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#### GROUND TIME

The idea of crop dusters flying from sunrise to sunset with unending strain is false. Most crop dusters are lucky to get in a few hours in the morning and evening if the wind is down and the temperature isn't too high. "But the strain for those few hours is plenty," says Paul Kitchen, a Grass & Grain area crop duster. The plane in the two pictures above is a Steerman belonging to Kitchen and the bottom picture features the Grumman Ag Cat that belongs to Don Aukes, Conway, Arkansas. Aukes is helping Kitchen meet his schedule after Kitchen's plane developed an oil leak.

One point Kitchen stressed was that the price per acre when he started spraying in 1949 is close to the same price today.

The common idea of a crop duster just flying out to the job isn't true. It takes a lot of preparation, locating a strip for operation, looking over the terrain of the field to be sprayed, and getting the pilot and signal men on the same field or pasture are just a few of the problems the crop duster encounters.

Most of the spraying, in the Grass & Grain area during the early summer months is done in pastures. "You know the terrain is rough because the farmer would do the spraying himself in most cases if he could get through the pasture with a tractor," Kitchen said. Later in the season the job switches to insect and weed control in various crops.

# Nation's Steer Shows Get Low Value Rating

Grave concern over the future of the nation's steer shows and their present low value to the beef industry has been expressed by the U.S. Beef Breeds Council, whose members said they can not continue to accept "some common practices" of exhibitors at those shows.

Composed of nine established beef breed registries, the Council stated that "some positive changes must take place if steer shows are to regain their beneficial objectives", and "if those changes can not be implemented, the major emphasis of breed associations should be shifted to junior breeding heifer shows".

The Council met in Kansas City to consider methods of implementing rules and procedures which would make the junior steer shows of more educational value and more meaningful to the beef industry. The Council recently recommended the elimination of "open" or adult steer shows. That recommendation is generally being accepted at most major shows.

The discussions concerning Junior steer shows ranged from expressions of utility in supervising equitable rules for shows and controlling ineligible exhibitors to high hopes that the shows could be made even more meaningful than in the past.

Council members generally agreed that the steer program was a worthwhile activity for youth, and that the benefits to youth in educational value and self discipline and leadership development justified the continued support of the Council. They also agreed that steer shows were of benefit to the beef industry in training young breeders and for promotion of purebred seedstock.

However, the future effectiveness of those shows depended on drastic and sweeping changes which would require close supervision and enforcement, the Council said.

The Council agreed that the most significant problem was in the identification, including permanent identification of the individual steer and of the owner, and the age and breed of steer.

The Council recommended that all steers be fire branded at the beginning of the project before they are shown in the exhibitor's county show, and certainly before entrance

in shows of state level or higher. This identification would have to be made at least 120 days prior to the show, using a code system that would reveal the breed and the state from which the entry was made.

The Council also recommended that all shows have a uniform ownership requirement of at least 120 days prior to their respective show date.

Both the identification and entry deadline recommendations would help eliminate a practice of some exhibitors who purchase an animal at one show for exhibit at later shows, Council members explained.

Each breed association would assume the responsibility of determining eligibility of entries by breed identity. In case of disputes, a respective breed representative or a committee selected by the respective breed association would rule and decide on the exhibitor's eligibility to receive association premiums.

The Council restated earlier recommendations that carcass contests should be combined with regular established on-foot steer shows with the top end of the cattle being slaughtered and entered in the carcass show, the number determined by the cooperation of local packing plants.

Also, the group earlier recommended that breed associations not pay premiums in on-foot classes

where these carcass shows are separate from regular steer show classes at the same fair or exposition or on carcasses that do not grade choice. It was further recommended that breed associations support individual carcass classes at the rate of 20 percent of the total premiums paid.

The Council is composed of breed registries of Angus, Brangus, Brahman, Charolais, Hereford, Polled Hereford, Red Angus, Santa Gertrudis, and Shorthorn breeds.

## Foodmarket Price War Possible

For years the \$95-billion-a-year retail grocery business has watched what appears to be the gradual dethronement of the old king — the A&P food store chain.

At the end of March it appeared that the king might have lost his crown. The aggressive Safeway Stores, based in Oakland, Calif., intimated it might have passed A&P in sales by the slim margin of \$3 million the preceding 12 months.

Nobody could be sure because there's a month's difference in the dates of the two companies' reports.

Now the old king has launched a consumer price war that might shake the industry. It could result in A&P's resurgence. It also could lead to heavy losses for A&P and slash profits of some of its major competitors.

If A&P posts a good sales gain when it reports late in June on the first quarter of fiscal 1973, the dethronement will be postponed or averted.

That report should tell whether A&P's recasting of image and policy with the new WEO-for "Where Economy Originates" — label is working.

Safeway already has set a mark for A&P to shoot at. In the first quarter, Safeway sales spurred to \$1.326 billion from \$1.173 billion a year earlier.

A&P has had little to say about current sales except that, at the end of the fiscal year Feb. 26, it said sales had been improving steadily for months. Published reports have indicated some spectacular gains for A&P stores already converted to

the WEO price policy. Stores were doing only \$80,000 to \$100,000 monthly now are said to be up to \$300,000 a month.

Basically little has been changed except the prices at the 2,600 stores turned into WEO's. But price cuts have been so dramatic that both Supermarket News and Supermarketing magazine said a tough price war was inevitable.

The rest of the 4,200 A&P stores will be converted to WEO's by February. Even before then, average profit margin on individual items may be cut from the standard of 21 per cent to the level of 9 to 13 per cent.

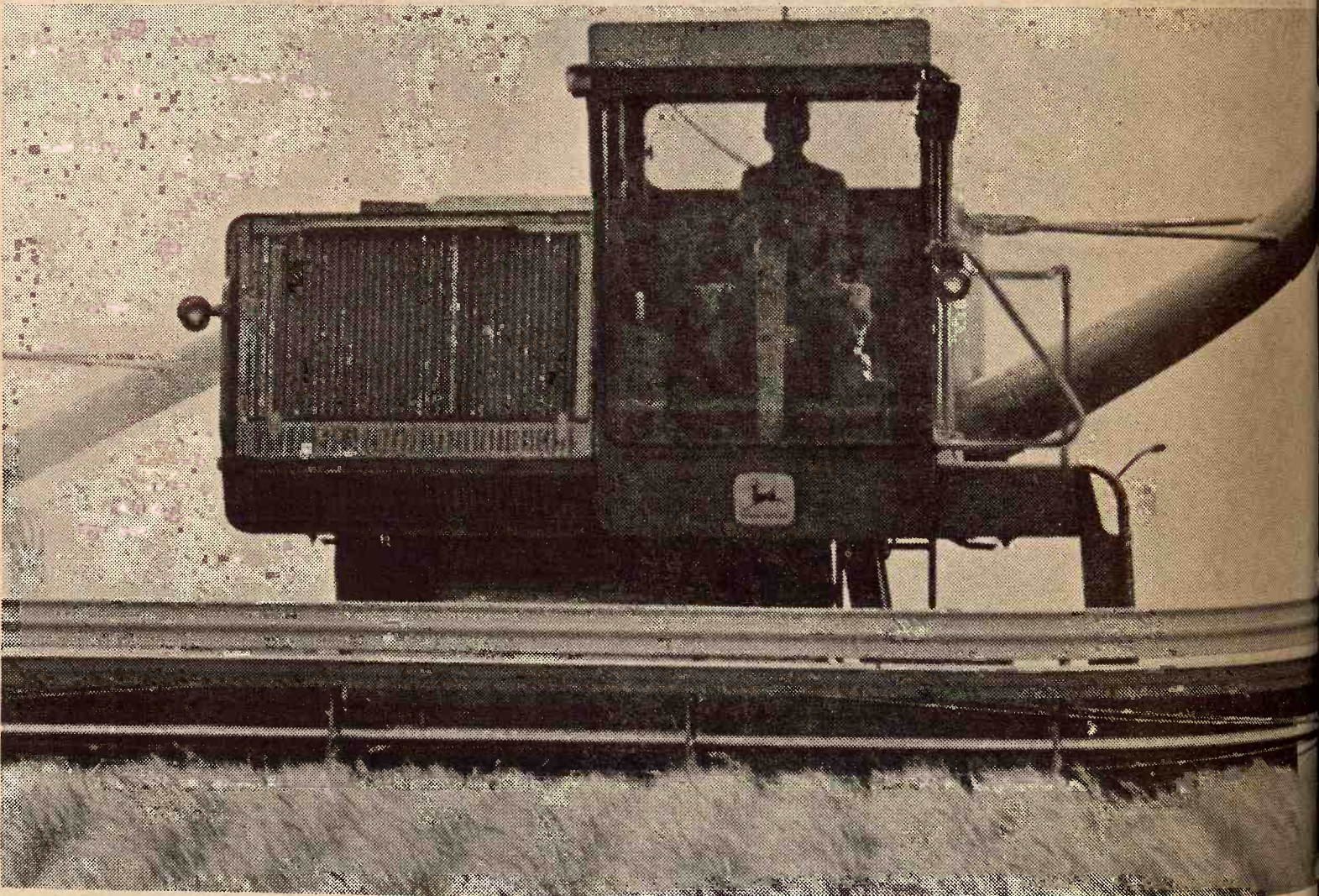

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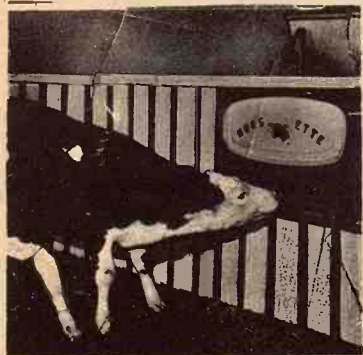
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# Simple Emphysema Test Determines Disease Carriers

Scientists have discovered a test that will enable people to learn quickly and inexpensively if they carry the genetic seeds for emphysema, the crippling, breathing lung disease.

Their finding, reported recently,

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means that smokers or others exposed to lung irritants can find out easily if nature has dealt the genetic cards predisposing them to emphysema.

For almost one decade, scientists have known that as many as one in every 20 people has an inherited deficiency of a blood protein called alpha one-antitrypsin or A.A.T. People with this deficiency are significantly predisposed to emphysema, which causes overextension of the lungs' air sacs and

kills more than 20,000 people each year.

Until now tests to pinpoint such individuals have been either too complex and expensive or discouragingly inaccurate to lend themselves to the necessary mass screening techniques.

The test was developed by Dr. Jack Lieberman of the City of Hope Medical Center in Duarte, Cal., and an associate Dr. Charles Mittman.

Dr. Lieberman said that the simplicity and apparent reliability

of the new test should enable an eventual large-scale screening program.

And Dr. Lieberman said that apart from being used as a diagnostic test, "We have stumbled into the cause of deficiency." He added, "We are getting to the basis of why there is an A.A.T. deficiency to begin with."

Such an understanding is essential to finding medical treatments that, once the genetic carriers are identified, could be used to correct the A.A.T. shortage in the blood or otherwise prevent development of emphysema.

Lieberman says the new test, will have immediate uses for employers to screen employees for work where lung irritants are present. He says one southern California industrial plant already has requested mass screening.

The test, which he expects can be performed for about 50 cents when widely available, requires placing a small amount of the patient's blood

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serum on a glass plate containing biochemicals. They react with A.A.T. and indicate how much A.A.T. or its breakdown products are present.

A similar test used in the past was inaccurate because a stress on the patient, such as an infection, disease or use of birth control pills, could mask the A.A.T. deficiency.

The doctors also discovered the reason for deficiency, individuals with the genetic defect produce A.A.T. in their blood just as other people do but for some unknown reason it breaks down soon after the body produces it.

As a result, the protein isn't available in the lungs where the body's natural defense mechanisms fight off invaders such as cigarette smoke or irritants.

