn of Partridge, said it is a shame that farmers sold their wheat early.

"Some are bitter about it," Dunn Kingman Farmer said. "Some inside information was leaked out by high officials. I think the grain trade was told but I don't the grain trade was told, but I don't feel that Nixon was responsible."

"I feel like it's the kind of business we're in," said David Jacob of Sedgwick. "It's a gamble."

Jacob said farmers could have put their wheat under government loan (averaging \$1.25 a bushel) and held it until next spring.

"We had an inkling that there might be a grain sale when Nixon was in Russia," Jacobs said. "At the time, I thought wheat prices might go higher. Too, it's an election

Oliver Brown scoffed at charges that two former high officials of the Department of Agriculture were able to capitalize on inside information about the grain deals.

"Those buyers and shippers are in the know before our own government," Brown said. "Those accusations are wrong, but then this is a political year.

The Kansas wheat belt is traditionally Republican, but Brown is a former Democratic chairman

for his county.

The price boom comes as wheat growers are in the midst of planting

Roy Frederick, agricultural economist at Kansas State University, says they may plant 6 percent more than a year ago-or around 10 million acres.

"Many farmers are bullish about 1973 price prospects and will plant thick pork rib chops stuffed sen getting the full remove wheat." he predicted more wheat," he predicted.

"If production soars and sales to the Soviet Union do not continue at a high level, we could see a return to the situation of the late 1960s when a glut of wheat had a depressing effect on prices."

Future World Trade Influenced By Wheat Sales

Rod Turnbull

Kansas City Board of Trade As huge and dramatic as the U.S. grain sales have been to the Soviet Union and China, and even after recognizing what this has meant to current grain prices, these transactions may be even more important as a symbol of what can be happening in world trade.

This admittedly, is an optimistic appraisal based upon the contention that the world, almost suddenly, has become more open to trade with the United States than it has ever been before. There are simply more potential customers than ever in history-because the Soviet Union

Comparisons are difficult to make. But it can be argued convincingly that we live in a different world than existed before World War

and China have been brought into provide transportation across the ocean in a matter of hours. Instant communications permit a farmer in mid-America to watch a race as it is being run at the Olympics in Munich, or to see the President of the United States sit down to a dinner in Peking with the top officials of China.

Isolation had become a thing of the past for all but the most depressed of peoples around the world.

It might be argued that prior to World War II, trade actually was possible with most nations of the world. But the fact is, it was on a scale that is dwarfed by the present volume. For instance, U.S. agricultural exports in 1938 totaled 800 million dollars. In the fiscal year ended last July 1, the total was better than 8 billion dollars, more than ten times as much as in the earlier period. Last year's business included no wheat sales to Russia, although that nation did take a substantial quantity of corn. The point is, U.S. farm exports reached record proportions without sales to Russia or China. Part of this increase is due to the fact that the whole world wants to eat better.

Our expanded farm exports are proof that even prior to the Russian transactions, a growing part of the world was looking to the U.S. for food, and thus we had an export trade that would have been beyond any expectations of the period prior to World War II.

But after the World War II era, two great nations, the Soviet Union and China, were in effect, off limits to U.S. farm business.

Within the last year, this all has been changed. On top of the record trade with other nations around the world, Russia and China have become potential customers.

The situation might be illustrated with an example of a store that served customers on one side of a river. There were no bridges over the river, thus the store could count as customers only those people who lived on the same side of the river as the store. Yet, it was doing record business. Then bridges and new highways are built. Suddenly, they are opened and the store finds it is serving people it never saw before.

Developments of this last year sportation facilities which now have to limit on its expert have opened the U.S. farm store to limit on its export capable more than a quarter of all the people on earth. How much these new customers will buy is a question, but a potential does exist.

Again the statement is pertinent that the whole world wants to eat better and those who can afford it want more meat, which requires feed grains and soybean meal.

Trade begets trade. Japan is the outstanding example. Before World War II, Japan was a minor buyer of U.S. farm products. Now as one of the world's greatest industrial nations and exporters, it is the No. 1 foreign customer of the U.S. farmer.

