State Cattle Count Still At 5.5 Million

Total Livestock Value At \$809 Million

Cattle and calves on Kansas farms and ranches January 1, 1968 totaled 5,564,000 head, down 1 percent from last year but 5 percent above the 1962-66 average, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

Hog and pig numbers, at \$41,000 head, were up 7 percent from January 1, 1967 and 13 percent above the 5-year average.

Sheep and lambs totaled 454,000 head, down 3 percent and the smallest number for the

state in 42 years.

Chicken numbers continued the decline of the past decade as numbers totaled 5,173,000, down 4 percent from a year earlier.

Turkey numbers on farms January 1, 1968 totaled 47,000, 20 percent less than a year ago and 30 percent below average.

Total value of all livestock and poultry on Kansas farms and ranches January 1, 1968, was \$809,333,000, down 1 percent from last year but third highest of record.

Conservation Changing Land's Face

Farmers, ranchers and others on Kansas' 82,276 square miles are not leaving the land as they found it, the U.S. Soil Conservation Service says.

"Land forming" is a big item today, because conservation-minded farmers have learned wise use of soil and water resources, and preserving them for the future often requires reshaping the natural lay of the land, George R. Smith, Salina, state conservation engineer for the federal agency, said.

He lists the most important land forming practices in Kansas as terracing, land smoothing, drainage, land grading and land leveling for irrigation — all used to control erosion and conserve moisture.

"These practices are planned

and applied to make the best use of available rainfall and the applied irrigation water for farm production with minimum tolerable erosion damage," Smith said.

"Kansas farmers and conservation contractors have made great progress in applying these conservation practices. In fact, Kansas leads the nation in terracing and in grass waterways."

Richard H. Comer, work unit conservationist in the Shawnee County SCS office, estimates perhaps 30 per cent of the county's 155,000 acres of cropland are subject to some conservation practices.

"We'd like to see this closer to 50 percent," says Comer, but considering that Shawnee was

the last county in the state to organize as an SCS district — in October, 1964 — "this is about average." He said ownership changes have slowed the program somewhat, and indicated progress here can not be easily compared with Brown or Osage counties, where SCS districts were organized 22 years ago.

Smith reports the SCS now is updating the state's conservation needs inventory, and predicts it will show "much conservation work remains to be done and that practices need to be applied even faster in the future."

While there are few farmers who don't know that conservation increases production, there seem to be some who question that such practices increase net profits. Some feel they make tillage, planting and harvesting operations less convenient."

He says farmers who discontinue terracing and contour farming usually cite inconvenience and higher costs, but reports SCS research shows such costs "are far outweighed by increased returns."

To make it more convenient, he suggests eliminating the point rows caused by irregular terrace intervals through parallel terracing, relocating field boundaries to parallel the terraces and put small, odd areas into wildlife use, hay or pasture.

Kansas engineering standards for terraces were revised last year to better enable SCS technicians to plan and lay out parallel terraces, Smith said. Land forming, drainage land grading, irrigation land leveling and irrigation water management recommendations have been adjusted to conform to the new standards.

More Cattle Income, A Committee Goal

Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman has summoned a National Cattle Industry Advisory Committee to meet with him Feb. 19-20 on ways and means of boosting prices and income on beef cattle.

The 38-member committee is composed of representatives of all segments of the cattle and beef industry as well as marketing organizations, consumer goods and other industry persons.

The committee was appointed by Freeman to serve as a liaison between the industry and the government.

"This meeting," the department statement said, "will explore adjustments needed in light of the current cattle and beef situation."

NFO Turns To Meat Boycott, After Disputed Grain Gains

The NFO 3-phase holding action has entered its second section with the militant farm organization asking members to hold livestock from markets, just 30 days after its grain holding-action started.

The NFO says it has members in 35 states and that its all-commodity holding action which will later include milk will boost prices.

The farmer group wants cattle prices increased from 26 to 32 cents per pound, hog prices up from 19 to 23 cents and

sheep from 23 to 29 cents.

President Oren Staley said members would offer contracts only to those meat packers "willing to sign and pay the price."

The grain boycott was called January 11. Staley said the meat embargo was timed to hit gains in grain prices before they reached a level harmful to cattlemen in need of feed.

Prices have risen some since the grain boycott. The NFO, of course, has looked for signs that its withholding has forced an increase. Trade specialists have generally countered that price gains can also be explained by increased exports, grains stored under government loan, a big signup for the 1968 acreage diversion program and the political crisis in Southeast Asia.

The counterclaims cloud the

picture in grain markets, but Staley says farmers can outlast the grain traders as long as grain can be stored under government loan at prices equal to or higher than the market price, a current condition.

Thirty days after the grain boycott started, corn on the Chicago had risen from \$1.13

to \$1.18 a bushel. The NFO goal is \$1.50.

Soybeans on the major markets were, at \$2.73, seven cents over the price when the boycott started. Wheat edged to around \$1.60 at the big grain

trade centers—up 36 cents from January 11—with the NFO asking \$2.

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Little Money Filters To Poor

The conservative radio commentator Paul Harvey recently used Wichita as an example of what he thinks has been a wasteful war on poverty.

A war-on-poverty program there, Harvey says, had funds of \$1,338,600. Harvey said this one and a third million was to help 5000 poor.

The program had a permanent staff of 124 and it added 110 additional employees. Regular employees averaged \$5,000 each and part-timers \$1000.

In short, the people who were to spend the money in the program got over half of it!

That doesn't count offices, supplies, cars and so on.

Average amount left for the 5000 poor of Wichita: \$123.