## FDA Warns Against Oral Diabetes Drugs

After long delay and much resistance, the Food and Drug Administration has warned physicians against prescribing oral diabetes drugs for an adult patient except as a last resort.

Only when his condition "cannot be adequately controlled by diet and reduction of excess weight alone," or when insulin injections cannot be used the diabetes patient should take oral drugs, the FDA said.

The reason: The drugs appear to increase the risk of the fatal heart and bloodway diseases they are intended to prevent.

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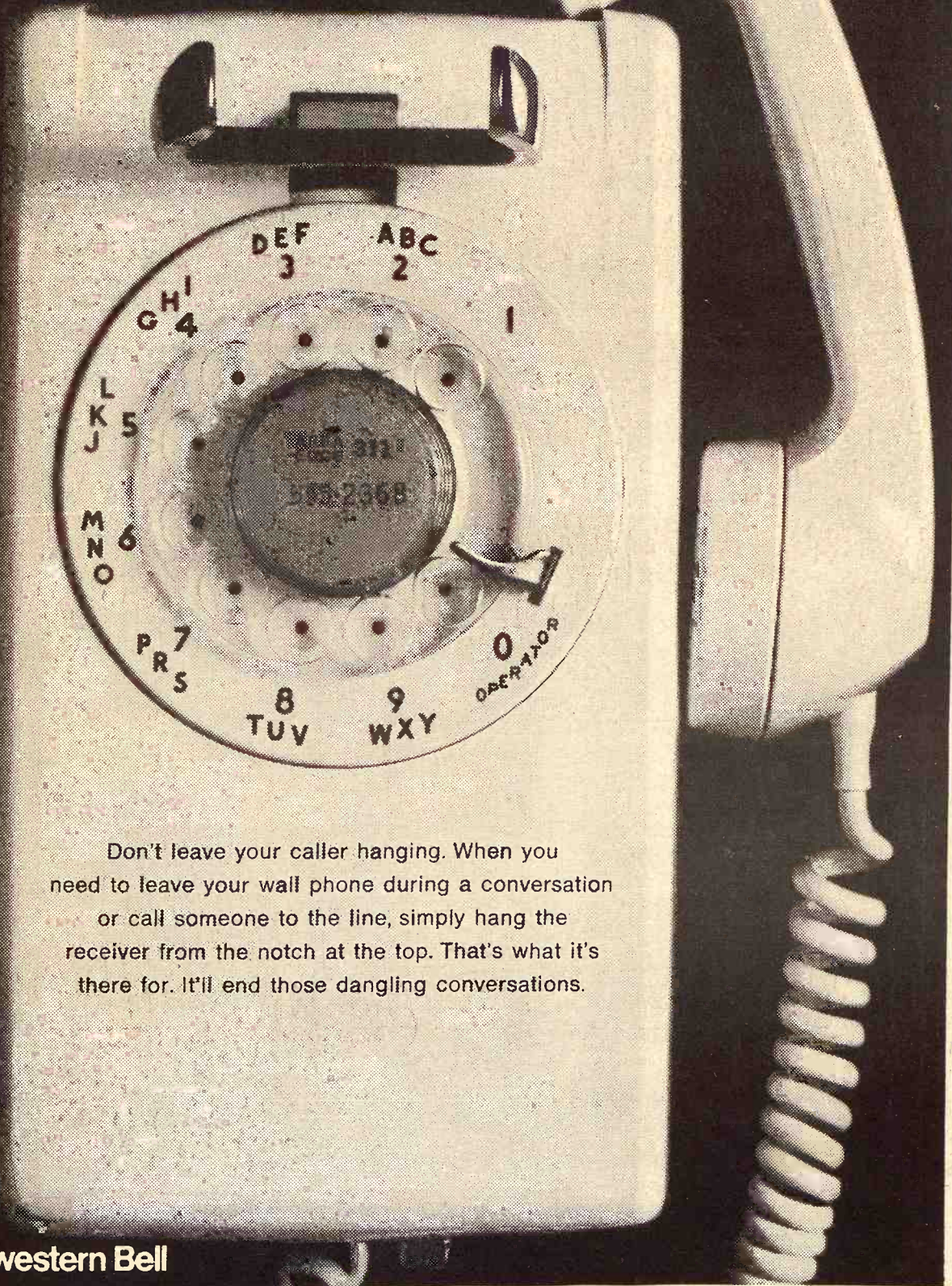
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# Harvest Problems Under Control

The impression prevails in the grain trade that the wheat harvest will be handled this year without serious trouble as to elevator space or transportation.

If this turns out to be a reality, it will be rather significant in view of a crop estimated to turn out at around 1.5 billion bushels and a carry-over on July 1, of 927 million bushels.

In neither case are these figures records, but they are big. This country's largest wheat crop was last year when the total harvest was 1,640 million bushels. The biggest carry-over was in 1961 at 1,411 million bushels. The carry-over this year, however, will be the largest since 1963, when it was 1,195 million bushels.

In a week or so, the harvest should be going full swing in Kansas, the biggest wheat state. Weather always plays a major role both in the pace of the harvest and in storage and transportation problems. A fast, dry harvest obviously produces a larger amount of wheat for all storage and transportation facilities in a short period.

On the other hand, a wet harvest not only creates difficulties for farmers and their combines, but disrupts plans for the normal handling of the grain as it gradually

ripens from the south to the north. As an example, if harvest is delayed by wet weather in Southern Kansas, it becomes entirely possible that by the time the fields have dried, the wheat in the central and northern parts of the state will be ripe and ready for the combines. Thus custom outfits which had planned to cut early in the southern part of the state and a week later farther north, find their schedules out of kilter.

There is nothing farmers, the grain trade, elevators or railroads can do about the weather. But they can plan for the harvest, and this year all facets of the business indicate they have no major worries. Thus if trouble does develop, it will come as a surprise.

Companies and cooperatives which have elevators throughout the hard red winter wheat area of Oklahoma, Kansas, Colorado and Nebraska say they think they have plenty of room for the new wheat, assuming they get the necessary freight cars to move grain to terminals. The terminals, such as Kansas City and internal terminals at Enid, Okla.; Hutchinson, Wichita, Salina and Topeka, Kans., have an abundance of storage space available.

The feeling prevails too, that the railroads are well prepared for this year's harvest. The fact is, the

railroads have rather successfully coped with the wheat harvest situation the last couple of years, dispelling to some extent the unhappy memories of a few years ago when it was necessary to pile millions of bushels on the ground.

If there is any entity that might be having qualms about the harvest, it could be the government which has millions of bushels of wheat in store in country locations. The Kansas City Office of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture handles government-owned (CCC) grain. This office has notified all country elevators in which CCC wheat is stored that if they want it moved to make room for the new harvest, loading orders will be issued immediately.

But the elevators are earning storage payments on the government wheat and they are reluctant to ask for removal of the grain until they are absolutely sure that they will be refilled from the new harvest. Some of them apparently are going to wait until they see the trucks of new grain coming down the road.

This creates a worry for the USDA officials, because they can foresee the possibility of having to move from 15 to 30 million bushels of old wheat in Kansas right at the time the

new harvest is underway. They are aware that at least some elevators, despite current optimism, could run into difficulties if isolated car shortage developed.

One factor favorable to handling of the hard winter wheat harvest is that while there is a rather heavy carry-over of the bread grain, percentage-wise the greatest increase over last year is in the spring wheat country. Since the spring wheat harvest is later, there is more time to prepare for it. Also, more of the spring wheat in store is on farms rather than in elevators.

It also is a fact that the wheat harvest, which once was the great rush season on the farm, no longer provides the largest quantity of grain moving to market in this country. The real harvest crunch comes in the fall when corn, milo and soybeans are all garnered at the same time. Once upon a time, nearly all corn was used either on the farm where it was grown, or in the local area. Now great quantities move into export, to feedlots and to the huge broiler farms. The same is true of milo.

Virtually all soybeans move from farms to market.

## Rising Shoe Prices Prompt Restraining Government Action

The rising price of shoes has prompted the price commission to take restraining measures.

In granting eight companies authority to increase shoe prices, the commission trimmed back the request and ruled that shoe companies could pass on to consumers

only a dollar-for-dollar increase in the price of leather.

It was the first time that a commission had restricted a company for a dollar-for-dollar increase to consumers on increases in costs of a raw material.

"It's not going to help the companies one bit," a spokesman said of the action. "There's no relief to the consumer because prices will not be going up as fast as the price of leather."

Since President Nixon's Phase economic controls were launched in November, the price of leather doubled, causing the administration to call in representatives of shoe companies and the cattle industry to explain what was happening.

The administration still has decided what to do although consideration of export controls on leather is one possibility. Commerce Department is studying that route to determine whether leather exports are causing domestic shortage.

## Parsons Stockyard In Different Hands

PARSONS — A change in operation of the Parsons Stockyard became effective recently with W. (Shorty) McAtee, of St. Paul, Kan., as the new lessee. The yard is owned by the Katy Railroad.

The change came with expiration of a lease initiated in 1932 by the C. I. Stafford, Springfield, Mo., carried on by members of family.

McAtee is a partner in one of the commission firms operating at yards. His lease from Katy operation of the yards is for 10 years with an option of renewal for another 10 years.

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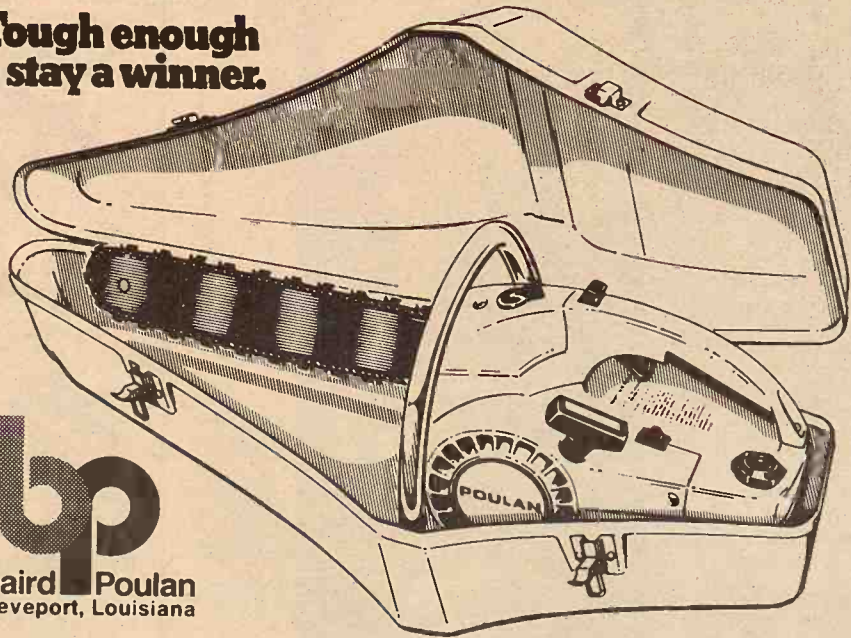
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# Nebraska Farm Income Doubles In Nine Years

The average Nebraska farmer and rancher's gross and net incomes doubled in the period from 1962 to 1971 but his net income has been declining each year since 1969, according to the State-Federal Division of Agricultural Statistics. The fact that the average farm unit's net figure declined in 1970 and 1971 illustrates what every good operator knows... that his costs of production, including taxes, have shown drastic increases. No one understands this better than the

man who has just paid \$30,000 for a new combine or in excess of \$10,000 for a new tractor. No figures can ever reflect the differences between individual farm and ranch situations.

