## Health Department Persists On Feedlot Pollution

Sixty-five per cent of the fish kills discovered in Kansas last year were the result of feedlot pollution.

Mel Gray, assistant director Environmental Health Services, Topeka, outlined the feedlot problem to about 30 engineers and feedlot operators at a seminar at Hutchinson.

Attending the all-day session were men from California, Oklahoma, Iowa, Texas, and Kansas.

So far, there have been no reported fish kills this year, Gray said.

But he gave neither feedlot operators or new state legislation credit for the year's record saying, "We haven't had the kind of rainfall conducive to flushing the feedlots."

Although the present totals of fish kill are not good, Gray said nationally the totals were much worse.

During the seminar, programs were presented on feedlot retention ponds, construction of feedlots and use of retention pond water for irrigation.

The seminar was sponsored by the Kansas Engineering Society, the Kansas Industrial Extension Service and the Engineers in Private Section of KES. Gray said the state is seeking to develop adequate control of man's environment.

Lack of controls was the basic reason underlying the massive killing of fish, where as many as 250,000 were destroyed. Pollutants depressed the oxygen to zero or near zero, resulting in fish suffocation.

The production of livestock is the number one industry in the state and is growing rapidly. "It has had a tremendous growth. Last year it increased 44 per cent," Gray said. This in turn is increasing control problems.

Gray said cattle feeders are becoming more aware of pollution problems and are cleaning up more often.

Feedlots are normally cleaned every 90 to 120 days as the end of a feeding schedule. More often than not this is not bene-

ficial. Often the manure and soil is stockpiled nearby until it can be spread. Some times 15 foot piles will stretch for a half mile.

As weather or crop conditions permit, the stockpiled manure is spread and used as fertilizer on surrounding land.

Fish kills have not been the only problem created by mis-managed feedlots.

Two years ago one of the state's federal reservoirs was closed for a few weeks because of feedlot pollution. The bacteria count was so high, that water was unsafe for body contact such as swimming.

The Kansas Department of Health, Gray said, also has the power to control pollution of surface and ground water.

Under present legislation, feedlots must have a permit from the Health Department to operate. The permit is not issued until required pollution control facilities are constructed, Gray said.

Usually retention ponds are designed to handle three inches of runoff water at a time, but each feedlot is studied individually.

Used as fertilizer, the wastes can double production for farmers at a fraction of fertilizer costs.

Plowed under, the waste is applied from five up to 300 tons per acre.

Further study by the department will be directed toward the use of irrigation water and the possibility of nitrogen or nitrate contamination.

The dissolution of nitrates could percolate into the ground water table.

In high enough concentration, this causes abortion of calves in cattle, lack of gains in cattle, and blue babies in humans.

Swine feedlots, not as numerous as cattle, are operated under similar rules.

Gray said there were not enough sheep or lamb feeding operations in the state to require attention.

Slated for future study and action will be milk parlor

wastes from dairies and disposal for kill plants in the state.

## Farmer Protest Of Deer Permits

Three legislators from rural areas told the House Natural Resources Committee many farmers are unhappy over the allocation of permits to hunt deer.

Under the 1967 law, 80 per cent of the available permits are allocated to non-landowners while only 10 per cent are earmarked for landowners or tenants.

Reps. Rex Borgan, R-Asherville; Raymond Vaughn, R-Burlington, and W. R. (Bob) Brown, R-Emmett, said farmers in their areas would be willing to go along with the 50-50 split.

Vaughn said farmers are upset about not being able to get hunting permits to hunt deer on their own property.

Vaughn said the present allocation system might lead to posting of additional rural lands to prevent hunting.

The Natural Resources Committee also heard Rep. Fred Linde, R-Wichita, speak in favor of his bill which would eliminate a necessity for a fishing license for a nonresident minor.

### OUSTED ASCS COMMITTEE WINS USDA REVIEW

Three Haskell County ASCS committeemen fired by the state ASCS last August have been reinstated after a review by USDA. About 225 county farmers and landowners had backed the banished committeemen following the ouster last summer. The three men are Thomas Lewis, Satanta, and LaVerne Smith and Kirby Clawson of Sublette.

## Farmers Union Plots Statewide Tax Protest

TOPEKA — The Farmers Union legislative steering committee in Kansas wants a statewide tax-protest meeting in Topeka.

The announcement was made by Philip J. Doyle, Beloit, following an all-day session.

Doyle warned the Kansas legislature not to underestimate the depth of resentment and concern sweeping the state over what he called excessive taxation

on farms and homes.

He said the committee plans to bring at least 25,000 farmers and homeowners to Topeka sometime in February as tax protestors.

Doyle, a Mitchell county farmer and president of the county Farmers Union, is a former Republican state representative.

Dale Lyon, Athol, president of the Smith county Farmers Union, was named chairman of the potential protest rally.

"If it appears the legislature will give us a square tax deal, we will not put our protest into effect," Smith said. "However, we plan to begin at once to schedule special buses and trains in the event we do call for the rally."

Resolutions adopted unanimously by the committee were:

— Support of legislation to abandon property taxes as a source of income for operational costs of primary and secondary schools in the State of Kansas, and the use of state income taxes for schools.

— Support federal legislation to prevent tax loss farming by non-farmers.

— Support legislation to tighten loop holes in the Kansas anti-corporation farm law.

— Support of federal legislation to limit the number of head of livestock a packer can kill

from his own feedlot each week. — Support state legislation to provide state meat inspection in Kansas.

## Squabble Building Up Over Milk-Price Differential Legality

The intricate system through which the federal government seeks to regulate milk handling, to set minimum prices paid dairy farmers and to otherwise develop marketing procedures has grown tremendously over the years.

Agriculture department officials say federal milk marketing orders — the most important legal instrument in the system, have increased from 17 in 1940 to a peak of 83 in 1962. Con-

solidations and terminations have reduced this number to 66 now operating.

Federal marketing orders regulate transactions between producers and milk dealers in a specified geographic area, requiring that dealers pay farmers certain minimum prices for milk used for different purposes.

Basically, in the case of fluid milk used for bottling, prices are arranged on the basis of supply-demand conditions within in-

dividual areas. The actual prices, methods of payments and other guidelines may vary greatly from one area to another.

One of the hottest milk situations to be inherited by secretary of agriculture Clifford M. Hardin involves a group of New England dairymen who want the U.S. Supreme Court to review the method of payment used in their federal marketing order area.

The legal action has been going on for several years and includes lower court decisions which have tied up more than \$6 million in "differential payments" to an estimated 2000 dairy farmers who serve the Boston markets.

Department officials say the system being challenged permits "nearby" farmers in the main market area a price bonus or differential of from 23 to 46 cents a hundredweight of milk, while those farmers located further away — mostly in Vermont, Maine and New Hampshire — receive a lesser rate.

The "outsiders" contend the price differential not only is discriminatory but is illegal. The challengers — some 160 dairy producers — say the secretary of agriculture was not authorized by law to establish differential payment rates which gave

more money to farmers located nearer the market.

For two years the differential payments — part of the over-all receipts from milk sold in the order area — have been held in escrow, accumulating at the rate of about \$250,000 a month.

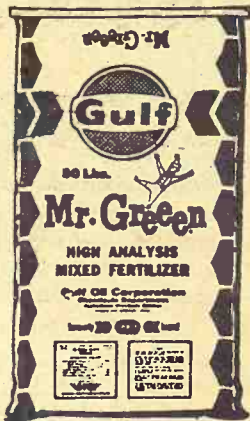
The escrow of this money — part of the income of the New

England producers — has been continued by court ruling until the Supreme Court decides whether it will review the case. Agriculture Department officials say the government's petition in support of the differential payment method is due to be filed with the high court by Feb. 20.

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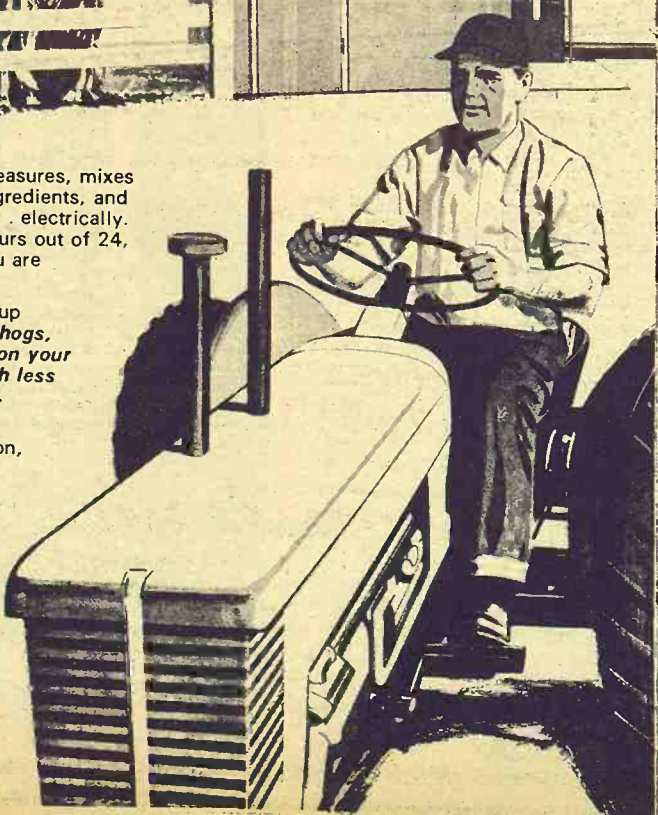
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## Would Unlock Rural Water System Funds

Rep. Joe Skubitz, R-Kan., has urged Congress to unlock the door to Farmers Home Administration-insured loans for water

and sewer systems for small communities and offered a solution.

The door was closed by the Treasury Department under the Johnson administration in July 1966, Skubitz informed the House of Representatives as he introduced his legislation.

Congress created a program of grants, direct loans and insur-

ed loans from the Farmers Home Agency of the Department of Agriculture to assist rural communities in providing adequate water and sanitary sewer systems, Skubitz said.

The treasury department in July 1966, continued the Kansas, blocked the insured loan program on the grounds that the private investors in local government bonds did not have to pay federal income tax on the revenue received on the purchased bonds.