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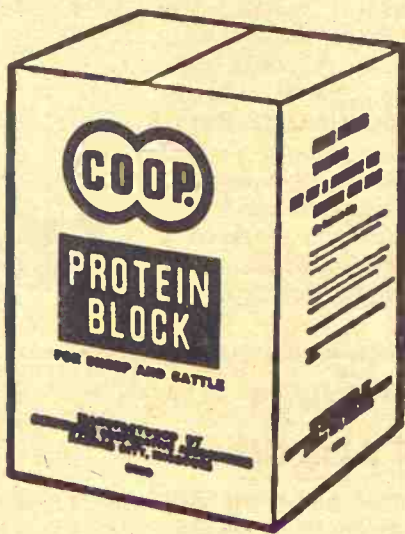

To Sign Or Not For Sorghum Program?

Right now, many corn growers are deciding whether to sign up for the 1968 USDA Feed-Grain Program. In making this decision, one important thing to consider is the outlook for supplies and prices of corn in the 1968-69 marketing year.

With average weather next summer, we think the corn supply will be more than enough to meet all needs, and that prices will again swing around the price-support loan level of \$1.05 a bushel. Here is the situation and prospect as we see it now:

The January 1 USDA estimate of the supplies of corn on hand was 4,215 million bushels (118 million tons — up 15 percent from a year before. Estimates on the supplies of the four feed grains (corn, sorghum grain, oats, and barley) totaled 156 million tons — 9 percent more than a year earlier.

Looking ahead, we see three big questions: (1) How much corn will be fed to livestock and poultry before October 1? (2) How many acres will farmers plant this spring? (3) What will be the average yield per acre?

More Corn for Feed. Most of our corn — about 78 percent in recent years — is fed to livestock and poultry here in the United States. The livestock and poultry industries are not expected to expand much this year. But we do expect a little more corn to be fed, because

corn is cheaper than it was a year ago. The amount used for feed (and lost in the fields) may be about 8 percent more than last year.

Bigger Exports, Too. Foreign buyers are taking more corn than last year, but not so much as two years ago. It appears that exports will be a little more than 400 million bushels — up about 25 percent from a year ago.

Other uses for corn — starch, syrup, sugar, corn meal, grits, alcohol, etc. — increase a little almost every year. They will use up about 280 million bushels.

Total use and exports from January 1 to October 1 seem likely to be around 3100 million bushels — leaving about 1100 million bushels for carryover next October 1 (compared to the 823 million bushels carried over last fall).

1968 Corn Crop. If the weather is favorable this spring, we expect farmers to grow about 56 million acres of corn. This would be 4 million acres less than last year, but about the same as the record small acreages harvested in 1962, 1964 and 1965.

With decent weather, the U.S. average yield per acre would be about 80 bushels. While this would be 2 bushels more than the record yield in 1967, it would be in line with the steadily rising trend of yields over the past 12 years.

With acreage and yields as indicated above, the 1968 corn crop would be about 4,480 million bushels. Added to the carryover, this amount would make a total supply of around 5600 million bushels, or about the same as the 5545 million bushels listed as available in the present marketing year.

If the supply situation develops about as now expected, corn prices would dip below the loan level at harvest time — then rise a few cents above the loan rate by spring or summer.

These figures reflect conditions that seem most likely at this time. But many unforeseen developments may occur during the next 18 months.

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Second Episode Leads To Rustling Charge

Some young men who recently were fined for rustling up a wet field west of White City may have been in other G&G fields for something other than 20-year old "fun-ing."

Two of the three were arrested last week for cattle rustling. They were arrested in Wichita for the theft of four head of cattle near Junction City.

Named in warrants issued by Max Hinkle, Dickinson county attorney, were Lyle Weber, Robert McGee and Paul Atherton, each about 20, of Wichita.

The arrests were made when four head of Angus cattle showed up for sale at the Flint Hills Commission Co. at Wichita. Dickinson county sheriff M. A. Anderson said the animals were taken from a pasture of Marvin Poland.

Weber and Atherton had been fined in Council Grove just the week before for trespassing in the alfalfa field of Lowell Herpich west of White City. They became stuck in the field and Morris County Sheriff Wayne Brooks was called to pick them up.

In the theft on the Poland farm six cattle were taken from the pasture but two escaped when the truck in which they were loaded broke down.

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2 1/2 Percent Yearly Decline In Farms

As many as 16,000 Kansas farms may "disappear" by 1975 if the trend towards fewer but larger farms continues at the same rate as in the past.

The Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service esti-

mates the number of farms in the state for 1968 at 91,000, down from 93,000 a year ago. This number has been decreasing at roughly 2 1/2 percent a year. There were 156,000

farms in the state in 1940, only 135,000 in 1950, and 110,000 in 1960. If this trend continues, there may be only 75,000 farms in Kansas in 1975.

Most of the farms which "disappeared" were added to other operating units. Thus, size of the average farm has grown from 374 acres in 1950 to 551 acres in 1967.

What's behind this decrease in farm numbers? The cost-price squeeze has greatly reduced the margin of profit per unit. This has forced farmers to strive for lower per unit production costs. One way to do this is to spread fixed costs over more acres.

Other ways of lowering costs

are to use more fertilizer, raise higher producing livestock, and specialize in only one or two farm enterprises.

More intensive farming systems combining two major enterprises already characterize the high income farms in the state.

Scarcity and high cost of hired labor and high costs of land will keep the family farm predominate in Kansas. Family farms will become larger and more profitable per operator because of efficiencies in family partnerships.

The premium for good management will increase. Decisions based on better record systems, faster adjustments to changing conditions, and earlier adoption of new technology will help increase net income.

Some of the mechanical and technological innovations now being predicted challenge the imagination and financial ability of the individual and family.

