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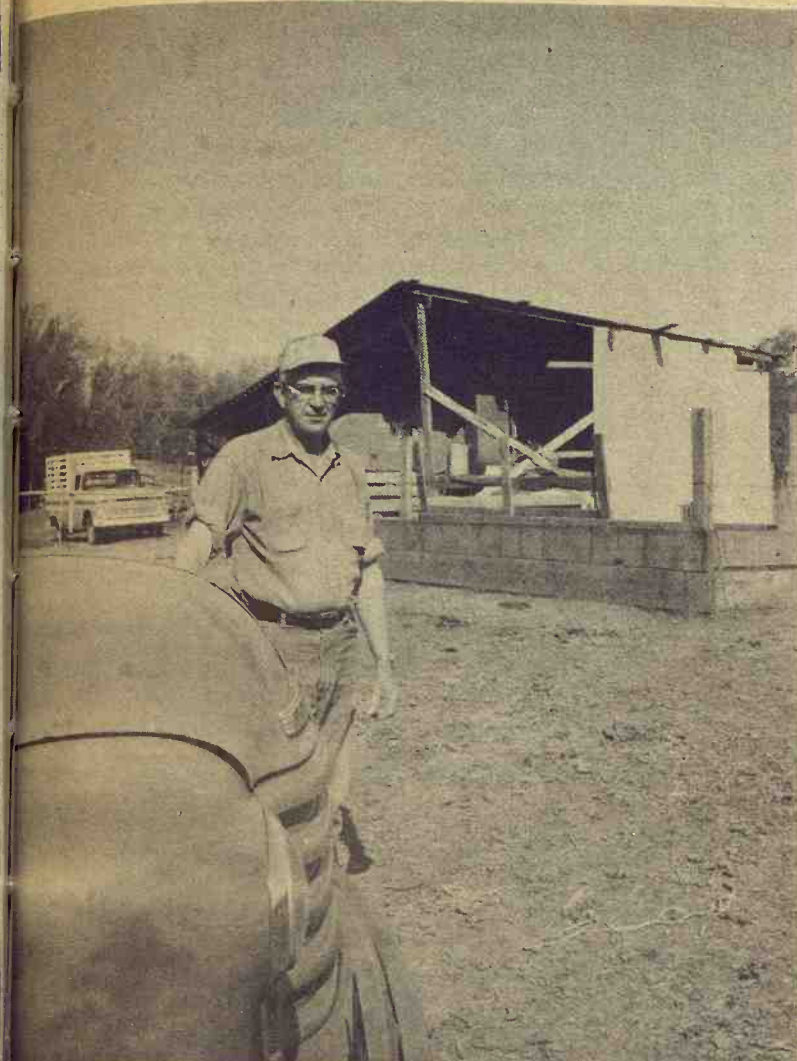

Heavy Cuts In USDA Budget

The House appropriations committee cut deeply last week into 1969 budget requests for the Agriculture department, but spared most of the long-established programs from the proposed economies. It sent to the House floor for debate a bill to appropriate 5.5 billion dollars, a cut of 1.4 billion or 20 per cent from presidential requests and 21 per cent under current year allotments. In what it called "a wartime

bill," the committee allowed 1.85 billion for general activities of the department, an increase of 107 million over the request. But it cut funds for credit agencies from 955 million to 527.5 million and chopped 10.8 billion from the 4.23 billion requested for the department's corporate activities. The committee claimed the bill would provide "as fully as possible for the production of ample food for our consumers," preservation of national resources and improvement of the nation's foreign-exchange position.

various price support and other programs. The committee also cut heavily into financing of programs for the sale and other distribution abroad of U.S. commodities. It approved 300 million for the program, a reduction of 618 million. The committee noted there will be available a total of almost \$1,200,000,000 for these programs next year due to loan repayments, unused balances of previous appropriations and receipts from the sale of foreign currencies.

The committee said these programs "contribute nothing to our balance of payments deficits" and "probably add to such deficits since they have a tendency to substitute donations and sales for borrowed currencies for the regular commercial dollar sales."

Other large allotments approved by the committee included 126 million for research, 93 million for the federal extension service, 104 million for the special milk program for needy children, 183 million for the school lunch program, 424 million for rural electrification and telephone loans, 225 million for the food stamp program, 228 million for the soil conservation service and 190 million for soil conservation payments.

April Price Index Drops A Bit

Prices received by farmers in Kansas for products marketed at mid-April were moderately below last month and April 1967, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The all-farm products price index was 228 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 234 percent at mid-March

and 233 percent a year ago. Price increases from March were noted for hogs, lambs, chickens, and eggs. Wheat prices decreased substantially while oats, soybeans, beef cattle and milk were slightly lower.

Crop Prices

The crop price index at mid-April was 154 percent of the 1910-14 base period, 11 points below March and 28 points below a year earlier.

Wheat, at \$1.27 per bushel, was 11 cents below March and 25 cents below a year ago. This was the lowest wheat price since June 1965.

Corn averaged \$1.12 per bushel, unchanged from March and compares with \$1.26 a year ago. Oats, at 76 cents per bushel, were 1 cent below last month and 3 cents below the previous year. Barley averaged \$1.01 per bushel, unchanged from the previous month and last year.

Sorghum grain, at \$1.81 per cwt., was unchanged from last month but well below the \$1.93 a year ago.

Soybeans, at \$2.50 per bushel, were 1 cent below March and 16 cents below last year.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index was 313 percent of the 1910-14 base at mid-April compared with 312 percent in March and 292 percent last year. The meat animal price index was 372 percent in April, slightly above the 370 percent in March and well above the 342 percent last year.

Hogs brought \$18.30 per cwt., 40 cents above March and \$1.30 above the previous year.

Beef cattle, at \$23.70 per cwt., were 10 cents below the previous month but \$1.80 above last year. Steers and heifers brought \$25.00 per cwt., unchanged from March but \$2.00 above a year ago. Calves averaged \$26.70 per cwt., compared with \$26.90 last month and \$24.80 last year.

Lambs brought \$27.30 per cwt., \$3.30 above the previous month and \$5.30 above a year ago.

Sheep, at \$6.10 per cwt., were 40 cents below a month ago but unchanged from a year earlier.

The dairy products price index stood at 299 percent of the 1910-14 base in April, slightly below the 304 percent in March but well above the 283 percent last year. The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$4.95 per cwt., was 15 cents below March but 35 cents above a year ago.

Eggs averaged 21.7 cents per dozen, up 0.6 cent from March but 0.8 cent below a year ago.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by farmers for feed at mid-April were unchanged to lower than in March.

Grass & Grain Circulation Gains With Purchase

The circulation of Grass & Grain will take a 10 to 12% leap beginning with the issue of May 14, following the purchase of the mailing list of the Bull-a-ton, a weekly four-pager published the last four years by Jim Kirkemide of Topeka.

Kirkemide's paper has circulated mostly south and west of Topeka in a line from Ottawa thru El Dorado, numbering about 1800 subscribers. Some of these are already Grass & Grain subscribers, so the exact addition will not be known until a cross-checking of subscriber lists is completed.