The exemption is provided by the federal income tax laws.

The treasury, at that time, took the position that the insured loan program has given an unwarranted tax break to those investors who generally are in the high income tax bracket.

Skubitz' proposal would allow the unit to purchase tax-exempt bonds from small towns or public districts at interest rates not to exceed 5 percent.

FHA then would resell the loans to private lenders to bear an increased interest rate.

Under the Skubitz plan, the bonds when resold by the Farmers Home Administration would retain their tax-exempt status but the purchasers of the bonds from the FHA would pay federal income tax on the interest received above the original interest rate on the bonds.

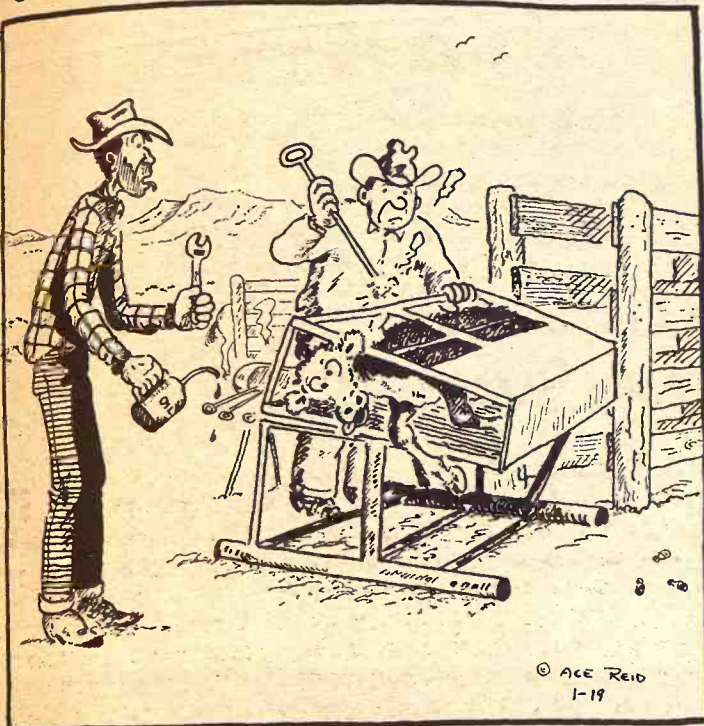

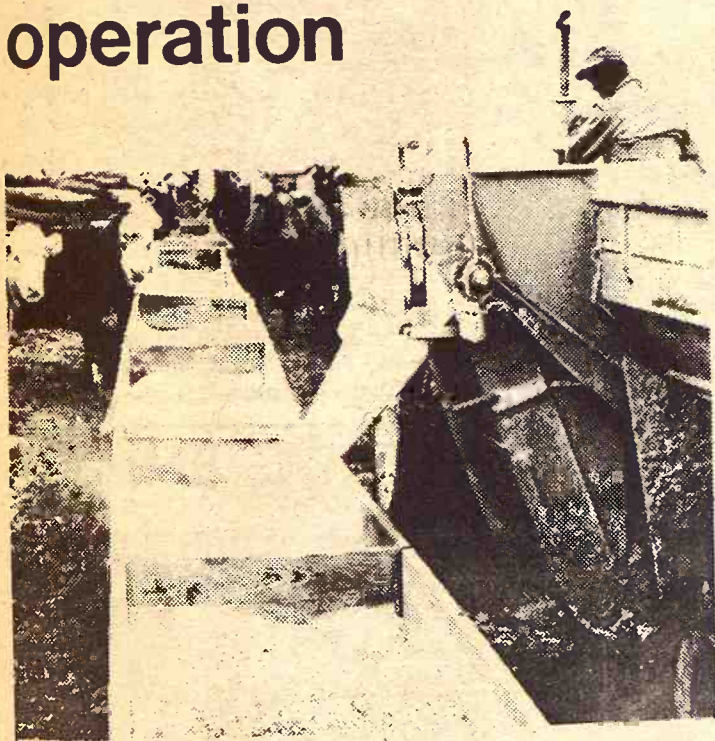

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# Where Will Western U.S. Get Its Water?

A severe water shortage faces the 17 western states unless substantial new sources can be developed by the year 2020, says a Colorado river reclamation expert.

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H. P. (Pat) Dugan has estimated that in 50 years the western regional population should reach 64 million and irrigated areas could easily advance from 36 million acres at present to 50 million acres.

Dugan is chief of project investigations for the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and chairman of the Upper Colorado River commission. He delivered his warning in a recent address before the Four States Irrigation council, representing Colorado, Wyoming, Nebraska and Kansas.

Current water withdrawal in the 17 states is 158 million acre-feet annually and could be 290 million acre-feet by 2020, he said.

Northern California and the Columbia river basin are the only western areas which now have an abundance of water Dugan said.

He said prompt and detailed water studies in California, particularly in view of the new Colorado river basin project act which provides that no water importation studies for that basin can be undertaken for 10 years.

He proposed investigation of

schemes for importing water from Canada and urged an inventory of waters from the Mississippi river system "with a view toward supplying more water for the Missouri river basin states and Texas and Oklahoma."

Nuclear power for desalting sea water may be a possibility by 1990, but all alternatives to water importation will be very expensive, Dugan said.

In such a situation, he said, it becomes more than ever apparent that the West requires increasingly efficient use of existing water supplies and better coordination in the management of surface and ground water.

An SPF boar named Atlas Ace, the animal sired pigs

Kansas State officials said they knew of only two other Kansas breeders who have raised hogs which attained their similar ratings.

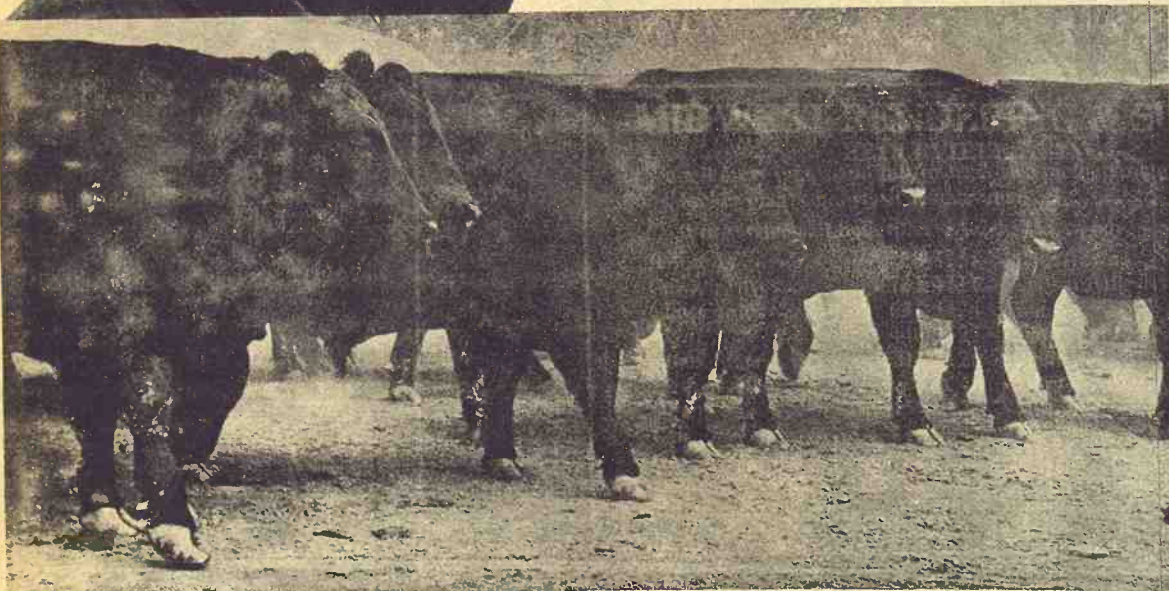

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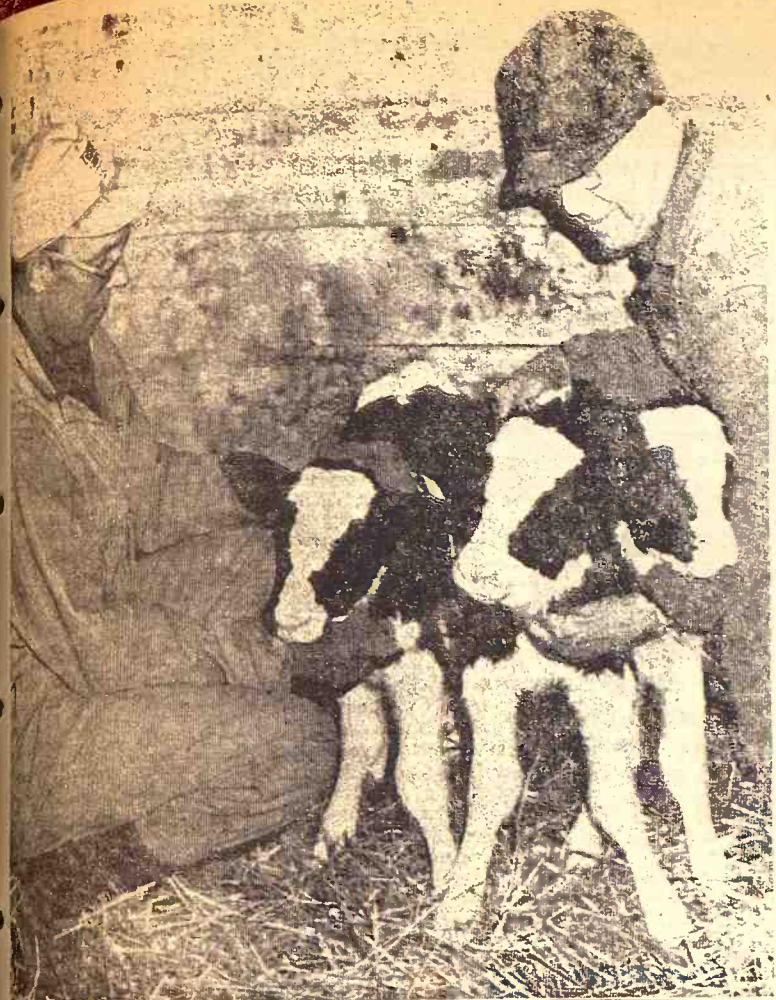

### A Down Year For Beekeepers

Honey production in Kansas in 1968 was 10 percent below the previous year, according to the Kansas Crop Reporting Service.