In general terms, however, the statistics are revealing. In 1962, there were an estimated 84,000 farm and ranch units in the state. In 1971, the total was down to 72,000, a decline of 14.6 per cent. Fewer farms and ranches produced more and consequently had larger gross and

net incomes in most cases. Prices received for commodities overall advanced relatively little, with some drastic ups and downs as in the case of the hog market. Most of the gain in gross income came from bigger crop yields and greater livestock production.

In 1962, the cash receipts from all crops totaled \$405.1 million; from livestock and livestock products, \$834 million; from government payments, \$101.4 million; for a total of \$1.34 billion.

## Livestock Receipts Up

In 1971, the estimates for cash receipts from all crops showed \$643.2 million; from livestock and livestock products, \$1.49 billion; from government payments, \$173.2 million; for a combined total of \$2.31 billion.

Note that the total gross income increased approximately \$1 billion for the 10-year period, with the most spectacular gain coming from the increase in livestock production. It is also interesting to note that the percentage of the average unit's total gross attributable to the government payments remained almost constant. In other words, the \$101.4 million in government payments made in the state in 1962 was about 7.4 percent of the total gross agricultural income. In 1971 the \$173.2 million in government payments was just slightly over 7.5 percent of the total gross agricultural income.

The average gross income per farm in 1962 was \$15,851 with a net of \$3,570. In 1971, according to the

estimates, the average gross income per farm was \$32,955 with an average net income of \$8,002. While gross income figures went up every year, the average net income per farm hit a high of \$8,561 in 1969, dropping to \$8,136 in 1970 and then to the \$8,002 in 1971.

Compared with the rest of the nation, farmers and ranchers in Nebraska gained more rapidly than their counterparts in most other states. For example, the average farm operator in the U.S. had a net income of \$3,424 in 1962 on a gross income of \$11,196. In 1971 this was \$5,468 on a gross income of \$20,383. This would indicate that Nebraska farm and ranch units have been getting bigger faster in the 10 years, and also producing more livestock which overall has proved the more favorable farm commodity during this period.

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today asked states to go slow in passing antisniffing laws.

The Adhesive and Sealant Council, representing 60 companies, said the most common glue-sniffing deterrent, pungent oil of mustard, is ineffective and potentially dangerous.

The council said that of 42 sniffing deaths reported by newspapers in the last eight months of 1971, only four were attributed to glue while 26 were caused by aerosols and 12 by other household substances such as paint thinners.

Deaths resulted from suffocations, severe depression leading to suicide, and accidents caused by hallucinations such as the case of one sniffer who "thought he was Superman and jumped from the rooftop five stories to his death," the council said in a new report.

Antisniffing legislation has been passed in four states — Illinois, Indiana, New Jersey and Massachusetts — and is being considered in New York.

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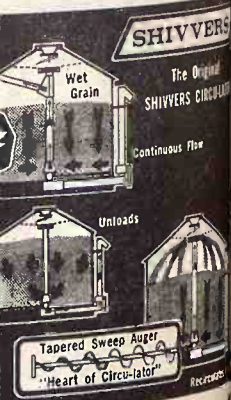
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## Secret Burgers Perfect Fare For Picnic

**SECRET BURGERS**  
1 pound ground beef  
1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
4 ounces processed American cheese

Break up meat with fork in a mixing bowl. Sprinkle with monosodium glutamate, salt, and

pepper. Toss gently to distribute ingredients. Shape into 8 thin patties. Cut cheese into 4 slices. Place 1 slice on each patty; cover with remaining 4 patties and press edges together to seal. Brown on both sides to desired doneness on outdoor grill. Serves 4.

**Variation No. 1:** Omit cheese. Combine 2 tablespoons pickle relish and 2 tablespoons catsup. Spoon 1 tablespoon on each of 4 patties; cover with remaining patties and seal. Cook as above.

## Change Closet Doors To Add More Space

The doors are sanded smooth at the factory and are ready for staining or painting.

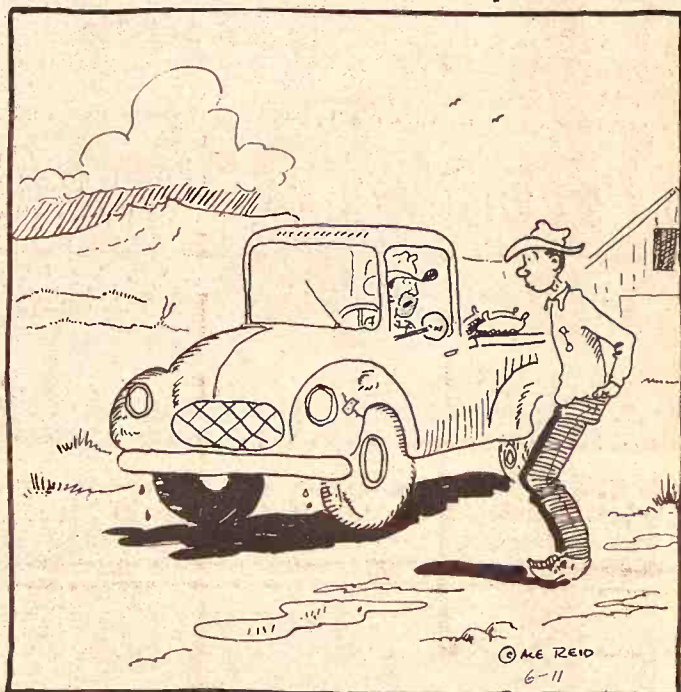

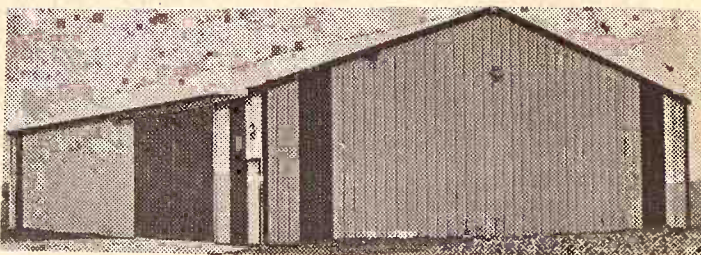

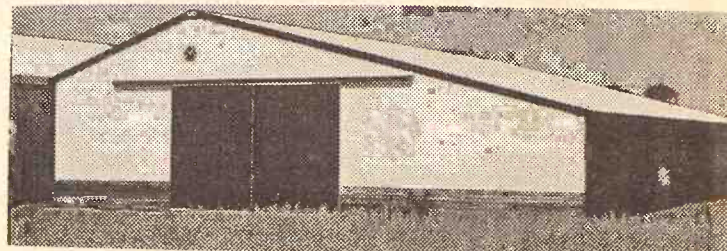

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## Aged Meat

To make a fine pressing cloth, cut the shape you desire from heavy muslin or drill cloth.

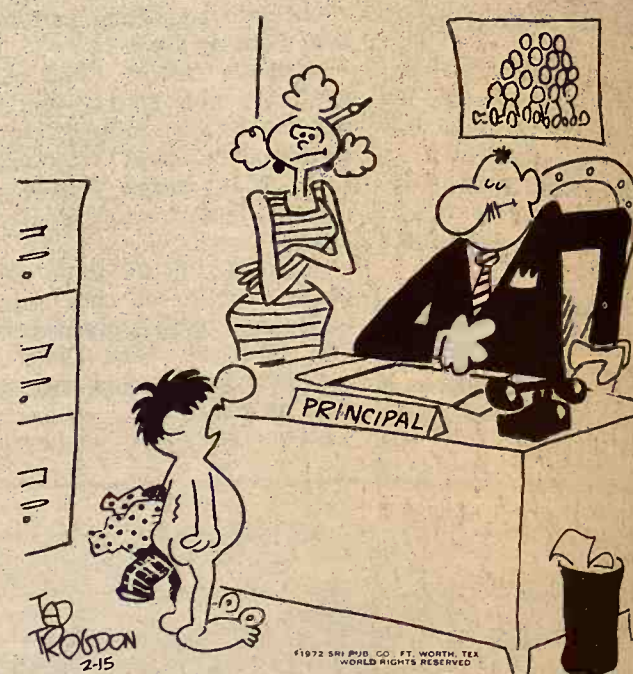

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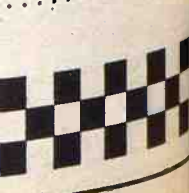
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## Questions On Range Burning Answered

MANHATTAN — Prairie fires — dreaded by early settlers on the Great Plains — have been credited with being responsible for the lack of timber on America's central grasslands.

Were they? Every spring one sees rangeland fires, many deliberately set in eastern Kansas to improve the quality and stand of new grass.

Does burning have a place in grass management farther west? Dr. J. L. Launchbaugh, who is a specialist in grass management at the Fort Hays Branch of the Kansas Agricultural Experiment Station (Kansas State University) and who has observed and analyzed burning effects on the central grassland, gives no definite "yes" or "no" answer to the first question, but has information from which to draw conclusions about the second.

Exactly what his research has led him to believe will be reported by him at the annual Tall Timbers Fire Ecology Conference, to be held in Lubbock, Texas, June 8 to 11.

Central rangeland grasses are known to tolerate grazing, to be

palatable, and to be highly nutritious. Reflecting the stresses of a long history of development in a harsh environment, those grasses are well adapted to the extremes of rainfall, temperature, and wind. Such extremes, compounded with a plains topography, have been conducive to widespread, periodic burning of the grasslands.

Citing various authorities, Launchbaugh points out that the concept of "prairie fires being instrumental in maintaining herbaceous species at the expense of shrubs and trees has not been universally accepted," but also that "circumstantial evidence of periodic burning... first by lightning and later by human agents as well is overwhelming."

So much for Question Number 1. The focus now is on Question Number 2 — on whether periodic seasonal burning of rangeland is beneficial or damaging; on where and how fires can be used in grassland management.

Launchbaugh notes that in the Flint Hills Tallgrass Prairie, burning is practiced widely to improve forage quality and summer grazing performance of young cattle and also to suppress woody plants.

He then notes that farther west, on the Mixed and Shortgrass ranges, burning is not practiced generally; indeed it is suppressed.

Why?

In his report, "Effect of Fire on Shortgrass and Mixed Grass Prairie Species," Launchbaugh interprets the effects of some recent wildfires in the central grasslands and explains results of three burning experiments on pure stands of mixed and short grasses on range sites near Hays. He takes into consideration climatic factors and grass types and especially illustrates how soil types (range sites) can influence species responses to burning — in conjunction also with mowing and raking — of top growth.

Launchbaugh concludes:

1. When mulch accumulations of herbaceous vegetation are extremely high, such as on protected lowland sites, burning will be beneficial and result in increased yields.

2. On most grazed sites where mulch accumulations are low, burning generally will reduce yields greatly — resulting "directly from heat kill or removal of growing points or indirectly from crown exposure to temperature extremes and unfavorable soil moisture relationships associated with subjecting high clay-content soil to the puddling action of raindrops."

3. Unless the overriding purpose is to control woody plants or to suppress accidental fire or to rid special areas of excessive mulch

accumulation, "yield sacrifices may be too great to consider periodic burning to increase livestock performance on many Mixed and Shortgrass Prairie range sites."

## Food For Peace Farm Dollar Share Hits Record Low

The dollar share of farm exports under Food for Peace programs fell last year to 13 per cent of the total, the lowest since 1954 when the popular aid program began, an Agriculture Department report said.

Commodities sold under Food for Peace accounted for about \$1 billion of the record \$7.7 billion in U.S. farm exports during the calendar year,

the Foreign Agricultural Service reported.

That was almost the dollar level of 1970 Food for Peace shipments, but far less than the peak of \$1.62 billion exported under the aid program in 1964 at the height of its popularity.

Several reasons were cited for the downturn: some of the traditional big aid recipients such as India and Pakistan are producing more of their own grain and need fewer imports, a sharp rise in cash sales of commodities, and a transition of commercial-type credit arrangements.