Grass & Grain's circulation of 11,100 is the largest of any newsweekly listed by the Kansas Press Association and the addition of the Bull-a-ton is expected to increase it by approximately 1200.

Kirkemide's paper has been mostly oriented to auction trade.

The readers of the Bull-a-ton who were already subscribing to Grass & Grain will have their subscriptions to the latter extended.

Studies May Help Flood Damage

Flood plain studies may hold the answer to reducing flood damage in Kansas and the nation, according to a Kansas State University Extension economist.

Total value of damage caused by floods continues to increase each year, Kirk Baker says, despite the billions of dollars spent on flood control.

Inflation accounts for a part of this increase. But most of it is caused by man — through unwise use of natural flood plains.

New residential areas, shopping centers, and industrial

plants are being built in potential flood disaster areas faster than our political system can build protective works, Baker says.

The economist believes the use of flood plain studies is the first step in reversing this trend. Prepared by the Army Corps of Engineers and the Kansas Water Resources Board, these reports describe flood hazards along major rivers in the state.

Reports on the Kansas, Neosho, Cottonwood, Verdigris, Fall, Elk and Smoky Hill River below Salina are now available.

Studies of other rivers are being prepared.

Flood plain zoning is another useful tool in preventing flood damage. New homes and businesses are often built in a flood plain which may be subject to serious flood hazards developers do not or will not recognize.

Flood plain zoning prohibits development in these areas. However, the land may be used for agriculture, parks, golf courses, or parking lots, Baker says.

Dams and reservoirs especially designed to control flood waters are useful in protecting residential and commercial areas, but are not designed to prevent all floods.

Most Kansas watershed projects prevent annual flood damage in agricultural areas and reduce damage in large storms. But there will still be occasional flooding.

Even large reservoirs and levees do not provide 100 percent protection against floods. Salina flooded in 1950 and 1951, only a few years after Kanopolis Reservoir was completed.

Baker says our present reservoir system would not have prevented the 1903, 1904, and 1951 floods in Wamego and Topeka.

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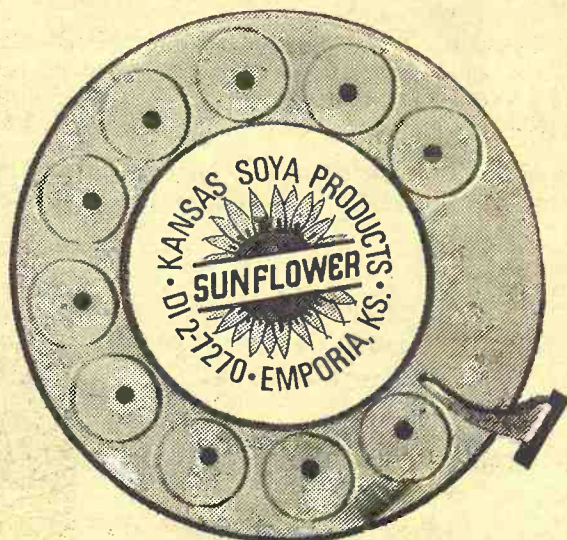
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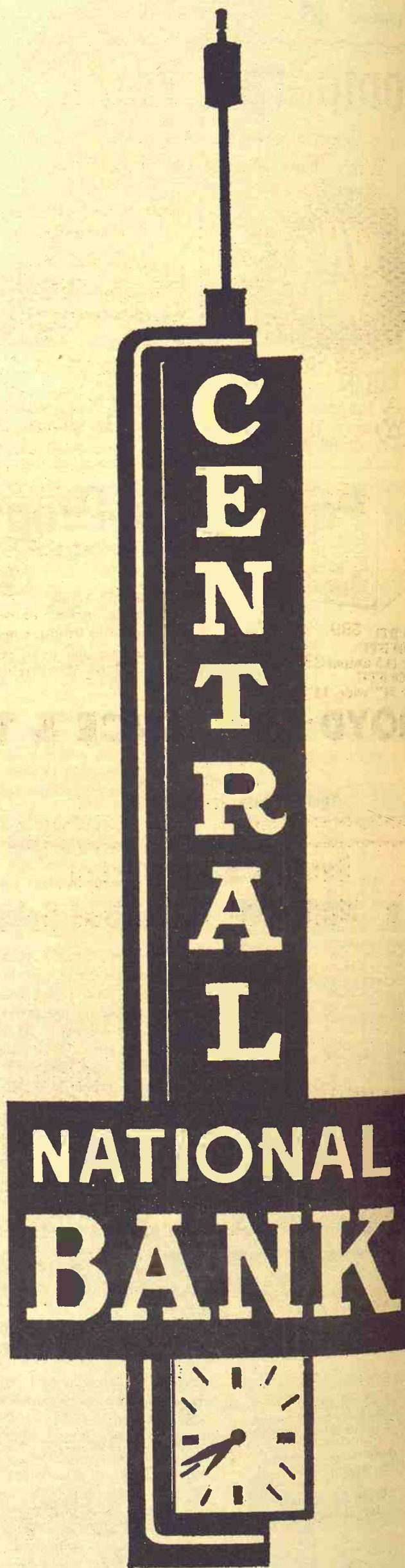

Full Settlement of Abilene Mill Debt

Creditors of the Abilene, Kans. Flour Mills Co. received 100 cents on the dollar in payment of claims totaling more than \$2 million as reorganization plans for the firm neared completion during a hearing Thursday in the bankruptcy division of U.S. District Court, Wichita.

The only creditor remaining with an outstanding claim was Security Milling Co., Abilene, known as a "sister company" of the Abilene Mills because of close corporate ties between

the two.

Attorneys for Security and Abilene Mills said they were near agreement which probably would result in transfer of stock in College Hill Medical Tower, 3333 E. Central, Wichita, to satisfy Security's claim against Abilene Mills.

The Medical Tower building is owned by Business Investments, Inc., another wholly owned subsidiary of Abilene Flour Mills.

Major claims settled included \$567,118 to the Commodity Cre-

dit Corp., \$671,800 on promissory notes held by six banks Abilene National and Farmers National, Abilene; First National, Wichita; First National, Topeka; Merchants National and Union National of Kansas City; and about \$250,000 on unsecured debts to various creditors including utility and shipping firms.

Payments totaling \$600,000 were made earlier on notes held by Commerce Trust Co. and Union National Bank of Kansas City.

The claim held by Security represents approximately \$220,000.

Judge Robert B. Morton, referee in bankruptcy, also approved attorney's fees totaling \$100,000.

Abilene Flour Mills and Abilene Grain Co. filed Oct. 10 for reorganization under Chapter XI of the Federal Bankruptcy Act.

"Reorganization" is a rehabilitation plan under which companies may continue to operate rather than undergo complete liquidation as in outright bankruptcy proceeding.

Judge Morton described this as the largest reorganization case ever to be handled in Kansas and praised all parties concerned for the expediency with which the case was settled.

