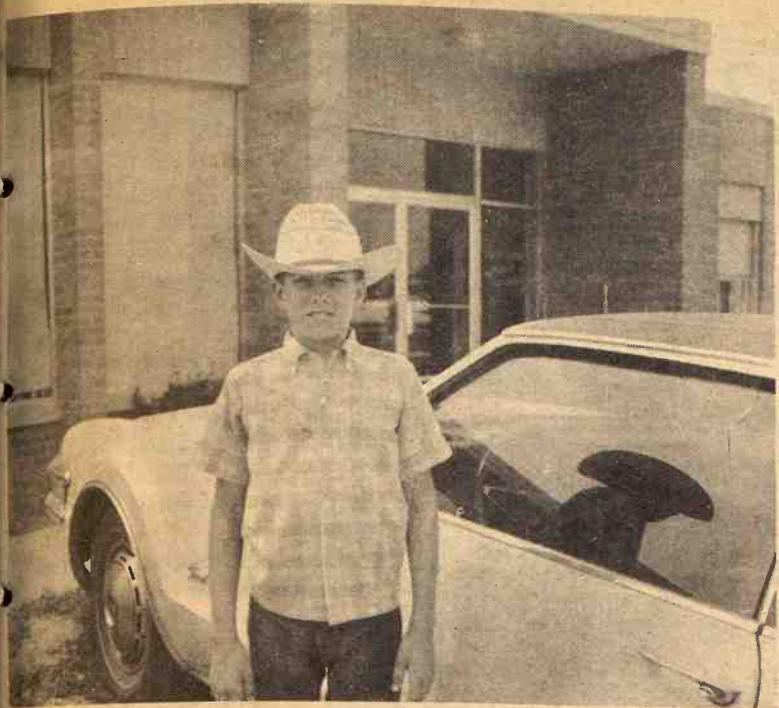

How Tax Reform Might Affect You

What the tax reform bill would do for you — or to you — depends on where you stand in the income scale.

Say you're the Mr. Middle Income Taxpayer the cartoonists like to draw wearing a wrinkled suit and a worried expression.

The biggest benefit in the bill for you may be the increase in the standard deduction. This is now 10 percent with a maximum of \$1000. The bill would increase it by 1972 to 15 percent and \$2000.

If you don't have enough deductions to make it worth your trouble to list them separately you would be money ahead under the new plan.

In any case, you can look forward — if the House and Senate pass the bill intact — to a general rate reduction that would cut your tax as it is phased in during 1971 and 1972. The result would be a tax cut of not less than 5 percent, the specialists say.

If you're poor, or even at the lower end of the middle incomes, you would do much better.

A new low income allowance, in conjunction with the rate cuts, would have effects like these, the specialists say:

About 2 million poor families would drop entirely off the tax rolls. A single person earning up to \$3000 would have his tax cut 63 percent. Even up to \$7000 the cut would be 12 percent.

For a widow or widower with dependent children, or a career woman or single man 30 or older maintaining his own household, there are further advantages.

The surviving spouse would get the same tax treatment that a married couple now gets — the advantage of splitting an income so as to pay in the lower tax bracket applying to half of it.

The mature single person would get head-of-household treatment.

The savings, in either case, could be on the order of \$120 at \$7000 income, up to \$280 at \$12,000.

For the rich, the story is different.

There is the advantage of the rate cuts and of a special 50 percent ceiling on the tax rate on earned income, however high, instead of the present 70 percent maximum.

But if, like many of the wealthy, you have been using some of the special advantages of present law, the bill's trimming of these would probably more than offset the rate reductions.

Suppose you have \$50,000 in ordinary taxable income and

\$100,000 in income which under present law is sheltered from taxation. Now you are taxed on \$50,000. If the bill becomes law, you would also be taxed on half the excess of preferred income — or \$75,000 in all.

Or suppose you have a \$100,000 income and good credit. You borrow 1 million dollars and invest it so as to produce no immediate income, but capital gains you will realize later at favorable tax rates. Now you can deduct the \$70,000 interest you pay, leaving you a taxable \$30,000 income. But the bill would allow you to deduct interest in such a case — above \$25,000 — only from investment income. So you would be taxed on \$75,000 instead of \$30,000.

Or, again, you have \$50,000 ordinary income, \$50,000 income on which you owe no taxes. You have deductions of \$40,000. You charge them all off the taxable part of your income, cutting it to \$10,000. No more, the bill says — the deductions must be prorated.

Most of the nearly 400-page bill is made up of tightening provisions. It was passed by the House late last week and is now before the Senate.

Cite Wetlands As Landmark

The Baker University wetlands in Douglas County have been selected for inclusion in the National Registry of Natural Landmarks.

Rep. Larry Winn (R-Ks.) was informed by the Interior Department that its national advisory board had chosen the wetlands and that a certificate and a plaque will be awarded to the university, which owns the land.

Two tracts of virgin wetland prairie, pasture and meadows consist of 572 acres three miles from Lawrence. These are reserved as a source of study for scientists.

LIFT NEBRASKA LICENSES TO \$15.50

It'll cost Nebraska car owners \$15.50 per year to register an automobile, beginning next year. The legislature has just raised the registration from \$9. The state will also start using car license plates for three years, with renewal tabs used for the second and third years. The change in fees will add about \$6 million to state revenues.

'End Direct Payments In 5 Years'

An end to the direct-payment farm program within five years has been called for by the American Farm Bureau Federation.

Charles B. Shuman, organization president, told the House agriculture committee a completely new approach is needed

because the farm program, started in 1965, "is a demonstrated failure."

"Despite the expenditures of billions of dollars, farm problems have not been solved," he said, "and farmers have not achieved a satisfactory level of net farm income."

Shuman, flanked by nine state Farm Bureau presidents, called for a 5 year transition period during which acreage controls, base acreages, marketing quotas, processing taxes and direct payments for wheat, feed grains and cotton would be phased out.

The program, scheduled to expire at the end of 1970, has provided annual payments of more than 3 billion dollars to farmers for controlling production of those crops. It also applies to wool.

The committee is holding hearings on general farm proposals and food stamp issues.

Shuman backed a proposal which, he said, also would:

- Direct retirement of at least 10 million acres per year from 1971 to 1975.

- Provide government price support for wheat, feed grains, cotton and soybeans at not more than 81 percent of the previous 3-year average price beginning with the 1971 crop year.

- Prohibit sale of government stocks for farm commodities at less than 150 percent of the current loan rate plus carrying charges, except when sales are

offset by equivalent purchases in the open market.

- Authorize offering of a special transitional program to any farmer who has had average gross annual sales of farm products of not more than \$5000 and off-farm income of not more than \$2000 a year for husband and wife in the preceding three years.

'Let's Have More Farm Trade,' Says Administration

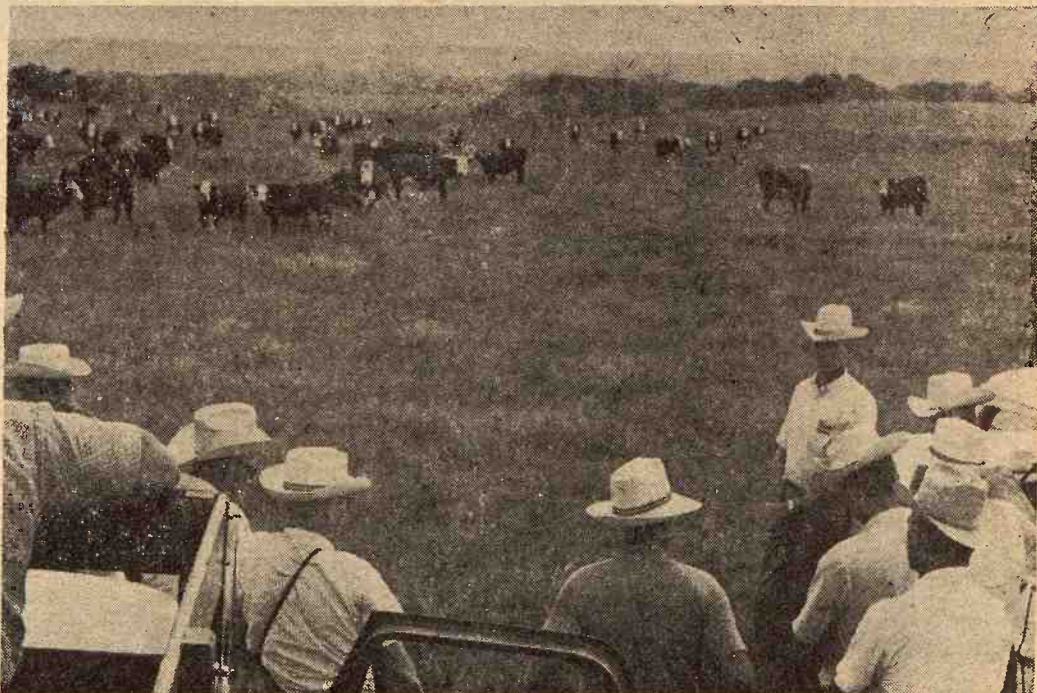
Clifford M. Hardin, secretary of agriculture, said the Nixon administration's farm program would emphasize expanding world markets for American farm products.

The expansion will be sought, he said, in "an atmosphere of freer trade and emphasis on food distribution among the needy."

Hardin told the American Institute of Co-operation, meeting at the University of Illinois, the administration expected to recommend a farm program to Congress next year.

By June 30, he said, the Agriculture department hopes to have "family food-distribution programs in every town in the country."

These would be locally managed, he said.

Remembers Harvest At D-Day

After the 20-mile wide storm that moved across much of what I farm near Salina, the twisted farm buildings and flattened grain reminded me of the harvest in Europe after D-Day of World War II.

I was with the 487th Water Supply Engineers battalion in Company A. We delivered water to the men as they made ready for D Day in England. After standing room was gained in Normandy, we also moved our trucks up the beaches and across to Germany.

Up to St. Lo, much of the

wheat that was left was cut by hand and tied with wheat straw. Later on, near Paris and into Belgium, small binders and even old reapers were used. However, the bundled shocks were left in the fields until after the German army had been pushed out. As we came, the bundles of wheat were gathered into the barns or stacked around the buildings.

Their threshing machines were different than ours. Instead of the wheat straw going in head first, it was fed in by hand cross-wise, so as the straw came out at the rear. It was then rebundled and tied as it had been before it was threshed. One man carried the grain away in sacks.

As Hitler had taken many of the young men and horses, many women used cows to plant and get next year's wheat crop in. There are many things I could point out as how people can do on short supplies and equipment. Some even flayed the wheat out in the winter and used fanning mills to clean the wheat from the chaff.

After the war ended in 1945, A company got back in time so I could help harvest at home again.

Speaking of this year's harvest, I had four combines to harvest over 900 acres. But trying to get the down heads, we scooped up

dirt and rocks along with the 4 foot straw and later the weeds so that it kept me busy putting in bearings and making repairs.