A few years ago, huge quantities of surplus U.S. farm products, particularly wheat, were sold under long-term "soft" credit arrangements allowing payments in foreign currencies. Changes were made in the Food for Peace program when Congress extended it in 1970 for three years, including a phaseout of the local currency payments.

Except for special authority reserved for defense grants and

other aid, the local currency payment method no longer is allowed generally in new agreements beginning this year.

The 13 per cent share of total U.S. farm exports last year was the smallest for Food for Peace since a four per cent ratio in 1954. That, however, was for only the first six months of the new program.

In the intervening 17 years, Food for Peace accounted for up to 30 per cent of all U.S. farm exports. In 1956 the entire value of commodity sales was \$4.1 billion, little more than half the current farm export pace.

The Food for Peace plan is split into two basic operations, Title I which permits sales under credit arrangements, and Title II which allows U.S. commodities to be donated to needy countries.

Last year, the FAS report said, sales under Title I totaled \$680 million, down from 1970, while Title II donations rose some, to about \$291 million.

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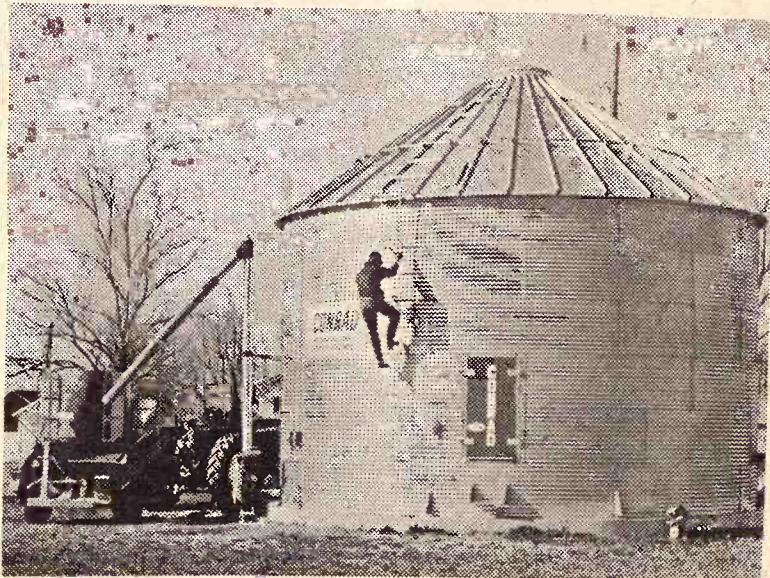
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## Kansas Drivers Accident Reports Change July 1

Effective July 1, Kansans will have a longer time in which to file fewer accident reports but will have to carry increased liability insurance.

Elton Lobban, superintendent of the State Motor Vehicle Department, reminded that the changes

were made by the 1972 Legislature. Drivers involved in accidents will have 15 days to file written reports with the motor vehicle department. Written reports are required only when the damage is \$200 or more, or if an accident results in personal injury or death.

Before the legislature's change, drivers had only five days in which to file written reports and were required to make reports if total property damage was \$100 or more or if an accident resulted in personal injury or death.

Similarly, law enforcement of-

ficers now have 10 days to file their reports instead of five days. If the investigation is not completed within the 10 days, the officer must file the original report and submit a later supplemental report.

Minimum public liability insurance has been increased to \$15,000 to cover bodily injury or death to one person, \$30,000 to cover bodily injury or death to two or more persons and \$5,000 for property damage. Before the legislative change, the statutory requisite was \$10,000-\$20,000-\$5,000.

If a person does not wish to take

out public liability insurance, he may, as an alternative, deposit \$30,000 (increased from \$25,000) in cash or securities with the state treasurer.

Louis Casebier, assistant administrator in the driver control division, safety responsibility section, said that last year 97,867 of 116,824 accident reports involved drivers who carried liability insurance. This left 18,957 accident reports involving uninsured drivers.

Casebier explained the procedure for liability-uninsured drivers who are involved in an accident. He said the person is issued a security request for the amount of damage indicated on the accident report. The person then has 20 days to comply. If he does not, he suffers the suspension of his driving and registration privileges until he has complied.

The person also must offer proof of financial responsibility for at least three years. Casebier said 99 per cent do this by actually taking out liability insurance. The home office of the insurance carrier files a statement confirming the issuance of liability insurance.

Casebier said he knew of only one individual who had deposited a \$25,000 bond or certificate with the state treasurer. He said taxicab companies deposit the \$25,000 bond rather than carry liability insurance for each vehicle.

## Feeder Cattle Imports Reduced

Efforts to build up cattle herds in Canada and Mexico have reduced sharply the flow of imported cattle and feeder stock into U.S. pastures and pens, says the USDA.

Feeder cattle imports from Canada, which averaged more than 300,000 head a year a decade ago, have dropped to fewer than 30,000 annually, says the Foreign Agricultural Service.

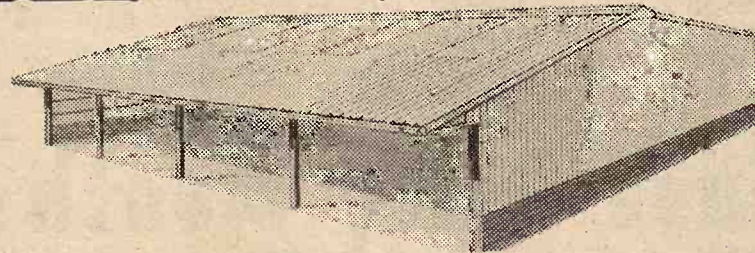
Mexican producers, who boost shipments to U.S. markets because of drought — forced cutbacks years ago, are now rebuilding herds. Consequently, the Mexican government has reimposed traditional embargo on heifer exports.

Thus, the FAS said Monday report, there was an 18 per cent decline in Mexican cattle shipments to the United States last year, down from 907,000 head in 1970 to 749,000.

Consumer demand for more beef, a spreading phenomenon in many countries, had forced Canada to reduce cattle exports in order to build up its herds, officials said.



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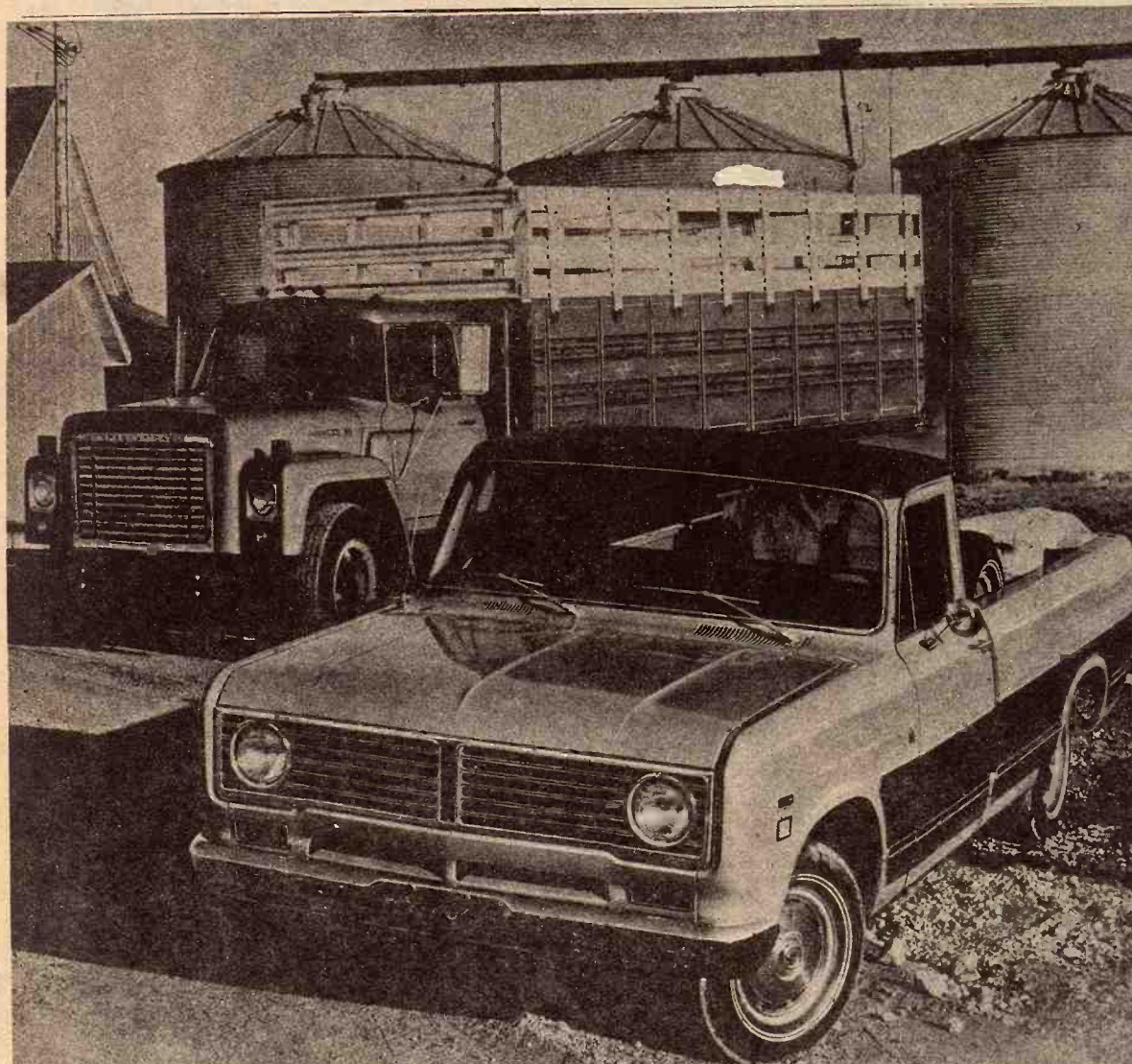

## Kansas Wheat Silage Being Feedlot Tested

If animal science researchers have their way more wheat will find its way into silos instead of elevators during harvest next year. Research underway in the Animal Science and Industry Department of Kansas State University could have a major effect on the use of wheat in cattle feedlots of the state, scientists believe.

Dr. Keith Bolsen is leading the team of researchers studying wheat head silage as a growing ration and finishing ration for cattle and sheep. Results are being compared with corn silage in the ration.

Tests this spring are being made to determine at what point in maturity wheat heads are the best and most nutritious feed. Bolsen said silage is being made from wheat in boot and milk stages, dough stage and ripe, mature stage.

Research is being done with 48 acres of wheat near the beef research center on campus. About 100 tons of wheat silage will be used in a steer finishing ration this fall.

Researchers want to learn if wheat silage can be as productive as corn silage in the ration.

If wheat silage is successful as a finish feed, Bolsen points out it will mean earlier harvests, allow time for double-cropping wheat land, and will provide for use of wheat as

graze as it has been traditionally used in grain cropping.

The test was begun last year with wheat provided by Walter Porter, rancher from Osage County who has used some wheat silage in cattle rations.

Dr. Don Good said the research could lead to greatly increased use of wheat as a finish feed for cattle in the state and thus increase demand for wheat.

About 35-50 per cent wheat grain is in the head chop silage being used. Extra time and extra machine hours for the research is being absorbed from regular funding patterns, Dr. Good said, because it was hoped earlier the Kansas Wheat Commission would sponsor the research. However, the plan was presented to the KWC in January and nothing has been heard from the group, Good said.

"So, we just decided this was important enough to do the best we can with what we have. The whole team has been doing their best despite lack of funding," he said.

The wheat is being ensiled at 60 to 70 per cent moisture in 55-gallon barrels for one test, and in regular upright silos for another.

highways or subdivision, it may be dead; dead from the standpoint that it is not living up to its best possible agricultural use.