"We are delighted with the effectiveness of the creditors' committee. War O. Brooks, the operating receiver, did an outstanding job," Judge Morton said.

The plant of the Abilene Mills was sold to Archer Daniels Milling Co., Minneapolis, Minn., and reopened last week on a 24-hour-a-day basis, with 20 employees. The number was reduced from 30 to 20 because of a decision to eliminate a small packaging unit considered a minor portion of the operation.

The building housed the plant. The building which housed the plant here was financed by a city industrial revenue bond issue.

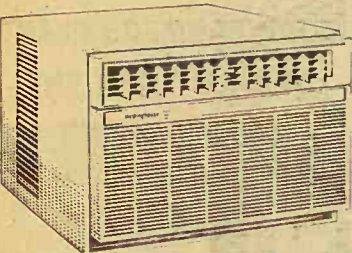

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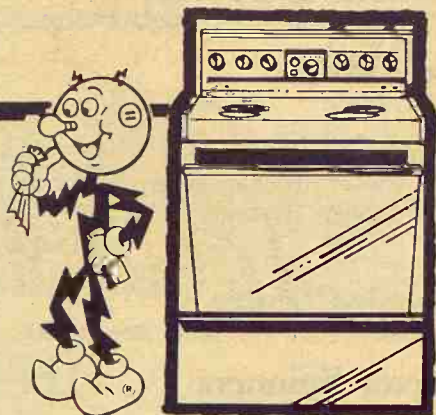

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Pork Production Nickels Starting To Come In

The National Pork Producers Council's "nickels for profits" program is off and running at a great rate, announcements from headquarters say.

Market deductions for hogs

under the plan more than doubled in February, they said. Iowa, with 222,000 hogs marketed under the checkoff program led all the states and Nebraska ranked second with 120,000 head.

Kansas is moving toward the deduction program as rapidly as possible.

Under the plan each hog marketed is assessed 5 cents with

the money being split three ways. The split is 2 cents to the home state hog producer organization, 1.6 cents to the National Pork Producers Council and 1.4 cents to the National Meat Board.

The Pork Council already has launched a major project, Roland Paul, NPPC executive vice-president has reported.

The first project will be a major consumer attitude research.

The group also is cooperative in a pilot project to identify and eradicate trichinosis, and with the federal extension service cataloging all available swine research as a guide to its allocation of research grants from the "Nickels For Profits" fund.

The NPPC has estimated the "Nickels for Profits" effort will yield \$300,000 annually for expanded efforts to sell more pork and to assist the pork industry in general.

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Major Sheep Import Into State

About 5350 head of yearling ewes were shipped into Kansas this week by the Kansas Quality Sheep Committee, George Ahlschwede, Extension livestock specialist at Kansas State University, announced.

Ewes went to 85 producers in 27 counties. Single orders ranged from 10 to 350 head. Mitchell County sheepmen combined for the largest county group of 1068 ewes. Orders were light in the western half of Kansas due to dry weather conditions, Ahlschwede said.

The ewes are fine-wool type, weigh 90 to 100 pounds, and are in good flesh. Conditions in the range country, where the ewes were purchased, have been excellent, he said. The animals were selected in the Del Rio, Texas area by Ahlschwede and V. E. McAdams, Extension sheep specialist at KSU.

"These ewes arrived in Kansas for about \$3 a head less than our producers have been getting for their market lambs in recent days," Ahlschwede pointed out.

McAdams explained that the sheep industry is changing, and Kansas is out in front in developing new ideas in sheep production. "We are using ewe breeds and ram breeds. Kansas producers get fine wool ewes from the range areas, cross them with large, growthy, meat-type rams to produce quality lambs in greatest demand at markets," he said.

Kansas is maintaining stock sheep numbers at 377,000 head while many states are experiencing declining sheep production.

Kansas Quality Sheep Committee members are representatives of Kansas Purebred Sheep Producers Association, Kansas

State Sheep and Wool Association, St. Joseph Public Livestock Market, Kansas City Livestock Market, Wichita Livestock Market, Midwest Wool Marketing Cooperative, Kansas Farm Bureau, Kansas Livestock Association, and KSU Extension Service.

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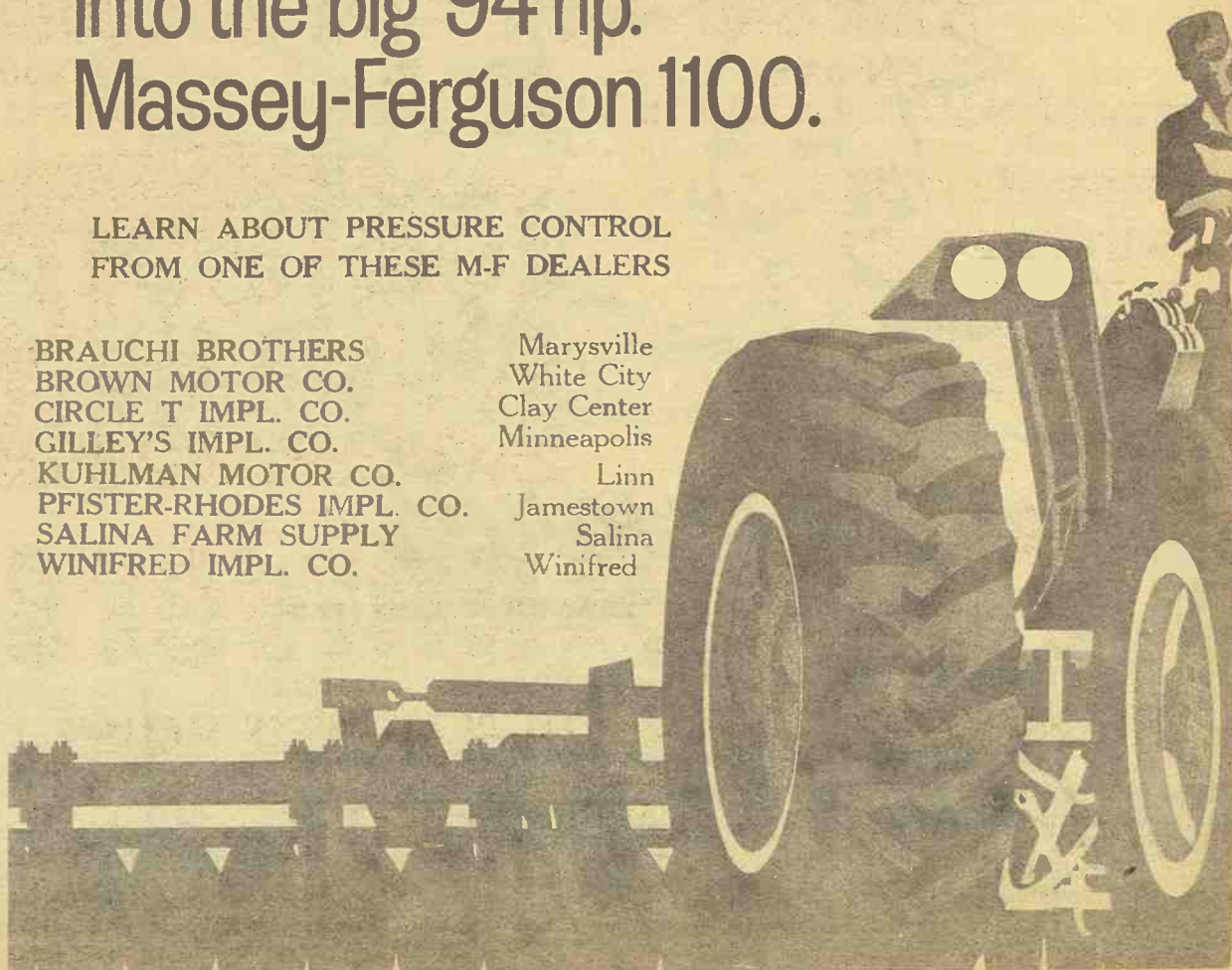
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Mrs. Norma Tanner, Wamego Sends Prize - Winning Recipe