In 1968, 2,205,000 pounds of honey were produced compared with 2,450,000 pounds in 1967 and a range from 2,254,000 to 3,332,000 pounds in the previous five years.

Colonies of bees numbered 49,000, unchanged from 1967. The average yield per colony was 45 pounds, down 5 pounds from a year earlier.

Producers received an average price of 16.6 cents per pound for

honey in 1968, about a penny more than in 1967. The average price for beeswax sold in 1968 was 59 cents per pound, down 3 cents from the previous year.

Total value of honey and beeswax produced in 1968 was \$392,000 compared with \$417,000 a year earlier.

## Japan Resumes U.S. Wheat Purchases

RUSSELL — Sale of U.S. wheat to Japan has been resumed after a two-month ban by the Japanese. Carl Dumler, Russell, chairman of the Kansas Wheat Commission, made the announcement after he returned from the annual meeting of the National Association of Wheat Growers.

News of the trade resumption was received at the meeting in a telegram from a U.S. trade team in Tokyo.

Dumler is also president of the regional Great Plains Wheat, Inc., at Kansas City.

Since the middle of November the Japanese Food Agency has bought no wheat from the U.S.

Their government suspended purchase of U.S. wheat because of the extremely low amylo-graph (breakdown in protein in sprouted wheat) value of recent shipments.

American exporters reportedly had delivered six shiploads of rain damaged wheat to Japan.

Part of the damage was indi-

cated by sprouted wheat, caused by weather conditions at harvest time in the Northwest.

"We are very happy that the efforts of our negotiating team have been able to remove the restrictions on wheat purchases by our largest cash wheat customer," Dumler said.

An estimate has been made that the wheat sales to Japan lost for January and part of February amount to 200,000 tons. The U.S. supplies roughly 55 percent of Japan's imported wheat.

At the time the Japanese Food Agency announcement was made, the U.S. Department of Agriculture also announced that it was giving Japan a tonnage of wheat valued at \$750,000.

This action, in agreement with the U.S. trade, is in recognition of unforeseen circumstances, such as the untimely rains in the northwestern United States during the harvest period, and end use requirements in Japan that are not part

of U.S. sales contracts.

The Kansas Wheat Commission, as a member of Great Plains Wheat, supported the negotiations carried on by Wheat Associates, USA, a combination of Great Plains Wheat and the Pacific Northwest regional, Western Wheat Associates, and by government agencies.

Although Japan is the U.S.'s number one cash customer, Australia has begun an aggressive campaign which has increased both their sales and their share of the Japanese market.

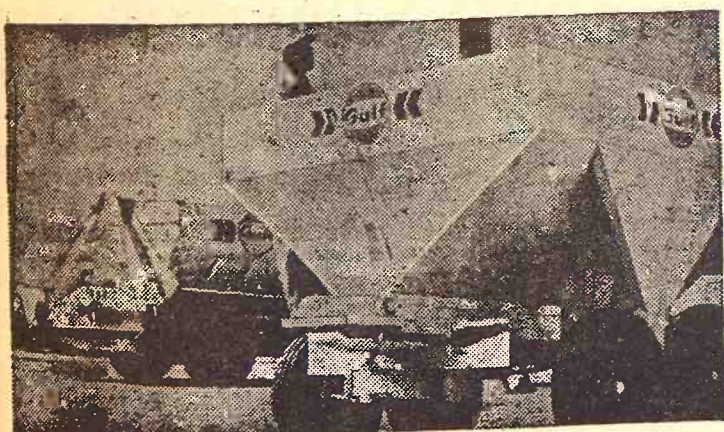

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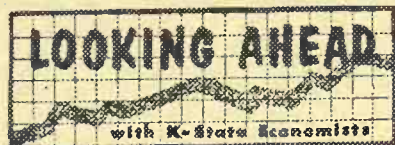
# Sellers Give Credit For Own Land Deals

A tight money situation has put the squeeze on farm real estate credit during the last year and a half. But you'd never know it the way the market for farm land has been acting.

Despite the reduced supply of loanable funds from conventional sources and the record high interest rates, demand for farm land as indicated by spiraling land values continues. The big reason: seller financing.

Extensive financing of farm land transfers by sellers is nothing new. Sellers have become the No. 1 source of real estate credit. Since about 1957 they have financed about 40 percent of all credit transfers, totaling nearly half the dollar value of credit extended.



More than three-fourths of this seller financed credit was through installment land contracts. The other fourth was by

seller mortgage.

Interest rates on seller-financed contracts were from 0.3 to 0.5 percent lower than rates charged by commercial lenders. Seller contracts usually range between 10 and 15 years, significantly shorter than those from commercial real estate lenders.

Sellers averaged 5.8 percent interest on land contracts and 6.1 percent on seller mortgages, each about a half percent lower than commercial bank and insurance company rates.

Through October 1967, 24 percent of credit sales included other real estate pledged as credit for additional security. These credit arrangements generally had a higher debt purchase price ratio and longer terms than those purchases having only transferred property as security.

curity.

Farm operators are still the No. 1 buyers of farm land. They make nearly two of every three land purchases and are generally buying for farm enlargement.

The beef cattle airlift was contracted by the Chilean government in an effort to build up Chile's beef production. It was arranged through the American Polled Hereford association.

Chile imports 80 per cent of the beef that it consumes.

The airlift began experimentally with a shipment of two plane loads in December.

4 eggs, beaten  
5 cups sifted flour  
1 tablespoon vanilla  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
¼ teaspoon each nutmeg, cloves and allspice  
1½ teaspoons salt  
2½ tablespoons baking powder  
1 cup raisins  
1 12-ounce package chocolate chips  
1 cup chopped nuts  
Combine shortening and sugars and beat until fluffy. Add eggs, tomato juice and vanilla. Blend well. Add flour sifted with spices and baking powder. Add raisins, chips and nuts. Drop onto greased cookie sheet. Bake at 400 degrees until done. Makes five dozen.

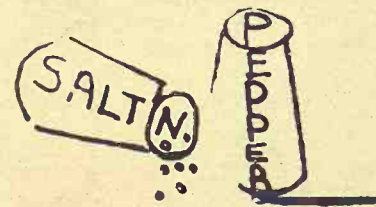

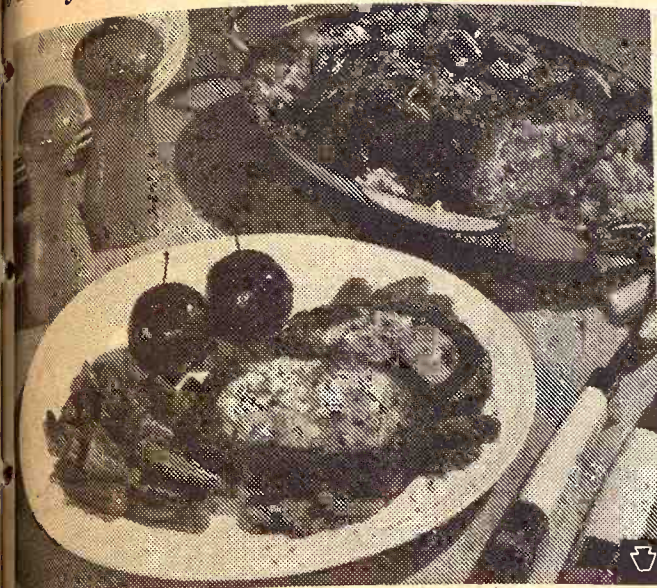

## Minimum Farm Pay To \$1.30

Livestock men hiring workers for more than 500 man-days in any calendar year will be subject on Feb. 1 to an increase of minimum wages to \$1.30 from the previous \$1.15 under Federal Law.

Not all hired labor, however, is considered in figuring the 500-man-day base, officials explain. Some of the labor that is exempt will be: members of the employer's immediate family; local, daily commuting hand-harvest piece workers who worked in agriculture less than 13 weeks last year; and migrant hand-harvest pieceworkers under 16 years of age who work with their parents and who are paid the same rate as older workers.

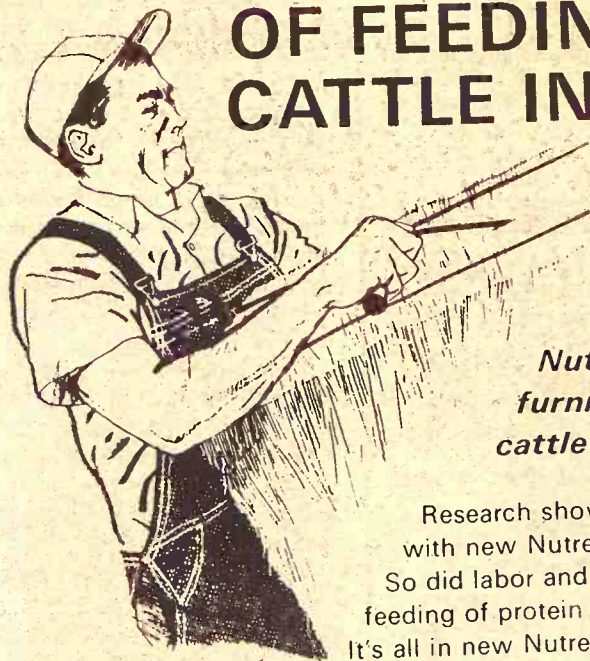

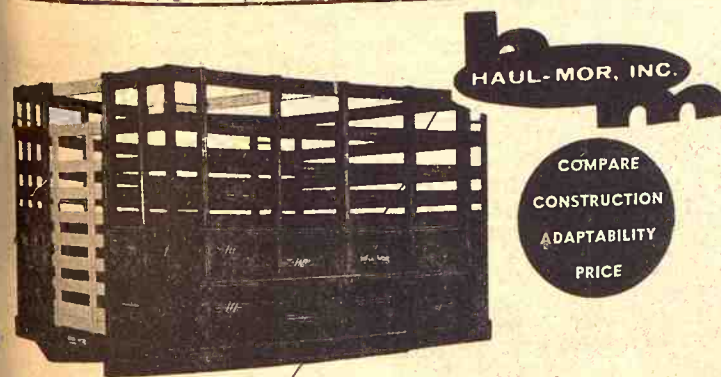

# Major Feedlots Now Number 138

That boom in cattle feeding in Kansas is doing its share to boost the farmer's income. But it's also pumping many dollars of new income into the state's communities. This is the opinion of Dr. Floyd W. Smith, acting vice-president for agriculture at Kansas State University.