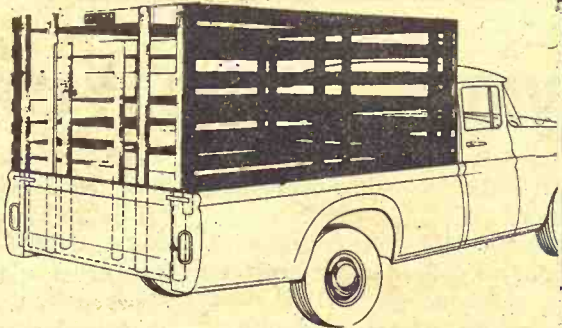

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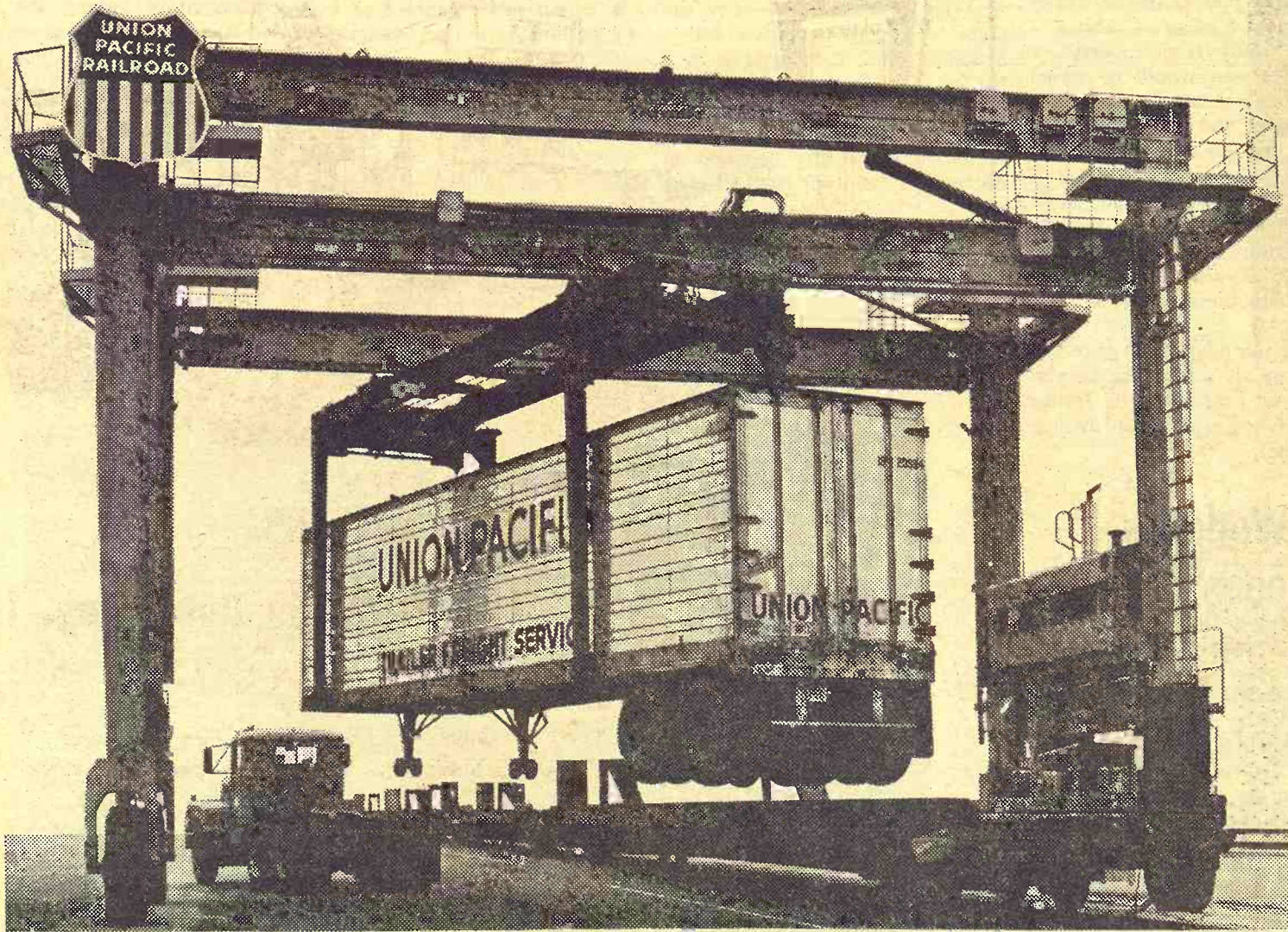
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Management Expert Retires

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COME TO ABILENE

Call Off Wheat War?

Talks among the world's leading wheat exporters ended with agreement to call a temporary halt to indiscriminate price cutting. The big five wheat growers — the United States, Argentina, Canada, Australia and the EEC (European Economic Community) — decided to set up an export group from their selling agencies to work for market stability.

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Junction City, Kans.

This group will meet in London August 11. It will be the first such meeting in the life of the 1967 International Grain Arrangement.

Julius Katz, assistant secretary for economic affairs at the State Department, who led the United States delegation, told reporters the technical group has been given specific instructions on what it must undertake, but he refused to detail them.

The London wheat talks were the sixth in a series of conferences called to cope with the world wheat glut. In the 1968-69 crop year, stocks reached an all time high of 65 million metric tons. The previous high was 63.5 million metric tons in 1960-61.

Against the mounting stocks, sales are expected to drop this year to 45.5 million tons from 51 million tons last year. Three Soviet bumper harvests after seven lean years, and mounting European wheat production encouraged by high internal support prices and export subsidies helped increase stocks.

As a result of this, the 1967 IGA minimum wheat selling prices have been constantly undercut by all members beginning only a month after the agreement began to function in June last year.

Commenting on the outcome of the London talks, Katz told reporters: "The group of technicians won't examine past performance of the five. What we are looking into is the present

market situation, its future and what must be done to bring prices back to the IGA floor.

"There has been no recrimination about the past and in fact there has been no recrimination during the talks here. I can't say we have solved the problem but we have certainly made progress. What has been done here will help but we must not exaggerate the result."

Other conference sources said the present agreement will call a temporary halt in the market-snatching tendencies of some of the five. Prices will not be cut further while the technical group is at work, these sources said.

How long that will hold, however, is problematic, U.S. experts attending the meeting said. The appearance of the Common Market, backed by its huge subsidies, is a factor the world wheat trade has not reckoned with in the past.

State Calls Time On Welfare Budgets

HUTCHINSON — The Reno County board of county commissioners has lost its battle with the Kansas Department of Social Welfare. The county opposed an increase in the 1970 welfare budget.

The state agency has ordered

the commission to increase the budget \$20,000. The commissioners told Marvin Larson, Topeka, state welfare director, they feel the original \$1,875,000 budget "is workable." Larson was told that if a county welfare tax raise was to be made, it would have to come through state action.

Larson, in a letter to the commission, quoted a state statute which requires county welfare budgets to be corrected in accordance with direction of the State Board of Social Welfare.

The board last week reaffirmed a requirement that Reno County add the \$20,000 in local funds and increase the county property tax levy accordingly. The commissioners said this will boost the welfare total over the tax levy.

"The law cited by Larson seems to be specific," said Mrs. Mildred Baughman, county commission chairman. "We have no other choice but to follow the state's directive."

Larson said he insisted that the \$20,000 be added because of a belief that the budget as proposed by the county "may prove to be inadequate."

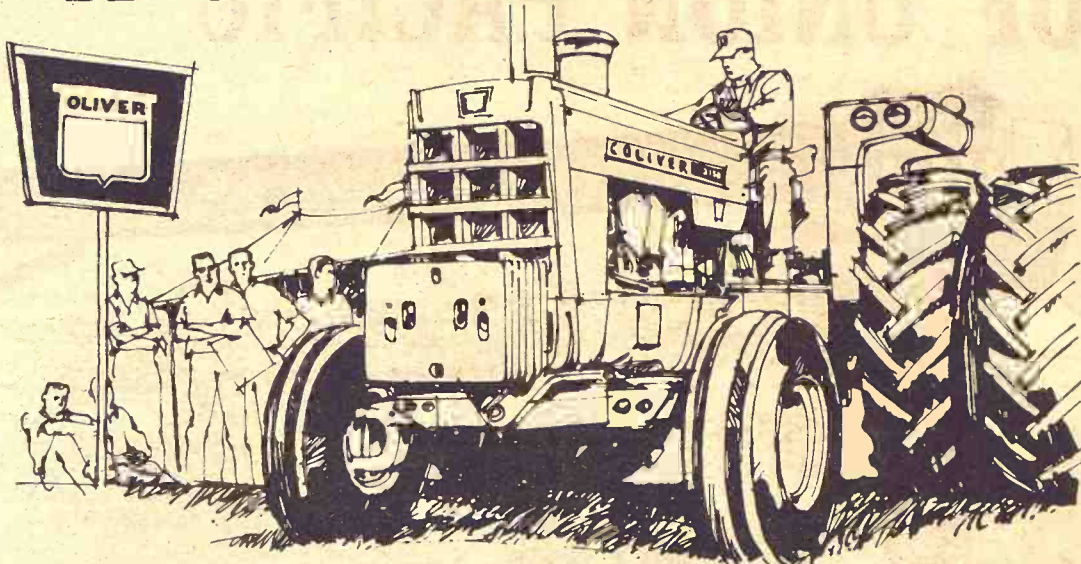

Annette Smith, Bennington, Wins 'Daily Bread' Prize

The winning recipe is from Annette Smith, Bennington:
SPICED PEACH DUMPLINGS

1 can (1 pound 13 ounces) (3½ cups) sliced peaches
¼ cup sugar
2 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1½ cups biscuit mix
½ cup brown sugar
½ teaspoon nutmeg
¼ teaspoon cinnamon
Pinch of ginger
½ cup milk
2 tablespoons cooking oil
2 tablespoons chopped nuts

In large saucepan, combine peaches, white sugar, butter and lemon juice. Heat to boiling. Meanwhile, stir together biscuit mix, brown sugar, nutmeg and cinnamon. Combine milk and cooking oil and add to dry ingredients; mix well. Drop dough by rounded tablespoons onto hot peaches in saucepan. Sprinkle with chopped nuts. Cover; cook over low heat for 15 minutes. Serves six to eight. "This is good served warm or cold with or without whipped cream."

other meats, too."

HAMBURGER RELISH
4 quarts large cucumbers
2 quarts onions
Remove seed from cucumbers
and grind both cucumbers and

onions. Mix 5 tablespoons salt
with mixture. Let set two hours
then squeeze dry. Make syrup
from the following:

6 cups sugar
6 cups vinegar
2 tablespoons turmeric
1½ teaspoons celery seed
2 teaspoons mustard seed
¾ teaspoon ground cloves
½ cup mixed spices tied in bag
Boil syrup five minutes then
add pickle mixture and cook five
minutes more. Can in sterilized
jars.