First, let me suggest you mothers out there — let the kiddies stir these up for "Grandma" for a nice inexpensive gift that she will enjoy doublefold — because the grandchildren made the candy themselves and also the mints are actually good for settling the stomach of older people, not too sweet either."

CANDY MINT RECIPE

1 pound box powdered sugar
1/4 cup melted oleo
3 tablespoons water (hot)
7 drops of oil of peppermint (buy 25c worth at a drug store) or 1/2 tsp. of mint flavoring.
Mix and form into small balls. If too soft refrigerate 1 hour. Melt 4 (1-ounce) squares unsweetened chocolate with toothpick into top of each mint and dip. Place on waxed paper. Allow chocolate to set at room temperature. Will make about 5 dozen small balls. Suggestion: When the kiddies are making these let them press the candy into a 9-inch square greased baking pan and drizzle with about half the chocolate. Much easier. Remember to score squares before candy cools completely to avoid excessive crumbling. * * * *

2 pounds spareribs
1 tablespoon fat
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1 quart kraut
1 tablespoon brown sugar

Brown ribs well in hot fat. Salt and pepper. Put kraut in bottom of pan, sprinkle with brown sugar. Put ribs and potatoes over kraut. Add water and cover. Let cook on low heat until done. * * * *

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May Put Career Soldiers On Salary

The Pentagon plans a major revamping of the military pay system that would put career servicemen on a straight salary comparable to government civil servants, officials said yesterday.

They portrayed the present pay system as so complex and fragmented that few military personnel really know exactly how much they are paid.

A new study forwarded by the secretary of defense, Clark

M. Clifford, to Congress as part of a 4-year review showed that military men often underestimate their pay by as much as one-fourth.

In the long run, the study says, the military system suffers because individuals often leave uniform for seemingly more lucrative, but actually only equal-paying jobs.

In the next few months Pentagon officials plan to submit detailed legislative proposals to

Congress.

Key features of the plan, as outlined to newsmen:

- The government would pay a full cash salary to career men that would be equivalent in all respects to civilian salaries.

- This salary would include and replace basic pay and allowances provided under the current system.

- The government would withhold individual retirement contributions of 6.5 per cent of the annual salary. Now a man's retirement contribution is paid by the government and he gets nothing if he quits before completing 20 years.

- The military man would pay his own subsistence and housing, both on and off base, except when assigned to the field or sea.

- He would pay income taxes on the full salary.

Currently, basic pay is only part of the compensation given to military people. This taxable cash ranges from 63 per cent of a corporal's pay to 80 percent of a 2-star general's.

In addition they get nontaxable housing and subsistence allowances that vary according to years of service and number of dependents.

The formula is so complicated there are 11 possible different total reimbursement amounts for men with the same rank and service.

Officials have decided to continue basic pay plus housing and subsistence allowances for non-career people — the thous-

ands who put in their short tours and leave service.

The pressing reason for switching to straight salary for career men is to make their compensation fully visible, it was said.

The study cited a survey in Washington which said that banks and credit firms understate the pay of enlisted men seeking loans by as much as 51 per cent.

Often the quarters allowance — which can range up to nearly \$1,600 a year for a sergeant with eight years' service — is overlooked, as are tax advantages amounting to a few hun-

dred dollars a year.

To switch over to the proposed salary system would cost the government 12.15 billion dollars annually, a gross increase of 1.5 billion dollars over the current setup, officials estimated.