The United States, with its immense capacity to produce on the farm, is in an ideal situation to benefit from expanded world trade in the United States. in food products. It should be expected, however, that this country would not have a monoply. Trade always must be a 2-way street. Tariff restrictions still would be deterrents. Trade always is affected by price. Competition would spur increased production around the world. Canada, as an example, surely would improve its tran-





150 million bushels. Farmers may be holding more than 650 million bushels under reseal price-support loans. The remainder, which may be around 300 million bushels, is needed for pipeline supplies and working stocks on farms, at feedlots, mills, and elevators, and in transit.

The new crop is a large one, second only to the huge crop harvested last fall. On the basis of conditions observed and reported on September 1, the USDA estimated the crop at 5,124 million bushels. This estimate should be fairly accurate, since it was based on careful counts and measurements of ears in many fields, as well as on the usual reports turned in by farmers.

The new crop, however, probably will not be large enough to meet the needs for domestic use and exports. Furthermore, farmers are expected to put a substantial amount of the new crop under price-support. Thus, the billion-dollar question is, "At what prices will farmers redeem and sell enough corn-new and oldto meet market demands?"

MARKET REQUIREMENTS

Estimates of market requirements for corn during the marketing year beginning October 1 vary considerably, but most seem to be around 5,200 million to 5,300 million bushles. If use and exports do take 5,300 million bushels, farmers may be able to redeem and sell at a profit not only all of the new crop that they put under loan, but also about 200 million bushels of old corn they now hold under reseal loans. Up-to-date figures are not available to us at the time of this writing, but the total amount of corn held under loan by farmers a few weeks ago exceeded 700 million bushels.

The amount of 1971 corn alone under reseal probably exceeds 400 million bushels. The break-even redemption prices on this corn next July will be about 9 cents over the county price-support levels.

In addition, farmers apparently hold under reseal loans more than 200 million bushels of corn from the 1970 crop, and 50 million bushels from the 1969 harvest. The breakeven prices on the 1970 corn will be about 13 cents over the local loan rates; on the 1969 crop, about 17

Many farmers recently could sell corn for delivery next July at prices that were 20 to 25 cents over the break-even redemption prices for 1971 corn. Some have been taking advantage of this, either by contracting with elevators or by selling futures. Others are holding out for a better deal. Time will tell which farmers are the smartest-or luckiest-ones.

In summary: If prices of corn could be held at near recent levels, farmers could sell at a good profit all of the more than 600 million bushels

the same as was announced September 20 by Dr. David O. Manley, veterinarian in charge of federal programs in Kansas.

The quarantine boundaries take in all of Osborne county and that portion of Smith county south of a line formed by Kansas Highway 9 and County Highway 868.

Dr. Manley reports that federal, state, and local veterinarians are making "satisfactory progress in the control of the outbreak." He indicates that they are surveying all farms in the area in an attempt to determine the source of the outbreak.

Dr. Caley suggests that producers in the quarantine area should not be unduly alarmed, "because any financial loss due to hog cholera will be covered by available indemnity funds.'

He explains that the quarantine means producers cannot move any swine within or out of the designated area except to slaughter, and then only by a permit issued by Federal or state regulatory officials.

Such permits can be secured at a temporary headquarters in the Lazy L Motel in Osborne from Dr. Donald Nicholson or Dr. George Allen. The telephone number is 913-346-2184.

Permits are also available from Dr. Manley, 913-234-8661, Ext. 211, Topeka; or from Dr. Gerald Gurss. Kansas Livestock Commissioner, 913-296-2326, Topeka.

Both Dr. Manley and Dr. Gurss strongly request support and cooperation from hog producers in the area and across the state during this emergency. They feel combined efforts should greatly reduce dangers and risks of further spread.

The meat cuts are vacuum sealed in plastic at the plant, a process Wilson believes eventually will be extended to the smallest cuts of meat for shipment.

Havrilla said the first savings with meat come because the excess fat and bone, which may be 100 pounds of a 650-pound carcass, is left behind. The retailer, who might not have been able to sell the fat and bone profitably, normally would be forced to tack the price of the fat and bone to other cuts for customers to

Instead, Iowa Beef pays a credit to the retailer for the fat and bone, The company also brings in which is rendered to make it edible groups of cattle feeders to the in animal foods and sold profitably

The company's processing fee and other carcass prices are figured from an industry sheet that analyzes markets daily. Much bargaining is eliminated.