PEACH PEEK A BOOS
1 pound margarine
2 8-ounce packages cream
cheese
3½ cups flour
6 large fresh ripe peaches
Beat together flour, cream
cheese and butter in large bowl.
Chill in refrigerator overnight.
Next day roll dough to ¼-inch
thickness into 2½ or 3-inch
squares. On each square put ½
teaspoon very fine chopped, sug-
ared peaches. Bring two opposite
corners together over filling and
pinch to seal. Bake in 375-degree
oven on ungreased cookie sheet.

CRYSTAL PICKLES
25 dill size cucumbers. Put in
brine of 1 gallon water to 1 quart
salt for two weeks. You may add
cucumbers as gathered and start
counting time when you have 25.
Wash, drain and cut into slices.
If too salty, soak in clear water.
Cover with cold water in which
you have dissolved 2 heaping ta-
blespoons alum to 1 gallon wa-
ter and soak 24 hours. Drain.
Wash several times to make sure
alum is washed away. Make a
syrup of:

1 quart vinegar
2 quarts sugar
1 tablespoon mixed spices to
each quart vinegar (Put
spices in a bag)
Bring to good boil and pour over
pickles in stone jar. Let stand
four days and seal in sterilized
quart jars.

PEACH CAKE
1 cup peaches (cooked and
mashed into pulp)
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
½ cup shortening or oil
1 tablespoon lemon juice
½ teaspoon lemon rind
2 cups flour
½ teaspoon salt
½ teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon baking powder
¼ teaspoon nutmeg
½ cup chopped pecans or other
nuts

Beat eggs with sugar until
thick. Add peaches, lemon juice
and rind and beat with electric
mixer. Add softened fat. Fold in
the dry ingredients which have
been sifted together. Add nuts.
Bake for 45 minutes at 350 de-
grees in buttered and floured flat
pan. Cake may be frosted.

To Whiten Sweater

If your white wool sweater
has turned yellow because of
inefficient washing, it may
brighten up from a soaking in
a mixture of two tablespoons
of hydrogen peroxide to a gal-
lon of cool water. Soak for one-
half hour at least and then
rinse thoroughly in cool water.

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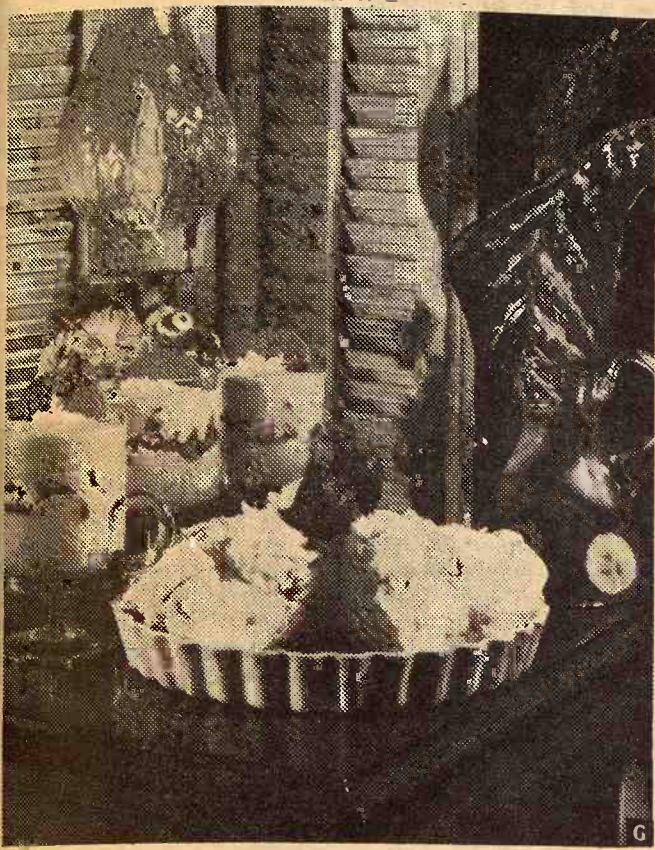


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Easy Summer Desserts Made With Cookies



Open two packages of cookies; combine with other instant and produce this pair of summer desserts.

The first package, Apple Strudel Cookies, forms the bottom crust for vanilla ice cream pie which is served with a fruit sauce. The second package, Old Fashion Ginger Snaps is layered, parfait style, with instant butterscotch pudding enriched with cream.

COOKIE ICE CREAM PIE
Break 18 Apple Strudel Cookies into small pieces and spread evenly on bottom of an 8-inch round cake or quiche pan. Pack 1 quart softened vanilla ice cream on top. Freeze. In a small saucepan, blend 4 teaspoons cornstarch and 1 cup orange juice. Cook until thickened; add 1 (10-ounce) package frozen strawberry halves, thawed. Cool. Stir in 1 medium sliced ripe banana and 1 cup fresh blueberries. Serve over ice cream topped cookies. Makes eight (3-inch) wedges.

GINGER PARFAIT
Prepare 1 (3 3/4-ounce) package

butterscotch instant pudding according to package directions using 1 1/2 cups milk. Beat in 1/2 cup dairy sour cream; chill. Break 18 Old Fashion Ginger Snaps into small pieces and combine with 6 tablespoons flaked coconut. Layer pudding with crumb mixture in 6 parfait glasses. Garnish each with a whole cookie and coconut. Makes six (1 cup) servings.

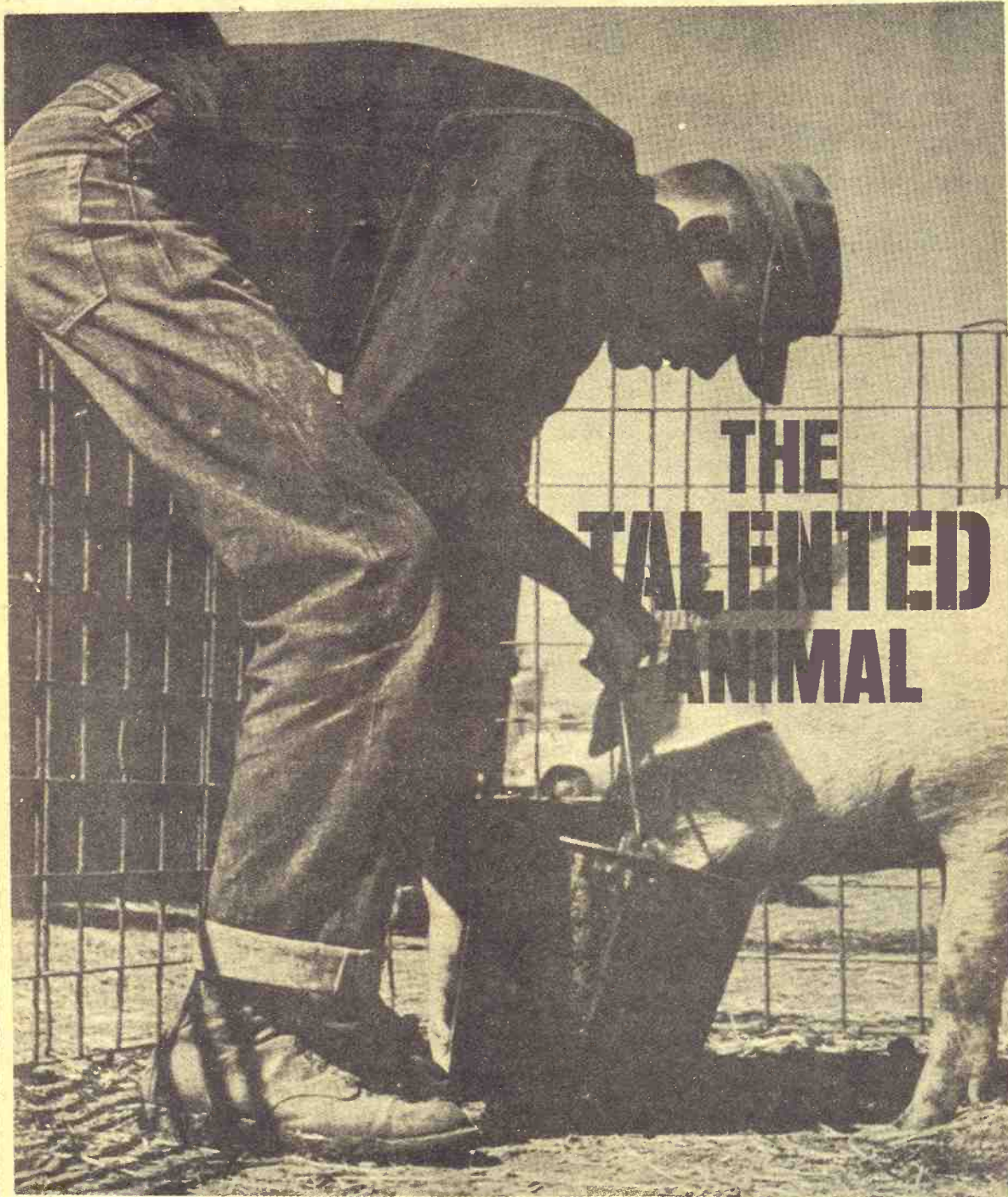

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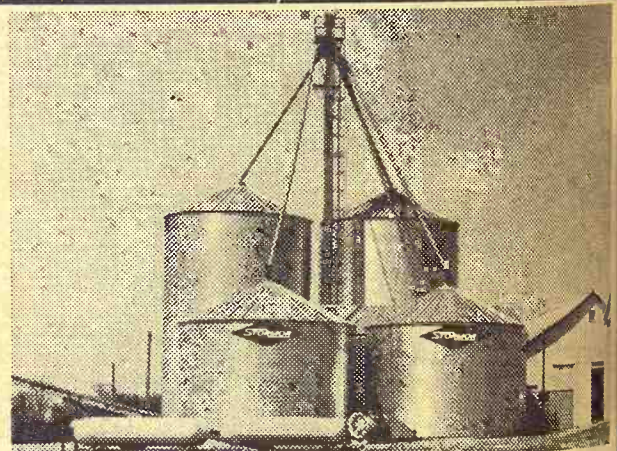

Cheer In Report On Corn Stocks

The USDA report of stock of grains on hand July 1 provides important new information for all grain producers. For example, analysis of the report indicates that the corn situation may not be so tight as was thought earlier.

The report itself lists only stocks on hand July 1, but by using these amounts we can estimate other useful figures such as amounts of "free" grain and rates of use of corn for feeding.

Less corn on hand. Stocks of corn on hand July 1 totaled 2,053 million bushels, 6 percent less than year earlier. Other official reports show that about 909 million bushels were under price support in one way

or another. This left about 1,144 bushels of "free" corn. The "free" supply was about 27 percent less than one year earlier.