Cattle feeding has been an important enterprise for the farmer for years, Dr. Smith says. Lots holding anywhere from a dozen to 1,000 head may be found on many farms throughout the state.

Communities have always benefited indirectly from this type of cattle feeding operation through the dollars farmers spend on clothing, food, machinery, and other supplies, he points out. But only in the last few years have feedlots provided a direct boost for the community's economy.

Behind this trend is a shake-up in the cattle feeding business — and the emergence of lots handling up to 30,000 head at one time. These are the mechanized lots which have their own feed mill, mixing facilities, and electronic feeding equipment.

The big shift in cattle feeding

in Kansas has taken place since 1960, says Kirk Baker, Extension economist at Kansas State University.

On January 1 that year, only 58,000 head, or roughly 20 per cent of the cattle fed in the state, were in lots with a capacity of more than 1,000 head.

By January 1, 1968, the larger lots were handling 338,000

head — about 55 per cent of the cattle on feed in the state.

These commercial feedlots benefit entire communities by providing jobs; good markets for grains, roughages and feeder cattle; and large expenditures for repairs, supplies, interest, taxes and insurance.

Baker points out that a typical 10,000 head lot may cost as much as \$300,000 to \$500,000. A feedlot of this size requires \$3 to \$4 million worth of feeder cattle each year, along with more than 40 million pounds of grain, 2,000 to 4,000 tons of hay and 7,000 to 10,000 tons of silage.

At least 10 full-time workers are needed to operate such a lot. Veterinary services and supplies, taxes, fuel and repairs add another \$100,000 in expenditures to the community. And the lot is a consumer of electricity, telephone and insurance services.

Baker and other K-State Extension specialists recently completed a feasibility study for a proposed 10,000 head feedlot to be located near Goodland in northwestern Kansas.

The report notes that a commercial feedlot of this size could add \$6.4 million to the Sherman County economy if all inputs are supplied locally — cattle, feed grain, capital, labor and management.

This estimate, based on 1967 average choice slaughter prices at Kansas City, assumes that 760 pound steers are fed to 1,110 pounds in 120 days and that 30,000 head could be handled in the lot each year.

The accompanying map shows the location of 136 feedlots in Kansas with a capacity of 1,000 head or more. Most of the 1,000 head lots are farmer-operated. But the larger ones are the commercial yards owned and operated by groups of local livestock men and businessmen.

Commercial lots have been a boom to towns like Dodge City, Garden City, and Leoti, each the center of a cluster of feedlots. Single lots have said a significant impact on the economy of other towns such as Pratt, Meade and Oakley.

Most of the big lots are concentrated in two areas — a four-county region in the Flint Hills, and the western third of the state.

Baker says the Flint Hills is one of the primary feeder cattle producing areas in the state. The big lots in Chase, Lyon, Osage and Franklin counties draw calves from this area, and from neighboring states as well.

Greatest expansion in cattle feeding, however, has occurred in western Kansas. This is part of the trend which has seen the Central Plains states emerge as the fastest growing feeding center in the country.

The rapid development of ir-

rigation and an increase in grain sorghum production favor cattle feeding in this area. Another factor is the relatively low rainfall in this region, resulting in fewer problems with water pollution.

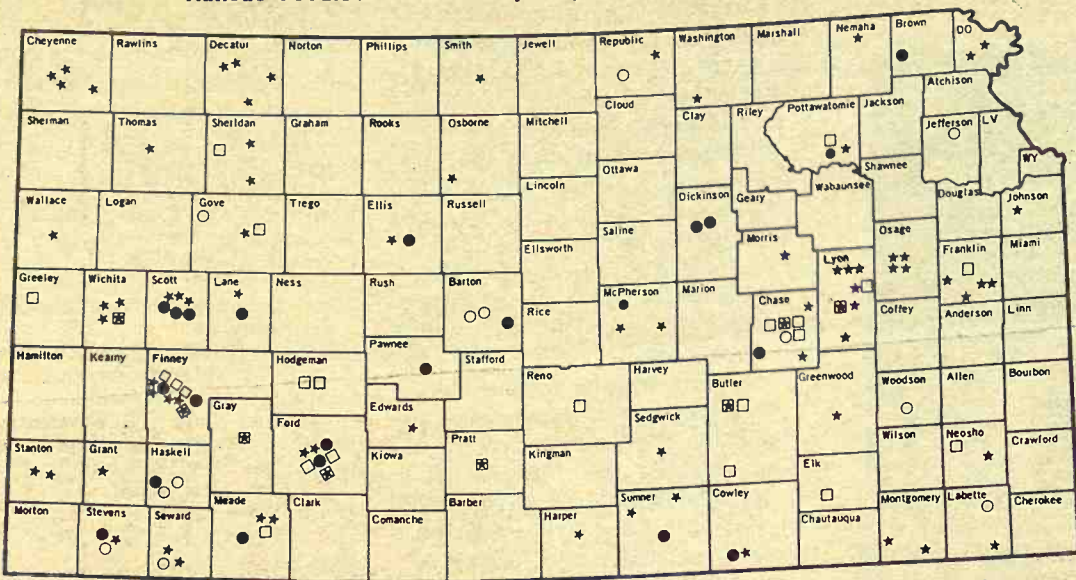
What does the big shift in cattle feeding mean to the farmer-feeder who handles 100 to 300 head at once? Can he compete with the big commercial lots?

Yes, says Baker, if he has the facilities, experience and ability as a manager. In fact, the small operator can benefit by adapting the feeding techniques and nutritional know-how from the large lots.

Baker points out that a growth in the number of small operators can also stimulate business for the community. "Thirty-three 300 head lots would have roughly the same economic impact as one 10,000 head lot," he says. "And the inputs from the smaller lots are more likely to be supplied locally."

How big can the cattle feeding industry become in Kansas?

No precise estimates are available, but a study by Kansas State University, Department of Economics, gives an indication of what the future may hold. The report predicts that total beef production in Kansas will increase 79 per cent between 1966 and 1980.

John H. McCoy, professor of economics at K-State, believes grain fed beef production will expand even more rapidly. He points out that fed cattle production soared 14 per cent during 1966, 11 per cent during 1967 and 10 per cent during 1968.

"The average for the three year period is more than 11 per cent a year," he says. "The 70 per cent increase in total beef production projected for 1980 assumes an annual increase of only about 5.5 per cent a year, so we already have a good start on surpassing this estimate."

There's little doubt that the years ahead will see a significant expansion in cattle feeding, both in the large commercial yards and the smaller farmer-owned-and-operated lots. It adds up to a growing industry which stands to generate new income not only for the farmer and agri-business dealer, but for the state's communities as well.

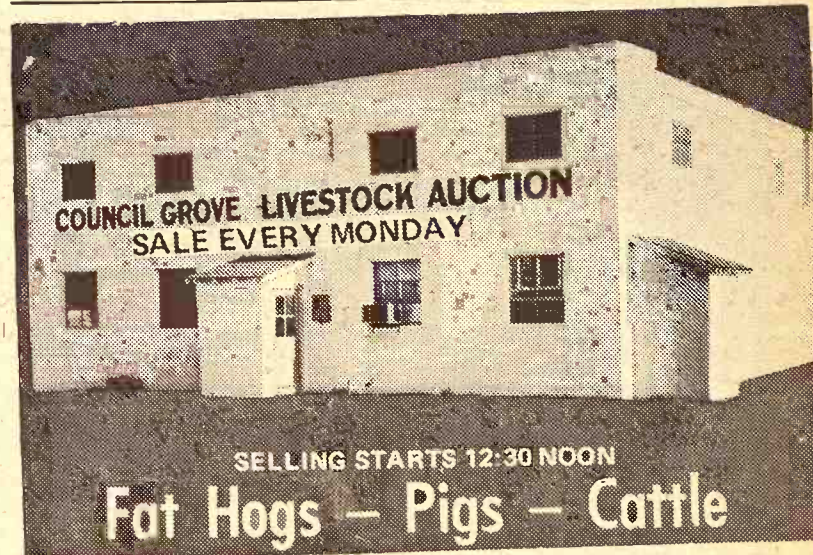

# Synthetic Protein From Oil And Gas?

Several researchers at Kansas State University are studying a method by which the state's crude oil and natural gas resources could possibly help solve some of the world's food shortage problems.

One K-State investigator, Dr. Larry E. Erickson, associate professor of chemical engineering, thinks Kansas may have an opportunity to create a new industry by using these resources.

He studied last year at the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, under Dr. Arthur E. Humphrey, professor and director of the School of Chemical Engineering.

Humphrey has been tackling bio-engineering problems associated with the microbial production of single-cell protein (SCP) from hydrocarbons of oil and natural gas.

Erickson points out that the development of an economical process for producing SCP from these two Kansas resources could be successful. He indicates that protein is important to the world's diet and that SCP

could be used to supplement the protein supply in meat and dairy products in the human diet.

Protein, he says, is important in solving the problem for at least two reasons: a minimum of 25 grams of protein are required by adults each day for growth and body maintenance because the body cannot synthesize certain amino acids, and protein cannot be stored in the human body for later use.

Not stored in the body, protein is the principal constituent of body cells and important for growth and repair of the body. Quality of the diet, however, is the real key to the starvation problem. If energy intake were the only nutritional requirement of human beings, the average person could live adequately by eating 1.7 pounds of rice daily.

Microbial protein, says Erickson, has a high nutritional value and it can be produced in abundance cheaply and rapidly. There is beginning to be a real awareness of the potential this

process has for the state," he said.

A resolution, not passed, suggesting the development of an SCP industry in Kansas was introduced to the state House of Representatives in its 1968 session.