Larger units usually require more financial planning with the lender. They also make possible faster increase in net worth than the smaller over-diversified inefficient farms of yesterday.

Tax management and money are taking a place alongside soil, crop, and livestock production techniques as vital parts of farm management.

It all boils down to this: The farmer who can keep pace with the times will be the farmer of tomorrow.

The new standard will require that the seats of the driver and the right front passenger be equipped with head rests, either as a part of the seat, a cushion added on or any other device which meets the standard.

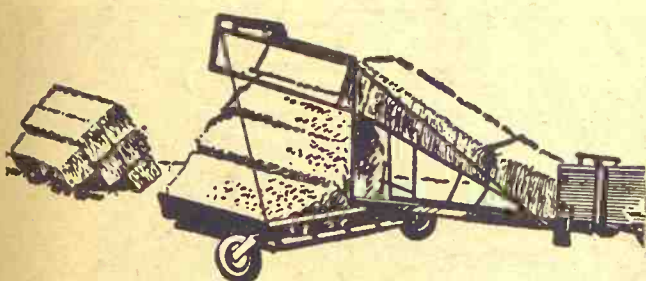

Swine Station Sale March 4

MANHATTAN — A special class of boars hit the auction block Monday, March 4, at Manhattan ending winter tests at

the Kansas Swine Improvement Association testing station on the Kansas State University research farm.

Boars are coming off test daily and about 50 head are expected to pass rigid requirements to be placed in the sale. Breeds include Duroc, Hampshire, and

Yorkshire, according to Wendell A. Moyer, Extension livestock specialist at KSU.

Sale begins at 1 p.m. at Weber Hall on the campus. All sale animals are eligible for registry. Information on each boar includes average daily gain, feed efficiency, backfat thickness, loin eye area, and an overall index. Carcass information is available on litter-mate barrows fed with the boars.

Minimum requirements for animals in the sale include average daily gain of 1.6 pounds or more, 1 pound of gain for each 3.10 pounds or less feed, and average backfat thickness of 1.25 inches or less.

These boars can move into many Kansas herds and start improving hog quality and performance, Moyer said.

Catalogs for the sale are available by writing Kansas Swine Improvement Association, Weber Hall, KSU, Manhattan, Kansas 66502.

- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Mix thoroughly. Mixture will be crumbly but when worked by hand it will stick together. Shape long like a finger. In top of double boiler put 1 cake melted paraffin and 2 6-ounce packages butterscotch bits. Melt over hot water and mix well. Leave over hot water, drop cookies in a few at a time, to coat them. Place on waxed paper to cool.

Fold in 1 cup of the frosting mix to cherry mix. Spread into the pie shell and spread the remaining frosting mix on top. Toast 1/4 cup chopped almonds and 2 tablespoons coconut. Sprinkle toasted mix on top of pie. Freeze at least four hours.

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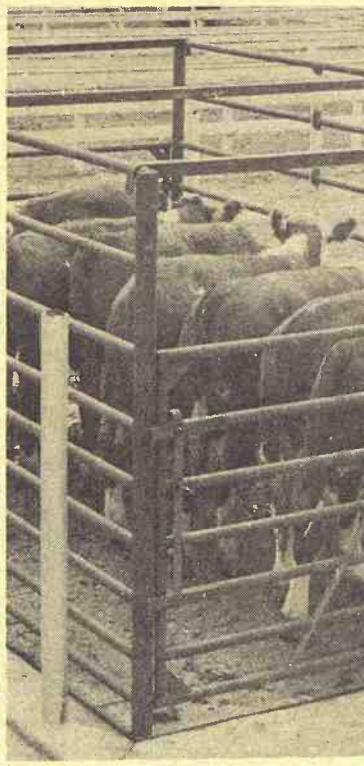
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Pineapple Swiss Steak Is Tasty Party Dish



Count on canned pineapple's golden goodness to give Swiss steak a new twist. Easy does it, just add onion soup mix to syrup drained from pineapple and pour over the browned steak. The full flavor develops as it slowly simmers and there will be plenty of gravy to serve over noodles or other go-along. Add the pineapple slices and touches of green pepper and fresh tomato before serving.

PINEAPPLE SWISS STEAK SAVOY
3 tablespoons flour
1 teaspoon paprika
½ teaspoon salt
4 pounds boneless top round steak (about 2 inches thick)
3 tablespoons shortening
1 (1-pound 4½-ounce) can pineapple slices
water
1 envelope dry onion soup mix

1 tablespoon cornstarch
thin green pepper rings
small tomato wedges
Mix flour, paprika and salt and rub into both sides of steak. Brown in hot shortening in heavy skillet. To syrup drained from pineapple add water to make 1½ cups. Combine with onion soup mix and pour over steak. Cover tightly. Bake in moderately hot oven (375 degrees F.) 1½ hours or until tender. Top with pineapple slices; mix cornstarch with 2 tablespoons water. Stir into pan liquid. Simmer until clear and thickened. Garnish steak and pineapple with green pepper rings and tomato wedges. Serves six to eight.

Be Careful Not To Overcook Cauliflower

Fresh cauliflower is one of the many convenience vegetables. If you want to serve it at its snow-white best, delay cooking until you know that everyone is on hand for dinner. It's very easy to overcook cauliflower and since it tastes as good raw as cooked it's a mistake to give it "just another minute of cooking lest it be underdone. It's also a mistake to cook it too far ahead of time and then try to keep it warm.

A whole head of cauliflower needs not more than 25 minutes of total cooking time. Set it in a 1-inch depth of boiling salted water. Let cook five minutes without a lid, then cover and cook another 15-20 minutes, depending on size of head.

Add a teaspoonful of fresh lemon juice to the cooking water and the cauliflower will stay nice and white.

