

Here Is Background On Dairy Field Days Stops

Here is background material on the six dairy farms to be visited this week during the Dairy Management Field Days:

TUESDAY, OCT. 21, 9:30 a.m.
PAUL & ALLEN BINFORD
HAVILAND, KIOWA COUNTY
 Located 1 mile east and 2 miles north of Haviland on the east side of the road.

The Binfords are milking 65 Holsteins and have approximately 10 dry cows.

Paul does the artificial inseminating on the dairy and has had very good conception rates.

One big labor saving technique on the Binford Dairy is the use of self feeders to give cows a complete roughage-concentrate ration. This ration of alfalfa pellets, corn, milo, wheat, minerals and monosodium glutamate will be detailed during the field day.

They rear their heifers on a labor-saving nursette and have lost only one calf in five years using this method.

They have had good success with a liquid manure tank under their holding pen. They say it reduces fly problems as well as providing valuable plant nutrients for their forage crops.

Binfords attribute their high concentrate feeding of 22-24 pounds per cow per day as major reason for production reaching over 600 pounds of fat per cow.

JOHN & ELWARD HISS
GREAT BEND, BARTON CO.
 Located three-fourths mile west

of Hwy. 96 from the first county road intersection northwest of Great Bend cemetery on Hwy. 96.


The Hisses are milking 150 Holsteins. Since they began milking, their herd average has jumped from 11,000 to 14,000 pounds of milk.

They do their own artificial inseminating with excellent results.

They switched from two walk-through milking parlors to one double five herringbone parlor. They milk 125 cows in two hours and twenty minutes.

Central forage handling facility is 40x160 concrete bunker silo which they fill with sorghum silage. Irrigated silage made 28 tons per acre last year.

They raise their own heifers in individual stalls.

CHARLES LEIS
VIOLA, SEDGWICK CO.

Located one mile east of Goddard; then 8 miles south and 1/2 mile west, or 12 miles west, one mile south, 1/2 mile west of Haysville Corner on Hwy. 81, or one

mile south and 1/2 mile west of Kansas Hwy. 42 at Clonmel.

Leis has an outstanding, informative set of records. He has taken a Polaroid picture of each animal in his herd to facilitate knowing ear tag numbers without catching the cows.

He keeps a set of metal tags — one per cow — in his milk parlor. Each tag has the cow's identification number, date bred, date due to freshen, and last freshening date on it.

He has records showing why each cow has left his herd. He keeps his records in the barn to assist the DHIA tester.

Leis milks 85-90 cows. Has one full-time hired man. Herd average is 15,160 pounds.

Leis sells many of his replacement heifers because he has had great success keeping cows in his herd.

He saves all his calves — keeps some heifers, sells the remaining heifers as replacements, and sells the steer calves for locker trade. Calves are raised in outdoor hutches that are easily built and moved from one location to another. Construction details will be given at field day.

Leis uses artificial insemination with mostly KABSU bulls.

He fills one silo with sudan and one with alfalfa haylage. He mixes the two types of silage and they drain together as the silos unload. He feeds into portable bunks from a self-unloading wagon.

He has a large concrete lot and free stall barn. Plans to split herd into high and low producers sometime in the future.

BURTON ZECH
WELLINGTON, SUMNER CO.
 Location — follow Hwy. 160 to

west edge of Wellington; turn north 100 yards east of Slate Creek Bridge on unmarked county blacktop road. Go 0.6 miles to Zech place on west side of road.

The Zechs milk 85 Holstein cows. They have a 539 pound rolling herd average and it has risen continuously since 1967.

Cows are fed a home-formulated ration of corn, vitamins A, D and E and trace minerals. Ration is mixed in portable mixing unit.

Forage handled in two upright silos and a pit silo. Pit is topped with sudan to keep corn silage from spoiling.

Labor situation is handled by specialization. A full time professional dairy herdsman, Wilbur Smith, and a hired high school boy do the milking; Richard specializes in doing the farm work; Burton does relief choring and emergency farm work.

Cows separated into two production units in winter.

All grain fed while milking in double 6 herringbone barn.

Calves are reared in individual stalls. Heifers are bred to calve at 24 months. Steers are fed out for supplemental income.

LLOYD & JERRY KLASSEN
HILLSBORO, MARION CO.
 Located 6 miles north of Hills-

boro on Highway 15, then 1/2 mile east.

Brothers will be milking 100 Holsteins by time of field day. Partnership began 1 1/2 years ago. It is set up on an interest and rent basis that will be discussed on the field day.

They cut equipment costs by buying swather and silage equipment in partnership with a neighboring dairyman, Chet Unruh.