Responding to the introduction of this resolution, KSU's department of chemical engineering has submitted to the state a research proposal entitled "Production of Proteins and other Nutritional and Medical Elements by Microbial Metabolism of Natural Gas and other Petroleum Hydrocarbons." If approved, the research will be conducted by Dr. Erickson, Dr. L. T. Fan, professor and head of the department, and Dr. William H. Honstead.

Recent interest in world food shortage problems was evidenced at KSU during the Senator Frank Carlson Symposium on World Population and Food Supply held on campus December 3-4.

In the thinking of Dr. Honstead, professor of chemical engineering who is now with the Kansas Industrial Extension Service, any hopes Kansas has for taking advantage of this idea of developing a process for producing SCP must be "guarded."

Honstead, a former head of chemical engineering at K-State, says that several oil companies — Esso, Gulf, Mobil, Sun, and others — in addition to other research interests, are already involved in developing "efficient, workable SCP processes."

Erickson says that bio-engineers encounter two types of problems in producing SCP. First, there are the economic difficulties of developing a process which allows SCP production at minimum cost. Secondly, the SCP product must be nutritionally acceptable as a food or feed supplement.

K-State's department of chemical engineering has been concerned with the first problem. The University's Institute of Food and Feed Grains is investigating the second problem.

Uses of SCP being seriously considered are for consumption by livestock as well as by humans. In Kansas, there is strong interest in SCP as a protein supplement for feeding livestock, says Erickson.

Main advantage of microbial production of SCP is that the mass of this protein doubles very quickly, in 20 to 120 minutes. This is much faster than meat or even grasses and plants. Chickens may double their weight in two to four weeks and cattle in a month or two, while grasses and alfalfa double in a week or two.

A microbial protein production process also has no real space problem. It can take place in a small area whereas production

of protein from animals and crops, relatively speaking, requires much more land.

In addition, manufacture of SCP would not depend on agricultural or climatic conditions, nor is SCP's growth dependent on surface or sunlight.

At present the Soviet Union has three plants which use this microbial process to produce a million tons of protein a year,

10,000 tons of which are used for cattle food supplement, said Erickson.

He added that British Petroleum has been producing 225 tons a year for swine experiments. Other countries involved in using SCP food supplements for animal consumption are Czechoslovakia, France, India, and Nationalist China.

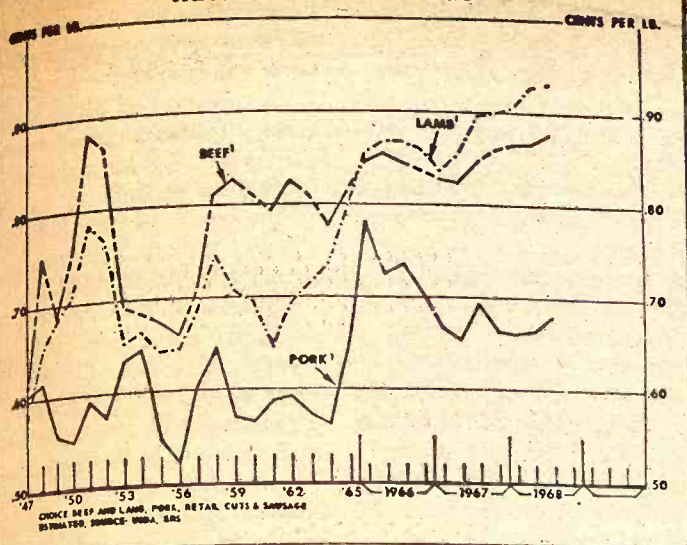

George O'Rourke, a teller, said a man appeared at his window and ordered: "Fill it up. Don't move or I'll kill you."

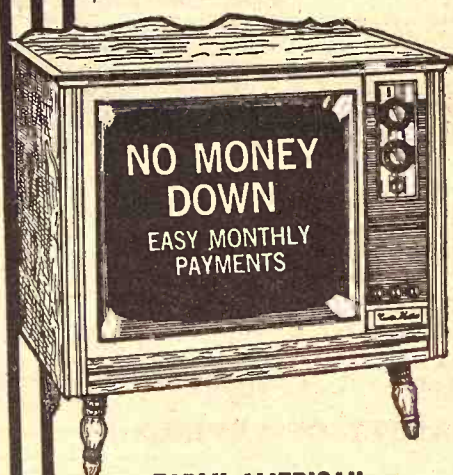
Mrs. Carol Butner, teller at the next window, said she saw the man shove a paper bag toward O'Rourke and heard O'Rourke exclaim: "Really!"

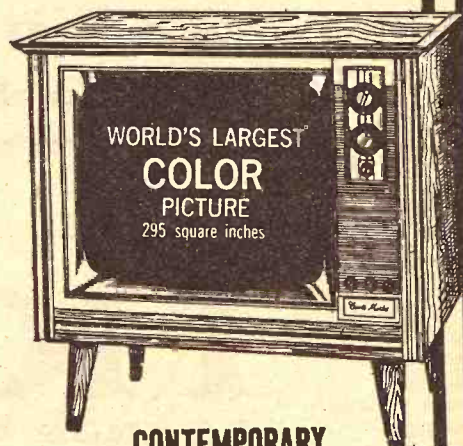

# Discover High-Lysine Barley

Discovery of a barley high in lysine in combination with high protein content is jointly announced by the Swedish Seed Association, Svalof, Sweden, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

They report that the amount of the amino acid lysine in the

protein, as well as the total protein, in a variety now called Hipoly are 20 to 30 percent higher than that of commonly grown varieties. In addition, Methionine, another limiting amino acid, is higher.

Plant breeders of USDA's Agricultural Research Service say

this discovery opens the way for breeding barley with greatly increased food and feed value. They say the increase should be comparable to that being developed in corn by use of germ plasma containing the opaque-2 gene.

Hipoly is not adapted for

growing in the United States, but ARS scientists believe they can transfer most of the desirable characteristics of this barley into good adapted local varieties.

Lysine is one of the 20 amino acids that make up the proteins of all plants and animals, and it is the amino acid usually in shortest supply in cereal grains. The enhanced lysine content now possible is especially important for meeting the needs of people in many parts of the world whose diets lack animal protein as well as for feeding nonruminant livestock, such as swine and poultry.

Dr. Arne Hagberg, Dr. Lars Munck, and Dr. Karl-Erik Karlsson of the Swedish Seed Association discovered the high lysine content of Hipoly, one of the many barley varieties in the World Collection maintained by USDA. The department furnished seed of the World Collection to the association in 1967. Hipoly was introduced from Ethiopia in 1924.

Limited amounts of seed for breeding purposes may be obtained by writing Dr. J. C. Craddock, Agricultural Research Service, USDA, Plant Industry Station, Beltsville, Md. 20705.

necessities, the Board also noted increased competition from pork and broilers.

"A question of major importance in 1969 is whether consumer demand for red meat will be strong enough to absorb larger beef and pork production without substantial price weakness," the Board said.

Concern to farm areas is particularly great because in the Kansas City Board's area livestock marketing comprises approximately 65 per cent of total cash receipts to farmers.

In the immediate area, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma and Missouri showed a moderate increase in calf crop ranging from 5.2 percent to 5.6 per cent.

But translated into figures, this means an increase of 261,000 calves in Kansas over the number of fed cattle marketed in 1968.

Oklahoma showed an increase of 1,336,000 calves over fed cattle and Missouri showed a surplus of 910,000. Only Nebraska in this area, with a decrease of 1,589,000 strengthened the market.

Nationally the figures were even more discouraging to the bankers since 11 per cent more cattle were on feed at year's end than the same time in 1967, and 25 percent more than the same time in 1965.

And not only are there more cattle in the feed lots, but pork raisers have increased farrowings.

Due to a favorable hog-corn ratio the Board expects the spring pig crop to exceed last year's by as much as five per cent.

Ending its warning about prices the Board predicted "fed cattle prices are likely to weaken as winter advances."

## H. C. Stephens, Co-op Leader, Dies

Harry Carl Stephens, a pioneer in the cooperative movement in Kansas and Colorado, died last week in Wichita. Stephens, 74, worked some 40 years in Colorado wheatgrowers' co-ops, the Wichita Bank for Cooperatives, and various co-op developments.

He retired as Vice President and Treasurer of the Wichita Bank for Cooperatives in 1964.

Born in Melvern, Ks., Stephens spent many years at Yuma, Colo., before coming to Wichita. He was buried in Superior, Neb.

## From Fed Reserve On Beef Supply Low Key Alarm

The Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City's monthly review has sounded a low key alarm on future cattle prices if the present trend toward increasing the amount of beef is continued.

Citing an educated guess that consumers, to a degree, might back off from the purchase of beef because of an increase in Social Security tax and increases in prices of most other

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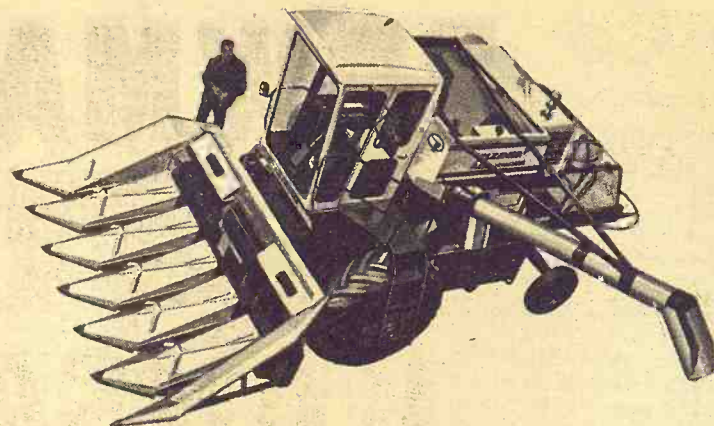

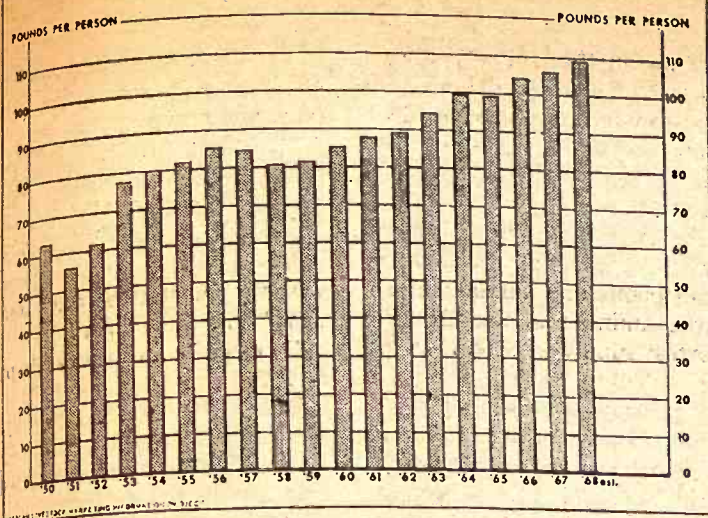

## Eating More

Per capita consumption of beef in 1968 will be close to 100 pounds. It will be up about 3 pounds from the 105.9 pounds average consumption per person in 1967. This is a substantial increase and a continuation of the trend toward increased consumption of beef. Consumption per person is almost twice as much this year as in 1951.