How do you prevent this? Some 400 Iowa Farm Bureau members got together and said, "By planning ahead," and they're doing just that. Most of these folks were members of County Farm Bureau environmental resources committees and they want to see what can be done for agriculture and land use management.

I think we, as farm people, should be learning our lesson from standing back and letting other segments of our society dictate what and what not we shall use in insecticides, drugs, additives for our crops and livestock. Also we should revolt to the way they say our crop sales are handled overseas by the State Department instead of the Agricultural Department—people who know our needs. The problem we are faced with at the moment is county zoning, first for one thing and then another. Mr. Minott "June" Silliman an Assistant Director in the resource development division, Soil Conservation Service, U.S.D.A. told the Iowa group that as people become involved, they find that land use planning is not zoning, nor does it necessarily have to lead to zoning. "In fact, some people have found that zoning without planning is like 'hitching the cart before the horse'," Silliman said.

I think we have a horse of a different color galloping into the foreground. The problem is not one as much of diverting rich agricultural land to urban use, but unplanned development. For example, residential areas along highways are stretching out into ribbon developments and can produce real management problems. One Iowa State University extension economist Mr. Eber Eldridge struck close to home when he said planning should consider removal of abandoned farmsteads that are becoming eyesores; also the possibility of closing rural roads no longer needed because of the decline in farm numbers. I personally feel that the time is almost past ripe in doing something about our own roads, unsafe bridges and the extended building along Highway 24 and around other towns here in Pottawatomie County.

U.S. Senator Jack Miller of Iowa also

told the group the "permanent damage to our agricultural land base has been occurring through unplanned or poorly planned urban development, inadequate flood plan development, uncontrolled site location for industry and housing, and improper routing of streets and highways. This is not to say that all of these developments are bad or unplanned. But one bad one is too many.

We find a net shift of almost 15 million acres from agricultural to non-agricultural uses has occurred since 1958. This should sober us up to realize it is later than we think.

It must be pointed out that farmers need to be well informed on the land use issue so they can be knowledgeable enough to lead local action, to insure that any proposals made will protect rights of those people on the land.

We also need planned legislation affecting the land and the fact that social and environmental goals—not just econ-

omic goals—must be considered. We, in the nation now and in years ahead must make do with the land we have. Increasing numbers of people in many walks of life are sharing with us a concern that all people work together to achieve wise use, care and development of our environmental resources—people, land, air and water. For example with Tuttle Creek Lake here and another being planned, along with expanding industries and housing mushrooming all over, we now need to get in at the beginning of land use planning right along with zoning boards, planning boards, commissioners, boards of appeals and boards of health.

My challenge is, "Do you want to protect your property rights and develop a workable land use management plan, or just have it zoned away?"

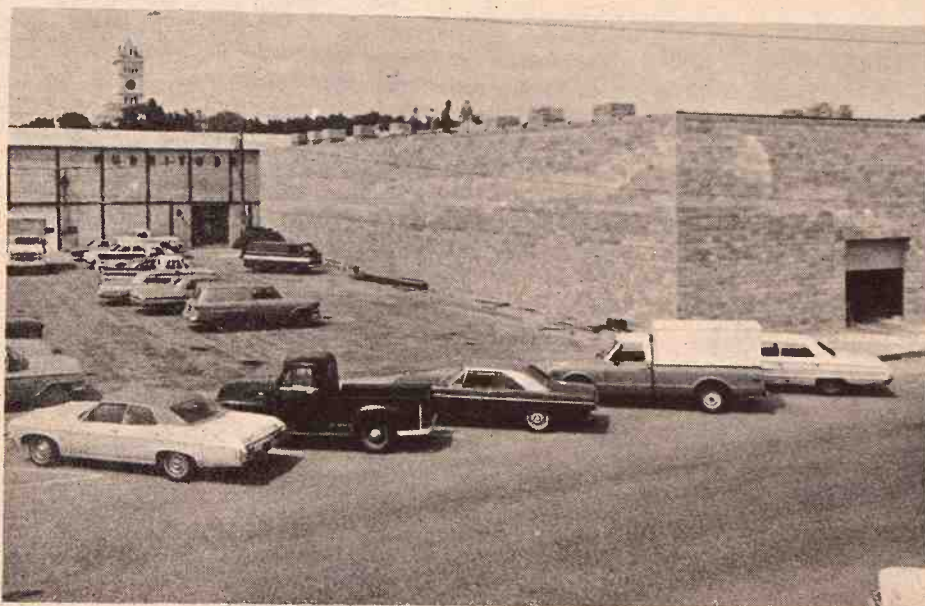

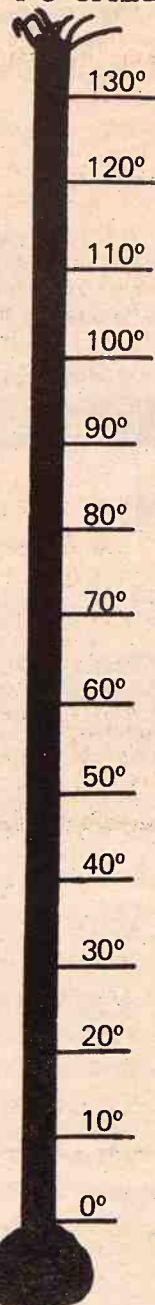

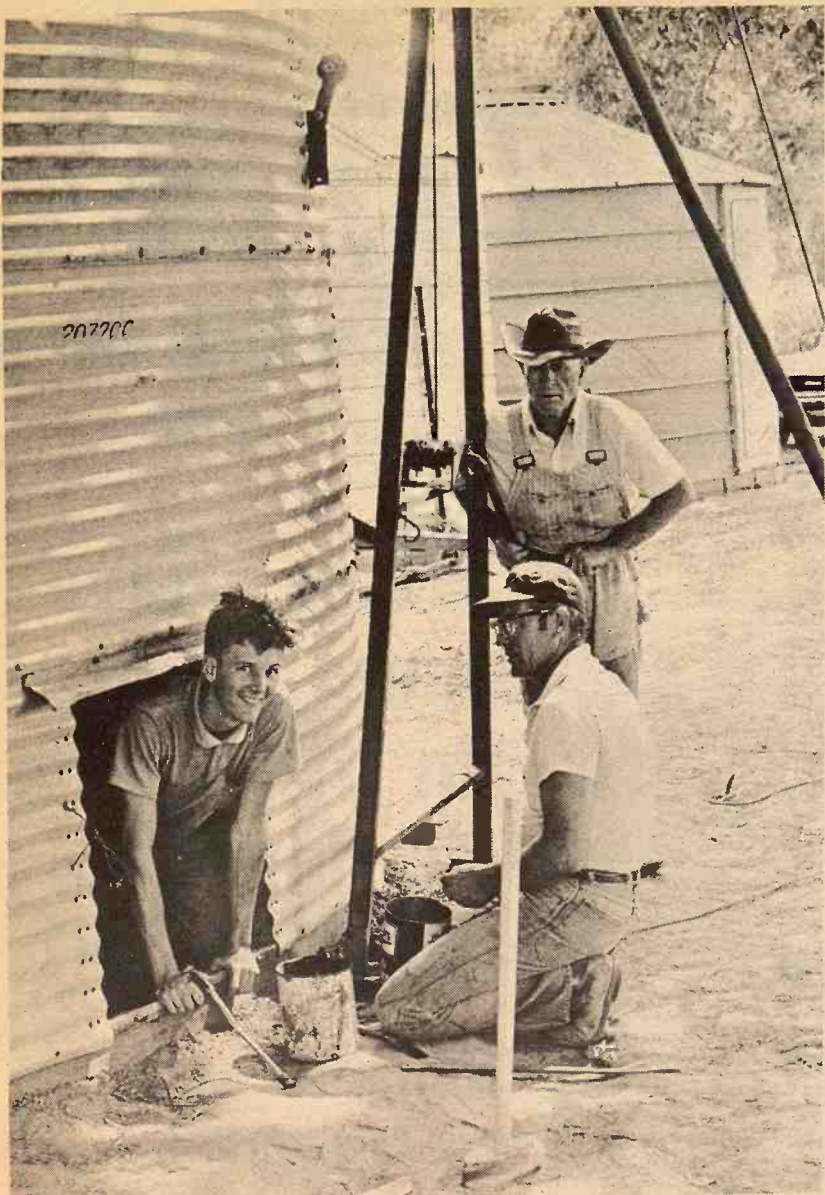

#### Atrazine Peddlers Plague Nebraska With Fake Stuff

Transient door-to-door peddlers selling counterfeit atrazine "at a big savings" apparently haven't pestered Kansas farmers yet, but they've been active in Nebraska. Frank Bieberly, Extension agronomist at Kansas State University, was told several tons of counterfeit atrazine were sold and delivered in Nebraska within the year.

Aatrex is the registered trade name of the Ciba-Geigy Corp. for the herbicide atrazine. Bieberly said Nebraska officials told him counterfeit packages of Aatrex 80W are difficult to tell from the authentic product.

Instead of getting atrazine, Nebraska farmers apparently received finely-ground lime. In many cases the counterfeit material was sold to farmers below dealer cost.

Chances are that farmers using

the material as atrazine will encounter difficulties when it is mixed with liquid fertilizer.

Bieberly suggested farmers avoid door-to-door chemical salesmen and purchase material only from established local dealers.

consolidated 5-State report showed Scout at 8.4 million acres, compared with 7.5 million acres seeded in the fall of 1970. Scout and Scout 66 were combined in the regional tables. Scout was the leading variety in Kansas, Nebraska, and Colorado. The percentage seeded to Scout in Kansas increased from 46.9 to 47.7 but decreased from 37.2 to 36.9 in Nebraska. In Colorado, Scout increased from 40.4 to 49.0 percent of the total.

Triumph remained the second most popular winter wheat variety, accounting for 17.5 percent of the seeded acreage for 1972, although down from the 18.2 percent the previous year. Triumph was seeded on 3.8 million acres, compared with 3.7 million last year. Triumph was the leading variety in Oklahoma, accounting for over half of the acreage seeded to winter wheat in that State. Virtually all of the acreage seeded to Triumph was in Oklahoma and Kansas.

Satanta continues to climb in popularity, ranking as the third most popular winter wheat variety in the 5-State region. Satanta comprised 5.3 percent of the seeded acres compared with 4.4 percent last year. Satanta was seeded on 1.1 million acres last fall compared with 0.9 million acres the previous fall. Parker moved up from seventh to fourth position, representing 4.4 percent of the seeded area. There were 0.9 million acres of Parker seeded for 1972 harvest, compared with 0.8 million in 1971.

Wichita dropped from third to fifth, representing 4.1 percent of the seeded acreage compared with 6.4 percent the previous year. A total of 0.9 million acres was seeded to Wichita in the fall of 1971 compared with 1.3 million acres the previous year. Most of the Wichita variety is grown in Colorado and Oklahoma. Lancer accounted for 4.0 percent and Warrior 3.5 percent of the total seeded acreage. Sturdy, grown primarily in Oklahoma and Kansas, continued to show a moderate gain in popularity. Sturdy was seeded on 2.8 percent of the acreage, an increase from 1.9 percent in 1971.

# Steak Definition Causes Confusion On All Sides

When is a steak a steak? That's the question the Beef Industry wants answered, and apparently the problem isn't simple.

A hearing on changes in regulation of the Kansas Meat and Poultry Inspection Act adopted two years ago by the Kansas Legislature drew fire from all directions.

Officially, regulations say a steak

is a slice of meat cut from the muscle of a food animal. Whether it is new York, K. C., sirloin, chuck, club, round, rib or even T-bone doesn't seem to cause any problems.

But if one grinds it, the meat becomes a patty, according to regulations. If you want to call it hamburger steak, or perhaps salisbury steak, then comes the

argument.