Their farm records, which will be discussed by a farm management association fieldman, are set up on a fast depreciation schedule.

The Klassens have some outstanding facilities, including a new 30x80 upright silo, a 22x40 upright, and a 7000 bale hay barn.

They also have a free stall loading barn and are installing a second feed bunk attached to their silos. The new system will utilize a belt upon which supplemental grain is metered into the bunk.

They recently poured 180 yards of new concrete for a new lot for cows.



He breeds his heifers to calve at 18-24 months. He has one heifer he will show the visitors who has produced \$200 over feed costs since she freshened and she is only 24 months old.

Uses a large free stall barn that has automatic waterers and automatic silage bunks in it. He has two 20x60 upright self-unloading silos.

The Cases milk in a double 6 herringbone parlor. It takes two hours for two persons to milk 90 cows.

**IVAN STRICKLER DAIRY
IOLA, ALLEN COUNTY**

Located 1 mile north and ¼ mile east of Junction of U.S. Hwy. 54 and Kentucky Street at the east edge of Iola.

Strickler has a dairy health program that should be of interest to all dairymen. His veterinarian makes regular trips to the dairy to treat diseases and breeding problems, make pregnancy checks, and post-calving examinations.

Strickler milks 126 cows in a 20-stanchion barn. Milking in this barn lets him milk around cows that are slow eaters and allows



plenty of grain eating for his high producers. Has plans for new milking facilities.

Raising registered Holsteins is a major part of Strickler's dairy enterprise. He owns some of the highest producing cows in the nation and has sold bull calves to the major national bull studs. Seeing these fine cows should be a special treat to dairymen on the field days.

FRIDAY, OCT. 24, 1:30 p.m.
WILBUR WEBBER

CENTERVILLE, LINN CO.

Located 4 miles north of Mound City on Hwy. 7, then 7 miles west.

Webber milks 60 Holsteins but plans to expand when his two older sons complete their military service and return to the farm business. They farm 505 acres.

To reduce labor Webber feeds his cows strictly hay for forage, no silage. He makes every effort to get his alfalfa and brome hay baled at the peak of nutritive value.

His herd fat average is 550 lbs. He recently completed a 60x72 Butler building with 16½' clearance. He uses it for storing hay with his automatic bale unloader and for machinery storage.

One unique trick Webber uses to hold down his fly problem is hanging burlap bags of methoxychlor near outside the cow entrance to his milk parlor. As the cows walk under the bags, they get dusted.

Webber treats quarters of dry cows with antibiotic to hold down mastitis problems.

tie by mastitis and they attribute it to special attention to milking. They spend an hour and 45 minutes to milk 90 cows.

They keep close production and breeding records and cull the herd on the basis of production and breeding performance. They participate in DHIA and practice artificial breeding.

They raise their own heifers and keep 70-80 steers. Calves are kept in individual stalls and re-

ceive a vitamin supplement.

Their herringbone milk parlor was converted from an old horse barn for \$4000 six years ago.

**GALEN CASE DAIRY
McPHERSON, McPHERSON CO.**

Located 4½ miles south of the junction of U.S. Hwy. 81 and City Route at the south edge of McPherson. Home on west side of road.

The Cases probably get the most dairying out of the least amount of land investment of any dairy family in Kansas. They are milking 90 Holsteins and they operate only 40 acres.

They buy all their grain and much of their hay and silage. They raise only 30 acres of silage sorghum.

Galen does his own artificial inseminating work and has worked out a system that settles his

most troublesome repeat breeders. He will discuss his thinking on this matter during the field day.

Herd average was below 400 pounds of fat when he began dairying. His rolling herd average now stands at 599 pounds.

To reduce labor he self-feeds his heifers and has a proven method of keeping them from getting too fat. He will discuss his heifer program during the field day.

BAKED LIVER & ONIONS

- 1 large onion, thinly sliced
- 3 tablespoons butter, melted
- 6 tablespoons water
- 1 pound sliced beef liver
- Flour seasoned with salt and pepper
- 2 tablespoons minced parsley or dried parsley flakes
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1 bay leaf

Place onion slices in a shallow baking dish. Drizzle butter and water on top. Cover dish. Bake 25 minutes in 350 degree oven. Dip liver in flour. Place on top of onions. Sprinkle on parsley and thyme. Add bay leaf. Cover dish. Bake 30 minutes longer. Remove bay leaf. Serve immediately.

Mrs. George Korinek, Ellsworth: "Here is a very good recipe for Pea Salad."