We estimate needs for corn during this last quarter of the marketing year at around 1,050 million bushels. Some additional supplies, perhaps around 200 million bushels, will be needed for working stocks. Thus total requirements for "free" corn may be 1,200 to 1,300 million bushels. Since this amount exceeds the apparent free supply on July 1, some more corn will be withdrawn from price support.

Prices up. This does not necessarily mean that prices will go up, since they already are high enough

to make it profitable for farmers in some areas to sell corn under loan and resale programs.

Future price changes will depend mostly upon new crop developments. Production seems quite likely to fall short of needs during the next marketing year. With average weather the 1969 crop may make 4.2 to 4.3 billion bushels. Needs for domestic use and exports could be around 4.6 billion. The difference would have to be obtained from corn that will be under the resale program or owned by the CCC. Thus, the rate of sales by farmers probably will largely determine the seasonal trend of corn prices during the next marketing year.

More soybeans left. Stocks of soybeans left on hand July 1 were estimated at 448 million bushels, 57 percent more than a year earlier. Of this total about 365 million bushels were under price support or in CCC stocks. The difference between these figures, about 83 million bushels, is the "free" supply. This amount may be only half enough to meet needs of processors and exporters until the new crop becomes available. Hence, some more beans will have to be drawn from stocks now under loan.

New crop may be smaller. We would guess that the new crop may be no more than about 1,000 million bushels, compared with 1,080 million last year. A crop of one billion bushels might just about be enough to meet the requirements of processors and exporters during the coming year.

In that case prices might hold above the loan level, except possibly for a short time during harvest. The upper limit might be the minimum price at which the CCC would sell beans. This is the loan rate (\$2.25 national average) plus 15 percent and carrying charges of 1½ cents per month beginning with October. These prices would apply, for example, at Chicago.

gressional subcommittee that bigger trucks would be easier on bridges and highways than those now in use. Some members dissent vigorously.

The truckers are pushing a House bill that would permit wider, heavier and longer trucks on the interstate system.

The truckers have tried to prove that the bill would result in safer trucks because their larger size would permit improved safety features and make driving of them easier.

They offered the theory that less damage would be caused to bridges and highways by bigger trucks because the weight distribution would be more favorable.

What the bill would permit, essentially, is wider use of the double trailer units that some people call "truck trains."

The bill would impose for the first time a length limit of 70 feet on trucks using the interstate system. There is no federal limit now.

Most states, however, have length limits of less than 70 feet. Only three states have a limit of 70 feet with the rest running 65 to 55.

Other provisions of the measure would raise single-axle weight limits from 18,000 to 20,000 pounds, tandem-axle weights from 32,000 to 34,000

pounds and permit widening of trucks and busses from 96 to 102 inches.

A special formula in the bill would permit raising the gross weight limit from 73,280 pounds to a maximum of 108,000 pounds on a 70-foot, 9 axle truck.

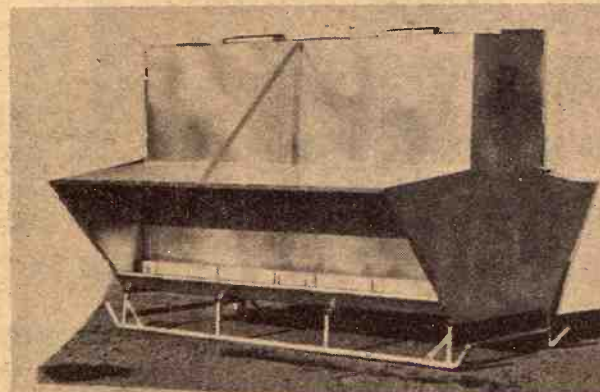
Bus company executives said they need the extra width to widen seats and increase passenger comfort.

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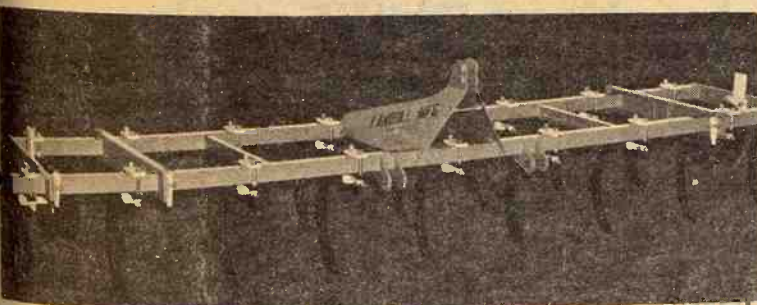
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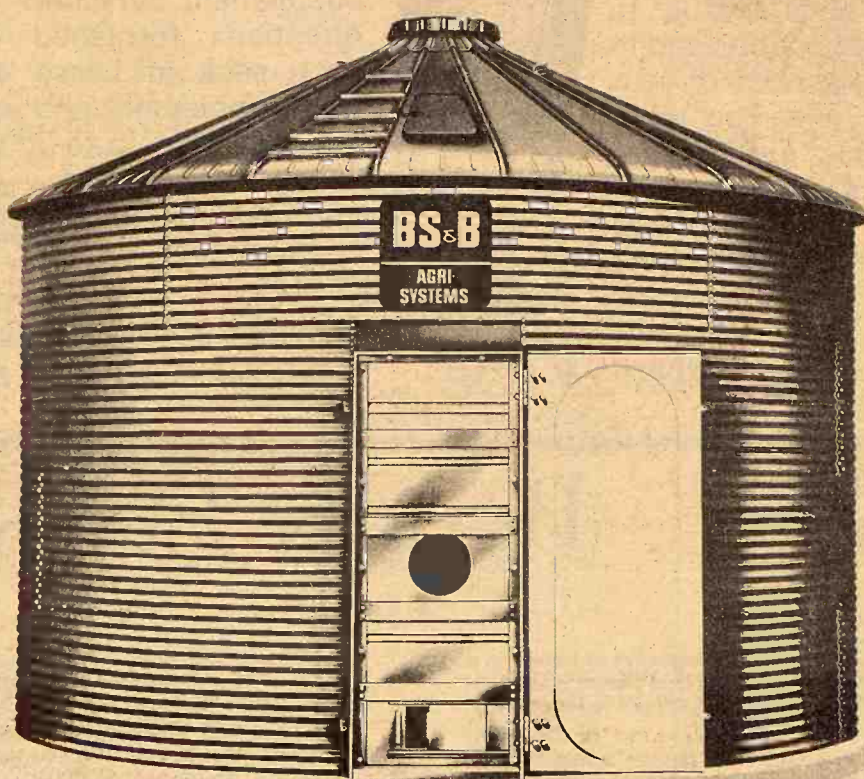

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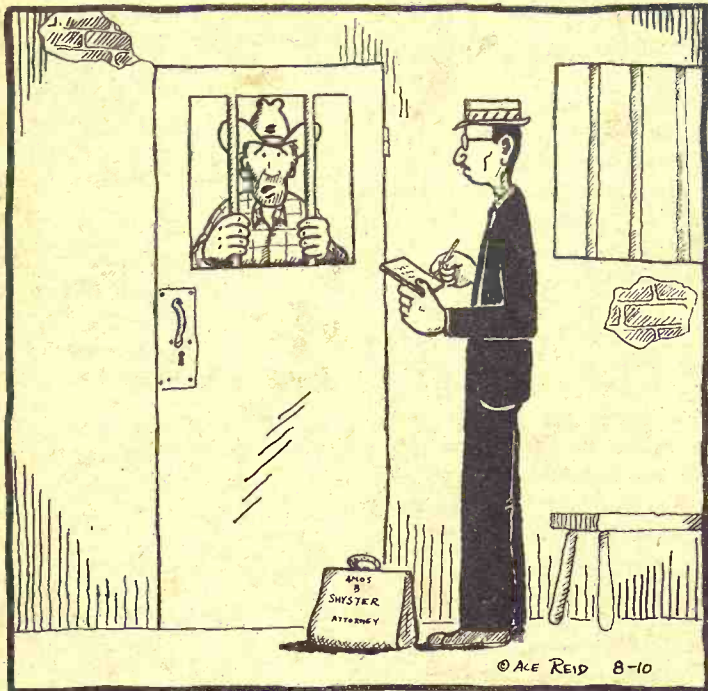

Livestock Gains Marking Farm Income Figures

Soaring retail meat prices have crimped family budgets but are boosting farm income prospects to one of the highest levels on record.

The Agriculture Department reports that farmers sold a record \$19.9 billion worth of products during the first half of 1969, about \$1.6 billion more than they took in a year earlier.

CONSERVATION FIELD NOTES STATE DEATHS

Recent deaths of four men active in Kansas conservation have been noted by the Kansas Association of Soil Conservation Districts. One of the deceased is Raymond Schemm, former president of KACD, who died in early July at the age of 50 in Lyon county. Other county board members who have died recently are Robert Evans, Wellington; Preston Dubach, Doniphan county; and Louis Boyd, Pawnee county.

Most of the gain — \$1 billion — came as a result of higher prices for cattle and hogs, although farm output increased only slightly.

At this pace, net farm income this year would be \$15.6 billion, the most since 1966 and the second highest since \$15.9 billion in 1948, officials said.

The rosy outlook for farm income has been signaled for months by spiraling consumer food prices, particularly for meat.

Costs of living jumped six-tenths of one percent in June, led by a 4.5 percent gain in the retail price of meats, poultry and fish.

Hamburger, which cost 57 cents a pound last December, averaged 64 cents in June. Choice sirloin priced at \$1.20 a pound six months earlier averaged \$1.40. Chuck roast jumped from 64 cents to 74 cents a pound.

And during the same period cattle and hog prices at the farm level averaged 13 and 11 percent higher, respectively, than a year earlier.

Economists said in the \$1.6 billion increase in farm sales during the first half, cattle ac-

counted for \$750 million and hogs \$250 million.

At the same time, total output of the two major meat animals rose only one percent, the report said.

Some authorities say the percent increase was not enough to keep pace with growing summer demand without the higher retail prices.

Per capita beef consumption last year was 110 pounds, compared with 85 in 1960.

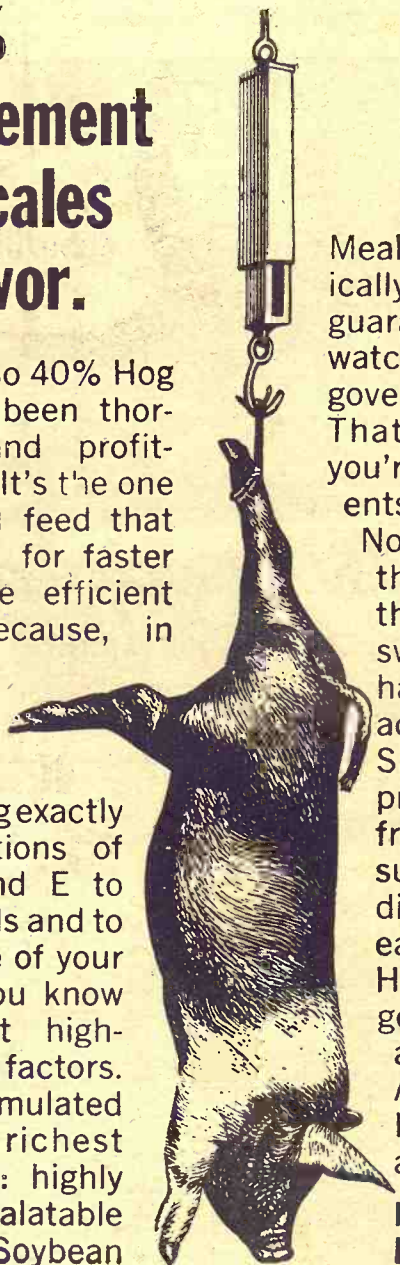

Nothing Bigger Than A C-Note

From here on-out, the Treasury Department says, the money game will be played with smaller chips.