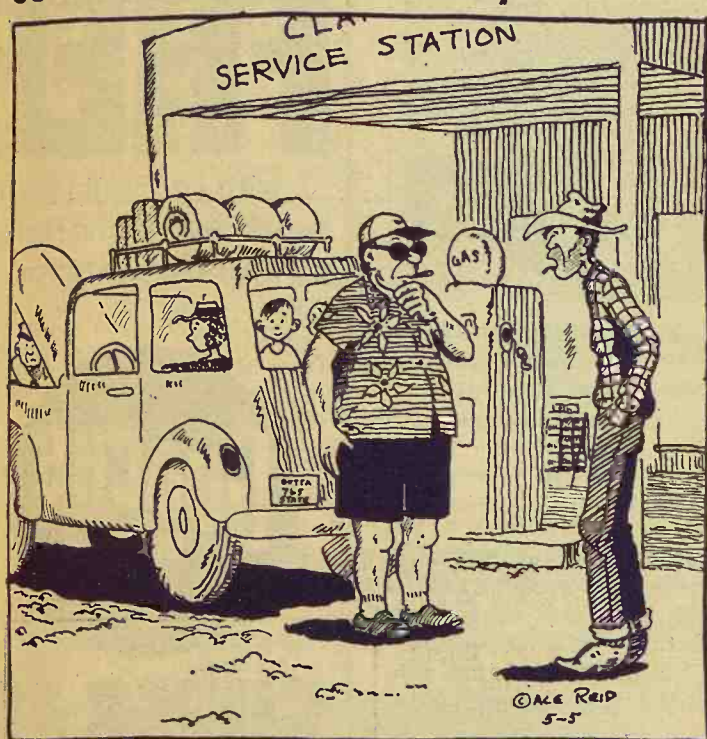

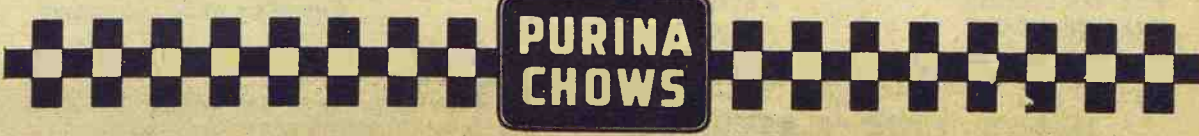

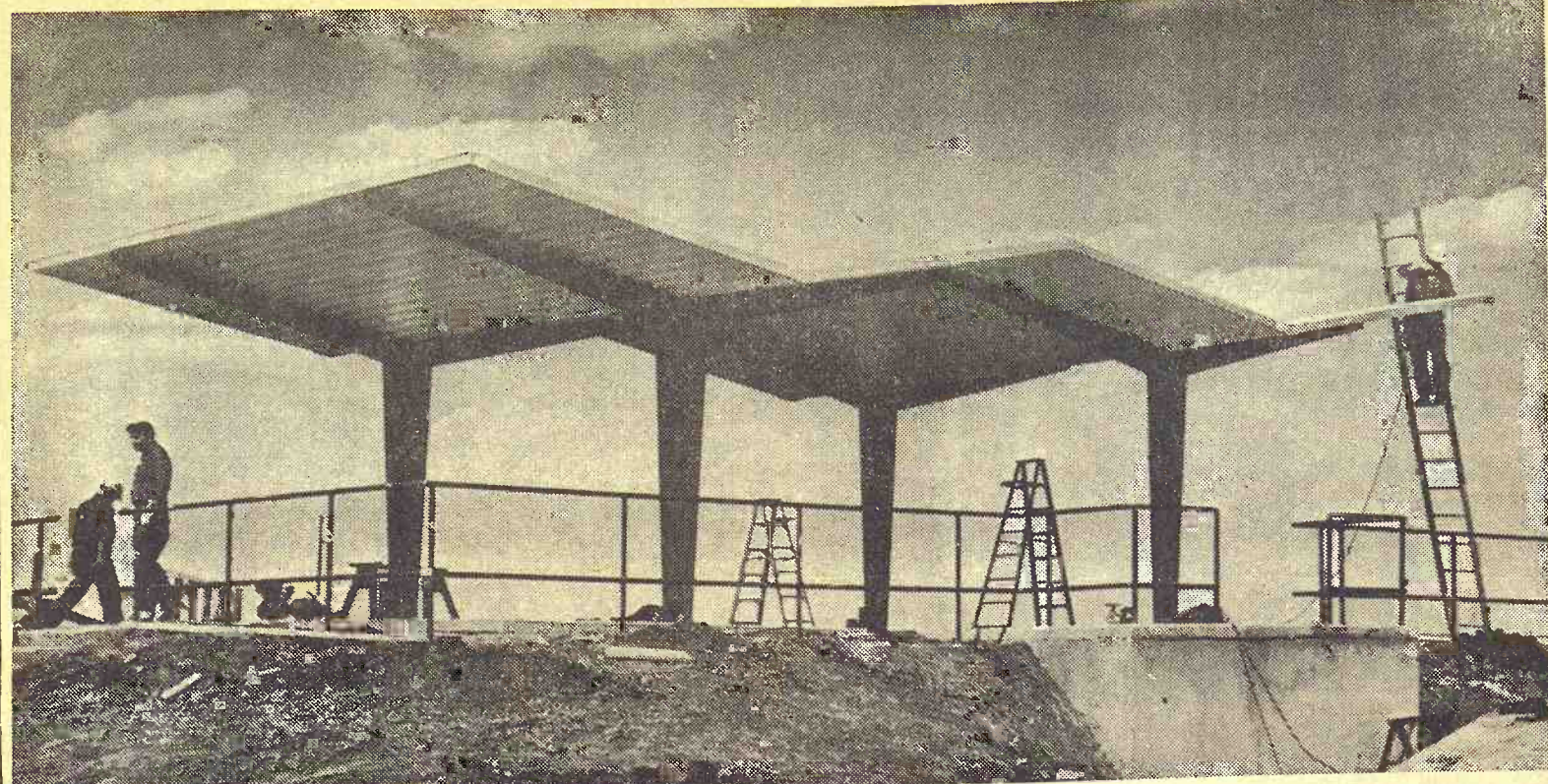

Government Closes Helium Plant At Otis

OTIS — The Bureau of Mines Otis Helium Plant closed down last week for the second time in the plant's history.

Superintendent J. L. Asbill said "We quit taking gas April 30. It was just a matter of economics. There was so much more helium being produced than there was a demand for, that it was not economical to operate this plant."

The plant was constructed during World War II, but was shut down after the war. It was reactivated in 1951 and has been producing helium until Tuesday.

Asbill said that approximately 30 employees of the plant from Larned, Otis, Great Bend, Bison, and La Crosse will be left without jobs as a result of the plant

closure.

"Some of us will stay around for a while to assist in the disposal of equipment," he said.

Asbill noted that some of the employees of the Otis Helium Plant have already found new jobs in private industry while others are still looking.

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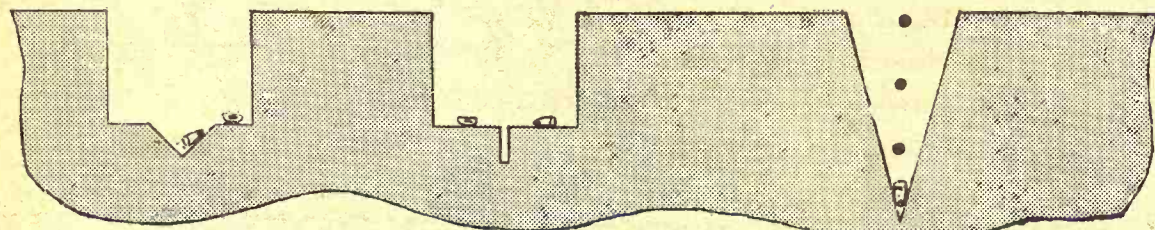
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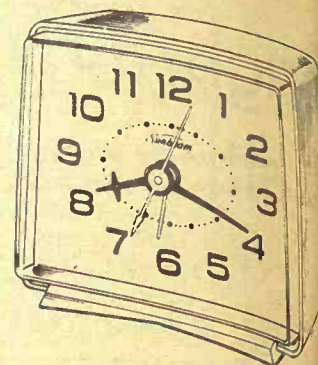
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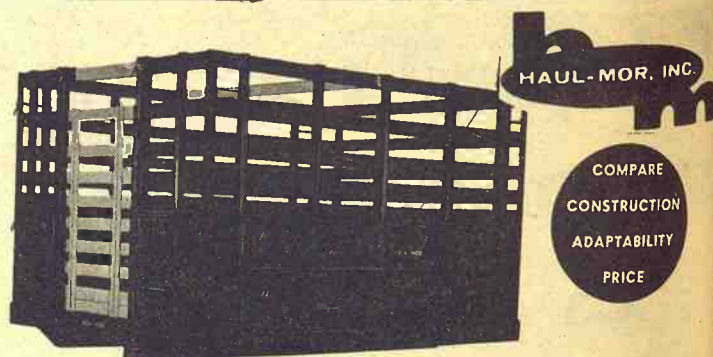

Bright Look For Cattle Feeders

On April 1, farmers were fattening 2 percent more cattle for market than one year before. This makes a moderately favorable outlook for both cattle feeders and beef eaters: Prices of fat cattle seem likely to average a little higher than in 1967, while supplies of beef available to consumers will be at, or near, record levels.

The USDA estimate of the number of cattle on feed April

1 in 32 states was 10,671,000 — an increase of 2 percent from a year earlier. The increase consisted entirely of heifers, which numbered 3,264,000 — up 10 percent from 1967. The number of steers on feed was 7,375,000 — down 1 percent.