PEA SALAD

- 1 can peas
- 1/2 cup celery
- 1/2 cup sweet pickles
- 1/2 green pepper
- 1/2 onion
- 1 small jar of stuffed olives
- 1/2 cup American cheese
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1/2 cup prepared salad dressing

Drain the peas. Cut celery, green pepper, stuffed olives and cheese into small pieces, mix and add cut up pickles and diced onions. Mix in sugar and add salad dressing. Mix all together and it is ready to serve.

Mrs. Lawrence Orshorn, Wamego, sent the following recipe:

CHILI SAUCE

- 1 gallon peeled tomatoes
- 1 cup chopped onion

2 green mango peppers, chopped
2 cups vinegar
1 1/2 cups sugar
5 teaspoons salt
1 teaspoon cinnamon
Mix all together and cook for two hours. Seal in sterilized pint jars.

(Slick trick to making cooking time less: Heat tomatoes and drain juice before adding other ingredients. When mixture boils, put in oven to cook. No stirring. Drained juice may be canned separately.)

Mrs. H. V. Weaver, Ozarkie: "This recipe is for an orange-banana-flavored tapioca dessert. It is easily made, different and delicious. The candy called for is orange-colored circus peanuts. This is a marshmallow-type candy and has a banana flavor."

ORANGE TAPIOCA DESSERT

Using a large saucepan, bring to a boil 4 cups water. Add 3/4 cup minute tapioca and 1 regular size package circus peanut candy. Cook, stirring until the candy is melted. Cool this mixture and when cool, add 2 cups crushed pineapple and 1 package whipped topping. Pour into a large bowl and chill. This serves 12-14.

Periodic Cleaning Keeps Piano In Condition

Piano tuning must be done by an expert but not all the interior care requires professional help.

Keeping the inside of your piano free from dust and dirt will prevent dirt from harming the felts and corroding the strings and pins. Use the long flat vacuum attachment and blower outlet on your vacuum cleaner. This way, dust can be dislodged from the sounding board without touching the strings and other parts.

Although the felts in your piano have probably been moth-proofed at the felt mill, give your instrument added protection by placing naphthalene or camphor cakes inside it. In grand pianos, place moth repellent cakes on pieces of heavy cardboard on the bronzed plate. In a

vertical piano, place the repellent in small cloth bags which are then hung on the clamps located on the extreme bass and treble sides of the instrument, under the top of the piano.

Freeze Fruit In Milk Cartons

Use empty milk cartons to freeze individual servings of fruit. Place several layers of waxed paper between servings.

Quick Way To Make Hamburger Patties

When entertaining a group of friends at a hamburger fry, try rolling out the hamburger steak to the desired thickness with a rolling pin, placing the meat between the layers of waxed paper so that it will not stick.

Cut with a biscuit cutter. You will find this method much quicker than the usual way of making patties.

Fish Accompaniment

To make an interesting accompaniment to fish, mix commercial sour cream with salt, sugar and vinegar to taste and add thinly sliced pared cucumber slices.



can face without panic the prospect of preparing a holiday banquet for the relatives. While a turkey or duck is roasting away in one oven, pies, potatoes and casseroles can be baking in the other.

Two ovens also come in handy when there is a week-end chef in the house who likes to practice his culinary hobby. Simlo Reacquires Concordia Plant

CONCORDIA — New construction and a change in ownership have been announced by the Simlo Manufacturing Co. plant here. Construction is underway on a new 2400 sq. ft. addition estimated to cost some \$10-\$12,000. The new addition will be used as a paint shop.

Francis Sutton, general manager of the Clay Center based firm also indicated that effective Sept. 15 Simlo had taken over production from the Ehram Co.

Simlo built the Concordia plant in 1966 but then sold the facility to Ehram in Oct. 1968. The reacquisition of the plant will provide more facilities in addition to Simlo's Clay Center

plant.

Kenneth Goff, general supervisor at Concordia, hopes the new addition will be ready for operation by the end of October. The timetable for completion will depend mainly on the amount of time it takes to install overhead cranes after the addition is completed.

The Concordia plant is a structural steel shop featuring manufacture of grain handling equipment. The equipment is completely manufactured at Concordia from start to finish.

The facility now employs 14 persons but officials hope to add 10 more after the new addition goes into operation.

'Public Can't Want Beef And Low Prices Too'

Consumers will have to pay even more for beef if cattlemen are expected to satisfy the nation's increasing hunger for meat, according to a packing industry spokesman.

"With all due sympathy for their problems," Herrell DeGraff told congressmen, "I have to say to consumers that on a continuing basis they cannot have both the beef supply they want and

the level of beef prices they seem to want."

DeGraff, president of the American Meat Institute, said the cattle industry had reached the point where it must expand to meet future demands.