Or, if a processor wants to put in a little meat extender, some nonfat dry milk, and perhaps a bit of textured vegetable protein and vitamins, can he shape this and call it steak?

The restaurateur would like to keep the names salisbury steak and hamburger steak, according to testimony by Bill Morris, executive director of Kansas Restaurant Association.

Charles Todd, Kansas City, president of Ranch Hand Food Inc., said he thinks Kansas meat inspection regulations are in error when they don't allow textured vegetable protein under a steak label.

Even the State Board of Health would like to hold on to the terms "hamburger steak" and "salisbury steak," according to Dr. John Blank, Hutchinson, president of the State Board of Health.

Blank appeared before the hearing in support of all regulations adopted by the Meat and Poultry Inspection Division of Kansas Department of Agriculture except the steak issue.

Three other regulations were discussed at the hearing in the basement auditorium of the State Office Building.

These regulations concern "water added hams" pork tenderloin and patties — both beef and pork.

More than 50 persons attended the hearing, and about half of them spoke. Any changes in the regulations will await the quarterly

meeting of the State Board of Agriculture in July, said Roy Freeland, secretary of the state board.

R. C. Clappitt of the Manning-Clappitt wholesale meat firm, Wichita, touched a sore spot in the state enforcement of meat inspection regulations, when he complained meat carefully inspected at wholesale levels is immediately treated without any inspection once it reaches retail outlets.

He pointed out many of the regulations covering food processing are ignored by retail stores so that consumers are not being protected to the full extent of the law.

The state's meat inspection law requires the inspection division to enforce the law to the retail level only if a firm does more than \$10,000 or 25 per cent of its volume in meat each year.

State Health Department is required to make the retail inspection.

Rep. John Vogel, R-Lawrence, chairman of the house agriculture committee, spoke briefly. He said that if the confusion of terms and regulations (between the health department and the meat inspection division) was not settled, the Legislature may take specific action in the next session.

"I just want you to know that there was many hours of discussion about this in the last session, and I believe if this is not settled, the Legislature will take action," he warned.

Wallace Austin, Kansas Consumers Association representative, warned the processors producers that anytime there is improper labeling or confusion about a product, consumers buy it "but it makes us mad about and that isn't good for business."

C. A. Schreiber, Thies Packing Co., Great Bend and Max Winchester Packing Co., Hutchinson, advocated new regulations allowing packers to process and sell water-added hams.

They pointed out many of the Kansas grocery shelves are 8 per cent water. They said hams are allowed under meat inspection regulations that the cost of these hams usually 10 per cent below that which water is not allowed.

Water-added ham is brought by processing in which the flavor is put into the ham in a solution during processing. The smoked hams must weigh when they are sold as they before the processing began.

The water added hams are 110 per cent of the original weight.

Clappitt, in his testimony, vocated a relief from the regulation which requires 70 per cent lean in pork sausage. He said with a 60-40 per cent of lean to a better flavor than the higher proportion.

He also said that hamburger across retail grocery store in Wichita seldom meet the 70 per cent lean requirement.

Clappitt said he bought 100 pounds of family style hamburger in Wichita and his chemical analysis showed none of it met the 70 per cent lean requirement.

## Wheat Trade Update

Final statistics for 1970-71 world wheat trade was the fourth year, the Agriculture Department reports.

The volume totaled 53.8 million metric tons, compared with 52.1 million in 1969-70, according to a report issued by the Foreign Agricultural Service.

Smaller wheat crops in Europe and the re-entry of the Union into the import market cited as major factors in the increase, the report said.

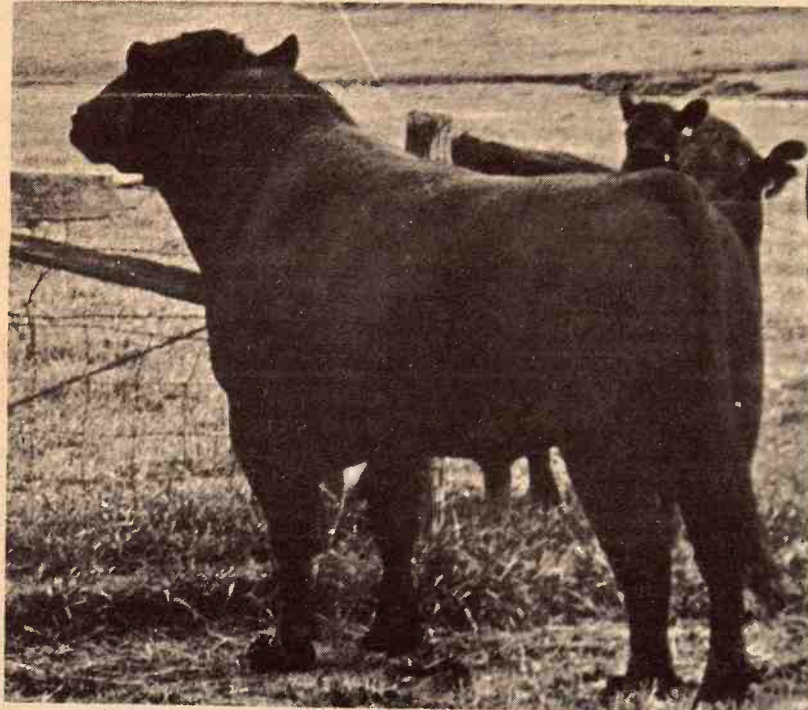

# Wheat Forecast Jumps To 300 Million Bushels

The 1972 Kansas wheat crop is forecast at 306 million bushels based on June 1 conditions, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. This year's production, if realized, will be 2 percent smaller than last year's record 312.6 million bushel crop but will be the State's third largest crop. Timely early May rains together with favorable cool filling weather during much of the month gave the State's wheat crop a good boost. Dry weather relief was limited in several western counties and conditions were somewhat variable. Some frost damage to wheat from low temperatures in early April became more apparent during May in a number of southern counties. Wheat harvest started this week in counties along the Oklahoma border. The condition of pasture and range feed as of June 1 was well above average for the date.

## WINTER WHEAT

The 1972 winter wheat production

following the 312.6 million bushel production last year and the 307.6 million bushels produced on a much larger harvested acreage back in 1952.

Farmers expect to harvest 9,000,000 acres, 1 percent less than a year earlier. The expected yield, at 34 bushels, is 1/2 bushel below last year's record high but otherwise highest in the State's history.

The wheat crop in several counties in the southwest district along the Colorado border suffered considerably from lack of moisture before general rains provided relief in mid-May. Also in a number of southern and some central counties frost damage from an early April freeze became more apparent in many wheat fields thus reducing yield prospects. Some leaf rust and considerable streak mosaic have been reported from local areas but overall damage thus far has been local in nature. Harvest started this

week in extreme southern counties with wheat combining expected to be in full swing in southern areas during the week of June 12 if weather permits.

## PASTURES

Pasture and range feed condition in the State improved during the month of May and on June 1 averaged 90 percent of normal, the second best for the date in 11 years.

Substantial rains over most of the State in the first half of May followed by warm weather in the last half stimulated growth of pasture and range grasses.

## OTHER CROPS

Irish potato production is forecast at 95,000 cwt., down 23 percent from last year and one of the smallest crops of record. A yield of 95 cwt. per acre is expected, equal to last year and well in line with that of other recent years.

June 1 prospects for the 1972 peach crop at 1.7 million pounds are sharply below last year's 6 million pound crop and the third smallest produced in the State since the early 1940's. Winter freeze damage was severe in many areas of the State followed by a sharp freeze in early April which killed many additional

peach blooms. However, a few growers scattered over the State expect to harvest some peaches from their orchards.

## UNITED STATES

The Nation's 1972 winter wheat production was forecast on June 1 at 1,192 million bushels, up 4 percent from the May 1 forecast and 2 percent above last year's crop. Acreage of winter wheat to be harvested for grain was estimated at 34,798,000 acres compared with 33,049,000 acres last year. An average yield of 34.3 bushels per harvested acre is expected, down .9 bushels from last year's record high.

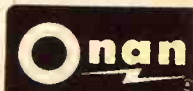

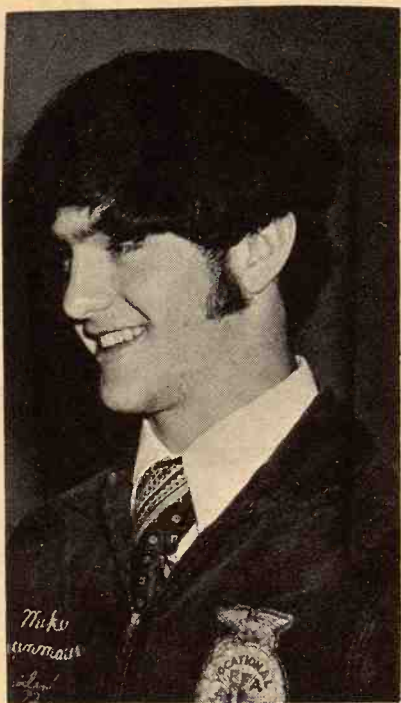

## More Family Held Farm Corporations

Corporation farms are becoming more numerous in Kansas, an Extension economist says. But most of this growth appears to be in the family-held farm, rather than giant corporate operations owned by non-agricultural interests.

Recent census figures show there were 328 corporation farms in Kansas in 1969, Don Pretzer told a group of 80 Kansas bankers attending the second annual Kansas School of Agricultural Banking on the Kansas State campus.

"Almost 90 per cent of these number 10 or fewer shareholders," Pretzer said. "Corporation farms with 10 or fewer stockholders are almost always family-held operations."

"We have little information on the few corporation farms with more than 10 shareholders, but some of these could be headed by non-agricultural interests."

Pretzer dispelled the myth that the corporate form of organization is synonymous with farm size. Size is a function of management and availability of resources, not the type of organization, he said.

Corporate farms accounted for less than one-half of one per cent of the total farms in Kansas, according to the latest census. Forty per cent

of the farms in the state were operated by single proprietors, 41 per cent by part owners and 18 per cent by tenants.

Corporate farms with 10 or fewer shareholders averaged 1,867 acres in size, and accounted for only about one per cent of total farm acreage in Kansas. Corporations with more than 10 stockholders averaged 1,836 acres and totaled only one-tenth of one per cent of farm acreage.

Pretzer pointed out that larger farms and those involving high risks gain most by incorporating. Among the main reasons for incorporating are ownership transfer and estate planning.

Ownership of a corporate farm may be transferred from one generation to the next, allowing the farm to survive as a single unit over time. Single owner farms frequently must be sold by the heirs on the death of the operator.

## Developed Camp Grounds To Draw Camping Fee

A daily camping fee will be charged at selected camp areas at six Corps of Engineers lakes in the Kansas City district starting May 26 and extending through Sept. 1, Col. W. R. Needham, district engineer, said.

Ten lightly developed campgrounds with such facilities as potable water, quality toilets, controlled access, tables and fireplace grills are involved, he said. Kansas lakes included in the \$1 user fee for campgrounds are Milford Lake near Junction City, the Rolling Hills campground area; Pomona Lake near Ottawa, Wolf Creek and Michigan Valley campgrounds; Perry Lake northwest of Lawrence, the two areas of Old Town and Perry campgrounds; Wilson Lake near Russell, the two areas of Minooka Park and Otee Park campgrounds.

## Santa Fe Expects Heavy Grain Load

Santa Fe Railway expects heavy grain movement this season with the winter wheat harvest promising to be close to the 1971 harvest of 487 million bushels in Santa Fe territory, John S. Reed, president of Santa Fe Railway, said.

The grain movement during the first four months of the year, however, was disappointing due largely to the failure of the U.S. Department of Agriculture to order the relocation of grain stored in country elevators in Kansas before this year's harvest, he said.