Issuance of \$500, \$1000, \$5000 and \$10,000 bills has ceased. Moreover, any such bills that wend their way to the Federal Reserve banks will meet a sad end: they will be turned over to the Treasury for destruction.

The largest bill in circulation will be the \$100 denomination.

The Treasury move won't touch the life of the average citizen. Nor will it brake the wheels of commerce. An officer of a Federal Reserve bank said most requests for large denomination bills came from firms to pay top executives year-end bonuses.

The decision against issuing any more high-denomination bills saddened hardly anyone except possibly gamblers, a government spokesman said, adding that he

suspects the gamblers were probably giving the large bills the most play. They are easier to carry than a wad of tens or twenties and can be exchanged as winnings without written records — such as checks — that can be traced by the Internal Revenue Service.

Such bills enjoyed added popularity during World War II among black marketeers who, like many gamblers, shunned any written reports of their transactions.

The \$10,000 bill isn't the largest currency denomination ever issued by the Treasury department — there are 12 known bills in existence with a face value of \$100,000. One is at the Kansas City Federal Reserve. They are, however, gold certificates and not negotiable.

President Woodrow Wilson's portrait embellishes the \$100,000 certificate, Salmon P. Chase's the \$10,000 bill, President James Madison the \$5000, President Grover Cleveland the \$1000, and President William McKinley the \$500. Alexander Hamilton's portrait was on the older, larger

\$10,000 bills called out of circulation June 3, 1929.

Salmon P. Chase was secretary of the Treasury under Abraham Lincoln. Together they put together the Currency Act of 1863 which, among other things, established a national currency, and state and national banks to handle it. This helped, since at the time there were 10,000 varieties of currencies — not counting counterfeit money — in circulation. The federal government supplied only gold and silver money.

The big bills haven't been printed since 1946. They were authorized primarily for inter-bank dealings. Today there are 780,000 high-denomination Federal Reserve notes, worth about 543 million dollars, circulating outside the Federal Reserve System. A breakdown shows 488,295 \$500 bills, 291,894 \$1000 bills, 634 \$5000 bills, and 383 \$10,000 notes.

That hardly seems a lucrative effort, and it wasn't until this summer — when Reynolds Metals Co. decided to pay half a cent for each used aluminum can turned in to the company in the Los Angeles and Miami areas.

"We're trying to point out that aluminum is too valuable to be left lying by the roadside," says David P. Reynolds, the company's executive vice president.

Also too risky. What Reynolds is also trying to do is reverse a growing aluminum litter problem before irate state legislators reverse it for the company by legislating the aluminum can out of existence. Some 54 bills to restrict or ban nonreturnable con-

tainers were proposed in 25 states last year. Several of them specifically singled out the aluminum can. None of the bills was voted into law, but just the threat has launched Reynolds' public relations campaign and caused nervousness throughout the industry.

Reynolds restricts the cash-to-individuals policy to the Los Angeles area. In Miami, it pays Goodwill Industries for cans donated by collectors. About one-third of the four billion cans produced yearly end up in those two areas. It says there aren't enough aluminum throwaways elsewhere to make the program pay for itself in scrap value.

For collectors in other parts of the country, the company's ads point out that any scrap dealer will pay \$200 for a ton — that's 40,000 cans — of scrap aluminum. The ads encourage community organizations to sponsor can collecting drives to earn money "for worthwhile causes."

There's no doubt the sudden proliferation of aluminum cans — which were hardly in existence five years ago — has added to the nation's litter. As the top aluminum can producer, Reynolds is a prime contributor. The trouble is, aluminum companies say, their product is just too good. It doesn't rust or rot away like a tin can. It just lies there

on the roadside or beach or park — bright, shiny and visible for years.

The Los Angeles Boy Scouts, for one, have leaped to the Reynolds offer with capitalistic fervor. In one week alone, they turned in 48,640 cans to the company's reclamation center and pocketed \$243.20. Non-Scouts added 22,860 cans, for which they were paid \$114.30. But that's hardly a dent in the 60 million aluminum cans used by Southern Californians each month. If Scouts could round up just 1% of that total, or 600,000 cans, they could earn \$3000 a month, a visionary Reynolds spokesman says.

The Reynolds promotion has generated enthusiastic response. The first week its ads ran, the company got 400 letters from readers offering to turn in used cans. One elderly lady from Wisconsin informed Reynolds she drinks three cans of beer a day to induce the burping she believes is good for her health, and offering to give her empties to charity.

But the antilitter drive isn't without problems. Most people can't tell an aluminum can from a tin can. (Tin cans have side-seams and raised rims. Aluminum cans have no seams and rimless bottoms.) Three Midwestern boys wrote Reynolds that its ad inspired them to collect cans day and night — cans that turned out to be tin, worth nothing to scrap dealers.

Beet Growers Optimistic

GOODLAND — A better than average sugar beet crop is expected in Western Kansas this year, with record yields forecast for some sections of the growing areas of Northwest and Southwest Kansas.

Lamar Henry, agriculture production manager for Great Western Sugar Company's Frank A. Kemp factory west of Goodland, said many fields will produce 25 to 26 tons of beets to the acre.

Henry said "plenty of rain" and an unusual lack of weeds aided good growth by mid-July.

Advent of mechanical thinners has helped farmers to handle more beets. There are about 26,000 acres of beets in the Northwest Kansas counties. In the Garden City area of southwest Kansas 23,000 acres were planted to beets this year, a record planting. Forecast there is 17 tons an acre, 1½ tons above the average yield.

Prices at \$16 a ton, less 90 cents a ton freight, are forecast for

the Northwest Kansas crop.

Use of herbicides has required fewer hoeings than usual. Mechanical thinners are also helping beet growers, Henry said.

In going through the beet fields last week, Henry said, many roots were weighing around 5 ounces each with the tops weighing 11 or 12 ounces. This indicates a crop of at least 20 tons to the acre, he said.

The extra plantings mean the Kemp factory probably will handle about 500,000 tons this winter, as compared with 350,000 tons last year.

Beet dumps will open about October 1 in the Kemp factory area, Henry said, and slicing will continue until about March 1.

New truck dumps are being readied at the factory to enlarge its capacity to unload and handle the crop as harvest gets under way.

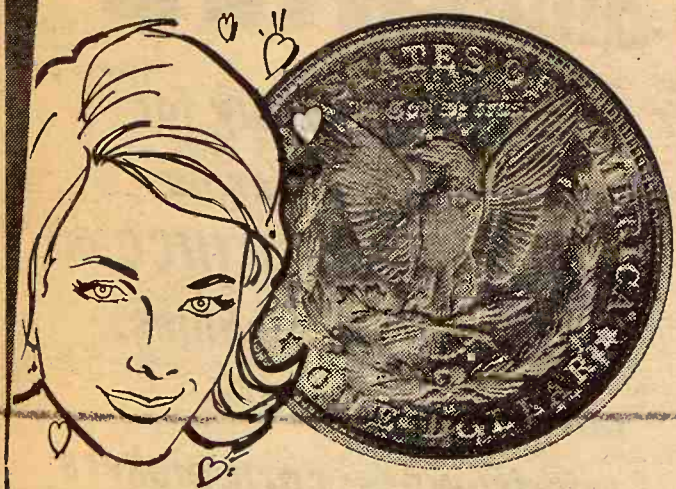

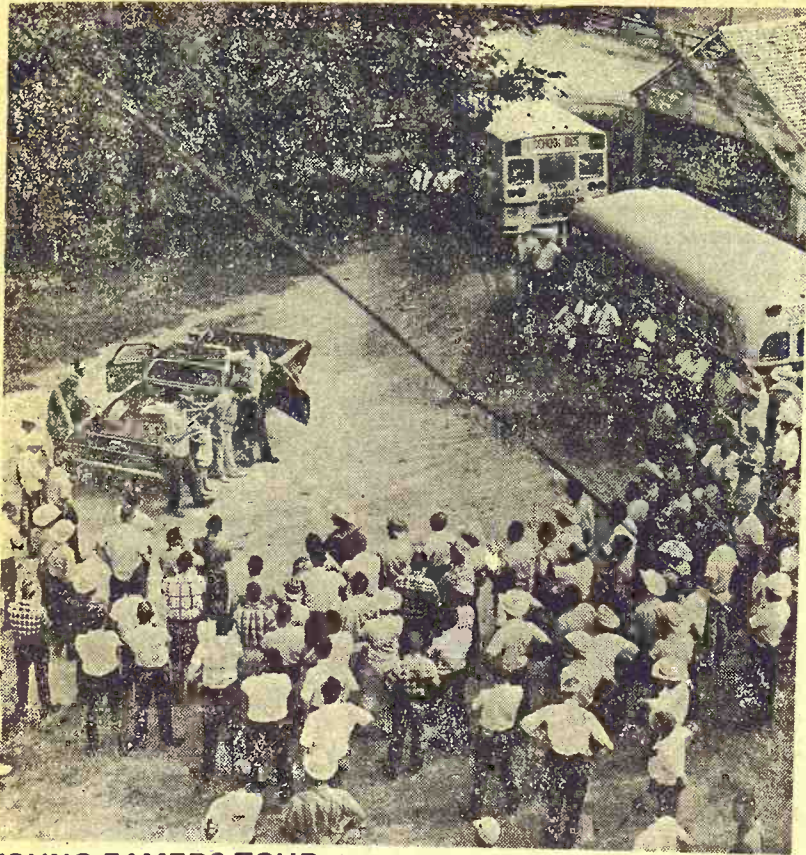

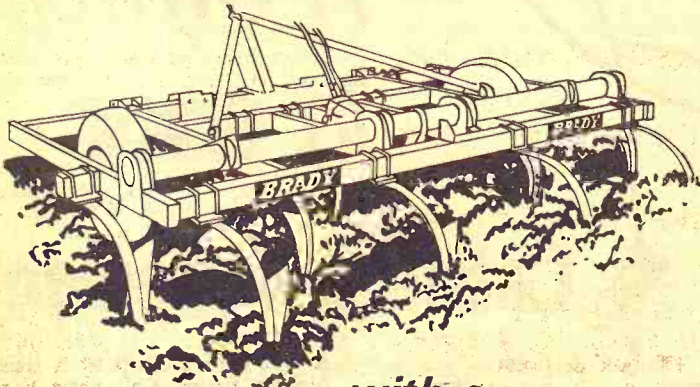

400 At Eastern Management Field Day

BURLINGTON — Some 400 farmers and agri-businessmen visited two modern farms in Anderson and Coffey counties August 5 during the first of two Kansas farm management field days.