But he said cattlemen won't make the investment unless they can expect a reasonable price. He did not say how high the price might go.

He testified before a House government operations subcommittee studying the high and rapid retail meat price increase this year.

DeGraff blamed the 16 percent beef price increase between July

1968 and July 1969 on a bad winter that produced beef shortages. He said that squeeze is easing and prices are coming down.

But he said it has been clear to the industry since 1965 that beef prices "would have to increase for a more fundamental reason than a bad winter."

Beef production from a basic 50 million animals has increased to 21 billion pounds this year from 13.5 billion in 1955 because of improved methods, DeGraff said. But, he went on, the only way to meet the rising demand is by increasing the basic number of cattle.

Kansas Allocated \$6 Million In ACP Funds

A fund allocation of \$6,037,000 has been made for the 1970 Agricultural Conservation Program (ACP) in Kansas, Chairman E. R. Patton of the Kansas State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee reports.

"This Federal money is used to share costs with farmers and ranchers for needed measures to conserve soil and water resources on agricultural lands," said the ASC committee chairman. Generally, the farmer pays one-half the cost and the ACP pays one-half.

Allocations are made to each State ASC committee on the basis of the State's conservation needs. The State committee in turn allocates funds for administration by county ASC committees on the basis of conservation needs within each county.


"Every ACP practice, in fact, has public benefits built into it. Most ACP practices help keep silt out of streams, ponds and

lakes. Some practices help provide wildlife habitat, add recreational opportunities, and contribute to the beautification of the landscape. All ACP practices help conserve soil, water, or woodland resources."

Principal ACP practices in Kansas in recent years have been terraces, waterways, farm reservoirs and seeding cropland to pastures.

ACP is administered in Kansas by State and county ASC committees. Approvals of cost-sharing requests by individual farmers are made by the county ASC committee. In addition to Chairman E. R. Patton, members of the Kansas State ASC Committee are Frank Boyd Jr. and Vern Becker.

Milk Cattle on U.S. Farms



Income from Milk and Cream



There continues to be less milk cows on U. S. farms but milk sales continue to go up, according to USDA. The peak of dairy numbers in the country was 27.7 million in 1945 but the current figure is down to 14.1 million. But income has climbed from \$3 billion in 1945 to an estimated \$5.9 billion in 1968.

'Ship U.S.' Has Cost Us Wheat Sales

Rep. Garner Shriver, R-Ks., has urged removal of the cargo preference regulation as a condition to obtaining a license to export wheat and feed grains to certain eastern European countries.

Shriver called upon the Department of Commerce to discontinue discriminatory shipping requirements as an export license condition.

"Since 1963," Shriver told the House, "the department has required that at least 50 percent of all wheat and feed grains sold to selected eastern European countries be shipped in U.S. flag ships."

"The unintended result has been a complete cessation of such sales."

"U.S. flag shipping rates average about \$10 per long ton compared with about \$7 a long ton in foreign flag vessels," Shriver added.

"Thus this executive branch decision has made the U.S. price for these commodities unacceptably high and not a single bushel of U.S. wheat has been sold to the nations in question for three years."

Shriver said the Department of Commerce justified its decision on grounds it was for protection of the American Merchant Marine.

He noted that since the regulation has eliminated all such sales there "obviously could be no benefits to American shipping interests."

The practical effect has been to freeze a potential export market for one million U.S. wheat farmers and to escalate the na-

tion's wheat surplus to nearly a billion bushels.

There is no legitimate reason for continuing the regulation, Shriver said.

That Bright Light Was No Meteor

The bright object that flashed across the sky to be seen by most of the G&G area last week was cometary matter, not a meteorite, says a scientist at the University of Kansas.

"From the characteristics of the track as it came in, it would appear to be a fragment of a dead comet," Dr. William Van Schmus, a KU geology professor, said after reviewing photographic reports from the Smithsonian Institution's astrophysical observatory.

"It was definitely not the density of the material that meteorites are made of," he said.

Because the comet fragment was less dense, the initial mass

of several tons was apparently burned up as it traveled from 40,000 to 50,000 miles an hour.

"Essentially it consumed itself," Dr. Van Schmus said. Some soot or ashes might remain on the ground, but probably would never be recognized.

The brightness of the object hampered the accuracy of the 16-camera Prairie network, Dr. Van Schmus said, and the exact site of the remains could not be pinpointed.

If anything had been left, it would have been about 15 miles northeast of Fort Scott, near the state line, the professor said

First Wheat Sale To India In A While

About 110 million bushels of U.S. wheat will be supplied to India under a Food for Peace agreement, the Agriculture department has announced.