Havrilla said Iowa Beef figures wrapping the meat with plastic eliminates shrinkage from moisture loss in the 650-pound carcassfigured at 3.25 pounds during shipment, 12.94 pounds in the warehouse and 12.68 pounds in the store. Again these lost pounds would have to have been made up by the retailer who bought them, on other

Havrilla said 90 boxed carcasses can be shipped in the same vehicle that was able to transport 55 hanging carcasses so the cost of transportation per carcass is reduced. The same savings is realized in warehouse storage space Havrilla estimated shipping and storage costs are cut by a fourth.

He estimated in-store labor costs for cutting meat are lowered by 40 percent and the end single carcass in half.

Havrilla said Iowa Beef leaves purchase of less commonly used. meat cuts like brisket and shank to the discretion of the retailer. If the retailer has a market for them he can sell them. Otherwise Iowa Beef will distribute them profitably and save the store owner the chore of selling undesirable cuts at a loss and making up the difference on demanded cuts.

Bagley said boxed beef is leading to greater demand for Midwestern beef which will help maintain prices. He said the beef industry already



carcass quality of the calves they sell. The USDA, with the cooperation of the Kansas Livestock Association, is selling special orange eartags for 50 cents which stay with the animal until slaughter. At the packing plant the USDA meat inspector will transfer the tag to the carcass so the USDA meat grader will know to record yield factors and carcass

quality characteristics. This information will then be made available for \$1.50 to the man who originally tagged the animal. The program is called the BEEF CARCASS DATA SERVICE.

Quality data on the report will include: conformation score, maturity score, marbling score, and USDA Quality Grade. Cutability data will include: Carcass weight, fat thickness, ribeye area, percent pelvic, kidney and heart fat, and yield grade to the nearest tenth. Producers, commercial and purebred alike, can use the information to identify superior herd sires of families. Feeders can use the information to identify the right kind, or the best source, of feeder cattle. It is the hope of the USDA and the cooperating cattle industry organizations that the information available at this low cost will enable more cattlemen to do a better job of producing high quality lean beef.

Every effort is being made to see that these bright orange tags are not removed. Nevertheless, since the possibility of tags being lost or removed does exist, the tags will be sold separately and then the reports will be paid for when available. The program hopes to be self-supporting. Cattle producers and feeders who want to purchase tags may do so by sending 50 cents for each tag desired, plus 75 cents for one attachment tool, to the Kansas Livestock Association, 2044 Fillmore, Topeka, Kansas 66604. The tags will be sent by return mail immediately.

A Pheasant Cost Him \$40 A Pound SCOTT CITY—If you think meat is

expensive, how about pheasant at \$40 per pound?

A Scott City man, Thomas D. Wilkinson, 39, recently discovered that meat purchased in a supermarket is cheap when compared to his pheasant which cost \$118.30.

Wilkinson was arrested recently by game protector Claude Blair, Scott City, after Blair observed him shooting a cock pheasant. After a chase of nearly 10 miles, Blair apprehended Wilkinson and charged him with shooting game birds out of season and shooting from a vehicle.

Eythel Hollingsworth, Scott County judge, fined Wilkinson \$100 plus \$18.30 in court costs. Wilkinson's hunting license was also revoked.

Shooting of pheasants is prohibited in Kansas except during

the legal hunting season when cock birds can be taken. The 1972 pheasant season will open Nov. 11 and run through Jan. 14, 1973.

first six months of 1973, then may be increasing faster in the second six months than in the last part of 1972, observers pointed out.

The pig crop on farms during the June through August months just past was estimated at 17.1 million head, an increase of 1 percent above the same period last year. The number of sows farrowing was the same in both periods, but the average number of pigs per litter increased from 7.25 a year ago to 7.29 this year, the report said.

During the September through November quarter of this year, hog producers intend to farrow 2 percent more sows than in the same quarter of last year, the report said. Compared with last year, five of the 10 states are expecting a decline. The largest drop-14 percent-is expected in Wisconsin, while 1 to 4 percent fewer sows are expected to farrow in Ohio, Iowa and South Dakota.

The big difference, however, appeared in intentions for the December (1972) through February, 1973, quarter, in which hog raisers told the USDA they plan to farrow 1,954,000 sows, an increase of 7

Decreases from a year ago of 2 percent or less in Missouri and Kansas, and 8 to 12 percent in Ohio, Wisconsin, Minnesota, South Dakota and Nebraska more than offset increases of 2 to 6 percent in Indiana, Illinois, and Iowa. Market hogs closely followed the state changes for all hogs but breeding stock increased in all states except Ohio, Wisconsin, and South Dakota for an overall 5 percent increase.