The annual event is sponsored by the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce of Greater Kansas City.

Guests had their choice of seeing the David Hirt farm 13 miles west of Garnett or the Herbert Niles place 20 miles north of Burlington. Both farms are enrolled in the Farm Management Association program sponsored by K-State.

Hirt is proof that a young man still can make it in farming. The 26-year-old operator has built a sizeable swine operation since he purchased the farm only five years ago.

He has held expenses in check by converting old farm buildings into a farrowing house, finishing house and two nurseries. Manure is caught in a pit under each building and is pumped into a honey wagon for disposal on his fields.

His feed handling and processing unit is as modern as any to be found. He feeds a mixture of $\frac{3}{4}$ corn, $\frac{1}{4}$ milo plus concentrate. Feed is augered directly from the processing unit to the feeders.

Hirt has 100 acres in corn, 100 in beans, 60 in milo plus a little wheat and alfalfa. Doing custom harvesting for neighbors enables him to justify owning a combine.

Feeding high moisture grain has paid off on the Herbert Niles farm. He handles about 2800 acres of cropland and feeds out 525 steers under the deferred system.

Niles stores high moisture grain in two upright silos. He harvests milo at about 25 percent moisture. The grain is rolled and water is added as the milo is blown into the silos, bringing the moisture up to around 30 percent.

Alfalfa haylage, ensiled at about 50 percent moisture, goes into one silo in the spring after the milo has been fed.

Niles handles high quality steers, marketing on a grade and yield basis. More than 80 per-

cent of his steers graded choice to prime the last time he sold.

Soybeans, milo, corn, silage alfalfa and wheat are his main crops.

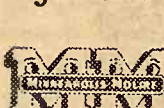

TRACTOR - PULLING CONTEST Blue Rapids

Sponsored by Waterville Young Farmers, Thurs., August 21

1. Contest is open to all Agricultural Farm Tractors equipped with rubber tires.
2. Tractors must be farmer owned.
3. (a) Tractors under 6,500 lbs. will pull in T-1. Tractor pulling greatest percentage of its own weight will be the winner.
(b) Tractors 6,500 lbs. and under 9,000 lbs. will pull in T-2. Tractor pulling the greatest percentage of its own weight will be the winner.
(c) Tractors 9,000 lbs. and over will pull in T-3. Tractor pulling greatest percentage of its own weight will be the winner.
(d) T-4 Exhibit Class—Any farm tractor of any weight may enter. Any special equipment such as duals, locks, 4-wheel drive, etc. can be used in this class. Gear and RPM change allowed as long as tractor does not stop after pull is started. Tractor pulling greatest percentage of its weight will be the winner.
4. Weight includes driver. No weight changes, weight shifting or driver changes after weigh-in. All weights must be bolted or otherwise fastened securely to the tractor chassis.
5. Weigh-in time will be at 10:30 a.m., Thursday, Aug. 21. Meet at the fairgrounds. Contest will start at 12:30 p.m.
6. No dual wheels permitted except in exhibit class.
7. All rear tires must be inflated to 14 pounds or more.
8. Maximum drawbar height is 16 inches from the ground, unless it is the standard tractor drawbar. Drawbar must be locked. The tractor must pull on a standard length drawbar that is 14 inches from the end of the PTO to hole in the drawbar.
9. Driver may pull in any gear but cannot change gears after pull has started except in the exhibit class. There can be no mechanical change in engine RPM except in exhibit class.
10. Pull is ended when tractor engine stalls or forward motion stops.
11. Drive will be stopped if front wheels leave the ground or if the tractor leaves its assigned track.
12. Driver will be stopped by the judges when in their opinion the rear tires are causing excessive damage to the track.
13. All decisions of the judges will be final.
14. Judges have the right to stop a contestant, if in their opinion, his tractor is being operated in an unsafe manner. The Waterville Young Farmers will not be responsible for any accidents.
15. Minors must have a written consent of parents or guardians to enter the contest.
16. An entry fee of \$2.50 will be charged for each pull by a tractor. Any entry can have repulls for \$2.50 each if not satisfied with first pull. The final pull only will be considered.
17. In case of tie, a free second pull will be given.

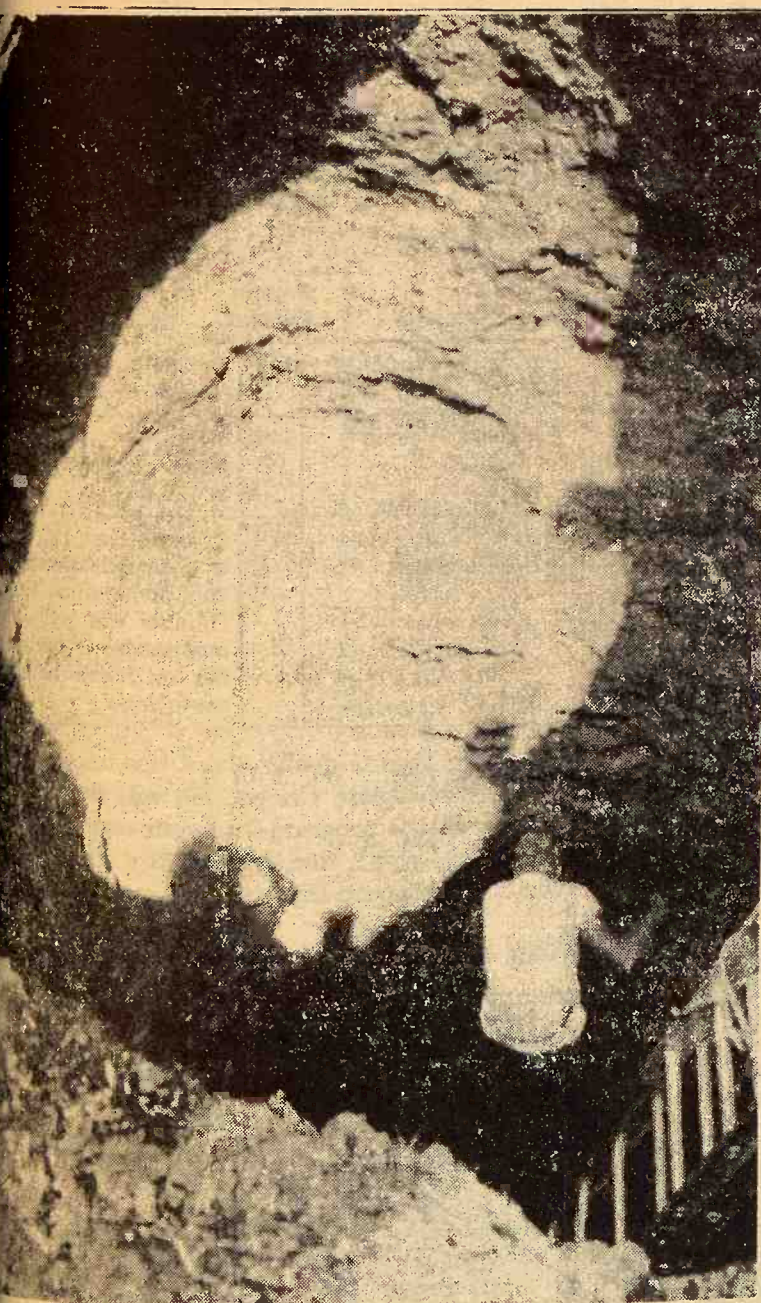

Auto Costs Almost Sure To Rise

The 1970 car models will hardly have gone on display before the cost of building autos takes three more fast jumps.

Industry sources who decline to be named view a price increase as "inevitable, with some forecasting \$100 to \$150 as the range.

The industry got the news July 30 that prices would be \$6 to \$8 a ton higher for most of the steel products it uses.

Next comes a series of hikes in labor costs.

Under current contracts with the United Auto Workers Union, a new fringe benefit is effective October 1 for hourly rated workers at General Motors, Ford and Chrysler: The companies assume the cost of prescription drugs and refills beyond a charge of \$2 each.

This new fringe benefit, estimated to cost a cent and a half hourly per worker, goes on top of a company-paid hospital-medical-surgical insurance plan good for up to 365 days of semi-private accommodations for an employee and his dependents.

A cost of living escalator, on which wages rise or descend with the index of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, will add nine cents an hour on Oct. 27.

On Nov. 24 an automatic so-

called annual improvement factor increase of three per cent takes effect.

The current hourly straight-time wage in Big Three factories is \$3.83.

With the nine-cent cost of living increase and the three per cent annual improvement factor the straight-time hourly wage will go to \$4.04 for the final year of current three-year contracts.

Contracts, negotiated in 1967, run out together on Sept. 14, 1970, for Chrysler Corp., Ford Motor Co., and General Motor Corp. Bargaining on new ones will begin next summer.

Some hint of what may be in the wind could show up later this month when the UAW and American Motors Corp. open negotiations to replace a two-year pact expiring Oct. 16.

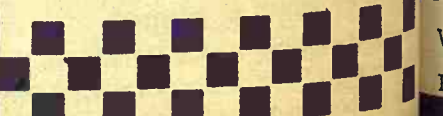

Assn., said in Los Angeles that persons in some states who want to buy homes may soon wind up with no source of mortgage funds unless a few laws are changed.

House financing activity in Maryland "shut down" several months ago when interest rates on government-backed mortgages crept above that state's 8 percent usury-law ceiling, she said.

Several other states — includ-

ing Missouri, Indiana and Ohio — "could drop out of the picture soon" if mortgage rates rise a bit further, Miss Legg said.

Upward pressure on interest rates may ease soon, but FNMA president Raymond H. Lapin has taken the usury-law problem to Congress in an effort to avoid regional chaos in the housing market, she added. Last week Lapin told a House housing subcommittee that laws should be

enacted to exempt government-insured mortgages from the state interest ceilings.

Impelled upward by a nationwide dearth of loan funds, interest rates on FHA and VA home loans recently have been right on the 7½ percent legal ceiling for those government-backed loans.

In addition, lending institutions are charging one-time fees or "points" of 5½ to 6 percent on the government mortgages.

Spread across the life of the loans, the "point" charges raise homeowners' net interest costs to the neighborhood of 9 percent nationally on FHA and VA loans.