The sale is part of a larger package calling for \$191.5 million dollars worth of wheat, cotton and vegetable oil to be shipped to India in the year ending next June 30 under the public law No. 480 aid program.


Officials said it was the largest Food For Peace wheat sale to India in nearly two years.

The agreement, signed in New Delhi, included 159.8 million dollars worth of wheat or flour; about 1000 bales of cotton valued at \$12.6 million, and 209 million pounds of soybeans or cottonseed oil worth \$19.1 million.

Sixty percent will involve credit terms calling for conversion of local currencies to U.S. dollars, with the remainder paid in rupees.

Limits To 'Green Revolution'

Optimistic talk of an "agricultural revolution" or "green revolution" is misleading, at best, leaves a prominent cereal scientist at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

In a recent magazine article (in the September issue of Current Magazine), Dr. John Shellenberger argues that there is no revolution and none in sight.

What has happened, he says, is that astonishing increases in production have been achieved gradually through introduction of such things as hybrid seed and fertilizer. There are "one-trick" methods of boosting production and once a farmer has realized the development, no other tremendous gains in production are to be anticipated.

"Where the major sources of increased agricultural productivity such as hybrid seed, fertilizers, irrigation, herbicides and pesticides have been utilized, it is not logical to expect remarkable production increases to continue year after year," writes Shellenberger, who for more than two decades directed Kansas State University's program in milling, baking and feed technology.

Shellenberger is less than optimistic about the possibility of increasing agricultural production in new and developing countries the concept of an "agricultural

revolution." Almost never is it possible to increase yields by introducing a single agricultural practice such as new seeds. To achieve food increases requires simultaneous advancement in numerous ways, many of which must come from the community itself. Often the problem is not lack of production but inadequate food storage, processing and distribution. It requires no scientific breakthrough to relieve these situations, since knowledge is commonplace.

"There is scarcely a country," he points out, "that does not have the skills required to perform the tasks involved. The missing element is application."

Noting that it took American farmers more than a quarter of a century to adopt hybrid corn, Shellenberger is not overly optimistic that the changes needed in developing countries will come quickly.

The K-State scientist thinks that a rejuvenation of world trade might be a lot more productive toward increasing food supplies around the world than continued emphasis on increasing agricultural production.

To illustrate, Shellenberger notes that the introduction of dwarf wheat varieties in Mexico has enabled that country to become more than self-sufficient with respect to its wheat needs.

But Mexico has accomplished this at a time when there is a world-wide surplus of wheat. Wheat production is mainly a world-wide governmental enterprise; therefore, it is not necessarily an unmixed blessing to achieve production goals. As efforts continue around the world to increase wheat production, careful thought needs to be given to resource allocations to avoid building up additional surplus supplies that cannot be marketed or used economically, Shellenberger concludes.

Finding Ways To Save On Irrigation Water

It is possible to get greater crop yields with less irrigation water, an engineer for the Kansas Water Resources Board believes.

John J. Pinney Jr., senior engineer, said new irrigation management techniques are proving this thesis in areas of Arizona, Idaho and Nebraska.

The "more for less" bonus comes as a result of increased irrigation efficiency — getting just the right amount of water in the root zone at just the right time.

This is difficult for even the best irrigators to do," Pinney stated in an article written for the latest issue of Kansas Water News.

Pinney said a recent study by the bureau of reclamation shows that better irrigators average only between 40 and 50 percent efficiency.

But he said some irrigators, mostly in districts or other co-operating groups, are taking advantage of the latest scientific principles involving the complex relationships of climate, hydraulics, soils and crops.

"This is done with the help of technicians and, in some cases, with computers," Pinney said.

When a farmer irrigates on the basis of experience and visual observation, he is liable to

waste water unknowing through runoff or in deep percolation into the soil, Pinney said.

In a project in Arizona, a technician visits each farm once a week. He and the farmer check soil moisture and other pertinent data to determine the timing and amount of the next irrigation, Pinney related.

The annual cost of this service has been \$1.50 an acre, with estimated annual benefits from \$35 to \$75 per acre in greater yields and reduced water pumpage.

In Idaho, a computer is programmed to estimate the time of irrigation and the amount of water that should be applied, while a combination of the technician and computer approaches has been used in an area in Nebraska.

There is no reason the cooperative methods could not be used in Kansas, Pinney said.

In a related article, Lee Wright, editor of Kansas Water News,

said evapo-transpiration research now getting under way at Kansas State University stirs up the possibility of a sort of water bonanza through higher efficiency.

"The largest user of Kansas water is evapo-transpiration," Wright said.