Market hogs accounted for 39,855,000 head for the September 1 inventory, 2 percent below a year earlier and 8 percent less than 2 years earlier. Decreases in the heavier weight groups more than offset increases in the light weight

Changes from a year ago are as follows: Under 60 pounds-15,619,000 head, up 312,000; 60-119 pounds-10,248,000 up 27,000; 120-179 pounds-8,405,000, down 515,000; 180-219 pounds-4,701,000, down 428,000; and 220 pounds and over-882,000, down 87,000 head.

Mid-September signals the peginning of wheat planting in Kansas, the nation's No. 1 producer.

Farmers in the northwest part of Kansas will begin sowing wheat in approximately the second week of the month. Planting will move across the state in a northwestsoutheast direction, concluding in mid or late October.


Scientists at Kansas State University generally recommend these dates:

September 10-20 for northwest Kansas, from the northern part of Hamilton county north to and including Cheyenne county, east to and including the western one-fourth of Phillips county, and southwest to Hamilton county.

September 10-October 5 for southwest, west-central, north central, and extreme northeast sections of the state.

September 25-October 10 for southern, south-central, east-central and eastern counties.

October 5-20 for southeast Kansas, for eastern Harper county, northeast to Bourbon county, south to Cherokee county, and west to

\$68,000 Pipeline To Water Cattle In N.C. Kansas

GLADE—Construction will soon begin on a \$68,000 pipeline project to bring water to cattle in a 9500-acre area between the Solomon river and Bow Creek near Glade, Phillips county.

"This is one of the largest projects of its kind ever authorized in Kansas, and perhaps in the United States," Phillips county ASCS director Burce Weber said.

Land-owners served by the project will pay about one-third of the cost, he said.

Weber said that a 35-mile pipeline will bring livestock water to land owned by 32 individuals. Seventy percent of the cost of eligible itemspipe and wells but not pumps will be paid by the grant made available by the 1972 Rural Environmental Assistance program.

"The set-aside amount for special projects in Kansas was only \$200,000 for the entire year," he said, "and this project was authorized through the ASCS because water for livestock was so badly needed throughout the entire area.'

Weber said that he and Leo Weinhold first proposed the grant because the need for water for stock was so great. "It has cost as much as \$500 a day to haul water in that vicinity, with some producers hauling up to 100,000 gallons last summer."

He said terms of the grant provided that any project must benefit a wide area, and more than one producer.

The project area runs from a point about 2 miles south of Glade 4 miles east and 2 miles west.

Weber estimates that the grant will pay about 65 percent of the total cost, including wells, with landowners paying the balance.

"The Soil Conservation Service has completed design work, and

construction will probably be started within the next two weeks," said Weber. It should be of material benefit to land owners in an area traditionally short on water for livestock and household use.

U.S. Hog Cholera Flare-Ups Continue

Outbreaks of hog cholera during September 1972 continue to flare up in states that have been free of the disease for more than a year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) reports.

Officials of USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) say that two more "Hog Cholera Free" states-Kansas and Tennessee-have reported confirmed cases. Free states previously reporting hog cholera during the month are Georgia, Indiana, Kentucky, and Ohio.

"These flare ups of hog cholera emphasize the fact that the disease is still with us," points out Dr. E. E. Saulmon, deputy administrator, APHIS, Veterinary Service. "Producers must stay alert for signs of the disease and must continue to 'Suspect Cholera First'." However, the intensive current effort being applied by state and federal veterinarians is encouraging since they are doing all they can to hunt out and eliminate the last remnants of the disease.

Two confirmed cases in Kansas were found in Osborne county, and the three Tennessee cases were found in Bedford and Knox counties. Investigation into the source of these cases is continuing.

During September, 45 hog cholera infected herds have been reported, the highest monthly total since the 45 reported in October 1970. The states involved and number of cases reported are Indiana 17, North Carolina 14, Ohio 5, Tennessee 5, Kentucky 2, Kansas 2, plus one case each in Puerto Rico and Georgia.

The three-state area of Kentucky, Ohio, and Indiana has produced 24 of

the 45 cases reported so h month. These cases have traced to the movement of swine through several swines central Kentucky,