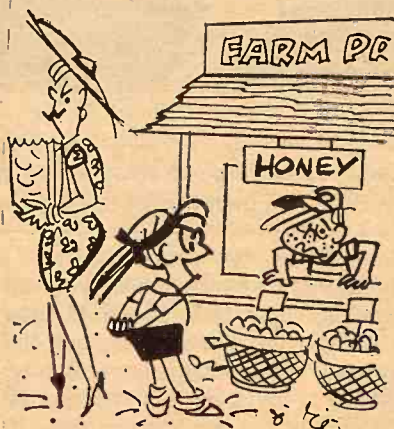
The stated rate for the government-backed loans is 7½ percent, and with the added points the Kansas rate comes to about 8½ percent, McBride said.

"With the ceiling at 10 percent it looks like Kansans are safe for awhile," he said.

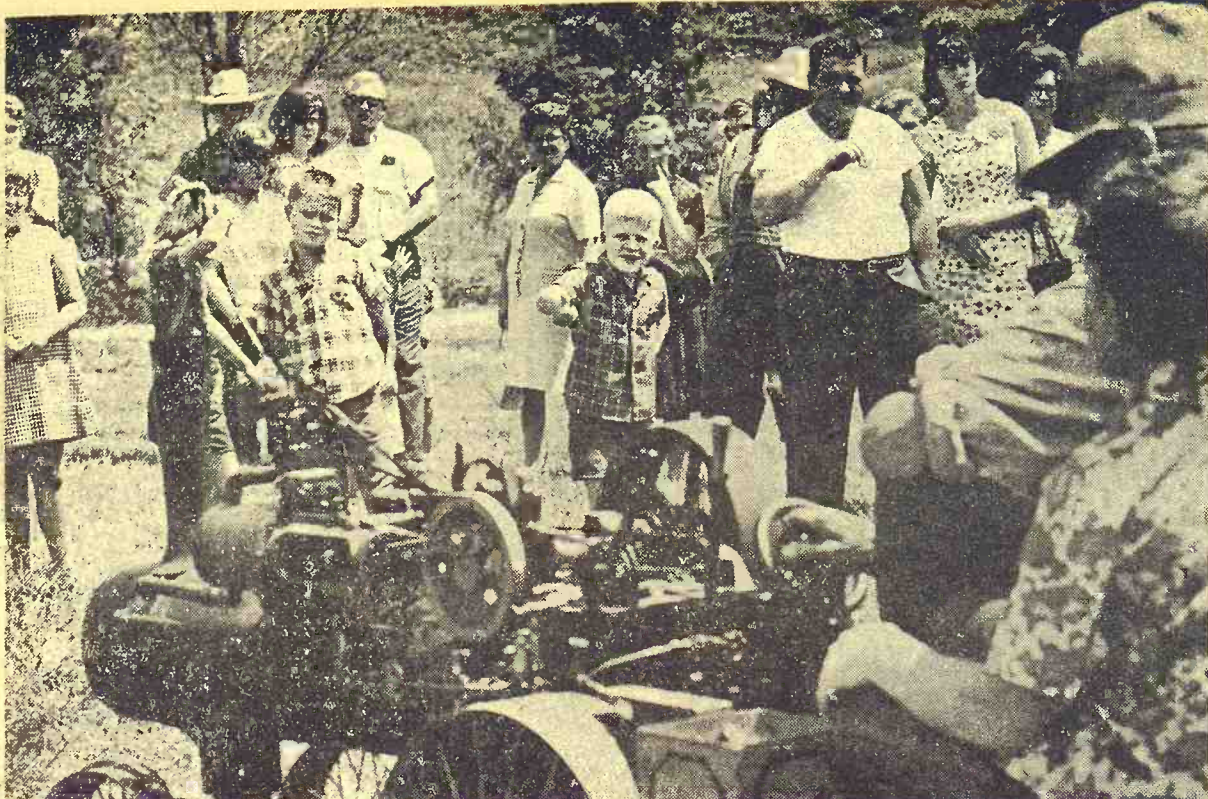

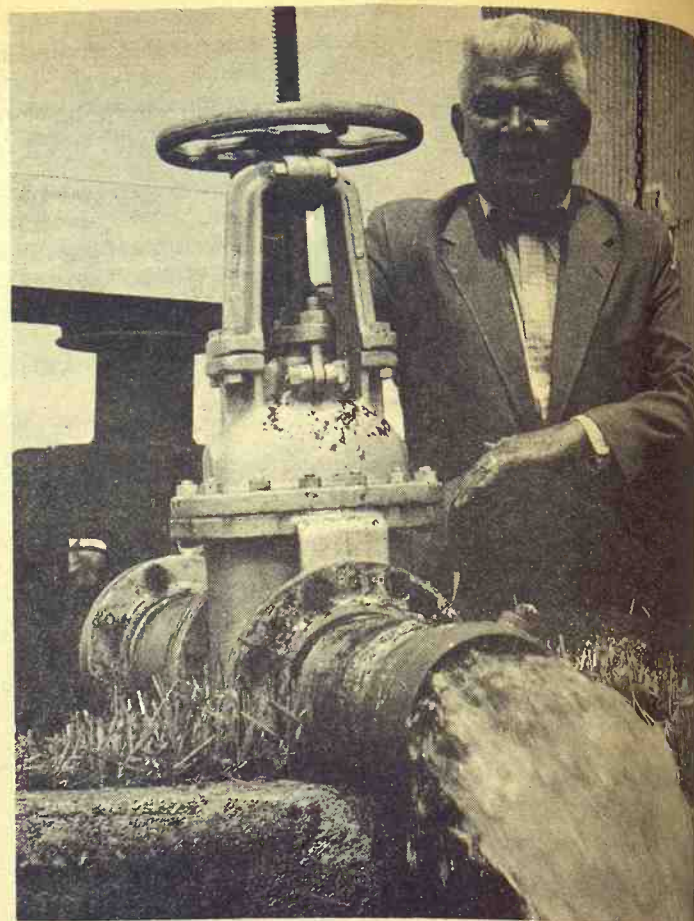

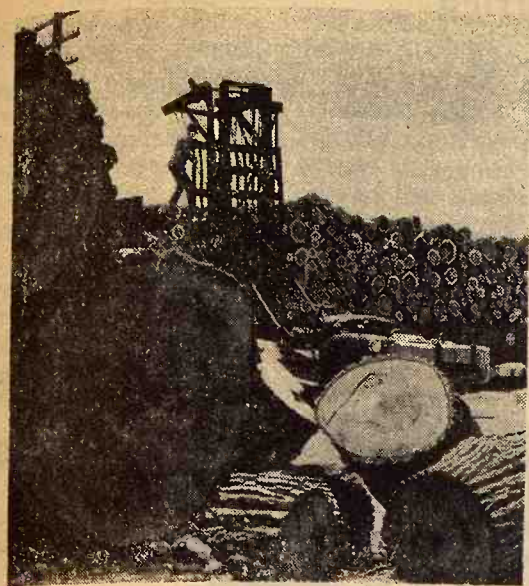

COTTONWOOD HARVEST

Near Hazleton, Kansas, big cottonwoods are being harvested for use by a Houston paper pulp mill. Albert Deviney, a native of Oklahoma who has been logging 14 years in the Midwest, said his operations have been concentrated on the region around Hazleton for about three months. Much of his operations are in the Medicine River valley, where there is an abundance of cottonwoods in the lowlands.

USDA Sees Continued Beef Demand

The Agriculture Department says the higher livestock prices in the first half of 1969 were due largely to rising consumer incomes, a high employment rate, and inflationary pressures.

"Continued strong consumer demand for meat is likely the rest of 1969," the Department said.

Livestock prices this summer and fall are expected to remain below early-summer highs but above a year earlier.

Slightly larger red meat supplies this July-December are expected, with increases in beef output more than offsetting declines in pork, veal and lamb.

Although fed cattle marketings were up only 3 per cent during April, May and June, consumer demand and lower pork output helped push fed cattle prices in June to \$34.25 a hundred pounds. This is \$5 higher than in January and more than \$7 above a year earlier.

Fed cattle prices dropped sharply in July and they are expected to continue in the lower range this summer as marketings increase. Prices in late July averaged about \$30.

gress made since the beginning of the past decade when net farm income was around 11 billion a year."

Only Some Steel Prices Rolled Back

U.S. Steel Corp. has rolled back part of its broad-based price increase, but the big steelmaker held fast to higher rates that have now been matched by virtually all major producers on materials used in the auto and appliance industries.

The company, which triggered the current round of price increases, lowered posted hikes on galvanized and aluminum coated sheets from \$9.50 to \$4.50 a ton. The move was attributed to a failure by other producers to adopt the \$9.50 increase.

Major producers followed U.S. Steel's average 4.8 percent increase. But they settled for a \$4.50 a ton increase on the galvanized items, which account for about five percent of the industry's shipments.

FU Plug For Farm Law

A 5-billion dollar annual loss in net farm income could result if Congress fails to extend the 1965 farm law, the National Farmers Union said.

However, in making the statement to the House agriculture committee, Tony T. Dechant, N.F.U. president, acknowledged that the law's extension wouldn't solve all problems of agriculture.

The panel has been holding a series of hearings on the general farm program, started by Congress in 1965 and now set to expire at the end of 1970.

It has made possible annual payments of more than 3 billion dollars to farm operators to control production of wheat, feed grains and cotton.

Dechant, appearing with 12 state N.F.U. officials, argued that the 5 billion net farm income annual loss would reverse "the pro-

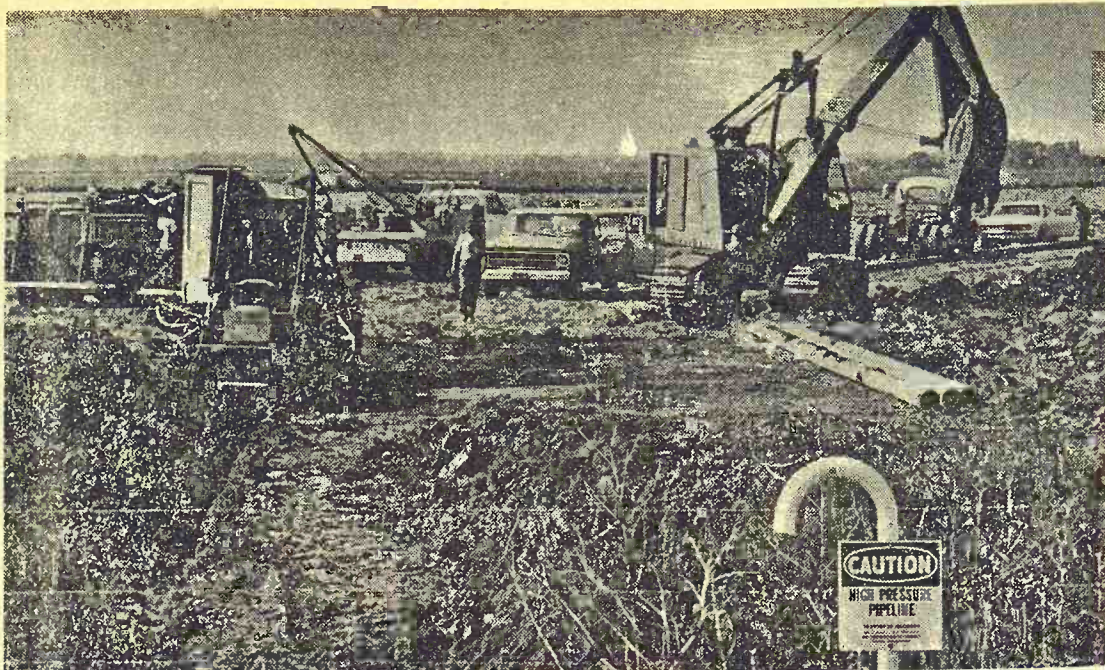

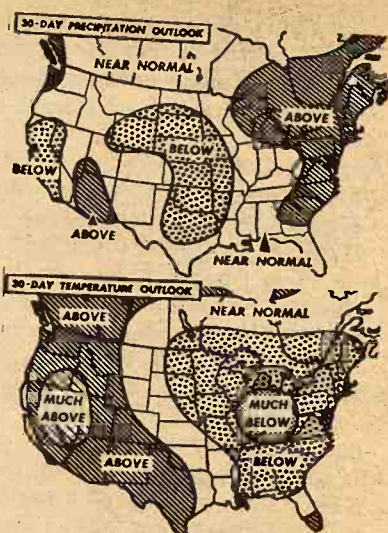
Hog Warning On BVD Vaccine

Hog producers should definitely not use Bovine Virus Diarrhea (BVD) vaccine as a preventative measure against hog cholera. The United States Department of Agriculture has specifically warned against this practice, cautions Dr. Homer K. Caley, Kansas State University Extension veterinarian.