There are many ways of serving cauliflower. Sprinkle it with bread crumbs browned in butter. Cheese, lemon or tartar sauce is delicious over it.

A Nudge Upward In Price Index

Prices received by Kansas farmers for products marketed were slightly above December but moderately below January 1967, according to the Kansas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

The all-farm products price index was 223 percent of the 1910-14 base period compared with 218 at mid-December and 241 percent last January.

Nearly all agricultural commodities were unchanged to higher than in mid-December except for butter fat and chickens.

Crop Prices

The crop price index was 164 percent of the 1910-14 base period at mid-January, up 5 points from December and compares with 186 in January 1967.

Wheat, at \$1.38 per bushel, was 4 cents above December but 18 cents below the previous year.

Corn averaged \$1.07 per bushel compared with \$1.04 last month and \$1.30 last year.

Oats, at 76 cents per bushel, were 1 cent above last month but 2 cents below last January. **Barley** brought \$1.00 per bushel, an increase of 2 cents over the previous month but 4 cents below January a year ago.

Sorghum grain averaged \$1.69 per cwt., up from \$1.66 in December but well below the \$1.86 per cwt. in January 1967.

Soybeans averaged \$2.43 per bushel, 3 cents above last month

and compared with \$2.67 a year earlier.

Livestock Prices

The livestock and livestock products price index was 290 percent of the 1910-14 base at mid-January compared with 286 percent in December and 304 percent a year ago. The meat animal price index was 337 percent of the 1910-14 base period, up 5 points from December but 12 points below a year earlier.

Hogs brought \$17.30 per cwt., \$1.20 above last month but \$1.50 below a year earlier.

Beef cattle, at \$21.40 per cwt., were up 10 cents from December but 60 cents below last January. **Steers and heifers**, at \$22.80, were unchanged from December and compared with \$23.40 a year ago. **Calves**, at \$25.50 per cwt., were unchanged from last month but 30 cents below January the previous year.

Lambs averaged \$21.70 per cwt. compared with \$21.30 in December and \$21.20 in January 1967. **Sheep**, at \$5.10 per cwt., were unchanged from last month but 70 cents below a year ago.

The dairy products price index was 311 percent of the 1910-14 base in January, unchanged from last month but slightly above the 303 percent last year.

The preliminary wholesale milk price, at \$5.30 per cwt., was 5 cents above December and 20 cents above last year. **Eggs** av-

eraged 20.8 cents per dozen, up 0.6 cent from December but considerably below the 29.2 cents a year ago.

Prices Paid

Prices paid by Kansas farmers for feed were changed little from a month earlier, but slightly lower than a year ago.

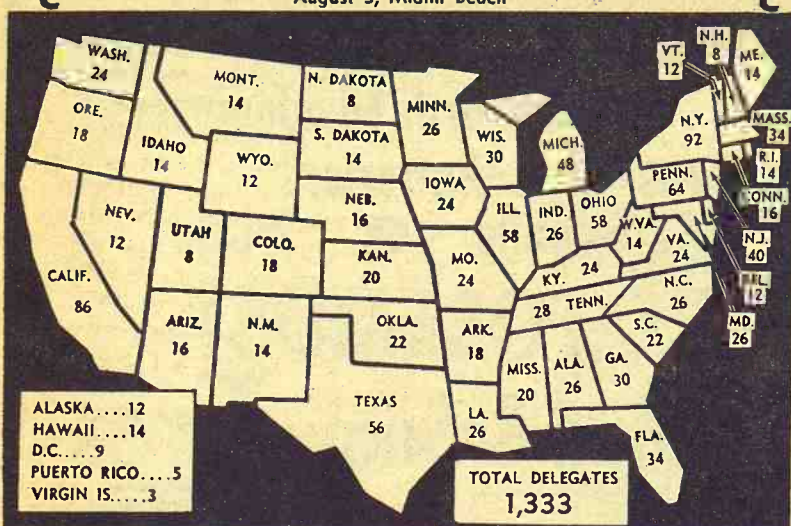

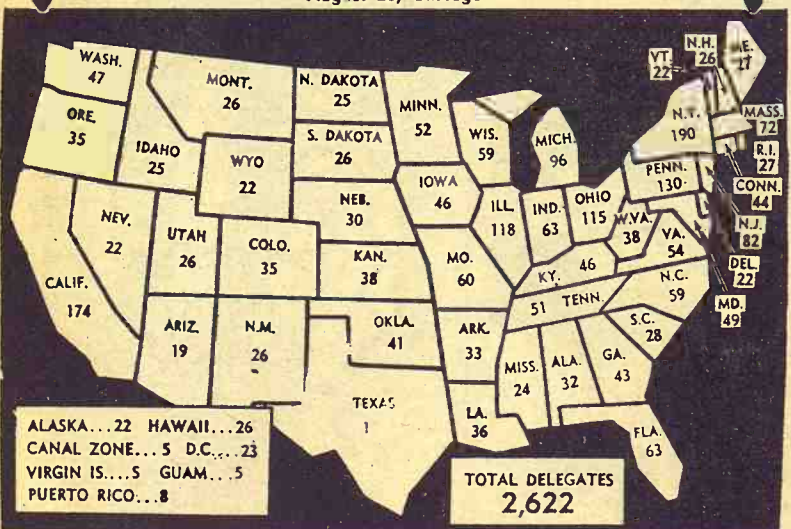

The Democratic convention will be at Chicago three weeks later. Despite the candidacy of Senator Eugene McCarthy of Minnesota, President Lyndon Johnson will win the nomination unless there are drastic political upheavals in the next few months.