The increase was mostly in Iowa and Texas, but substantial increases were also shown for Nebraska and Minnesota. Of the 32 states reporting, only 12

There were 17 states reporting decreases. The biggest cuts were in California and Illinois. These states seem to have passed their peaks in cattle feeding. Increases are now coming mostly in the Great Plains and the Western Corn Belt.

Fewer heavy cattle. The number of steers weighing over 1100 pounds plus heifers over 900 pounds totaled 729,000 — 9 percent less than a year earlier. Many of these cattle already have been moved to market.

(We combine numbers of steers in each weight range with heifers 200 pounds lighter because average slaughter weights are about 200 pounds lighter for heifers than for steers.)

The number of steers weighing 900 to 1100 pounds plus heifers 200 pounds lighter totaled 3,007,000 — 1 percent more than in 1967. Within this grouping, however, there were 66,000 more heifers but 32,000 fewer steers. Consequently, the tonnage of beef on the hoof was up less than 1 percent. These cattle will provide most of the beef during May and June.

More middleweights. The number of steers in the 700- to 900-pound range plus heifers 200 pounds lighter was estimated at 4,016,000 — 7 percent more than a year before. But within these weight ranges, most of the increase was heifers. Consequently, beef-on-the-hoof was up only 6 percent. Most of these cattle will be marketed during June, July, and August.

Light cattle and calves. The number of steers 500 to 700 pounds on feed April 1 plus heifers 200 pounds lighter was estimated at 2,488,000 — 2 percent less than last year. The tonnage was down about 3 percent, because there was a decrease in the proportion of steers to heifers.

Marketing Intentions. Of the 10,671,000 cattle estimated in feedlots on April 1, farmers reported plans to sell 5,542,000 before July 1. This number would be just 1 percent more than they sold a year ago.

Supplies of other meats. Beef will again meet strong competition in the retail meat counters. Supplies of both pork and broilers are expected to be about the same as last year. There is a lot of left-over turkey, but fewer birds may be raised this year.

Consumer demand for beef up. The nation's consumers may be willing to spend a little more for beef this year. The normal increase is 2 or 3 percent. The increase could be more this year, if supplies of other meats are no greater than in 1967.

\$85,000 For One-Third of Him

Here is the Charolais bull which brought \$85,000 for a one-third interest at the Lauright Ranch sale near Douglass last week.

H. D. Shawver, managing partner of Lauright is on the left, and the purchaser Fred Gladdis of Forest Mississippi, on the right. The other two owners of the bull are Lester Laue of Hanover, Kansas, and the Mad Ranch of Blanco, Oklahoma. The bull, Beau Ivo 1 Y, was purchased at Calgary, Canada, for \$13,000 and brought to the Lauright Ranch at the age of 3½ months. The bull holds the yearling weight record for weight gains, weighing 1579 as a yearling on March 17 of this year.

The Lauright Ranch had been a family partnership of the four Shawver sons and daughters and the mother, Mrs. D. M. Shawver of Wichita.

The entire sale grossed \$771,250, averaging \$1602, counting in the one-third interest of the yearling bull. The bull average for 27 other bulls besides the Beau Ivo sale was \$5756.

There were 107 purebred and 15/16 Charolais females that sold for \$338,900 to average \$3167. Six 7/8 females sold for \$6850 for an average of \$1142.

The 134 ¾ Charolais females brought \$80,000 to average \$597, and the 207 one-half blood females sold for \$114,975 to average \$555.

Another outstanding sale was that of one-quarter in Aiglon Jr. Y01, an imported French son of Aiglon out of an Usurpateur dam. Karl Ehmer, Linden Farms, Lagrangeville, N.Y., paid \$29,000 for Lauright's one-quarter interest. The other three one-quarter interests are held by Lester Laue, Hanover; Mad Ranch, Blanco, Okla.; and Double R Ranch, Tyler, Texas.

Five State Armories Closed

Leases are being terminated on five National Guard armories in Kansas — at St. Marys, Kingman, Arkansas City, Paola and Holton.

All except the one at Holton are city-owned.

Brig. Gen. Philip Smyth, assistant Kansas adjutant general, said attempts were being made to keep other facilities open after units of the 69th brigade leave for active duty.

Most of the armories are state owned, but the five ones closed are not.

Smyth said the National Guard's lease agreement on these armories provides for termination on 30-day notice in event of mobilization.

Smyth said National Guard officers are at work on arrangements to keep as many as possible of the state-owned armories open. There about 60 such armories in 57 communities.

State Livestock Slaughter Up 5%

Production of red meat by Kansas commercial slaughter plants during 1967 totaled 1265 million pounds, up 5 percent from the 1966 production and establishes a new record large production, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Beef led the red meat production by accounting for 72 percent of the total; pork, 27 percent; mutton and lamb, and veal less than 1 percent each.

Beef production for 1967 totaled 916.3 million pounds of dressed meat, up 2 percent from last year and a record high.

Production of pork, at 335.8

million pounds, increased 16 percent from the previous year while lamb and mutton production, at 11.8 million pounds, was down 19 percent from the previous year. Veal production, at 1.5 million pounds, was less than half the 1966 production, once again setting a record low.

The number of cattle slaughtered, at 1,617,000 head, was up slightly from last year and established a record high number.

Hog slaughter during 1967, at 2,423,000 head, was up 17 percent from the previous year.

The number of calves, sheep and lambs slaughtered was down from the 1966 total and set record low numbers for each species.

Kansas' rank among the states for commercial slaughter by classes in 1967 was as follows: cattle, 6th; hogs, 13th; sheep and lambs, 14th; and calves 31st.

The average liveweight of cattle slaughtered during 1967 was 1036 pounds. This was 19 pounds heavier than the previous year. Hogs averaged 243 pounds, down 1 pound from the previous year.

Sheep and lambs had an average liveweight of 97 pounds, down 1 pound from a year earlier while calves averaged 393 pounds, 22 pounds heavier than in 1966. Federally and non-federally inspected commercial slaughter are included in these totals.

United States

Total production of red meat in the 48 states during 1967, including commercial and farm slaughter, was 34,195 million pounds, up 5 percent from 1966.

Beef production in 1967 amounted to 20,185 million pounds, 2 percent greater than the 1966 production of 19,694 million pounds. Veal production was 792 million pounds, down 13 percent from the 1966 production of 910 million pounds. Pork production totaled 12,572 million pounds, up 11 percent from the 11,328 million pounds produced in 1966.

Lamb and mutton production was 646 million pounds, down 1 percent from the 1966 total of 650 million pounds. Beef accounted for 59 percent of the total red meat production during 1967, pork 37 percent, veal 2 percent, and lamb and mutton 2 percent.

Lard production totaled 2,076 million pounds in 1967, up 8 percent from the 1,929 million pounds produced in 1966.

The total number of cattle slaughtered in 1967 was up slightly from 1966. Total calf slaughter in 1967 was 11 percent below the 1966 number.