Dr. John M. Hejl, Director of the Veterinary Biologics Division of USDA's Agricultural Research Service, warns in a recent directive that farmers or veterinarians who use BVD vaccine against any disease other than BVD do so at their own risk and against all recommendations. He continues that it could be a

dangerous or ineffective practice to vaccinate swine with a vaccine intended and approved for cattle. He points out that no manufacturer has applied for or received permission to market BVD vaccine for any use other than BVD control in cattle and that manufacturers sell USDA-licensed products only for uses approved by the Veterinary Biologics Division.

The division regulates the manufacture and marketing of vaccines and related products under authority of the Virus-Serum-Toxin Act. In this capacity, it evaluates data on the safety, purity, potency, and effectiveness of vaccines and issues licenses for products that pass the evaluation. Uses approved for licensed products are spelled out clearly on product labels and directions.

Tested Boars Sell August 25

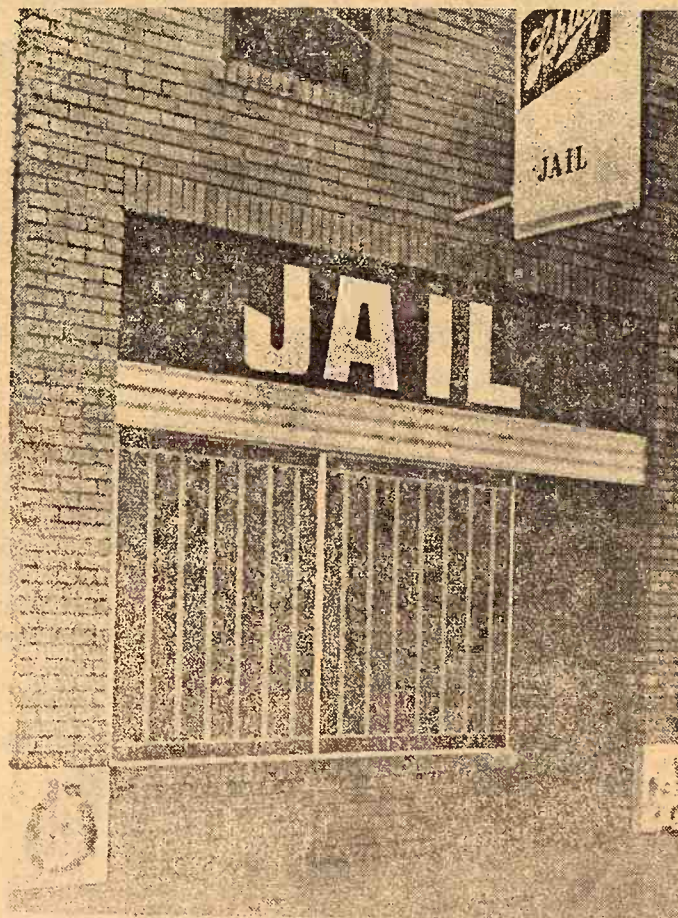
MANHATTAN — A sale of boars that have been performance tested at the Kansas State University Swine Test Station will be held Monday evening August 25 at 7:00 p.m. in Cico Park (Riley County Fairgrounds) one and a half miles west of the KSU football stadium in Manhattan.

Breeds of tested boars for sale will be Duroc, Hampshire, Yorkshire, Spot, Berkshire, Chester White, and Poland China.

Breeders with pigs on test invite prospective buyers to a charcoal broiled pork chop feed at 6:00 p.m. that evening.

Test information reported on each boar is daily gain, age in days to reach 200 lbs., backfat, loin eye area, and pen feed efficiency. Carcass information on littermate barrows is included in the catalogue.

Commercial producers are recognizing the value of tested boars for improving the productivity and efficiency of their swine operations, according to Wendell A. Moyer, Kansas State University Extension swine specialist.



CITY COUNCIL DOESN'T LIKE THE NAME

The city commission in Wichita would like to have a local tavern change its name from "The Jail," tho it is uncertain that it has any authority to force the name change. The problem—if it is one—is not confined to Wichita. Several towns in the G&G area have taverns or private clubs with similar names that do not meet universal approval.

Manhattan, for example, has a private club called "The Bank," and soon will have a beer hall to be called "The John."

More Wheat As Livestock Feed

U.S. farmers fed 176 million bushels of wheat to cattle, hogs and poultry in the year which ended June 30 — the highest total during the past 22 years.

The Agriculture Department in a report on the wheat situation also said that, with a bearish outlook for U.S. wheat feeding in world markets, wheat feeding in the 1966-70 season could easily match or exceed this season's total.

Improved corn prices also are expected to result in possibly more feeding of wheat.

Another factor working toward continued heavy use of wheat for feed, the department said, is the change in attitude of many farmers toward the full potential for wheat usage.

The amount of wheat that is fed is important because the wheat supplies in 1969-70 are up for the third consecutive year, as the result of a sharp jump in carry-over and the fourth largest crop of wheat of record.

If wheat feeding continues at or above last year's total, the department said, domestic use of wheat in 1969-70 could total as much as 800 million bushels. Exports are expected to show a small increase from the 10-year low of 542 million bushels in 1968-69.

ILLINOIS EASES CHOLERA BAN

Illinois has removed restrictions on hogs moving into the state from Missouri and Arkansas. Such shipments had been banned June 27 due to a widespread outbreak of hog cholera in the two states.

What Happened To Wheat

The wheat situation is of growing concern to many people. Prices of wheat have trended lower in recent years. Exports have been shrinking. Surplus stocks have been swelling. And the cost of price support is of concern to many people.

Larger Supplies. The carryover of old wheat on July 1 was estimated at 811 million bushels. This amount is 51 percent more than one year before.

The new crop was estimated in July at 1425 million bushels. This

estimate is 9 percent less than the crop that was harvested last year. Adding the new crop to the carryover makes a supply totaling 2236 million bushels. This total is 6 percent larger than that of last year.

A large part of the carryover of old wheat was tied up under price support in one way or another. About 451 million bushels — from five different crops — was under loan and resale programs. In addition the CCC held 157 million bushels. Thus the to-

tal under price support was 608 million bushels, leaving only about 200 million bushels of "free" wheat in the carryover.

Smaller Disappearance. The total disappearance (use and exports) of wheat during the year ended June 30 was 1298 million bushels. This was 8 percent less than the year before, and 19 percent less than during the big year of 1965-66.

That was the record year for exports: We shipped out 867 million bushels of wheat (including the wheat equivalent of flour and other products of wheat). During this past year we were able to export only about 544 million bushels, and about half of that had to be shipped under foreign aid programs. Exports were huge in the earlier year because the three most populous nations — China, India, and Russia — had poor crops. Since then their

crops have been much larger.

U.S. Food Needs Steady. We use about the same amount of wheat for food each year — about 525 million bushels. The amount used for seed varies a little from year to year, depending on the acreage planted. About 60 million bushels may be used for seed this fall and next spring.

The decline in wheat prices has stimulated the use of wheat for animal feed. About 190 million bushels of wheat was used for feed in the past year, and a similar amount may be used during the present marketing year.

Poor Prospect for Exports. The outlook for exports of wheat is not good. India, the biggest

foreign user of U.S. wheat, will need even less this year than in 1968-69. Canada and other exporting countries have burdensome supplies. The USDA recently cut export prices for some types of wheat by as much as 12 cents a bushel in order to meet competition from other exporters.

Details of the 1969-70 wheat program were not available when this report was prepared, but were scheduled to be released near August 1.

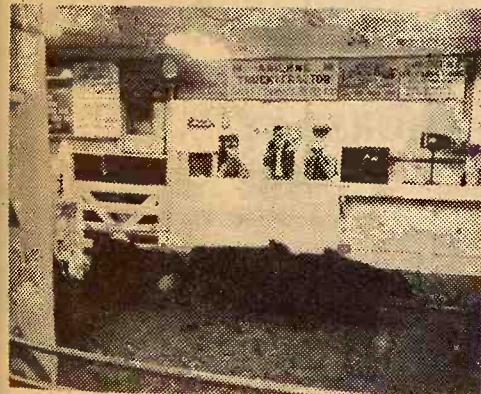

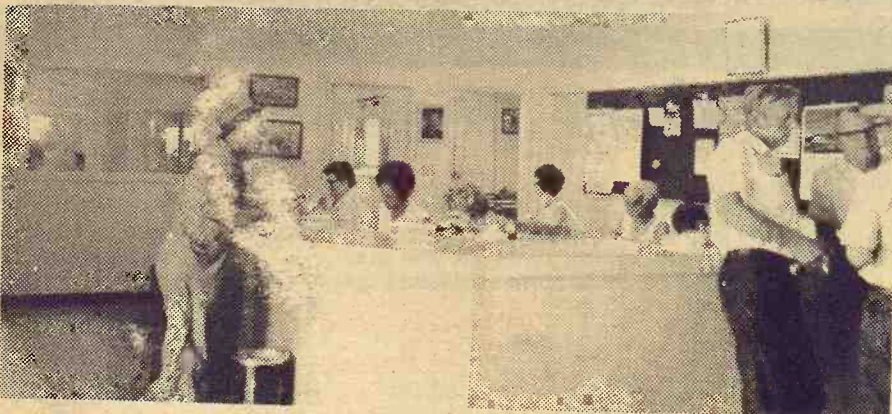