Carcass Disposal Problem In Salina

SALINA — Carcasses of dead cattle are posing a health problem in Salina County.

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About Time To Kill '68 Wheat Crop

For this year the estimate is that 130 million bushels will be consumed as food. The assumption is that this will be about 40 per cent of all wheat produced on the 59,000,000 acres. Therefore, each participating farmer will get certificates to cover 40 percent of his "projected" production. This is a word used to suggest what the farmer's average yield should be. It differs from actual average in that yields are gradually increasing year by year, so past history supposedly isn't an accurate measure of what current yields may be.

The value of the certificates is set each year on the difference between the loan (\$1.25 a bushel) and full parity as of July 1.

For the 1967 crop, the certificates were valued at \$1.36 a bushel. The actual value of the 1968 certificate will be set soon after July 1. It will be in the neighborhood of the value last year.

To comply with the 1968 program, a wheat farmer must not only stay within his allotment, but must maintain his conserving base.

This base covers the acres on farm that are being held out of crop production. Last year, the conserving base was reduced 15 per cent to permit a like increase in wheat acres. For this year, the 15 per cent must go back into the conserving base because the wheat acreage has been reduced.

There is no payment provided for a farmer who might want to idle more of his wheat land this year.

In other words, there is no diversion payment on wheat this year similar to the diversion payments which will be made on feed grains.

It is possible for a farmer to harvest up to 50 per cent more than his wheat allotment, and

still get price support, if his excess production is stored under certain conditions.

However, if a farmer wants to plant in excess and store it, he has to sign up for this, also.

To participate in the programs, that is for a farmer to get the price support loans and direct payments, he must sign up. There is no such thing as automatic participation, even if a farmer should be reducing his acreages in accordance with the government provisions. The sign-up is with county ASCS offices.

It's about time to kill the 1968 wheat crop.

There's not enough moisture to suit wheatfarmers, there have been signs of greenbugs here and there, and plants generally lack root growth.

But those are only mild complaints against a crop which is "killed" by a pessimistic trade

Three Properties Of Abilene Mill Have Been Sold

ABILENE — Three properties of the Abilene Flour Mills have been sold thus far in connection with the reorganization of the company.

Sold have been elevators at Larned and Talmage and a lumber and grain company at Longford.

Buyer of the Larned Elevator Co. was Keith Mall, Pawnee. Rock farmer-stockman who plans to incorporate it and continue the operation.

The Longford Lumber and Grain Co. and the Talmage Elevator were purchased by the Central Kansas Milling and Elevator Co. of Salina, which is one of the John Vanier enterprises. Vanier heads the CK Ranch and Gooch feed companies. The Longford holdings included 79 percent of the stock.

The federal district court at Wichita has authorized the liquidation of assets sufficient to pay off creditor claims of about \$1.5 million against the milling company. Key to the reorganization apparently will be the sale of the College Hill Medical Tower in Wichita, owned by the Abilene Flour Mills.

several times, before it gets into bins.

But everybody concedes that wheat has made it thru the better part of winter alive, and that all it needs is moisture. Give it rain and it will grow. It practically always has.

The worrying started a lot earlier a year ago, when extremely dry fall and early winter seemed to some to have counted out a 1967 crop. Late rains revived plants, in time to test them with late spring freezes and finally a wet harvest. Still, the Kansas crop turned out to be 221.6 million bushels, about average.

There has been some light wind damage already in the southwest, and windy, dry springs are always threats to the crop in the western third of the state.

There is some greenbug injury also. The little aphids come in the fall and weaken wheat plants. Usually cold weather will kill them, but apparently there was enough snow cover to insulate them from any cold. At least some have survived, showing signs of life January cold. At least some have survived, showing signs of life on warm days.

Greenbugs can come again later in the spring, moving up from Oklahoma and Texas. But farmers can spray to control them.

The wheat acreage in Kansas this year is down about 8 percent. The USDA program has reduced allotments by 13 percent; thus the 8 percent acreage cut indicates some overplanting.

However, they can plow up their excess acres before harvest and still comply with regulations. The usual practice, of course, is to plow up the poorest looking parts of the field.

Western Kansas is shy of moisture, but then it is nearly every winter. The big wheat-producing counties southwest of Wichita appear to be better off than they were a year ago.

The northern tier of counties is in good condition, although some Eastern Kansas farmers were late in getting their wheat planted last fall because of continuous muddy fields. Such wheat is short now but in no trouble.

Bill In On Farm Bargaining Power

The first bill aimed at obtaining for farmers the same bargaining power enjoyed by organized labor was introduced in Congress last week.

The controversial bill was introduced by Sen. Walter F. Mondale, D-Mich. It comes at a time when the administration is searching for ways to placate restless farmers beset with sagging farm prices and rising costs in a Presidential election year.

Two separate programs would be authorized by the bill. One would include a "National Agriculture Relations board" to supervise farmer bargaining committees. The committees would negotiate with processors for minimum prices and other terms of contracts covering farm commodities.

The other program would extend federal marketing agreements to any farm product. These marketing orders carry a broad range of powers, including collective bargaining for minimum prices. Federal marketing orders at present are in use only in fruits, vegetables and nuts.

Mondale was joined by nine co-sponsors, all from the Midwest and including Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana, the Senate Democratic leader. Sen. Milton R. Young of North Dakota, banking Republican on the Senate Appropriations committee, also is a co-sponsor.

Sen. Allen J. Ellender, D-La., who is chairman of the Senate Agricultural committee, promised early and extensive hearings on the bill. However, no action is expected this year.

The hearings will set the stage for extensive debate early next year when existing farm programs come up for renewal.

The outcome of the elections this fall would have great influence on the farm fight next year.