The number of hogs slaughtered in 1967 was up 11 percent from 1966.

Sheep and lamb slaughter in 1967 was virtually the same as the previous year.

The average liveweight of all cattle slaughtered during 1967 was 1,018 pounds, 9 pounds heavier than a year earlier.

Average liveweight of calves slaughtered, at 234 pounds, decreased 6 pounds; hogs averaged 241 pounds, 1 pound lighter; and sheep and lambs averaged 101 pounds, 1 pound lighter than in 1966.

Pressure At The Stadium

As often happens on rush construction jobs, talk about labor shortages and bad weather has started around the Kansas State University football stadium project, scheduled to be completed by mid-September.

Altho April rains were only normal and the area was dry enough before that there were complaints of dust, construction bosses have recently talked about the difficulty of moving heavy equipment around the soft ground. Foremen say skilled laborers, especially plumbers, are in short supply and their shortage may also cause difficulties.

Despite what may sound like alibies planted in the spring, construction men say they'll be finished for the first Wildcat game in September. What if they're not? "Look me up in Hong Kong," said one boss.

Allow Bids On New Highway Road Forming

For the first time, the Kansas Highway Commission is going to allow bids for the use of profile concrete paving equipment known as "slipform paving."

The slipform paving is a combination device that spreads, consolidates, screens and floats the concrete surface between its edges to the final desired thickness. Conventional equipment runs on forms similar to railroad rails.

The commission will receive bids May 23 at Salina for paving work on I-35 north of McPherson and on US 24 in Jefferson County.

The commission has programmed about \$7 million for work on US 24 in Jefferson County from Williamstown Junction west to the Newman Corner. The other involves 20.7 miles of four-lane pavement on I-35 from McPherson north to the Saline County line.

Including the ramps at the four interchanges and the safety rest area paving, there is nearly 45 miles of two-lane, 24-foot wide pavement on the project.

The slipform device has built-

in forms for concrete that are nearly 60 feet long. They are drawn along the top of the sub-base as the paver moves at 10 to 20 feet a minute.

The Highway Commission

said its engineers expect little difference in bids received for the use of either type of machine.

Defense Of Farm Technology

MANHATTAN — How many times have you heard farmers say that they are on a treadmill — that they're getting nowhere, but must keep running just to keep from falling behind.

They may feel they receive little financial reward from advances in agricultural technology. As more persons adopt new techniques, they argue, output goes up, prices go down, and they're no better off than before.

This line of reasoning describes a characteristic of a keenly competitive society. But it overlooks important advantages from technological improvements, a Kansas State University economist says.

And it would be a serious blunder to infer that research expenditures which advance knowledge are not worth making — or that adoption of improved technology does not pay off.

Farmers who are among the very first to adopt new techniques may enjoy higher profits until these innovations are accepted by others. But, because of competition, it's impossible to stay ahead of the game for very long, E. S. Bagley says. The function of competition is to insure that technological advances are quickly and widely disseminated — that they may benefit everyone.

One form of technological progress results in improved methods of producing existing products. It may result in increased output or lower production costs.

In the long run, the result may be to release some productive resources from these industries and make them available for producing other items. For example, a new variety of seed may boost output or make it possible to produce the same quantity at a lower cost. If more output is not needed, land and labor used to produce it may be freed to produce other items.

A second form of technological progress is the development of new products. For example, television, automobiles, and home freezers were unknown to even the wealthiest persons 100 years ago.

Today, most Americans accept these innovations as part of everyday life. This, Bagley says,



may be the most important form of technological progress. So farmers benefit from tech-

nological progress as consumers, enjoying a higher standard of living.

And finally, farmers may realize benefits from technological progress in the form of more leisure time. With modern farm machinery available to do the jobs formerly done by hand, they have more time to relax and enjoy life.

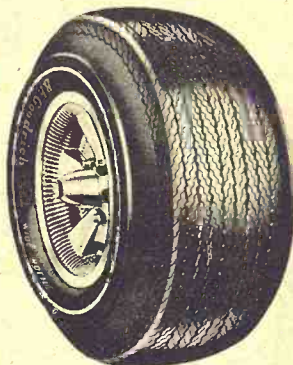

The panel discussion centered on a federal meat inspection and plant facilities law passed last year. The law requires states to bring their regulations up to federal specifications by December 1969 — or the federal government will step in and enforce federal rules.

The state's meat industry has said the state should pass a law requiring the state to pay the higher inspection costs expected to result from the new standards, since the public would benefit. Packers contend the federal regulations would put many smaller operators out of business because of expenses in modifying facilities to meet physical plant requirements. A bill introduced in the last state legislative session to establish a "comparable" state law failed.

Clarence Knebel, Belmont, Wis., president of the National Institute of Locker Operators and Freezer Provisioners, said at the meeting the federal law will mean much higher costs for small custom operators located near, and doing business across, state borders. "I really feel sorry for them," he said. "They're really going to be hurt."

5-lb. Broiler In 56 Days

A new champion Kansas broiler weighing in at 2330 grams (5.14 pounds) at 56 days of age has been produced at Kansas State University, Manhattan.

According to Dr. Paul E. Sanford, K-State poultry nutritionist, the champion gainer was a Hubbard White Mountain, a commercial meat-strain broiler bird. It weighed 265 grams (about half a pound) more than the previous champion produced in 1966.

The champion bird was fed Kansas State University's standard 21 per cent protein broiler ration, but Sanford thinks the secret of the extraordinary weight gain was a zinc bacitracin supplement. He used the bacitracin at a level five times as high as the normal amount, although the amount used still is within the maximum allowed under Federal Drug Administration regulations.

"Considerable proof indicates that the extra supplement of bacitracin was responsible for the weight gain of the champion," Sanford said.

Feed efficiency of the experimental lot containing the champion broiler was 2.15 pounds of feed per pound of gain. Sanford explained that this rate of gain was not as good as average and said smaller birds would convert feed to meat more efficiently than larger birds.

Anyone interested in information on KSU's standard broiler ration may secure this from Dr. Sanford.

