



A Start Toward **Higher Supports** On Wheat, Corn?

The new manual on uniform traffic control devices for streets and highways today was adopted by the Kansas Highway Commission as the standard to be used for signs, markings, and other traffic controls on the state highway system.

John Montgomery, director of highways, in announcing adoption of the manual for Kansas, said the changes will be made gradually so motorists will not be confused by having to learn several new sign symbols immediately

"Biggest change in 1972 will be the use of a dashed yellow center line on all two-lane highways instead of the present dashed white line. By the end of 1972 the Maintenance Department expects to complete the change on the nearly 9,000 miles of two-lane highways.

Another addition in 1972 will be large X's painted in white on the roadway at approaches to railroad grade crossings. The letters RR will be painted in the X," Montgomery explained.

The Highway Commission obtains striping paint from the state prison at Lansing and already the prison officials have been informed that there will be a change in paint estimated 500,000 road signs along quantities needed in 1972.

The new manual includes a wider use of symbols to replace words on both regulatory and warning signs. Color coding also is being used more extensively

At locations where maintenance and construction work is in progress, all new traffic control signs will be orange with black letters. This color will be used exclusively to mark these work zones.

Montgomery said, however, in most instances signs now in use along Kansas highways are in the new sign manual as alternates and their use may be continued. This will eliminate the need for a crash program of sign changes that would cost a great deal of money.

He predicted that the first change by the Highway Commission to the new symbol signs will be on urban state highway links in cities that are now revising their other street signing.

In January the Highway Commission expects to take bids for sign modification along 38 miles of I-70 in Gove and Logan counties. The plans include signs from the new manual. The "Yield" signs will be red in-stead of yellow; "Do Not Enter" signs will be red; and there will be combination red, white and black "No Left" or "No Right Turn" signs. The Highway Commission has an 11.

by the Federal Highway Administration as a national standard. 





of the finish coat. you're working on an old piece miture and it's in good conn, begin by removing old wax, grease, or dirt with mineral ts. It is also wise to prepare the surface so that the new coating dhere properly.

Brushing on a proprietary surface conditioner is one way to improve adhesion. Let the conditioner stand on the surface for the amount of time instructed on the label. Then apply a fresh coat of paint. Another way to improve adhesion is to sand the surface lightly with a fine sandpaper and then dust it.

If old furniture is cracking or peeling, it should be stripped completely of its old finish. Use a good paint remover and follow directions. Be sure to work in a well-ventilated room. Fill any holes or cracks with plastic wood or water putty and let dry thoroughly. Sand as smooth as possible, apply the enamel undercoat, and sand again before applying the top coat.

Make Skirt Do Double Duty

To make one skirt into two, an evening and a dress length, is an easy matter. First, select a skirt style for an evening length that is somewhat flared and as wide at the hem as at the hips. Make it in evening length, lined and hemmed.

Buy snap tape, which consists of two strips of twill fabric ribbon; one strip has heads, and the other has matching snap bottoms. Buy this in a length that will go completely around the bottom of the skirt.

Sew the snap-head twill strip around the inside of the hem. Turn the skirt up to the desired short length and pin in place. After marking on the lining, sew the other strip of snap tape in place on the lining. Snap the snaps to wear the skirt short, and unsnap for evening. Its an easy way to add to your skirt wardrobe.





Seedling Orders A goldenrain tree seedling for spring planting will be added free of

charge to each tree or shrub order placed with the Division of State and Extension Forestry at Kansas State University.

Free Tree With

Gary Naughton, Extension forester in charge of this year's tree distribution program at KSU, said 10,000 free seedlings will be provided on a first-come, first-serve basis. Persons who have already ordered trees will also receive the bonus.

The offer is made to call attention to the centennial anniversary of Arbor Day, "It's the first year we've been able to obtain goldenrain seedlings and it will be a one-time offer," Naughton explained.

Arbor Day was first established by the Nebraska legislature in 1872.

Other states followed and today Arbor Day is observed throughout the U.S. In Kansas, it's the last Friday in March.

Also known as the varnish tree, the goldenrain is a native of Korea. Because it is drouth resistant, relatively free from insects and diseases, and tolerant of alkali soils, the goldenrain should grow in all parts of Kansas.

The compound leaves are up to 15 inches long-dark green on top and pale green below. The showy summer flowers are bright yellow and hang in clusters 8 to 14 inches long. Seed pods in autumn are brown, bladder-like puffs with papery walls.

Naughton called the goldenrain an attractive specimen tree that can be used for a multitude of beautification purposes.







Legislative Favor For Tax Lid

arguments from critics of Kansas' tax lid.