## Surtax Has Been Partly Effective

The 10 percent surtax recommended by Lyndon Johnson has been on the books for more than six months and will apparently be extended for another year. So now may be a good time to evaluate its effectiveness.

The surtax was intended to control inflation and reduce pressure on interest rates and credit restrictions, says Jack A. Richards, Extension economist at Kansas State University.

Yet inflation continues to erode the dollar's purchasing power. The cost of living index jumped about 4.8 percent during 1968. Interest rates reached record highs recently and there is

talk of reduced credit availability.

Does all this mean the surtax has failed? Not necessarily, Richards says. Without the tax or a more restrictive monetary policy, inflation would be even worse than it is today, he explains.

Nearly all observers underestimated the basic strength of the economy last summer, he argues. This resulted in a less restrictive monetary policy designed to combat the threat of a recession early in 1969. However, this led to continued economic boom and more inflation.

To fight this inflation, a more restrictive monetary policy has

been initiated during recent weeks. This slowed the expansion in available credit and increased rates.

Richards believes that fiscal action during the fall of 1967 could have prevented most of the difficulties which currently plague the economy.

Although delay increased the threat of inflation, the surtax will help pave the way for a balanced budget by the end of the current fiscal year, Richards points out. Less than 12 months ago, the budget was running at a \$25.2 billion deficit.

Additional revenues from inflated consumer incomes, the accelerated rate of real economic growth and the limited spending controls that accompanied the surtax also will help balance the budget, he says.

Looking ahead, Richards sees the inflationary pressure receding somewhat during the first half of 1969. But it may gain renewed vigor in the second half unless additional monetary or fiscal restraint takes place in the coming weeks, he warns.

## Best Dollar Year For Turnpike

The Kansas Turnpike made its best financial showing in 1968 since the roadway opened in 1956, with \$4.7 million left over after operating costs and payment of interest and bond retirement were made out of \$12.6 million in gross revenue.

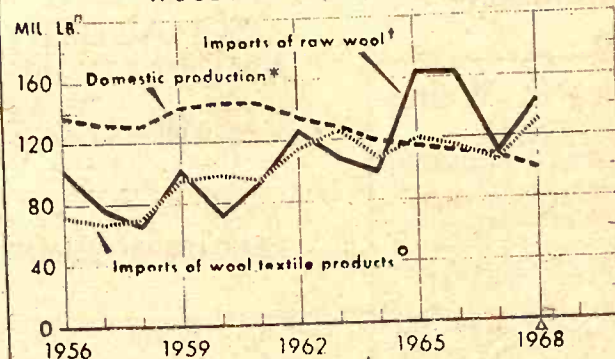
About 8½ million vehicles drove over the Turnpike in 1968. Of the \$12.6 million in revenue, \$10.8 million was in tolls, \$1.1 million in concessions, and

\$667,000 in investment income. Expenses were \$2.8 million and \$5.27 million in bonds were redeemed.

## MILITARY BIG BUYERS OF BUTTER PRODUCTION

The Defense Department has bought 28 million pounds of butter and only one million pounds of margarine since June. Additional use of butter by the military began a year ago after members of Congress from dairy states persuaded defense officials to drop a ban on butter and use it instead of margarine.

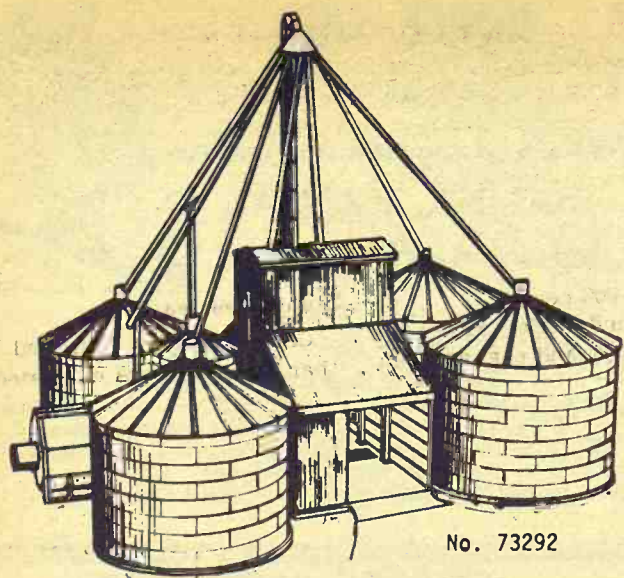

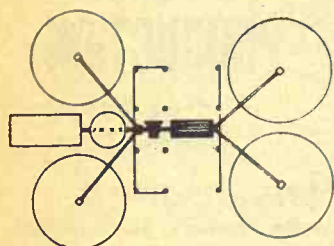

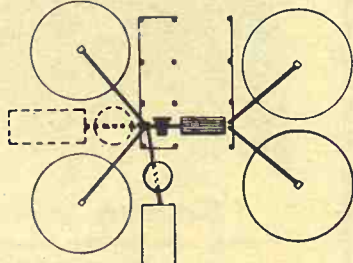

### Plans For Grain-Feed Handling

These plans for a feed and grain handling center are available from the Kansas Extension Service.

The center is capable of handling more than 200 tons of feed a year and becomes a feasible size operation for a farmer-feeder who finishes about 250 head of cattle a year. It is especially suited to a feeder who raises his own feed.

The facility is well adapted to commercial grain production, and with additional grain processing equipment, it is a good set-up for a cattle feeder.

The central building, surrounded by storage bins, is 20x32 feet including a 21-foot drive-thru plus an 8x32-foot processing area. Hopper bins over the drive are 700-bushel capacity and the processing area holds 375 pounds.

Complete working drawings of two separate plans are available — one with the work tower and dump pit at the end of the center building, and the other with this equipment in the center of the building.

The advantage in having the dump pit in one end of the building is that there is room for a scale in the remaining drive area.

The auger dump pit has a pine grate cover and can handle up to 3000 bushels of wet corn per hour. The plans have alternative storage layouts including bin and high-temperature drying with 12,000 to 40,000 bushel volumes.

### Some Car Risk Firms Ask For Higher Rates

Car insurance rates are going up again in Kansas.

Frank Sullivan, commissioner of insurance, announced 191 companies are increasing their auto insurance rates effective immediately.

The companies claim they're not making their usual percent of profits due to "ever-increasing costs of auto accidents."

The revised rates were filed on behalf of the affiliated companies of the Insurance Rating Board and will mean an average statewide increase of 1.5 percent of auto liability insurance and 9.5 percent for auto physical damage coverages.

Not all companies are raising their rates, however. There are 337 companies authorized to write auto coverage in Kansas.

Sullivan said that for private passenger pleasure cars (not driven to and from work) with no male drivers under 25, the

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# Kansas Feedlot Count Up By A Fourth In One Year

Cattle and calves in Kansas feedlots totaled 766,000 head on January 1, a new record high, 26 percent more than last year's previous record number on feed, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

This is up seasonally from the 570,000 head on feed October 1, 1968.

Numbers on feed for the slaughter market generally reach their highest level on the first of the year.

Steers accounted for 72 percent of the total number on feed, or 552,000, while heifers on feed comprised the balance of 214,000.

Cattle on feed in the State included 486,000 in large feedlots with 1000 head or more capacity.

This is a new record high number for large lots. Smaller farm operations had 280,000 on feed a year ago and the third highest year ago, 3 percent more than a number in the last 10 years.

Marketings of grain fed cattle for slaughter during the October-December quarter were 293,000, 3 percent more than a year earlier. Placements during the past quarter were 489,000, 15 percent more than in the same period a year ago.

Feeders' intentions to market indicate that 430,000 cattle on feed January 1 will be marketed during the first quarter of 1969, 13 percent more than in this quarter last year. The remaining 336,000 head are expected to go to market after April 1.

**Major Feeding States**  
Cattle and calves on feed for slaughter market in 39 feeding states are estimated at 12,579,000 head as of January 1, 1969, an increase of 10 percent from a year earlier.

The 32 major feeding states had 12,424,000 head on feed for slaughter market compared with 11,263,000 head January 1, 1968, also an increase of 10 per-

cent.

The North Central States had 7,698,000 cattle and calves on feed as of January 1, 1969. This was an increase of 8 percent from a year earlier.

Iowa, the leading state, was up 15 percent, while Nebraska, the second ranking state, showed an increase of 6 percent.

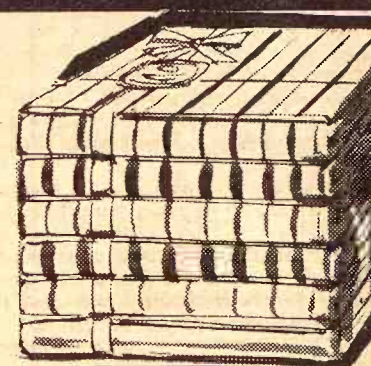

## Eye New Areas Of Research

Agricultural research programs which could boost economic development in most areas of Kansas were outlined by Dr. Floyd W. Smith, acting vice president for agriculture at Kansas State University, Manhattan, during the annual Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station Conference on the K-State campus, January 27, 28, and 29. The acting vice president also is director of the agricultural

experiment station which includes a statewide network of five branch stations and 12 experimental fields.