"This includes every means of returning water to the atmosphere: From the steam rising above your coffee cup, to evaporation from land and lakes, to transpiration by plants.

"In an average year, evapo-transpiration consumes enough water to cover the entire state to a depth of two feet. This is more than 10 times as much as all the rivers carry out of Kansas in an average year."



Cattle Prices Swing Widely

Prices for beef cattle have fluctuated much more than usual this year. The average, monthly prices for Choice steers at Chicago rose from about \$29 last winter to around \$35 in May and June, then dropped sharply in July. Recently, they have been near the \$29 level. This wide range of prices is the largest in any year since 1964.

What's ahead? We think that prices will average near \$30 during the next 12 months, probably

holding between \$29 and \$31 most of the time. The next high tide of prices seems likely to come in spring or summer of 1970. If a business recession develops in 1970 (as some economists expect), the next high may be delayed until late in the year.

No dependable seasonal pattern. No longer is there any dependable seasonal pattern in cattle prices. This is an important change from earlier years. Older cattlemen will recall the time when the highest prices of the year usually came during the late summer or early fall, and lowest prices in the spring.

In recent years there has been a slow, undulating pattern in cattle prices, with the high points usually 9 to 15 months apart. But the price highs have come at all times of the year. Thus, these highs have occurred over the past 10 years:

April 1959 — March 1960 — January 1961 — April & November 1962 — August 1963 — September 1964 — June 1965 — March 1966 — September 1967 — March 1968 and June 1969.

The big rise in cattle prices last spring was the result of (1) rapidly increasing consumer buying power, (2) no increase in the supply of beef to meet the increased demand for it, and (3) a lag in marking-up retail beef prices. When retail prices were raised to offset the increase in wholesale costs, some consumers restricted their purchases of beef, thus weakening the demand for live cattle. When prices were reduced, consumers resumed their normal buying

No big increase in supply. There is little prospect for a large increase in the output of beef during the year ahead. There simply are not enough cattle in the country to provide for a big increase in slaughter without reducing the breeding herd. According to USDA surveys and reports, the number of cows has not increased significantly since 1963. However, the production of beef increased about 11 percent between 1964 and 1968. So far this year, beef production has been just about the same as in 1968.

We may not be able to get much more beef until there is an increase in the breeding herd. At least three years will be required from the increase in the number of cattle to an increase in slaughter and beef production. If the demand for beef continues to grow as it has during past years, prices for cattle will have very strong support.

Jobless? How About Unfilled Jobs?

A new measure of the economy's balance between under and over-employment is about to be introduced. It is the job vacancy rate, a monthly statistic that will measure the percentage of jobs seeking workers much as the unemployment rate now measures the percentage of workers seeking jobs.

If the number had been available, it might have been possible to say that despite the rise in unemployment in September to 4 percent from 3.5 percent of the labor force, the biggest jump in two years, the job vacancy rate remained high, indicating continued tightness in the labor market.

At the same time, it might have been possible to add that

more than a quarter of the jobs available last month had been open three months or more and about one-eighth had been open six months or more. These were the results of a limited one-city pilot survey made several years ago.

While it is unlikely the hard-to-

fill job number will stir the emotional response as the number of hard-core unemployed in regular publication may give support to those who argue the solution to the problems of employment does not necessarily lie in over-all stimulation of the economy.

producers to limit their shipments of man-made fiber and wool textiles to the U.S.

Washington would like an accord covering these products patterned after the Long-Term Arrangement between importing and exporting countries on cotton textiles. Negotiated under the auspices of GATT, the 7-year-old arrangement permits countries whose home markets are threatened with disruption to call for restrictions on foreign goods. Brodie told the committee that since the cotton textiles agreement was negotiated there has been a "tremendous surge" of manmade fiber textile imports into the U.S.

This year for the first time these imports actually exceed those of cotton textiles, he said, although the latter amounted to 2.7 billion square yards last year against 1.1 billion square yards seven years before when the agreement went into effect.

The American delegate also noted that wool textile imports were at very high levels, accounting for more than one-fourth of the American domestic market.

Asking for more time to study the voluminous document, the National Independent Meat Packers Association commented that "what took the department over a year to concoct is going to require more than 60 days for the industry to digest."

U.S. Textiles Complain Over Imports Too

The United States has told the world's major trading nations that the flooding of the American market by foreign textiles manufacturers created a problem requiring an international solution.

"It is not our desire to choke off trade," the U.S. delegate, Henry Brodie, said at a session of the cotton textiles committee of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade. "But," he continued, "neither can we permit trade to choke off our textile industry or its growth."