Mondale said he expected his bill to become a "center of controversy," and that was why he had introduced it.

"Farm bargaining has been debated and considered for many years, but nothing has been done because it has been too controversial," he told the Senate.

"But the time has come to fish or cut bait, to get down to the hard specifics of legislation to see how this concept can be achieved. This proposal is intended to accomplish that objective, by encouraging and focusing debate on the benefits and problems that may be associated with farmer collective bargaining."



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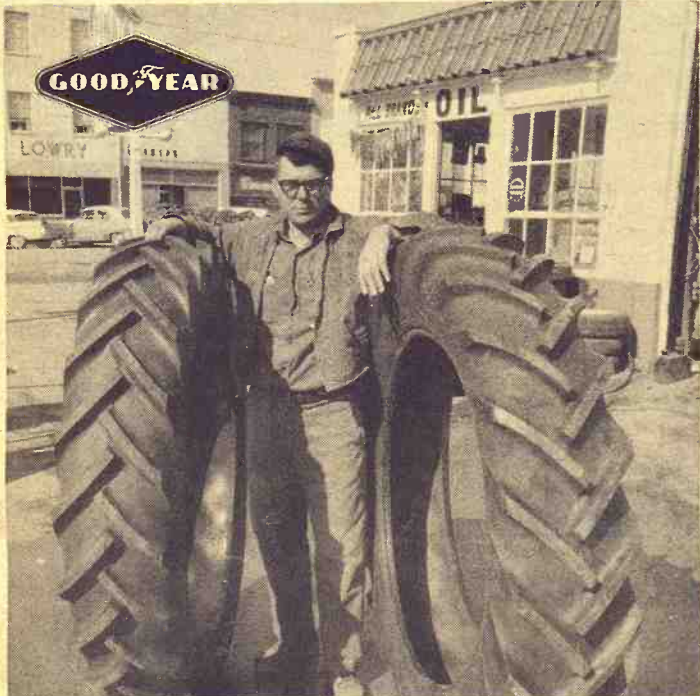

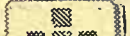

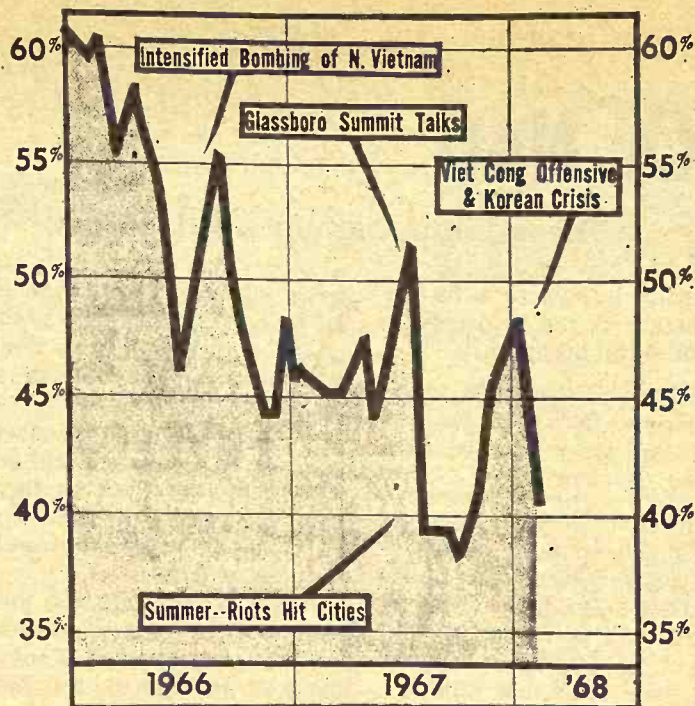

To Sign Up... Or Not?

—Feed Grain Signup Until March 15

The signup for the 1968 feed grains program is one now, opening February 5 and closing March 15.

For the administration the size of the signup is important not only in gaining acreage cuts as prescribed for the specific purpose of reducing supplies, but also as a general measure of support for the present farm program.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman has propagandized freely for it. There is no major campaign on against the signup on either feed grains or wheat, altho the Farm Bureau is generally opposed to present programs.

Whatever Secretary Freeman wants, or whatever some farm organization extols, is not what

principally influences a farmer on whether or not he joins a federal farm program.

What he is interested in is how does it affect him? He gets pencil and paper out and does his own figuring.

In the past two years about as many farmers stayed out of the feed grains program as signed up. About 1.47 million farms of the 3.1 million farms in 1966 were in the program. Last year there were about 1.38 million farms signed up out of 3.17 million farms.

In the case of wheat, 827,000 farms out of 1.6 million farms were signed up in 1966, and last year 822,000 out of 1.7 million farms signed up.

These figures are based on farms; on an acreage basis, the signup is a little larger.

This year the government has reduced the wheat allotment by 13 percent. It is seeking to cut feed grain acres (corn and milo) by about 10 million acres, up to 30 million from the 20 million that were diverted a year ago.

Here are the factors a farmer will be figuring when he decides whether or not he will sign up:

In the acreage reduction or government supply management programs, farms have a crop base.

For instance, each farm that

grows wheat has a wheat base and those that grow feed grains have a feed grains base. Some have both, and they can be interchanged.

A farm's base is established on the farm's history. Farm program activities, figuring the base, allotments, diversion and so forth, are becoming routine business with farmers.

Under the program this year, farmers growing feed grains may get price support if they divert 20 per cent of their base. But they also can divert up to 50 percent of their base and get base, he is eligible for a price more. This is the way it works:

If a farmer simply diverts the minimum 20 per cent of his corn it that he should get a full par-support loan of a national average of \$1.05 a bushel. If it is milo he is growing, the loan will be \$1.61 a hundred pounds. In addition, the corn grower will get a direct payment of 30 cents a bushel on the production of up to 50 per cent of his base. The milo direct payment will be 53 cents a hundred pounds, or 29.68 cents a bushel.