Smith told of three proposed projects, approved by the State Board of Regents, which are expected to be acted upon by the current legislature. They are:

\* Establishment of a Kansas River Valley irrigation experiment field which would permit economic development of the state's largest river valley resource.

\* A project which would attempt to convert hydrocarbons to proteins useful as animal feedstuffs and "even for human foods." This, Smith explained, would result in "supplemental" economic developments of the state's petrochemical resources. Initial research would be done by the K-State Engineering Experiment Station, he said, with subsequent evaluation research to be done by the Agricultural Experiment Station.

\* Establishment of a horticultural experiment field in the Wichita vicinity for conducting research with vegetables and fruits. Experiments useful to urban homemakers also would be a part of the Wichita area research.

Smith told the conference participants that restoration of tornado-damaged facilities at Manhattan and at the Garden City Branch Experiment Station is nearing completion.

"The new facilities at Manhattan will provide us an opportunity to do more modern research in beef cattle, swine, sheep, and agronomic projects," Smith noted.

He said the new facilities at the Garden City branch station are now in the final stages of construction. The last unit to be completed is one which will provide feed processing and handling equipment needed for the beef cattle studies.

The acting vice president described two other important research endeavors which were started in 1968. They were: (1) The introduction of an electronic data processing project in agricultural economics which, hope-

fully, can assist farmers and agribusinesses in making management decisions; and (2) the establishment by the 1968 legislature of an evapotranspiration laboratory to investigate ways of reducing water losses.

Smith commended the steady growth of K-State's unique Food and Feed Grain Institute, established less than three years ago. The Institute, under the direction of Dr. William Hoover, is now working on 14 research projects of national and international scope. Fifteen different departments of K-State are involved in the research to date.

"This Institute is concerned not only with Kansas economic development but also with aiding developing countries throughout the world," Smith said.

## OK For Drug To Treat Severe Burn Cases

A drug with exceptional experimental success in treating severe burns has been approved by the Food and Drug Administration.

Sterling Drug says it will initially market its Sulfamylon cream mainly to major burn treatment centers and to private general practitioners.

The new drug's role in treatment of severe burns is said to be its prevention of septicemia, an infection of the blood stream that develops after severe burns. Researchers long have experienced difficulties in combating septicemia. Antibiotics given oral-

ly or by injection rarely reach the burned areas because the small blood vessels near the burn often are destroyed.

Sulfamylon cream is applied directly to the burned area. Unlike many other antibacterial agents, the drug isn't inactivated in wounds where blood and pus are present, Sterling said.

The drug was originally introduced by Sterling's Winthrop division 20 years ago to treat ear infections. Three years ago, the staff at Fort Sam Houston hospital reported that Sulfamylon cut deaths from septicemia in burn patients by about 50%. When 40% or less of the body was burned, there were practically no deaths from infection.

## Now Tab Wheat Exports At 625 Million Bushels

The Agriculture Department says that U.S. wheat exports this year may total from 600 million to 625 million bushels, or as much as 61 million less than in 1967-68.

Officials until now had said only that the department's export target of 750 million bushels for the year ending next June 30 would be "increasingly difficult" to attain.

## Taxpayers Union Forming Around Russell Revolt?

**RUSSELL** — A Kansas tax-  
payer revolt, long predicted, ap-  
pears to be gaining impetus.  
Taxpayers in at least 25 west-  
ern Kansas counties appear  
to be organized for a kind of unionism  
if they don't get relief they  
just go on strike.  
In effect that's what 193 Rus-  
sell County taxpayers have al-  
ready done. Both rural and ur-  
ban residents are included in the  
taxpayer suits, filed in District  
Court, which attack the legality  
of reappraisal in Russell Coun-  
ty.  
Taxes paid under protest are  
held aside in a special fund and  
cannot be touched until the pro-  
test is resolved.  
Most of the Russell County  
taxpayer suits came about  
through efforts of the Russell  
County Taxpayers Association.  
Last week taxpayer associa-  
tions from 10 counties met in  
Russell and voted to form a par-  
tisan organization similar to a 15-  
county organization that start-  
ed in Dodge City. They also vot-  
ed to affiliate with the Kansas  
Federation of Taxpayers of  
which Guy Josseland of Dodge  
City is president.

The next move in Russell  
County will be made in the  
courts. According to Michael  
Holland, Russell County Attor-  
ney, the 193 taxpayer suits there  
may be consolidated into a sin-  
gle case. He said the district  
judge favors this approach and  
"the county is very agreeable to  
this."  
He said the judge also wants  
to enter voluntary appearances  
in the case. If this is not done,  
the county will have to serve 193  
subpoenas on the State Board of  
Tax Appeals as well as the coun-  
ty clerk, treasurer and commis-  
sioners. "This would be a lot of  
expense for nothing," he declar-  
ed.

However Holland indicated the  
attorney for the State Board of  
Tax Appeals has not yet agreed  
to voluntary appearances.

"We're accusing the board of  
violating the laws of the state  
of Kansas," Holland said. "We  
want them to at least have the  
opportunity to be heard and to  
defend against this accusation,  
which is more than they did for  
Russell County when we went  
up there to be heard."

The county commissioners had  
earlier filed an injunction ask-  
ing that the 1968 tax assess-  
ments be declared and distribu-  
tion of 1968 taxes be prohibited.  
No action has been taken on  
that injunction to date.

The individual taxpayer suits,  
also challenge the legality of as-  
sessments in virtually the same  
language contained in the com-  
missioners' injunction.

Holland said that in many cas-  
es valuation in the county was  
doubled last year and taxes in-  
creased accordingly. Many tax-  
payers, he said, are being charg-  
ed 30 to 50 percent more than a  
year ago. "It wasn't gradual,"  
he explained. "It was just there  
all of a sudden."

The situation became even  
more confused when the Joint  
Legislative Tax Committee,  
headed by Sen. Frank Hodge, R-  
Hutchinson, recommended re-

ducing the legal property assess-  
ment ration in the state from 30  
to 25 per cent.

The committee's report said  
rural assessments in 1967 were  
at the 17 per cent level, urban  
assessments at 20 per cent and  
the state average was 18 per  
cent. The committee contends  
that the 30 per cent assessment  
ratio is "unattainable in the  
near future."

The committee also recom-  
mended placing a limit on prop-  
erty tax in the state for a three-  
year period. Equalization of as-  
sessments is of prime impor-  
tance, the report stated.

## State Turkey Growers Stand Pat

The number of turkeys to be  
raised in Kansas during 1969 is  
expected to be the same as in  
1968, according to the Kansas  
Livestock Reporting Service.

Early season intentions point  
to about 395,000 turkeys to be  
raised this year, the smallest  
number for the state since the  
early 1930s.

Revised estimates for 1968  
show 388,000 heavy breed tur-  
keys raised in Kansas, about  
two-thirds the number in 1967.

Light breed turkeys raised in  
1968 totaled 7000, more than  
double the previous year. In-  
tentions for 1969 indicate the  
same numbers of both heavy  
and light breed turkeys as in  
1968.

Turkey growers in the nation  
intend to raise 3 percent more  
turkeys in 1969 than in 1968.  
Present plans of growers are to  
increase heavy breeds 4 percent  
and decrease light breeds 5 per-  
cent.

If producers carry out present  
intentions, the 1969 turkey crop  
would total about 110 million  
and would be the third largest  
crop of record. In 1968, 106 mil-  
lion were raised.

# Kansas Still Major Miller In U.S.

Despite the loss of a number of mills in the past few years and a decline in milling output, Kansas continues to be the nation's leading flour producing state. Last year, about one-seventh of the flour milled in the United States came from Kansas mills.

Milling capacity in the state decreased from nearly 17 per cent of the nation's capacity in 1962 to less than 14 per cent in the first 11 months of 1968. Even with the decrease, Kansas

maintained an impressive lead over the next most important milling state, New York. In 1963 Kansas mills were turning out double the amount of flour to that of New York.

Kansas steadily increased its position in flour milling through 1963, Orlo Sorenson, associate professor of economics at Kansas State University, says. An abrupt change occurred in 1963 and the state's position in the milling industry began to decline.

Since that time, a number of Kansas communities have suffered loss of their mills. One of the latest to close was the Rodney Mill in McPherson in 1967. It reduced the number of mills in the state to the lower twenties.

Sorenson notes that several reasons have been offered for the decline in Kansas milling in recent years. As a matter of fact, flour production has declined nationally as well, but reduced production began sooner in Kansas and proceeded more rapidly.

Changes in flour markets and marketing techniques have had significant influence on the location of flour milling. One such change, Sorenson says, is the increased purchase of pre-blended bulk flour by commercial bakeries. This involves blending of wheat from different production areas and tends to favor mills located where

they can conveniently obtain wheat of various types.

He cites as an example mills in Illinois and Ohio, so located they are able to draw red spring and hard red winter wheat without greatly increased transport cost. Flour production in these and nearby states has increased in the past few years.

Transportation rates, of course, have been a major factor in the problems of Kansas mills. The principal breakaway from equal rates on wheat and flour came in 1963, at the same time flour production in the state turned downward. The rate changes affected transport costs to destinations in the southeastern U.S.

Even though transport charges were important in changing Kansas milling patterns, they have not been the exclusive reason for the decline. Sorenson says. Only last week, proposed sharply reduced flour rates from the midwest to the southeast were suspended by a temporary restraining order by federal courts after the Interstate Commerce Commission had earlier rejected appeals for suspension.

## Schnittker Back To KSU

He will return as a full professor and will engage in research and teaching in agricultural economics, with emphasis on rural economic development. Schnittker, who loses his job in the federal government with the change in administration, will be associated with the Resources for the Future Foundation, a Washington-based organization engaged in research in natural resources, for the next six months.