There is reason to believe that legislators, who will be heading for Topeka next week for the annual session, still favor the tax lid.

And a good percentage of them favor extending the lid this session, even though the law does not expire until the end of 1972. That's the conclusion of a mail survey of legislators taken by a newspaper wire service.

United Press International said it sent out questionnaires to the legislature's 165 members. It got back 109 responses and 62 percent of them said they favored retaining the law. Against retaining the law were 27 percent, while 11 percent returned the questionnaire but did not answer the question.

Whether the tax lid should be extended during the coming session drew a more limited response, although 51 percent of the responses

Don't misread the weight of the favored that immediate move. Some legislators think the ex-

tension of the lid can wait until 1973 because any local governmental budgets for 1973 will have to be approved in 1972 when the law is still effective.

Governor Docking has said that getting the tax lid extension approved in the coming session is one of his major legislative goals.

The 1970 legislature imposed the lid on property tax levies and operating budgets of counties, cities, school districts and junior colleges for tax pears 1970, 1971 and 1972.

Subject to specified exceptions, property tax levies were limited to the dollar amount levied in 1969 and operating budgets to 105 per cent of the amount budgeted in the preceding fiscal year or in 1970, whichever was greater.

It also offered optional income or sales tax authority to local governments to provide alternate sources of revenue, subject to voter ap-

proval. Topeka, Lawrence, and Manhattan adopted local half cent sales taxes under the law this year.

Docking, who pushed hard for enactment of the law in 1970, is pushing hard again for the 1972 Legislature to extend the law. He claims it has curbed property tax increases.

Some legislators say extension of the lid will turn into the hottest political issue of the 60-day session. Republicans control both houses of the legislature.

Docking also says he will recommend measures to tighten up the lid although specifics have not been revealed on what he has in mind.

House Minority Leader Richard C. "Pete" Loux, D-Wichita, says he will jointly sponsor legislation to extend the lid.





11 Grass & Grain December 28, 1971 **Toymakers Find Everything Not** Fun And Games

For toy manufacturers 1971 wasn't the usual fun and games.

After years of steady growth, the toy business went flat this year with a number of industry giants hard-hit by recession, a reluctance of retailers to buy, dock strikes and higher overseas costs. Moreover, consumer activists leveled a steady stream of criticism at the industry, attacking unsafe toys, misleading packaging and advertising, and even the theme of some toys.

Long-considered a virtually inflation-proof business, toys, games and hobby sales had been rsising eight to 12 per cent annually in recent years. This year, however, the Toy Manufacturers of America, the industry's trade 'association, said a gain of two per cent over 1970's 2.3-billion dollars wholesale sales was about the best that could be hoped for.

According to the trade association, manufacturer's shipments for the first nine months of 1971 ran about 1.1 per cent behind last year

Topper Corp. told its shareholders that based on information presently available it might lose \$10 to \$15 million this year.

Mattel, the largest U.S. toy manufacturer, with sales of \$347.5 million last year, may finish the year in the red for the first time since it was incorporated in 1948.

Ideal Toy Corp. reported a 2.5 per cent drop in sales to \$57.4 million for the first three quarters of 1971, although profits were up.

General Mills, which entered the field by acquiring such companies as Craft Master, Kenner Products and Parker Brothers, saw its toy, game and craft sales grow to \$126.6 million last year. But profits dropped from \$10 million in 1969 to \$1.4 million last year, or from 9.6 per cent of total profits to 1.1 per cent.

Remco Industries, one of the oldest names in the business, filed a petition in bankruptcy last January—it has since been dismissed-and other companies are feeling the pinch.

About the only bright lights in the industry were focused on companies which specialize in educational or preschool games and toys.



Wheat In Best Winter Shape In A Decade

This fall 10.1 million acres of winter wheat were seeded in Kansas for harvest in 1972, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock **Reporting Service**

Seeded acreage was up 5 percent from a year earlier, but still the fifth smallest wheat acreage seeded in the State in more than half a centure.

Acreage increases from a year earlier were substantial in the northwest, south central, northeast and southeast districts of the State.

Seedings were below a year earlier in scattered counties, but all districts showed some increase.

The first forecast of the 1972 wheat crop indicates 313 million bushels, a

shade above the record large 1971 crop

The 1972 production forecast represents a prospective yield of 31 bushels per seeded acre, 1.6 bushels less than in 1971 but the State's second highest. 🕿

the production forecast is based on condition of the growing wheat as of December 1, currently available soil moisture supplies, and assumes that weather and other factors between December 1 and harvest time will be normal.



Verlin Peterson, Extension crop production specialist at Kansas State University, says total farm value for Kansas soybeans this year probably will soar past the \$50 million mark.