A farmer who diverts only 20 percent of his base gets no diversion payment.

However, he can divert up to as much as 50 per cent of his base, and for that part between the 20 and 50 per cent, he will be paid.

In effect, the government is making a direct payment to him to keep that much more land out of production.

This payment is calculated by multiplying 45 per cent of

Special provisions apply to farms with bases of 25 acres or less.

No crops can be harvested from diverted acres except that such land may be grazed in the winter months.

The national wheat allotment has been set at 59,300,000 acres which compares to the allotment last year of 68,200,000 acres.

Each farmer has his allotment. Those farmers who sign up to stay within their allotments are entitled to price support loans and certificates (direct payments).

The loans are at a national average of \$1.25 a bushel. A participating farmer can get his loan on all the wheat produced.

In addition, he gets marketing certificates to cover that part of his crop consumed do-

mestically for food. The theory is that the should get a full parity price (loan plus the certificate) on that part of his crop consumed in the United States. For that part sold overseas, he would get the world price.

Farm Groups Find Chinks In President's Economic Report

Spokesmen for three farm organizations have agreed that farmers have not fared as well as other sectors of the economy but they disagreed on most other issues raised by President

Johnson's economic report.

Charles B. Shuman, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, called for tighter government economies before any tax increase is impos-

ed.

He said the Farm Bureau will make specific spending cut suggestions "and these will include proposed cuts in government expenditures of special interest to farmers and ranchers."

Harry L. Graham, representing the National Grange, said "We do not agree with those who believe that it is too late for a tax boost to be valuable in the present situation."

The United States has been advising other countries in balance of payments difficulties to raise taxes, Graham said, and "the time has now come for us to take a dose of our own medicine and substitute statesmanship and responsibility for political considerations."

Angus McDonald, research director of the National Farmers Union, urged Congress to crack down on what he called "tax evasion by wealthy individuals" operating farms at a loss to reduce their liability and corporations "buying up millions of acres of farm land as a hedge against inflation and for tax loss purposes."

All their statements were prepared for the Senate-House Economic Committee, which is conducting hearings on the economic report.

The Farm Bureau criticized the proposed international wheat convention, now before the Senate for ratification. Shuman said "It would restrict export opportunities for U.S. wheat farmers and significantly limit their ability to contribute further to solving the balance of payments deficits."

Shuman opposed a proposal to build up a reserve stock of agricultural commodities as "a device to manipulate markets politically."

The Grange spokesman, however, said actions taken by the Department of Agriculture this year to shore up farm prices indicate a change of policy which he said "We are pleased to note."

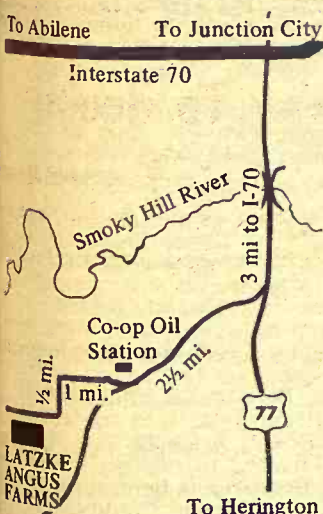

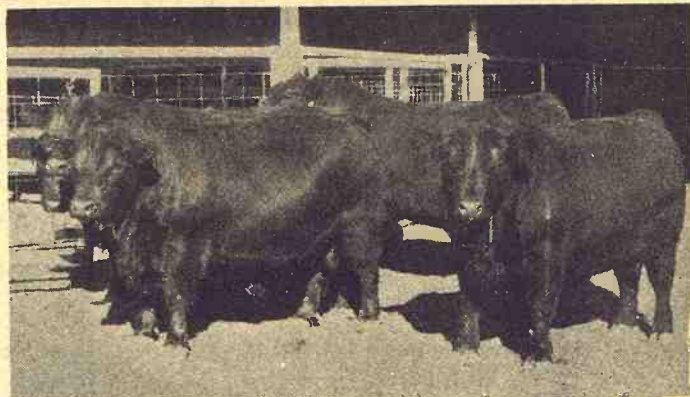

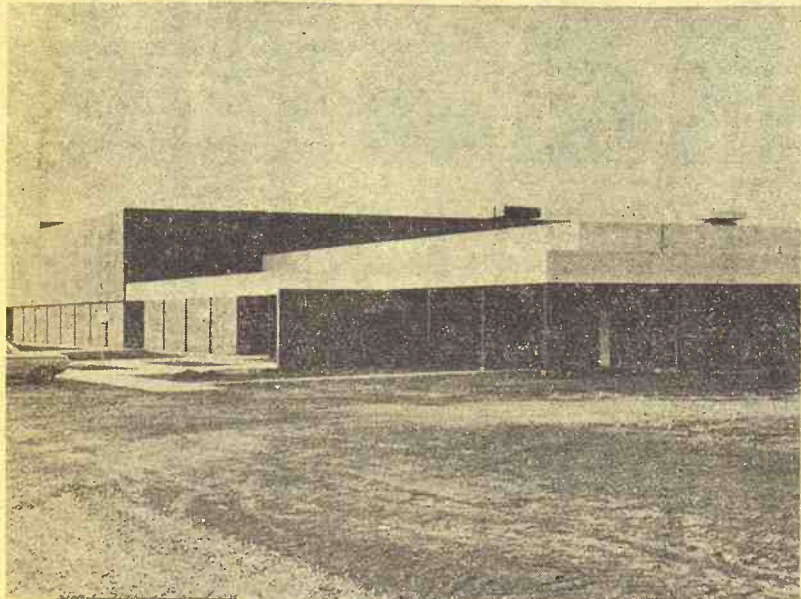

Anhydrous Pipeline Thru G&G Area

A \$14 million anhydrous ammonia pipeline will stretch 800 miles from Borger, Tex., north-east of Omaha and will be laid through McPherson, Saline and Dickinson counties.