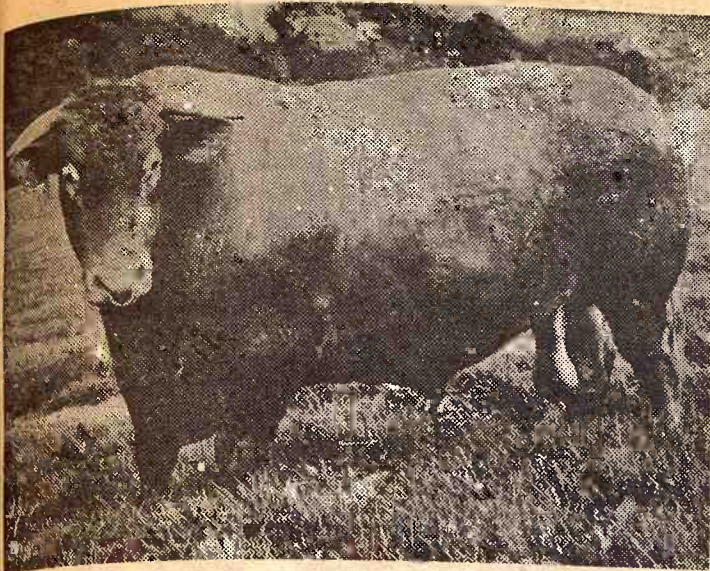

## 'Fresh Coat Of Rust' On Bridges

EMPORIA — That dark red color of the steel beams on the new Lyon County bridges is really a coat of rust. And the county has no plans to paint them — ever.

It's all part of a new technique in construction of small rural bridges — build 'em and forget 'em.

Like most county engineers, William D. Kretsinger of Lyon County found himself with a lot of old, dangerous bridges — many built 75 years ago or more — on secondary routes that don't qualify for federal aid.

And, again like most county engineers, Kretsinger didn't have much money to work with.

"I know of no county in the nation which has the money to replace all of its bridges that are

inadequate for today's loads," he said.

John Frazier, a Topeka design engineer, suggested using beams of "weathering steel that never need painting.

The industry has been fiddling around with weathering steel for more than 30 years, but only recently was the demand and production great enough to bring the cost within reach of local governments.

By adjusting the amount of nickel used in the smelting process, steel makers came up with a product which within a year of exposure develops a thin skin of iron oxide — or rust — which resists anything the Weather Bureau can throw at it. The rust coating, the manufacturers say, won't flake or rub

off once it sets.

To the untutored eye, a weathering steel bridge looks like any other bridge — steel frame and railing with a concrete deck.

Lyon County built its six bridges for a combined total cost of about \$115,000 — roughly the same as for ordinary steel spans. The added cost of buying the special material was just about offset by the fact that weathering steel is high-strength, and therefore less steel was needed.

## Missouri Outbreak Of Trichinosis

Trichinosis, once the scourge of pork promotions, has had an unusual outbreak in Washington, Mo., a town of 8000 west of St. Louis, which reported 47 cases over recent weeks, compared with 65 cases reported in all of the U.S. last year.

Trichinosis comes from eating the small worms in improperly cooked meat, usually pork. It has also on occasion been caused by meat from bears or marine mammals.

Health officials apparently think the origin of the disease in Washington, Mo., can be traced to a single meat market. They figure it will be in full control by mid-February.

The disease does not spread from one person to another. The only source is improperly prepared meat.

## A New 'Super' Pine Tree

International Paper company says it has developed a new strain of pine trees at its experimental forest and will plant new seedlings on nearly 4 million acres of company land in the South.

Darwin E. Fender, director of the experimental forest, said the so-called "super trees" grow

faster and are more resistant to disease and drought. In addition, they yield more fiber per cord for papermaking.

The new trees are scientifically crossbred from carefully selected species of southern pine — loblolly, slash and short leaf.

The company said the new strain may be harvested completely and a new crop planted in about 25 years as compared to the current cycle of 40-50 years from planting to harvest.

## Pearson Seeks Nixon Support Of Rural Development Bill

A Kansas senator — with the bipartisan backing of 30 colleagues — will seek President Nixon's backing for a rural redevelopment bill designed to stem migration from rural areas to cities.

Sen. James B. Pearson said he hopes to persuade Nixon and key members of his cabinet to put the bill in the administration's legislative program.

The, much like some others on the problems of rural and ur-

ban America, would attack the problems of the cities by making rural areas more inviting for workers and industry.

Pearson, a Republican, said it would provide a "judicious blend of private initiative and public responsibility."

Specifically, it would offer a 14 percent tax credit on personal property, a 7 per cent tax credit on real property, an accelerated depreciation of two-thirds normal life on industrial equipment and 50 per cent tax deduction on wages paid workers given on-the-job training.

The incentives would be offered industry choosing to locate in counties designated "rural job development areas," Pearson said. He defined such an area as counties with no city of over 50,000 population and where at least 15 percent of the families have incomes less than \$3000 annually.

The bill contains a provision guarding against abuse of such incentives by industry, including

a "recapture clause" designed to prevent an industry from moving in and moving out arbitrarily.

"The objectives of the rural development movement are truly national, not sectional," said Pearson.

"The rural development movement represents a new and vital part of our growing effort to deal with the crisis of the cities," he said.

## Too Many Steaks?

Farmers are making 11 steaks now where they made a year ago — also, 11 pounds of roast beef and hamburger for each 10 pounds served up in 1968. This is great news for the nearly 200 million beef eaters in this country, but the farmers who are producing this abundance are concerned lest they be forced to sell some of their cattle at a loss.

Ten percent more cattle on feed. The report of the abundance of beef in the making was released by the USDA on January 17. It showed that on January 1, farmers were fattening 12,579,000 cattle for market — 10 percent more than one year before. The figures are for cattle-feeding states.

The biggest increases were in Iowa, Texas, and Kansas. Illinois farmers were feeding 1,000,000 cattle — 9 percent more than last year.

We do not expect the total output of beef to be 10 percent more than in 1968. There are two reasons: (1) Some of the increase in the number of cattle on feed may have been caused by moving lighter, younger cattle into feedlots. (2) There probably will be a reduction in the number of nonfed cattle slaughtered.

The USDA survey of cattle feeders indicated that farmers would market 5,919,000 cattle during the first quarter of this year. This would be 6 percent more than the number farmers moved to market during this quarter a year ago.

Orderly marketing practiced. Cattle feeders have been sending cattle to market as fast as they reach desirable weights and finish. The report of Cattle Feed showed no holding back of cattle, which would produce excess tonnage of beef.

The number of steers weighing

ing over 1,100 pounds was estimated at 473,000 — up 22 percent from a year before. But the heaviest heifers (those weighing over 900 pounds) numbered only 323,000 — 12 percent less than last year. These two heaviest weight groups totaled 796,000 — just 5 percent more than in 1968.

Other weights also up. The number of steers weighing 900 to 1,100 pounds, plus heifers weighing 200 pounds less, totaled 3,070,000 — 12 percent more than a year earlier. Steers weighing 700 to 900 pounds plus the heifers that were 200 pounds lighter numbered 3,615,000 — 11 percent more than a year ago.

The number of steers weighing 500 to 700 pounds plus the heifers that were 200 pounds lighter totaled 2,703,000 — 14 percent more than twelve months before. Steer calves weighing under 500 pounds

were estimated at 1,029,000 — 3 percent less than at the first of 1968.

Caution lights on. A part of the prospective increase in the supply of fed cattle probably will be balanced by some increase in consumer demand for beef. We usually expect consumers to take 2 to 4 percent more beef each year without balking at prices. The indicated increase of 7 percent in marketings may be a little too much.

There will be more competitive meats, too. Farmers are reported to be increasing pork production by about 4 percent. The production of broilers is expected to run 4 to 6 percent greater than in 1968.

As we said before, the outlook is favorable for consumers, but farmers may have to take some lower prices for their meat animals.

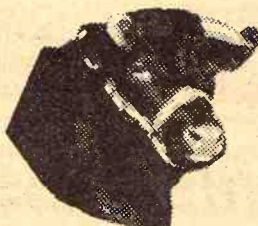

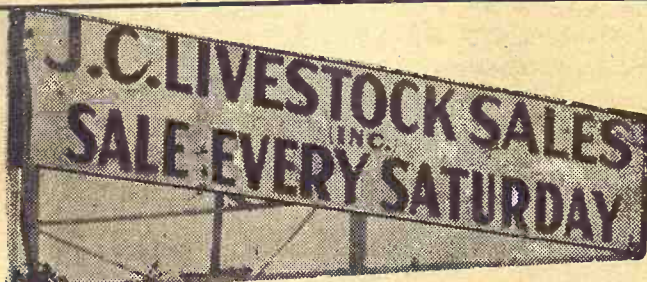

number of questions from com-  
mittee members about the phys-  
ical plant requirements de-  
manded of packers under the  
federal wholesome meat act.  
He said the requirements,  
which are generally considered  
too stringent by Kansas packers  
and processors, apply only to  
new packing plants that are  
constructed. He added, however,  
that cleanliness standards in the  
new federal act apply to exist-  
ing plants in Kansas.  
Sen. Bob Dole, R-Kan., said  
he was unsuccessful in offering  
amendments to the Wholesome  
Meat Act in the last Congress,  
largely because of fears by  
some of his colleagues that any  
amendments would open up the  
act to even tougher require-  
ments.  
Congressmen said attempts  
would be made to get sufficient  
support in Congress to make the  
requested changes in the federal  
law.

## USDA Says State Meat Inspection 'Not Acceptable'

A U.S. Dept. of Agriculture veterinarian says that present Kansas meat inspection stand-  
ards are unacceptable under the  
Federal Wholesome Meat Act.  
Speaking before a joint meet-  
ing of House and Senate Agri-  
culture Committees, in a ses-  
sion also attended by the state's  
seven congressmen, Dr. K. P.  
Mitchell of Kansas City said one  
big flaw is that packers pay the  
cost of the present inspection  
program.

The federal law requires that  
the cost for ante- and post-mort-  
em inspection of livestock car-  
casses be paid by money from a  
state's general fund.  
Witnesses testifying before  
legislative committees last year  
said the reasoning behind such  
a requirement is that the gen-  
eral public benefits from meat  
inspection, and that the persons  
most directly affected should  
not be paying the inspectors.  
The state has a voluntary sys-  
tem of meat inspection for pro-  
cessed products that are sold  
intra-state, and do not cross  
state boundaries.

Dr. Mitchell, who is the fed-  
eral-state coordinating officer  
assigned to Kansas, fielded a