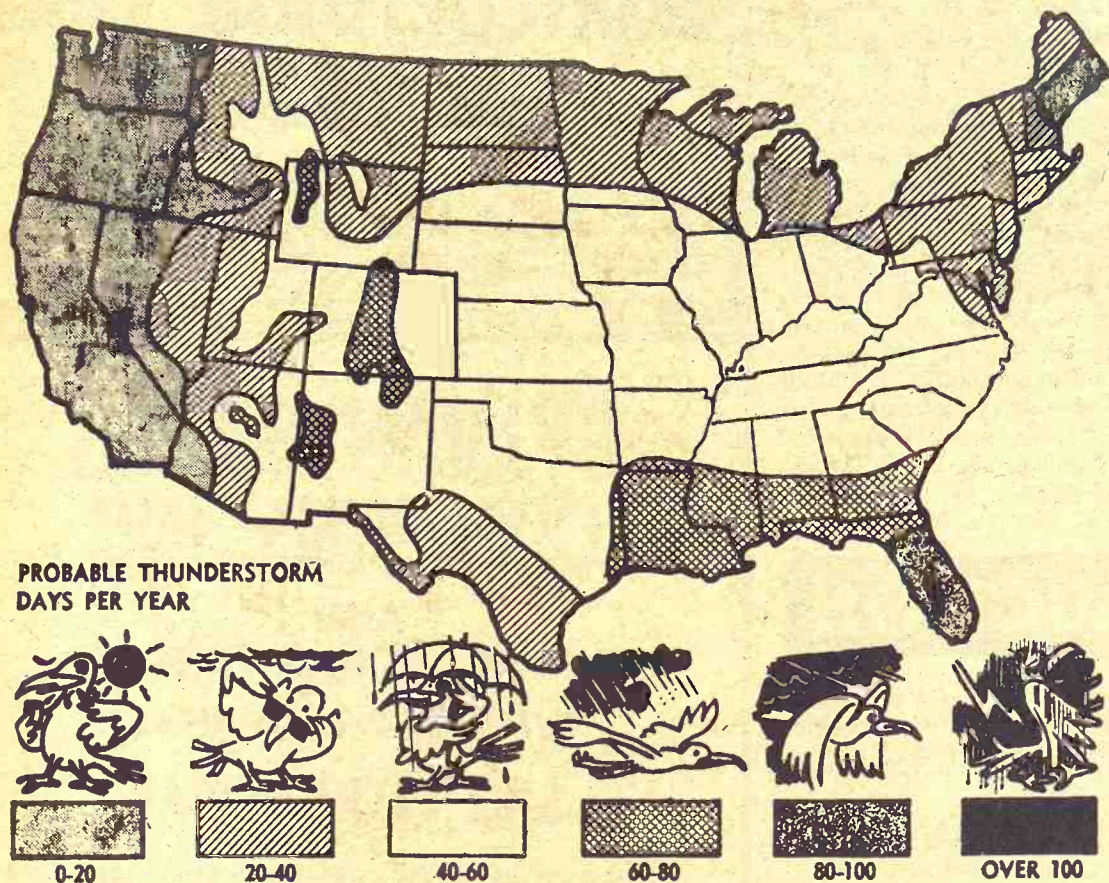

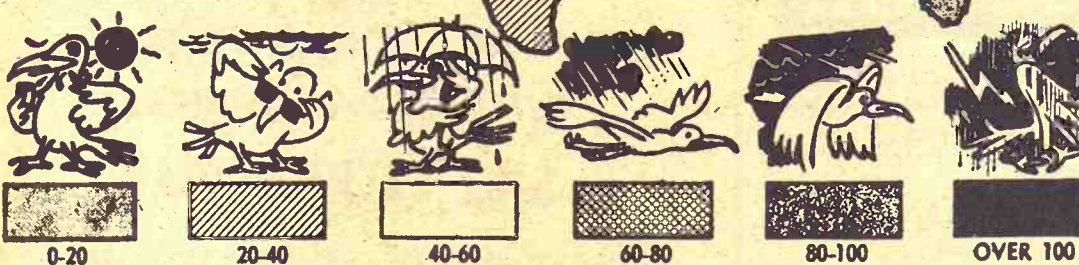

Near Agreement On Cut In Wheat Acres

— But Farm Bureau Sends Only A Letter

HUTCHINSON — Kansas farm organizations and commodity groups Friday unanimously recommended extensive cuts in wheat acreages for next year's crop.

The recommendations were made in a meeting with Agriculture Stabilization Conservation Service officials from Kansas and U.S. Department of Agriculture officials from Washington, D.C., here in an all-day session.

Only major farm organization, not making a recommendation at the meeting was the Kansas Farm Bureau. KFB President Ray Frisbie addressed the officials by letter noting that he had no power to make such a recommendation for his group under present Farm Bureau policies.

The Kansas Association of Wheat Growers, Kansas Grange and farmers Union all recommended a 10 per cent mandatory cut in acreage with diversion acres clauses to increase the amount of acres left unsown.

The National Farmers Organization for Kansas recommended a 25 per cent decrease in allotments to bring prices back to higher levels.

About 150 to 200 persons from Kansas and Oklahoma attended the meeting. A half dozen formal statements were made with perhaps half a dozen other comments from the floor during a discussion session following the presentation of formal statements.

Claude Freeman, chief of the price and program development staff, USDA, Washington, D.C., and Carl Larson, Southwest area director, ASCS, also from Washington, summarized the possibilities and programs open under present law.

Larry Brennan, Dodge City, chairman of the Kansas ASCS committee, conducted the meeting.

Freeman explained that a situation similar to that faced in 1966 is present. Carry-in at the beginning of the 1966 marketing year was 535 million bushels. Allotment for 1966 was 47.8 million bushels. Carry-over the following year was 425 million bushels.

Figures at the beginning of the 1968 crop year, July 1, are expected to be about 545 million bushels. A reduction in supply appears to be needed to boost prices for the year to come, because a 1.5 billion bushels harvest for the 1968 crop is in prospect.

Favorable crop weather throughout the world has caused increased food grain supplies in formerly short crop areas, too. Some U.S. commitments abroad are lowering with prospects of better crops in both India and Pakistan.

The group was asked by federal officials:

- How much U.S. wheat production do we want in 1969?

- What size allotment would produce the desired amount of production?

They were also asked for opinions on:

- Whether there should be a substitute clause for wheat and feed grain substitutions.
- Whether there should be a substitute clause for wheat and feed grain substitutions.
- Whether there should be a program for diversion in addition to diversion required for the program.
- What should the diversion payment be?
- What should the loan rate be?

Harold Shaw, Oklahoma spokesman for the President's Grains Advisory Committee, told the group the committee in Washington recommended a 10 per cent mandatory decrease in allotments with a 40 per cent voluntary diversion and payment for diversion at half the county loan rate, with a substitution clause and the same loan rate as the current year. (\$1.25 a bushel)

All speakers recommended extension of the 1965 act.

A dissenter to the unanimity of feeling at the meeting was J. L. Edwards, representing the Union Equity Cooperative Exchange, Enid, Oklahoma.

He recommended a minimum carryover of 600 million bushels; acreage enough to maintain at least 600 million bushels in reserve; export payments of 25 cents a bushel, and subsidy enough to keep the U.S. wheat competitive in the world markets.

George Meeker, Garden City, president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, told the group the 1965 act is the best to date, but said it could be improved and offered two possibilities.

He said the entire certificate could be paid by the processors (they now pay 75 cents a bushel for domestic wheat, about 35 per cent of the crop) and then the federal cost under the current law, could be shifted to make an export payment to farmers.

Under current law, processors pay 75 cents a bushel for wheat they are processing for domestic use. The federal government then picks up the tab for the difference between the price of wheat, plus 75 cents, and parity.

Parity set last July 1 was \$2.52 per bushel. This parity payment is made on 35 to 40 per cent of the crop. The remainder of the crop is sold at going prices.