He calculated that on the basis of 19 million bushels, at a price of approximately \$3 per bushel.


"I'm busy talking soybeans these days because a lot of people have done well with them in recent years," says Peterson. "It's been several years since we've had \$3 soybeans."







Hogmen Head Off Big Buildup

The number of hogs and pigs on Kansas farms December 1 was down moderately from a year earlier but substantially higher than in any of the previous 16 years for which December 1 records are available, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock reporting Service.

The September-November 1971 pig crop was down slightly from 1970, but the annual 1971 pig crop and prospective spring 1972 farrowings are slightly above a year ago.

Inventories Down

There were 2,100,000 hogs and pigs on Kansas farms December 1, a decrease of 5 percent from last year but 28 percent more than in 1969.

Included in this total were 273,000 head being kept for breeding purposes and 1,827,000 head for market.

The number of breeding hogs was down 8 percent from a year earlier while market hogs were 4 percent lower

The number of market hogs in all weight groups of 60 pounds or more was down from last year.

Decreases ranged from 4 percent for hogs weighing 180 pounds and over to 11 percent in the 60-119 pound group. The number of market hogs weighing under 60 pounds increased 2 percent from last year.

Past Quarter Pig Crop Smaller Sows farrowing during the September-November, 1971 quarter totaled 119,000 head, down 3 percent from last year.


The purchase a week ago was of 1.77 million bushels, somewhat more than was purchased the weekend before.







from a Lincoln, Nebr., firm. Butz had said when confirmed as USDA secretary on December 3 that there would be a quick effort to

bolster sagging corn prices. The impact was felt immediately with Kansas City prices going up 7

cents in the days after the purchase. The corn purchases were made for \$1.12 to \$1.30 per bushel, with variations reflecting locations and costs of transportation.

About 16 million bushels had been offered to the government by various private sellers. The initial purchase was less than 10 percent of the amount offered. USDA officials said other offerings were priced too high.

Corn prices fell to 90 cents a bushel at many corn belt locations during the fall harvest. Prices had come back somewhat after harvest, generally to about \$1, but trade sources said the price had not yet come back to profitable levels before the open market purchase.

Butz said the department would continue to make weekly offers to buy, with offers to be received each Friday in the office of Carl Heaton, Commodity Credit Corporation director at Kansas City.

The sale to the Atchison firm was for \$1.29½ cents per bushel and "transit." "Transit" refers to grain received by rail, which may result in cheaper transportation costs to California or the Gulf of Mexico.

Other sales were made "flat." which refers to truck-received grain with no freight bill.

The other purchases last week were from a storage at Sioux City, 200,000 bushels at \$1.16 flat; Council Bluffs, 150,000 bushels, \$1.22 flat; Herndon, Iowa, \$1.15 flat; Waterloo, Iowa, 100,000 bushels, \$1.125/8 flat; Gilman, Ill., 100,000 bushels, \$1.19 flat; Nebraska City, Nebr., 75,000 bushels, \$1.21 flat; and Lincoln, Nebr., 350,000 bushels, \$1.31 transit.


Ease Limits On Big Packers

The Packers Consent Decree, which since 1920 has prevented meat packing firms from wholesaling nonmeat foods and other commodities, has been amended by the U.S. District Court.

The order will permit Swift and Company, Armour, Wilson and Cudahy to manufacture and wholesale more than 100 product lines that had been barred by the decree which was signed Feb. 27, 1920 in settlement of an antitrust suit brought against Swift and other major meat packers.

The order also permits the companies to enter the previously banned product lines by acquiring other firms subject to restrictions on size and market position. Remaining valid, however, is the ban against entering the product areas at the retail level.

changes say it is logical to assume that if the government purchases are to be of any moment in sustaining prices, they must be of an appreciable volume. After all, volume is the word that describes the corn situation. Total supplies this fall at the start of the marketing year were at 6.2 billion bushels following the harvest of a crop of 5.5 billion bushels.

And, it is a fact that the government apparently intends to be buying corn for some time. When Earl L. Butz, the new Secretary of Agriculture, announced the cornbuying program Dec. 3, he said specific amounts to be purchased and prices to be paid would be a "continuing determination." He revealed the first purchases would be made Dec. 13.

A few days ago the Kansas City Commodity office announced that offers would be received from those desiring to sell corn to the government every Friday "until further notice," except when Friday falls on a holiday

Corn offered to the government in this program at this time must be yellow, Grade No. 2 or better, with 14 per cent or lower moisture and instore in warehouses (elevators) with official weights and grades.