Mid-American Pipe Line Co. is building the pipeline, which will run parallel to the company's petroleum line. This line has been in operation for several years.

Work is now underway on the six and eight-inch line in Kiowa county and is expected to progress through McPherson, Saline and Dickinson counties during May.

"The liquid ammonia line will carry from 300 to 800 pounds pressure and will be available to ammonia shippers who meet Mid-American's tariff rates," R. L. Ball, district director of Mid-American at the Conway terminal, said.

Ball said the line will enter central Saline county east of Lindsborg, cutting north east and entering Dickinson county north of Solomon. It then will head toward Manchester.

Plan A Riley County Swim Pool With Retractable Roof Feature

A swimming pool with a sliding roof — a smaller replica of the one planned for the sports center in Kansas City — will be built west of Manhattan as a county project if voters approve a bond issue in May.

Voters will decide whether they want to spend \$300,000 to build the facility.

The project itself will cost \$500,000, but \$200,000 of the amount will come from federal funds, thru the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation, which has recommended a grant of that size if the project is approved.

The plans come from Schwab, Eaton and Associates, Manhattan engineers, and William Eidson, Manhattan architect. If the bonds are approved, the pool could be ready for the 1969 season.

County commissioners said the pool would be available to the four school districts in the county — Manhattan, Luckey, Riley County and Blue Valley — for physical education purposes.

The Olympic-size pool would also be open to the general public after school hours during the winter and in the summer and for the summer recreational program for children.

The eye-catching feature of the pool is a sliding roof which could be moved to cover the pool during the coldest months and retracted to open position in the summer.

The plan also includes a wading pool, bathhouses, and storage facilities.

The pool would be located south of the existing high school football stadium and adjacent to two parking lots which can accommodate 2000 cars.

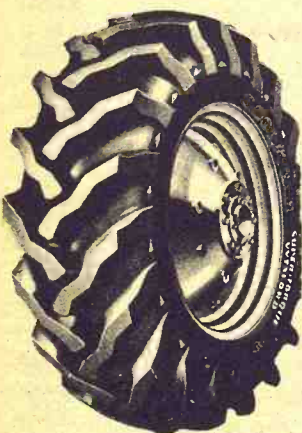

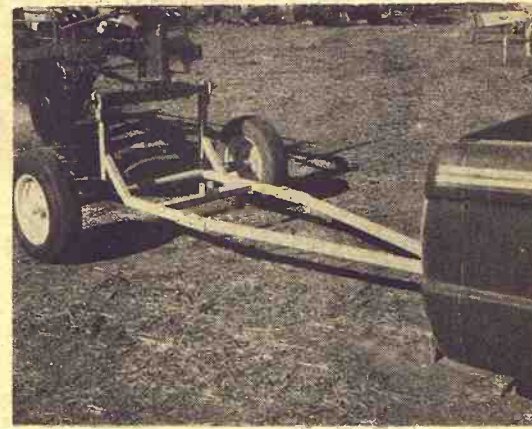

Farmer Lacks Records When He Comes To Borrow,' Says Banker

A Missouri banker has refuted charges that farmers cannot borrow the same as other businessmen.

Willis W. Alexander, president of the Trenton, Mo., Trust Company, told about 230 bankers attending the Kansas Bankers Agricultural School at Kan-

sas State University that the farmer can "borrow" as a businessman if he will "perform as a businessman."

In too many instances the farm customer does not regard himself as a businessman when he makes his credit arrangements, Alexander said.

"The farmer frequently lacks the records that businessmen present; he has no projections, no budgets, no performance checks, and frequently declines to accept the discipline imposed by these records."

"Too often the farmer assumes he is automatically entitled to the credit he desires."

The businessman, Alexander said, accepts his credit as an item to be proven by records of past performance and anticipated results.

The trust company president noted that bankers face a challenge in coping with the ever increasing credit demands of larger farm units. He acknowledged that branch banking offers a possible solution to the problem.

But he suggested other routes which may be used to bring loan funds to a community. "Development of federal intermediate credit bank discounting arrangements and a more realistic Federal Reserve seasonal discount program could be beneficial," he said.

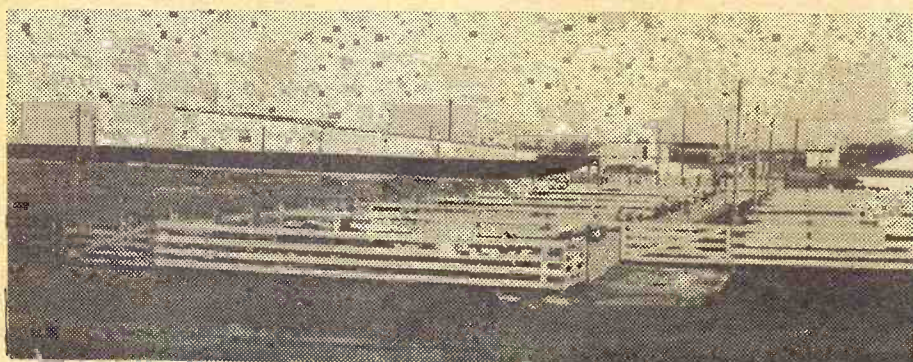