The blunt statement in the world's most important trade forum was a continuation of the Nixon administration's so far unsuccessful campaign to obtain the agreement of foreign textiles

Probable Delay In Meat Inspection

Very few states appear able to meet the December 15 deadline for assuring consumers that meat processed and sold only within state boundaries will meet the same standards as federally inspected meat.

Although 44 states and Puerto Rico thus far have agreed to set up the intrastate meat inspection programs required under the wholesome meat act of 1967, officials in the Department of Agriculture say many lack funds to put such programs into effect. In addition, starting inspection programs "at least equal to" federal standards has been slowed because a 400-page set of federal regulations to govern such state projects wasn't published until recently.

Agriculture officials thus far have been unable to determine how many states will be able to comply in less than three months. They reportedly are studying proposals for inspection programs submitted by sev-

eral states.

The wholesome meat act allows a one-year grace period until December-15, 1970 for states that are making significant progress toward compliance.

In states which appear to be ignoring the law, the federal government can set up the inspection program. Federal inspectors now check all meat sold in interstate commerce — about 85 percent of the total.

Six states, Connecticut, Indiana, Maine, Nebraska and Wyoming, have not signed agreements with the Department of Agriculture.

J. Phil Campbell, assistant secretary of agriculture, indicated the department would be more likely to grant extensions than move in to set up federal inspection programs.

"I would expect a lot more will be extended than taken over," Campbell said.

Another source within the department said "a lot more states will be extended for a year than will be ready to begin operations."

Both the industry and the states have objected to the De-

USDA Sees Higher Winter Slaughter Market

The Agriculture Department does not expect a large increase soon in the number of cattle fed for slaughter. The USDA also predicts prices paid farmers for beef this winter are likely to rise again.

Though feeders are expected to increase operations some this fall, the number of cattle to be fattened is expected to rise less than the 7 percent hike during the fourth quarter of last year, the department said in a report.

"Thus, fed cattle marketings

early next year will probably show only a moderate increase over 1969," the report said. The outlook for fed cattle has much to do with total beef supplies during 1970. Demand for higher quality meat has resulted in more cattle being fed and fewer going to slaughter directly from pastures. This year, the report said, about 90 percent of all steers and heifers slaughtered came from feedlots, compared with 85 percent in 1968. Officials said choice grade steers at Chicago averaged \$29.75 per hundredweight during September, compared with \$28.80 a year earlier and the peak monthly increase last June of \$34.22 per hundredweight.

Live cattle prices this fall are expected to average near the late-summer mark, the report said, despite a seasonal increase in marketings. Part of the supply increase predicted for slaughter cattle will be offset by less

pork than earlier predicted. Supplies of veal, lamb and mutton also will be less. Consequently, total red meat production during October-December may be less than a year ago, the report said.

"Thus, fed beef prices likely will remain above the \$28.50 average of last fall," the report said. "Fed cattle prices may strengthen late fall or winter as seasonally large supplies of meat animals begin to diminish."

Miltonvale Delays Merger





Drop Most Charges Against Cedar Vale Bankers

Dismissal of 42 counts of embezzlement and making false entries in bank books that were pending against two former Cedar Vale bankers has been approved in Wichita's U.S. District Court.

Charges against Ray D. Oltjen, former president of the defunct Cedar Vale National Bank, his son, Thayne D., 29, the

bank's former vice president, were dismissed at the request of Asst. U.S. Atty. Bernard V. Borst.

The Oltjens were placed on five years' probation Jan. 20 after entering pleas of guilty to some of the counts in a 33-count indictment that charged they had embezzled \$1,010,730 of the bank's funds and made false entries to cover the losses.

Borst said in his arguments that the two counts the elder Oltjen pleaded guilty to, embezzling \$46,600 on Jan. 10, 1964, and making a false entry to cover the loss, were typical of all the other

counts in which he was named.

The one count Thayne Oltjen pleaded guilty to, making a false entry in conjunction with his father to cover a loss of \$49,982.52, was typical of the other counts in which he was named, Borst said.

One of the requirements of probation set out by U.S. District Court Judge Wesley Brown when the men were sentenced was that they were to cooperate with authorities in making a maximum recovery of the losses, "and they have cooperated," Borst said.

A total of \$712,500 was paid out by a bonding company to cover losses, Borst continued. More than \$200,000 was recovered from insurance policies and money due from pending law suits is expected to bring the total recovered to more than \$1 million, he added.

Borst said it was believed "further pursuit of the case would be of little benefit to society as a whole."

"The U.S. attorney's office is interested in a sentence that brings justice to all parties concerned and we feel this has been accomplished," Borst said.