Another fundamental reason for the downward trend in grain shipments is the great change in marketing patterns of recent years with more grain consumed locally in vast feedlot operations throughout the Southwest, he added.

Reed estimated earlier that Santa Fe will be called upon to move more than 20,000 covered hoppers and more than 3,000 box cars loaded with wheat.

## Hickory Flavor In Grass & Grain Area

Old-fashioned hickory-smoked flavors and three generations of experience in meat processing makes the Pony Express Ranch and Meat Processing Plant one of the tastier places to visit in the Grass and Grain area.

This modern facility, the only one of its kind in Kansas, is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. James Swim. Located on U.S. Highway 36, just east of Marysville, the plant began operation about four years ago.

The plant's name is derived from the fact that it is located on the Pony Express Memorial Highway and because Swim's original locker and frozen food plant was formerly in the old Pony Express station in Marysville. That site has since been renovated and restored as a museum commemorating the history of the Pony Express.

The new plant is a far cry from Swim's grandfather's day of scalding a freshly stabbed fat hog in an iron kettle of boiling water over a roaring fire when the butchering chore on the farm required four to six men from daybreak to dusk to process three or four hogs. The Pony Express Ranch can if necessary butcher 25 to 30 hogs per hour with only three men working.

Among the products processed in the new plant are cured, smoked ham, bacon, summer sausage, link pork sausage, bologna, liver sausage and headcheese, all bearing the Pony Express label.

Swim has revolutionized the processing of cured meat products

by the use of automated equipment. But products of the Pony Express Ranch reproduce as nearly as possible the best of the old-fashioned family recipes, some of which originated in a German ethnic community three generations ago.

Swim, who keeps 150 head of cattle and 75 hogs on his 300-acre farm, said he has a dependable source of hogs and cattle from local producers. The plant buys local livestock, local grain and sells the finished processed meats locally. "This way," Swim said, "the money stays in the community."

About 75 percent of the operation is concerned with custom butchering for local people. Swim also does his own butchering and provides meats to individual customers on a retail basis. He also provides some meat for the school lunch program and has some restaurant and institutional trade.

A drive-in and tourist trade has been established at the farm home and the mail order demand for home-cured hams and bacon has grown rapidly.

A smoke house within the processing plant is far removed from the hickory wood or cob-stoked building on the farm. Four hundred hams can be accommodated in the smoke house after being cured by chemical reaction to organic matter in the curing room. The plant utilizes a dry curing method. Prior to being dry cured, the hams are soaked in fresh water for six to eight hours to remove the body salt. In the curing process, the meat is raised to 138

degrees to kill any internal organisms and prevent trichinosis.

Hams and sausages hang on smoke trees, stainless steel brackets extending from a center pedestal. The smoke house will hold five smoke trees.

Products are cooked at 189 degrees by turning on the inverted hot showers in the cooking room. Both hot and cold showers are located in the smoke house for humidity control. Smoke from the specially fabricated smoke tender machine, equipped with a burner and generator, is piped into the smoke room where funnels dispense dry hickory smoke. Different types of sausage require different heat procedures but the smoking process usually takes three days.

The meat is removed from the smoke house by track and stored in the product cooler on stainless steel shelves maintained at 38 to 46 degrees.

The new plant utilizes an hydraulic sausage stuffer. It also uses an automatic bacon slicer which cuts two slabs at a time.

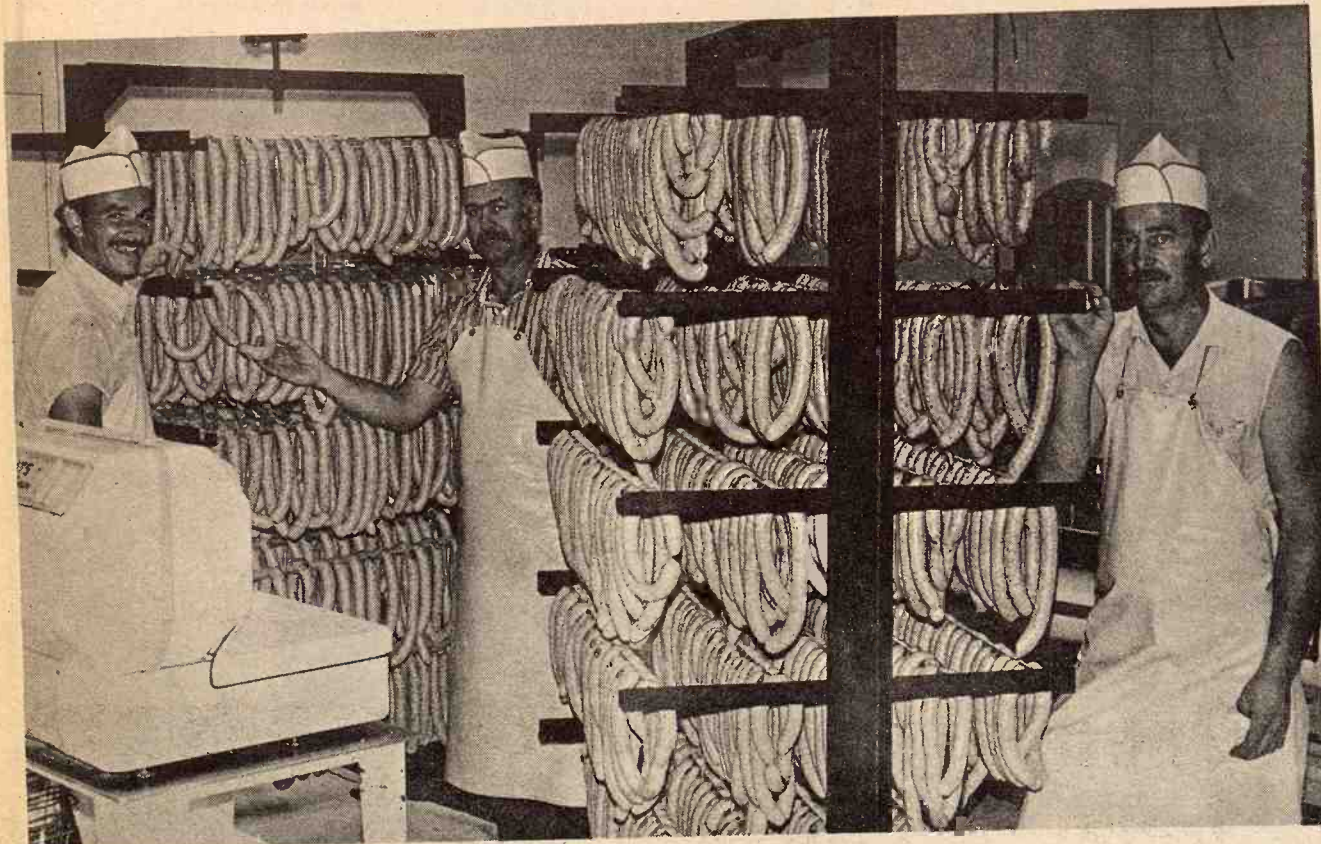
The building and meat processing all meet rigid federal requirements. During the processing, from butchering to the sale of the meat, two federal meat inspectors observe and monitor the operation. All ingredients, utensils and personnel must meet federal specifications.

Three full-time employees and four part-time personnel are involved in the operation. And the entire process is supervised by Jim Swim. Mrs. Swim handles the correspondence and bookkeeping.

#### MILO CULTIVATION

Romanus Hieger, Wamego, may be one of the few people that isn't overly excited about the Oscar Mayer plant that will be built near Wamego. Hieger farms east of Wamego and handles over 100 head of hogs. He's looking for some rain because his milo just broke through. "Grasshoppers have been more of a problem than greenbugs," he said.

## Wheat Harvest Fast Approaching

With wheat harvest fast approaching it appears the Grass and Grain area will record a good crop, though not as good as the record crop last year.

There is some problem with lodging due to high hot dry winds that have been experienced in our area.

Claude King, extension pathologist, after examining fields in the southern half of Kansas, said that freeze damage is quite widespread. The reason for the damage this year is apparently because of the 70 and 80 degree temperature in February. The wheat came out of its dormancy and grew rapidly. This tender growth was then damaged by freezes that occurred late in March and early in April. This is apparently when damage occurred that is now becoming evident.

Many apparently fine looking fields of wheat show some damage. The damage can be seen by examining the stem below the lower node. When the leaf sheath is peeled back, brown and white dying tissue can be found.

The outcome of this damage is hard to predict because of limited experience. If wheat should come under stress due to hot, dry winds, the damage could be very severe. If cool moist conditions exist, the damage could be limited somewhat.

The freeze damage added to the damage already done by wheat Streak Mosaic could greatly limit this year's wheat crop.

## Old Kansas Forts Get Repair Funds

Funds to begin restoration of two historic military posts in Kansas, Ft. Scott and Ft. Larned were approved.

Ft. Larned is earmarked for \$25,000 for planning and \$300,000 for restoration of a barracks and a quartermaster building. The nearby town of Larned will observe its centennial beginning July 17.

Ft. Scott is in the bill for \$128,000 to rebuild the hospital and officers quarters and repair a second officers quarters damaged in a fire. Last year an appropriation of about \$100,000 was not spent and that, too, will be used for the work.

Rep. Keith Sebelius made the successful pitch for Ft. Larned and Rep. Joe Skubitz spoke in behalf of Ft. Scott in testimony before the committee. Both men serve on the interior committee which has jurisdiction over national parks, monuments and historic sites.

Ft. Scott was established in May 1842 as a frontier outpost and played an important role in the Civil War in the West. Some of the old buildings are well preserved while others need restoration. A renovated Civil War blockhouse is part of the scene. Carroll Plaza is the parade ground of the original fort. Buildings not associated with the fort and constructed in this century have been razed and after more than a decade

of preparatory work Skubitz believes the project will be realized and become an attractive tourist spot.

Ft. Larned, established in the late 1850s, was the most important Kansas military post on the Santa Fe Trail. The fort was under siege by Indians at least three times. A secret tunnel led from one of the buildings to a creek 75 yards away so water could be obtained by the besieged garrison. All of the buildings in the quadrangle, including officers quarters, barracks, bakery, hospital and stables, still

stand although there have been some alterations. The buildings are constructed of sandstone. The fort opened as a tourist attraction in 1957.

Ft. Larned is on U.S. 136, western Kansas and Ft. Scott is on U.S. 69 in southeast Kansas.

# USDA Predicts Record National Wheat Harvest

The Agriculture Department estimated the 1972 crop of winter wheat at 1,192,478,000 bushels, 2 per cent more than last year and 4 per cent more than predicted in May.

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The Crop Reporting Board said that rain in major growing areas, and favorable growing temperatures boosted prospects.

It said the June 1 forecast is 43 million bushels above a month earlier largely because of improved prospects in the plains, Eastern corn belt and Montana. Adequate moisture supplies and favorable temperatures helped improve production prospects.

The board said the changes in production forecast between June 1 and harvest time have averaged 41 million bushels for the past decade, ranging from negligible to 115 million bushels.

Last year the winter wheat crop totaled 1,163,420,000 bushels and averaged a record 35.2 bushels per acre. The 1972 forecast calls for a yield of 34.3 bushels per acre, based on June 1 field conditions.

Production estimates of 1972 — crop durum and other spring wheat will not be made until July. Earlier projections based on planted acreages, however, indicated an output of 374 million bushels, allowing for average yields.

Added to the June winter wheat

estimate, that would mean a total U.S. wheat crop this year of about 1,192,478,000 bushels. Last year the output was a record 1 billion 640 million bushels.

There was no estimate for 1972 corn production. The first national estimate will be made in July but there will be no state corn production estimates until the August report.