Many inquiries have been received in recent days at the Kansas City Board of Trade concerning purchase of white corn by he government. The answer to the inquiries has been that the government's initial offers to buy have specified yellow corn only.

When offers to sell are received on Friday, the government reveals its acceptances and prices paid on Monday. Monday, Dec. 13, only 1,425,000 bushels were purchased Prices paid were generally in line with market values at the locations where the corn was bought.

Monday, Dec. 20, the Commodity Office revealed it had purchased 1,770,000 bushels.

When corn is purchased by the government, it will be left just where it is in storage, at least for some time to come.

The government corn-buying program obviously is a subject for discussion in the grain trade. Heavy purchases of corn in the current buying program would take some of the urgency out of passage of grain reserve measures. Some in the grain trade argue. Others contend that the government knows from experience how difficult it is to return surplus stocks to market channels and therefore will not want to build up beyond necessary at least anyone outside the govern- supplies ment, knows at this time how big the minimums.

While the government does not reveal ahead of time what prices will be paid or how much corn will be bought, the trade logically assumes these decisions are made at the highest level in the Dept. of Agriculture in Washington.

The government, incidentally, already owns a lot of corn. Before



of same is a proper-concern for government. The trouble is that the government, from its early entry into the field, has tried not so much to facilitate and cushion change as simply to stop it.

It hasn't worked. The government has funneled out many billions of dollars to support farm product prices, deluding itself that it was thus saving the family farm. But economic factors have made it necessary for farms to get bigger and bigger, and the bulk of those federal benefits have gone to the bigger farms, not the marginal operators who really need it.

If Secretary Butz follows the wishes of his Senate critics he will now proceed to push for more of the same. The big farms will grow larger and the small farmers will steadily grow more desperate.

That would be sad, to say the least. In some of his pre-appointment writings and comments, the Secretary appeared to see that it was time for the government to try an entirely different tack.

Government could, if it would, start to free the farm economy from its tight federal management. In passing it's surely worth noting that the current corn glut, and the resulting low corn prices were produced, primarily by mistaken advice given farmers by the Agriculture Department.



of either toxophene or hot-limed sulphur. Usually the toxophene method is used because of the cost and equipment necessary for using hot-limed sulphur.

Reports show three feedlots and two ranches are involved in originating the parasitic disease in Oklahoma. In Texas, reports show seven infected ranches and 34 exposed ranches. New cases are still being discovered in those areas, prompting the federal embargo.

Scabies is a parasitic disease that causes lesions in the flesh of cattle, but is not considered dangerous to humans.

"We have had excellent Hudelson said. "Therefore, we have kept the disease from spreading.

buyers and feedlots, without taking chances on spreading the disease among cattle in our own state," he said.

Puzzle Over Yellow Wheat ARKANSAS CITY-Wheat that is

turning yellow in this area is triggering questions for Cowley County agent Charles W. Smith. Smith said he has looked at several fields and is in contact with Kansas State University's plant pathology department, which, he said, is stumped as to what is causing the yellowing.

"They have received numerous samples," Smith said, "and they are finding some soil-borne mosaic, rush, natural slowing of plant and yellow dwarf.

"The yellowing is being observed in all varieties and on all classes of land and apperas to be more prevalent in early seeded fields."

Smith said he is advising Cowley County farmers to go ahead and treat fields as though they were



going to keep the wheat for a crop. He said he is advising against plowing up the yellowed wheat, but to wait until spring "when we may have the answer.'



SHOULD I USE WHEAT FOR GRAIN HARVEST **OR PASTURE** IN EASTERN KANSAS?

Abundant wheat pasture is high quality feed for growing cattle. Starting about April 1, wheat grows rapidly for 45 to 60 days. This is the period that maximum beef production should be obtained from pasturing wheat. With adequate moisture, an acre of wheat during this period can support 3 or 4 head of 500-pound cattle.

The stocking rate should be heavy enough to keep the wheat grazed down. This will delay maturity and provide a longer grazing season. The average gain may be about 1.75 pounds per day per animal. During April the gains may be above this, although they'll slow down as the wheat matures.

Weather conditions may have a big influence in the results. Dry weather may limit the growth or, excessive rain may cause muddy conditions in which the animals destroy much of the grazing.

Although the feed cost per pound of gain may be low the cattle program must be such that other costs do not eliminate the possibility of a net profit. Possibly the best program would be one in which the cattle go to a feed lot for finishing as they come off wheat pasture.

The expected returns from a pasturing program may be calculated and compared to the returns from a harvested wheat crop. The returns should include the federal farm program payments under the different alternatives .--Herman W. Westmeyer, Extension Beef specialist, Kansas State University.