I started showing Black Hull kafir at fairs in 1934. Wherever they had a class, my brother and I showed. Sometimes I would win and he would be second; sometimes it was the other way.

This year at fairs I won six first places on milo, four seconds and three thirds. I also had a first place in Atlas. The state fair has the best milo show anywhere.

In this county we have one of the best markets for milo anywhere—at the Crofoot feedlot at Strong City. Some milo in this area will make as much as 125 bushels per acre.

European Farmers Talk Of Killing Dairy Cows

The European Common Market has taken what U.S. observers call "a mini-step to limit milk production" which in turn will reduce the mountain of butter accumulated since 1964.

One part of the plan, the Agriculture Department said, is to reduce farmers subsidies for killing dairy cows.

The other idea is to pay European dairymen not to market milk.

If a farmer agrees to slaughter his entire herd, he will get a subsidy of \$200 per cow, up to 10 animals. Farmers must have at least two cows to participate.

Under the milk-dumping plan, a farmer can get up to \$200 per cow — no limit on the number — for agreeing to keep milk off the market.

Each part of the plan is on an experimental basis and will be limited to 250,000 head, the Economic Research Service said in a report. Farmers will have until April 30 to apply for the subsidies, which will be limited to \$100 million.

Common Market stocks of butter last July totaled about 950 million pounds, or around a five month supply for domestic use. Before the Common Market began high subsidies for dairy production in 1964, butter stocks usually totaled about one month's supply, the report said.

The Common Market's dairy herd numbered about 22.6 million cows last year. Officials hope to eliminate — either through slaughter or milk dumping — production from 500,000 cows, roughly the increase from 1967 to 1968.

Lasers Next Branding Irons?

DALLAS, Tex. — A new method of livestock branding may soon replace the old hot iron method and even the newer freeze branding method, according to a report from the Veterinary Research Institute here. The new method will be branding by laser beam.

The laser method will be portable, self-contained and carry its own power supply. Branding will be accomplished by the use of a stencil or through automated beam manipulation. Laser branding will be done at a temperature of 5000 degrees and will


be completed faster than the animal's pain reflex.

It will be so precise that it will eliminate damage to tissue around the brand, a common problem in traditional branding which last year cost some \$50 million in hide losses, according to Clifford Stilwell, vice-president of the institute, developer of the laser branding process.

The institute hopes that once tests are completed and the instrument is ready for market, large ranchers and feedlot operators will employ the laser. Smaller operators could use the method on a custom basis.

Institute officials said they have experimented with every

known method of branding, including chemical, depilatory, microwave and freezing, and laser branding has proved to be by far the most functional, permanent and inexpensive.



Heavy Demand Buys Soybeans

Prices for the 1969 crop of soybeans are expected to hold around the price-support level of 2.25 a bushel. Prices may sag below the loan rate until farmers put the surplus under loan. Enough beans are placed un-

der loan, the prices will go up enough that farmers will redeem and sell the beans needed for processing and export.

Record carryover. According to the USDA, the carryover of old soybeans on September 1 totaled 322 million bushels. This was a new record and nearly double the previous high of 166 million bushels recorded a year ago. It was equal to 31 per cent of the 1968 crop. Most of the carryover was under price support — either under loans or owned by the CCC.

The 1969 soybean crop was estimated by the USDA in early September at 1,055 million bushels — down 2 per cent from last year's record crop. A new esti-

mate, based on a survey made around October 1, will be released on October 10.

The new crop appears to exceed probable use and exports but the excess is much less than last year. The 1968 crop apparently exceeded disappearance by about 156 million bushels. The 1969 crop may exceed disappearance by less than half that much.

Control of prices. Farmers will control prices by their sales of soybeans. If they sell freely, prices will be depressed. If they hold strongly, prices will climb.

The lower prices dip during the first part of the marketing year, the higher they may become later on. But if prices are too high early in the year, they may be weak by next summer.

The demand for soybean meal and oil will, of course, also be an important factor in price determination. Soybean meal is the more valuable product. It usually contributes about two-thirds to the value of soybeans.


The demand for soybean meal may be stronger in the year ahead than it has been during the past twelve months. Soybean meal is used mostly as a high-protein feed for farm animals. More soybean meal probably will be needed to feed an increased number of poultry, hogs, and beef cattle.

The demand for soybean oil also appears to be strong. Recent cash prices for soybean oil were about 20 per cent higher than one year before. Futures prices were also up about 20 per cent

from earlier laws.

Soybean oil is used mostly for making edible products — margarine, shortening, salad oil, and cooking oil. The prices of some competing products — such as lard, peanut oil, and coconut oil — are also higher than they were a year ago.