The indicated production of winter wheat and yield per acre, respectively, by major producing states included:

Missouri 37,050,000 and 39; Nebraska 94,646,000 and 37; Kansas 306,000,000 and 34; Oklahoma 81,796,000 and 22.

## Minimum Wage Hike Planned To Help Cut Welfare

Democratic and Republican Senate Liberals, argue that a \$2.20-an-hour minimum wage is the best way to help the deserving poor and simultaneously cut welfare costs.

That will be the key argument in the attempt to preserve the \$2.20 minimum from an attack by a conservative coalition, Sen. Harrison Williams, D-N.J. has said.

Williams, chairman of the Senate Labor Committee, is chief sponsor of a minimum wage bill approved by his panel which would boost the wage floor from \$1.60 to \$2.20.

He plans to file the committee's report on the bill by mid-week, setting the stage for the debate expected to take place before the Senate recesses June 30 for the Democratic National Convention.

The New Jersey Senator argues that millions of families whose breadwinner earns \$3,200 a year which the \$1.60 minimum would provide are mired in poverty.

And many of them still would be there under the \$2 minimum supported by President Nixon, he contends.

But a \$2.20 figure would provide \$4,400 of annual earnings which would be enough to move a family of

four above the poverty line, he says.

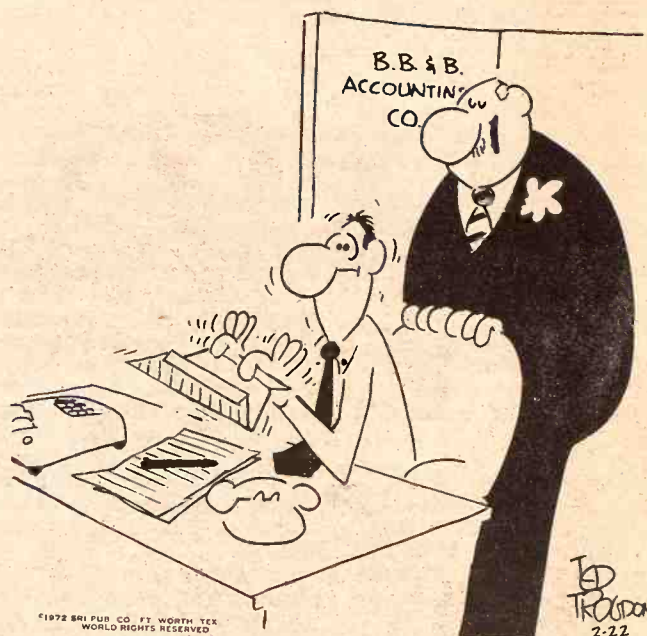
Williams has directed a study made by congressional researchers which shows that, under Nixon's welfare reform plan as passed last year by the House, the earnings of the head of a family of four under a \$2 minimum would be so low he would be entitled to \$107 in federal grants each year.

The study reports also that in nearly all states, supplementary welfare payments now are made to four-person families with earnings as low as \$3,200 or \$4,000 annually.

Williams thus argues that, if his bill became law, there would be substantial savings to the state because they no longer would have to make such payments.

## Hired Farm Force Increases Slightly

The Agriculture Department says the hired farm work force increased slightly during 1971, interrupting a downward trend in progress since 1967.

It says a survey of workers 14 and older paid cash for doing some farm work in 1971 showed about 2.6 million persons were part of this

hired labor force, up from 2.5 million the year before.

All of the gain was in the non-migrant group. The number of migrant workers declined 12 per cent — falling from 196,000 in 1971 to 172,000.

The hired farm work force was young, median age 22; male, 73 per cent white; 78 per cent and lived in nonfarm places most of the year, 73 per cent.

A department report says that considered as a whole, the group averaged \$22 in cash wages from farm work — \$11.60 a day for 76 days.

Almost three-fifths of the workers — 1.2 million — weren't in the labor force most of the year. This group consisted mainly of students, about 1 million, and housewives. Their farm earnings for the year averaged \$89, or \$9.90 a day for 9 days of work, a department report says.



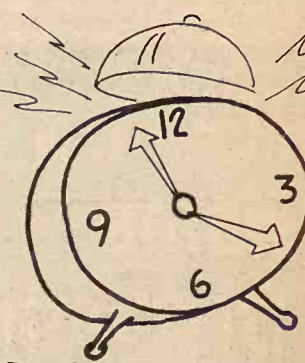

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## Statistical Survey Reveals Kansas Facts & Figures

The number of Kansas farms declined from 129,000 in 1952 to 86,000 last year.

This is one of many insights to be gleaned from the latest annual issue of the Kansas Statistical Abstract, a paperback volume published by the Institute for Social and Environmental Studies, University of Kansas.

The abstract shows, however, that Kansas farms in 1972 averaged 580 acres each, compared to 391 acres in 1952. Total farmland acreage in the state thus declined only slightly over the 19-year period, from 50.5 million acres to 49.9 million. Average property value per farm acre, including land and structures, increased from \$78 in 1952 to \$155 last year.

Looking further the annual total of kilowatt-hours of electricity sold in Kansas increased from 664,815,000 in 1955 to 13,887,014,000 in 1970.

It might surprise some to learn that in 1970, there were 410,408 trucks and 1,126,601 autos registered in Kansas.

Also in 1970, fall public school

enrollment in the state was 502,462, compared to 364,449 in 1940. Estimated enrollment in public elementary and secondary schools in 1970-71 was 545,565, which gave Kansas a ranking of 30th among the states. At the same time, full-time equivalent enrollment in Kansas four-year colleges and universities was 74,767, and in two-year public and private colleges, 17,224.

Of the 105 Kansas counties, 61 reported last year they had no resident daily newspaper. The same number had no radio or TV station within county limits. Fifty-four counties had neither a radio or TV station nor a daily paper.

But there's plenty of telephone communication — 1,294,183 phones in the state in 1970, compared to 343,605 in 1939.

In 1971 there were at least seven counties with no resident dentist and 22 with only one dentist; about six counties had no resident physician and 12 had one doctor.

Wyandotte County had the most physicians — 258 — for an average of 732 residents per doctor. Harvey County had fewest number of residents per physician about 547, with 50 doctors in the county for only 27,384 residents. Honor for most residents per physicians went to Coffey County, with 8,319 persons and one doctor.

Sedgwick County had the most

dentists, 156 — 2,123 persons per dentist, and McPherson County had only 1,256 residents per resident dentist, lowest ratio in Kansas. Highest resident-to-dentist rate was 10,232 persons, for the one dentist in Doniphan County.

Abstract readers are reminded that Kansas covers 82,048 square miles, with 15 counties encompassing 1,000 or more square miles each. Largest county is Butler, with 1,443 square miles.

The number of incorporated places of 10,000-or-more population

increased in Kansas in 1900 to 33 in 1971, according to the abstract. Wichita in 1900 had a population of 24,671, compared to 263,297 in 1971, down from its peak in 1969 of 282,989.

When area citizens were in the final stages of forming the state of Kansas in late 1860, the population within present boundaries was 107,206. By 1880 it increased to 996,096 and by 1960, to 2,178,611. The population in 1971 was 2,249,248. The state's population was 0.34 per cent of the U.S. population in 1860 and this proportion increased to a high of 2.27

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per cent in 1890. It then declined steadily to 1.08 per cent in 1971.

Within the present boundaries, the state's urban population was 9.4 per cent in 1860. the population was 52.1 per cent urban by 1950, and in 1970, this figure had risen to 65.3 per cent.

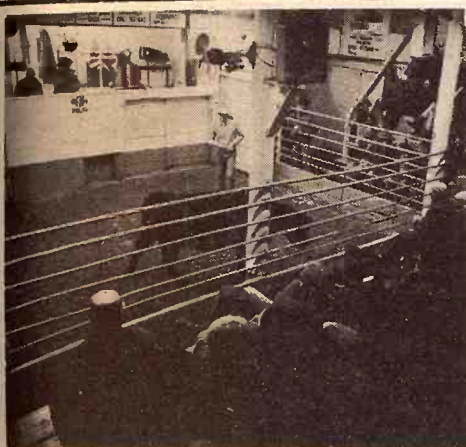

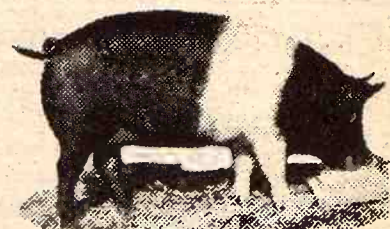

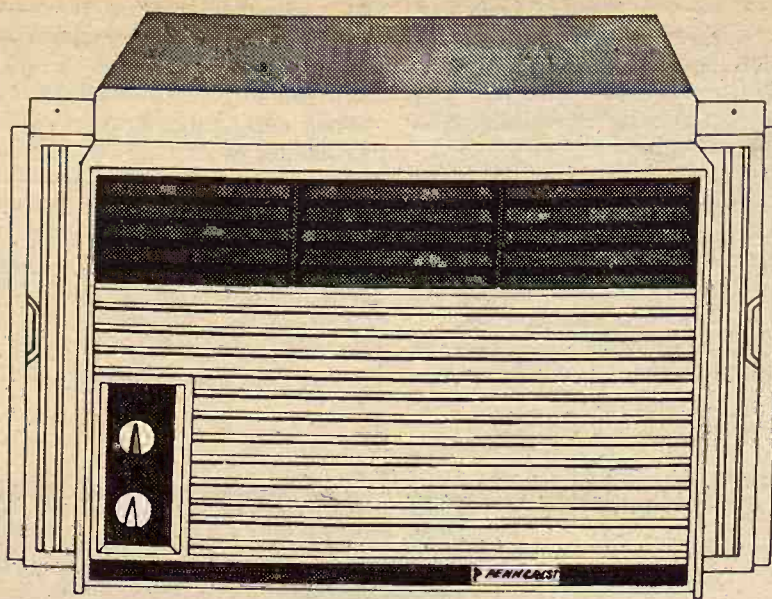

Salina's Marymount will get \$100,000 in co-operation with Kansas State University. Benedictine will get \$112,000. Marymount and Benedictine will get \$35,000 in a joint project with Maryville College of Tennessee.

Park College at Parkville, Mo., will co-ordinate a group receiving \$250,000. The others are Baker, Donnelly, Leavenworth's St. Mary's, Kansas City, Kan., Community College, and Ottawa University.

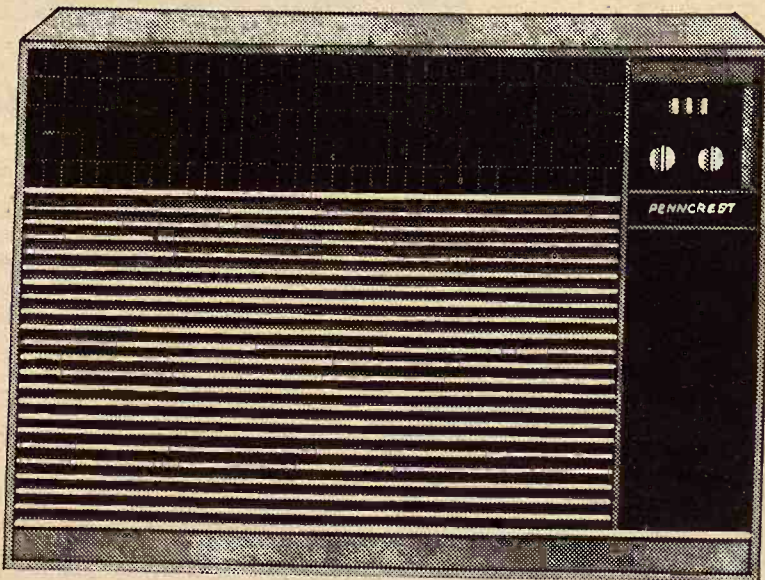
